— AUGUST 1748 —

The Diary and Consultations of the Worshipfull Robert Rawdon Esq^r. Chief &c^a. Factors at Tellicherry their Transactions in the Service of the Honble United English East India Company, Commencing August the Second to the 30th October 1748 and From that time carried on by the Worshipfull Thomas Byfeld Esq^r. Chief &c^a. Factors to the 31st. July 1749.

ALLY RAJAH in an Ola to the Chief says that the Business he wanted to conferr with the Old Linguist about was not proper to be communicated in writing, that as to his Debt he has it in remembrance as he had before noticed, and concludes with desiring the Old Linguist may be sent to him.

A BRIGANTINE appeared in the Offing early this Morning with English colours, a Toney was immediately sent on board [...] they hoisted French; and proceeded to Mahie where she anchored soon after. The Mucquas say she mounts eighteen guns and [have] about thirty Europeans and twenty Topasses; it is reported she came from the Mauritius and brings advice that Admiral Boscawen had made an attack on that place but was obliged to retire.

THE FRENCH have sent this Morning another Detachment to the assistance of Pondicherry consisting of one hundred and forty men.

As we frequently have ships drop in about this time of the year the Chief therefore sent out several boats to the northward and southward of this port with a Letter from the Secretary to the commander of such ships bound this way advising of the ship and prementioned Brigantine their being in Mahie Road and also of their strength to prevent any accident happening from surprise or otherwise.

AN INVENTORY having been taken of the House Furniture by Mess^{rs}. Thomas Benton and Charles Waters by an Order of Council the same is now laid before the Board and there appearing a Deficiency in several of the Articles the Secretary is DIRECTED to acquaint Mr. West with it and that the account be entered hereafter.

THE COLLECTOR of Durmapatam delivers in to the Board his Annual Account of the Rents and Revenues ending the 31st. of July last and there appearing outstanding from the Renters of the salt pans the sum of six hundred seventy Rupees three quarters and three Reas (R^s. 670. 3. 03) it is recommended to the Collector to recover the same as soon as he can conveniently so as not to oppress them as also to pay into the Treasury Rupees nine hundred twenty seven Rupees two quarters ninety four reas (R^s. 927. 2. 94) being the Ballance due by him as ^{qrs. reas} account entered after this consultation.

THE COLLECTOR also acquaints the Board with several abuses on the Island particularly that there are some have several Oarts belonging to the Honble Company who let them for want of care go to ruin, and that there are other good Oarts which give Fruit and if let out would bring some money to the Honble Company are now rented to people who pay nothing. Taking the same into consideration it is AGREED that Mr. Thomas Byfeld & Charles Waters be a Committee for inspecting these Irregularities and that they report the same to the Board in writing.

READ a report from Mr. Byfeld of his conference with the 1st. King of Cotiate which is approved of and ORDERED that the same be entered after this consultation.

EXAMINED & PASSED the following accounts viz.

TREASURY ACCOUNT for last month the Ballance of which being Rupees one hundred thirty nine thousand eight hundred ninety six & ninety six Reas is ORDERED to be Exam^d. and the account entered after this consultation.

WAREHOUSEKEEPERS Receipts & Issues for June & July last the several pepper accounts of which follow hereafter.

STOREKEEPER'S Account sales for February March and April, the amount of which being Rupees three hundred ninety three (Rupees 393. —) is ORDERED to be paid into the Treasury and the account to be abstracted underneath.

MANOEL RODRIGUES his account Rents and Revenues of Tellicherry and Moylan, Morah and Codoley ending the 31st. of July last the Ballance of which being Rupees one thousand three hundred and seventy three quarters and ten Reas (R^s. 1370. 3. 10) as per account entered hereafter is ORDERED to be paid into the Treasury.

On the 31st. ultimo I set out for Arinihole and in the Afternoon had an Interview with the 1st. King of Cotiote.

When the compliments as usual on such occasions were passed on both sides and the Presents I carried with me delivered in the Name of the Hon^{ble} Company, his Majesty opened the Conference by acquainting me with the present Difference between him and his brother the Second King which I found Solely to proceed from some infringements made by the latter in the Hereditary Dominions of Cotiote and as interfering therein would involve us in endless disputes & contests I did not care to descend into Particulars Especially as I could find by his Discourse, that he Aimed at little less than a tryal of our Friendship (the late Meeting had with his Brother having occasioned a little jealousy) therefore in General terms I assured him that from our zealous Attachment to his Royal House it was with concern we observed the Discords and Divisions subsisting as they might involve his country in Blood and Confusion if not timely Accomodated and although it could not be thought we were sufficient Judges of the case in General (being unacquainted with the Situation and Boundaries of their respective Principalities yet so far as our interest with the Second King would prevail he might depend upon its being Exerted to bring about a happy Reconciliation. This he said was all he desired of us and gave him a convincing proof that we had as good an inclination to preserve Peace and tranquility in his Country as in any other in which we were settled and that we might depend upon a reciprocal return on his part when our Exigencies required offering to enter into an Alliance both offensive and Defensive with us against any Enemy whatever which I told him was not in our power to comply with so as to prove effectual, such engagements being only entered into between Crowned Heads and as we were only subjects to one and acting for a body of Merchants we could only promise such assistance as the circumstances of time and the nature of our affairs would admit of though if his Majesty would give our Hon^{ble} Masters the sole Trade of his Dominions as obtained from the House of Colastria and a Banksall therein it would have the same effect as our Friendship would then not only be united in a more Effective manner, but we should have the same good pretext to assist him as we had done our Prince when the Cannarees and other Enemies invaded and disturbed the Peace of the country, and I really believe, he would have complied without much hesitation had not some Braminees persuaded him that his Idol Perimal, a Poda (by whose Dictates he governs the country) would be displeased therewith, which being the only Obstacle and what I found him debating with his Ministers I applied to Unichee Nair (whom I observed was his principal Rajadore and a great confidant) by whose assistance and repeated Solicitations I at last obtained the written Grant now enclosed you by which you'll perceive the sole Pepper and Cardamom Trade is given the Hon^{ble} Company exclusive of all other European Nations succours promised, and if a Banksall is judged necessary I think we may rely upon having a place allotted for that purpose, by what is mentioned in its sequel and the Discourse that passed between us. I am further to acquaint you that the King in my presence called for his Head Officers or Generals and ordered them to send any Number of Men to our Assistance when required should he be at his inland pallace where he generally resides assuring me that if his Presence was at any time necessary he would instantly come and Stay at Netture upon receiving a Letter from the Chief desiring the Hon^{ble} Company would upon his sending Unichy Nair Supply him with Ammunition Rice &c^a. when he stood in need thereof upon paying for the same which I took upon me to promise and hope that and all my transactions will meet with your Approbation.

Cacart Tupy being at the palace I desired his Majesty's assistance in recovering his large Debt to the company which he promised me, and then ordered some Nairs to assist him in collecting his outstanding Debts when the ensuing feast of

Ona is over and I have great reason to believe it will then be put into a course of payment—The pepper seized at Piachy I intended to have mentioned likewise had not I been informed by our Second Linguist Manoel Rodrigues who attended me that the Second King governed that part of the country and having before obtained his promise that it should be restored to us. I judged it unnecessary to take any notice of the same.

The reception I met with was much the same as set forth in my report concerning the late interview I had with the Second King as was the pretext given me by him on the occasion and the Professions of Friendship at taking my leave to which I have only to add that I am

I must advise you that no other Chief ever wrote me in this manner as whenever I applied to them I always had Answers of Reason and Truth returned me. That as to your saying what is done in your Districts does not touch me I dont apprehend the meaning of as when my Ancestors gave leave for building Tellicherry Fort and liberty to make contracts in their country I Cannot hear they assigned you any Districts and they called the Company's are mine; this was so in times past and in the same manner it must be in future and what is to be done on my part you may be assured of.

THE Ramban Express Boat arrived in the Evening from Bombay & brought us two letters from the Honble President and Council dated the 19th. & 21st. instant. In the former they acknowledge receipt of our original Advices of the 12th. of April and 18th. May as also Duplicate of those under the 27th. of April & Sallamaty Express Boat which was drove on shore a little to the Eastward of Dui and the packet lost but the Crew were all saved. They approve of our having supplied Anjengo Factory with fifty thousand Rupees (Rs. 50000) and as we had not contracted for any pepper so late as May last at which they admire and desire our Reasons for, they imagine we are sufficiently in cash, to spare more to that Factory they therefore order us to send thither a further sum of fifty Thousand Rupees or as near to that Amount as our Circumstances will admit, having regard to keep sufficient for ourselves to serve to the end of November. They order us to keep the sandall Wood in readiness for shipping off at an Hour's Warning and to get as much pepper Garbled as we conveniently can for being disposed of as may be hereafter directed. They inform us of a French Squadron having appeared off Fort St. David the 9th. of June last and as their Intentions are as yet unknown, they recommend to us to keep our Military & Gunroom Crew in good order and Discipline. That the Honble Company very much approved of our preparations for Defence wherefore permit us should we think necessary of enlisting a suitable Number of Nairs & Calliquilones but the latter they think are most likely to do us Service. They enclosed us copy of the 6th. paragraph of the Honble Company's Commands under the 24th. July 1747 as also the Resolution of the General Court concerning their Settlements in India and that as serjeant John Rolofstall has been well recommended to the Honble President enclosed came a Commission appointing him an Ensign at this place. They approve of the answer we intended to give the Prince in case he should have applied to us for assistance against the Cannarees. That till they receive a Report of the Repairs necessary to be given to Maddacarra Fort and the Seramby at Mottamy they cannot therefore they say give us the full Directions but in the Interim must rely on our Discretion in this as well as in things of the like nature. That this Boat is Dispatched purposely to be employed in carrying back such material Advices as may offer for which purpose they shall shortly dispatch another but hope first to receive our latter Advices with the usual papers and accounts of this Settlement when they shall be much better ably than at present to give us the necessary Directions. They order us upon no account to make any Loans to the Prince but to excuse ourselves in the most handsom and plausible manner we can. Their Letter under the 21st. is only to acknowledge receipt of our advices under the 6th. of June and which reached them just as the above Letter was closed. They express a great pleasure in finding that since the

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arrival of the Chief this Settlement is from a state of Wrangling attained to that of Harmony, the continuance of which they strictly enjoin us as it will tend greatly to the Honble Company's Interest, as also to the care and Dispatch of Business. The packet for Anjengo which came enclosed we are ordered to forward by the first opportunity.

THE Chief wrote the prince that in June last he had advanced money to Ballapilagata Cutussa for Sandall Wood and Cardamoms and on requiring from him why he did not send them Goods he was informed your Highness had impeded him and that if he was not permitted to go inland to fetch them he should not be able to get them for which reason on receipt of this Ola he was desired to let him go that he might comply with his contract.

THE Prince answered the above that he had laid an Impediment on Ballapilagata Cutussa as he had Accounts with him which as he had made up he was cleared.

DISPATCHED a Toney this Morning to Anjengo with a Letter to the Chief and Factors, enclosing them the packet received from the Presidency and desired they would return this boat with such Advices as they may have to transmit to Bombay as soon as possible. We acquainted them with the orders received from the President and Council for supplying them with fifty thousand Rupees (Rupees 50000 —) which we assured them should be complied with, when the Weather was a little settled. That their advices forwarded in the Sallamaty Express boat were lost on the Guzerat Coast but the crew were all saved.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Alexander Douglas at Callicut dated yesterday wherein he acknowledges receipt of ours under the 27th. instant with the Wareh^o. keepers Indent and agreeable thereto should procure such of the necessaries as he could at this season of year. That in August last he transmitted an Account Remains at that Factory and desired to know at the same time the cost of several articles but no account having been transmitted and not knowing whether the account Remains sent quadrated with our Books prevented his framing a sett of Books at that Factory and as he is still unacquainted therewith desires us therefore to acquaint him what that Factory stands indebted on our Books as also from what date we will have his Books commence. That as we have been pleased to mention we should bring that Factorys charges to Account at the end of the year enclosed came Abstract thereof from August 1747 to the 31st July 1748 as also an Account Current with this Settlement for the same time and cash account from August 1747 to the 12th. of May 1748 and for July 1748 being the time he had charge of the Factory. That the Inventory of Plank provided for Fort St. David is now taking and will be sent shortly. That on the 18th. Instant one hundred Tirumgaddy Moors plundered the house of the principal shroff and killed two Nairs Jungadas who were laying in the Veranda of his House; the Government as yet have done nothing in regard to this affair except apprehending a merchant of Tirumgaddy who they say will be released in a few days, That he has had a conference with two of the Samorines Rajadores in regard to his putting his Debt into a course of payment and discharging the amount of the Powder and Ball supplied him in January last in regard to the former that they still put him off with evasive Answers notwithstanding all the arguments he made use of, and as to the latter they acquainted him that the Samorine had not as yet sent them his Directions how they should raise the money, when he did they would advise him and that he now waits their answer. That Serjeant Peter Avicot deserted from thence to the French the 19th. Instant and on the 24th. following a Dutch Europe Ship appeared off that port she came from Mocha and was bound for Cochyn. Enclosed came Manuel Netto's Accounts for June and his for July and there being no Cash remaining for the Factory Expences desired therefore a supply.

THE 1st. King of Cotiote writes the Chief that when he conferred with the second at Arrinhole he desired to inform him concerning Unichi Nair for to say the truth when he was examined in Council he was obliged to fly his country and in his absence Narrangport Comapa Nair was brought in after a Residence of 4 or five Years at Cartanaddu being turned from Tellicherry for many Crimes committed against the company and was put in possession of Unichi Nairs Estates and as Unichi Nair is in his confidence he desires he may be reinstated which will give him great content and if the chief wants to know the truth of this he will send two persons for that purpose.

THE Cheif answered the above that by being sick he could not at present examine into Unichi Nairs case but on his recovering his health justice should be done to him.

Chief's Answer to the King of Cottiote in respect to Unichi Nair.

A large ship appeared off Cannanore and the Dutch toneys getting on board from thence brought a Letter from Mr. George Williamson Captain and Supra. Cargoe of the Phazzee Salam who writes the Chief that he designs for Callicut.

SATURDAY 3^d.
The Phazzee Salam appears in the offing & Letter from Mr. Williamson.

A small Brigantine appeared in the offing early this morning and anchored soon after in Mahie Road. It is said she came from the Mauritius and has been three Months in her passage owing to an Insurrection made by the Coffree Slaves who killed the Captain his Mate and one European before they were quelled.

CHEERIANDI CUNHOMOD one of our pepper Merchants acquainted the Chief that the prince in Mr. Wests time had laid an Impediment on his Houses and Oarts which lie in our Districts and which is not yet taken off notwithstanding he had often applied for redress he therefore requested the Chief would intercede with his Highness in his behalf as he was not sensible of his having done any thing to deserve such treatment.

SUNDAY 4th.
A complaint from Cherriandi Cunhomod.

THE Chief accordingly wrote his Highness in regard to the above complaint desiring him to take off the Impediment as his Oarts were in our Districts. For as he would not be content the Chief should lay Impediments on his people so he cannot suffer the same to be done in this place. That on his Highness writing him he had laid an Impediment on Ballapilagata Cutussa until he had paid his Debt which being done he had taken the same off, he could not help informing him that he had now heard he had forced a great number of Fanams from him which proceedings was not experienced by our Merchants from his Ancestors.

MONDAY 5th.
The Chief writes the prince in respect to Cherriandi Cunhamod's complaint.

THE prince in answer to the above writes the Chief that Cherriandi Cunhamod having struck his custom Master occasioned him to lay an Impedim^t. on his houses and Oarts, and that if he will pay the penalty laid on him for it he will take it off and as to what is said of his not being contented with our laying Impediments on his people or that he should not like the same he had only to say as he had adviced the Chief before that no Impediments could be laid by us but on places and people belonging to him as we had no separate Districts of our own. As to the great Number of Fanams mentioned of his taking from Ballapilagata Cutussa and of the Chiefs not knowing of his Ancestors practising the same he was now to tell him that on a persons having ten Fanams it was always usual with his Ancestors to take five and on their committing any Fault the whole which method he himself practised and was not obliged to give an account thereof to any one and that Conformable to reason he had so acted by Ballipilagata Cutussa and for the future would do the same.

WEDNESDAY 8th.
The Princes Answer to the above.

THE Chief observing from the Princes preceding answer that no Justice could be obtained from him, he seeming at present deaf to all reason, therefore sent some of our Nairs to take off the Impediment laid on Cherriandi Cunhamods Houses and Oarts they being in our Districts and under the command of our Guns which they effected without any Molestation.

The Impediment laid by the Prince on Cherriandi Cunhamods Houses &c. taken off by the Chief & reasons why.

NOTWITHSTANDING the Chief took off the Impediment from Cherriandi Cunhamods Houses and Oarts and though they are in our Districts and the person they belong to one of our pepper Merchants and under the H^c. Company's protection yet the Princes Custom Master by his Highness's orders put the same on again.

the Impediment laid on Cherriandi Cunhamods Houses &c.

He was thereupon sent for by the Chief and surely reprimanded for having acted in that manner and the Impediment was again taken off by our own Nairs who had orders from the Chief for that purpose.

SATURDAY
10th.

The province of Irrewadanadu said to be given to the Boyanore. Methods taken by the Chief on this occasion.

It is said that the Prince has made over to Boyanore the whole Province of Irrewadanadu who is coming with a considerable Body of Men to take Possession of it and that the French also have assisted him with men for that purpose. The Chief thereupon sent an Ensigns Command to the camp Captain Johnson to Durmapatam as also a Recruit of men to Moylan with strict orders to the respective officers to be on the Defensive and not act otherwise unless attacked and to keep the strictest Guard possible to prevent Treachery, as from this unexpected and strange step of his Highness its reasonable to think he may be on schemes prejudicial to the Company his actions of late speaking him no Friend.

West was Chief had been paid long since having ordered his Custom Master to pay the same out of the Customs he might receive from the old Linguist but his not discharging the same has occasioned this Delay he therefore desires the Chief will tell the Linguist to pay the same to his Custom Master or for him to receive it himself and that other accounts with the Linguist he will look into.

THE Chief in answer to the above wrote his Highness that he had spoke to the Linguist who says that the Customs are by him yearly deducted out of his Highness' particular account as formerly practised wherefore could not pay the same again. THE Hawke Sloop M^r. Leslie Bailie Master built for the service of Bengall River arrived here from Bombay and brought us a Letter from the Honble President and Council dated the 30th. Ultimo and another under the 9th. instant the former of which enclosed us Duplicate of their last under the 19th. and 21st. They order us to load on this sloop with all Expedition as much Pepper as she can take in consigning the same to the Honble President & Council at Bengall ordering the Master in his way thither to call first at Fort St. David for any advices the Gentlemen there might have to transmit to the Bay. They express a great satisfaction at our being on such friendly terms with the second King of Cotiote and that if by his assistance we should recover Cacart Tupy's Debt they shall not disapprove of our making him a present to the amount of two hundred Rupees (Rupees 200. —.) They referr us to their opinion formerly given us in regard to the peace made with Ally Rajah and to the money he agreed to pay us at certain limited times and add by way of answer to our letter that if the Ambergrease he offers be good and to any considerable amount they permit us in such case to receive it of him otherwise to refuse it in a Civil manner acquainting him that unless it then suited him to pay any considerable sum that we chuse to wait till it did. They approve for the reasons we give of our Intention to make a Battery on the Rocks planting such Guns thereon as were heretofore customary. They

observe our intending to send to Anjengo the sum of eighty thousand Rupees at the opening of the fair season in order to compleat the one hundred and thirty Thousand Rupees formerly ordered but the Gentlemen there having wrote them that fifty thousand Rupees will be sufficient for their present occasion we are directed only to end them that sum. Enclosed came a Commission for serjeant John Christian appointing him an Ensign at this place as also a packet for the Chief and Factors at Anjengo to be forwarded thither by the first convenient opportunity. They approve of the answer given the Dutch and enjoin us constantly to communicate to them such advices as we may from time to time receive of the French Motions.

THEIR Letter under the 9th. Instant only acknowledges receipt of our advices under the 17th. June and of their detaining the Hawke Sloop till then.

THE Toney dispatched the 30th. Ultimo to Anjengo returned this Evening with a letter from the Chief and Factors, enclosing us a packet for the Honble Presid^t. & Council of Bombay which they request may be forwarded by the first opportunity. In answer to what we wrote them concerning our supplying them with fifty thousand Rupees they write that not being very low in cash thirty thousand Rupees will be sufficient which they desire may be sent them as soon as we think proper.

Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo with a packet for Bombay.

RECEIVED another short Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo dated the 4th. Instant in answer to ours under the 24th. Ultimo. They thank us for the advices on the other coast and acquaint us that by a Dutch ship which passed their port the 3^d. they learn from the Captain that he came from Mocha and left there our Honble Master ship Essex Captain Jackson which was all the News they could get from her.

Letter from Anjengo.

THE Chief wrote Ally Rajah that the old Linguist would go to Cannanore in a few days when he might discourse with him as he desired.

That the sloop being in want of a cable and some other necessaries we had accordingly spared them and that enclosed went an account particulars thereof.

FROM the above accident we wrote another short Letter to the Governour and Council at Bengall acquainting them with it and of our supplying her with a small toney the Amount of which being Rupees forty (Rs. 40) we requested they would carry to the credit of Bombay presidency.

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THE above letter together with his sailing orders being delivered to Mr. Bailey he accordingly went off and weighed immediately.

THE Chief wrote the prince that in a few days he proposed examining into Narranport Unichi Nairs affairs and that if his Highness pleased to send any of his Rajadores or Ambu Namby he should be well contented for which reason he had sent him notice of his intentions.

THE Prince wrote for answer that should he send his Rajadores from the usage he has lately received he could not tell whether the Chief would credit them when they declared the truth for that Unichi Nair who had committed these faults against him was now by the Chiefs orders recalled and as he observes the same he thinks sending his Rajadores will be of no signification for to Examine into the truth he ought to be sent to him with our second as the falsities were spoke before which would be the best way for him to clear himself likewise before him.

ALLEY MAMEE a Moor who lives to the southward of Mahie and a person who was in Boyanore Wars with the French and strongly attached to the Honble Company's interest came this morning and paid a visit to the Chief.

THE French at Mahie are throwing up a Breast Work and strong Intrenchments round the hill Bera planting Cannon thereon which will greatly strengthen Fort St. George. What their intentions are from this is uncertain but imagine 'em to be only to put themselves in the best posture of Defence possible in case of an Attack.

The French fortify the Hill Bera.

THE prince wrote the Chief that he had advised him to receive two thousand Rupees from the Linguist which sum he owed him and had received for answer that the same was deducted from his Debt but says he had given the Linguist no writing for discharging the same out of his customs; that it was usual for him sometimes to discharge the same that way, at other times to borrow money of him as his necessity required and therefore now writes the Linguist to pay the same and desires the Chief would ask it of him for that he must get the Customs of his Country to defray his charges and pay off his Debts.

Ola from the Prince to the Chief.

By a private Letter from Governour Floyer to the Chief we learn that the Enemy made an attack upon our Trenches the 19th. ultimo and by our men giving way Major Laurence of their Garrison was taken Prisoner with Captain Bruce of an Independent Company and carried into Pondicherry, that the Enemy the same day deserted Ariacop[am] and blew up part of the Fort but that our people soon repaired the Damages and lodged themselves in it and the village thereabout. That Mr. Hallyburton in endeavouring to part some seepoys who were quarrelling with one another was unfortunately shot by one of them whose loss was greatly lamented being of singular service. That the 31st. ultimo the Enemy made a sally with the Flower of their Garrison consisting of six hundred Europeans and the rest Blacks commanded by Monsieur Paradis but being warmly received were obliged to retire into the Town leaving a great number of killed and wounded among the latter was Paradis and some say he is Dead. That on our side we lost Captain Brown and three private Men besides twelve wounded. That they have taken of the party sent from Mahie sixty seven Europeans thirty three coffrees and seventeen seepoy prisoners the remainder having got into Madrass. That we are entrenched within four hundred yards of Pondicherry walls and that he hopes a few days will finish the Batteries when he thinks the Enemy cannot stand it long. He advises the arrival of the Winchester Man of War from Bombay as also of the the Augusta Success and Northesk.

Answer to the above Ola from the prince. THE Chief in answer to his Highness's Ola received yesterday wrote him that the Linguist was at Cannanore but that on his return he would write him further.

SATURDAY 24TH. WROTE to Mr. Alexander Douglas at Callicut advising of our sending him by the Toney the sum of two thousand Rupees for defraying the Factory charges and providing the Necessaries indented for. He is ORDERED to send us by the first conveyance what firewood he may have ready, as also to return the Military now sent as a security to the Treasure as soon as possible.

SUNDAY 25TH. Mr. Byfeld sets out for Cannanore & why. THE Old Linguist who is now at Cannanore writing the Chief that he imagined our sending the second to Ally Rajah may probably induce him to think of some method to defray his Debt to the Honble Company. Mr. Byfeld accordingly proceeded thither in the Barge this Morning with an Ensign command.

TUESDAY 27TH. Letter from Callicut. RECEIVED a letter from Mr. Alexander Douglas at Callicut dated yesterday in answer to ours under the 24th. and acknowledges receipt of the two thousand Rupees. He advises that the Nairs Jungadoes of Callicut burnt and destroyed the Bazaar of Carranditti^{ch}. was occasioned from some of the Inhabitants being concerned in the Robbery committed in the House of one Golanda Shroff. That he shall send us some Firewood shortly but that there are no Taffaties procurable. The Military sent with the Treasure returned in this Toney.

Byfeld Thomas returns from Cannanore. His conference with Ally Rajah in respect of his Debt. MR. BYFELD with the Detachment returned this Evening from Cannanore who reports that from the Conference he had with Ally Rajah he seemed to have all the appearance of a Sincere friend and would was he capable gladly put his Debt into a course of payment but as that family is now greatly reduced he has been only able to get a promise of a parcel of Ambergrease which he looks upon to be of little value however he has brought Musters of it and should that not be accepted of he would then think of other means of paying off his Debt. He brought with him an ola from Ally Rajah to the Chief to which he refers himself.

Ola from Ally Rajah on the occasion. ALLY RAJAH in his Ola writes that he has seen Mr. Byfeld with whom he had discoursed concerning his Debt to the Honble Company, that he has offered to give one thousand Rupees worth of Ambergrease and the rest in Coir Cowries and other Goods by the Month of May and the other five thousand Rupees he would pay in the ensuing year. On the whole he had talked with the Old Linguist who would acquaint the Chief of what had passed between them and hoped a continuance of the Chiefs favours as formerly was shown him.

THURSDAY 29TH. Boyanore writes for permission to pass through Tellicherry on his way to Talliparambu. THE Boyanore wrote the Chief of his having determined to go to Talliparambu the 5th. of next month and as passing through Tellicherry was the best way he thought proper to advise the Chief of his Intentions.

FRIDAY 30TH. Chief's answer on the Occasion. THE Chief returned for Answer that he was welcome to pass with three or four hundred men but that the times at present would not permit of his allowing a greater number to pass our Districts.

Letter from Callicut. RECEIVED a letter from Mr. Alexander Douglas at Callicut dated yesterday advising of his sending us up two Europeans who came from Travancore to enter into our Military. Enclosed came an account of what plank had been provided by the late Francisco Dias for Fort St. David and that after he had closed it Manuel

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Netto informed him of three hundred seventy eight plank more from one to four Borells thick of which he shall send us an account as also of what has been sent up in the year.

THE Chief wrote the prince that he had received advices from the Governour of Bombay that his Highness's pattamars were arrived there and that in two or three Days they were to receive their Dispatches. That agreeable to his Highness's request he had asked the Old Linguist for the two thousand Rupees who says his Highness is already largely indebted to him which if he will pay that he shall not be wanting in discharging the customs till when he shall put the same to the credit of His Debt. The Chief concludes that his Highness should not refer him to those for the money from whom it is not to be got and hopes he will now send the same himself.

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EXAMINATION of Unichy Nair as taken by the Chief and second viz.

THIS EXAMINATION saith that the ola said to be dictated by Domingo Rodrigues was entirely false as Amboo Namby had declared that upon being called upon the reason of his absconding was for fear of his Life the Princes Nairs as he was informed being in search for him as he had too much reason to think for that purposes, and that an Ensign with a Guard was likewise ordered out by the then Chief to look for him that about ten day before this happened he this Examinant laid a complaint before the Chief against Chitil Conna and Cailla Cunga for putting an Impediment on his Oarts of which the chief took no further Notice than by declaring if he was not quite he would put him in Irons and send him away to St. Helena and would put Comaport Nair in his Room being interrogated who indicated the Ola said to be sent by the Prince to Mr. Dudley or which way and how he came to be acquainted with it, answers that he knows there was an Ola wrote and the way that he knew it was about fifteen days before the Anniversary of the Death of Prince Cunhi Homo he went to Cherrica being then on good terms wth. the Prince and further Declares that the Ola was wrote at his the Prince's pallace at Cotart where he then was and discoursing upon the near approach of the Anniversary he said if his Friends the English would fire three days before it would be doing a great Honour to the Memory of his Deceased Brother and that the seconds being sent with an officer and a Detachment of soldiers the very day would be very pleasing and look well all over the country that it was formerly customary for all Chiefs to write a Letter of compliment when they arrived which Mr. Dudley had not done neither Mr. West so that it would be proper to mention the same to him and as Mr. Dudley (had by some Misfortune fell in with people not properly conversant in the Affairs of his Government) did not agree with him as his predecessors had done, he would write to Mr. West not to tread in such a Crooked path that the Ancient Friendship subsisting between his Ancestors and the Honble Company, might be preserved. From this Discourse Amboo Namby was then directed by the prince to draw up the ola who went to wash his Body at the Tank and upon his return read the same signed it and Dispatched it directly by one of his Nairs this he Declares will be confirmed by Mr. Robinsons Report upon his return from Cherrica if referred to as the Prince then renewed this very subject and seemed surprised Mr. West had not fully replied to the several parts of the Ola so very Essentiall which he desired him (upon his return to Tellicherry) to mention earnestly requesting that he the said Mr. West would not follow the Dictates of his late predecessor. Two months after this the Prince called at the Fort in his way to Cartanaadu at which time he this Examinant was with him during his stay there Cristnah Cutty Putterah his principal Rajadore came several times and had a meeting with Mr. Dudley and the then Chief upon the Princes return which was about twenty days afterwards he found a quite Different Behaviours in him and was then informed by Chattole Nombier one of the Council then with him that in the two days they were in the Fort, Mr. Dudley had requested. First to declare that Domingo Rodrigues dictated the Ola, secondly to give it under his hand that the late War with the Prince and Ally Rajah was by the Instigation of Domingo Rodrigues and carried on without reason by Mr. Geekie that the same might be sent to the Honble Company. Thirdly and Lastly that Comport Nair might be brought into the Districts again and govern that Family, after the whole of these proceedings his Highness returned to Cherrica and came hither again about the 15th. September and on Monday the 26th. of that month Mallabar style about five o'clock in the Afternoon he this Examinant was summoned before the Council where he was interrogated for sometime in respect to discovering the Person that wrote the Ola abovementioned at which time he declared as above that it was the Prince that dictated and Amboo Namby wrote it in his presence at which the prince seeming greatly displeased he told his Highness what he declared was only the Truth and what the Council directed him to adhere to, but if it Displeased him and he would signify his Intentions and thoughts a due Obedience should if possible be shown to his Commands and Inclinations. Then Amboo Namby was called for

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but not being to be found the Prince broke up the Conference and departed to Cotart then ensued what is Declared in the foregoing part of this Examination and occasioned him to leave his Wife Family and House in order to preserve his Life for doing nothing more than every honest man ought.

Agreeable to your Desire I Deliver the following as a true Relation of what I know concerning the Ola wrote by the Prince to M^r. West and of the Discourse that passed between us as interpreted to me by the Old Linguist and Manuell Rodrigues.

On the 22^d. May 1747 I set out by Direction of the late Chief and his Council with a Present and a compliment to the Prince of Cota Cuna and the now reigning Prince of Cherrika on the Anniversary of their Brothers Death, on the meeting of whom after delivering the Present and acquainting them of the Errand I was sent on the Prince of Cota Cuna presented me with a Gold Bangle and made an Excuse for his Departure to attend his Devotions, when the young prince (in whose hands lays the executive part of Government) asked me if I had not brought an Ola from the Chief whom I answered in the Negative at the same time told him I imagined the Chief had wrote him (as M^r. West told me he would on my leaving Tellicherry) To this he replied that the Chief had indeed wrote him but it was in answer to an Ola he had sent him the material parts of which were unnoticed w^{ch}. occasioned his then going to mention such particulars which he told me I must observe and acquaint the Chief of on my return to Tellicherry.

He then began with acquainting me it was always usual on the appointment of a new Chief for the Prince of the Country to receive notice thereof which had not been sent him as usual, however he had waved [*sic*] that point of ceremony and had wrote himself first in order to show how willing he was to preserve a good understanding between the Prince of Colastria and the Honble Company, which had not subsisted between the former Chief (M^r. Dudley) and his Family and which he told me was owing to his giving ear to Idle Reports and using Boys and mean people to negotiate the great matters of consequence as frequently interfered between the Company and him, whose interest ought to be one for which reason there had been a difference between them but he hoped that M^r. West from whose long continuance here and knowledge of the country customs, the case would be altered, to which purpose he had wrote him and not having received an answer to these points, desired I would acquaint him of the same and that he expected a suitable reply, which message having repeated and enjoined me to deliver I departed and on my arrival acquainted M^r. West with the same who when the Dispute between M^r. Dudley and the Old Linguist was deciding in Council before the Prince the 28th. of September following cleared me of having delivered my message with him.

