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## FOREWORD.



## Bureau of Economic Survey.

The people are fortunate in having a sympathetic, liberal and tactful ruler in the person of Lt. Col. Shri Rajaram Chhatrapati Maharajasaheb, G. O. I. w., a worthy descendent of Shivaji the great, the illustrious founder of the Maratha Empire.

His Highness is trying his best to improve the sanitary conditions of the capital, develope the economic resources of this principality, and educate the citizens in civic rights by conferring upon them the benefits of local self-government.

Rao Bahadur A. B. Lathe, M. A., LL. B., the Dewanaaheb of Kolhapar, has evinced a keen interest in the economic survey of the State.

Infact, both the ruler and the prime minister are anxious to know the real condition of the people and foster their commercial and industrial development; hence they have started a Bureau of Economic Survey.

Two very valuable reports on the industrial aurvey of the Kolhapur State were written respectively by Major Graham in 1854 and Professor Modak in 1895.

It-ia intended to collect (a) data on the same points for showing comparative progress, and (b) statistics on other useful topics.

Only a modest beginning has just been made.
Scope of the Survey. The present enquiry was confined to mercantile and manufacturing establisiments, both wholesale and retail, exclusive of household and hand industries carried on in private houses. Thus all those who are engaged in local business and have their shops in any street or lane within the Municipal limits of Kolbapur and Shahupuri, have given the returns.

Such occupations as black-smithing, copper-smithing, harness-making, tanning, tin-amithing, tailoring, basket-making, weaving, etc., as are being followed in any houses and those whose products are not meant for public sale, have been excluded. The number of auch exclusions oin not be ascertained.

We have also excluded
(a) Itinerant hawkers like sellers of mineral waters, tea, fruits, vegetables, confeotionery, etc.
(b) Temporary shops put up by gardeners to sell vegetables in the evening or on Sunday-the market day.
(c) Wheelbarrow shops set up in corners of streets to sell toys and artioles of dress.

The work of collecting information was begun in May, 1926. The form issued to all the establishments and shop-keepers is given on the next page.

On account of the untrained clerical staff, the tabulation of about 2400 entries on ten different items has taken a long time, and there is a possibility of 'some mistakes remaining unnoticed.

The work of flling the forms was done through voluntary agency. I take this opportunity to thank all the professors, teachers, students, and other gentlemen who volunteered their services for the task.

## GENERAL STATISTICS.

———㪘———
Power Industries, Large scale manufacturing industries are still in their infancy at Kolhapur. Even hand-industrien fo satisfy the local needs are to be found to a small exteut. Retail stores predominate. Amongst them shops to supply food, drink and tobacco will arrest the attention of every passer-by. The town is a centre of the principality for the distribution of foreign and non-Kolhapur products.

Hand Industries. Makers of bricks, tiles, and fire-clay products; weavers of cotton, wool and silk goods like turbans, sarhies, dhoties, cholies; basket-makers bamboo-workers, carpenters; men employed in tanning, curing and finishing leather; workers in copper, tin, bronze and sheet-iron; producers of oil and oil-cake; limemakers, tinkers, cap-makers, makers of !eaf-plates, stone-workers; manufacturers of bread and other bakery products; makers of boots and shoes; frame-makers, manufacturera of fire-works; makers and repairers of musical instruments like Sitars and harmouiums are found in the city.

Prominent Occupations. Dress-making, tea-shops, pan and tobacco shops, haircutting saloons, restaurants, hotels, shops of mineral-watcrs are very prominent. Thus Kolhapur is being rapidly westernized.

Manufacture of Ornaments. In Kolhapur there is only one big industry of making gold and silver ornaments for which the town is famous all over the Presidency. Hence we have 247 shops of jewellers and goldsmiths. It is, indeed, a very large number for a town of the size of Kolhapur.

Many of the jewellers are Hundi-dealers and money-lenders. The export and import trade is financed by them.

Flour-mills. The grinding stone which was universally found in every house, has given place to flour-mills. There are iv all 19 small mills-out of these 14 are worked by electric power and 5 by oil-engines.

Oil mills. There are two big oil-mills worked by electric power for extracting oil from ground-nuts and Kurdi. Both have got shelling machines too. Three more mills do shelling work only. The husk is used as fuel by the Electric Works, grainparchers and by the poor people. Its use for feeding the cattle is also growing.

Commission Agents and Exporters are mainly to be found in Sbahupuri-the thriving trade-centre established by His Late Highness Shri Shahu Chhatrapati Maharaj. Its proximity to the Railway Station, its high level, open and large houses, healthy climate and the paternal government which has imposed no laxes upon merchants, have attracted many wealthy men from outside districts. They are mainly engaged in the export and import trade.

