**REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE CRIMINAL TRIBES
ACT IN THE BOMBAY PRESIDENCY (EXCLUDING SIND
AND BOMBAY CITY) FOR THE YEAR ENDING
31st DECEMBER 1930.**

The total number of notified Criminal Tribes remained the same as in the preceding year. One more mixed gang from the Nasik District was notified under Section 3 during the year, bringing the total of mixed gangs to 153.

Statistics.

The total number of registered members belonging to all tribes and mixed gangs at the close of 1929 was 22,095. Subsequent verification of the figures showed a decrease of 79. The grand total at the beginning of 1930 was therefore 22,016.

Additions and alterations.

During the year 1,396 members of different tribes and gangs were registered, 275 died, and 1,058 were released from the operation of the Criminal Tribes Act (472 for improvement of character and 586 for other reasons).

193 persons were sent to Settlements under Section 16, and one Kaikadi from the Sholapur District was sent to the Madras Presidency under Section 13.

The gang of Nir Shikaris referred to in last year's report left Dharwar voluntarily and returned to Anantapur District in the Madras Presidency. Another batch of the same tribe who came to Dharwar during the year also left voluntarily for the Madras Presidency. Consequently no steps were required for their deportation under Section 11 read with Section 13 of the Criminal Tribes Act.

A gang of Dawari Gosavis, resident of Shelevadi under Sangola Police Station, Sholapur District, was traced in the Vizagapatam District in the Madras Presidency. The local authorities there, regarding it as composed of Jodhpur Marathas or Kanjar Bhats, registered it under Section 4 and sent the 29 members under Section 10 (3) to their native place. On further enquiry in the Sholapur District it was ascertained that these persons were not Kanjar Bhats or Jodhpur Marathas but Dawari Gosavis, a caste not notified as a Criminal Tribe under Section 3 in this Presidency. Consequently their registration was cancelled by the District Magistrate, Sholapur, under Section 8 of the Act.

The total number on the register at the end of the year was 21,902. Of these 3,585 are subject to the provisions of Section 10 and 18,317 are restricted under Section 11. Of these restricted persons 5,251 Waghris of the Kaira District were free from any restriction being in class 1, i.e. on probation. At the close of the year 804 persons were absconding and 418 in jail. These figures refer to registered members outside Settlements.

Details relating to all tribes are shown in statement A.

The number of registered members inside Settlements, whose registers are in the custody of the District Superintendents of Police of the Districts in which the Settlements are situated, was as under :—

2. One mixed gang, consisting of Mahars, Malis and Bhils of the Nasik District, was declared as a Criminal Tribe under Section 3 during the course of the year. The members of this gang are subject to the provisions of Section 10 only.

Application of the Act to new tribes or gangs.

3. The total number of members struck off the register during the year was 1,333 as against 1,245 last year. The Additions to, and removals from, the Register. The following tables give details of the members struck off the register, by District and by tribe separately.

The registration of Dharalas convicted for certain offences specified in Government Resolution, Home Department, No. 6886, dated 28th November 1925 automatically ceases after a certain period and in accordance with these orders 407 members of this tribe were struck off the register.

Those Waghris of the Kaira District who rose to class 1 and thus became free from all the restrictions are not included in this statement.

The methods of registration continue as in previous years, i.e., those members of Criminal Tribes who were convicted for non-bailable offences or against whom reasonable suspicion of their having been concerned in cognizable offences existed were brought on to the register, except in the case of Bhils and Tadvis for whom special orders exist, their registration being effected in accordance with the orders contained in Government Resolution, Home Department, No. 9752/1, dated 5th December 1927, and Government Resolution, Home Department, No. 9752/I/13877, dated 7th January 1930, respectively.

Members undergoing imprisonment in jails were transferred for release to their respective Districts and were registered on the expiry of their sentences.

The work of rectifying defective Criminal Tribes registers (Government Resolution, Home Department, No. 2912/2, dated 5th January 1928) so far as it relates to members outside Settlements is up to date in the Dharwar District with the exception of a few cases in which the registrees are absconders. In the Bijapur and Belgaum Districts this work is nearing completion, while in other Districts this work is complete.

3. Criminal Tribe members in the Dharwar District, whose registration was cancelled for improvement of character, were again brought on the register as they reverted to crime.

Members added and struck off the register during the past three years are given in the following table :—

Statement 1-A gives details regarding the registered population of the Bombay Presidency outside Settlements according to tribe, and statement 1-B the distribution according to Districts.