THE Chief received a letter from Mr. Wardman at Maddacarra advising that the relief of soldiers sent yesterday were followed from Cherriera by a party of Nairs to the Number of thirty five with Arms Swords and Targets, with what intent he does not know, however thinks it adviseable that our people in future march by the way of Cannanore. That within these two days a great number of Nairs having come from Callicherry to Billiapatam and Cotacuna where they are making great preparations. Some say it is to receive Boyanore and others that they are to serve as a Garrison to Billiapatam but how true he cant say.

THE Chief answered that he was glad to hear himself and Boyanore were willing to come hither and conferr with him, but as it is against the custom of all Nations to permit a large number of Forces to come armed under their Forts he must beg to be excused departing from so General a Rule. That if his Highness and Boyanore chuse to come with the usual Guards as attend on such occasions he would satisfy them of his inclinations to preserve a good understanding between them and the Honble Company.

THE second King of Cotiate writes the Chief that the Business which was Discovered on between himself Mr. Byfeld and the Old Linguist he doubted not was kindly received by us as he had done on his part. That now Boyanore was coming with a great force to enter into the province of Irrevadanaddu, which will be the loss of great Respect to that venerable place, but in order to prevent it he had posted his Forces at the River of Puringallem and that should Boyanore offer to pursue his Designs he is determined to Encounter him for which purpose desires the Chief will send him two candies of powder which with such quantity of shott as is sufficient for the same will be very agreeable as also two thousand Flints and that so soon as he is advised of their Amount he will punctually Discharge the same. That though the prince has no Gratitude to the Honble Company for their Extraordinary services to himself, yet as it is his Intent to be on friendly terms we should do well by making use of suitable methods to remove such Evil Counsellors as are about him. They approve of our Agreement with the second King of Cotiote as he may be made a check to our Prince should he take any Measures contrary to the Honble Company's interest. That they observe what we say concerning the French fortifying the Hill nigh Mahie which probably proceed from such Reasons as we conjecture. Private advices from M. Floyer in respect to the French.

GOVERNOUR FLOYER in a private Letter to the Chief dated the 26th. ult^o. writes that the late heavy rains have greatly retarded our Works before Pondicherry but that the Weather has again cleared up and seemed as if it would Continue so. That the 25th. we opened seven Gun and Mortar Batteries but with what success he has not learnt. That the ships were to have cannonaded the next day but have not yet begun and that there is heard but very little firing either from the Town or our Batteries. All accounts agree that they cannot hold out ten days longer and in case we have fair Weather on which our success greatly depends its thought a much shorter time will reduce that place. On the 22^d. the French set upon our convoy from the sea side and carried off two twenty four pounder Guns slung on Carriages but that we saved a large quantity of stores, that we have lost no officer of Rhank [*sic*] since his last and but few private Men, the Loss of the French side is Monsieur Paradis and many other officers.

Report of Admiral Boscawen raising the siege of Pondicherry Rejoiced at Mahie on that acct.

THE French at Mahie fired this Morning twenty one Guns & at noon saluted round all their Forts, giving out that Admiral Boscawen has been obliged to raise the siege of Pondicherry, in which he has lost a great Number of Men besides ten Mortars and twelve brass cannon how true this may be is uncertain as possibly they may have received later advices from the other coast.

4. Our secret Committee for the current Year are Richard Chauncey Esq. Dodding Braddyll Esq^r. Harry Gough Esq. Alexander Hume Esq. and William Mabbot Esq. what orders you may receive from them or any three of those Gentlemen relating to our ships must be strictly obeyed.

5. Our ships Marlborough, Salisbury and Britannia arrived safe with us We thank God the 31st. March and the Kent and Severn at Kinsale the 21st. April last.

6. We are preparing to Dispatch the Somerset and Pelham for the Coast and Bay as also the ship Doddington to Bombay and likewise our own ship Duke of Newcastle for Bencoolen.

7. Notwithstanding the above in case any Men of War are bound home and any of our ships can conveniently join them we would have them come in company with such Men of War for their greater security till further orders.

DISPATCHED the Ramban Express Boat with a Letter to the Presidency advising the Death of Mr. Rawdon of Mr. Byfeld's having charge of the chiefship and of Mr Wests getting himself in readiness to proceed to Bombay by the first opportunity that offered, acquainting them likewise of our having agreed to supply the Chief and

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Factors of Anjengo with Thirty thousand Rupees out of fifty thousand they had requested and should have supplied them with the whole if they had not before wrote thirty thousand Rupees would be as much as they should want from which notice we had Calculated our Expences and that now having advanced forty thousand Rupees for Rice we had only sufficient in the Treasury to Defray our Expences untill the end of December therefore desired a supply of three hundred and fifty thousand Rupees might be sent us as we were in hopes of getting five thousand candies of Pepper at or under fifty eight Rupees the Candy but that we could not send an Exact Calculate for cash untill the next conveyance. That Mr. Boscawen had wrote the Chief he intended to Dispatch three Men of War to this Coast who were to call here and that one of them wanting a Main Mast he desired the same might be proceeded and such other large masts as could be got for the Fleet in General which request we should endeavour to Comply with and that if a Mast was not to be got for the ship mentioned to be in present want we intended to spare one of the Company's. That from Fort St. David we learnt the Delawar was Dispatched hither the 12th. ultimo to take in Sandall Wood and Pepper who should have the quickest Dispatch possible; with her the Oxford came in company to fill up at Anjengo, at which place should they fall short of Tonnage the Gentlemen there had Directions to send her hither to fill up and in such case we had every thing in readiness. That the sudden Dispatch of this Boat hindered sending the usual papers and accounts and being more full concerning the Transactions of this Settlement but we should inform them of all particularly in our next, and acknowledged receipt of their Letter of the 15th. Ultimo which brought advice of a Cessation of Arms.

Wrote the Chief and Factors of Anjengo, acknowledging receipt of their Letter of the 22^d. ultimo which arrived us the 30th. but that only a serjeant and eight Men came, two returning back to them from Quilone, as the Serjeant says they were forced in there through stress of Weather. That we now consign them thirty thousand Rupees (Rs 30000) and are sorry we cant send them fifty thousand as they desire, but our cash being low at present from having advanced forty thousand Rupees for Rice we hope the same will be sufficient for them, as they had wrote us under the 7th. Septem^r. last they should not want more than what we now sent which had we known sooner we should have deferred advancing for Rice as yet but that we had advised the President and Council of Bombay by a Pattamar Boat this Day of their Request to us. Advised them of the Death of Mr. Rawdon and of Mr. Byfeld having charge of the Settlement and that we heard Admiral Boscawen had raised the seige of Pondicherry through the Excessive Rains and sickness among his Troops and that we heard the Oxford was Dispatched to their place to fill up and the Delawar hither.

That yesterday when one of our Calliquilone Moors was sent with a Letter to Maddacarra he met eight of his Nairs with arms who made two cuts at him (which he founded off with his sword) gave him very offensive Language beat him and then tied his hands and feet and in the condition flung him among some Briars; a few Days agoe much the same accident happened of which immediate notice was sent him and that as his Highness had not punished the offenders undoubtedly it had occasioned them to continue this affronts. That in his Letters he seems to Declare a Friendship for the Honble Company but that he observes the contrary from his suffering his people to insult ours for which reason if he will not give a proper satisfaction to the Chief he shall be obliged to take it as various Insults of this sort have lately been experienced without our meeting any Redress. That now he sent the same Calliquilone Moor with the sword he before carried to inform him particularly of his Nairs ill Treatment to him and that if he has a mind to show his Friendship and Readiness to redress these Grievances he may send a proper Guard with this man who will show him the place in which these people Lodge themselves.

THIS Morning the Chief received an Ola from the Prince endeavouring to evade a search and punishing his people in reply to what wrote him the 9th. Instant which will be answered upon return of the Calliquilone Moor that carried the last Letter to him.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Douglas dated yesterday advising receipt of one thousand Rupees consigned him the 9th. which not being sufficient to provide the articles indented for he desires two thousand more may be sent him. That the Person who offered to contract for the Poon Mast was one Manacaddem Cojagee who always had supplied the Company without giving security by whom they had never been sufferers but as he was ordered he should send for him and endeavour to get the same which if he refused to do he should advice us. That he now sent up two hundred and ten Teak Rafter twenty one feet Long four and an half Inches Broad and three and an half Inches thick likewise eighty two large Bamboo Mats and three thousand seven hundred and fifty Mats for embalging Pepper.

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By the return of the Barge and Toney's which carried Ensign Wardman and his Command to Maddacarra he wrote the Chief that the Princes Nairs had again insulted another Calliquilone Moor in his way to that place and that in short they were all afraid to go overland at present.

THIS Morning the Chief received a Letter from Ensign Wardman advising he had heard from Cunha Pokra that the prince has delivered over the Different parts of his country to the following head Men to plunder his subjects residing therein viz. To Conna Croop Chericuna and all that way, Mattamy point with the two Islands of Muttong and Ticombar to Annanda, Maddy and all that part to Cammall and all to the northward to Pattalye and the Lordship of Munderry (which is worth them all) to Christna Cutty Putterah so that its thought the Country will soon be ruined. That the Princes Nairs are very saucy and use the poor Natives very ill, and that they wish heartily the Company would pity their condition. That since his arrival with a further Command the Prince is more on his Guard and has reinforced Billiapatam Fort and Cherrikana.

THE Chief wrote Ensign Wardman that he duely observed what he wrote him in respect to the Princes base Behaviour and cruel oppression his subjects laboured under. That two of his Rajadores are just come here so that he shall take proper notice of the same to them directing him to keep a vigilant Watch and a Careful look out and to advise him constantly of everything that passes.

THE Prince returned an answer to the Chiefs Letter of the 10th. Instant by remarking, the Chief said, That from his not chastizing his people before for the fault they had committed the same had now happened again. But that he could not chastize Charrandin Iogee for the charge laid against him as he declared he was not Guilty. That if the Moor was again sent him and would prove him to be the Man he should be punished. That as to the late Insult he cannot find any body that appears guilty, but that when he has Examined into the first complaint he will enquire further into the next and that for further particulars he referred the Chief to two of his Rajadores who were sent by him to Discourse on this Business.

THE two Rajadores mentioned to be sent with it had a meeting this afternoon with the Chief who finding their Discourse to be in substance much the same as what related in the Princes Ola he told them that his Highness not Detecting the Gang of Villians that basely insulted our people when they met them going singly to Maddacarra showed but little Inclination in him to give us satisfaction for even admitting Charrandin Iogee was not the man surely if there was any manner of Government he might easily find him or those out who harboured at Chatote and detect the whole or part and in case he did not a proper remedy should be thought of to prevent the like happening hereafter. However to convince them Charrandin was actually Guilty he called for the Calliquilone Moor (that had his Musquet cut) before them who plainly proved the same declaring they had from their Infancy been acquainted and therefore he could not be deceived Upon which they proposed cutting him off without any further hesitation or enquiry by way of giving satisfaction, but were told by the Chief that such Proceedings were contrary to the Laws of humanity as any person ought to have an Opportunity given him to make a Defence before such severe sentences were passed upon them and his only request was to have those who might be found Guilty severely punished that a stop might be put to such Proceedings in future without confining it to any.

All which they promised sincerely to consider of and to return tomorrow having some religious ceremonies to perform at the Pagoda.

THIS afternoon the Princes Rajadores came to the Fort and acquainted the Chief that they had seriously considered of every thing that passed yesterday and were of opinion that a Conference between him the Regent and Prince Gogo would

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be the most proper and effectual means to settle every thing to General satisfaction therefore with his Leave they would return to Cherrika and make known the same to their Highness which was agreed to and the following Letter wrote by him on the occasion was in substance.

THAT the Letter sent by the two Rajadores was received that they had informed him of what his Highness had Directed them whom he likewise had conferred with and that they would acquaint him of the same; and that as his Highness knew how often he had put up with the affronts given our people for their passing to and from Maddacarra which he had endeavoured to accommodate amicably from the Friendship subsisting between him and the company, by expostulating with him so as to cause no breach in the good understanding he was desirous to keep up, but he is sorry to say he finds that there is no Remedy taken to hinder the same happening in future, for which and many other reasons he is Desirous of seeing him which he might have reasonably expected before now agreeable to a former Promise given him, and that he hopes the Message his people now bring will induce both his Brother and himself to come hither, and that he is ready to send the Barge with a Guard and the Linguist to attend him.

Letter to the Prince.

THE Chief received an Ola from the 2^d. King of Cotiote, that after his Departure from Arinhole on the last meeting he had with him, he had Discoursed with the Nombiers concerning both his and their Interest on the Intention of Boyanore to enter Irrevadanaddu, and that the Messenger he now sent named Guennavadiadden Canachim Nombier would acquaint him verbally of what had passed between him and the said Nombiers, and that he should not come to any Resolution therein, untill he received his sentiments on their Propositions, as the good Harmony and Correspondence lately made between him and the Company occasioned him to rely on his Council and that he stays to receive a written answer on this subject.

Ola from the 2^d. King of Cotiote in respect to Boyanores Intention against Irrevadanaddu. Chiefs Opinion Decd. thereon.

THE second King of Cotiotes Rajadore coming to the Fort relates that his Majesty had several meetings with the Nombiers in respect to Boyanores Intention of passing the River of Paringatara, and settling in the Province of Irrevadanaddu, when they proposed to put that part of the Country under the Protection of Perinal and to levy an annual Tribute for him of one Panam on every coconut Tree, 10 Cent on the Verge Land, and one hundred and fifty Fanams on the Bazaar of Panure, and to erect one Tonquin (which is a House of Worship) more Desiring the Chiefs opinion thereon as he well knew his Council and Friendship might be relied on, which being an affair of consequence and in some respect or other might possibly affect the Honble Company's Trade by his being settled in the Province, the Chief in a suitable manner excused himself giving a Determinate answer as his attention to other Branches of the Honble Company's Business at present would not permit him to make the necessary enquiry, into the Grants obtained for carrying on our commerce therein but that he would do it in a few Days and if he would call here in his way from Choudar (where he was going) he would then acquaint him with his Opinion freely which he promised to do and took his Leave.

Chiefs Conference with the King of Cotiotes Rajadores.

ENSIGN WARDMAN wrote the Chief that the Princes Nairs continue very abusive to his People and that Cristina Cutty Putterah passed to Cherikuna with about one hundred and fifty Nairs, that Annanda Croop and Conna Croop crossed over from thence towards the northernmost [sic] part of Mottamy point nigh Urbelly with a good Body of Men, though as yet he cannot learn their Intentions but had sent a cautionary Letter to Serjeant Reed at Mottamy Point to be on his Guard and in case any thing happens he would reinforce him as he sees occasion.

But being told that the late Chief and Council refused his Cardamoms because they were so far short of the Goodness we always have had them and that what he presented w^d. not be vendible at the Europe Market, it therefore could not be Expected that those which was refused before should be accepted now nor was he called hither for that purpose, but on the contrary to give us a satisfactory account for tendering such bad Goods and that it was expected he would deliver this Year as many of the first sort as would clear his Debt which Demand finding us resolutely to insist on, he after many Excuses promised punctually to comply with but was told no more money should be advanced him until we saw how far he keeps his Promise when he was Directed to withdraw.

It is here to be observed that the Cardamoms produced last year in the Country were not so good as has been brought to Market for many years past, which cannot be imputed to the fault of the Merchants as we found on enquiry what they offered was the best that could be procured, however as submitting ourselves to accept just what they bring may give them a Latitude to put bad upon us when better may be got. It is therefore Resolved absolutely to refuse them, that in case such another Year should hereafter happen they may be more carefull and first and Musters of such as are to be had when the money advanced them will be more easily got back again and to secure this Outstanding in the best manner possible the Chief promises to assist him in the sale of the three Candies he mentions to have now in his Warehouse.

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As Cota Marcan begins to annoy the Vessels coming & going to and from this Place the Chief proposes sending out an Armed Munchua and Toney to carry on them which is agreed to and that the Chief give orders and put such a command on board as he judges necessary.

RAWDON my Predecessor in a General Letter sent you notice of the cessation of Arms, there was in Europe between our two Nations and copy of the articles was likewise enclosed you, this I thought sir was sufficient to renew the antient Friendship there was between these two Settlements, but with great concern I am obliged to inform you that three Days a Merchant Boat coming from Anjengo to Tellicherry fell in with your Round Boats, who without any Examination fired and killed one of our people, this Proceeding I believe cannot be Done with your Order, I therefore Decline asking publick satisfaction from the firm Opinion it happened more by Mischance than with Intent and that proper Redress may be Given in an amicable manner, I beg you will Examine into this Particular, and if any of your soldiers are faulty, I dare you will chastize the Culpable Person to prevent the like happening in future giving proper Orders that our Boats may pass unmolested by those you send out.

That he cant come to Tellicherry as his Mother is still ill, but that he has sent for Chatote Nombier whom he will Discourse of such Business he has to communicate to the Chief and then send him hither for that purpose and wll likewise appoint a Day for coming himself.

Mr. Bouchier having wrote Mr. Rawdon in his Letter of the 16th. Instant (which the Chief opened at his request) that Captain Thomas Stevens of the Oxford had applied to him for assistance being in a miserable situation for want of Men and being unable to supply him he requested the one Enclosed for the Hon^{ble} President might be forwarded with the utmost Expedition which the Chief complied with this morning by Boat Express advising the Governour of ship Delawars arrivel here and of every thing else necessary.

THE Chief received the following answer from Monseieur Louet Chief of Mahie in answer to what wrote him yesterday Translate of which from the Portuguese was as follows.

To M^r. BYFELD.

SIR

I have the Honour of your Letter giving notice of the people belonging to our Round Boats having killed one of your people in a Boat coming from Anjengo to Tellicherry desiring Justice of me if done against my orders.

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My orders to my people are only to impede the carrying Pepper off clandestinely from this Place either to the northward or southward and not to molest any Boats, and when I heard that my people had fired at a Boat in her Passage I directly recalled them hither who on their arrival were ignorant of having killed any body and that when I examined why they fired they told me because the people in the Boat would not answer on their hailing them but endeavoured to fly therefore they thought it had been some Boat who was trading for Pepper clandestinely. This Sir is the case and you are sensible that all vessels are obliged to answer when called to.

The reason of my giving Orders to prevent Pepper being carried off is from various Persons having made contracts for that commodity in those Places which appertain to us of which I have written Proofs in my hands which is quite contrary to the Privileges formerly taken with my superiors in Europe. None of us nor our Inhabitants have ever made any contracts for Pepper in the District belonging to you nor while the war subsisted have we acted contrary to the Interest of your superiors.

On the whole the soldiers who have acted contrary to orders shall be punished and I beg you will Direct your People in going backwards and forwards in meeting with Ours to answer.

My true Intention is to live in Friendship and good correspondence which on my part all as is possible shall be Done and I doubt not of your acting in the same manner.

That as to coming here he begs to be excused as since his Predecessor Died he has not seen his own king but on his going to him he would in his way back call here and that Paqui Moopa will inform him of his good Intentions and hopes we will not allow any of our people to molest those belonging to him.

THE second King of Cotiote Rajadore coming to the Fort is acquainted by the Chief that he highly approves of the Methods taken by his Master to preserve the Province of Errevadanaddu free from Embroils at the same Time acquainted him that as we are settled and carry on a great Trade therein if any further Resolutions are taken by him or the Nombiers he expects from the Regard and Expressions of Friendship made use of that he shall be previously acquainted therewith to prevent controversies hereafter; and as he is very Desirous to cultivate and preserve a strict Friendship with his Majesty therefore should be Glad a Grant was passed by him (as lately had been by the first King) to the Honble Company for carrying on a Free and Uninterrupted Trade in that part of his Dominions which he Governs, exclusive of all other European Nations which would make the Union firmer and give a much better Pretext to assist him in Time of need than otherwise which the Nombier promised to mention to him and then took his Leave.

By the return of this Rajadore the Chief acknowledges receipt of his Letter and acquainted him that Canachy Nombier had imparted him the Methods proposed by himself and the four Nombiers for preserving the Good and Peace of the Province of Errevadanaddu to which he had not given an immediate answer at first as it was a Business which required attention as he could not be unsensible of the Priviledges the Honble Company have in this Province for the great Trade they carry on in it. Therefore he had told Canachy Nombier to call again and receive his answer and opinion and he cannot but say that he thinks his Majesty and the Nombiers have taken very proper Methods for the Good of the Country and its Commerce and that now he hoped from the Friendship which subsisted between us our priviledges would be more firm. As to other particulars Canachy Nombier would inform him.

CHATOTE Namburee whom the Prince mentions in his Ola received the 19th. Instant being the Head of the Brass Pagoda was this Morning sent for by the Chief, acquainted of his Highness's Request and told that the occasion of his being sent for to Chierrika was to Examine impartially into the several abuses which had been committed by the Princes Nairs on the people going to and from Maddacarra belonging to the Honble Company which as yet the Prince had given Evasive Answers to and Delayed punishing the offenders although the clearest Proofs had been given on our parts that the complaints were made with Justice, such as the People so abused have been sent to him to Examine and that they even have pointed out some of the particular Men and the Place where these affronts have been repeated which were undeniable circumstances and called aloud for satisfaction. That it might be easily perceived if he had not harboured Pulamby Conna and his Gang when they run away from the Company's service and with their Arms nothing of this kind would have lately happened and upon the whole he was desired to acquaint his Highness that if he was Determined to countenance and give Ear to such base people without giving the satisfaction so justly required he would compell the Chief to pursue such measures as would be quite contrary to his Inclinations in Order to obtain it; therefore as he Chatote Namburee was a well wisher to his Sovereign he did not Doubt of his Integrity and using all proper Methods to obtain speedy Redress in order to preserve Peace and Tranquility in the country which by his long Residence amongst us he must be sensible the Honble Company had hitherto preserved. At the same time the Chief gave Chatote Namburee to understand that the satisfactions so much Desired was only to punish the offenders in a Corporal Method and not to take away their Lives unheard as the Princes Ministers had hinted to the Chief they were willing to do by Charadin Iogee as such proceedings among us appeared very inhuman and all as wanted is for a stop to be put to our receiving any further Insults.

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THE Chief wrote the Prince that agreeable to his request Chatote Nambooree now comes to wait on him whom he had informed fully of the ill usage our people had received from his Nairs at Different Times concerning which if proper notice is not taken and satisfaction given it may prove of bad consequence and that for many other reasons he was very desirous of seeing him here as he had formerly promised to come.

The Chief informs the Board that he had privately wrote the Governour thereon and had sent him copy of what he himself had wrote Mr. Bouchier on the subject as is noticed in the Diary of yesterdays Date wherefore it is resolved not to comply with their Request.

HAVING made a calculate of our Expence of Rice It is AGREED to Demand back of Domingo Rodrigues the sum of ten Thousand Rupees advanced him on that account and as the Chief has had private advices to supply Anjengo Factory fully with money It is AGREED to send them to the amount of Twenty Thousand Rupees more part in Rupees and the rest in the Dollars we have here which commonly sell better to the southward than at this place and with this further supply they will now have to the full amount of what they Desired as to send them.

Rice its Expence consid^d. & 10000 R^s. to be Demanded back from Domingo Roiz.

Supply of cash to be sent to Anjengo.

CAPTAIN Stevens having been here two Days and not as yet taken any Sandall wood the Secretary is DIRECTED to require his reasons for the same and to inform him of our Honble Masters standing orders in relation to his not receiving any of our Military or others without permission from the Chief.

Captain Stevens to give his Reasons for his Dilatoriness.

TAKING into consideration the Linguists Letter concerning the sandall wood lent him by Mr. West It is AGREED to take all the First sort he has in Warehouse and as no more is procurable that he Deliver the rest in the 2^d. Sort making an allowance from ninety five to one hundred and ten Rupees the Candy.

Agreed to what 1st. sort of Sandall Wood Domingo Roiz may have & wth. may be remaining of his Debt in the 2^d. sort allow^d. for Difference of Price.

YOURS of the 23^d. Instant I was favoured with, with orders to land the Honble Companys Iron from on board the Delawar, we have since been employed on board to get the same to hand with the utmost Diligence and must beg leave to inform your Worship that the Iron is under all our Water Butts fore and aft in the ships Hold down the flooring of the ship that it has taken up much Time to get it to hand for Landing, hope this Day it will be all on shore then must Desire your Worships Indulgence to heel ship to scrub her bottom before we take on board the Honble Companys Wood. Our ship being very foul being off the Ground above Eighteen Months and did not think it consistent with the Dispatch of the voyage to stop and clean at Tricomala on the Island of Zealone as was intended when we left Fort St. David October the 15th. 1748 by the consent of the Governour and Council of that Place for I finding when off the Island the northerly wind was set in strong and blowed Right into that Harbour that I was Doubtfull we could not be able to have got out again for sometime that might be very hurtfull to our Intended voyage so proceeded round the Island for this coast with all Expedition hope for this Reason you will favour me with a little Time to clean them will take on board the Honble Companys Wood soon in order to receive your Worships Dispatches to proceed on my intended voyage.

Your Worship was likewise pleased to inform me of the Honble Company's Orders, that no Gun, Fire Arms, or Warlike stores of any kind whatever should be sold out of the Delawar at any of their Settlements on this side of India. That he is now very busy from the ships arrival here, the Linguist is ill, and as his Highness does not chuse to come here, he now deires he will send those People who have offended the Company to clear themselves at the Pagoda that all things may end well and be at last give his superiours this pleasing notice and that if he will not do this he shall be obliged much against his Inclinations to take another Method and that before an End is put to this Business he cannot send again to him".

THE Chief having received private information of a parcel of arms brought from Anjengo and said to be sent from Captain Forbes to the Prince and the same being contrary to the Express Orders of the Honble Company the Board now proceed to take the several Information concerning them which are ORDERED to be entered after this consultation, but the Nair who was the Bearer of Captain Forbes's Letter to the Prince having secreted himself and the Board having observed it has greatly an appearance of his being employed in this unwarrantable Trade with Captain Forbes's servant Miguel De Gomiz from whose Deposition and those of others It is but too plain the arms belong to and were sent by Captain Forbes to the Prince It is AGREED that we immediately write to the Gentlemen of Anjengo sending them copies of the Depositions and to desire they will take proper notice of the same as we intend acquainting our superiors therewith till when to Detain the Arms and Boat and keep his servants under confinement till further Orders from the Presidency. Minguel de Gomez producing Captain Forbes's Orders to him in regard to the Disposal of the arms signed by one Ignatio by order of Captain Forbes, Translate of it is ORDERED to be entered hereafter from whence it likewise evidently appears he had some Business to Transact with the Prince.

Captain Forbes Detected in sending arms to the Prince.

Severally Examined concerning it.

THE Chief acquainting the Board that M^r. Bouchier in his answer is still determined not to give any Orders in regard to the Oxford and as she is still lying at Gallee at very high Demorage and we having standing Orders to fill up any ship which may come hither from the other side. It is AGREED as Mr. Bouchier has already acquainted the Commander with the cessation of arms and there being no Extraordinary risque in the ships coming hither to write a recommendatory Letter to Captain Steevens accordingly especially as the Gentlemen at Anjengo have not sufficient Tonnage for more than one ship by the Calculate sent us and the Oxford daily expected from the Presidency to take it in.

A Recommendatory Letter to be wrote Capt. Stevens of ship Oxford for proceeding hither and why.

DECLARATIONS GIVEN concerning some Fire arms sent from Anjengo by Captain Boderick Forbes to our Prince.

1748-49-10

— NOVEMBER 1748 —

INFORMATION given by Minguel de Gomez.

THIS informant says he is a servant to Captain Forbes who delivered him on his leaving Anjengo ten arms bought by him of ten Deserters from Cochin with orders that upon his arrival at Calicut in case any of the Princes people were there to Deliver the said arms to them, but that not being acquainted with any one there and not finding those people he brought the said arms to Tellicherry and on his arrival acquainted the Custom Master with the Purport of his Errand who there-upon immediately Dispatched a Nair to inform his Highness of it who afterwards sent three others here to receive the Arms, but upon his Informant acquainting them he should go to Cannanore and that he should deliver the arms to them at Carlisle (as he imagined they would be stopt here) the said Nairs went accordingly thither and received seven of him the rest having been since secured by the Chief. He further adds that a Nair came also with him from Captain Forbes and brought a Letter for the Prince which he carried to him and being asked what he was to bring back says that he had Orders from Captain Forbes to receive twenty five candies of sandall wood from the Prince and further this Inform^t. saith not.

CONDAPA Head of the Nairs now at the Camp being called says, that a Calliquilone came to him who said that Captain Mostyns Orders were for him (this Informant) to give him a good Nair to carry another who was in company with him and come from Anjengo to the Prince and to take care to bring the said Nair back along with him all which this Informant punctually complied with by sending Balligen Chatoo and further saith not.

BALLIGIEN CHATOO being called says that he went by order of Condapar with a Nair who came from Anjengo to conduct him to the Prince which he accordingly did and who carried an arm with him and met the Prince at a small Pallace by Cherikuna and that the said Nair delivered the Arms to the Prince with a Letter from Captain Forbes at the same time acquainting his Highness that there were nine others for him at Tellicherry and upon his Highness asking the Nair why they were not brought he answered that he believed there was an Imped^t. put on them that the Prince then called for nine Nairs whom he Dispatched for them but presently afterwards called them back and sent only three writing an Ola by them but to whom this Informant knows not. That upon the Prince's reading the Ola from Captain Forbes to him said that there were ten Boxes and Bayonets come with them and asked the Bearer where they were, upon which he said that being engaged in the Passage up and a person killed in it he imagined they must be either in the Balloon or in Tellicherry but that he knew nothing of them. This Informant further says that whenever the Nair who came from Anjengo was in Discourse with the Prince or his Rajadores that he constantly bid this Informant stand at a further Distance and further saith not.

CHARLES CORDEE being called and asked whether any person ever came to him by Order of Captain Moyston to send a Calliquilone to the Camp for getting a Nair to accompany him who came from Anjengo to the Prince says that Andrew Rodriguez came and acquainted him that he was sent by Captain Moyston to desire this Deponent to send a Calliquilone to the camp to advise Condapa to send a Nair with him who came from Anjengo to conduct him to the Prince which he accordingly complied with and further saith not.

ANDREW RODRIGUEZ being called says that Captain Moyston having ordered this Informant to go and advise the Corporal of the Choukee to send a Calliquilone to the Camp to get a Nair that instead of going himself he told Calandra to go but does not know whether he did or not and further says not.

CALANDRA being called denies every thing mentioned by Antonio Rodriguez and further says not.

CAPTAIN THO^s. MOYSTON being present absolutely denies his ever giving any Orders to send a Nair to conduct him who came from Anjengo to the Prince and offered to take his oath to the Truth of it if required.

By a Letter received Overland from the Honble Co. dated the 10th. of May we are advised of a Cessation of Arms between England, France and Holland pursuant to the Preliminaries signed at Aix La Chapelle the 19th. of April OS by which it is AGREED that all Hostilities both by Land and Sea should Cease within six Months after signing over all parts of the World and at particular set Times in Europe.

IMPORTED ships Stratham and Oxford from Bombay by the latter we received a letter from the Honble President and Council dated the 23^d. ultimo advising they had laden on the two ships ten chests of Treasure which with the stores and stationary Ware for this place and Anjengo, amounted to one hundred and five thousand nine hundred fifty six two quarters and forty five reas as ₹ Inv^c. and Bill of lading enclosed. That they have shipt on the Oxford seventy five Tons two hundred twenty eight Decimals (Tons 75.228) as ₹ Calculate enclosed w^{ch}. they at first intended should have been compleated at Anjengo but as they expect the Oxford from Fort St. David has taken in all or the greatest part of the Goods lying there (which we must certainly have been advised of) they leave it to us to send him to that port or not, directing us to ship on board her such a proportion as with what remains at Anjengo will compleat her Tonnage allowing for surplus. But should the Anjengo Warehouses have been near cleared we judge the Orford cannot be dispatched from thence by the 18th. of December when her Demorage Commences in such case to load her entirely and dispatch him to Great Britain giving him as much surplus as he will engage to carry half freight. THE Prince of Cotacuna arrived this Evening but being fatigued sent an Excuse to the Chief for his passing to the Pagoda promising to meet him in the morning.

THIS Morning the Prince of Cotacuna came to the Fort and brought with him Cherriendi Curkoloe declaring to the Chief that if what alledged against him by our Calliquilone Moor proved true upon Examination he would treat him with

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the utmost Rigour as also all others of his subjects that attempted to make a Breach in the Friendship between the Honble Company and his Pallace. The prisoner being then called for and as positively denying the Fact he was accused as the other was in making good his assertion the Prince ordered that he should take a Ring out of boiling Ghee tomorrow in his Presence (agreeable to the Custom of the Country on all such occasions) and that if he was burnt nothing should save his Life, directing the proper Officers to keep him close confined for that purpose, and then took his Leave promising to meet the Chief again to morrow morning.

and Cherrriandi Curkeloe ordered to take a Ring out of Boiling Ghee to prove his innocence a complaint having been made of his striking one of the CS. People.

