SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Report on the Administration of the Minors' Estates in the Northern Division for the Revenue year 1906-07 in accordance with the orders in Government Resolution No. 8913, dated 16th December 1902. The Estates under the Court of Wards Act have also been dealt with in this Report as no separate Annual Report under that Act has yet been prescribed.

2. The total number of Estates under the guardianship of the Collectors in this Division and the Tálukdári Settlement Officer was 79 on the 1st of August 1906. 53 of these were under the Tálukdári Settlement Officer in the Districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira and Broach and 26 were with the Collectors. Those with the Tálukdári Settlement Officer were increased by 2, as 6 new Estates were added and 4 were released; out of the 6 new Estates, *viz.*, Nos. 2, 20, 33, 43, 50 and 53 of the statement 'A' Nos. 20 and 43 call for notice. No. 20 Khambhda is a Mulgameti estate and an application was made to the District Judge by the Collector of Ahmedabad at the instance of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer for the appointment of himself as guardian of the minor's property. The application was granted, but the minor's mother having subsequently taken objection to the arrangement, the order of appointment of the Collector as guardian was reversed. The estate in the meantime remained in the hands of the minor's mother and was not taken under actual management. The entry is therefore nominal. Similar is the case of estate No. 43 Vávdí Tagdí Bhikhuba, about which the Tálukdári Settlement Officer writes as follows:—

"The estate is a large one yielding a revenue of more than Rs. 10,000. It comprises several villages in Bhávnagar State territory besides the two villages of Vávdí and Tagdí in the Gogha Táluka. Danger to the well-being of the cultivators was apprehended, and in order to prevent interested relatives from taking undue advantage of the situation created by the death of the Tálukdár, the District Judge passed an *interim* order placing the property in charge of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer pending final disposal of the application. The Bhávnagar State authorities were twice addressed with a view to the remittance of the surplus revenues of the estate's property in the State territory, but no reply has been received from them. Strenuous efforts are being made by the minor's mother and other interested relatives to oppose the application and as the necessary information to rebut their contentions is not obtainable arrangements are being made to assume management of the estate under the Court of Wards Act. The matter has been submitted to Government whose orders are awaited."

The estates of the two minor step-brothers of No. 19 Khodubha Bhojarajji were also taken under management, but as they hold the estates in common with No. 19, no separate number is given to them. Of those released from management the two most important were Nadiád (No. 53, last year's statement) in the Nadiád Táluka and Ahima (No. 48, last year's statement) in the Anand Táluka of the Kaira District. The former with a large balance including promissory

notes of the value of Rs. 12,000 was restored to the two brothers who have received a fair education. The latter estate, that of Chhatrasingji Chandrasingji of Ahima in the A'nand Táluka, was referred to in paragraph 9 of the last year's report and about which the Tálukdári Settlement Officer writes as under:—

“The appeal filed in the High Court against the District Judge's order sanctioning a sum disproportionate to the estate's means for the marriage expenses of the minor's sister was withdrawn since the minor's attainment of majority precluded all possibility of limiting his expenditure. The estate has been handed over in a prosperous condition with a large balance.”

The other two estates (Nos. 4 and 49 of the last year's statement) released during the year call for no special remarks. Of the 26 with the Collectors last year, 6 (*viz.* No. 43, 55, 59, 60, 67 and 72) have been restored to the minor owners on their attaining majority, except No. 67, Shukeltirth), which was released under the orders of the District Court. Out of these 6, one (No. 59 of the last year's statement) Shivarajpur, a Tálukdári estate in the Panch Maháls District, has been taken under management by the Collector under Section 28 of the Gujarát Tálukdári Act on the death of the late Thákore. To the balance of 20, 4 have been newly added from Broach; Out of these two have been taken under management under the Guardian and Wards Act and 2 under the Court of Wards Act. Thus the number under guardianship during the year under report was as follows:—

A statement “A” giving particulars about each estate in the Division is appended, the necessary information as to who is in charge of the person of each minor being added in the last column.

#### *Income.*

3. The season was favourable to the kharíf crops of jowári and bájri while rabi crops, such as wheat, cotton and gram, suffered in Dhandhuka from deficient rain. The year was on the whole inferior to the preceding one and its effect was reflected in the receipts of the estates. They however increased in the Gogha Mahál on account of the fertility of mango trees. In the estates of the Dholka Táluka too the receipts increased to an appreciable extent. In the case of No. 29, Lolia Odhubha, the produce of land was nearly double that in the preceding year. But in some cases the figures of receipts were far below those of the preceding year. The sum of Rs. 8 shown as produce of land in column 13 against estate No. 31 Lolia Vakhatsing Vajesing represents merely the amount of past arrears. The rent of the land belonging to the estate during the year was not recovered as the lessee to whom the estate has been leased for a period of 7 years for Rs. 700 succeeded in avoiding all payment under various untenable pretexts. Similarly in the case of No. 32 Lolia Verubha only half the amount of the lease money was with difficulty recovered from the same lessee. Steps are in progress to effect the recovery of these amounts by coercive processes. The cause of decrease in the receipts of the Bhetashi estate No. 51 in the Borsad Táluka is ascribed by the Mámlatdár to the contumacy of the tenants.

In general, with regard to the fluctuations or apparent discrepancies in the figures of income of these estates, it may be noted here that most of the estates are managed under the crop-share system which owing to its elastic nature gives rise to considerable increase and decrease in the figures of realizations. Besides the local conditions, the absence of fixed rent-rolls and variations in prices affect the amount of Rajbhag (estate owner's share) in an estate.

The lands belonging to the estate have been leased to cultivators who pay only Government dues under an acknowledged custom. There is, therefore, no fluctuation in the income which was the same as last year, *viz.*, Rs. 32.

1 estate under the management of the Collector of Ahmedabad.

The income of both the estates under management was increased on account of greater recoveries of rent from the tenants and of dues from the debtors, the season being favourable. In the case of estate No. 57, the increase in column 14 is due to the fact that gold and silver ornaments of the value of Rs. 548 were sold by auction in satisfaction of a Civil Court decree and the sale-proceeds both of these ornaments and of cattle belonging to the minor were credited to this head.

2 estates under the management of the Collector of Kaira.

1 estate under the management of the Collector of the Panch Mahals.

In the case of estate No. 58, the decrease in column 13 is due to the inclusion in last year's figures of arrears of past years recovered during that year.

The figures of income derived from land show a slight decrease in many of the estates under management as arrears recovered during the year were less than those collected during the previous year. The increase in the case of estate No. 63 under "other income" (column 14) is due to the fact that about 41 acres of land mortgaged to the minor were redeemed by the mortgagors on payment of the mortgage money and the amount credited to this head; also long standing debts of previous year were recovered owing to the season being favourable.

15 estates under the management of the Collector of Broach.

In the case of estate No. 75, there is a small increase of Rs. 9 under "produce of land" resulting from increased rent derived from land. Estate No. 77 shows an increase of Rs. 1,516 under "produce of land" (column 13) and a decrease of Rs. 1,001 under other income (column 14).

5 estates under the management of the Collector of Surat.

The increase is due to the recovery of past arrears of rent of shops, houses, etc., whereas the decrease in column 14 may be attributed to the fact that the minor received fewer offerings than in the previous year from devotees. The reason is that he was required to attend the Mosula ceremony of a female relative at Kankroli, and to make a long stay at Nathdwar, the seat of the highest deity of the Vaishnava sect and consequently he was not able to tour much; which resulted in reducing the number of offerings received from his followers. The income of estate No. 78 decreased by Rs. 1,932 under "other income." The decrease is due to the fact that last year several pieces of gold were sold and the proceeds credited to this head. This year there were no such sales. In the case of estate No. 79 the receipts under "other income" (column 14) are greater than those of the previous year because the Moglai Hak for the year under report as well as arrears for the preceding year were received from the Taluka Sub-Treasury in the course of the year. A statement "B" giving information regarding the area assessment and gross income of land (on which full assessment is paid) belonging to each estate accompanies.

#### *Expenditure.*

4. The causes of apparent fluctuations and discrepancies in the figures of expenditure shown in the statement were dealt with at length in paragraph 4 of last year's report, the absence of a fixed rent-roll, the rise and fall in prices, the fluctuating character of the details of expenditure, special famine remissions and suspensions of Jama, costs of litigation, different arrangements made for the maintenance of the minors partly by cash allowance and partly by grant of home farm (garkhed) lands and a number of other causes affect the expenditure of an estate. In these circumstances the figures under the head "expenditure" scarcely permit of comparison with those shown in the statement of last year. The causes of increase in the figures shown in column 18 have, however, been noted in the remarks column of the statement in the case of some estates where there was an appreciable increase.