On the all-important question of the proper registration and removal therefrom of a member of a criminal tribe Mr. Holland, District Superintendent of Police, Dharwar, sums up the correct policy as follows : —

“ Original registration was carried out in 1916 and onwards. No definite principles were laid down and mere reputation was counted as sufficient cause for registration. Many anomalies resulted, as reputation was a matter of opinion. In addition, many actual ex-convicts evaded registration altogether. On arrival in 1927 I began to look into this and insisted on all ex-convicts with convictions in the last ten years being registered. At the same time I took steps to see that restrictions on those without any convictions were gradually removed ; first names were removed from Hazari and then after two or three years' experience, depending on the gravity of the original offences, names were struck off altogether. Similarly ex-convicts with a clear record of eight years were removed from the register after a period of release from Hazari only which amounted to probationary period. This overhauling started at the end of 1927 and sent up the registration figures in 1928 ; thereafter registration has automatically followed conviction and figures of 1929 and 1930 have remained steady. It is likely that the figures will drop as the deterrent effect of these measures gradually becomes operative. With the overhauling, after observation of the results of partial release from restrictions, the full effect of the new principles began to be felt in 1929, and automatically the same results have followed in 1930, when releases from restrictions have been 120 and 114 respectively. Every ex-convict has the hope in front of him that prolonged good conduct will automatically bring its own reward just as bad conduct evidenced by a conviction automatically results in the imposition of the restrictions which registration imposes.”

He adds—

“ Registration is now put on a logical basis whereby every convicted Criminal Tribes man is automatically registered ; similarly men of prolonged good conduct are released from restrictions. The Criminal Tribes Act is thus worked with a maximum of effect and minimum of hardship. Figures prove definitely that registration prevents crime.”

4. The remarks made in previous years hold good, and the ineffectiveness of the present system of roll call in controlling crime is stressed by all Districts. It is hoped that the revised rules, in which provision has been made for domiciliary visits, will result in better control. The District Magistrate, West Khandesh, remarks that there is a marked increase in the number of offences committed against property by Criminal Tribes members, the tribe primarily responsible for the increase being the Bhils. While the effects of the Civil Disobedience Movement have contributed to this increase the necessity of a better check during the night time is beyond dispute.

5. Convictions of members of criminal tribes, both registered and unregistered, for offences against the coinage, property, and other cognizable offences under the Indian Penal Code. Indian Penal Code. are shown below with the figures of the last three years :—

The above figures show that the fall in the criminality of the registered members of Criminal Tribes, outside Settlements, continues.

6. 804 registered members were out of sight at the end of the year
 Absconders. an increase of 41 over the previous year's figures,
 while 138 absconders were apprehended during the
 year. The difficulty of tracing absconding tribesmen is very great and
 has been dealt with in previous reports.

The question of rounding up, and registering, certain wandering gangs to whom the Criminal Tribes Act has been applied had to be postponed in the absence of rules to control them when registered. These rules, in which the necessary provisions exist, are still under the consideration of Government.

91 settlers absconded from various Settlements, and 78 were traced, during the year. Of these 34 were handed over to the Criminal Tribes Settlement Officer, Dharwar, to be dealt with departmentally. 115 settlers, as against 79, were absconding on the last day of the year.

7. (1) *Under the Indian Penal Code and the Criminal Procedure Code.*—During the year under report 1,115 members of Criminal Tribes were convicted for cognizable offences and under Chapter VIII of Criminal Procedure Code. Of these 305 convictions were against registered members and 810 against unregistered members. 757 members were convicted for offences against property and two for offences against coinage. The figures show steady improvement over those of last year.

(2) (a) *Criminal Tribes Act, Section 21.*—25 members were convicted under this Section during the year for avoiding registration as against 16 last year.

(b) *Criminal Tribes Act, Section 22.*—Under this Section 690 members were convicted as against 756 in the previous year.

61 registered Waghris of village Od in the Anand Taluka, Kaira District, were instigated by non-co-operators in the village not to attend roll call. All were prosecuted and convicted.

Instances still come to notice where the distinction between sub-sections 1 and 2 of Section 22 is not properly understood by some Magistrates.

(c) *Criminal Tribes Act, Section 21.*—Under this Section only 4 registered members were convicted during the year as against seven in the previous year and 27 in 1928.

8. The number of convicted persons liable for enhanced punishment
 Use of Section 23 under the provisions of Section 23 of the Act, and
 of the Criminal Tribes Act. the number of persons whose cases were considered
 in that light, are shown in columns 18 and 19 of
 Statements II-A and II-B.

