1. There have been no changes in population or boundaries during the year 1918-19.

II. COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT NO. 1.

2. The number of meetings of the General Body held during the year was 90 as against 93 in the preceding year and 645 items of business were disposed of, as against 505 disposed of in the year 1917-18. Out of these 90 meetings, four were ordinary quarterly meetings held in April, July, October and January as required by the Municipal Act, 21 were special and 65 adjourned. 55 Meeting of the Managing Committee were called during the year under report, out of which 14 were adjourned for want of quorum, as will be seen from appendices 1-B and 1-D.

3. The constitution of the Municipality remained unchanged, but its personnel underwent many changes during the second half of the year under report. The triennial elections of the Municipal Councillors were due in March 1918 and the new body of Councillors would have come into power from 1st April 1918; but owing to the prevalence of plague till about the end of February 1918, the Municipality represented to the Commissioner C. D. the desirability of extending the period of office of the members by another six months. Further, several works of public utility launched during the regime of the old Councillors required their care and attention for some time more. These reasons appealed to the Commissioner O. D. who extended the term of Office of Councillors till the end of September 1918. Shet Kisandas Vishnudas was returned at the bye-election held on 13th July 1918 caused by the death of Mr. G. G. Dharap.

The new elections were held in the month of September 1918, and brought in many new members. Out of the twenty-six elected members, fourteen were already on the old Board and 12 were new. Of these 26, 14 were Brahmins, 1 Prabhu, 1 Mudliar, 1 Marwadi, 3 Gujarathi Baniyas, 1 Parsi, 1 Lingayat and 1 Shimpi. The twenty-six members can be subdivided

as under with respect to their callings :— 1 editor, 2 medical practitioners, 1 Vaidya, 5 pleaders, 1 actuary, 1 professor, 1 manager of a students' hostel, 7 merchants, 1 contractor and 6 landlords. The new body came into office, on 1st October 1918. Mr. H. N. Apte, a nominated Councillor, who had been the President of the Municipality for the last three years, died on 3rd March 1919. He had been a councillor for the last 20 years, and by his death, Poona lost a great author, a man of vast learning and a sincere worker who was closely connected with almost all educational, literary, social and religious institutions and movements in Poona and Bombay.

4. For information regarding the constitution of the several executive and consultative committees and the attendance of the members thereat, reference is invited to the Appendix No. 1-D.

### III. CHANGES IN THE SYSTEM OF TAXATION.

Although the system of taxation underwent no change, certain alterations were effected in the rates of taxes, such as those of Octroi, House-tax, Wheel-tax and General Water-cess. These measures were undertaken with a view to improve the financial position of the Municipality which had been called upon to meet extra expenditure entailed by the Drainage and Water Supply loan and the upkeep of these works. The revised taxes were sanctioned by Government ( vide G. R. No. 6649 dated 25th September 1918 G. D., G. O. No. 8843 dated 13th December 1917 G. D., G. O. No. 2126 dated 22nd March 1918, G. D. and G. O. No. 3782 dated 31st May 1918, G. D. respectively).

The Trade Registration Fee was altogether abolished and most of the articles liable to duty under Trade Registration were included in the Octroi Schedule. The whole Octroi Schedule as revised came into force from 1st January 1919. The effect of this revision will be an additional income of about Rs. 75,000 per year.

The rate of house-tax was increased from 4 to 5 per cent on the annual rental value of houses. The revised rate came into force from 1st April 1918 and brought an additional income of Rs. 10,000.

Motors, Motor-cycles &c., which had escaped wheel-tax until now, were included in the schedule of conveyances liable to pay wheel-tax. Wheel-tax was levied on them from 1st April 1918.

### IV. COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT, FORM NO. 2.

6. The year under report opened with a cash balance of Rs. 75,165. The income amounted to Rs. 5,91,794, both these together made up a total of Rs. 6,66,959. It may be pointed out here that the income shown here as well as in the following paras is net income. It is exclusive of the refund of octroi ( vide G. R. No. 1147 dated 19th February 1907 G. D.),

As compared with the previous year's total, the income (leaving aside "extraordinary and debt" which is only an adjustment account) shows an increase of Rs. 33,383 which is due principally to increased revenue from municipal rates & taxes.

(a) *Octroi*:—As a separate chapter is devoted to Octroi a detailed description of its recoveries and working will be given there.

(b) *House, Bhangee and Wheel-taxes*:—These brought in during the year Rs. 59,667, Rs. 36,083 and Rs. 8,866 respectively making a total of Rs. 1,04,616 as against Rs. 51,160, Rs. 38,213 and Rs. 8,180, making a total of Rs. 97,553 in the year 1917-18. The collections made during the year under report show an increase of Rs. 7,063. The increase is explained by the fact that house tax was revised, in place of the 4 p. c. tax on the annual rental value of houses, a 5 p. c. tax was levied.

Similarly, motors, and motor-cycles, which were taxed for the first time in the year under report, account partially for the increase. The increase would have been still more marked, had it not been for a number of objections raised by several house-owners to the payment of dues on the ground that individual notices were not served on them about the increased assessment. Further, the last two valuable months viz. February and March 1919, were lost by the clerks in charge of the recoveries of assessment dues, as they were called upon to render assistance to the special Officers who were appointed to complete the entire revision of the house-tax assessment of the whole city during these two months.

- The amount of arrears recovered during the year was Rs. 5,239 as against Rs. 5,896 in the previous year. The arrears at the close of the year 1917-18 were Rs. 5,798 while those that remained to be recovered at the close of the year under report were Rs. 12,231.
- (c) *Tax on Professions and Trades*:—This brought in Rs. 1,183 during the year as against Rs. 633 in the year 1917-18 showing an increase of Rs. 550 which was wholly due to larger recoveries from music passes, as the year had a very busy marriage season.
- (d) *Water-rate*:—This brought in Rs. 66,493 during the year as against Rs. 59,861 in the year 1917-18 showing an increase of Rs. 6,632 which was due to a large number of new water connections taken by the house-owners during the year under report. The number of water connections during the year was 3,648 as against 3,250 in the previous year. Another cause of this increased revenue was that during the second half of the year under report, a general water cess at a rate of Rs. 1 per half year was levied from the owners of houses who had not taken piped supply and whose houses were situated at a distance not exceeding 100 yards from the nearest municipal main [ vide G. O. No. 3782, (G. D.) dated 31st May 1918 ]. The recoveries on account of this tax during the latter half of the year amounted to Rs. 4,437.
- (e) *Trade Registration Fee*:—This brought in Rs. 12,961 during the year as against Rs. 20,406 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 7,445. The deficit was only apparent and not real. What was lost under this head was compensated under Octroi. It was due to the fact that Trade Registration Fee was altogether abolished from 1st January 1919 and most of the articles subject to this fee were embodied in the schedule of articles chargeable under Octroi.
- (f) *Tax on Plague huts*:—This brought in Rs. 248 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,643 in the year 1917-18 showing a decrease of Rs. 1,395. The decrease is due to the fact that there was no out-break of plague in the City and no one went out of the City to live in huts. The amount of Rs. 248 recovered was on account of the arrears of the year 1917-18.
- (g) *Dog Tax*:—This brought in Rs. 258 as against Rs. 315 showing a decrease of Rs. 57.
- (h) *Realizations under special Acts—Founds*:—The income from this source of revenue was Rs. 1,765 as against Rs. 1,604 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 161. The number of cattle impounded in the year 1918-19 was 7768, whereas in the year of 1917-18 and 1916-17 they were 6488 and 4575 respectively.

- (i) *Rent of lands, houses &c.*—The income under this head was Rs. 1,356, while it was Rs. 1,060 during the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 296. The increase is partly due to a larger amount realised as rent on account of temporary encroachments on roads for erecting mandaps and for dinners and partly to recovery of rent of lands leased out to the King Edward Memorial Hospital.
- (j) *Sale proceeds of lands and produce of lands* :—The income from this source was Rs. 1,882 as compared with Rs. 1,649 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 233 which was due to larger amounts realised from the auction sales of grass, fruits, &c.
- (k) *Conservancy receipts* :—The income under this head was Rs. 6,943 as against Rs. 21,571 during the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 14,628. The decrease is partly due to the fact that there was less amount realised from sale of kachara as there was no demand for kachara manure owing to scarcity of water to irrigate the fields and partly due to the fact that there was no income from the manure of the night-soil as it was admitted into the sewers and thus lost for manure.
- (l) *Fees and revenues from Educational Institutions* :—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 1,981 as against Rs. 1,835 in the year 1917-18 showing an increase of Rs. 146 which was due to a larger amount realised from fees as the schools were open practically throughout the year, there being a break of only one month during the Influenza Epidemic.
- (m) *Fees and revenue from Markets and Slaughter houses* :—The income from this source was Rs. 51,193 during the year as compared with Rs. 45,275 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 5,918. It is due to more amount realised from rents of market stalls. Some of the increase is also accounted for by the fact that duty was newly levied on animals brought for sale in the Bhamburda Bazar.
- (n) *Other fees* :—The income from this source consists of notice, warrant and comparing fees. This amounted to Rs. 2,068 during the year under report as against Rs. 2,011 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 57.
- (o) *Fines under the Municipal Acts* :—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 4,578 as against Rs. 3,750 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 828. It is due to more fines being imposed under the Police Act during the year as compared with those in the previous year. On the other hand fines inflicted by

the Magistrates under the Municipal Act amounted to Rs. 5 as against Rs. 908 in the year 1917-18. This decrease is more apparent than real, as under recent orders of Government, the cost on account of the establishment of the Bench Magistrates is deducted from the amount of the Municipal fines and the net balance paid into the Municipal Treasury.

