Sir,

I have the honour to submit the report on the Administration of Minors' Estates in the Northern Division for the seven months ending 31st July 1904 as directed in Government Resolution No. 2, dated 4th January 1905.

2. There were, at the beginning of the year 1904, 79 estates in all under the guardianship of the Collectors in the division and the Tálukdári Settlement Officer, Gujarát. The latter officer alone had the management of 46 estates in the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira and Broach. During the period under report the management of 3 estates was relinquished, the minors having attained their majority, and that of 9 taken up, leaving a total of 85 at the close of the period. Of these 85 estates 32 were under the guardianship of the Collectors and 53 under that of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer. The Collectors have this year reported on the estates under their own guardianship and the Tálukdári Settlement Officer has submitted a single report on those managed by him. A statement giving particulars about each estate in the division is appended, the necessary information as to who is in charge of the person of each minor being added in the last column.

3. Although the period covered by the present report was less than a complete year it embraces those months in which income collections and payments are generally received and made. Comparison of the figures with those of the past year has therefore been made as far as possible.

The total income from the estates in the division amounted to Rs. 2,64,685 as compared with Rs. 2,11,853 in 1903. The increase is satisfactory and is due partly to the collection of arrears of past years.

In the Ahmedabad District 41 estates were under guardianship in 1903, of which only one—that of Thaltej in the Sanand Táluka—was under the Collector and the remaining 40 under the Tálukdári Settlement Officer. Of these 3 were released from guardianship in 1903 but 6 were added, leaving 43 under the Tálukdári Settlement Officer on 31st July 1904. In 1903 the total income of the Ahmedabad Estates, excluding Thaltej, was Rs. 1,14,209, while during the period under report Rs. 1,41,772 were realized, showing an excess of Rs. 27,563, due chiefly to better realizations from the estates of Shermia Bapumia (No. 17) and Juvansingji of Gangad (No. 18).

The total income of Rs. 1,25,433 from lands is more than double the amount of land revenue payable, *viz.*, Rs. 57,128, and hence no explanation is necessary.

The only one estate, that of Thaltej, under the Collector, yielded an income of Rs. 41 only from lands against Rs. 78 last year. The land revenue payable was Rs. 27, including local funds, as compared with Rs. 13 in the preceding year when a partial remission was presumably given. The reduction in the receipts was due it is explained to the unfavourable character of the season. The explanation does not seem entirely satisfactory, and I am making further enquiry.

There were 8 estates in Kaira under guardianship at the end of the year 1903, of which one—the estate of Bāi Sona—was released from management. None were taken up. Out of these 4 estates were under the Collector which yielded Rs. 1,532 in all as compared with Rs. 1,520 in the previous year. The slight increase is due to the produce of 7 acres of land which reverted from the possession of the uncle of minor No. 4. The income from lands alone comes to Rs. 1,348, which was more than three times the land revenue payable, *viz.*, Rs. 401. The number of estates in charge of the Tālukdāri Settlement Officer, together with those taken up during the period under report, were nine. Of the new estates which came under management Mogar and Napad are important. The fathers of both the minors died suddenly, and to prevent confusion the estates were taken under guardianship. The total income from these estates (in charge of the Tālukdāri Settlement Officer) amounted to Rs. 29,688, out of which the sum of Rs. 25,545 was on account of the produce of lands, which is about three times the amount of land revenue payable on them.

The number of estates under the guardianship of the Collector of the Panch Mahāls (seven) remained unaltered. No estate is in charge of the Tālukdāri Settlement Officer in this district. The total income from these estates amounted to Rs. 32,666 against Rs. 30,820 during the year preceding. The increase of about Rs. 2,000 is due to compensation having been received by the Mehlol Estate for lands taken up for the Baroda-Godhra Chord Railway and to *tagāvi* collections credited to the funds of the estate during the period. This sum of Rs. 32,666 includes Rs. 27,777 as the produce of land, which is less than double the land revenue payable, *viz.*, Rs. 15,164. This, the Collector explains, is due to the estates not having entirely recovered from the effects of the famine.

There were 16 estates in all, under guardianship, in the Broach District during the period under report, one under the Tālukdāri Settlement Officer and 15 under the Collector. The total income of the estates under the Collector, including the estate of Shāhpura recently added, amounted to Rs. 23,205, which includes Rs. 11,728 from lands paying Rs. 9,329 as land revenue. The fact of the income from lands being so small in comparison with the land revenue is explained as being due to the decrease in population on account of famine and plague and to the great difficulty in securing tenants and as a result rents in general have fallen. The variations in receipts are apparent in the case of the estates in Jāmbusar Tāluka where, in consequence of the failure of crops, the revenue could not be collected except to a small extent for the Dhari Estate, whereas in certain individual cases the amounts collected are larger than those of the previous year, due chiefly to the recovery of arrears of past years. In cases where the land is cultivated at home the entry in the column "Produce of and" is limited to the sale of agricultural produce and does not include the value of the grain reserved for home consumption.

The Broach Kāzi's estate, which is only one in charge of the Tālukdāri Settlement Officer in that district, yielded Rs. 2,529 in all, of which the sum of Rs. 2,200 was realized from landed property as compared with Rs. 1,634 in the year preceding. The difference is due to the arrears of past years having been collected during the period under report.

Four estates remained under the guardianship of the Collector of Surat at the end of the period under report out of the five during the previous year: one, that of Ambelal Jogibhai, had been handed over to him during the period under report as he attained his majority. The total income of the 5 estates amounted to Rs. 31,213, of which the sum of only Rs. 1,528 was from lands assessed at Rs. 888. The cause of the income being so small is attributed to there being little or no demand for land inhabited chiefly by Dúblās, and in very rare cases only is the letting value of lands equal to or more than double the amount of land revenue. In Māndvi Tāluka in particular the letting value is ordinarily one and a half times the amount of assessment in good years, which has naturally fallen off since the last famine. The estate of Ambelal (No. 3) shows a reduction in income when compared with last year's, and is due to non-receipt of rents from certain tenants and to the non-drawal of his *desaigiri* allowance. The increase in the produce of land belonging to estate No. 5 (Shri Gōswāmi) is nominal. Correct figures were not available for the last report,

but those for the present one have been more accurately ascertained. Rupees 4,550 were realized from the sale of a house and a piece of land belonging to the *gōswāmi*.