55 estates under the management of the Talukdari Settlement Officer.

The minors live with their maternal uncle and the estate, therefore, has not to bear the cost of their maintenance or any other expenditure except the payment of Government dues on account of landed property owned by the estate and there is no variation.

1 estate under the management of the Collector of Ahmedabad.

The increased expenditure in columns 15 to 18 in the case of estate No. 57 is due chiefly to the payment of maintenance charges, arrears of servants' pay debts, and the expenses of the death ceremony of the minor's wife. In the case of estate No. 56 the expenditure was on the whole less than that of the previous year though Rs. 150 were paid for maintenance.

2 estates under management of the Collector of Kaira.

The excess in column 15 over the figures of the previous year was due to the payment of all the arrears of Government dues.

1 estate under the management of the Collector of the Panch Maháls.

In the case of these estates the increase is noticeable under estate No. 63 in which Rs. 59,000 were paid off in charity in accordance with the terms of the will made by the father of the minor and Rs. 1,500 were spent on the marriages of two relations of the minor.

15 estates under the management of the Collector of Broach.

The fluctuation of the figures against estate No. 77 are as follows:— Increase of Rs. 505 under column 15 was due to the high prices of food-stuffs and Rs. 110 under column 16 was due to income-tax having been included under this head instead of column 18, as was done in the previous year. The decrease under column 17 was due to non-payment of liabilities owing to lack of funds and under column 18 to less travelling by the minor, who, however, visited Kankroli and Nathdwar at the expense of his Vaishnav devotees. The increase under column 18 in the case of estate No. 78 was due to the expenses incurred in connection with the Mosala ceremony of the minor and the decrease under column 16 resulted from a reduction in the income-tax. In the case of estate No. 79 no comparison with the figures of the previous year is possible as the estate came under management only in the closing month of the latter year. Under column 15, against the estates Nos. 75, 76 and 78 no expenditure is shown, as No. 75 lived with his mother; No. 76 was in charge of the Irish Presbyterian mission; and the minors of estate No. 78 lived with their husbands.

5 estates under the management of the Collector of Surat.

#### *Management of immoveable property.*

5. The lands are managed departmentally except in a few cases where the system of leasing estates to outsiders contemplated in Government Resolution No. 5316, dated 31st May 1906, has recently been introduced. In addition to this, arrangements are being made to increase the revenues of the estates by bringing large areas of waste lands under cultivation, *e. g.*, estates Nos. 1, 18 and 19 in which 1,400 bighas of waste lands were let out for cultivation.

Estates with the Tálnkdári Settlement Officer.

The lands of this estate are cultivated by the parents of the minors and the rents are collected by the village officers under the direction of the Mámlatdár of Daskroi.

Estate with the Collector of Ahmedabad.

The lands are given on permanent leases and the rents are collected by a special kárkún or a Taláti of the village. There was a slight variation in the area of the lands of estate No. 57 as 3 acres not taken into account in the previous year, and one acre received in liquidation of debt, have been added.

Estates with the Collector of Kaira.

Estate with the Collector of the Panch Maháls.

There was no change.

Estates with the Collector of Broach.

The minors in Sisodra cultivate their lands themselves. In other cases the lands are let out on annual leases.

Nos. 75 to 79 are managed by the Mámílatdárs. In the case of Nos. 77 and 79, the Mámílatdár is *ex-officio* Manager under the Court of Wards Act. The immoveable property of No. 77 situated in the Baroda estate is managed by the State authorities who collect the income and pay it to the Manager. All the other lands are leased out annually at suitable rents.

Estates with the Collector of Surat.

#### *Moveable Property.*

6. The total value of this amounts to Rs. 3,03,128. The increase under this head in the case of No. 18 is due to the minor's mother having redeemed ornaments of the value of Rs. 600 with the produce of Gharkhed land, and in the case of No. 19 is due to the addition of the property of two minor step-brothers of the minor. The decrease in the case of No. 57 is due to the sale of cattle worth Rs. 32 and ornaments worth Rs. 548 sold in satisfaction of a Civil Court's decree.

#### *Liabilities of the Estates.*

7. The total amounts to Rs. 6,17,571, out of which Rs. 38,430 are due to Government and the remaining to other creditors. No loans were raised for the management of any of the estates. The increase in columns 22 and 24 against Nos. 1, 3, 6, 8, 9, 10, 13, 16, 18, 22, 30, 34, and 49, is due to the inquiries by the Tálukdári Settlement Officer into the debts of the Tálukdár minor having brought to light many claims previously unknown, and the decrease in the case of Nos. 12, 14, 23 and 52 is due to the rejection of claims not submitted within six months of the publication of notice and to the elimination of debts incurred without the sanction of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer. In the case of estate No. 55 debts amounting to more than Rs. 15,000 had to be liquidated, out of which debt amounting to Rs. 9,211 has been settled for Rs. 8,685 and arrangements have been made to pay off the balance partly by assignment of land and houses and partly by cash payment. Also a scheme is under contemplation for increasing the revenue by relinquishing unproductive lands, and by bringing waste lands under cultivation. In the case of Nos. 21, 23, 29, 30, 37, 44 and 45 steps were taken to discharge the liabilities. In the case of No. 57, Rs. 610 were paid to creditors from the sale-proceeds of ornaments and cattle as stated in paragraph 6 above. In Broach attempts are being made to clear off the debts. In Surat Nos. 75, 76 and 78 are now free from all debt. Nos. 77 and 79 are considerably involved and inquiries into their liabilities are in progress. Both however have paid off some of the debts.

#### *Education of Minors.*

As regards Tálukdári minors, efforts are being made to provide each boy with the best instruction and moral training his estate can afford. Three of them have joined the Scot College at Sádra. Two more are expected to join shortly. The minors of estate No. 46 are with their maternal uncle who is looking after their education. One of the minors in Kaira has left the school and the other two are prosecuting their studies in the village school. The minor in the Panch Maháls attends the Telang High School at Godhra and is studying the third standard. Six of the minors in Broach attend the vernacular schools and one attends the private Anglo-Vernacular School at Broach. The minor No. 75 has completed his education and has taken up service in the Baroda State Police. No. 76 attends the Areth Mission High School. No. 77 is receiving religious and secular education at home. No. 79 is studying at the Vernacular School.

#### *Litigation.*

There was no important litigation in connection with any of the estates.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit the report on the administration of Minors' Estates in the Central Division for the year ending 31st July 1909.

2. I attach a statement\* A showing the estates now under the guardianship of Collectors in this Division. At the commencement of the year, there were twelve such estates. One (No. 2) was added during the year and three (Nos. 4, 6 and 11) were given up. As regards the estate of deceased Ghadge minor (No. 9) the heirship question has not yet been settled and the estate continued under the management of the Collector.

Of the Bokil minors, the elder Narayan attained majority and the estate (No. 10) was to be handed over to him under the order of the District Court, Sátára, dated 29th July 1909; but it could not be restored during the year as the cash balance had to be verified.

As regards personal guardianship, the Akola minors (No. 1) are in charge of their cousin, Bhau Pandoba. The Dhangar minor (No. 2) is under the care of one Pandu Korade of Sade, taluka Kopargaon. The West Khándesh minor (No. 3) is under the charge of the Mámlatdár of Sháháda. The estates of Devargaonkar and Haste minors (Nos. 4 and 6 respectively) were given up early in the year. The Samner estate (No. 5) continued under management till the close of the year and the minor was in charge of his grandfather. Both the minors (Nos. 7 and 8) in the Poona District are in charge of their mothers. The two Bokil minors (No. 10) are in charge of their mother. Of the two Sholápur minors, one (No. 13) is in charge of his mother, Laxmibai, and the other (No. 12) is in charge of Khán Bahádur Pir Mahomed Dafedar, a leading Mahomedan gentleman and an Honorary Magistrate of Sholápur.

3. The total income of estates from land was Rs. 16,438 as against Rs. 24,856 in the previous year. The decrease is for the most part due to the relinquishment of two big estates (Nos. 4 and 11) and partly to short collections. The reasons for the decrease under the head "income from other sources" are given where necessary in the remark column of statement A. A statement giving the amount of land revenue assessed and of income derived this year from land is appended to this report, as required by Government Resolution No. 6323, dated 25th June 1907, Revenue Department.

4. As compared with the previous year, the total expenditure under the head "cost of maintenance" shows a decrease of Rs. 4,415 and is due to

- (a) the release of estates Nos. 4, 6 and 11, and to
- (b) the non-payment of maintenance allowance to the relatives of the deceased Ghadge (No. 9).