Out of 13 persons liable for enhanced punishment 10 were convicted and sentenced to a term of punishment provided by Section 23 of the Criminal Tribes Act.

No suitable case has occurred during the year to test whether it is obligatory on a Magistrate to frame an additional charge under this section when previous relevant convictions exist.

9. The inefficiency and apathy of the large majority of Police Patils in the proper execution of their duties under the Village Headman Act is, as usual, a common ground of complaint from all Districts. This year, owing to the Civil Disobedience Movement, it is still more marked ; but it is gratifying to note that the infection of lawlessness did not spread to the criminal tribes in any marked degree, although the Dharalas and Bhils seized the opportunity to some extent.

During the year under report 16 Village Headmen were reported for dereliction of the duties imposed on them by section 26 of the Criminal Tribes Act. Of these, 13 were warned, 1 was removed from office, 1 was fined and 1 was kept under suspension for three months.

In connection with the duties of Police Patils the District Superintendent of Police, Bijapur, remarks :—

“ The experience of the past year has confirmed my conviction that the ends aimed at by the Act and the rules framed under it are considerably hampered, if not defeated, by the lack of interest and supervision displayed by the Village Headmen or Patils and by the unavoidable restrictions on the Police Patrol System.” * * *

* * * “ If the truth were known there is hardly a village officer who really ever does more than fill in a ‘ Hazari ’ and that too irregularly. The remedy is difficult to conceive so long as the present type and standard of village Police Officer or Patil exists.”

The issue of a set of instructions regarding the duties of Police Patils under the Criminal Tribes Act will be issued as an appendix to the new pamphlet, recently approved by Government for their general guidance, after the new Rules under section 20 are sanctioned.

Notes on individual Tribes.

WAGHRIS.

10. (1) The number on the register at the close of the year was 10,061 in Kaira, 4 in Ahmedabad, 5 in Broach, 2 in Bombay Suburban District and 1 in West Khandesh as against 9,915 in Kaira, 4 in Ahmedabad, 5 in Broach, 2 in Bombay Suburban District and 6 in the Poona District in the previous year.

The registration of the 6 Waghris in Poona District has been cancelled during the year.

(2) During the year 260 more Waghris were registered—259 in Kaira District and 1 in West Khandesh. Of those on the register 111 died, 6 were removed for improvement of character, and two were transferred to Settlements.

(3) The net increase in the registered population of Waghris in the Kaira District was 146.

37 registered Waghris were convicted under the Indian Penal Code as shown below :—

During the year 5 Waghris were convicted under section 21 of the Criminal Tribes Act for avoiding registration, 183 were convicted under section 22, 36 registered Waghris were absconding and 34 were in jail on the last day of the year. 13 absconders were apprehended during the year.

The Waghris of the Kaira District are controlled at present by the rules applicable to their own tribe in that district only. When found outside the Kaira District they are subject to the general rules under section 20 of the Act.

The question of applying general rules to the Waghris of the Kaira District is under the consideration of Government as the present rules are inadequate.

The District Superintendent of Police, Kaira, comments that "The criminal tendency of the Waghri tribe has remained unchanged and therefore a general surveillance over this tribe by way of some special rules is essential. The worst may be subjected to restrictions in addition."

This tribe is more of a local problem of the Kaira District. Elsewhere in the Presidency they give little trouble though they are given to the manufacture and uttering of false coins.

DHARALAS.

Dharalas are notified and registered in the Kaira District only. They are controlled by special rules applicable to the tribe and in

accordance with these, they remain under restrictions for a fixed period only. On the expiry of that period they automatically cease to be registered members.

Dharalas convicted of certain offences specified in Government Resolution, Home Department, No. 6886, dated 28th November 1925, are registered automatically and restricted to their residence between sunset and sunrise.

The number of Dharalas on the register at the beginning of the year was 735. Two Dharala settlers (released on probation by the Criminal Tribes Settlement Officer, Dharwar, and allowed to reside in the Kaira District) were erroneously included previously in the registered population outside Settlements. The correct figure last year was therefore 735.

Two hundred and forty-seven persons were added during the year under report. Out of those on the register, 7 died; 407 ceased to be registered members on the expiry of their period of restriction; and 6 were transferred to Settlements. The total number on the register at the end of the year was 562.

Out of 247 persons placed under restrictions all were not convicted for non-bailable offences only, as is the intention of the Act; a considerable number were convicted for offences against persons and under the Abkari Act for illicit distillation.