- (p) *Interest on investments*:—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 4,926 as against Rs. 4,088 during the the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 838 which is due to the fact that the interest for two years on Pro. Notes of the School Board was drawn during the year under report, whereas no interest from the same source was received in the previous year. Similarly interest on some Pro. Notes for the year 1917-18 was received during the year under report and hence there was an increase of Rs. 494.
- (q) *Grants and contributions*:—The income under this head was Rs. 29,380 as against Rs. 60,909 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 31,529. It is due to the fact that no special grant was received from Government for sanitary purposes in the course of the year 1918-19 like the one in the previous year. Similarly no Government contribution towards the cost of the establishment of the Health Officer and Sanitary Inspectors was received in time. On the other hand the grants for Technical School and the Drawing Classes were received from Government during the year while there were no such grants received in the previous year. The Government grant for Municipal Primary Schools exceeded the previous year's grant by Rs. 7,391.
- (r) *Recoveries on account of service rendered to private individuals*:—Orders from Public Institutions, Government Officers and private persons are executed at the Municipal Workshop. The amount recovered on this account was Rs. 1,627 as against Rs. 1,487 showing an increase of Rs. 140. The increase shows more out-turn of work and hence the greater efficiency, of the work-shop.
- (s) *Other items*:—The income under this head amounted to Rs. 955 in the year while it was Rs. 969 in 1917-18, showing a decrease of Rs. 14.
- (t) *Loans from Government*:—No loan was received from Government during the year under report.
- (u) *Deposits*:—This shows a decrease of Rs. 5,729 which is due to ordinary fluctuations in business.

#### Y. WORKING OF THE OCTROI SYSTEM.

7. The area under the administration of the Poona City Municipality for Octroi purposes includes, in addition to the city Municipal Dis-

tract, the Cantonment of Poona, the Suburban Municipal District and the Cantonment of Kirkee. The last had, at first, been added to the Cordon as an experimental measure under certain conditions for three years from 1st October 1911 as sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 2004 of 19th April 1909 G. D., but the period was extended by two years by Government in their Resolution No. 6841 dated 3rd January 1915. From the year 1917 the old arrangement still continues but definite orders from Government for its continuance are not yet received. The area, therefore, includes four different units. The Municipality levies Octroi according to the schedule on articles imported into the Octroi Cordon and after deducting the amount of duty refunded on account of articles exported and the establishment and other charges from the gross revenue, distributes the remainder among the several Bodies except Kirkee according to the population of each District, as sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 4653 of the 9th November 1895. Kirkee gets the net income from Octroi on its imports including all charges which are deducted from the gross revenue as was agreed to by the City Municipality and the Kirkee Cantonment Committee. The figures of income and expenditure given in this chapter are therefore for the whole of the Octroi Cordon consisting of the four Districts and not for the City only, while the figures given in those parts of the report which relate to the City represent the income and the expenditure of the City only.

8. The gross income from Octroi in the year 1918-19 was Rs. 4,51,251 including Rs. 5,521 paid to the Cantonment of Kirkee as against Rs. 3,45,928 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 1,05,323.

The octroi rates on most articles were enhanced in the year under report and brought into force from 1st January 1919. The rates were sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 6649 G. D. dated 25th September 1918. Several articles which were not previously subject to Octroi duty but were liable only to pay what was called the Trade Registration Fee were given a separate 9th class and it was termed the "Miscellaneous class."

9. Out of the gross revenue of Rs. 4,51,251, Rs. 53,928 were refunded on account of exports, Rs. 28,067 were spent on establishment, Rs. 6,104 on contingencies, Rs. 340 on repairs to the Naka buildings, Rs. 5 on repairs to weigh-bridges, Rs. 603 on Police establishment, and Rs. 534 on uniforms to peons. The amount given to the Kirkee Cantonment in the year was Rs. 5,521 as against Rs. 11,913 in the previous year. Thus the total expenditure amounted to Rs. 95,133 as against Rs. 74,745 of the previous year. Deducting this amount from the gross revenue, the remainder, i. e. Rs. 3,56,118 were distributed amongst the three Bodies. The City Municipality's share (which is exclusive of expenses including establishment charges) amounted to Rs. 2,62,861, that of the Cantonment Committee to Rs. 72,943 and that of the Suburban Municipality to Rs. 21,014.

10. The amount of Rs. 53,988 was, as mentioned above, refunded in 1918-19 on account of exports as against Rs. 31,148 in the year 1917-18. The increase is due to high prices and a larger amount of trade.

11. The figures quoted above show the result of the working of the whole of the Octroi Department. They show the gross income from and the

gross expenditure chargeable to Octroi. But the figures given in the statements Nos. 2 and 3 only show the share of the City Municipality in the total income and expenditure. But it does not require separate explanation as it has already been given in the preceding paras, dealing with the whole of the Octroi system. The Octroi Establishment has cost 6·8 per cent of the gross income as against 7·2 in the previous year. The decrease in percentage is due to the fact that Rs. 1,05,323 were recovered above last year's figure without any extra establishment.

12. The following table gives information regarding the average consumption of articles:—

It will be seen from the above that the average consumption is within the standard under only one head viz., Ghee. The rise under the heads, Drugs and Spices, Cloth and Metal is due to the abnormally high prices prevailing in the market owing to the war.

The rise under other heads may be due to the traders having cornered the articles with a view to profiteering.

#### VI. COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT FORM NO. III.

13. A reference to statement, form No. III, will show that the total expenditure in the year under report amounted to Rs. 6,13,852, the details being as follows :—

The total expenditure amounted, as shown above, to Rs. 6,13,852 in the year under report as against Rs. 5,98,534 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 15,318. Some of the sub-heads such as A, C, D, and F show an increase, while B and G show a decrease.

- (a) *General Administration* :—This shows an increase of Rs. 4,350 as compared with the expenditure of the last year. It is partly due to the high prices of stationery and new furniture purchased for the use of the offices and partly to the additional cost of temporary establishment.
- (b) *Collection of Taxes* :—The expenditure under this head, viz. Rs. 26,039 consisted of the Octroi and the Assessment establishment charges amounting to Rs. 20,246 and Rs. 5,793 respectively, as against Rs. 19,406 and Rs. 4,399 (23,805) of the last year. This shows an increase of Rs. 2,234. The increase is explained by the fact that uniforms costing Rs. 653 were supplied to the Naka and Assessment establishment. Additional expenditure on account of the salary at Rs. 50 per month of the House Tax Revising Officer, which post was created during the year under report, and of some temporary establishment in the assessment office was incurred. There is also an increase of Rs. 603 in the cost of stationery and the pay of Police Constables while there is a decrease in the expenditure under the heads "Registration Establishment and new Naka Buildings."
- (c) *Refund* :—This shows an increase of Rs. 122. It is due to a larger amount of water rate having been refunded during the year than in the previous year.
- (d) *Pension and Gratuities* :—The expenditure under this head shows a decrease of Rs. 1,353 which was due to a smaller number of Municipal servants retiring during the year than in the previous year.

- ( e ) *Fire* :—This shows an increase of Rs. 2,160 as compared with the expenditure of the year 1917-18. The figures of expenditure show a regular increase in the subheads, viz. Establishment, contingencies, fire-plugs and repairs to sheds. The increase is due to high prices of the materials and to uniforms having been supplied to the Fire Brigade Establishment. There were 19 fires in the City during the year under report and the total loss of property on that account, as roughly estimated, amounted to Rs. 22,135.
- ( f ) *Lighting* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 2,777. It is due to less expenditure incurred under all sub heads and especially on the heads of oil and lamps. As there was no sufficient supply of kerosine oil, many street lamps had to be left unlighted.
- ( g ) *Police* :—No special expenditure was incurred on this account by the Municipality. The charges of five constables taken on loan are debited to octroi, assessment and market departments.
- ( h ) *Water Supply —(Capital outlay)* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 5,550. This decrease is explained by the fact that in the year under report no extraordinary works were carried out, whereas in the year 1917-18, cost on account of special works, such as rebuilding baffle walls in the City Storage Tanks &c., had to be incurred.
- ( i ) *Water Supply ( Repairs )* :—This shows an increase of Rs. 12,954 as compared with the expenditure in the previous year. The increase is explained by the fact that Government have enhanced the water rate for water supplied to the City which came into force from October 1916. The Municipality has submitted a representation to Government protesting against the enhanced rate and claiming a refund. The expenditure on this account was double that of the last year.
- There was also an increase of Rs. 1,135 on maintenance of the Settling Tanks.
- There was a fresh expenditure of Rs. 720 for purifying City Water supply by means of alum immediately after canal closure while there was no such expenditure in the previous year.
- ( j ) *Drainage—Capital Outlay* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 1,380 as compared with the expenditure of the previous year. Fewer payments had to be made to Government for Drainage Works in the year under report.
- ( k ) *Establishment and Repairs* :—This shows an expenditure of Rs. 74,527 as against Rs. 95,320 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 20,793. The decrease

is mainly due to the fact that Rs. 56,622 were remitted to the Government Treasury as against Rs. 77,430 during the previous year, by way of contributions towards the maintenance of Pumping Stations and Septic Tanks. There is also a decrease of Rs. 172 on cleaning of the Maniknala. On the other hand there is an increase of Rs. 1,138 on the sub-head of cleaning of gutters etc

Conservancy would thus appear to have cost in the year under report Rs. 23,193 more than in the previous year; most of the heads such as B. C. D. E. & F show an increase while A and G show a decrease, the reasons of increase and decrease are explained in the following paras.

