PREFATORY NOTE

All letters and papers received from England in 1748-49 are printed in this volume in the order in which they are found in volume No. 52 of the Series known as "Public Despatches from England."

The years adopted in dating the letters are what are called "Old Civil Years" and to convert a date of the old style into the corresponding historical date, the following rules should be observed:—

- (1) When any date from 1st January to 24th March (inclusive) is followed by figures denoting a single year, add one to them.

Example.—25th February 1690 = 25th February 1691.

- (2) When any day from 25th March to 31st December (inclusive) is followed by figures denoting a single year, make no alteration.

Example.—25th June 1690 = 25th June 1690.

- (3) When any day in the year is followed by figures denoting two years, adopt the second of these two.

Example.—25th February 1690-91 = 25th February 1691.

25th June 1690-91 = 25th June 1691.

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. DAVID, DATED MAY 10, 1748.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 52, pp. 27 & 28.*]

OUR GOVERNOUR AND COUNCIL
OF FORT S^t. DAVID.

1. Enclosed We send His Majesty's Proclamation Declaring the Cessation of Arms, as well by Sea as Land, agreed upon between His Majesty, The Most Christian King, and The States General of the United Provinces, and Enjoining the Observance thereof.

2. On a perusal you may perceive that by the Preliminaries for Restoring a General Peace Sign'd at Aix la Chapelle on the 19th. of April last Old stile, All Hostilities either by Sea or Land against the French are to Cease in the East Indies Six Months after the said 19th. April, which must be complied with accordingly.

3. As Hostilities are Ceased, Our ships must be Dispatched directly home to Us after the 19th. of October next in the usual manner as before the Commencement of the War, by Directing the Commanders to Proceed to our Island S^t. Helena, and after Refreshing there for a few days, to make the best of their way to the Downes.

4. Our Secret Committee for the Current Year are Richard Chauncy Esq^r. Dodding Braddyll Esq^r. Harry Gough Esq^r. Alexander Hume Esq^r. and William Mabbott Esq^r. what Orders You may receive from them, or any three of those Gentlemen relating to our Ships, must be strictly Obeyed.

5. Our Ships Marlborough, Salisbury and Britannia Arrived safe with Us We thank God the 31th. March, and the Kent and Severn at Kinsale the 21th. April last.

6. We are preparing to Dispatch the Somerset and Pelham for the Coast and Bay, as also the Ship Dodington to Bombay, and likewise our own Ship Duke of Newcastle for Bencoolen.

7. Notwithstanding the above, in case any Men of War are bound home, and any of Our Ships can conveniently Join them, we would have them come in Company with such Men of War for their greater Security till further Orders.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT S^r. DAVID.

1. We wrote the 10th. May Overland, and Duplicate thereof went by His Majestys Ship the Tartar, as ☞ Copy Enclosed.

2. M^r. George Mandevile and M^r. John Goodere Supra Cargoes for Benjar and China with our Linguist John Jones take Passage on the Pelham, on their Arrival a your Place, Our ship Delawar, or in case of her Miscarriage by any Accident, some one other of our ships must be hastned away to Tellicherry to take in the Sandall Wood We ordered to be got ready for the China Market, and You must put on board Fifteen Chests of Treasure with the several Particulars in the Pelham's Invoice Marked as Presents designed for the Sultan of Benjar and Factory stores and Consign the same to the said Supra Cargoes and Captain.

3. We have judged it highly proper to put our Military & Artillery at your Place upon a New footing as ☞ the Establishment and Regulations Enclosed.

4. Proper Cloth must be Delivered out of Our Warehouses to Cloath the Military and Artillery at Prime Cost according to Invoice, Valuing the Pagodas at Eight shillings at which Rate Our Covenant Servants and they are also to be paid.

5. We have Entertained M^r. Lawrence Witherington to be Captain Lieutenant and Director of the Laboratory of the Artillery Company at your Place, his salary is to be One hundred Pounds Sterling ☞ Annum, and to Commence from the 7th. March last, We have Advanced him the sum of Fifty Pounds to be repaid out of his growing salary, his Bond for the same is enclosed in the Somersets Packet.

6. Henry Learner comes also as first Serjeant of the Train at Two Shillings a Day to commence from the 7th. March last, at whose Request six shillings a Week in part of his Pay is to be received here by his Wife, but Major Mosman is permitted to Employ them at Bengal if he thinks fitt.

7. M^r. Mandevile is permitted to bring out about One hundred and seventy Yards of Broad Cloth in Remnants as noted at the foot of the Invoice, which are to be disposed of by You, and the Produce is to be paid him.

8. Your Cash Accounts and Consultations should have been transmitted by the Severn down to that Ship's Departure.

9. Such Money as shall be offered to be paid into Our Treasury on Account the Estate of the late John Hinde Esq. deceased, We direct that You receive the same and Grant Bills of Exchange upon Us for the amount at the Rate of Eight Shillings a Pagoda.

10. We expect and require that You will exert your selves to put our Investments on the Coast into a flourishing situation, Dispatching Home unto Us all the ships possible, and such as cannot be loaden, must be employed in the best manner.

11. We have order'd the Ships Somerset and Pelham if they cannot be loaden Home to be sent from Bengal to your Place with Salt Petre, Rice, and what else may be proper for your Coast, Each of them are to bring Ten Chests of Treasure, on their Arrival, You must send them away in the proper Season to Canton in China with the said Treasure, Consigning them to such Supra Cargoes as We shall order to take Charge of them there.

12. It cannot be unknown to You that there had been for many Years at Madrass a Stock or ffund subsisting commonly called the Church Stock of Fort S^t. George, the Foundation of it was laid so many Years since that We are strangers to the Origin of it, whether by Legacys of deceased Persons or by the voluntary Gifts, and Contributions of others, whether such Legacys, Gifts and Contributions were tyed down to particular Charities, or the Disposition thereof left to the Discretion of the Ministers and Church Wardens. may perhaps be an Enquiry attended with difficulty, however We desire You will give Us the best Satisfaction You can therein, It may also be a Question whether as very large Allowances have for a Number of Years as We are informed been paid to the poorer sort at Fort S^t. George, more may not have been expended for that purpose than the Legacys and Charitable Contributions amounted to, notwithstanding which it appears by the last Books which were transmitted to Us, there was a very handsome Ballance in favour of the Church, But whether such Ballance arises from the Capital of Legacys or Charitable Donations unapplyed, or from Profits in Trade We know not, for We are told the Church was sometimes concerned at Respondentia, and in stocks on the Countrey Ships, and also in lending of Money at an higher Interest than what was paid to others, when We say others, We allude to a practice which had been frequently in use before the coming out of the Charter, namely that the Minister and Church Wardens possessed themselves of the Estates of such Persons as dyed Intestate leaving Children behind them, who upon their coming of Age were paid the same with the grown Interest thereon.

13. What has been already said relates chiefly to the Management of the Minister and Church Wardens before the coming out of the Charter, after that they declined altogether taking Possession of Intestates Estates, and perhaps would have Confined themselves solely to what was left in their Hands, as the Church Stock, if it were not that some of the Inhabitants whether as Executors, Administrators or Guardians becoming Possessed of Money for the Children of Deceased Persons, considering their own Mortality, and the uncertainty if they should dye, what Hands the Money should fall into, what would become of it, or where to be sought for by the Children when they came of Age, and as the Minister and Church Wardens had acquired a Reputation, by their discreet management, that they kept regular Books of the Employment of the Money in their Hands, which Books as We are informed were Yearly Ballanced and produced at a Vestry held for Inspection thereof and other purposes, and as these Books were as We understand looked upon as a constant and certain Record, and the Minister and Church Wardens supposed to have perpetual Succession, the Children would always when they came of Age, know where to ask for and receive their Right, an Advantage which could not certainly be depended on, if the Money was left in particular and private Hands,

and We are informed that for these Reasons several Persons who were Executors, Administrators or Guardians, thought it the best as being the most secure Method, of employing the Childrens Money to pay several sums to the Minister and Church Wardens, taking their Bonds for the same, payable with no higher Interest than Five Pounds $\frac{3}{4}$ Cent, though the Common Interest of the Place was from Seven to Eight $\frac{3}{4}$ Cent, and subject also to a Deduction of Five Pounds $\frac{3}{4}$ Cent from the Net sum due, and payable to the Children, when they came of Age, and that Deduction was also to be made if the Executor, Administrator or Guardian should at any time before demand and receive the Money from the Minister and Church Wardens, other Sums We are told were paid to the said Minister and Church Wardens for which they gave Bond to make certain Monthly payments, to certain Persons, and upon the Demise of such Persons to repay the first Principal.

14. Matters were in this Situation when the French lately Attacked and took our Settlement, when as We are informed the Minister and Church Wardens or Persons who were possessed of the Securitys in which this Stock was Invested, thought proper to destroy the same, to prevent their falling into the Enemys Hands, however We are also acquainted that several of the Debtors have since voluntarily executed fresh Obligations, and that the rest of them are ready to do the same, or to pay what they are Indebted to the Stock.

15. And as by the taking of Madrass the being of a Minister and Church Wardens is at an end, and as there are in fact no Persons to receive the Money owing from the Debtors to the Stock, We have been requested to direct you to receive the same, to the end it may be applyed for the purposes it belongs, and We being willing to Contribute all in our Power that Justice may be done, have agreed to take upon Us the receiving the Debts which are Outstanding, But as We are not fully apprized of what may be due from the Stock to the Orphans, and to the Charitys, and as it may be uncertain whether all the Money which is Represented to Us as owing to the Stock will be paid, so the greatest care must be taken that a just and equal Distribution be made of what shall be received.

16. We send You in the Somersets Packet a Copy of the last Ledger received from Fort S^t. George, and having extracted the several Debts and Credits, the same is entered by way of Ballance Paper, at the end, that will shew You as far as is in our Power, how Matters stood in 1745. We hope the same together with the Information You may get from the Gentlemen who acted as Church Wardens the subsequent Year and otherwise will enable you to form a Clear and exact state of the several Debts and Credits of the Church Stock, distinguishing in the Debtor side the sums due to the Orphans by Name, and specifying what is due to each particular Charity, and whether such Charity is general at the Discretion of the Minister and Church Wardens or appropriated to any particular purpose.

17. In the Credit side You are to set down the several sums due to the Stock from whom by Name, and how secured, and a Copy of this Account so made up You are to transmit to Us by the first Opportunity.

18. You are to give Notice to the Debtors to the Stock that You are Directed to receive their several Debts, and to Indemnify them on paying the same.

19. The Money as it comes in is to be paid into our Treasury, and You are from time to time to Credit the Account with an Interest of Five Pounds $\frac{3}{4}$ Cent $\frac{3}{4}$ Annum for so much of the Money as shall be in our Hands.

20. And upon any Orphans coming of Age and demanding their Money, You are to make up the Account of what is due for principal and Interest after the Rate of Five Pounds $\frac{3}{4}$ Cent $\frac{3}{4}$ Annum upon the Money of each Orphan, and a like Interest upon each Charitable Legacy, and You are at the same time to take an Account of what you have then in Cash upon the general Account, and having so done, You are at Liberty and You are hereby directed to pay to such Orphan a Dividend in respect of the Money due to him or her in proportion the Money you are in Cash bears to what the Stock shall at that time be Indebted to all the Orphans & Charitable Legacys Deducing from the Money You pay to such Orphan Five

Pounds £ Cent, which is to be applyed to and as an encrease of the general Fund till the whole principal Money and Interest due to both Orphans and Charitys is replaced, and as any further sum comes to your Hands; You are to distribute the same in the like manner, so that an equal Dividend of the whole Money which may at any time be received be from time to time made between and among all the Orphans and Charitys in proportion to the sums due to them respectively both for Principal and Interest, and if you should be so fortunate as to receive sufficient to pay the whole Principal and Interest due to the Orphans and Charity with a surplus, You are to keep such Surplus for our Account, to be disposed of for such Charitable or Publick Use as We shall hereafter direct.

21. It has also been represented to Us that independant of the Church Stock there was another which it is said amounted to between Five and Ten thousand Pagodas established for Maintaining a Charity school wherein the Children of the poorer sort were taught to Read and Write, and Educated in the Communion of the Church of England, and that Trustees were appointed every Year, when the Accounts of the Trust were inspected.

22. The same Reasons that induce Us to interfere in Relation to the Church Stock, require our Attention with respect to this, and therefore if you can receive any part of this Stock, We direct you to do so, and to give Receipts for the same on our Account, and if required, to indemnifye the Partys to the Amount of the Money You receive, We shall not at present give any Orders touching the Application of the Money You may receive on this Account, but shall wait for your answer to this, when We expect You will give Us the fullest Information you can of this Stock, how it was raised, by whom and for what purposes, how it has usually been applyed, what part of it was in being when Madrass was taken, wherein it consisted, what You shall have received, and from whom, and how much may then be Outstanding and how secured, and We desire You will at the same time give Us your Opinion how this Stock or so much of it as can be received may be most usefully employed.

23. The Money as it comes in is to be paid into our Treasury, and you are from time to time to Credit the Account with an Interest of Five Pounds £ Cent £ Annum, for so much of the Money as shall be in our Hands.

24. As to the Dutch Pretensions to an Exclusive Right of Trade in Ophium in the Streights of Malacca and to the Eastward as advised from Bengal, We utterly deny such Right, and in case Our Ships are molested in carrying on Our Commerce, do You empower the Commanders to resist such Hostilitys and to make Reprizals, not only in Defence of themselves, but also of English Countrey ships with your Passes and British Commanders, that may be in their Company, Publick notice must be given hereof, by fixing this Our Order up in the several Languages at every Factory as We are informed the Dutch fixed their's up at Surat and other Places.

25. In case these ships should come to your Place before they proceed to Bengal, You must forward to the Bay all their Treasure, not detaining any part without the most urgent Necessity.

26. The George Snow if with you on Receipt hereof must be immediately sent Home.

27. Their Excellenys the Lords Regent on the Suspension of Arms with France having given Orders that any Officers, Private Men or others belonging to the Company of Artillery and the Twelve Independant Companys of Soldiers under the Command of the Honourable Rear Admiral Boscawen, who are willing to Enter into the Companys Service, may have leave to Stay in the East Indies, We Embrace the Opportunity to fill up all Our Garrisons and to compleat Our Companys of Artillery the sooner, You are therefore to receive into Our Service at Fort S^t. David according to these Directions so many of the Officers who may offer their Service as You may have Vacancys for on our new Establishment and all the Private Men You can who are in Health and fit for Service, distributing so many of the non Commission Officers and Private Men among the seven Companys as will make them compleat, taking the first Opportunitys to send the others to Bombay and Bengal in such Proportion as

(according to the best Information You have they may be of most Use) Though We judge the greater Number ought to be sent to Bombay, as it is not so convenient for Us to send Recruits thither as it is to the Choromandel Coast.

28. In case You Engage any of the Commission Officers to stay at Fort St. David, the Governour with Major Lawrence are to take care they be Men of Good Characters, Brave, Prudent and Sober, and as it is expected Admiral Boscawen will have had some Opportunitys of Trying the Merit of every one under his Command, We hope he will be so good as to give You his Opinion of such as may offer themselves, which We know may be relyed upon, and as the Conduct of officers in Action is seldom concealed, It will be no difficult thing to be informed of those who have behaved well or ill.

29. For an Encouragement to the non Commission Officers and Private Men to enter into Our Service, We allow You to give a Bounty not exceeding Forty Rupees to each Man, but in cases where any one Enters on his being promoted to the Rank of Serjeant or Corporal not having served in that Rank before; We expect such Person enter without any other Bounty than that of his Promotion.

30. On the good Character we have had of Major Goodyere, We offer him the Post of Major at Bombay, on the same Conditions We have Engaged Major Mosman for Bengal. You are forthwith to acquaint him with this Our offer, and in case he Accepts of it, You are to let him know that the Establishment of the Military and Artillery at Bombay together with the Regulations for each will be Simular to those We have now made for Fort St. David, and are to give him Copys of them for his Government.

31. As to the Commission and non Commission Officers to fill up the Company of Artillery after due regard being had to those belonging to the Gunroom, who may be equally fit according to our Regulations to serve as Officers in the Company of Artillery, You are to choose them out of such of those belonging to His Majesty's Company of Artillery as may offer their service. We rely on Admiral Boscawen's, Opinion of their Conduct and Behaviour under him, and on Major Goodyeres Judgment as to the Post each Man may be fit for, And as many of that Company may offer themselves for Commission or non Commission Officers in the Artillery whom You cannot make Room for at Fort St. David, We leave it to the Governour and the Majors Lawrence and Goodyere to Engage them for such Posts as they or any two of them may judge them fit for, and direct that those Three or any two of those Three may distribute the officers so Engaged for the Artillery as may be judged most beneficial to the service, Taking care to make a reserve for the officers sent from hence, viz^t. William Atkinson to be Captain Lieutenant and Director of the Laboratory and Creswell Maddox to be first Lieutenant at Bombay and Lawrence Witherington to be Captain Lieutenant and Director of the Laboratory and Henry Learner to be first Serjeant at Fort St. David or Bengal, making also a reserve according to the best of their Judgment for such belonging to the Gunrooms at Bombay or Bengal as may according to Our Regulations be equally fit to serve as Officers of the Artillery, As to the Matrosses or others belonging to his Majestys Company of Artillery who enter into Our service without Immediate Promotion, You are to give them a Bounty in like manner as We have order'd for those of the Independent Companys, and all those who Enter in our Service are to Engage for Five Years certain except Major Goodyere, who having his Grace the Duke of Montague's leave to stay some time in India to Assist in putting the Company's Ordnance Affairs into Order without prejudice to his Rank in the Royal Regiment of Artillery, We do not insist on his Engaging for a time certain that he may have it in his Option to make Tryal of Our Service before he resolve to quit his Majestys, if he determine to stay on either footing, his Pay together with all his other Allowances are to Commence from the time he shall declare his Resolution to stay in India, and continue till the time of His Embarking to return for Europe, And he is in such Case to Repair to Bombay by the first Opportunity.