## The chief articles of export are:-

Groundnuta, groundnut-oil and cake, raw sugar or Gur, cotton, tobacco, turmeric, and chillies.

The articles of import dealt by these Shahupuri merchants are only grains and fertilizers.

Shops for the sale of ten and tobucco show a mushroom growth. These are over two hundred in number. Thus there is one such shop per $\mathbf{3 0 0}$ persons in the town. It is a pity that with the best and cheapest tobaceo at its very doors, Kolhapur does not possess any cigarette factory. The experimestal farm of tea plantation has not thrived, otherwise a part of the demand could be easily satiafied by the local produce.

Tailoring shops number one-hundred and fifty-two. The habit of getting clothes sewn from tailors is spreading fast in the town. There seems to be one ahop catering to 400 persons here. It will be interesting to find the number of aewing machines used by families for the same purpose.

Cloth-shops-There are about one hundred and sirteen shops for the sale of cloth. sarhis and cholis. Specialisation has been carried to some eztent in the sale of special kinds of cloth. Besides, there are numerous atalls temporarily put up every day in the afternoon for Khedar and other indigenous cloth.

Sarhi-manulactories are as many as 52 in number. Besides, there are twentyfour other establishments for weaving turbans and short dhotis. Then rugs are being made in at least eighteen places. The hereditary weavers manufacture coloured sarhis, dhoties, etc., for the local needs. It is satisfactory that this line has not been taken up by the Mill here and many weavers are finding employment. The number of looms at work in the various manufactories of the town was not returned, and hence the aggregate value and quantity of cloths made on them can not be estimated. It is evident, however, that hand-loom weaving is supporting a large number of fumilies here.

Motor services have come into existence during the last six, but mostly during the last three, years. The train service is extremely inconvenient and sinw, and hence the people prefer to go by motor-lorries. Secondly, the interior parts of the state are still unserved by railway trains. Their trafflc has been captured by taxies. There ara now (1926 A. D.) regular services from Kolhapur to Kazal, Nipani, Gadhinglaj. Sanke. shwar, Belgaum, Miraj, Sangli, Panhala, Satara. Poona, Bavada, Malvan, Ratnagiri and Savantvadi. The fares are so low that poor people can take full adrantige of the bus service. It is highly satisfactory that the bodies of the buses are in almust all casea being manufactured and painted by local carpenters. This business has encouraged the establishment of several motor-repair workshops and shops of motor-accessaries.

Aeriated waters are manufactured and sold at 29 shops, but there is a constant tendency for an incrense in their number.

Leather-tanning is done in 29 establishments. These are beredit. is concerus worked on a small scale. It is a prospering industry, and there is much scope for its improvement.

Shoe-makers' shops are not less than 25 in number. These supply all the requirements of the local market. Snme of these leather workers are making leather cases hand-bags, purses, etc.

Oil Presses. Oil is largely used for culinary purposes by all the classes in this state. The demand of the town and state is mainly aatisfied by small local presses and mills. Large quantities of oil and cake were exported by the two mills during 1926

Cap-arakisg is a speciality of this town. Numerous varieties are being mauufactured here and supplied all over the State

Musical Instruments like Sitarg, Dilrubas, etc, are manufactured here, Though these are not as famous as those made at Miraj, yet they too are exported to outside places.

Eggs are largely sent out to Poona and Bombay.
Fireworks-On account of the patronage of the Durbar, fireworks of a very high quality are manufactured here.

Banks-There are only two banks in the city. The Urban Co-operative Society was started in May 1913, while tho Kolhapur Bank began in 1926 Their position at the end of 1926 s shown below:-

It is evident that banking is in its infancy and needs much effort to develop its various activities.

The Electric Supply Company was started in 1921 on a partnership basis. The totai amount of capital invested in machinery and buildings, is Rs, 4, 81,426. Three suction gas engines drive three D. C. generators. About 90 men find employment here. The rates charged by the Company are:-

The Liquor Distillery was started in 1898 as a private concirn. Only fourteen men now find employment in this business. Fifty-five thousand rupees were approximatsly invested in thy concera. 98,203 gallons of liquor were distilled in $19 ? 6$, out of which 62,710 gallons werelocally consumed. The concern holds a monopoly for the whole state. It means that the consumption of this country liquor is only ${ }^{\circ} 0784$ gallon per head of population. It is satisfactory to see that the rural people are not fond of intoxicante.

The Maharashtra Film Producing Company owned and managed by the famous artist, Mr. Baburao Gaikwad, has won a great reputation for itself and the state, Some of their films like the Sinhagadh, have been very popular.

Cast Ifon Works wera started in 1922 as a private concern. Sixty-thousand rupees were invested in the undertaking, but it is now closed down.

