I. Changes in Population or Boundaries.

II. Comments on Tabular Statement, Form No. I.

2. In the year under report there were 30 meetings of the General Committee, as against 29 in 1912-1913 ; and 274 items of business were disposed of, as against 188 in 1912-1913 ; of these four were quarterly meetings held in April, July, October and January as required by the Municipal Act, and 16 were special and 10 adjourned meetings. There were 87 meetings of the Managing Committee during the year under report ; all these were well attended, as will be seen from Appendices I—A, I—B and I—C.

3. The constitution of the Municipality remained unchanged in the year under report ; there was however a slight change in its personnel. Mr. Bhikubhai Moolchand who had been an elected Councillor at a Bye-election in ward No. 3 in the previous year was disqualified under Sub-Sections 2 and 3 of Section 22 of the Bombay District Municipal Act No. III of 1901. A fresh bye-election was held on 6th September 1913 at which Shet Hiralal Dhanjibhai was returned. Further as regards the Officers of the Municipality Mr. N. S. Mulay, L. C. E., the Chief Officer of the Municipality resigned the post on 30th June and Mr. M. D. Lotlikar, Assistant to the Chief Officer was appointed to officiate as Chief Officer pending the appointment of a permanent Officer. Mr. Lotlikar, however, at the beginning of August had a stroke of Paralysis and had to go on a long leave ; he succumbed to the disease on the 5th December. During this period Mr. K. P. Paranjpye, B. A., L. C. E., the Engineer of the Municipality was appointed to officiate as Chief Officer. He officiated in that capacity for six months when the Municipality took him up on probation for a period of six months on the 9th February 1914. The post of the Assistant to the Chief Officer was given to Mr. R. Y. Mahajani on 14th March 1914.

4. For information regarding the constitution of the several Executive and Consultative Committees and the attendance of the members thereat, reference is invited to statement I—D.

III. Changes in the system of taxation.

5. The system of taxation did not undergo any material change in the course of the year. A new tax on dogs at Re. one per dog per year was sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 5615 dated 30th July 1913 G. D.

IV. Comments on Tabular Statement Form No. II.

6. The year under report opened with a cash balance of Rs. 1,56,126; the Municipal income amounted to Rs. 6,15,453 which includes Rs. 2,00,000 on account of the third instalment of the loan from Government for the Drainage and Water Supply Schemes; the cash balance and the income during the year made a total of Rs. 7,71,579. It may be pointed out here that the income excluding the part of the loan, shown in this as well as in the following paras, is net income; it is exclusive of the refund of Octroi (Vide Government Resolution No. 1147, 19th February 1907 G. D.) The same explanation applies to expenditure also. The income for the year consisted of the following :—

As compared with the previous year's total, the income, leaving aside "Extraordinary and debt" which is only an adjustment account shows a decrease of Rs. 16,643 which is due to the visitation of Plague that prevailed in the City in the course of the year under report. It lasted for more than five months and interfered with the trade of the place.

(a) *Octroi* :—As a separate chapter is devoted to Octroi, detailed description of its working will be given there. During the year under report there is a slight falling of in the Octroi receipts as compared with the receipts for the year 1912-1913 mainly owing to the existence of the Plague.

(b) *House, Bhangi and Wheel Taxes* :—These brought in, in the year under report Rs. 88,578 87,765, 7,892 respectively making a total of Rs. 88,729 as against Rs. 82,220 brought in in the year 1912-1913. The collections made during the year under report, show an increase of Rs. 1,509. The amount of arrears recovered during the year was Rs. 2,584 as against Rs. 2,441 in the previous year. The arrears at the end of 1912-1913 amounted to Rs. 2,941 while those that remained unrecovered at the end of the year under report was Rs. 2,128. It must be said to the credit of the department that the work of recovering the taxes is done very satisfactorily.

(c) *Dog Tax* :—A new tax was levied during the year under report on dogs. This tax realised Rs. 58. The object of introducing this tax is to bring under control the dogs in the City and to empower the Municipality to destroy the rabid dogs.

(d) *Tax on Music* :—This brought in Rs. 1,035 as against Rs. 1,085 in the preceding year. The decrease is very slight and calls for no special remarks.

(e) *Water Rate* :—This brought in Rs. 47,227 as against Rs. 48,068 in the year 1912-1913 showing a decrease of Rs. 841 due to some of the water connections being cut off during the Plague epidemic.

(f) *Trade Registration Fee* :—This brought in Rs. 15,980 as against Rs. 15,430 in the year 1912-1913 showing a rise of Rs. 550; the rise is small and calls for no comments.

(g) *Tax on Plague Huts* :—This brought in Rs. 1,458 as against Rs. 1,055 in the preceding year. The increase is due to the increased tax having been realised on the Plague huts.

(h) *Realizations under Special Acts, Pounds* :—The income from this source of revenue was Rs. 979 as against Rs. 1,120 in the previous year. The decrease of Rs. 140 is due to fewer stray cattle and other animals having been sent to the pound during the year under report as many people had left the City on account of Plague.

(i) *Rent of Land, Houses, etc.* :—The income from this source was Rs. 2,870 as against Rs. 14,374 during the preceding year. The nominal decrease of Rs. 12,404 is due to the fact that in the preceding year Rs. 12,000 were received from the Chairman King Edward Memorial Committee for acquisition of certain lands in the Raste Peth for the Hospital building. During the year under report Rs. 1,500 were received on account of Bolai Quarry which was sold. In previous years the Municipality used to receive a fixed amount of Rs. 50 p. a. for the ownership of this quarry. As the quarry is now sold no rent will be realised in future on this account.

(j) *Sale proceeds of land and produce of land* :—The income from this source has fallen from Rs. 1,054 to Rs. 962 showing a decrease of Rs. 92. This decrease is due to the fact that whereas in the previous year the sale of grass in the Health Camps realised Rs. 163, this year it realised only Rs. 50 owing to the Health Camps having been occupied for the Plague season and thereby impeding the growth of grass near about.

(k) *Conservancy Receipts* :—The income from this head was Rs. 14,428 as against Rs. 8,000 in the preceding year. This revenue represents the amount paid to the Municipality by the contractor who removed night soil and kachars out of the City at his own cost. The increase is due to the contractor having paid the arrears due for the previous year and the amount for the year.

(l) *Fees and Revenue from Educational Institutions* :—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 2,459 during the year under report, as against

Rs. 4,034 in the year 1912-1913. The decrease is due to the fees having been reduced by half throughout the Municipal Schools.

(m) *Fees and Revenue from Markets and Slaughter Houses* :—The income from this source was Rs. 33,150 as against Rs. 30,212 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 2,938 due to higher rent having been realised from the Reay Market stalls and to a larger number of stalls having been occupied.

(n) *Other fees* :—The income under this head was Rs. 1,953 as against Rs. 1,599 in the year 1912-1913 showing a rise of Rs. 354. The increase was due to a larger amount having been recovered on account of comparing fees for extracts from documents asked for by the public in this year, as compared with the previous year.