32. We are putting Our Garrisons at Bombay and Bengal on the same Establishment We now put Fort St. David, and have ordered Ten Companys to be established at Bombay and Five at Bengal, besides a Company of Artillery at each Place, If

therefore more Officers of Characters as above belonging to His Majestys Troops than You have Vacancys for offer their service, The Governour with Major Lawrence and Major Goodyere (if he declares his Intention to stay in India) may Engage such a Number as According to the best Information they can get will be wanting at each place to complete the said Companys, And such Officers are to be sent to their respective Places with the other Military by the first good Opportunity, but great care is to be taken that none be Engaged as Officers who have misbehaved in his Majestys Service or are of Characters unfit for Ours.

33. You are to acquaint Major Goodyere that Major Mosman has a salary of Two hundred and fifty Pounds a Year with Allowances for Diet, Palankeen and Servants equal to our Council, in which he hath the Rank of Third, and hath the Command of a Company besides the Command of the Company of Artillery. We are

I Gladly Embrace this Opportunity to Acquaint You the Grantham from Bencoolen and Seven Ships from China mentioned hereunder were at our Island St. Helena the 12th. of April.

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. DAVID, DATED JULY 21, 1748.

[*Public Despatches from England Vol. 52, pp. 43.*]OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT ST. DAVID.

1. Our last was dated the 17th. June by the Ship Somerset and Pelham, they sail'd the 26th. of that Month, Copy of our said Letter is Enclosed.

2. Since then We received *via* Denmark Your advices dated the 27th. September, with a Letter from the Governour of the 8th. of October 1747 and are highly pleased that you divided the Risque by sending 485 Bales of Our Callicoos to Bencoolen, which We thank God are come safe to Us on the Grantham, that arrived off Leith the 6th. Inst. in Company with Seven of our China Ships.

3. As We have reason to conclude that Your Troubles are now all over, We most strenuously recommend it to you to bend Your minds to what is our main concern, the Enlarging of Our Investments, and particularly to secure as many Fine Bettellees as you are able, they being in demand at present.

4. With respect to the Countrey Government We perceive that You had some expectation of Nasa Jongs coming to Your Assistance, on his doing so We hope that strong Remonstrances were made how greatly We have suffer'd, for want of reasonable and timely protection.

5. Having reason to be satisfied with the management of Our Affairs on the West Coast, We have confirmed Joseph Hurlock Esq^r. as Deputy Governour, and the rest of the Council in their standing by Our ship Duke Newcastle bound thither, as ☞ Copy of our Letter to that Settlement enclosed.

6. If the Swallow or Swift is at your Place, put on board as many fine Goods as they can Safely take in, and send them home without loss of time, taking special care they are well caulked and filled. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. DAVID, DATED DECEMBER 2, 1748.

[*Public Despatches from England. Volume 52, pp. 45-49.*]OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT ST. DAVID.

1. Our last was by the Syren Man of War the 21th. July 1748 as ☞ Copy herewith sent, since that time the Advices from Our President and Major Lawrence to the Secret Committee by the Warwick and George Snow have been received from the said Ships at Lisbon by the Packet, as likewise a Letter from Admiral Griffin thro' the hands of the Lords of the Admiralty.

2. A List of the Ships it bath pleased God to return Us in safety is enclosed as likewise a List of the Ships taken up for the carrying on Our Trade this Season.

3. A Treaty of General Peace is happily concluded between Great Britain, France and Holland, to which Germany, Spain and the other Powers engaged in the late War have acceded.

4. In order to lighten the heavy Burthen of Demorage that lyes upon Our Estate, by the great Number of Ships now abroad, We recommend and direct that you exert yourselves, in Using all the means you can think of for the Speedy sending home as many as possible, and in order thereto dispatch those first which have been longest out, send all Our Ships home, Fifty, One Hundred or even One Hundred and Fifty Tons dead Freight in case you cannot give them their Charterparty Tonnage, But at all Events, We positively order that no Ship have more than her bare Charterparty Tonnage till further Directions.

5. Our own Ships the Lapwing, Dolphin, Newcastle and Dragon must be sent immediately to Tellicherry, Anjengo or Bencoolen directing the Chief and Council of those Settlements to put aboard them what Pepper they have to spare although not sufficient fully to Load them, and dispatch them home without Loss of time.

6. If after all, more Ships are on your hands than can be Loaded home, as before directed from your Place and Bengal, or can be usefully employed in India, inform yourselves what Goods they have or may expect at Bombay, the Mallabar Coast, or any of Our other Settlements, and accordingly send them to such Places, from whence they may most probably be Loaden home in whole or in part remembering that the Ships at the War Freight and Demorage, are the first to be dispatched and fixing upon Captain Lowe for a Countrey Voyage in Preference to any other Commander.

7. As We have a large Quantity of Salt Petre in Our Warehouses and more expected, We positively order that you load no more on each ship than the Charterparty Kintlage only, and rather than you should send home more, We direct if any remains to reserve it for the next Season, observing that those Ships Kintlaged by Charterparty with Iron and Stones are to have no Salt Petre.

8. Procure as large a Quantity of Bale Goods as possible although Inferior to the Sorts usually sent, taking due Care that a proportionable Abatement is made in their Prizes, and give as early Notice as you can to Our President and Council in Bengal of the Quantities you have and may reasonably expect.

9. The Rate of Exchange between Fort St. David and England is to continue according to Our last Regulation until We shall order the contrary.

10. The Buyers have complained that Five Pieces of Long Cloth D.S. N^o. 1. by the Britannia measured but Thirty One and Thirty two Yards instead of Thirty Six, without any Appearance of being cut, Care must be taken to prevent any such Imposition in future.

11. In a full Relyance that Our several Ships ordered for China were sent thither last Season from your Place, We shall direct the Four Ships stationed for China this Season to proceed first with Goods to you, therefore forthwith procure such Articles as are proper for the Canton Market, to be ready against their Arrival, they must in all Events be sent thither, as We shall deem them upon that Establishment, and take Our Measures accordingly.

12. Communicate the Contents of this Letter to the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort Marlborough, as far as concerns that Settlement by the First Conveyance.

13. We shall Comply with your Indents for Stores as far as the Tonnage of this Year will admit of it, as We cannot encrease the Tonnage till We have eased Ourselves of the great Burthen of Ships already in India.

14. In case the Dragon should come to Fort St. David We direct you to take out the Treasure and Coin it with all Expedition and forward it to Bengal by all safe Conveyances, also the Packets, then immediately dispatch her to be Loaded at Bencoolen as before directed.

15. Upon Opening and Examining the Goods by the Ships Britannia, Salisbury, Marlbrô and Grantham, We found several Pieces wanting in the Bales althô the outside Package seemed not to have been Altered since they were first Packed, therefore it could be done no where but in your Warehouses, an Account of the same Attested by the proper Warehouse Keeper is Enclosed, in which the Names of the Persons who Embaled them are Incered and of whom We expect Satisfaction for Our Loss, it appears likewise by the said Account many Mistakes have been made in sending Bales of One Sort for another, more care must be taken in these particulars for the future.

16. Having been directed by the Government to Name Two or Three Persons as Commissarys to receive Madrass from the Commissarys who will be appointed by France to restore that Settlement, We have accordingly sent to the Secretarys of States Office the Names of Major Stringer Lawrence, M^r. William Holt and M^r. Alexander Wynch, and that in case of the Death or Absence of any of those Gentlemen, Our Governour and Council are to supply their Place with such others as they shall think most proper for that purpose, of which you are to take due Notice, and when you are in a quiet and Undisturbed Possession of it, you are to look upon it as a Subordinate Settlement till Our further Orders and send such Persons there, as are necessary to Invite and Encourage Trade, then immediately endeavour to procure as large a Quantity of Piece Goods thereabout as you can, especially of the Fine Sorts, and some Bales of every kind of Muslins the French usually send to Europe, all which you are to agree with the Merchants to be delivered and paid for at Fort S^t. David.

17. As the reasons for Investing a Secret Committee with Extraordinary Powers are happily Ceased, that Committee is now only to give Directions relating to Signals as usual, you are therefore for the future to make all your Addresses to the Court of Directors as before the War.

18. If your Fortifications are not Compleated We would have you proceed on them gradually, and as far only as is absolutely necessary with as little Expence as possible, Send a Plan of the whole Works and if any Alterations are proposed, send a Plan thereof likewise, with an Estimate of the Charge, and you are not to proceed on any New works till further Orders.

19. Altho' We have already ordered Our Ships to be sent home even One hundred and Fifty Tons dead Freight, yet you may fill up their Tonnage with Red Wood of the China Sort, Turmerick, Lacks or any other Gruff Goods that may be had on reasonable Terms, which will prevent Our Paying for so much Dead Freight.

20. When you are in Possession of Fort S^t. George you must not lay out anything upon the Fortifications or Works until you receive Our Orders, send Us a Plan of the Place in the Condition you receive it from the French.

21. We have permitted Fourteen Chests of Treasure to be laden on this Ship free of all Charges as to the Company for the use of the Land Forces under the Command of Admiral Boscawen, which are to be delivered according to the Tenour of the Bills of Lading.

22. If Admiral Boscawen shall have left India before the Dragon arrives, you are to receive the said Treasure into the Companys Cash, and draw Bills upon Us for the Amount at the same Rate as allowed to Our Covenant Servants payable to John Calcraft Esq^r. Agent to the said Forces in London.

23. Since Writing the beforegoing We have received your Advices by the George Snow of which due notice will be taken in Our next Letters.

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT S^t. DAVID, DATED DECEMBER 21, 1748.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT S^t. DAVID.

1. Our Last under date of the 2^d. Decem^r. went by the ship Dragon, Copys-whereof are enclosed in the Packets by the Ships Montfort and Sandwich.

2. We have Consigned the Ships Montfort, Griffin, Sandwich and Augusta directly to you with Bullion and Goods according to their respective Invoices-enclosed, which you are to receive ashoar as soon as possible, giving Notice to the Commanders that they on their Parts use their utmost Endeavours to be ready for a speedy Dispatch, as their early Arrival in China will be of great Consequence to Us.

3. So soon therefore as you have Received the Consignments to Fort S^t. David, immediately give the Commanders Sailing Orders to proceed directly to Canton in China, and follow all such Orders as they shall receive from the Supra Cargoes appointed by Us to take Charge of their several Ships for their further Proceedings.

4. As We have particularly Consigned the Bullion and Goods intended for Canton to the Supra Cargoes, you are to take no part of such Consignments out.

5. The Bales on the Augusta are Intended as you will see by the Invoice for Bengal, you must therefore Consign them to Our President and Council at that Place and forward them by any good Conveyances that Offer.

6. We have sent you by these Four Ships One Hundred and Forty Chests of Treasure, such Part of it only as is absolutely necessary for carrying on the Business on the Coast must be detained by you, the rest you must get Coined as soon as possible and forward it by all good Conveyances to Bengal.

7. As a General Peace is now Concluded We have great reason to believe many of the People belonging to the Company of Artillery and the Twelve Companys of Soldiers under the Command of Rear Admiral Boscawen will readily Engage in Our Service, We therefore recommend it to you to procure as many of them as possible, as also of the Marines, with the Consent of their Commander in Chief or their Officers, Governing yourselves by the Directions sent you by the Ships Somerset and Pelham the 17th. of June last which were very full on this Head.

8. We are acquainted that you have given M^r. Robert Wynch a Grant for Building an House with a handsome Inclosure to the Southward of the Garden House which approaches rather too near the Fort, We absolutely forbid the Erecting of this or any Buildings that may obstruct the Defence of the Place.

9. We will send you an Assay Master and an Assistant as soon as We can find any Persons properly Qualified.

10. We shall likewise by the next Opportunity send you some Communion Plate and Books for the Use of your Chapel.

11. Since We sent the List of Ships taken into the Companys Service for the ensuing Season by the Dragon, We have taken up the Ship Severn Burthen ^{Tons} 499 Captain Joseph Collier Commander, to carry out Stores for the use of His Majestys Ships in the Indian Seas.

12. Altho We directed you in Our last Letter to procure such Articles for these Ships as were proper for the Canton Market, We think it necessary to forbid the same, that nothing may hinder their immediate Dispatch, unless it can be done without Endangering their Passage.

13. Acquaint the Supra Cargoes with the Number of Ships and the Value of their Cargoes that have been and may be sent from India to China, and give them such other Information and Assistance as may be necessary for their better transacting Our Affairs.

14. This also comes by the Ship Tavistock Captain Nathaniel Cush Commander, who is to call at Madeira for Two Hundred and Fifty Pipes of Wine, One Hundred of which will be Consigned to you, and the rest to Bengal.

15. We have also Consigned to you by the Tavistock Thirty Chests of Treasure which is to be Coined and forwarded to Bengal according to the Directions in Paragraph 6 with respect to the One Hundred and Forty chests there mentioned.

16. So soon as the Treasure, Wine and the other Consignments are delivered, and you have Laden what you think proper, Give Cap^t. Cush sailing Orders to make the best of his way for Fort William and follow the Orders of the President and Council of that Place for his further Proceedure.

17. Cap^t. Cush and his Officers are allowed only Twenty Pipes of Wine, send Us an Account therefore how many they Land at your Place. We are

with the French Commissarys in the Mutual Restitution of all Conquests which have been made, during the late War there, I am ordered by the Honble the Court of Directors to acquaint you, that they have taken the advantage of this Conveyance to consign Sixty Chests of Treasure unto you according to the enclosed Invoice and Bill of Loading, you are to pay Captain Palliser Two and a Half p Cent Freight agreeable to the Bill of Loading.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT ST. DAVID.

1. The Right Honble the Lords of the Admiralty having appointed Captain Hugh Palliser Commander of His Majestys Ship the Sheerness to Proceed to the East Indies with Orders from His Majesty to Rear Admiral Boscawen to assist with the French Commissaries in the mutual Restitution of all Conquests which have been made there during the late War, We have taken the Advantage of this Conveyance to Consign to You sixty Chests of Treasure according to the Invoice and Bill of Lading accompanying the Secretary[s] Letter of Advice committed to the Care of Captain Palliser, You are to pay him Two and a half p Cent Freight agreeable to the said Invoice and Bill of Lading.

2. The said Treasure must be Coined with all speed, and all or so much of it as can be spared from the necessary Occasions of your Settlement, must be forwarded to Bengal by all safe Conveyances. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. DAVID, DATED JANUARY 27, 1749.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
OF FORT ST. DAVID.

1. We have wrote to you this Season by the Dragon the 2^d. December, the Four China Ships and the Tavistock the 21th. December with an Additional Letter to Montfort, Sandwich and His Majestys Ship the Sheerness of the 4th. Instant; this comes by the Britannia and Walpole.

2. We shall now take such Notice of your several Advices by the Warwick and George Snow, and give such further directions under the Usual Heads as may be necessary, and here We must observe We have been at a Great Loss for your Books as the Warwick which brought them did not arrive in the Downes until the 24th. December.

FIRST OF SHIPPING.

3. As a Particular Account of all Transactions relating to Shipping is very necessary and agreeable to Us, We therefore recommend the same care in all your future advices, as We observe in those now before us.

4. You must give Due Notice from time to time to Our President and Council of Fort William of the Quantity of Goods you have or expect may be ready, that Proper Measures may be concerted for the dispatch of as many Ships as possible, agreeable to Our Directions by the Dragon.

5. The Ships Britannia Captain John Somner and the Walpole Cap^t. Benjamin Lowe Commanders are consigned to your Settlement with Treasure and some Particulars according to their Invoices.

6. You must immediately set about coining their Treasure, that all or a part of it may be forwarded to Bengal by the said Ships, if it can be effected without detaining them.

7. In case you cannot finish it by the time they are to sail, then put aboard what Rupees are ready and such a Quantity of Bullion as will make the Treasure on each Ship amount to at least Fifty Thousand Pound[s].

8. As soon as you have laden what Treasure and Goods you think fit, give the Commanders Orders to make the best of their way to Fort William in Bengal.

9. We observe of what Consequence the Second Critical Arrival of Admiral Griffin was for your Relief: We have a thorough Sense of his Care and Constant attention for the Good of Our Service in every Respect.

SECONDLY OF EUROPE GOODS.

10. We could not comply with your Indents this Season so fully as We were inclined to do for the reason given in Our Letter by the Dragon viz^t. as We could not encrease the Tonnage till We are eased of the Great Burthen of Ships already in India.

11. It must be a Standing Rule with you to detain no more Treasure than is necessary for the use of your Presidency, and all the rest must be forwarded to Bengal by every good Conveyance that offers, taking Care that as much of it is coined as possible.

12. The Communion Plate and Books for the Use of your Chapel come on the Ship Walpole, as We are desirous of having it decently furnished, you will observe more Books are sent than were indented for.

THIRDLY OF INVESTMENTS.

13. It is with Great Satisfaction We observe a Good Prospect of a Thriving Investment on your Coast; We shall take Care to encourage it with Plentiful Supplies by every Conveyance that offers.

14. We take notice of your making a Contract with Andiapa and the Old Sett of Merchants for the Investment, We rely upon your Care and Integrity for agreeing with such Persons and upon such Conditions as will be most for Our Interest.

