SIR.

I have the honour to forward, for the consideration of Government, proposals for the revenue settlement of the Belgaum Táluka, and in doing so would observe, first, that the grouping and maximum rates proposed in the accompanying report from the Deputy Superintendent, Southern Marátha Country, were arranged by Mr. Stewart before handing over the office of Survey Commissioner. The preparation of the figures, showing the estimated results of those rates, together with the remainder of the report, has been carried out by Mr. Disney with more or less assistance from this office. The report and its appendices contain the whole of the information usually furnished on revision settlement of a district, and in making the few comments and emendations which are necessary, I will add to the volume of these papers as little as possible.

- 2. The report includes 131 Government villages and 1 inám (viz. Khásbág);

  Government and Inám villages.

  the latter belonged to Government when originally settled, and has subsequently been granted in inám. The survey operations for revision settlement of these 132 villages have been conducted on the lines hitherto approved by Government, and comprised a remeasurement of 30 per cent. of area and 45 per cent. of fields. The reclassification done in the field embraced 41 per cent. of the total new survey numbers, and 33 per cent. of the assessed area. This proportion is somewhat larger than has been found necessary in tálukás hitherto revised, because the rice cultivation and hilly nature of the Belgaum Táluka made the work more intricate and difficult. For the same reason, the differences, in detail measurements, between the old and new survey work have been found to be considerable.
- 3. The value of the information as to proportionate areas shown in the crop statement is much lessened by the very large proportion included under 'Miscellaneous,' viz. 26.7 per cent. This statement is compiled, in average of five years, from the kulkarni's papers, and it would take too much time now to amend the figures. The large proportion under grass and fallow (40.6 per cent.) is very nearly the same as has been found to exist in the Mával Táluka of Poona, where a moist climate and the proximity of a great military station combine, as in Belgaum, to make grass land very profitable.
- 4. The 'Waingan', or summer rice lands, mentioned by Mr. Francis, are remarkable; and were it not for the risk of damage which always threatens the crop, and the fact that a monsoon crop is seldom possible, would be extremely valuable. Their special nature has been duly allowed for in assessing them.
- 5. The railway is now complete from Poona to Miraj, and from Belgaum to the Tinai Ghát, and from below the Ghát to Marmagoa; but, until the connection with Poona is complete by the Sátára route, the full benefit will not be felt; perhaps, before orders are passed on these papers, this may be realised.

- 6. I am not inclined to believe that the weaving trade will die out when Mr. Disney's para. 18. exposed to competition with the goods which the railway will bring, but rather that the same causes which have hitherto supported the industry will still enable it to hold its own under altered circumstances. Cotton and the poorer food-grains will always be comparatively cheap where the rice country meets the black-soil plains, and there are already practical indications, at Gokák and Hubli, that capital will not be long absent.
  - 7. With regard to the number of houses given in the summary in this paragraph, the detail figures should have been shown; they are as below:—

These figures are significant of the improvement in the circumstances of the people, which is indicated by the rest of the statistical information.

- The statements, which contain the usual abstract of the sub-registrar's records regarding land transfers, cannot, I think, be Mr. Disney's paras. 26 and safely taken as the basis of any calculation of value per acre, because they, doubtless, in very many cases, are vitiated by connection with past money transactions not alluded to in the deeds. The sales by decree of Court, however, may, from the nature of the case, be trusted as showing a value always more or less below what would be ordinarily obtainable, and an average realisation of thirteen times the assessment for such cases must be looked on as an indication of the general high value of land in the district. In the matter of leases, the calculation made by Mr. Disney is incorrect; for the figure Rs. 7,778 is the total of column 8 of the statement, and represents. therefore, the aggregate rent of many years, whereas the assessment, with which he compares it, is for one year only. The total Government assessment, including the full assessment on inam land, during the periods embraced of the different leases is Rs. 6,204, but of this sum Rs. 2,616 are stated to be paid by the lessees in addition to the sums agreed on, and must be added, therefore, to the Rs. 7,778, making a total of Rs. 10,394 paid by sub-tenants for land, on which the Government assessment for the same periods amounted to Rs. 6,204. Leases are far more free from connection with past transactions than either mortgages or sales, and a comparison made in this manner is of some value as evidence. This calculation, however, falls much short of the full value paid by the sub-tenants; for, in a large proportion of cases, the sum agreed on (Rs. 3,605) was paid in advance. To work out the full equivalent, would be too tedious a calculation to find place for in this report.
- 9. The statements of prices which accompanied the report was cumbrous, and needlessly complicated, containing the prices for numerous small bázárs for which trustworthy records do not exist: it was in some ways, moreover, not correctly compiled. I have, therefore, substituted a statement prepared in this office with the following comments for Mr. Disney's paragraphs. The prices of the Belgaum market, of course, rule those of all the smaller neighbouring bázárs, and, besides, being a truer indication of the general course of prices in the district, may be assumed to

It was on a consideration of the prices of the years preceding the introduction of the settlement that we must assume the old rates to have been fixed, though it may be said that the prices of the ten years following are those on which the settlement grew to success. The latter, however, are higher than the former, and if we compare with them the average rates of the concluding fourteen years of the lease, this will be to make a liberal allowance for all contingencies. The two grains above mentioned, therefore, may by this calculation be taken to have increased in value by 63 and 82 per cent. respectively.