(o) *Fines under the Municipal Act and other Acts* :—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 1,396 as against Rs. 973 in the year 1913-1914; fines inflicted by Magistrate under the Municipal Act amounted to Rs. 512 as against Rs. 148 in the previous year. There is a considerable improvement this year in the amounts of fines inflicted by the Magistrates. It is, however, desired that the fines inflicted will be more heavy than now so as to improve the efficiency of the Municipal administration and make the people respect the Municipal law. Fines under the Police Act amounted to Rs. 852 as against Rs. 818 in the year 1912-1913.

(p) *Interest on Investments* :—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 1,068 during the year under report, as against Rs. 958 in the preceding year. The increase is due to the amount deposited having been increased and also to a higher rate of interest having been offered by the Bank.

(q) *Grants and Contributions* :—The income under this head amounted to Rs. 18,397 as against Rs. 19,728 in the previous year. The decrease is due to a smaller grant having been received from Government.

(r) *Recoveries on account of services rendered to private individuals* :—Orders from Public Institutions, Government Officers and private persons are executed at the Municipal Workshop. The amount recovered on this account in the year under report was Rs. 2,881 as against Rs. 2,858 in the preceding year.

(s) *Other items* :—The income under this head amounted to Rs. 758 as against Rs. 980 in the previous year. The decrease is confined to amounts lapsing to the Municipality which were much smaller than those in the year 1912-1913.

(t) *Loans from Government* :—A loan of ten lacs of Rupees was promised by Government to the Municipality to enable it to meet part of the cost of the Drainage and Water Schemes. The amount of the loan is drawn in small amounts from time to time as they are required by the Executive Engineer incharge of the works. During the year under report, Rs. 2,00,000 were drawn out of the loan as the third instalment and paid by the Municipality to the Executive Engineer, Poona Drainage and Water Supply Works. Including the

third instalment just mentioned, the Municipality has so far drawn Rs. 7,25,000 out of the loan of Rs. 10 lacs.

(u) **ADVANCES.** (1) *Permanent* :—There is a decrease under this head as the account was wrongly shown under this head instead of under “others” in Col. 61.

(2) *Others*.—Increase is due to the recoupment of the money advanced to the contractors through the Municipal Engineer and (b) to the H. O. for giving rewards to the inoculated persons.

(v) *Deposits* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 28,354. This decrease is more apparent than real as it is due to no grant having been received from Government in the year under report as was the case in the year 1912-1913 when a grant of Rs. 28,000 was received from Government for paying the Maniknala. The decrease is also due to ordinary fluctuations in business.

V. Working of the Octroi System.

7. The area under the administration of the City Municipality, for Octroi purposes, includes, in addition to the City Municipal District, the Cantonment of Poona, the Suburban Municipal District and the Cantonment of Kirkee which has been added as an experimental measure under certain conditions to the cordon from 1st October 1911, as sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 2004 dated 19th April 1909 G. D.; it, therefore, includes four different units. The Municipality levies Octroi according to the schedule on articles imported into the Octroi cordon, and after deducting the amount of duty refunded on account of articles exported and the establishment and other charges from the gross revenue, distributes the remainder amongst the three bodies except Kirkee, according to the population of each District, as sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 4653 dated the 9th November 1895. Kirkee gets the net income from Octroi on its imports, excluding all charges which are deducted from the gross revenue, as was agreed to by the two bodies, the City Municipality and the Kirkee Cantonment Committee. The figures of income and expenditure given in this chapter are, therefore, for the whole of the Octroi cordon including the four districts and not for the City only; while the figures given in the other parts of the report which are for the City, represent the income and expenditure of the City only.

8. The gross income from Octroi in the year 1913-1914 was Rs. 2,77,121 including Rs. 3,591 collected for the Kirkee Cantonment as against Rs. 3,02,602 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 25,481. The decrease was principally due to the prevalence of Plague for five months in the year under report which considerably interfered with the trade of the City. All the classes of articles with the exception of Class No. VI “Tobacco” show a decrease in income, the reason for the decrease being the Plague. In the case of “Tobacco” there is an increase of Rs. 5,937. This increase is more apparent than real. In the year 1912-1913 there was an unusually small quantity of Tobacco imported into the cordon.

9. Out of the gross revenue of Rs. 2,77,121, Rs. 44,243 were refunded on account of exports. Rs. 22,760 were spent on establishment, Rs. 486 were

spent on uniforms supplied to Octroi Peons, Rs. 15 were spent on spring balances for weighing at the Octroi Nakas, Rs. 3,185 were spent on contingencies and Rs. 215 were spent on repairs to Nakas. Rs. 400 were spent on Police establishment. The amount given to Kirkee Cantonment in the year under report was Rs. 8,591 as against Rs. 4,044 in the previous year. Thus the total expenditure amounted to Rs. 71,304 as against Rs. 31,325. Deducting this amount from the gross revenue, the remainder i. e. Rs. 2,05,817 was distributed amongst the three bodies :—this Municipality's share which is exclusive of expenses including establishment charges amounted to Rs. 1,51,919 that of the Cantonment Committee to Rs. 41,753 and that of the Suburban Municipality to Rs. 12,145.

10. The amount of Rs. 44,243 was as mentioned above refunded in 1913-1914 on account of exports, as against Rs. 51,109 in 1912-1913. The decrease of Rs. 6,866 is due to prevalence of plague in Poona. The amount of refund to be paid varies directly with the total receipt and consequently with the decrease in income, there was a proportionate decrease in the amount of refund.

11. The figures quoted above show the results of the working of the whole of the Octroi Department. They show gross income from and gross expenditure chargeable to Octroi. But the figures given in the Statements Nos. 2 and 3 only show the share of the City Municipality in the total income and expenditure. But it does not require separate explanation, as one has been already given in the preceding paras. dealing with the whole of the Octroi system. The Octroi establishment cost 5.21 per cent of the gross income as against 8.61 per cent in the previous year. The appointment of the Octroi Superintendent still continues to be on probation and he has not been drawing full salary of the post.

12. The following table gives information regarding the average consumption of each of the 8 classes of articles :—

It will be seen from the above that the average consumption is within the standard fixed under certain heads such as I, VI and VII; while that under III, V and VIII shows excess. That under III was due to the existence of oil mills; oil seeds when imported pay duty, but refund is not generally claimed on the oil exported. That under Class V was due to various causes, the principal cause being the rise in prices which have gone up all round in the course of the last 4 or 5 years.

CLASS VIII. "Metal."—The excess under "Metal" was due to larger imports of iron-wares during the year under report. There is a regular trade in iron articles and wares; a large quantity is imported every year for building, domestic and agricultural purposes as new buildings are springing up in places; amongst these again corrugated iron sheets have become very popular and are mostly used for roofing purposes. They have replaced tiles in many places. People, as a rule, prefer them to other materials as they do not require repairs or renewals like other roofing materials. In villages they are very largely used; in cities also they can be seen on the tops of most of the new houses. There is one more explanation about this excess and it is this—many persons make small purchases and take the articles to outlying villages in quantities not entitled to refund. These are left out of account, as no refund is claimed for them, and as no entry is made of such exports in accounts. These go to swell the consumption of most of the articles in question, and Poona being the centre of trade in Deccan, the explanation applies to it with far greater force than to other towns. It may be also noted here, that the system of refund is based on a very liberal principle at Poona and has worked in an equally liberal spirit.

