RECEIVED a Letter from the Commodore & Council of Cochin Dated the 7th. Instant N.S. Wherein they say that having wrote us on the 9th. December 1740 Concerning the Exchange of Deserters and we had wrote them under the 26th. following that we Could not Enter into any such Engagement with them without Liberty from the Gov^r. & Council of Bombay, to whom we had Transmitted their Letter; and when we Received their answer it should be sent to them; but as Several Months had past & they had Reced no Answer to Such a Salutary Proposition to both Nations, which was practiced In Bengall & On the Cormandell Coast Without the Least Opposition, they were much Surprized at it & Demanded of us to give them a Catagorical Answer, whether we would or not make Such An Agreement for the Exchange of Deserters.

WROTE a General Letter Under this Date to the Commodore & Council of Cochin In Answer to One Reced from them yesterday, Our Answer Which was Dispatched this Day is As follows.

Instant N.S. in which you Require a Catagorical Answer of us in Respect to the Exchange of Deserters, which by Our Letter of the 26 December (which you Acknowledged to have Received) Your Hon^r. & c^a. may Perceive we Cannot give you, till we are Authorized so to do by the Honble the President and Council of Bombay, to Whom we Transmitted what you had been pleas'd to write us on that Subject; But Altho' as yet we have Reced no Other Answer than that they would take it into their Consideration we presume there is no Reason to Doubt But Your Hon^r. & c^a. will be Informed at the beginning of the Ensuing fair Monsoon What Resolution they may Come to in this Affair, which shall then be Immediately Transmitted to you. EXTRACT OF THE LETTER FROM ANJENGO.

They Acknowledge to have Reced Ours of the 28th. May with Duplicate of Our Letter by the Hallifax, which Ship Passed there in sight of their Flag on the 18th. of that month, when they had got Boats ready, which would have taken Every thing Out of her for that Settlement in an hour or two, If the Com^r. had only laid too & not anchord. That it was rightly Judged in us to fill up that Ship as the Surf seldom Admits of doing much business after May setts in.

The King of Travencore Continued the Seige of the Dutch Fort of Quilechee, where they had two Sloops; but by the Kings Forces were prevented Landing any Men &c^a.

They Expected Changanaut's forces Joyned by the Dutch in a Small time would Invade those parts, when they must Expect any Evil that Could be put In Practice Against them, Wherefore they Requested we would send them as soon as Possible Fifty Barrells of Gun powder & two Candys of Iron by a Munchua.

Sent a Packet to be forwarded to the Presidency.

THIS day Reced a Letter dated the 13th. past Month from the Presid^t. & Council of Fort St. George wherein they Acknowledge the Receipt of Our Letters of the 2^d. & 10 May with one of the 6th. from Mr. West by the Hallifax which Ship Arrived there on the 5th. June & they Expecting a Ship would be bound to this Coast in September Next they would send the Treasure, Military & Stores Designed for Anjengo On her. They had Given Cap^t. Blake a Receipt for the Pepper they had taken out of the Hallifax, of which they had Advised to Bengall And Passed the Value thereof to the Credit of that Presidency as they should to the Presidency of Bombay The Amount of the Coir Freight on the Burmudus Sloop.

Our Honble Masters Ships Prince of Orange & London were Arrived there from England, both Consigned to the Bay, so they had No Packet, and therefore were Inpatient for the King William Consigned Directly for that Place. When those Ships Left England the 20th. February, the War Continued with Spain.

RECEIVED a Letter from Francisco Dias Linguist at Callicut—Advising that the Samorine Intended to Come thither About the End of this Month That the Merchants of Burgorah sent thither In Boats Several Quantitys of Pepper for Which he Understood they Asked at the rate of One hundred and Ten Rupees $\frac{3}{4}$ Candy.

LATE Last Night Arrived Pattamars from Anjengo with a Letter dated the 3^{Inst}. from the Chief and Factors there and One to be forwarded to the Presidency. They Acknowledge the Receipt of our Letter of the 17th. Past Month and write that the Garrison of the Dutch Fort at Quileche had Surrenderd at Discretion of the King of Travencore through the want of Provisions they being very Apprehensive of Insults from y^e. Dutch & that the French might be Expected there at the Opening of the Season with whom they Supposed we might be at Warr; Therefore they requested we would send them Twenty five Topasses & a Gunner to remain there till such time as the Recruits Arrived from Fort St. George.

THE Munchua Not being Sailed Mr. Wake Immediately Orderd the Quarter Gunner ashore who had been appointed to take Care of the Powder and sent Mr. Charles Garden our Gunners Mate in his stead, advising the Chief of Anjengo Accordingly, As also that In the Morning their Request for Recruits should be taken Into Consideration & they advised of Our Resolution in respect thereto Either by their Pattamars or a Munchua with them.

Opened & Read a Generall Letter this Day from the President and Council of Fort St. George Dated the 24 Ult^o. Copy of Sundry Par^a. therein is ORDERD to be Enterd After this Consultation.

The Request made by the Gentlemen of Anjengo in their Last Lett^r: for a Detachment of Twenty five Topasses being taken Into Consideration Altho they do not Mention the State of their Garrison it May Reasonably be Supposed they were In want of a Sufficient Number of Men for the Defence of the Fort by the Presidency their thinking proper to Send a Reinforcement thither.

By the Letter from Fort St. George this Day Reced, we are given to Understand that a war with France is Judged to be Near at hand & that Five hundred Men from Pondicherry are to be Expected this way In October or November next, who may Stop at Quilechee, when, If the King of Travencore Should Adhere to his former

Invitation & Agreement with the French, (which it may be hoped he will not as he hath taken the Dutch Fort without their Assistance) and War Should be Declared with France, very bad Consequences may Ensue therefrom to the Settlement at Anjengo, But as the Gentlemen there are the best Judges of their Own Circumstances; It is AGREED that as soon as the weather will permit we send them by a Munchua Twenty five Topasses of Our Garrison with a Serjent to Govern them During their Passage.

It is Agreed to send 25 Men & a Serjent to their Assistance.

ORDERED that the Commanding Officer Draw out a Serjent and Twenty five Topasses to be got In Readiness to send to Anjengo And that a Letter be wrote to the Chief and Factors there giving them the Advices from Fort St. George with a List of Shipping.

Letter Orderd to be wrote them.

Francisco Dias having Lately wrote that Small Quantitys of Pepper are Coming from Burgorah to Callicut and we being orderd by Our Superiours at Bombay to Procure all we Possibly Can, And also Observing the large Quantity of Tonnage Intended this year for this side India. ORDER'D That Mr. William West be Sent thither so Soon as the Weather will permit to Purchase Pepper, And that Propper Instructions be drawn up for that Purpose and Deliverd him and that he now Delivers his Key of the Treasury to Mr. Geo: Hamilton and his Charge of the Office of Pay Master to Mr. Thomas Byfeld During his absence.

Mr. William West Orderd to Repair to Callicut to Purchase Pepper.

There Remaining Eighty three Candys of Pepper at Mangalore Purchased there last Year by Mr. Tho^o, Purnell & as about the Month of Oct^r. Piraticall Boats May render the Passage hither Unsafe, It is AGREED that Mr. Purnell Repairs thither in a Toney with a Guard of four Topasses & Sends the Said Pepper with all Expedition. The Ballance Remaining In the Treasury being But thirteen thousand four hundred One Rupees and an half & no likelyhood of Hur Comotys Complying with his Contract made with the Presidency last year. It is Also AGREED that Mr. Purnell send hither at the return of the Boat he goes in, The Sum of Ten thousand Rupees of the Twenty three thousand Lodged in the Portugueze Factors hands, and that with the Remainder he Use his Utmost Endeavours to Purchaze what Pepper may be remaining of the Last years Crop, but If None be Procurable, to Return hither with the Pepper now there, and leave the Remaing. thirteen thousand Rupees In the hands of the said Factor to be in Readyness for Purchasing Rice, or Sent hither as Our Occasions may Require.

Mr. Purnell orderd to Repair to Mangalore for forwarding thither the Pepper Lying there.

ORDERED that Proper Instructions be Drawn Out & Deliverd to Mr. Purnell, also that a Generall Letter be prepared for the Presidency to go by him, & forwarded by Sea to Goa, or Otherwise As Shall Appear to him most Safe & Expeditious, And from thence to Bombay by Padre John Alexander to whom the Chief will write a Letter for that Purpose.

Instructions Orderd to be Drawn Out for him & a Letter wrote to the Presidency.

COPY OF SUNDRY PARAGRAPHS OF THE LETTER RECED THIS DAY FROM FORT ST. GEORGE.

THE 18th. Arrived the King William Cap^t. Sanders who brought us our Honble Masters Commands of the 6th. Feb^r. wherein they are Pleased to write us that the war against Spain was Continued to be Vigorously Carried On And that a war with France was by most Judged to be Near at hand.

THE French have two Ships Arrived at Pondicherry from France The Triton and Argonaut. The first left the Fort St. George & the Nassau at Johanna the beginning of June both bound for Bombay And we hope you will be Advised of their Arrival there before you receive this however we send you Enclosed A List of Ships arrived in England the Last Season and of those taken up for the Different Parts of India for this. The Somerset Arrived at Portsmouth After the King William & other Ships we Mentioned in Our Last were Dispatched. But there was then no news of the Normanton; We Learn from yours of the 2^d. May the Haeslingfeld had Passed the Cape. The Duke homeward bound was met of that

Place in a very weak Condition by a Danes Ship Arrived at Tanquebar, the Cap^t: of which gives us hopes, that she shortly got there or to St. Hellenah.

We are Advised from Pondicherry that Mons^r. L'Bourdonais the Late Gov^r. of Mascarine was Coming Out with Six Sale of Ships (two of them of Seventy Gunns) It is given Out they Intend to take Mombass on the Coast of Africa, but they hint at some other Secret Expedition Which we are Left to guess at Upon the Late Allaram of the Moratta's they sent for & Reced a Reinforcement of about Six hundred Men from the Islands of whom 'tis said they intend to send five hundred to Myhie.

As DOUBTLESS you will be Previously Advised of Any Commotions that may break Out between the Samorine & the Commonality of Callicut; you will be able to Judge Whether It will be Necessary to Send up the Pepper here for its Security; Wherefore you must proceed in Such Manner as you Judge to be most for the Interest of Our Honble Masters, taking Due Care that the Munchua you may Freight have one of the pass ports we Deliverd you when you Left this place & also to put two Soldiers or Sepoys in Each.

We now Send you Four Candys & Thirteen pounds of Iron Amounting to Fanams Six hundred Seven & a Quarter as ꝯ Invoice Enclosed for Which you must Credit this Settlement.

The Ballance of whose Accompt Consists of Callicut Fanams Two hundred Twenty three thousand Sixty four & one Vis of the Loan lent him for building the factory without Interest & Fan^a. Callicut Four hundred & thirty Seven thousand One hundred fifty Nine & Twelve Vis Principal & Interest on his Ola Dated the 1st. of Aprill 1728 both which you are to Use y^r. Utmost Endeavours to get him now to Discharge.

You will perceive by the 7th. Parragraph of the Commands of the Honble Company to us In their Letter Dated the 23^d. Company, you Must acquaint him that we only Desire liberty of having a Factory there & Hoisting Our Colours in Common with Any other European Nation, but at the same time Acquaint him, that as he has been so Exceeding Dilatory in Discharging the Amount lent him for the Preservation of his Country we do not think that having a factory in any part of his Dominions will be of Any Advantage to our H^o. Employers, till we are Convinced of his Friendship towards them, & for which reason we have Delay'd rebuilding their Factory at Callicut which now is in a ruin'd Condition.