- 10. The revenue history of the tract is clearly shown by the appendices given; I would only observe that the figures in the columns of unoccupied area are in some cases open to doubt, as it appears that forest land has sometimes been included. Instances of this will be seen against the years 1878-79 and the following year in the statement for the 54 villages settled in 1854-55, and in that for the 19 villages settled in 1864-65 the same kind of discrepancy is seen against the years 1879-80 and 1880-81. Several references have been made by Mr. Disney to the Mam-latdar for the means of correction; but as the matter, when explained, does not interfere with the general inference deducible from these statements, I have preferred not to delay the report further on this account.
- The details of each of the groups, with separate rates, as proposed by Mr. Stewart are most carefully explained in Mr. Dis-Mr. Disney's para. 33. ney's paragraph 33; but as they are, from the nature of the country, more numerous and complicated than usual, it will be well to add a few words regarding the general principle on which they have been framed. The general facts, on which the grouping depends, are: (1) The climate for dry crops is good in the easternmost villages, and deteriorates with every mile to the west, until in the most remote villages only very inferior dry crops can be grown at all; (2) for rice the climate is good throughout, though not quite so good in the first and second groups as in the rest; (3) the advantage of accessibility to markets is greatest close to Belgaum, next greatest, to speak generally, in the villages east of the meridian of Belgaum, and least in the western villages. This advantage, however, in a district which includes hill country, is subject to considerable modification within comparatively small areas, being affected by the vicinity of roads or markets, and by the conformation of the individual village. It may and does often occur that in a village, which in regard to climate is to a small extent better off than another, the advantage of accessibility may be much less than in the other, or vice versa, and it is evident that in a district, like the one now in question, the differentiating of the maximum rates will demand many separate groups, and can hardly be appreciated without an intimate knowledge of the country. To give an explanatory example; -in the first group, the best dry-crop climate is combined with excellent communications, and the climate for rice is good, though not quite the best possible. In the third group the advantage of accessibility to markets is still greater than in the first, but the climate for dry-crop is comparatively poor, and this fact, outweighing the comparative advantage of greater accessibility, results in a reduction of the dry-crop rate, which is put at Rs. 1-14 against Rs. 2-8 in the first group. With regard to rice, however, the case is different: the greater accessibility to market is not counterbalanced by any climatic disadvantage; on the contrary, the climate for rice is in the third group somewhat better than in the first, and the rice maximum rate has been fixed, therefore, considerably higher. The rates for each group have been fixed in the way just described, and it will, I

think, be readily understood that there is sufficient reason for the employment of an unusual number of different maxima.

12. The increase estimated to be produced by the proposed rates in the sixth group amounts to 4 per cent. more than the limit usually imposed, and requires, therefore, special justification. Of the total increase on this group of Rs. 2,805, or 37.2 per cent., only Rs. 739, or 9.8 per cent., falls on the dry-crop, and is due to the raising of the maximum rate, counterbalanced, in some measure, by the adjustment of the classification on the poorer soils. The remaining increase—Rs. 2,066 (=27.4 per cent.)—is due partly to the increase in rice area (about 13 per cent.), but mainly to the rectification of the old water classification, which was unduly low. There has been no increase made to the old rice maximum rate in this or any group in this settlement; and as it is the main object of a revision survey to correct former errors, and put the classification on a uniform and fair standard, I trust Government will see fit to sanction the enhancement now explained. The case is very similar, I may observe, to that of two groups of villages in the Sampgaon Táluka,

Government No. 4057 of May Government No. CLXXII.

which was approved by Government in the correspondence marginally noted. The classification and assessment of the new rice land has been carried out on the principles hitherto approved, and re-affirmed by Government in the Resolution just quoted.

- Mr. Disney's explanation of the special increase of 90.2 per cent. in the village of Kitwade appears correct. The old average rice rate per acre here was Rs. 1-11-0; the new classification, worked out on the same maximum rate as before, gives an average assessment of Rs. 3-6-2, in spite of the inclusion of a large area of new land bearing a comparatively lower rate than the rest.
- 14. I have no further remarks to offer on this report, and beg to conclude with the recommendation that the rates proposed may, if approved, be sanctioned for the usual term of thirty years,—any cases of individual increases over 25 per cent. being dealt with, as provided by Government Resolution No. 3541 of 4th May 1885, in paragraph 11.