15. You are to have a due Regard to the Enclosed List of Investment and agreeable to the Orders already sent you by the Dragon, you must exert yourselves in procuring as large a Quantity of Bale Goods as possible although of Inferiour Sortments.

16. We observe the Old Merchants were about to pay the several Ballances due from them, which We hope your next advices will acquaint Us are fully discharged.

17. We approve of your not repaying Vencatty Ramiah's Fine, until he applied in Person for the Reasons given by you.

18. We are pleased to find Coja Mirza has deliver'd in the Chay Goods to the Amount of what was advanced him by Our Late President and Council of Fort St. George, and We recommend it to you to collect in such other Debts of this kind as may be standing out.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

19. We think it very happy that Nauzir Jong did not stand to his Engagements with your Vackell for the Hire of his Troops, and that you disengaged yourselves from taking into pay the Body of Three Hundred Horse mentioned in your Advices. We recommend it to you to keep up a Good Correspondence with all the Country Powers, but at the same time We must caution you to be at as little Expence therein as possible, for Experience shows they are not to be depended upon.

FIFTHLY OF BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

20. You must strictly observe the Directions We sent by the Dragon with regard to your Fortifications and Buildings.

21. We absolutely forbid your making any Grants for Ground to erect Buildings on without this Express Condition, that you shall have liberty to demolish the same, in case they incommode or obstruct the Defence of the Place, without making any recompence to the Owners of such Buildings.

22. We acquiesce in your purchasing of a House at Porto Novo, as We rely upon the Justness of your Representation that it was necessary for Our Service.

23. We readily conceive the Inconveniency of having a Dutch Factory within so small a Distance of the Fort, but as they insist on maintaining their Companys Right and Property in it, We can give no Directions relating thereto, until We know on what Authority they ground their Claim, which you must state to Us in your next Advices.

SIXTHLY OF FACTORS, WRITERS, OFFICERS AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

24. As We apprehend you will be able sufficiently to recruit your Military out of the Forces and Marines in His Majestys Service, We have sent none out this Season.

25. The reasons for introducing Martial Law into the Garrison being now ceased, you must, if you have not already done it, vacate the Commission mentioned in your Advices by the Warwick.

26. It being stipulated in the Definitive Treaty of Peace that all Records, Books and Papers are to be mutually restored, We do not think it necessary to send Copys of the Fort S^t. George Accounts, as in all Probability you will have the Originals.

27. If you have not already broke the Troop of Horse mentioned in your advices by the George, you must immediately on receipt of this do it, as there can be no occasion for it now.

28. We observe that you misunderstood Our Directions with regard to Major Lawrence's Salary and Allowances, however in consideration of the Services We believe he has and will render Us, We confirm what you have done, but in future We require you will alter no Agreements We make, without first obtaining Our Leave.

29. Acquaint John Gray and Peter Dencker, that We shall have a Particular Regard to their Cases, when We come to a Resolution in regard to the other Fort S^t. George Claims.

30. You are hereby authorized and directed to take into Our Service all Our Servants who were on the Choromandel Coast Establishment at the time of the taking Fort S^t. George by the French, the late President and Council excepted.

31. And they are to be stationed with the rest of Our Servants according to their then standing on the said Establishment next under the Council appointed in Our Advices of the 24th. December 1747 and are accordingly to succeed in turn as Vacancys happen in Council, unless their past Behaviour or present Circumstances may render them unfit for that Station.

32. As you represent M^r. Charles Hopkins to be a Useful Person in keeping your Books, We approve of your appointing him Sub Accountant, and he is at your Request hereby station'd as a Factor on your Establishment, from the time you employed him in Our Service, he must execute the Enclosed Covenants, which are to be returned to England by the First Conveyance, and he must write to his Friends here to give One Thousand Pounds Security for him.

33. You have in no respect given Us satisfaction as to the Enquiry We directed you to make with regard to the Money borrowed by Our late President and Council of Fort S^t. George, several Large Sums are inserted in the List you have transmitted Us, for which Bonds were executed after the Surrender of the Place, and no notice taken of the Uses for which it was borrowed, you mention several other claims but give Us no Particulars of them.

34. You must therefore on receipt of this immediately take all Proper Measures for getting the Best Information you can of all Money Transactions on the Coast of Choromandel as well before as after the Surrender of Fort S^t. George to the French, the Uses for which the same was taken up and the manner it was applied, with such other Circumstances as may enable you to give Us an Exact and Clear State of this affair.

35. As We have Resolved by the Ballot that it is necessary for M^r. Morse to come home to give an Account of his Conduct at Madrass from the time the French took possession of the place, you must give him Notice to return to England by the next Ships accordingly, in the mean time during his stay at Fort S^t. David, pay him the respect due to his late station.

36. We observe some of the Writers sent out on the Madrass Establishment in 1745 and 1746 proceeded directly to Bengal, they are to be stationed on your List in the same manner as they would have been ranked, had they arrived first at Fort S^t. George, or Fort S^t. David, You must give them notice to come to you by the first Conveyance.

37. Herewith is sent a Copy of the Last List, We received before the Loss of Madrass, of Our Servants on the Coast of Choromandel, that you may know their Respective Stations at that time.

38. We have entertained Timothy Tullie as a Writer on your Establishment, who will take his passage accordingly on one of these Ships.

39. We have permitted David Lopez Fernandes and Samuel de Castro to reside in India as Free Merchants in the Diamond and Coral Way.

40. We have permitted John Walsh, who after the Loss of Fort S^t. George came to England for the Recovery of his Health, to return to his Station on your Establishment, without prejudice to his Standing.

41. James Wilson has Our Leave to go to any of the Companys Settlements in India, and succeed as a Surgeon to any vacancy wherever he is wanted and approved of.

42. In consideration of the Long Services of Lieutenant Eckman, and as he is incapable, through his Great age of further Duty, We have agreed to allow him a Pension of One Hundred and Fifty Pagodas a year for his life, to commence from the time he received his last Pay, and you are directed to pay it him accordingly.

SEVENTHLY OF THE WEST COAST.

43. Be Attentive to what passes on the West Coast, and supply Our Servants there with such Goods, Stores and Necessarys as they may from time to time stand in need of, as also some Military Recruits, as you have so good an Oppertunity of procuring them out of his Majestys Forces.

EIGHTHLY OF ACCOUNTS.

44. We hope M^r. Rosewell the Agent Victualler returned from Bengal to adjust his Accounts, you must give Us as full and as distinct an Account of this Affair as possible, that We may be enabled to make a Regular Claim on the Government for satisfaction.

45. And here We recommend the Utmost Care in adjusting all Accounts relating to His Majestys Ships, according to the Rules and Methods of the Navy, and giving Us the necessary Advices relative thereto.

46. It appearing to Us that the Sum of Five Thousand Pagodas was paid into the Companys Cash at Fort S^t. George, for which a Bond was given under the hands of the late President and Council dated the 10th. Aug^r. 1745 bearing Interest at Eight $\frac{1}{2}$ Cent payable to Michael de Gregorio, if the said Bond has not already been discharged, you may pay it to whoever has a Legal Right to the same.

47. The Ship Severn Captain Richard Dorrill Commander, which We have taken up to carry Stores and Provisions for the Use of His Majestys Ships in India, will be dispatched some time after these, We shall send Fifty Chests of Treasure by her consigned to your Settlement, which must be coined and forwarded to Bengal by all Safe Conveyances.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT ST. DAVID.

1. Our Several advices to you this Season have been sent by the following Convoyances Viz^t. under date of the 2^d. of December, by the Dragon the 21st. by the Sandwich, Augusta, Montfort, Griffin and Tavistock an additional Letter the 4th. January by the Montfort, Sandwich and Sheerness Man of War, and the 27th. of the Same Month by the Britannia and Walpole.

2. The Swift Snow arrived the 3^d. of March with your advices chiefly containing an account of the unsuccessfull Military Operations against Pondicherry, and on the 5th. arrived the Houghton Captain Isaac Worth from Bengal.

3. This comes by the Severn Captain Richard Dorrill laden with stores for the Use of his Majestys Ships in the Indian Seas which are to be deliver'd the Commanding Officer or to such Person or Persons as he shall Direct to receive the same.

4. The Commissioners of the Victualing have laden on the Salisbury, Boscawen, Warren and Stafford consigned to Bombay about Eighty Tons of Flesh provisions, of which you are to give notice to the Commanding Officer.

5. We have laden on this Ship Fifty nine Chests of Treasure, some Utensils and necessarys for the Mint, and other Articles according to the enclosed Invoice, as much of the Treasure as can be spared must when Coin'd, be forwarded to Bengal agreeable to Our repeated Orders on this head.

6. The Severn must if possible be dispatched home the Season She arrives, and to that end as soon as she is discharged of her Cargoe you are to send her to Bengal, or to fill up on the Mallabar Coast according to time and circumstances, but if it shall happen that you and Our President and Council of Bengal are under the necessity of keeping in India any other ship besides the Walpole, it must be the Severn, which being a late ship will consequently incur less demorage than the others, and in that case she is to be sent on a Freight voyage to Surat, or otherways employ'd so as to earn her Demorage at least. We have sent the necessary Directions hereupon to Bengal.

7. The Relations of the Mariners that belonged to the ships Princess Amelia and Princess Mary, at the time they were taken by the French, being very desirous of knowing whether any of them are in our Service, We direct that you send by the first opportunity a Seperate List of the Mariners of the Said Ships, that are or have been in our service, Since the Said Ships were taken with the times of their Death, Discharge or Desertion.

8. The different way of Folding many of the Goods and laying them in the Bales by the Ships Caesar, Princess of Wales and Warwick from what We used to receive them has occasion'd much more trouble and Expencc, as the Warehouse Keepers were obliged to take them out of the Package to tell them, You must therefore give Orders to have the Bales packed in the usual manner.

9. In two Bales of Ganjam Sallampores received by the Princess of Wales there were four sorts in One, and two in the other, and no Cloth between to distinguish them, as has been customary and which for the future must always be done.

10. As it is of great consequence to have before Us an Exact account of our Estate at the Several Settlements, You must agreeable to our former Orders send by every Conveyance a Calculate of your Quickstock, regularly brought up to the time of transmitting it. And in order to let you know what We mean We have here enclosed the Copy of One of the last received from Fort St. George in a method We approve of.

11. We have appointed Mr. Edward Edwards who takes his passage on this Ship a Factor on your Establishment, We have likewise appointed him Assay Master and as such he is to have the Salary and allowances the late Mr. Foxall had; We have advanced him One hundred pounds to be repaid out of his growing Salary as ~~of~~ his Bond herewith transmitted you.

12. One of our Covenant Servants must agreeable to Our Orders on the 24th. of December 1747 be trained up under him that he may be qualify'd to carry on the Business in the Mint whenever there may be occasion.

13. We have permitted Mr. Norton Nicholls to reside in India as a free Merchant.

14. We have likewise permitted Francis Hodges and William Dogan to reside in India in the Seafaring way; provided they behave in a satisfactory manner.

15. We find there are Several of Our Servants on Your Establishment who are under no legal obligations for the Faithful discharge of their Duty to the Company, We here acquaint you that We will have no Persons employed in Our Service; who

are not under Covenants, and have given or are ready to give the Usual Security in England for the Faithful discharge of their duty, We mean in such Stations where Security is always required, and that Our Orders on this head may be immediately Comply'd with, We have enclosed a List of the names of the Persons for whom Security is required, as well as the Names of such who are to execute Covenants.

16. You must observe it as a Standing Rule that as any of our Junior Servants come of age, they are to enter into Fresh Covenants, which you must get executed accordingly and transmit to Us.

17. It must likewise be a Standing Rule, that as Our Serva[nts] respectively advance in Station, they write to their Frie[nds in] England to give the Usual Security for such advanced Sta[tion].

18. We are well assur'd that our Business is greatly neglected by our Junior Servants, owing in a great measure to the want of a due Obedience to their Superiours in the respective Offices, particularly in the Accountants, where the Regular keeping Up the Accounts is of the Utmost Importance to the Company, If therefore You find any of them refuse to set about any Business allotted them, or Directed by their Superiours, Idly waste their time, or otherwise misbehave, let Us know their names with the particular Circumstances of such misbehaviour, that We may dismiss them from our Service, or show a Resentment suitable to their Demerit, and to the purpose frequent Enquirys must be made into their conduct in General, as We shall impute any future ill Behaviour in our Junior Servants to the inattention of you Our President and Council.

19. You must always fix upon an able Book keeper to act as Su[b-Ac]countant and such We hope M^r. John Duncomb whom You have appointed to that Employ will prove.

20. We have Entertain'd the Reveren'd M^r. George Swynfen A.M. as One of Our Chaplains at Fort S^t. David at the usual Salary Gratuity and other allowances, We have lent him Fifty Pounds to be repaid out of his growing Salary, and have for that purpose herewith sent You his Bond he takes his passage on this ship.

21. Captain John De Morgans Claim for Pagodas Twelve Hundred on Bond under the hands of our late President and Council of Fort S^t. George, as likewise Father Severinis for Six Thousand Pagodas, Shall be consider'd, and Directions given thereupon, when We come to a Resolution with regard to the other Claims.

22. The Charter for Establishing Courts of Justice at our Settlements in the East Indies Erected a Mayors Court at Madraspatnam, for the Administration of Justice there and to the Factorys subordinate to Fort S^t. George, and as We conceive such Constitutions to be local, We do not apprehend You have any authority to Erect any.

23. You did well in giving so quick a Dispatch to the first Four China Ships, as likewise to the Edgecot and Admiral Vernon, as soon as the Circumstances You were then in would admit of it.

24. It would have given us great Satisfaction to have had a more agreeable Account of our Investment, and We still are in hopes as it could not be long before you had advice of the Cessation of Arms, that the Merchants were [...] to send in a considerable Number of Bales according to their [...]t promise by January.

25. Your detaining so much [of] Treasure We intended for Bengal has been a very great [...]ance to the Investment at that place, which is of the greatest Importance to Us, You must therefore for the future keep no more at Fort S^t. David than is absolutely necessary for our Investment.

26. We take notice of the Sharp Repulse You gave the French at Cuddalore, under the good Conduct and by the Bravery of Major Lawrence.

27. Although the attempt against Pondicherry proved ineffectual, We have the Satisfaction however of observing that upon all occasions the Major and most of the Officers and Soldiers behaved well.

28. And in regard to the Gallant Behaviour of Captain Holland We direct in case of the absence or Death of Major Lawrence, which would most sencibly affect Us, that Captain Holland do succeed him as Major of Fort S^t. David with the same salary and appointments.

29. Having received a good [Account] of the ability and Diligence of M^r. Robert Sloper during his employment as a Monthly Writer under the Accountant and Storekeeper at Fort S^t. George, We have appointed him a Factor on your Establishment, to be station'd next below the Youngest Factor, upon the arrival of these advices, he is to execute the enclosed Covenants (which are to be returned to Us) and write to his Friends to give the usual Security.

30. Enclosed You will receive under the hand of our Accountant the Weights and Essays of the Several Musters of Pagodas and Rupees lately received from You, of which due notice must be taken.

31. We being restrain'd by a Resolution of the General Court of the 23th. December 1747 from paying any Bonds, Bills of Exchange or Certificates for money said to be taken up for the Companys Account at Fort S^t. George bearing date since the 30th. August 1746, a General Court was held on the 22th. Instant, when several Possessors of Bonds given by the late President and Council of Fort S^t. George dated since the said 30th. August 1746. Demanded payment of the same, which being taken into consideration the General Court came to the following Resolution Viz^t.

“RESOLVED that it be referr'd to the Court of Directors to Enquire what money, or other Consideration was paid or given, for the several Bonds, whereof payment is now demanded, by whom, and to whom, and when, and upon what occasion, and how such money was paid, apply'd and disposed of, and by whom, and to whom, and when, and for what purpose, and to state all the Material Circumstances relating thereto, And that the Court of Directors Do take the Opinion of Council, how far the Company are liable to the payment, of all or any of the said Bonds, and Report their proceedings to the next Quarterly General Court ”.

32. You see what the General Court expect from Us, You must therefore upon the Plan laid down in the said Resolution, pursue the Enquiry We have already Order'd You to make, with regard to all money Transactions of our late President and Council of Fort S^t. George as well before as after the French took Possession of the Place, and give Us a full, clear and Distinct Account of the same, that We may be enabled to comply with the abovemention'd Reference of the General Court, which We are at present not able to do for want of the necessary Lights.

33. And as it may be presumed before this comes to Your hands You will be in possession of the Fort S^t. George Books and Papers, You must by the first Conveyance transmit to Us such Originals as were usually sent to England, with whatever else may be of service in this enquiry or attested Copys of such Books and Papers whereof You do not send the Originals, and you must take care to keep attested Copys of all such Original Books and Papers as you send to Us.

34. It has been intimated to Us that a spirit of Gaming has lately prevailed among our Servants at Fort S^t. David, and as We can place no Trust or Confidence in Persons guilty of that pernicious vice, You must immediately make a strict Enquiry into the Behaviour of Our several servants in this respect, and send Us a particular Account of such Enquiry and in the meantime Reprimand Suspend or even Dismiss them from our Service according to the Degree of their Guilt. GENERAL LETTER TO BENCOOLEN, DATED MAY 10, 1748.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 52, pp. 83 & 84.*]

OUR DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND
COUNCIL OF BENCOOLEN.

1. Enclosed We send His Majesty's Proclamation Declaring the Cessation of Arms, as well by Sea as Land, agreed upon between His Majesty, The Most Christian King, and The States General of the United Provinces, and Enjoining the Observance thereof.