As we find that the French and Others will Make Presents to the Second Samorine you are Likewise to wait on him, & Present him with two peices of Silk Now Sent you for that Purpose.

HAVING Duly Considered the Tenour of Mr. Purnell's Contract for two hundred Candys of Pepper with Hur Comaty In Aprill 1740 When he Reced In part of Payment thereof the Sum of Ten thousand Rupees And the Remainder to be paid him In the September following or Upon the Delivery of the Pepper. We find Hur Comaty has no Manner of Foundation for the Demands he makes As Enter'd Under the 28th. Past, By which Contract we were Under no Obligation to take away the Pepper in September, nor did he Demand the Remainder of the Money for the two hundred Candys, till it was Deliverd In January last, when Mr. Purnell paid him In full for it, as also for Forty Candys Twelve Maunds & Two pounds then Reced of the Bombay Contract for three hundred Candys. And Deliverd Up Comatys Obligation for his Contract for the Two hundred Candys to his Agent, At the same time Offering him Money for the whole Quantity of the Bombay Contract, but his Agent Refused it Not having the Pepper In Readyness, nor Did the Agent then make any Demands, or Comaty on us till those Received on the 28th. Past And altho Comaty did Not Receive the Twenty three thousand Rupees we sent him to Mangalore In the Beginning of May Last, It was then Tender'd his Agent there Least he Should Demand Interest which tender seemed to us most Conformable to the Presidencys Commands to us under the 17th. & 18th. July on Acco^t. of the two hundred Candys of Pepper you Reced of him In January last Amounting to Rupees three thousand two hundred Sixty two, & one Quarter which Sum he pretends to have Suffer'd by that Contract Copy of all which we now Send you Enclosed.

THE Demands Hur Comaty makes on Acco^t. of the two hundred Candys are Doubtless very Unjust, as you made up that Acco^t. with his Agent when you Reced the pepper In January Last, & paid him the Ballance Conformable to the Tenour of your Contract with him Wherefore you must Not pay him Any thing more on that Account.

In his Letter to the Chief he makes a tender of One hundred Candys of Pepper Now Lying at Mangalore at the rate of Twenty Eight Pagodas & an half $\frac{3}{4}$ Candy of Five hundred & Twenty Pounds Averdupoiz which If he will Deliver to you On Acco^t. of the Bombay Contract (he paying all Charges till it is On Board) Receive it as such & give him a Receipt for the same Specifying therein that it is On Account and on the Terms of his Contract with the Gov^r. of Bombay for three hundred Candys, but do not Receive it on any other terms, nor pay him Anything On Account thereof Either for Cost or Charges he having Reced the twenty three thousand Rupees of the Portugueze Factor on Acco^t. of that Contract.

From your not taking Any Notice of Comatys Demand's of Three thousand two hundred Sixty two Rupees one Quarter as above Mention'd, We Conclude you knew Nothing of it but as he has thereby Shewn Such bad Intentions we are Apprehensive he will not clear the Bombay Contract as he Ought, Wherefore After you have talked over this Affair with him or his Agent At Mangulore, in the Speediest as well as the most Distinct Manner, Inform the H^o. the Presid^t. of Bbay hereof, & how he proposes to Clear that Contract Also with what Quantity of Pepper he has at Onore & what at Myrjee Ready to Ship off. Upon the arrival of the Ship there for it; And if you are Satisfied he has at those Ports the Remainder of that Contract which is two hundred fifty nine Candys Seven Maunds & Twenty Six pounds, & will Deliver it Accordingly, you may In such Case Agree with him for the One hundred Candys he has at Mangulore on the best terms you Can, Notwithstanding that we have Mentiond in y^e. RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. West at Callicut Dated the 7th. Instant Acknowledging the Receipt of Our Letter under the 4th. With the accompts. And Papers then Sent him, and writes that As the French & others would make large Presents to the Second Samorine It was Expected that he Should give him One hundred & fifty Rupees Requesting an answer In Respect thereto. That as the Samorine Intended to Chaistize the Commonality of Callicut for their Insults to the late Samorine. The Gov^r. & head of Thirty thousand Nayrs Came to him Privately & Desired him to go & Intercede with the Samorine to disist for three or four Days In which time the People might be brought to their obedience with which the Samorine Complied & those Embroils where happily Accomodated by the Commonality giving some thousands of Fanams and two houses to be burnt, & the Samorine to Burn two Houses at Penany belonging to Some head Nayrs there.

This morning we Reced your Letter Dated the 7th. Inst^t. And very much Approve of your Accomodating the Differences between the Samorine & the Comonality of Callicut And from Each party making the Other Reparation it may be Supposed Something wrong had been Done on both sides.

THE Samorines Stipulated Present is only Sixty Narradys in Tale, which is about One hundred & Eighty Silver Rupees. Indeed it was Augmented, as also that to his Ministers when the Chief met him at Penany In the year 1729 he having then very Considerable Affairs to Transact, and Adjust with the Samorine. It is Customary not to give any thing but to Such as are In his Presence but as it becomes Necessary to wait on the Second Samorine, you have a Sufficient Present for him as we think, but the one hundred & fifty Rupees you and the Linguist Propose further to give him, will make so Small a Distinction between the first & Second as may give Occasion for disgusting the former, and bring on an Ill President, Even at a time when all that is wanted of him is, That the Honble Company be paid their Just Demands: besides, If we give never so much, The French (whom you write will make him Large Presents) will Certainly give more; nor are Others to be Regarded, who are the Samorines Subjects; But we Need Not have Mentiond the Extravagance or Indeed Fantasticalness of the French on Such Occasions you being well acquainted with it.

Thus having Mentiond to you Our Reasons for Not Presenting the Second Samorine Otherwise than as before Directed we must leave it Entirely to you, to Act therein According to the best of your Judgment being well Assured you will not give more than Appears to you absolutely Necessary, Wherefore we Shall only further Observe that we wish you are not Obliged to make further Presents for Recovering the Samorines Debt, when all you give now will be of no Effect in respect thereto.

EXTRACT OF THE LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENCY VIZ^t.

Acknowledged the Receipt of Our Letter Dated the 31st. July with all Others to that time. Enclosed Severall Parragraphs of the Honible the Court of Directors their Commands by the Fort St. George with a List of ships taken up for the Current Year Three of which were Arrived there, The Queen Caroline was Daily Expected there & the Porto Bello of three hundred Tons was Also taken Up & Consign'd thither. Ship Prince of Wales Sailed from Mochoa Directly to Fort St. George with two thousand Bales of Coffee Conformable to the Companys Orders in Respect to that Ship. The Nassau was Dispatched the 20th. of August to Bengall. The Onslow Remains at Bombay till March, Commodore, When she would be sent to China about the middle of October the Fort St. George was Intended to be Sent to Carwarr And Onore for Pepper Expected there, & was to take in Nine hundred Seventy six Candys of Pepper & Ten thousand Seven hundred Peices of Cloth at Anjengo, the remainder of that Ships Lading was to be sent On Board on her Arrival here.

Approved of Our Dispatching the Hallifax Directly from hence on the 2^d. May last Also of the Measures taken for Protecting the C^o. Merchants at Agar in the Month of June, of not Rebuilding Callicut Factory at Least till a Visit is made to the Samorine whose Accompts must by Adjusted And Our Utmost Endeavours Used for Recovering all that is Possible of his Debt. Also for obtaining the Same Liberty of him for Settling at Cota, as the French may Obtain.

ORDER'D us to provide three hundred Candys of Sandalwood for the Onslow which early Notice was given that the best might be bought at the Cheapest Rates, To Provide One hundred & Eighty Coils of Coir Cordage (conformable to An Indent) to be sent on the Emelia Sloop And to fill her up with Coir Also to Provide Ten thousand Pounds of Cardamoms. To Protest against Such who having the Honble Comp^a. Protection, shall Dispose of Any Great Gunns or Small Arms being Contrary to their Orders. They are pleased to Mention their Concern, that we shall not have two thousand four hundred Candys of Pepper In readyness and having So Large a Tonnage to provide for, They think it Necessary that we Continue to Purchase at Out Ports without Limitting the Price, As we Must use Our Endeavours to buy as Cheap as Possible and In respect to Raising the Price here by our Continuing to Purchase at Callicut what is Necessary to be Done therein, They Leave to Our Discretion; being Informed that Hurri Comaty of Onore had three hundred Candys of Pepper to Dispose of at About Eighty Rupees for that Candy, they had Sent a Person to agree with him for it And As Mr. Thomas Purnell was Employed there the Last Season And it will be necessary to have a European to weigh it off & pay for it they recommend the Sending him as the most Proper Person for that Service And for the Adjusting Commatys Demands on his former Contracts. The Dutch Laws are so Severe in respect to Deserters, as their being Returned Is giving them' up to Immediate Death, therefore they Shall Lay that affair before the Honble the Court of Directors and wait their Orders till the Arrival of Which, protection is to be continued to all Deserters as heretofore of which we are to write the commodore and Council of Cochín. The Errors in the Several Invoices Ought to have been guarded Against with the utmost Attention, Wherefore a Standing Rule is Laid Down, that all Acco^{ts}. be Examined by two persons, Who are to Under write they have been so Examined. To Choose Out of the Military Now at this Settlement the best men we Can for Petty Officers. To allow Ensign Davis of the Bengall Detachment the same Pay As other officers of his Rank on this Establishment, But as Reducing that of the Private Men may Occasion Disgust it is Left to us to Act as shall Appear most Convenient. Mr. George Hamilton by the Companys Orders being restored to his standing Should he Desire leave to Repair to the Presidency we may Grant it.

They having been wrote to by the President & Council of Fort St. George, that the French talk of Sending Five hundred Men to Myhie which If true may give a notable turn to the war they are Engaged in with Boyanore; Wherefore they begin to think that provided a Peace Could be obtained on such terms, as

might Promise a full Security to Our trade on the footing it was formerly Enjoyed, it might be better than standing the Chance of such Effects as may proceed from the Superiority of the French; But as we shall know what Dependance may be had on this Report of Large Succours and are Versed in this Important Business they Depend Upon Our Prudence for Managing as we shall Judge most Elligible. To send the Boat Express to Anjengo with their Packet in Case we do not want to Return her Immediately to Bombay.

WROTE a Letter to the Chief and Factors at Anjengo Under this Date Advising them of the Hire & Charges of the two Munchua's sent with the Military and Gun powder towards the Latter End of August last. This Letter with the Packet and a Bundle of stationary were Reced Yesterday from the Presidency is now Dispatched by the Boat Express.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. William West at Callicut Dated the 27th. Instant the Purport of Which is to acquaint us, that the Samorines Ministers had been with him, as also of Poniture Rajah; By the former he was told that the Samorine Declared from the great Expenche he had been at on Account the Late Samorine and Must be at a greater at the Feast of Mammanga (about fifteen months hence) he Could Not till that was over Discharge any part of his Debt to the Honble Company. But then he would begin to Clear it Off, Punitures Minnisters Inform'd him from their Master, That As his Country had been ruined by the Dutch & was therefore Unable to Discharge his Debt; He had applyd to the Samorine & Shewd him the Chiefs Letter on this Occasion, but the Samorine Refused to take his Debt upon himself, Telling him that the Company were solliciting him for the Payment of his own Debt to them, but he would further Consider of this affair when he Returned to Penany.

