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## DESCRIPTION OF THE COUNTE

The whole extent of the country under the Commssioner, may (.) very roughly estimated at 50,000 square miles, and the population nay be guessed at 4,000,000; but this does not include any of the letached territories, beyond the Nizam's frontier.

The grand gegophical feature of this tract is the chain of ghauts, hich run along the western boundary, for its whole length. Beween this range and the sea lies the Concan, now under Bumbay. It stends from 40 to 50 miles in breadth, includes many fertile places roducing abundance of rice; but, in general, is very rough, and uch crossed by steer and rocky hills. Towards the ghauts, the untry is in most places extremely strong, divided by hills intercted by ravines, and carered with thick forest. The range itself is om 2,000 to 4,000 feet $7 \mathrm{grg} \dot{\mathrm{f}}$, extremy abrupt, and inaccessible on the west. The passes are numerous, but stecp, and very seldom pass, he for carriages. The table land on the east is nearly as high as lany parts of the ridge of the ghauts, but, in general, the lills rise hove it to the height of from 1,000 to 1,500 feet. The table land - for a considerable distance, rendered very strong, by numerous urs issuing from the range, among which are deep winding rugged alleys often filled with thick jungle. Further east the branches .om the ghauts become less frequent, and the country becomes more $\therefore$ vel, till the nuinhbourhood of the Nizam's frontier, where it is an pen plain.