2. On a perusal You may perceive that by the Preliminaries for Restoring a General Peace signed at Aix la Chapelle on the 19th. of April last Old Stile, All Hostilities either by Sea or Land against the French are to Cease in the East Indies Six Months after the said 19th. April, which must be Complied with accordingly.

3. As Hostilitys are Ceased Our Ships must be Dispatched directly home to Us after the 19th. of October next in the usual manner as before the Commencement of the War, by Directing the Commanders to proceed to Our Island S^t. Helena, and after Refreshing there for a few days, to make the best of their way to the Downes.

4. Our Secret Committee for the Current Year are Richard Chauncy Esq^r. Dodding Braddyll Esq^r. Harry Gough Esq^r. Alexander Hume Esq^r. and William Mabbott Esq^r. what Orders You may receive from them, or any three of those Gentlemen relating to our Ships, must be strictly Obeyed.

5. Our Ships Marlborough, Salisbury and Britannia arrived safe with Us We thank God the 31th. March, and the Kent & Severn at Kinsale the 21th. April last.

6. We are preparing to Dispatch the Somerset and Pelham for the Coast and Bay, as also the Ship Dodington to Bombay and likewise our own Ship Duke of Newcastle for Bencoolen.

7. Notwithstanding the above, in case any Men of War are bound home, and any of Our Ships can conveniently Join them, We would have them come in Company with such Men of War for their greater security till further Orders. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT MARLBOROUGH, DATED JULY 21, 1748.

OUR DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND
COUNCIL AT FORT MARLBOROUGH.

1. By the ship Godolphin We wrote the 9th. March 1747. And She sail'd the 15th. of that month, since then We wrote the 10th. May 1748 Copys of those Letters come Enclosed.

2. The ship Grantham from Your Place reached our Island St. Helena the 6th. April and We thank God arrived safe with Us the 7th. July, by her We received Your Advices dated the 25th. January last, and cannot help expressing our satisfaction with your Quick return of that ship, whereby the heavy Charge of Demorage was avoided.

3. We now consign You Our Own ship Duke of Newcastle Burthen 360 Tons Captain Francis Fowler Commander having put on board Five Chests of Treasure, and sundry Merchandize as p Invoice and Bill of Lading Enclosed.

4. We have Entertain'd the following Covenant Servants upon Your Establishment viz^t. Messieurs John Cranmer, Samuel Ardley, John Hildrop, and Samuel Dutton as Factors, and Richard Smith Writer, be sure to keep them and all others close to Business and Encourage the most deserving among them.

5. We have lent Captain Fowler Five Hundred pounds at Respondentia, in case he offers to pay any money into our Cash in part thereof, Do you receive the same and Grant him Certificates for the Amount.

6. In case of the Captains Death see to it that his Effects are not Embezled, they being assigned over to Us as a Security for the same.

7. You must furnish this ship with such stores and Provisions as upon the Captains Representation may appear to be requisite, and Dispatch her with a full Loading unto Us.

8. We are glad to find by the Advices before Us, that You expect to have no more reason to complain of the Dutch, as to their pretentions to an Exclusive Right of Trade in the Streights of Mallacca, and to the Eastward, We utterly deny such Right, and in case our ships are molested in carrying on our Commerce, Do you Empower the Commanders to resist such hostilitys and to make Reprizals not only in defence of themselves, but also of English Country ships with your Passes, and British Commanders that may be in their Company.

9. As surplus Tonnage is expressly settled in Charterparty, whatever the ships are able to take in, may be loaden without making any Agreement with the Commanders.

10. The Countrey Governments and People around You being in a tranquil state gives Us great satisfaction, having reason to expect an Encrease of Pepper from thence, not doubting the most prudent measures will be continued to keep our affairs in a Flourishing scituation all over the Coast, We hereby confirm Joseph Hurlock Esq^r. as Deputy Governour, and the rest of the Council in their standing, Directing that the vacancys therein be filled from time to time with such of Our Servants who are next upon the List, in case there is no Objection to their Ability or Integrity, Each of you must take the Oath of Fidelity to the Company on receipt hereof, noting the same upon Consultation, but you are to be subject nevertheless to the Orders of our President and Council of Fort S^t. David.

11. Upon the Departure of every ship Advise Us the Quantity of Pepper, that then remains in our Godowns at your Place, and the several Residencys.

12. A calculate of Quickstock must also be transmitted to Us pursuant to our repeated Injunctions.

13. Some soldiers come on this ship to strengthen Your Garrison as Ψ List enclosed, We have forbid their Detention at S^t. Helena.

14. Mess^{rs}. Carter and Preston having behaved Diligently, We approve of a Years time being given them.

15. In order to encourage the Military to Reenter when their time is Expired, make each Man the Offer of Twenty Dollars to Engage for Five Years longer, which if any One refuses, grant such a Discharge from our Service.

16. The List of Burials, Marriages and Christenings should have been Certify'd and dated from Your Place in a regular manner, by the Reader of Divine Service, upon the Chaplains Death.

17. If the Captain of this ship should have Disbursed any money at Batavia, or Princess Island for the Ships Use, You most [*sic*] repay him the same.

18. We will furnish You with the Guns Indented for as soon as We can conveniently. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT MARLBOROUGH, DATED FEBRUARY 15, 1749.

OUR DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND COUNCIL
 AT FORT MARLBOROUGH.

1. Our last to You went by the Newcastle under date of the 21st. July last, since which Your address of the 10th. of April by the way of Holland has reached our hands.

2. We have herewith transmitted a List of the ships it hath pleased God to return Us, and another of the ships We have taken up for the carrying on our Trade this season.

3. A Treaty of General Peace is happily concluded between Great Britain, France and Holland to which Germany, Spain and the other Powers engaged in the late War have acceded.

4. As the reasons for Investing a Secret Committee with Extraordinary Powers are thereby ceased, that Committee is now only to give Directions relating to signals as usual, you are therefore for the future to make all Your Addresses to the Court of Directors as before the War.

5. And give the Commanders Orders when You Dispatch them to make the best of their way to S^t. Helena, and from thence to the River of Thames as usual in time of Peace.

6. This comes by the ship Marlborough Captain William Parks Commander, who is Directed to proceed first to S^t. Helena with stores, and from thence directly to Fort Marlborough.

7. We have Consigned to You by the said ship Fifteen Chests of Treasure, as also some Medicines, Stationary and other Articles according to the enclosed Invoice.

8. We have permitted Our Governour and Council at S^t. Helena to take out One Chest of Treasure if they should want it for the necessary expences of the Island, and Order'd them to advise You of the same, and likewise to forward the Copy of the Charterparty.

9. It being absolutely necessary to send a large Quantity of stores to S^t. Helena, We have not been able to comply with Your Indent by this ship, as We cannot think of sending out more ships until We are eas'd from the heavy Burthen of Tonnage now in India.

10. We have given Directions to our Servants in the several parts of India to exert themselves in easing Us from the heavy Burthen of Demorage that lyes upon our Estate, by sending home as many ships as possible, and as some of them may in consequence thereof come to your Settlement, We recommend and expect the same from you, and We hereby Direct that you Dispatch those first which have been longest out, send all the ships on your hands home from Fifty to One hundred and Fifty Tons Dead Freight, in case You cannot give them their Charterparty Tonnage, but in all Events We positively Order that no ship have more than her bare Charterparty Tonnage until further Directions.

11. As to our Own ships You are to put aboard what Pepper You have to spare, although not sufficient fully to load them, and Dispatch them home without loss of time.

12. Having a large Quantity of salt petre in our Warehouses and more expted [*sic*], in case any should be forwarded to You from Bengal, You are to load no more on each ship than the Charterparty Kintlage only, and rather than You should send more, We direct that what remains be reserved for the next season, Observing that those ships Kintlaged by Charterparty with Iron and Stones are to have none.

13. Although We are in hopes You will be able to Dispatch home all the ships which may be sent to Your settlement, Yet if atter Your Utmost endeavours any One remains, which cannot be loaded as before Directed, or usefully employ'd in India, send her to any other of Our settlements from whence she may be most probably loaden home in whole or in part, remembering that the ships at the War freight and Demorage, are the first to be dispatched.

14. We have Order'd our President and Council at Fort S^t. David to be attentive to what passes on Your Coast, and supply you with such Goods Stores and necessarys as you may from time to time stand in need of, also some Military Recruits as they will have so good an opportunity of procuring them out of his Majestys Forces and Marines, which is the reason We send none by this ship.

15. We have Entertain'd William Norris, and Robert Hay as Factors on your Establishment, and they take their passage on this ship accordingly.

16. As does the Reverend Mr. Arthur Neill, who We have appointed our Chaplain at Fort Marlborough at the Usual Salary, Gratuity, dyet, and advantages annext to that office. We have lent him Fifty Pounds to be repaid Us out of his growing Salary, and have accordingly sent you his Bond in the Packet by this ship.

17. We cannot engage any Handicraft People such as Carpenters, Tylers, and Smiths who are to be depended on without extravagant Wages, You must therefore write to Fort St. David to send the best they can procure for You.

18. There being no immediate occasion for an Engineer We do not think it necessary to comply with your request especialy as Captain Delavaux will have Orders to take a survey and send his observations on your Fortifications and works, as well as upon those of our other settlements.

19. We have appointed Mr. Christopher Dixon late One of the Council at St. Helena a Factor on Your Establishment, he is to be station'd the next below Mr. Robert Wadman.

20. We have sent by this ship a Mill of a particular Construction for Garbling and cleaning Pepper, acquaint us whether it answers the purpose.

21. We find there are several of Our Servants on the West Coast Establishment who are under no legal obligations for the Faithful discharge of their duty to the Company, We here acquaint you that We will have no Persons Employed in our Service who are not under Covenants, and have given, or are ready to give the Usual Security in England, for the faithful discharge of their Duty, We mean in Such Stations where Security is always required, and that our Orders on this head may be more immediatly complied with, We have enclosed List of the Names of the Persons for whom Security is required as well as the Names of such who are to execute Covenants.

22. You must observe it as a standing Rule that as any of our Jun^r. Servants come of age they are to enter into fresh Covenants, which You must get executed accordingly and Transmit to Us.

23. It must be likewise a standing Rule that as our servants respectively advance in station they write to their Friends in England to give the Usual Security for such advanced station.

To All People to whom these Presents shall come, The United Company of Merchants of England, Trading to the East-Indies, Send GREETING. WHEREAS in and by an Act of Parliament made in the Fifth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, It is (amongst other Things) Enacted, That if any of his Majesty's Subjects should, from and after the twentieth Day of February, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighteen, sail, go, or repair to, or be in the *East-Indies*, in the Countries and Parts of *Asia* and *Africa*, or in such Places of *Asia*, *Africa*, and *America*, or any of them, beyond the Cape of *Bona Esperanza* to the Streights of *Magellan*, where any Trade or Traffick of Merchandize is or may be used or had, contrary to the Laws then in being, or the Tenor of the said Act; such Persons, so offending, should be liable to such Punishment as by any Law in being might be inflicted for such Offence; and that it should and might be lawful to and for the *United Company of Merchants of England, Trading to the East-Indies*, and their Successors, to take, arrest and seize, or cause to be taken, arrested and seized, such Person or Persons, being a Subject or Subjects of his Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, at any Place or Places where he or they shall be found, within the Limits or Places aforesaid; and the Person and Persons so taken, arrested and seized, to send and remit to *England*, there to answer for the Offence aforesaid according to due Course of Law. And it was in and by the Said Act provided and enacted, that the Said Act should continue in Force for five Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, and no longer. AND WHEREAS in and by an Act of Parliament made in the ninth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George, the said Act of the fifth Year of his said late Majesty was further continued in Force for seven Years, from the 25th Day of March, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Twenty-three, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament. AND WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the fifth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty the said first mentioned Act is revived, and further continued in Force for seven Years, from the first Day of May, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Thirty-two, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament. AND WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the thirteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, the last recited Act of the fifth Year of his present Majesty is continued till the first Day of June, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Forty-seven. 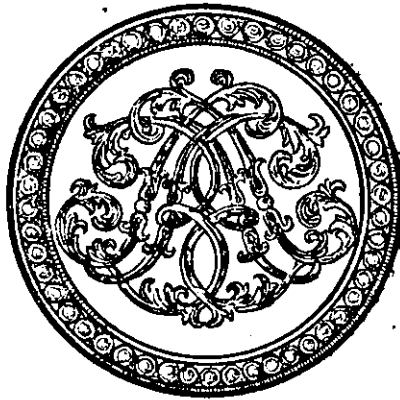

THE DEFINITIVE TREATY OF PEACE AND FRIENDSHIP BETWEEN HIS BRITANNICK MAJESTY, the Most CHRISTIAN KING, AND THE STATES GENERAL OF THE UNITED PROVINCES. CONCLUDED AT AIX LA CHAPELLE THE 18th DAY OF OCTOBER N. S. 1748.

SOIT notoire à tous ceux qu'il appartiendra, ou peut appartenir en maniere quelconque. L'Europe voit luire le jour, que la Providence Divine avoit marqué pour le Retablissement de son Repos. Be it known to all those, whom it shall or may concern, in any Manner whatsoever. Europe sees the Day, which the Divine Providence had pointed out for the Re-establishment of its Repose. A General Peace succeeds to the long and bloody War, which had arose between the most Serene and most Potent Prince George II, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, Duke of Brunswick and Lunebourg, Arch-Treasurer and Elector of the Holy Roman Empire, &c. and the most Serene and most Potent Princess Mary Theresia, by the Grace of God Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, etc. Empress of the Romans, on the one Part; and the most Serene and most Potent Prince Louis XV, by the Grace of God, the most Christian King, on the other; as also between the King of Great Britain, the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, and the most Serene and most Potent Prince Charles Emanuel III, by the Grace of God, King of Sardinia, on the one Part, and the most Serene and most Potent Prince Philip V. by the Grace of God, King of Spain and the Indies (of glorious Memory) and after his Decease, the most Serene and most Potent Prince Ferdinand VI, by the Grace of God, King of Spain and the Indies, on the other: In which War the High and Mighty Lords the States General of the United Provinces of the Low Countries had taken Part, as Auxiliaries to the King of Great Britain, and the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia; and the most Serene Duke of Modena, and the most Serene Republick of Genoa, as Auxiliaries to the King of Spain. God, in his Mercy, made known to all these Powers, at the same Time, the Way which he had decreed for their Reconciliation, and for the Restoration of Tranquility to the People, whom he had subjected to their Government. They sent their Ministers to Aix la Chapelle, where those of the King of Great Britain, his most Christian Majesty, and of the States General of the United Provinces, having agreed upon Preliminary Conditions for a General Pacification; and these of the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, of his Catholick Majesty, of the King of Sardinia, of the Duke of Modena, and of the Republick of Genoa, having acceded thereunto, a General Cessation of Hostilities, by Sea and Land, happily ensued. In order to compleat, at Aix la Chapelle, the great Work of a Peace, equally stable and convenient for all Parties, the high contracting Powers have nominated, appointed and provided with their Full Powers, the most Illustrious and most Excellent Lords their Ambassadors Extraordinary, and Ministers Plenipotentiary, viz. His sacred Majesty the King of Great Britain, John Earl of Sandwich, Viscount Hinchinbrook, Baron Montagu of

Seigneurs *Jean Comte de Sandwich*, *Vicomte de Hinchinbrooke*, *Baron Montagu de Saint Neots*, *Pair d'Angleterre*, p[. . .] *Seigneur Commissaire de l'Ami* [. . .] l'un des Seigneurs Regens du Royaume, son *Ministre Plenipotentiaire* auprès des Seigneurs *Etats Generaux* des Provinces Unies, et *Thomas Robinson*, *Chevalier du très Honorable Ordre du Bain*, et son *Ministre Plenipotentiaire* auprès de sa *Majesté l'Empereur des Romains*, et de sa *Majesté l'Imperatrice Reine de Hongrie et de Boheme*.

The High and Mighty Lords the *States General of the United Provinces*, *William Count Bentinck*, *Lord of Rhoon and Pendrecht*, one of the *Nobles of the Province of Holland and West Friesland*, *Curator of the University of Leyden*, &c. &c. &c. *Frederick Henry Baron of Wassenaar*, *Lord of Catwyck and Zand*, one of the *Nobles of the Province of Holland and West Friesland*, *Hoog-Heemrade of Rhynde*, &c. *Gerard Arnoud Hasselaer*, *Burgomaster and Counsellor of the City of Amsterdam*, *Director of the East-India Company*; *John Baron of Borsele*, *First Noble and Representative of the Nobility in the States*, in the *Council and Admiralty of Zeland*, *Director of the East India Company*; *Onno Zwier Van Haren*, *Grietman of West-Sterling-Werf*, *Deputy-Counsellor of the Province of Friesland*, and *Commissary General of all the Swiss and Grison Troops in the Service of the aforesaid States General*, and *respective Deputies in the Assembly of the States General*, and in the *Council of State*, on the

Article II.

The most Serene Duke of Modena, the Sieur Count de Monzene, his Counsellor of State, and Colonel in his Service, and his Minister Plenipotentiary to his most Christian Majesty.

The most Serene Republick of Genoa, the Sieur Francis Marquis Doria.

Who, after having communicated their Full Powers to each other, in due Form, Copies whereof are annexed at the End of this present Treaty ; and having conferred on the several Objects, which their Sovereigns have judged proper to be inserted in this Instrument of General Pacification, have agreed to the several Articles which are as follow.

Article I.

