PREFACE

An authoritative body of current opinion rejects the maxim of laissez-faire and welcomes the widening radius of governmental interference. But in the following pages the teaching of philosophy and psychology is utilised to reinforce the economic importance of an individuality which has transcended the stage of leading strings.

Granted that some of man's impulses are anti-social expressions of what has been called the 'pleasure principle,' the remedy lies not in repression but in sublimation. The unruly instincts, when their natural ends have been subserved, may be diverted into fresh channels, conformable to the exigencies of external reality. This transformation is the port after heavy storms, the solvent of mental conflict and neurosis. It signifies a concrete gain to society, as when an inventor, formerly absorbed in mere technical perfection, reduces his contrivances to commercial propositions, or when a self-assertive spinster gives over the search for a husband and manages a school instead.

Of course this process of displacement is difficult. Certainly it implies efforts and sacrifices. But it is demanded of every individual who desires to resolve the contradictory tendencies in his finite life.

The existence of this little volume is largely due to the sympathetic encouragement of Professor W. R. Scott. To him and to Mr. A. L. Macfie, who brightened the drudgery of proof correction with some able suggestions, the author is very much indebted.

WEALTH: A Brief Examination of the Causes of Economic Welfare.

By Edwin Cannan, Emeritus Professor of Political Economy in University of London. *Third and Revised Edition*. Crown 8vo. 330 pp. 5s.

First published in 1914, nearly 20,000 copies have been sold to date, and the book has been translated into Spanish, Japanese, Chinese, Poish and Braille. In this, the third edition, the book has been entirely re-set, much new matter added, and the price reduced to 5s. There are also many alterations in casual allusions and examples which have been made necessary by the effects of the War, especially the great decline in the purchasing power of money.

THE PROSPERITY OF AUSTRALIA: An Economic Analysis.

By F. C. Benham, B.Sc. (Econ.), Demy 8vo. 288 pp. Four Graphs and many Statistical Tables. 12c. 6d.

The author first considers what tests should be applied to determine the prosperity of a nation, and then proceeds to analyze what the trend of Australian prosperity, judged by these tests, has been from 1901 to 1926. Later chapters discuss the sources of prosperity, and the effect of Protection and Wage Regulation.

UNEMPLOYMENT AND PURCHASING POWER.

By P. W. Martin. Crown 8vo. 96 pp. and many Diagrams Paper. 3s. 6d. Cloth. 4s. 6d.

Fundamental to the problem of unemployment is the question whether or no purchasing power is being maintained. This book presents an analysis of the basis factors tending to bring about a deficiency of purchasing power, with special reference to the course of events in Britain during the last ten years. In a concluding chapter certain specific measures are considered, having as their object the maintenance of purchasing power nationally and internationally.

INTERNATIONAL COMMERCE AND ECONOMIC THEORY.

By R. G. GRALE. Crown 8vo. 168 pp. 68.

A short study of the economics of international trade, with a criticism or one fundamental errors and ancillary fallacies of the classical English School. In the papers on Reparations, the Dawes Report, the Russian Treaty, Foreign Loans, Dumping, and the Safeguarding of Industries it is shown that free trade doctrines have proved as mischlevous in practice as they are unacound in theory.