Miscellaneous. Attention should be paid to the number of allopathic and Aryurvedic dispensaries (4?), flour-mills (19), printing presses (14), watch-repairing shops (15), cycle-dealers, (14), bakeries (11), Rock-oil dealers (11), lact-masiers (9). photographers and framemakers (12), tea agencies (4), sewing-machines ageucits '4), cinemas (3), etc. These establishments are of ordinary size, yet they present a fair view of the new character of the modern trade and of the extensive emplosment afforded by it in the city.

## Occupations by Caste

Caste holds its own in all those trades and occupations which have been followed in these parts from olden times. Practically no breach has still been mado in sucha occupations as brick-laying, weaving, tanning, shoe-making, dyeing, oil-extracting dairying, stone-cutting, bamboo-working, basket-making, lime-making, bair-cutting clothes-washing, and trades concerned with the manufacture and sale of metalie articles, The exact strength of the caste system is sloswn in the following table:-

.In the occupations followed by gold-amiths and tailors, in carpentry, emithy, and high-class weaving, the hold of the caste is loosening to an appreciable extent. The nature of the auccess will be evident from the following table:-

## Places of Residence.

There is a good aprinkling of Bohras, Gujratis and Konkaniea in tho city, but thie table No. XIV will disillusion many, because only a few trades and industrien of secondary importance are in the hands of out-siders. The exact proportions are put forth in the said table, but the broad conclusiona have been summarized as under:-

Men following hereditary professions are mainly inhabitante of the city. Ia such occupations less than $5 \%$ persons belong to places out-side the principality. They include bricklaying, pottery, sarhi manufacturing establishments, basket-making, bamboo-workshops, laundries, turban and short dhoti factories, mutton atalla, dairiea, rug-loom factories, lime akilns, stonework, dyeing, manufacture and repair of musical instruments, trade in sheep hides, and manufacture of fireworks.
(b) Kolbapur is famous for the fine arts of psinting and photography. In these the Kolbapuries have a monopoly.
(c) Men irom outside have no ahare in petrol ahopa, tea agenciea, Shahu Milla, Electric Supply Co., Film Producing Co., etc.

In the following occupations outaiders have a share from 6 to $10 \%$ in the ownerships of the concerns. Still from 90 to 94 per cent of these, are owned by Kolhapuries:-

Tailors' shops, grain and pulse shops, hair cutting aloons, establishments for the manufacture and sale of mriated waters, sweet-oil presses, timber concerng, flour and rice mills, sarhi shops and shops for sale and repair of cyclea,

The share of the outsiders rises to 11 to 15 per cent in traded and industrien like the saje of Pan, Bidi, asd tobacco, motor services. carpentry shops, tannerien, iron smithies, shoemaker's shops, shops of glass bangles, fruit and vegetable stalls, capmaking, motor-repair works. motor accessaries and petrol supplies, cocoanut shops and dispensaries for native medicines.

16 to 20\% OUT-SIDERS.
Outsiders range from $\mathbf{1 6}$ to 20 in the occupations of fire-wood sellers, confectioners, dealers in brass and copper utensils, perfume sellers, charcoal dealers,

> OVER 20\% OUTSIDERS.

The share of the outsiders varies from 21 to 25 per cent. among persona engaged in parching rice, tinkers, makers of leaf plates, and cutlery whetters.

Some of the modern trades claim more outsiders. In the following their number varies from 26 to $30 \%$ :-

General merchants and atationers, doctors' dispensaries, booksellers and stationers, rock-oil dealers, manufacturers of bronze articles.

The human mobility is greater in trades like those given below. The proportion of outsiders ranges from 31 to 40 per cent.

Goldsmiths, grocers, commission agents, and exporters, shroffa (dealers in gold and silver ornamenta and jewels), and watch repairers, and tea-shops, hotels restaurants, Agurvedic dispengaries, and bakeries.

Kolbapuries have not much taken to trades like those named below, Herein the outsiders are as strong as 41 to 50 per cent.

Trade in cloth, coppersmith's wares, anuff, chemicals and druga, iron and steel goods, glass ware, paper and stationery, grass and hay, umbrella, epectaclea, cotton aeed and oil cakes. Printing Presses, banke and Cooperative credit aocieties, and boat-making establishments also fall in this eroup.

It is a surprise that in almost all trades of reeent growth the Kolhapuries have much leas hand than in the long-eatablished tradea. They ahould carefully atudy this list and improve their opportunities to learn the following occupations.