(1) *General Supervising Establishment*:—This shows a decrease of Rs. 551.

(2) *Road cleaning*:—This includes the cost of the road sweeping establishment, new carts, dust-bins and repairs to the same, removal of rubbish from the City and charges incidental to it. The total expenditure on this head amounted to Rs. 21,678 in the year under report as against Rs. 20,994 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 684. There is an expenditure of Rs. 421 incurred in paving the ground under dust-bins in the year under report while there was no such expenditure in the previous year. Removal of brickbats cost Rs. 1,633 more as compared with the expenditure on the same head in

the previous year, while this increase was compensated by the decrease of about the same amount on the head "removal of kachra." There is also a regular increase on the heads, "establishment, contingencies, repairs to dust-bins, and new kachra carts," which accounts for the total increase in the main head. The expenditure on the maintenance of Municipal bullocks utilised for removal of kachra was not shown to this head but it was included under the head "Bhangee Service."

- (3) *Bhangee Service*:—The expenditure under this head includes the pay of Bhangees, new night-soil carts, repairs to old ones, contingency and purchase and feeding of bullocks. The Bhangee Service cost Rs. 33,068 in the year under report as against Rs. 32,472 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 596. The new night-soil carts cost Rs. 835 as against Rs. 1,023 showing a decrease of Rs. 188. The repairs to old carts cost Rs. 2,803 as against Rs. 2,748 showing an increase of Rs. 55. Contingency cost Rs. 1,104 as against Rs. 1,273 showing a decrease of Rs. 169 and the purchase and feeding of bullocks cost Rs. 64,768 as against Rs. 44,604 showing an increase of Rs. 20,164. All heads except contingency and new night-soil carts show an increase. The increase under some heads except purchase and feeding of bullocks has been compensated by the decrease under other heads. The increase of Rs. 17,767 on the head "Feeding of bullocks" is due to the fact that prices of the articles for feeding bullocks have risen very high owing to scanty rain-fall. In the year under report, a sum of Rs. 2,397 was spent in purchasing bullocks, no expenditure being incurred in the previous year.
- (4) *Night-soil and kachra Depots*:—The expenditure under this head includes rent of Depots, repairs to Depots and Depot Establishment. The total cost of these was Rs. 4,504 in the year under report as against Rs. 3,522 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 982. The increase is due partly to additional lands taken on rent for stacking kachra as the present ones are not sufficient and partly due to additional establishment maintained at the Depots.
- (5) *Latrines and Urinals*:—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 1,739 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,392 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 347. The increase is due to a larger number of latrines and urinals having been repaired.
- (6) *Road watering*:—Road watering cost Rs. 4,887 in the year under report as against Rs. 3,547 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 1,340. The increase is due to bullocks and drivers having cost Rs. 1,511 more in the year 1918-19 than in the year 1917-18.

- ( l ) *Miscellaneous* :—This shows an decrease of Rs. 67 when compared with the expenditure during the previous year. Less expenditure was incurred in providing uniforms to servants and this accounted for the decrease.
- ( m ) *Charges on account of Health Officer and Sanitary Inspectors* : The charge is debited to this new head ( vide G. R. No. 936 dated 7th February 1916 ). The expenditure under this head amounted Rs. 6,921 as against Rs. 6,715 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs 206 which is due to the increment paid to the Health Officer and Sanitary Inspectors during the year as per sanctioned schedule. This expenditure was previously shown under the head "General Supervising Establishment".
- ( n ) *Hospital and Dispensaries* :—The Municipality maintains three Dispensaries, at two of which English drugs are used and at one Indian drugs; the latter therefore goes by the name of Deshi Dawakhana. There are other charitable institutions such as the Infirm Asylum, the Leper Asylum, the Dufferin Fund, the David Sassoon Hospital Nursing Fund and the King Edward Memorial Hospital to which the Municipality pays grants-in-aid. The total expenditure on this account amounted to Rs. 10,976 in the year under report as against Rs. 10,447 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 529. The increase is mainly due to the fact that the Municipality had to pay Rs. 796 to the Committee of the Edward Memorial Hospital, representing the balance to their credit out of the total amount of Rs. 12,000 deposited by that body with the Municipality in the year 1912-13 for acquisition of sites.
- ( o ) *Plague* :—There was no cut—break of plague during the year under report ; still the Municipality had to incur expenditure on the usual precautionary measures such as contribution of its share to the cost of the Infectious Diseases Hospital and the Rat Campaign, and the upkeep of the Health Camps. The total cost on account of the same was Rs. 10,735 as against Rs 28,058 during the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 17,323 which was due to absence of plague during the year under report.

The Infectious Diseases Hospital has been under the management of a Committee with the Collector of Poona as its Chairman. The Municipality has no direct hand in its management ; it is, however, represented on the Committee by two of its members. The Municipality has to pay 54 per cent. charges out of the total expenditure of the Hospital.

The Rat Campaign was continued throughout the year under the direct control of the Officer appointed by Government on that account. The Municipality had to pay half the cost.

- (p) *Vaccination*:—This cost Rs. 1,437 during the year under report as against Rs. 1,044 in 1917-18 showing an increase of Rs. 393 which was partly due to grain compensation having been given to the establishment and partly to higher prices of stationery.
- (q) *Other Sanitary Requirements*:—This new item is introduced under G. R. No. 936 dated 7th February 1916 (G. D.) It includes the cost of preventive measures against Cholera and Influenza and removal of prickly pear. The total expenditure on this head amounted to Rs. 9,583 in the year under report as against Rs. 87 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 9,496 which was due to an out break of Influenza which lasted for two months. This disease was of a virulent type and it carried away 3,767 souls. The Municipality was required to open several temporary Dispensaries and an Hospital for the care of the innumerable patients that required care and attention. The total expenditure incurred by the Municipality during these two months, when the epidemic was at its worst, was Rs. 9,300.
- (r) *Markets and Slaughter houses*:—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 6,836 in the year under report as against Rs. 7,965 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 1,129. This is due to the decrease of expenditure on all sub-heads except Slaughter-house repairs.
- (s) *Pounds*:—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 576 in the year under report as against Rs. 597 in the year 1917-18, showing a decrease of Rs. 21.
- (t) *Public Gardens*:—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 691 as against Rs. 724 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 33.
- (u) *Veterinary charges*:—This usually represents the annual contribution which the Municipality pays towards the Local Board Veterinary Dispensary. The expenditure on this account amounted to Rs. 600 as against Rs. 300 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 300, which was due to the increase in the grant-in-aid sanctioned to the Dispensary.
- (v) *Registration of Births and Deaths*:—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 957 as against Rs. 504 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 453. The increase is explained by the following facts:—

- (1) The Establishment of three clerks appointed to register births, to issue death passes and to prepare statistical returns could not cope with the work; the Municipality therefore engaged one more clerk on Rs. 12 per month and a peon on Rs. 10 per month from the beginning of the year and hence there is an additional expenditure of Rs. 264.
- (2) As births are not properly reported, the Municipality advertised to the citizens their responsibility in respect of notification of births to the Municipality and this cost Rs. 74.
- (3) Road Sweepers were paid rewards for reporting births at the rate of anna one for each birth. It cost Rs. 115.
- (4) The number of births reported and registered in the year was 2,332 against 1,140 registered in the previous year. The total number of births registered in the year gives a ratio of 19.8 per mille as against 9.72 per mille in 1917-18.
- (5) As regards deaths, the total number registered was 9,722 as against 6,744 in the preceding year. Those are classified as under:— Plague 67, Cholera 52, Small-pox 189, fevers (including Influenza and other causes) 4,817; the total mortality gives a death ratio of 82.9 per mille in the year under report. The infant mortality was 3,288 in the year.
- (w) *Public Works Establishment*:—This includes the cost of the Public Works Establishment, the Parwangi Establishment and uniforms. The total expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 7,373 in the year under report as against Rs. 7,374 during the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 1.
- (x) *Building Repairs*:—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 731 in the year under report as against Rs. 4,220 during the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 3,489. The decrease is explained by the fact that no expenditure was incurred on acquisition of land for cremation, while there was an expenditure of Rs. 3,079 on that account during the previous year. No expenditure was incurred on new works, while it was Rs. 209 in the last year. There was also a decrease of Rs. 268 in the cost of maintenance of cremation ghats.
- (y) *Road repairs and Road widening*:— The maintenance and improvement of roads in the year under report cost Rs. 45,165 as against Rs. 42,817 in the year 1917-18 showing an increase of Rs. 2,348. Out of the total expenditure of Rs. 45,165, Rs. 39,223 were spent on road repairs and Rs. 5,942 on road widening as against Rs.