SIR

- I have the honour to forward Mr. Disney's proposals* for the revision *Received on 17th instant with a map and Appendices A to T—except E, O, and R: Mr. Fletcher's comments thereon. I fully concur in these proposals.
- 2. The papers show to what extent it has been found necessary to alter the original survey record of measurement and classification. The record has now been made sufficiently accurate for all practical purposes. Materials, taken from

it, are available to make an assessment; that will, in all future operations, be treated as the "initial assessment."

- 3. The original settlement was fair. Experience has proved it to be so. This is shown by the revenue history of the taluka and the account of the present condition and progress of these villages—more especially of the cultivating classes—that are here given in detail.
- 4. The only point, in connection with these matters, that I need remark on, is the following. The present supply of agricultural cattle is ample for all requirements. Still I do not consider that they have increased in number to the * Section 21 of his report. extent supposed* by Mr. Disney.
- 5. The total number of cattle is said to have fallen from 60,257 to 58,860, or 2.3 per cent. Part of these, Mr. Disney shows as "agricultural cattle;" the remainder as "cows, buffaloes, and young." The word "buffaloes" is, no doubt, a mistake for she-buffaloes. He-buffaloes constitute a considerable proportion of the "agricultural cattle" of this tract, seeing that it is in great part a rice
- † If they were not, this alone would go far to account for the very large increase that, according to Appendix S., has taken place in the numbers of agricultural cattle, especially in the western villages, where buffaloes are more numerous than elsewhere, and where the increase in the number of agricultural cattle is supposed to be greatest.

country. They may or may not have been entered accordingly in the original survey census returns. They are unquestionably shown

as such in the returns of 1885-86.

- 6. The remaining agricultural cattle are bullocks. These—generally throughout the taluka and especially in the western villages—are used for field-work throughout the cultivating season. During the rest of the year they work as pack-bullocks between Belgaum and the coast.
- 7. A good many bullocks, too, are used only for traffic. They are here entered under the heading "cows, buffaloes, and young"! The proper headings, then, should be "cattle used in agriculture" and "cattle not so used."
- 8. The original survey returns \$\\$ show the number of agricultural cattle to be 21,896 and of non-agricultural 38,361. The returns of 1885-86 show them as 31,076 and 27,784 respectively. An increase of the former of 41.9 per cent.; and a decrease of the latter of 27.5. The differences are, I feel sure, due, in great measure, to temporary and accidental causes, that I need not particularise; also, to a considerable extent, to different interpretations of "agricultural cattle" obtaining at the two censuses.
- 9. I have gone at length into the matter, as it strikes me as of considerable importance in connection with the present condition of the cultivating classes. At all events, as these returns pass through me, I feel bound to point out where I think them misleading on an important point.
- 10. I have, since I received the papers, gone through the statistical returns of these villages for the last 44 years. I did so in the hope that I would be able to supply correct figures. I am not, however, able to do this. The reason is that the earlier returns are defective on many points—e.g. buffaloes are omitted from them; and also, for the most part, young cattle.
- 11. But, on a comparison of these returns and making enquiry in various ways, I am of opinion that the present returns are substantially correct; and that, within the last thirty or forty years, cattle have increased somewhat in numbers.
- 12. A slight decrease has taken place in the numbers of non-agricultural cattle. This is due, not to deficiency of pasture, as in parts to the East, but to the fact that the traffic by pack-bullocks is on the decline. It has fallen off in

consequence of the opening of the cart-road to the sea vid Amboli. Before this ghát was opened, the traffic with the coast was, for the most part, carried on by means of pack-bullocks. The Rám Ghát leads down from the tract in question to the coast; but, "with its slope of about one in eight," was never used by carts to any considerable extent.

- 13. The increase in agricultural cattle has more than made up for this decrease. It is not, however, nearly so large as stated in Appendix S. But it has fully kept pace with the extension of cultivation.
- 14. "Appendix B.—Details of Cultivation." I consider the entries in this important return to be defective and incorrect to a material degree. It will suffice to notice that "miscellaneous kharif crops" are said to be cultivated in no less than 23.2 per cent. of the total area; while "náchni," one of the chief crops, is allotted only 0.3 per cent.
- 15. I cannot give complete figures for the five years in question. But I show below the percentages of the various crops during the last three years. This is for the whole of the "occupied" land. Its yearly average area is 160,246 acres; of this 12,607 acres are returned as twice cropped.