Three hundred and twenty-seven Dharalas were convicted of cognizable offences or under the Criminal Procedure Code during the year, but out of these only 12 were registered members.

Thirteen registered Dharalas were absconding and 101 were in jail on the last day of the year. 2 absconders were apprehended during the year.

The problem of the Dharalas, like that of the Waghris, is peculiar to the Kaira District.

The following table shows the comparative figures of convictions obtained against Dharalas and Waghris for offences under the Indian Penal Code during the last 5 years.

Nine Dharalas were convicted under section 21 of the Criminal Tribes Act for avoiding registration, and 52 were convicted under section 22 for breaches of rules under section 20.

The number of registered Waghris and Dharalas in Settlements at the end of the year was 11 and 26 respectively. Of these, 1 Waghri settler absconded from the Settlement and 3 Dharalas are on probation. During the year no Waghri or a Dharala was discharged on probation.

In connection with the working of the Criminal Tribes Act in the Kaira District the Commissioner, Northern Division, remarks :—

“The work of administering the Act was considerably dislocated during the year by the Civil Disobedience Movement and the registered members had opportunity to enjoy freedom from the usual restrictions on account of the resignation of a large number of Patils in sympathy with the movement and the pre-occupation of the Police.

On the whole the statistics supplied do not reveal any noticeable improvement in the criminal tendencies of the tribes.”

MANG GARUDIS.

This wandering tribe is found throughout the Presidency, excluding Gujarat.

During the year, 92 Mang-garudis were registered in the Central and Southern Divisions of the Presidency. At the end of the year the registered population of this tribe was as follows :—

At the close of the year the number of registered members in Settlements was 739. Of these, 68 registered members were sent to Settlements during 1930. 126 registered Mang-garudis were absconding and 16 were in jail on the last day of the year.

Eighty-nine settlers were discharged on probation by the Criminal Tribes Settlement Officer of whom 19 were discharged during the year under report and 70 in previous years. 3 settlers so discharged on probation were recalled by the Criminal Tribes Settlement Officer owing to misconduct, while 11 probationers were discharged altogether from the operation of the Act.

Most of the members of this tribe have no fixed domicile, and registered members are restricted in their movements to the Districts in which they are registered.

The number, both of registered and unregistered members of this tribe convicted for offences during the year under report, is shown in the following table :—

The members of this tribe have a rooted dislike to any form of manual labour, and wander from place to place in order to maintain themselves by begging or committing petty crime. In this connection the District Superintendent of Police, East Khandesh, remarks "I have noticed that, when the male Mang-garudi is criminal, he is *very* criminal but on the whole the women appear to have a greater idea of the communism of property than the men. Almost all the women of this tribe in this district appear to have convictions, chiefly for pick-pocketing in bazaars and towns." * * * "It was from this tribe that some members committed a high-way robbery by night after giving "Hazari."

The problem of settling wandering Mang-garudis and Phase Pardhis in places where they can earn their own livelihood in the Districts of Nasik and West Khandesh, referred to in last year's report, is still apparently unsolved.

BHILS

Bhils are a resident tribe, chiefly found in the Central Division. The automatic registration of members of this tribe (Government Resolution, Home Department, No. 9752-I, dated 5th December 1927) is nearly complete.

The registered population of Bhils at the end of the year was 2,470 as against 2,358 the previous year. During the year 319 persons were registered, 29 died and 145 were struck off the register owing to improvement of character.

During the year Bhils have been responsible for more crime than any other class in the Districts of the Central Division. The marked rise in offences against property in conjunction with less activity on the part of the Police under the Criminal Procedure Code and the Criminal Tribes Act for breaches of rules may fairly be ascribed to the preoccupation of the Police with the Civil Disobedience Movement and to economic distress.

The proposals submitted last year to remove Bhils and other members of Criminal Tribes already declared as such from the notifications of mixed gangs in the West Khandesh District has been sanctioned by Government in Home Department notification No. 9752-I, dated 10th November 1930, and the work of giving effect to these orders is in progress.

BERADS.

A resident tribe found in the Districts of the Karnatic, the registered population of which at the end of the year was 793.

Out of the 59 notified Criminal Tribes men convicted under the Indian Penal Code in 1930, 21 members belonged to this tribe. Two more Berads were also convicted under the Abkari Act. Experience has shown that the Berad tribe in this District remains law-abiding after registration under the Criminal Tribes Act. Steps have been taken to get the ex-convicts registered under the Criminal Tribes Act."