27,710 and Rs. 15,107 spent on them during the previous year. As regards road repairs, it may be stated that they include remetalling a certain length of road, repairs to lanes and murum roads with gravel and murum, patching damaged portions of the roads, removal of mud during the monsoon, repairs to Steam Rollers, sundries such as painting the boundary stones, and temporary establishment &c. The total length of metal roads repaired during the year was 3.68 miles with an average width of 20 feet and that of murum roads and lanes 0.65 miles with an average width of 15 feet. There was an increase of Rs. 11,513 in the expenditure on road repairs. As regards Road Widening, it may be stated that the total cost to the Municipality on this account was Rs. 5,942 showing a decrease of Rs. 9,165 which is due to a smaller number of claims for compensation for lands acquired having been paid in the year under report.

( z ) *Stores*:— The expenditure on this head was Rs. 30 in the year under report as against Rs. 59 during the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 29. The decrease is due to no new tools and plant having been purchased in the year under report.

( a-a ) *Town Planning*:— The Municipality declared its intention to make a Town Planning Scheme in respect of some portion of the area of the City limits under its Resolution No. 174 dated 12th December 1916 as the Government approved of the extension of the Town Planning Act to Bhamburda and Yerandavna under G. O. No. 6590 dated 25-8-15 (G. D). Its intention was notified to the public. After considering public objections and suggestions in the matter, Government sanctioned the making of the Scheme ( vide their order No. 943 G. D. dated 10-2-17) The Municipality engaged an establishment to prepare a scheme for the portion of the City for which the Government had given its sanction. The scheme was prepared and notified to the public and public objections being considered, some additions and alterations were made in the Scheme which was finally submitted to Government for sanction. The expenditure incurred on that account in the year under report was Rs. 3,221 as against Rs. 2,806 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 415 due to additional cost of establishment and printing charges of the scheme.

( a-b ) *Public Instruction, Schools and Colleges*:— The Administration Report of the School Board will be found in Appendix XI of this report, wherein is given the full account of the working of the Schools. It is not therefore necessary to enter into details in this place. It may suffice to state here that the total expenditure during the year



under report amounted to Rs. 59,700 as against Rs. 54,440 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 5,260. The increase is to be explained by the fact that more expenditure was incurred under the following sub-heads, viz. Office contingency, pay of teachers, house rent, contingency, Gymnasium, water-tax, repairs to school buildings, Technical School Establishment and its contingency. An additional expenditure on prizes to boys, grain compensation to teachers and gratuity was incurred during the year while there was no such expenditure in the previous year. There are some heads which cost less such as Scientific Books and apparatus &c.

**Progress of Mahomedan education:—** There are 9 day-schools and night school for Mahomedans. The number on rolls was 463 boys and 128 girls against the last year's number of 422 and 144. The average attendance was 290 and 78. The fall in attendance is due to influenza in September and October 1918 and to the continued prevalence of malaria in the City. The Educational Department was requested to supply trained Urdu teachers but was unable to meet the wishes of this Municipality for want of such teachers. Friday was substituted for Sunday as a weekly holiday, as desired by Government. An English class has been attached to one of the Urdu Schools as an experimental measure. The expenditure on Urdu schools during the year amounted to Rs. 9,311. Arrangements are being made for the acquisition of a site in Raviwar Peth for the location of an Urdu school.

( a-c ) *Contributions:—* There was an expenditure of Rs. 85 under this head in the year under report, as this amount was given as grant to a school for the deaf and dumb, while there was no grant sanctioned to any School in the previous year.

( a-d ) *Libraries and Museums:—* The Municipal Teachers' Library cost Rs. 117 in the year under report as against nil during the previous year. The School Board has thrown the responsibility of maintaining the Museum on the shoulders of the Trustees and hence there was no expenditure incurred on that account during the year under report as well as in the previous year.

( a-e ) *Interest on loans:—* The expenditure under this head is Rs. 38,460 which represents interest during the year under report on the loan of Rs. 10 lacs drawn by the Municipality from Government by four instalments since the year 1912. In the the year under report the information regarding amounts debited to repayment of principal and interest being not received from the Accountant General, the apportionment has been shown

as per figures given in the Budget Estimates for the year 1919-20.

- ( a-f ) *Work done for private individuals*:— This shows an increase of Rs. 313 which is due to more out-turn of work for private individuals.
- ( a-g ) *Address*:—A farewell address was given to His Excellency Lord Willingdon at the time of his departure from Poona in November last. The expenditure incurred on that account was Rs. 58.
- ( a-h ) *Loss account* :—This shows an increase of Rs. 69 over the expenditure of Rs. 17 of the previous year.
- ( a-i ) *Election* :—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 1,030 and was incurred in preparing and printing a new Election Roll for the year and for the General Election held in September 1918. This shows an increase of Rs. 61 over the expenditure in the previous year.
- ( a-j ) *Printing* :—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 1,030 in the year under report as against Rs. 836 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 194. It is due to the fact that services of some additional compositors were engaged to meet the pressing demand of work in the Press.
- ( a-k ) *Destroying stray dogs* :—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 47 showing an increase of Rs. 9 over the expenditure in the previous year.
- ( a-l ) *Law charges* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 799 as compared with the expenditure during the previous year.
- ( a-m ) *Contribution to the Pasteur Institute at Coonoor* :—This represents the annual contribution of Rs. 60 which the Municipality pays to this Institute. The contribution during the year under report as well as in the year [ 1917-18 is the same. Formerly the Municipality used to pay the charges of indigent patients who were residents of Poona City and proceeded to Coonoor for anti-rabic treatment ; but they are now being borne by Government as per G. R. No. 5344 dated 5th August 1916.
- ( a-n ) *Maintenance charges of Lunatics* :—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 1,269 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,502 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 233. The decrease is due to the fact that the Municipality has had to pay for fewer patients as per Government Order No. 1557 dated 7th April 1917 than in the previous year. This expenditure represents the charges for the maintenance of poor lunatics, who were residents or habitual visitors of the City before admis-

sion into the Asylums. The Municipality have to pay this cost since 18th March 1915 (vide G. R. No. 4091 of the same date).

- ( a-o ) *Refund of money lapsed to Municipal fund after three years* :—Nil.
- ( a-p ) *Grain compensation and war allowance* :—As the prices of articles of daily necessity have gone very high, the Municipal servants drawing salaries not exceeding Rs. 30 were allowed grain compensation during the months of April and May 1918. It was then stopped and war allowance was given to servants drawing salaries up to Rs. 100 from June 1918 to the end of the year. The expenditure on this account was Rs. 12,300 showing an increase of Rs. 7,555 over the expenditure of the previous year on grain compensation.
- ( a-q ) *Armistice day* :—An expenditure of Rs. 958 was incurred on the 27th November 1918 which day was observed as a festival for rejoicings throughout India for the success of Allied Arms against Germany and her satellites. Some Military units marched through the City and a purse of Rs. 500 was presented to them. Illuminations and dinners to the poor were provided on that day.
- ( a-r ) *Repayment of loan* :—The expenditure under this head represents a portion of the principal of Rs. 10 lacs to be repaid to Government. The Municipality paid Rs. 50,322 to Government as the 8th and 9th instalments of repayment of loan which was adjusted by showing Rs. 11,862 to principal and Rs. 38,460 to interest. This apportionment has been made as per figures given in Budget Estimates, as the exact figures of adjustment were not received from the Accountant General, Bombay.
- ( a-s ) *Deposits* :—The expenditure on this head amounted to Rs. 7,281 as against Rs. 13,902 during the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 6,621 ; this is only an adjustment account, and as the rise or fall in the expenditure on this account does not affect the ordinary expenditure of the Municipality, this head does not require any explanation, as the variations are due to ordinary fluctuations in business.
- ( a-t ) *Advances* :—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 3,241 which represents the advances given to the Officers of the Municipality for emergent works.

#### VII. ACQUISITION OF LAND.

14. 8 Pieces of land measuring in all 6,755-6-6 1/2 Sqr. Ft. were purchased in the year under report for Rs. 5,159-12-4 as against 10 pieces of land purchased in the previous year for Rs. 16,078-11-8.

### VIII. AUDIT OF ACCOUNTS.

15. The Municipal accounts for the year 1917-18 were audited by Mr. Rebello and Mr. Deshmukh of the Local Audit Department.

### IX. MUNICIPAL WANTS.

16. The question of carrying out supplementary works so as to make the Drainage Scheme a real blessing to the City still remains unsolved. The Government experts are preparing estimates in regard to these works, but unless these works are put in hand, it cannot be said that the drainage of the City is properly completed. Similarly the two Peths, Nana and Bhawani, which adjoin the Cantonment area, must be provided with an up-to-date drainage system. Malaria, an offspring of the defective Drainage and Water Supply Works, is a new visitor and is raising a new problem for the Municipality. Distribution of the Water Supply by providing suitable sized pipes throughout the City is another important question, which has to be solved by the Municipality. The draft scheme in connection with the Bhamburda Town development has been submitted to Government for sanction.