Mr. West further Mentions the Arguments he Used with the Minnisters; Which were very Proper on this Occasion.

He Likewise advised that he had bought Ten Candys of good Dry Pepper at the Rate of One hundred & Ten Rupees $\frac{1}{2}$ Candy And Desires money may be sent him to pay for it.

ARRIVED a Munchua with Seventy nine Candys, Eight maunds and Seven pounds of Pepper, which remain'd at Mangulore Since May last, Which Mr. Thomas Purnell Dispatched thence on the 23^d. Instant & writes that by the first Propper Conveyance that Offers, He will Send the forty One Bales Remaining at Manjaseer. He Likewise writes that Hur Commaty has some Pepper at Mangulore but the Portugueze Factor has Attached it On Account of Commatys being Indebted to A Merchant at Goa.

It being towards the latter End of August before Hur Comaty took away the Twenty three thousand Rupees Lodged with the Portugueze Factor at Mangulore on Account of Comatys Contract for Pepper with the Presidency, which was Contrary to our Expectations As We had heard Nothing from him till the time Above Mentioned And the Ballance of Treasure Remaining in the Callicut Linguist's hands

The Present lowness of the Treasury owing to Several Disappointments

on the 1st. August was Upwards of Fourteen thousand Rupees we had no Advance to make for Pepper, wherefore we were not Under any Apprehensions till About the Middle of last month of being In want of Cash for the Necessary Disbursements before we Could be supplied from the Presidency As we might Reasonably Expect to have Recourse Either to Mangalore (from whence We had Orderd Mr. Purnell to Send hither Ten thousand Rupees) or Callicut, but the Large Advances made by the Linguist there, And the Purchase of Forty Eight Candys of Pepper as ₹ his Account Reced the 23^d. Ult^o. together with Comatys Receiving the Twenty three thousand Rupees as Above mentiond are Disappointments we Could Not Expect.

Mexico Dollars not to be Exchanged here but at great Loss.

THERE is Remaining in the Treasury one Chest of Mexico Dollars, but that Specie for above two months past has not here or at Callicut been worth more than two hundred Twenty Six Rupees ₹ one hundred Ounces, Which is About Seven and a Quarter ₹ Cent less than their Value at Bombay, and are as Low at Mangalore Where by Late Advices Pagoda's are worth near three hundred & Sixty Rup^s. ₹ one hundred Pagodas.

It is Agreed to take up a Sum at Interest.

THE CHIEF Supply'd the Treasury with two thousand Rupees on on [sic] the 30th. Ult^o. but the Ballance Now Remaining being only two hundred & Eighty Eight Rup^s. Two Quarters & forty Raes & as the Loss upon Dollars will be Above five ₹ Cent more than Interest will amount to It's AGREED the Sum of Twelve thousand Rupees be taken up at Interest on the H^o. Comp^{as}. Acco^t. for Defraying the Charges of this Settlement, but for as short a space of time as Possible as we may Expect by the last Advices from the Presidency to be Supplied about the beginning of Next Month.

HAVING taken the Contents of Mr. Wests Letter Reced on the 29th. Ult^o. Into Consideration, an Answer is now wrote thereto, which being Read & signed. ORDERD that the said Letter be Enterd after this Consultation And Dispatched to Callicut.

WE do not Apprehend the Chiefs Meeting the Samorine on this Occasion can be of Any Service If you find it Can, Advise Accordingly.

That we were thoroughly Acquainted how Unjustly war had been made upon them by the French in the year 1739, who with their Allies Boyanore and Curringhoda Nair had forced them to Such terms of Peace, as they thought Proper to Impose upon them, but they had Violated them all, obliged them to Serve in their

Present Warrs, & Invaded their Rights In so high a Degree, as they Could no Longer Suffer or Labour Under; wherefore they had lately Entered into a League with the Boyanore And Curringhoda Nair for the Mutual Defence of their Laws Rights, & Priviledges, But the French by Large Presents had Since Prevailed upon Curringhoda Nair to stand Neuter Altho' they and Boyanore were firmly Resolved to assist each other to the Utmost of their Power, and Both of them had begged the Assistance of Prince Cunhi Homo their Lawfull Sovereign who had Promised them Accordingly; And they now Requested that of the Honble Company. The Rajadores of Boyanore Desired likewise to be supply'd with about two thousand Bales of Rice the Cost of which should be Punctually Repaid as Likewise what Boyanore stood Indebted to the Honble Company.

The Chief Reply'd to them that he was very sorry the Nombiers found themselves under the Necessity of Entering again into a War with the French, as nothing Could be more Prejudicial to the Interest of the Honble Company than Wars and Embroils In those Countrys where they had Grants for a free Liberty of Trade. That they only Desired to Purchase And Punctually pay for at Reasonable Rates, Such Commoditys of the Country as it Produced, and they had Occasion for. That as the French had Long been Settled at Myhie & Our Nation and theirs In alliance & Friendship with Each Other, we Could give them no Assistance Against the French that was Inconsistent with Such Alliance, But Our Bazar was free & Open to Such of Any Nation or People with whom we were in Amity, all which they must be Acquainted with, and have Experience in their Late Wars with the French. The Chief then Recommended to all the Rajadores to Endeavour to Accommodate Matters with the French, to which Boyanores Rajadores in Particular Reply'd It was Impossible, They wanting to be first In Possession of one Hill, then of another, till they Possessed them all, which If they gave them, they would not be Satisfied, But would Either Oblige them to Raise more Hills for them or Subject them to Slavery, which they were Resolved to Prevent. The Chief took this Opportunity of Getting the Nombiers to Clear their Former Account the Ballance of which being Fanams One thousand Nine hundred Twenty nine & five Vis they Promised to pay Speedily. He Likewise Reminded Boyanores Rajadores of Ally Mackreens Debt of thirty five thousand Eight hundred Thirty five fanams & Seven Vis for Rice and Other necessarys, Which Sum Boyanore stood Engaged to Discharge. This they Promised Should be faithfully Complied with in the Like manner As Boyanore had heretofore to a much Larger amount, for what the Company had on the Like Occasion Supplied, him with. The Chief giving them the Usual Presents on these Occasions Dismissed them Letting Boyanores Rajadores know they Should hear further from him Concerning their Request for Rice.

THE CHIEFS Conference with the four Nombiers and Boyanores Rajadores as Entered yesterday In Our Diary, is now taken Into Consideration as Likewise all Circumstances Relating thereto.

It is Observed the great Probability there is of a war Shortly breaking Out between England & France Particularly by the advices from the President & Council at Fort St. George Dated the 24th. July after the arrival of the King William there,

— OCTOBER 1741 —

Who at the Same time wrote us, that five hundred Men were Intended to be Sent from Pondicherry to Myhie as do Our Superiours at Bombay in their last Commands; but they Could not then Know that the Nombiers would Joyn Boyanore who in all Probability will Over Run Curringhoda Nair If he Does not Joyn them, And Consequently must very much Distress the French and Render it very Difficult to Subdue them, which If Effected would prove highly Detrimental to the Honble Companys Pepper Trade here, But In Case there should be war with France it will be for the Preservation of this Settlement to Engage Boyanore and the Nombiers on Our side As any other Force we Can Call to our aid, is not near Equal to theirs, And If a Peace should Suddenly be made, as Conditionally Recommended by the Presidency, and a War Break Out with France, the French would Certainly use Boyanores and the Nombiers Forces Against us, which United with their Own might be Attended with the worst Consequences to this Settlement More Especially If the Rumours we hear should Prove true of Six Ships from France with a very Large Military force on board being Intended for this Coast. But If the War Continues between the French Boyanore & the Nombiers from such assistance (If it should be thought necessary be Our Superiours) As we Could give them Openly In Case of a War with France, we may humanly speaking be at least Equall to the French, should they Receive only the above mentiond five hundred Men for Pondicherry.

The Importance of keeping Boyanore & the Nombiers in our Interest in the Present Juncture.

THE French Indeed till Some Short time after Mr. Durois went from Myhie Sought all Manner of ways to make Peace with Boyanore Except Restoring two Hills they had Fortified which Boyanore would Never Acquiese in, and now being Joyned by the Nombiers, he will not So much as hear of a Peace. Indeed we Could Streighten them by not suffering them to procure Rice from hence Or any other Necessarys, But that we Judge would be Imprudent, As we know not how soon we may want their Assistance as well as for Many other Reasons.

It is of the greatest Moment with these Tributary Princes or States to have the sanction to their Sovereign In their Undertakings In Respect to War, nor Can Cunhi Homo's Engaging in the Present Disputes give the French any other Pretence for Making war upon him that heretofore, as he always did more or Less Espouse the Cause of such Tributary Petty States on the Like Occasions— The French Settling in his Dominions by force, and for which they have not his grant to this day.

The Sanction & Assistance of the Prince Requisite for forming an Alliance.

What Assistance the Prince gives on this Occasion, his Poverty will not permit him to Defray the Charge thereof, which According to the best Judgment we Can at Present make will Amount to Near three thousand Rupees ꝓ Mensem, but as his Brother is to Conduct on this Occasion, there need be no Apprehensions of such Practices as Cunhi Homo Used Lately on the Like Occasion.

He is not in a Condition to defray the Expence of such Assistance.

THE Quantity of Rice Solicited for By Boyanore is for the subsistence of his People now with the Nombiers, who Cannot be so easily Supply'd as from hence— The Amount of Which with what he was before Indebted, will come to about Eleven thousand Rupees. In their Wars with the French at their First Settling at Myhie, The Presidency did Permit of Supplying him, to the Amount of three thousand Rupees ꝓ month, which was Lent him at that time, & he afterwards Discharged it to Satisfaction And Our Superiours last Year Allowed us a greater Latitude on this Occasion likewise Approved of all our Transactions therein.

HAVING fully weighed and Considered the Present Circumstances of Affairs at this Settlement, which we Can Transmit to the Presidency, and Receive their answer thereto in a month or Six weeks, RESOLVED that Domingo Roderigueze Supplys Boyanore with a Quantity of Rice not Exceeding Two thousand Bales taking a Proper Ola for the Amount thereof, and that he be paid for the same out of the Treasury.

Agreed to Supply Boyanore with a Quantity of Rice

RESOLVED that Prince Cunhi Homo be Assisted for the Defence of his Country and thereby the Rights & Priviledges of the Honble Companys trade therein, with Rice & other Necessarys to the Amount of a Sum not Exceeding

Instant acknowledging the Receipt of Ours Under the 1st. & acquaints us that he had not then Reced the Samorines finall answer to his Message sent to him, but he Could not give us any other hopes of his Complying, than what Force would oblige him to; That he apprehended the not granting his Merchants Passes might be of some Service as it would make them complain, but he Judges the Chiefs Proceeding thither Cannot be of any—The Next Day he Intended to send the Chiefs Letters to the Samorine by the Linguist. He had Deliverd that to the King of Poniture Who Declared he would Instantly Deliver it to the Samorine, who If he had Any shame Left, would put him in a way of Clearing his Debt—There was a small Quantity of Pepper to be Purchased but it being so wet, as he Did not Care to Meddle with it.