CHEERRIANDI Curkeloe having this forenoon took a ring out of boiling Ghee and his hand being bound up and sealed in the usual manner the Prince came to the Fort and delivered him to the Chief to be confined Directing his Rajadores to break the seal the third Day and if Blisters appeared immediately to cut him off but the Chief after much Entreaty got the sentence revoked for a severe Whipping. And then had a long conference with his Highness in respect to the late perfidious Behaviour of his Brother the present Acting Regent so frequently set forth in the Diary more especially his illegal and unwarrantable proceedings of attaching Houses Oarts &c^a. belonging to the Companys Merchants who live under our Fort Walls, Oppressing the Achamars of Rhandoterra Destroying and plundering that part of the Country which is mortgaged to the Company for payment of a certain sum lent them thereon with the consent of Prince Cunhi Homo, suffering the Custom Masters at this Place to lay additional Duties on Pepper Rice &c^a. with many others of the like nature never before Experienced. All these complaints he solemnly Declared to be entirely unacquainted with and therefore begged of the Chief to rest assured he would make Enquiry and take Due notice of them upon his arrival at Cherriica and bring his Brother hither between the 20th. and 25th. Instant to settle every Thing in an amicable manner as he was convinced whilst such Differences subsisted there cannot be a good Understanding or Friendly correspondence on Either side. But as what alledged against the Custom Master required a speedy Remedy and he residing here the Chief desired his Highness to take suitable Notice of that Complaint and put a stop to such base Proceedings w^{ch}. he did immediately by a Publick Reprimand and giving Positive orders to attempt nothing of that kind in future as he would answer the contrary at his Peril. The Chief then acquainted his Highness of a Tivey Prisoner being confined in our choultry on suspicion of being Guilty of Felony and Murder desiring that as he was his subject the affair might be enquired into by his Rajadores to whom he gave the necessary Directions and then took his Leave of the Chief desiring him very pressing to continue the same method of communicating all Grievances in that amicable manner he has lately Done when immediately Redress should be given, and which he looked upon as a Certain prelude to the future Welfare and Happiness of his Country.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Alexander Douglas at Callicut dated the 9th. Instant advising that having sent us by a Munchua five hundred Sheathing Plank being part of that provided for the service of Fort St. David's Presidency. That our Honble Masters ship Royal Duke anchored there the same Day with the Date of his Letter being Dispatched to take in the Mast wanted for one of his Majesty's ships and in the Evening appeared in sight four sail which he takes to be the Fleet under the command of Captain Paulet.

Instant wherein they advise that they now send for the use of ship Oxford four Europeans and Eighteen Topasses whom we are to forward to the Chief and Factors at Anjengo with all possible Expedition transmitting them at the same time the original contract entered into by the Europeans as also the General abstract which came enclosed specifying their names the Wages they have been advanced and are to receive with Provisions &c^a. necessaries put on board for their use amounting to Rupees nine hundred fifty six two quarters and sixty three reas (Rs. 956. 2. 63) But that in case the Oxford for want of Goods sufficient at Anjengo to fill her up Should have proceeded hither we are then to Deliver the people to the Commander on his paying us the sum abovementioned with this Difference only that if he should not want the Copper potts we are to keep them deducting their amount accordingly observing by accounts from this Factory that the Military when sent to Duty on Durmapatam are always allowed Diet money notwithstanding Provisions of all sorts are cheaper there than at Tellicherry they Direct that that Expence cease; but to remedy any Inconvenience such people's Families may sustain thereby they permit one of our Lieutenants with his Company to be constantly stationed there and which may be of great use in the cultivation of that Island. They enclosed us an Indent for the use of their Marine which we are ordered to comply with as soon as possible and forward thither the several articles by such good conveyances as may offer as also to send home such Bales of Cloth as we may receive from Anjengo. The musters of Ambergrease offered by Ally Rajah in part of his (Debt which was sent them sometime since) having been Examined by proper judges a small Quantity they believe would fall either at Bombay or Surat for about Two Rupees the Tola Weight if therefore he chuses it he may send what quantity he has on any ship bound thither with a Person to Dispose of it at publick outcry and if he does not like the Price he may order it to be bought in Enclosed came a Packet for the Chief and Factors at Anjengo which we are to forward with all convenient Expedition.

They likewise ordered the Tivey accused of being Guilty of willfull Murder to put his fingers in boiling Lead and take out a small quantity three several times which being done they secured his hand with a Cloth and sealed it up as usual delivering him over to the Chief who ordered him to be confined till the Day came for opening it again.

THE Chief wrote an Ola to the Prince acquainting his Highness that his Rajadores having examined the hand of Joque-Charradin and found him Guilty he had therefore punished him in the manner they desired and delivered him up to be turned out of our Districts and hoped he would also give orders not to permit such a Villain to remain in his country. That he expected to see his Highness here agreeable to his promise to consider and resolve on such measures as were most for the Benefit of himself his country and the Honble Companys affairs.

I came up with Angria yesterday afternoon several of my shott reached him & One we saw go through his sail, he run in shore and I continued contrary to his Expectation to fall close in with him again at Nine o'clock at night had the wind held a quarter of an Hour I really believe should have taken three of his Grabs but it falling calm at that Instant the Gallivats towed him of before I could bring my Grape to bear and I lay muzzled between the Land and Sea wind. I am driving the Dog to the northward as fast as I can, he is now about four miles to the N. west of me and we are two or three leagues past Mount Dhilly, I beg my Compliments to the Gentlemen of Tellicherry and am.

That he has for the present given Orders not to suffer any Oxen to bring Goods down as formerly and the King of Bednure on his part has prohibited any Rice being Exported to the Prince out of his country. As therefore his Ancestors carried on a friendly correspondence with the Honble Company himself at present an infant and obliged by necessity to enter into these Measures he requests the Chief to look on them in a favourable Light and to assist in finishing this Business and in case the Prince should be backward he hopes should there be any Rupture not to afford his Highness any assistance. For the rest he referred himself to the Bearer of the letter.

O.S. he returns his particular Thanks for the advices in respect to Angrias Fleet of which he says he shall take care to give due notice to any ships w^{ch}. may appear off that port to put them on the Guard and afford such assist^{ce}. to any of ours as may be required of him.

THURSDAY 22^d. WROTE to the young Prince advising him of Palliarems application to the Chief in respect of the money he stands security for to the King of Bednure which Business he was Desired to finish in as amicable a manner as possible as otherwise himself and country may probably be brought into Trouble. The Chief acquainted him that he should not return any answer to Palliarems Letter till he had a meeting with His Highness and hoped it would be the 25th. Instant as promised in order to consider of this as also other material affairs.

Ola from Ally Rajah. ALLY RAJAH writes the Chief that he observes what he wrote him in respect to the Ambergrease which he hoped would be disposed of here that he might be no sufferer referring himself to the Writer now sent for further Particulars.

Anjengo Letters from. RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo dated the 17th. Instant wherein they advise us that the Oxford did not reach that place till the 14th. at night and that in their next they should inform us whether the Stores received by her turn out right, agreeable to Invoice. They acknowledge Receipt of our Letter under the 12th. Instant with the Box and Packet for the Honble Court of Directors as also from the Presidency. The two former they promise to Deliver to Captain Joddrell taking his receipt as usual. They advise us of Mr. Farrin's being arrived and that they shall pay due obedience to the several Paragraphs enclosed them of the Honble President & Councils Commands Relating to the Dispatch of ship Oxford.

Angria seen off Beypore. M^r. DOUGLAS in a private Letter to the Chief advises him of Angria's Fleet being seen off Beypore last night standing to the southward.

Boats stationed to the northward. THE Chief immediately wrote Letters of advice to the Commander of any ship bound to this Place or down the Mallabar coast which were given to three Toney's stationed between Mount Dilly and Maddacarra who were ordered to go daily into the latter Place and make a report to the officer in command.

FRIDAY 23rd. Letter from Fort St. David. A Pattamar arrived from Fort St. David and brought us a Letter from the Honble President and Council dated the 6th. Instant in which they Express a concern for the Death of Mr. Rawdon. That as Mr. Rawdon in a private Letter advised of our having in Warehouse the 22^d. of August last five thousand two hundred and Eighty candies of Pepper (Ca^s. 5280) they have come to a Resolve to send hither the Colchester to take in a Loading thereof and that they should Dispatch her to us in a few Days. They desire us to advise them the Quantity of Pepper we shall have remaining when she is filled.

The three Receipts given by Cap^t. Paulet amounting to Rupees six Thousand nine hundred fifty five Rupees and Eighty reas (R^s. 6955. —. 80) for w^t. supplied his Majestys ships were Duely forwarded and desired they would recover it of the Admiral as we should Debt their Presidency for the same. We advised them of the Delawars arriving here the 19th. Ult^o. and her sailing hence the 1st. Instant for Canton, that we put on board her the three hundred Candies of Sandall wood and consigned the same to her Supra Cargoes to whom we enclosed all necessary Papers. That the 3^d. Instant arrived here ships Stretham and Oxford the latter of which we Dispatched to Anjengo the next Day to fill up for Europe and former returned to Bombay with such part of their several Indents as she could take in. They returned to Mount Dilly the 27th. and being there joined by a Great number of Gallivats proceeded again to the southward where they are now cruising in hopes I suppose of [meeting] with the Bengall shipping but as we may expect them to return shortly I have stationed Boats up and Down the coast with Letters of Intelligence keeping a strong Detachment of this

Two Rajadores from the Prince waited on the Chief this Morning with an Ola (as Extracted hereafter who was acquainted with what Ensign Wardman had wrote in respect to Camall Mopla's holding a Conference with one of Angria's Subedars under Mount Dilly quite inconsistent with the Friendship that does or at least ought to subsist between the House of Colastria and the Hofible Company and as the same had been practised by him last season as well as this the Chief therefore Desired that an immediate and suitable punishment might be inflicted on him if not they might Depend we should look on such Proceedings, not only done by the Princes orders or consent but as the voluntary acts of an open and Declared Enemy and take suitable Measures accordingly. However the Chief finding they had nothing else to say in vindication of such an unwarrantable Proceeding than that the Prince was ignorant of it and being willing to avoid an open rupture if possible wrote therefore an answer to his Highness's Ola requesting him once again to come hither as he had this and many other Points to settle in his Presence before a good Understanding could possibly subsist or any Dependance put in the frequent promises of Friendship made by him.

THE new crop of Pepper being now gathering It is proposed that the Chief write to Monsieur Louet the Directore of Mahie and endeavour to settle a Price for this article as formerly practised before advancing any money which is agreed to especially as we cannot were we inclinable to contract advance now more than fifty thousand Rupees so as to leave sufficient in the Treasury to Defray the necessary Expences of the Garrison, which might probably raise the Price of this article as it would induce the Merchants to think we were greatly in want whereas by our staying sometime longer and acting jointly with the French in respect to settling a price for this commodity will in all probability have a quite contrary Effect and enable us to make an advantageous contract for the Honble Company hereafter which is agreed to.

The Price of the [ensuing] crop of pepper to be previously settled between the French and us. Reasons why.

It being the Honble Companys Express Orders to adjust annually the several Merchants accompts the 31st. December, It is AGREED that they be summoned accordingly and the accountant directed to prepare their respective accounts against next Meeting.

THE Muchadum of the Coolies having been very serviceable on all occasions and in every Respect Deserving of encouragement. It is AGREED that his pay be in future twenty Rupees (Rs. 20) 3^d Month which is only an Encrease of five Rupees, and it is hoped therefore the same will be approved of.

THE Achamars come to the Fort, and acquaints the Chief that by the Express measures Daily taken by the Prince, that part of the country in which they reside is in a manner totally Destroyed, Desiring him to think of some speedy remedy to relieve them from such acts of Tyranny and oppression, otherwise it would be impossible to Discharge the Interest on the sum lent them by the Honble Company to Cultivate their Estates formerly plundered by Ockoos Gang. The Chief told them he had at a late meeting with the Prince of Cotacuna, represented the Grievances formerly complained of and was holding him that they had in a manner flung off all obedience to him as their sovereign, on which account he was obliged to treat them with rigour but when once they again behaved as faithfull and loyall subjects they should Experience a different sort of treatment, and as this was the Case no Determinate answer could be given till they appeared in person before the Prince and as he with his Brother (the present Regent) is expected here in a few Days, they were then Directed to attend and assured all acts of friendship should be Done them that were consistent with reason and Justice.

Our last consultation fully sets forth the reasons for our delaying to Contract this long which it's hoped will be approved of, but as the Merchants of Burgorah and Cannanore are now making in a way for this article, it may probably disappoint us in respect to the quantity we sometime since imagined to get and oblige us to give a greater price; but notwithstanding these little Impediments we are still in hopes of getting the ensuing season between three and four Thousand Candies of pepper at or under Sixty Rupees the Candy; to prevent therefore any being carried away to Callicut as we hear small quantities of the old Crop are shipping off both from Cannanore and Burgorah, which will if not prevented affect the price of what is now Gathering, It is AGREED that we kept Boats properly stationed off the former Port and that Monseieur Louet be desired to do the same off the Latter which we doubt not will have the Desired Effect and enable us to make an advantageous contract for the Honble Company.

ABOUT ten o'clock this Morning the Prince of Cotacuna and Regent Cunhiram came to the Fort and had a Conference with the Chief till near four o'clock this afternoon in respect to the injurious treatment lately experienced as frequently taken notice of in the preceding Diary but no essential points being settled and it growing late the two Princes took their Leave promising to return Early in the Morning.

THE four Nombiers paid the Chief a visit in the Evening, and related several Grievances they laboured under for sometime past, by the arbitrary Proceedings in the Princes Government which had almost reduced them to a state of Slavery and who even now was attempting to subvert the antient constitution of that Province wherein they live by a Design he had of settling Boyanore in Erravadanaddu intending thereby to make them subservient to him which they could not submit to and Desired the Honble Companys Protection and Friendship might be continued to them in their present Distress as they had formerly experienced.

THE Chief finding by this and other Discourses he had with them that their Intentions were to act offensively against Boyanores should he attempt passing the River of Peringature and enter the Province of Errevaddanaddu could they but Depend on no succours being afforded from hence to the Prince, and as they have put that part of the country under the Second King of Cotiotes Protection who is firm in the Honble Company's Interest, as taken notice of in this Diary under the 15th. of November last by which Union the Princes destructive Schemes may be infallibly frustrated, without our appearing to be openly concerned which must otherwise happen to prevent an Innovation on the Liberty of Trade we have in that part of the Country by the Instigation of the French to whose Interest Boyanore seems much more attached than to that of the Honble Company's, the Chief therefore acquainted them that he should have a meeting with both the Princes of Colastria to morrow and would then make a proper representation of the Grievances complained of and act as a friendly Mediator being very Desirous to see the country preserved free from Embroils and in a perfect state of Tranquility especially that part where our Friends and Allies are settled in which light he looked upon all the parties concerned, therefore should he be not so fortunate as to succeed in his friendly Endeavours to accommodate matters and any acts of Hostilities were commenced on either side we should remain neuter unless an Infringement was made on the Grants and Priviledges we had obtained for carrying on our Trade with which they seemed thoroughly satisfied and took their Leave.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Directore of Mahie in answer to what wrote him by the Chief yesterday wherein he says that he has given strict Orders to his Round Boats to take all possible care to prevent pepper being exported at Burgorah and gives it as his Opinion that if a strict hand was carried towards our respective Merchants it would have a good Effect and in some measure lower the Price of Pepper.

THE small ship which came in Company with the Portuguese Frigatta and anchored in Mahie Road sailed thence to the southward.

By several Northern Boats that have imported we learn Angria's Fleet passed Mangalore the 5th. Instant standing on to the northward.

THE Chief and two Princes had another meeting this Day till the close of the Evening which preventing a conclusion of Business they appointed to meet early in the morning.

THE coference bewteen the two Princes and Chief being renewed this Day and the former made thoroughly sensible of the injurious treatment received of late as taken notice of very frequently in the preceding parts of this Diary they strenuously requested the whole might be buried in Oblivion giving their firm Assurances that all necessary care should be taken to avoid occasion of complaint hereafter. But that we might be on some certainty in respect thereto, act upon a sure footing in future and have some publick satisfaction of such Persons as had occasioned this Differences especially Camall Moplah (one of the Princes Ministers or Rajadores) who had met Angria's Subedar under Mount Dilly those who insulted and abused our people going overland to Maddacarra and the custom masters for attempting to lay additional duties on pepper and rice, the following articles were proposed by the Chief to be mutually signed between them which being agreed to by both Princes they were Translated into the Mallabar Language and executed accordingly.

TRANSLATE of an Agreement between the Prince of Cherrica and Thomas Byfeld Esq^r. Chief viz.

ARTICLE the 1st. His Highness promises to take from Cammall Mopla the charge of Madday and confine him close prisoner at Cherrica for the space of twenty Days; after which his Highness may permit him to return to Madday or

wherever else he may think proper but that from the 1st. November 1749 to the 1st. March following the said Cammall Mopla is to remain to the Southward of Madday River. Terms of agreement.

ARTICLE the 2^d. THAT should the Chief at any time send out the Honble Company's soldiers to Chastize Angria his Highness also promises to join his Forces.

ARTICLE the 3^d. His Highness promises to banish Iogee Charadin his country as does also the Chief on his part not to permit him to remain in any of the Honble Company's Districts.

ARTICLE the 4th. His Highness also agrees to expell his Country the Eleven Persons who associated with the preceding Iogee Charadin as likewise Pulamba Conna the Chief on his part promising not to entertain them in any of the Honble Company's Districts.

ARTICLE the 5th. His Highness promises that in future he will not oppress any of the Honble Company's Merchants or take from Thomas more without first obtaining the Chief's consent.

ARTICLE the 6th. His Highness promises to turn out the present Custom-Master the 1st. February next and in his room to put the late one Changerah Putterah to hold the same for 6 years and in case of his Death before the said time is expired to continue the same to his Heirs.

ARTICLE the 7th. His Highness agrees that at the time of gathering the Rents of Rhandoterra he will send his Rajadores to Tellicherry and there settle with the Chief and Achamars in what manner the said Rents are to be Gathered so as to pay off annually the Interest due to the Honble Company and part of the Principal of their Bond together with five thousand Fanams to the Prince, after that is settled the Honble Company are to send their People and Gather the said Rents. That should the Achamars commit any Misdemeanour against the Prince his Highness is to acquaint the Chief thereof but if they (the Achamars) will not accept of his mediation that then in such case his Highness is to join his Forces with those of the Honble Company for Chastizing them. His Highness on his part promises that he nor his people shall in future ever Destroy that part of the country or in any shape molest them but that if they should at any time owe him money he is permitted to arrest their Persons but not, to make use of any other Method for the recovery thereof.

SIGNED by the Regent in the presence of the Prince of Cherrica this 10th. Day of January 1748 and a Duplicate by the Chief.

THE complaint made by Palliarems against the Prince was likewise enquired into before the Bearer of his Letter and it too evidently appearing a private Agreement was made by Prince Cunhi Homo and his Rajadores to pay two hundred and two Thousand Pagodas (Pagodas 202000) upon the King of Bednure's evacuating that part of the country he had obtained by conquest in the late Wars and that Palliarems had a written power to act in this affair as he thought proper. The Chief recommended a punctual and faithfull performance of the same which the Regent at first seemed to evade by Declaring no such Agreement did ever Exist tho at last he confessed a promise was made by him last year to one Bowana Palliarems first Minister of fifty Thousand Pagodas (including fifteen Thousand already paid) which was the most he could comply with and even not pay that sum in a less space of time than six years desiring the Chief to use his friendly endeavours to finish this Business for him which he promised should be attended to but that his Highness must not expect him to act in any other manner than as a Friend to both parties.

THE Chief in discussing about the Nombiers complaint soon found it was a Disagreeable subject and therefore rather than give Disgust or occasion any jealousy at present only recommended to their Highness to preserve the country if possible from War and confusion which he apprehended would be the case if they

CUNY NAIR by Report having been frequently at Cherrica of late soliciting for a Title the Chief acquainted both Princes with her late insolent Behaviour in seizing one of our Topass soldiers who was shooting adjacent to his District taking two Arms away and sending him prisoner to Mahie desiring no countenance might be shown him till he had made a proper submission. As to the Title requested they said it was hereditary, therefore could not be denied him and which was to be conferred by the King of Colastria in Billiapatam Fort, but that the Chief might be assured no further acts of Favour should be shown him or any one else who was not a sincere and true Friend to the Honble Company. After which they each made a present to the Chief of a Gold Manilla and having the usual one of sixty Fanams returned took their leave and when back to Cherrica immediately Just as the two Princes had taken their leave this Evening the Achamars of Rhondoterra arrived and came directly to the Fort when they were acquainted by the Chief of the Resolutions taken concerning them with which they did not seem very well pleased as the Prince they said by the Laws that part of the country is subject to and Governed by cannot arrest any person whatever within their jurisdiction, however the Chief told them the Fault lay at their own Door by not attending on him when the Prince and his Brother were here agreeable to Order and that the steps now taken would suppress the oppressions they have felt of late therefore this Trifle might be left unsettled till he had an Opportunity of mentioning it hereafter to the Prince which he would do the first proper occasion acquainting them a punctual compliance must be shown to the Agreement now made in their Behalf and all due obedience and Respect paid to their sovereign which they faithfully promised to observe and took their Leave.

By a small Balloon bound to Anjengo the Chief advised Mr. Bourchier that he had received certain information Angria's Fleet passed to the northw^d. of Mangalore the 5th. Instant. He also wrote the Commadore of Cochin the same desiring him to return the Letters lodged there for the comm^r. of any ships bound to this place or up the coast and two others to give information thereof if any ships were met by the Boat in her Passage.

DISPATCHED Palliarum Messengers with an answer to his Ola complaining of not being able to recover of the Prince the money for which he is Security to the King of Bednure in which the Chief acquainted him that in Order to finish that Business in the best manner possible he had sent to the two Princes with whom he had conferred who both confessed it was impossible for them to pay so large a Demand but that not to lose his friendship they were willing to comply with the promise made last year to Bowana Achee Aunen which was the utmost they could do without oppressing the poor and Destroying the Country which he desired him to take into consideration. His prohibiting any oxen bringing Goods down into the Country and the King of Bednure laying an Impediment on Rice being exported are acts against the Honble Company and not the Prince contrary to the Privileges granted by the said King in order therefore that no Differences Might happen the Chief desired that he with the King of Bednure would drop their Intentions his being on this occasion only to see a good Understanding settled between him and the Prince of Cherrica as also all others of the Company's Friends. For other particulars the Chief referred himself to the Bearer of the Letter.

Letter from Captain Joddrell of Ship Oxford. By a Toney from the southward the Chief received a Letter from Captain Phillip Joddrell Commander of ship Oxford dated the 8th. Instant wherein he writes that on the 26th. ultimo having met with a fresh Gale of wind off Cape Comarine his Pumps Choah (the Rats having eat a hole in the Bottom of the Well) and his ship having three feet water in her hold occasioned his bearing up again for Anjengo. That he has examined his Main and most part of his Forehold and finds several Bags of salt Pepper to be entirely washed away and others much wetted which he imagines to be all the Damage he has received, and hopes (his ship having been surveyed and almost corked) to get away again by the 15th. of the Month.

Ola wrote the Prince for settling the Tax to be levied on Rhandomterra. Ola to the Achamars on the occasion. THIS being the proper time of the year to settle the Tax annually levied on the Inhabitants of Rhandomterra towards paying off part of the Principal and Interest lent the Achamars the Chief wrote the Prince as agreed on between them the 10th. Instant that he had appointed Tuesday next for that purpose desiring him to send his Rajadores accordingly. He likewise Dispatched an Ola to the Achamars Directing them to attend on the Day appointed.

THE ship in Mahie Road under Portuguese Colours weighed this day and stood to the southward.

Second King of Cotiote wrote to not to [] Pulambetty Conna. THE Chief being informed Pulambetty Conna &c^a. banished by the Prince for their insolent behaviour to our people going overland, have taken sanctuary in the King of Cotiotes country wrote an Ola to the second King acquainting him with the reasons of their being banished, desiring his Highness would not permit of their being entered in his service, as it might give an opportunity for the Enemies of the Honble Company and those of his Highness to make such conclusions on the occasion as are not agreeable to the Friendship subsisting between us.

Letter from Monsieur Lomet. RECEIVED a Letter from the Directore of Mahie wherein he says that he is not ignorant of a Grabs being arrived at Burgorah consigned to Boyanore for a Cargoe of Pepper, who won't ship off a Grain without his consent, and that the small quantity she is to take in will no ways raise the Price of which he shall be particularly carefull.

Advices for Fort St. David from Bombay. LATE at night an Express Boat arrived from Bombay with Letters for Fort St. David which are ordered to be Dispatched early in the morning by two Putterahs and to Draw up a letter agreeable to the Orders of our superiors by this conveyance.

SUNDAY 22ND. Advices sent to Fort St. David. DISPATCHED to Fort St. David and sent the Putterahs to Callicut on the Express boat in order to forward them on their journey. The General Letter to the Honble President and Council advises them of the Strethams being to be Dispatched from Bombay Directly and that after ships Oxford and Colchester are loaded we shall have no further Demands on us for Pepper, than only three hundred candies for ship Durrington but not having received any calculate of Tonnage either of ship Oxford or Colchester we cannot pretend to say what we may have remaining

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after having fully completed the loadings of those ships, so left it to their Discretion to send round such others as they might Deem necessary and acquainted them that we have this Day in Warehouse five thousand three hundred twenty one Mds. lb

candies fourteen Maunds nineteen pounds (Ca^s. 5321. 14. 19).

CAPTAIN RODERICK FORBES came on shore this Morning and acquainted the Chief that he left ship Oxford the 20th. Instant in the Evening, and by Captain Steevens Orders had been in quest of the Colchester, but as not meeting with that ship thô he went so low as Callicut induced him to send the Command he had taken from on board the Oxford from thence under the care of a Sober Serjeant and to come thither himself in order to proceed with those on board the Colchester.

Captain Forbes [arrives] here the Detachment belonging to Anjengo part, sent the other from Callicut. Ola from the Prince.

THE Prince in an ola writes the Chief that they had agreed at their last Interview to turn out the present Custom Master and put in his room Changarah Putterah for which purpose he lately called on the former to settle his account of last years Customs who says they are not yet finished, there being several outstanding Debts among the Merchants, and as the accounts ought to have been made up before another takes charge, his Highness therefore desires the Chief would call upon the Merchants and order them to settle their respective Account Customs. IN answer the Chief wrote his Highness that he immediately summoned the Merchants to finish their several accounts for last years Customs, and as his Rajadores are shortly to come hither the same should be adjusted before them to avoid any Differences, and assured his Highness that no assistance in his power should be wanting for this purpose and hoped therefore he would fully Execute what agreed upon at their last meeting.

Changarah Putterah appointed Custom Master.

SHIPS Oxford and Colchester appearing in sight to the southward this afternoon Captain Forbes was ordered off in a Munchua on board the former and Directed to take the Anjengo Detachment under his command and to make the best of his way. By him a Letter was wrote to Captain Wood on the occasion.

Ships Oxford and Colchester appear, Capt. Forbes Ordered . . . for the men of his Detachment.

CAP^t. FORBES set out Early this Morning.

RECEIVED an Ola from the Prince wherein he acknowledges that wrote him by the Chief in respect to sending his Rajadores hither the 23^d. Instant for settling the manner in which the Rents of Rhandoterra are to be gathered, but says that as that is an unlucky Day he ordered his Rajadores to set out the 24th.

We are to acquaint you that it is the Honble Companys Express orders that no Guns Fire arms or warlike stores of any kind whatever, shall be sold at any of their Factories or settlements on this side India in consequence of which we are to require a due Observance both by Yourself and Officers, as a Deviation may be attended with the worst of Consequences to their affairs in these parts.

Agreeable to Our Honble Masters standing orders we now require you to acquaint us if any Soldier or sailor have deserted on board your ship from any of their settlements since your arrival in India positively ordering you not to Countenance or receive on board any person or Persons belonging to this Garrison that may apply to you for a Passage unless the Chiefs liberty is first obtained.

THE Letter from Mr. Alexander Douglas at Callicut as mentioned in the preceding Consultation, enclosed us that Factory's adjustment to the 31st. July 1748 drawn out from the several accounts sent him from hence. He acknowledges

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receipt of the Indent for Cordage which will be coupled with so soon as Coir is procurable.

THAT from Captain Forbes only acknowledges receipt of our orders to him for proceeding to Anjengo which he says shall be duely complied with.

ANCHORED between this place and Mahie a Portuguese Frigatta called the Merciful commanded by Roberts Holmen, she has been to the southward and came last from Calicut. A Portuguese ship imports.

RECEIVED an Ola from the Prince wherein he assured the Chief that nothing on his part should be wanting duely to comply with what agreed upon between them at their last meeting. In respect to Gathering the Rents of Rhandoterra he now sent those Rajadores in order to consider the same before whom the accounts for the last years customs might be made up which he desires may be finished. For other particulars he refers himself to the said Rajadores. WEDNESDAY 25TH. Ola from the Prince.

RECEIVED also an Ola from the Achamars of Rhandoterra promising so soon as the Heads are assembled to come hither. They complain that his Highness has now three Elephants which are Destroying their Jack trees breaking the Olas and doing other considerable Damages. Ola from the Achamars.

THE Chief received a Letter from Ensign Target at Maddacarra advising that Angria's Fleet were in the offing which obliged our Round Boats to put into Cannanore last night and that this morning the Express Boat went into the River being pursued by some of his Gallivats which were then in sight. Advice of Angria having chased over Round Boats into Maddacarra. Resolution thereon.

As it may be reasonably imagined by the preceding Letter that the Enemy's Grabs are not at a Great Distance off and ships Oxford and Colchester now in the Road being but weakly manned. The Chief ordered on board each of them twenty soldiers and the like number of seepoys with proper officers.

SOME of Angria's people may possibly attempt landing under a Mount Dilly as they have Done before this season, the Chief therefore thought this a convenient opportunity to see if our Prince was inclinable to adhere to his promise in respect to securing them and ordered forty Nairs and Calliquilones to Cherrica desiring him to join such a number of his People as was judged necessary in order proceed thither and seize such of the Enemy as might come on shore. THURSDAY 26TH.

THE Portuguese Frigatta that laid at an anchor between this Road and that of Mahie weighed this morning and stood to the northward. Portuguese ship sails.

SHOULD Angria's Fleet proceed so low as this place or to the southward the ships now in our Road may in such case be attacked by him for whose security and those of others which may arrive hereafter and that there may be some certainty what service the Guns mounted upon the several Batteries will be of on such an occasion the Chief Directed the Gunner to fire two Guns from each of them fronting the sea desiring the commanders to take the Bearings and soundings accordingly which being done the following Report was made.

From the Flag Staff Bastion to y^e. N^o. Ward.

From the Burying Ground Battery Directly between the ships.

Their Behaviour in respect to the agreement made with the Prince in their favour.

Soon made sensible of their Folly.

SIX of the achamars and Prince Rajadore came to the Fort when the former declared to the Chief that they could by no means submit to the peoples being arrested in their District &c^a. as it was contrary to the ancient Establishment of the country therefore till that was settled they could not think of paying any annual Tax or Tribute to the Prince. The Chief had before told them that not attending when ordered at the late Interview between him and the two Princes prevented this affair being settled in a proper manner but that it should be done by the very first opportunity so that their behaving in this abrupt and indecent manner he thought could proceed from little else than perverse Obstinacy and as by the late Agreement with the Prince no acts of violence or oppression can be committed in Rhandoterra nor even the Inhabitants chastized by him without the Chiefs consent and approbation they were told in direct terms that if the Council given and the articles of Agreement made in their favour were not attended to no further Friendship must be expected from us and as the Prince had frequently promised to Discharge what lent at his request for the cultivation of their country formerly Destroyed by a Rebellious Gang that had assembled in the parts adjacent thereto he should now write his Highness about it and acquaint him that part of the Agreement made the 10th. Instant in relation to them became void. Upon which they Desired the Chief to give them four Days to assemble the rest of the achamars to Re-consider this affair and till they returned not to write to the Prince which being thought a reasonable Request was complied with.

— JANUARY 1748-49 —

RECEIVED an Ola from the second King of Cotiote wherein he acquaints the Chief that the 1st. King Died the 25th. Instant and that his Funeral is to be on the 5th. of next month.

Ola from the 2d. King of Cotiote advising of the 1st. King's Death.

ENSIGN TARGET at Maddacarra writes the Chief that the Report in respect to Angria's being in the offing was false the Vessels taken for his Fleet being only Padiers & Munchuas bound to Mangalore for Rice.

Report of Angria's being off proves false.

THE Chief ordered the Detachments on shore from on Board the Oxford and Colchester and recalled the Nairs & Calliquolone Moors from the northward under Mount Dily.

The People recalled from the no. ward.

THIS Evening Captain Wood acquainted the Chief that his ship would be in readiness to take in Pepper to morrow morning which the Warehousekeeper is ordered to send off.

WROTE to the Prince acquainting his Highness that the Achamars with whom the Chief had a conference before the Rajadores, were not content with that part of the Agreement relating to them, but as they desired to the 3^d. of next Month to Reconsider the affair with the rest of the achamars, their Request was complied with.

THE letters from Captains Steevens and Wood requesting to be advanced five thousand Rupees each for providing necessaries to their respective ships as entered in the preceding Diary under the 29th. Instant are laid before the Board and as the Terms of the charterparty terms say "That if the ships shall not be Dispatched on or before the 31st. It is AGREED therefore that he be advanced the five hundred Rupees Desired, and the Secretary is DIRECTED to write Mr. Douglas accordingly and order him to provide as many more masts as possible they being wanted for his Majestys Services also to hold in readiness the several articles indented for the service of the Presidency.

