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TERMS OF REFERENCE

To advise the Secretary of State on:

- (a) any groups of persons for whom housing accommodation of special types may be desirable;
- (b) the principles which should govern the provision and allocation of any such accommodation; and
- (c) the types of accommodation which should be provided.

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