Notwithstanding the foot of the above is Fanams Forty Five thousand five hundred Twenty Eight & Six Vis. yet the Real Charge of the Settlement for Last month are no more than Thirty nine thousand four hundred thirty Eight Fanams & Ten Vis. as Garrison Stores and the three Sequent Heads are the pay of Sundry Employed In making Stores &c^a. which are Rated Accordingly when sold as well as a Due Proportion thereof Annually wrote Off for what is Expended. The Reason why the head of Pepper Remaining at Mangulore and the three following Ones should not be Included As part of the Charges is Duly noted at the Foot of the Last months Account.

The Decrease of this months Charges Amounts to Fanams Four thousand Five hundred & Twenty of which Five hundred & fifty Fanams & four Vis is the head of Garrison Charges, Occasioned by the absence of the Military sent to Anjengo & the Discharge of others Unfit for the Service. In Petty charges one hundred Fanams & Seven Vis Occasioned by a Lesser Expencc of Diet to Pattamars this month Also Fanams Three hundred & forty & Eleven Vis In the Charges Garrisoning Maddacarra & Mattamy Point part of the Garrison being withdrawn from thence this month. In Charges Garrisoning Andola Malla & Tere Malla Fanams Four hundred Fifty Eight & fifteen Vis by the Difference of Rice Expended, as the Quantity charged was for One whole Month and Part of the Preceeding and the Head of Account Presents amounting to Fanams Two thousand Nine hundred Ninety five is Entirely Lessend.

As we have not Lately sent Out a Guard or Party of Soldiers any where, The French Gentlemen must have been Informed in that Particular, which they might Easily have known by sending a Person to see where said Party of Men were—by the Articles above mentioned we were Indeed so Long as they kept them obliged to Assist Curringhoda Nayr In Case any of the neighbouring Powers should attack that Part of his Country Assigned him by those articles; But the French have Repeatedly Violated Every one of them, and as Often as they Judged It suited their View & purposes of which are Many Instances of Complaint in Our Diarys In a more Particular manner on the 8th. September 1739 and several other Occasions Afterwards in their Last Warrs with the Nombiers in which they Employed Curringhoda Nayr with all his Nayrs Against them as they do on all other the Like Occasions The French have fortified several Hills in his Country and Look upon him as their Subject but by the Articles none of Us are to fortifye in his Country, and he is to be a Common friend to both Settlements. In the Present Case our Assisting Curringhoda Nayr is Assisting the French Against the Nombiers with whom we are in Friendship, wherefore it would be absurd In us not to stand Neuter as heretofore—which is AGREED to.

YESTERDAY we Reced your Letter of the 24 Inst. N.S. wherein you write us of your being Informed of Our having sent a Guard of Soldiers into Curringhoda Nayrs Limits Near Curiche which is a Breach of the First Article of Agreement made in 1728 And that by the same Article, we jointly with you are to assist Curringhoda Nayr in the manner specified therein In Case of his being Attacked.

We have had frequent Complaints heretofore of the Like Groundless nature with what you now make which we are the more Concerned at as we have Lately Flatterd Ourselves they would have ceased. We Assure you Gentlemen you are Entirely Misinformed in Respect to Our having sent out a Party of men toward Curiche or for a Long time Into any part of the Country whatever, And that no Such party was sent as you mention now, you Might Easily have Satisfied yourselves; your Pattamars who Brought your Letter Can Convince you of the Truth of it.

In Respect to Assisting Curringhoda Nayr we must beg Leave to stand Excused, as the same Reason for so doing still subsist that we gave you Under the 8th. September 1739 And afterwards In Several Other Letters and Protests, which we Sincerely wish there had been no Occasion for, or may in future, well knowing the Confusion that has so Long been In these Parts is highly Prejudicial to the Trade of both Our Respective Companys and heartily wish it were In Our Power to Prevent it. On My Arrival here I have been made Acquainted with your Correspondence with the Council of Myhie & that of Mr. Wake with Mr. Dirois. To Speak Sincerely, I think I have distinguishd in it much of the Personal, and but Little

Regularity In the Observation of Treaties: But right or wrong I Beleive the wisest part at Present is to draw a Curtain over what's past and to Act with Greater Heartiness & frankness for the future. At Present allow me to Explain myself to you on a Point of Importance in the actual Circumstances of Affairs.

The Peace which subsists between our Kings makes me believe that you will Consider us as a Nation in Alliance, Consequently you know all the Duties we Reciprocally owe Each Other.

The Desire I have to maintain a good Correspondence, Occasions me to Inform you, that I am Come in the name of the King My master and of the Company to make Warr on Prince Boyanore; I hope you will be Willing to Assist me, as good and faithfull Allies, and above all forbid your Subjects Carrying any Supplies of Provisions or Warlike Ammunition to our Enemys; as I am perswaded of the uprightness of your Intentions in this respect, I have Declared to the neighbouring Nations, that all Boats which shall Come within a League of the Coast of Our Enemys & shall attempt to Enter the river of Cota with Provisions or Ammunition shall be Confiscated & the People Treated as Pyrates, However, Gentlemen, If any of your Vessells have Business upon this Coast in any affairs which I Cannot foresee, Be so good as to Send them on Board the Commodore Ship, who will give them notes that they may not be Disturbed in their Navigation by the round Boats. These Precautions will Prevent a thousand Inconveniencies that may afford; Perhaps; Some Occasions of coldness Between us, Besides you know that it is from natural Right that I prevent Succours being given to Our Enemys, Thus, Under whatever Persuasion I am of your way of thinking, and whatever Respect I have for your Nation, I Cannot forbear searching the Boats which Even Carry your Collours, for without this Precaution there would be Knaves hardy Enough to make Use of them without your knowledge, and you are to Just and too much our Friends to Desire to Countenance such abuses.

That they had sent a Number of Cask on the Onslow, as they Expected the Contract Arrack might be In readyness, and If it was more than the Onslow Could take in to put the remainder on board the Emelia Sloop which was Orderd from Anjengo Hither & in such Case to Omit the Coir formerly Indented for Particularly the Lower ones, which they had Mentiond In Cap^t. Balchens Instructions.

They were Pleased to Leave it to us for Encouraging the Cultivation of Durmapatam, so as to Render it most Beneficial to the Honble Company. Left it to us to send up or not the Remainder of the Bengall Detachment, And the Godolphins Recruits by the Onslow & Hallifax.

He Acquaints us that he Received from Hur Comaty One hundred Seventy two Candys, Nine Maunds & Seven pounds pepper (Onore weight of 520 lb) which he had Laden on board the Fort St. George being all Comaty had Ready there, but being assured by him that the Remainder of his Contract with the Presidency lay at Mangalore he Intended to Call for it there but overshooting that Port so farr as they Could not Return in two Days, they Proceeded hither.

Imported the Honble Companys Ship Halifax Capt. John Blake from Bengall who Brought us a Letter from the President and Council there Dated the 2^d. Ult^o. & 17th. July with the Several Papers Enclosed, Except Copy of Capt. Jacobs his Declaration made at Bombay. They had Reced Advices from Fort St. George that the Callcutta Grab being Leaky put into Columbo, where the Master Designed to Refit her for which purpose he was Assisted with Money by the Dutch Government but they were in pain for her safety that they had Reced Such Remains of Pepper Laden on the Halifax here and at Calicut as the Gentlemen at Fort St. George Could spare & find themselves Charged at the Foot of Both Invoices with Fourteen Candys & three Quarters Loss in weight which they shall Deduct out of the Amount of them and Advise to Bombay accordingly—also Acknowledge the Receipt of Mr. Wests Letter with Copy of his protest against Capt. Blake for not taking On Board the full Quantity of Pepper he was Orderd, & the Captains Answer thereto which they Transmitted to the Presidency of Bombay. That the Military, Stores, Treasure &c^a. Laden at Bombay for Anjengo, they were Advised from Madrass was Landen [sic] there,—They had made a strict Enquiry Into Arms Missing which they sent by the Detachment in May 1740. We Indeed gave the Usual & Proper Order to the Master of the Sloop for Landing such stores as belonged to the Detachment not being Advised from Bengall till the next Season that Cap^t. Jacobs had Passed any Receipts for them, and We Dispatched the Sloop back on the 28 Aprill, which was five Days After she Arrived here but we Could not get a List of stores on board the Grab till the 18th. of May as she Could Reach no further than Beeypore River where she Lay up the Rains.

Having been obliged to Open the Bengall Packet for the Presidency to see the Accounts & comparing them with the List of what was On board the Grab & what we had Reced from the Sloop, we found Several Defeciencys in the stores, & one thousand Rupees specified to be paid Cap^t. Jacobs of the Millitary, which he declares he never Reced—Several Articles Lumpt—such as Casks Eight hundred Seventy Nine Rup^s. without specifying the Quantity, muster Roll of the Millitary not Signed by any body and which neither Agreed with that of the Officer nor the number of Men sent on Shore—and On the 10th. June following We Advised the Presidency of Bengall of the Defeciencys, sending them a List thereof, Upon the Grabs Arrival here after the Rains, The Cap^t. gave An Account of four Brass Musquetoons mentioned In the Letter belonging to the Detachment which he thought when he sent up the List In May had belonged to the Vessells Stores, after which only one sword of all that was missing in Like manner Came to Light here, but it may be Expected all will In Bengall, as Cap^t. ARTICLE
1st.

WHEREAS the Forts and Fortifications newly Raised in the Country of Irrevadanadu by the English & French Companies serve only to bring An Expencc on both, give Disgust to the Mallabars, & affords them an Occasion of sowing Divisions between the Settlements of Tellicherry & Myhie, to Prevent the same we do Agree to Demolish, Raze & Evacaute the Forts which we have In the Province of Irrevadanadu; Namely The French shall Raze Peringature, Canamalla, Chimbera & Poitera and Quit Bilay and Maylote, After having withdrawn from those Several Places the Guns & Garrison. The ENGLISH Shall Raze Andolamalla Putinha, Tere Malla, Ponella Malla, Muicarra Cunu & Muicarra Candy after having withdrawn in Like Manner the Guns & Garrison.

WE will preserve an Union and Tranquility between the Mallabars who are In the pay of both Companys, as are Naranport Nayr Muicarra Cunotu Nayr & Muicara Candel Nayr of Tellicherry & Curringhoda Nayr & Unichatto Nayr of Myhie—We will Cause them to Live Peaceably in their Respective Districts that they do not Disquiet Each Other And when any Differences Arise between them we will Conjointly pacify them According to right & Reason Allways having Regard to their Usage and Customs. We will not allow the Other Mallabars to molest them In any wise.

Enclosing his Protest against Mr. Mordica Walker Supra Cargo and Captain of Ship Ann belonging to Bengall, for his Secreting some of the Sailors belonging to the Hallifax when last In Bengall, He likewise Enclosed to us Copy of Said Protest to be forwarded to the Presidency— The Protest is as Follows Viz^t.

SIR,

The Protest.

My Second Mate Mr. Thomas Jones having Deserted the Hoñble Companys Ship Hallifax at Bengall I Used my utmost Endeavours to Recover him, but could not, he being Seduced by some People to Quit the Hoñble Companys Service to go In the Employ of Some of the Country Ships & for that Purpose had taken Protection at the French Factory, till Such time we Sailed.

We were by Sickness and Mortallity much Weakened and Our Compliment Reduced, & Could not be Assisted from the Factory, so that I was Obliged to take Lasscars.