The other estates do not show any important fluctuations in receipts.

In Thána the only one estate reported on last year continued to be in charge of the Collector for all but the last two months of the period under report.

The total produce of the land has been shown at Rs. 135 in the statement which includes Rs. 74 on account of arrears of past years recovered during the period under report, leaving Rs. 61 as the sale-proceeds of the produce of land. But it is reported that a tenant paid Rs. 19 direct towards the assessment and also agreed to pay Rs. 40 in cash which remained in arrears and for which the Mámlatdár has passed an order for assistance. The explanation of the meagreness of the income of lands of this estate is that land in one village was not taken up for cultivation and in two others lands were leased on payment of the bare assessment only. The Collector's attention will be drawn to this matter, though the estate is no longer under management.

The figure in the column "Other income" has swelled this year from Rs. 154 to Rs. 1,928 for the reason that sum of Rs. 973 deposited with a Bania by the minor's father without security or documents was recovered and Rs. 20 were received from a man whose property was mortgaged to the minor without possession and Rs. 2 from the Táluka Kacheri, being a sum due to the minor's father. The sum of Rs. 954 withdrawn from the Postal Savings Bank under the Saving Bank Rules, the minor being over 18 years of age, has also been shown under "Other income."

4. The total expenditure amounted to Rs. 1,92,412 as compared with Rs. 2,10,999 in the preceding year. The decrease is due to various causes, but the following reasons are mostly assigned—(1) smaller payments towards liquidation of liabilities, (2) fewer investments by purchase of promissory notes, (3) fewer marriage ceremonies and smaller expenditure incurred, and (4) to the comparatively lower expenditure on the *gōswāmi*'s estate in Surat.

As the Thaltej minor (Ahmedabad District) is being educated at Sanand he has now to stay there and hence the expenditure of Rs. 41 on maintenance and Rs. 10 on books, school fees, etc.

The total expenditure in the Kaira District amounted to Rs. 746 only as compared with Rs. 2,234 in 1903 when a promissory note of the face value of Rs. 1,000 was purchased and Rs. 341 spent on a marriage.

There were no fluctuations worth notice in expenditure of the estates in the Panch Maháls and Broach Districts.

In Surat the decrease of nearly Rs. 5,000 is due to the abnormal expenditure incurred in the year 1903 under "Other expenditure" against estate No. 5, that of Shri Gōswāmi.

The expenditure in Thána during the period under report was much less than in the preceding year for the reason that boarding charges of the minor for 4½ years were paid in lump in 1903.

5. The agricultural lands of minors under the guardianship of the Collectors are managed departmentally by the respective Mámlatdárs as far as possible on the same system as lands in Government villages, and shops and houses are leased to tenants wherever obtainable. Some minors till the lands themselves. The estate of Shri Gōswāmi of Surat, which consists of numerous temples, shops, houses and lands, is managed by the Ráo Báhádur Mukundrai Manirai, a pensioned Subordinate Judge, for an annual lump remuneration of Rs. 1,000.

The immoveable property in charge of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer mostly consists of lands in tálukdári villages and is managed departmentally by the establishment employed under that officer in the different tálukás for the management of estates generally.

The total area of lands under management during the period under report was about 288,258 acres as compared with 263,895 reported last year. The

increase is due to eight new estates having been taken under guardianship by the Tálukdári Settlement Officer and the area of lands belonging to the *gôswámi* of Surat being more accurately ascertained.

It may be stated here that the area of certain tálukdári estates in the Ahmedabad District cannot be ascertained, as the sharers get their shares according to *dókdás*, *i. e.*, according to percentage calculations.

It may be noted that an important estate in the division, that of Kerwáda, was omitted from the Broach report last year, presumably through oversight. The Thákor having attained his majority the estate was formally handed over to him with due ceremony by the Commissioner Mr. Lawrence in January 1904. The Thákor has received his estate in an unencumbered and generally prosperous condition with a large balance invested in landed property. The young Thákor was educated at the Ráj Kumár College, and, being an intelligent man of active habits, will, it may be hoped, manage his property well.

On the wards who have attained or will shortly attain their majority the Tálukdári Settlement Officer and the Collectors concerned should keep a watchful eye. Such of them as can be trusted to manage their own estates will doubtless be given such management, and in the case of those who either have encumbered estates or cannot be trusted to manage the estates continued management by a department of Government is in their best interests.

The improved conditions of the year 1903-1904 influenced by a more regular rainfall in 1903 are reflected in the receipts of some of the estates, while in the case of others there was nothing noticeable concerning the effects of the season.

6. The value of the moveable property of the estates in the division was Rs. 2,37,788 against Rs. 1,22,815 mentioned in the last report. The chief cause of such an abnormal increase of almost cent. per cent. over the last year's figure is that an inventory was made and the value ascertained of the moveable property of Shri Gôswámi of Surat who is the hereditary high priest of a celebrated Vaishnáv temple. The *gôswámi's* property alone is reported to be worth Rs. 1,10,528, and in Kaira also there is an appreciable rise of Rs. 26,946 over the last year's figure, mainly due to the accession of the two estates of Mogar and Napad which alone brought in over Rs. 25,000. The increase in Broach and the Panch Maháls is trifling and calls for no remark, but a decrease of Rs. 24,464 in the value of such property is noticed in Ahmedabad, which is presumably due to more correct estimates having been framed by the Tálukdári Settlement Officer who manages 43 out of the 44 estates under guardianship in that district.

7. The total liabilities of the estates in the division, both Government and other, amounted to Rs. 7,60,139, of which Rs. 6,07,392 still remain to be paid.