The average standard of consumption under Classes I, III and VI continues with the standard laid down, and was due to the larger exports of the articles to the surrounding villages due to famine.

VI. Comments on Tabular Statement, Form No. III.

13. A reference to Statement Form III will show that the total expenditure in the year under report amounted to Rs. 7,71,579 which includes Rs. 2,00,000 part of the loan which was received from Government during the year and handed over to the Executive Engineer for Drainage and Water Supply Schemes to meet charges on account of these works. The details of the total expenditure are as follows :—

The total expenditure amounted, as shown above, to Rs. 6,21,127 in the year under report, as against Rs. 6,45,171 in the previous year, showing a

decrease of Rs. 25,044. All Sub heads with the exception of "D and G" show a decrease. The causes of decrease and increase will be explained in their proper places.

(a) *General Administration* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 39,665 as compared with the last year's total expenditure under the head. This is mainly due to the fact that during the year under report neither bonus to the Municipal servants nor grain compensation was paid which accounts for a difference of Rs. 3,966.

(b) *Collection of Taxes* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 3,362; it was due to less expenditure on the Octroi establishment during the current year owing to the Superintendent of Octroi not having drawn the full salary of the post.

(c) *Refunds* :—This calls for no special remarks.

(d) *Pensions and Gratuities* :—The expenditure under this head shows a decrease of Rs. 4,121; this is due to the fact that in the preceding year gratuity of Rs. 4,800 was paid to the Chief Officer Rao Bahadur Kumthekar.

(e) *Fire* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 1,807. The decrease is due to the fact that the new Engine that was purchased during the current year cost Rs. 3,507 whereas the one purchased during the preceding year cost Rs. 5,350; besides no new shed for the fire Engine was constructed during the year under report which also accounts for the decrease. There were 8 fires in the City during the year causing a total loss of Rs. 19,758 in property. It has to be mentioned that one of these fires that broke out opposite to the Native General Library in Budhwar Peth caused considerable damage. This fire was caused by the lighting of Kerosine oil which was stored in a cellar. Two lives were lost as a result of the explosion when the Kerosine drums exploded. At this fire, it was found difficult to work the Engines owing to the narrowness of the lane in the rear of the house by which lane alone the Engines could be brought into action. The Municipality owes a debt of gratitude to the Sappers and Miners of Yeravada who rendered invaluable assistance in putting down the fires.

(f) *Lighting* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 1,620. This is due to the fact that during the year under report no new installation of lighting was introduced. Under other Sub-heads such as Battiwallas pay, purchase of oil, wicks etc., and purchase of new lights, there is a slight increase.

(g) *Police* :—This calls for no remarks as the Municipality has been relieved of its responsibility in respect to repairs to Police Chowkys.

(h) *Water supply, capital outlay* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 9,325 owing to the fact that during the year under report not much extra water had to be taken from the Khadakwasla canal as in the preceding year, owing to the Katraj tanks being pretty full. The monsoons last year were quite sufficient to keep the Katraj tanks full. During the year under report a new Houd in Kirad Ali was constructed for the convenience of the cattle at a cost of Rs. 473.

(i) *Water supply* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 784. The ordinary repairs cost less during the year under report than in 1912-1913.

(j) *Drainage, Capital outlay* :—The expenditure under this head in the year under report was Rs. 2,01,414 as against Rs. 2,51,925 in 1912-1913, the decrease being due to the Municipality having had to pay to the Executive Engineer for the Drainage and Water Supply Schemes Rs. 2,00,000 from the loan fund as compared with Rs. 2,50,000 paid last year.

(k) *Establishment and Repairs* :—The expenditure under this head includes the cost of repairs to gutters and cleaning the roadside and underground drains both of which cost Rs. 499 less than in the preceding year. It must be stated here that old underground sewers are cleaned each year in places where they get choked up ; some of the important roadside gutters were cleaned once before the monsoons.

(l) *Conservancy* :—The total expenditure on conservancy is as follows :—

"Conservancy" would thus appear to have cost in the year under report Ra. 1,626 less than in the previous year, as the reasons of the decrease and increase under several heads are explained in the following paras. It is not necessary to enter into them at this place.

(1) *General Supervising Establishment* :—The decrease under this head is very small and calls for no special remark.

(2) *Road cleaning* :—This includes the cost of road sweeping establishment, new carts and dust bins and repairs to the same, removal and rubbish from the City, and the changes incidental to it. The expenditure on this item was Ra. 16,959 in the year under report as against Ra. 16,203 in 1912-1913 showing an increase of Rs. 756. The increase is due to an additional temporary establishment having been employed to clean the Fergusson College Road and river side near Lakdipul.

(3) *Bhangi service* :—The expenditure under this head includes the pay of Bhangies, the cost of carting sullage out of the City, new carts for night soil, and repairs to old ones. The Bhangi service cost Ra. 47,844 in the year under report as against Ra. 49,395 in the preceding year, showing a decrease of Rs. 1,551. This was chiefly due to smaller expenditure having been incurred on account of new night soil carts.

(4) *Night Soil Depots*:—The expenditure under this head includes rent of depots and repairs to depots, roads &c. The total expenditure on account of depot was Rs. 1,506 in the year under report as against Rs. 3,001 in 1912-1913, showing a decrease of Rs. 1,495. The decrease is due to the smaller expenditure having been incurred on account of the cost of repairs to the road from Bibewadi to Hadapsar. The contract system of night soil and street sweeping from the City continued in the year under report.

(5) *Latrines and Urinals*:—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 1,434 as against Rs. 1,334 in the preceding year showing a decrease of Rs. 100. The decrease is small and calls for no remarks.

(6) *Road Watering*:—Road watering cost Rs. 5,573 in the year under report, as against Rs. 4,974 in 1912-1913 showing an increase of Rs. 599. The increase is due to the additional cost incurred in obtaining bullocks and drivers.

(m) *Hospital and Dispensaries*:—The Municipality maintains three Dispensaries at two of which English Drugs are used and in one Native Drugs; the latter is, therefore, called Deshi Dawakhana. There are other Charitable Institutions, such as Infirm Asylum, David Sassoon Hospital, Nursing Fund and the Leper Asylum &c. to which the Municipality pay grants-in aid, and the total expenditure on this account amounted to Rs. 5,980, which, when compared with that in the previous year, shows a decrease of Rs. 6,065. The decrease is mainly due to the fact that in the year 1912-1913 the Municipality had spent an amount of Rs. 8,250 towards the acquisition of land for the King Edward Memorial site, money for which was advanced by the Edward Memorial Society.