His Deserting the Ship was made so Publick at Bengall That I am pretty well Assured you Could not be Ignorant of it, But If you did not know it there you Cannot Deny but you was thoroughly Acquainted of it when I met you at Cochin; In my Return down the Coast.

As I was Informed by Letter from Bengall that he was Second Mate of your Ship, I sent my Boat on board to Demand him, and take him Out but my Officer was Deceived by Captain Pidgeon, bringing a Person unknown to the Officer under the Name of John Jones and Denied to have any such Man belonging to your Ship as the Person Enquired after.

I Spoke with Mr. Walker ashore and Acquainted him what I had Done, for the Recovery of my Officer, and likewise told him, that If I had found the man on Board, I should have Supplied him with another more Capable of the Station, as Also one Experienced having formerly been My Officer In the Mediterranean, who did not belong to the Hallifax And would have been glad of the Opportunity, so that you are no ways Excusable for Detaining my Officer from the Honble Companys Service I Do therefore Protest against you both for whatever Consequences may happen to the Ship Hallifax on this Account and therefore very fairly give you notice to provide Against it, for I shall take Care to Represent it to the Company, who I have Some Reason to think will shew their Resentment to you as they do to us when take any People from the Service of the Hoñble Company thó Even to Man their own Ships. THE Heirs of the Late Chatto Chitty are Divided & In Disputes among themselves nor do they Express any willingness to Receive mony Among themselves nor Do they Express any willingness to Receive mony for Pepper this Season, but Promise to Clear their debt of One hundred & Seven Candys Seventeen maunds & Twenty Six pounds of Pepper without any further Advance.

The Heirs of Chattoo Chitty Decline a further Advance.

Their Circumstances we know are very good but their Estate being Chiefly In Lands and Outstanding Debts they Cannot Immediately Discharge their to the H^o.Comp^a. altho there is no manner of reason to Suspect any Loss will Ensue, however as they are Quarrelling Amongst themselves it is not thought Advisable to be Solicitous about Advancing them Money as heretofore. They being Come here to Adjust their Accounts The Ballance of which Due from them is Fanams forty five thousand Eight hundred fifty four & Eleven vis, but they Insist that Ten thousand Fanams of it be Transferrd to Pr. Cunhi Homo his Acco^t. with the H^o. Comp^a. Conformable to a Promise made the Late Chatto Chitty by the Prince & the Chief about the 10 June 1738 when the said Chittys Acco^t. was Debted to that of the Prince with the Comp^a. for Twenty thousand Six hundred Sixty four Fanams and An half In part of Forty four thousand Two hundred ninety three Fanams and a Quarter Specified in Consultations as Collected by Our Bramine of the Achmars of Randotarra, and Princes Account Credited for the whole Sum last Mentioned.

State of their Acco^ts.

They Insist that 10000 fan^s. for their Ballance be transferr'd to the Princes Acco^t. Accordg. to a former Agreem^t.

The Achmars of Randotarra were Assessd by the Prince One hundred thousand Fanams which we were to Collect and Credit his Account for as it should be Received and Sett forth In Consultation of the 1st. June 1737 The Chittys paying Twenty thousand Six hundred sixty four Fanams & an half aforementioned was because the severall Lands that were taxed to that Amount for the Proportion they were to Bear of the Said One hundred thousand Fan^s. were Mortgaged to the Late Chattoo Chity.

The Same Examined Into.

There is Indeed no mention made In Our Diarys of such a Promise but It is well known to Domingo Rodrigues (who was then Linguist) & Others that the Prince being at that time very Considerably Indebted to the S^d. Chitty as both of them were to the Company, The Then Chief Did Prevail with the Prince to Promise that when the Said One hundred thousand Fanams was Collected by us, Ten thousand thereof Should be paid to the Chitty, but as this Did not Occur to us, when we Adjusted the Achamars Account In Consultation of the 3^d. Jan^y. 1740/1 We Credited the Prince for the whole Sum of Twenty nine thousand Eight hundred Sixty Nine Fanams and three Quarters which was then Remaining Due of the Princes Sum of One hundred thousand Fanams, The Interest that Arose thereon was Carried to the Companys Credit, whereas the Chitty should have had Credit for Ten thousand thereof Conformable to the above Mentiond Promise The Achamars Account of One hundred thousand Fan^s. being then Clear'd.

We being fully Satisfied that It was Intended that the Said Sum of Ten thousand fan^s. should have been paid as aforementioned and It being Agreeable to the Princes Ministers that his Account be now Debted for the same, It IS AGREED that the acco^t. of the Heirs of Chatto Chitty be Credited by that of the Prince for the Sum of Ten thousand Fanams & Debted three hundred thirty five Rup^s. one Quarter & Eighteen Raes for a Mulct of three Rupees ₹ Candy Due on their Pepper Contract the 31st. SIR & SIRs,

MR. WILLIAM WEST having Deliverd me here a Protest by Order of your Worship & c^a. as from Cap^t. John Blake Commander of Ship Hallifax, It lies Incumbent on me in this Address not Only to Clear up my Innocence to you but Convince the Said Captain I have not Deserved Such Treatment from him.

As First the Ship Ann Did not Arrive In Bengall till a great while After Captain Blake had Sailed from thence, & so very late that I Even Despaired of getting her Out the Season, and as I am no Marriner I never knew, till I was on board, Either the Officers or their Names, It being the Province the Captain Acts In, And not myself, But I dare say had Cap^t. Blake wrote to the Gov^r. & Council of An Officer of such Consequence having Left him, that they would have given such Orders, as no Person would have dared to have Shipped him, or at Least not the Captain of the Ann, And without this the Person Could not be known by Instinct neither Could it be Expected that he would make himself so, when Punishment must have been the Consequence of his Misdemeanour, so that thus farr I hope It will Appear to you Gentlemen as Likewise to the Hon^{ble} Company, That If there is any fault It is for want of knowledge, not Design.

Cap^t. Blake told me at Cochin by Information from Bengall that he had Sent his pinnace on board the Ann to search her before he Came ashore for his Second Mate, but that he was not On board, When I had this from himself, that he was not there, I made no Reply or Enquiry as I Did not think he Left me Room After so Ungenteel a Proceeding.

But I am very much Surprized at such Severe Usage from the Said Captain without the least Provocation and Rather Believe he Does this to Screen himself from a Censure, that he is much more Deserving of than me, For If Ignorantly One of his People had been On Board the Ann, Surely Its more Excusable than his manning a Trading Vessell of his Own to this Coast with Officers & c^a. from his ship And by this Means Lessening the Compliment of Men, When he was to pass by the Ports of Angria, in his Passage to Bombay & more Especially After so Mallancholly an Acco^t. of sickness & mortallity In Bengall.

I hope Sir & Sirs that what I have Said is Sufficient to Clear up this, thô I Can plead no more In my Behalf than that I have been these Twenty Years In India and Never had a Complaint of any kind before, And flatter myself that I shall be found Undeserving of this.

ON the 29th. December We wrote the Presidency that three of the Cota Marcar's Munchua's had taken near Mangalore a shybar Carrying English Pass and Colours belonging to Mr. John Morley of Bombay, that upon Proper Application to Cota Marcar, he had Restored about half of the Cargo, Protesting It was all they took, and Pretended they Did not know the Vessell belonged to the English, Upon which the Chief Complained to the Samorine when at Callicut, who Offerd to Assist any Force we should Appoint with as many of his Nayrs as we pleased In Order to Suppress Cota Marcar but It was withall Signified to Francisco Dias our Linguist that the Hoible Company must pay the Expencc of them.

This hath not hitherto been taken Notice of, otherwise than In Our Letters to the Presidency, but List of the Cargo of said Shybar called the Godda as Deliverd by the noquedah Faqui Hassen to the Portuguese Factor at Mangalore & Sent by him to the Chief here remains In the Office as Also list Signed of what was Restored and what is Deficient with the value thereof.

Last night Our Boats Sent Out to Prevent Pepper being Exported Clandestinely from Cannanore to Callicut Mett with a Boat from Cota, In which were fourteen Armed moor Men, who, upon giving no better Account of themselves, than that they were seeking their fortunes Our People brought them In, and Confined them at the Banks all Guard till morning, when the Marcar of the Boat, who was nephew to the Cota Marcar being brought Into the Fort and Examined by the Chief, he Said he was going to a Feast at Cannanore, also to Demand a Munchua which had been Detain'd there with many other Pretences, but whatever Designs they were going upon the chief thought It a Proper Opportunity for Getting some further Satisfaction for the Cargo of the Godda Shybar, and accordingly ORDERD the Marcar of the Boat; who being a Principal Person; to be Confined to a Room in the Fort, upon Entering of which, with a Small Knife that he had Concealed In a Cloth Usually wore by them On the Shoulder or Under the Arm, he Suddenly stabbed the Serjant In three places and attempted to Do the Like by others of the Guard but was Presently shott Dead and the Serjant Died within an hour After. Immediately those of the Boat that were at the Banks all having Somehow gott Notice of what had Passed In the Fort (Probably knowing the Marcars Intentions of Running amuck from his having taken A Considerable Quantity of Ophium after he was brought Ashore as we were Afterwards Informed) Suddenly Rushed from the Guard Into the Buzar, whither a Guard was Immediately Sent In Pursuit of them but they all Made their Escapes It is believed by favour of the Moors, Except two, One of which making Resistance with his Knife, and Wounding a Serjant was shot, and the Other was made Prisoner. The Soldiers Searching Some Houses for them, and stopping Such Moors upon Suspicion as were Strangers gave great Offence to the Moors of the Buzar (though In reality it was the Shooting the Marcar who was a Moor) who made their Complaints to the Principal Christians of the Place that they were beat & Abused by those of the Garrison. A Moor man Indeed Received some Blows with the hand Only, and was pulled by the Beard by a Topass Soldier, he thinking him to be One of those he was In search of, but there was not the least abuse offerd to any Inhabitant or Other Person. However the Christians whether Out of fear of the Moors or any Benefit they Receive from them, Expresed themselves in favour of the Moors, and Alledged Also that the Soldiers were very Disorderly, upon Accidents of Fire, as Some times happened In the Buzar, where they have Allways been Sent In a friendly manner to their Assistance. The Chief told both Moors & Christians that the latter Complaint wd. be Easily remedied in future & that the Soldiers were Sent into the Buzar for the Preservation of the Inhabitants Least those that made their Escapes from the Banks all should run amuck upon them, as their Marcar had Done In the Fort.

Mr. Wakes reply Offering to Confront Our Merchants with theirs

To this Mr. Signard Replyed Under the Same Date that He was Sorry the Merchants had raised the Price of Pepper as he well knows Its Contrary to the Interest of Both Companys, which now It was very Late to Remedy but notwithstanding If Mr. Wake would Send his Merchants, he would Confront them with theirs, but he doubted much of Its being of any Service, because the Price of Pepper Inland was greatly Raised & would Not this Season be lower'd, as its being Carried to Callicut Could not be Prevented.

