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INTRODUCTION.

The first title-deed of the family now extant is dated in A.D. 1761, and records the fact that the Nizam in that year ap-See pages 21 and 35. pointed one Husain Alí Khán as Killadár (Commandant) and Faujdar (Magistrate) of Banganapalle. This document refers to the "removal" of one Muhammad Beg Khán, apparently from the post given to Husain Alí Khán; but the nature of that transaction is not indicated. It would seem, however, from the manuscript records of See page 29. the family, that a Muhammad Beg Khán, who died in 1137 Hijra (A.D. 1724-1725), was the great grandfather of Husain Alí Khán and the adopted son of a person of the same name appointed Killadár of Banganapalle by the King of Bijapur in the last half of the seventeenth century. A document is still preserved in Bangana-See page 46. palle bearing the seal of Muhammad Beg Khán and the date 1131 Hijra (A.i). 1718-1719).

Within a few years the country fell under the dominion of Mysore. The translation of a letter of confirmation from See page 23. Tipú, dated in 1783 (the verbal quotations are from another translation also in the records) is preserved in the archives of the Madris Government. This grant refers to "the assiduity" of the just then deceased Husain Ali Khan "in the sirkar affairs," and confers the jagir of Banganapalle on his son Ghulam Alí Khan. As a matter of fact it would appear that notwithstanding this grant Tipú at once resumed the jágír and expelled Ghulám Alí Khán. The

originals of letters written by Tipú in the same year are extant in which he summons Ghulám Alí Khán to his presence and refuses to accept his excuses for not soming. The next extant letter from Tipú, dated in 1790, to the Killadár of According to the traditions of the family Tipú's deputy was defeated in a pitched battle by Ghulám Alí Khán and his uncle Assad Ali Khán about seven years after Ghulám Alí Khán's expulsion. A document is extant purporting to be an order of the Nizam's of the year 1790 conferring Banganapalle on Assad' Ali Khán and Ghulám Alí Khán. It is however of doubtful authenticity.

These two persons are referred to as joint jagirdars in the correspondence of the year 1800. The present family traces its See page 25. descent from Ghulám Alí. Khán who They are referred to by their titles of Muzuffursurvived his uncle. In 1800 when the ul-Mulk and Moneur-ud-daula. Nizám handed over Kurnool and the other

CEDED DISTRICTS to the East India Company in exchange for a subsidiary force to be stationed in his territories, he transferred to the Madras Government his control over Banganapalle. At the same time he stipulated that as it was "the sole means of subsistence of a numerous family" the jagir should be continued to Assad Ali Khan and Ghulam Ali Khan and this was agreed to by the British representative.

Whatever had been the precise relations of the Jágírdárs to the Court of Hyderábád, the British at first neither levied tribute from them nor, as far as can

• See letter of Collector of Bellary, dated 26th September 1821, on page 8. be ascertained, exercised any authority over them. Indeed the jágírdár till as late as 1821.* seemed to consider himself still dependent on the Nizám. He resided

at Hyderábád, and civil and criminal justice were nearly at a stand. Internal government, now went from bad to worse, and at times shameful disorder prevailed. Finally (1831) the jágírdár was himself driven out of the country and took refuge in British territory. These disturbances induced the British Government to decide to resume the jagir in 1832. The Government did not at this time consider that they were pledged to its continuance, and a proclamation notifying the resumption was issued in 1835. From 1835 to 1848 the State was accordingly administered by the Madras The stipulation of the Nizam about the continuance of the jagir was however brought to notice in 1837 and the Court of Directors decided in the following year that the Nizám's stipulation entitled the holder of the estate to be treated as a hereditary jágírdár, and that the resumption must be cancelled and the jágír restored as soon as it was free from debt. Accordingly in 1848 the jágír was restored free from debt to the head of the family Ghulam Muhammad Alí, grandson of Ghulam Alí Khán; and, as had been the case before 1831, he was permitted to enjoy it without payment of tribute and with certain restrictions to administer its Civil and Criminal justice himself. A sanad conferring these powers was issued in 1849. In 1862 another sanad was granted to him guaranteeing that the British Government would permit any succession to the jágír which might be legitimate according to Muhammadan law.

SIE,

Since my arrival here I have learned that the districts of Banganapalle and Chenchummulla usually called the Jagir of Moseffur-ul-mulk are immediately under the authority of that Chief and not subordinate to any of the Naiks to whom the Purvanahs of the Nabob Aristogah were addressed. Having therefore no official document to transmit to Moseffur-ul-mulk for the surrender of his district I have sent no Amildar to take possession of them.

?. His irregularity in paying his kists and his turbulent conduct obliged Tippoo Sultan to expel him and annex the jagir to this Sirkar lands. It was, however, restored to him though I have not heard on what terms by the Government of Hyderabad after the Treaty of Seringapatam. It is entered among the taluks in the schedule of the ceded countries at a Jumma of Nos. $41804-9\frac{1}{2}$, but does not appear to be considered as a jagir or Nibataty Province as no mention is made of peshkash as in the case of Conoul.

I am anxious to receive the instructions of the Right Honourable the Governor in Council on this subject as soon as convenient because if this jagir is to be resumed it ought to be done without delay.

3. As no person has come to me on the part of the Nabob of Conoul, I have written to him desiring him to send a vakeel with his amounts to the cutcherry, but no correct statement of the balance of peshkash due for the current year can be expected unless it is procured through the Resident at Hyderabad.

At the earnest request of Syeed Ghoolam Hoossein Alee Khan Buhadoor Jagheer-dar of Banganapully, who is now seeking a temporary asylum in my jurisdiction, I beg leave to forward the enclosed letter addressed to the Right Honourable the Governor.

I have signified to him the propriety of his representing the state of his affairs to the Resident at Hydrabad, and this step he informs me he has already adopted. Although the affairs of the Jagheer do not concern me, it may be satisfactory to the Right Honourable the Governor in Council to be informed of the circumstances which have induced him to seek my protection. His country may be said to be entirely in the hands of certain Patans, his creditors, the Principal of whom, Shah Alum Khan, a merchant of considerable wealth and consequence, is now suffering under the wounds inflicted on him in a late attempt at assasination. The Chief, however well disposed, has nomeans of supporting his authority; and the general insecurity which arises from the absence of all control has led to the employment of Arab bands by the above-mentioned Patan and his rival whose factions appear to divide the state. So oppressive has been, and is still, the restraint exercised over the Jagheerdar and his family, that nothing I believe will induce him to return to his country until by the efficient interposition of high authority some equitable adjustment with his creditors is effected.

Letter from Symp Hussain Aly Khan Bahadoon, Jaghiredar of Bygunpully, to the Right Hon'ble S. R. Lushington, dated the 30th Jamed Ool Awal 1247, Hijery, corresponding with 6th November 1831.

The fame of the Honourable Company's justice and equity being spread over all the world and the assistance of their Government being requisite for the settlement of my affairs, I therefore take the liberty to state that up to this time no mal-administration or breach of faith has by any means been ever practised towards any one in this ancient state; I mean the Jaghire of Bygunpully, and so the Jaghire has come into my possession by a regular course of inheritance, from my ancestors. But in the time of my father the late Nawab Mansoor Ood Dowlah Buhadoor some debt was contracted by borrowing at interest from Afghans. Principal and interest, they have already received a double payment. But not content even with this, they make up exorbitant accounts against my sirear and are exceedingly importunate in their demands. Therefore trusting in your kindness and generosity I have come within the territories of the Honourable Company, to the town of Coilgoontah in the district of Cuddapah, and if you will have the goodness to appoint some person worthy of confidence and acquainted with the rules of law and justice to decide in this case, and will thus deliver me from the annoyance caused me by those people, I shall be feel myself laid under the strongest obligations of obedience and gratitude. Further particulars will be known to you from the Hinduwee Athbarnamahs. What more need I trouble you with?

Translation of a memorial addressed to Mr. Lacon, Principal Collector of Cuddapah by Nabob Hussam Ally Khan Bahadur of the Talook of Byganpully, dated 5th November Fusly 1241.