The criminal activities of this tribe are confined almost entirely to the Dharwar and Belgaum Districts.

I visited this Camp at Harigaon in November last and found that the Pardhis residing there were becoming amenable to discipline and showed definite signs of reclamation.

The free colony of this tribe at Barsi is also reported to be progressing well.

RAJPUT BHAMPTAS.

This tribe is found in the Ahmednagar and Sholapur Districts and also in some villages of Jath and Akalkot States. Their activities extend over the whole of India and they are inveterate criminals.

During the year some of these Rajput Bhamptas have been traced as far afield as Yeotmal (C. P.), Allahabad, Bangalore, Baroda, Ajmer, Akola (C. P.) and Madras, and steps have been taken to bring them home for trial under the Criminal Tribes Act.

The District Superintendent of Police, Ahmednagar, remarks (and I agree with him) :—

“The only course to deal satisfactorily with them would appear to be to clap them into Settlements whenever possible.”

One Rajput Bhampta who absconded from the N. P. Settlement at Dhalewadi Camp was traced in Ahmedabad. He was dealt with under Section 109, Criminal Procedure Code, and made P. R. T. to Sangola for internment in a Settlement.

I am afraid this tribe is incorrigible.

In the Satara District a gang of Javeri Kaikadis, who were responsible for a series of offences committed in that District during the past 2 or 3 years, was arrested during the year. In all 15 offences were traced to members of this gang; the cases against them were pending at the end of the year.

A gang of Kaikadis who had escaped surveillance and left the Bijapur District sometime in 1927 was traced at Jalke, a village in the Nevasa Taluka of the Ahmednagar District. The members of this gang found in the Nagar District have now been registered under the Criminal Tribes Act while some members of the gang are undergoing imprisonment in Bangalore Central Jail. It has been found that this gang was committing depredations in Mysore Territory.

TADVIS.

The number of registered Tadvīs at the beginning of the year was 168. This year 48 were added by registration, one died and 2 were removed for improvement of character. 116 were struck off the register as they automatically ceased to be registered members in accordance with the orders contained in G.R., H.D., No. 9752-1/13877, dated 7th January 1930. 6 persons were interned in Settlements under Section 16 of the Criminal Tribes Act, leaving 91 Tadvīs on the register at the end of the

year. One registered member was absconding on the last day of the year.

The District Superintendent of Police, East Khandesh, says that the release of so many Tadvis from the operation of the Criminal Tribes Act, in accordance with the new orders, has had a bad effect on crime in Yawal, Raver, Edlabad and Bhusawal Talukas and that he suggests a revision in these orders. He has, however, made no attempt to prove this assertion he will be asked to try and do so.

FUTGUDIS.

Futgudis live in two Talukas of the Thana District.

The registered population of this tribe at the end of the year was 234. Two (one registered and one unregistered) members of this tribe were convicted for offences against property, 5 were absconding, 5 were in jail at the end of the year; and 2 were removed to Settlements during the year. 14 members were in Settlements of whom 2 were absconding on the last day of the year.

The District Superintendent of Police, Thana, reports that the criminal tendencies of Futgudis in general have materially decreased. In 1927 and 1928 it was reported that crime committed by members of this tribe was on the increase and it was suggested by the then District Superintendent of Police and District Magistrate, supported by the Deputy Inspector General of Police, Northern Range, and the Commissioner, Northern Division, that these Futgudis should be collected and placed in Settlements instead of leaving them scattered as at present.

This seems to be a somewhat drastic proposal, and is not justified now by the figures of criminality of this tribe.

Futgudis are a local problem and are controlled by special rules applicable to their tribe in the Thana District only. These rules are inadequate and ineffective. When the new rules are sanctioned and applied to this tribe the anomalies created by the existing rules will be set right and each case will be treated on merits. In the new rules provision has been made to discharge a member of a notified Criminal Tribes altogether from the operations of the Criminal Tribes Act if his or her record shows consistent good conduct for a specified period.

During the year there was no prosecution for a breach of rules under Section 20 of the Criminal Tribes Act.

11. During the year under report no registered member of a Criminal Section 28. Tribe was deported to any Indian State.
12. The gang case against 29 Delhiwal Bauriahs, which was under trial at Ahmedabad at the end of the last year, ended Foreigners. in conviction this year. The convicted members were proved to be residents of Muzaffarnagar and have been made P. R. T. to that place when their time for release arrives.