Liabilities of the estates.

No. 6, Pipli (Gagubhai).
No. 12, Ambli (Dadubha).
No. 22, Lolía (Gagubha).
No. 26, Thori (Thamba Punjbha).
No. 31, Kherwa (Umar-khan Modji, etc).

There is a perceptible increase in the Ahmedabad District, due to the liabilities of the estates in the Tálukdári Settlement Officer's statement (and noted in the margin) having since been definitely ascertained.

The increase in the amounts of Government and other debts is mostly due to advances of *tagávi* and to the accumulation of interest on loans, etc. Owing to a succession of bad years no material progress has been made in liquidating debts, and nothing more is expected to be done in this direction till the return of favourable seasons.

The Tálukdári Settlement Officer is not confident of the correctness of the figures supplied by Mám latdárs, and his impression is that these figures are approximations only, except in the cases where payments have been made in liquidation of debts, as until then no searching enquiry is made. He hopes to secure greater accuracy and more intelligent compilation in future.

No loans were raised during the period to meet the current expenses of management of any estates.

8. The minor of Thaltej in the Ahmedabad District is being educated at Sanand under the supervision of the Mámlatdár.

Education of minors. Most of the minors under the guardianship of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer receive little or no education. Of those that do some receive it by private tuition and some in schools in their own village or in towns near their place of residence.

It had been arranged to send the minor Shermia Bapumia of Dholka to the Aligadh College but this was postponed as he was still very young and he was being well looked after at Dholka, his education included. The sanction of the District Judge has now been obtained to the boy being sent to Aligadh next year.

The Tálukdári Settlement Officer Mr. Mead, on the general question of education of the minors, states :—

“The question of providing minors and other boys of the tálukdári class with a special course of education suited to their needs came under consideration and is still engaging my attention. It may be hoped that the scheme will soon take a practical form as the suggestion is already meeting with considerable support, but no steps can be taken till good seasons recur and contributions by the tálukdárs are possible. The necessity for a cheap school which will impart a really sound training to future managers of estates is obvious. The operations of this department are continually being nullified by the stupidity and weakness of character almost universally displayed by those for whom we work.”

In Kaira out of the seven minors only two are below 12 years of age, the other being grown up boys of over 17. Both the Dhunadra boys stay at Petlád where they receive religious education under a *shástri*. The two Bhetáshi boys have left school and cultivate their own lands. These six boys are well reported on, but the Kapadvanj boy has shown no signs of improvement.

The Collector of the Panch Maháls writes :—

“The Thákor of MehloI is extremely backward and ignorant and has by his idleness and irregularity wasted his opportunity for study at the Godhra High School. Soon after the conclusion of the year under report he attained his legal majority, but as he was quite unfit to assume the management of his estate it was brought under management under section 28 of the Gujarát Tálukdári Act, VI of 1888 (*vide* Government Resolution No. 863 of 2nd February 1905).

“The Thákor of Mehtral is a bright lad who promises well, has fairly good capacity and is likely to do well. He has been attending the Godhra Telang High School throughout the year.

“The education of the Náik of Tahda has been completed so far as the vernacular course is concerned. He is, I believe, well behaved and well dispositioned.

“The Náik of Shivrájpur has been educated up to 5th vernacular standard and is reported to be of unsteady habits.”

In Broach some of the minors go to school and they are looked after by the Mámlatdárs. The Sutrel minor does not learn as there is no school in that village, while the Dahri boy is said to be very idle.

Of the Surat minors, Nos. 1 and 3 have completed their education, and No. 3 having also attained his majority the management of his estate has been handed over to him. Nos. 2 and 4 are studying at Navsári and Areth respectively, and No. 5 Shri Góswámi is receiving religious and secular education at home from a *shástri*. The conduct of all has been good.

The only minor in Thána attended for some time the vernacular school at Sháhpur, but, as he attained his majority on 1st June 1904, his property has been given over to him.

9. In Broach two civil suits for the recovery of debts of Rs. 1,499 and Rs. 399 are pending on behalf of the minors of Shukaltirth and Derol respectively.

Litigation.

As reported last year the suit filed against minor No. 5 of Surat (Shri Góswámi) in the Court of the Sub-Judge of Benáres for the recovery of Rs. 9,840, due to an idol at Benares, was decided against the *góswámi*, and the amount will be paid off in due course. Evidently the intention of preferring an appeal has been abandoned.

There has been no important litigation in connection with the estates in the Ahmedabad District, except Gangad. The application of Bái Majirajba, the

step-grandmother of the Gangad minor, to the High Court in connection with the settlement of the debts of the estate, referred to in the last report, is still pending. Further, a certain Ramsing, describing himself as the son of Bái Motiba, widow of a cadet of the Gangad family, has sued in *forma pauperis* for a declaration that he is heir to the Gangad Estate on the ground that the High Court's decision which confirmed the present Thákor Juvausingji as heir was given during his minority. The same Bái Motiba has filed a suit, contesting the right of the Thákor to levy *jama* from her for certain *jiwai* lands in her possession. Both suits were pending at the close of the year.

There has been no litigation in connection with any of the estates in Kaira, the Panch Maháls and Thána.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit the report on the administration of the minors' estates in the Central Division, for the seven months ending with the 31st July 1904, as directed by Government Resolution No. 2, dated the 4th January 1905.

2. I attach a statement showing the minors' estates under the management of Collectors in this Division. At the commencement of the period under report there were nine such estates, against 7 in the previous year; two each under the Collectors of Násik and Sholápur and five under the Collector of Sátára. Of the two new estates one the Devargaon estate in Násik had come under the management of the Collector too near the close of the year of the last report, for particulars regarding it to be available for that report. The estate of the minor Usafali in Sholápur came under the management of the Collector of Sholápur on the 22nd August 1903, but was omitted by an oversight from the Collector's report for that year. The persons of the three Násik minors are under the joint guardianship of their mothers and the Collector. Of the two Sholápur minors one is in charge of the District Judge of Sholápur and the other, in charge of Khán Bahádur Pir Mahomed Dafedár, a Mahomedan gentleman and an Honorary Magistrate of Sholápur. Of the seven minors in the Sátára District, four are in charge of their mothers, and the other three, in charge of other relations.

