## STATISTICAL ABSTRACT FOR BRITISH INDIA.

### FOREWORD.

In this publication, the statistics relating to Agriculture and Co-operative Societics generally relate to the year running from July to June. All the other tables relate either to the fiscal year ending 31st March or to the calendar year, and where the latter is the case the fact is clearly indicated in the tables. The alterations and additions made in the present issue of the Abstract are noticed below:—

(1) The following new tables have been introduced:
