Sir,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report of the Department of Land Records for the year 1904-05. The period comprised is in accordance with the orders contained in paragraph 7 of Government Resolution No. 5509, dated 18th July 1904, that from 1st August 1904 to 31st July 1905. As in 1903-04 copies of the remarks of the Commissioners on the working of the staff are appended as directed in paragraph 5 of the same Government Resolution.

2. There has been some delay in the submission of the report due to the late receipt of extracts from Collectors' Administration Reports and Commissioners' remarks; the unfavourable character of the season is probably responsible for this to a great extent.

3. In my predecessor Mr. Lawrence's No. A./1580, dated March 8th, 1905, a detailed report was submitted to Government on the working of the Record of Rights Act during the year. As, however, the record is no longer a novelty and the supervision of its compilation is now one of the ordinary duties of the Department, I have decided to deal with it in Chapter V of this report. It is hoped that this course will be approved.

#### Department of Land Records.

#### CHAPTER I.

#### PREFATORY.

1. The charge of the Department was held by Mr. II. S. Lawrence, I. C. S., throughout the period under report, except during the months of February and March when he was absent on one month's privilege leave and on special duty in the Punjal for one month. During this period Mr. A. S. A. Westropp, I. C. S., held charge.

3. The compilation of the Record of Rights, the training of Circle Inspectors' staff in survey and settlement matters according to the revised scheme and the resurvey of the Tálukdári Estates in Gujarát, all started in the previous year, were continued during the year under report.

4. Proposals, to which the sanction of the Secretary of State has since been received, were submitted during the year which involve an important change in the superior staff of the Department. The appointments of Superintendents of Land Records and Agriculture hitherto only temporarily sanctioned and held by members of the old Survey Department have been sanctioned permanently under the designation of Superintendent, Land Records and Registration, with effect from 1st April 1905, and two of them, *i.e.*, those of the Northern and Southern Divisions have been made tenable only by members of the Indian Civil Service; the appointment in the Central Division has been left in charge of the present incumbent, Mr. McIver, till his retirement. In the case of the Southern Division the retirement of Mr. J. L. Lushington rendered it necessary to anticipate the sanction of the Secretary of State and introduce the new arrangement with effect from November 1st, 1904.

5. During the year 12 districts (including Hyderabad, Karáchi and Thar and Párkar in Sind) were yisited by Mr. Lawrence and five districts by Mr. Westropp for inspection, inquiries and personal discussion with the local officers.

6. The Superintendents, Northern and Southern Divisions, visited all the districts in their divisions during the year. The Superintendent, Central Division, visited five out of six districts in his division during the year, the remaining district receiving a visit soon after the end of the year. The last mentioned officer was also entrusted by Government Resolution No. 449, dated 21st January 1905, with the work of testing the measurement and classification of 15 Inám villages of the Bhor State which at the request of the State was done by a British Officer. The work was satisfactorily completed.

7. The more important matters connected with Land Records and Survey work which received Mr. Lawrence's attention during the period both at Head Quarters and in the Districts were ;-

(1) The Record of Rights compilation;

(4) The conduct of the Akráni survey;

(5) Water-logging in Broach District and salt efflorescence in Broach and Belgaum Districts;

(6) A study of Record of Rights system in force in the Punjáb;

(7) The continuance of the Marátha States survey.

#### CHAPTER II.

#### LAND RECORDS ESTABLISHMENT.

8. Establishments working immediately under the Superintendents, Land Records and Registration .- Besides their own establishments and the District Survey Offices the following establishments worked under the Superintendents, Land Records and Registration :-

Northern Division.

Throughout the year-

(1) A field party consisting of 6 Surveyors and 4 classers;

(2) A temporary establishment of correction classers and Register writers at the Central Record office at Broach;

For a part of the year-

(3) Establishment of the Survey Daftardár, Southern Division, in the Thána District Survey Office up to April 1905;

(4) A Head Surveyor with a kárkún and 2 peons for the test of reclassification work in the Anklesvar Táluka for a period of 3 months.

Central Division.

(1) The Akráni Survey Party;

(2) The establishment of the Survey Daftardár, Central Division, who also had under him the Judi establishment and temporary establishments for calculating the detailed assessments of talukas in which revision settlements were to be introduced. The Akráni Survey party was, as explained in paragraph 40 below, considerably strengthened from 1st November 1904 with a view to accelerate the progress of the work.

Southern Division.

(1) A field party of 6 surveyors;

(2) Small temporary \* establishments at all \* Referred to in Chapter IV under the head Survey. District Survey Offices, except Belgaum, for repairing torn survey papers;

(3) An establishment of three temporary kárkúns for the identification of areas under tanks in the Belgaum, Bijápur and Dhárwár Districts;

(4) The establishment of the Survey Daftardár, Southern Division, from May 1905.

9. By Government Resolution No. 4295, dated 20th December 1904, the office establishment of the Superintendent, Central Division, was revised with effect from 1st March 1905 at a minimum additional cost in the first year of Rs. 75 per mensem and a maximum cost of Rs. 145 at the end of five years. The establishments of the Superintendents, Northern and Southern Divisions, were also revised after the close of the year under report.

10. By Government Resolution No. 3922, dated 19th November 1904, the pay of the Survey Daftardár, Central Division, was raised from Rs. 55 to Rs. 75. Sanction was also received after the close of the year to the retention of the posts and establishments of the Survey Daftardárs, Central and Southern Divisions, for a further period of five years. The pay of both the Survey Daftardárs has been raised to Rs. 75-5-100.

11. <u>Training of Junior Cirilians in Survey and Settlement work.</u>—A class was held in September-October 1904 under the supervision of Mr. J. A. McIver, Superintendent, Land Records and Registration, Central Division. Nino Civilians and one probationary Deputy Collector attended it. The course was satisfactorily conducted and was of considerable benefit to all concerned. Under the orders contained in Government Resolution No. 5284, dated 29th June 1905, the class will in future be held every year and a limited number of more senior officers will be allowed to join it.

12. <u>Training of Circle Inspectors in Survey and Settlement matters.</u>—In Government Resolution No. P.-270, dated 12th September 1904, Government sanctioned Mr. Lawrence's proposal that Central classes for Circle Inspectors should be held in each Division at the Head-quarters town, instead of a class in each district. The classes were held accordingly and the full course of 5 months prescribed in Government Resolution No. 7972, dated 13th November 1903, was enforced for the first time. The classes were conducted by the permanent Surveyors in each Division and were closely supervised by the Superintendents. The course consisted of :—

> Theoretical training at the head-quarter towns for ....11 months, Practical training under the permanent surveyors in the

13. At the end of the full course the Circle Inspectors were examined both in practical and paper work. A paper in Revenue matters prescribed in Government Resolution No. 7757, dated 18th September 1894, was also set to those Circle Inspectors who had not passed in it. The final results of these examinations, which were communicated to the Collectors and Commissioners, are shown below :—

They were, however, sent back later in the year to complete their course and submit themselves to the examinations. No Circle Inspectors were sent by the Collector

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of Bijápur to attend the class in the Southern Division in view of the apprehension of a famine in that district.

15. The results, so far as mere figures are concerned, were satisfactory; but in soveral respects there is ground for further improvement. Under the rules sanctioned by Government Resolution No. 4517, dated 14th June 1904, all graduates, who enter the Revenue Department, have to serve as Circle Inspectors for 12 months and obtain a certificate of proficiency in survey before they are allowed to appear for the Higher Standard Examination and consequently out of 80 Circle Inspectors, who attended the classes, no less than 49 were graduates. The conduct of these young men while under training has been very far from satisfactory. They are apt to consider it derogatory to their dignity to attempt to grasp the details of measurement and classification: they are often, I regret to say, somewhat wanting in courtesy and consideration: and they generally regard the course as a necessary evil to be got through somehow with as little trouble to themselves as possible. The result is that the amount of actual knowledge gained during the course is often extremely small.

16. During the year under review 18 Circle Inspectors (10 of them graduates) were, after passing in survey, sent to the Akrani to assist the survey party at work there in actual measurement in the field. The experiment proved somewhat of a failure as the Circle Inspectors, particularly the graduates, were found incompetent to give efficient assistance: this fact has rendered it necessary to increase the difficulty of the survey test, so as to ensure that the Circle Inspectors passing it have a real knowledge of the subjects taught and to prevent graduates from treating it as a mere idle formality. From the reports of the classes which have just been held in the Central Division it appears that this step has had effect: as the results of the final examination, particularly among the graduates, are far superior to those of 1904-05. At the same time there can be no doubt that a longer period of practical work is necessary, after the course is held, if it is to be of any real benefit: if this is not secured, the knowledge acquired in the course will be very soon forgotten.