The Padshah of Delhi long ago granted to my ancestor as a Jaghire the Talook of Byganpully, which has ever since been engaged by my family in succession. My ancestor having distinguihsed himself by his services under the Hakim Bundagan Ally of Hyderabad was honoured and rewarded with high titles and great allowances and several Jaghires were conferred upon him. namely, the Talooks of Tandoor, Alpoor, Chittapoor, Goonda, Mittakul, etc. Depending upon these favours my father Nabob Mansoor Dowla Bahadur, otherwise called Ghoolam Ally Khan Bahadur, contracted debts with sowcars at Madras, etc., both on account of the Circar and on his own account, for money advanced, cloths, horses and camels, etc. The Hyderabad Circar however resumed the Jaghires, and there remained only the old Jaghire of Byganpully. In the meantime, the said Nabob Mansoor Dowla Bahadur died, and his creditors who during his life-time had received some payment partly on account of principal, and partly on account of interest, making up their accounts by adding interest upon interest so that the balance was accumulated to four or five times the original amount of the debt, demanded payment from me, and brought a force to compel me by sitting Dhurna at my gate; and taking possession of the villages of my Jaghire managed the cultivation and collection, etc., at their own pleasure employing their own people. They then began to dispute and to quarrel among themselves without caring for me, so as to afford occasion for a contest. When I told them that whatever was due to them by account they might receive by instalments, they replied that unless they were paid the principal and interest together with the expense of the force, and interest upon the whole they would not leave me. Thus it is impossible to say to what extent they will carry the troubles they are causing. Being unwilling therefore to stay there I have come to the Cusha of Koilcoontla in the Zilla of Cuddapah to save my life and house and my request to the Government is that they will depute a respectable person well acquainted with accounts and the customs and usages of the country to enquire what is justly due to the creditors, and having ascertained the balance, and the state of my property and revenue, to make a suitable arrangement with them for the liquidation of my debts, and also to appoint amildars, etc., upon my recommendation for superintending the cultivation and collection of my villages and that when my debts are paid off my country may be restored to me. If this be done my debts will be discharged in a suitable manner, and I shall be enabled to preserve my honour and to live happily. Such generous assistance to my sumstanum will be greatly celebrated, and my posterity will offer glad prayers for the prosperity of your Government. If my request is not complied with and my creditors contending amongst themselves offer any injury to my honour, I must give up my life. My creditors committing such excesses at their own will and pleasure I have come to Koilcoontla in the Company's territory. But my family and property are detained at Byganpully by my creditors who have violently seized upon my country. Your Government affording protection to the people of many provinces and relieving them from their troubles I make this representation and pray that it may be taken into favourable consideration. To the above there is an attestation in Persian.

I am directed by the Right Honourable the Governor in Council to transmit to you the accompanying copy of a letter from the Principal Collector of Cuddapah reporting that the Jaghiredar of Byganpully is seeking a temporary asylum in his jurisdiction and transmitting an address from the Jaghiredar soliciting the interference of the British Government in adjusting the demands of his creditors and undertaking the management of his country pending the settlement of his debts.

As it is an object of importance to prevent the assembling of bodies of men for purposes hostile to tranquillity in land a ljoining the Company's territory, I am directed to state that this Government will be disposed to lend its aid in any way that may be thought useful and proper in adjusting the matters in dispute between the Jaghiredar and his creditors.

SIR,

The Resident at Hyderabad has lately forwarded to me copy of a letter to your address intimating the intention of His Highness the Nizam, to take the Jaghire of Byganpully into the hands of Government, and to place there an officer for the purpose of collecting the revenue.

- 2. The Jaghiredar Hussain Ally Khan has always maintained that his Jaghire was exempt from tribute and independent of the Nizam, and such opinion I have lately seen corroborated by that of the Government as expressed in a letter, dated 12th October 1825, wherein in reply to an application from a former Collector Mr. Russell, soliciting the interference of the Resident of Hyderabad respecting some boundary dispute, it is stated, quoting the terms of the treaty concluded with the Nizam, that the Jaghire of Byganpully consequently "ceased to be connected with the Hyderabad Sirkar, and became a dependency of this Government".
- 3. Under the impression that the affairs of this petty State were wholly of a political nature, in which it did not become me to interfere, I have, in all my communications with the Chief, given him to understand that beyond affording him protection, I must in other respects leave him to exercise his own discretion. As a Magistrate, I naturally feel anxious for the restoration of lawful authority, as the villages of the Jaghire are much interspersed with those of the Sirkar, and the murder of a British subject last year in that country by a Puttan, related to one of the renters, still remains unnoticed.
- 4. I beg leave to add that it is the Chief's present intention to take up his temporary abode somewhere within the talook adjoining to Byganpully.

SIR,

When the Ceded districts were made over to this Government by His Highness the Nizam, a letter was addressed to the former Principal Collector here, by Mr. Secretary Webbe, in the Secret department, under date, the 25th December 180, explaining that these countries had been ceded to the Company, "without any other limitation or exception, than the conditions in favour of the Nabob of Kurnool, and of Monzuffur-ool moolk".

In the extract from the letter of the Resident at Hyderabad, dated the 13th October 1800, enclosed in the abovementioned communication, and referred to therein in explanation of the conditions in question, it is explained, as regards Moozuffur-col-moolk, that "the districts of "Byganpully and Chunchurmullah, rated in the schedule at forty-one thousand eight hundred and four Cantaroy l'agodas, are to remain in Jaghire, to Morzuffur-col-moolk and his family, subject however of course to the paramount authority and control of the Honourable Company, as sovereigns of the whole of the Nimm's late possessions, etc."

This definition of the rights of the British Government over the jaghire of Bungunpilly, is very distinct from that of those over the Kurnool territory, defined, in the same communication, to be "the full exercise of the tributary and feudatory rights over that principality".

The final arrangements since made with the Kurnool Chieftain by the British Government, have left the administration of civil and criminal justice in that territory to the Nabob who resides there, subject to the general inspection and control of the British Government. He has been treated, as he was before by the Nizam's Government, like a petty resident Chieftain, paying tribute and owing feudatory obligations to the British Government, but vested with the internal management of the principality in which he resides, subject to general British controul.

But the jaghiredar of Bungunpilly, even under the Nizam's Government, never seems to have been viewed in this light; he never has been authorized to exercise either civil or criminal jurisdiction over the subjects of the company dwelling in his jaghire, the grant was an assignment to him and his family of the revenue alone; a positive stipulation was made, at the period of the cession, that the company's authority should be paramount in his jaghire; and as the jaghiredar resides always at Hydrabad, he is unable to exercise the administration of civil and criminal jurisdiction, like the Nabob of Kurnool even if it were granted to him, as I have understood it is intended to be granted to the resident Mahratta jaghiredar of Sundoor; nor can he, at the distance of Hydrabad, efficiently controul the exercise of it by his resident amildar.

Whether the administration of justice, civil or criminal, in the Bungunpilly jaghire, shall be vested in the British officers at Cuddapah or Bellarie, or shall be vested in the jaghiredar, or be deputed by him to his amildar who alone resides there, is a point which never has been yet settled. Suitors and merchants of great respectability here have been lately applying to me for letters to the Resident at Hydrabad, begging his intercession with the jaghiredar there, to ensure the administration of civil justice between them and the inhabitants of his jaghire. The little attention paid to my letters by the jaghiredar's amildar at Bungunpilly, and jaghiredar's own opinion that he is independent of British authority, may be inferred from the correspondence which I have the honour to enclose; and as civil and criminal justice in the Bungunpilly district may in fact be considered nearly at a stand, it is a very common resort for criminals who commit depredations on this district.

Bungunpilly is situated in the midst of the Ceded districts, between the Bellarie and Cuddapah divisions If the administration of justice, civil or criminal, is to be left to the jaghiredar, means should be adopted to require him to enforce it by means of his amildar, who should be placed under the general controll of the proper British authority either here, or at Cuddapah, authorized to correspond with him on all matters of police, or complaints of the inhabitants of these districts. But, as the jaghiredar is an absentee, I certainly would submit that, being precisely in the same situation as the Carnatic jaghiredars, the subjects of the company in his jaghire may justly claim the protection of the established British tribunals, without at all interfering with his collection of the revenue assigned to him, and that this would be preferable to vesting the administration of justice there in a currupt amildar, subject to no controll, and from whom there is no appeal, except at the distance of Hydrabad.