JEYNSON & Hamilton Returning from Myhie, this Evening brought a Letter from Mr. Signard to the Chief and relate that soon After their Arrival there, he Summoned all their Pepper Merchants Except Candote Paqui, who he said was Absent from the Place, when after Severall Arguments were Used, And Proofs Offerd to Clear Each Other from the Imputation of having given more for Pepper than the Price Stipulated between the two Settlements, It did appear that One of theirs had done so, whereupon Mr. Signard Declared it was without his knowledge & Expressed the highest resentment thereat withall telling their Merch^{ts}. that In Case Any of them presumed to Act in like Manner In future, they should be Severly Dealt with not Doubting but Ours would Meet the like Treatment, he Also remark'd that the Rise of Pepper was Chiefly Owing to Boyanores Merchants buying it up at most Extravagant rates in Order to Transport it to Callicut, where it was Purchased by the Country Shipping of Our Respective Nations and which he was Persuaded would Oblige him to give more than the Price first Agreed On.

EXTRACT OF THE LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENCY DATED THE 11TH. INS^T. VIZ^T.

Acknowledged the Receipt of Our Letters under the 19th. January 12th. of February and 20th. of Past Month Orderd to Dispatch the Onslow to China with three hundred Candys Sandall Wood, but from the Disagreeable prospect of Providing Pepper being Such, as none is to be Sent On that Ship to China. That we are to Receive no more Arrack from Mr. George Jenkinson on Account of his Contract, but as what had been sent, did not Answer to Muster. We are to Adjust with him for the Deficiency in an Equitable Manner, for which purpose the Warehousekeepers Account of the whole Quantity Sent up is Enclosed to us. To Supply the Sloop with four or five Tonns of Cash.

Approved of Our Demolishing the Forts according to Agreement with the French, And Reduction of the Garrison Also of the Method Transmitting an Account Currant with the Presidency Wherefore it is to be Continued towards the Latter End of the Season to Compare with their Books and form a Certain Adjustment The Sepoys we Permitted to proceed on the Onslow &c^a. Ships on the 12th. February last Pretending they were not Discharged and Demanding Provisions besides pay and We certainly knowing the Terms on which they were sent they are therefore returned hither and We to make them Such Satisfaction as shall Appear Equitable.

The Small Provision of Pepper we are Likely to make gave them a Sensible and a Real Concern, which being so Unequal to the Tonnage that may be Expected the Ensuing Season that Notwithstanding the Price is so Excessive high, yet a Disappointment therein may prove more Prejudicial to the Company, and altho they

are Convinced the having Recourse to Callicut may In all Probability Enhance the Value & Drain the Countrys of Pepper that are Contiguous to Tellicherry Yet as the merchants at Callicut can Pursue their Scheme of Selling to Other Nations or Private Persons they will Undoubtedly prosecute it & In such Case necessity will Oblige us to Purchase there likewise However they must rely on our Prudence to avoid any Encrease in the price & In the following Parragraph (after mentioning their having applyed to Bengall to know If they Can provide for One Ship if sent them from Bombay) Add with Respect to buying at Callicut they must Observe that In Case it does Actually tend to the Enhancing the Value at Tellicherry It had better be Avoided, but Again leave it to us.

The Depending Contract with Hur Comaty (this Contract was made by the Presidency) had subjected them to many Disappointments and Disputes, in which they Should be Less Anxious, had he not got a Sum of in his Possession, which they wish had been Avoided but as that has happend it Only Remains to take the best Measures Possible, wherefore they then Dispatchd a Person to Onore to bring the Matter to Some Conclusion And If any Occurr to us for that End, they Doubt not but they will be attended to And Reccommend—To our Consideration the Preventing Our Hoñble Masters being Any Sufferers in the End.

Sent Fifty thousand Rupees on the Onslow, Also the Amount of Eight thousand Seven hundred & Eight Rupees in Fifths and In Copper Pice, & Intended to Send a further Supply by the Phazze Salam They Deliverd Cap^t. Balchen Twenty Eight thousand rupees out of which we are to Receive the Amount & Charges of the Sandall Wood.

Returned the Arms Sent up by the Miliat from this Place with a List of them, also one of Some Differences in Invoices from hence. The Packet for Anjengo and Cochin to be Forwarded.

By the Samorines Answer to what your Linguist Wrote him by your Order to know when you should Wait on him what the Pattara Related we perceive he is not Inclivable to meet you at Panany this Month In Order for the Discharging part of his Debt or giving new Ola's for the Ballance; But as this is Contrary to the promise he made you when he was at Callicut, as well as those of his Ministers Several times since We think a greater Regard is to be shown to his Promise than the Abovementioned Triffling Answer wherefore you are hereby Order'd to proceed to Panany upon Receipt hereof taking the Linguist (Francisco Dias) with you, upon your Arrival there Send the Chiefs Ola, which accompanys this; to the Samorine & Request to know the time you shall wait On him, & when you do

you are to follow such Instructions as were Deliverd you, for adjusting with him when he was at Callicut copy of which we now Enclose to you as also his acco^t. Interest made up After the Usage & Custom of the Country the Ballance of Callicut Fanams Four hundred Eighty Seven thousand Ninety & five Vis (487090.5) which is Considerably more than when made up with Simple Interest as Specified In yr. former Instructions There is likewise a Ballance Due from him after the Customs on Pepper shipt on board the Queen Caroline is Deducted of Callicut Fanams Ten thousand Seven hundred Twenty two and seven Vis (10722.7) which is to be Reced out of the Customs.

From the late Proceedings of the Samorine we have too much reason to Apprehend he will make Innumerable Excuses for not Paying any Part of his Debt at Present; or passing new Ola's for the Ballance. If after your Utmost Endeavours you find he will not now pay any thing you Peremptorily Insist upon his giving new Olas to run at Interest after Certain time in the Manner of those he formerly gave, Acquainting him that yr. Orders are not to Return without the Money or proper Security for the Ballance & In case you should find him Absolutely Refuse to pay or give proper Olas you must Advise hither & stay at Panany till you receive our Answer.

By the Barge we Send you a Guard Consisting of A Serjent Two Corporal & thirteen private Men, of whom do you take Particular Care that they be not Guilty of any Offence to the Country People or other Irregularities.

You having the Accounts and being well Acquainted with the nature of this Material Affair, nor Doubting in the Least but you will use your best Endeavours for the Interest of Our Hon^{ble} Employers we have Only to wish you good Success & Remain.

By Order of the Honble the President and Council of Bombay, we have Laden on Ship Onslow which Arrived from thence the 21st. Instant, Three hundred Candies of Sandall Wood, and Consigned the Same to you On Account of the Honble Company As ₨ Invoice and Bill of Lading Enclosed, and have taken Out of this Ship Rupees Twenty One thousand four hundred forty three One Quarter and Twenty raes (21443. 1. 20) the Amount thereof, for which the Commander has Our Receipt; so that of the Twenty Eight thousand Rupees put on board by Our Superiours there, a Ballance Remains of Rupees Six thousand Five hundred, Fifty Six, Two Quarters And Eighty Raes (6556. 2. 80).

The Honble Companys Ships Dispatched from this side to great Brittain this Season are the Fort S^t. George, Hallifax & Queen Caroline The former Left Anjengo the 8th. December and the Two Others on the 15 Febr'y Their Ship Porto Bello Arrived here the 25th. Ultimo & Sailed the 27th. for Bombay, she Left the Cape the 23^d. November where was the Princess Mary which we hope Shortly After this time will Arrive Safe with you. Four Maccoa Ships are Arrived upon this Coast One of which is at Goa from whence we hear She will Return in Company with a Frigatta to Maccao this Season And the other we Judge will Leave this Coast by About the 10th. of Next month.

From what we Can Learn, those of the Maccao Ships have Purchased About four hundred Candys of Sandall Wood at Mangulore And Other parts at very high Prices, and have Given at Callicut for Pepper from One hundred Twenty five to One hundred & thirty Rupees ₨ Candy, but what they bought at Cochin and Columbo we believe is at cheaper rates. We do not hear of Any Other goods they have Provided, nor Can we give you Any Account of what the Frigatta's Cargo will Consist of, altho we believe her Stock will be Inconsiderable We hear a French Ship will be Sent to China from Pondicherry and Probably there may be One likewise from Fort S^t. George but of this we are not Certain.

In Conformity to a Standing Order we have Caused a Survey to be made on board this Ship And Enclosed is a Report thereof.

On the 29th. Ultimo I arrived at this Place And On the 1st. Instant waited upon the Samorine, who Said he had wrote to me to Callicut to Prevent my Coming here, as his Letter would Inform me he Could do nothing In the Affair of his Debt to the Company till the Feast of Mamanga was Over; which I told him I was Sorry for as the breaking his Promise (made to me at Callicut) of Paying part thereof or giving new Olas for the Same in April, which was then Past, would give Reason for the Company to Suspect his Intentions of Ever discharging it and therefore begged he would Consider of it. Again it being Long since Any Payment had been made on Account thereof, to which he Only Replied that he would Order his Ministers to Come to me, where I Lived, that Evening, which they did, and Continuing so to do Every day with the Story Alone, of staying till the Feast of Mamanga was Over obliged me this Evening to send the Linguist to Samorine to know his Ultimate Resolution in this Affair, when after Long Consideration the Receiving of two hundred thousand Fanams & upwards Out of the Callicut Customs, the giving new Ola's without Interest for two hundred And fifty thousand more to be made good at five Different Payments of Fifty thousand ☞ Annum & the Remainder which they Compute will be about thirty thousand to be paid now, were the Proposals he brought from the King and his Minnisters and the only ones they would Comply with altogether Refusing to give new Ola's to run at Interest for any time, or to pay Any Certain Sum at the Feast of Mamanga or Even any thing now but upon the Aforesaid Conditions, which In my Opinion ought Only to be Accepted of but upon a Certainty of no other Remedys being Left for the Recovery of the Debt; Whereas I am Confident the Distressing of his Merchants by Denying them Certificates and Impeding their Trade will bring the Samorine to more Reasonable Terms. However I Dispatch this Toney Express to Advise you of those now Offerd And to bring Back with all Expedition your Further Orders.

Taking Into Consideration what is wrote in the Letter now before us Concerning the Expençe of the Bengall Detachment & Recruits of Godolphin Its being Charged to this Settlement, It appears by Our Letters thither they were not Detain- ed for the Service here, or otherwise than to Strengthen the Expected Ships from England, or as proper Conveyances Offerd of sending them up and Could the Godolphin have Proceeded to Bombay, which ships Crew was in a very Sickly and weak Condition, the Remainder of the Bengall Detachment, as well as the Recruits from England, by her, had all proceeded On her to the Presidency; and those Sent up In November preceeding that Ships Arrival, were all we Could well Prevail on the Commanders to take on board. In the month of May following we wrote the Presidency that from the Godolphins not proceeding thither, we should continue to Debt Acco^t. Current Bombay for the Expençe of them & which untill now hath not been disaproved off.

Feb^r. last (when it was Conjectured both here & at the Presidency the H^o.C^o. might have alterd their Resolution in respect to the Dispatch of that Ship) they were all then Sent up, nor did we Ever want them or request a man from the Presidency, nor did they write for them otherwise than as Proper Conveyances Offerd to Send them up, From which Circumstances It appears that According to the Nature of Acco^ts. this Settlement Ought not to be charged with any part of the Expençe During the time those Men remained here Except from the 12th. Decem^r. last to the 12th. Feb^r. following which time they were Detained as abovementioned but In respect to Our Superiours Commands Concerning the Manner of clearing this Expençe. Acknowledged the Receipt of Our Letter by the Porto Bello & Sent On the Phazzee Salam, Sixty thousand two hundred Sixty three Rupees three Quarters and Eighty Raes (60263. 3. 80) Including Copper Pice In Case Ship Tygris Arrives here to Receive from her Such Woolen goods and Iron as are to be Landed here, Enclosed the 5th. Parragraph of the Honble the Court of Directors their Letter Dated the 24th. April by Ship Porto Bello which Relates to Bills of Exchange.