(n) *Plague*:—The Health Officer of the Municipality having submitted a separate report on plague administration (vide Appendix XII) it is not considered necessary to repeat all the details about the epidemic here. It would suffice to remark here that the usual precautionary measures were taken by the Municipality with a view to prevent an epidemic breaking out and also to lessen its rigour when once broken out. The cost on account of plague and the necessary precautions taken on that account was Rs. 15,811 as against Rs. 10,877 in the previous year. The expenditure of Rs. 15,811 consisted of Rs. 407 spent on rat killing, Rs. 1,180 on Inoculation, Rs. 8,560 on Health Camps, Rs. 534 on Disinfection and Rs. 5,130 on salaries of Medical Officer and the other establishment and on several minor heads. The infectious Diseases Hospital cost in the year under report Rs. 8,488 as against Rs. 7,959 spent in 1912-1913. This Hospital has been under the management of a Committee with the Collector of Poona as its Chairman, the Municipality has no direct hand in its management; it is, however, represented on the Committee by two of its members. There was a serious type of Plague in the year and the Municipality had to keep in order the Health Camps, it had to maintain establishment for it; the rat campaign was continued under the direct control of the Municipality; it had also to pay its share in the cost of the Plague Hospital; all these cost the Municipality Rs. 24,299 in the year under report.

(o) *Vaccination* :—This cost Rs. 1,803 showing an increase of Rs. 188 over the preceding year's expenditure. This was mainly due to the temporary establishment of Vaccinators having been engaged in the year. It is also due to the increase in expenditure in contingencies.

(p) *Markets and Slaughter Houses* :—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 6,802 in the year under report, as against Rs. 7,437 in 1912-1913. The decrease is due to smaller amount having been spent on repairs to Market.

(q) *Pounds* :—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 558 in the year under report as against Rs. 599 in the preceding year. The decrease is due to smaller amount having been spent on repairs to pounds.

(r) *Public Gardens* :—The expenditure under this head in the year under report was Rs. 1,354 as against Rs. 400 in the preceding year. The increase of Rs. 954 was mainly due to the fact that a sum of Rs. 826 was spent on Ambarkhana gardens. The Ambarkhana site opposite to Shanwar Wada was acquired with the help of Government. The Municipality has resolved upon keeping this site turfed and turning it into a garden. The work of laying out a garden is in progress.

(s) *Veterinary charges* :—This represents the annual contribution of Rs. 600 towards the Local Veterinary Dispensary. During the year under report there was an extra ordinary charge of Rs. 8,010 paid towards the construction of the Isolation Ward as per letter No. L. F. 1161 dated 25-7-1913, from the Collector of Poona and sanctioned by General Body in their Resolution No. 91 of 27-8-1913.

(t) *Registration of Births and Deaths* :—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 82. It represents the amount spent on establishment &c. Last year a special Sub-Committee was appointed for the purpose of investigating the causes of high infant mortality and the report of that Sub-Committee is practically ready.

The No. of births reported and registered in the year under report was 1675 as against 1801 registered in 1912-1913. The total No. of births registered in 1913-1914 gives a birth rate of 14.32 per mille, as against 15.33 in 1912-1913. As regards the deaths it may be stated that the total No. registered in the year under report was 5,720 as against 6,329 registered in 1912-1913. The total No. of deaths due to Plague was 1,779, that due to Cholera was 9, that due to Small Pox 270 ; and that due to other causes was 3,662. Of these 2,012 deaths occurred amongst children below the age of 8. The total mortality gives a death rate of 48.89 in 1913-1914.

(u) *Public Works Establishment* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 702 which is due to the temporary Engineer not having drawn the full salary of the post.

(v) *Building Repairs* :—The outlay under this head was Rs. 880 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,219 in 1912-1913. The decrease was due to the fact that no extra work was done at the cremation Ghat as was the case in the preceding year.

(w) *Road repairs and Road widening*:—The maintenance and improvements of roads in the year under report cost Rs. 55,649 as against Rs. 42,890 spent in the preceding year, showing an increase of Rs. 12,759; out of the total expenditure of Rs. 55,649, Rs. 43,520 were spent on road repairs and Rs. 12,129 on road widening as against Rs. 33,582 and Rs. 9,308 spent on them respectively in the previous year. As regards road repairs it may be stated that they include regular road repairs and road patching, keeping the roads free from obstruction and slush &c. Many of the roads in the City had been cut up by the drainage department for laying the pipes. The repairs to the roads were in consequence taken up on an extensive scale. The total length of roads completely repaired during the year was seven miles. As regards road widening it may be stated that the total cost to the Municipality on its account was Rs. 12,129 showing an increase of Rs. 2,821 over the cost of the preceding year. The increase was due to a large No. of claims for compensation for lands acquired having been paid in the year under report.

(x) *Stores*:—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 218 in the year under report as against Rs. 198 in 1912-1913. The increase is due to some Engineer's tools having been purchased in the year.

(y) *The Public Instruction*:—SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES.—The Administration report of the School Board will be found in Appendix XI of the Report wherein is given the full account of the working of the Schools. It is not, therefore, necessary to enter into its details in this place. It may suffice to state here that the total expenditure on Schools in the year under report amounted to Rs. 50,161, while in the previous year it was Rs. 45,577 showing an increase of Rs. 4,584 which was mainly due the salaries of the teachers having been increased so as to enable the teachers to get at least the face value of their certificates. The increase was also due to the increase in house rent of some of the School buildings as also to the new furniture having been supplied to different Schools.

(z) *Contributions*:—The expenditure under this head shows a rise of Rs. 155, as compared with that in the previous year, and it is due to the Grant-in-aid having been given to the Bhoari School and Sevasadan.

(a, a) *Libraries and Museums*:—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 776 as against Rs. 629 of the preceding year showing an increase of Rs. 147. The increase was mainly due to the increase in rent of the house occupied for the Museum.

(a, b) *Miscellaneous*:—INTEREST ON LOANS.—There has been no expenditure under this head during the year under report.

(a, c) *Work done for Private Individuals*:—This shows an increase of Rs. 1,150 which is due to a larger No. of orders having been received during the year.

(a, d) *Address*:—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 484 which includes the cost of the address of welcome and the casket presented to His Excellency Lord WILLINGDON, Governor of Bombay.

(a, e) *Loss account* :—There was no expenditure on this item in the year under report.

(a, f) *Election* :—The expenditure under this head consisted of Rs. 476 and was incurred in preparing new election roll for the year and for a Bye-election held in the month of September 1913 to fill a vacancy caused by the election of Shet Bhikubhai Mulchand having been set aside.

(a, g) *Printing* :—This shows an expenditure of Rs. 454 and is due to printing work having had to be given to other presses in the City.

(a, h) *Destroying stray dogs* :—The expenditure on this head is Rs. 82 showing an increase of Rs. 22 over the expenditure of the preceding year.

(a, i) *Law charges* :—There is a decrease of Rs. 580 under this head, as compared with that with the previous year, and it was due to few cases having had to be defended in the Law Courts on behalf of the Municipality.

(a, j) *Contributions to Pasteur Institute at Coonur* :—The expenditure on this item was Rs. 60 which represents a contribution made by the Municipality to the Institution.

(a, k) *Repayment of Loans* :—There was no expenditure under this item. The amount i. e. Rs. 31,525 is debited to the Municipality and credited to the reserve fund as a provision for the repayment of the loan taken and to be taken from Government to meet the cost of the Drainage and Water Supply Schemes.

ADVANCES. (a) *Permanent* :—There is decrease as last year. The amount was wrongly shown in this col.

(b) *Others* :—The increase is mainly due to money having been advanced to the Municipal Engineer for paying to contractors.