Moozuffur-col-moolk, the original Jaghiredar, died long ago; and I cannot find that his successor has ever communicated this matter to the Government, or obtained the usual sunnud of confirmation. In fact, he seems to view himself and his jaghire, as still dependent exclusively on the Nizam's Government.

Sir,

With reference to my letter of the 26th September 1821 to your address I have the honour to enclose copy of a communication from the Magistrate in Cuddapah, stating his belief that the Jaghire of Bangunpilly transferred with the Ceded districts, and specially then declared to be subject to the "paramount authority, and control of the Honourable Company" is subject to my control.

Whilst I was lately at Kurnool, I learned that the most shameful disorder prevails in that district; the contending parties lately had recourse to arms; loaded cannon are stated to have been fired; and many lives to have been lost. Since the cession, His Highness the Nizam cannot exercise any authority there; and since the Principal Collector left the Ceded districts, it has not been defined by Government, whether the Collector of Cuddapah, or of Bellarie, is to exercise authority over the Jaghire.

Numerous complaints of exactions similar to that contained in the enclosed urzee from the Amildar of Punchpollem reach me from the inhabitants of this district, against the people in Bangunpilly. But I wait the orders of Government, on my reference of the 26th September 1821 to enable me to point out to them the proper channel for redress.

I beg, therefore, that if I am to exercise the control which it is believed I possess, the Government will be so good as to sanction the same; if not, that I may be authorized publicly to disclaim it, and to point out to complainants in whom the controlling power over the jaghire is vested.

Extract from the Minutes of Consultation, 13th January 1832.

* Read the following letter from the Principal Collector and Magistrate of Cuddapah.

No. 11.

From the Principal Collector and Magistrate of Cuddapah—States that the Resident at Hydrabad forwarded to him copy of his letter to Government intimating the Nizam's intention respecting the Jagir of Banganapully—observing thereupon—and adds, that it is the present intention of the Jageerdar to take up his temporary abode somewhere within the Talook adjoining that district.

Here enter 6th January 1832.

No. 12.

Resolution and order thereon.

No mention having been made in the letter from the Principal Collector of Cuddapah dated 7th November 1831 of the Jaghire of Banganapully being a dependency of this Government and no reference having been therein made to any former correspondence on the subject, the Right Henourable the Governor in Council presumed that the suggestion which the Principal Collector stated he had made to the Jaghirdar of "the propriety of representing the state of the affairs to the Resident at Hydrabad" was unobjectionable, and under that impression directed the letters dated 22nd November 1831 and 3rd January 1832 to be addressed to the Resident.

In the letter from the Principal Collector of Cuddapah now recorded, allusion is made to a former correspondence on the subject of this jagir, and on referring to it, and to the 6th Article of the Treaty with the Nizam, dated 12th October 1800, upon which the instructions of Government to the Board of Revenue, dated 11th November 1825, are founded, it clearly appears that the jagir of Banganapalle was by the said Treaty coded in full and in perpetuity to the Honourable Company.

In consequence of the reference now made to former correspondence, three letters from the Collector and Magistrate of Bellary as noted in the margin on the subject of this jagir have been discovered, and the Right Honourable the Governor in Council considers it necessary, with reference to what is therein stated and with a view to restore order and to provide for the due administration of Civil and Criminal Justice as well as to establish the authority of the Honourable Company and the district in question, that measures should be taken for annexing it permanently to one of the divisions of the Ceded districts. Resolved, therefore, as a preliminary step that a copy of the letter from this Government to the Board of Revenue, dated 11th November 1825, be transmitted to the Resident at Hyderabad in order that he may make such communication on the subject to the Nizam's Government as he may deem necessary, or that if he should not consider himself at liberty to take any steps in the matter without previous instructions from the supreme Government, reference may be made either by him or by this Government to the Right Honourable the Governor-General with a view to obtain them.

From the Collector and Magistrate in the sillah of Bellary. Submits that it has never been settled by whom the administration of Civil and Criminal justice in the jagir of Banganapalle shall be conducted, states that owing to the interruption in their dispensation the jagir, which is situated in the midst of the Ceded districts, is a common resort for oriminals who commit depredations in his zillah, represents that the original jagirdar has long been dead but that he cannot discover that his successor has ever communicated the circumstance to the Government or obtained the usual sanad of confirmation.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Acting Secretary's letter, 29th March, forwarding for my information and guidance extracts from the Minutes of Consultation under date 13th January and 13th March.

- 2. The only step which I have as yet deemed it prudent to adopt has been the issue of a proclamation announcing the annexation of Banganapalle to the zillah of Cuddapah, and calling upon all the creditors to attend either in person or by Vakeel in order that I may be able to form some correct judgment of the chief affairs. With the exception of certain villages in the possession or usurpation of Nuseeb Khan, a Patan and of one Chuzoogeree Gasamee, I am gratified to observe a general disposition to submit to the new jurisdiction to be exercised in the jagir.
- 3. I was inclined to hope however that these two refractory creditors would, after a few days' reflection, see the folly of resistance, and to promote this change of sentiment, I requested the Principal Collector and Magistrate of Bellary to exert his influence with the Nawab of Kurnool in requiring Nuseeb Khan, whose family and connections belong to that country, to withdraw his large party of Arabs from this zillah. I regret to find that no suitable impression has yet been effected. The Jagirdar, who has never quitted his asylum, has this day represented the harsh and disgraceful treatment, which his family in the Fort of Banganapalle begin to experience from the said Patan, whom I believe, from the little intercourse I had with him, capable of any outrage, and which, if perpetrated, would defeat all the kind intentions of Government towards the chief and his family. The Arabs and Patans now occupying the Fort of Banganapalle, in such seeming defiance of all authority, cannot be less than two hundred, a force not to be disregarded whether as respects number, or the character of the men. I am unwilling bowever to call in military aid without the previous sanction of Government, but some powerful manifestation of authority appears to me indispensable to restore order in a country, which has been so long disorganized.
- 4. The accompanying statement will afford your Board some idea of the manner in which the jagir has been partitioned, mortgaged or usurped. It is prepared from the best information I have as yet been able to procure. I have also added a geneological chart of the Jugirdar's family.
- 5. Notwithstanding the opposition I have experienced, it is my intention to introduce our system of police in those villages, which have shown requiescence in one rule; and as a temporary arrangement I have authorized the Tahsildar of Koilkuntla to take cognizance of all cases which the village officers may send up to him. It would be satisfactory to me to know as early as possible in what relation the country is to be considered in a revenue point of view particularly with respect to the Extra Sources of Revenue, Sayer Abkarry Mohterfa and Sundry small farms and licenses. The merchants and traders of Bangauapalle though accustomed to occasional

exactions have never been subjected to any contributions similar to the Neesabudee tax of the Ceded Districts. Exemption therefore in future would, I apprehend, encourage merchants to desert the adjoining taluks for the purpose of settling within the limits of the Jagir.

GENTLEMEN.

- 1. Owing to the obstinacy of the Patan in holding out for so long a time the Fort of Banganapalle in defiance of my authority, I have been prevented from complying with the direction of your Board, in preparing at an earlier period the report on the title and tenure of that jagir, for which the sunnuds and other documents which were kept in the fort, required to be examined.
- 2. The first sunnud to the present family is dated 1178 Hij/1764-A.D. and confined to the taluk of Banganapalle the grants being described as a transfer of the claim of the former Jagirdar Moohummed Beg Khan in which family of Mogbul descent it had descended from three generations. The last of that race being without heirs, it was bestowed on Hoossain Alee Khan, the grandfather of the present chief whose father had married

allusion is made to a separate sunnud granted Asud Alee Khan, the brother of Hoossein Alee Khan for the Killadaree of Chunchulmulla, and also to the assignment of this Pergunnah in the name of Fuzal Alee Khan, Chunchulmulla is described of the Sirkar Gundicottah Soobah Hydrabad and Banganapalle of the Sirkar Nundial Soobah Beejapoor. It will be seen that under the head of diamond mines, Ahsham and provision for two jagirs, a large portion of the total revenue was altogether set apart.