There shall be a Christian, Universal and Perpetual Peace, as well by Sea as Land, and a sincere and lasting Friendship between the Eight Powers abovementioned, and between their Heirs and Successors, Kingdoms, States, Provinces, Countries, Subjects and Vassals, of what Rank and Condition soever they may be, without Exception of Places or Persons. So that the High Contracting Powers may have the greatest Attention to maintain between them and their said States and Subjects, this reciprocal Friendship and Correspondence, not permitting any Sort of Hostilities to be committed, on one Side or the other, on any Cause, or under any Pretence whatsoever ; and avoiding every Thing that may, for the Future, disturb the Union happily re-established between them ; and, on the contrary, endeavouring to procure, on all Occasions, whatever may contribute to their mutual Glory, Interests and Advantage, without giving any Assistance or Protection, directly or indirectly, to those who would injure or prejudice any of the said High Contracting Parties.

Article II.

There shall be a general Oblivion of whatever may have been done or committed during the War, now ended. And all Persons, upon the Day of the Exchange of the Ratifications of all the Parties, shall be maintain'd or re-established in the Possession of all the Effects, Dignities, Ecclesiastical Benefices, Honours, Revenues, which they enjoy'd, or ought to have enjoy'd, at the Commencement of the War, notwithstanding all Dispossession, Seizures, or Confiscations, occasioned by the said War.

Article III.

The Treaties of Westphalia of 1648 ; those of Madrid, between the Crowns of England and Spain, of 1667 and 1670 ; the Treaties of Peace of Nimegen of 1678, and 1679 ; of Ryswick of 1697 ; of Utrecht of 1713 ; of Baden of 1714 the Treaty of the Triple Alliance of the Hague of 1717 ; that of the Quadruple Alliance of

Article V.

Toutes les Conquêtes, qui out été [. . .] depuis le Commencement de la [. . .] ou qui, depuis la Con[. . .] des Articles Preliminaires, [. . .] le trente du Mois d'*Avril* der[. . .] ourroient avoir été ou être sai-[. . .] soit en *Europe*, soit aux Indes [. . .] les ou Occidentales, ou en quelque Partie du Monde que ce soit, devant être restituées sans Exception, conformément à ce qui a été stipulé [par] les dits Articles Preliminaires, et par les Declarations signées depuis; Les Hautes Parties s'engagent à saire incessamment proceder à cette Restitution, ainsi qu'à la Mise en Possession du serenissime Infant Don *Philippe* dans les États qui lui doivent être cedés on Vertu des dits Preliminaires; Les dites Parties renonçant solennellement, tant pour Elles, que pour Leurs Heritiers et Successeurs, à tous Droits et Pretensions à quelque Titre et sous quelque Pretexte, que ce puisse être, à tous les États, Pays et Places, qu'Elles s'engagent respectivement à restituer ou à oeder; sans cependant la Reversion stipulée des États cedés au serenissime Infant Don *Philippe*.

Article VI.

Il est arrêté et convenu; que toutes les Restitutions et Cessions respectives en *Europe*,

London of 1718; and the *Treaty of Peace of Vienna of 1738*, serve as a Basis and Foundation to the General Peace, and to the present *Treaty*; and, for this Purpose, they are renewed and confirmed in the best Form, and as if they were herein inserted, Word for Word; so that they shall be punctually observed for the Future in all their Tenour, and religiously executed on the one Side and the other; such Points however, as have been derogated from in the present *Treaty*, excepted.

Article IV.

All the Prisoners made on the one Side and the other, as well by Sea as by Land and the Hostages required or given during the War, and to this Day, shall be restored, without Ransom, in six Weeks at latest, to be reckoned from the Exchange of the Ratification of the present *Treaty*; and it shall be immediately proceeded upon after that Exchange: And all the Ships of War, as well as Merchant Vessels, that shall have been taken since the Expiration of the Terms agreed upon for the Cessation of Hostilities at Sea, shall be, in like Manner, faithfully restored, with all their Equipages and Cargoes; and Sureties shall be given on all Sides for Payment of the Debts, which the Prisoners or Hostages may have contracted in the States, where they had been detained, until their full Discharge.

Article V.

All the Conquests, that have been made since the Commencement of the War, or which, since the Conclusion of the Preliminary Articles, signed the 30th of April last, may have been or shall be made, either in Europe, or the East or West-Indies, or in any other Part of the World whatsoever, being to be restored without Exception, in Conformity to what was stipulated by the said Preliminary Articles, and by the Declarations since signed; The High Contracting Parties engage to give Orders immediately for proceeding to that Restitution, as well as to the putting the most serene Infant Don Philip in Possession of the States, which are to be yielded to him by virtue of the said Preliminaries, the said Parties, solemnly renouncing, as well for themselves, as for their Heirs and Successors, all Rights and Claims, by what Title or Pretence soever, to all the States, Countries and Places, that they respectively engage to restore or yield; saving, however, the Reversion stipulated of the States yielded to the most Serene Infant Don Philip.

Article VI.

It is Settled and agreed, that all the respective Restitutions and Cessions in *Europe* shall be

Et les Villes et Places dans les Pais-Bas, dont la Souveraineté appartient à l'Imperatrice Reine de Hongrie et de Bohême, dans lesquelles Leurs Hautes Puissances ont le Droit de Garnison, seront évacuées aux Troupes de la Republique dans le même Espace de Têmes.

Le Roy de Sardaigne sêra, de même, et dans le même Terme, entièrement retabli et maintenu dans le Duché de Savoie, et dans le Comté de Nice, aussi bien que dans tous less États, Pais, Places, et Forts conquis et occupés sur Lui, à l'occasion de la presente Guerre.

Le serénissime Duc de Modène, et la serenissime Republique de Gênes, seront, aussi dans le même terme, entièrement retablis et maintenus dans les États, Pais, Places et Forts conquis ou occupés sur Eux pendant la presente Guerre; et ce, conformément à la Teneur des Articles treizième et quatorzième de ce Traité, qui Les concernent.

Toutes les Restitutions et Cessions des dites Villes, Forts et Places, se seront avec toute l'Artillerie, et Munitions de Guerre, qui s'y sont trouvées au Jour de leur Occupation dans le Cours de la Guerre, par les Puissances qui ont à saire les dites Cessions et Restitutions; et ce, suivant les Inventaires qui en ont été saits, ou qui en seront delivrés de bonne soi, de part et d'autre; Bien entendu, qu'à l'égard des Pieces d'Artillerie, qui ont été transportés ailleurs pour être resondues, ou pour d'autres Usages, elles seront remplacées par le même Nombre, de même Calibre, ou Poids en Metal. Bien entendu aussi que les Places de Charleroy, Mons, Ath, Oudenarde et Menin, dont on a demoli tous les Ouvrages extérieurs, seront restituées sans Artillerie; On n'exigera rien pour les Faix et Depences, employés aux Fortifications de toutes les autres, ni pour autres Ouvrages publics ou particuliers, qui ont été saits dans les Pais, qui doivent être restitués.

entirely made and executed on all Sides in the Space of six Weeks, or sooner if possible, to be reckoned from the Day of the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present Treaty of all the Eight Parties above-mentioned; so that, within the same Term of six Weeks, the most Christian King shall restore, as well to the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, as to the States General of the United Provinces, all the Conquests which he has made upon them during this War.

The Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia shall be put, in Consequence hereof, in full and peaceable Possession of all that she possessed before the present War in the Low Countries, and elsewhere, except what is otherwise regulated by the present Treaty.

In the Same Time the Lords the States General of the United Provinces shall be put in full and peaceable Possession, and such as they had before the present War, of the Places of Bergen-op-Zoom and Maestricht, and of all they possessed before the said present War in Dutch Flanders, Dutch Brabant, and elsewhere.

And the Towns and Places in the Low Countries, the Sovereignty of which belongs to the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, in which their High Mightinesses have the Right of Garrison, shall be evacuated to the Troops of the Republick, within the same Space of Time.

The King of Sardinia shall be in like Manner, and within the same Time, entirely re-established and maintained in the Dutchy of Savoy, and in the County of Nice, as well as in all the States, Countries, Places and Forts conquer'd, and taken from him on Occasion of the present War.

The most serene Duke of Modena, and the most serene Republick of Genoa, shall be also, within the same Time, entirely re-established and maintained in the States, Countries, Places, and Forts conquer'd and taken from them during the present War, conformably to the Tenour of the 13th and 14th Articles of this Treaty, which relate to them.

All the Restitutions and Cessions of the said Towns, Forts and Places, shall be made, with all the Artillery and Warlike Stores, that were found there on the Day of their Surrender during the Course of the War, by the Powers who are to make the said Cessions and Restitutions, and this according to the Inventories which have been made of them, or which shall be deliver'd a bonâ fide, on each Side. Provided that, as to the Pieces of Artillery, that have been removed elsewhere to be new cast, or for other Uses, they shall be replaced by the same Number of the same Bore, or Weight in Metal. Provided also, that the Places of Charleroy, Mons, Athe, Oudenarde, and Menin, the Outworks of which have been demolished, shall be restored without Artillery. Nothing shall be demanded for the Charges and Expences employed in the Fortifications of all the other Places; nor for other publick or private Works, which have been done in the Countries that are to be restored.

Article VII.

Article VII.

In Consideration of the Restitutions that his most Christian Majesty, and his Catholick Majesty make, by the present Treaty, either to her Majesty the Queen of Hurgary and Bohemia, or to his Majesty the King of Sardinia, the Duchies of Parma, Placentia, and Guastalla, shall, for the Future, belong to the most serene Infant Don Philip, to be possessed by him and his Male Descendants, born in lawful Marriage, in the same manner and in the same Extent, as they have been, or ought to be, possessed by the present Possessors; and the said most serene Infant, or his Male Descendants, shall enjoy the said three Dutchies, Conformably and under the Conditions expressed in the Acts of Cession of the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, and of the King of Sardinia.

These Acts of Cession of the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, and of the King of Sardinia, shall be delivered, together with their Ratifications of the present Treaty, to the Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Catholick King, in like Manner as the Ambassadors Extraordinary and Plenipotentiaries of the most Christian King and Catholick King, shall deliver, with the Ratifications of their Majesties, to the Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the King of Sardinia, the Orders to the Generals of the French and Spanish Troops to restore Savoy and the County of Nice to the Persons appointed by that Prince to receive them; so that the Restitution of the said States, and the taking Possession of the Dutchies of Parma, Placentia, and Guastalla, by or in the Name of the most Serene Infant Don Philip, may be effected within the same Time, conformably to the Acts of Cession, the Tenor whereof follows.

We Mary Therisia, &c. make known by these Presents: Whereas, in order to put an End to the fatal War, certain Preliminary Articles were agreed upon the 30th of April of this Year, between the Ministers Plenipotentiaries of the most Serene and most Potent Prince George II, King of Great Britain, and the most Serene and most Potent Prince Lewis XV, the most Christian King, and their High Mightinesses the States General of the United Provinces, which have been since ratified by all the Powers concerned. The Tenor of the 4th Article whereof is conceived in the following Manner.

The Dutchess of Parma, Placentia, and Guastalla shall be yielded to the most Serene Infant Don Philip to serve him, as an Establishment, with the Right of Reversion to the present Possessors, after that his Majesty the King of the Two Sicilies shall have succeeded to the Crown of Spain; as also in Case the said most Serene Infant Don Philip should happen to die without Children.

And whereas a Definitive Treaty of Peace having since been concluded, the several Points relating to this Affair, have been, by virtue of the Articles thereof, explained by the common Consent of the Parties concerned, in the following Manner.

In Consideration of the Restitutions, that his most Christian Majesty and his Catholick Majesty make, by the present Treaty, either to her Majesty the Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, or to his Majesty the King of Sardinia, the Dutchies of Parma, Placentia, and Guastalla shall, for the Future, belong to the most serene Infant Don Philip, to be possessed by him, and his Male Descendants born in lawful Marriage, in the same Manner, and in the same Extent, as they have been or ought to be possessed by the present Possessors; and the said most serene Infant, or his Male Descendants shall enjoy the Said three Dutchies, conformably and under the Conditions expressed in the Acts of Cession of the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, and of the King of Sardinia.

These Acts of Cession of the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, and of the King of Sardinia, shall be delivered, together with their Ratifications of the present Treaty, to the Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Catholick King, in like Manner as the Ambassadors Extraordinary and Plenipotenciaires of the most Christian King and Catholick King shall deliver, with the Ratifications of their Majesties, to the Ambassadors Extraordinary and Plenipotenciaires of the King of Sardinia, the Orders to the Generals of the French and Spanish Troops to restore Savoy and the County of Nice, to the Persons appointed by that Prince to receive them; so that the Restitution of the Said States, and the taking Possession of the Dutchies of Parma, Placentia and Guastalla, by or in the Name of the most Serene Infant Don Philip, may be effected in the same Time, conformably to the said Acts of Cession.

Wherefore, in order to fulfil those Things, to which we have bound ourselves by the Articles before inserted, and in the firm Hope, that the most Christian and Catholick Kings, and the future Possessor of the aforesaid three Dutchies, and his Male Descendants will, on their Part, bona fide, and punctually, fulfil the Tenor of the Articles abovementioned, and will likewise restore to us, within the Same Time, the States and Places, which are to be restored to us, in Consequence of the 2d and 18th Articles of the same Preliminaries, we do yield and renounce, for us and our Successors, under the Conditions expressed in the abovementioned Articles, all Rights, Claims, and Pretensions to us under any Title or Cause whatsoever belonging, upon the aforesaid three Dutchies of Parma, Placentia and Guastalla, formerly possessed by us; and transfer the same Rights, Claims and Pretensions, in the best and most solemn Manner possible, to the most Serene Don Philip Infant of Spain, and his Male Descendants to be born in lawful Marriage, absolving all the Inhabitants of the Said

Article VIII.

Pour assûrer et effectuer les dites Restitutions et Cessions, on est convenu, qu'elles seront entierement executées et accomplies de part et d'autre en *Europe*, dans l'espace de six Semaines, ou plutôt, si faire se peut, à compter du Jour de l'Exchange des Ratifications de toutes les huit Puissances; Bien entendu que quinze Jours après la Signature du present

Dutchies from the Allegiance and Oath, which they have taken to us, who shall be obliged, for the Future, to pay the same Allegiance to those to whom we have yielded our Rights; all which however is to be understood only for that Space of Time, that either the said most Serene Infant Don Philip, or one of his Descendants, shall not have ascended either the Throne of the Two Sicilies, or of Spain; for at that Time, and in Case the aforesaid Infant should die without Male Descendants, we expressly reserve to ourselves, our Heirs and Successors, all Rights, Claims and Pretensions, which have heretofore belonged to us, and consequently the Right of Reversion to the said Dutchies.

CHARLES Emanuel, &c. *The Desire we have to contribute, on our Part, to the most speedy Re-establishment of the publick Tranquillity, which lately induced us to accede to the Preliminary Articles, signed the 30th of April last between the Ministers of his Britannick Majesty, his most Christian Majesty, and the Lords the States General of the United Provinces, which we did, on the 31st of May last, by our Plenipotentiary, accordingly accede to, inducing us now to accomplish as much as is to be performed on our Part, in Pursuance of them; and particularly for the Execution of what is contained in the fourth Article of the said Preliminaries, by vertue whereof the Dutchies of Parma, Placentia and Guastalla, are to be yielded to the most serene Prince Don Philip, Infant of Spain, to hold, as an Establishment, with the Right of Reversion to the present Possessors, as soon as his Majesty the King of the Two Sicilies shall have succeeded to the Crown of Spain, or that the said Infant should happen to die without Issue Male; we, in Conformity thereto, do, by the present Act, renounce, yield, and transfer, for ourselves and our Successors, to the aforesaid most serene Infant Don Philip, and to his Male Issue, and their Descendants born in lawful Marriage, the Town of Placentia, and the Plaisantinne, (whereof we were possessed) to be held and possessed by him as Duke of Placentia; renouncing to this End all Rights, Claims, and Pretensions, which we have upon them; reserving, however, expressly to us, and our Successors, the Right of Reversion, in the Cases above-mentioned.*

In Witness whereof, &c.

Article VIII.

In order to secure and effectuate the Said Restitutions and Cessions, it is agreed, that they shall be entirely executed and accomplished on all Sides, in Europe, within the Term of six Weeks, or sooner if possible, to be reckoned from the Day of the Exchange of the Ratifications of all the Eight Powers; it being provided, that in fifteen Days after the Signing of the present Treaty,

the Generals, or other Persons, whom the High Contracting Parties shall think proper to appoint for that Purpose, shall meet at Brussels and at Nice, to concert and agree on the Method of proceeding to the Restitutions, and of putting the Parties in Possession, in a Manner equally convenient for the Good of the Troops, the Inhabitants, and the respective Countries; but so that all and each of the High Contracting Powers may be agreeable to their Intentions, and to the Engagements contracted by the present Treaty, in full and peaceable Possession, without any Exception, of all that is to be acquired to them, either by Restitution or Cession within the said Term of six Weeks, or sooner if possible, after the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present Treaty by all the said Eight Powers.

Article IX.

In Consideration that, notwithstanding the reciprocal Engagement taken by the 18th Article of the Preliminaries, importing, that all the Restitutions and Cessions should be carried on equally, and should be executed at the same Time, his most Christian Majesty engages, by the 6th Article of the present Treaty, to restore, within the Space of six Weeks, or sooner if possible, to be reckoned from the Day of the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present Treaty, all the Conquests which he has made in the Low Countries; whereas it is not possible considering the Distance of the Countries, that what relates to America should be effected within the same Time, or even to fix the Time of its entire Execution; His Britannick Majesty likewise engages on his Part to send to his most Christian Majesty, immediately after the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present Treaty, Two Persons of Rank and Consideration, who shall remain there as Hostages, till there shall be received a certain and authentick Account of the Restitution of Isle Royal called Cape Breton, and of all the Conquests which the Arms or Subjects of his Britannick Majesty may have made before, or after the signing of the Preliminaries, in the East and West Indies.