17. Training of Village Accountants.—The following table shows the progress in the training of Village Accountants in survey made during 1904-05 :—

• Includes men who had passed in the preliminary test in the preceding year also.

18. The total number of village accountants who passed the final test was 924, a figure which is much below the total for 1903-04 (1,341) and that fixed by Government (1,400) as the minimum to be aimed at. The circumstances of the year were, however, peculiar. No classes at all were held in the Ahmedabad, Kaira and Panch Maháls Districts of the Northern Division, and in the Central Division many of those opened had to be closed owing to the deputation of the accountants on locust duty. In the Southern Division on the other hand, where the work of instruction proceeded without interference, there was a very marked improvement, the total passing the final test (358) being more than double that for the previous year (171).

19. Complaints are again received from Superintendents that many of the accountants selected for training were too old or imperfectly educated to be B 1766-2

able to learn surveying: this was particularly the case in the Násik and Surat Districts. It would perhaps be well if each batch selected for training were inspected by the Sub-Divisional Officer before the training begins and unsuitable candidates rejected. This would possibly entail their journeying to headquarters for inspection: but it would seem preferable to incur the small expense which this would involve, rather than to persist in a vain attempt to communicate knowledge to persons unfitted to receive it.

20. Other features of this experiment, which seem to require attention, are (i) the large number of accountants in the Central Division and Southern Division, who though ordered by Collectors to attend the classes failed to do so:—

and (ii) the small proportion of "passes" to candidates in these divisions. Out of 1,608 who attended the classes only 1,074 passed the preliminary examination, and of these again only 789 passed the final test.

21. These figures seem to argue a certain want of discipline. If the accountants were made to realize that failure to attend and pass carried with it a severe penalty, they would probably show a greater keenness to learn. But as far as watandárs are concerned, there is reason to fear that the examination is not taken seriously. It should, I venture to think, be definitely laid down that any kulkarni, whether he be himself a representative watandár or mcrely a deputy, who has twice attended a survey class and failed to obtain a certificate, should be disqualified for further service. The test is so simple that, now that the novelty of the idea has passed away, any accountant of ordinary intelligence should find no difficulty in passing it.

22. The following statement shows the progress made in the training of village accountants in survey from the year 1901 to the year under report (1904):--

23. The above figures show that, given normal seasons, the training of the accountants in the Northern Division should be completed in three years. But in the Central and Southern Divisions, where the accountants are for the most part hereditary, the slow rate of progress seems to indicate that a period of at least twelve years will be required, and it is probable that, when allowance comes to be made for the numerous changes in the *personnel* due to the working of the watandári system as well as for interruptions due to bad seasons, this period will be considerably exceeded. I am personally doubtful whether hereditary accountants will ever, as a class, become efficient surveyors: but, whether this view be

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correct or not, it would seem desirable that our attempts to instruct them should receive hearty and vigorous support. Otherwise the time and money expended. on the task of instruction must be wasted. In the report for 1903-04 my predecessor, Mr. Lawrence, reported with regret the failure of the village accountants who had passed in surveying to turn their knowledge to practical use. It is pleasing to note that in the year under report there has been a very marked improvement in this respect. In examining the Record of Rights prepared in the districts of the Northern Division I have found that in most of the talukas those Talátis who have qualified in survey have drawn sketches of survey numbers in which there are unrecognized sub-shares and in some cases, such as the Thána Tálukas, the Talátis have drawn them surprisingly well. These sketches have not been prepared with chain and cross-staff and are therefore not strictly accurate : but they are a useful guide to the position of the sub-shares in question and certainly tend to improve the correctness of the record. Of course, the accountants concerned are all stipendiaries : but considering how much has been written as to the uselessness of instructing this class of officials in surveying, it is satisfactory to find that they have been able to turn Kirknowledge to good account.

24. District Survey Offices were the same in number as in the previous ycar, viz., a Central Office at Broach for the five districts of the Northern Division and separate offices at the head-quarters of other districts in the Presidency. Besides their routine duties, viz., correction of akarbands, village maps and survey papers, and supplying extracts from field books and copies of village maps, they performed a fair amount of miscellaneous work. The Superintendents inspected carefully all the offices in their divisions and the Director visited the Central Office at Broach and the offices at Kolába, Bijápur, Sholápur, Belgaum and Dhárwár.

25. As regards the Northern Division the work in the Broach Central Record Office was kept fairly up-to-date. In Thána there were heavy arrears of correction work, and it was found necessary to depute the Survey Daftardár, S. D., with a small establishment to Thána until April 1905 to assist in their disposal. The work of this office, owing to the development of the country near Bombay, will always remain heavy, and I anticipate that it will be necessary to ask for a considerable addition to the staff. In the Central Division and Southern Division arrears are not serious: but in the Central Division the large increase in the volume of the correction work has rendered it necessary to submit proposals for the improvement of the position of the staff. It is hoped that they will receive carly consideration.

District Inspectors.—An important change was made in the position of 26. District Inspectors during the year, as under Government\_Resolution No. 9161, dated November 28th, 1904, such of them as had qualified in measurement, classification and the use of the theodolite, viz., all the District Inspectors in the Northern and Central Divisions and two in the Southern Division were graded with Mamlatdars with effect from April 1st, 1905. The Inspectors of the remaining four districts of the Southern Division having duly qualified, have since been similarly graded. The change is one to which I attach very great importance. It will raise the status of the District Inspectors, improve their pay and prospects and attract recruits from graduates who have qualified for Mamlats and have shown a special aptitude for survey work. With an improvement in the intelligence and qualifications of these officials, the dislike and suspicion with which many subordinate revenue officials regard them will in great measure disappear. The amount of routine inspection performed by the District Inspectors is shown in Appendix B. The Compilation of the Record of Rights of course added very largely to their work, which from the Collectors' and Superintendents' reports seem to have been conscientiously performed.

27. General Duty Inspectors.—All the General Duty Inspectors have qualified in measurement, classification and the use of the theodolite. Collectors have again as a rule omitted all mention of these Inspectors, though the Collectors of Ahmedabad, Khándesh, Kánara and Kolába characterize their work as satisfactory. The Inspectors seem to have disposed of a large number of difficult and complicated cases, especially in the Northern Division; I have noticed, however, in some districts a tendency to hand over to them work which ought to be done by Circle Inspectors. This of course should be avoided. 28. Circle Inspectors.—From December 1904 pincteen Circle Inspectors in the Ratnagiri District who had previously been deputed on miscellaneous work were posted to permanent circles : and with this the reorganization of the staff, which was begun in the previous year, was complete. Towards the end of the year a further change of some importance was carried out under orders contained in Government Resolution No. 4617, dated 7th June 1905, by which Circle Inspectors' staff was for the purposes of pay and promotion amalgamated with the ordinary Revenue establishments : this change will doubtless prove beneficial by enabling Collectors to reward deserving Circle Inspectors with promotion, without necessarily transferring them to sedentary posts. As regards the actual work performed by them I attach information regarding the inspection of crops, wasto lands and boundary marks, so far as it has been supplied by Collectors (see Appendix C). It will be noted that in the case of several districts the information is very scanty indeed. I am preparing some statistical tables for use next year which will, it is hoped, remedy this defect.

29. As regards measurement work the following statement shows the numerical outturn, so far as it has been reported :---

30. It will be noticed that except in three districts no information is forthcoming as to the arrears at the close of the year, although in some, notably Ahmednagar, these are known to be very heavy indeed. Such as they are, however, the figures show that in Kaira, Panch Maháls, Poona and Khándesh a fair amount of work has been done.

31. Turning to the general work of Circle Inspectors, the duty of criticizing it is, as the Collector of Násik truly remarks, both difficult and delicate. But there can be no doubt that, as a class, their standard of efficiency is very much below what it should be. In the first place the present rules regulating their appointment have not proved satisfactory. Under the orders contained in Government Resolution No. 4517, dated June 14th, 1904, every graduate who is admitted to the Revenue Department has to serve six months as a Circle Inspector before appearing for the Lower Standard examination and six months again before appearing for the Higher Standard. Of the first six months no less than five are to be spent in instruction in survey and in work in the field with a survey party. The result of this is that a large proportion of Circle Inspectors' post have to be set aside to be held by a constant succession of young men who regard them as stepping stones to higher places, and are as a rule too indifferent or elso too wrapped up in their own endeavours to pass the departmental examinations to pay more than a superficial attention to the work which they are paid to perform.

32. The effect of this on the quality of the work done is, it is hardly necessary to say, extremely bad. The personnel of the appointments is always changing: at least one-third are generally learners. The technical and more difficult part of the work is constantly shirked and time spent over petty revenue cases which ought to be done by the Taláti. There can, I would submit, be no question that the present rules require immediate alteration.