3. As this report is for seven months only financial comparisons with the previous year cannot be made with profit, and there is nothing very striking to mention in the receipts of the estates during the period under report.

Owing no doubt to the broken period none of the Collectors have supplied the information required in paragraph 2 of Government Resolution No. 2, dated the 4th January 1905, but they are being asked not to overlook the point in future reports.

4. Under the heading "other expenditure" (column 18 of the statement), there is an increase of Rs. 1,430 in the expenditure of Chandori (No. 1 in the statement). This increase was due to the payment of arrears of cash allowances to village Hakdárs and others for 3 years from 1901-02 to 1903-04. In respect of the Bokil minors in Sátára (No. 6 of the statement), the increase of Rs. 330 over the figures reported in the statement for 1903 is due to expenditure on the marriage of Narayan (the elder of the Bokil minors), for which Rs. 400 were sanctioned. No important fluctuations occurred in expenditure in the case of any other minor.

5. The practice of leasing out the agricultural lands, houses and shops of the minors was continued in the period under report. Nothing noticeable in this connection is reported in regard to any of the estates. There were no acquisitions or transfers of immovable property except in the Bársi estate, and in the Shinde estate in Sátára. In the Bársi estate 35 acres (assessed at Rs. 24), reported to have been held in liquidation of debts for fixed periods, were relinquished. In the Shinde estate 4 acres of inám land passed out of the possession of the minor by a Civil Court's decree and 5 acres of mortgaged rayatawa land were restored to his possession.

No effect of the season is noticeable in the case of any estate.

6. There were no important fluctuations in moveable property.

7. The liabilities of the Usafali (Sholapur) and Devargaon (Násik) estates have not yet been fully ascertained. The debt of the Chandori (Násik) estate is due to a single sowkar and steps have been taken to liquidate it from savings by yearly instalments. As regards the Ghatge minor of Malavdi (Sátára) no special arrangement exists at present for the liquidation of the liabilities. But debts to the extent of nearly Rs. 11,000 were discharged during the period under report. The total liabilities on this estate still amount to Rs. 39,000 exclusive of interest, and they will shortly increase as the nuptials of the minor's sister are in contemplation and it is proposed to raise a loan of Rs. 12,000 for the purpose. The charges of the minor's education are also likely, it is said, to increase by Rs. 6,000, which will have to be obtained by a loan. The draft of a mortgage deed for a loan of Rs. 39,000 from the Sávantwádi State has been approved by Government letter No. 2310, dated the 10th April 1905, Political Department.

8. The minor Hingne of Chandori and the elder of the Devargaon minors attend the Násik High School, and a special tutor has been appointed for each of them. The other Devargaon minor attends a vernacular school at Násik. The minor Ghatge of Malavdi (Sátára) resides at Baroda for his education. The minor Rajopadhye of Visápur (Sátára) has passed the 2nd Grade Public Service Examination and is still attending the Sátára High School. Private tutors have been appointed for the education of the two Deshpande minors of Kolewadi (Sátára).

The Chandori minor is reported to have shown no improvement in his conduct, previously referred to in the preamble to Government Resolution No. 1482, dated the 25th April 1904, Financial Department. The conduct of the other boys appears to have been satisfactory.

9. As regards the two suits relating to the Chandori estate referred to in the last report, the Collector has failed in the appeal preferred by him in one, while in the other the decision given in favour of the estate has been confirmed. In connection with the Devargaon estate suits are being filed for the recovery of debts advanced before the estate came under administration. None of the Sátára estates except those of Ghatge and Shinde are engaged in much litigation. In the case of the Hagre minor of Bársi one suit was filed in the Conciliator's Court during the period under report. In the case of the Usafali minor the institution of a regular suit for the restoration of the greater portion of the inám lands which are at present in the wrongful possession of one Papa Miya Khatib, a relation of the minor, is under contemplation.

In compliance with para. 1 of Government Resolution No. 2 of 4th January last, I have the honour to submit the Report on the Administration of Minors' Estates for the 7 months ending 31st July 1904.

2. There were six estates under guardianship at the beginning of the period under report; three were added, so that the total number under management at the end of the period was 9.

It is to be explained that in the case of estate No. 1, of the late Baba Maharaj of Poona situated in Belgaum and Ratnágiri Districts, the Collector of Belgaum has been appointed Manager under Section 9 of Regulation VIII of 1827 by the District Judge of Poona, pending the settlement of a dispute between two litigants who, each, claim to be entitled to it by reason of adoption by the now deceased Tai Maharaj, widow of Baba Maharaj. There is therefore as yet no recognized heir to the estate and column 2 of the accompanying statement—name of minor—is accordingly left blank.

In the case of estate No. 2, the person of the minor was not in charge of the Collector until April 1904, when his mother Bhagirthibai, who had acted hitherto as his guardian, suddenly died. Thereafter a house at Belgaum was engaged for the minor Desai and his brother; and the management of the household placed in the hands of a trustworthy Lingáyat Tutor, who also looks to the home education of the minor. The other minors were all under the care of their relatives as shown below:—

3. Estates Nos. 1, 3 and 4 came under management for the first time during the period under report. In case No. 3, the income from the lands (Rs. 1,519) has not been fully realised and the Collector of Dhárwár's attention is being called to the point. There were no material fluctuations in the income of the other estates, except in the case of Nos. 2 and 6. In the case of No. 2, of the Rs. 10,972 (column 13) representing produce of land Rs. 6,465 were on account of 1903-04 and the rest on account of previous year's arrears; of the latter there still remain Rs. 25,812 to be collected. The outstandings (Rs. 4,507 for 1903-04 and Rs. 25,812 for past years) are considerably large, and the Collector's attention has already been drawn to the matter, with a view to their remission in deserving cases and speedy recovery in others. The fall of Rs. 1,502 in the receipts from

the produce of land in the case of estate No. 6, the Collector of Dhárwár thus explains:—

(1) The annual rents of some fields have not been recovered from the tenants concerned as yet; steps are being taken to recover the same.