Similarly expenditure under the head "Government dues" shows a decrease due mainly to the giving up of the three estates mentioned above. No Government dues had to be paid for the Samner estate (No. 5) as it was put up for sale by the creditor of the minor. The decrease under column 17 is attributable to the relinquishment of estate No. 4 and to the payment of only one instalment

of Rs. 2,000 instead of two as last year by estate No. 9 to the Sáwantwádi State. The column headed "other expenditure" shows a net increase of Rs. 3,887 which is apparently due to the purchase of promissory notes by estates Nos. 1 and 3 and to the handing over of the cash balance in respect of estates Nos. 4 and 6. The real decrease noticed in the case of estate No. 9 was of Rs. 3,675 and the principal heads under which it occurred are given in detail in the column of remarks. There were no important fluctuations in expenditure in respect of other estates.

5. The practice of leasing out the agricultural lands, and houses of minors, where possible, was continued during the year. Most of the houses do not fetch any rent as some of them are occupied, either by the minors themselves or their relatives and some are situated in small villages where there is no demand for them. Of the estates continued under the management till the close of the year, No. 13 only was able to secure some more lands under Civil Court decrees. While the Samner minor (No. 5) was deprived of all his immoveable property as it was put to sale by his creditor in liquidation of heavy debts. During the year one new estate of a Dhangar minor (No. 2) was added, but it has no immoveable property. The house belonging to the minor Usafali (No. 12) is still in the possession of the minor's creditor who is also his *bhauband*.

6. There is a net decrease of Rs. 80 under this head, and it is due to the relinquishment of estate No. 4. No more property was added during the year. The property of the Dhangar minor (No. 2) is in cash and it has been held in deposit in the name of the minor in the Kopargaon Sub-Treasury.

7. Of the estates under management at the close of the year, estates Nos. 5, 7, 8 and 9 are in debt; while the rest are free. As mentioned in paragraph 5, the property of the Samner minor (No. 5) was put to sale in satisfaction of heavy claims against the estate with the result that there was nothing left for management; and the Collector was asked by the District Court, Násik, by an order, dated the 13th August 1909, to hand over the cash balance to the Názir of the District Court. Estates Nos. 7 and 8 have come under management since last year and the debt due by them not being heavy, is likely to be paid off within a few years. In addition to the current expenses the estate No. 8 was able to repay a debt of Rs. 443. Of the Sátára minors, only the Ghadge estate is heavily in debt and Rs. 2,000 were paid during the year in liquidation.

8. The elder of the two Akola minors is being educated in the Vernacular School at Vadale Budruk in the Shevgaon Taluka. The Dhangar minor (No. 2) is not being educated. He is tending the cattle of one Pandu Korade of Sade who feeds the minor and provides him with clothes. The Matkar minor (No. 3) attends the Vernacular School at Sháháda and a tutor has been engaged to give him private education at home. The minor Pethe (No. 5) attends the Násik High School. Of the two Poona minors, Mokashi (No. 7) is being educated in the Anglo-Vernacular School No. 2 at Poona; and Shindkar (No. 8), aged 10 years, attends the Practising School attached to the Male Training College, Poona, and a tutor has been engaged to give him private tuition. The minor (No. 8) is reported to be making good progress. In Sátára the elder Bokil has long left school and the younger is receiving education in the Sátára High School and his progress continued satisfactory. The minor Usafali (No. 12) has now left school after learning up to the 5th Maráthi Standard and English Second Standard. Khán Bahádur Pir Mahomed Dafedar has been teaching him Arabic and Persian at home. The progress and conduct of the minor have been reported to be satisfactory. The minor Giram (No. 13) is too young to attend school and a private tutor has been engaged for him.

9. Four suits after agreements executed before conciliators, and two darkhást cases were filed in the Civil Court on behalf of the Akola minors (No. 1). With regard to the

estate of minor Giram (No. 13), one suit, that was pending last year, has been decided in favour of the minor. 19 applications were filed in the Conciliator's Court, Bársi, for the recovery of the minor's dues on bonds, etc. Out of these 12 have been disposed of in favour of the minor and 7 are pending. Three regular suits were filed during the year, two on behalf of the minor for the recovery of amounts due on mortgage-bonds and one against him for redemption of certain lands. They have not yet been decided. In respect of the other estates, there was no litigation.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit my report on the administration of estates of minors and others in my Division for the year ending 31st July 1909.

*Assumption and relinquishment of estates.*

2. I attach statement (A) giving the usual particulars about each estate in the Division. Omitting those estates under the superintendence of the Court of Wards, for which a separate report is being submitted, there were at the beginning of the year 15 estates under Government management. Of these, No. 1 in Belgaum, Nos. 6 and 7 in Dhárwár and No. 16 in Kolába were released during the year, while only one estate No. 5 in Belgaum was taken over. Owing to litigation estate No. 14 in Dhárwár has not yet come under the management of the Collector. Thus the total number of estates actually under Government management at the end of the year was 11.

Information regarding the guardians of the persons of the minors has been given in the remarks column of the statement.

*Income.*

3. *Belgaum District.*—Estate No. 2.—Of the rent demand of Rs. 823 for the year a sum of Rs. 708 was recovered, leaving a balance of Rs. 115 uncollected at the close of the year. A sum of Rs. 135 was also collected on account of arrears of previous years. The property consists of one alienated village Hudli. A long standing dispute has existed between the minor's mother and the other co-sharers (the minor's uncles, aunt, step-mother and step-sisters) as regards their respective shares, and until recently the co-sharers used to recover the whole of the Inámdár's dues and pay nothing to the minor. During the year under report the minor's name was substituted as registered holder of the Inám village in place of his deceased father, and the Inámdár's dues were collected by the Collector through the agency of a Kárkun specially appointed for the purpose. The payment of their respective shares to the several co-sharers awaits a determination of the extent of their interest in the property. Steps are being taken to effect a settlement of the dispute shortly..

Estate No. 3.—The minor who has no landed property gets a monthly allowance of Rs. 85 from his uncle, the Jáhágirdár of Here.

Estate No. 4.—Only the agricultural lands of the minor are managed by the Collector, his other property being under the management of the District Court of Belgaum. The small fluctuation in the income calls for no remarks.

Estate No. 5.—The property of the deceased Desai of Ingli consists of land in British territory and in the Native States of Sángli and Miraj, Senior and Junior. The rent demand on the property in the Native States has not yet been fully ascertained. Of the rent demand of the property in British territory of Rs. 3,612 in cash, and 37 maunds of jowari valued at Rs. 148, Rs. 3,151 in cash and 2 maunds of jowari and Rs. 60 representing the price of 12 maunds of jowari were recovered. The pseudo-adopted son of the deceased Desai, the cause of the dispute now pending before the Civil Court, recovered a sum of Rs. 401-4-0 in contravention of the Collector's orders ; and steps are being taken to file a suit against him for the amount.



*Dhárwár District.*—Column 13 of the Statement.—There has been a decrease under this head in the case of all the estates owing to the unfavourable character of the season. In the case of estates Nos. 6 and 7 the collections were made by the minors after the estates were handed over to them. These have not been shown in the statement.

Column 14.—There is an increase in the income under this head in the case of Nos. 8 and 13. In the case of former, the increase is on account of recovery of house-rent which was not realized last year, while in the case of the latter estate, Rs. 442 represents the sale proceeds of a house which was not of use to the family. As the bid was found to be inadequate, the sale was not sanctioned and the amount was refunded and shown under expenditure in column 18. Deducting this amount the net receipts under this head come to Rs. 54 as against Rs. 307 in the previous year. At the inspection of accounts the Mámlatdár found that the kárkun in charge had misappropriated Rs. 811, on account of land revenue and other items amounting to Rs. 400. The amount of land revenue Rs. 411 was made good, and inquiry about the other items is still going on. The kárkun concerned is under suspension. This accounts for the decrease. The increase or decrease in the case of other estates is too small to need any comment.

*Kánara District.*—Estate No. 15.—Here too the variations in the income derived from land and other sources need no explanation.

*Kolába District.*—As remarked last year, the minor had no income during the year.

#### *Expenditure.*

4. *Belgaum District.*—Estate No. 2.—Of the total expenditure of Rs. 329, Rs. 267 were paid on account of Judi and Rs. 62 represent the cost of management.

Estate No. 3.—The total expenditure amounted to Rs. 832, of which Rs. 817 represent the cost of the maintenance and education of the minor and his sister, and other incidental expenses. The balance Rs. 15 was spent in repayment of a loan raised last year.

Estate No. 4.—The total expenditure was Rs. 534, of which a sum of Rs. 200 was spent in effecting certain repairs to a well and Rs. 70 were paid to a tenant for embankment, which he had constructed the year before last. It also includes a sum of Rs. 38 incurred on account of the proportionate share of the cost of the Collector's personal establishment and Rs. 46 paid on account of Government dues.

Estate No. 5.—Of the total expenditure of Rs. 722, Rs. 68 were paid as Judi to Government and Rs. 348 to the Inámdár on account of his dues. Rs. 272 were incurred on account of cost of management including Rs. 118, proportionate share of the cost of the Collector's personal establishment, and Rs. 34 represent miscellaneous charges.

*Dhárwár District.*—Column 15.—The rise in the cost of maintenance in the case of estate No. 9 is due to the raising of the allowance from Rs. 70 to Rs. 85 per mensem on the representation of the personal guardian of the minors, in consideration of the dearness of provisions, while that in the case of estates Nos. 6 and 11 is due to the arrears of the last year being paid this year. The decrease in the case of estates Nos. 8, 10 and 13 is accounted for by the fact that some charges are still to be paid.

Column 16.—The increase in the case of estate No. 12 is due to the arrears of the past year being paid during the year under report. The Government dues in the case of estates Nos. 6 and 7 were not paid while the estates were under Government management, the work of collection of rent and payment of land revenue being left to the minors, who had attained majority. The decrease in the case of estate No. 10 is accounted for by the grant of suspension of the Government dues in consequence of the unsatisfactory character of the season, while that in the case of No. 8 is due to the fact that the land revenue due for the lands in the Kalghatgi Táluka has not yet been paid.

Column 17.—There is no material increase or decrease calling for remarks.

Column 18.—The large amount shown under this head in the case of estate No. 7 represents the sum at the credit of the minor, which was handed over to him at the time of the surrender of the estate. The increase in the case of estate No. 8 is due to expenses in connection with the thread ceremony of the minor. There is a satisfactory decrease in expenditure in the case of estates Nos. 9 to 13, that in the case of No. 13 being due to heavy law charges and marriage expenses of the minor in the previous year, which are absent this year, while that in the case of No. 11 is due to the fact that the arrears of pay due to dancing girls for the performance of service in the Shri Venkatesh Temple at Nargund on behalf of the minors were paid in the preceding year—a feature which is absent this year.

*Kánara District.*—The increase in the cost of maintenance has been explained by a note embodied in the statement, while Rs. 487 shown in column 18 represent the actual cost of a Promissory note of Rs. 500 which was purchased during the year.

*Kolába District.*—The minor was maintained by disposing of the pots and ornaments belonging to her.

#### *Management of immoveable property.*

5. None of the lands are under departmental management. The houses and lands are leased out for a term of years at fixed rents. There have been no changes in the immoveable property of any of the minors except in the case of estate No. 8 in which two survey numbers in the village of Attikol, Táluka Dhárwár, which had been mortgaged with possession by the adoptive father of the minor were redeemed from the mortgagee on condition that the amount of the debt (Rs. 600) would be repaid to him in 5 instalments. Except in Dhárwár the season was fair and it was not found necessary to grant any suspension or remissions of rents.

#### *Moveable property.*

6. The only estate, the moveable property of which is in charge of the Collector of Belgaum, is No. 3. The property consists of gold, silver and pearl ornaments and the box containing them is deposited in the Belgaum Treasury strong-room. The Collector personally inspected and made a list of the contents of the box during the year. A few copper pots, worth Rs. 6, belonging to estate No. 5, are also in the Collector's charge. In Dhárwár and Kánara, there were no changes in the moveable property of the minors during the year, while in Kolába the minor with her estate of some pots of the value of Rs. 10 or 11 was entrusted to the care of one Laxmibai Vani of Pen.

#### *Liabilities.*

7. The estates practically free from debt are Nos. 3, 4, 6, 7, 9, 13, 14, 15 and 16. Estate No. 2 is hopelessly involved. The minor has two uncles, an aunt, a step-mother and 2 step-sisters, and all of them claim a share in the estate, which has suffered from their dissensions. The Collector is trying to settle the disputes and bring the estate under the superintendence of the Court of Wards. Estate No. 5 has also debts, the extent of which however is not yet known. Estates Nos. 8, 10 and 12 in Dhárwár are also encumbered. In the case of Nos. 8 and 10 special arrangements have been made for the discharge of the debts by instalments. In the case of the former, there was a Civil Court's decree for Rs. 160 during the year, which is exclusive of the sum shown in column 22 of last year's statement. The decree was compromised for Rs. 80 which will be paid shortly. There was a small sum against No. 11 which has been paid off during the year.

#### *Education.*

8. Meherbán Sáheb Pachha of Hudli attends the Sardárs' High School at Belgaum and is in the 3rd Standard. He is reported to be doing well. The Here boy resides at Kolhápúr with his joint guardian Meherbán Hanmantrao Sarlaskar and continues to attend the Rájárám High School. He is also in

the 3rd Standard and is reported to be doing well there. The Collector of Belgaum saw him during the year and was satisfied with his appearance and progress. The minor holder of estate No. 4 attends the Vernacular School at Sholapur in the Hukeri Taluka. No. 10 passed the Matric Examination and is now attending the Grant Medical College. The other minors in Dhárwár are being educated in the Schools shown in column 6 of the statement and are believed to be making fair progress. The Sirsi minor continues to attend the Kárwár High School and is in the Matric Class. His progress and conduct are reported to be fair. No. 16 Shantabai has been attending the Girls' School at Pen since 17th May last.

*Litigation.*

9. A Darkhast has been filed against estate No. 2 by one Dastagir walad Mahomed of Belgaum and an appeal in which the minor is indirectly concerned is pending in the High Court. In the case of estate No. 5, one Appasaheb alias Shidappa Venkatrao claims to be the adopted son of the late Desai, and litigation is pending between him and Meherban Rachoji Rao Desai of Chinchli, who claims to be the nearest heir of the deceased Desai. We are not concerned with this suit. The pseudo-adopted son having forcibly taken certain crops and the other moveable property belonging to the estate, cognizance of the offence has been taken, and the cases are now pending in the Court of the First Class Magistrate of Gokák. In Dhárwár the suit against No. 9, which was pending at the end of the last year, was decided against the minors in the Sub-Judge's Court and an appeal has been filed in the District Court which is still pending. Two suits are also pending against Estate No. 13. There was no litigation as regards the other estates in Dhárwár and in Kánara and Kolába Districts.

10. The Statement prescribed by paragraph 7 of Government Resolution No. 6323, dated 25th June 1907, is appended.

HONOURABLE SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Report on the Administration of Minors' Estates in the Province of Sind for the year 1908-1909. The usual statements Nos. 1 and 2 are appended.

*Assumption and relinquishment of Estates.*

2. Out of the 80 estates under the guardianship of the Collectors and Deputy Commissioners at the beginning of the year, 7 were released during the year under report (1 in the Karáchi District, 2 in the Hyderabad District, 2 in the Lárkána District and 1 each in the Sukkur and Thar and Párkar Districts). Six out of these seven estates were released on account of the minors having attained majority and one (that in the Sukkur District) owing to the minors' mother being unwilling to place the property under the Collector's guardianship. Seven new estates were taken up during the year, one in the Hyderabad District and 3 each in the Sukkur and Lárkána Districts, bringing the total number of estates under guardianship at the close of the year to 80, *i. e.*, the same number as at the beginning of the year.

3. In the case of 5 estates only are the persons of the minors under the guardianship of District Officers, the owners of the remaining estates being in charge of their relatives and friends.

*Income.*

4. The increase of Rs. 619 occurring in the income of estate No. 1—a purely non-agricultural estate—is chiefly due to the purchase by the Karáchi Municipality, of a plot of land, measuring 43 square yards, belonging to the estate. The other estates are all agricultural, and, with the exception of No. 8, are leased out for a term of years. The income of estate No. 2 is about the same as last year. That of estate No. 3 includes some arrears due from the lessee for last year but is exclusive of the amount due from him for the year under report, as recovery of this amount had to be postponed owing to the general failure of crops in the Delta tract from floods. Estate No. 5, which was managed departmentally last year, was leased in the year under report, and the amount appearing against it in column 13 consists of Rs. 3,902 realised on account of lease money and Rs. 2,621 paid by the lessee as Government assessment. The sum of Rs. 2,213 appearing in column 14 consists of Rs. 1,925 realised from the sale-proceeds of live stock and Rs. 288 from the estate's debtors. In the case of estate No. 6 the decrease of Rs. 731 is due chiefly to the fact that the figures of the preceding year include one extraordinary item of Rs. 606 recovered, on account of a deficit in the lease money on re-sale of the lease, from the old lessee according to the terms of his contract.



