MEMORANDUM.

Forwarded to the Commissioner, Central Division. The undersigned has not seen the Pal Tappa and he can therefore add nothing to the remarks made by the Superintendent. He had heard that the colony had shown signs of breaking up since the death of the Patel, who was one of the first settlers, and the statement appended to Mr. Fletcher's report shows that the decrease in cultivation has been rapid during the last five years, especially in Morwhal. Doubtless, as Mr. Fletcher says, the Vanjaris and Bhils will stay and cultivate some land, and possibly some Kunbis may be attracted, by the favourable rates now proposed, from the crowded plain villages of Sávda. The undersigned would recommend that Mr. Fletcher's proposals should be sanctioned.

SIR,

I have the honor to return the papers received with your endorsement No. R. 5560, dated 14th instant.

2. They deal with the introduction of a survey settlement into the isolated tract called the Pal Tappa of the Sávda Táluka of the Khándesh District. I have very little to add to the succinct report submitted by Mr. W. M. Fletcher, the Survey Superintendent.

3. A revision settlement was last year introduced into the Sávda Táluka with the exception of the three villages forming the Pal Tappa, and three Inám villages. The record of the settlement is already published (Government Selection No. CLXXXVI., New Series,) which contains a map from which the position of the Pal Tappa can be readily seen.

4. The Pal Tappa is especially interesting on account of the successful attempt made by the Khándesh Collector in 1867 to re-people a long-deserted tract suitable for cultivation. The Gazetteer, Vol. XII., pp. 400-401, describes the steps taken which are given with more detail in Mr. Fletcher's report.

5. That officer urges that the colony should be fostered to a limited extent in order that labour may be locally obtainable for working the forest produce. I thought it advisable to consult the Conservator of Forests. Mr. Shuttleworth offers no objection but adds that "a large proportion of the population is composed of Vanjáis who are professional carriers and drive their pack bullocks in all directions during the fair season. They chiefly take grain down to the coast and return with salt. By establishing their head-quarters in the Pal Tappa settlement these men obtain free grazing for their cattle." It appears then that the Conservator does not value the colony on the ground indicated by Mr. Fletcher though there is no objection to the existence of the colony. Indeed such objection there could not be, seeing that the colonists have long ceased to enjoy any special forest privileges. I quote from the Government Resolution (No. 3284, dated 8th June 1881). The Commissioner said: "As regards the privileges conceded to the colonists at Pal, I concur with the Conservator that there is great danger of the reserve forest being completely destroyed if free access is needlessly granted." The orders passed by Government were that there "is no reason why exceptional privileges should be granted to them. The colony has now been fostered for 12 years and has thoroughly taken root, and the colonists may now be placed on the same position as other villages in the hills."

6. I think that Mr. Shuttleworth in describing the occupation of the Vanjáis in the tappa rather describes the former than the present condition of this interesting class. They have to a great extent lost their old trade of carriers and have in the open parts of Khándesh settled down to more or less desultory tillage and in the wilder tracts and in the adjoining territory of the Holkar taken to cattle-breeding. It is not an exaggeration to say that the Deccan cultivator is almost entirely dependent on the Vanjáis for his annual supply of plough cattle. The Vanjáis of the plains bring cattle from those of the hills and march throughout the length and breadth of the Deccan. They sell on trust and collect their dues on their return journey, when the rayats having reaped and disposed in part of their produce find it most convenient to pay. Government is greatly indebted to the Vanjáis, and the useful work done by them is rightly noticed in this report, because the head-quarters of the cattle-breeders is in the Jinsi village of the Pal Tappa. The Gazetteer gives many interesting facts connected with their past and present condition and shows how they have adjusted themselves to the times of railways and good roads (Gazetteer, pp. 41, 107, 136, 218). In the Sávida report Mr. Fletcher remarks: "The carriage of timbers and bamboos from the Sátputás is chiefly in the hands of the Vanjáis. Cattle-breeding is only carried on by them. Their head-quarters are at Jinsi. Besides breeding, an annual trade is carried on in cattle purchased young in Rajputána, Central India and kept for a year or two and then sold in Khándesh and the Deccan."

7. My object in making these references is to show what excellent reasons still remain for fostering the colony of the Pal Tappa and to claim that the proposals made by Mr. Fletcher do what is right and fair towards them as far as action on the part of the Survey Department is possible. The colony is at present not in a flourishing condition. How far the deprivation of special forest privileges is an explanatory reason I cannot say, but there is one special reason, for Shev Chavan Patel, the founder of the colony, is dead.

8. The Collector supports the proposals for settlement and I am of opinion that they may be unreservedly accepted. The proposed maximum rate (12 annas) is not too low. The dry-crop maximum for the nearest villages of the táluka is Re. 1-10-0, but in one case a settled and prosperous population is being dealt with. In the other the new settlement is a novelty. It is also experimental in that it follows on periods first of rent-free tenure up to 1878-79 and then of a rough division into fields by the táluka classer, the latter step leading

up to, and educating the colonists to the settled tenure. The liberality of the settlement proposed will tend also to induce the colonists to settle down to ordinary tillage without diminishing their usefulness as cattle-breeders.

9. I have only to request that the papers may be submitted to Government at your earliest convenience in order that the settlement may be given out early in February, for otherwise the Superintendent's movements will be unnecessarily hampered.

10. The guarantee should be for 29 years, so that the tappa may fall in for revision with the rest of the Sávda Táluka.

2. Messrs. Fletcher, Loch, and Ozanne agree in recommending the introduction of the survey settlement into Pál Tappa, and are unanimous in thinking that the low rate of 12 annas per acre would attract settlers from the adjoining plain country to come and settle there.

3. Undersigned has no personal knowledge of the Pál Tappa colony. But from the past history and description given of it in these papers he feels unable to advise Government to accord sanction to these proposals.

4. The climate of the Tappa is insalubrious and the place does not otherwise offer any extraordinary advantages to people from the plains below.

5. Of the existing population numbering 1,178, 712 belong to the non-agricultural class, while 189 live partly by agriculture and partly by other occupation. 277 people alone live exclusively by agriculture (*vide* Appendix B to Mr. Fletcher's letter No. 1488). Kunbis are the only steady agriculturists in this part of the country, but it appears from paragraph 8 of Mr. Fletcher's report that few or none of them have settled in the Pál Tappa.

Wanjaris and Bheels apparently constitute the agricultural community of the Tappa. But these classes principally live on the produce of cattle and timber-cutting and neglect agriculture. They will settle there as long as they can get free grazing for their cattle and are likely to leave the tract if they are required to pay for grazing, which will doubtless be the case if the survey rates are introduced.

6. The statistics furnished by Mr. Fletcher clearly show that the colony is in a declining state, and that there are few, if any, signs at all, of its acquiring fresh life and vigour. The population has been gradually clearing out, the revenue shows a remarkable falling off, and the only people who stick to the

locality are the half civilized Bheels and Wanjaris. To introduce a survey settlement in such an unpromising and ill-favoured tract, would, in my opinion, be a mistake, and I altogether fail to see why statistical purposes having been served by the survey operations, the existing system should not continue, and how the imposition of survey rates, small it is true, but yet higher than what is now paid, will attract settlers to the colony—I would leave well alone.