(2) The fields under usufructory mortgages were restored to the owners concerned after the recovery of last year's rent (Rs. 285).

The income of this estate from other sources includes Rs. 8,000 credited by the guardian for the purchase of promissory notes.

4. There was nothing noticeable in the expenditure of the several estates, except that in the case of No. 2, Rs. 5,000 were spent on the marriage ceremony of the minor's sister.

5. No agricultural land is managed departmentally. It is generally leased out for a number of years for fixed cash rents. Houses have been let for rent. There was nothing noticeable in the effect of the season on the estates. No important property was acquired or surrendered on behalf of any estate-owner.

6. There were no fluctuations worth notice in the moveable property.

7. Estate No. 3 excepted, which is indebted to the extent of Rs. 4,100, all the others are free from any liabilities. As regards this estate, the Collector of Dhárwár states that any surplus remaining over and above the expenditure will be applied for the liquidation of the debts. No loans were raised for the management of any estate.

8. Minor No. 3 is very young and does not attend school. No. 5 is receiving private tuition at Hombal owing to plague at Gadag. The second of the two minors of estate No. 6 has just commenced to attend the vernacular school at Hombal, where he lives with his mother. No. 7 is receiving no tuition, as his income is too small to allow education being given him in a place where there is a school. It is perhaps too late for him to go to school now, he being already over 18. The Collector of Kolába writes that the second of the two minors in his charge has been going to school since 31st July last, *i. e.*, after the end of the period under report. The first is too old to begin to attend the school: he is now past 17. The other minors, who are regularly attending schools, are all reported to have progressed and behaved satisfactorily.

9. There is a Civil Court decree for Rs. 10,200 against the adoptive mother of the minor No. 3; and its execution is said to be in progress. The estate has also a debt of Rs. 4,100. The total liabilities against it would seem large compared with its income of Rs. 1,500, and the Collector's attention will be drawn to the advisability of effecting some compromise with the judgment-creditor, so that the lands may not be sold away from the estate. A certain person has filed a suit against the minors of the 6th estate for the redemption of mortgaged lands in the Civil Court which is yet pending. There was no litigation regarding the other estates.

10. A statement showing the income from lands of the several wards and the Land Revenue payable thereon required by Government Resolution No. 2 of 1905, § 2 is attached. Generally the income exceeds double the assessment. In Belgaum where it is slightly less, in the case of estate No. 2, the explanation is that the lands include those in possession of persons rendering service to the Desgat and enjoying the profits after paying only the Judi theron. The Collector further adds that as the lands are leased out by auction, some fetch bids in excess of assessment and some less for want of competition.

I have the honour to submit the report on the Administration of Minors' Estates in the province of Sind for the seven months ending 31st July 1904.

Assumption and relinquishment of estates during the year.

2. The total number of estates under guardianship on the 1st January 1904 was 78. Of these, three were relinquished, two owing to the minors having attained majority and one owing to the minor's death. One estate, that of Kaimkhan and Balochkhan (No. 76) in the Upper Sind Frontier district, was newly taken up, so that the number under guardianship on the 31st July 1904 was 76. In the case of 17 estates only are the persons of the minors under the Collector's guardianship. The owners of the remaining estates are in the charge of their near relations.

Income.

3. Estates Nos. 1 and 2 are non-agricultural estates. The latter shows a decrease of Rs. 1,648 due to the recovery, in the preceding year, of a larger amount of debts due to the estate than this year. The sum of Rs. 4,505 appearing in the statement as the income of this estate is made up as under:—

Estates Nos. 3 to 5 comprise agricultural lands. No. 3 was leased out for Rs. 470, the assessment being paid by the lessee, as against Rs. 450 in the year 1902-03; Rs. 220 were recovered during the period under report and Rs. 260 after the close of the year. The sum of Rs. 10 recovered in excess has been refunded, *vide* entry in column 18 of the statement. Estate No. 4 realised the same amount as last year, *viz.*, Rs. 132 plus the assessment of Rs. 55 paid by the lessee. Estate No. 5, for the leasing of which arrangements could not be completed last year, was leased for Rs. 152, of which Rs. 127 only were recovered during the period under report.

Hyderabad district. The most noticeable fluctuations are—

(a) a decrease of Rs. 1,680 in the income of estate No. 6 due to the rabi produce not having been sold during the period under report;

(b) an apparent increase of Rs. 3,764 under the head "produce of land" against estate No. 9. The real increase amounts to Rs. 255, which is due to increased cultivation. The rest represents the amount of assessment paid by the lessee to Government on behalf of the estate. In the previous year such assessment was not accounted for in the statement as part of the estate's income.

There has been a considerable falling off in the income of estate No. 16, namely, from Rs. 31,482 in the last year to Rs. 19,039 during the period under report. In the case of this estate the arrangements for the cultivation of the land are left in the hands of the minor's relation Wadero Ilahi Baksh Bhuto, who after deducting all expenses of cultivation and of the minor's maintenance credits the net balance only. Owing to the details of expenditure not being available, it is not possible to state whether the falling off is due to the decrease in the gross income or to an increase in expenditure or to both these causes, but part of the decrease is no doubt due to the fact that the produce shown last year was for 12 months whereas that shown this year is only for 7 months. Estate No. 35 was leased for Rs. 150, but as the lease money was recovered after the close of the year no income is shown in column 13 against this estate. As the land in this estate was not cultivated by the lessees, column 10 "land revenue payable" and column 19 "Government dues" are both blank. No income is shown against estates Nos. 46 and 47; for lack of water-supply and owing to insufficient rainfall no part of the land comprising them could be cultivated. In the case of estate No. 42 the land was leased out in the year 1903-1904 and the instalments have only this year fallen due, which accounts for the increase. Estate No. 45 shows an increase in the produce of land from Rs. 600 in the last year to Rs. 4,033 during the period under report. The increase is due to the instalments due last year (for which postponement was allowed) having been recovered during the period under report, and also to the figures of assessment (Rs. 2,362) paid direct by the lessees having now been included in columns 13 and 16. The latter reason accounts also for the increase in the income of other estates. The income from other sources shown in column 14 consists chiefly of rent from shops and houses.