5. The total income from land of all the estates during the year was Rs. 15,697 as against Rs. 10,999 in the preceding year. The increase is chiefly due to extension of the cultivated area of the several estates owing to a favourable inundation. The income from other sources amounted to Rs. 2,397 against Rs. 2,273 in the preceding year. The difference is small and needs no comment.

Hyderabad District.

6. There is an increase under the head 'Income from land,' which is chiefly attributed to the assumption, in the year under report, of the guardianship of the extensive estate of Wahid-bakhsh Khan and Nabibakhsh Khan, sons of Wadero Illahibakhsh Khan Bhuto (No. 23). Of the other estates there is an increase in the income of estates Nos. 22, 25 to 33, 35 to 37, 41 and 43. It is due, in the case of estate No. 27, to the recovery of the arrears of lease money which were erroneously omitted from the previous year's report and in the case of estate No. 28 to the fact that in the year 1907-1908 the estate came under guardianship after half the year had expired and consequently the income from land in that year was only Rs. 73. In the case of the other estates the increase is either very small and needs no comment or wherever it is remarkable, it is due to extension of cultivation owing to the favourable inundation of the year. The incomes of estates Nos. 24, 40, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46 and 47 show a decrease as compared with the previous year's figures. In the case of No. 24 the decrease is due to a contraction in cultivation, in that of No. 40 to the previous year's figures including some arrears of lease money recovered in that year and in the case of No. 42 to the fact that the lease money for the current year was recovered in the previous year and consequently nothing was paid on that account in the year under report. Column 13 in the case of estate No. 45 is blank because the lease money due on account of it could not be recovered during the year under report. In the case of the remaining four estates the decrease is too small to need explanation. The income from land of estate No. 34 is the same as last year and estates Nos. 38 and 39 were taken up only in the year under report. A great part of the increase under the head 'Other sources' is ascribed to the collection of debts amounting to Rs. 7,368 due to estate No. 23. As regards the other estates, noticeable fluctuations occur only in the case of Nos. 22, 26 and 30. The decrease against the first named estate is due to the fact that a larger amount of debts was recovered in the previous year as compared with the recoveries made in the year under report. A contrary cause explains the increase in the case of estate No. 26. No explanation has been given by the Collector as to the increase of Rs. 285 in the case of estate No. 30.

7. Compared with the figures of the previous year there was an increase of Rs. 10,875 in the total income from land. The increase is due to a larger area having been brought under cultivation and to the fact that arrears of lease money on account of past years were recovered during the year under report in the case of estates Nos. 54, 56, 61, 62, 63, 64 and 65. A further cause is that items of the nature of rents on buildings which were shown last year in column 14 have this year been included in the figures of income from land. The income from other sources amounted to Rs. 13,266 as against Rs. 11,922 in the previous year. The increase is due chiefly to the sale of a house belonging to estate No. 61 which fetched the large sum of Rs. 11,268.

8. There is a decrease under the head 'Income from land' in the case of estate No. 70 due to the fact that only a portion of the estate was cultivated owing to the land having been exhausted by frequent cropping by former lessees. Estate No. 71 shows an increase which is due to extension of cultivation during the year under report. The amounts entered in column 14 against these estates represent receipts from the sale of cattle.

9. Estates Nos. 72 and 79 are non-agricultural estates. All the other estates, with the exception of No. 80, show an increase in the amount of income from land, due in almost all cases to increased cultivation consequent on the favourable inundation. The decrease in the case of estate No. 80 is the result of the

non-recovery of the full amount of the lease money. The figures appearing in column 14 against estate No. 72 represent the amount refunded to the minor out of the fine in the jirga case referred to in paragraph 9 of the previous year's report. Those against estate No. 75 represent the unspent balance out of the Rs. 150 granted last year for the purchase of bullocks and those against estate No. 79 represent interest on promissory notes.

### *Expenditure.*

10. There are no important fluctuations in the cost of maintenance (column 15) except in the case of estate No. 5, which Karáchi District shows an increase under this head owing to the payment to the minor, during the year under report, of all the arrears of his allowance from 1st January 1908, at the rate of Rs. 125 a month. The increase in the amount of Government dues paid is to be ascribed to the extension of cultivation owing to the favourable inundation. In the case of estate No. 8 out of the land revenue demand of Rs. 330 the payment of Rs. 279 has been postponed and Rs. 51 were remitted. It is not clear why a postponement was necessary when the estate has a balance of no less than Rs. 1,427 (Rs. 800 in securities and Rs. 627 in cash) to its credit. The Collector will be asked to report on this point. The only important items under the head 'Other expenditure' are the sums of Rs. 2,120 and Rs. 464 appearing against estates Nos. 1 and 8 respectively. They are composed as under:—

11. The only fluctuations of importance under the head 'Cost of maintenance' are those in the case of estates Nos. 12 and 20, both of Hyderabad District. which show an increase, the former owing to the total payments including the previous year's arrears of the minor's allowance and the latter to the minor's allowance having been raised on account of the recent rise in the prices of articles of food. The increase under the head 'Government dues' is contributed by almost all the estates and, as elsewhere, is the result of the good inundation of the year. The sum of Rs. 1,104 appearing against estate No. 20 under the head 'Discharge of liabilities' represents payments made towards the liquidation of certain debts incurred by the minor in the year under report without the cognizance or authority of his guardian, the Collector. Column 18 'Other expenditure' also shows an increase, due mostly to the construction of a new house for minor Bhugro (estate No. 14) at a cost of Rs. 1,160.

12. The expenditure under the head 'Cost of maintenance' has remained stationary in a majority of cases, and the small fluctuations in the remaining cases call for no remark. Lárkána District. The large increase under the head 'Government dues' is due partly to increased

cultivation during the year but for the most part to the inclusion of a large amount paid on account of estate No. 23. The payment of a sum of Rs. 3,828 on account of this estate towards the discharge of liabilities accounts for the increase in the figures of column 14 over similar figures entered in last year's statement. The following are the details of the sum of Rs. 19,755 representing 'other expenditure' (column 18) :—

13. In this district the total amount spent on account of cost of maintenance rose by Rs. 222 owing to the fact that the allowances given to the owners of estates Nos. 63 and 65 in the preceding year were for a portion only of that year. Increased cultivation accounts for the rise in the amount of 'Government dues' paid during the year. The decrease in the amount of liabilities discharged is due partly to want of funds and partly to the settlement of claims against certain estates being still under negotiation. Under the head 'Other expenditure' important fluctuations are observable only in the following estates and are explained as under :—

Estate No. 54.—Increase, due to increased expenditure on account of civil suits and repairs to buildings, and to the payment of a sum of Rs. 939 to a sharer in the produce of the estate.

Estate No. 56.—Decrease, due chiefly to inclusion in last year's figures, of an extraordinary item of Rs. 5,000 on account of marriage expenses.

Estate No. 61.—Increase, due to increased expenditure under the head 'Cost of civil suits', the payment of Rs. 472 to a sharer in the minors' estate and the expenditure of Rs. 350 on the circumcission ceremony of the minors.

14. Maintenance allowance was given for the first time in the year under report to the owner of estate No. 70. The falling off under 'Government dues' is nominal. It is due chiefly to the last year's figures including the amount paid on account of the large estate of Gulam Muhammad and others which was released during the year under report. The figures in column 16 against estate No. 70 include Rs. 200 on account of expenditure incurred on repairs to water courses.

15. The maintenance allowance has been increased from Rs. 15 to Rs. 20 per mensem in the case of estate No. 75 and from Rs. 10 to Rs. 15 in the case of estate No. 77, hence the increase in the figures of column 15. No maintenance allowance was paid to the owners of estates Nos. 72, 74, 76, 78 and 79, who were supported by their relatives. The increase under 'Government dues' (column 16) is due to increased cultivation. Under the head 'other expend-

iture' the only noticeable item is the sum of Rs. 593 appearing against estate No. 76. It is composed as under :—

*Management of immoveable property.*

16. Out of the 80 estates under management during the year one (No. 24 in the Lárkána District) has since been released, 57 are wholly under leases for a term of years and 10 (Nos. 8, 46, 48, 49, 50, 51, 57, 58, 59 and 70) are under departmental management, but endeavours are in progress for leasing out the property belonging to three estates, *viz.*, Nos. 46, 48 and 49. In the case of four estates (Nos. 1, 67, 72 and 79) there are no agricultural lands to lease. The remaining 8 estates are accounted for as under :—

(a) Estates Nos. 14, 22 and 23 are partly leased and partly under departmental or private management.