(a, l) *Deposits* :—The expenditure under this head amounted in the year under report to Rs. 29,053 as against Rs. 6,480 in the previous year showing a rise of Rs. 22,573. The increase of Rs. 16,098 during the year under report is mainly due to the fact that Rs. 20,157 were spent on providing pavement to the Maniknala out of advance of Rs. 28,000 given to the Municipality last year by Government.

VII. Acquisition of Land.

14. Eleven pieces of land measuring in all 7109-6-7 sqr. ft. were purchased in the year under report for Rs. 9730-0-8 as against 4 pieces of land purchased in 1912-1913 for Rs. 6,619. No piece of land was sold in the year under report.

VIII. Audit of Accounts.

15. The Municipal Accounts for the year 1912-1913 were audited by Mr. A. C. Rebelle and Mr. N. B. Karnik of the Local Audit Department, the audit was commenced on the 7th July 1912 and lasted till the 26th August 1913.

IX. Municipal Wants.

16. Efficient drains and a good and plentiful supply of water have been prominent amongst the wants of the City and they had solely engaged the attention of the Municipality some years, and it is a matter of congratulation that the Municipality is now in a position to state that the works have been taken in hand since some time, that they have made satisfactory progress during the last 3 years. But now that these two schemes have been taken in hand and they have made good progress. Smaller wants are pressing themselves on the attention of the Municipality; amongst these may be mentioned better road-widening, better road-watering, better street-lighting, opening congested areas, such as Hati Mahal in Shukrawar Peth, Koshtipura in Bhawani Peth, Mali Wada in Budhwar Peth, Bhokarwadi in Nana's Peth, but all these mean much larger expenditure and, therefore, heavier taxation. These may, however, be thought of while considering the question of ways and means for the liquidation of loan of Rs. 10 lacs taken from Government for the two Schemes. The pavement of the Maniknala towards which the Government has last year given a grant of Rs. 28,000 is completed. This has removed one of the standing nuisance in the heart of the City.

GENERAL REMARKS.

17. Government in their Resolution No. 5196, dated the 28th September 1904, extended the Bombay Municipal Servants Act (V of 1890) to the Poona City Municipality so far as it relates to persons employed by or on behalf of the Municipality to perform any of the duties specified (a) in Class I of the Schedule of the said Act and (b) in Classes (a) and (c) of Class II of the said Schedule. In the year under report, the Bhangies and other Municipal servants gave no trouble, having worked quietly and obeyed the orders of the Supervising Staff willingly.

18. Before concluding, the Municipality would place on record its sense of obligation to the various working Committees, Special Committee, for the interest they took in Municipal matters. It would also recognise the assistance given and the work done by Mr. K. P. PARANJPE, the Chief Officer and by the other Officers of the Municipality.

(3, a) The School Board Office and the Municipal schools were under the immediate supervision of Mr. N. H. Parandekar, B. A., Superintendent of schools, for the first nine months. He resigned his place in January last. The Board is in correspondence with Government to have a man of Departmental training lent to the Municipality.

4. *Schools*:—The School Board had forty-three schools under its management. Out of these, thirty-one teaching Marathi, one Gujarathi and eleven Urdu. Of the 31 Marathi Schools 16 were Boys' schools, 8 Girls' schools and 7 night schools. Of the 11 Urdu Schools 5 were Boys' schools, 4 Girls' schools and 2 night

This shows an increase in the daily attendance of the girls' schools only. Appendix 1 (d) gives the information regarding the attendance in these schools.

7. *Teachers*:—There were 178 teachers, on the 31st of March 1914, as against 191 in the previous year. Of the former, 133 were men and 45 women. In the year under report one third-year trained man, 2 second year trained men and 3 first year trained men were added to the staff. One second year trained man was taken on the staff in December last and two women teachers of fourth year's certificate were taken up in January, the two latter being Municipal scholars. It may be mentioned here that the school Board has been maintaining students in the Training College for women, Poona, for the last four years, to secure the services of trained Mistresses for girls' schools. The Educational Department has approved of this policy. The decrease in the number of teachers from 191 to 178 is due to the decrease in the number of attendance.

Detailed information about their distribution and qualifications is given in appendices II, and IIa. From the latter it will be seen that there were 759 boys and 481 girls under trained teachers and 1660 boys and 1024 girls under untrained ones. The Board is anxious to employ a larger number of trained teachers as will be seen from the fact that during the year under report 4 trained masters and 2 trained mistresses were engaged in addition to those of last year. Thus at the end of the year the total number of trained masters and mistresses came to be 75, while that of last year was 69.

8. *Examination of Schools*:—Owing to the out-break of Plague in the city just at the time of the Annual Examination the Deputy Educational Inspector of the District and his staff could not examine all the schools in the city under Municipal control. They, therefore, examined 26 schools only and inspected the rest. Appendix II B shows the details regarding the examination and the inspection.

The following table will show how these schools fared in the last inspection.

From 26 schools 1597 students were offered for examination of whom 900 passed; while 226 pupils were presented for examination from the infant class and 143 were reported to have made good progress. Thus there have been 60 percent passes, which shows a good amount of work.

Boys' School No. 5 was made this year a full primary school and was allowed to teach all the seven standards. This school and the Municipal Boys' school No. 1 sent up 19 and 25 boys respectively for vernacular final examination, of whom 17 and 21 passed.

9. (a) *Technical School* :—There were in the Technical School proper 35 students upon the rolls on the 31st of March 1914, learning drawing which was compulsory for all the students. Of these 8 were learning carpentry, 4 smithy, 10 sign-board painting, 5 wood and metal turning, and 3 mechanical drawing. The average number on the rolls and the average daily attendance were 15 and 12 respectively.

(b) There are special classes for drawing and carpentry for persons who cannot become regular students of the school, and they are charged a fee of annas 4 a month. The teachers and students from Municipal and aided schools and Local Training Colleges are exempted from the payment of fees. The classes are attended by 25 boys.

(c) The school has been under the immediate supervision of Mr. K. G. Kelkar, a graduate of the Bombay Technical Institute, who was appointed in place of Mr. Naidu as the Superintendent of the School. Mr. Kelkar has practical experience and it is hoped that under his direction the school will improve. Among the suggestions made by the School Board for the improvement of the Technical School was one that the Technical School and the Municipal Work-shop should be amalgamated, so that students in the former might get some practical knowledge. The course of the school will also be changed if the

proposal of the Board is accepted by the Municipality. The Board strongly hopes that the Technical School will show at least some improvement at the time of next inspection by the Inspector for Technical Education for the Presidency, which will enable the Board to obtain Government grant which has been withheld by the Director of Public Instruction for the last two years. Qualified teachers have also been provided under the Superintendent for different subjects viz:—Drawing, Carpentry, Smithy, Painting etc. As this school imparts a sort of industrial education, it may be worth while to draw attention to another attempt on the part of the Board in that direction. The Board is shortly going to open a weaving class, and it will be attached to Boys' School No. 20 in Nana's Peth, which is a centre of the weaving community. Mr. Sujauddin Ahmed who has been specially trained for the purpose will be the teacher in charge.