The total receipts were Rs. 24,871 of which Rs. 15,551 was realised from agricultural land and Rs. 9,320 from other sources. The Government assessment on the agricultural land belonging to the minors amounted to Rs. 7,294 of which Rs. 9 only in the case of estate No. 57 was paid departmentally, the rest being paid by the lessees to whom the estates were leased. The increase of Rs. 7,207 under "produce of land" over the figures of last year (which amounted only to Rs. 8,314) is due partly to increased cultivation and partly to the assessment paid direct by the lessees not having been included in the figures of last year.

The unusual increase in the income from other sources which rose from Rs. 5,400 in the last year to Rs. 9,320 during the period under report is due to the inclusion in the present report of two items of Rs. 273 and 7,000 recovered on account of the debts due to the estates of the minors Balumal (estate No. 54) and Abdulkadar (estate No. 59).

The opening balance of the two estates (column 12) does not correspond with the closing balance as shown in columns 19 and 20 of the statement appended to the last report owing to the rectification of some mistakes made last year.

The total income from the produce of the land (column 13 of the statement) shows an increase of Rs. 35,715. This is due to the figures of assessment paid direct by the lessees (Rs. 48,715) having been included in this column. As a matter of fact there was a decrease of Rs. 13,000 which the Deputy Commissioner attributes to the present report covering a period of 7 months only.

The sum of Rs. 3,850 shown as "other income" of estate No. 65 is made up of the following two items:—

The income of estate No. 67 from land was Rs. 829 (exclusive of Rs. 138 being the estimated price of grain given to the minors from the produce of land) against Rs. 1,924 in the preceding year. The decrease is due to the injury to crops by locusts and

deficient water-supply. This estate was managed departmentally during the period under report and has been leased from 1904-1905. The minor Fateh Muhammed, estate No. 68 (No. 71 of the statement for the last year), does not hold land. As stated last year his father was killed, and according to the decision of the Council of Elders he was awarded Rs. 1,000 from the fine inflicted on the accused. The sentence was passed in July 1898 and the amount has been recovered from time to time as under:—

Estates Nos. 69 to 71 and 74.—All show an increase under “produce of land” owing to the assessment paid direct by the lessees not having been included in the figures of last year and also in the case of estates Nos. 71 and 74 to increased cultivation due to good inundation. Estate No. 72 has been leased from 1904-05. The assets of estate No. 76 consist of a sum of Rs. 2,000 awarded to the minors under a decision of the Council of Elders issued under the Sind Frontier Regulations as compensation for the murder of their father. A sum of Rs. 63 has accrued on account of interest and is included in the amount shown in column 14.

Expenditure.

4. The decrease in the cost of maintenance which fell from Rs. 1,275 in the last year to Rs. 719 during the period under report is due to 7 months' figures only having been incorporated in the present statement. No maintenance charges are shown against estate No. 5, as the minors are supported by their relations. The increase under “Government dues” is nominal, being due to the fact that unlike last year the figures of assessment paid direct by the lessees have been included in this column. In the case of estate No. 3 in which the land revenue (column 10) appears to have absorbed more than half the total income from the land, it must be explained that the figure does not include the Rs. 260 which were recovered from the lessee after the close of the year. Taking this amount into account the incidence of land revenue on the income is reduced to 44 per cent. In the case of the other two agricultural estates the percentage is 29 in the case of estate No. 4 and 21 in case of estate No. 5.

The decrease under “other expenditure” is due to the inclusion, in last year's figures, of the large sum of Rs. 2,000 paid by estate No. 2 in liquidation of a claim. The sum of Rs. 774 shown against this estate is made up of the following items:—

The decrease under the head “cost of maintenance” is chiefly due to the figures for 1903 being for 12 months and those now given for 7 months only. No maintenance allowance was awarded to the minor of estate No. 13 who lives on the produce of his cattle. In the case of Nos. 11, 14 and 15 the disbursement of the allowance was made after July and No. 6 was paid in kind instead of in cash. The head “Government dues” shows an increase notwithstanding the fact that the assessment due on estates Nos. 6 and 8 was paid after the period of the report. This is due to the figures of assessment paid direct by the lessees being included in this head during the period under report.

The proportion of the Government assessment on the estates in this district, which are all agricultural, is 49.95 of the gross income of the land, which is inclusive of the assessment paid by the lessees but exclusive of the profits of the lessees and the income of estate No. 8 realised after the 31st July 1904.

Under the head "other expenditure" important variations are noticeable only against estates Nos. 9, 10 and 12. The marked decrease in the figures of the estate No. 9 is due to last year's expenditure including a large sum on account of expenditure on canal clearances and the death of the minor's mother. The expenditure of estates Nos. 10 and 12 increased owing to the carrying out of repairs to old buildings and the construction of a new house.