The next sunnud is from Tippu Sooltan dated \$\frac{1197}{1782}\$ Hij. briefly confirming to Gholam Alee Khan, the son of Hoossain Alee Khan, the enjoyment of the former sunnud according to its terms. Notwithstanding this grant, it appears from the Deshpondies accounts, that the jagir was immediately resumed, it is said on failure of service, and never enjoyed during that Government. In 1205 Hij/1790-A.D., above a year previous to the treaty with Tippu, on the part of the Nizam's Government a fresh sunnud was granted by the Dewan Azum Pol Omra (afterwards styled Arnstoojah) to Asad Alee Khan, the brother and Gholam Alee Khan, the son of Hoossain Alee Khan of both the Pergunnahs of Banganapalle and Chunchulmulla, which had been formerly assigned to Hoossain Alee Khan and Fuzul Allee Khan. Other taluks such as Vellaloor, Rychoore, Adhone (since resumed) were also conferred on this family

of the present Chief Hoossain Alee Khan, his incapacity for business and the partition which has taken place among the different members of the family seem to preclude all hope that the management of the country could ever be satisfactorily entrusted to him. Of the villages composing his share there is not one at his disposal, all being in possession of different creditors. His own brother to whose share 10 villages, also mortgaged, belong is one from whose exertions I can alone look forward to the rescue of the family from utter ruin, and as one of his sons has been adopted by the Nawab their interests may be considered in some degree united.

5. That the Government is at liberty to impose in lieu of the conditions and reservations named in the sunnuds, whatever amount they may deem equitable in the way of peshcush cannot, I think, be doubted, but the difficulty is how in so divided and unsettled a state as I have described the

The absham peons who garrisoned the forts, I have shown to derive their pay from the town duties in which are . . . and other items, and these extra sources therefore seem applicable for the maintenance of the Police administration of the country, the expense of which has now devolved on the Government. The diamond mine, on which such stress seems to be laid in the sunnud, is of little value and confined to the immediate vicinity of Banganapalle.

He should prohibit the persons whom he may establish in different police stations in his Foujdary for the administration and good order of the country from receiving anything unlawfully, exercising any forbidden act or using any spirituous liquor; and should take such care of the public roads that the travellers and passengers may pass there with confidence and comfort. No larceny or robbery should take place; but if the property of any person should be stolen, he must produce the property together with the thief or robber, and having delivered over the property to the owner, he shall punish the offender; and in case he fails to produce the same, he shall make it good. The superior and subordinate officers as well as the land-holders of the said Purgunah are to consider the functions of the said officer as vested in the abovementioned Khan—written on the 21st Ramzan in the 5th year of the reign.

Extract from Board's E.M.C., dated 11th September 1837, Nos. 42-43.

Major Thomas Munko,

Principal Collector of the Ceded Country.

I have received your letters of the 15th and 18th instant and am directed to express to you the satisfaction of the Governor in Council at the expedition with which you have taken possession of the ceded country.

- 2. You have already been furnished with the orders of the Governor in Council founded on the treaty to resist all claims which may be preferred to you in consequence of the late transfer of authority; and I now enclose for your further information extract from a letter from the Resident at Hyderabad explanatory of that part of the treaty.
- 3. The Governor in Council considers the resumption of the Pollams of Kotcondah and Kapitral to be conformable to his Lordship's instructions of the 25th ultimo and his Lordship approves the pensions, which you have granted to the widows of the late Polygars.
- 4. The Governor in Council will consult the Resident at Hyderabad on the subject of the Extent of Mozuffer-ul-Mulk's jaghir, and will furnish you with his Lordship's orders at a future period relative to the villages retained by that chieftain.
- 5. The claims of the Rajah of Annagoondy and of the Polygar of Goodicotah on the Company's Government are unsupported by the terms of the treaty of Hyderabad, but the Governor in Council will be prepared to consider their pretensions as a question of humanity or of expediency, whenever you may deem it expedient to bring the actual circumstances of their situation under the notice of his Lordship.

EXTRACT of a letter to Major Thomas Munno, from the Chief Secretary to Government, dated 25th December 1800, Secret Department.

- 5. These territories have been ceded in full sovereignty to the Company in lieu of stipulated subsidy for the support of a military force and the value at which the several districts have been mutually rated is stated in the schedules already transmitted to you. It is evident therefore that no objection on the Company exists for the continuance of any other jagirs than those to the continuance of which the Company shall have expressly agreed and if any of the officers of the late Government shall be liable to injury from the change of authority, it is equally manifest that their claims to a compensation can only be binding on His Highness the Nizam because the admission of them by the Company would deprive it of a portion of the means allotted for the performance of its engagements.
- 6. Upon the ground's of this reasoning, the Governor in Council directs you to consider no lands to be jugir, with the sole exception already mentioned in favour of Muzuffer-ul-Mulk and the Nabob of Kurnool.

EXTRACT of a letter from the Resident at Hyderahad, to the Chief Secretary to Government of Fort St. George, dated 15th January 1801.

Observing that Major Munro in his letter to you of the 21st November expresses a wish to be furnished with copies of all documents respecting such jagirdars or poligars as may have been established in the Ceded districts with the concurrence of this Government, it is proper that I

should notice for the information of the Right Honourable the Governor in Council that I know of no jageerdars or other individual claimants or claims whatever in the ceded countries excepting those of the family of Muzuffur-ul-Mulk on the jageers of Banganpilly and Chenchurmalah, the whole scope indeed of my late negotiations and the discussions in particular respecting those two jaghiers tending most incontrovertibly to prove that either no other claims existed or that they were not brought forward from a thorough conviction of the inutility of so doing—several applications have of late indeed been preferred to me for confirmation or reinstatement in possessions which they pretend to hold or to have held in the ceded districts, but I have deemed it my duty invariably to resist and discourage all such applications, the unfounded nature of which may be sufficiently inferred from their meeting with no support or countenance from this Government.

With respect to poligars (as alluded to in Major Munro's letter) their entire or partial toleration or expulsion from the ceded countries is a question, I humbly conceive, of mere political expediency, which the Government under whose authority those countries have fallen is alone competent to decide upon.

EXTRACT of a letter from the Resident at Hyderabad, dated 13th October 1800

It is proper I should acquaint your Lordship that it has been finally settled by virtue of full authority delegated to me for the purpose by the Governor-General that His Highness the Nizam shall be responsible for two years from the date of the treaty for the regular yearly payment of the Kurnool peshcush and that at the expiration of such period the Company are to assume the full exercise of the tributary and feudatory rights over that principality devolving to them by the present treaty. The districts of Banganpilly and Chenchalamala rated in the schedule at forty-one thousand eight hundred and four country pagodas are to remain in jageer to Muzuffur-ul-Mulk and his family subject, however, of course to the Paramount authority and control of the Honourable Company as sovereigns of the whole of the Nizam's late possession south of the Toombooddrah and the Kistna below the junction of those two rivers. The enclosed copy and translation of Azim-ul-Oomrah's letter to me on the foregoing subject and of my answer to the same will enable your Lordship to judge saill more accurately of the nature and extent of the engagements above alluded to.

TRANSLATION of a letter from Azim-ul-Oomrah, to the Resident, received 20th September 1800.

What His Highness has been pleased to determine upon in consequence of the representations of Moonshee Uzazoolla respecting the Jageer of Munsoor ad Dowlah and Muzuffur al Mulk Bahadur as also on the subject of the Pesheush of Kurnool I have now by His Highness's express commands the pleasure of communicating that as the said Jageer is in truth the sole means of subsistence of a numerous family of the abovementioned chieftains a desire to avoid committing an act of injustice renders it impossible for His Highness to deprive them of it. With respect to the Pesheush of Kurnool it has likewise been determined by His Highness that for the present from the date of the pending treaty the said l'eshoush shall be annually paid to the Honourable Company by the Circar according to the schedule of the Treaty of Mysore, and that by degrees in consideration of the Union, and Friendship subsisting * * the two States the Peshoush aforesaid will after a certain period (viz. two years) be paid by Muhummud Alif Khan, and that the said chieftain will become agreeably to instructions a dependant of the British Government.

Translation of a letter from the Resident to Azim-ul-Omrah in reply to the above dated 25th September.

I have had the pleasure to receive your friendly letter respecting the Jageer of Muzuffur ul Mulk, and Munsoor ad Dowlah Bahadur and on the subject of the Peshoush of Kurnool.