THE Captain of Cannanore in a private Letter to the Chief complains that a Toney which was coming from Manjesaram loaded with Sandall wood was stoppt by one of our Round Boats off Mount Dilly, and as the Toney and Cargoe belonged to him such an action greatly surprises him but hopes however the Chief will give immediate Orders for her Release, as also that the officer of Maddacarra pay the Charges which may arrive from his impertinent Detention of said Toney.

THURSDAY 2^d.

It Belongs to the Capt. of Cannanore Lre from him on the occasion.

THE Chief in answer to the above wrote to the Captain of Cannanore that its certain he had stationed Round Boats off Mount Dilly to prevent Villains carrying away Goods out of the country that were the Property of the Honble company, and that as his Toney of Sandall Wood had neither his Passport or so much as a Letter for him from Manjeswaram occasioned her being Detected and carried into Maddacarra from where the officer in Command sent one of the People hither to be Examined and that he has given him orders to release the Toney but that however his action on this occasion little Deserved the Epithet of Impertinent as others in the like circumstances would have done the same.

Answer to the above.

THE Chief wrote Ensign Wardman that he approved the Serjeant of the Round Boats Detaining the Toney of Sandall wood but as it belonged to the Captain of Cannanore and not the Produce of the Country where the Compy^s. Priviledges Extend ordered him to release her.

THIS Day the Achamars came to the Fort with the Princes Rajadores and acquainted the Chief that his Highness wanted to be free from paying the Annual Tax hitherto levied on such Trees as belonged to him, called Cuddimanin although they were willing not to Demand it upon those called Attipar in Coddamber Briticagata however that no Difference may arise, and to show their inclinations to keep the Country far from Embroils they were willing to allow the Prince one thousand Fanams more annually in consideration thereof observing that if the Tax or annual Tribute was not collected thereon other Proprietors that have the same Pretensions to such lands would refuse paying which might occasion many Disturbances to happen & greatly Decrease the annual sum to be collected as they are large Proprietors in Rhandoterra. To which the Princes Rajadores made many objections but being very frivolous ones the Chief told them he would write his Highness concerning them observing to them that they could not be insensible the Trees called Attipar were only those whose Proprietor was the absolute Ground Landlord and those of Cuddimanin such as were planted by Tenants and pay annually one or two Fanams which could not be sold without the consent of the Ground Landlord. That the Trees which the Prince claims in Cuddambur Briticagahe were the Property of a Braminie who was the Absolute Ground Landlord, and he before his Death selling all the Trees therein except five to Moors and reasoning to himself the Ground Title they could not be called Cuddamanin Trees so that his Objections to paying the Tax were without Reason for if he looked upon the Estate to be his own which it was not only by usurpation the Braminei having a Wife and a child alive surely it ought to be on the same footing and pay the same Tax as when in the Bramineis Possession. After which they considered in what manner the annual Tax for the ensuing Year should be levied and it appearing evidently that by the verge Land being exempt which belongs to the Head of the Country the poor people are overburthened it was proposed to collect 15 ¢ Cent on the Produce thereof to make a new valuation of the Trees, that they are then to pay twenty ¢ cent which is ten ¢ cent less than last year in order to raise the sum of Fanams twenty four thousand two hundred and twenty five (Fan^a. 24225) which will fully appear by the following statement viz.

The Inhabitants having suffered greatly within these few years by oppression it is judged should a heavier Tax be paid upon them they must be totally ruined and the country greatly suffer so that the above was agreed to but the achamars were told by the Chief they must think the ensuing year to raise the sum considerably and begin to pay off their Debt as they had so faithfully promised long since when the money was lent them which they assured him to be duly attended to, and acquainted him they were willing to acede to the articles made in their favour the 10th. ultimo which he promised to advise the Prince of and then Dismissed them.

IMPORTED our Honble Masters ship Durrington Captain Richard Crab the Drake Sloop, ship Mamoody and a Ketch from Bombay. By the former received a Packet from the Honble President and Council dated the 26th. Ultimo enclosing Duplicates of this last letter to us by Express Boat under the 17th. ultimo and advised they had consigned us on the Durrington and Drake ten chests of Treasure amounting to one hundred thousand Rupees and that as they had noticed to us formerly of our having contracted for a larger quantity of Rice than usual they therefore judged two thousand Bales of Champsal could be spared for the Durringtons voyage to Mocha and had ordered her Supra Cargoes etc. Call at Mangulore for taking in the same the Honble President having wrote a suitable Order to Antonio Pires our Contractors agent to deliver the same and on her arrival at this Port direct that the several articles we have provided for her to be Delivered to her Supra Cargoes John Sewell Esq^r. Captain Richard Crab and Mr. William Mackinsie as part of her Stock as is to be the Rice as prementioned, which ship proceed under their Orders That having received some Madeira Wine by ships Durrington and Stretham they now sent such part thereof as is our proportion charged at prime cost being the same rate the covenanted servants there have paid for it. There being likewise Some on board for Anjengo Factory they direct us to send it by the first proper conveyance writing the Gentlemen there concerning it as above. They order the Drake to be Detained till she be joined by one of our Grabs. But in case any private ship should be bound hither which we may judge to be of sufficient Force joined with her to Defend themselves against Angria then to Dispatch her without waiting for the Grab sending in her such Cordage or Timbers as may be in readiness. I received your Letter and am very sorry you have no better reasons to assign for Defending your conduct in respect to advancing money to your Merchants for Pepper than not advising us thereof through an imagination of my being hurried in Business, especially as were first particularly agreed and you promised by Letter not to open the Price for this article nor advance money without the consent of each other. It is my Maxim always to adhere to the time present whereas any favourable advantages offer for the Interest of my Employers as well in one branch of Business as another so the Dispatch of the shipping could not have hindered my taking proper notice of your Intention nor is your reason sufficient by saying you have not opened the Price at a time when you confess to have advanced money without letting me know your Intention and on which I take the Liberty to give you my sentim^{ts}.

The advancement you have made is as pernicious as if you had actually fixed a Price the Merchants being enabled thereby to purchase their Commodity at their own pleasure which they could not have done had we jointly told them such a Price should be given and no more. To which I answered I am contented and consent not to advance any money untill this end of the same Month.

In my last Letter I acquainted you that I had advanced money and likewise said I had not given this money untill the beginning of February O.S. and I did not pretend when I sent you this advice to justify my Proceedings but only to show you that I had been punctual to what I had promised.

What I wrote you concerning my not desiring to trouble you in the Expediting the Shipping you had at that time under Dispatch I did not intend therein to offend either in your capacity or otherwise, but as is usual in such Cases to let a Day or two slip.

I have sent and called all our merchants together to settle the Price of Pepper and I will advise you how I succeed therein and stay till you communicate to me what Method you think most proper to bring them to a reasonable contract.

You think yourself injured by my being silent in respect to your letter concerning the quantity of Pepper I expected to buy to which I answer in two Particulars.

FIRST There never were the like Declarations made by us on Either side.

SECONDLY From the Desire you have to know what quantity I have to purchase so in like manner you must Declare to me what quantity you have to purchase.

From what I wrote you in the beginning of this Letter you must conclude that I have not deviated from the points we first agreed on you having desired me not to advance any money till the end of January which I have not done, you likewise Desired one not to open the Price of Pepper till both were agreed which I have in the same manner adhered to.

I received your letter in answer to one wrote you the 18th. from which I observe that you are not fully satisfied of my good Intentions in the points you have answered me.

First In my Letter of the 3^d. January O.S. I desired to be informed if your Inclinations were the same as mine in respect to observing the Methods taken by our Predecessors for the good of both settlements. To which you answered in your letter to me of the 15th. of the same Month viz. I have no other Intention or Inclination but to do what is for the good of our respective Establishments.

The Practice of our Predecessors was not to open the Price nor make any advances on Either side for pepper without first agreeing between themselves which was hitherto punctually observed without any Deviation in respect to times much more a Day which you cannot be ignorant of and as you have not observed one of these two Principal articles the fundamental part of my present complaint arises therefrom.

I neither ask nor Desire to know what quantity of Pepper you purchase this year for its what I should never agree to myself; all I requested of you in my Letter of the 8th. of January was to communicate to me your opinion what quantity of Pepper you thought there might be this year in the Country and what Price was reasonable to give for it. This was my true Intention and if it was badly explained it was worse understood.

Upon the whole I desire you will favour me so much as to advise me when you advanced money to your Merchants what Price you ordered them to purchase at and if no limitation was given what they bought it for that I may come to some Resolution what is reasonable to allow ours.

That as to justly informing them of the Price Rice may turn out at $\frac{3}{4}$ Bale from Mangalore we could not do it untill our Contractor made up his account with us but by the nearest calculation allowing Freight Risque customs &c^a. we imagine it may be two Rupees and one quarter or something more so that we left it to them to furnish themselves as appeared most eligible. They likewise wrote us that the Honble Company in their General Letter dated the 10th. of May last wrote them as follows. "As Hostilities are ceased our ships must be dispatched Directly home to us after the 19th. of October next in the

That the French at Mahie are purchasing at so great a rate as Eighteen Fanams the inland Maund which has raised the Price of that Commodity considerably beyond their Expectations. Also the great Quantities which have been carried overland to Calicut &c^a. parts to the southward bought up by Shybars & other vessels for want of Mallabar Goods and on the whole add they cannot contract with us for less than 75 Rupees the candy at which Price they assured us they should not be Gainers one Fanam the Candy.

And we have been likewise credibly informed by our Linguist the same has been raised to Eighteen Fanams and an half which is three hundred and seventy Fanams or seventy four Rupees the candy so that on the whole it is considered what is reasonable to allow them for their trouble including Customs &c^a. Charges and to form a judgment what to offer for the new crop with some Exactness the following calculate is made.

allowing the Merchants so reasonable an advance as two Rupees the Candy for risking small parcels of money to the Inland shopkeepers it will then come out at Rupees seventy four however we judge it necessary at first to offer them no more than seventy two Rupees the candy in order to bring them to as low a price as possible and being called in they are acquainted with the same but notwithstanding all the arguments made use of to prevail with them to accede to this, they absolutely Declare they cannot contract at less than seventy four and an half without being considerable sufferers and that for no more than one thousand five hundred Candies at present and indeed as it appears by the above calculate it cannot be got for less and the Honble Company's orders being to purchase all we can at or under 70 Rupees and only three thousand candies should the Price be higher a large Tonnage being expected and it being experienced last year that Delays were attended with bad consequences by Pepper falling into other hands, and as we are informed the French have been supplied with Gold and Commissioned to purchase this article for the Maccao ships now upon the coast and at the same time certain they have already made an advance to their Merchants. It is judged from these circumstances to come to some Resolution at Present and the merchants being again reasoned with are at last brought to accept seventy four Rupees and a quarter which being but a small Difference in the above calculate. It is AGREED to contract with them at that price to prevent this article falling into the hands of our neighbours and that money be adv^d. as usual when they acquaint us of the quantity each will engage to Deliver and for which Desiring a few hours time might be Given them to consider the same with Combem Allipy and other Relatives who is concerned with them in the purchase of this article It is likewise agreed to.

The Stores from Bombay being in readiness at Callicut and the Goods brought on the Drake Ketch for the Durrington Mocha voyage being landed. It is AGREED that Captain Dick be dispatched to Callicut for taking them in and the Secretary to prepare a letter to Mr. Douglas accordingly and enjoin him to dispatch the same with all Expedition.

And as I plainly perceived a continuance of this Method would be giving them a greater Latitude to raise it still more. I was obliged to come to the Resolution of assembling our Merchants as I before advised you I should do in a Letter of the 14th. Instant O.S. with whom after many Conferences and a great Deal of Trouble I fixed the Price of Pepper with them for seventy four and a quarter Rupees the candy but as yet I have not advanced them any money though I shall do so shortly.

Before I inform you what I think of your answer I am to tell you, I was informed of the Price before I received your notice and everybody assured me their Delivering it at seventy four Rupees and a quarter Candy was for what you have fixed them to pay their old Debts off at taking the Cotiote Candy which is two Maunds less than the Tellicherry or Mahie Candy.

Now to give you my Opinion in answer to your Letter before told you our Merchants asked Eighty Rupees Candy for the Pepper outstanding to us. To which you gave me no answer nor as to the Price you thought we ought to give for our new Contracts this year which we may be obliged to purchase. To both which particulars I asked your opinion but as you returned no answer I now give you mine if you please to observe it which is, I think as to the Price we may give for what we are to purchase we cannot get it at less than Eighty Eight Rupees Candy and it may I think possibly rise to ninety or ninety two Rupees Candy and I now Desire your sentiments.

I doubt much whether your Merchants will take money for purchasing Pepper at Rupees seventy four and one quarter Candy.

That they now sent us twenty two thousand Rupees being all the new money they have nor can they at present procure any Gold at a reasonable date, but will not be unmindfull of sending a further supply in due time. In regard to the Pease that have been so long at this place Captain Pawlet will be desired to receive them on his Majestys acco^t. in case he touches here on his return to Fort St. David. They approve of the Chiefs sending Boats out to prevent any vessels falling into Tollajee Angria's hands when he was here this season down as far as Cochin and are greatly pleased with the agreeable situation we are now in with the Prince and Country Powers round us. They direct us to supply the Chief and Factors at Anjengo with such Warlike stores they may apply to us for as far as our own occasions will admit. That observing we had spared the Carpenter of ship Durrington a Mast designed for the Men of War if he had not paid for the same we must make a Demand on Captain Crab. The Cuddalore sloop built for the service of Fort St. David Presidency they Direct us to Dispatch thither at a proper season with as much Pepper as the Master can take consigning the same to the Governour and Council That observing the Poon Masts last received from hence are Charged at higher rates than usual they expect the Resident at Callicut will give a satisfactory reason. THE Chief received an Ola from the Prince of Cherrika Translate of which is as follows.

Ola from the Prince relating to the Dispute between him and the oden Quilote family.

Complains of unkind treatment, but still hopes for assistance.

Answer to the above.

I have been favoured with your Letters and observe what you write. In times past it was very unusual for my Uncle Badencalameur to lay his Grievances before the Chiefs of Tellicherry and for them to attend to his complaints the French being those he applied to; Our great Uncle of Cherrika in order that the Honble Company should assist us when occasions required whether against Foreign or Domestick Enemies gave Liberty for them to build a fort, to make Contracts in his Country and such other Priviledges as they required which hitherto have been kept inviolable and without the least infringement, but now you are endeavouring to put the Family of Badencalameur and mine upon the same footing, however I still hope considering the former Friendship between the House of Cherrika and the Honble Company that you will be induced not to put this Design in Execution. There have been many former Chiefs whose Esteem I experienced but your Friendship I greatly preferr therefore little expected you would have wrote me in the manner you did and should be told no assistance would be afforded me (of which even my Enemies seem to be assured) however upon weighing these things you can have no reason not to support me as in times past. To the foregoing Ola the Chief returned the following answer.

I have received your Royal Writing and in respect to the Friendship between the Honble Company and your Pallace there is no occasion for me to be put in mind as I am well acquainted with it and my Desire is to serve your Highness in every thing that is in my power.

The Difference between you and Badencalameur its necessary I should be well acquainted with before becoming a party of either side for should I act otherwise I shall incurr the censure of my superiors, Wherefore if your Highness is willing to send your Rajadores here to confront those of Badencalameur I shall take such measures to serve your Highness in the manner I informed you when last here and shall take care no affront shall be offered them but on their meeting I will show my Intentions are to aggrandise your Highness and consult your Interest.

THE Chief received an Ola from the four nombiers signifying their having formerly acquainted him with a state of their affairs and depend entirely on our friendly assistance should any offer to molest them. And that having received a

Letter from King Badencalamcur (between whom and the Prince of Cherrika there is a Difference) desire the Chiefs opinion in what manner to act between those two parties observing that the latter had been lately no good Friends to them.

THE Chief having Detected two people that wanted to sell Women and children in this place who had been stole from the Samorines Country he sent them Down to Mr. Douglas to make an enquiry therein and Deliver them back to the Government which having been accordingly done he received an Ola from Tallia-chenor the Samorines Minister at Tannore returning the Chief particular thanks for his care and desired he would do the like kind office should such another instance happen hereafter acquainting him he had paid the charges of the Toney and was ready to do all the good offices to the H^c.Company in his power.

People detected in exposing to sell women and children [as] slaves. They are sent back to their own country. The Chief thanked for the same.

ABOUT four O'clock this morning sailed ships Stretham and True Briton to Great Britain.

THE Chief answered the nombiers ola by letting them know he is acquainted there are Differences between the Pallace of Cherrika and that of Oden Quilote but being uncertain how the same arose and subsisted he could not therefore advise them what part to act at present.

THE Chief received an Ola from the Prince acquainting him with the offers he had made the Princes of Oden Quilote to prevent the Differences now between them and that at a meeting they had at Ambaddy it was actually agreed that whatever Lands they then enjoyed should be still held by them without molestation, they on their part promising not to Disturb the quiet of the Country, yet notwithstanding this agreement Badencalamcur with the Prince of Travancore came to Caddambore and there joined by the Family of Soravas began many hostilities burning the Houses, killing the poor Inhabitants and committing many other unwarrantable actions which they still continue and had obliged him several times to apply to us for succour against them. But he the Chief being very Desirous to be fully informed of the particulars the foregoing was a full account and hoped he would now afford such assistance as would enable him to humble them as other measures which were proposed to be taken for making up their Differences in a Friendly manner by bringing Rajadores on both sides to a meeting would only elate his Enemies and not produce the Effects he desired and therefore he repeats his request for assistance and for other particulars refers him to the Bearer Chiddamberry Putterah.

Ola from the Prince.

His proceedings with the Prince of Oden Quilote.

THE Chief returned for answer to the above Ola that he had duely observed the contents of his Highness's Royal Writing and had discoursed fully with Chaddamberry Putterah but untill he heard what the other party had to urge in their vindication he could not care to any Resolution but assured him if he was willing to accept him as a Mediator he would do all in his Power to settle matters in a proper manner as he had before promised.

THE Chief received a private Letter from Mr. Douglas dated the 4th. advising the Danes ship sailed at two clock in the afternoon for Penany where he is pretty well informed there is laying in readiness about four hundred candies of Pepper and that one Abraham Saffi a jew is gone to see said Pepper delivered to the Danes; that they have received in the whole at Callicut one hundred thirteen candies two Maunds (Ca^s. 113. 2. —) Diego de Silva the French Linguist there he informs the Chief has purchased a large Munchua for five thousand Fanams and sold the same for ten thousand Fanams to the Danes and that Diego is now repairing of her when she is to go to Tranquebar with a loading of Plank which he likewise hears the said Diego has agreed for. He adds he should be glad to hear what effect the Chiefs

Letter to Mahie against Diego Dsilva has had whose Writer assisted at the weighing of the Pepper and that he bought part of it before the ship arrived which he can prove by one Francisco D'Silva formerly an Inhabitant of Madras who had sold him thirty candies. He likewise paid the syrang and Lascars who assisted on board the ship during her stay there.

FROM the information given by Mr. Douglas with regard to Diego de Silva the French Linguist at Callicut having assisted the Danes ship in so open manner much to the Prejudice of both our Companies the Chief wrote the following Letter to Monsieur Louet Directore of Mahie on the occasion.

This Proceeding being equally prejudicial to both our Companies in respect to the sale of this article in Europe I take this opportunity to advise you being certain that you would not have permitted of it had you known it and must request that you will take proper notice of it by putting a stop to such Proceedings for you cannot but be sensible that the Danes or others on finding they may with Ease procure what Pepper they want they will yearly visit this coast the consequence of which will be fatal to both our Companies.

THE Chief wrote Mr. Douglas a private Letter informing him of Mr. Louets having sent two Gentlemen to enquire into the conduct of Diego D'Silva in respect to assisting the Danes ship and desired him not to be wanting to give them all the information possible.

Mr. Douglas advised of two french Gentlemen going to Calicut about their Linguists Conduct.

THE Chief wrote Monsieur Louet acknowledging receipt of his Letter and enclosed him one to Mr. Douglas who would inform the Gentlemen sent by him fully of the particulars set forth already in regard to Diego D'Silvas Proceedings.

The Chief answers Mons^r. Louets Letter.

SAILED the Cuddalore sloop for Calicut on whom Mr. Thomas Benton proceeded as Resident of that Factory.

WEDNESDAY 8th. Cuddalore sloop sails for Calicut.

PEDRO RODRIGUES our Head Linguist received an ola from one of Boyanore's Rajadores acquainting him that our Round Boats meeting a Toney in her passage from Mangalore to Cochin brought her too but soon after Dismissed her, and another bound to Penha (being empty) they also fired at and killed one of the people at the same time obliging them to run the said Toney ashore w^{ch} they took and sent to Tellicherry. That as they are not certain whether the Chief knows of these proceedings is the reason of their writing that he may be advised of the same to prevent the like in future as such actions may possibly create a Difference between the Honble Company and their master Boyanore who is Desirous of preserving the antient Friendship which has so long subsisted between them.

Boyanores Letter to the Hd. Linguist in respect to the Toney taken.

IMPORTED the Penha Macao ship Manuel Fernandez Salgado Captain and Antonio Vincento de Roza Supra Cargoe.

THE Chief received the following Letter from Mr. Alexander Douglas.

SIR,

MONSIEUR FLORIN and another Gentleman came from Mahie yesterday and immediately went to Diegos and as I hear sealed up his papers and in the Evening carried him to their Factory. About ten this morning they came to me and said Monsieur Louet had received a Letter from you wherein you mentioned I could give sufficient Proofs of Diegos having sold Pepper to the Danes and that they were thereupon ordered to come to this Place to take information thereof and that they came to me desiring I would prove the same whereupon I told them I believed I could and immediately sent to Francisco Joseph to desire he would come but he refused the same giving many frivolous Excuses whereupon I sent our Linguist to him in company with a person belonging to Florin to desire he would Declare to them whether he did not tell me that he had sold Diego de silva thirty candies of Pepper for the Jew Abraham Jaffi. The answer he returned was That perhaps he might have told me so but that he did not recollect he had that he had sold Jaffi

Letter from Mr. Douglas in respect to the proceedings of the French Gentlemen concerning their Linguist.

Thirty candies and that Diego was the Person that came to him and Desired he would sell the same to the said Jaffi and that he Diego would be answerable for the money in case the said Jaffi did not make it good finding this Equivocation I then sent Monico to confront him whether he had not told him the same he had done me which he before Monico said he did not remember. Puchroe of whom fifty Candies was bought is not in the Place. Diegos sending the Lascars on board is proved. When I asked Diego whether his Writer did not assist at the weighing the Pepper he said he was his servant formerly but had been Discharged about a month agoe upon which I immediately sent for Uny Shroff and asked him whether any of the Linguists sent to him to Exchange Pagodas or other coins while the Danes ship lay here, he said Diego did but that he would not go to him. I then asked him who were the Persons that Diego sent to call him he said his Writer and Seepoy I asked him whether he knew him to be Dagois writer he said yes, and that he had served him for a long time and that he went to his the Shroffs House as Diegos servant and that he had sent to Diego and his Brother within these few Days Fananus by the hands of the said Writer at Diego's Writer and that if he Diego had turned him off or Discharged him he never heard any thing of the matter nor had Diego taken another in his room.

As Francisco Joseph refused to come here I went in the afternoon to the Padre Vigar to desire he would send for him as I had some questions to ask the said Francisco Joseph before him the said Vigar but he refused to come and at the same time went to the French factory to the two Gentlemen who have taken as I hear his Deposition however to morrow I'll have a second Trial with the Padre to get him and if he refuses coming I'll leave you to judge how things are managed and hope you will use him in the manner you will Jaffi for a man that acts in this Double manner does not deserve to set his foot amongst us.

As to Diego's nairs and servants calling the Custom house people the two Gentlemen make no account of that and I am afraid there is something at the Bottom I hear Diego De Silva said yesterday this affair was nothing. When you consider the Equivocations now made use of a Man may be surprised. A man to be my servant for two or three years and just be Discharged upon the Danes arrival & to go & serve Jaffi is a little astonishing.

AGREEABLE to an order from the Chief Pedro Rodrigues answered the Boyanores Minister his Ola. That as the King of Colastria had by his Grants given to the Honble Company the sole Trade of his Dominions and Pepper being daily exported from Burgorah to Callicut and the other parts thereof from that Power and Grant Round Boats were sent from hence to prevent the same and as the Toney which they mention refused to come nigh ours occasioned her being fired at and chased ashore, and there being some loose pepper with mats &c^a. to pack the same up in still left in the Toney she was accordingly sent here, but however if Boyanore would assure the Chief that no pepper should in future be carried out of his country to the southward that he will withdraw the Round Boats having the same inclination to preserve a Friendship between his Master and the Honble Company.

THE Chief having received private advice of the Prince of Cherricas having gone against his Enemies and proved successfull in a skirmish wrote him a congratulatory Letter on the occasion and advised him that as soon as he was at leisure he should set out from hence in order to pay him a visit and hoped by so doing it would be productive of a sincere and perfect Friendship.

SAILED the Phazzee Salam for Bombay and Surat.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Douglas in answer to the Paragraph wrote from the Presidency with regard to the Dearness of the Masts purchased by him which Letter having by mistake been sent to Bombay the same is to be wrote for and will be entered at the end of this years Diary.

IMPORTED a Macao ship.

THE Chief received an ola from the Prince of Cherrika advising that he had already been acquainted with the unjust proceedings of Badencalamcur and the Prince's of Travencore without any provocation whatever but they still continuing their Hostilities he had sent to them to Desist instead of which they came and attacked him which action lasted the whole Day when Badencalamcur represented to his party it would be better for them to return to their Duty and behave as in times past. And should they be Determined to continue in their Disobedience they must expect no further assistance from him as he was resolved in such case to stand neuter. They accordingly promised to adhere to his advice but in the night without saying any thing they left Badencalamcur who immediately sent notice of it and on meeting him requested he might live peaceably without intermeddling in any affairs and promised that in future he would endeavour to prevent others from acting otherwise. That as yet he does not know to what place the Rebels are gone or what is their Intention, however hopes that should there be occasion the Honble Company will assist him and that he shall take care to advise the Chief of all proceedings.

THE Chief returned for answer that he had already congratulated his Highness on his success and would serve him when in his power.

IMPORTED the Restoration Grab from Callicut by her received from Mess^{rs}. Douglas and Benton advising they now Dispatched her to us with such stores as Captain Leeke informed them he could take in as Invoice & Bill of Lading enclosed.

IMPORTED the Nossa Senhora D'Esperanca from Macao.

By private advices we learn that there is a Europe ship at Cochin which is supposed to be the Prince William Captain Webber from Bengall.

BOYANORE'S Rajadores wrote the Linguist in answer to his Ola the 9 Inst. That in respect to the Grant from the King of Colastria to the Honble Company for the sole Trade of his Dominions the same did not effect the Kingdom of Boyanore and that impeding Goods being carried out of his country seemed to be the forerunner of a Breach between the English Company and their Master to prevent which they now again repeat their former complaints desiring the Chief may be acquainted therewith and the Toney returned them which was taken by our Round Boats.

ABRAHAM JAFFI the Jew mentioned by Mr. Douglas to be assisting the Danes ship at Callicut and who went on her to Penany for the same purpose, coming into the Districts this Day the Chief Directed he should be turned out as an Example to others being under our protection not to concern themselves in such matters either here or Elsewhere as such proceedings tend to the prejudice of our Honble Masters.

TAKING into consideration the Honble President and Council their Directions to us to send them four thousand Bales of Rice It is observed they might reasonably expect we should be able to furnish them with this quantity, we having advised them our Contractor had been advanced Forty thousand Rupees (R^s. 4000 —) for this article in November last but finding afterwards that we should not stand in need of so large a supply (if our Garrison should be reduced which there is hopes it will be soon) we withdrew ten thousand Rupees (R^s. 10000) so there remains no greater a sum in his hands than will purchase above fifteen Thousand Bales two thousand of which has been already spared in part of the Durringtons Cargoe to Mocha and our monthly Expences being from Eighteen hundred to two thousand Bales the remainder will not serve us above seven months and therefore renders it impossible to comply wth their Directions to us on this Head.

It is AGREED to represent their case to Bombay for our superiors notice and Directions thereon.

He also appointed Governours to that part of the country which was in subjection to him and his successours promising to protect them in their antient customs. But the first that flung off his obedience was the Pallace of Cotiote by which is now lost the Jurisdiction and Rights of that Country to the Pallace of Pally and the priviledge of Trade to the Honble Company. That this Example others are endeavouring to follow, and though he is sensible his Grand father gave the company a Right to Trade in his country he cannot Re-establish these priviledges entirely (though in some places they still subsist) being incapable of such an undertaking. DISPATCHED the Cuddalore sloop to Anjengo and by her wrote a Letter to the Chief and Factors advising our sending on her one thousand Bales of Rice being as much as she could take in and desired them to return her to us as soon as possible as she is to be sent to Fort St. David; That we could not inform Them exactly what the Price of the Rice turned out at 30 Bale though what we had received came out nearest at two Rupees and twenty Raes and that this article is now rising at Mangalore; therefore we have advanced for the Provision of the whole Two thousand two hundred Bales on account of their Factory which will be kept apart from our Purchase and when the whole is Delivered in and the account adjusted we should take care to transmit the same accordingly. That the Chief having transmitted Mr. Bouchier Our Account Currant with their Factory by a Conveyance that occasionally offered they would be able to settle the Price of the Rice supplied them with last season. That we had forwarded their Packet to the Presidency by the Restoration Grab in whose company sailed our Honble masters ship Prince William and other merchant Vessels for Bombay on the 20th. Instant. By the sloop we had sent them a Pipe of Madeira Wine received from the Presidency for the service of their Factory, Invoice of which we now enclosed them. That we likewise had sent a corporal and six men on the sloop who had been supplied with Provisions amounting to thirteen Rupees and a half which we Desired them to bring to the credit of this Factory.

Letter to Messrs. Douglas and Benton.

By this conveyance wrote a Letter to Messrs. Douglas and Benton acknowledging receipt of their severals under the 10th, 12th, 14th, and 16th. Instant the former of which had been forwarded to Bombay for the President and Council to be advised of Mr. Douglas his Reasons for the Dearness of the Poon Masts. That the stores sent hither by the Restoration turned out right and Mr. Douglas accounts for last month was duly received and agreeable to their Request we now transmitted them five thousand Rupees having ordered Mr. Holland to Deliver the same who was not to be Detained afterwards.

Ola to the Prince.

THE Chief wrote the Prince an Ola in reply to the one received from him yesterday advising his Rajadores had informed him fully of every thing they had in charge. But that till he had done the company's Business by Dispatching away the shipping expected he could not wait on him and the Queen Mother which he hoped they would not look upon as a framed Excuse desiring him to be assured he wanted much to have that satisfaction but could not till the Monsoon was set in though if his Highness would appoint an adjacent Place to meet in he would have a Conference.

The Prince Dismissed on account of the Debt due to Palliarem.

Chiefs Message to the Rajadores.

THE Princes Rajadores having advised the Chief that Palliarem had sent people to dun his Highness he wrote to their Head as follows.

“ That he signified to his Master his willingness to be a mediator for to make up the Differences between him and the Prince of Cherrika but not having yet received any answer and finding him now sent to dun the Prince he is desired to acquaint Palliarem he thinks it very unhandsom treatment and what his kind Profession of service do not deserve therefore now thinks it unnecessary to take any further Trouble about their affairs.”

That the Merchant who contracted for the Poon masts for the service of his Majestys ships represents he cannot possibly comply therewith till the Month of June and if we chuse to accept of them at that time desires to be advanced the other four hundred Rupees agreeable to his former contract giving for reason that the Rivers inland are dried up from whence they are conveyed to Callicut and there being no possibility of a land carriage occasion their sending us this timely notice for our further directions though they cannot help doing the Merchant so much Justice as to Declare that nothing has been wanting on his part to fulfill his contract having been at a very Extraordinary Expence for that purpose. That agreeable to former Directions Mr. Douglas had delivered over the charge of the Factory to Mr. Thomas Benton with all Books and papers relating to the Honble Company's affairs of which an Inventory was now enclosed. That Manuel Netto having made a Demand of Eighty Eight Rupees fifty six reas as due to the Estate of Francisco Dias late Linguist at Callicut on account of plank provided for Fort St. David Presidency desired to know if the same might be Discharged. Being in want of a Maund of nails and three hundred Oister shells request the same may be sent for the use of the Factory.

TAKING into consideration that part of the Letter wrote by Mess^{rs}. Douglas and Benton under the 26th. Instant (as extracted in the Diary) in relation to the Poon Masts which were ordered to be provided for the service of his majestys ships It is observed that although the same failure is represented to us by Mr. Douglas not to be owing to any fault of the contractor yet such may be the immediate service for these particulars for his Majestys ships as may occasion the admiral to seek elsewhere to be provided, in which case our giving the contractor further time to procure them the same may fall on our Hon^{ble} Masters hands which may have no use for masts of the Dimensions engaged for; The Question is therefore put to the Board whether or not It is better to withdraw the sum already advanced on this account and make the contract void (as in justice it ought to be from this failure) or run the risque of entering into fresh engagements the ensuing season should they be wanted which being Debated It is AGREED to give Mr. Benton Directions to recover from the Merchant the money advanced on this account as the Admiral may be advised of this Disappointment time enough to let the Chief know if his occasions still require them and a certain answer be returned at what time to send proper conveyances round to us for the same.