### GENERAL REMARKS.

17. Government in their Resolution No. 5196 dated the 28th September 1904 extended the Bombay Municipal Servants Act ( V of 1890 ) to the Poona City Municipality so far as it relates to persons employed by or on behalf of the Municipality to perform any of the duties specified, ( i ) In class I of the schedule of the said Act and ( ii ) in classes (a) and (c) of Class II of the said schedule. In the year under report, the bhangees and other Municipal servants worked quietly.

Before concluding, I feel it my duty to place on record an expression of the sense of gratitude to my predecessors in Office, the late Mr. H. N. Apte and Mr. N. C. Kelkar ( who is now in England ) for the invaluable services they rendered to the Municipality during the year under report. I also have to record my sense of obligation to the various working Committees and special Committees for the work they did in the interest of the Municipality and the help they gave to the Presidents. I have also to recognize the assistance which the Chief Officer, Mr. K. P. Paranjpye, rendered to my predecessors.

3. Mr. Vinayak Vasudeo submitted a list of subscribers who had subscribed Rs. 700 towards the proposed Duke of Albany Memorial Fund and requested Government to found an annual prize in the name of His Royal Highness to be awarded to meritorious pupils in the Female High School Poona.

4. Mr. Narayan Govind Apte gave Government a sum of Rs. 500 as an endowment for a prize to be awarded in Mr. Apte's name to a student in the Sanskrit Patha Shala in Poona.

5. Mr. Suleman Shet Ladha gave a sum of Rs. 500 as an endowment for Scholarships to be awarded to deserving Mahomedan boys in Urdu Schools under the control of the Municipality and also to Mahomedan boys passing from vernacular standard and entering the Anglo Vernacular Schools.

6. The Honble Diwan Bahadur Kashinath Ramchandra Godbole placed at the disposal of the Municipality, Bombay Improvement Trust Bonds for Rs. 1,500 yielding an annual interest of Rs. 60 for awarding a scholarship tenable for one year and to be called the Godbole Scholarship to be awarded to the most successful Brahmin student from V. J. Municipal Technical School, Poona, who after he completes his School course, should work as an artificer or join a higher Technical Institution for furthering his technical studies.

I have the honour to submit the following report on the Administration of the School Board for the year 1918-19.

5. The School Board Office and the Municipal Schools were under the direct control of the Superintendent of Schools during the year under report. The post of the Superintendent was held by Mr. S. D. Dixit, B. A., till the middle of December 1918, when he resigned it for better prospects. Mr. V. L. Gutne, B. A., has been appointed in his place in February 1919 on probation for six months. He has had considerable experience in the educational line ; moreover, he is active. The Board trusts that he will discharge his duties to the complete satisfaction of the authorities.

6. *Schools:*—There were 35 Primary schools and 1 Technical Institute under the management of the School Board in the year under report as against 37 in the previous year. The Boys' school at Bhokarwadi for low caste children had been transferred to the Depressed Classes Mission Society, Poona, for management in August last with the concurrence of the Educational

authorities and the Municipality has undertaken to give a grant of Rs. 250 per year. One night school No. 17 is closed as there was no sufficient number of students in the school. The schools are classified as under:—

- 15 Marathi day Schools for boys, including 2 for low castes.
- 5 Urdu day Schools for boys.
- 1 Gujrathi day School.
- 1 Marathi night School.
- 1 Urdu night School.
- 8 Marathi day Schools for girls.
- 4 Urdu day Schools for girls.

There are 22 boys' schools, out of which nine are entirely free. These nine free Schools are made up as under.

- (i) 5 Marathi boys' Schools ( which include two schools for boys of the Depressed Classes ).
- (ii) 4 Urdu Schools.

7. *Pupils in Primary Schools*:—The number of students in the schools increased in the year under report from 3,535 to 3,683.

The schools were closed in the year under report owing to a severe type of influenza epidemic from 26th of September 1918 to 9th of November 1918. This epidemic, as well as malaria, which has become a constant visitor of Poona, has told on the attendance of schools. Out of the total number 3,683 on the rolls on the last day of the year under report, there were 2,130 boys and 77 girls in Boys' Day Schools; 1,435 girls in Girls' Schools; and 41 boys in Night Schools. Information, regarding their caste, age, social condition and the profession of their guardians, is given in Appendix 1 ( A, B and C ).

There were during the year under report 818 boys and 553 girls of ages ranging between 5 and 8 as against 602 boys and 401 girls of the previous year. 1005 boys and 808 girls of ages ranging between 8 and 12 as against 943 boys and 712 girls of the previous year, 259 boys and 145 girls of ages ranging between 12 and 15 as against 308 boys and 184 girls of the previous year, and 89 boys and 15 girls above 15 years as against 74 boys and 6 girls of the previous year. Only 1. 6 p. c. of boys and 2. 1 p. c of girls were married as against 2. 4 and 1. 5 respectively of the previous year.

8. *Attendance*:—The following table shows the comparative attendance in schools during the year 1918-19 and 1917-18.

This decrease in attendance is explained by the prevalence of a severe type of influenza in the city and also malaria and other fevers after it. Appendix 1-D will give detailed information regarding attendance in these schools.

9. *Teachers*:—There were, in the year ending 31st March 1919, 189 teachers serving in Municipal Primary Schools, showing neither decrease nor increase in number in the year under report. Information regarding their distribution is given in Appendices II and II (2). There were 22 Head Masters and 11 Head Mistresses; out of these 30 were trained and 3 untrained. The number of Urdu trained teachers is proportionate to that of the Marathi teachers; still to secure a greater number of trained Urdu teachers, the School Board had made a provision of 3 Scholarships of Rs. 8 each to be paid to the qualified Mahomedan candidates, who desired to prosecute their studies in the Male Training College and who further undertook to bind themselves to serve the School Board for a period of three years. As no one came forward to avail himself of this facility during the past years, no provision on this account was made in 1918-19.

The Board affords reasonable facility to teachers under its control to appear for training college examinations privately so as to improve the quality of the teachers. In the course of the year the number of trained teachers increased by five, and the Board is shortly going to start coaching classes for the unqualified male and female teachers to enable them to pass the Vernacular School Final Examination and to undertake the work of training all the untrained teachers by opening a normal training class to increase the efficiency of the staff of the Municipal Schools. These classes will also give facility to the unqualified Urdu teachers and unqualified mistresses to obtain the Vernacular School Final Certificate. There were 100 trained and 89 untrained teachers in the year under report. The corresponding figures for 1917-18 are 95 trained and 94 untrained. 927 boys and 790 girls were under trained teachers, and 1244 boys and 722 girls were under untrained teachers, as against 863 boys and 996 girls under trained teachers, and 1054 boys and 717 girls under untrained teachers in the previous year.

10. *The Annual Examination of Schools*:—This year the Municipal schools were examined from 15th February 1919 to 23th of February 1919 by a Board of Examiners, selected from amongst the senior teachers of the Municipal Primary Schools. The examinations of classes IV, V, and VI were partly written and partly oral, and those of other standards oral. The Superintendent of Municipal Schools supervised all the examinations and checked the results personally. Appendix II (B) will give information regarding the results of the examinations. 1390 boys were presented for the examinations from I to VI standards, of whom 935 passed and 580 girls were presented for the examination, of whom 456 passed.

Only three full Primary Schools were maintained by the Municipality viz., (1) Marathi Boys', (1) Marathi Girls' and (1) Urdu Boys'.

The Municipal Schools were inspected by the Deputy Educational Inspector of the District and his Assistants this year in the month of July, but their remarks on the work of schools are not yet to hand.

*Technical School.*

10 *Technical School*:—(a) There were in the Victoria Jubilee Technical School, Poona, 34 students on the 31st March 1919. All of them had to learn Drawing, which is compulsory; 34 were learning carpentry, 7 smithy, 6 metal turning, and 28 sign board painting. 26 were Brahmins, 1 Jain, and 7 belonging to other castes

(b) There is in the Technical School a special class for drawing for the benefit of students who cannot afford to become regular students of other schools. The fee for the special class is charged at the rate of annas two per month per boy. The teachers and students from Municipal and Aided Schools, and the Local Training College are exempted from paying fees. This class was attended by 5 students in the year under report from Municipal and other Schools.

(c) The School sends up candidates for Elementary and Intermediate Examinations of Drawing of the School of Art, Bombay, every year.

This year 7 boys were sent up for the Elementary Examination, and 5 passed. 3 appeared for the Intermediate Examination, of whom 2 came out successful.

(d) During the year under report the School was examined by Mr. T. Dowson, Chairman of the Committee of Trustees of the Technical Education in the Presidency, and recommended the full grant to the School.

(e) The School has been under the direct supervision of Mr. K. G. Kelkar, a Graduate of the Bombay Technical Institute. Mr. Kelkar has a considerable practical experience and conducts the School in an efficient manner.