Although the continuing the Jageer to the above mentioned chieftains is far from being unattended with difficulty, still in compliance with your wishes, I have taken the responsibility of the measure upon myself persuaded that henceforward these chieftains like all other Jageer-dars will not fail in any of the duties of obedience and attachment to the Honorable Company's Government.

With regard to my acquiescence with your application respecting the Peshcush of Kurnool although adverting to the positive injunctions of the most noble the Governor-Genèral, my meeting your wishes on this head is attended with numerous objections yet in deference to His Highness's desire with which it is my constant endeavour to comply, I shall take upon myself the load of responsibility in this particular also. But I must entreat Your Excellency to bear in mind that no obstruction is ever to be given to the passage of the Honorable Company's troops through the district of Kurnool.

Agreeable to the union and friendship subsisting between the two States and by Your Excellency's arduous endeavours which from the commencement to the termination of their negotiation have been the subject of most grateful reflection, some whatever diminution the space of two years can conveniently admit, will afford me proportionate satisfaction and delight.

GENTLEMEN,

As it is probable your Board may shortly have under your consideration the report on the affairs of the Banaganpully Jageedar, I consider it my duty to forward for your inspection copies of correspondence for which I am indebted to Mr. Blane having been taken by him since his return from the Bellary records.

These papers are of much importance as clearly showing the reasons by which the district of Banaganpully was continued to the family of Muzuffur ul Moolk after this Country was ceded by the Nizam.

Among the Copies of Extracts herewith forwarded your Board will find a translation of a letter from Azim ul Comrah to the Resident at Hyderabad and received by him on the 20th September 1800 in which regarding the Jageer of Muzuffur ul Moolk he says—"I have now by His Highness's express commands the pleasure of "communicating that as the said Jageer is in truth the sole means of subsistence of "a numerous family of the abovementioned chieftains, a desire to avoid committing "an act of injustice renders it impossible for His Highness to deprive them of it."

The reply of the Resident to this communication is dated 25th September and is as follows:—

"Although the continuing the Jageer to the abovementioned chieftains is far from being "unattended with difficulty, still in compliance with your wishes I have taken the responsibility of the measure upon myself persuaded that henceforward these chieftains like all other Jageerdars "will not fail in any of the duties of obedience and attachment to the Honorable Company's "Government."

The Resident at Hyderabad in his letter of the 13th October 1800 reports that by virtue of full authority delegated to him by the Governor-General it was finally settled that the districts of Bunganpilly and Chenchermulla were to remain in Jageer to Muzuffur ul Moolk and his family, subject to the Paramount authority and controul of the Honorable Company as Sovereigns of the whole of the Nizam's late possessions south of the Toombudra and Kistnah rivers below their junction.

The Chief Secretary to Government in a letter to Major Munro, dated 25th December 1800, stating the Terms on which the territory had been ceded remarks: "It is evident therefore that no obligation on the Company exists for the continuance of any other Jageers than those to the continuance of which the Company shall have "expressly agreed" and in an after paragraph "upon the grounds of this reasoning the Governor in Council directs you to consider no lands to be Jageer with the sole exception already mentioned in favor of Muzuffur ul Moolk and the Nabob of Kurnool."

It would therefore appear that the continuance of the district of Bunganpully in Jagheer to Muzuffur ul Moolk and his family was stipulated for by the Nizam's Government and agreed to by the British Authorities prior to the conclusion of the treaty with the Nizam, this Agreement having taken place in the month of September 1800 whilst the date of the treaty is the 12th of October of the same year.

As the documents above alluded to do not appear to have been brought to your Board's notice when on your Proceedings under date the 10th of September 1835 the orders of Government were issued for the resumption of the Jageer. In consequence of their importance to the parties concerned and the new position which the claims of the family thereby assume, I am induced respectfully to request your Board's consideration of the information now furnished and shall await your future orders for my guidance.

DEMI-OFFICIAL CORRESPONDENCE OF 1905 BEGARDING THE HISTORY OF BANGANAPALLE.

Demi-official from A. Galletti, Esq., I.C.S., Acting Under Secretary to the Government of Madras, to J. C. Molony, Esq., I.C.S., Assistant Political Agent, Banganapalle, dated 11th July 1905.

The Government of India are bringing out a new edition of Aitchison's Treaties and want the summaries of the history of Native States in Aitchison verified and brought up to date. The Banganapalle summary is not correct, and cannot be corrected by other accounts we have herewhich conflict with one another.

The only authentic documents throwing light on the early history of Banganapalle which we have in our records are copies of sanads and inayatnamas taken from the fort in 1832. The earliest sanad is one of the 5th year of Shah Alum (1761) conferring Banganapalle on Husain Ali Khán "in consequence of the removal of Muhammad Beg Khán for whom Shuja-ul-Mulk lately "procured a sanad". A genealogy was also sent up in 1832 according to which Husain was the great-great-nephew of Muhammad Beg; and Muhammad Beg the grandson of a person of the same name "who first held the jaghir". In a petition of 1838 it is also stated that the jaghir was originally granted by the Emperor Aulum-Gheer (i.e., Aurungzeb).

Our printed accounts do not give their authorities. One of them says that the jaghir was originally procured for the family by Mubariz Khán, a vazir of Aurungzeb's; another that Aurungzeb's vazir (sic) had it given his own son. The only Mubariz Khán I know of was a Subadar of Hyderabad in the reign of Muhammad Shah. According to the genealogy of 1832 the original Muhammad Beg's father was called Atha Khán and I know of no vazir of Aurungzeb's of that name.

If Banganapalle was conferred in jaghir by Aurungzeb it could hardly have been earlier than 1687-89 when he conquered the kingdoms of Bijapur and Hyderabad. In that case the six generations of the genealogy have to be squeezed into 70 years. Also Aurungzeb was a fanatical Sunni and the Banganapalle family are Shiahs. Also in 1832 the family were trying to make out that they had always been independent of the Nizam and had held direct of the Emperor. In these circumstances I do not believe much in Aurungzeb's grant or the genealogy.

Are there any old sanads, genealogies, etc., in Banganapalle now? Have the family any traditions?

Demi-official from J. C. Molony, Esq., I.C.S., Assistant Political Agent, Banganapalle, to A. Galletti, Esq., I.C.S., Acting Under Secretary to Government, Political department, dated 1st August 1905.

Herewith is the history of Bangauapalle, as set forth by Khaja Mahammad Husain, the Medical officer of the State. He quotes his authorities in foot-notes, and has verified them more or less by the traditions current in the places. It is probably a much more accurate history of the place than that in the Gazetteer. As you may see Aurungzeb had nothing to do with the place, it was much too small for him to bother about.

HISTORICAL ACCOUNT OF BANGANAPALLE

• BY

Hadji Khaja Muhammad Humain, Medical Officer, Banganapalle.

Prior to 1601 Hijri = 1651 A.D. Banganapalle was under the sway of Rajah Nanda-Chakravarthy and his descendants who had their head-quarters at Nandavaram. About this time, Ismail Adil Shah, the King of Bijapur, conquered Banganapalle and the sur-

rounding zamindaris and gave Banganapalle as a jagir to his General Siddu Sumbul as a reward.

The latter held it until 1665 A.D. During this year Muhammad Beg Khan Rosebahaui (a) was made the Khilladar of Banganapalle through the influence of his nephew Mubaraz Khan (b) who was the Subadar of Hyderabad. In 1186 Muhammad Beg Khan Rosebahani was succeeded by his adopted son Muhammad Beg Khan-i-lung.

This man continued to be a Khilladar of Banganapalle, but during the latter part of his administration, he sent an arzi (petition) to the Court of Delhi through Mubaraz Khan for a

sanad conferring upon him the jagir of Bangauapalle. This was procured (c) for him by Khutbul-Mulk, the vazeer, under seal of Rafi-ud-darjat, a grandson of Aurungzeb.

Muhammad Beg Khán-i-lung died in 1725 or Hijri 1137 (d).

He was succeeded by Ata Khan.

Ata Khan was the son-in-law of his predecessor and held the jagir for three years and died in 1728. He was followed on the gaddi by his brother-in-law Fazle Ali Khan, the son of

Muhammad Beg Kan-i-lung.

4. Fazil Ali Khan, 1728-1737.

Fazil Ali Khan administered the jagir for nine years. He died in 1737. His son Fazil Ali Khan II succeeded him.