33. In the second place there is still a general and growing tendency to employ Circle Inspectors on duties which lie outside their legitimate sphere of work. In paragraph 2 of Government Resolution No. 9180, dated November 10th, 1905, reviewing the report for 1903-04 this tendency was deprecated; but the previous orders in Government Resolution No. 7147, dated September 4th, 1905, directing that all duties previously performed by bhág kárkúns should be transferred to them have been allowed to remain in force, and the result is that in some districts Circle Inspectors tend to be revenue kárkúns and nothing else. For my own part I have no wish to encourage departmentalism, or to deprive hard-worked Mámlatdárs of the legitimate assistance to which they are entitled; but if Circle Inspectors are to devote their whole time to enquiries into the solvency of would-be-borrowers of tagai; to the collection of outstanding revenue and similar work, their proper duties must suffer.

#### CHAPTER III.

UTILIZATION OF THE LAND RECORDS STAFF.

### Progress in the Compilation of Circle Books.

31. The following remarks show the progress made in the compilation of Circle Books by Circle Inspectors :---

Ahmedabad.-The books have been compiled by Circle Inspectors up to 1902-03 in all talukas.

Kaira.-Compiled up to 1902-03.

**Panch Maháls.**—The work has been postponed pending the introduction of the revised survey rates. In Hálol special arrangements were made and the books have been filled up.

Broach.—The compilation has been undertaken only in Broach and Vágra Tálukas, where revision settlement has already been introduced; the progress made is satisfactory.

Surat.-The books have been compiled as follows :-----

Thána.—Circle books have been completely filled up in the Sálsette and Bassein Tálukas only. The work was either stopped or only partially attempted in Umbargaon Petha, and Kalyán, Sháhápur and Murbád Tálukas owing to the fact that Circle Inspectors were employed on locust duty. In other tálukas the work progressed satisfactorily.

Sátára.—No information supplied. Poona.— Do. do. p\_1766—3 Násik.—The books are complete in Sinnar, Niphád and Chándor; in Málegaon, Báglán and Kalvan, the compilation has not been started as the revision settlement rates have not yet been introduced. In Peint no work was done owing to the deputation of Circle Inspectors on locust duty. In Násik, Dindori, Nándgaon and Yeola, the books have been brought up to date for the second revision.

*Khåndesh.*—In all tálukas except Erandol and Dhulia the work of compilation was done during the year and is reported to be up to date. In Erandol and Dhulia the information is complete up to 1902-03, but no further progress was made as the Circle Inspectors were engaged in the Record of Rights work and the campaign against locusts. In Pimpalner the Circle Books are not yet introduced as the revision survey settlement has not yet been introduced.

Sholápur.-The village and táluka copies are filled up to date.

Bijápur.—In Indi, Sindgi and Bijápur Tálukas no progress was made owing to the engagement of Circle Inspectors on other dutics. In Bágevádi and Hundgund Tálukas the work has been brought up to 1903-04 and in the remaining tálukas up to 1902-03.

Belgaum.—Except in Athni Táluka, where two years' work is in arrears, the compilation of Circle Books is up to date in all tálukas.

Kánara.-Books bave been compiled up to date.

Dháracár.—Information supplied by one Sub-Divisional Officer only. In this sub-division the compilation is up to date in the Hubli and Kalghatgi Tálukas, is only one year in arrears in the Dhárwár Táluka, but in Bankápur it is 10 years in arrears in one circle of 39 villages.

Kolába.—Satisfactory progress has been made in the compilation of these books by Circle Inspectors. The work is, however, still in arrears in all talukas of the district.

Ratnágiri.—The Circle books in the tálukas of Málvan and Vengurla have been written up to date. In the remaining tálukas the compilation will be taken up this year.

#### CHAPTER IV.

#### SURVEY AND SETTLEMENT.

#### Survey Work.

35. Northern Division.—Two special temporary establishments continued to be entertained (1) a field party consisting of 6 surveyors and 4 temporary classers for miscellaneous measurement work and (2) a staff of correction classers and Register-writers at the Broach Central Record Office.

During the field season the field party was employed on the following work:-

(1) Measurement of lands taken up for famine relief works in the Kaira District;

(2) Demarcation of Bhatha lands in the Chorási Táluka of the Surat District;

(3) Miscellaneous measurement work in the Daskroi Táluka of the Ahmedabad District;

(4) Survey of an Inám village in the same táluka;

(5) Measurement and classification of Bhatha lands in the Ahmedabad District;

(6) Re-classification of deteriorated land in the Anklesvar Táluka of the Broach District;

(7) Settlement of the boundary between the Dángs and the Baroda territory.

The important work in connection with the Bhatha lands in Ahmedabad was carried out under the supervision of Mr. P. R. Mehta, Acting Superintend36. The re-classification work in the Broach District was in the immediate charge of an experienced head Surveyor specially employed for the work for about three months. This work was tested by the Superintendent.

37. During the recess months, *viz.*, August to October 1904 and June and July 1905, the Surveyors and Classers carried out the recess examination of the field work done during the preceding seasons. Two of the Surveyors were employed at Broach from 3rd October to 16th November 1904 on training Circle Inspectors in survey work.

The correction classers completed the corrections of the survey records neccessitated by the measurement of lands taken up for famine relief works. They dealt with 4,026 survey numbers.

38. The Register-writers were employed on (1) the preparation of the village papers of the A'mod Táluka in which the revision settlement was announced in the year under report, (2) the preparation of revised Appendix Q to certain old settlement reports called for by Government, (3) the duplication of akarbands of 252 villages, (4) separation of Himayat and Akasia assessments of 222 villages and position class assessment of 1,280 villages and on other miscellaneous work.

39. Survey of Tálukdári Estates in the Ahmedabad District.—This survey, which was ordered in Government Resolution No. 2263, dated 22nd March 1904, is being carried out under the immediate control of the Director of Land Records and Agriculture. The details were settled by Mr. Lawrence in personal consultation with the Tálukdári Settlement Officer. Work was started in Sánand in March by one party consisting of about 15 men under the supervision of a special Survey Mámlatdár, and was continued till the end of the fair scason. During this period 4 villages were completely measured, comprising an area of 13,570 acres in all. Settlement registers were also prepared by small parties under the immediate control of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer in respect of 16 Tálukdári villages of the same táluka.

40. Central Division.—The Akrani field party which consisted of a Head Surveyor and six permanent and 8 temporary Surveyors continued to work in this Division. Under the orders contained in Government Resolution No. 1890, dated 6th March 1905, the party was strengthened in March 1905 by the addition of 6 temporary measurers for employment all the year round, and from March to May by the deputation of 18 Circle Inspectors—three from each district in the Division-with a view to accelerate the work in the Pargana. The outturn, however, was not commensurate with the increase of the establishment. A separate report on the subject has been submitted to Government under this office No. L.—688, dated 7th March 1906.

41. During the fair season the party carried out the following work :---

(1) Complete measurement and classification of five Government and four Inám villages of the Khándesh and Sátára Districts and partial measurement and classification of two Inám-villages, one each in Sátára and Násik Districts;

- (2) In the Akrani tract-
  - (a) Complete measurement and classification of 9 villages,
  - (b) classification of one village,
  - (c) measurement of one village,
    - (d) partial measurement of 4 villages.

The area measured in this Pargana amounted to 13,037 acres and that classed to 13,217 acres. During the monsoon the party carried out the recess examination of the field work and prepared maps and duplicato classification books in respect of 25 villages measured and classed by it. Four of the permanent surveyors were also employed from the end of September to the middle of November in instructing the Survey Classes for Circle Inspectors at Poona. Some of the measurers also assisted the Survey Daftardár in the preparation of settlement papers.

42. The Survey Daftardár, C. D.'s establishment assisted by the temporary kárkúns for Akarband work carried out the following work :---

(1) Preparation of Akarbands of four talukas of the Shelapur District and one of the Nagar District, the revision settlements of which were sanctioned by Government;

(2) The preparation of revised Appendix Q to old settlement reports of G talukas;

(3) Preparation of Appendix Q of 11 talukas of which revision settlement reports were reviewed by the Director;

(4) Preparation of other settlement papers and maps in respect of 6 tálukas;

(5) Instruction in settlement work for a fortnight to Circle Inspectors attending the survey class.

43. The establishment of three kárkúns employed for the preparation of scale remuneration statements of village officers also continued its work under the supervision of the Survey Daftardár. It prepared the judi statements for 125 Government and 5 Inám villages and scale remuneration statements for 497 Government villages and 1 Inám village.

44. Southern Division.—The field party in this Division consists only of 6 permanent surveyors. They were employed (1) as instructors of the Central Survey Classes for Circle Inspectors started at Belgaum towards the end of September 1904, (2) on measurement and classification of the Inámi village of Nimbargi in the Bijápur District, (3) measurement of roads constructed during the last famine in the same district, (4) measurement and classification of kadim Inám lands also in the same district. The Superintendent, S. D., took a verifying test of the work done by some of these surveyors.