11. *Income*:—Appendix III gives information regarding the funds at the disposal of the Board. In the year under report the general income shows an increase over the preceding year. The causes of increase and decrease are given below:—

(i) *Fees in primary Schools*:—There is an increase of Rupees 161 under this head in the year under report. The increase is due to the increase in number of students.

(ii) *Government grant-in-aid*:—There is an increase of Rs. 7,391 under this head in the year under report. The increase is mainly due to the fact that a grant at the rate of half the expenditure for the year 1917-18 was received in the year 1918-19 (vide Government Resolution No. 1667, dated 3-7-18). Government have accepted the principle of paying the grants to Municipalities on the basis of actual expenditure of the previous year. Although this principle was laid down on a previous occasion, as will be seen from a revision of the grant in the year 1912-13, based on half the actual expense of 1911-12, the practice was not followed up in succeeding years. It is now that Government have undertaken to give a grant equal to half the actual expenditure of the preceding year and the amount of the grant will vary from year to year.

(iii) *Grant-in-aid to the Technical School*:—This item shows an increase of Rs. 1,619, which is due to the grant for 1917-18, being received in the year 1918-19. The grant for the year under report is Rs. 1,290.

(vi) *Drawing Grant*:—This shows an increase of Rs. 167 in the year under report, which is due to the fact that no grant was received in the year 1917-18.

(v) *Local Fund Cess on lands within Municipal limits*:—There is an increase of Rs 533 under this head in the year under report. The grants for 1916-17 and 1917-18 were received during the year under report and hence the increase.

(vi) *Donations*:—The funds placed at the disposal of the Municipality brought in Rs. 325 in the year under report. No interest was drawn in the year 1917-18; hence the large amount.

(vii) *Technical School Fees*:—The amount received under this head is Rupees 4 only.

13. *Expenditure*:—Details, regarding the expenditure on Primary Schools, Technical School, Secretary's Office establishment and other institutions, are given in Appendix IV and IV-A with its accompaniments. The total expenditure on Education amounted to Rs. 63,387 in the year under report, as against Rs. 54,627 in the year 1917-18, thus showing an increase of Rs. 7,760, which is explained in detail below under each sub-head.

*Secretary's Office Establishment*:—This item shows an increase of Rs. 83.

*Contingency*:—This item shows an increase of Rs. 297 over the expenditure of the year 1917-18. The increase under this head is chiefly due to the rough census of children of school-going age taken for preparing a scheme in connection with Act I of 1918 (Compulsory Education Act).

*Salaries of Masters, Mistresses and peons with pension Fund*:—There is an increase of Rs. 3,280 under this head in the year under report. The cause of increase is due to increase of pay of untrained teachers and untrained head masters with effect from 1st April 1918, and increase in the pay of teachers.

*Rent of School Buildings*:—This item shows an increase of Rs. 312 in the year under report, which is simply due to the higher rates paid to the owners of School houses. Remarks regarding this item are given under "general wants of the School Board."

*Contingency to Schools*:—There is an increase of Rs. 214 under this head in the year under report. This is due to the increase in prices of stationery, printing &c.

*New furniture*:—The expenditure amounts to Rs. 816 in the year under report, showing a decrease of Rs 176-7-0.

*New books and Maps*:—There is an increase of Rs. 6-6-0 in the year under report under this head. But it is very small and requires no explanation.

*Repairs to School Buildings*:—The amount of Rs. 784 has been spent under this head in the year under report, showing the increase of Rs 543. The increase is due to the fact that the bills for the repairs, which were carried out in the year 1917-18, were paid off in the year under report.

*Scholarships paid from the interest on Donations*:—There is an increase of Rs. 120 under this head in the year under report. The Godbole Scholarship for the year has been paid. The bills for other Scholarships were not received, though called for, and hence no other prizes and Scholarships could be paid.

*Scientific Apparatus*:—There is a decrease of Rs. 293 under this head because no appliances were purchased in the year under report.

*Gymnasium*:—There is an increase of Rs. 101 under this item in the year under report. This is due to the fact that in the year 1917-18 this item was not separately shown; in that year payment to gymnasium teachers during three months was made out of the general grant for teacher's establishment.

*Municipal Library*:—This item shows an increase of Rs. 75 in the year, which is due to the fact that the bills for magazines subscribed for in 1917-18 were paid in the year 1918-19.

*Technical School Establishment*:—The expenditure under this head amounts to Rs. 3,042 in the year under report, showing an increase of Rs. 277. The causes of increase are given below:—

1. Pay of Superintendent, increment from Rs. 120 to 130.
2. Pay of the Drawing teacher, increment from Rs. 45 to 50.
3. There was no clerk for the technical School during 1917-18. An appointment of a clerk was made in 1918-19.

*Contingency and Miscellaneous for Technical School*:—The expenditure under this head amounts to Rs. 801, showing an increase of Rs. 505. The increase is due to the fact that some of the bills for 1917-18 had been paid in the year under report, and another cause of increase is the increased rate for materials, such as wood &c.

*Machinery for Technical School*:—The expenditure under this head is Rs. 6-14-6; it requires no explanation.

*Weaving Class*:—There is neither decrease nor increase under this head. The expenditure is Rs. 180. It has to be stated that although one teacher's pay is debited to this head, there is no actual class conducted in any school. The weaving master is employed as an ordinary teacher in one of the primary schools. This anomaly will be discontinued from April 1919.

*Grant to the Deaf and Dumb Institute:*—The Municipality have sanctioned a grant upto a maximum of Rs. 200 p a. to this institute on condition that the grant of Rupees ten per boy on the average be paid. Thus the amount spent under this head comes to Rs '85 only.

*Gratuity:*—The amount spent under this head comes to Rs. 394. Last year no amount was paid. The increase is due to the fact that the gratuities to five peons were paid and hence the increase.

*War allowance and grain compensation:*—There is an increase of Rs. 1905 under this head. The Municipality sanctioned war allowance to their servants from June 1918, instead of grain compensation. This is one cause of increase. Another is that Government in their Order No. 2941 dated 6th November 1918 sanctioned grain compensation to the teachers of Primary Schools according to the scale sanctioned for other Government servants. The Municipality paid grain compensation to these teachers in accordance with Government order from 1st April 1918.

#### General Remarks.

*Free and Compulsory Education in the Poona City Municipal District:*—The question of making primary education free and compulsory in the Poona City Municipal District came before the Municipality for consideration for the first time in April 1918. The Municipality referred the question to a sub-committee, which in return requested the School Board to take the census of children of school-going age, and give a report on the subject to the Sub-Committee. A rough census was accordingly taken in July with the aid of students, to whom the thanks of the School-Board are due. But no further progress was made by the Committee, as the period of the office of the Committee expired on 13th September 1918. The new Committee came in office in October 1918. The new School-Board prepared a detailed scheme showing the initial and recurring cost of making primary education free and compulsory in the case of boys and girls.

In the opinion of the School-Board of the Poona City Municipality the time had arrived when the Municipality ought to make primary education free and compulsory as provided by Bombay Act No. I of 1918, and any scheme of compulsory education must make adequate provision for housing all Municipal Schools in suitable buildings, owned by the Municipality; the compulsion should be applied to boys only in the first instance. The question of bringing the girls under the operation of the Act should be left open for the consideration of the General Board, as it will entail a very heavy outlay. The General Body with a view to strengthen its hands as regards the correctness of the financial proposals referred it to a small sub-committee; these proposals have not yet been received. Whatever the report of the sub-committee may be, it may safely be assumed that the Poona City Municipality is bound to make a beginning in the matter of compulsion of boys at no distant date.

*School Buildings:*—This is the most important question which the School-Board will have to take in hand in a short time. The present housing

accommodation for schools is far from being satisfactory. The question of having buildings owned by the Municipality for primary schools is engaging the attention of the Municipality, which will be seen from the fact that Government sanctioned a grant of Rs. 25,000, and a loan of equal amount for acquiring four sites. The Municipality accepted the grant on conditions laid down by Government in their Order No. 765 dated 18-3-18. The negotiations for the acquisition of sites are in progress ; and it is expected that by the end of the year 1919-20 the Municipality will have three sites, and it is proposed to earmark Rs. 10,000 every year for the purpose of School buildings and then it is hoped to have every year at least one School Building of our own in future. The School-Board have further made a representation to the Government for a free building grant of R. 1,00,000 and it is hoped that the request, made by the Board, will be accepted by Government. The School Board takes the opportunity of thanking Mr. D. V. Nagarkar for giving his piece of land in Ganesh Peth free of charge to the Municipality for a School Building.

A separate note, dealing with the progress of the education of Mahomedan children attending the Urdu schools under the control of this Municipality, is attached herewith ( vide Appendix ).

In conclusion, I cannot conclude this report without referring to the valuable help, rendered by my colleagues on the Board and the Secretary of the Board.

### The Administration Report of the School Board.

A note on the progress of Mahomedan education in Urdu Schools of this Municipality in the year 1918-19 under review, as per Government Resolution.

In the year under report there were nine day Schools and one night School; of these five were for boys and four for girls. Two day Schools are entirely free. The rates of fees charged in Urdu Schools are much lower than those charged in Marathi Schools as will be seen from the following table:—

All the Girls Schools are free.

There were in the year under report 591 students on the rolls, The number of boys and girls were 463 and 128 respectively as against 422 and 144 of last year.