Norss - (a) The above account was taken from a book in manuscript preserved in Bangan palls which is believed to contain an authentic record of the early history of Langanapalls. It was written by one Chulam Hyder, Shahwar, a munchi of jagirdar Hussain ali Khan II (1822-1843) from records kept in the time of Mansur ud-dowlah the Great It is not specifically mentioned in this book, how long Mohammad Bog Khan Rosebahani continued to be a Khilladar and in what year his adopted son succeeded him. The two names have been mixed together in the narrative. It is, however, casually mentioned in another place that Rosebahani was a Khilladar for 21 years. It can therefore be safely calculated that he held the Khilladari till 1686.

(b) Minbraz Khan through whom Muhammad Beg Khan Rosebahani is said to have procured the Khilladari, is variously mentioned as Grand Vazeer of Aurungzeb, Grand Vazeer of Shah Alum, etc. According to the manuscript referred to in note (a) he had no connection with Delhi but was a Subadar of Hyderabad. How and where Mubaras Khan worked his influence to produce the grant for his uncle is not mentioned. Muhammad Beg Khan Rosebahani came into possession of Bangan palle when the Deccan was governed by Bijapur and long before its fall in 1588. Under these circumstances, it is evident that Aurungzeb (vis) called Alum Gir) had nothing to do with the original grant of the Khilladari of Bangan-palle to Muhammad Beg Khan Rosebahani. The first sanad ever granted by the Court of Delhi was to his successor Muhammad Beg Khan-i-lung (c).

(c) This sanad is not to be found in the records kept in the Fort at Banganapalle; it is said to have been lost during its occupation by Tippu's men (1784-1791). It's prive that Raftind-darjat during his very short reign was the granter of the sanad of the jacir to Mahammad Beg Khan-i-lung, there exists now a document in Banganapalte of some inam to the Khasi's family which bears the seal of Mahammad Beg Kaha. The following is a facsimile of the seal:—

Transliteration of the seel "Muhammad Beg Khan, fid-er-i-Rad-ud-darjat, Badeba-bi Gházi 1131."



Translation of the seal "Muhammad Beg Khan, the arreant of Kafi-ud-darjat, Badsha-hi-Ghasi, 1131".

"Badelfa-hi-Gházi" which literally means a warrior king is a title assumed by all the Emperors of Delhi. The date 1311 Hijri = 17:9 A.D. corresponds with the period in which Baff-ud-darjat was the nominal Emperor of Delhi (see also Shamsul-i-lms, Moulavi Zuka cllah's Hist.ry of India, Mogbal period, Vol. IX for the reign of Rafi ud-darjat.

(d) By the process called aljad; that is. a, b, j, d), in which every letter has a numerical value, it is cu-tomary to record in Indus the decesse of celebrated men by such a combination of letters as will give their name, or character, or the manner of their death, while showing at the same time the date of the coonarence. By this method, the death of Muhammad Beg Khan-i-lung is thus recorded in verse:—

1137 Hijri

(Maskandmava.i-6 Khul-de larin ") " His residence and destination (is) the magnificent heaven ".

This man was jagirdar of Banganapalle 5. Fasit Ali Khan II'alise Gharaffar Ali Mirma alias Gullu for 32 years, and died in the month of Zilqada Nawab, 1737-1769. 1182 Hijri or 1769 A.D. He did not marry

and was therefore issueless. His nephew (sister's son) Saiyid Hussain Ali Khan succeeded him.

With Saiyid Hussain Ali Khan the present dynasty of the jagirdars of Banganapalle begins. He was the son of Saiyid Muhammad Khan 6. Saiyid Hussain Ali Khan I, 1769-1783. Nakhde. His mother was the daughter of Fazil

Ali Khan I. Saiyid Muhammad Khan Nakhde again was the grandson of Saiyid Muhammad Razvi, Prime Minister to Shah Abbas II of Persia. There is a legend in Banganapalle to the effect that Fazil Ali Khan II did not marry with the sole object of handing over the jagir to the son of his beloved sister—the mother of Hussain Ali Khan—and adopted the latter as his own The nephew therefore succeeded the uncle after his death in 1769.

During the period in which Saiyid Hussain Ali Khan held the jagir, the paish-kash (tribute) of Rs. 12,000 per annum together with 200 men for infantry which was being regularly paid

by the jagirdars of Banganapalle to the rulers Paish-kash remitted. of Kurnool, since the jagir was first conferred

on Muhammad Beg Khan-1-lung was permanently remitted. It was Shuja-ul-mulk (e) the then Nawab of Imtyazgar, Adóni, etc., who interceded on behalf of "the poor Saiyid family" and had the paish-kash remitted by Run-mast Khan, the ruler of Kurnool.

Hussain Ali Khan being desirous of earning some military distinction applied to Haidar Ali of Mysore and was made a General in his army and fought many battles with distinction. After Haidar's death, he took leave of Tippu to return to Banganapalle but died on the way. His body was brought to Banganapalle on the 27th of Ramzan 119. Hijri or 1783 A.D. and buried there.

Tippu on hearing of Hussain Ali Khan's death sent for the children of the deceased. They were four in number, the eldest of whom was Banganapalle in the hands of Tippu, 1784-1791. Saiyid Ghulam Ali Khan, a minor. As the children were of tender age and in delicate health, the widow refused to send them to Mysore. This Tippu construed into a deliberate slight and ordered the confiscation to his State of the jagir of Banganapalle. The widow, her sons and their paternal uncle Saiyid Asad Ali Khan then fled to Hyderabad.

Saiyid Asad Ali Khan earned a great repute as a military commander in Hyderabad. After about seven years' stay there, he returned to Banganapalle with a number of troops and fought a pitched hattle at Jammadpalle, defeated Khutbudin, Tippu's deputy and got back the possession of Banganapalle. In this battle Asad Ali and his eldest nephew Ghulam Ali were wounded and the latter's brother Fathe Ali Khan who was above 16 years of age was killed. This happened Two years after this, Asad Ali Khen took a leading part in installing his nephow in 1791. Saiyid Ghulam Ali Khan as the jagirdar of Banganapalle.

Mansur-ud-dowlah during his regime introduced the sub-jagir system and made soverat grants of villages to his brothers and cousins (Asad Ali Khan's sons, as sub-jagirs. He lived 7. Saiyid Ghulam Ali Khan Mansur-ud-dowlab 1, 1793-1822. a great portion of his time in Hyderabad, leaving Banganapalle in charge of an Agent or Naib.

When the ceded districts were handed over (f) to the Honoural le East India Company by the Nizam of Hyderabad, in 1798, the latter asked Mansur-ud-dowlah if he would exchange Banganapalle with Imtyazgar or Adóni whose revenue was calculated to be twice that of Banganapalle. Maneur-ud-dowlah, however, did not wish to do so. (g) He said that, as all his forefathers were buried at Banganapalle, he would on no account relinquish the old jugir. Hashmat Jung (A), the British Resident at the Court of Nizam, then intervened and offered on behalf of the British Government to allow Mansur-ud-dowlah to retain his jagir, if the Nizam The Nizam acquiesced. would hand over Adóni to his Government.

Mansur-ud-dowlah abdicated the Gaddi on behalf of his son in 1822, died three years after and was buried at Banganapalle.

Saiyid Hussain Ali Khan II, the eldest son of Mansur-ud-dowlab, succeeded his father in 1822. It was during his administration that the 8. Saiyid Hussain Ali Khan II, 1822-1848. jagir was assumed by the British Government as it was heavily involved in debt. He died in 1848 without male issue and was succeeded by his mephew and son-in-law, Saiyid Ghulam Ali Khan, Mansur-ud-dowlah II.

Saiyid Ghulam Ali Khan administered the jagir for about 19 years. He was created a C.S.I. He died in 1868 without a son and was 9. Saiyid Gholam Ali Khan, c.s.t., aliae Mansur-pd-dowlah II, 1849-1868. succeeded by his nephew (the son of his brother Saiyid Asad Ali Khan) Saiyid Fathi Ali Khan-



Many thanks for the historical account of Banganapalle which the Medical officer of the State has been so good as to draw up.

The manuscript on which it is based is said to have been drawn up from records kept in the time of the elder Mansúr-ud-daula. Do not those records or some of them exist now? If so, could von let me have copies? I am not particular about translations. I could send the copies to the Translator to Government for translation.