45. During the rains the surveyors were employed (1) in clearing off arrears in the District Survey Office, Belgaum, (2) supervising the copying and repairing of torn survey papers of the Kanara District, (3) recess examination of the field work done in the Bijapur District.

46. Small temporary establishments were employed in all District Survey Offices except Belgaum in copying and repairing torn survey papers. An establishment consisting of three hands was also entertained throughout the year for identification of the arrears assessed for tank water in the Belgaum, Bijápur and Dhárwár Districts. The work was finished in the Belgaum and two tálukas of the Dhárwár District.

47. The Survey Daftardár, S. D., and his establishment of three clerks worked at the Thána District Survey Office up to the end of April disposing of the arrears of correction work there. From May 1905 this establishment was transferred to Belgaum to prepare the survey papers of the Hubli and Vengurla Tálukas, the revision settlements of which were sanctioned by Government and revised rates in which have been ordered to be introduced carly in the year 1905-06; about three-fourths of the work in the Hubli Táluka was finished by the end of the year under report at a cost of Rs. 553. The work in both tálukas was subsequently completed and the revised rates were introduced in Vengurla in December 1905.

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#### Settlement work.

48. Northern Division.—Revised Revenue Settlement rates sanctioned by Government for the A'mod Taluka of the Broach District were announced in February 1905. The result of the revised settlement is shown below :—

49. Revision settlement reports in respect of the Dohad, Jhalod and Halol Talukas of the Panch Mahals District were completed during the year by the Assistant Collector appointed for the work.

50. Central Division.—The Superintendent, Land Records and Registration, C. D., submitted revision settlement reports for two inám villages of the Násik District and seven Government villages in the Khándesh District and an original survey report for one Government village of the Sholápur District.

51. Original or revision survey rates were introduced into-

(1) 1 iuám villages of the Ahmednagar District, 1 of the Sátára District, and 3 of the Khándesh District,

(2) 2 Government villages of the Khándesh District,

(3) In the whole of the Pimpalner Táluka of the Khándesh District,

(4) In the Shelápur, Mádha, Bársi and Karmála Tálukas of the Shelápur District.

52. The results of the revision settlement are shown below :---

53. The sanction of Government to the revision settlement proposals in respect of the Sangamner and Kopargaon Tálukas of the Ahmednagar District was received during the year. The new rates were to be announced in 1905-06, but owing to the unfavourable season of the current year their introduction has been postponed. Revision settlement reports in respect of the Bhimthadi Táluka of the Poona District and Chándor and Niphád Tálukas of the Násik District were prepared by the Assistant Collectors appointed for the work. The report on the Bhimthadi Táluka was roviewed by Mr. Lawrence in July 1905 after personal discussion with the Commissioner, C. D., and the proposals were submitted to Government through that officer.

54. Southern Division.—The Superintendent submitted proposals for the revision of the settlements in respect of eleven villages of the Kurundvád (Junior) State and original settlement proposals for ten inámi villages of the Chikodi Táluka of the Belgaum District. He also submitted revision settlement proposals in respect of the Ron and Navalgund Tálukas, which have been since submitted for sanction.

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55. Revision Settlement Reports in respect of the Indi, Sindgi and Bágovádi Tálukas of the Bijápur District were prepared by the Assistant Collector appointed for the work, and are at present under consideration. Sanction was received to the revision settlement proposals submitted for the Hubli Táluka of Dhárwár and the Vengurla Táluka of Ratnágiri. The new rates have been introduced in the Vengurla Táluka and they will be shortly introduced in the Hubli Táluka.

#### CHAPTER V.

#### RECORD OF RIGHTS.

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56. I have endeavoured to show in the following remarks as concisely as possible the progress made in the compilation of this important Record during the year.

59. The attached statement shows the amount of inspection performed by Mámlatdárs and Sub-Divisional Officers, except in the case of Poona and Sátára for which information has not been received. In some cases the columns have

been left blank owing to want of information. Arrangements will be made to remedy this defect in future years.

60. No work was dono in the Kaira and Panch Maháls Districts owing to the unfavourable character of the season.

**61.** Speaking generally, the progress made, though unequal, has been fair, considering that the circumstances of the season, owing to the locust plague in the Konkan and short rainfall throughout the Presidency, were extremely unfavourable. In Surat, Khándesh, Dhárwár, Ahmednagar, Bijápur, Kánara and Sholápur, the compilation was finished in all tálukas selected within twelve months of the commencement of work. On the other hand in Kolába the outturn of work was small and the Record at the moment of writing, though the compilation is in its third year, is far from complete. The subject seems to demand more vigorous attention on the part of the district staff. In Sátára the testing by the Circle Inspectors was allowed to fall a good deal into arrears: it will probably be advisable to employ a special staff to complete it. In Poona the fair copying of the Record in Khed and A'mbegaon, where the actual testing was finished in July 1905, is most unaccountably delayed. As in these tálukas also the compilation is now in its third year, vigorous steps seem necessary to complete it, or the work done in 1903-04 will fall seriously out of date.

62. The statistics (Appendix D post) regarding the inspection performed by Mámlatdárs show that the standard laid down by the rules was reached either actually or approximately in most of the talukas completed during the year. In the following, however, there was a serious deficiency :--

In Sálsctto and Sháhápur it is possible that account has not been taken of villages visited in the provious year; while in Chopda and Erandol the work had been done already before the present rules were sanctioned. In the táluka last mentioned, however, the Mámlatdár seems to have been exceedingly remiss; and I regret that as Collector, I omitted to notice it. In the other tálukas it would be well if the Mámlatdárs were to make a point of visiting villages which they could not see in 1904-05 and correcting the record with the assistance of the Matation Registers.

63. The figures for the inspection done by the Sub-Divisional Officers are not nearly so satisfactory. Making allowance for the fact now, I think, generally recognized that the ten per cent. test exacted by the rules is rather too high, the number of entries checked in several cases was very low, as the following figures show :—

There may have been adequate reasons for the small amount of inspection done; but I cannot refrain from calling attention to the fact, as, unless the Sub-Divisional Officer shows a vigorous interest in the work, it cannot fail to be done perfunctorily and therefore badly. In making the compilation the cooperation of the people is above all things essential and to secure this the Sub-Divisional Officers' aid is indispensable.

64. During the preparation of the Record the Superintendents of Land Records and Registration personally tested the work in the following tálukas:—

The nature of the inspection is explained in paragraph 13 of this office report of last year, No. A-1580, dated 8th March 1905, printed with Government Resolution No. 6994, dated 29th August 1905. The progress of the compilation work was also watched by obtaining monthly progress reports and inviting the attention of the Collectors to cases in which the work was not proceeding satisfactorily.

66. Mutation Registers Village Form No. 1-D have now been opened in all talukas in which the record has been completed, and are being kept up from the information supplied by the Sub-Registrars and the public.

67. A few remarks regarding the mapping of sub-shares will perhaps be of interest. By No. 2 of the Remarks on Village Form No. 1-C the accountant is directed to prepare a field measurement book containing sketches of all the Survey Nos. in his village. Owing to the incapacity of the Watandár Kulkarnis in the Deccan it has been considered impossible to enforce this rule in the districts of the Central Division; but in the districts of the Northern Division, mapping has been carried on with considerable success. I have examined fairly closely a certain amount of the work done in the Bassein, Máhim and Sálsette Tálukas of the Thána District, where the minute sub-division makes surveying far from easy, and have been astonished to find how good on the whole it. is. There is ground for doubt as to the capability of the hereditary village accountant to map sub-shares; but if the accountants whom I saw in Thána are fair specimens of their class, and I have no reason to suppose that they are not, that of the stipendiary accountant is unquestionable. The effect of this on the future maintenance of the Record will of course be great.

68. As regards the accuracy of the Record and the attitude of the public towards the compilation I extract the following remarks from reports submitted - under paragraph 14 of the Instructions for the Maintenance of the Record.

The Collector of Sholápur reports :----

"There was no opposition on the part of the ryots who seem to have sufficiently understood the object and usefulness of the Record and therefore took great care to have their interests correctly recorded."

In Kánara Mr. Haigh, I. C. S., Assistant Collector, writes :---

"I have no reason to be dissatisfied with the work. The Record will, I think, be found to be both complete and accurate. The people were already familiar with the Record as it was prepared under the old rules in this taluka in 1901-02. They were dilatory but not unwilling to give information."

Mr. G. D. Panse, the Collector, adds :----

"With very few exceptions information was promptly furnished. On the whole it may be said that the appreciation of the value of the record is gaining ground with the people."