(d) In the year under report the Technical School was not examined by Mr. W. J. Ingham, Superintendent of the Work-shop, (College of Engineering, Poona). Nor could it be examined by the Superintendent of the School owing to Plague.

(e) This school sends up every year students for the first and second grade Art examinations in Drawing. 9 candidates passed out of 15 presented for the first grade Art examination held in November last. 16 candidates were presented for the 2nd grade Art examination and 4 came out successful.

10. Drawing Classes :—The School Board has been maintaining drawing classes in 13 boys' schools and 8 girls' schools. 137 boys and 54 girls attended these classes. They are taught by three drawing teachers specially engaged for the purpose. Their work is supervised by Mr. Yadav, the Drawing Master of the V. J. Technical School. All the students under various Standards on the rolls were sent up for the examination held in October last in Poona High School. Of these 126 were present for the examination and 90 came out successful. The fall in the number of students is due to Plague.

11. Receipts :—Appendix III will give detailed information regarding the funds at the disposal of the Board. The income showed a decrease of Rs. 1751-10-6 as compared with that of the last year. The total amount placed at the disposal of the Board was Rs. 60478-14-7 as against Rs. 54216-2-4 made available for expenditure in the preceding year. This shows an increase of Rs. 6262-12-3. The causes of increase and decrease are fully explained under each head.

(1) *School Fees in Primary Schools :—*In order to make Primary Education more popular by making it cheaper, the Board in the year 1912-1913 recommended that the fees then charged should be reduced by 50 percent throughout. The General Body in July last sanctioned the proposal. It may be mentioned here that the Board is in favour of the principle of free Primary Education and this reduction in the rates of fees is a first step taken to give effect to that principle. The reduction in the rates of fees partly explains the decrease of Rs. 1636-13-6 under School fees, another reason being the closing of the schools on account of Plague.

(2) *Government Grant-in-aid*:—The Government grant-in-aid received was Rs 17,988 as against Rs. 18,150 of the previous year. The Government having revised the scale of grant-in-aid, 50 percent of the total expenditure incurred by the Municipality was paid. (Vide G. R. No. 3058 dated 26th Nov. 1912). This grant was assessed on the expenditure of the year 1911-1912 on Schools within contract; i. e. no special grants were given for the Schools aided by the Municipality.

(3) *Government grant-in-aid to Technical School*:—No grant was received by the Municipality for the School in the year under report. A grant of Rs 61-8-0 was received as per results of the drawing class attached to the Technical School.

Proceeds from land:—There is a piece of land attached to the free school in Nana's Peth. In the year under report no auction was held for letting the land for the purposes of grazing, as the question of giving a portion of the same, free of charge to the Depressed Classes Mission, was under the consideration of the Municipality. It was decided and settled that a piece of land measuring 3 Acres and 30 Gunthas should be handed over to the Depressed Classes Mission Society of India, Poona Branch, at a nominal rent of Re. 1 per year for 99 years. The lease from the Secretary of that Mission will be executed and the piece of land will be given over to the Society next year. The auction sale for the remaining portion of the land will also be held next year.

(4) *Local Fund Grants*:—The grants for the year 1911-12 and 1912-13 were received in the year under report. In the previous year arrears of grant for three years were received; and therefore this item shows a decrease of Rs. 101-2-6. These grants are paid to the Municipality under Section 47 of the Bombay District Local Board Act of 1884.

(5) *Donations*:—The funds that have been placed at the Disposal of the Municipality brought on Rs. 207-8-0 as interest in the year under report. No fresh endowment was received during the current year. The amount of interest received on the several funds was as follows:—

13. Expenditure :—The details regarding expenditure incurred on Primary Schools and other Institutions are given in appendices IV and IVA, with its accompaniment. This would show that the total expenditure of the Municipality on Public Instruction amounted to Rs. 52118-2-8 This shows an increase of Rs. 6124-4-3, over that of the last year. The causes of increase and decrease are given under each head.

(1.) *Establishment at the Head Office :—*This item shows the increase of Rs. 278-5-7 chiefly due to the appointment of a Superintendent for Municipal Schools. (Vide G. R. No. 5558 Dated 22-8-12.)

(1a) *Contingencies, including printed forms, etc.:—*This item shows an increase of Rs. 203-3-4, due to the sufficient supply of printed forms which had fallen short the year previous. Under this head are also included the conveyance charges paid on account of the members visiting schools for inspection, charges for printing the Administration Report with its Statements, cost of dress to office poen and postal charges.

(1b) *Cycle for the Superintendent :—*This is altogether a new item intended to enable the Superintendent to pay frequent visits to schools in different Peths.

(2.) *Salaries to Teachers and peons and Pension Fund:—*Under this head there is a net increase of Rs. 4780-4-1, and the circumstances which led to this increase in expenditure are as follows :—

(1) With increased grant for schools within contract from Government, the Board had to revise the scale of pay of permanent teachers, so as to approach the limit defined in the Masters Code as far as possible. (2) It had to reduce the number of temporary staff and make it permanent, so that the No. of permanent places increased from 124 to 180, for it saw that the work done by temperary hands was necessarily perfumetory. (3) It had to give some relief to teachers who stood last in the scale of pay i. e. Rs. 10. This relief was given in the form of monthly allowance of Rs. 2, to some teachers who were found to be deserving. (4) On the revision of the scale of pay some deserving teachers got promotions and a retrospective effect was given to these promotions from 1st April 1913. So one half of the additional grant obtained from Government was spent on this account.

(3.) *House rent :—*This shows an increase of Rs. 489-3-6, due to the increase of rent for the buildings of boys school No. 5, 18 and girls school No. 2. The rent of the first was doubled from June 1913. That of the second was increased by Rs. 10 and that of the third by Rs. 4 from August. In this connection it might be stated that want of proper accommodation is greatly felt in some of our primary schools. The Board is unanimously of opinion that the Municipality cannot any longer allow the present state of things to continue. Some attempt at improvement must be made at a very early date. This question is seriously engaging the attention of the Board and a definite schem for erecting good school houses will be placed before the Municipality for consideration early in the next year, and it is hoped that at the end of next official [year one or two school buildings will be taken in hand.

(4 to 8.) *These deal with Contingencies including sewing materials, sweetmeats, new furniture, new books and maps and repairs to furniture, books and maps:—* The decrease of Rs. 102-3-3 under contingency is partly due to the closing of the schools for four months owing to Plague and partly to no sweet-meats being distributed to school boys and girls on 12th December 1913, which was the anniversary day of Coronation of his Imperial Majesty George V. There was, however, an increase under furniture of Rupees 1031-5-1, due to the purchase of new 40 tables, 47 chairs, 215 benches, 5 stools, 34 black boards and 2 boxes for the use of different schools. While the decrease of Rs. 102-3-3 under books, and maps is due to non-supply of them to the schools. Under the head repairs to books and maps the increase is very small and needs no explanation.

9. *Repairs to School houses:—*The reason why only Rs. 278 were spent on this head is that the usual annual repairs being completed in the year under report, no bills were submitted by the contractor in due time therefore, they could not be paid in the year. The amount of unpaid bills is about Rs. 950, so the decrease will appear to be properly accounted for.