That as we had Charged the Presidency for what charged the Bengall Detachment and Recruits from England During the whole time of their Remaining here which they Say is not Equitable after a Conveyance Offerd of Sending them and that It is a Natural Conclusion we Esteemed them Necessary for the Service here, where they would have us Reform the Said Account As it shall Appear Reasonable.

Enclosed An Indent for Timber to be Purchased at Callicut for the Presidency.

SIR,

We have Rec^d your Letter from Panany Dated the 4th. Instant by which we perceive the Samorine Absolutely Refuses to give new Ola's at Interest for the Ballance of his Acco^t. or to Comply with any Other Terms than paying at Present about thirty thousand Fanams payble at five Equall Anual Payments And the Ballance which Amounts to Two hundred Seventeen thousand Eight hundred twelve & three Quarters Callicut Fanams (Including Ten thousand Seven hundred Twenty two Fanams & Seven vis the Ballance of the Old Debt) is all to be Received Out of the English Customs at Callicut.

These Conditions we Observe, In your Opinion, not to be Accepted of but upon a Certainty of no Other Remedy being Left for the Recovery of the Debt, and that you think Impeding the Trade of the Samorines Subjects will bring him to more Reasonable Terms.

The Means you Seem to think most Expedient to be Used we have heretofore Proposed to the Honble the President & Council of Bombay who Under the 9th. January Last wrote us In Answer that th^o Expostulations had been repeatedly made without Effect yet for the Present they Could not Enter into any other Method.

The Samorine proposing so Large a part of his Debt as upwards of Two hundred thousand Fanams, to be paid Out of the Callicut Customs which are so very Small when the Honble Company does not buy Pepper there appears to us Little more than A Refusal to Discharge that part of his Debt. We further observe

that, by a Letter from your Linguist to Domingo Rodrigues here, he Mentions the Customs to be Received Annually are those of the Companys Only, this you must Distinguish and withall Let the Linguist know that his writing the business of the Hoñble Company otherwise than to their proper Servants, is an Extraordinary Breach of Orders & Cannot Again be passed Over, notwithstanding the Confidence we have of Domingo Rodrigues, as having been A faithfull Servant During the Time he was In the Service of the Honble Company. What Comes to your Linguists knowledge, or is Necessary to Communicate must be Communicated to us, or you Only During your Residence at Callicut.

We formerly, and now Again on this Occasion have Duely weighed And Considerd, all Orders & Circumstances Relating to this Debt Amounting to Upwards of Eleven thousand Pounds Sterling and are Come to a Resolution to Direct that, after you get the Utmost present money that you Can, not Accepting of less than thirty thousand Callicut Fanams down In part of Payment and take Proper Ols without Interest for the Remainder of his Debt, payable In five years or Less time If Possible at five Equal payments, and for some Sort of Security he must make over not Only the Customs Arising on such goods as the Hoñble Company may Import or Export at Callicut, but also those that Trade Under their Protection; And the Anual Customs so Arising to be Received in part of his Annual Payment for the Same Year but If the Samorine does not Punctually comply annually with those Payments, then In such Case Interest Shall Commence upon the whole Sum Due at the Usual Rate of One Ɔ Cent Ɔ Mensem till the Debt is paid.

Some Small Deviations from these our Orders, According to your Own Discretion, you may make In Case you find it necessary but you must not In any that are Essential, and If After yr. Utmost Solicitations, he will not Comply with these Terms, you must give him A Remonstrance Setting forth the Nature of the Debt, as that It Arose for Money Lent him for the Preservation of his Country &c^a. The Manner you proposed for the Payment of it, which he Refuses to Comply And Conclude with making him the Author of all Such Losses and other Inconveniencies as may Accrue to his Subjects from the methods the Hoñble Company, you Apprehend, will be Obliged to pursue for doing themselves Justice, Immediately upon our Representing to Our Superiours at Bombay that their proposals Are Rejected. And If such remonstrances has no Effect, you are to Return, without taking Leave, to Callicut, where you will meet with Directions for Providing Such Necessarys as the Presidency have Lately Ordered and what will be wanted for the Service of this Factory the Ensueing Season.

THE Chief Reced a Letter from the Dutch Capt. & Chief of Cannanore Dated the 25th. Instant N.S. In which he Complains that a Topass Soldier of Our Garrison had Taken Refuge at Cannanore and that some Days After a Serjeant of Ours with two Topasses Used their Endeavours to take him from thence, but as he, the First Mentioned Topass Refused to go with them, they took from him his Arms, without giving the Captain Notice thereof altho their Company Never Refused Restoring such Arms as belonged to the Honble Company and as this was an Unreasonable Action, he Supposed it was Committed without the knowledge of the Chief here, likewise that frequently People of this Place as well free As those in the Service go Into the Buzar of Cannanore under their guns, without giving Any account of themselves to him which In future he Desired might be Remedied and Requires a full Answer to his Letter.

Having Enquired Into the Complaint made In the Capt. of Cannanores Letter Reced this Day, It Appears that Our Serjent, who was in Command of the Boats appointed to Cruize for Preventing Pepper Its being Exported by the Natives, from

Cannanore meeting with bad weather Put ashore near that Place and a Topass under his Command Deserted with a Boyonet, whom he afterwards went In Search of in the Buzar of Cannanore & finding him at An house near the Fort, he used Persuasive arguments with the fellow to Return, but he Refused, thô Deliverd the Boyonet to the Serjent when he Returned to the Boats.

The Chief wrote to the Captain of Cannanore an Answer in Portugueze to the Letter Received from him Yesterday Importing that It was Indeed without his knowledge or consent that the Serjent went in search of a Deserter belonging to this Garrison. Thô when he had Reced the Boyonet he Returned without Committing any Disorder which was a sufficient Reply to that Part of the Letter and In Respect to People from hence whither free or In the Service that go to Cannanore without giving the Captain an account of themselves, there was no obligation for it without they went Into their Limits, that it was Purely Out of Regard to the keeping up a friendly Correspondence with him that he made this Reply and not from the Nature of his Complaints, w^{ch}. did not Require Any.

RECEIVED A Letter from Mr. George Jenkinson at Callicut Dated the 17 Instant, wherein he Acknowledges his Readiness to come up for Adjusting his Acco^t. of Arrack Complained of by the Presidency but the weather would not Permit of it With all mentioning Such Objections as to him appear Reasonable Against his making Any Allowance for the Pretended Deficiencys In his Contract.

That the Risque of the Arrack, according to his Agreement is no farther than to Tellicherry, wherefore he Apprehends he is not to be liable for Any Damage It may Sustain Afterwards, Either by Leakage Or otherwise. The Charge for Distilling it Over Again At the Presidency, he Says he Ought not to bear, First, because Its Putting it Into the hands of such as know not how to Manage it And secondly because, In his Letter to the Governour (of which we had Copy Deliverd us) he Desired that If any Part of what Sent up In February Last, was Judged Improper for the Service he would take it upon his Own Acco^t. But notwithstanding the Above he should Leave it to us to Decide as we should think Proper.

The Letter to the Hoñble the President which he mentions, was Sent up In the Packet on the 12th. February last.

Mr. Signard the French Chief of Myhie wrote a Letter to Mr. Wake by his Secretary, Informing him that the Late Linguist who had been Confined had made his Escape with the Centinel that was Set Over him, withall Requesting If the Said Linguist was or Should Come here that he might be Secured he Standing Indebted to their Company Upwards of the Sum of Two hundred thousand Dollars Also Requested that his Secretary might have Any Assistance he Should Want In his Passage to Cannanore, And thence to Mangalore he being Apprehensive the Linguist might be gone thither, he having a Brother there who is Entrusted with their Affairs at that Port.

The Secretary proceeded on his Journey to Cannanore Carrying with him A Copy of the French at Myhie their Agreement with the Commodore & Council of Cochin, for the Return of Deserters in like manner as wth. this Settlem^t. which Agreement he Says was Interchanged About four Days before the Linguist Deserted.

This Evening Mr. William West Arrives here from Callicut and brings An Ola from the Samorine to the Chief. Mr. George Jenkinson Intended to have Come up with him, but was Obliged to Return Suddenly to Beepore Recev^g. An Acco^t. of his Distill house there being Robbed.

MR. WILLIAM WEST now lays before the Board A narrative of his Proceedings at Panany, as Likewise Translate of the Samorines Ola to the Chief which are now read & taken into Consideration.

It is Observed that, In the manner the Samorine proposes to Discharge his Debt, what Is now become Principal would, Accordg. to the Custom of the Country, become Double before the Time of the Last Payment of Fifty thousand Callicut Fanams (50,000) But it has Long Since been Apprehended that nothing but Force Could prevail with the Samorine to Discharge his Debt with Compound Interest thereon, which we presume may be the Reason the Honble Company hath heretofore given a Conditional Liberty for foregoing the Interest which is in a great Measure the Method now proposed, by the Samorine for Paying of his Debt, Altho the first payment of Fifty thousand Fanams (50,000) is not to Commence till a Year After the Feast of Mamanga, which is In the month of April next Ensueing, but Mr. West beleives they will speedily pay twenty thousand Fanams (20,000) to the Linguist, And the remaining Sixty Seven thousand Fanams to be Laid on the Customs, Seventeen Thousand (17,000) of which to be paid at the Settling his Account Customs which he is not Inclined to do, before he knows whether his Proposals will be accepted of.

This is an Affair of such Moment, the Sum Amounting to Upwards of Eleven thousand pounds sterling, as we Judge It will be most Proper to Refer the Conclusion thereof to Our Superiours at the Presidency, but as the Writing the Samorine that we shall wait their Commands In respect to agreeing, or not, to his Proposals may give him a pretence for not paying the Twenty thousand Fanams (20,000) till their pleasure is known It is AGREED that the Chief does not reply to the Samorines Ola, now before us till the said Sum of Twenty thousand Callicut Fanams (20000) be Actually paid Also that this Affair be Particularly represented, to the Presidency in Our next Advices thither, and the Samorines proposals Enclosed to them.

ORDERED that Mr. William West his Narrative of his Transactions with the Samorine at Panany & Translate of the Samorines Ola, to the Chief be Enterd After this Consultation.

SIR & SIRS,

Mr. West his
 Narrative.