In Belgaum Mr. Mobedji, Mámlatdár, writes :---

"On the whole good work has been done and a very large amount of information has been gathered which will be very useful in future. The number of assistance suits, which usually ran up to 70 or 80 during the provious three years, has this year fallen to about 50. It is yet too early to say if this reduction is due in any measure to the fact that the C. Register has tonded to curtail the disputes between landlords and tenants, but the fact is remarkable, coming as it does in the same year in which the register has been prepared."

Mr. Cowan, I. C. S., the Assistant Collector, adds :-

"The work has in general been done satisfactorily and as quickly as could reasonably be expected."

In Dhárwár, the record in the Bankápur Táluka is reported "to be appreciated by the public and accurate."

In Surat Mr. Desai, District Deputy Collector, in charge Olpád Táluka, remarks :---

"People have now begun to understand the value of the Record, and as time goes on, even the most backward classes will understand its utility."

In Broach the Collector, Mr. Bagnell, thinks that the record is fairly correct.

In Ahmednagar Mr. Wales, I. C. S., Assistant Collector, and Mr. Greer, I. C. S., testify to the general accuracy of the record; but there are complaints as to occasional dilatoriness on the part of the people in coming forward, and of Sávkárs in producing documents; also as to the difficulty in complying with paragraph 8 (b) of the instructions, which requires the Oircle Inspector to examine every entry in the presence of persons concerned or their representatives in the villago.

In Ahmedabad the work done is reported to have been good except in Dholka, where the people were very dilatory in supplying information.

In Khándesh Mr. Shepherd, I. C. S., Assistant Collector, after examining over 4,000 entries in Sháháda Táluka noted that "the work was remarkably well done": and Mr. Wachha, District Deputy Collector, was fairly satisfied as regards Erandol. In the Edalabad Petha Mr. Bell, Assistant Collector, found the attitude of the people at first almost hostile but subsequently colourless and one of acquiescence, but the Sávkár "very much alive in the matter" and anxious to advance claims which had really been extinguished some years ago. Mr. Bell

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is rather inclined to doubt, whether the record is not being turned to the advantage of the Sávkár for the advancement of his rights.

69. To the above it will perhaps not be out of place if I add a few remarks. based on my recent examination of the work done in Khandesh and the districts of the Northern Division. The difficulty of the work varies in the most marked way: in districts like Khandesh and the Panch Mahals where the fields are large and sub-divisions comparatively few in number, it is fairly easy: in Ahmedabad, Surat and Kaira the work becomes more difficult, especially in rice villages: in Thána and the Konkan generally the minute sub-divisions make the task one of very great intricacy and complexity. Generally speaking, the accuracy of the record is marred by a failure to bring up-to-date Village Form No. I, from which columns 2 to 6 of the record are copied, by the omission to issue notices under section 7 and to exact proper penalties when they are not complied with, and by failure to arouse the interest and enlist the co-operation of the people. A great deal more might be done than has been done to consult the convenience of land-holders. Many of the latter have assured me that they are only too anxious to show their deeds and have their rights properly registered. But they object to being made to dance attendance on a Circle Inspector or Taláti for days at a time with no assurance that, when they have done so the Taláti will not pretend that he is too busy to attend to them. 'If steps were taken to remedy this and at the same time to use the powers, which the law gives to remove from Village Form No. I the names of persons, who through death or otherwise have lost all interest in the land, the practical advantage of the enquiries set on foot would be more generally apparent and there would be less apathy in the supply of information.

A second point, which might with advantage be brought to general 70. notice, is the desirability of completing the formal and mechanical part of the work at the earliest possible date. The rules at present require the compilation to be begun on November 1st but as a matter of fact, the forms are often not sent for until after this date and, when they are received, a great deal of time is wasted over the purely mechanical work of copying out the necessary details from Village Form No. I. A proposal will in all probability shortly be submitted to Government by the Commissioners for the modification of the provision of the Rules as to the date of commencement; but in the meanwhile it seems advisable to point out that forms can be sent for in June and the mechanical copying done between June and October, during which months the village accountants have very little to do. If this is done, the enquiries necessary to fill up the remaining columns of the Record can be set on foot early in October and sufficient material collected to allow of the Circle Inspectors and other officers starting their tests early in December. I have been repeatedly assured by Mámlatdárs and others that compilation work must necessarily stop while the revenue is being collected. This is most inexpedient. Ryots will attend to pay their revenue, who cannot be got hold of at any other time, and the accountant should take advantage of this to extract as much information as possible.

71. A third point on which I found it advisable to lay emphasis is the necessity of continuing attention to the Record after its formal compilation is over and of ensuring that the Mutation Registers are properly compiled. I have noticed a tendency, when the record is finished, to throw it on one side and treat it as a statistical compendium of doubtful utility, requiring no further attention from any one. This of course is wrong. Apart from the fact that even the most accurate record is not altogether devoid of error, the Mutation Registers require constant supervision: where this is not given, the accountants willinevitably neglect their duties.

72. The questions whether the present form of the Record cannot be improved and whether it cannot be utilized so as to take the place of some of the other Village Account Forms, are at present receiving consideration. In the meanwhile I venture to record my opinion that notwithstanding several imperfections it is on the whole reasonably accurate and that it will be, if properly maintained, of the greatest value to our administration.

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## COLLECTORS' REMARKS ON THE WORKING OF THE LAND RECORDS STAFF.

Akmedalad.—The work of the Circle Inspectors appears to have been fairly good as a whole. The work of filling up Circle Books is behind hand in several talukes. The Record of Rights interfered with this work. In several Circles a fairly large amount of test inspection in connection with the Record of Rights work was done by the Circle Inspectors.

Kaira.—The ordinary programme of work had to be put on one side owing to the failure of the monsoon. The holding of the classes for the training of village accountants had to be postponed; and all ordinary routine work was subordinated to crop inspection and the preparation of "annawari" statements. The damage caused by the failure of the rain was not homogenous; some crops came to maturity while others failed. The Circle Inspectors work under the direct control of the Sub-Divisional Officers and the latter report that on the whole they have found their work useful and satisfactory. The work of the TalAtis was on the whole good. One only was dismissed. The percentage of TalAtis punished varied from 23.8 in MAtar to 6 in Nadiád. Out of the total number of TalAtis (32-) 109 have received survey training. The District Inspector has worked with zeal and efficiency. Throughout the year he was active in supervising the Circle Inspectors' work.

Panek Mahale.—The District Inspector and the Circle Inspectors of the Godbra, Dohad and Jhalod Talakas were occupied upon special daties which to a certain extent interfered with their regular programme .... The District Inspector got through a creditable amount of inspection work during the rest of the season. He devoted much time and trouble to the supervision of the new Mutation Register in the Kalol villages and of the mapping work in connection with the Record of Rights. The work of the Circle Inspectors has been found to be good on the whole.

Broack,—The Record of Rights which was commenced last year in Broach and Vágra Tálakas was completed this year and was completely announced in Vágra by 3rd June 1905, and in Broach between 12th and 20th idem. The Sub-Divisional Officers examined the required number of entries in each and every villago and the Mámlatdárs also took proper interest in the work . . . Mr. Gundaria, the District Inspector, examined the record in detail in both tálakas.

The amount of work accomplished by the District Inspector appears sufficient and though the inspection done by him did not reveal any serious mistakes of the Circle Inspectors and of the Talátis it was done in detail and embraced all branches of the work of the Circle Inspectors and Talátis.

The Circle Inspectors' work was fair but the Collector does not look upon the amount of their work of examining llyots' receipt books as satisfactory.

Surat.—The entries in the Record of Rights 61,457 numbers out of a total of 91,779 survey numbers were checked by the Circle Inspector. They had moreover to assist the Mámlatdárs in connection with details of suspensions and remissions. Taking these circumstances into consideration the work of the Circle Inspectors was satisfactory.

The District Inspector was active throughout the year. The Collector adds "the District Inspector has worked well and takes interest in his work. In his reports he is inclined to dogmatize and to base his inferences on insufficient premises. He should communicate more freely with the Sub-Divisional Officers and Mámlatdárs about any remissness on the part of the Talátis and Circle Inspectors and not restrict himself to an annual indictment of the staff."

Thána.—" The District Inspectors' work was satisfactory, but he complains about the inadequacy of his staff which is not able to cope with the ordinary work in the district which is generally heavy. The Circle Inspectors and Talátis are on the whole well spoken of. I am inclined to doubt whether enough work is got out of the Circle Inspectors. Their routine work if the figures from Kalyán may be taken as average is not of very great value."

**Poona.**—The work of Circle Inspectors was on the whole found to be good. The Collector concurs with the Superintendent in the statement that the District Inspector exercised careful supervision and his work on the whole was in all respects satisfactory.

Sátára.—The Collector states that on the whole Mr. Kirane (District Inspector) and Mr. Ghanekar his successor from 21st January 1905 have done a solid amount of good work.