(10.) *Prizes and Prize distribution ceremony:—*As desired by Her Excellency Lady Hardinge and as the Director of Public Instruction wished that arrangements should be made to observe the 20th of June as a holiday in all schools on account of the Viceroy's recovery after the attempt made on him at Delhi and to carry out arrangements suggested by Lady Hardinge in her letter of 20th March, the 20th June was observed as holiday and sweetmeats were distributed to all the primary school boys and girls from the Municipal, aided and unaided schools in the city. The Municipality had requested His Excellency the Governor of Bombay to preside on the occasion, and to this His Excellency kindly consented. The ceremony was a grand success. All the school boys and girls from all schools—Municipal and others—were gathered together in the Reay Market. His Excellency the Governor went round the Market Building and saw the great assemblage of children. He also addressed from the chair some words of advice to school children and distributed prizes and sweetmeats to them. Nearly 12000 pupils were present on the occasion. There was a large gathering of ladies and gentlemen also who were invited specially for the occasion. The Portrait of His Majesty George V, presented to the Municipality by Prof. S. K. Pimpalkhare, was unveiled by His Excellency. The Secretary of the School Board and his office staff deserve credit for the arrangements. The expenditure on this occasion was Rs. 1063-8-8.

(10a) *Prizes from the interest on donations:—*The prizes worth Rs. 10-8-0 were awarded to the girl students from the fifth standard who came first in Arithmetic and needle work. This sum represents the interest derived from the K. C. Dhole Prize Fund. Prizes worth Rs. 24-8-0 were awarded to the students in the girls' High-School from the interest derived from the Duke of Albany Memorial Fund. Prizes to the value of Rs. 17-8-0 were given to the students in the Training College for women from the interest derived from Bhima Aba Puranik Prize Fund. Prizes of the amount of Rs. 35 for the year 1912-13 and 1913-14 were awarded to students according to the conditions of the Narayan Govind Apte Prize Fund. No Godbole Scholar-ship was awarded, in the year

under report as there was no claimant. A scholarship of Rs. 12 was given to a Mahomedan student from the interest derived from Shet Suleman Latha Prize Fund. The scholarships which were left unpaid will be paid next year.

(11) *Scientific apparatus*:—Under this head only Rs. 28-4-0 were spent. So the sum is too small to require an explanation.

(12) *Gymnasium*:—Under this head there is a small decrease of Rs. 24 which scarcely wants an explanation.

(13) *Municipal School Library*:—Has an increase of Rs. 12 only.

(14) *Contingency for Drawing Classes*:—The increase being very small, explanation is hardly necessary.

(14 a) *Scholarships to Students in the Training College for Women*:—There were only two students learning from the beginning of the official year and they have been given scholarships of Rs. 8 each p. m. on condition that they serve under the Municipality for at least five years. These two scholars passed the fourth year Training College-examination this year and they are employed in girls' schools Nos. 1 and 5. Last year there were three students learning, while in the year under report there were two, hence the decrease of Rs. 84-14-5 under this head.

(15) *Technical School Establishment* :—The decrease under this head is due to the vacancy for the first two months of the post of the Superintendent of the Technical School.

(15 a) *Contingency and Scholarships to pupils* :—Under this head there is an increase of Rs. 241-2-7 chiefly due to bills for the last year, being paid in this year. Similar was the case with bills of scholarships.

(16, 17 & 17 a) *Machinery to Technical School , repairs to the same and Oil Engine repairs*:—No machinery was supplied to the Technical School in this year. But oil engine repair is a new item. Six burner-coils were purchased at a cost of Rs. 46-4-0.

(18) *Aid to Urdu indogenous School in Ganesh Peth*:—A quarterly grant of Rs. 45 was given to this school instead of a monthly grant.

(19 a) *Aid to the Poona Islamia School* :—A grant of Rs. 300 was given to the school. Boys and girls from the city attended it.

(20) *Aid to Sanskrit Pathashala* :—The amount of Rs. 150 was paid to this institution as in the previous year.

(21) *Grant to Bhora School Rawiwar*:—As recommended by the School Board in the year 1912-13 and sanctioned by the General Committee in the year 1913-1914, a grant of Rs. 150 was paid to this School in the year under report.

(22) *Libraries* :—Grants of Rs. 100 to Native General Library, Poona and of Rs. 50 to the Jewish Reading Room, Poona were paid, while nothing was given to Raste Peth Library and Islamia Library in Vetel Peth, as they did not produce any document proving that they were registered.

(23) *Museum* :—Under this head there was a decrease of Rs. 1-2-0 in the establishment, but the rent increased from Rs. 10 to 25 a month from June last, and so there is an increase of Rs. 135.

(23 a) *Grant to Seva Sadan* :—This Institution was registered by the Municipality for Grants-in-aid as it serves the useful purpose of educating such women as cannot attend the Girls' School. Rs. 300 is a grant allotted to this.

(24) *Grain Compensation* :—Expenditure under this head is only Rs. 7-3-5.

(25, 26, 27) *Gratuity, Bonus and Scholarship to students sent to Bombay to learn Weaving* :—There was no expenditure incurred under these heads this year.

The Board expresses its thanks to Mr. Ghate, Assistant Deputy Educational Inspector Poona, for giving Magic Lantern demonstrations to teachers in Municipal Schools.

In conclusion, I have to acknowledge with thanks the help and co-operation received by both the chairmen at the hands of their colleagues on the Board.

I also take this opportunity to place on record my sense of appreciation of the prompt and efficient manner in which the Secretary of the Board Mr. K. P. Paranjpye discharged the duties of his office.

I have the honour to submit my report on Plague Measures in Poona City Municipal District for the year 1913—1914.

The city remained free for about four months i.e., from the end of March to the end of July. The mortality from plague during the Epedemic under report was as under:—

The infection in the western part of the city appears to me to have been brought from Wai. A student had come here to join his school from Wai. The very next day of his arrival here he was down with plague and died in house No. 502 Shanwar Peth. About a week after his death dead rats were found in 503 Shanwar Peth and a case occurred in the same house. Soon after cases commenced to occur in that locality and the infection slowly spread over the Western part of the city. Simultaneously with this, infection broke out in Shukurwar Peth. It rapidly extended towards the south and took hold of Shukurwar, Vetel, Ganj and Ghorpadi Peths. The epizootic amongst rats and the epedemic amongst men appeared simultaneously. The mortality rose to the highest point in October. The epedemic on the whole was of a milder character.

The measures adopted for the prevention and suppression of plague were nearly the same as those adopted in the previous years except that of providing the medical relief to poor and destitute patients into their own houses. The measures were:—(1) Collection of information of Plague cases and deaths and registration of the same. (2) Disinfection of infected tenements. (3) Removing patients that were willing, to the Hospital. (4) Inoculation. (5) Evacuation. (6) Destruction of rats.

(1) *Collection of information of plague cases*:—An establishment of 2 Karkoons was entertained for registering deaths and issuing death passes. The supervising staff of the Health Department collected information about plague cases.

(2) *Disinfection of infected tenements*:—This was carried on systematically with Kerosene Emulsion, which was prepared by me. The work of disinfection was carried out by eight men divided into two parties, each acting under a Mocadam and an Inspector at the head of both the parties. I occasionally checked their work.