Their Brittanick and most Christian Majesties oblige themselves likewise to cause to be delivered, upon the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present Treaty, the Duplicates of the Orders addressed to the Commissaries appointed to restore, and receive, respectively, whatever may have been conquered, on either Side, in the said East and West Indies, agreeably to the 2d Article of the Preliminaries, and to the Declarations of the 21st and 31st of May, and the 8th of July last, in regard to what concerns the said Conquests in the East and West Indies. Provided nevertheless, that Isle Royal, called Cape Breton, shall be restored with all the Artillery and warlike Stores, which shall have been found therein on the Day of its Surrender; conformably to the Inventories, which have been made thereof, and in the Condition that the said Place was in, on the said Day of its Surrender. As to

the other Restitutions, they shall take place conformably to the Meaning of the second Article of the Preliminaries, and of the Declarations and Convention of the 21st and 31st of May, and 8th of July last, in the Condition in which Things were on the 11th of June, N. S. in the West Indies, and on the 31st of October, also N.S. in the East Indies. And every Thing besides shall be re-established on the Foot that they were or ought to be before the present War.

The said respective Commissaries, as well those for the West, as those for the East-Indies, shall be ready to set out on the first Advice that their Britannick and most Christian Majesties shall receive of the Exchange of the Ratifications, furnished with all the necessary Instructions, Commissions, Powers, and Orders, for the most expeditious Accomplishment of their said Majesties Intentions, and of the Engagements taken by the present Treaty.

Article X.

The ordinary Revenues of the Countries that are to be respectively restored or yielded, and the Impositions laid upon those Countries for the Entertainment and Winter Quarters of the Troops, shall belong to the Powers that are in Possession of them, till the Day of the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present Treaty, without, however, its being permitted to proceed to any Kind of Execution, provided sufficient Security has been given for the Payment; it being always to be understood, that the Forage and Utensils for the Troops shall be furnished till the Evacuations; in Consequence of which, all the Powers promise and engage not to demand or exact Impositions and Contributions which they may have laid upon the Countries, Towns and Places that they have possessed during the Course of the War, and which had not been paid at the Time that the Events of the said War had obliged them to abandon the said Countries, Towns, and Places; all Pretensions of this Nature being made void by the present Treaty.

Article XI.

All the Papers, Letters, Documents, and Archives, which were in the Countries, Estates, Towns and Places which are restored, and those belonging to the Countries yielded, shall be respectively, and bona fide, delivered or given up at the same Time, if possible, as Possession shall be taken, or at farthest two Months after the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present Treaty of all the Eight Parties, in whatever Places the said Papers or Documents may be, namely, those which may have been removed from the Archive of the Great Council of *Mecklin*.

Article XII.

His Majesty the King of *Sardinia* shall remain in Possession of all that he anciently and newly enjoyed, and particularly of the Acquisition.

which he made in the Year 1743 of the *Vigevanasque*, a Part of the *Pavesan*, and the Country of *Anghiera*, in the Manner as this Prince now possesses them, by vertus of the Cessions that have been made of them to him.

Article XIII.

The most serene Duke of *Modena*, by Vertue as well of the present *Treaty*, as of his Rights, prerogatives and dignities, shall take Possession six Weeks, or sooner if possible, after the Exchange of the Ratifications of the said *Treaty*, of all his States, Places, Forts, Countries, Effects, and Revenues, and in general, of all that he enjoyed before the War.

At the same Time shall be likewise restored to him his Archives, Documents, Writings, and Moveables of what Nature soever they may be, as also the Artillery, and Warlike stores which shall have been found in his Countries, at the Time of their being seized. As to what shall be wanting, or shall have been converted into another Form, the just value of the Things so taken away, and which are to be restored, shall be paid in ready Money; which Money, as well as the Equivalent for the Fiefs, which the most Serene Duke of *Modena* possessed in *Hungary*, if they are not restored to him, shall be sold and adjusted by the respective Generals or Commissaries, who, according to the 8th Article of the present *Treaty*, are to assemble at *Nice* in fifteen Days after the Signature, in order to agree upon the Means for Executing the reciprocal Restitutions and putting in Possession, so that at the same Time, and on the same Day as the most serene Duke of *Modena* shall take Possession of all his States, he may likewise enter into the Enjoyment, either of his Fiefs in *Hungary*, or of the said Equivalent, and receive the Value of such Things as cannot be restored to him. Justice shall also be done him, within the same Time of six Weeks after the Exchange of the Ratifications, with respect to the Allodial Effects of the House of *Guastalla*.

Article XIV.

The most serene Republick of *Genoa*, as well by Vertue of the present *Treaty*, as of its Rights, Prerogatives and Dignities, shall re-enter into the Possession, six Weeks, or sooner if possible, after the Exchange of the Ratifications of the said *Treaty*, of all the States, Forts, Places, Countries, Effects, of what Nature soever they may be, Rents and Revenues, that it enjoyed before the War; particularly, all and every one of the Members and Subjects of the said Republick shall, within the aforesaid Term, after the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present *Treaty*, re-enter into the Possession, Enjoyment, and Liberty of disposing of all the Funds, which they had in the Bank of *Vienna*, in *Austria*, in *Bohemia*, or in any other Part whatsoever of the States of the *Empress Queen* of *Hungary* and *Bohemia*, and of those of the King of *Sardinia*; and the Interest shall be exactly and regularly paid them, to be reckoned from the said Day of the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present *Treaty*.

Article XV.

Article XX.

Article XV.

It has been settled and agreed upon between the Eight High Contracting Parties, that for the Advantage and Maintenance of the Peace in general and for the Tranquility of Italy in particular, all Things shall remain there in the Condition they were in before the War; saving, and after, the Execution of the Dispositions made by the present Treaty.

Article XVI.

The Treaty of the Assiento for the Trade of Negroes, signed at Madrid on the 26th of March 1713, and the Article of the Annual Ship, making Part of the said Treaty, are particularly confirmed by the present Treaty, for the four Years during which the Enjoyment thereof has been interrupted, since the Commencement of the present War, and shall be executed on the same Footing, and under the same Conditions, as they have or ought to have been executed before the said War.

Article XVII.

Dunkirk shall remain fortified on the Side of the Land, in the same Condition as it is at present; and as to the Side of the Sea, it shall remain on the Footing of former Treaties.

Article XVIII.

The Demands of Money that his Britannick Majesty has, as Elector of Hanover, upon the Crown of Spain; the Differences relating to the Abbey of St. Hubert; the Enclaves of Hainault, and the Bureaux newly established in the Low Countries; the Pretensions of the Elector Palatine; and the other Articles, which could not be regulated, so as to enter into the present Treaty, shall be amicably adjusted immediately by the Commissaries appointed for that Purpose, on both Sides, or otherwise, as shall be agreed on by the Powers concerned.

Article XIX.

The 5th Article of the Treaty of the Quadruple Alliance, concluded at London the 2nd of August 1718, containing the Guaranty of the Succession to the Kingdom of Great Britain in the House of his Britannick Majesty now reigning, and by which every Thing has been provided for, that can relate to the Person, who has taken the Title of King of Great Britain, and to his Descendants of both Sexes, is expressly confirmed and renewed by the present Article, as if it was here inserted in its full Extent.

Article XX.

His Britannick Majesty as Elector of Brunswick Lunebourg, as [well] for himself, as for his Heirs and Successors, and all the States and Possessions of his said Majesty, in Germany are included and guaranteed by the present Treaty of Peace.

Article XXI.

Article XXI.

All the Powers interested in the present Treaty, who have guaranteed the Pragmatick Sanction of the 19th of April 1713. for the whole Inheritance of the late Emperor Charles VI, in Favour of his Daughter the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, now reigning, and of her Descendants for ever, according to the Order established by the said Pragmatic Sanction, renew it in the best Manner possible, except however the Cessions already made, either by the said Emperor, or the said Princess, and those stipulated by the present Treaty.

Article XXII.

The Dutchy of Silesia and the Country of Glatz, as his Prussian Majesty now possesses them, are guaranteed to that Prince by all the Powers, Parties and Contractors of the present Treaty.

Article XXIII.

All the Powers contracting and interested in the present Treaty, reciprocally and respectively guaranty the Execution thereof.

Article XXIV.

The solemn Ratifications of the present Treaty, expedited in good and due Form, shall be exchanged in this City of Aix la Chapelle, between all the Eight Parties, within the Space of one Month, or sooner if possible, to be reckoned from the Day of its Signature.

In Witness whereof we the under-written their Ambassadors Extraordinary and Ministers Plenipotentiaries have signed with our Hands, in their name, and by Vertue of our Full Powers, the present Treaty of peace, and have caused the Seals of our Arms to be put thereto.

SEPARATE ARTICLES.

Article I.

It has been agreed and determined, that the French Language made Use of in all the Copies of the present Treaty, and which may be used in the Acts of Accession, shall not be made a Precedent that may be alledged, or drawn into Consequence, or in any Manner prejudice any of the Contracting Powers; and that they conform themselves for the Future to what has been and ought to be observed with regard to, and on the Part of Powers, who are used and have a Right to give and receive Copies of like Treaties and Acts in another Language than the French.

The present Treaty, and the Accessions, which shall intervene, having still the same Force and Effect, as if the aforesaid Practice had been therein observed: And the present Separate Articles shall have likewise the same Force, as if they were inserted in the Treaty.

In Witness whereof, we the underwritten Ambassadors Extraordinary and Ministers Plenipotentiaries of his Britannick Majesty, of his most [Christian Majesty, and of the Lords the States General of the United Provinces, have signed the present Separate Articles, and caused the Seals of our Arms to be put thereto.

Whereas, in order to perfect the Work of a General Peace, so happily begun, and to bring it, as soon as possible, to the desired Conclusion, We have thought proper to invest Two fit Persons with the Title and Character of Our Ambassadors Extraordinary, and Plenipotentiaries at the present Congress; Know ye therefore, that We, having entire Confidence in the Zeal, Judgement, Skill and Abilities in managing great Affairs, of our Right Trusty and Well-beloved Cousin, John Earl of Sandwich, as also Our Trusty and Wellbeloved Thomas Robinson, Knight of the most Honourable Order of the Bath and Our Minister Plenipotentary to Our good Sister the Empress of

Whereas we desire nothing more ardently, than to see the War, with which Christendom is at present afflicted, terminated by a good Peace, and the City of Aix la Chapelle has been agreed upon for the Place of the Conferances; We, by the same Desire of putting a Stop, as far as shall be in us, to the Desolation of so many Provinces, and to the Effusion of so much Christian Blood, have been willing to contribute thereto all that depends up-

Gerard Arnold Hasselaer, Schepen and Senator of the City of Amsterdam, and Director of the East India Company; and Onno Zwier van Haren, Grietman of West Stellingwerf, Deputed Counsellor of the Province of Frizeland, and Commissary General of all the Swiss and Grison Troops in our Service; respective Deputies in our Assembly, and in the Council of State, on the Part of the Provinces of Holland and West Frizeland, and Frizeland, have distinguished themselves in several Employments of Importance for our Service, in which they have given Marks of their Fidelity, Application and Address in the Management of Affairs; For these Causes, and other good Considerations us thereunto moving, We have commissioned, ordained and deputed the said Sieurs Bentinck, Wassenaer, Hasselaer, and van Haren, do commission, ordain and depute them, by these Presents, and have given and do give unto them Full Power, Commission and Special Order, to go to Aix la Chapelle, in Quality of our Ambassadors Extraordinary and Plenipotentiaires for the Peace, and there to confer with the Ambassadors Extraordinary and Plenipotentiaires of his Most Christian Majesty, and his Allies, provided with sufficient Powers, and there to treat of the Means of terminating and pacifying the Differences which at present occasion the War; and our said Ambassadors Extraordinary and Plenipotentiaires, all together, or any of them, or any one among them, in Case of Absence of the others, by Sickness or other Impediment, shall have power to agree about the same, and thereupon to conclude and sign a good and sure Peace, and, in general, to transact, negociate, promise, and grant whatever they shall think necessary to the said Effect of the Peace, and generally to do every Thing that we could do, if we were there present, even though a more special Power, and Order, not contained in these Presents, should be necessary for that Purpose; promising sincerely and bona fide, to accept and keep firm and stable whatever by our said Ambassadors Extraordinary and Plenipotentiaires, or by any, or any one of them, in Case of Sickness, Absence, or other Impediment of the others, shall have been stipulated, promised and granted, and thereof to cause our Letters of Ratification to be dispatched in the Time that they shall have promised in our Name to furnish them. Whereas we desire nothing more ardently, than to see the War, with which Christendom is at present afflicted, terminated by a good Peace, and the City of Aix la Chapelle has been agreed upon for the Place of the Conferences; We, by the same Desire of putting a Stop, as far as shall be in Us, to the Desolation of so many Provinces, and to the Effusion of so much Christian Blood, have been willing to contribute thereto all that depends upon us; and, to this End, have already deputed some persons heretofore to the said Assembly out of our own Body, who have given several Proofs of the Knowledge and Experience, which they have of Publick Affairs, as well as of the Affection, which they have for the Good of our State; To wit, the Sieurs *William Bentinck*, Lord of *Rhoon and Pendrecht*, of the Body of Nobles of the Province of *Holland and West-Friesland*, Curator of the University of *Leyden*, &c. *Frederic Henry* Baron *Wassenaer*, Lord of *Catwyck and Zand*, of the Body of Nobles of the Province of *Holland and West-Friesland*, *Hoog-Beemrade of Rhynland*, &c. *Gerard Arnold Hasselaar*, Schepens and Senator of the City of *Amsterdam*, and Director of the *East-India Company*; and *Onno Zwier Van Haren*, Grietman of *West-Stellingwerff*, Deputed Counsellor of the Province of *Friesland*, and Commissary General of all the *Swiss and Grison Troops in our Service*; respective Deputies in Our Assembly, and in the Council of State, on the Part of the Provinces of *Holland and West-Friesland*, and *Friesland*. And whereas we have at present thought proper to join a Fifth Person to the Four above-mentioned, for this same Purpose; and the Sieur *John Baron Van Borsselle*, First Noble, and representing the Nobility, in the States, in the Council, and in the Admiralty of *Zeeland*, Director of the *East-India Company*, and Deputy in our Assembly on the Part of the said Provinces of *Zeeland*, has distinguished himself in several Employments of Importance for our Service, in which he has given Marks of his Fidelity, Application and Address in the Management of Affairs: For these Causes, and other good Considerations Us thereunto moving, We have commissioned, ordained, and deputed the said Sieur *Van Borsselle*, do commission, ordain, and depute him.

Considering therefore entirely, in the often tried Fidelity, Experience in Business, and great Prudence of our actual Privy Counsellor, *Wenceslaus Anthony de Kaunitz & Rittberg*, Count of the Holy Roman Empire, as also of *Thaddæus*, Free Baron of *Reischach*, our Lord of the Bed-Chamber, Counsellor for the Government of Anterior, Austria, and our Minister to the High and Mighty the States General of the United Provinces; [both] of whom, and each of them, we have invested with the Character of our Ambassador, as well as with Full Powers, as we do accordingly, by these Presents, invest them both, and each of them, in Case of the Absence, or Hindrance of the other, in the most ample Manner possible; to the End, that both, or either of them, in Case of the Absence or Hindrance of the other, may join their Endeavours with our Allies, and their Ministers, hold friendly Conferences with those of other Princes engaged, in the present War, against us or our Allies, and with any one, or more of them, furnished with the like Full Powers, and agree upon any Matters and Things relating thereto, and whatever shall have been so

REGULATIONS FOR FORMING, DISCIPLINING AND GOVERNING THE MILITARY AT
FORT ST. DAVID, [DATED JUNE 17, 1748.]

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 52, pp. 229-237.*]

1. That the Governour make his Constant Residence at the Fort, that he may have the Military more immediately under his Eye, and that he may be the better able to judge of the Conduct and Capacity of the Officers and Soldiers. It is not by this intended to restrain him from being Absent on the Customary Visits or Tours in the Countrey for Health or Diversion.
2. That upon Receipt of this, the Company's now at your place be formed into Seven Companys, intended to consist of One Captain, One Lieutenant, One Ensign, Four Serjeants, Four Corporals, Three Drummers, & Seventy Private Men each, and that in case there be any Surplus Men, they be equally divided among the Companys until the Design'd Establishment of a Company of Artillery can take place, when a Number of the Properest Men for the [service] of the Artillery are to be draughted from the Companys, in order to complea[t—]Company of Artillery, the Lieutenant of the Major's Company is to be Captain Lieutenant, and is to rank as Captain, and if there be, on receipt of this, a Greater Number of Serjeants, Corporals, Drummers and Musick than are Necessary, they shall be reduced to form the New Establishment, but for their Encouragement, they shall be provided for in their Former Ranks, if qualified for them, as Vacancys happen.
3. That all Vacancys of Companys that shall happen be named appointed and commissioned by the Governour and Council, but that Subaltern Officers under the Degree of Captain be named, appointed and commissioned by the Governour only.
4. That All Officers be promoted by Seniority, unless very good reasons to the contrary be given to the Governour in writing. The Major or Officer commanding the Five Companys to recommend to Vacancys, when they happen, to be approved of or not by the Governour, but every Captain to recommend to all Vacancys of Serjeants, Corporals and Drummers that may happen in their Respective Companys, which are to be approved of or not by the Major or Military Commanding Officer of the Five Companys.
5. That all Commissions given by the Court of Directors continue in Force without any Fresh Commissions to be issued by the Governour or Council who are only to grant their Commissions as above in case of Vacancys happening in the Country by Decease, Dismission, Resignation or otherwise.
6. That the Entire Discipline of the Five Companys be under the Direction Command and Inspection of the Major or Commanding Military Officer Subordinate nevertheless to the Governour or next in Council in the Governour's Absence, and all Orders to the Military shall be conveyed thro' the Major or Adjutant, unless in cases of Urgent Necessity.
7. That for Encouragement to the Adjutant in the Punctual Execution of his Office, he [have] the [Rank] and Pay of Lieutenant and be promoted according to his Seniority, as abovementioned, but when promoted to the Rank of Captain to quit the Office of Adjutant.
8. The Major, Commanding Officer or Adjutant shall every morning at an hour appointed wait upon the Governour or next in Council in his Absence to receive the Word and Daily Orders, [all] shall at the same time make a Report in writing to the Governour, or next in Council in his Absence of all Irregularitys and Accidents that have happened among the Military, whether at the Barracks or other Quarters, or in or about the Town or other Places as also of the Names and State of the Sick in the Hospital or elsewhere, and of any Abuses relative to them. And the Major or Commanding Officer, shall take care for his better Information in this Respect to appoint Proper Officers to visit them once or twice daily. He is likewise to make Report in the same manner of all Detachments sent abroad or returned, signifying

the Names of the Officers and Soldiers belonging to such Detachments, and shall also Report all Just Complaints the Officers and Soldiers may have to make against one another.