M^r. BENTON having requested the sum of two Thousand Rupees to be sent him to pay for some particulars provided and carrying on the Factory charges and Mr. Douglas informing the Board that by Eleven cables some Teak Timbers and Plank provided in all March being unpaid for occasions the present Indent. He is now Directed to deliver in a narrative of what passed on their arrival at Callicut as we are informed they had Directions to apply to him to make good his assertions.

PARRAPOREM CUNHIPPI & TOY CUNIALLEY being willing to take the same Price for the Cardamoms Delivered in by them as was settled by Cunhissu the same is agreed to and their accounts ordered to be made up and the late Chiefs administrators having likewise made over a quantity (which he contracted for on his own private account) in order to make up the Provision ordered by the Hon^{ble} Company the same is agreed to be paid for at the like rate and that Interest be allowed on the money advanced.

SIR AND SIRS,

CONFORMABLE to the Resolution of Council I am now to lay before you what passed at Callicut relating to the Proceedings of Dugo De Silva French Linguist.

THE beginning of last Month two Gentlemen of Mahie came to Callicut and immediately on their arrival went to their Linguist placed a Centry at each of the doors of his House and as I heard sealed up his papers and in the Evening carried him to their Factory; the next day about ten in the morning they accompanied by their Linguist came to our Factory and informed me that the Chief of Tellicherry had wrote Monsieur Louet that I would give Proofs of their Linguist having sold Pepper to the Danes ship and that they desired I would make the same appear whereupon I sent for one Francisco Joseph (who sometime before had told me of his having sold Pepper to the French Linguist which Pepper he said was for Abraham Ghaffi a Jew who shipped the same on board the Danes ship) but he refused to come whereupon the French Gentlemen and I agreed to send two People to him in order to Declare before them whether he did not tell me and afterwards Manuel Netto that he had sold Pepper to the French Linguist and that it was for Abraham Ghaffi but he gave a very equivocating answer saying that he might perhaps have told me so but that he did not then recollect he ever did and that the Pepper he sold was not to the French Linguist but to the Jew mentioning at the same time that the French Linguist went to him telling him the Jew was in want of Pepper and desired he would let him have some and that if he doubted Payment of the money he the Linguist would be answerable for the same. This being quite Different from what the said Francisco Joseph had told me personally and his refusing to come to our Factory I resolved to go in the Evening to Padre Cypriano D'Amorim Factor for the Portuguese nation desiring he would send for Francisco Joseph to him as I had some Questions to ask in his presence whereupon he was sent for but he hearing I was there refused coming and the same Evening the French Gentlemen sent for him to their factory where he went and as I was informed took Down his Deposition but what he Deposed I know not as they never offered to show them to me; these Proceedings appearing to me not altogether right I went the following Day again to Padre Cypriano D'Amorim and desired he would once more send for the said Francisco Joseph which was done but on his hearing of my being there he refused to come whereupon I desired the said Padre as also Padre Alexander to bear Witness that I had been twice to them to get a meeting with Francisco Joseph but could not which they said they would testify.

The day after the arrival of the Danes ship at Callicut the Commander of her applied to the French Linguist to get him a syrang and some Lascars to work on board during the ships stay there which he accordingly did and settled their Wages this I acquainted the French Gentlemen of sent for the syrang who before the French Linguist declared he was the person got him to go on b^d. the ship as likewise settled his and the Lascars their Wages.

I acquainted the French Gentlemen that their Linguists Mallabar Writer assisted at the weighing off all the Pepper that was shipped on board the Danes ship, took the account thereof paid the Cooleys &c*. upon which the Linguist denied his being his servant saying he had Discharged him about three weeks before the ship arrived, this appearing still more strange, I immediately sent for a shroff by name Uny asking him whether he had Exchanged any Pagodas within the month last past and for whom whereupon he made answer that the French Linguists Writer came to him saying his Master wanted him to Exchange some Pagodas but he refused going I then asked him how he knew such a one to be the French Linguists writer and whether he was certain of the same in reply to which he said, that he and every body in Callicut looked upon him as his Writer and during the Danes ship stay he had sent money by the hands of the said writer to the French Linguists Brother and that if he was Discharged no one in the place knew it nor had the French Linguist taken another Writer in his Room.

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I shall only remark further that I was informed the French Gentlemen sent for people to their Factory took Down their Depositions privately without ever showing them to me and after staying three Days at Callicut they returned to Mahie taking their Linguist with them who before I left Callicut was come back.

CODOLEY QUELLOO NOMBIER came this Day to the Fort and in behalf of the Oden Quilote Family represented to the Chief that the Differences subsisting between them and the Pallace of Pally Quilote ended in a manner to the absolute ruin of the whole Country as they were carrying on Conquests on both sides destroying Estates Houses and Families of each others adherents so that unless a remedy was soon applied nothing could be expected but entire Desolation in the whole Country and as the former were not the aggressors being engaged no further than to obtain their Hereditary Right He and several other Heads of the Country had interfered therein and as this was the sole Motive, hoped the Company would afford no assistanec against them. The Chief being fully perswaded what related

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by the nombier was real matter of fact and being sensible the Prince is endeavouring to subdue the House of Capaut which if he succeeds we will make him so very arbitrary and absolute that it will be Difficult to curb him in future without a large expence of Treasure. And on the contrary that if we do not appear in the present case he will soon be reduced by them to an humble and submissive state which will oblige him to fly hither for Protection. He judged the keeping up the present enmity between them for a little time would be necessary for bringing the Prince to a just way of thinking therefore replied that he was sensibly concerned to observe the Disunion between the two Pallaces and that as the occasion thereof seemed to proceed from matters tending to the established Laws and Customs of the Country he might depend we should remain neuter [sic] upon the occasion. But as the succours promised by the King of Cotiote may sum the scale and the Nombier being greatly respected by the King it was intimated to him how necessary it was to prevent the same being afforded if possible.

THE Prince of Cotacuna came this Day to the Fort and Earnestly solicited assistance from the Chief to subdue the Enemies of his Country who were committing many acts of cruelty & Oppression therein growing so very formidable that a Continuance of the same he said would soon terminate in the utter ruin of his Pallace.

THIS the Chief told him was what he expected to hear when these troubles first commenced and occasioned him to advise his Brother upon applying them for assistance to accommodate Affairs with their Uncle Badencalamcur and his Family as he did not seem inclinable that the cause of such Differences existing should be enquired into by him when the same was at that time proposed. Since when Christna Cutty Putterah (his Counsellor) has not only Deluded our people and secreted them in Munderry Fort but robbed the Honble Company of their Property by keeping the Arms they carried with them for wth. ample satisfaction in their name Was demanded of him and that the Offender should meet with a suitable Chastizement, otherwise a proper resentment would be shown and suitable methods taken to obtain Redress. Upon which he Declared to the Chief if such acts were committed they were Done without his knowledge but that he would send Orders immediately to search for the people who if found should be sent hither and hoped in such case no hesitation would be made, in complying with his present Request, but he was plainly told that till Christna Cutty Putterah (who has Generally been at the botton of all dirty work) (& Leads the Prince into many scrapes) was disgraced and bereaved of all employments whatever and made a publick Example of for the base act he has been guilty of nothing but a continual jealousy and a reserved Behaviour could be expected between us, therefore, till such were executed no professions of Friendship could be made him when he desired to take his leave and depart for Cherrika to consider of the same with his Brother promising to make strict enquiry into this affair and with the Chief from thence.

THE Chief received the following Letter from Monsieur Louet.

I have received your answer but cant give you any certain advice of a Peace being concluded in Europe. Whether my superiors have received any or not I cant say their Letter to me relating only to keeping such a number of people and other Regulations.

Though I have not received any advices from my superiors, yet as a Peace may be reasonably suspected to have been concluded (which I am anxious to know) I am resolved to reduce the Garrison in order to lessen our charges.

ARRIVED the Ramban Express Boat from Bombay with a General Letter from the Hon^{ble} President and Council dated the 4th. Instant acknowledging Receipt of our advices under the 24th. February ^{of} ship Doddington which they will reply to in a few days by her this Dispatch being purposely to direct us to provide two

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hundred candies of Sandall Wood, one half of which to be the first sort and the other the second, but if not procurable in those proportions then to get as nigh them as we are able and to hold the same in readiness for the Doddingtons cargo who is Designed for China.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo (designed by their sloop now at Callicut) dated the 19th. ultimo advising that conformable to orders given them from Bombay they had now sent us up all the Piece Goods they have ready packed up being Forty two Bales amounting to Rupees Eleven thousand two hundred fifty eight two Quarters and twenty two Reas (Rs. 11258. 2. 22) but expect more ready by the return of the sloop whom they desire us to send back with all possible Expedition that she may make a second Trip before the bad Weather sets in. That having wrote us for two thousand two hundred Bales of Rice in a former Letter desire we will send such a part thereof on her return as she can take in reserving the same quantity for her second Trip and the remainder they Desire us to freight to them on the best terms possible and the sooner the better as the surf runs high sometimes in April. That having occasion for four Pieces of Course Red Cloth and twelve Pieces of blue perpetuanes to compleat their Military Cloathing desire us to send the same to them if to be spared otherwise to add this quantity to our Indent to Bombay for the service of their Factory. That they had sent us by this conveyance a Packet for Bombay likewise a Box with their Diary and General Books which they desire may be forwarded by the first safe conveyance.

WORSHIPFULL SIR & SIRS

On my arrival at Callicut this Day from Anjengo which Port I left the 20th. of March bound for Tellicherry having on board forty two Bales of the Hon^{ble} Company's cloth consigned for your Port this being the first Opportunity I had to advise you of my being on my Passage to Tellicherry and with Difficulty got so high up the coast the season being far spent, the land Winds are so inconsiderable they are of little or no service to us at all and the sea Wind continually blowing from the NW and WNA with a strong curr^t. setting to the southward which has rendered our Passage hitherto Difficult, for what we have gained has been against Wind and Current though our Vessel is not well calculated for that purpose.

I have sent the Packet Directed for the Chief and Factors of Tellicherry together with a Packet Box for the Governour and Council of Bombay to Mr. Thomas Benton to be forwarded by him to Tellicherry and am preparing to proceed to your port with all Expedition where I hope to be in a few Days. But in case we should not get to Tellicherry by the 20th. Instant it will not be safe to keep the sea any longer on account the Monsoon setting in which may happen sooner or later and if the Rice can be conveyed down by any Munchuas which may take our Bales at the same time we can take Eight hundred Robins of Rice which if you think proper of it will be the quickning of our voyage if not entirely the meaning of saving it. If we continue till the 25th. we cannot return to Anjengo the season will be so far spent to land any Dry Goods as Rice the surf will be so large there. If we continue so long we shall be obliged to go into Beypore River or some place of security Therefore Gentlemen I must depend on your Dispatches or your Inspections before that time is Expired or I must make sure of Beypore. For in my opinion its not safe for any vessel being on the coast without a good harbour or Roadstead not Doubting but most of you Gentlemen are acquainted with the monsoons and its times of setting in is so uncertain.

AMBOO NAMBY brought an Ola from the Prince to the Chief acknowledging that he was convinced Christina Cutty Putterah had harboured our Deserters and would shew a proper resentment thō he hoped the Chief would not expect his sentence to be so rigorous as was mentioned at their last conference.

His Minister desires his Punishment to be alleviated but denied. THE Bearer of this Ola endeavoured to use many arguments with the Chief to mitigate the same but was told nothing less would be accepted of and if the Prince had thoughts of screening such villains there must be an entire break of Friendship which he was desired to signify to him and was dismissed with this message.

Cunhiseu takes our Protection. The ill Treatment he met with from his Sovereign the King of Cotiote. THIS day Cunhiseu our Principal Merchant came hither and requested the Honble Company's protection being compelled to leave his House and Family through the cruel persecutions of his sovereign the King of Cotiote who by Ally Rajahs instigation and Promise of large Presents was going forcibly to take away his Nephews wife and give her to him in marriage which being a very arbitrary act and quite inconsistent with the Moor Laws, his request was complied with in order to prevent so considerable a Merchant being ruined, and acts of cruelty being committed, which is often the case among these Mallabar powers where an immediate submission is not shewn to their Will and Pleasure, by those who are subjects to them of any Degree whatever.

THIS Day a violent storm of Wind set in at N and NNW veered about to SSW and from thence to SW where it blew very hard by which several vessels that arrived this afternoon from Mangalore loaded with Rice were drove ashore and wrecked.

THE storm continuing very violent last night more vessels were drove on shore and some foundered which makes the whole number eight that had on board three thousand three hundred seventeen Bales of Rice belonging to the Companys Contractor and three thousand one hundred ninety three to private Merchants of this place.

ENSIGN NICHOLAS WARDMAN at Maddacarra writes the Chief that a Munchua appearing off the Bar at Day Light this Morning in great Distress he sent out assistance and with much Trouble brought her into the River the people of which informed him they belonged to Manuel Rodrigues, and had flung above five hundred Bales of Rice over board in the storm which they had taken in at Mangalore, from which place they sailed the 13th. Instant in company with five more loaded on our contractors account w^{ch}. they imagined were all lost under Mount Dilly being seen in the utmost Distress, and that at the same time hearing the Moors of Mottamy point were gone to the northward in quest of plunder he had sent a Serjeant and twelve men to protect the unhappy sufferers till further orders upon which fifty Nairs were immediately dispatched to him by the Chief with a Letter approving of the steps hitherto taken to preserve the Effects of such vessels as were drove on shore, and Directions to employ them in protecting the same till further Orders.

UPON the occasion the Chief wrote the Prince, that our Rice Munchuas in their voyage from the Canaree ports having met with a storm some of them had been drove on shore in his country therefore to prevent their being plundered he had sent a party of the Companys people and desired they might be joined by some of his nairs likewise, and that the Ensign of Maddacarra was advised of the service for which they were sent.

SEVERAL people belonging to Munchuas of this place arrive and report that when the five vessels were lost in the storm betwixt Mangalore and Mount Dilly they were loaded with six thousand nine hundred seventy two Bales of Rice on board.

THE Chief answered the above by acquainting his Highness that as the vessel he wrote about belonged to people trading under our protection and loaded with Rice for the Hoñble company, he had sent people from hence to bring the said Vessel hither if possible, and observed to him that in times past whenever such accidents happened either immediately to the Hoñble Company or others trading under their protection his predecessors never laid the like claim but on the contrary assisted the unhappy sufferers. That he hears a shybar of his own, is lost with a valuable cargoe and that Camall Mopla has got some of the Goods at Madday therefore desires he will order him to deliver the same up without secreting anything and return such Letters as may have come to his hands.

Instant who desires that boats may be sent to take out the cloth in her which being taken into consideration it is the unanimous opinion of the Board that the same is much more safe on board the sloop where it is secured from being Damaged by Rain whereas should we now send open boats to bring the same up the Weather appears so very squally and unsettled that we should run a great Risk of having the same much Damaged. It is therefore AGREED not to comply with his request more especially as we cannot expect an opportunity to send the Bales away this season.

THE Chief and Factors of Anjengo having wrote us very strenuously for Rice as noticed in the several Extracts of their Letters and as we are now uncertain whether the sloop will arrive us from the strong N. Westers we have had for some time. It is AGREED to freight two Munchuas and send on them Eight hundred Bales for the present and the Secretary is DIRECTED to prepare an answer to their Letter that they may be dispatched this Evening the season being far advanced and the owners of the Munchuas concerned for their safety who was not without much Difficulty prevailed on to let them out on freight.

RECEIVED a General Letter from the Honble President and Council of Fort St. David dated the 3^d. Instant per Pattamar advising that by contrary Winds and currents the Winchelsea was drove back to Negapatam and the season being now very late they imagine she will be obliged to return back again without gaining her passage round Ceylone though they had sent Orders to the Commander to make another Tryal to effect it which if he should not be able to do the Timber Plank and sandall wood they wrote us for in February last they desire may be sent them by some of the shipping bound there that may touch at this place.

Letter to

DISPATCHED the Munchuas to Anjengo with eight hundred Bales of Rice and advised the Chief and Factors of the sloop having lost her Passage but that if the Master arrived us hereafter we should Dispatch him back to them with the remainder of Rice they requested and that we could not inform them of the cost of what now sent, our contractors Agent at Mangalore not having as yet made up his account That not having cloth or Perpetuanoes near sufficient for the cloathing our own Garrison we could not comply with their request for this article, but will add the quantity they desire to the Indent we send from hence; acknowledged receipt of the Box with their Diary and Books and advised them we should send the same to Bombay on the 25th. Instant if the Weather proved fair. That we heard the Winchelsea who was designed to take in a Loading of Pepper and their Bale Goods at this Place had lost her Passage and been drove back to Negapatam but that the Commander had Orders from St. David to make another Trial and she was now daily expected as was the Doddington likewise from Bombay.

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By private advices we hear the Prince advised Cristna Cutty Putterah to leave his Country immediately as the Chief seemed determined to have a publick Example made of him and that he retired thereupon to a remote place inland with one hundred nairs.

The Prince said to convince at Cutty Putterah & advises him to fly.

THE Chief is advised by Letter from Ensign Wardman that a Grab belonging to George Carvalho Inhabitant of this place and loaded with our contractors Rice was drove on shore at Ayconna the Guns Cordage anchors &c^s. of which were carried into Ramdilly Fort by the Princes People and had been demanded by our head nair, who was upon this occasion treated with Impertinence and very indecent Language, where he waited for further orders, the Princes Nairs having drawn up the Fort Ladder and put themselves in a Defensive posture. In answer to which the Chief wrote him that proper notice should be taken of what represented by him to the Prince, who is expected to arrive this Day therefore for the present every thing must be kept quiet and easy and Condapa (the Head of our nairs sent hither directly) as satisfaction will be insisted upon if he can fix upon any particular person.

FRIDAY 21st.
The Prince seizes on the appurtenances of a vessel lost.
His Treatment of a Nair who demanded them.

THE Chief received an ola from the Prince advising him that since his Intentions of coming to Tellicherry on the 21st. Instant was communicated Cristna Cutty Putterah (whether induced to it through Fear or otherwise) had fled to the King of Cotiotes country taking with him twenty of his best Nairs and that he is now ready to come to Tellicherry and waits the Chief's Directions how to act on this occasion.

Ola from the Prince
advices of Cristna Cutty Putterahs flying the country.

In answer to the foregoing ola the Chief wrote the Prince as follows.

I have received your Royal Letter, from whence I observe Cristna Cutty Putterah is retired, which I was apprehensive of before, from the Reluctancy your Highness shewed in giving me that just satisfaction which I required for his villianous Behaviour and at the same time communicated to your Rajadores my suspicion on this Head which are confirmed. This Behaviour of your Highness, in not punishing Cristna Cutty Putterah has encouraged others of your subjects much lower than him, to abuse the People I sent with Condapa to Ayconna, to protect such Goods as might have been saved from the Wrecks of Vessels belonging to Merchants under our Protection. For these and many other reasons I am obliged on the part of the Honble Company to declare to your Highness that should the good understanding subsisting between them and the Palace of Pally Quilote meet with any alteration the fault is not mine but your Highness's owing to your not giving that justice required, and which we might reasonably expect. For my part I always endeavoured to convince your Highness of my good Inclination for preserving the Friendship existing between your Royal Palace and the Company, and which I will still use my endeavours to do, should your Highness not give me occasion to act otherwise therefore if you chuse to come to Tellicherry agreeable to what you have been pleased to write, I have at present no manner of objection to it.

Letter to the Prince on the occasion.

THERE being great reason to believe by the Princes Behaviour of late, that he is determined to carry things such lengths as will infallibly occasion a breach between him and the Honble Compy and least he should attempt to insinuate that it proceeds from any misconduct here. It is judged necessary to acquaint the seriums with what has lately passed especially as we may be able to judge by their answer how they stand affected, and the following Letter was accordingly wrote them by the Chief.

Sometime since, Three soldiers belonging to the Honble Company deserted from hence with their arms, and notwithstanding Cristna Cutty Putterah one of the Princes Rajadores was well acquainted with the same, yet he clandestinely concealed them for three months. Two of them have been since returned by his Highness the other having made his Escape, to whom I have repeatedly applied for

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Redress by bringing his said Rajadore to a proper Punishment by imprisonment or otherwise; his unwillingness to comply with so reasonable a request has given Cristna Cutty Putterah an opportunity to escape; I have therefore thought proper to advise you of the Princes conduct on this occasion, which ill agrees with the antient Friendship so long subsisting between him and the Honble Company; as also, that should this affair give rise to any Differences hereafter, you might be acquainted how greatly his Highness is culpable by not giving that just satisfaction which might so reasonably be expected from him.

By some Travellers who came from the southward we are informed the Anjengo Sloop was lost in the late storm at Penany by the Treacherous Council of the Moors there, who advised the master to weigh his anchor and tow her into a Bay by the assistance of a Rope fixed on shore which he inadvertently adhering to, and getting under way they Either cut or slipped the same when she immediately foundered.

Mr. BENTON having taken no notice of this accident the Chief instantly dispatched a Toney Express to be certified thereof, acquainting him with the information received and Directions to make strict Enquiry into this affair, transmitting such intelligence as he might get with the utmost Expedition.

THIS Evening the following Letter was received from Mr. Robert Baldwin Master of the Anjengo Sloop.

ON the 11th. Instant I left Callicut bound for Tellv. and on the 14th. D^o. five Leagues S.E.W. from the Sacrifice Rocks we were taken with a Gale of wind W.N.W. which came to the W and W S W to S W and lasted about twenty four Hours during which time our sails were split and all to pieces excepting our Fore sail which we preserved with great Difficulty, with which I plied to Windward as well as could possibly be expected and on the 15th. in the morning found ourselves three Leagues to the northward of Chitoe the Wind coming to S W. we were obliged to wear and stand to the northward and at one in the afternoon being housed in by the sea and for want of sail within two Miles of the River of Penany the Wind shifting to W S W we was obliged to let go an anchor but found it impossible to ride should the Wind continue in that Quarter as it threatned much so that we could not clear the shore either one way or another at which time our Pumps being choaked as was our Lumbers by the Ballast which was sand and nothing but Mat and Bamboes to keep it from the outside Plank and our Sails in so shattered a condition I concluded to go into the River of Penany accordingly I made signals for a Pilot or Boat to come off to us. The Dutch Factor sent several but none come off the seas ran so high and at two in the afternoon finding no assistance and the making much Water together with the Seas which broke on our Deck for want of Tarpaulings did us much Damage. I thought it better to risque the going into the River than the following Nights Danger which appeared very Dismal should we have seen driven on shore in the Night it was impossible to save Either Goods or our Lives: there I shipped my Cable and by Gods assistance we got safe over the Bar which run prodigious High and we let go an anchor in a small cove which lies between the Rivers Mouth and the Surff with every thing as safe on board as the Day we left Anjengo at which time number of Boats came to us in a manner to assist us as they said to haul the sloop into the River for we could not lie there in the station we were any time but instead of assisting us they strove to ruin us and by their means hauled the sloop on a Bank which was very nigh us We cut the Mast by the Board as the sloop struck very hard on the Bank and on the Tide of Floods coming in the sea made a Breach over us notwithstanding we hauled the sloop off to the Rivers Mouth where the Kings people took Possession of her from us and took out the Bales she being two thirds full of Water when they ordered us on shore and I believe would have murdered us if we had not swam on shore where the Kings Rajadores stood ready to receive the Bales and even my cloaths they began to plunder, like an

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Enemy or worse than pirates. They took out all the Bales which was forty two and three small Bales of private Trade and put them in a warehouse by the Rajadore and before sunset she was full of water lying at the mouth of the River and this morning could see only her Bowspirit and Taffarell. I desired the Rajadore to let the Bales be opened and washed with fresh Water which they said they could not untill the Kings orders. As for the sloop I believe they will not haul her on shore though they make pretensions so to Do and I believe her to be irrecoverable. If they will Deliver any of the Goods I will stay untill I have your answer. My cloaths they plundered and with much ado I got as much as to shift me I have sent a copy of this Letter to the Chief and Factors at Anjengo and am waiting for your answer in what manner to proceed had not the Factor of Penany stood my Friend I know not what we should have done for Food Worthy Gentlemen as this is our Misfortune to fall into the hands of a treacherous people I hope you will not cast any Reflections on my conduct seeing I did the best of my Endeavours to preserve both Sloop and Cargoe but as Fortune has ordered it otherwise it is not in my power to resist therefore Gentlemen I rely entirely on your Bounty and Good Will and I am begging leave

P.S. I had three small Bales on board one of Mr. Williams the other of Mr. Tarrins at Anjengo the other my own which I beg you will please to mention as the Companys when you write to the Samorine King or otherwise they'll know its private Trade it will be best had we only good sails Penany this Day had not contained us which was not wanted for want of asking at Anjengo. I am bare of money to bear my Expences to stay here and am obliged to borrow a small sum to supply our people with Food of the Dutch Factor of Penany, therefore I shall be obliged to you Gentlemen to supply me with a little money if you think proper of my continuing here any time concerning the Bales.

REPERUSED the foregoing Letter from Mr. Baldwin concerning the Loss of the Anjengo sloop and an Ola wrote by Mr. Benton to the Samorine on this occasion and as it plainly appears this accident happened through the Treachery of his Subjects and that she cannot be a Wreck The Chief is Desired to write a proper ola to him and that Mr. Benton be Directed to send Manuel Netto down to Penany with orders to make the Strictest Enquiry into this affair and endeavour to prevail on the Governing people there to Deliver up to him what may be saved out of her likewise that he be directed to dispatch the Master and People down to Anjengo with the utmost Expedition advising what he may have supplied them with for provisions,

Manuel Netto sent to Penmany to make strict enquiry into the loss of the Anjengo sloop & to dispatch the Master & people to Anjengo.

THE Chief lays before the Board the several olas & Transactions of the Prince as set forth in the Diary under their proper Dates and as it fully appears no fair means have been left untied to bring him to a sense of his ill Behaviour by conniving at the Base actions of his Rajadores especially Cristna Cutty Putterah who openly protected our Deserters and fraudulently kept the Honble Companys arms, against whom the Prince refused giving a proper Redress and connived at his Escape notwithstanding he has been often solicited on this Head and the clearest Proofs given him of his being Guilty of the Fact he stands charged with. Besides which he is

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now endeavouring to ruin the Pallace of Oden Quilote who are Third from the Crown and have a just right to part of the Colastria Dominions which attempt should he succeed in may be of bad consequence to the Honble Company's affairs by leaving them, no head to set up against him when he is following Destructive schemes both to their Prejudices and that of his country's. And as it has been found a necessary piece of policy not to let them be too much overcome by him and recommended by the Honble President in his Instructions at leaving this place the Board are of Opinion by giving the Prince a jealousy that we are ready to Espouse their cause it will be the most Effectual way to bring them to a sense of Reflection and be the means of obtaining Redress for the Grievances so long Experienced from him which is a growing Evil that ought to be checked in due time Therefore the Chief is Desired to watch the most favourable opportunity for letting him see that we are resolved to maintain our Honble Masters Priviledges by acting offensively or otherwise to prevent impositions of any kind so ever.

SATURDAY
22^d.

AGREEABLE to the Resolution of Council yesterday the Chief wrote the following ola to the Samorine.

Yesterday I received a Letter from Mr. Benton our Resident at Callicut enclosing me one from the Captain of a sloop belonging to the Honble Company bound to this place wherein he advises me of his being obliged by stress of Weather to put into Penany River which he had happily Effectuated but that some Toneyes belonging to Moors of that place came on board and acquainted him that he was not safe where his anchor was Dropped and therefore advised him to weigh and go higher up the River which accordingly he did but found too late the advice given him was nothing but a piece of Treachery w^{ch} he fatally Experienced by their running him ashore soon after whom the sloop filled and he was obliged to cut away his mast. That soon after this accident some of your Majestys People seized the sloop took out of her thirty five Bales of Cloth and plundered the unfortunate people belonging to her in such a manner as if they were Pirates and Enemies. What I have above represented being the Truth I hope that your Majesty will be induced from the Friendship and good understanding subsisting between you and the Honble Company and the many favours your ancestors have received when in the greatest necessity to afford all necessary assistance and give orders to your people to Deliver the Goods to Manuel Netto whom I have directed to open the Bales in order to wash and dry the Goods which may have received Damage from the soft water, that the H^o. Company may be no sufferers and further request that the moors who by their advice were the occasion of this Misfortune may meet with a suitable punishment.

WROTE a Letter to Mr. Thomas Benton Resident at Callicut approving of his having applied to the Samorine for the Sloop and Cargoe and enclosed the Chief Ola to him which he was Directed to send on receipt thereof likewise to order Manuel Netto down to Penany and recommended him to use all permissive Means in his power with the Governing people there to get charge of our Honble Masters Property and should they not comply with his request he was desired to continue there for sending the necessary notice how the same is Disposed of. Enclosed him a Letter to Robert Baldwin whom he was Directed to send from Penany with his people to Anjengo with the utmost Expedition giving our Packet to the Chief and Factors there in his charge and Directed him to remit an account of what money and Provisions he had supplied him with.

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THE Letter to the Master of the Sloop Directed him to give Manuel Netto a full account of all such circumstances and Transactions as had passed during his stay at Penany when he was to make the best of his way to Anjengo.

OUR Letter to the Chief and Factors of Anjengo advised them of the Unfortunate Loss of the sloop and referred them for particulars to the master of her and that we should use all means in our power to recover what might be saved of her, and Demand satisfaction of the Samorine on his treacherous subjects who were the cause of this Accident.

Advised the Chief & Factors of Anjengo of the loss of the sloop.

WROTE a Letter to the Governour and Council of Fort William by the Louisa Kitch belonging to this place desiring they would procure us Two Thousand Double Gunny Bags for shipping off Pepper and sending them to Bombay or hither by the first opportunity that offered and advised them of the arrival and Departure of our Honble Masters ships from this place this season with such others as we still expected to Dispatch from hence.

Wrote to the Presidt. & Council of Bengall.

WROTE likewise a Letter by the same conveyance to the Honble Presidt. and Council of Fort St. David in reply to their Letters of the 25th. Feby and 3^d. Instant and advised them we should have paid due regard to their Directions had the Winchelsea arrived us but it was now too late in the season that we had given over all hopes of seeing her That in regard to the three hundred candies of Sandall Wood they wrote us to provide in March last we were in much Doubt whether we should be able to get any Thing like that quantity as it is usual to adv^e. Money for this article in the month of July which having been done by private Merchants of this place the same was sold to the Maccao ships before receipt of the advices besides which we had lately received Directions from Bombay to provide two hundred candies for the Doddingtons China voyage whom we daily expected but if there was any left after this Provision was made we should take proper care to purchase the same. Advised them of the Cuddalore's Sloop having arrived us the 28th. of February who were designed for the service of their Presidency and that we had received orders from Bombay to fill her up with pepper and dispatch her to them at a proper season of the year in consequence of which in asking advice of such Commanders of ships as were here they gave it as their opinion that this service ought not to be thought on till the Month of April was near expired during w^{ch}. time the Gentlemen of Anjengo having strenuously applied to us for a quantity of Rice we Dispatched her to them on the 23^d. March for that service not Doubting but she would return to us soon enough to perform the service required but since that time we have had here a very severe Gale of Wind which has drove several small Craft on shore and not having heard that she is lost or put into any Port between this Place and Anjengo for security we imagine her master has pushed round to Fort St. David otherwise its probable some News would have come to our knowledge concerning her. Advised them that we should send their Timber and Plank by the first occasion that offered and that we were in daily Expectation of the arrival of his Majestys ships under the command of Capt. Paulet.

Also to the Presidt. & Council of Fort St. David. Advised them it was too late to expect the Winchelsea. Doubt of being able to procure the Quantity of Sandall Wood wrote for.

Advised them we should send the Timber & Plank by the first opportunity.

DISPATCHED the Ramban Express Boat to Bombay and wrote the needfull advices to the Honble President and Council transmitting them the Anjengo Box and Packet with our General Books commencing August 1746 ending July 1747 and the other sett for the last year likewise the Diary for 1747 and that for the year brought up to the Dispatch of the True Briton the 2^d. of March.

MONDAY 24th. Express Boat dispatched to Bbay with advices.

THIS Morning the Chief received a Letter from Ensign Nicholas Wardman at Maddacarra advising him that as one of our Calliquilones was fishing at Irney amongst numbers of Country people he was insulted and Beat by one of the Princes Nairs who took his Fish by force making use of very indecent Language against the Company and that in short the people thereabouts are grown so very insolent he is afraid of sending out for Provisions or Common Necessaries.

THE Chief advised the Prince of the above and desired a proper Redress might be given to this as well as other Grievances.

— APRIL 1748-49 —

THE Chief received the following answer to the Letter wrote the Prince on the 21st. Instant.

Ola from
the Prince.

I have received your Letter and consider its contents in respect to Cristna Cutty Putterah I have only to alledge that he being from a child brought up under my care and one in whom I placed a great deal of confidence as the reason of my not confining him as I little thought he would not run away it was my confidence therefore only and not any Intentions of my own that gave him an opportunity to escape satisfaction I always intended should be given you for his Behaviour and which I only deferred untill our meeting in order to adjust the Punishment to be given him however his plight shall not encourage others whether of a higher or lower class of Life to commit any Disorders, in my opinion instead of being a means to Encourage others it will have a quite contrary effect when they consider if I was obliged to give him up whom I greatly Esteemed I would scarcely protect others who were but indifferent to me and my flinging off him will I am afraid be a Disgrace to me when its known by the rest of the country Powers therefore my Behaviour on this occasion sufficiently shows the good Inclination I have to preserve the Friendship that subsists between me and the Honble Company. You write me there is no Impediment for my coming to Tellicherry, my Desire is to have a meeting with you but as I am informed some of my Enemies held a correspondence and even have had Conferences should I therefore in this situation come to Tellicherry and afterwards return without a promise of assistance it will induce them to think the company will stand neuter but notwithstanding should I come I still hope you will favour me with assistance in order to reduce my Enemies who are now many.

