and in line 8, after "undertaking", to insert "industry".

The motion accordingly negatived. On the motion of the Chairman,

Resolved: To add at the end " or any provincial administration ",

and that the following be a proviso to the Clause:

Provided that if any number of persons employed in any department of the Government in any undertaking, industry, trade or occupation is, with the approval of the Minister of that department, a party to, or is represented upon, any industrial council or like body existing for the consideration and regulation of matters of mutual interest to employers and employees in that undertaking, industry, trade or occupation or the prevention or settlement of disputes between them, such persons and any other persons so employed in that department may, with the approval of the said Minister, be a party to, or be represented upon, any industrial council established under section two of this Act.

Clause, as amended, put and agreed to.

On Clause Two,

On the motion of the Chairman,

Resolved: In line 15, to omit the heading "Conciliation" and to substitute "Prevention and Settlement of industrial disputes"; (S.C. 5-'83.)

that sub-sections (1) and (2) be omitted, and that the following be new Clauses to follow sub-section (2):—

- 2. (1) Any employer or association of employers may agree with a registered trade union or group of registered trade unions for the establishment of an industrial council for the consideration and regulation, in accordance with the provisions of this Act, of matters of mutual interest to them and the prevention and settlement of disputes between them. Upon compliance with the conditions prescribed in this section, any industrial council the establishment of which is so agreed upon shall be registered under this Act.
 - (2) An application for the registration of an industrial council shall be made in writing to the Minister by the parties to such agreement, who shall furnish with the application information as to—
 - (a) the authority under which the application is made;
 - (b) the numbers and occupations of the persons authorizing the application;
 - (c) the character of the undertaking, industry, trade or occupation in respect of which it is desired that the industrial council shall be registered;
 - (d) the area for which it is desired that the industrial council shall be registered; and
 - (e) the situation of the head office of the industrial council; together with a copy of the constitution and rules of the industrial council and of any agreements between the parties.

The Minister may require the applicant to furnish such further information as he may deem to be necessary.

- (3) If the Minister is satisfied that the agreement for the establishment of the industrial council is in accordance with the terms of sub-section (1) of this section; that the constitution and rules are satisfactory; that all conditions prescribed by this Act have been complied with; and that the industrial council would be sufficiently representative within any area of the particular undertaking, industry, trade or occupation, he shall register the constitution and rules for the particular area mentioned in the certificate. No alteration of the constitution and rules so registered shall have effect until a copy of the proposed alteration has been submitted to and approved by the Minister.
- (4) Whenever the Minister is satisfied that an agreement has been reached between a registered industrial council and any other person, registered trade union or organization of employers for the extension of the constitution of such council to any other undertaking, industry, trade or occupation or to any further area and that such extension would be in accordance with the provisions of this Act, he may register such extension.
- (5) Whenever the Minister is satisfied in respect of a registered industrial council—

- (a) that it has ceased to exist or to perform its functions under this Act; or
- (b) that a resolution for the removal of its name from the register has been passed by a majority of its members at a meeting held in accordance with its rules; or
- (c) that a majority of the representatives of the employers or a majority of the representatives of the employees upon the council have resigned therefrom;

the Minister may cause the name of the council to be removed from the register.

(3). (1) The rules of a registered industrial council shall, provide for—

- (a) the appointment of an equal number of representatives of employers and employees and of alternates, and the method of such appointment;
- (b) the election of a chairman and, whenever the occasion arises, of a person to preside over meetings in his absence, and the method of such election;
- (c) the appointment of other necessary officers;
- (d) the times when, and circumstances in which, officers shall vacate their offices and members their seats;
- (e) the times and places for the holding of meetings;
- (f) the keeping of minutes of meetings;
- (g) the method of procedure for dealing with disputes coming under the consideration of the Council; and
- (A) all other matters necessary to be governed by rule.
- (2) Upon the settlement of any dispute or other matter by a registered industrial council, a memorandum of the terms of settlement shall be drawn up and signed by the parties or their representatives, and a copy of the memorandum shall forthwith be transmitted to the Minister.
- 4. (1) If in any area no industrial council exists under section two of this Act in respect of a particular undertaking, industry, trade or occupation, any employer or organization of employers, or trade union or organization of employers concerned in that area in that undertaking, industry, trade or occupation may apply to the Minister for the appointment of a conciliation board for the consideration and determination of any dispute in that area between any employer and any of his employees in that undertaking, industry, trade or occupation, and upon the receipt of such application the Minister may take immediate steps for the appointment of such a board.
- (2) A conciliation board shall consist of such number of persons, not being less than six, as the Minister may determine, and for each member there may be an alternate member. Half of such members with their alternates, if any, shall be employers, and half shall be employees nominated by any trade union or organization of the employees concerned. Where, in the opinion of the Minister, there is no organization or trade union sufficiently representative of the employers

or trade union sufficiently representative of the employers [8.C. 5-23.]