The work of the Circle Inspectors has on the whole been satisfactory. They have done a fair amount of crop inspection and waste inspection. Boundary mark inspection has also received its due share of attention in all talukas except Satara where none has been done, the reason assigned for the omission being that the Circle Inspectors have been solely the record of rights work. The compilation of Circle books is up to date in almost all the talukas and a fair amount of measurement work and work in reference to encroachments has also been done.

Násik.—" The duty of criticising the work of Circle Inspectors under the present arrangements is both difficult and delicate. Now-a-days the permanent staff and its legitimate duties have to be interfered with so often in a year that supervising officers find it very difficult to test any particular branch of their work with appreciable success or effective check."

"The Record of Rights, the Village Accountants' Survey Classes, the clerical work in connection with the revision of settlements, the work in the Poona Survey Daftan, the Poona Survey Training Classes, the special measurement works and special work of famine years, all these combined with the ordinary leave interruptions and the evil of periodical appointments necessitated by the new rules of promotion, have rendered the position of a Circle Inspector repulsive to the staff and confusing to the supervising officers. Poor work is the natural result of interrupted employment. The old measurer class apart, Circle Inspectors have little incentive to good work because their duties have scarcely become familiar before they are transferred to other spheres."

"The District Inspector did excellent work thoroughout the year."

Khindesh.—The work done by the District and the Assistant District Inspectors during the year under report was on the whole satisfactory. The introduction of the Record of Rights and the supervision of the Village Accountants' Classes have necessarily occupied a great deal of the attention of these officers and interfered considerably with their test of the ordinary work of the Circle Inspectors.

The work of Circle Inspectors appears to have been somewhat uneven throughout the district, and complaints about their inefficiency are still forthcoming from some of the Pránts. On the whole, however, they have much improved.

Sholápur.-The District Inspector was more active in the year under report than in the preceding year. His work was on the whole good.

The Sub-divisional Officers have not made any unfavourable remarks as regards the quality and quantity of work performed by Circle Inspectors.

Nagar.—The District Agricultural Inspector Mr. Bere's work is commended by all the Prant officers and under his careful supervision the Record of Rights work is making good progress. Several Circle Inspectors have done very good work in connection with it, thereby compensating the bad work of kulkarnis, who, though on the whole efficient as far as mere account work is concerned, do not appear to be of a sufficiently good stamp for the discharge of the multifarious duties that devolve on them now-a-days.

Bijápur.—The work of the District Inspector Mr. V. H. Lakshmeshwar was good, but I think he might have done more than he has as regards the examination of Circle Inspectors' Daftars and the Record of Rights work in the Hungund Táluka. The work of the Circle Inspectors is reported to be from fair to good.

Belgaum.—The Táluka and Mahál establishments worked on the whole satisfactorily. \* \* The majority of the Circle Inspectors were employed in the preparation of the record. On the whole they have discharged their duties satisfactorily. The District Inspector Mr. Ghali has shown commendable activity in supervising the work. No final test of Village Accountants was taken by him as his time was fully occupied by the Record of Rights work.

As the Circle Inspectors were engaged on Record of Rights work in five talukas and on special crop inspection and Famine work in Parasgad and Athani talukas, the crop waste, encroachment and boundary marks inspection work could not be performed according to standing orders. What little measurement work was done during the year was carried out by the General Duty Inspector.

Kánara.—"The Sub-divisional Officers have no complaint to raise against the Circle Inspectors' establishment. The Record of Rights diverted a portion of this staff from their prescribed duties, and though there was some dislocation of business on this account, it was only temporary and does not call for special notice. Assignment of additional Bettas in the above-ghat tálakas and of Hakkal to the Kunbis of Bhatkal also fell to a great extent upon the Kanungo establishment. However their work was on the whole satisfactory. I would add that this staff, lacking the knowledge of practical agriculture, is prevented from being as useful to the agriculturists as they might have been owing to their constant touch with the rayats and their fields."

I have no hesitation in saying that "the work of the District Inspector Mr. Shesho Shriniwas, who is shortly to retire, has been eminently satisfactory."

Dhárwár.—The accounts of Sub-divisional Officers of the work done by Circle Inspectors and Village Officers differ somewhat, but it is noteworthy that Mr. Monteath speaks highly of the way the village officers did the Record of Rights work.

Kolába.—Mr. Naik, District Inspector, has sufficiently accounted for his work and notably that he has exercised an efficient supervision over the Record of Rights work. The Collector adds: "I cannot share my predecessor Mr. Bonus' poor opinion of the efficiency of Talátis in this district. The Record of Rights work was found both by Mr. Mountford and Mr. Koreishi to have been done with extraordinary care by them and to be wonderfully accurate so far as it could be tested." \* \* \* "An equally good opinion cannot be "The chief complaint against them is that they ought to get more into their day's work and that they ought to acquire the habit of conducting more than one revenue inquiry relating to the same individuals at the same time and that when they are in a field they ought to strive to finish all the various kinds of inspections and inquiries as far as possible at one time instead of doing as little as possible."

"It has been the endeavour of the District Inspector and myself to indicate to them how this can be done, and the Mámlatdárs also have been directed to personally instruct them."

Retagiri.—The work of the District Inspector of Land Records and Agriculture was satisfactory. In consideration of the Record of Rights and locust work and of the fact that the Circle Inspectors took charge of their respective circles so late as December, the work on the whole may be considered sufficient.

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Extract from the Commissioner, N. D.'s Land Revenue Administration Report (Part II) for 1901-05 bearing upon the working of the Land Records Staff :--

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The opening of Survey Classes for Village Accountants was impeded in most districts by the untoward nature of the seasons. The two classes, which were opened in Breach District, were attended by 39 candidates, of whom 36 passed the preliminary test. No mention is made as to the efficiency of men who have already passed, except in Ahmedabad District, where they are reported to be able to do simple measurement work.

The work of the Circle Inspectors is said to be fairly satisfactory in the Ahmedabad, Kaira and Panch Maháls Districts. In other districts their work is spoken of indifferently. However, their ordinary work was in many instances interfered with by the special measures to meet the stress of a bad season. The reports of the Surat District do not give much information as to the manner in which these officers have discharged their duties. The Collector of Kaira and Mr. Wiles, Assistant Collector, Panch Maháls, touch upon the inexperience of the present run of Circle Inspectors, resulting from the cast of the existing rules, which necessitate frequent changes among them. There can be no doubt that the graduate Circle Inspectors too often regard the posts of Circle Inspectors mercly as stepping-stones to higher places and shirk the work or at best do it without zeal or interest:—

Extract from the Commissioner, C. D.'s Land Revenue Administration Report for 1904-03 :---

The scheme for the grading of District Agricultural Inspectors with Mámlatdárs came into force during the year. The result will be a great improvement in their prospects, which cannot but add to their efficiency. The present Inspectors, with one exception, are well spoken of. Their most-important duties at present, namely those connected with the record of rights and the training of kulkarnis, would seem to have been performed satisfactorily on the whole.

Opinions differ on the work of Circle Inspectors, but more than one officer alludes to the difficulty of getting good work out of men who look upon their tenuro of a Circle inspectorship merely as a stepping-stone to a higher post.

The statistics of punishment in the reports give an average of 5.5 per cent. of Patils and 20.3 per cent. of kulkarnis fined, suspended or dismissed during the year. As regards individual districts, the percentages were highest in Sholápur (9 and 26) and lowest in Sátára (4 and 12). The kulkarni from his position is necessarily more liable to disciplinary penalties than the Patil, but the figures for some of the districts seem to suggest more frequent resort to punishments than is perhaps desirable or necessary. The subject of the kulkarni's inefficiency has now been discussed threadbare. Until the proposals for N his improvement take some definite shape, his limitations must be recognized. Under the Watandári system, the average kulkarni is really not fit for anything more than the collection of revenue and the keeping of accounts; and lapses of duty beyond this require to be treated with a considerable measure of indulgence. Classes for the training of kulkarnis in survey were held in all districts of the division; and of the 932 kulkarnis who attended them, 431 passed the final test. Special measures were adopted in the Khandesh District for the regular exaction of measurement work from the trained kulkarnis; and this plan must be generally followed if what is learnt in the classes is not to be forgotten. Apart, however, from the question of the mapping of sub-occupancies, which is a question under consideration, it is very doubtful if it is worth while training kulkarnis in survey at all. As remarked above the ordinary watandár kulkarni or his deputy may be expected to do his ordinary account and clerkly duties, but not much more can be expected of him. If we want to have a man who is

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at once an accountant, a clerk and a land surveyor, it is probable we shall have sooner or later to reform the watandar by ending him.