The total expenditure during the period under report amounted to Rs. 43,830 against Rs. 31,417 in the preceding year. Lárkána district. The increase is nominal being due to the figures of assessment paid direct by the lessees having been included in column 16 "Government dues", whereas last year these figures were excluded from it. The figures appearing under the head "other expenditure" represent for the most part cost of repairs to houses belonging to the minors. In the case of estate No. 19 a sum of Rs. 100 was given to the minor for the opening of a new shop and in the case of No. 27 Rs. 120 were paid for the purchase of immovable property in the interests of the minor. No maintenance allowance is shown against estate No. 16 because the minor's relation Wadero Illahibaksh Bhuto credits the net balance of the estate after deducting the expenses of cultivation as well as of maintenance. In the case of all the remaining 11 estates against which no maintenance allowance is shown in column 15 of the statement, the minors are supported by their near relatives. No entry has been made in column 16 "Government dues" against estates Nos. 46 and 47 because the land comprised in them yielded nothing owing to the inferiority of the soil. The land revenue payable on estates Nos. 19 and 35 was recovered after the close of the year. The sum of Rs. 357 shown against estate No. 37, which is a jágir, represents only the jágir cess and hakabo paid on the estate.

The percentage of the total assessment to the gross income of all the estates in this district is 58 per cent., but if the profits of the lessees and the expenses of cultivation and maintenance (the details of which are not available) in the case of estate No. 16, which is by far the wealthiest estate in this district, were known and could be taken into consideration, the percentage would be much reduced.

The total expenditure during the period under report amounted to Rs. 10,662. Sukkur district. Of this Rs. 2,612 were paid on account of the cost of the maintenance of the minors as against Rs. 5,080 in the past year, the decrease being due to the present report covering a period of seven months only. No maintenance allowance is shown against eight of the estates belonging to this district owing to the minors being maintained by their guardians. The Government assessment on the estates amounted to Rs. 7,294 as against Rs. 8 only in the past year, the increase being due to the fact that a sum of Rs. 7,285 representing the amount of assessment paid direct by the lessees has been included in the figures of the present report. The proportion of Government assessment to the gross income from agricultural produce (Rs. 15,551) is 47 per cent. exclusive of the profits of the lessees which must have been at least as much as the assessment, and of Rs. 1,672 outstanding against the lessees of estate No. 57. If, however, the excluded amounts are taken into consideration the percentage of assessment would be much reduced and the net produce would be at least double the assessment.

Of the sum of Rs. 756 shown as "other expenditure" Rs. 350 were spent on the marriage of Chimanlal (estate No. 48) and the rest on repairs of buildings, civil suit expenses, cost of medicines, etc.

Thar and Párkar district. The Deputy Commissioner explains as follows the absence of any figures in column 15 (cost of maintenance) :—

"Estate No. 65.—One of the minors is a girl living with her mother. The other is a boy Ghulam Hussain who also lives with his mother when at home, but when at the Madressah he is supplied with money for his maintenance which is debited to his share of the income.

"Estate No. 66.—The minors continue under the guardianship of their maternal uncle who is also the lessee of their land and maintains them."

The explanation as regards estate No. 65 is not clear. The other two co-owners of the estate who are majors, and one of whom is in England studying for the Bar, must require some money for their maintenance, and as no partition of the estate has been carried out they doubtless draw their allowances from the joint funds. The Deputy Commissioner will be asked to report further on this point.

The increase under "Government dues" is due to the figures of assessment paid direct by the lessees having been included in this head during the period under report.

The incidence of Government assessment on the gross income is 64 per cent. in the case of estate No. 65 and 53 per cent. in that of estate No. 66. These are large percentages, but the lessees' profits are not included in the gross income.

Out of the sum of Rs. 16,456 shown as "other expenditure" against estate No. 65, Rs. 3,062 was spent on the purchase of promissory notes for Rs. 3,000, and Rs. 10,000 was drawn by the two majors, Rs. 5,000 by the elder (Ghulam Muhammed) for the purpose of awarding scholarships at the Madressah and a similar amount by the younger (Jan Muhammad) to meet the expenses of his marriage.

Upper Sind Frontier district. The most noticeable fluctuations are—

(a) an increase from Rs. 1,132 to Rs. 2,719 under the head "Government dues"; and

(b) a decrease from Rs. 1,197 to Rs. 265 under "other expenditure".

The former is due to the inclusion this year of the Government assessment paid by the lessees. The latter occurs chiefly in the case of estates Nos. 67 and 72 and is due to the heavy expenditure on account of canal clearances last year.

The proportion of Government assessment (Rs. 2,767) to the gross income from the produce of land (Rs. 4,348) is 63.6 per cent. If, however, the profits of the lessees are taken into consideration (which could not have been less than the assessment paid), the net produce will be nearly double the assessment.

Management of Immoveable property.

Out of the 76 estates under management 54 have been wholly given out on lease, 13 estates are under departmental management and 2 (estates Nos. 16 and 74) are managed partly departmentally and partly by lease. In 5 estates there are no agricultural lands to lease. The remaining 7 estates are accounted for as shown below:

- (1) Estate No. 6, which was formerly leased was not re-leased this year in view of its impending restoration. It has since been relinquished.
- (2) Estate No. 11 is managed departmentally, but will be leased as soon as a suit filed against the creditors for the clearance of accounts under section 16 of the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act has been disposed of.
- (3) and (4) As explained last year estate No. 19 consists only of a garden of date-trees the produce of which is sold annually, and estate No. 18 is cultivated by the minor and his eldest brothers, the produce being appropriated by them in lieu of a maintenance allowance.
- (5) Estate No. 52 has no water-supply as was reported last year and no attempt has yet been made to improve it on account of want of funds.
- (6) and (7) The property of estates Nos. 61 and 63 is mortgaged and their produce is appropriated by the mortgagees in lieu of their debts against the minors.

The period of 7 months to which this report appertains belongs to the revenue year 1903-04, which proved to be an excellent one on the whole, but as most of the estates were leased the profits from them remain unchanged. In the Upper Sind Frontier district, however, the good effects of the excellent inundation were completely nullified by the ravages of insect pests. During the period under report the following changes occurred in the properties held by the minors:—

Estate No. 2.—Four plots measuring 1,397 square yards, situated in the town of Karachi were acquired on behalf of the minors from the debtors of the estate in satisfaction of outstanding debts.