- 16. The great millet is the staple crop in 23 villages. These comprise the 3 outlying villages to the north-east and the 20 villages to the south-east. Rice and ragi may be taken as the staples of the rest of the taluka.
- 17. The original assessment, shown to be fair, has now to be revised. The profits of cultivation, i.e. the money equivalent thereof, have increased. Prices have risen; but it cannot, I think, be safely assumed that they have risen to the extent, estimated; by Mr. Fletcher. Allowance must be made for scarcity-prices and the fact that the villages were settled in various years.
- 18. Mr. Fletcher, rightly I consider, looks only to the prices of the ruling bazar of Belgaum-cum-Shahpur. He divides the last forty-four years into four periods. The prices of the second decade rose considerably over those of the first; this resulted from general causes. While the rise of the third decade was exceptionally great; it was mainly due to the great increase of cotton-cultivation in the country, lying some little way to the east of the taluka. In the last period (fourteen years) prices have, however, fallen. We must, I think, calculate this fall to be greater than what Mr. Fletcher estimates it as. He includes in this period the years 1876-77, 1877-78, and 1878-79. But the prices of these years must, I consider, be looked on as "scarcity-prices." They ought accordingly to be struck out of

the calculation. These high prices were due to bad harvests in the country, lying immediately to the east and outside of the taluka. The bad seasons were caused by the unfavourable rains of 1876, the subsequent plague of rats &c.

19. The following table fairly indicates, I think, the variations of prices throughout the taluka from 1842-43 up to 1885-86:—

20. The fact that the villages were settled in various years makes it very difficult to frame a satisfactory estimate of the rise of prices for the tract as a whole. The villages were settled in the following years:—

9 in 1852-53 6 , 1853-54 59 , 1854-55 29 , 1855-56

one in each of the years 1856-57, 1858-59 and 1859-60.

22 in 1860-61 1 , 1867-68 and 3 , 1873-74

- 21. Then we must not omit to take into consideration that the costs of cultivation have undoubtedly increased. I consider them to have risen some 5 + Sections 22 to 27, page 100, to 10 per cent. I have explained in my report† on Government Selections No. the Chikodi revision settlement how I have arrived at this estimate. I am, however, unable to hazard a conjecture as to what percentage of the former net profits they have eaten up.
- 22. Then allowance must be made for the rise in the standard of comfort of the cultivating classes, that has assuredly taken place. Allowance, too, must be made for the rise in the future, that may confidently be looked for.
- 23. I assume, too, that the profits of cultivation will, during the next thirty years, remain what they have been during the last period. It cannot be predicted with confidence, or any great show of probability, whether they will rise or fall. But the railway through the taluka is to be opened within the next few months; and will doubtless affect them. It will give ready access to Poona and the country to the north and north-east; to Hubli and the south and south-east; and to

Gos and the sea. It will lessen the cost of the carriage to foreign markets of rice and other exportable produce. It will open out markets hitherto practically closed. It may, I think, be expected to increase the profits of cultivation.

- 24. The proposed increase in the assessment of the whole tract is 24.2 per cent. This, on a consideration of the above matters, seems to me to be fair to all concerned. The increase appears, too, to be fairly distributed over the various villages. I had the advantage, a few weeks ago, of discussing in detail with Mr. Disney the grouping and rating. The villages seem to me to be properly grouped; and the maximum rates relatively fair.
- 25. The question of the transfer to other talukas of the outlying villages—see Section 46 of Mr. Disney's report—will be disposed of separately.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the proposals of the Deputy Superintendent, Southern Maratha Country Survey, for the introduction of a revision settlement into 131 Government and *1 Inam village of the Belgaum Taluka. This taluka is principally formed out of the old Pachhapur Taluka; but, owing to territorial changes, only 79 Pachhapur villages remain in the new sub-division, which, however, has received considerable additions from the Ankalgi and Kittur Mahals of Pachhapur and from the old Bidi Taluka. An addition of 22 villages forming part of the Kagvad estate, which lapsed to Government in 1857-58 on the death of the Chief without heirs, completes the taluka.

- 2. The first settlements by the Survey Department were made between 1852-53 and 1873-74. The date and authority are shown opposite each group, as far as Mr. Disney was able to ascertain them. I have added the authority for the 10 Páchhápur and 24 Bidi villages settled in 1854-55 and 1855-56, but have failed to supply this information for *1 Bidi and 6 Páchhápur villages subsequently settled. The term of the original guarantee was (except in the cases of the isolated villages settled after 1855-56) for 30 years. The settlement of the Kini Kariyat (Kágvád) villages was guaranteed, however, for only 20 years, in order that the settlement might expire with the bulk of the villages of the táluka. The time for resettlement is thus overdue. But the inequality of the present assessments renders this continuance of the old rates a gain, which is by no means an unmixed advantage to the rayats.
- 3. The recent semi-amalgamation of the Southern Marátha Country and the Poona and Násik Surveys gives Government the benefit of Mr. Fletcher's criticism of Mr. Disney's proposals. This is of special value, as Mr. Fletcher settled the adjoining tálukás of Gokak (1881) and Sampgaon (1884).
- 4. The taluka, as now constituted, includes tracts of a very diverse character as regards soil and climate. I need not enlarge on the description which the papers contain. Captain Anderson introduced the original settle-

^{*} These were Inam villages, which, on becoming khales, were settled, with the condition that the rates would be revised with the rest of the taluks.

ments of the large groups. His chief aim was to equalize assessments no where more unequally apportioned. His settlements in some cases, in the villages now under consideration, resulted in a reduced rental for the area then occupied, and were severely criticised. But his action was justified by the quick recovery resulting from an extension of the occupied area; and the verdict of the Collector now is, that the fairness of the original settlement has been proved by experience and by the present improved condition of the cultivating classes.