6. Special Matters.-(1) During the year the record of rights was completed in one taluka in Sholapur, where more work was prevented by the introduction of the revision settlement in the greater part of the district; and in 5 tálukas in Khándesh. In Poona the record for the Khed and Sirur Tálukas, compiled in the preceding year, was gone over again owing to the unsatisfactory nature of the work previously done. As regards the other districts, the proparation of the record was in progress in 6 talukas in Satara and 3 each in Nasik and Ahmednagar. Additional establishments were employed in every district except Khandesh; and the necessity for it has since been felt in that district also. The Superintendent of Land Records and Registration gives no opinion in his report as to the character of the work done in the different districts. Apparently he is not in a position to do so, as he did not test it at all in Khándesh and Poona and only in 30 villages altogether in the remaining 4 districts of the division. Judging, however, from such remarks as the Collectors make, the work was on the whole satisfactory. As regards the attitude of the people, Mr. Moore, the only Collector who remarks on the point, states that the record "is slowly but steadily gaining favour with the people." On the other hand, Mr. Plunkett, his District Deputy Collector, states, that except perhaps the money-lenders, the attitude of the people was one of indifference.

The initial record has now been prepared in 1 tiluka of Poona, 3 of Sholápur, 6 of Ahmednagar, 5 of Násik, 3 of Sátára and 9 of Khándesh; and finally declared in 2 tálukas of Sholápur, 3 of Ahmednagar, 3 of Násik and 9 of Khándesh. The mapping of sub-occupancies has practically been attempted only in one district—Khándesh.

#### Remarks recorded by the Commissioner, S. D., on the work of the Land Records Staff in the Southern Division during the year 1904-1905.

## Circle Inspectors.

The routine work of the Circle Inspectors' crop, waste, and boundary marks inspection suffered to some extent owing to the deputation of some of these officers to places where the Record of Right was in progress and also to other special duties such as—

(1) drawing up estimates of the outturn of crops with a view to ascertaining the extent of the need for granting suspensions and remissions in Bijápur and the famine-affected parts of Belgaum;

(2) measuring land for the assignment of betta and hakkal lands in Kánara; and

(3) helping in the operations of the destruction of locusts in Kolába and Ratnágiri.

But from the information supplied by the Collectors of the routine inspection that was done, it is not easy to ascertain the amount of the work done by the village officers, the amount of the test of this work by Circle Inspectors, how far the village officers' work was found by them to be satisfactory, also how far the Circle Inspectors' work was in its turn tested by the Mámlatdárs and the Sub-divisional Officers and by District Inspectors and with what results. It would appear necessary to prescribe some forms for the supply of this information.

2. The general complaint on the part of the Sub-divisional Officers appears to be that boundary marks are out of repairs to a serious extent and that neither the land-owners on the one hand nor the village officers and Circle Inspectors on the other care to see them repaired. It seems necessary to take some practical steps to have the marks repaired.

## Measurement cases.

3. Correspondences involving measurement of land are stated to have accumulated in every district owing to the diversion of Circle Inspectors for other special dutics, and the District Officers are of opinion that village officers are not as yet able to dispose of such work. The General Duty Circle Inspector is stated to have disposed of some measurement cases in Belgaum and Kánara.

#### Circle Books.

4. These books appear to have been written up to date except in Bijápur and the Athni Táluka of Belgaum apparently on account of famine duties and in the parts of Ratnágiri where the establishment of Circle Inspectors has been recently (December 1904) organised and placed in charge of regular Circles.

5. Nothing has been said in the Collectors' reports as to the comparison of ryots' receipt books and the inspection of vital statistics and the statistics of water-supply by Circle Inspectors. On account of large remissions in past years and non-recovery of land revenue due to scarcity, the inspection of receipt books as laid down in Government Resolution No. 5175, R. D., dated 7th July 1904, by Circle Inspectors is most necessary and ought to be done as far as possible to prevent frauds.

6. An opinion has been expressed by some Sub-divisional Officers that the Circle Inspectors have not sufficient experience of their work, that they regard the post as a stepping-stone to promotion to Head Kárkúnships and Mámlats and that the frequent transfers add want of local knowledge to want of knowledge of work and there is much truth in this.

7. Mr. Panso says that as Circle Inspectors have no knowledge of practical agriculture they are not able to give useful instructions to agriculturists and it is so. Until, however, the strain on account of special duties has been removed, any measures for remedying this defect seems difficult for adoption. The better informed cultivators are stated to take some interest in the operations of the Experimental farm at Dhárwár.

#### District Inspectors.

8. Nothing has been said by the Collectors of Belgaum, Dhárwár and Kolába as to the amount and character of the work done by these officers. Elsewhere the Collectors were generally satisfied with their work.

## Training of Village Accountants in Survey.

9. Considerable progress was made in every district in the training of village accountants in survey. The number who have passed the final test form a considerable proportion of the total number of village accountants, though the efficiency of the passed men in dealing with practical measurement work is much doubted by the District Officers. It seems desirable to prescribe some form for the supply of information on this subject, both to secure uniformity and to convey a clear idea as to (1) the total number of officiators in the district, (2) the number of those exempted from the training, (3) the number of officiators and others trained during the current year and up to date, (4) the number who have passed the final test during the current year and up to date, (5) number who have passed the final test during the next season.

10. Mr. Bomanji says that many watandar kulkarnis, who have received survey training, pass out of office on account of the rotation system, before they have learnt to use their knowledge and that the labour and expense incurred for training them are wasted. But this cannot be helped under the present circumstances. It is enough if Collectors see that a candidate for appointment, whether a representative watandar or his deputy, has undergone the necessary survey test.

11. Except the mapping the state of work done is as below :---

12. In the Bijápur District the progress of the work is reported to have been retarded owing to the incompetency of some of the kulkarnis, the prevalence of plague and cholera.

13. The Collector of Kolába attributes the slow progress of the work as due to (1) the small number of Talátis, (2) the difficulty in assembling the villagers and interested persons living in Bombay and suburbs, (3) locust operations, (4) the difficult nature of the country, and (5) large number of sub-divisions,

14. In Ratnágiri likewise the number of sub-divisions is very large, but the larger number of villages is Khoti. The work has to be done in Khálsa villages only and is likely to be finished with other districts.

15. It will thus be seen that the progress already made is satisfactory and the Collectors think that the current year's work is superior to that done in the previous year and hope that with the experience gained the work will improve.

16. The Commissioner has in his personal examination of the work of the Málvan Táluka of the Ratnágiri District, Chikodi Táluka of the Belgaum District and Navalgund Táluka of the Dhárwár District, found that the Talátis or Kulkarnis and the Circle Inspectors have on the whole gained sufficient experience and that the former have turned out good and larger quantity of work than was expected in addition to their other multifarious duties.

17. The Collectors got the work done by deputing Talátis and Circle Inspectors from one táluka to another and with only small additional establishments where necessary.

18. The attitude of the people towards the record is stated to be favourable, and mistaken notions as to its objects are stated to have been dispelled. Some officers have reported that the moral effect of the introduction of the record of rights has been to some extent the loss of harmony existing between the creditor and debtor, khatedar and sub-sharer, and landlord and tenant. Mutual confidence and friendly relations long subsisting between them are said to have been strained owing to the attempts of the one party to gain some undue advantage as regards the titles being recorded over the other in the course of the enquiry. 19. To prevent such advantage being taken, the assistance of Panchayats should be taken as their services are likely to be of utility in securing accuracy in the record (Rule 7 of the Instructions).

20. To ensure accuracy and to protect the interests of the poorer classes' it will be interesting to know, in connection with this record, whether the agriculturists and other poor people in whose favour mortgages, &c., are discharged or extinguished (explanation 2 of section 4 (1) of the Act) promptly and readily report them. So also whether such people take advantage of the free inspection of the record allowed by section 14 and rule 15.

20. The attitude of the people could have been better gauged if the District Officers had mentioned the number of cases in a taluka where requisitions under section 7 (1) were necessary and cases in which the fees mentioned in section 8 are levied.

21. The following information may also with advantage be inserted in future in their remarks by Collectors :--

(1) Whether any entries have been the subject of civil suits and what opinion the Civil Courts have expressed.

(2) How many appeals were there under section 3, sub-section 4, and rule 8 and with what result. Only the Collector of Kánara has remarked that there were very few appeals.

(3) Whether Mutation Registers are opened from the date of the completion of the record of rights and kept up to date.

(4) How far the Patels have been useful in the preparation of the record of rights and the maintenance of Mutation Registers (No. 6 of General Instructions).

(5) Any use of Panchayats made and how far they proved useful (Rule No. 7 of the Instructions).

## PART III OF THE LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION REPORT FOR THE PROVINCE OF SIND FOR THE YEAR 1904-05.

No. 857 or 1906.

REVENDE DEPARTMENT.

Commissioner's Office, Karáchi, 91h April 1906.