or the employees respectively, he may, if he deem fit, cause the members of the conciliation board to be nominated directly by the employers or employees themselves or partly by any organization or trade union and partly by the employers or employees. Where such method of nomination is not adopted, the Minister may himself directly appoint the members of the conciliation board.

On sub-section (3),

On the motion of the Chairman, Resolved: In line 30, to omit "inspector" and to substitute "Minister" and that this sub-section be a sub-section (3) to new Clause 4.

On Clause Two, standing over,

On the motion of the Chairman,

Resolved: That the following be new Clauses to follow subsection (3):-

5. (1) A conciliation board shall appoint a chairman from amongst its members and when the chairman is absent a vicechairman. In the absence for any cause of any members of the board, the alternate of that member may sit and vote as a member.

No act or proceeding of a conciliation board shall be invalid by reason only that there was a defect in the appointment of any member or that any vacancy existed in the membership.

(2) A majority of the total number of members shall be a quorum at any meeting. Meetings shall be held at such times and places as the board may from time to time determine. Minutes of the proceedings of every meeting shall be kept and shall be submitted to the next meeting and confirmed after necessary correction in such a manner as may be determined by the board.

6. (1) If both parties to any dispute which is under the consideration of any industrial council or conciliation board established under this Act apply to the Minister for the appointment of a mediator in respect of such dispute, or if the Minister is at any time satisfied that the settlement of any matter by any industrial council or conciliation board can be assisted thereby, he shall appoint a person to be mediator in respect of such dispute.

(2) A mediator so appointed may attend the meetings of the council or board at which such dispute is considered, and may act as chairman thereof. He shall confer with the members of the council or board, conduct such enquiries and investigations as may appear to him to be necessary, endeavour to bring about a settlement of the dispute by the parties thereto, and make a report to the Minister as to the results of his mediation.

7. An industrial council or conciliation board may agree to abide by the decision of one or more arbitrators for the determination of such dispute. Such council or board shall thereupon make the appointment or request the Minister to do so, and upon receipt of any such request the Minister shall make the

appointment.

On sub-section (4),

On the motion of the Chairman, Resolved: In line 35, to omit "Every" and to substitute "In the performance of any duty under this Act an industrial council or "; in the same line, after "board" to insert "or arbitrator"; in the same line, to omit "for its purposes"; in line 36, to alter "jurisdictions" into the singular; in line 40, after "any" to insert "industrial council or"; to add at the end "or before an arbitrator"; that the following be a proviso to the sub-section:

Provided that no offence shall be deemed to have been committed by any member of any such council or board, or by any such arbitrator, who bone fide and for good reasons communicates to any party to a dispute under consideration any such information as is referred to in section five of the said Act.

and that this sub-section be Clause Eight.

Resolved: That the following be a new Clause to follow Clause Two:

10. (1) It shall be unlawful in any undertaking, industry, trade or occupation to which this Act applies—

(a) for any employer to make any alteration in the terms of employment of any employee; or

(b) for any employee to demand an alteration of the terms of his employment

unless one calendar month's notice of such alteration or of such demand has been given by the employer to the employee or by the employee to the employer, as the case may be: Provided that a shorter period may be agreed upon by both parties.

(2) If, within fourteen days of the receipt by an employer or employee of any such notice, the person receiving it refers the subject-matter of the notice to an industrial council having jurisdiction, or where there is no such council applies to the Minister for the appointment of a conciliation board and the Minister appoints a conciliation board upon such application in terms of section four of this Act, the alteration of terms of employment of which notice was given shall not have effect until the matter has been determined, or has been reported on by the industrial council or conciliation board, as the case may be.

On Clause Three,

On the motion of the Chairman,