The monthly average attendance was 290 and 78. The Schools were closed from the 26 th September 1918 to 9 th November 1918 owing to the prevalence of the Influenza Epidemic in the City, on account of which and malaria, which has now made an abode here, the general attendance had much fallen as in the case of other Marathi Schools

There were 31 teachers, out of whom 14 were trained. With the object of enhancing efficiency of Schools, by employing still more trained Teachers in the Urdu Schools, the School Board has requested the Government to provide the Municipality with some trained teachers, but the Department could not do so. The Board finds it very difficult to secure the services of even Vernacular passed men knowing Urdu and for this very reason unqualified people had to be employed in some places. The School Board had also made a provision of Scholarships to be awarded to mahomedan candidates for undergoing training course in Poona Training College for men; but no candidate availed of this opportunity. The School Board is going to open the coaching Classes for such teachers as have not passed even the Vernacular Final Examination. In order to increase the efficiency of the teachers, the question of opening a normal class is before the Municipality.

#### EXAMINATIONS

The Schools were examined from the 15 th February 1919 to 20 th by the Board of Examiners, selected from amongst the Urdu senior trained teachers. The Superintendent of Municipal Schools supervised all the examinations and scrutinised the results personally.

The Schools were inspected by the Deputy Educational Inspector of Urdu Schools, C. D. with the help of his asisstant and the Girl Schools by the Inspectress of Urdu Girls' Schools, C. D. in the months of July and Agust. The remarks are not still to hand.

The School Board with the consent of the mahomedan community substituted Friday as a holiday in place of Sundy.

An English class has been attached to one of the Urdu Schools as an experimental measure It is doing much benefit to the students and the Deputy Inspector's remarks are favourable The Board strongly hopes that it will be made permanent in a short time.

**EXPENDITURE.**

The Municipality incurred an expenditure of Rs. 9, 311/- for the education of the children of Urdu Schools during the year under report.

**GENERAL REMARKS.**

One of these full Primary Schools maintained by this Municipality is specially reserved for the mahomedan children in the heart of the City. And it is under the management of the most senior third year trained Head Master. This School sends candidates for the Vernacular Final Examination every year.

The Board is also making provision for housing accomodation for the schools and one of the four sites proposed for the erection of new School buildings by the Municipality this year, is meant for the Urdu School to be located in Ganesh Peth.

**REMARKS OF THE S. B.**

The School Board it will be seen, is giving due attention to the question of Urdu Schools and it is hoped that steady improvement will be marked year after year. The object of the Board is to see that all classes do get proper education and it is prepared even to spend proportionately larger sums over education of backward classes.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit herewith the Annual Report on the condition and administration of the Public Health of Poona City for the year 1918-1919.

### I. AREA AND POPULATION.

The area of the City is 6.38 sq. miles and the population according to the Census of 1911 is 1,17,256. It must be stated here that this figure is below the actual number, as there has been a large influx of people in the City owing to the war. This fact will clearly be seen from the occupation of all the vacant and dilapidated houses in the eastern Peths of the City by several military clerks with their families. The number thus increased together with the natural increase will go to 15,000; thus the estimated population will come up to 1,32,000 approximately. This rise in the population has made no small effect on the general living of the permanent residents of the City, and on the general mortality.

### II. VITAL STATISTICS.

1. *Registration of Births* :—The number of still births registered during the year was 182 as against 165 of the previous year.

The number of births registered during the year is 3,288 as against 2,436 of the last year and the birth rate works out to 28.04. This marked increase is due to the interest taken by some members of the Sanitary

Board and by the superior inspectorial staff of the Sanitary Department. The registration is, however, not perfect since it has to depend upon the road sweepers and individual informants for information. Notification by placards and by the beat of "Davandi" were given to the public and this, together with some test prosecutions, has brought in some more informations. The pays of the Registration clerks are recommended for some increase and the rate of rewards to be given to the road-sweepers is raised to one anna for each birth information brought by a road-sweeper.

2. *Registration of Deaths* :—The total number of deaths registered from all causes during the year was 9,722 as against 8,744 of the last year. The abnormal increase in the mortality was due to the havoc played by influenza in the two months of September and October especially, when no less than 529 deaths from Influenza and 3,188 deaths from respiratory diseases were recorded. The general debility produced by this disease coupled with the prevalence of malaria and other famine-diseases has increased the general mortality rate of the City to a great extent. The death rate for this year thus comes to 82.91.

3. *Infant Mortality* :—The infant mortality was 3,317 as against 2,533 of the last year. The increase is due to the prevalence of Influenza and to the deficient rain-fall.

4. *Infectious Diseases* :—Plague, Cholera, Small-Pox, Measels and malaria were all prevalent but not in an epidemic form during the year. Influenza was the chief disease of the year.

(a) *Plague* :—(i) With the exception of July, plague was prevalent throughout the year in a very mild form. 67 deaths in all are registered as due to Plague as against 1,693 of the last year when it was in an epidemic form. This year it was chiefly confined to Mehun Pura in Shanwar and Bhoi allî in Kasba from whence it did not spread owing to the prompt preventive measures taken by the Department and owing to the systematic Rat Campaign under the supervision of the Government Inspector.

(ii) *Rat Campaign* :—No definite opinion can, however, be given about the efficiency of this measure as absence of Plague for two years from the City is not an infrequent occurrence.

(b) *Cholera* :—52 deaths are registered from cholera, May and June alone giving 30. The disease did not assume an epidemic form as the usual precautionary measures were promptly adopted.

(c) *Small-Pox* :—The mortality from small-pox was 189. Cases from this disease were noticed chiefly among the new clerks' families, that came to live in Poona on military duty. Almost all the children that succumbed were not vaccinated. Vigorous efforts were made by the Department to visit places where small-pox cases had occurred and tried to induce the people to take advantage of vaccination but to no purpose. It is quite necessary to make Vaccination

compulsory. The first and the last three months of the year were very bad, they alone registering 168 deaths.

- (d) *Measles* :—This epidemic has also registered 169 deaths.
- (e) *Malaria* :—Malaria is gaining a firm footing in the City day by day, and the Municipality has been seriously thinking over it. A Sub-Committee consisting of medical practitioners on the body was formed and is considering the causation &c., of the malady. It is hoped that something will be done very soon in the matter.
- (f) *Influenza* :—This can be said to be the chief disease of the year as it alone registered nearly 3,500 deaths. It visited the city on two occasions—the first in the month of June 1918 when it was mild and then after a respite of two months it returned with renewed violence. At the time of the second epidemic, the total mortality of the City was normal till about the 5th of September, but after that date it began to rise rapidly, the highest daily mortality being above 200 by the end of September 1918. The epidemic subsided at the end of October. A detailed report has already been made by the Health Officer to the President at the end of the epidemic, and the following is a short history of the 'Mystery fever'. The coming of the disease was not anticipated and it came and spread with a lightning speed, taking a heavy toll of City's population during such a short time of two months. When the mortality began to assume alarming proportions and a pandemic seemed imminent, it was felt that the personnel of the Health Department for normal times and in ordinary out-breaks of the usual infectious diseases, would not be able to cope with the situation and that measures on a larger scale would be necessary. The President called meetings of the General Committee almost every day and a sum of Rs. 10,000 was placed at the disposal of the President for the expenditure that would be incurred in adopting the necessary measures. Organised efforts were made for medical relief by opening hospitals and dispensaries and co-operation from voluntary organisations was also availed of.

#### ADVICE REGARDING PRECAUTIONARY MEASURES.

- (i) Notifications were published from time to time, in all the local newspapers, advising the public to take the precautionary measures.

#### VOLUNTARY AGENCIES.

- (ii) The response to the appeal made by the Municipality was very gratifying. Volunteers in large numbers came forward and in a short time relief measures

were organized on a scale and in a manner which do credit to those energetic gentlemen and to the City. Prof. Kanitkar of the Deccan Education Society and Mr. D. H. Bhat of the Arogya Mandal deserve special mention for the untiring efforts they made in helping the Municipality at this critical time.

- (iii) Temporary Dispensaries and one Hospital with two Wards—One for Allopathic and the other for Ayurvedic treatment—were at once started. The temporary dispensaries were opened by the Municipality as well as voluntary organisation, in conspicuous places in the City in localities inhabited by the poor, and at these, stock mixtures were kept for distribution. Additional medical men and Volunteers were put on to visit the poor and treat them in their homes if unwilling or too ill to go to the hospital. The disease subsided after causing a serious dislocation of trade and family life, and the dispensaries and hospitals were closed. I particularly wish to bring to your notice the very satisfactory manner in which the heavy work caused by the epidemic was carried out by the entire staff of the Health Department though it was not paid any extra allowance for the same.

