FOREWORD.

In this publication, the statistics relating to Agriculture and Co-operative Societies generally relate to the year running from July to June. All the other tables relate either to the fiscal year ending 31st March or to the calendar year, and where the latter is the case the fact is clearly indicated in the tables. The alterations and additions made in the present issue of the Abstract are noticed below:—

(1) The following new tables have been introduced:—

No. 272.—New Life Assurance Policies effected by non-Indian Companies in India.

No. 273.—Total Life Assurance Business in Force in India of non-Indian Companies.

No. 274.—Amount of Income and Outgo of Post Office Insurance Fund and total sums assured in force (and Bonuses).

No. 275.—Particulars relating to Policies (other than Life Assurance Policies) effected by Indian Companies.

No. 276.—Particulars relating to Policies (other than life Assurance Policies) effected by non-Indian Companies.

(2) Certain additions and alterations have been made as stated below:—

No. 1.—Area and Population of British India and Indian States (Census of 1921). The column showing land revenue and rates has been deleted as being out of place. Fuller information regarding land revenue and charges is given in Tables Nos. 80 and 81.

No. 25.—Number of Judicial Divisions, and Number of Officers exercising Appellate or Original Jurisdiction. The form of the table has been recast so as to show the civil and criminal sides separately.

Nos. 29 to 32.—General results of trial of cases and of appeals other than Criminal—Additional columns have been introduced showing the details of suits and appeals before the courts and average duration of contested and uncontested suits and appeals.

No. 83.—Details of Excise Revenue—The details of revenue have been recast and a supplementary table No. 83A added.

No. 278.—Estimated number of letters, postcards, newspapers, parcels and packets. Distribution of these statistics according to the various circles having been discontinued, total figures only have been shown.

No. 308.—Woollen Mills—Number, Capital, Looms, Spindles, Persons employed and Production—Additional information relating to paid-up capital has been given.

No. 318.—Production of Chief Minerals in each Province and State in India—Statistics relating to Antimony-ore, Ilmenite and Zircon have been added.