(b) In the case of estates Nos. 4, 15, 19 and 74 the lands are cultivated by the minors themselves or their relatives.

(c) The owner of estate No. 9 is dead as reported last year and his estate is about to be restored to his heirs who have obtained the necessary certificate of heirship.

17. The season was generally favourable, resulting in an expansion of cultivation in the lands belonging to the estates under guardianship.

18. During the year under report the following changes occurred in the properties held by the minors :—

Estate No. 1.—A piece of land measuring 43 square yards was purchased by the Karáchi Municipality.

Estates Nos. 22 and 25.—The excess areas were acquired during the year by purchase or otherwise.

Estate No. 27.—Four acres of land were transferred.

Estate No. 51.—Ten acres of land were transferred under a Civil Court decree to a claimant entitled to a share in the property.

Estates Nos. 3, 54 and 65.—The increases represent areas cultivated on yearly tenure.

Estate No. 58.—An area of 2 acres 23 ghuntas was newly taken up during the year under report and 9 acres 20 ghuntas were forfeited to Government on account of non-payment of the fallow assessment.

Estate No. 60.—The decrease of 20 acres is due to the fact that in the previous year's report the area held on yearly tenure was included in the figures representing the area of the estate.

Estate No. 61.—The increase in the area of agricultural land is due to certain omissions in last year's figures. A house belonging to this estate was sold during the year for Rs. 11,268 for the discharge of debts.

Estate No. 64.—The decrease of 24 acres is due to the fact that on the introduction of the Record-of-Rights the correct area possessed by the minor was found to be 46 acres not 70 acres. The latter figure which was given last year included the shares of co-occupants.

Estate No. 71.—The difference is due to an error in the previous year's figures.

Estate No. 75.—Eighty-six acres of land were newly taken up during the year under report.

Estate No. 77.—Forty-eight acres were forfeited to Government on account of non-payment of fallow assessment.

Estates Nos. 9, 10, 12, 15, 19 to 22, 58 and 78.—These estates have all along consisted of buildings as well as agricultural lands, but buildings have hitherto been erroneously omitted from column 7. The agricultural lands belonging to estate No. 15 were erroneously shown last year to be jágir lands. In reality they are rayati lands.

*Moveable property.*

19. Fluctuations are visible in the case of the following estates and are explained as under:—

Estate No. 3.—The excess over last year's figures is due to the inclusion, for the first time, of the value of the jewellery belonging to the minor.

Estates Nos. 5 and 8.—Some of the property belonging to these estates was disposed of by the ladies of the two households to meet expenses in connection with certain family ceremonies during the time the Collector's applications for guardianship were pending before the District Court last year. This fact was brought to the notice of the Collector only during the year under report.

Estates Nos. 10, 12 and 14.—The differences are due to errors in last year's figures.

Estate No. 22.—The decrease is due to the death of a mare valued at Rs. 208, belonging to the estate.

Estate No. 27.—The decrease is due to the fact that 4 heads of cattle valued at Rs. 150 were stolen and some property was appropriated by the minor for his maintenance.

Estate No. 30.—The increase represents the value of a carriage purchased for the minor's use.

Estate No. 41.—Moveable property of the value of Rs. 225 was acquired for the estate during the previous year but it was erroneously omitted from that year's report.

Estate No. 60.—The difference is due to an error in last year's figures.

Estates Nos. 70 and 71.—The moveable property belonging to these estates consists mainly of cattle. The decreases in the figures of column 11 are due partly to the sale of cattle and partly to previous over-estimate.

*Liabilities of the estates.*

20. Out of the 80 estates shown in statement I, 48 are free from debts. The remaining 32 estates are dealt with in the following remarks.

21. The only estates against which there were liabilities at the beginning of the year were Nos. 5, 6 and 8. In addition to the debts amounting to Rs. 860 shown against estate No. 5 last year a decree-holder's demand of Rs. 225 also stood against the estate, which was erroneously not shown in the previous year's report. Out of the total of Rs. 1,085 Rs. 285 were paid during the year, leaving a balance of Rs. 800. The creditors of estate No. 6 have been referred to the Civil Court as reported last year. The extent of debts against estate No. 8 has not yet been fully ascertained as there are suits pending in the District Court for certain disputed items. The figures appearing in column 22 of statement I against this estate represent debts admitted and these have since been paid.

22. The estates against which debts were shown to be outstanding in the previous year's report were Nos. 9, 10 and 19. The debt against estate No. 19 was wholly paid during the year as also a debt amounting to Rs. 1,104 which was incurred by the minor Khair Muhammad (estate No. 20) and which is referred to in paragraph 11 above. Arrangements are in progress for the payment of the debts due by estates Nos. 9 and 10.

23. A sum of Rs 4,227 was paid during the year in liquidation of debts on account of estates Nos. 22, 23 and 45. Amounts which are still due will be paid as soon as funds permit. Rs. 156, which were due to Government by estate No. 22, were paid during the year. Of the total sum of Rs. 334 due to Government by estate No. 34, Rs. 277 are on account of last year, which were erroneously omitted from last year's statement.

Lárkána District.  
Sukkur District.

24. The sums of Rs. 463 and Rs. 91 entered in column 23 of statement I against estates Nos. 51 and 61 represent arrears of land revenue due by the estates on account of former years, which were not claimed by the táluka officers before through oversight. The arrears due by estate No. 54 at the close of the year under report amounted to Rs. 228 out of which Rs. 48 were recommended for remission leaving a balance of Rs. 180 which is payable by a lessee of the estate and is in course of recovery. Estate No. 58 is in arrears on account of the produce of the estate lands not having been sold during the year. The Government debts against estate No. 60 represent takávi due for payment in future years. Out of the Rs. 218 and Rs. 972 shown in column 23 against estates Nos. 62 and 64, Rs. 85 and Rs. 137 respectively represent arrears on account of the year under report and the remainder on account of past years. Estate No. 65 had to pay Rs. 53 on account of past years out of which Rs. 45 were paid during the year leaving a balance of Rs. 8. The most important payment in liquidation of debts other than those due to Government was that of Rs. 5,930 on account of estate No. 61.

25. All the estates in these districts are free from debts. Out of Rs. 823 payable by estate No. 71 on account of land revenue during the year under report, Rs. 320 were paid and the balance of Rs. 503 will be paid shortly.

Thar and Párkar and Upper Sind Frontier Districts.

#### *Education of Minors.*

26. Of the two minors (estates Nos. 5 and 8) whose persons are under the guardianship of the Collector, one is being educated at Sann in the Mánjhand Mahál and the other has been directed to attend the same school. The only other minor in the district receiving education is Rijhumal, of estate No. 1.

Karáchi District.

27. Of the six minors who were receiving education last year, three, *viz.*, Nur Muhammad and Obhayo (estate No. 5) and Jeram (estate No. 11) have given up their studies. But the Collector has instructed the sub-divisional officers concerned to put pressure on the minors and induce them to go to school again. Minor Bhugro (estate No. 14) commenced his studies during the year.

Hyderabad District.

28. Of the 33 male minors whose estates are under guardianship, 17 are receiving education, 2 at the Lárkána Madressah, 2 at the A. V. Schools, Lárkána and Rato-dero, 2 at the Vernacular School, Lárkána, and the rest at village vernacular schools. Of the remaining 16 male minors, one Ghulam Muhammad (estate No. 42) is dead and Ali Hasan (estate No. 30) is receiving private tuition, a teacher on a monthly salary of Rs. 30 per mensem having been engaged for him by the Collector.

Lárkána District.

29. There are in all 39 minors under guardianship, of whom 11 are girls. Of the remaining minors, 15 are receiving education, 4 are past the age of studying, 8 follow business and 1 is below the school-going age.

Sukkur District.

30. Ahmad Ali Shah (estate No. 69) is studying in the Vernacular School at Umarmot and Nihal Khan, Ahsan Ali Khan (estate No. 70) and Sayad Khan (estate No. 71) at the Pithoro Madressah.

Thar and Párkar District.

31. As the persons of the minors are in charge of their relatives their education is not superintended by the Deputy Commissioner. Minor Khush Muhammad (estate No. 80) continues to study at Jacobabad and lives in the boarding-house.

Upper Sind Frontier District.