#### AYURVEDIC HOSPITALS.

It will not be out of place here to make a special mention of the Temporary Ayurvedic Hospitals started and conducted with conspicuous success during the terrible Influenza epidemic of the year under report. While the whole city was writhing beneath the crushing weight of the malady an Ayurvedic Ward or rather Hospital was opened in the buildings of the New Poona College kindly placed by its Principal at the disposal of the Municipality. Another Ayurvedic Hospital and a Dispensary were also opened in Bhawani Peth by the kindness, public spirit and sacrifice of Messrs Poman and S. A. Maturkar, a well known Councillor of this Municipality. But it must be noted with pleasure that the idea of such a Hospital was brought to the fore-front and materialised by the efforts of the Poona Vaidya Mandal through its President, Mr. Vasudeo Shastri Shedanikar and its energetic Secretary Mr. Krishna Shastri Kavade who was assisted by his zealous colleagues, Messrs. Appasaheb Gadre, Joshi, Apte, Date, Jadhav and others. It has, however, to be admitted that the scheme would never have been carried out had not the late lamented Mr. H. N. Apte, the then President, given the scheme his whole hearted approval. The starting of an Ayurvedic Hospital to meet a pandemic was in itself a bold experiment. For, as rightly observed by Mr. N. C. Kelkar, the President of the Municipality in his address to Lord Willingdon, it was the Ayurvedic system of treatment that was so to say on its trial. The trial was confidently accepted, nay, invited by the Mandal and there is now no doubt that the best traditions of Ayurved have thereby been amply vindicated. The opening of Ayurvedic Hospitals was a novel and unique step. No-where in the whole of the Presidency was such an experiment tried or even contemplated at such a time of grave crisis; and the

Poona Municipality was well advised in coming forward to support the beneficial experiment initiated by the Vaidya Mandal. As to the marvellous success of the Ayurvedic treatment Dr. Paterson of the Mission Hospital and Miss Henry, a nurse of the Willingdon War Hospital have borne personal testimony. But more than their success in treatment, the Ayurvedic Hospitals carried out another great object. They inspired in the mind of the suffering people a confidence which nothing else could have created. This fact is prominently mentioned in his report by Prof. Kanitkar of the Fergusson College who said that the unwillingness of the stricken people to submit to the Hospital treatment was insuperable. Nothing could induce them to go to a Hospital ; but when the Ayurvedic Hospitals were opened, they were exceedingly eager to avail themselves of that treatment. The Poona Vaidya Mandal came forward at a critical time and without any remuneration voluntarily undertook at much personal cost and troubles to look after and treat the patients in the Municipal Hospital for which the Mandal and its Secretary deserve the special thanks of the Municipality. Government also have kindly watched the methods of treatment at the Mandal's Ward, and the Municipality would gladly note that Government have agreed to look at the support which the Municipality accorded to the Ayurvedic system, in a liberal and sympathetic spirit. This fact goes a long way to prove not only that the expenditure of the Municipality on its Ayurvedic Dispensaries is necessary and justifiable, but that a permanent Ayurvedic Hospital supported by the Municipality is a crying need.

### III. SANITARY CONVENIENCES.

#### (LATRINES & URINALS).

59 public latrines with 403 seats, and 63 urinals continued to exist in the City for the use of the public. The total number of habitable houses in the City was 14,000 approximately, of which more than one-fourth were without privy accommodation of their own. The public conveniences are, therefore, not equal to the demands of the people availing of them. To compel house-owners to have privy accommodation of their own, vigorous steps were taken during the year, but the results are not yet very satisfactory. Provision is made for constructing 10 urinals of a suitable type for the next year and this, it is hoped, will fulfil the demand for the same.

### IV. DRAINAGE.

The work of giving free and extra connections to private houses was unfortunately very much delayed and little progress was made in that direction, the result being that several houses are still left without their privy and house-drains connected to the new sewers. This failure is one of the biggest draw-backs from a sanitary point of view and must have been producing no small effect upon the general health condition of the City.

Provision is made for constructing 10 new head-load Pail-Depots in different parts of the City and this will greatly minimise the trouble given by the Bhangis in removing the nightsoil to a great distance. Only one Pail-Depot was constructed this year.

### V. MILK SUPPLY & CATTLE SHEDS.

The By-laws, drafted by the Sanitary Committee to improve the most insanitary and objectionable conditions of private milch-cattle stables in

the City, are still before the General Body and no improvement could be expected in this direction, until they are sanctioned and allowed to be brought into force. [ The bad milk supply of the City is causing the infant mortality to increase and the sooner the Municipality moves in this respect the better.]

#### VI. NOTICES UNDER THE ACT.

The number of notices issued by the Health Department under various Sections of the District Municipal Act during the year under report was 2,396 against 1844 issued last year. 931 of the total were cancelled owing to compliance and 1546 (including 81 of the last year) were sent for prosecution. Convictions were obtained in 729 cases, 142 were dismissed; 542 were withdrawn as the offences ceased to exist, and 133 are pending disposal by the Court. The slow process of hearing the cases greatly hinders the work of the Sanitary Department; and frequently, however, on account of the leniency of the Honorary Magistrates or want of evidence or some technical detail, the prosecution fails; or the fines are so trivial as to be ludicrous and the efforts of the Inspectors go in vain. Nothing but constant active support of the Magistrates will ever have any effect. It will, therefore, be much better if a special magistrate is appointed to try municipal cases. This will certainly ensure much progress towards the Court work of the Department and will create a proper impression on the minds of the general public.

#### VII. MEDICAL RELIEF.

Two English Dispensaries ( One in Nana's and the other in Narayan Peth ) and one Ayurvedic Dispensary in Sadashiv Peth, were maintained by the Municipality for giving free medical relief to the poor and the following figures will show the number of patients treated at these charitable Dispensaries during the year under review.

It will be seen from these figures that the dispensaries are very much availed of by the public and their existence is thus justified. The Medical Officers of these dispensaries together with their staff have done valuable work during the last influenza epidemic and this was duly acknowledged by the Municipality by paying them extra remuneration for their work.

#### VIII. ESTABLISHMENT.

##### ( i ) HEALTH OFFICE.

Dr. B. S. Photographer, L. R. C. P., D. P. H., &c. resigned his post by the end of February 1919 and Mr. G. A. Godbole, the Senior Sanitary Inspector, was temporarily appointed to act in his place.

## ( ii ) SANITARY INSPECTORS.

Three of the qualified Sanitary Inspectors resigned their posts during the year and went away to better their prospects. New persons were appointed in their places, but this has had some effect upon the caliber of the staff. It is feared that this municipality's service is being made a stepping stone for securing jobs in mofussil municipalities, and the Committee will have to seriously consider this.

## ( iii ) SUBORDINATE OUTDOOR STAFF.

This remained the same, but the Sanitary Committee is considering a proposal from the Acting Health Officer regarding the re-organization of this staff, and it is hoped that this scheme will secure capable and efficient men for the Department.

## ( iv ) OFFICE STAFF.

A proposal, made by the Chief Officer, is before the Committee regarding some improvements in this branch, and some improvements are very soon expected.

## ( v ) LABOUR STAFF.

The manual work which the Sanitary Department has to do, may be divided into two branches—one Dry Branch or Road Conservancy, and the other Wet Branch or the Bhangi Service. The Sanitary Committee has asked the Ag. Health Officer to submit his proposals regarding the re-organization of the same and he, in his turn, is giving his serious attention to the question.

## ( vi ) DEPARTMENTAL REMOVAL OF RUBBISH &amp;c.

This system of removal of Kachra &c., is giving out very good results, though the cost is a little high, but it must be remembered that economy and efficient work will never go hand in hand. The City presented a very clean appearance during the last monsoon months and the credit is mainly due to this system of work. The Department was never during this year at the mercy of the contractors as before.

## ( vii ) GENERAL REMARKS.

The sanitary condition of the City has of late become a very delicate question and the general health of the City is giving a very strong cause for anxiety to the Municipality in general and to the Sanitary Committee in particular. Critics are to be found everywhere, but mere criticism will surely not mend matters.

## ( ix ) SANITARY COMMITTEE.

In the year under report the Sanitary Committee consisted of ( for the first 6 months ) Mr. S. G. Lavate, ( as chairman ), Dr. V. C. Gokhale, Mr. S. A. Manurkar, Mr. G. M. Damle, Mr. Mirjafar Alli Khan, Prof. S. R. Bhagwat, Mr. G. V. Malwadkar and Mr. D. H. Bhat; and of ( for the second 6 months ) Dr. K. G. Lohokare, ( as chairman ) and G. S. Sahasrabudhe, Mr. S. G. Lavate, Mr. S. A. Manurkar, V. P. Kavadeshastri, Mr. P. N. Pataskar and Shet Chimanlal Kisandas.

Shet Chimanlal ceased to be a member of the Sanitary Committee owing to his continued absence and Subhedar Bahadur Posheti Muri was elected in his place.

Out of 60 meetings called, 42 were held and business was transacted. My Committee exercised general supervision and control over the Department and my thanks are due to the members of the Committee for the very kind and able help received by me from them. At the close of the year the following important propositions were under consideration of the Committee :—

1. Appointment of a Health Officer who will be more responsible to the Municipality than to Government.
2. Re-organisation of the Out-Door Staff of the Health Department.
3. Re-organisation of the Conservancy-Labour Staff of the Department.
4. Construction of 10 head load Pail-Depots at suitable places in the City.
5. Construction of an incinerator to cremate dead bodies at Lakadi Pool.
6. Construction of 10 Urinals of a new and suitable pattern.