Estate No. 17.—41 acres were received in satisfaction of debts due to the minor.
Estate No. 25.—193 acres were handed over to the minors' co-sharers in the estate on partition carried out in accordance with the award of the District Court.

Estate No. 27.—9 acres were acquired by purchase as a consequence of the settlement of the minors' share in some land held by him jointly with others.

Estate No. 32.—9 acres were acquired in settlement of the minors' shares in certain land.

Moveable property.

6. The only important fluctuations under this head are the following :—

Estate No. 2.—A sum of Rs. 3,172 was realised by the sale of some jewellery (value Rs. 2,800) held in pledge on behalf of the estate. The debtors were given notice last year through the Press to redeem their property within one month of the date of publication of the notice, but they failed to do so.

Estate No. 14.—The surplus cattle belonging to the minors were sold for Rs. 260.

} The difference in the value of moveable property of these 3 estates as shown in the statement attached to the report and as shown last year is Rs. 481, 1,292 and 4,565 respectively. This is due to the rectification of errors made last year in showing the value of properties.

Liabilities of the Estates.

7. Out of the 76 estates under management 48 are without debts. The following remarks explain what has been done or is being done to liquidate the debts of the remaining 28 indebted estates :—

The sum of Rs. 6,000 shown as liabilities against estate No. 5 represents a debt incurred by a near relation of the minor before the estate came under management, 3 survey numbers (in 2 of which the minors had a $\frac{1}{4}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$ share respectively) having been mortgaged as security for the loan. The District Court of Karáchi at the instance of the plaintiff has issued a prohibitory order against the leasing of these numbers which order is still in force.

An arrangement for the liquidation of the liabilities of estate No. 11 will be made by the Collector as soon as the suit for the clearance of the accounts under section 16 of the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act has been decided. With regard to estate No. 13 it has been arranged to liquidate the liability by yearly instalments of which one of Rs. 50 has been paid during the period under report. The creditors of estate No. 14 have agreed to receive a payment down of Rs. 750 in satisfaction of the entire claim (Rs. 1,018) and arrangements will be made accordingly. Estate No. 15 is expected to be cleared of its liabilities in the current year.

The creditors of estate No. 17 were paid Rs. 1,418 only. More was not paid because they have not yet settled the dispute existing among themselves as to their respective shares. They have been informed that no interest will be allowed them for the time this question remains unsettled.

The liabilities of the estates in this district are the same as reported last year, *viz.*, Rs. 7,392. Rs. 575 have, however, since been paid on account of the private debts of estate No. 62

and will appear in the next report. As stated last year the lands in the case of estates Nos. 61 and 63 are in the possession of mortgagees who appropriate the produce in gradual discharge of their claims.

The amounts shown as liabilities against estates Nos. 71 and 74 have been paid since the 31st July 1904. The amounts shown against estate No. 67 will be paid shortly. Rs. 63 are paid annually towards the liquidation of debts of estate No. 69.

Education of Minors.

8. Miss Ethel Maud Gray (estate No. 1) being now 18 years of age has left the Grammar School and has been permitted to live with her aunt at Lahore. Minor Tarumal (estate No. 2) is still working as an apprentice in a native firm and has made fairly good progress in book-keeping. Rajhumal, Monabai and Totabai, the other minors of estate No. 2, are still being educated in primary schools and are reported to be well behaved. The six Mahomedan minors of estates Nos. 3 to 5 are not receiving any education for the reason reported last year. Their conduct continues to be good.

Of the three minors whose persons are under the Collector's guardianship the estate of two, viz., Mir Muhammad and Fakir Muhammad has since been released and the Collector states that orders have been issued for sending the third, Kando, of estate No. 15, to school. Minors Ali Muhammad (estate No. 10) and Ibrahim (estate No. 13) are not receiving any education. The Collector has ordered minor Rakhio (estate No. 11) to be sent to school. All the other minors receive education in Government schools with the exception of Khair Muhammad of estate No. 9 who is receiving private tuition.

Of the 39 male minors under the Collector's management 16 receive education, 6 at the Lárkána Madressah, 1 at the Karáchi Madressah and the rest in various schools. Of the remaining 23, 2 are under 6 years of age, 2 Hindus (estate No. 35) have as stated last year passed the Third Grade Public Service Examination and are in Government service and 1 (Nur Muhammad, estate No. 32) who was last year studying at the Karáchi Madressah, passed the Matriculation and the School Final Examinations. His estate will soon be discharged. The remaining 18 minors are following the avocations of their fathers. The minors studying at the Lárkána Madressah are making satisfactory progress with the exception of Nawab Khudadkhan (estate No. 37). Out of the 16 minors receiving education the persons of 6 are under the Collector's guardianship.

Of the 34 minors under guardianship 12 are girls: 10 attend the school and 12 do not. The Collector does not mention what endeavours were made to induce the latter to go to school.

Gulam Muhammad of estate No. 65 has been educated in the Aligarh College and has now gone to England, it is reported, to qualify himself for the Bar. His brother Jan Muhammad has reached the VI standard in vernacular, and the youngest Gulam Hussain is studying in the Madressah at Karáchi. Oladishah of estate No. 66 is learning in a Mullah school in the village of his uncle Sayad Maujalishah and will be sent to the Madressah at Pithoro when it is started. The rest of the minors in this district are girls.

Of the 19 minors under guardianship 2 are girls, 5 go to school and one is under 6 years of age. The Deputy Commissioner states that the persons of all the minors are in charge of their relations.

Litigation.

9. One fresh suit was filed against Muhammad Hassan and other debtors of estate No. 2. The case has not progressed beyond the framing of issues. Of the 5 suits on behalf of the

same estate pending from the year 1903, 4 were decided in favour of the minors and the execution of the decrees is awaited. The fifth also was decided in favour of the estate, but the Court's decision being *ex parte* an appeal has been lodged against it.

The suit filed last year against the creditors of estate No. 11 under section 16 of the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act has not yet been decided.