On Receipt of your Commands of the 7th. Inst. I again waited On the Samorine And Informed him that you thought his proposals with which I had Acquainted you, were very Unreasonable Especially as he had Paid nothing, in part of his Debt, for Some Years past, That his Assigning so large a part of his Debt, as Two hundred thousand Fanams to be Deducted from the Companys Customs at Callicut appear'd to you Little better than A Refusal to pay so much thereof, Wherefore I begged he would Consider of Some more Reasonable Method of Discharging it, If he meant to Continue that Friendship which Subsisted between the Company

and his Predecessors, to which he then made no reply, but said that I might go home, and In an hours time he would Send his Ministers to treat with me. But Finding on their Coming that their proposals Little Differed from the former Ones, I told them I Could Stay no longer to be thus Trifled with. That In the morning I would wait on the Samorine, And give unto him A Memorial Setting forth his Ill treatment of the Company in not paying his Debt In due time. His Encouraging his Subjects to Commit Acts of Pyracy On the English, & Insult and Murther Our People Even In Our Forts; For all which If the Company should hereafter take their Own Satisfaction, he, The Samorine will have drawn it On himself. After which his Ministers Left me without Saying Anything more on this Affair. And Accordingly I Went the next Morning to the Palace and was Instantly lead In to the Samorine who told me that he had laboured, a long time Under a Great Uneasyness In regard to his Debt to the Company, which his Affairs would not Let him Discharge, In the Manner he was Inclined to, at One Payment whereas he Could now Only propose the Cleaing of Four hundred thousand Fanams (400,000) At Eight Different Payments of Fifty thousand Fanams ₹ Annum to Commence In the Year 1744 And for the Remainder Fifty thousand Fanams (50,000) thereof to be laid on the Customs. Twenty thousand he would pay now, And Seventeen thousand on the Settling the Account Customs, of which, he Said, he Should then write the Chief, and Desired that the Comp^a. w^d. not be pressing Upon him.

As for Cota Marcar, he told me It was his Business to Chastize him for his Insolencies & had Sent for him with Others for that Purpose.

His People are Coming to Callicut to pay the Twenty thousand Fanams, And for my Own part, I am Persuaded he will clear the whole In the Manner Above Mentioned.

Before I Left Callicut I Regularly Deliverd Over the Charge of the Factory, Cash & Acco^{ts}. to Francisco Dias, as his Letter will Advise you.

TRANSLATE OF THE SAMORINES OLA TO THE CHIEF.

I have Received your Letter And Observe It's Contents. Mr. West and Francisco Dias have Also Informed me what was further necessary. On Discouring with them Concerning my Debt to the Hoñble Company which I find is Doubled; I proposed that Admitting you Carry on a Considerable Trade at Callicut you might therefrom Receive two hundred thousand Fanams without Interest and Two hundred & Fifty thousand Fanams should be Discharged at Five Several payments and the Remainder of what Due (on Settling the Accounts) paid at Callicut, But these Proposals were Rejected Therefore that no Misunderstanding may happen between me & the H^o.Comp^a. nor any further Delay In Settling this Depending Account. I Desire it may be Done In the following Manner. The year 1743 is feast of Mamanga, therefore from the year 1744 I shall begin to pay Anually to the H^o. Comp^a. Fifty thousand fanams (50,000) and by Eight Successive Payments will Compleat the Sum of four hundred thousand Fanams (400,000) and fifty thousand fanams without Interest, Arising from the Trade at Callicut shall Likewise be made Good. On these Terms I would have passed An Ola And the Remainder, which shall appear Due on Adjusting the Accounts shall be paid there, But Mr. West gave me to Understand that without First Advising with you, he Could not Assent to these Proposals. However I Dispatched Along with him to Callicut Parra Changara & Vazaur Manicha with Orders to Deliver him there. Twenty thousand Fanams. On the whole Considering the Friendship Subsisting between my Kingdom and the Hoñble Company and the Confidence I have in them,

It is Reasonable you Should Agree to the aforementioned Terms, And I am In hopes you will give Directions to your People at Callicut to settle the Account in this Manner And Accept my Ola Accordingly.

After having obtained Due Information of what happened In the Fort of Tellicherry, In Respect to Cunhihamud Heir of Cyoddy Cunhi Ally & Cuttiassem of Cota, I shall chastize them, & In Order thereto I have wrote to the four Heads of Paenattu & Also to Cunhi Ally & Cuttiassem wherefrom you need not Doubt but this Affair will Terminate in a Proper manner.

I hope you will not be wanting on your Part to Preserve In future the Friendship and good Understanding at Present Subsisting between me and the Honourable Company.

The Late King of Colastria was very Ancient but Declined being Crown'd till very lately, when preparations were making for that Ceremony, which was to have been performed in a few days If he had lived; when he might have taken the Governm^t. upon himself, which as he would not have done his Coronation could not have Caused Any Alteration therein, neither will his Death.

THIS Evening a Moorman Unknown coming Suddenly behind the Sepoy that Stood Centinel at the North Limit gate gave him a Violent Chop In the Neck with a Broad Sword & Also wounded a Lad (both Mahametans) In the Arm, when he flung down his sword and Ran away. He was Immediately Pursued but to no Purpose.

The Christian's Apprehensive of Danger from the Moors.

THE Several Treacherous actions lately Committed by the Mallabar Moors at Callicut as well As this place and Elsewhere & the French Chief having wrote hither, that he hath Twice had Warning given him to take Care of his Life, have much Alarmed the Christians on the Coast in so much that they seldom Stir Out but with Arms for their Defence Altho all Danger Apprehended is from a very small Number of y^e. Mahomitan Profession who have selected themselves to Murder any Christian when If they Die in the Attempt they are Perswaded it is very meritorious, and have Adorations paid to their Memory by many Enthusiasticks of their faith, which have been performed at the Tomb of him who killed the Serjeant in this Fort in march last & much more at that of him who Afterwards Killed the Portugeze Padre at Callicut altho the more prudent Part of the Moors Deny that such Evil practices are Conformable to their Religion.

The Moors of the Buzar are very Apprehensive lest the Christians should take revenge upon them In General, In Case Such an Action should Again happen here, And the Christians who live without the Limit are Afraid of their lives from the Affairs which have for some time been Spread abroad that such Ruffians as above mentioned should Murder them.

Notwithstanding there has heretofore been many Such Case Transactions Committed by this Cast of Moors which in a Little space of time have been forgot Yet the Present Timidity of both Moors and Christians is so great that the Chief Orderd the Armed Nayrs and Caliquiloners to Patrole in the night and Apprehend any suspected Person; Also this Day Summoned the Codjee with the Moor Merch^{ts}. And Other Principal Inhabitants of the Buzar to Consider the most Proper Methods to be taken for their Security, The Merchants After much Discourse and Expressing their Zeal for the Honble Companys Service, in which many of their Cast had lost their Lives, they Left it to the Chief to take Such measures as he should think most Proper, when he proposed to them that no Moor should pass with his Sword, or Any other Arms (as in the Cannaree Country) between Trentapatam River and Moylan Fort, Except Such of those living under the Honble Companys Protection, As Should take tickets to produce to the officers of the Forts and Such Out guards of Nayrs &c^a. as had been Appointed to patrole for their Safety, by Means of which Ticket they might Pass such other with their Arms, for whose Behaviour those that so passed them sho^d. be Accountable Also that they sho^d. Appoint Some of their Own Cast with swords & Targets to watch day & night in the Buzar who sho^d. likewise have tickets Deliver'd them, w^{ch}. sho^d. be number'd & Register'd by the Linguist likewise as the Ill Disposed of their Cast und^r. pretence of Paying Ceremonies at the Tomb of the Above Mentiond Deced Moor (which had been Erected without Permission from the Governm^t. or Other wise) Sh^d. take that Opportunitiy of putting in Execution the most vile Designs, wherefore it became Necessary to Demolish it, without Any Abuse to the corps, but no sign to be Left of a Grave.

All this they Readily Consented to, however the Chief Advised them to Wait a Day or two & Consider of Any more Effectual Method for their Security, After which time they sho^d. Come Again to the Fort & Communicate their Resolutions.

It hath hitherto been thought Proper to give Protection to All Such as Live In the Buzar, Notwithstanding the Honble Company Receives no Other Apparent Benefit thereby than About One hundred Rupees ₹ Annum quit Rent for their Shops and Out of Regard to the Pepper Merchants who at Present are five . . . in number which would be much better If Reduced to Two In Partnership as they Injure each other in their Purchases of Pepper but as they are In arrears to the Company and Cannot Clear their Accounts at Once Proper Opportunities will be taken for that Purpose.

THE TOMB that was Erected Over Cunhi Ahmud who murdered the Serjent in this Fort, on the 25th. March last, was Razed.

THE Principal Moor Merchants & others of the Buzar Assembled in the Fort On the 26th. Heads & forty three Gallons upon the whole Quantity, he is no ways Obliged by his Contract to Stand to, & he moreover Changed all Such Casks as the Comm^{rs}. objected Against at the time of Ship^s. off & Deliverd none but what they Approved off.

His observations on the Tenour of his Contract.

Secondly In Regard to Its Turning Sour, or of a Bad Colour, that as none of the Second Parcel Deliverd in Feby. last, was then so, Altho Some of it was Eight Months Old, it must Proceed from Some Abuse on board, It being well known that A Small Quantity of Salt Water, putt Into A Cask Even of Batavia Arrack, wd. Entirely Spoil both Taste & Colour.

Thirdly that the Disstillling [*sic*] over Again, as had been Done by his Arrack at Bombay depended Entirely upon the art which he Alledges none there knows, by which means A Great Waste will Ensue as well As Expence.

Fourthly that On the last Parcel he presumes it will be noways Equitable for him to make An Allowance as in his Letter Above mentiond to the President, he requests they wd. not Accept of it, if it was not thought fit for their Service.

Mr. Jenkinson being withdrawn his Objections & all Other Circumstances in Relation to this Affair are fully Considered.

The greatest part of the Loss Arrises from the leakage which is Upon the whole Fifty three H. Heads & forty three Gallons but by the Tenour of his Contract Mr. Jenkinson is not to Stand to this, or Indeed to Any other loss After the Delivery of the Arrack here Twenty Seven hogsheads & forty two Gallons Leakage During the Passage, altho but of one Month, was more than happen'd here in About five months, therefore whatever the Honble Company Ought to be Allowed On Acco^t. of the Said Twenty Seven hogs heads forty two Gallons we Presume should have been Recoverd of the Commanders of the Ships it went upon; though Concerning which we are not Acquainted from Our Superiours.

Mr. Jenkinson's Desiring the last parcel might not be Accepted of, If not thought fit for their Service when it Should be Reced at the Presidency, Clears him of being Obliged to allow any thing thereon Otherwise than On Account of the Companys not being Supplyd According to his Contract with the full Quantity which the Presidency Mentions nothing of to us, Excepting the Deficiency in the Gauge of the Casks of Fifty four Gallons he must allow for.

After Duly Considering all Circumstances It is AGREED by the whole Board that Mr. Jenkinson for Sundry Deficiencies in his Contract do allow the Ho. Comp^a. the Sum of Five hundred rupees & the same be Deducted Out of the Ballance Due to him of Rupees three thousand four hundred at the Rate of twenty three Rupees for fifty Gallons the Price Contracted at. He being Again Called In & Acquainted therewith & After his Repeating the Injuries the Arrack may have reced During the Passage & from its being Distilled Over Again, by Unskillfull Persons w^{ch}. he thinks himself not liable to; Alledging that what he Disposed of to the Shipping (which was A Considerable Quantity) none of it sold for Less than Twenty four Rupees & Some at thirty five Rupees $\frac{1}{2}$ H. Hd of the Same Standard of what he Deliver'd to the Hon^{ble}. Company He, however, as it had been Adjudged that he Ought to Allow the Sum of Five hundred Rupees Acquiesed therewith.

The Board Agree that he abate the Sum of 500 Rupees. In the Amot. of his Ballance.

which he Consents to.

ORDER'D that Mr. Jenkinson be paid out of the Treasury the Sum of Two thousand Nine hundred Rupees (2900.) being so much Due to him, After Deducting the Sum of Five hundred Rupees (500) as Above Agreed to.