*Litigation.*

32. The suits pending against estate No. 8 have not yet been decided. The one filed by certain ladies of the family has been compromised, but the final order of the Court has not yet been passed. The other two suits are still pending.

Karachi District.

33. No fresh suits were filed during the year in respect of any of the estates. The suits filed on behalf of the estate of Bhugro (No. 14) are still pending.

Hyderabad District.

34. The two suits filed during the previous year were compromised. No fresh suits were filed during the year on behalf of or against any of the estates except No. 42. In the case of this estate one Ghulam Kadir filed a suit for the possession of the minor Musamat Alam Khatun whom he claimed as his wife. This case is still subjudice.

Larkana District.

35. Of the four suits reported last year as pending, two were decided against the minor and one is still pending. In one of the suits decided the Court awarded Rs. 1,387 to the plaintiff instead of Rs. 2,700 for which the suit was filed and in the other the minor's step-mother has been allowed a share of the property in spite of her deceased husband's will to the effect that she was entitled to a maintenance allowance only. An appeal has been filed in the latter case, which has not yet been decided. The estate of Naraindas and Sukhramdas against which there was a suit pending last year has since been released from guardianship. A new suit has been filed against estate No. 52 for division of ancestral property, which is still pending.

Sukkur District.

36. None of the estates under guardianship was involved in litigation during the year under report.

Thar and Parkar District.

37. The suits pending against the owners of estates Nos. 73 and 77 have been decided. The plaintiff abandoned his claim against the owner of estate No. 73 and the suit against estate No. 77 was decided in favour of the estate owner, but an appeal has been filed by the other party in the District Court of Sukkur-Larkana.

**RESOLUTION.**—These reports show that, in addition to estates which are under the superintendence of the Court of Wards and for which separate reports have been submitted, there were at the beginning of the year 183 minors' estates under management in the Presidency and Sind. Of these 17 were released during the course of the year, while 10 estates were newly taken under management. Of the 176 estates under superintendence at the end of the year 50 were being administered by the Talukdári Settlement Officer.

2. The season in the Presidency proper, although below the average, was better than its predecessor and the improvement in Sind was very marked. In consequence the conditions of management appear to have been easier than in the preceding year. In this connection Government observe with satisfaction that the system of leasing estates continued to be followed with success. The total land revenue demand on the estates amounted to Rs. 1,39,256 and the collections to Rs. 1,30,257. The income realised from land was Rs. 3,25,603 or nearly 2½ times the Government dues. In the case of fully assessed lands, for which separate statistics are given, the income in the case of 32 estates in the Presidency proper amounted to Rs. 22,945 against an assessment of Rs. 10,052. For 61 similar estates in Sind the income was Rs. 90,671 and the corresponding land revenue demand Rs. 39,458. The income from sources other than land was, for all estates, Rs. 72,445. The total income for the year thus amounted to Rs. 3,98,048. Of the total expenditure of Rs. 3,26,231, a sum of Rs. 57,934 was expended in maintenance, Rs. 1,30,257 were paid in Government dues and Rs. 46,044 in discharge of debts. The balance in cash and securities at the end of the year was Rs. 6,86,621.

3. The figures relating to the indebtedness of the estates are not quite complete, but as reported they show that at the end of the year the gross liabilities were 6½ lakhs against an original debt of 9½ lakhs. In some cases the debts are partly covered by the balances in hand. The attention of the Commissioner, N. D., is invited to the large balance of the estate of Shermia Bapumia (No. 25) and he is requested to consider the propriety of clearing off the Government debt of Rs. 20,000. It seems anomalous that this debt should be allowed to continue while the estate is permitted to make large investments out of its balances. At the close of the year 115 estates were free or practically free from debt, while 21 were heavily involved.

4. The arrangements for the education of minor wards were on the whole satisfactory.

5. Government are of opinion that the reports might be suitably compressed by the elimination of explanations on all matters which are not of marked importance.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the report on the Minors' Estates in the Northern Division under the Guardians and Wards Act for the year ending 31st July 1908. Estates managed under the provisions of the Court of Wards Act are being separately reported on in accordance with the instructions contained in Government Resolution No. 9606, dated the 21st September 1908.

*Assumption and relinquishment of Estates.*

2. At the commencement of the year 74 Estates were in this Division under management, 54 under the Tálukdári Settlement Officer in the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira and Broach, and 20 under the Collectors. Of the former three estates were released from management and one new one taken over during the year, so that at the close of the year the number under management was 52. Of the three Estates released, one (No. 4 in the last year's statement) was restored to Khokhernesh Vajesing Satbha, the eldest of three minor brothers, who had come of age; the Estate was restored to the owners in a solvent condition. The second was that of Khodbha Sartansing and Jalamsing Sartansing of Tagdi (No. 12 in last year's statement A) which was released on Khodbha's coming of age. This Estate being still heavily encumbered management continues under section 28 of the Tálukdári Act. The circumstances under which the third Estate—that of Khambhda Aling Dada—was released were explained in paragraph 2 of last year's report. The single Estate newly added is that of a minor named Gagubhai Bhurabhai. None of the Estates managed by the Collectors was released during the year but four more were taken over, two in Broach and two in Surat. Thus the total number of Estates under guardianship during the year under report was as follows:—

*Income.*

3. The year was inferior to the preceding one from an agricultural point of view and the crops in the Ahmedabad District, where the majority of the Managed Estates are situated, suffered considerably from deficient rain. The effect of the season was reflected in the receipts of the Estates which show a marked decrease. The diminution was most marked in the case of Estate No. 3 Chandrasing Dajiraj of Khokhernesh, where the income fell from Rs. 437 to Rs. 24, while in the case of Estates Nos. 5, 8, 9, 11, 19, 27, 23, 41 and 42, there was a shrinkage of more than 50 per cent. As remarked in paragraph 3 of last year's report, the figures of

income, in most of the Estates where the system of Bhagbatai is in vogue, hardly admit of comparison with those of the previous years. The most important fluctuations however are noted below.

*Nos. 14, 15 and 17.*—The increase in the income of these Estates is nominal only and is due to the recovery of arrears.

*No. 29.*—The Estate has been leased for Rs. 700 for a period of 7 years and the increase is due to the recovery of the rent reserved under the lease for the current year as well as for the previous year which had remained in arrears.

In the case of Estate No. 35 there has been no real falling off in the income. The Estate has been leased with possession to the creditor for seven years in full satisfaction of the debt and the Rs. 37 shown as "produce of land" merely represents the recovery of arrears.

The increase in column 14 in the case of Estate No. 44 amounting to Rs. 1,214 is due to the sale of Babul trees belonging to the Estate.

The lands belonging to this Estate have, as remarked last year, been leased to cultivators who under an acknowledged custom pay only Government dues. The annual income of these is Rs. 32 out of which Rs. 3-8-0 have been remitted and Rs. 26-8-0 suspended under the Suspension and Remission rules, and only Rs. 2 on account of Local Fund was the income of the Estate during the year.

Two Estates under the management of the Collector of Kaira.

The income of the Estate No. 54 decreased by Rs. 218 under the head "Produce of Land" owing to an unfavourable season.

There is a net decrease of Rs. 624 in the total income of the estate, which is due to no forest having been sold during the year under report. The income under head "Produce of Land" shows an increase of Rs. 286 over last year's figure, cultivation in waste lands having expanded.

One Estate under the management of the Collector of the Panch Maháls.

Fifteen Estates under the management of the Collector of Broach.

Most of the Broach Estates show a decrease in the income under head "Produce of Land" which in the previous years included the amounts recovered on account of arrears of past years.

The decrease under the head "Produce of Land" against Estate No. 80 is mainly due to the exclusion of the sum of Rs. 3,318 on account of "income from other sources" which was wrongly included under this head in the previous year.

Five Estates under the management of the Collector of Surat.

A statement (B) giving information regarding the area, assessment and gross income of land (on which full assessment is paid) belonging to each Estate accompanies.

#### *Expenditure.*

Fifty-two Estates under the management of the Talukdári Settlement Officer.

4. The causes of increase in the amounts have been noted in the remarks column wherever necessary. The most important fluctuations are explained below.

The reduction of maintenance allowance in the case of Estates Nos. 3 and 16 was due to the grant of leases of the Estates to the minors' guardians who had to bear the costs of maintenance under the terms of the leases.

One Estate under the management of the Collector of Ahmedabad.

The minors live with their uncle and hence the estate has not to bear the cost of their maintenance.