- 5. The taluka is divided into 12 assessment groups according to the variations in the maximum dry-crop rates proposed. The grouping was arranged by Mr. Stewart. It is approved by the Collector after full discussion with Mr. Disney, who describes the conditions of each group with great minuteness; but his description is nevertheless incomplete, in that it does not clearly show the principles on which the grouping is based. These are well given by Mr. Fletcher. The maximum dry-crop rate decreases as one goes west, the decrease keeping pace with the gradual disappearance of the superior dry-crop cereals. This is no new principle. Captain Anderson in 1856 said that "excess of rain, as regards dry-crops, is almost as great an evil as deficiency." In detail the grouping is modified by consideration of proximity to market. I have carefully examined Appendix Q., in order to satisfy myself that the somewhat large increases in individual villages cannot be reduced by transfer to the next lowest group, but no such expedient is justifiable or called for. The explanation of these large increases is, not that the villages concerned are wrongly grouped, but that in them the soil or water facilities, or both, were undervalued at the old survey. The paramount aim of the survey is the fairest possible distribution of the Government demand. Increases, which result from the uniform application of the rules for classification, only show that villages, in which they occur, have up to date paid an unduly low share of the revenue. The provision, by which increases over 25 per cent. in individual occupancies are taken gradually, fully meets the necessities of the case.
- 6. The number of groups may appear large, but, as a fact, they have been reduced from 18 to 12, and further reduction would be risky, owing to the rapid change of climate and cultivation from east to west. I append a statement, showing, at a glance, the modifications in the old grouping:—

It will be seen, from this table, that the rice maximum rates have in no case been modified.

The dry-crop rates are also unaltered in 23 villages.

An increase of one anna has been made in 25 villages, of 2 annas in 63, of 4 annas in 14, and of 6 annas in 7 villages.

Mr. Fletcher has commented on the comparatively large increase in the 6th group and on large increases in individual villages. I have little to add to his remarks. In individual villages, where the maximum rate has been raised 6 annas, the percentage increase is large in only 2, viz., Virpankop and Singankop. The former is in the extreme east of its group, near a good road, and adjoining the villages of the higher group. The latter is in the centre of its group, and through it the new railway passes. These are instances which illustrate what I have said above, that the increases cannot be attributed to faulty grouping. Though the main object of the original survey was to equalize assessments, the labours of the present survey have been greatly directed towards the same object. Thus it will be seen that in the 22 villages of group 12, where the maxima are unmodified, the differences vary from positive decrease and increases as high as 59 per cent. On the other hand, where the maxima have been most raised, the total increase is reasonable in comparison with the average increase recommended in the aggregate.

7. The maximum dry-crop rates are based partly on the rates fixed for the adjacent villages of Sampgaon, Chikodi, and Gokák, and partly on the maxima fixed by Captain Anderson at the original settlement. The former has guided the pitch of the assessment in the border villages, and the latter the gradient of fall as the country deteriorates for dry-crop cultivation. The absolute increase of assessment is 24 per cent. This increase has been gained by a very small enhancement of the dry-crop maxima, without in any case altering the maximum rates for rice land. Rice is a most important staple throughout the taluka, but the mode of cultivation greatly varies. The summer rice, described by Mr. Francis (see paragraph 13 of Mr. Disney's Report), is exceptional. But, in the east, the rice-crop is drilled, and requires tank irrigation to maintain a sufficient water-supply. In the west, rice is grown, as in all tracts similarly conditioned, from seedlings reared in a rabed nursery and transplanted. The special conditions requiring this mode of cultivation are an early and very heavy rainfall, coupled with an early cessation of the rainy season. The rice maxima vary from 5 to 12 rupees. The latter rate applies to only 2 villages, where under the pre-survey assessments some fields were rated as high as Rs. 40 per acre. A recent even experiment in this papellicular fine land, which always yields a second recent crop experiment in this peculiarly fine land, which always yields a second crop of pulses after the rice, fully justifies the apparently high rate (Crop Experiment Report for 1884-85). For garden land, the usual maximum, for similar tracts, of Rs. 8 per acre has been fixed for land irrigated from the never-failing streams which flow either into the Ghatphrabha or the Malprabha—(Gazetteer,