Worsers in silk and lace, dealers in sheep hides, dealers in egge, cinema-houses, yarn-sellers, sewing-machines agencies, tea agencies, groundnut crushing and oil pressing mills, dealers of plants and flower seeds, gram hullers, ice factory, cast iron works, electric accessories, vulcanizing works, shoe merchants, country liquor factory,

## WORKING HOURS

The figures of working hours are not fully reliable. They err on the side of under-statement. Shop-keepers have no fixed hours of work. They generally open their shops in the morning at seven or in some cases even earlier and close them late at night. Grocers, confectioners, tobacconists, tes sellers, conducters of liquor shops and restaurants, sellers of aeriated waters, and even cloth-merchants are guilty of remaining in their shops for more than sixteen hours. The peopla are suffiring from over-work, sedentary habits, the vitiated atmosphere of their small and ill-lighted shops, stinking smell of the open drains and the storms of dust raised by motors and winds on the roads.

It is a pity that weavers, basket-makers, tanners, iron-smiths, potters, limemakers and some othera work for about seventeen hours a day. Such a heavy and continuous wort is suicidal for the nation. It lowers physical vitality and increases the death roll.

Municipalities and Panchayats should make stringent lawe for the reduction of the hours of work and provide means for the recreation of the people. If these local-bodies are afraid to take this legislation, the Durbar must come forward to save the manhood of the people.

OWNERSHIP.


Joint-atock concerus are conspicuous by their absence. Only the two banking societies come into this category.

Partaership too is not popular, but commission agents, shroffs, cloth-merchants, motor services, motor-repair works bhow this type of ownership to an appreciable extent.

The shops of tailors, goldsmiths, grain and pulse deslers, general merchants, carpentern, manufacturers of aeriated waters, chemists and druggista, petrol suppliers, rock-oil dealers are being conducted on the basis of individual ownership. Printing presses and bakeries are included in the same class. In short, individual owner ship is the predominant type in trade and industry here.

It is evident that partnership is not popular at Kolhapur.
The bankg are the only join-stocis companieg. The Spinning and Weaving Mill is a state concern. The remaining trades and oceupations are being done on the basis of individual ownership.

## House-owners as occupants:-

Brick-lagers, potters, weavers, basket-makers, tanners, bamboo-workers, ironsmiths, cowherds, lime-makers, makers of leai-plates, manufacturers of fireworks, atontworkers, work in their own houses. It is satisfactory that these lower grades of society have not to pay rent and are at the same time independent workers.

## Occupations in Reated Shops :-

As a contrast to the above, we have the following trades and occupations mainly followed in rented shops:-

Old trades and industries are being still carried on in the bouses and shops owned by the workers, but the modern trend here as elsewhere is that trade should be carried on in rented buildings. This lends insecurity and impermanence to those occupations as a worker does not have much stake in his trade and in the city. On the other hand, the system favoura mobility of men and money. The immigration of adventurous and unscrupulous men and the encouragement to frauds and bankruptcies so frequent in large cities, are attributable to the prevalence of the aystem of rented shops. Every effort should be made by the society to discourage this system and replace it by that of the ownership of shops.

## The Age of Establishments.

The figures of Table No. 25 are important in revealing the tendencies of modern trade and industry. There is a constant flux and little fixity in the continuance of shops.

In the Kolbapur town, only $18 \%$ of the establishments go back to more than forty years and many of these belong to the old world.

Brick-layers, gold-smiths, grain-dealers, weavers, baskei-makers, tanners, some cloth-merchants, bamboo-workers, iron-smiths, washermen, oil-pressers, oil-sellers, cowherds, lime-makers, confectioners, makers of leaf-plates, stont-workers and such other hereditary workers make up this group. Their occupations are carriad on from father to son and thus the continui.y of an occupation in the same family has been preserved.

## Generation-old establishments.

There are a very few shops which are a generation old. For instance, about 3.2 $\%$ of the establishments now existing, can be traced to the fifteen years of 1886-1000. It is an extremely low percentage and speaks volumes of the phevomenal modernization of the town and the short life of modern establishments.

Establishments of the Ist decade - $\mathbf{1 4 3}$ out of 240 , or six per cent. of the total number ol' establishments at present existent, were started during the first decade of the 20 th century. This group mainly includes the following nineteen items: 一

The last five yeara are characterized with a mushroom growth of new establish menta. It in a unique phenomenon that out of 2404 establishments exiating in $19 \div 6$, the majority should have come into being during the preceding five years only. In fact more than 54 par cent. of the establishments can be traced to this period. It will be wrong to conclude that within these five yeara the number of shops has been doubled in Kolhapur. More establishments have undoubtedly cropped up in Shahupuri and Kolhapur, but the increase is also due to the transfer of aome establishments from one place and owner to another place and owner. Still there is no doubt that Kolhzpur has developed fast during the last fow years.