1. Proposals were sanctioned in the year of report for the revision of assessment rates for the Thul, Kashmor and Kandkot

tálukas of the Upper Sind Frontier district, for the Tatta, Mirpur Sákro, and Ghorabari tálukas of the Karáchi district, and for the arca dependent on the Jamrao Canal. The new rates were introduced in the Jamrao arca at the end of the year, and in the tálukas of the Upper Sind Frontier and Karáchi districts in 1905-00. A survey settlement was introduced in the current year in the Sir Amani tract of the Shahdadpur táluka in the Upper Sind

Appendix A. Appendix A. attached. Proposals have been prepared during the current year for the revision of rates in the Umarkot and Pithoro tálukas of the Thar and Párkar district, in the Dero Mohbat and Hala tálukas of the Hyderabad district, and in the Jacobabad táluka of the Upper Sind Frontier district. They are at present under the Commissioner's consideration and will shortly be submitted to Government.

The amount of work transacted by the head-quarters office is shown in 2. Appendix B. The total number of survey registers Land Records-Appendix B. (Village Form No. 1) prepared during. the year (columns 25, 26, 33, and 34) was 561 as against 327 in the previous year. In addition, (a) the column of abatement of canal clearance in the 1st, 2nd and 3rd copics of 02 survey registers of taluka Mehar, which remained over from last year, was completed, and (1) owing to the revision of rates in the Thul; Kandkot, Kashmor, Tatta, Ghorabari and Mirpur Sákro tálukas, the preparation of entirely new registers was undertaken. Of these the first copies of the survey registers of 72 dehs out of 87 of taluka KandRot were completed in all respects. There was also a large increase over the preceding year in the number of Sindhi maps supplied (column 22) due to heavy indents received from various departments in the Province, more especially the Public Works Department for Contour surveys. The number of Sindhi maps (column 32) prepared for printing was 289 as against 238 in the previous year. The number of extracts from field books supplied to Revenue authorities was 699 as against 645 in the previous year (vide column 17 of the table). In this are included three extracts from survey registers and maps which were supplied to petitioners.

3. Turning now to the work of correction performed by the head record office in connection with the reservation of lands under section 38 of the Land Revenue Code and the survey work. done by Revenue tapedars in their tapas, it may be mentioned that 8,710 survey numbers were corrected. Two copies of Ghat Wadh registers, each consisting of 8,713 numbers, were prepared—one for the use of the record office and the other for issue to the taluka officials concerned. Of these corrections a percentage test of 155 numbers was taken. Tests were also taken in recess of the numbers measured by the survey parties in the field shown in para. 10 of the report.

4. Appendix C shows the amount of survey work done by tapedars (apart Appendix C. from that done by the surveys parties) which was received for examination in the record office and returned duly scrutinized.

5. The numerical strength of the Revenue surveyors stood the same as last year. Five remained in charge of survey parties

Survey work. in the Sukkur and Hyderabad districts. The other two Revenue surveyors, who are not in direct charge of the survey parties, were deputed to sub-divide numbers cut up by certain canals in the Tando Bage and Dero Mohbat tálukas of the Hyderabad Collectorate and the Sukkur and Ubauro tálukas of the Sukkur district, where they remained till the close of the field season. One of them Mr. Rama Parshad also finished the work of demarcation of the Mirzanpur Jaghir, which had remained over from last year. The pervices of Mr. Santdas were, as usual, placed at the disposal of the Colonization Officer, Jamrao Canal, for survey work under his orders.

6. Appendix D shows the amount of measurement work dono by the Appendix D. various survey parties, during the field scason and the test taken by the Revenue surveyors and by the Superintendent, Land Records and Registration, respectively. In addition to the work shown in the statement 3,130 acres were measured by the two Revenue surveyors who are working independently of the parties, making a total of 140,295 acres. This amount looking to the scattered and varied nature of the work is satisfactory.

7. A reference to the tabulated statement will also show that of the 31,453 survey numbers which were measured by the survey parties in two districts of the Province, the surveyors in charge took test of 3,352 numbers and an error of 4 per cent. and over in 16 numbers only was detected. The small proportion of fields in which an error of 4 per cent. and over occurred indicates that the work on the whole has been accurately done by the tapedars.

8. 'In addition to the work shown in the preceding table 280 survey numbers which, though measured by revenue tapedars, had not been plotted on maps or entered in village and taluka registers were cleared off by the survey parties in the Hyderabad district.

9. The Superintendent personally took tests and retests in 741 survey numbers against 554 numbers in the previous year, and an error of 4 per cent. and over was detected in one number only. Of the 744 numbers tested by the Superintendent, 132 were retests of numbers tested by Revenue surveyors. In these the error was within 2 per cent, in 3 numbers and within 1 per cent. in 129 numbers. The tests taken by Revenue surveyors in charge can, therefore, be considered accurate and reliable. The larger amount of personal test was necessitated by the larger outturn of work accomplished by the survey parties at time of visit. In addition to the above, of the two Revenue surveyors who are working independently of the parties, the work of one was tested. The total of numbers measured was 403 and the test taken therefrom was 14 numbers in which no mistake of any importance was discovered. The other Revenue surveyor's work was not tested owing to want of time. The total work done by him was 534 numbers.

The field season commenced, as usual, on 1st November and ended on 10. 15th April instead of 30th with the exception of the work of one survey party which was working in the Naushahro Division. The closure of the work earlier this year was due to the fact that the work usually done was found so heavy that it could not be completed during the recess. With this view the work was closed 15 days earlier. Thereafter the survey parties returned to the head-quarters at Hyderabad to bring their recess work, i. e., recalculation of areas, plotting on • maps and preparing Ghat-Wadh registers and distribution statements, i.e. Form F of the numbers measured in the field. The work was begun and completed by the end of October. Of the total numbers, viz., 31,453 numbers, 770 numbers were tested by the Superintendent. In only 69 of them errors and omissions were discovered which were duly corrected. Apart from the survey parties the Superintendent also took test of the two Revenue surveyors' work alluded to in paragraph 10 supra. Of the total numbers measured, viz., 927 numbers, 43 were tested by the Superintendent. All were found correct.

11. As usual a separate class for the training of junior Civilians, Deputy Col-Training of Revenue Officers in survey. Collectors, 2 Deputy Collectors and 10 Mukhtiarkars attended the class. They were examined at the end of the usual period of 6 weeks. All passed and were granted certificates of proficiency.

12. Owing to the unfavourable reports in connection with tapedars not kceping up their knowledge of surveying, it was arranged that all tapedars, who had undergone a two months' training during 1894-98 should be examined in batches, and those who failed should pass through the mill of the survey parties. Accordingly Mr. Wilkins was specially deputed for this purpose. The tapedars were examined by him and those who failed in field examination or who did not appear at the examination for various reasons, have been ordered to pass through the survey parties with a view to their obtaining such thorough instructions as will enable them subsequently to do survey work in their respective charges. Of the 12 tapedars, who failed in the special officer's examination in the survey Manual, 11 appeared at the examination which was held at the time of the Sub-Departmental examination. One did not appear. Of these eleven, 9 passed and 2 failed. One of these two and one who failed to appear have been sent to the survey parties this year. The remaining one is on leave on Medical certificate and the Collector of the Sukkur district has been asked to send him next year. The names of the candidates who qualified were duly communicated to the District Officers concerned. Eleven untrained men, who were employed as tapedars owing to paucity as passed men, appeared for the agricultural school examination in survey. All of them passed and were awarded certificates.

13. Under the orders contained in Government Resolution No. 8704, dated 14th December 1900 (Revenue Department), the Examination of Registry Registry offices of Upper Sind Frontier and Thar and Offices. Párkar districts were examined by the Superintendent

and their results wore communicated to the Inspector-General of Registration of the Bombay Presidency. He also checked the monthly prices of the provisions supplied to the troops and followers stationed at Hyderabad, Sind, in terms of Government Resolution No. 2019 of 9th April 1902 (General Department) and found no appreciable difference between the market rates and those quoted by the Huzur Deputy Collector in all cercals. In Ghee, however, a difference of rupee 1 per maund was found. The samples of grains received in sealed bottles were duly returned after examination.

14. The result of the Superintendent's examination of Taluka Forms numbers 35 and 36 is shown in the subjoined table. Examination of Táluka The errors and omissions detected, details of which are Forms numbers 35 and 36. noted in the statement following, were forwarded to the Mukhtiarkars concerned through their District Officers :--

The total cost of the Land Record Office, including the cost of the work of measurement and demarcation done by the survey parties and the two Revenue surveyors, who are working independently of the parties, amounted to Rs. 1,06,169-10-8, exclusive of the pay, etc., of tapedars themselves, which has been met from the Village Gess Funds direct by the Revenue Department.