- p. 506). Land irrigated from wells has been dealt with under the liberal orders of Government, which are designed not only to avoid all suspicion of taxation of improvements, but also to give the greatest incentive to the application of private capital towards well-digging. It cannot escape notice that most of the wells, shown in Mr. Disney's 20th paragraph, are for drinking water, and not for irrigation. The tract is, except in the extreme east, not rich in garden land. Only 94 of the 3,000 wells and budkis are used exclusively for irrigation.
- 8. The increase proposed for sanction amounts to 24 per cent. on the present demand, or an enhancement of 3 annas 1 pie per acre, which will be in a small degree reduced when distance from the village of individual fields receives the fixed allowance. In order that the actual effect of the raising of the dry-crop maxima, coupled with the increase due to bringing the valuation of the land to a proper and even standard may be fully shown, I now give a table exhibiting the present and proposed average rates for each variety of land:—

(This is calculated on the occupied area only. The old average rate is 14 annas. The proposed rate, Rs. 1-1-1. The rate shown in column 29 of Appendix Q. (1-0-4) is calculated on all Government land, occupied and waste. The percentage increases in column 30 of that Appendix are on the occupied area only. I state this to prevent misunderstanding.)

This table shows that whereas, in the hilly villages, where long fallows are required and where much of the dry-crop land is really land required to produce ráb material for the seed nurseries of rice and náchna, the average rate is hardly raised, on the other hand a just increase is given to the dry-crop of the first two groups. The irregularity of the rice averages is simply due to the grouping in accordance with the dry-crop maxima. Rice land improves as dry-crop deteriorates, though, owing to the alteration in the character of the rice land noticed above, this principle applies with less force to the lower groups. It must not be supposed that the average of the 12th group, the tract where ráb is most essential, indicates the charge made by the survey for ráb-producing lands. Such lands are classed at 1 anna, and with a maximum of 7 annas are rated at less than ½ anna per acre. The average of this group is raised by the comparatively superior quality of the cultivated dry-crop.

- 9. Since the original settlement of the major portion of the taluka, the fine Amboli Ghat Road has been opened, and the railway will almost immediately pass through the taluka. The improvement in communications is evidenced by a very large increase in carts, from 1,380 to 3,661, during the currency of the settlements for each tract. Though village statistics are very untrustworthy, the enumeration of carts may be taken as correct.
- 10. Prices have risen. The papers contain a great deal of comment on this important question, which is, after all, the most important question in settlement. In his Gazetteer, Mr. Campbell has discussed prices very carefully. He points out that the statistics are not trustworthy, and this fact must always be borne in mind. Analysing the figures given in the Gazetteer, which agree

The periods are those into which Mr. Campbell thought the years should be divided, to show most clearly the fluctuations in prices. It will be seen that, in the 4 years from 1863 and in the 3 years from 1877, prices were abnormally high. As regards the former period, Mr. Fairlie Muir attributes the sudden rise to the general rise due to the large extension of cotton cultivation in the neighbouring tracts, to meet the demand from India caused by the American Civil War. This is, no doubt, true; but the seasons were bad, at any rate, in 1864. I think that both these periods should be eliminated, and that the range of prices should be judged by the following summary:—

From this it appears that prices rose 33 per cent. in the case of jowari and 30 per cent. in that of rice, comparing the 2nd period with the 1st. A further rise of 20 per cent. and 25 per cent., respectively, was gained in the last period. A study of the annual figures or of the figures of the Gazetteer periods just given, if the abnormal years are left out of consideration, shows a slow but steady rise, with a re-action in the 9th period as compared with the 7th. This is simply due to abundant crops since the scarcity of the 8th period, and is more likely to be followed by another re-action than a long continuance of low prices.

- 11. A rise of prices, then, of over 50 per cent., during the currency of the present settlement, is claimed as the justification for the proposed enhancement of 24 per cent. of the revenue demand. But, as the Collector argues, the rise in the standard of comfort and the cost of cultivation must be allowed full weight. Both tend to diminish the net profits of cultivation. The wages of labour indicate, more than any thing else, the progress of the people towards a higher standard of comfort, and also affect materially the cost of cultivation. The Gazetteer again may be studied with advantage. Wages have risen. Unskilled labour was, 30 years ago, paid about ards of what it now commands. The wages of labour do not greatly affect the cultivator, who tills his own land, though the raised standard of comfort does. It is satisfactory to find that more than half the survey numbers are tilled by the occupants themselves. This is satisfactory, as showing that the cultivators are thrifty and able to retain their land. The contrary fact, that 37 per cent. of the numbers are tilled by tenants of superior holders, is, in its turn, a proof of the value of land, in that it can pay rent sufficient to meet the demand of the superior holders, after the share with which Government demand has been met.
- 12. The value of the land is well shown by the fact that, on the average, 13 times the assessment has been fetched in compulsory sales by decree of the

Civil Court. Such sales, as Mr. Fletcher remarks, are always more or less below the proper value of the land. It is not possible to compare the value of land thus indicated with that of 30 years ago, but it is a matter of regret that Mr. Disney has not collected the figures paid for land taken up by the new railway in this taluka. Mr. Stewart in his report on Chikodi showed the worth of such statistics.