9. That after the Governour or next in Council in his Absence hath delivered the Publick Daily Orders for the Garrison, the Major or Officer commanding the Companys shall give such Orders as he shall find necessary for their Discipline and Good Government, which are to be obeyed by all Officers and Soldiers, and All Orders issued by the Governour or next in Council in his Absence, and by the Major or Officer commanding the Companys are to be entered fair in a Book to be kept for that purpose by the Adjutant.

10. That the Governour at Relieving the Guard shall have a Report made to him immediately in writing by the Officer of the Guard Relieved, of all Occurrences that passed during the time he was upon Guard, to which shall be added all New Orders relating to the Troops, which shall have been issued by the Major or Commanding Officer during that Guard.

11. That All Outposts or Stations of the Military be constantly relieved at Stated Times, that every Commission, NonCommission Officer and Soldier may have their Turns upon all Dutys and Services, and that none may grow Negligent or Forgetful of their Duty by too long Absence from the Main Body.

12. No Officer or Soldier shall be excused from doing his Duty, but in case of Sickness or Inability or with Leave of the Major or Officer commanding the Companys, and the Approbation of the Governour, nor shall any one hire another to do his Duty for him without such Leave and Approbation, on pain of being punished as the next Court Martial shall think proper, and every NonCommission Officer conniving at such Excusing or Hiring of Duty shall be reduced for it, and every Commission Officer knowing and allowing such practices in the Company's Service shall be punished according to the Judgment of a Court Martial.

13. That no Man among the Military be allowed to keep a Publick House for the retailing of Strong Liquors, or to retail them, or be concerned in the retailing them in any manner whatsoever, But if the Governour and Council think fit to permit any Military Man on his Request to keep a Publick House, or to get his Living by his Trade or Profession, they shall discharge such Person from the Military, on condition that he remain at the Settlement 'till his time be expired, and that he be ready to take up Arms and assist in common with the Military in Y^e. Defence of the Place, or to go on any Expedition, during which time of Service he shall be allowed Pay and not otherwise, But this shall not extend to prevent any one's Re Entering into the Company he was discharged from, on his giving up the retailing or being concerned in the retailing of Strong Liquors or the carrying on his Trade or Profession.

14. That no Commission Officer shall be broke or degraded unless by Order of the Court of Directors, without a Fair, Full and Impartial Hearing before the Governour and Council, and where the Offence is of a Military Nature, the Major or Officer commanding the Companys with Two Captains shall be Members of Council on such Tryal, and shall Judge and Determine in common with the Governour and Council in all Military Offences according to the Rules, Articles and Customs of War in his Majestys Service, conforming in this respect to the Powers granted to the Company by their Charter, And for the better maintaining of Discipline and Good Order, All Offences of a Military Nature committed by the NonCommission Officers or Soldiers, shall be tryed by a Court Martial consisting of a Captain and Four Subaltern Officers to be appointed by the Major or Officer commanding the Five Companys after the Nature of a Regimental Court Martial who shall try and examine in a fair and impartial manner all Military Crimes such as Disobedience of Orders, neglect of Duty, Disturbance in Barracks or Quarters, or upon Guard or Party or elsewhere, and shall give their Opinion, according to the Rules, Articles and Custom of War in the manner above mentioned, which Opinion is to be confirmed by the Governour or next of Council in his Absence before put in execution, and upon inflicting Punishment upon European Soldiers it shall be done by Europeans only.

But no part of this Clause or any other in these Regulations shall be construed to deprive the Governour and Council of the Power to suspend any Military Person of what Rank soever for any Offence, whether of a Civil or Military Nature. In cases where they are in doubt as to the Nature or Degree of the Offence, or of the Proper Punishment for it, and such Suspension shall remain, if they think fit till they have the Determination of the Court of Directors upon the Offence, of which they are hereby ordered to send home a Full and Just Account with their or the Court Martial's Opinion upon it by the First Returning Ships.

15. That no Captain or other Officer shall on pain of being dismissed the Service demand or receive directly or indirectly any Present, Fee, or Reward for the Admission or Promotion or Recommendation of any Person to be promoted in the Military Service.

16. That no Man shall be discharged from the Military Companys before his Time is out but by Order of the Governour and Council, but those who have served their full time shall be discharged unless they engage for a further time.

17. That the Governour shall appoint One of the Companys Covenanted Servants to be Military Pay Master, who shall at the Beginning of each Month after the Close of the General Muster pay to each Captain or Officer Commanding the Company (Unless the Governour and Council have Good Reasons to the contrary) the Pay of the Company, which is to be issued Weekly to the NonCommission Officers and Private Men or in such Payments as may be most proper for the Service and most Advantageous to the Men to whom the Pay is due. The Major or Officer commanding the Companys, is to oblige them to Regularity in their Diet by Messing or such Other Methods as the Nature of the Countrey and Service will admit of.

18. The Governour or Second in Council shall make a General Review or Muster of the Military and see them exercised, once towards the latter End of each Month, or oftner when the Season will permit it.

19. That the Muster Rolls of each Company shall be signed by the Captain and Subalterns and certified by the Governour or Second which soever shall have made the Review, as also by the Major or Officer commanding the Companys, and then they shall be laid before the Council in time for Approbation before the next Payment.

20. That a Separate List be made up to the 1st. of January and sent home yearly in the Companys Packets of each Military Company, in which shall be inserted the Name of each Person Received from England or any of the Company's Settlements abroad, as also of such as may be Enlisted, setting forth what Nation they are of and specifying the times of their Arrival or Enlisting as also the times of every Man's Discharge Death or Desertion.

21. No Commission or NonCommission Officer or Soldier put under an Arrest or confined and continued so above Six Hours shall be discharged or Cleared but by the Governour or Council, and any Officer detaining a Person under arrest or confinement more than Six Hours without making a Report in Writing to the Governour or in his Absence to the next in Council, shall be broke, unless such Person be taken into arrest in the Night Time, in which case Report thereof shall be made to the Governour or next in Council in his Absence, early in the Morning.

22. That each Captain have the Cloathing of his own Company, and that for Regularity, the Major or Officer commanding the Companys shall appoint a Pattern Coat and Hat or Cap suitable to the Climate to be approved of by the Governour, and to which every Captain shall conform at the first making New Cloaths, and that the Major shall appoint the Uniforms for the Commission Officers, to be approved of by the Governour, but Great Care is to be had by the Governour and Major that the Cloathing be not too Expensive either to the Officers or Private Men, and that the Stoppages from the NonCommission Officers and Private Men be no more than is Reasonable and that it be made Gradually, and in such Equal Parts as to reimburse

the Captains from New Cloathing to New Cloathing for his First Cost and a Moderate Profit thereon, making an Equitable Allowance for the Losses he may sustain by Deserters carrying away their Cloathing or from other Accidents.

23. That the Governour and Major or Officer Commanding the Companys shall take Care that the Captains do Justice to their Non Commissioned Officers and Soldiers in their Cloathing and Pay, that they be New Cloathed once in Two Years with English Cloth out of the Companys Warehouses, and that they nor the Subaltern Officers do not oppress them, and that the soldiers be kept to a Strict Discipline and Subordination.

24. That a Sufficient Quantity of Ammunition shall be delivered for Disciplining the Companys, for which the Adjutant shall give Receipts, and deliver in Accounts of the Consumption thereof to the Person who hath charge of the Ammunition to be so deliver'd.

25. That upon the Death of any Commission Officer, unless the Deceased hath an Heir at Age on the Spot or hath by Will appointed an Executor at hand to discharge the Trust, The Major or Officer commanding the Companys shall authorize and appoint Three Commission Officers, One of whom to be a Captain, to take a True and Exact Inventory of the Effects of the Deceased and to sell the same at Publick Outcry, at such time as the Major or Officer commanding the Companys shall appoint, And on giving the Customary Notice thereof. The Three Officers ordered for this Service are out of the Produce of the Effects of the Deceased to pay forthwith the Funeral Charges, and All Just Debts due from the Deceased, and to make up and sign an Account of the same, in which no Commission is to be charged. The Major or Officer commanding the Companys is to examine these Accounts, and finding them Just is to certifye them accordingly, and deposit them for the Use of the Heirs in the Secretary's Office, and the Balance due to them, is to be immediately paid for their Benefit into the Companys Cash, and if the Officers ordered as above for this Service refuse, neglect or delay to perform it in a Just and fair manner, the Major or Officer commanding the Companys, shall forthwith make Complaint against such Officer or Officers so refusing, neglecting or delaying to the Governour and Council, and bring him or them to a Court Martial, to be punished according to the Nature and Degree of the Offence, and if any of the Officers so complained against appear guilty of any Fraudulent Practices, or of having embezzled or misapplied any part of the Deceased Effects or Estate, they shall be obliged forthwith to make Restitution, and shall be rendered incapable of serving the Company in any Station whatsoever, And in case of the Decease of any Non Commission Officer or Soldier, the Captain of the Company to which the Deceased did belong, shall perform this Service in the above manner, making Report thereof to the Major or Officer commanding the Companys.

In case of the Death or Desertion of any Non Commission Officer or Soldier, the Captain of the Company to which such Officer or Soldier did belong, is forthwith to see that the Arms, Accoutrements and Ammunition delivered to such Non Commission Officer or Soldier be returned to the Proper Officer, or that they be immediately paid for preferably to All other Debts out of the Effects if any can be found belonging to the Person Deceased or Deserted.

The Above Regulations are to be Strictly complied with in every Article and made publick in such manner that no one may be Ignorant of their Contents so far as he is concerned therein. And as it may be proper to make Further Regulations for the Military at Fort St. David, than can at present be foreseen to be necessary, more especially with relation to Detachments sent as Garrisons to the Subordinate Settlements, or to escort the Companys Effects; It is hereby left to the Prudence and Discretion of the Governour and Council, with the Advice of the Major or Officer commanding the Companys, to make such further Regulations, which they may from time to time amend or alter for the Good of the Service, provided such further Regulations be not contrary to or Inconsistent with the above.

It is ordered that the Garrison for the Settlement at Fort St. David be formed into Seven Regular Companys under the Command of a Major after the following Manner Viz^t.

REGULATIONS FOR THE FORMING, DISCIPLINING AND GOVERNING A COMPANY OF
ARTILLERY AT FORT ST. DAVID, AND FOR THE BETTER MANAGING AND
KEEPING IN GOOD ORDER THE ORDNANCE, SMALL ARMS AND MILITARY
STORES, TOOLS, UTENSILS AND OTHER HABILIMENTS OF WAR,
[DATED JUNE 17, 1748]

[*Public Despatches from England, Volume 52, pages 239-251*]

As it is intended to Abolish the Offices of Gunners, Gunners Mates, Quarter Gunners and Gun Room Crew, and to Consist in lieu of them a Regular Company of Artillery for the better defence of Our Settlements in time of danger, and for the Training up a Regular, and Disciplined Corps for the Ordnance Service, We do hereby Order for the more easy Attaining this End, that the following Regulations be strictly followed & Observed.

1. That the said Company of Artillery do Consult [*sic*] of One Second Captain, One Captain Lieutenant and Director of the Laboratory, One first Lieutenant Fire Worker, One Second Lieuten^t. Fire Worker, One Ensign Fire Worker, Four Serjeant Bombardiers, Four Corporal Bombardeers, Two Drummers, and One hundred Gunners.

2^d. That the formation of this Company of Artillery shall be set about immediately on Receipt of this and Cap^t. Delavaux with the Approbation of the Governour & Major Lawrence shall direct the same in the manner most suitable to the Service, and in Conformity to these Regulations.

3. The Officers and others already engaged for the service of the Artillery are to be placed immediately in the several Ranks they are engaged for, in which they are to continue 'till promoted, unless by Committing any Crime or Offence they shall be broke by the Judgment of a Court Martial, or Dismist by Order of the Court of Directors.

4. That such of those belonging to the Gunroom as have behaved well, and can give proof of their being properly qualified to serve in the Artillery, be admitted into this Company in such Rank as on tryal the Governour, Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer, or if Absent the next Officer of the Artillery may judge them fit for.

5. In case any of the Officers, or others belonging to the Company of Artillery in His Majestys Service under the Command of Admiral Boscawen should obtain leave to stay in the East Indies in order to Enter into the Service of the Company, they shall be Admitted into such vacant Employments as the Governour, Major Lawrence and the Chief Engineer may judge them Qualified for, but as it is intended the Second Captain is to be an Engineer, no one is to be Admitted into that Rank, who hath not a Competent knowledge and Experience in that Profession, It is therefore Intended to keep that Post open 'till a Person so Qualified is named by the Court of Directors.

6. In Order to Compleat the Company of Artillery as soon possible, a sufficient number of Young Healthy able bodied, and most sober Men from among the soldiers or others belonging to the other Companys are to be taught the Exercise of the Artillery, among whom it is recommended to have as many as possible who have been bred to the Occupation of Smiths, Carpenters or some other Trade or Business which may be of Use in the Service of the Artillery, as also such as can read and write, and seem to have the best Capacity to learn the several parts of Duty proper for the Ordnance Service, and as soon as they shall have made a sufficient Progress in the Artillery Exercise, they shall be Discharged from the Companys they belong to, and Entered into the Company of Artillery, and promoted in it according to their Merit, And that there may be always a supply of Men proper to Recr[u]it the Company of Artillery, Major Lawrence and the Chief Engineer are to take care that a sufficient number of Men Qualified as above, as much as possible be continually Instructed in the Artillery Discipline for that purpose Our Intention being that the Company of Artillery be always Compleat And in case any Person admitted into the Company of

Artillery misbehave, so as not to be fit to continue in it, he shall on the Judgment of a Court Martial be obliged to serve the remainder of his time in the Company he was taken from.

7. So soon as the Company of Artillery consists of a sufficient number of Officers and Gunners to do the Duty of the Gunner and Gunroom Crew (which it is strongly recommended may be as soon as possible) the Office of Gunner, and of all belonging to the Gunroom are to be Abolished.

8. On abolishing the Offices of Gunner, and others belonging to the Gunroom Crew, the Governour is to Order the Companys Storekeeper, or some other proper Person among the Covenanted Servants to Act as Military Storekeeper, to whom the Gunner is to deliver up all the Ordnance, Carriages, Arms, Powder, Shot, Shells, Tools, Instruments and other stores and Habiliments of War under his care, which the Military Storekeeper is to receive, and take into his Charge, and to make an exact Inventory of the same, distinguishing what part thereof is in Service, and where in Service, from what remains in Store, Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer or if Absent the next Officer of the Artillery are to Survey the whole, and to make Report of the Condition thereof, and this Inventory and Survey, Signed by Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer or if Absent the next Officer of the Company or Artillery and Storekeeper, are to be laid forthwith before the Council.

9. The Military Storekeeper is likewise to take Possession of the Gunroom, and different Magazines where the Military Stores have been usually kept, a convenient part whereof is to be set apart for a Laboratory, of which Possession is to be delivered to the Director of the Laboratory for a Place to prepare the Military Fire Works in, such as making and filling Cartridges, Fixing Shells or Grape Shot, Preparing Fuzes, Quick Match, Carcasses, Fire Balls, Signal Rockets, Port Fires, or other Fire Works of a Military nature, or for Experiments which may be necessary for the Service.

10. The Military Storekeeper is to keep an exact Account of all Military Stores received into his Charge, as also of all he delivers, he is to receive none but by Order of the Governour and Council, nor until they be surveyed by Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer, or if Absent the next Officer of the Artillery, who are to Certifye the Quality of such stores before he receive them, and if any of them prove Defective in Quality or Damaged, Report thereof is immediately to be made in writing to the Governour and Council setting forth the nature, degree and cause to the best of their Judgment of such Defects or Damage, that such stores if bought or Contracted for in the Countrey may be returned, or if received from Europe, or any of the Settlements abroad, an Account thereof may be transmitted to the Court of Directors, and to the President and Council of the Place they came from, that the Company may obtain satisfaction for such Defects or Damages; and all stores &c^a. Issued by the Storekeeper shall if they be returned to him, undergo the same survey and Report, before he give his Receipt for the same.