THE Express Boat dispatched yesterday being still in sight the Chief advised the Governour of the Brilliant Snows arrival and that the Elizabeth is at a great Distance in the offing but it being very late in the season the Tindall is ORDERED to make the best of his way.

IMPORTED ship Elizabeth Captain Ambrose Laurence Commander from Bombay by whom two Letters were received from the Honble President & Council dated the 14th. and 15th. Instant the former enclosing Duplicate of their Last and that as they hourly expect to receive our advices by the Restoration Grab they shall Deferr replying to those of the 24th. February untill the Dispatch of the Doddington who will sail in a few Days. That the Elizabeth is bound to Fort St. David at present in his Majesty's service the Commander of whom is directed by Captain Paulet to receive any Goods the Honble Company may have to send to that Presidency therefore without Loss of time they Direct us to ship on board her what Plank or other stores have been indented for from thence likewise as much Pepper as she can be taken having regard to leave room for the Eight Cables the ship is ordered to receive at Anjengo for His Majestys service. Advice that Captain Paulet now sends suitable orders for sending the Pease formerly landed at this settlement from the ship Wake which they Direct to be complied with That they now send the cloth indented for to cloath our Military amounting to Rupees six Thousand Eight hundred seventy four one quarter and Thirteen reas (Rs. 6874. 1. 13) as Invoice and Bill of Lading enclosed. THAT as the Winchelsea has in all probability lost her Passage and the Honble President and Council of Bombay in their Commands of the 15th. having Directed us in case of her not being here on the arrival of the Elizabeth then to comply with their former orders of the 14th. by loading on her what articles we have for Fort St. David Presidency with his Majestys Pease and fill her up with Pepper only reserv-ing room for eight cables she is to take in at Anjengo and there may be no want in either of these articles having no positive orders in respect to loading any particular quantity. It is AGREED to ship off the Peas with such Plank and Timber we have here and tender the Commander six hundred candies of Pepper which when received or such part thereof as he can take in that he be then Dispatched to Callicut for receiving the Rest of the Timber and Plank laying there and the Warehousekeeper is DIRECTED to use the utmost Expedition possible in this service.

Agreed to load on the Elizt. the Peas Plank & Timber lying here & tender six hundreds candies of Pepper.

THAT Paragraph from the Honble President & Council in respect to not send-ing the account Remains of Europe & India Goods in Warehouse by every opportu-nity seeming to censure our conduct therefore It is AGREED in our next advices to advise them that having received very few stores from Bombay this season and having constantly advised what Pepper was remaining in Warehouse occasioned our not being so very particular as we otherwise should have been which we hope they will admit as an Excuse but that we shall observe their Directions on this Head more punctually in future.

A BALLOON arrived from Anjengo with three Letters from the Chief and Factors there the first of which is dated the 31st. March wherein they acknowledge Receipt of our Letter of the 22^d. of that month, by the Cuddalore sloop by whom they had received the Thousand Robins of Rice but in such bad Package that on weighing three hundred thirty six of the broken ones by two that were whole there arises a Loss of no less than sixteen Bales and six pounds which must fall on our Honble Masters if we cant get redress of the Purchaser that indeed the Freight being saved is an advantage otherwise the Rice would prove so dear that they could not lay it upon the Garrison. Acknowledge Receipt of the account curr^t. with our Factory and send up the Particulars of an omission amounting to Rupees Fifteen two quarters fifty one reas for w^{ch}. we have undercredited ourselves; advise Receipt of the Pipe of Madeira and their intentions of sending their sloop for the Remainder of the Rice. This next Letter is under the 3^d. Instant advising that contrary Winds having kept the sloop in sight they are now to request we will supply them with two hundred Musquets by the first conveyance. The last is dated the 16th. Instant informing

us the Cuddalore sloop is drove back to their Port having on the 13th. Instant met with a Gale of Wind that split her sails and sprung her masts Dangerously which obliged her to put back and that the Master says he cannot get ready to sail in less than ten Days when it will be impossible for him to beat up to this Port they therefore send this Boat to inform us of the Accident and that we may load on their sloop what Pepper was Designed for her as they can do without the Rice a Bengall ship having arrived them out of which they can be supplied.

HAVING had strong & Westerly Winds ever since the Express Boat sailed and it being imagined a Toney will overtake her on this side of Mangalore the Chief wrote a short Letter to the Governour advising him of the Cuddalore sloop's being safe at Anjengo.

Instant and that as it was too late in the season to send down any Pepper for the Cuddalore sloop we had sent orders to the Master of her to make the best of his way to Fort St. David after receiving what cloth they might think proper to tender him which we left to their Discretion to Do after acquainting them with the orders we received by the Elizabeth on this Head. THIS Day the Prince of Oden Quilote attended by Codooley Quelloo Nombier, Cocart Nombier and King of Cotiotes Rajadores came to the Fort with whom the Chief had a conference at which they related the steps hitherto taken, to prevent an Entire Subversion in the antient constitution of the country by the Princes of Cherrika aiming long since to usurp an absolute authority in the Government and to bereave them of their Hereditary Rights and Priviledges therein for the Preservation of which they have at last been obliged to take up arms and prosecute a War with no other view or motive whatever.

NOTWITHSTANDING the Prince of late has greatly derogated from his attachment to the Honble Companys interest still there is hoped he will be brought to a due Reflection of his Errors (when he hears of this Interview) and make such an atonement for his conduct as will reconcile all Differences and animosities subsisting between us and as our continuing to remain neuter in the present Quarrell between him and his uncles Family has, and will beyond all Doubt be a great means to accomplish so Desirable an End. For these reasons and to avoid putting in Execution the Resolutions of Council the 25th. Instant if possible. The Chief thought it unnecessary (and likewise very improper) to make a strict scrutiny into this affair or to promise assistance to Either party therefore in a Friendly manner assured them. We had with great concern observed for some time, the Discords subsisting and as we Earnestly desired to see a happy Reconciliation between the two Pallaces and unanimity to subsist therein he would write a suitable Letter on the occasion to the Regent recommending to him a due consideration thereof who would he hoped adhere to the Council but if otherwise they might Depend upon our acting a neutral Part as we had done hitherto unless Infringements were made upon the Honble Companys Priviledges and Grants obtained for carrying on a free Trade in the Dominions of Colastria, which they promised should not only be preserved inviolably but any others assigned that would any ways augment their Trade and after expressing themselves thoroughly well satisfied with what had passed at this Conference took their leave except Cocart Nombier who renewed the Discourse formerly taken notice of in our Diary under the 8th. of January last in respect to Boyanores being brought into the Province of Irreavadanaddu by our Prince. The four nombiers having he said heard the Design was in agitation and therefore judged it highly necessary to put that part of the country under the Protection of the Oden Quilote Pallace desiring in their Name the Chiefs Opinion Thereon who finding by the Discourse he wanted to force a Declaration from him whether he would in such

case act openly against the Prince or not. He replied that as it was an affair relating to the Laws and Customs of their Country they were the best judges how to proceed and frame a plan for their future conduct in which we should not interfere unless our masters property was concerned and any apparent Danger apprehended to ensue therefrom.

IMPORTED ship Doddington Captain Benjamin Mason Commr. from Bombay bringing a packet from the Honble. President and Council dated the 23^d. ultimo advising that not having heard from us by the Restoration Grab and being uncertain of any other conveyance going down the coast they now sent us ten Chests of Treasure amts. to Rupees one hundred thousand and Eight, and ten reas out of which they desire us to supply Anjengo Factory with what they may want Enclose us sundry Paragraphs of our Honble Masters commands by that ship relating to this settlement. And Direct a due obedience to be paid thereto, also remit copy of a notification sent to Surat relating to the Dutch Pretensions to an Exclusive right of Trade in Ophium &c^a. which when properly varied & signed by the Chief is to be affixed at the usual Places in our settlement. That understanding there is a small Parcel of Putchuck lying at Tellicherry for sale if we find it good they would have us purchase it at sixteen Rupees the Surat Maund. And as soon as that and the Sandall Wood formerly ordered are on board to give the Cammander orders to make the best of his way to Canton.

Imports ship Doddington fr. Bombay with a Packet from the Ho. Preside. & Council. receive Ten Chests of Treasure order us to supply Anjengo with what they may want. Several Parc. of our Ho. Masters commands enclosed regarding this settlement. Orders to Purchase a small Parcell of Putchuck laying here of good & when everything is loaded to give the Comdr. ordrs. to proceed to Ca [nton]. Lve from the Deputy Secy. of Bombay advising that Ensign Harris was relieved with his command. and had reced their pay to the last of April.

RECEIVED also a Letter from the Deputy Secretary by order of the Honble President and Council advising they had returned us on this ship Ensign George Harris with the Detachment consisting of One Serjeant one Corporal and twenty five private Men who have received their pay from the 1st. January last to the end of this Month and for whom Provisions were put on board for ten Days They also sent a Clock for the service of the Settlement the value of which they will advise in the next General Letter to this Factory.

AND as the season is far advanced the Board take into consideration the most Eligible method to give her the quickest Dispatch possible and the Chief having received advices from our Contractor for the Sandall Wood that we may expect the whole quantity by the 10th. Instant (three hundred Oxens Load being expected to arrive at Irracure as yesterday) It is AGREED to order the Commander to weigh anchor proceeding to the Northward and lay off Maddacarra untill that time for the readier receiving of the same and that Mr. John Robinson proceed thither for shipping it off with the utmost Expedition as it arrives which will be forwarding the Dispatch greatly and in case any bad weather should set in, on the Commanders signifying to him in writing that he cannot stay there any longer in safety he is DIRECTED to give him his Dispatches immediately consigning such quantity as may be shipped off to his Supra Cargoe at China.

THE Putchuck ordered to be provided for her being inspected part thereof is found to be worm eaten but the Persons who have the same charge being willing to let it be Garbled. The Board agree to give him sixteen Rupees the Surat Maund for such a quantity as can be picked out good and the Wareh^o. keeper is DIRECTED to set proper people about it accordingly.

REPERUSED Mr. Baldwin's Letter and the Samorine's ola to the Chief as entered in the Diary and finding that the latter evades giving a satisfactory answer though it is plain by the formers narrative that part of our Honble Masters property is saved the Chief is therefore desired to write him again on the occasion and require a positive answer whether he will deliver the same up or not.

THE Chief relates to the Board his Conference this Day with the Prince of Oden Quilote Cacart Nombier Codoley Quelloo Nombier and the King of Cotiotas Ministers which is approved of and hoped that this meeting will have a Effect with our Prince.

READ copy of our Honble masters Commands relating to this Settlement by their ship Doddington as transmitted us from Bombay which is ordered to follow this consultation.

Par^a. 18th. In case Mr. Frazer or any other of our servants at subordinate Settlements behave unbecomingly shew a proper Resentment by a suspension or Dismission from our service as you may judge proper.

As to the Dutch pretensions to an exclusive right of Trade in Ophium in the Streights of Malacca and to the Eastward as advised from Bengall and your place We utterly deny such Right and in such case should our ships be molested in carrying on our commerce do you empower the Commanders to resist such Hostilities and to make reprisals not only in Defence of themselves but also of English country ships with your Passes and British Commanders that may be in their Company Publick notice must be given thereof by affixing this our order up in the several Languages at every Factory as we are informed the Dutch fixed theirs up at Surat and other Places.

I have been favoured with your Royal Writing in consideration of the Friendship and the good correspondence between your Majesty and the Honble Company I wrote you in my first Letter the circumstances of the sloops being obliged through stress of weather to go into Penany River and then desired you would deliver up to any people the Cargoe as also the vessel to which you have not as yet returned me an answer. Your Majesty says that you did not receive any notice of the said vessels being stranded by the Treachery of your Subjects who purposely ran her on shore which I can give you clear proofs of therefore all I desire now is that you will please to acquaint me whether you will or not Deliver the Goods and Vessel to my people whom I have ordered to stay at Penany for the same.

I THOMAS BYFELD CHIEF OF TELLICHERRY and one of the Council for all Forces and Affairs of the Honble United East India Company under the Presidency of Bombay. To ALL TO WHOM these Presents may come Greeting.

WHEREAS the Dutch East India Company by the Chiefs of their respective Factories said to be by the authority of their General and Council at Batavia did in the year 1746 by notification affixed at their respective Factories pretend to an exclusive right of Trade in opium &c^a. as set forth in said notification. To the end therefore that those trading under the Protection of the Honble United English East India Company may not be discouraged from carrying on their lawful Trade and Commerce they have thought proper in their commands to their President and Council of Bombay dated the 17th. of June last not only utterly to deny such a right to belong to the Dutch East India Company but in case any of their ships should be molested in carrying on their Commerce have empowered their said President and Council to give the Commanders of them positive orders to resist such Hostilities and to make Reprizals not only in Defence of themselves but also of English Country ships carrying their Pass and navigated by a British Commander. The said H^o. United English East India Company being resolved and Determined to suffer no Infringement in their Trade and Commerce. And that every one may be apprized thereof this Declaration is ordered to be affixed at their several Factories in the East Indies.

GIVEN at Tellicherry in the Factory of the Honble English Company this 2^d. Day of May 1749. By ORDER of the Honble William Wake Esq^r. President of and for all affairs of the Honble United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies on the Coast of India Persia and Arabia Governour & Commander in Chief of his Majestys Castle of his Majestys Castle and Island Bombay and its Dependencies.

THE CHIEF wrote an Ola to the first King of Cotiote observing that his Majesty at an Interview he had with him (in the late Chiefs time) promised his assistance in the recovery of several sums outstanding in the hands of merchants Inhabitants of his country due to the Honble company and their merchants particularly Cocart Tupy's Debt and the Pepper seized at Pyachy but as he has not yet seen any methods taken for the same occasioned his now writing this Letter and hoped he would oblige Cocart Tupy and others to come to Tellicherry to adjust their several accounts and as Parraporem Cunhipy has not complied with his contract this year. He now sent four people to oblige him to it in which his Majestys assistance was likewise requested.

THE CHIEF wrote an Ola to Ally Rajah forwarding him a Letter from the Governour of Bombay (which was inclosed to him with a copy thereof) and assured him the Friendship subsisting between him and the Honble Company should be kept up on his part while he continued the same good Behaviour he had Experienced during his having the Administration of affairs here. And imagining if his Ambergrease cannot be sold it will be returned he was therefore desired to think of some other Methods to Discharge his Debt to the Honble Company.

THE Doddington dispatched the 2^d. Instant (as taken notice of in that Days Diary) being the last ship we may reasonably expect this season and there being no immediate Business of the Honble Companys that requires the Chiefs presence here at present. He this afternoon set out for Maddacarra with a Lieutenants Command of our Garrison soldiers and a Body of one hundred thirty seepoys, Calliquiloners and Nairs in order to put in Execution the Resolution of Council under the 21st. Ultimo in case he could not by persuasive means obtain satisfaction from the Prince for the many repeated Indignities and Insults committed by his Rajadores and subjects so frequently represented to him of late, leaving Mr. Alexander Douglas (as second) in charge of the Factory untill his Return.

ALTHOUGH the Weather is very clear at present with a prospect of its continuing so for some time still as the monsoon is so near its approach the season cannot be depended upon with certainty. Therefore that we may get what quantity of Sandall Wood may be attainable for the Doddington with as little risque as possible. It is AGREED that she be dispatched from Maddacarra without fixing any limited time and Mr. Secker being to accompany the Chief thither the following order is wrote to Captain Benjamin Mason accordingly.

The former article has not as yet been Deliv^d. owing to its Scarceness and impediment lain on all oxen in the Misure country this season but the Merchants advising us that a quantity of it was arrived at Irracure we immediately came to a Resolution to order the ship to lay off Maddacarra River till the 10th. Instant and at the same time sent Mr. Robinson one of the Covenanted servants to ship the same off or such part as he might be able and that in case of bad Weather to dispatch the ship invoicing such Goods as she might have received to that time consigning the same to you at Canton This we thought necessary to advise you of but hope however she will be able to call here before she proceeds on her Voyage.

MADDACARRA MAY THE 4TH. 1749.

THURSDAY
4TH. EARLY this Morning the Chief received the following ola from the Prince dated yesterday in answer to one wrote him the 3^d. Instant.

Prince Ola
from. I have received your Letter and observe from the Relation given me by Ambu Canapulla that the Prince of Oden Quilote has been with you. In times past I never heard that any one belonging that Palace ever had a Meeting with the Chiefs of Telli-cherry at a time they were my Enemies, and its happening now I can only observe to be my bad Fortune. I observe what you say in respect to the Differences between them and me and your advice to accommodate the same in the best manner I can they having (as you alledge) reasons for breaking with me which makes me imagine they have not told the truth, you set forth that my Proceedings now are no ways consistent with the professions and the Good Will I profess to the Honble Company. My actions especially since your being Chief have shewn my good Inclinations to the Co. and yourself and which I shall continue to observe during Life this I Declare with sincerity. Notwithstanding I am thus inclined you misbelieve one side with my Enemies which is my misfortune. Your advice to accommodate the Differences between the Pallace of Oden Quilote and me I readily accept of and hope as in the time of my late Brother the company will consider what are the proper steps to be taken for preserving the Union of the two Palaces. For further particulars I referr you to Ambu Canapulla.

AMBU Canapulla the Bearer of this Ola and to whom the Prince referred the Chief for other particulars appeared by his Discourse to be rather sent as a spy than charged with any affairs of consequence therefore was told by him in Direct Terms the Prince had by many frivolous Excuses denied the reasonable satisfaction hitherto required for the abuses of late received which if longer Delayed would

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oblige him to act counter to his Inclinations for obtaining suitable Redress Therefore if his Highness was disposed to preserve and maintain inviolably that Friendship and regard he professes to have for the Honble Company and their Interest immediate resolutions would be taken by him to accommodate these Differences in an amicable manner declaring withall, a willing and ready inclination to receive and adhere to any reasonable proposals for bringing these Disputes and controversies to so Desirable an End.

CAPTAIN BENJAMIN MASON having at his own request had a Moopa and twelve Calliquilone Moors sent on board the Doodington at Tellicherry Two Toneys are ordered to go on board every night to bring them on shore in case by any sudden change of Weather the ship should be obliged to put off Directly of which he is acquainted by Letter from Mr. Robinson and told therein that in case any of them are taken away their Families must be supported at the owners Expence.

THE Prince writes to the Chief that he will meet him here on the morrow.

THIS afternoon the Prince came hither with whom the Chief had a long Conference and seeming to be made apparently sensible of his injurious conduct towards the Honble Company by adhering to the base council of those Rajadores who have been the Instigators and abettors of all the late Differences and at the same time showing a real concern for the same. The Chief thought this a convenient opportunity not only to get such evil Disposed Persons expelled out of the country but an absolute Grant for holding the Island of Maddacarra with whatever advantages and profits were belonging thereto in order to maintain the Garrison there also all pretensions whatever given up to Vessels and Goods Wrecked in his country belonging to the Honble Company or Merchants trading under their protection that all contests concerning the same might be avoided Declaring to the Prince that if these Resolutions were not taken it was impossible that an effectual Tranquility could subsist or be of any long Duration w^{ch}. after many Expostulations he seemed to adhere to. But as Prince Gogo (who is the Elder Branch of the Family and by right of Inheritance the actual Regent though he has given the Executive part of Government to his Brother Cunhi Ram being more inclinable to live a retired and religious Life) must be acquainted with all publick negotiations of this kind and not being present no Direct answer could be given thereto on the conclusion thereof was Deferred untill another Meeting which the Prince proposed to have in a Day or two took his Leave with the most solemn Professions of Friendship and a seeming Pleasure at the appearance there was of settling the present Disputes subsisting A Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo to Mr. Robert Baldwin Master of their sloop at Penany being forwarded to the Chief from Calicut the same is opened as possibly something material may be contained in respect to the Honble Company's property.

"They Express a concern for the Loss of our Honble Master's Sloop and declare they see no room to blame the Masters conduct as he acted in the best manner for the security of both vessel and cargoe approve of his writing us & Direct that he observe all orders we may transmit him in future, not doubting but he has given Information of three private Bales on board that they may be Demanded likewise. The Letter is dated the 24th. ultimo."

THE CHIEF received the following Ola from the Prince viz.

I have acquainted my Brother with our Conference which he approves and is continued with whatever the Company may judge necessary to be done however in order to humble my Enemies it is proper you should assist me as in times past. Tomorrow I expect you at Cherrika to consider of every thing.

It appearing by the contents of this Ola that the Prince is inclinable to accommodate the present Differences subsisting in an amicable manner the Chief accepts of his Invitation and returned him with a complimentary Message on the occasion by the Bearer thereof.

THIS Day the Chief set out for Cherrika accompanied by Mess^{rs}. Robinson and Secker where he had an audience with the Princes Gogo and Cunhi Ram at which the following articles were agreed upon to be mutually signed and Exchanged in order to put a final Period to the present Animosities and to renew the ancient Friendship subsisting between the Pallace of Pally and the Honble Company.

WHEREAS for sometime past Differences have subsisted between the Pallace of Pally Quilote and the Honble Company. In order to put an End to which and avoid the like happening in future so as to keep and preserve the antient Friendship formerly Established the following articles are agreed upon and inviolably to be kept between the Prince of Cotacuna Uni Tamba and the Prince Regent Cunhi Ram at a Conference held by them with Thomas Byfeld Esq^r. Chief of Tellicherry assented and mutually signed to in the Pallace of Cherrika this 8th. Day of May 1749.

FIRST Christna Cutty PUTTERAH having by his base Proceedings been the Chief occasion of these Differences, The Princes of Cotacuna and Cherrika on their parts and in Behalf of their Heirs promise from this time forward to expell him the country. His Brothers Ananda Narraina Putterah and Anna Cutty Putterah likewise Chittil Rama Putterah with all their Families and not to permit them to enter the Dominions of Colaestria in future. In which should any of them return They the Princes oblige themselves to treat them with the utmost Rigour and in case the Company should detect any of them The Princes give Liberty to transport them to whatever Place shall be thought proper by the Chief for the time being. He in Behalf of the Company promising no motive whatever shall induce them to give them or their Families any Protection or countenance in future.

SECONDLY WHEREAS there is reason to suspect Saben Cutty Putterah and Camall Mopla are people ill inclined The Princes Declare and Promise That from this Day forward they shall have no management in the Government nor shall pass the River of Billiapatam so as to settle in the northern part of the country which that River bounds.

THIRDLY WHEREAS the Honble Company has frequently afforded succours to the Pallace of Cherrika by assisting them with Money arms men &c^a. and built several Fortifications since the Grant was given by the King Badencalamcur and Prince Cunhi Homo in order to protect the country at a very Extraordinary Expence. The Princes of Cotacuna and Cunhi Raman of the Pallace of Pally to show this great affections and Zeal give absolutely from this time Forward the Island of Maddacarra to the Honble English Company Extending from the creek Imoit Adaro southw^d. to Imay Creek northward from the Companys Fort of Maddacarra Westward to the Creek called Imay Eastward with all Priviledges Profits Lands and Emoluments of what kind soever belonging thereunto. To cultivate and improve the same in such manner as they may think proper. Declaring to have from this time forward no Pretensions or Claim whatever GIVING & GRANTING to the Chief of Tellicherry for the time being full and absolute Power to Govern and administer Justice on said Island as practised at Tellicherry He promising on behalf of the Company to give the said Princes their Heirs &c^a. Five Thousand Dungoys of Nelly annually to be distributed by them to such Braminees and Pagodas who have heretofore had Land on said Island in order to prevent any Disputes in future which Grants the Princes promise to defend against any claimant whatever.

FOURTHLY ALL VESSELS of what kind soever that are drove on shore by stress of Weather or other accidents in the Dominions of Colaestria are by the Mallabar Laws and Customs the Sovereigns Property But the Chief having given various Proofs that the same may be Prejudicial to the Honble Company. The Princes of Colaestria Promise in future that if any accident of that kind soever should happen hereafter not to take to themselves

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the whole or any part of such vessels Goods &c*. belonging to the Honble Company or such Merchants who have their Colours and Passes of Protection but all others whatever are excluded the Benefit of this agreement unless such Wrecks are Drove on shore within reach of the Honble Companys Guns and if any other Power or Persons act contrary to this article the Company are hereby empowered to take such satisfaction as they shall think proper.

IN CONFIRMATION of which the Princes of Cherrika have signed the foregoing articles in the Mallabar Language and Delivered the same the Day and Year above written To Thomas Byfeld Esqr. Chief of Tellicherry. In exchange of which he now Delivers this counterpart in English under his hand and the seal of the Honble United English East India Company.

THE Prince was likewise very pressing with the Chief to assist him against the Oden Quilote Pallace for Prosecuting (as he said a very unjust War in the Country who replied as formerly that till a thorough Examination was made how the Disputes first arose and what occasioned them to subsist he could by no means enter into an offensive alliance with him against that Family but would if he thought proper endeavour to put affairs between them upon the same footing as they were in five years past (being very certain it was all the House of Capaut desired) which he agreed to and the following article was drawn up accordingly to be annexed to the foregoing.

FIFTHLY THE Pallace of Oden Quilote having a Difference at this present time subsisting with the Pallace of Pally concerning their Priviledges in this Country. To put an end to which in an amicable manner the Princes of Cherrika Do hereby give Power to Thomas Byfeld Esqr. Chief of Tellicherry to put the true Heirs of said Pallace in Possession of their Rights Lands & as were held by them five Years past since when what Fortifications and Lands may have been taken by either party shall be restored to Each other. And if this Proposition should not be consented to by the Pallace of Oden Quilote. The Chief promises to join the Honble Company's Forces with those of the Pallace of Pally Quilote to oblige them to the same so as to prevent the ruin of the Country and to keep it in a state of Tranquility. They the Princes of Cherrika obliging themselves to pay daily such charges as may ensue by affording this assistance.

but while it was transcribing he altered his Resolution and told the Chief he did not doubt but by the solemn promise just now made him the part of a sincere Friend would be shown therefore he saw no occasion for Executing the same though its thought his real motive was not absolutely declaring therein that the Princes of Oden Quilote are the aggressors and that the Company would compell them to accept of such Terms as the Prince might think proper to Grant which he frequently desired might be mentioned but as often denied for many substantial reasons especially as the subduing that Pallace putting it under a state of subserviency to the Pally Quilote Branch would prevent us applying for and supporting their Interest should we be in want thereof to quash or frustrate any Destructive schemes that may be attempted against us in future.

Just as the Chief was leaving the Pallace he received a Message for the Mother Queen (who is upwards of seventy years of age and bedridden) expressing an Earnest Desire to see him and being introduced to her by Prince Cunhi Ram (the Regent) she begged to be acquainted if affairs were accommodated and in what manner and being told by the Chief to General satisfaction. She turned round to her son and very affectionately enjoined him never to give the least umbrage or cause for complaint in future especially to those who had not only been the Protectors but assisted the Pallace of Pally in the utmost Distress desiring him to

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remember it as her last Parental Council and advice which after promising to adhere to with the greatest Respect and Reverence as he took him by the hand and said to the Chief.

“ This my son I deliver to you as the representative of the best of Friends whose Favour and Protection I fervently request for him desiring their Interest may be for ever united and no Discords or Divisions subsist “hereafter.” Which the Chief told her was what the Company most earnestly wished for and after making many repeated Professions and regard one for the other with the usual compliments he took his Leave.

By return of our Munchuas sent with Rice to Anjengo we received a Letter from the Chief and Factors there dated the 23^d. ultimo acknowledging Receipt of the Eight hundred Bales of Rice sent them desiring an account thereof when we settle the same with the contractor. Inform us they have a report from Porca that the Anjengo sloop was lost at Penany and that the Honble Company's cloth was seized by the Moors. That the Corporal and four Europeans sent on board the Cuddalore sloop from hence were returned to the Munchuas who having had Eighteen Rupees advanced them they desire the same may be brought to their credit.

M^r. DOUGLAS having forwarded the Chief a Letter received from Anjengo by an Express Balloon the same is now opened and found to be dated the 2^d. Instant dispatched they say purposely to request at least a supply of Thirty Thousand Rupees (R^s. 30000. —. —.) not having heard of any Treasure being designed them from the Presidency at a time they have a cloth contract to make for Thirty Thousand Pieces and probably a Pepper one shortly neither of which can be fulfilled without it therefore Desire the same may be sent immediately the Weather being fair and no appearance of a change which makes them hope it will continue so till next full moon. Advise us Mr. Baldwin is returned with the sloops crew from whom they received a confirmation of her Loss purely by the Villainy of the Moors at Penany and hope we shall be able both to get satisfaction for her and her Cargoe as they do not imagine the Samorine will protect them in their bare faced Villainy. That the Cuddalore Sloops was Dispatched for Fort St. David without a Bale of cloth not having any packed. As to the Rice they cannot say where it was lost but seem surprised that we should find a surplus on weighing and measuring One hundred Bales as such honesty they never heard of amongst Mallabars and their Factory is still the more unfortunate as the last eight hundred Bales fell twenty short of what they should contain.

READ the Letter from Anjengo as Extracted in the preceding Diary by which it is observed the Chief and Factors there cannot carry on the Honble Companys Investment without an immediate supply of Thirty Thousand Rupees (R^s. 30000. —. —.) and being Directed by the Presidency to comply with their Indents in respect to this article It is proposed that as the Weather continues clear to send that sum away immediately by two Toneys packed up in fifteen good Gunny Bags secured with Buoys and Buoy Ropes and that Serjeant Domingo Gonsalves with nine Topasses be sent with it and orders given him to proceed up Cochin River in case he finds it impracticable to proceed further by sea without running a great Risque which is agreed to.

WE are informed that such heavy showers of rain have fell within these few Days Inland that the Oxen cannot Travel at present and which will certainly make it at least five or six Days before a sufficient quantity of Sandall Wood is bro^t. down

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from the Hills to make up the two hundred candies required for ship Doddington (who has now on board one hundred thirty three candies nine maunds and twenty six pounds (Ca^a. 133.9.26). There is at present no prospect of a sudden change of Weather but as its very late in the season we apprehend a further Detention may be attended with Risque to avoid it. It is AGREED to give the Commander his Dispatches tomorrow at farthest.

AGREEABLE to this Days Resolution of Council a short Letter was wrote the Chief and Factors of Anjengo acknowledging receipt of theirs to us and acquainting them that we observed the great uneasiness they were under for want of money and having orders from our Superiors to supply them we now sent Thirty Thousand Rupees and should before had they applied for it under the care of a serjeant and Wine men whom we desired might be returned to us overland. That the Loss of Rice must certainly be owing to the Difference between their Measure and Ours no Mallabars as they seem to intimate having had it in their power to pilfer the same nor have we reason to suspect our contractor has imposed upon us but for a greater Certainty one of our Measures shall be sent after the Rains to compare with theirs though if the same had been weighed we should have been better Judges having as we advised them before tried One hundred Bales that turned out more than the quantity we ought to receive. In other particulars they would hear from us very fully shortly P^{at} Pattamar.

THIS Letter was sent under cover of another from the Chief to Mr. Douglas for his and Mr. Water's Perusal with Directions to get the Money packed up and sent away immediately by serjeant Domingo Gonsalves agreeable to what mentioned in the preceding Consultation to whom the Chief likewise delivered a suitable Letter wrote on the occasion to the Commodore of Cochin desiring his assistance in case our Toney's should put in there by stress of Weather or otherwise.

THE Chief received the following ola from King Badencalamcur and returned a Message by the Bearer of it that he would wait upon him to morrow at Billiapatam.

IN a Writing to the late Prince Cunhi Homo of Cherrika I yeilded up to him the Government of the country as I have now done by another Royal Grant to Unni Homo and Cunhi Ram Princes of Cherrika and have on my part further agreed to remain in that part of the country belonging to my Family which is bound to the southward by the River Quilavelly and to the northward by Mattamy and Urbelly so as to have no further Disputes. I am therefore Earnestly Desirous of having a meeting with you.

THIS afternoon the Chief proceeded to Billiapatam and being informed that King Badencalamcur could not come out of the Fort without the Princes permission (though frequently in Discourse he had given his assurances he was under no manner of restriction whatever) he sent a Messenger to him for obtaining his Liberty which being Granted his Majesty came to the old Linguists house situated by the River side and represented in very moving Terms the deplorable state he was reduced to even very little better than that of perpetual slavery, being taken out of his Pallace and imprisoned without giving the least offence whatever to the Regent Princes of Pally Quilote who in a manner have forced him to Execute a Grant for relinquishing all Pretentions to the hereditary Rights of the Oden Quilote Pallace bounded by the River Quilavelly Mattamy and Urbelly which is almost the whole of his Possessions by Declaring that unless it was complied with his Freedom could not be obtained which being before drawn up and brought him by Ambu Conna Capulla he signed in hopes of getting free thereby from his Imprisonment and now acted on the Honble Companys Friendship so often experienced in former Times to see the Distracted situation of the country settled in an equitable and

just manner and not by an entire subversion of his Pallace to a younger Branch of the Colastria family. All which he was told should be duely enquired into and any good offices of Friendship done him on the occasion that was in the Companys Power when he withdrew the Prince just then arriving at Cherrika whose Chief Errand was to discourse on the foregoing subject and to show the Chief the Grant obtained as following Translate thereof.