- 13. The ease with which the revenue under the expired settlement has been collected, the steady increase of the occupied area, the total absence of remissions (see Appendix P.), the great value of grass lands, the undoubted increase in stock (I need not refer to the Collector's contention that the settlement officer has over-estimated the increase in agricultural cattle, for he admits that they are ample for the cultivation; besides it is impossible to lay stress on such statistics, which are very untrustworthy),—these are all circumstances which tend to justify a moderate increase of the Government demand, such as that now asked for. Last of all, it must be borne in mind, that we are dealing with a tract which may be said to be naturally protected from famine—a tract which is protected by a sure and certain rainfall, and by ready communication with the sea and with inland markets on all sides.
- 14. Mr. Fletcher's review is full, and the interest taken by the Collector, enhanced in value by the experience he has had of settlement work and by his knowledge of the district, leaves little for me to remark upon.
  - 15. I add, for ready reference, a few notes collected from the papers:-
  - (1). The average area of the survey number has decreased from 12½ to 10 acres.
  - (2). The incidence, per acre of occupied land, of different kinds, as compared with that of the former survey, is as follows:—

- (3). To bring the field record to the present standard of the survey it was found necessary to remeasure 30 per cent., and to reclass 41 per cent. of the total area. The country was intricate, and the old water classification very unequal, as often overvalued as undervalued by the old survey.
- (4). The area of Government occupied land during the currency of the old settlements rose from 73,130 to 122,318 acres, or 67 per cent.
- (5). Only 10,127 acres of Government land available for cultivation remain unoccupied. This is less than 8 per cent. of the total.
- '• (6). The large percentage  $(36\frac{1}{2})$  of occupied fallow is due—(a) to the value of grass lands near Belgaum, and (b) to the usual rest given to the uplands growing *náchni* in the hilly west.
- (7). Kumri cultivation was permitted in certain fixed localities during part of the term of the old settlement. It is not specially noticed in this report. I approve of the restriction, for it is a most destructive cultivation, and can, I believe always be replaced by the much less destructive ráb cultivation, though it is more profitable.
- 16. The notification required by Government Resolution No. 7447, dated 21st October 1886, para. 1, was duly forwarded to the Collector by the Deputy Superintendent on the 25th March 1887.
- 17. Mr. Disney recommends the transfer of the villages of Chandanhosur and Karguppi to the Sampgaon and Chikodi Talukas respectively. I specially requested the Collector to give his opinion; as, if the transfers are made, the

period of guarantee should be given to make the settlement terminate with the rest of the villages of the already settled taluka to which transfer is recommended. I have received the Collector's reply. I agree with him that there is no reason to transfer Chandanhosur, which properly belongs to Belgaum. It is nearer Belgaum than Sampgaon. I also agree with him that Karguppi ought to belong to the Hukeri Mahal of Chikodi. "A glance at the map will show this. Karguppi was originally in the Ankalgi Petha. In 1862 the petha was broken up. Some of its villages were transferred to the Hukeri Petha, some to the Gokák Taluka, and some remained in the Pachhapur Taluka. Curiously enough, villages to the north, south, and west of Karguppi were transferred to the Hukeri Petha, and the village to the east to the Gokák Taluka. Karguppi remained

"The Collector thinks that it was through an oversight that Karguppi was not transferred to Hukeri in 1862. The transfer should now be made.

- 18. The Deputy Superintendent solicits sanction to the proposed settlement for 30 years from the ensuing revenue year. I support the recommendation, except as regards Karguppi, in which the guarantee should expire with that of the Hukeri villages.
- 19. In order that the increased revenue may be obtained in 1888-89 it is advisable that the date for receiving resignations should be extended to the 5th July. The season is advanced, and orders from Government cannot issue till the full time for receiving objections, named in the notification referred to in paragraph 16, has been allowed.
- 20. The concessions granted in recent orders on settlement proposals to occupants, whose assessment has been raised by more than 25 per cent., will doubtless be extended to the Belgaum Taluka.