11. The Military Storekeeper is to keep an exact List or Register of all Ordnance, whether the Great Guns, Mortars, Royals Cohorns or Peterraroes, as well Brass as Iron belonging to the Company at Fort St. David, whether they be at the head Settlement, or at the Subordinates, or on board of, or belonging to any of the Companys Vessels, expressing their several Natures, Lengths and Weights, with their Demensions [*sic*] at the Base, Trunnions and Muzle, Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer or if Absent the next Officer of the Artillery are to assist the Storekeeper in a general Survey of the Ordnance, in making the Register, and shall distinctly set down which of them are employed in Service and where, and which of them are in store, And if any of them be found unserviceable It must be particularly Remarkt against such Pieces in the Register Copy of this Register Sign'd by Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer, or if Absent the next Officer of the Artillery and Storekeeper is to be kept by the Governour, and another such Copy by the Major or Officer Commanding the Companys, a Third by the Chief Engineer, or if Absent the next Officer

of the Artillery on the spot under the Major, and a Fourth to be sent home. And at the end of every year a new survey and Register of the Ordnance is to be made, and Copys of it made out, sign'd and distributed in like manner.

12. The Military Storekeeper is to keep under his care all the Small Arms, and other Military Weapons, as also all the Ammunition, Tools and Utensils necessary for the Service of the Artillery, or for the small Arms, all Gun Carriages, Ingredients for making Fire Works, and in general every thing necessary for the Service of War, except such parts thereof as it may be proper to be kept under the care of the Director of the Laboratory, of which he is to deliver no part to any person whatsoever without an Order of Council, except on urgent Occasions, when an Order from the Governour, Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer or if Absent the Officer then Commanding the Companys, shall be a sufficient Warrant to him, but he shall make report in writing of what stores he shall have delivered by virtue of such Order to the Council, the first time it is held, and the Director of the Laboratory is to Act in like manner with relation to the Stores under his Care.

13. The Storekeeper shall keep a set of Correct Books by way of Journal and Ledger, in which every Article under his Care must have a separate Head, he is to take care the Entrys be fairly made, and the Books continually Posted up, that he may at all times be ready to shew to the Governour or Council the state of every or any Article he or they want to be informed of, he is likewise to keep a Book into which he is to enter a Copy of every Order he shall receive for the delivering, or receiving any Stores under his Care, he shall likewise Copy into the same Book all Letters he shall write or receive relating to them, as also all Contracts made for the furnishing of Artillery, Arms, Military Stores &c. together with all Surveys and Indents.

14. The Storekeeper shall at the end of every Year make up a General Rest or Ballance of all Military Appurtenances under his Charge, in which he is particularly to Explain a State of every Article, how Employed and what remains in store, the whole is at the same time to be surveyed in the Presence of Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer or if Absent the Officer Commanding the Companys, and the next Officer of the Artillery, who are to Certifye such survey, making the necessary Remarks thereon, by Distinguishing what is fit for Service, from what is not, what can be repaired and made fit for Service, from what ought to be Condemned as Irreparable or not worth the Expence of Repairing, that the latter may be sold, or otherwise Disposed of as the Council may think fit to Order, A like Rest and Survey is to be made at all times on the Death, Resignation or Removal of the Storekeeper, that the former Storekeeper or his Estate may make good to the Company all Deficiencies, and that the new Storekeeper may at his first Enttring upon his Office, know what he is Accountable for.

15. The Storekeeper is to take care that every thing under his Charge be kept in Repair, and in the best manner to prevent Damage or Wast, when Repairs are wanting he is to give immediate Notice thereof to the Council that they may give proper Orders for them to be made, and when there is a want of stores or other necessaries for the Military, he is to make timely Application for them by Indent to the Council, who if they think proper are to Order the same to be supplied, if they consist of Materials usually bought in the Country, or to Transmit the said Indents to Europe by the first Conveyance, if they consist of Articles usually supplied from thence.

16. When any Military Stores are received, or any Expences are made in Repairs or otherways by Order of the Council, under the Direction of the Military Storekeeper, he shall lay an Account Certified by him of such Stores bought, or Such Expences made, Monthly or oftner before the Council, who Approving of the same, are to give Warrants to the Military Paymaster for the Payment thereof.

17. Copy of all Books kept by the Military Storekeeper are to be sent home yearly in the Companys Packets.

18. The Director of the Laboratory is to have Possession of proper Places for the preparing, preserving and safe keeping of all Necessarys proper for the Laboratory, and to have an Apartment as near it as may be convenient, that he may have it the more under his Inspection and Care. He is to be Allowed such Assistants as may be necessary for the Business of the Laboratory, and is from time to time to give notice to the Governour, Major Lawrence, or the Chief Engineer of the number of Assistants he may want, who are to appoint them only from among the Company of Artillery, taking care that none but Sober Men be Chosen for that purpose, but the Director of the Laboratory may name for his Chief Assistant on all occasions any one of the said Companys, not above the Degree of Serjeant, on whose Skill and Care he can rely.

19. All such of the Company of Artillery as are Employed as Assistants in the Laboratory shall during the time of such Employment be Excused from other Duty.

20. The Director of the Laboratory is to Order and Regulate the Laboratory, and all Works which shall be fitted up, or prepared therein, and to see them carried on in the most skilful, diligent and compleat manner, and that there be no Wast or Embezzlement in the Companys Stores, and that none be made use of but for the Companys Service.

21. The Director of the Laboratory shall at the first taking Possession of the Places Assigned for his use, make out an Inventory of all Stores, Amunition, Tools, Utensils, Ingredients, or other necessarys, which he is to sign, and acknowledge the Receipt of the same from the Storekeeper, on their being deliver'd to him; this Inventory and Receipt he shall deliver to the Military Storekeeper who is to return a Duplicate thereof Signed by himself to the Director of the Laboratory, who shall enter the same in a Register Book kept for that, and other purposes hereafter mentioned.

22. The Director of the Laboratory is from time to time to Indent for such Working Tools, Utensils, Moulds and Implements, as also for such Ingredients and Materials as are used and proper for making, preparing, compounding and fitting up Laboratory stores or Military Fire Works, whether Offensive or Defensive or for Signals. This Indent he is to deliver to the Governour, Major Lawrence or the Chief Engineer who is to lay the same before the next Council, who if they think proper are to Order the Storekeeper to deliver the whole or part of the Contents of the said Indent to the Director of the Laboratory, taking his Receipt for the same; But in cases of Urgent necessity the Order of the Governour, Major Lawrence, or Chief Engineer to the Storekeeper for delivering what may be Indented for by the Director of the Laboratory shall be sufficient, But the Storekeeper is to make Report thereof in Writing to the Council at their next Sitting.

23. The Director of the Laboratory is always to keep in readiness such Ammunition, Stores or Fire Works, as may be wanting for the Ordinary Service of the Garrison, and to Conduct the Business of the Laboratory in such manner, and with such foresight as never to be unprepared at a short warning to furnish the Garrison in time with all that may be necessary to Defend the Place in case of sudden Attack or Attempt to surprize it, he is to prove all shells to see they be serviceable before they be filled, and if any of them prove unfit for service, they are to be kept apart to serve to throw as Dead Shells at the Exercise of the Mortars, or to be otherwise Disposed of as the Council may Order, but they are on no Account to be made use of for Live Shells in the Companys Service, unless on a survey by Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer, and next Principal Officers of the Artillery it be Judged safe so to do.

24. The Director of the Laboratory is to keep the Key of the Laboratory, and such other Places as may be Allotted for him to keep safe the Ammunition, Ingredients, Fire Works and Stores &c., under his Charge, he is not to suffer any of them to be Opened, but with the greatest care to prevent Accidents, and no Work is to be done in the Laboratory but at due hours, and by Day Light, unless in cases of most urgent necessity, and he or his Assistant is to take care that every day when any

Work is done in the Laboratory, that before the Door be shut, the Shelves, Tables, Chairs, Benches and Floor be swept clean and Mopt or Swab'd with Water to prevent Accident, and that the sweepings be thrown into Water and Carried out, and laid at a proper distance from the Buildings.

25. When there is a greater quantity of Live Shells or other Fire Works or Ammunition in the Custody of the Director of Laboratory that it may be convenient or safe to remain in the places allotted for him, he is to apply to the Governour, Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer, or if Absent the Officer Commanding the Companys that such part thereof as cannot conveniently or safely be kept by him may be delivered to the Storekeeper, who is to receive and give his Receipt for the same. And the Director of the Laboratory is to see that all Ammunition and Fire Works and Stores whether in his own keeping or that of the Storekeeper be stowed in the best manner in the Magazines to prevent Accidents, or their being spoiled by Damp or otherwise, and it shall be his Duty from time to time to Visit all the Military Magazines to see the Stores are preserved in the best manner, and in case he finds any Neglect, or that any thing is necessary to be done to the Magazines for the better preservation of the stores, he is to give notice thereof in Writing to the Governour, who is to lay the same forthwith before the Council that they may Order the needful to be done.

26. No Foreigner whether in our Service or not (except such as hath been Admitted into it by the Court of Directors) nor no Indian, Black, or Person of a mixt Breed, nor any Roman Catholick of what Nation soever shall on any pretence be admitted to set foot in the Laboratory or any of the Military Magazines either out of Curiosity, or to be Employed in them, or to come near them, so as to see what is doing or contained therein, nor shall any such Persons have a Copy or Sight of any Accounts or Papers relating to any Military Stores whatsoever.

27. The Director of the Laboratory is to keep a regular Account in his Register-Book of the Receiving, Delivering and Expending of every thing under his Care, and once in every three Months or oftner if necessary shall lay in writing before the Governour and Council, Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer, or if Absent the Officer commanding the Companys, a State of the Stores under his Charge, with a demand of such Materials, Utensils, Ingredients and Stores as may be necessary for carrying on the Current Service of the following Quarter, and at the end of each Year such an Account shall be made for the whole Year, Copy whereof must be sent home as is directed above with regard to the Military Storekeeper, and as it may so happen that the Director of the Laboratory may not understand Book-keeping well enough to keep these Accounts in a clear and distinct manner, if no Person proper for this purpose belong to the Company of Artillery, the Governour is on Application of the Director to Appoint One fit for this purpose from among the Companys Covenanted Servants to assist him, who is to be a Sober, Discreet Person, and One whose Secrecy and Fidelity can be depended upon.

28. That the Director of the Laboratory and his Assistant shall diligently, carefully and properly Instruct in the whole Art of making Military Fire Works for real use in every branch, without Concealing any part thereof, all Officers belonging to the Artillery, and such Officers and Cadetts belonging to the other Companys as are willing, and are desirous to be Instructed, as also such Cadetts and Gunners belonging to the Artillery, as have the best disposition to be Instructed, and are Employ'd, or intended to be Employed in the Laboratory, or be any ways promoted in the Service of the Artillery, in which care shall be taken to choose out the soberest and most Intelligent Persons whose Fidelity and Attachment to the Service of the Company, can be most relied on, and all Persons Instructed in the Business of the Laboratory shall first receive an Order of the Governour, Council, Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer, or if Absent the Officer Commanding the Companys, to be so Instructed, and shall then be personally employed in the actual making and preparing all Sorts of Fire Works, and for greater Certainty that no part thereof is Concealed from them the Director of the Laboratory is to Enter fair into a Book, all Receipts of Compositions, Titled with the Uses for which they are designed, with the manner

of Compounding, Preparing, Fitting and making up all parts of Military Fire Works, whether Compositions, Machines or Cases, and the said Book shall be an Office Book to be Inspected by all such as are Ordered or permitted to Attend the Laboratory as above, and are willing to be Instructed therein, and the Governour, Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer or if Absent the Officer Commanding the Companys shall each of them have a Duplicate of the said Book, but no other Copys either in part or whole shall be given to, or taken by any other Person whatsoever.

29. When Labourers are required to Work in the Military Magazines or Laboratory they shall be taken from the Company of Artillery only, and such Labour shall be deem'd as Tours of Duty, and in Extraordinary cases where the Labour may exceed the Duty of the rest of the Garrison, such a Compensation shall be made to the Persons so employed as the Governour and Council shall Judge equitable and reasonable, and the Council is to Act in the same manner with regard to any Artificers belonging to the Company of Artillery when employed as such, in the Service of the Artillery.

30. The Officers of the Company of Artillery are to take care to teach all Persons belonging to the said Company in the Practice of Gunnery in General, as the manner of Serving and Firing all Sorts of Pieces of Artillery, whether designed for the throwing of shot, Shells, Stones, Grenades, Carcasses or other Fire Works. They are to teach them the Use and Construction of all the Instruments used for Pointing or Levelling Great Guns or Mortars, and to Exercise them at Convenient times in the hitting Marks, whether Point Blank, or at any degree of Elevation, together with Quick Firing, for which a proper Quantity of Ammunition is to be allowed, they are likewise to Instruct them in the making Gabions and Fascines, with the manner to Use them in Making Batterys or Breast Works, as also the manner of making Intrenchments, whether for defence or Approaches, and they are likewise to teach them the manner to Mount or Dismount Cannon or Mortars, and to Remove them from Place to Place at which they are to be Exercised at proper times, but so as not to Over fatigue them, or give them a disgust to the Service, but the knowledge of this Exercise is necessary as in time of danger no other Assistance can be got to do this Work.

31. The Artillery Company is likewise to be taught and Perfected in the Military Exercise of Small Arms in all its parts in the same manner the other Companys are taught, and is to be Reviewed and Exercised in Common with the rest of the Garrison towards the end of each Month, they shall likewise go through a general Exercise of the Artillery once in each Month, at which the Governour or some one of the Council, Major Lawrence, the Chief Engineer, or if Absent the Officer Commanding the Companys shall be present, and twice at least in every Year they shall Perform a Solemn Exercise to Fire at Marks, and throw shells in Presence of the Governour or Second, Major Lawrence, and the Chief Engineer, and to Encourage such who Perform the best, the Council may Order suitable Premiums.

32. The Company of Artillery is to do Garrison Duty in common, and in proportion with the other Troops, and so many Officers and Gunners are to mount daily as may perform the Duty on the Platforms, and Bastians as was done by the Gun-room Crew heretofore, and in all respects the Company of Artillery is to be employed as is practised in His Majestys Garrisons of Gibraltar and Minorca.

33. No Deserter from any Nation whatsoever is to be Entertained in the Company of Artillery, not even a British Subject, who may have once Deserted from His Majestys or the Companys Service, although he may have been pardoned for his Desertion, nor any Roman Catholick, and if any Person belonging to the Company of Artillery marry a Roman Catholick, or his Wife become a Roman Catholick after Marriage, such Person shall be immediately dismiss from the Company of Artillery, and be obliged to serve the remainder of his time in one of the other Companys, or be removed to some other of the Companys Settlements to serve it out there, if the Council think fitt.

34. Cap^t. Delavaux with the Approbation of the Governour shall Regulate the Cloathing for the Artillery which is to be of Blew Cloth out of the Companys Warehouses with red Cuffs and Facings and Brass Buttons, with a Cap or Hat, which shall be Provided by the Captain and paid for by the Company in the same manner as Order'd in the 22th. & 23th. Articles of the Military Regulations, and the said Company shall be Armed in the manner most suitable to the Climate, and the nature of their Service.

35. The Company of Artillery is to be paid in the same manner by the Military Pay Master as Directed by the 17th. 18th. and 19th. Articles of the Military Regulations.

36. In case of the Death of any Person belonging to the Company of Artillery, the Effects of the Deceased are to be taken care of as directed in the 25th. Article of the Military Regulations.

37. The Commission, Non Commission, Officers and Gunners belonging to the Company of Artillery are to be promoted, Broke, Punished or Confined according to the several Regulations made for the Military in the Companys Service at Fort S^t. David, with this distinction that where an Officer or Gunner belonging to the Artillery is to be tryed so many of the Officers belonging to the Artillery as conveniently can, shall be of the Court Martial, and in all tours of Duty the Officers of the Companys and of the Artillery Company are to Roll together according to their Ranks & Seniority so far as is consistent with the nature of their different services, and are to have the same Military Honours done them, and those who serve in the Artillery may be promoted in the other Companys in case of Vacancys, as may those who serve in the other Companys be promoted to Vacancys in the Artillery Company, but not unless they have made themselves completely Masters of the Business and Service of the Artillery in all its branches, and give good Proofs of their knowledge and Experience therein to the Satisfaction of the Governour, Major Lawrence, Chief Engineer, or if absent the Officer Commanding the Companys.

38. All the Posts where Cannon or Mortars are Mounted or intended to be Mounted shall be Visited once in every Week or oftner by one of the Commission officers belonging to the Company of Artillery, who is carefully to Inspect the Artillery at those parts, that the Ordnance with their Carriages and other Appurtenances be kept in the best order, and if he observe any Damage, Decay, Wast or Embezzlement therein, whether from Neglect, the Injury of Weather or other causes he is to make immediate Report thereof in Writing to the Major, who is to acquaint the Governour therewith, that such Damages or Wast may be forthwith remedied, and means used to prevent the like for the future. He is at the same time, carefully to Observe if there be any Damage or Decay in any of the Fortifications or Works, and to make Report thereof in like manner through the Major to the Governour, that they may be forthwith repaired.

39. The above Regulations are to be strictly complied with in every Article, and made Publick in such manner that no one may be Ignorant of their Contents so far as he is Concerned therein, and as it may be proper to make farther Regulations for the Company of Artillery at Fort S^t. David than can at present be foreseen, more especially with relation to Detachments sent to the Subordinate Garrisons, or on Partys, It is hereby left to the Discretion of the Governour and Council, with the Advice of the Major or Officer Commanding the Companys to make such farther Regulations, which they may from time to time Amend or Alter for the good of the Service, provided such farther Regulations, Alterations, or Amendments be not contrary to or Inconsistent with the above Regulations.

It is Ordered that the Company of Artillery in the East India Companys Service Consist as follows.

To Reside where the Companys Service may require
