RRFFACE

Emphasising the need to improve the lot of workers in the Un-organised Sector of industries, the National Commission on labour recommended that a batter understanding of the problems of different dategories of un-organised labour was escential by the formulation of suitable ameliorative measures and that detailed surveys about condutions of work.