- RESOLUTION.—Of the 132 villages comprising the Belgaum Táluka, for the revision settlement of which proposals are now submitted, 79 formerly belonged to the Páchhápur Táluka, 25 to Bidi, 22 to Kini Karyat and 3 each to the Maháls of Ankalgi and Kitur. The original settlements of these villages took place at various periods between 1852-53 and 1873-74 and were guaranteed for twenty years in the case of the Kini Karyat villages settled in 1860-61 and tor thirty in the case of 103 villages settled before 1856-57. As regards the remaining 7 villages, viz., 6 of Páchhápur and 1 of Bidi, Mr. Ozanne states that they were inám villages settled when they lapsed to Government on the condition that their rates would be revised with those of the rest of the táluka,
- A sufficient description of this somewhat straggling taluka, in which wide differences are noticeable between the eastern and western villages, is given in the present reports, and various facts showing that since the original settlements progress has been marked and the revenue history extremely favourable are mentioned. Amongst the most noticeable of these, the Deputy Superintendent has rightly called attention to the enormous increase in the number of carts; the opening of the country to wheeled traffic in place of pack animals is one of the most important factors in the development of agricultural prosperity; in addition to roads the district will now have the further advantage of railway communication both with the interior and the coast on the early completion of the Southern Marátha Railway system. The great moderation of the original survey assessment is shown by the figures in Appendix P, noticeably in the · case of the 54 villages of the old Páchhápur Táluka settled in 1854-55 in which for some years before the survey a revenue of about Rs. 35,000 was collected, with very trifling remissions, from an area of about 28,000 acres, while the latest years of the expiring settlement show a revenue of about Rs. 41,000 on an area of 55,500 acres. A good deal of labour has been taken by the officers reporting on the settlement to elucidate the facts as to rise of prices since the first settlements of 1852. Broadly speaking it may be safely assumed that the prices of jowári and rice and rági have for some years past ranged at about double what they were in the period before the first settlement which furnished the data for assessment at that time. In this and in the other facts indicative of the development of trade and agriculture His Excellency the Governor in Council finds ample justification for the enhancement of assessment now proposed.
  - 3. Re-measurement and re-classification were as usual done on the partial system and on the lines hitherto approved by Government. The result of the former was an increase in the recorded areas of arable dry-crop, rice and garden land by 844, 1,661 and 153 acres respectively. The re-valuation of the water-supply of rice land was made on the principles approved by Government in Resolution No. 1031 of 16th February 1876 on the revision settlement of the Bankápur Táluka, and Mr. Disney has explained in paragraph 35 of his report

the manner in which the standing orders of Government respecting garden land were carried out. The special reduction in the soil classification of land converted from dry-crop to rice, referred to by that officer in paragraph 37 of his report, has already been approved by Government as protecting the cultivator from possible taxation of improvements.

4. The arrangement of villages in assessment groups was made by Mr. T. H. Stewart before handing over charge of the office of Survey and Settlement Commissioner and is approved by all the officers whose reports are now before Government. The sub-divisions are necessarily numerous owing to the characteristics of the taluka. In the present rice maxima rates, in consequence of the marked changes in class due to the re-valuation of water advantages already referred to, no alteration has been thought expedient; but in the drycrop maxima rates, which will vary from 6 annas to Rs. 2-8-0 per acre, increases of from 1 to 7 annas per acre are recommended in the case of all villages except 23.

5. The results of the original and proposed settlements are contrasted under all heads in the following table:—

The proposed increase of assessment on Government occupied land amounts to Rs. 25,982, equivalent to 24.2 per cent. The details for the various groups are given by Mr. Disney in the table attached to his 36th paragraph. (In this table under revision survey, the sub-heading Government occupied land should obviously be Government unoccupied land and vice versã). In only one group is the proposed increase in excess of the limit prescribed by Government Resolution No. 2619 of 26th March 1884, and the excess which is only 4 per cent. is sufficiently explained. Kitváde in the eighth group is the only village in which the percentage increase exceeds 66 per cent. The same explanation applies to this case.

- 6. As the result of the notifications published in accordance with Government Resolution No. 7447, dated 21st October 1886, 98 petitions have been submitted by villagers. They are forwarded by the Commissioner, S. D., together with reports by the Collector and Survey officers, which show that in no case have the petitioners been able to produce any valid arguments against the proposed maxima rates. It is clear, moreover, that the petitioners have as a rule quite misunderstood the object of the notification and have even imagined that the maxima rates notified in their villages were the actual rates which it was proposed to apply to every acre of their holdings. In these circumstances their discontent was natural, but the Governor in Council feels confident that it will to a great extent be removed when they learn the actual rates they are called upon to pay. In a few cases further inquiries have been ordered by that officer who will doubtless report to Government should any modification of assessment be called for. In the meantime it is not necessary to defer passing orders on the present proposals.
- 7. The proposed rates may be sanctioned and introduced in the current year, with a guarantee for thirty years in all villages except Kargupi. That

village should, as recommended, be transferred to the Hukeri Mahal of Chikodi, and its guarantee should expire with that of the other Hukeri villages. The concessions recommended by the Survey and Settlement Commissioner in the last paragraph of his report may be granted.