A date in the life and the date of death of Muhammed Bég Khán are fixed by first-rate original evidence. I should be very glad of similar evidence for other persons and events. The second-hand evidence of the manuscript itself is, I suppose, not of much value. The account of Hussain Ali Khán, for instance, reads very like a mere ingenious amplification of the short letter of Tipu to Hussain's son on Hussain's death, of which we have a copy and translation in the Government records. If so, the details in the manuscript which do not occur in the letter may be imaginary. The sanad of 1761 (of which we have copy and translation here) says Hussain got the jagir "from the removal of Muhammad Bég Khán for whose place the Vakil of Amírul-ul-amra Shuj-ul-muld Bahádur had lately obtained a sanad." Is there anything to show whether this Muhammad Bég was the Muhamed Beg who died in 1137 Hijree? If they are to be identified, it looks as if the manuscript account of the succession of Ata Khán and the two Fasal Ali Kháns were all fiction.

The genealogy in your account does not square with one in our records sent up in 1832 by the Collector.



The genealogy of 1832 brings in two extra generations. Is the genealogy in your account based on anything which goes back beyond 1832?

I enclose a historical account of Banganapalle which I have just got from Molony. Please return it when you have done with it. I should be obliged if you would correct the Anno Domini equivalents for the Hijree years before sending it back.

As the account is based on a manuscript written so late as 1822—1848 and in the time of an ex-jagirdar who was trying to get us to give the jagir back, it is not worth much. I am writing to Molony to ask him to send copies of the documents on which the manuscript is based, if they are still in existence. You will see that two documents are referred to in the account which give us the date of Muhammad Bég Khán.

Demi-official from F. R. Hemingway, Esq., I.C.S., Officer in charge of the office of the Gazetteer, to the Assistant Secretary to Government.

I send you back the Banganapalle article. But I want you to let me have it back again. Meanwhile I wish you would tell me what two manuscripts give us the date of Muhammad Bég Khán. Also I wish you would let me know whether you have got any of the originals from Molony. It seems to me that the seal quoted on page 3 of Muhammad Bég Khán-i-lung is pretty good evidence. Also I personally am rather impressed by the tone of the account and would be inclined to credit it generally. I should give it for what it is worth as "tradition" and should draw a sharp line between this part and what is known from history.

Demi-official from J. C. Molony, Enq., I.C.S., Assistant to the Political Agent for Banganapalle, to the Assistant Secretary to Government, dated 16th August 1905.

Can you send the sunnad of 1761 which says that Husain got the jagir "from the removal of Muhammad Bég Khán, etc."? I think this sannad is a work of imagination. The vakil of the gentleman with the long name may have got a sannad for Banganapalle, but nobody ever paid any attention to it.

The genealogy sent up by the Collector in 1832 which you quote seems all wrong according to information here. I am inclined to think that when the Collector asked for a genealogy some munshi either in his office or at Banganapalle wrote one offhand, and as nothing about the place

was ever verified it went up and did service as a genealogy.

What is the date in Muhammad Bég Khán's life that is fixed? Which Muhammad Bég was it and what is the evidence? If we have one fixed date we can test all the rest. The names of these men contain evidence as to their births and deaths; generally the name of a fairly well-educated Muhammadan will show his time. If you can give this fixed date, the medical officer can check his calculations by it.

There is not much documentary evidence here, but such as there is I shall get for you. However tradition is something and the people here say that the genealogy of 1832 is absurd. It

seems to me that it has too many generations: how can they fit in?

If you can send the sanad and the date in Muhammad Bég's life, I will send up all the information that can be procured and will return the sanad.

Demi-official from J. C. Molony, Esq., I.C.S., Assistant Political Agent, Banganapalle, to the Assistant Secretary to Government, dated Banganapalle, 30th August 1905.

Herewith is sent a further communication on the history of Banganapalle. A box of original documents is also sent by registered parcel; please be careful of these and send them back as soon as you can as the family prize them very highly.

As some questions seem to turn on the understanding of Persian and Arabic, I should be inclined to value as high the opinion of Khaja Hussain. He knows these languages exceedingly well; he settled for sometime in Arabia and carried on practice there.

From Khaja Muhammad Husain, Medical Officer, Banganapalle State, to the Assistant Political Agent, Banganapalle, dated 24th August 1900.

With reference to the remarks made by the Assistant Secretary on the historical account of Banganapalle previously submit ed, I beg to hand you over in a separate parcel a few records in original that were found in the Fort at Banganapalle.

- 2. By the kind courtesy of Nawab Saiyid Ghulam 'Ali Khán Bahadur who allowed me to have a free access to all the private records kept in the Fort, I went through them and have selected those that are likely to throw some light on the subject in question. It is stated that most of the early records were carried away by lippu's men during their occupation of Banganapalle while a few of the remaining papers were taken to Hyderabad by Mansur-ud-daula the elder and never brought back.
- 3. The date of the death of Muhammad Bég Khán, recorded in the manuscript by the process of "abjad" (that is a b j d), is regarded as "fixed by first rate original evidence." The dates of accession and death of the two Fazle 'Ali Kháns are also similarly recorded (please see A: pendix A) and they prove that these two individuals succeeded each other after the death of Muhammad Bég Khán in 1137 Hijri. There is a lapse of 3 years between the death of Muhammad Bég Khán and the accession of Fazle 'Ali Khán the First and if we were to take "the second-hand evidence of the manuscripts" as correct, this gap is filled up by Atá Khán, the son-in-law and "Mir-i-Sámán" (chamberlain) of Muhammad Bég Khán. I have not however come across any abjad record or any other paper to prove this man's identity. The genealogy of 1832 gives him the first place in the list of the Jaghirdars of Banganapalle. This probably is a mistake. The two Muhammad Bég Kháns (Rosebahani and Lung) are held by tradition to be the first Muhammadan Khilladars or Jaghirdars of Banganapalle.
- 4. The introduction also in the genealogy mentioned above, of the name of Muhammad Bég between the two Fazle 'Ali Kháns seems to be based on Hussain 'Ali's sannd which says that he got the Jaghir "from the removal of Muhammad Bég Khán for whose place the vakit of Amirul-Umra Shuja-ul-Mulk Bahádur had lately obtained a sanad." These words are evidently meant to convey the idea that Muhammad Bég Khán was removed from the khilladari of Banganapalle, that immediately after this the vakil t of Amir-ul-Umra Shuja-ul-Mulk obtained a sanad of the khilladari for himself and that finally the sanad of such khilladari was given to Hussain 'Ali. This interpretation, in my humble opinion, does not tally with the actual words of the sanad. The Arabic word, in my humble opinion, does not tally with the actual words of the sanad. The Arabic word, if (Taghi ur) in the sanad which was luckily found here and which is now submitted in original please see document marked 3) does not necessarily mean "removal". It can more appropriately be translated as "change" and its sense taken as follows: "From the changes or changes that occurred in the Khilladari of Muhammad Bég

[&]quot;The words "for whose place" appear to have been added by the translator as they do not occur in the mind

itself.

† This vakil's name was Mir Saifullah or Saiful-din. He was a Diwan of Cuddapah. The story as to how he managed to get a smad during the shiiladari of Fasle 'Ali Khan the Second and how it was revoked soon after, is narrated in the manuscript.