THE ROYAL WRITING of King Badencalamcur to Unamon and Cunhi Ram Princes of Cherrika May the 9th. 1749.

FORMERLY I gave a writing to Cunhi Homo late Prince of Cherrika relinquishing to him in the manner he desired the Government of the country as also that of the Pallace of Oden Quilote which Grant I now again renew Cunhi Naru who came lately from Travencore and Ambu of the Northern Pallace both joined with the Evil minded Moors burnt the Pallace of Erothe the Bizar of Tiruvanicattu killing the Weavers inhabiting therein as also Committing several acts of Hostility against the Poor Inhabitants of the Country burning their Houses breaking Down and burning the Places inhabited by the Braminees. Upon their committing these unwarrantable acts and Disturbances in their Country without any Grounds of reason you sent me word that if they did not return to their former obedience they would go against the Pallace of Oden Quilote wherefore I sent for all my Heirs and gave them my friendly advice which they did not care to listen to when Hostilities immediately commenced since then I have frequently called them together and told them they ought to behave as formerly but without paying any regard to my advice they left me and still continued hostilities.

King Badencalamcur's Grant to the Princes of cherrika.

I have been here with you and you have been at some Expence to quell those who have raised the Disturbances in the country for which reason I make over to you from the River Quilavally to Urbelly southward everything belonging to the Family of Oden Quilote as well verge Lands as oarts and you might to let them peaceably enjoy every thing that belongs to the Family from the River Quilavally and Mattumel Urbelly northward but if they refuse those Terms you may then proceed against them after such manner as you deem most proper for the safety and good of the country and for which I give my consent but you ought to protect me my Heir Quiput and our Country giving us a sufficient maintenance and upon these conditions it is I give my consent as also that of the Pallace of Oden Quilote with this my Writing to Unamon and Cunhi Raman of the House of Pally Quilote for them to govern the country witnessed by Tecum Cutticarum, Parracanor, Baddaquem, Cutticarion Porrcanor and Collasonetingel Parradevadda who are Gods.

THIS being repugnant apparently to the Honble Companys Interest as a compliance will certainly reduce the Pallace of Oden Quilote to a state of subserviency the Chief expatiated with the Prince a considerable time thereon representing the illegality of his proceedings to obtain his uncles possessions (that he had no Pretensions to) at a time he was under confinement and severe restrictions which made the whole action appear so very Tyrannical and arbitrary that it could be of no validity and only serve to defame his Character therefore hoped after duely weighing all circumstances he would relinquish all Thoughts of that kind and return the Grant which at last he delivered the Chief with full Power to do therewith as he thought proper though at the same time enjoined him to accommodate affairs and obtain some satisfaction for the Hostilities lately committed by his uncle's Family. But he was given to understand that unless the King was set at Liberty it could not be adhered to which was soon Granted and performed by the Prince in the Chiefs Presence who then assured him that the necessary steps should be taken for bringing about a happy Reconciliation between the two Pallaces and seeming thoroughly satisfied therewith he took his leave. After which the Chief had a second meeting with the King to whom he related the several Passages that had passed between him and the Prince for which he Expressed himself greatly obliged, declaring such Demonstrations of Friendship would for ever attack his Pallace to the Honble Company's Interest and that he was willing to accede to any Terms that might be

conducive to restoring Peace and Tranquility in the country therefore as the Prince seems to expect some acknowledgments and being at a great Expence in keeping up a standing army for the Defence of the Kingdom (especially of late years) which the Oden Quilote family have contributed very little to the support of It is proposed to make over the Lands and Estates belonging to that Pallace from the southward of Cherrica Cuna for that purpose w^{ch}. being agreed to the following Royal Grant was Executed and Deliv^d. in the Chiefs Presence to the Princes Rajahdores Annanda Cropp Conna Croop and Amboo Canacapalla who accepted of the same in behalf of their Prince after which the King took his Leave and was accompanied to his Pallace by ten Nairs in the Honble Companys monthly Pay.

TRANSLATE of the King Badencalamcur his Royal Grant to the Princes of Cherrica signed the 11th. Day of May 1749.

King Badencalamcur's Grant to the Prince of Cherrica.

OBSERVING the Dissentions that have happened between my Heirs and Unnamon and Cunhi Raman of Pally Quilote proceed from many unwarrantable actions committed by them in the Country and considering the Priviledges granted formerly by my ancestors to the Pallace of Pally Quilote I do of my own free will and accord in presence of Thomas Byfeld Esq^r. Chief of Tellicherry now consent that Unimon and Cunhi Raman enjoy all the Estate belonging to my family southward of Cherrica Cuna provided myself and heirs possess the Remainder of our inheritance without any further acts of Hostility or oppression being committed in the country which is to be preserved in a state of Tranquility and if any of my Heirs act a contrary part I will then in such case join my Forces with those of the Honble Company where they unite with Unimons and Cuni Ramons for bringing them to a state of obedience.

The Chief returns to Tellicherry.

EARLY this Morning the Chief set out for Tellicherry leaving Mess^r. Robinson and Secker to take a state of Maddacarra Island that some Judgment may be formed of the Annual Revenues thereof and the Improvements that may be made thereon of which they are to deliver a report in Writing.

Winchelsea lost & several more.

A PATTAMAR arrived with a Letter from the Honble President & Council at Fort St. David dated the 21st. Ultimo acquainting us that the Winchelsea after making a further attempt to gain her passage round Ceylone not being able to effect it returned again the 7th. Instant and very unfortunately with forty four more vessels was wrecked by a very hard Gale of Wind that they had on the 13th. and 14th. Instant amongst which number were his Majestys ships Namur and Pembroke both of which were at anchor in their Road untill the 13th. in the Evening when they cut or slipt their cable and endeavouring to get out to sea but the Wind being far Easterly they could neither of them Weather Cauldron point which lies to the southward of their place about ten Leagues wherefore the former came too and very soon after foundered & the latter struck as she was endeavouring to get round it with all the sails she could get and split immediately on board of which ships about nine hundred and fifty men perished and not above thirty five saved their Lives. That the Lincoln with the Winchelsea came on shore about a quarter of a mile to the southward of the Fort and lost very few of their people. The Hulls of which ships are entire but our Honble Masters ship Princess Augusta that was wrecked a few Miles to the southward had several of her Men drowned. They are not without apprehensions, the Apollo Man of War shared the same fate as there is no news of her and she was seen in the height of the storm very near in shore close by a place called Devah Cotah where they are informed a ship was wrecked but cant tell if it is her. The Tartar Deal Castle and Swallow sloop Men of war with the Honble Company's ship Edgebastion that were all going to the southward carried away all their Masts the three former of which are now in their Road and the latter in Pondicherry very much shattered where Mr. Duplex has greatly assisted her. The Somerset Royal George and Rhoda who arrived their the 16th. from Bengall met with the Gale off Ceylone but very fortunately none but the Rhoda suffered any thing to speak of which ship was very near being overset the Wind having lain

her upon her Broad side when her cargo shifted in her hold but upon her cutting away her Top mast she soon righted though is shattered a good Deal as is also several country ships that are now lying in their road of which a number also was wrecked and some of them belonging to the French and Dutch. That the 7th. Instant they received advice of the unfortunate ship Pembroke who arrived that Day from Columbo that the Syren Man-of War of twenty Guns left England the 28th. of August and had put in there the greatest part of her people being sick and that when she came away with a Packet for Admiral Boscawen mention was made of a Peace though the same was not proclaimed but great Preparations were making for it and the ships of our nation had free access to the French and Spanish Ports. That they are in daily expectation of seeing her with them and Expect a Packet from the Hon^{ble} Court of Directors as they are informed she has brought them some Treasure.

THE Shybar that sailed hence the 7th. ultimo having received some Damage in the late Storm and since met with strong N Westerly Winds and Southerly Currents returned hither the Noquidah of which Delivers our Packet sent by him to the Hon^{ble} President & Council of Bombay.

A Packet delivered back by the Noquidah of a Shybar w^{ch} was designed for Bombay.

THE CHIEF received for answer to the ola wrote the King of Cotiote that in order to enable the merchant Inhabitants of his country to pay off what they may be enabled to the Hon^{ble} Company we ought at a proper time to advance them money and contract with them as formerly which was the only method he could think of.

THE Chief received an answer to the Letter wrote Ally Rajah promising that nothing on his part should be wanting to keep up the friendship at present subsisting between the H^o. Company and his Family.

THE CHIEF wrote the following Ola to the Prince of Oden Quilote.

SATURDAY
13TH.

When I went to Maddacarra I had an interview with the Prince of Cherrika with whom after having finished other affairs I took the opportunity of talking to them about the Differences between your place and theirs. Their Highness thereupon shewed me a writing given them by King Badencalamcur which so soon as I had perused I found to be extremely rigorous and unreasonable but after a great deal of trouble I got it altered prevailed with the young Princes to release King Badencalamcur. After this the said Princes with their Uncle entered into articles of agreement between each other which are greatly for the Benefit of the country. In order therefore for your consenting likewise its necessary you send hither two or three of your Rajadores in whom you have the greatest confidence. King Badencalamcur is now returned to his pallace.

Prince of Oden Quilote Lre to.

ONE of our Calliquilone Moors not being able to keep company with others coming from Billiapatam the other Day set down to rest himself near the Pagoda of Choel Mallom where he fell asleep and had his arms taken from him and complaining thereof to the Chief he sent a Guard of Nairs with him to enquire for the same and to acquaint the Prince therewith instead of which they brought four suspected Persons Prisoners who being his subjects were immediately sent to Cherrika and the Linguist directed to write a suitable Ola on the occasion the substance of which is as follows.

The arms of Calliquilone Stolen.

THAT when the Chief set out from Billiapatam two of his Calliquilone Moors being tired staid in the Porch of Choel Mallom where they fell asleep and on waking found one of their arms missing and informing the Chief thereof he Directed four Nairs to accompany this Man to Cherrika instead of which they went to the prementioned place and took up four suspected people which he now sent by order of the Chief that his Highness might Examine them strictly especially Mundaadda who shows by his fear a great consciousness of Guilt.

THE CHIEF received an answer to the Ola wrote the Samorine wch. is as follows.

I have received your Letter and must acquaint you that whatsoever Vessel comes ashore by Storm or otherwise immediately becomes my property and as this therefore is the ancient Custom I cannot depart from it I hope this will cause no Difference between me and the Honble Company.

MESS^{rs}. ROBINSON & SECKER having taken a state of Maddacarra Island arrive from thence and Deliver the following Report.

AGREEABLE to Directions given us by the Chief at Maddacarra we have taken a state of that Island Report of which we now deliver you and according to the last accounts we could get at that time the same will bring the Honble Company in annually Fifty one thousand seven hundred nineteen Dungoys and an half of Nelly being what the Renters tell us they paid to the Prince but on asking his Rajadores for an account of the same they told us they laid no stipulated Rent on any particular person but took such a consideration from them as might be thought reasonable at the reaping of the crop. So that we propose (with your approbation) in the Month of July or August to take Venedores and survey it again when the Nelly will be grown up to such a height as will enable them to form a just Judgement of what is reasonable for Each man to pay.

THE whole of the Island was not Cultivated though the same appeared to us to be as good Land as that which was sown and is owing we imagine to want of people or from the heavy oppressions usually laid on the Renters by the Prince's Ministers it is also capable of further Improvement towards the Rivers side which is now overrun with Bushes for the most part round the Island which if cut down would make Exceeding good Salt Pans which we imagine will now be Easy to get People to undertake on giving them the same Rent free for a term of Years for Defraying the charges they may be at in the undertaking.

We are told by those who are competent judges that the whole Island is a very Rich soil and capable of further Improvements both as to Extending the verge Lands and planting coconut Trees (which latter there is not at present twenty off) though the same may be planted on the Banks of their Verges and hereafter bring in a considerable Revenue to the Honble Company which you will form a better judgement of by Mr. James Hogg's Report whom we left measuring the Island.

The Princes Ministers in our presence summoned the Inhabitants of Maddacarra and the Renters of the Lands Thereon and made a publick Declaration of the Prince's Gift of the same to the Honble Company Declaring from that Day forward his Masters having relinquished all right and Title to the same and that there living there were under the Honble Companys Protection Directing them to pay a due obedience to the orders of the Chief of Tellicherry.

THE Linguist presents the Princes answer to his Ola dated the 14th. Instant wherein he says he greatly suspects Mundiadda who shall have a further Trial and if no clear Proofs are brought against him he shall dip his hand in Oil to prove his Innocence.

THE CHIEF advised the Prince of Cherrika that he had wrote the Princes of Oden Quilote to send hither their Rajadores for settling the Differences between them and him and as his Presence would be absolutely necessary desired he would come to Tellicherry before them in order to accommodate the same if possible but if his occasions required his Presence at Cherrika then to send hither immediately Ananda Croop Ambu Writer Conna Croop or Pattaby.

RECEIVED an answer for the Prince to the above promising he would come hither in three or four Days at farthest. WEDNESDAY 17TH.

THE Chief received an Ola from Anjengo or the 5th. King of the Oden Quilote Family advising that the Chief was well acquainted with what have passed in the Pallace of Addutulla and that he understood through the Chiefs. means his uncle Badencalamour is returned to his own Pallace with which he is greatly pleased and whatever he may have to propose he shall readily adhere to and risques to the Chief will endeavour to prevail with his Uncle to let him live in the Pallace with him as since he has been from thence drinking bad water he has been very ill. That he intends coming to Tellicherry in hopes the Chief will settle matters for him to his advantage as during the Differences in the country he has remained neuter. THURSDAY 18TH.

WROTE the following Letter to the Samorine in answer to his ola received the 15th. Instant.

I have received your Letter and am concerned at the answer you have been pleased to return in respect to the sloop and her Cargoe which little agrees with the Desire you seem to have that there may be no Differences between your Majesty and the Honble Company and in some measure shows that you have already forgot the services done yourself also your Predecessors in the assistance which has been afforded you of Men Money &c^a. even now the Debt which your Majesty acknowledges by your several Olas no part thereof has been paid not even the first payment all which the Honble Company have patiently put with in order to preserve the antient Friendship between you and them and instead of your Majestys acknowledging such considerable services you now want to rob them of a sloop and cargoe as if she belonged to your Enemy upon so slight a pretence that it was formerly the custom for all vessels that came on shore whether by storm or otherwise belonged to you. I have already and do now again advise you that the said sloop was not obliged through stress of Weather or any other accident to run ashore but on the contrary went into the River of Penany in good condition where by the Villanous persuasion of your vessels to the Captain she got Damaged. But suppose she was orally drove ashore and became a Wreck how can your Majesty retaliate the many favours you have received from the Honble Company. Upon your Majestys considering what I have wrote I hope you will be inclined to deliver up the sloop and cargoe if not I am obliged in behalf of the Honble Company to protest against your Majesty for all Damages whatever arising from your Majestys Detention of said Sloop and Cargoe. OUR contractor for Sandall Wood having fell short of the quantity he was to deliver and being called upon to give in his reasons for the same He observes that when this article was engaged for he did not positively assure us the whole quantity contracted for would be delivered, but on the contrary made a scruple of the same from the King of Misure having lain an Impediment on this article being exported out of his Country which together with the Excessive rains that fell inland prevented its coming down to him at Irracure as the oxen on which it is brought were unable to travel and as these circumstances were fully proved to the Board to be the real cause of this Disappointment It is AGREED at our Contractors Request to receive back the Ballance of money remaining in his hands on this account and represent the same to Bombay for our superiors Approbation as he engages should they want the quantity to be made Good the ensuing year He will comply therewith as soon as the season admits.

Agreed to receive the Bals. back from the Sandal wood merchant he having given sufficient reasons for not complying with his contract.

Messrs. Robinson & Secker their report of Maddascarra taken into consideration.

They likewise deliver in a report of remains of Pepper in Warehouse.

& the great loss in Pepper appearing not to be from Pilfrage or fraudulenc[e] Practices Agreed to write the same off.

MESS^s. Robinson and Secker deliver in their Report of the Island of Maddacarra (as entered in the Diary under the 11th. Instant) which is ordered to lay on the Table for further consideration.

THEY likewise deliver in a report of the Remains of Pepper in Warehouse this day and an account currant of the General Receipts and Issues of this article from the 31st. December 1743 to this time whereby it appears there is so great a Loss in Weight as one thousand five hundred twenty seven candies sixteen maunds seventeen Pounds and an half which arises from Drying, wastage in Garbling and its being worm eaten for a Proof of which last particular they produce a Muster of the same and as it appears to the Board there is no room to suspect there has been any pilferage or other fraudulent Practises committed in the Warehouse. It is AGREED to write the same off and advise our superiors at Bombay of the same sending them the above Musters after the Rains and that for the future there be an allowance made for Loss in Weight on this article annually which has not been done ever since December 1743 and makes this Loss appear the more considerable by writing it off at once though it arises on Eighteen Thousand five hundred sixty two candies twenty four Pounds and an half received since that time and is nearest [lacuna] $\frac{7}{8}$ cent.

Agreed to discharge all the Sepoys having great reason to believe a Peace is concluded on.

THERE being great reason to imagine by the advices from Fort St. David that a Peace is long ere this concluded and our superiors at Bombay having recommended to us the lessening of our Garrison charges as soon as prudence will admit the same is now taken into consideration and agreed that we discharge all the sepoys except one hundred of the new raised ones (which may be picked from the whole) including the Carwar ones formerly in pay and that the Old Calliquilone Moors be made up one hundred which with our Garrison soldiers is judged sufficient to prevent a sudden surprise especially as we can raise a number of Tiveys and Nairs at a short warning. But as the Differences between the Princes of Cherrika and the Oden Quilote Family are not yet adjusted it is not deemed prudent to put this Design immediately in Execution least being Discharged by us and paid off they might go and side with Either party and so create fresh Troubles in the country. It is therefore AGREED to Defer this Business a few Days longer as we hope every thing will be settled between them in an amicable manner and prevent any suspicions on this Head.

READ the Chiefs Ola to the Samorine as entered in the Diary the 18th. Instant which is approved.

The Treasury account for last month being presented is examined and Passed and Mess^s. Water's and Secker are DIRECTED to examine the Ballance being Rupees three thousand four hundred fifty two three Quarters and sixty four reas and make a report thereof to the Board.

THIS Evening Mr. James Hog our Gunner returned from Maddacarra and reports that he has measured the Island which is in length one mile four hundred eighteen Decimals, Breadth Two hundred forty two Decimals and contains in the whole one million four hundred forty nine thous^d. seven hundred thirty one square yards.

THE CHIEF answered the 5th. King of Badencalamcurs Letter acquainting him he was well pleased to hear his Transactions with the Princes of Cherrika for the good of the country in General and the two contending Pallaces proved agreeable and that he should be glad to see him at Tellicherry with the other princes of Oden Quilote whose affairs he would endeavour to settle with the Princes of Cherrika likewise.

THE Prince intending to make his family a visit at Cartanadu called at the Fort upon passing the District when the Chief represented to him the absurdity of his present journey it being at a time his country was in the utmost confusion which made it necessary for him to be in Person in those parts to the northward where his adversaries were daily ravaging and oppressing the Inhabitants many of whom had revolted from their Obedience to him and others would certainly be led to follow the same steps under the apprehensions of being Deserted or Neglected by him which might prove of the most pernicious consequence to his affairs therefore he was very pressinglly advised to relinquish his present intentions and return to Cherrika which council he soon adhered to and desired a Guard of our Military might be sent to remain there who should be maintained by him while they staid. And as such a step may alarm the other party and possibly be a means of bringing them more Easily to Terms as they will imagine we are going to join the Prince his Request was complied with and a Serjeant Corporal Drummer and twelve Topasses were draughted off accordingly to whom orders were given by the Chief not to pass over the River of Billiapatam nor to commit any acts of Hostility whatever should the Prince Direct them so to do with which he was likewise acquainted and readily acquiescing thereto he took his leave.

MONDAY
22^d.

THE Chief wrote to Ensign Wardman at Maddacarra to have an Eye over our people sent with the Prince to Cherrika and if any Irregularities are committed instantly to advise him of the same.

HEARING the Princes of Oden Quilote still continue burning and Destroying the Country killing many of the Inhabitants thereof and no answer being yet received to what wrote them the 13th. Instant the Chief dispatched a Braminee with the following ola on the occasion.

In my last I desired your Highness not to molest the poor Inhabitants before you answered my Letter and sent your Rajadores but am now informed you still continue to commit Disturbances, and as therefore I cannot look over such proceedings they being of prejudice to the Honble Company. I am obliged to Declare to your Highness unless you direct I shall regard you as Enemies and act against you agreeably.

RECEIVED an Ola from the Prince of Oden Quilote Translate of which is as follows.

I have received your Letter and observe from thence that my Brother of Cherrika has taken a writing from my uncle King Badencalamcur. When the Cannarees made an Invasion on this country it is certain we consented that the Prince should collect the Revenues of the country for three or four Years w^{ch}. time is long since Elapsed and Except that Writing we know of no other our uncle King Badencalamcur has given the Prince nor is it lawfull for a Writing to be given in the Government of Callosrruvão; but if he has given any Writing during his Imprisonment we are ignorant of it he may perhaps have been induced to it in Order to get his Liberty which I confess had it been my case I should have done the same and even gone so far as to have made over to the company all our Lands had it been required. In about four Days time we shall send four of our Rajadores to Tellicherry.

THE Prince desiring to be acquainted with the answer that might be sent by the Prince of Oden Quilote the Chief transmitted him a copy of the above Ola for his notice.

RECEIVED an Ola from the Prince acknowledging Receipt of the Chiefs and copy of the Prince of Oden Quilotes Letter to him from which and the proceedings of him and his allies he is induced to think he wont come to any agreement and his saying he will send his Rajadores to Tellicherry is only to amuse the Chief and gain time by a seeming compliance whereas his real Intentions are only to delay time untill the monsoon sets in that he may take such Measures as will make it more Difficult to humble him which has been communicated to him by some of his Enemies Party. That after getting clear of the Cannarees his Uncle gave a Writing to his Deceased Brother yeilding up the Revenues of the Country before a late Chief and the Old Linguist therefore what the Prince of Oden Quilote alledges of his having forced the same from his uncle while imprisoned is false as he the Chief knew the Writing obtained from him being given in his presence.

I have received your Letter and observe what you have been pleased to write. I have committed no hostilities in the country neither have I laid the least impediment on the Honble Company's contracts only those who are in alliance with the Pallace of Cherrika have I proceeded against and as they are Enemies to the Pallace of Addatalla I am determined to do them and their adherants all the Damages in my power on which account I think the Company have no reason to write me in the manner they have done when we were drove from the Pallace of Addatalla we well knew that the company was then in alliance with the Prince of Cherrika and if they or him are Determined to act against us it will give us very little concern having nothing to lose.

THE Monsoon set in this Day with little or no Wind.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo by the return of our Toney and Detachment with the Treasure the 11th. Instant which they acknowledge receipt of and advise that they Dispatched the Cuddalore sloop the 2^d. Instant for Fort St. David empty having no Pepper in Warehouse nor cloth ready packed. That the Deficiency in the Rice sent them is certainly owing to pilferage but where that Pilfering has been committed they cannot tell Mr. Holland the master having declared he told the Chief of Tellicherry that the Package was bad before it was shipt on board the sloop, but as there is no probability of getting Redress they shall not trouble themselves or us any further about it. That the Royal Duke and Elizabeth had called on them and taken in the cables for admiral Boscauens Squadron and that Captain Ambrose Lawrence of the Elizabeth died the Day after he left Callicut and is succeeded in the command by Captain Edward Wills. They acknowledge Receipt of the two anchors and small arms but the latter Differing so widely from what we mention that they shall be obliged to return sixty nine of them which are unserviceable by the first conveyance and enclosed copy of their officers Report who were ordered to examine them. That having sent us by the Anjengo sloop an Inv^o. of cloth sent on her desire us to give their Factory Credit for that amount as the Goods treacherously cast ashore at Penany come under our care to recover as we may state it on our Books according to the Issue and if there is any probability of recovering the sloop or her value which is Rupees seven thousand six hundred forty eight one quarter forty six reas (Rs. 7648. 1. 46) desire us to give them credit for the same as otherwise they must be obliged to write her off to proffit & Loss. Desire we will send them an account corr^t. with their Factory before the last of July in order to close their Books. Inform us of the advises they have received

READ Mr. Seckers his Report (as entered hereafter and Pedro De Veigas being called Declares the Rice sent to Anjengo was received from Mangalore in good Order and when shipt was in the same condition therefore as we see no reason to alter our first opinion that the Difference arose from Pilferage or wastage on board. The Secretary is therefore DIRECTED to advise the Gentlemen of Anjengo we have taken all the means in our power to see if the Difference arose from hence which finding it does not we cannot give them any further information concerning this Business there we have already advised them of.

The Prince desires assistance of the Ho. Compy's against the Prince of Oden Quilote on Accot. of their unwarrantable acts in the country.

THE Chief informs the Board that he has had several Messages from the Prince desiring the Honble Company's assistance to quell the justifications made by the Princes of Oden Quilote who cannot be thought to reason but on the contrary are daily committing Devastations in the Country burning of Houses and killing the poor Inhabitants. On which it is observed that he does not complain without just cause as may be seen by the answer they have sent to several Letters wrote by the Chief who informed them therein that he was willing to settle their Affairs amicably if they would send their Rajadores hither for that purpose but as they have not adhered to his advice nor consented to the Terms made in Behalf of the Oden Quilote pallace by their uncle King Badencalamcur. It is judged necessary to afford the prince succours against them least by getting too great a height it may cause an extraordinary expence to the company hereafter to quell such insurrections and the Chief having given the prince no other answer than till money was deposited in our hands for defraying such Expences as may be incurred we could not think of assisting him and having promised that a sum should be sent in two or three Days the Board therefore agree that the Chief give him assistance as far as he may deposit money for payment and that what he may so send be received by our second Linguist Manoel Rodrigues who is Directed to keep an account Disbursements untill the Differences are adjusted and the Princes of Oden Quilote brought to consent to the articles made in their favour the 8th. of May at Billiapatam before their uncle the Prince Regent and the Chief.

officers and at the same time calling upon me to Deliver in my reasons how the same arose I now beg leave to inform you that I was at the packing up four chests which were all new arms and in the same condition we received them from the Presidency the remaining four chests were arms that had been used and that none might be sent but such that were in good condition I made the stores people in my presence examine every Musquet and after having seen the same complied with I left my assistants to pack them up however that you may be thoroughly satisfied in this affair I now request that you will send for the stores people and Examine them in the strictest manner possible.

All the officers have received my orders to stay three Days at Cherrika the reason of which Amboo Writer will advise you after the Expiration of which time they are to be under your Highness's Directions in order to reduce your Enemies and I doubt not but your Highness will be successfull. Should this Command not be sufficient on receiving notice thereof your Highness may rest assured of my sending you further assistance agreeable to my Promise on your Defraying the Charges. As your Highness writes me you intend going in person I have sent Orders to the serjeant who is now at Cherrika to go with you and serve as a Body Guard keeping only on the Defensive and hope your Highness will not give any Orders to the contrary. Unichi Nair now goes with ten Nairs agreeable to your request and I beg your Highness will believe that so long as this good understanding lasts all the assistance in my power to Grant shall be readily afforded.

As the strength of the Enemy is not certainly known our people may possibly meet with a superior number and be obliged to retreat to secure which the Chief sent the following order to Ensign Nicholas Wardman in command at Maddacarra as that Fortress is within a few hours march of the Fort where the Enemy are lodged at present.

CODOLLEY QUELLOO NOMBIER being a person of power and attached to the Oden Quilote pallace though engaged in the present Disputes on no other account than to prevent the country being destroyed by the conquests each party are making (as taken notice of under the 5th. of April last) the Chief thought it necessary to acquaint him of the Resolutions taken in respect to putting an end to such commotions as have of late existed that if possible he might be prevailed upon to remain neuter in case we should go to Blows and accordingly wrote him the following Ola.

The Linguist by my Order wrote you to come and have a meeting with me to which you have not returned any answer and for which I can attribute no reason my desire only is to have a meeting in order to consider how to preserve the tranquillity of the country I have already wrote to the Princes of Oden-Quilote to send hither four of his most trusty Rajadores in answer to which he promised that he should in about four Days though this is a month since and he has not thought proper to comply with his promise and you have failed in coming here. I am obliged therefore to put a stop to the Disorders the said Princes I am informed are committing in the country and as you seem to me to be a well wisher to the said Princes and the country I now advise you that in case they will send their Rajadores hither within four Days to talk over affairs I shall do all in my power to settle Every thing agreeable to my promise and on the contrary I shall take proper measures jointly with the Prince of Cherrika to oblige them to hearken to reason.

THE CHIEF wrote an Ola to King Badencalamcur acquainting them that as the Princes of Oden Quilote had not yet sent their Rajadores agreeable to what wrote but on the contrary continue to commit hostilities He has been obliged to send a Body of men to the assistance of the Prince of Cherrika and hopes his Majesty will join his forces with ours and the Princes in the manner agreed on at Billiapatam.

THE Prince wrote the Chief an Ola advising him of the arrival of our people and Necessaries at Cherrika and that he shall set out on the 19th. Instant for Future and doubts not but by our assistance to subdue his Enemies when he shall come to Tellicherry.

THE CHIEF in answer to the foregoing acknowledge its receipt and wished him success in his Undertakings.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Benton ^{of} Pattamar dated the 12th. Instant enclosing the Samorines answer to the Chiefs ola and enclosed his monthly accounts for March April and May and requested a supply of two thousand Rupees for Defraying the usual Charges of the Factory during the rainy season.

I have received your Letter and observe its contents before the Receipt of which I had acquainted you of all occurrences. Having several affairs to consider of. I shall send to you after the Feast of Ona one of any Rajadores and after having discoursed with them I desire you will advice me of what passes. On my part I shall take care to give no Reason for breaking the antient Friendship between me and the Honble Company which I shall study to preserve, and hope you will do the like.

THE Prince wrote the Chief that the nair who had been suspected of stealing the Honble Company's Fire arms at Chovey he had obliged on the 14th. Instant to dip his hands in boiling oil and should open it on the 16th. and then advise if it is burnt or not and concludes with requesting a Piece of Wax cloth and a Drum head may be sent him.

FRIDAY
16TH.

THE Chief answered the Princes Ola by acquainting him he was well pleased at his having brought the nair to a tryal who was suspected of stealing the Honble Companys Fire arms and desired to be advised of the Event and that he now sent him the wax cloth and Drum head requested.

THE Chief received an answer from King Badencalamcur assuring him he should observe the agreement made between them at Billiapatam as through his assistance he hopes to remain at his pallace. That he has sent a Person to talk with the Prince of Oden Quilote to advise him to observe the Chiefs Directions and on the return of his messenger will advise what effect it has on him.

SATURDAY
17TH.

THE Prince wrote the Chief an Ola acquainting him that on opening the nairs hand he found him innocent but sent him for inspection and that there being reason to suspect the arm was stole by two moors of Cannanore which the Nair now sent can give some light into therefore he will make further enquiry into the truth by whom the theft was committed.

THE Chief wrote the Prince the Justice his Highness had shewed on this occasion was highly pleasing and hoped he would endeavour to get the Moors or others who committed this theft if possible.

Instant wherein he acknowledges receipt of the Chiefs ola and says his being very busy prevented his Rajadores being sent hither and that knowing Hostilities can be of no service to the country especially to the Companys Trade he is willing affairs should be settled on the same terms they were with his Predecessors and that his uncle the 5th. King of Anjangore being Desirous of coming to Tellicherry he may be conferred with on this subject.

AGREEABLE to the Resolution of Council the 20th. Instant the Chief wrote the following ola to the Samorine.

I have received your Majestys Royal Writing and observe from thence your good inclinations to preserve the antient friendship between you and the Honble Company which is a sensible pleasure to me I shall be very ready to receive your Rajadores whom you intend sending after the feast of Ona But as the time will be so long I am to request your Majesty will Declare whether you will deliver up the Companys Effects that they may not be suffered by any further Detention. Whatever further Business your Rajadore may have to conferr on he shall be treated with Respect.

Two Nairs killed as the attack of Puture belonging to the House of Narranport. and sent here by the Prince with a Guard of his own people to protect their Bodies and by whom he wrote an Ola to the Chief Translate of which is as follows.

The 22^d. Instant my people took possession of Puture Pagoda from whence they fired against the fort but through ill conduct two of your nairs with one Calliquilone have been killed and two or three wounded, of my people two or three have been killed and three or four wounded which might have been done without such a Loss. As all the cartridges are expended I request you will immediately send me seven thousand. If in two Days more I find this force not sufficient I shall then advise you to send me immediately another Body of men with their proper

accoutrements, but the above cartridges with four maunds of Powder I request may be sent me immediately being in great want and shall duely write you of all occurrences. It appearing by the above ola that the Prince has great Expectations of reducing his Enemies in a short time if the necessary supplies of ammunition are sent him and the Money already Deposited being sufficient to pay for the same. The Chief immediately ordered away five Thousand Musquet Cartridges and a chest of cannon powder containing one hundred and twenty pounds to Escort which Serjeant Domingo Gonsalves with one Corporal and twelve Topasses were Draughted off and as the Prince may possibly be desirous of Detaining them, especially should the number of his Enemies increase it was thought proper to make him an offer rather than wait for application as he seems vigorously bent to carry on the attack in person himself and which therefore was done and the following ola wrote in Reply to the one just now received.