(3) *Removing patients to the Hospital*:—There was only one Hospital viz., the Infectious Diseases Hospital where patients from the City, Suburb and Cantonment were treated. This was under the control of the Government and managed by a Committee appointed for the purpose. The removal of patients to this Hospital was entirely voluntary. About 216 patients were treated in this Hospital. of these 153 died. The percentage of cured was 24.

(4) *Inoculation*:—This measure being the most important was carried on extensively. The Government had kindly lent the services of 2 Assistant Surgeons to carry on the work and they were assigned fixed stations for some time. One of them was placed in the Reay Market and the other in Ganj Peth. Then they were made to go from Peth to Peth. Besides these, two Assistant Surgeons, Drs. Shikhare, V.C. Gokhale, V.B. Gokhale, Phadke, Phatak, Bapat, Sardesai, Paranjpye, Bhide and Kirtane carried on inoculations in their own Dispensaries and private houses. In addition to all these I had a fixed station in the Health Office where I inoculated all those who came for it, and also went round and visited many private dwellings and exhorted the inmates to undergo the operation. Rewards were given to persons in poor circumstances, who allowed themselves to be inoculated, at the rate of four annas for an adult and two annas for a child. The total number of inoculations performed during the epidemic was 12973; out of these 2973 were performed by me. Most of the inoculated lived in the city. Very few had any rise of temperature. Amongst the inoculated there were five who were attacked with plague within ten days, out of which 4 proved fatal, and eighteen were attacked after 10 days, out of which ten died. The number as above recorded viz., 23 is much less in proportion than the attacks on the population of the city as a whole. The results on the whole were very satisfactory. The total figure of inoculations was only 12,973 as no operations were carried out in those parts of the city that were free from infection; so also the quarters of depressed classes were let alone, as no signs of infection were seen there.

(5) *Evacuation*:—The people are now fully alive to the necessity of leaving infected quarters and flying to the Health Camps at the first appearance of plague. All the Municipal camps viz., East and West Bhamburda, Erandavna and Sogar's Gate were fully occupied. The 5th Camp which was at Narayan Wadi being found malarious and unhealthy, was removed to Erandauna site. Besides these camps a number of huts were erected by well-to-do persons for their own use on the extensive open land on the western side of the city, where they

removed themselves. In addition to the four Health Camps the Municipality had rented a large plot of land near the Bhamburda Camp, on which people might put up their own huts. Besides those that go to reside in Health Camps many had left the city and had gone to the neighbouring cities and villages. A rough census was taken, and it was then ascertained that nearly 70,000 persons had left the city.

(6) *Destruction of rats* :—This measure was given up last March on the advice of best authorities. But as soon as the signs of the epidemic appeared, it was begun again. The work was entrusted to an Inspector with a party of 4 coolies under him. They set traps in the infected and threatened localities. All rats caught were dissected and examined for plague by a man trained in this work by the Plague Research Commission. In all 23,119 rats were caught.

In all the Plague measures, the people co-operated with the Municipality most cordially.

In conclusion, I beg leave to state that the Assistant Surgeons on inoculation duty and other subordinates performed their duties satisfactorily.

I have the honour to submit the following Report on the Administration of Municipal Schools for the year 1913-1914.

2. *Constitution of the Board.*—The School Board consisted of (1) Rao Bahadur Ramnarayan Amerchand, (2) Sardar N. T. Rajamachikar, B. A., (3) Prof. H. G. Limaye, M. A., (4) Mr. B. V. Mudliar, (5) Mr. H. N. Apte, (6) Shet Krishnadas Govardhandas Madiwale, and (7) Shet Hanmantram Ramnath. Rao Bahadur Ramnarayan Amerchand was the Chairman of the Board, for the first nine months of the year, but owing to his other engagements he resigned his Chairmanship in January 1914, and Shet Krishnadas Govardhandas Madiwale was elected Chairman of the Board for the remaining part of the year. Sardar Rajamachikar resigned his seat on the Board in October 1913, and his place was filled up by Shet Ebrahim H. Jaffer in the same month under a resolution of the General Committee of 3rd October 1913.

3. *Meetings and Visits to Schools.*—There were twenty-one meetings of the School Board as against thirty-one of the previous year. 432 items of business were disposed of at these meetings, and 52 by circulation, while last year, the corresponding figures were 579 and 17 respectively. More meetings could not be held in this year owing to the prevalence of plague in the city for four months. Still the work actually done was satisfactory. The Board had to deal with many important questions. It successfully tackled the question of the revision of the Masters' schedule, which was under consideration for two

schools. It will appear that one Urdu school is an addition to the number of this class of schools to that of last year. The General Committee at its meeting held on 23rd June 1913 sanctioned the opening of this school on the recommendation of the Board. It is located in Ganesh Peth, and has a fair number of boys on the roll. The locality has a large Mahomedan population and so it is hoped, the school, will prosper. This measure, and also the opening of an English Class in Urdu School No. 10 (for which the sanction of the Director of Public Instruction is obtained) cannot fail to secure the advancement of the Mahomedan community in the matter of education. It will appear from these facts how anxious the Board is to advance interests of that community so far as the education of their boys is concerned. The English teacher is appointed on Rs. 25 per month.

The Marathi Class attached to the Technical School was abolished owing to very poor attendance.

The 43 Schools may also be classified as schools paying fees and free schools. The former are 12 and the latter are 31. Of these thirty-one, ten are boys' schools, twelve girls' schools and nine night schools. Out of 10 boys' free schools, three are for depressed classes, two for Mahomedans and five for other castes. The Municipal Technical School is not included in the 43 schools above mentioned. It is not free.

5. *Pupils in primary schools* :—The number on the rolls decreased in the course of the year under report from 4142 to 3936. This slight decrease is due to plague in the city for nearly four months. All schools had to be closed from October to December 1913, and some of them had to be closed in the months of August and September also. When the schools were reopened in January 1914, the number on the rolls was 3327. This number began to increase very rapidly and went up to 3936 on 31st March 1914. By the end of June 1914 it reached 4400 in round numbers. This will show that there is no reason to fear that the Municipal Schools are getting unpopular. The schools had a fairly large attendance in spite of the circumstances stated above. Out of the number on the rolls, 2257 were boys and 38 girls in boys' day schools; 110 boys in night-schools; and 1473 girls in girls'-schools. Information about their caste, age, social condition and occupation of parents and guardians is given in appendix I, I (a & b) and I (c)

It is worthwhile noticing that these schools consisted mainly of scholars who are the sons and daughters of Government and private servants, merchants and labouring classes. 783 boys and 617 girls were above 5 and under 8 years of age. 1139 boys, 831 girls above 8 and 12 years of age, 342 boys and 54 girls above 12 and under 15 years of age, and 151 boys and 19 girls above 15 years of age. The corresponding figures for the last year were 783, 672, 1279, 725, 400, 102, 168, and 7. Only 3.5 per cent of the boys and 2.5 per cent of the girls were married, while out of 2275 boys in the day schools, 2218 were unmarried and out of 1511 girls 33 were married.