- Khán". These "changes" may mean the several successions that followed the death of Muhammad Bég Khán. Indeed in the orders issued to the village authorities by the granter of this sanad, the words "his associates and other persons" are written after the name of Muhammad Bég Khán. This paper is also sent in original (please see document No. 4).
- 5. Or again, the Arabic word as written in the sanad, can also be read as (Ja-i-un) meaning "once in the possession of". The jagir of Banganapalle is commonly known here as that of Muhammad Bég Khán probably because he was its original holder. The late Nawab Syed Fateh 'Ali Khán, Bahádur, c.s.i., used to say "we owe this jagir to Muhammad Bég Khán". It is therefore likely that in this sanad also his name is brought in to show the identity of the jagir.
- 6. I admit that these are far-fetched constructions on the wordings of the sanad but now that this document together with its accessory is sent in, in original, it could be scrutinized by experts in these matters so as to arrive at a right conclusion. My humble contention however is that it would be a pity if merely for the sake of one ambiguous word in Husain Ali's sanad a fictitious name be added to the genealogy and the succession after Muhammad Bég Khán of two individuals based on reliable data be completely ignored.
- 7. Again the genealogy of 1832 makes it appear that the mother of Husain Ali was the maternal niece or sister's daughter of Fazle' Ali the Second. This is incorrect. Documents Nos. 2 and 3 herewith submitted distinctly state that Husain was the maternal nephew—sister's son—of Fazle 'Ali the Second. Amatul Batul Khanam was the name of Husain Ali's mother and she was the daughter of Fazle Ali the First.
- 8. Documents Nos. 1 and 2 (in original) seem to be some sanctioned applications from Fazle 'Ali Khán and Husain 'Ali Khán, respectively, bearing the same dates and the same seals.
- 9. Papers Nos. 5 to 9 are letters addressed to the "wife of Nawab Fazle 'Alí Khán Bahádur" and Fazle 'Alí Khán the Second, respectively. This "wife" is supposed to be that of Fazle 'Alí Khán the First, as the other had no legal wife. This is merely a supposition. The name and the year of the seals on the cover of these two letters (5 and 6) are quite indistinct. They can merely be taken for what they are worth. There can be no doubt, however, as regards the other three letters (Nos. 7, 8 and 9). They prove the identity of Fazle Alí Khán the Second, also called Kham-Kham-ud-dowlah (please see Genealogical tree of the Banganapalle family).
- 10. Papers Nos. 10 to 13 are Tippu Sultan's letters addressed to Ghulám 'Alí Khán, who was afterwards called Mansúr-ud-dowlah the elder. These are also submitted in original to show that Tippu repeatedly wrote to Ghulam 'Alí Khán "to come to my presence" after his father's death and even used threats: "Your excuses are of no avail. If you do not come immediately after the receipt of this letter, Sirkar's men will come there and bring you here by force" (please see No. 13). It is stated that after the receipt of this letter Husain 'Alí's widow fied to Hyderabad with her sons and the fort was occupied by a Khilladar appointed by Tippu. No. 14 is a copy of Tippu's order to his Khilladar of Bauganapalle about some inam of the Khazi. I have copied this from the original document which is preserved in the Khazi's family.
- 11. No. 15 is a copy of the sanad granted to the Khazi by Muhammad Bég Khán bearing his seal with the year 1131. The original of this sanad also is with the present Khazi.

The printed "Genealogical tree of the Bauganapalle family" drawn up by the Political Agent mentions this lady as the wife of Syed Jahin 'Ali Khán, the grand-father of Husain 'Ali. This is certainly a mistake. She was the wife of his son, Syed Muhammad Nakhdé. It is a well-founded tradition in Banganapalle that Syed Jahir 'Ali Khán, the ancestor of the present Syed family, married the daughter of Asad 'Ali Khán, the Frime Minister of the king of Bijapúr.


After expressing a desire of seeing you let it become manifest that your letter for remitting. Rs. 400 on account of horses has arrived, and its contents relating to your welfare have afforded, pleasure. The non-remittance of the amount is due to many adverse circumstances. Mahbub Khan Sahib is involved here in an unsatisfictory state of affairs. The money he brought with him for troopers through Mir Moin, Ali Khan has been spent towards the expenses of (illegible) and hence the delay in remitting the amount. The shame created thereby has prevented me from writing to you. At present I have arranged to get Rs. 450 for expenses from a sowcar in Kadwal who is the Agent of Balab Sunder on the following condition that as soon as the horses arrive at Gadwal the money will be paid without any excuse. The balance will be repaid to you after two or three months, and hence I trouble you with a request that the horses may be sent by a trustworthy man to Gadwal so that the amount might be forwarded to you by him. The rest will be known to you through the letter of Mir Sultan Sahib. Please convey my salams to Husain Ali Khan Sahib, Asad Ali Khan, Qasim Ali Khan, Ibrahim Ali Khan, Muhammad Beg Khan and Miran Sahib. May you be happy and at ease!

To the kind Nawab Fazl Ali Khan Samsam-ud-doula Bahadur Shamsher Jung may the great God keep him safe!

Translation of document No. 9.

[Document executed by one Syed Jamal in favour of Nawab Fazle Ali Khan Bahadur.]

Nawab Fazl Ali Khan Bahadur, may your shadow last long!



I, Saiyid Jamal alias Shah Sahib, sent by Ghulab Khan, do hereby promise and execute that the said Khan received from the Sirkar of Nawab Sahib a sum of three hundred pagedas as a loan on exadition that he would repay it within four months and then went to Camar Nagar but has not repaid it. The Nawab Sahib, may his shadow last long, sent Muttu Dhalait to Ghulab Khan to the army of Nawab Ali Raza Khan for the purpose of recovering the amount. The Dhalait pressed the demand. Whereupon the said Khan sent two horses along with me to

the said Nawab Sahib with a promise that he would send for the horses after repayment of the debt. Three months have since elapsed, but the money has not yet been repaid by the said Khan and the Nawab Sahib repeatedly sent word through Mir Sultan Sahib to receive back the horses on repayment of the money due. I told him that Ghulab Khan had written to inform me that money was not forthcoming and hence he asked me to sell the horses and repay the amount due. The appraisers in Banganapulle, etc., settled Rs. 400 as the price of the horses and told this to the Nawab Sahib who ordered me to go to Qamar Nagar or Adoni and sell them at that price or even for more and bring the money to repay the debt. Not being able to do so I represented to the Nawab that I could not undertake the journey to the place, but would execute an agreement to the following effect. "I shall go to Ghulab Khan and bring Rs. 400, the settled price of the horses, make it over to him within one month and then receive the horses. Should the promise fail, the two horses be taken for the amount." The Nawab, having regard to my helpless condition, has agreed to the proposal. The balance of Rs. 620 due to the Sirkar by Ghulab Khan and the Rs. 25 which I took a loan of for the expenses of the horses from the Sirkar of the Nawab during these three months will also be made good and a non-due certificate bearing the signature of Ghulab Khan will be brought and given within the said time. Mir Sultan stands as a security in this respect. Hence these few words have been written by way of agreement so that they may serve as a voucher in future.




Saiyid Yoosuf Qiladar of Banganapalle.

At present the refuge of justice and virtue Qazi Muhammad Idrocs has shown us the sanads of the jagir of the Mouzah of Sarfarazpur, Mazrah in the Mouzah of Patpad with that of the other miscellaneous inams and of village fees. Which show that his jagir is rent free and his inam is

"Bhatorti saromanium" and hence the relinquished land in Sarfarazpur with all other iname and fees, etc., have had to be given to him the Qazi. You should also enjoin the Officials, Reddi, Kurnams of the Taluk, to give them to him and not to interfere with him in any way and considering that he is strictly enjoined in this respect shall act as written and shall make this over to the Qazi in original and retain a copy only. Dated 4th of the month Bahri of the year Zabarjad 1205 Muhammadi.

Translation of document No. 15.

[Copy of a Sanad of Muhammad Beg Khan.]



Let it be known to the Desmukhs, Despondis, Mukaddams, Kilkarnis and cultivators of the Parganah of Banganapalle and Chanchalma in the Sirkar of Ghazipur in the victorious Province of Bijapur that at present the post of Qazi has been conferred on Qazi Ahmad with the grant of the land in Sarfarazpur and the lands attached to the mosque in the Mouzah of Naudwar and Patta and Benmukal. It should be considered that he is a permanent Qazi, that none is his partner and that his seals are trustworthy. The following land comprised in a Mazrah and fees conditional as to performance of duty shall be continued to him. He shall not be obstructed. His duties being as far as possible to decide cases, to pass sentences, to cause Friday prayers to be held with the congregation, to induce people to worship, to tie the marriage knot, to distribute effects and to protect the properties of orphans, viz., executors. They should consider that they have been strongly enjoined in this respect.

Description.

The Mazrah lands in Sarfarazpur Two half chawar 70.

The land attached to the mosque in the Mouzab of Nandwar 4 cro Bijoari.

Mazrah in the Mouzah of Patpad 16 cro Bijoari.

The land attached to the mosque in Patta Benmukah 4 ero Bijoari.

Other marriage fees, etc., shall be continued as usual. Dated Ramzan 1132.