I have just now received your Royal Writing and your success against Puture is very pleasing to me But as your Highness writes the Loss sustained on the occasion was owing to the ill conduct of your people I hope the same will induce your Highness not to give the Command in future to such an officer. I now send your Highness five Thousand Cartridges with a chest of Powder containing one hundred and twenty pounds which I hope will enable you to subdue them but should this not be sufficient on your advising me I will immediately send people with their proper accoutrements agreeable to what I wrote you formerly. Should your Highness succeed my Opinion is that you then ought to pursue your Enemies till they come to a proper accommodation to prevent in future any Disturbances in the country which after you have duely weighed please to let me know your sentiments on this head by one of your Rajadores. I now send a Person to take care and dress such people as may be wounded so as they may be sent hither without endangering their lives and as a convoy to the ammunition I send a serjeant corporal and twelve soldiers of which if your Highness is in want pray detain them with the others giving the command not only of these but of those formerly sent you to this serjeant.

The Chief received a Letter from Mr. William Murrall our Gunn^r. Mate dated at Puture the 20th. Instant advising of his arrival there that Day when the Prince ordered the Fort to be stormed but proving Unsuccessfull two Nairs being killed and others wounded he was Directed to open the Bomb Battery which having been done with some success nineteen shells out of twenty two having fell into the Fort though the Enemy still continue very resolute and concludes with desiring a further supply of shells and fine Powder. But as the Prince in his Ola received yesterday makes no such request and as the ammunition he required is already sent what Mr. William Murrall now writes for is not complied with.

ONE of our Calliquilone Moors wounded at Puture died upon the Road to their place SATURDAY 24th.

A Calliquilone dies of his wounds reced at Puture.

Capt. Leake Lee from.

By a pattamar from Goa the Chief received a Letter from Captain Thomas Leake Commander of the Restoration Grab dated the 29th. Ultimo in which he acquaints him that ship Prince William wanting water before she got the Length of that Port put in there the 9th. of April and staid three Days when they stood both off to the westward about one Degree and an half and on the 15th. met with a hard Gale of wind which obliged them to bear away in shore and shape their course for Pidgeon Island the Grab making signals for the Europe ship that she might follow in which only a fore stay sail could be hoisted (though yards fore and aft were towered Down) that continuing to blow very hard Captain Webber imagined the Monsoon was setting in and therefore parted company the day following when the Grab was in the utmost Distress but happily got under the Island about seven o'clock that night and rode pretty Easy upon which the shrouds were knotted and every thing put to rights before the next morning when the commander put out again and reached Vingorla Rocks only by the 29th. He then was obliged to turn back or perish for want of provisions and staying no longer than to get Hogs and Rice on board he made a third attempt for his passage on the 1st. of May standing into five and twenty fathom water where he met with another Gale that sprung up at WNW and it was with Difficulty he could reach the Port again nay even then was obliged to ride so long under the Alguarda waiting for a Pilot that the Grab had like to have foundered it blowing very hard and she riding with three feet Water in her hold all the seams towards her sides on the main Deck open and her sides entirely so. All which Damages being repaired the Commander writes he will put out in August. The ship Mamoody put under his convoy from hence the 19th. of March last parted company the first night and has not since been heard of so that he is under some anxiety for her safety as such Winds and currents have never been known at that season of the year. A small sloop he says belonging to Cannanore met with the storm and being blown near the shore was taken by the Malluans of which one James Bannister is supra cargoe and has applied to the Vice Roy in the English name to get the Vessel again who reports that he spoke with Captain Crab the 30th. March. He further adds that twelve shybars having lost their passage winter at Goa. A Boat belonging to Mulna Tuckrodeen at Surat was blown into Canwar and is seized, another run ashore there and was lost, two are in at Anore, one lost there and Boun-sello has taken four belonging to Bombay.

Restoration looses her Passage to Bombay.

MANOEL LEON our Callicut Linguist advising the Chief by an Express Pattamar that Mr. Benton is dangerously ill and does not care to take the Medicines sent him for a Disorder he has for sometime complains of without first seeing the Doctor. He immediately Dispatched him thither with orders to stay no longer than is absolutely necessary as we have now upwards of sixty Men in the Hospital and may reasonably Expect others to come wounded daily from the camp who may loose their Lives for want of assistance as there are now no surgeons Mate, in pay nor none to be got that can be of much service.

NARRANNA CUTTY PUTTERAH who is appointed to collect the Tax levied by the Achamars upon the Inhabitants of Rhandoterra writes our Linguist to acquaint the Chief that when the Company's People went to Palleri to collect the Rents of the Verge Lands and Coconut Trees the cousin of Carimbiliatu Camall getting together the people of that country came against them and cut the hand of a nair named Conna whom he had carried and shown to the Achamars and now waits to know whether he is to stay or come to Tellicherry.

SUNDAY 25th.
A Nair collect the Rents in the Achamars country insulted and wounded.

When my people as I am advised went to Palleri to gather the Rent of the coconut Trees and Verge Lands the cousin of Carembilliatu Cammall joined with the people of that District attacked now and cut one of their hands which you have been already advised of by Cutty Putterah; for this Insolence I desire you will immediately without Delay punish that person and if you don't do it instantly I will take that satisfaction which is due to the Honble Company.

ENSIGN Nicholas Wardman at Maddacarra writes the Chief that the Prince has requested him to send from thence some hand Granadoes twenty five Double headed shot and some nair Balls but having no orders to supply him he returned a Civil message back and acquainted his Highness that he had wrote for Directions which he desires may be sent him. That he is now informed the Enemy consists of no more than twenty nairs in the Fort under the command of Cuppaden Conna the Traitor who delivered it over to the Oden Quilote Prince who had hoisted a Flag of Truce in order to capitulate but the Prince insisting they should Deliver up their arms and submit themselves to his Mercy it was immediately hauled Down again and the Proposals Disdainfully Rejected so that its thought they will Defend the Place while a single man is living. That amongst some of the people killed and wounded there was a Seepoy officer belonging to us shot in the back with a slug and not being able to march he had sent him to Town in a chair.

FROM the Princes Proceedings hitherto there seems to be no want of courage but as the Enemy may do much Mischief (though few in number) if not routed from the Fort by its standing upon an Eminence and as these country people are not used to storming, unless a Breach is first made and which is found to be impracticable by its scituation there seems to be no other way of taking it than by scalading the Walls and annoying the Enemy with hand Grenadoes whilst our people are mounting the Ladders which the Military must do, therefore to put an end to this affair out of hand and to lose no more time the Chief instead of sending the ammunition required ordered Ensign Wardman upon receipt of his Letter to take ten Topasses immediately and proceed to the Princes assistance joining with our forces now there and then do the utmost to Dislodge the Enemy without risking the Lives of many people or having the communication cut off taking what stores he may judge necessary from Maddacarra for carrying on the attack out of those now there which shall be made up from hence in the Morning as Ensign Harris will be sent to take charge of the Garrison and the Gunner to Puture with every thing necessary to make the Expedition more certain and to Dislodge the Enemy by bombarding if possible of all which the Chief advised the Prince in an ola wrote to him as follows.

Ola to the
Prince.

I have received a Letter from the officer of Maddacarra with an Ola your Highness wrote him by which I am informed of every thing which has happened at Puture. Your Highness will not I hope take amiss the officers not forwarding the necessities you requested as no orders were lodged with him for that purpose. But I now send agreeable to your Letter just received an Ensign and ten soldiers our Master Gunner and eight of his people also three small Mortars sixty shells thirty Double headed shot for three and four Pounders twenty five Grapes for four Pounders four thousand cartridges fifty hand Grenadoes and other necessities and request your Highness will give the Command of my people to the officer who with the Gunner will I doubt not finish every thing to your Highness's satisfaction you affording the latter such coolies as he may want to assist him.

JUST as the Gunner and Ensign Harris were preparing to proceed from hence this morning agreeable to what mentioned in yesterdays Diary a Letter arrived from Ensign Wardman advising the Chief that he heard the Enemy had surrendered up the Fort but making some hesitation in delivering up their arms and wounding some of the Princes people in his Presence he ordered them all to be cut off immediately but the number he does not know for certainty.

UPON Receipt of this Letter the Ensign and Gunner were ordered to return their people and stores when the Chief wrote the Prince as follows.

—Agreeable to a Letter received yesterday from the officer at Maddacarra I got ready a command of people with Gunners and proper ammunition to send your Highness but through the want of Mucquas was obliged to Detain them till now when I received the agreeable news of a victory gained against your Enemies which gives me a great deal of satisfaction and on which I beg my congratulations may be acceptable.

THE Chief in answer to the above wrote him he was informed of his Brothers success which had prevented his sending the command of men and necessaries he had got ready.

THE Chief received a Letter from the Prince Regent acknowledging receipt of his and advising that the 25th. in the Morning the People sent to his assistance arrived with him when the Fort of Puture capitulated and the officer thereof desired to confer with him which being Granted so soon as he came in his Presence his Brother made a cut at Amboo Writer which was warded off but not so effectually as to prevent his being slightly wounded which case proceeding of theirs had induced him to give orders to cut them off which was accordingly executed a few only of them Escaping and those wounded though his intentions were only to make them Prisoners at first. That one of the Companys Mucquas was killed and two or three slightly wounded. That considering the strength and situation of the place he did not think to take it so Easily and can attribute his success only to the Company's kind assistance.

THE adherents of the Oden Quilote Princes to the northward having Dispersed since the taking of Puture, Prince Cunhi Raman came hither with our people and returned the Chief particular thanks for the late assistance afforded him as he had thereby repulsed the Vigorous Efforts his Enemies were making much sooner than otherwise could be expected which he said was such a singular instance of friendship that would for ever oblige him to preserve and maintain the cordial amity and friendship that subsisted between his ancestors and the Honble company assuring him that he was now thoroughly convinced nothing could be more conducive to the prosperity and welfare of his country in General. On which subject the Chief Ex-patiated a long time laying before him the conduct of his late Ministers and how necessary it was to have a just notion of their base behaviour in Order to prevent those he might make choice of hereafter following their Maxims. On which occasion his Expressions were observed to be much more sincere than formerly & as he intended to go from hence to Cartanaddu the subject of Boyanores soliciting last year to settle in this province was renewed to prevent further Disputes and animosities and he positively told if any attempts were made of that kind it would certainly occasion an open breach as the French too evidently appeared to have a greater share of that Family's Interest and good will than the Honble Company, though they had on many occasions afforded large supplies to prevent a conquest being made in that part of the country and for which they were still largely indebted however if he was desirous of passing to Talliparambu as formerly proposed and would come attended with the usual Body Guard all the civility and Respect should be shown upon passing our Limits was it for no other reason than being so nearly related to his Highness who replied that upon what had formerly passed on his subject he was fully determined not to listen any more thereto though ever so much pressed by Boyanore and that we might be assured he would still adhere to this Resolution as such a step was disagreeable and thought prejudicial to us promising to use his best endeavours to settle a sincere and lasting friendship between that house and the Honble Company. He made loud complaints against the Achamars who he said were grown most intolerably insolent of late and had ill treated many of his people sent into their District. Upon which the Chief told him the Achamars should be summoned to answer the complaints and if found culpable should be proceeded against conformable to the agreement made with his Highness in January last but it being late and he intending to set out Directly for Cartanaddu the same was Deferred till another Opportunity.

UPON taking his leave he presented the Chief with a Persian Horse and gave each of the officers that commanded our people Gold Manilla or money.

THE Chief received a Letter from the achamars informing him they had met in order to consider how to punish the cousin of Carembilliatu Camall for the Insult committed by him on one of the Honble Company's people who was sent to collect the Rents of Rhandoterra. And that the several punishment inflicted on those who committed acts of injustice was to break down such persons house or houses, destroy their Oarts and turn him out of Rhandoterra where if he returned again the Person so offending is to be tied and led away in an ignominious manner and this was the punishment they had agreed to execute on the Person the Chief had complained of but he having absconded they could only put in execution the former part of their intentions and hope the same will be agreeable.

THE Chief answered the Achamars by acquainting them he should be contented with the satisfaction they intended to give the Honble Company for the insult committed and that the Prince of Cherrika having lain a complaint against them he desired on his writing them that they would come hither.

AGREEABLE to our Resolution of Council three hundred seepoys & Calliquilone Moors are discharged the service.

THE Queen Mother having expressed a great concern to the Chief when at Cherrika that there should be any strifes or animosities subsisting between her sons and the Honble Company desiring at the same time former Discords and Divisions might not only be buried in oblivion but assistance afforded against the usurpers of the Oden Quilote Palace and as she has on all occasions proved herself a sincere Well Wisher to the companys officers The Chief thought it proper to acquaint her with what had lately passed and wrote the following Letter accordingly.

When I had an interview with your Highness at Cherrika at your request I then promised to support your son against his Enemies and I am now to advise you that I have accordingly duly complied with my Promise. The young Prince your son has assured me that he will go hand in hand with the Honble Company should his actions therefore speak him sincere you may depend on his having all reasonable assistance in future on such occasions.

A Nair suspected of stealing Gold and a Moorman of giving false Evidence being brought to the fort the Princes Minister was sent for and agreeable to the custom of the country obliged them to take a Ring out of boiling Ghee and then sealed up their hands in paper which being to be opened the third Day they are both committed to the charge of our Guard till then.

THE Chief received a Letter from Mr. Richard Secker at Callicut advising him that Mr. Hog proceeds with Mr. Bentons Widdow overland and by whom he had sent his Will dated the 30th. of May last in which he had left his said Widdow the Chief and Thomas Lane Esq^r. his Executors.

SATURDAY 1st.

THE Chief received the following answer from the Queen Mother in reply to his Letter the 30th. Ultimo.

SUNDAY 2nd.

I received your Letter with great satisfaction. The Friendship between the Company and my Predecessors has subsisted time out of mind for which reason my desire is that it may meet with no alteration therefore when you came to Maddacarra I sent for you in order to communicate to you my affairs and so soon as you took my son by the hand it gave me the greatest pleasure and hope will still continue to act the friendly part by us against our Enemies. My sons will always observe your Directions and conform themselves in every thing to your Will and pleasure.

Queen Mothers answer the Oia sent her.

THIS being the Day for examining the peoples hands who put them in boiling Ghee the 30th. Ultimo the same was done by the Princes Minister who broke the seals in the Chiefs Presence and no mark appearing like a beam they were both discharged.

CACART NOMBIE who is Brother in Law to the King of Cotiote calling here in his way to Netture and paying the Chief a visit he took an Opportunity of mentioning the Behaviour of that Monarch for some time past who instead of assisting us in getting what due from the Merchants in his country making restitution of the pepper seized at Pyachy (as faithfully promised by him the 29th. May 1748 he was acting a quite contrary part by prosecuting & oppressing unjustly those we had dealings with amongst whom was Cunhiseu one of the most considerable Traders and who had been obliged to fly from his Family purely from the solicitations & sordid inclination of Ally Rajah all which seemed to astonish him very much (being present at the two Conferences the Chief had with the King had when second) and after a tedious Pro and Con he proposed a meeting between them at Arrinhiole for settling all necessary Points but that place being on the other side of the River it would occasion a great Expence therefore if he was given to understand that till his Majestys sentiments were known a Conference could be of little utility and that what seemed necessary to be done at present was to prevail upon him if possible seriously to consider of the Discourse that had formerly passed that if he was Determined to abide thereto and was then disposed to have a meeting the same should be considered of but that it must be at Canhirotee or some place that is near which he seemed to approve of and desired Cunhiesu might go with him but as the King whose mode of Government is very absolute and arbitrary might possibly instantly seize upon him in such case it was judged necessary first to settle some terms w^{ch}. was soon done and agreed to by Cunhiseu though as the Nombier could not in any respect make a promise in Behalf of his Majesty he desired leave to wait upon him promising that if Cunhiseus presence was requisite and he should be sent for that he would be security for his safety if the affair was not made up to satisfaction.

MONDAY
10TH.

BOYANORE's Grand Mother Lying last night the French fired Early this Morning twenty Guns at Mahie and Eleven at each of their other Forts which last number we hear is to be continued at the former place for [s]even days.

CUNHISEU waited upon the Chief and acquainted him that he had received a satisfactory Ola from Cacart Nombier in respect to the Business he has undertaken to transact desiring his Permission to attend the King of Cotiote which was readily complied with and he proceeded with ten of his own people.

TUESDAY

THIS Day four of the head achamars of Rhandoterra came to the fort and acquainted the Chief that since the receipt of his Letter dated the 30th. Ultimo they had met several times and was so thoroughly sensible of the indignity and affront given by the Nephew of Carimbilliatu Camall to a servant in the Honble Company's pay and sent at their particular request that it was unanimously agreed by them to break down his House destroy his Oarts confiscates his Patrimonial Estate (now in the Possession of Carembilliatu Camall) and publish an Order to punish him agreeable to the Constitution of the Country should he return into it again and as for the Tivey who was the instigator thereof they had resolved that he should receive Corporal Punishm^t. and that their intensions of waiting upon the Chief was to acquaint him therewith in order to know if the satisfaction proposed was in all points agreeable or not. Who replied it was so in General but as neither the Relations or Heirs of the offender had been culpable hitherto the sentence passed in respect to the Patrimonial Estate appeared very unjust and therefore ought to be revoked as their giving an obligation not to maintain assist or countenance him in any shape or manner whatever would be thought full sufficient which they promised should be adhered to and put in Execution the 13th. Instant but that a corner of Carrinbilliatu's House must be uncovered. They were then told of the Princes complaint and given to understand the only motive and view in getting his Highness to put their country immediately under the Honble Company's protection was to free them from the many acts of cruelty and oppression they complained of formerly and not done for them to fling off the Obedience due to him as their lawfull sovereign and upon the whole were advised to make a proper submission otherwise we must shew a suitable resentm^t. in conformity to the Promise made him in January last. Upon

which they desired the Chief strictly to enquire into the complaints and if he found their conduct upon Examination to be disrespectfull they would readily submit to any judgement. He might pass upon them being confident there was not just Grounds given for the present Complaint made when he told them it was what he intended when the Prince fixed a day for that purpose and expected that they would upon being advised thereof instantly repair hither which they assured him he might depend upon and that all orders sent from hence would be punctually comp[h]ied with and then took their Lea[v]e being first reminded that the whole of the Tax levied for the present year must be collected and paid into the Treasury this Month.

THE CHIEF received an Ola from the Samorine advising that he had neither wrote that he should deliver up the Goods taken out of the sloop which came ashore there or that he would send any person to talk with him on this Head but that after the Feast of Ona he would send some one to conferr with him on other Business and doubts not of the Chiefs acting in such manner as will occasion no alteration in the friendship subsisting between him and the Honble Company.

LASTLY I appoint the aforesaid Thomas Byfeld Esq^r. & Thomas Lane Esq^r. Executors (jointly with my wife) to this my last Will and Testament and further it is my last request that they will do me this friendly office that my affairs may be settled to the satisfaction of Everyone.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Hon^{ble} President and Council of Fort St. David dated the 30th. Ultimo advising the arrival of our Hon^{ble} Masters ship Elizabeth the 21st. of May by whom they received our advices with the Pepper and Plank which answering to Invoice they should Credit Bombay Presidency for. That on the 14th. June arrived with them the Hon^{ble} Companys ship Griffin Captain Thomas Thick who sailed from Great Britain in company with the Sandwich Montfort Augusta and Tavistock the 26th. of January last whom he parted from in a hard Gale of wind and though the Dragon sailed three Weeks before them they have not as yet heard any news of her. That on the 28th. Captain Petre of the Sandwich arrived there who had parted company with the above ships. They advise us that the Company have appointed Commissary's one of the Council to receive Madrass from the French which place is to be subordinate to Fort St. Davids untill further orders That Mr. Barwell is Dismissed the service and Mr. Dawson appointed President of Fort William as is Mr. Evles second That the Rhoda and Griffin sailed for China the 28th. of June and the Sandwich and R[oya] Duke would be Dispatched for that place likewise in a few Days.

NARRANNA CUTTY PUTTERAH having sent the Chief word by a Nair that the achamars delayed putting in Execution what promised by them the 11th. Instant making use of many idle Excuses in respect to the giving satisfaction he wrote them the following ola.

When you were here a Promise was made me that satisfaction should be given the Hon^{ble} Company as on the 13th. Instant for the Insult committed by the cousin of Carimbiliatu Camall but I have now received advice that you have not

acted agreeable thereto wherefore I am to advise you that if on receipt of this Letter you delay giving the necessary satisfaction I have ordered Narranna Cutty Putterah to return hither when I shall send my people to take it without Delay.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Richard Secker at Callicut dated the 15th. Instant Mr. Secker Lre from desires a supply of cash. advising he was in want of Cash to defray the monthly Disbursements as we might perceive by the Ballance of his account for last Month which he remitted.

THE Achamars continuing still to avoid giving the satisfaction they had proposed to the Chief Narranna Cutty Putterah returns from Rhondoterra and acquaints him it was hitherto Delayed under a pretence that the whole Body of them could not be got together and at last he was told that Carimbiliatoo could not give the obligation required under his hand which he looked upon to be nothing else but prevaricating Excuses therefore withdrew agreeable to Orders.

A detachment of Military to be sent to the Achamars to demand satisfaction for one of our people insulted in collecting the Ho. Co. revenue which is agreed to.

THE Pay Masters account for last Month being presented is Examined and Passed and abstract thereof entered after this consultation.

EXAMINED and Passed the Callicut accounts for the month of June cash account and abstract of the Disbursements being entered after this consultation.

I sent Cutty Putterah yet you have still failed for these reasons therefore I now
sent a proper command of soldiers who with the Princes people unless you do within
an hour comply with the Promise you have made take that satisfaction which is due.

seventy Military, Eighty Nairs and thirty Calliquilone moors were sent by the Chief

AND as by agreement made with the Prince last January the achamars are to be chastized for any insolence committed us in conjunction with him the Chief sent for the custom master (who is one of his Ministers) and demanded some of his people to go with ours which was immediately complied wth. and they proceeded likewise under the command of Captain John Johnson agreeable to the Directions given them.

CAPTAIN John Johnson returns with his command from Bhandoterra and reports that he has broke down the House of Carimbiliatu Camalls nephew but the Trees that were in his compound and levelled the Tiveys house likewise that Carimbiliatu Camall had given an Obligation as Demanded of him not to countenance or assist his nephew with another to pay the H^c. Company Fanams One Thousand two hundred as an acknowledgment of his Error in not complying with what was agreed upon by the achamars and who became security for the same.

The Translates of both which are as follows.

For the Crime committed by the Heir of Carimbiliatu Camall we the four Heads are willing to pay the Honble Company the sum of One Thousand two hundred fanams provided the House of the said Camall be permitted to stand and not broke down.

For the Injury committed by my Heir Unichi Numbier against the Honble Company I consent to fling him off and that he be banished and not permitted ever to return. This Writing I give in the Presence of the Heads of Five hundred Nairs with the consent and approbation of my heirs.

THE Chief received a letter from Manuel Netto concerning the Anjengo sloop and cloth with an information in respect thereto given and signed by the Dutch factor at Penany and Camaldin Noquedah of a sloop as following Translate thereof.

WORSHP^t FULL SIR

I have duely received your Letter from whence I observe your complaint against my not advising you of what has passed at Penany which I should have done had Mr. Benton on my leaving Callicut not ordered me to write him of all occurrences who I imagined would also have acquainted you if therefore you think me culpable I hope you will Excuse it but shall now agreeable to your Directions inform you of what has been transacted from my arrival at Penany to my return to this Place.

The 25th. April O S I arrived at Penany and in compy with the Captain of the sloop went and waited on Talechenor but he had not the opportunity of either seeing him or any of his Ministers however the Captain informed me that he had conferred with the said Talechenor (in the presence of the Dutch Factor) and at the same time communicated to me of his Resolution of going to Anjengo which he accordingly did the 26th. following. The same day I had a meeting with Talechenor who on my asking how the accident to the sloop happened gave me the same information as the Captain had already done withall adding That they did not force either the Captain or seamen out of her but they left her of their own free Will there being then much Water in her hold. That after which they immediately endeavoured to take out the Bale Goods as also to save the Vessel which notwithstanding [a]nding sunk.

They have to this time taken out of her twenty two Bales of cloth which have been wasted and repacked ten Fire arms some swords and Bayonets. I then told them that the Captain as also the sailors were by them forced out of the vessel notwithstanding what they have alledged to the contrary as otherwise they would not have quitted her which I enforced to them by many arguments to which they returned me no other answer than that as the King had wrote to Tellicherry in respect to this particular they should accordingly wait his Directions.

I am informed that the occasion of the Vessels being lost was owing to the advice given the Captain by those of this place pretending to Pilot him into the River who instead of Carrying the Vessel to a secure place brought her to a Dangerous part of the River when the Captain to prevent the Vessels oversetting cut away the Masts in which condition the Moors here immediately went on board when the Captain as also the sailors went ashore to the Dutch Factory.

I have been also further informed that after the Cloth was washed they put into every Bale forty Pieces in all twenty three Bales, ten Fire arms ten Swords and some Bayonets. After the Kings People had in vain endeavoured to weigh up the sloop a Noquedah by name Camaldin offered his service and said that if they would let him have two munchuas for that Purpose he would certainly Effect it if not, be liable to forfeit every Thing he had which however the moors by their bad advice prevented the Rajadore putting in Execution The vessel therefore is now sunk and no part of her to be seen.

A few days since arrived at Penany the Governour of Callicut whom I acquainted with all circumstances to which he replied that the King had wrote to Tellicherry advising his intentions of sending his Rajadores to conferr with you on this head as many who have had their vessels drove ashore are now pressing him to deliver them up. Being informed that the Rajadores had sold some of the cloth I enquired of Parambee (Governour of Callicut) whether they had his Majestys orders for that

purpose to which he answered he did know; as I was at that time out of order I sent two Nairs Jungadas to Tallichenor to ask the same question and to advise him that had he even those orders the selling the said cloth was not justifiable to which he replied that he had not yet received any orders from his Majesty but should he was obliged to put them in Execution.

When the Governour of Callicut went to the Dutch Factory in the Presence of the Factor I asked the prementioned Question of whether he had any orders for the Disposal of the cloth to which he gave the same answer as before "he did not know" adding that he had not heard of any of the cloth being sold I then protested against the said Parambee Governour of Callicut in case any of the cloth should be sold or otherwise made away with calling on the Dutch Factor as a Witness to the same Parambee then told me that he as also Appa Putterah had done every thing on their part to adjust this Difference between his Majesty and the Honble Company and which he should still endeavour to do.

Having taken my leave of Parambee I arrived at Callicut the 19th. Instant heartily fatigued with my Journey Enclosed goes a Declaration signed by the Dutch Factor of Penany and a Noquedah setting forth the accident which happened to the sloop.

I shall always be ready to receive any of your commands and hope God may shower his Favours on you being

INFORMATION given me by the Factor of Penany his Linguist and a Noquedah of a sloop who was called Camadime.

The 15th. of April 1749 appeared off Penany a sloop with English colours and fired three Musquets upon which the Factor of Penany sent off two Toneyes to aid and assist her but as they could not get over the Bar of the River they returned. The Captain of the sloop perceiving which and having no remedy left run into the River with his sail set for security but happened to touch on a sand Bank and there came to an anchor laying There from ten in the Morning till five in the afternoon. Tallichenor The Governour immediately sent off some People w^a. the Captain flung over his Cable and wanted Therewith to haul her off but finding the people sent no assistance to him he cut his Mast and about 6 o' clock some of the People belonging to the sloop came ashore, after which they saw them fling 8 Bales overboard, and then the Captain and sailors came to the Dutch Factory saying that the People sent off from the shore had Turned them out of the vessel. In the Morning on looking they found she was gone to the Bottom. When the Factor of Penany His Linguist the Captain and the Pilot of his sloop went to the Seramby and the Factor asked why they were sent for when he was answered they wanted to know who was the Captain to enquire of him what success he had had whereupon he the Captain gave a Relation of the whole and that the Natives had forced him to quit the sloop and jump ashore saying that now the Company's Goods and sloop were in their hands. And Talechenor asking what Goods he had brought in the sloop the Captain acquainted him therewith desiring at the same time to open the Bales they being wet with salt water in order to wash them and likewise desired his chest of cloths The Latter of which they complied with when they took their Leaves and came to the Dutch Factory and the Captain dispatched the Pilot and Lascars to Anjengo.

THE Fine of Fanams twelve hundred levied on Cannibilliatoo Camall was This day sent the Chief by Cutty Putterah when their security ola was delivered up and the money delivered to the Pay Master by his orders.

NARRANFORT COMAPA NAIR who has so frequently been turned out of the District for his base Proceedings and the last time in Mr. Randons Chiefship as taken notice in the Diary having wrote two olas to people in this place acquainting them that he was treated with injustice and had many things to say on that head desiring they would use all means whatever to get him into the Districts again or to appoint a place he might meet them in which olas being brought to the Chief and translated by our Linguist he ordered them to be tied round the Bearers neck and a file of Musquetiers and a Drum to Drum him out of the Districts.

THE Chief sent for the several pepper Merchants and acquainted them that he observed a great Dilatoriness in weighing off the quantity they had contracted for and that he expected their accounts would now soon be cleared as the weather was fair upon which they unanimously assured him no trouble or Pains had been wanting on their parts to source what was contracted for but that the French permitting their Merchants to raise the Price when the season opened and the Methods taken by those inland to Export it last season for want of Purchases being made here had induced them to follow the same track again the greatest part of what purchased had cost them upwards of ninety six Rupees $\frac{3}{4}$ Candy and its now at one hundred Rupees however they promised to Do the utmost in their Power but at the same time requested the Chief would represent their case to the Honble President and Council otherwise they must be totally ruined who gave them little hopes of any abatements being made on every candy they were Deficient of what we had contracted with them for.

The Pepper Merchants called upon for not having brought in the Quantity of Pepper contracted for their reasons.

THE only Proposal for renting the arrack Farm is Delivered in by Robert Adams which being opened he offers to give seven hundred rupees for the first Year and Eight hundred for the two following which being taken into consideration it is observed the sensible Decrease in this Revenue is Easily to be accounted for as the large Discharge we have and still propose to make in our Garrison will not allow so much to be given for this Privilege as formerly and even now the Board are of Opinion it is a very good offer and ought not to be rejected as we find that when a Duty of five Rupees was levied on the sale of every Hogshead the amount hereof seldom Exceeded one hundred Rupees $\frac{3}{4}$ Annum therefore it is AGREED to accept his proposal and the Secretary is DIRECTED to give him a Licence and draw out proper Bonds to Execute between him and the Honble Company accordingly.

The arrack Farm rented.

THERE being no caveats entered against the Executors for having Powers given them to administer to the Effects of Mr. Thomas Benton deceased agreeable to his Will the Commissioners are applied to for said Powers who agree to give them conformable to the Rules laid down by the Honble Mayors Court of Bombay.

OUR Contractors Rice account having been Examined his Heirs are called upon & assigns reasons why the Rice bought by order of the Honble President for the Durringtons Mocha voyage is charged at twenty Pagodas three Eighths $\frac{3}{4}$ Co. and not upon the Medium ours is charged at who says it was the first Rice brought down in the season when little [ha]d been imported from the inland countrys and having orders to ship off that quantity with the Greatest Expedition was the reason of beginning to purchase so soon whereas what bought for the service of this place turned out cheaper by taking an advantage of the Market when this article was at the lowest prices.

The rice contractors called upon for their reasons why the Rice provided for the Durrington Mocha Voyage turns out at so high a Price.

OBSERVING likewise that we fall short twenty five Corge of Rice adlamy (or custom free) we find the same is owing to an infringement made by the country Governmt. who ought to let us Export three hundred Corge but that they have lately Directed that two hundred Corge be allotted free from Mangalore seventy five from Mulhy and twenty five from Manjaseer and none having been purchased at the latter Place is the reason of this Difference nor was our Contractors Agent able to get this allowance made him at Mangalore.

As the Rice account is now Examined the same is passed and entered after this Consultation and the accomptant DIRECTED to draw out an account cost and charges of what has been bought and sent down for the service of Anjengo Factory and the Secretary is DIRECTED to reply to their Letters that we may Dispatch their Pattamar now at Callicut.

THE Chief informs the Board of his having given one hundred Fanams to the Nair who received the Wound from the Cousin of Carembilliatu Camall out of the Time laid on him which is approved of.

STEWART'S account Storekeepers sales for May June and July being presented are ordered to lay upon the Table for inspection likewise his receipts and Issues for July.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Honble President and Council of Fort St. David dated the 11th. Instant advising the arrival of the Dragon Walpole and Britannia all belonging to our Honble Masters. Enclosed as Extract of the 5th. Paragraph of the Honble Company's Letter to them by their ship Dragon wherein they Direct them to send their own ships Lapwing Dolphin Newcastle and Dragoon to this place Anjengo and Bencoolen from the latter of which the Newcastle had lately arrived them where there had been such a fatality among the Planters from the small pox that the Pepper Plantations had greatly suffered so that she could not be loaded from thence therefore they purposed sending her to this Coast so soon as the season would permit and the Dragon who was then going to Bengall would proceed Directly from thence in consequence of the aforesaid order from Our Honble Masters. They therefore Desire we will acquaint them as soon as possible what Pepper and other Goods we may have in warehouse by the end of October. They advise us likewise that two Days after the Date of their advices the Royal Duke sailed for China and that the Sandwich was to be Dispatched the Day following.