The gang of Nir Shikaris referred to in last year's report left this Presidency voluntarily and returned to Anantpur in the Madras Presidency as a permanent measure. There was thus no need for a notification under Section 11 read with Section 13 of the Criminal Tribes Act in respect of this gang.

6 Delhiwal Bauriahs who hailed from Muzaffarnagar in the United Provinces, and who were awaiting trial at the end of the last year, were convicted in Nadiad. One of them was awarded enhanced punishment as provided by Section 23 of the Criminal Tribes Act.

13. During the year under report 321 wandering gangs were noticed in the Presidency. 170 belonged to notified Wandering Gangs, criminal tribes and of these 29 were Irani gangs. The remainder (122) were ostensibly non-criminal.

The original orders for the registration of wandering gangs of Iranis and the actual registration of a few had an excellent effect. Subsequently Government in their notification No. 9356/4301 of 11th November 1930 cancelled the original notification H. D., No. 9356 of 31st March 1927, thus making the registers already prepared under notification No. 9356/IV/I dated 7th May 1929 inoperative.

The question of registering these troublesome wandering Iranis is now again under the consideration of Government.

14. The question of opening a Settlement at Ahmedabad for Chharas and members of other Criminal Tribes in the Northern General. Division is still undecided.

During the year the Presidency Construction Settlement, Pimpalgaon Kunzira in the Ahmednagar District, was removed to Gherdi in the Sangola Taluka of the Sholapur District.

The remarks regarding the amalgamation of the Kalyanpur and Umedpur Settlements in the last two years' Reports still hold good, though some of the settlers in the Kalyanpur Settlement have been removed to the Umedpur Settlement.

Settlers from both these Settlements were responsible for 22 offences in Sholapur City, Sadar Bazaar and Sholapur Taluka, as against 15 in the previous year. Altogether offences were brought home to 32 settlers and all were convicted. In addition there were 17 cases in which the property stolen being less than Rs. 10 the accused settlers were dealt with departmentally.

The remarks made in the previous year's Report regarding the control of Criminal Tribes in the Indian States, Southern Maratha Country, still hold good.

The Bijapur District in particular is reported to have suffered from the inroads of criminal tribes from various States, and notably from the Katbus of Jamkhandi, Mudhol and Aundh.

During the year 193 registered members of different tribes, with their dependents, were actually interned in Settlements as against 106 last year. The Criminal Tribes Settlement Officer discharged 130 settlers of different tribes on probation during the year. 17 probationers were recalled to Settlements owing to reversion to crime.

In October 1930 a serious dacoity with murder occurred in the Hubli Sub-Judge's Court, Dharwar District. It was established that this offence had been actually committed by settlers from the Hubli Settlement with the assistance of others discharged on probation. In this case about Rs. 11,000 were stolen and a watchman was murdered. 4 accused have since been committed for trial.

In all 149 settlers were convicted during the year; 63 for offences against property; 3 for other cognizable offences under the Indian Penal Code, and 83 for infringement of rules under Section 20.

One Kaikadi settler was convicted under Section 23 of the Criminal Tribes Act.

94 probationers were discharged from the operation of the Criminal Tribes Act by the Criminal Tribes Settlement Officer.

During the year under report the working of the Criminal Tribes Act, like other Police Work, was dislocated throughout
Conclusion. the Presidency owing to the Civil Disobedience Movement, as the Police were preoccupied with the extra work imposed on them by the campaign, and its lawless manifestations, in addition to their ordinary duties of prevention and detection of crime. That they should have been able to work the Act last year as well as they did is a most creditable achievement.

It is gratifying to note that the lawlessness of the Civil Disobedience Movement did not affect the members of Criminal Tribes to any great extent, although the opportunists among them naturally got busy at times when they found the Police fully engaged elsewhere.

To complicate matters many police patels—particularly in Gujarat—resigned owing to the movement and so made things easier for the criminal. These patels however,—as noted last year—are a poor instrument for the proper working of the Act.

For control under the Act to be made more effective we require a better class of police patel. We also urgently require the revised rules under Section 20 of the Criminal Tribes Act, and revised notifications which are still under the consideration of Government.

The comparative figures of convictions show a gradual fall in the crime committed by registered members of criminal tribes: and the removal from Districts of a larger number of "bad cases" to Settlements this year (193 against 106) should have a beneficial effect on crime generally. Such cases also serve as a useful reminder to those other registered members who have the itch for other people's goods.

The Criminal Tribes Branch in the Presidency C. I. D. under Rao Saheb B. V. Kelkar proved its continued usefulness and efficiency on many occasions during the year.