Commenting upon the expenditure incurred by the Estates, the Collector remarks: "Maintenance charges in Estates Nos. 1 and 2 were Rs. 254 more than last year, but on paper only. For Estate No. 1 payment was made for a whole year's charge, against 6 months only in the preceding year; and for Estate No. 2 the charges up to December 1908 were disbursed in advance in order to avoid attachment of the balance by judgment-creditors."

Two Estates under the management of the Collector of Kaira.

The decrease in Government dues for the year under report in the case of Estate No. 54 is due to general suspensions having been granted in the Táluka.

In favour of this Estate payment of half the revenue due to Government was suspended, the season having been a bad one. This, coupled with the fact that no arrears of Jama were outstanding for payment, reduced the expenditure from Rs. 6,617 to Rs. 3,523.

One Estate under the management of the Collector of the Panch Maháls.

#### *Management of immoveable property.*

5. Many of the Estates are managed departmentally but the system of leasing to outsiders has made some further advance since the submission of last year's report. Yearly leases of Estates Nos. 1, 5, 6, 7, 8, 16, 20, 24, 30, 47 and 48 were granted during the year and negotiations for leasing Estates Nos. 21, 23, 36 and 37 in whole or in part are in progress. The Tálukdári Settlement Officer remarks: "The opposition of Tálukdárs and of the subordinates of this Department to the system of leasing shows signs of weakening. While the report is under preparation I have succeeded in arranging a very favourable lease of the three villages of Endla, Daslana and Kanpura in which the Bhankoda minor has 9 Dokdas' share for Rs. 11,000 to a Desai of Nariád for 10 years. The subordinates of this Department have been given distinctly to understand that the work of leasing Estates within their charge is a paramount duty and that their promotion will largely depend upon their success in this branch of their work."

Estates with the Tálukdári Settlement Officer.

The total area of land under management at the close of the year under report was 218 acres. Some of this land is given out on annual leases and some for fixed periods, rents being paid some in kind and some in cash. This year again it was found impossible to lease the whole area to one person.

#### *Moveable property.*

6. The total value of moveable property belonging to the estates amounted to Rs. 97,747.

#### *Liabilities of the Estates.*

7. The total liabilities of the estates in the Division amounted to Rs. 5,17,518, of which Rs. 49,963 are due to Government and Rs. 4,67,555 to other creditors. The increase in columns 22 and 24 against estates Nos. 6, 23, 24, 28, 29, 30, 38, 40, 45 and 48 is due to the debt settlement inquiries, which have brought to light claims previously unknown. On the other hand, the debt settlement which rejected claims not submitted within six months of the publication of the notice and the elimination of debts incurred without the necessary sanction have lowered the aggregate of liabilities of Estates Nos. 4, 9, 10, 11, 12, 14, 20 and 50. Negotiations for the settlement of debts of estates Nos. 1 and 3 referred to in paragraph 3 of Government Resolution No. 4363, dated 30th April 1908, are, as remarked by the Tálukdári Settlement Officer, in progress. It is hoped that the settlements which are about to be made will extricate them from an all but desperate condition. The increase in column 23 of the statement in the case of estates Nos. 3, 7, 24, 36, 37, 38, 40 and 50 was due to the suspensions of land revenue, the impossibility of recovering Tagávi instalments, and to fresh advances of Tagávi, and loans necessitated by the unfavourable character of the season. The increase in the case of Estates Nos. 6 and 7 was due to the advance of Government loans amounting to Rs. 1,432 and 4,459, respectively, for settlement of the debts of the Estates. The reduction in column 24 in the case of Estate No. 32 was brought about partly by the debt settlement and partly the lease of a

portion of the estate to creditors with possession. A similar lease in the case of Estate No. 35 resulted in reducing the private liabilities of the Estate from Rs. 3,928 to Rs. 3,143. The Tálukdári Settlement Officer during the year raised a certain number of loans in order to effect a debt settlement on a few of the Estates or to meet special expenses which could not be avoided. For example Rs. 4,400 were borrowed for estate No. 5 from Estate No. 25 for debt settlement, and Rs. 1,000 for Estate No. 9 from No. 15 to meet the expenses of the minor's marriage.

#### *Education of Minors.*

The Tálukdári Settlement Officer remarks: "The education of minors is receiving systematic attention and efforts are being made to provide each boy with the best instruction and moral training his estate can afford. Lack of funds and still more the opposition of guardians results in very irregular attendance, and in order to check this, I have requested the educational authorities to submit terminal reports showing attendance and progress of each Tálukdári boy. In addition to the 7 boys who joined the Sádra College last year, and who were referred to in last year's report, three minors Nos. 16, 20 and 23 joined the College during the year. The Pipli Minor, Lalubha, No. 6 and Napa Chhatrasingji joined their village schools during the year. In the majority of Estates financial considerations prevent me from sending the minors to the large central schools. I therefore propose to open hostels for Tálukdárs' sons at two centres. Dhandhuka and Viramgám, where the boys may be boarded at the cheapest possible rate, under reliable supervision and may attend the Táluka Head Quarter Schools. I have called for opinions and estimate of costs from the Mámlatdárs and I propose to get the hostels if possible during the next touring season. The long felt want of a school at Tanmania, a Tálukdári village in Viramgám Táluka, was supplied by the educational authorities at the urgent request of this Department. The sanction of the Civil Court to educational expenditure was refused in the case of No. 17 under section 324A of the Civil Procedure Code and an appeal against the Sub.-Judge's decision has been preferred to the High Court." In the Kaira District, two of the minors have discontinued their studies. Such of the others as are of school-going-age attend either the vernacular schools or the High School.

#### *Litigation.*

There was no important litigation in connection with any of the Estates.

I have the honour to submit the report on the Administration of minors' estates in the Central Division for the year ending 31st July 1908. Estates Nos. 2 and 4 in the preceding year's statement are omitted from this report in accordance with Government Resolution No. 9606, dated 21st September 1908, Revenue Department.

2. I attach a statement A showing the estates now under the guardianship of Collectors in this Division. At the commencement of the year there were nine such estates, three under the Collector of Sátára, two each under the Collector of Násik and Sholápur, and one each under the Collectors of Ahmednagar and West Khándesh. Three new estates were added during the year, one (No. 5) under the charge of the Collector of Násik and two (Nos. 6 and 7) under the Collector of Poona. During the year, the whole of the estate of the Kolewadikar Deshpande minors (No. 10) was ordered by the District Court, Sátára, to be handed over to the elder brother Krishnarao Wasudeo; but as there were some discrepancies in the Huzúr and táluka accounts, the cash balance could not be handed over. As soon as the discrepancies are reconciled, the cash balance will be handed over.

As regards personal guardianship, the Akola minors (No. 1) are in charge of their cousin, Bhau Pandoba. The West Khándesh minor (No. 2) is under the charge of the Mámlatdár of Sháháda. Of the four Násik minors, the two at Devargaon are under the joint guardianship of their mother and the Collector, while the Samner and Haste minors are in charge of near relatives. Of the two minors under the charge of the Collector of Poona, the Mokáshi minor (No. 6), who is only 6 years old, is under the care of his mother. The two Bokil minors (10) are in charge of their mother. The Ghadge minor (No. 9), who was in charge of his mother, died of enteric fever on the 12th June last. Inquiry as to succession is being made and meanwhile the estate continues under the administration of the Collector by order of the Civil Court. Of the two Sholápur minors, one (No. 12) is in charge of his mother, Laxmibai, and the other (No. 11) is in charge of Khán Bahádur Pir Mahomed Dafedar, a leading Mahomedan gentleman and an Honorary Magistrate of Sholápur.

3. The total income of estate No. 2 was Rs. 1,496 as against Rs. 1,767 in the previous year, the decrease being due to arrears of revenue on account of the bad season. In the estates of Devargaon and Samner (Nos. 3 and 4), the receipts from land show decreases owing to the unfavourable season: the crops were worse than in the previous year and suspensions and remissions had to be granted as in the adjoining Government villages. Under the head "income from other sources" there is a considerable increase in the case of the Devargaon estate, due to the recovery of debts due to the estate. The decrease in the produce of land in the case of the minor, Ghadge, (No. 8), is due to the bad season: the decrease of about Rs. 15,000 in other income is due to the fact that last year Rs. 15,000 were received from the Sávantvádi State on account of the expenditure for the marriage ceremony of the minor's sister and the education of the minor, while

no such payment was received during the year under report. In the case of the minor, Usafali (No. 11) the increase of income in column 13 is due to the sale proceeds of mango fruit, the outturn of which was especially good this year. In the case of the minor Giram (No. 12), the increase in income from lands is due partly to higher bids for the current year and partly to recovery of arrears. There were no important fluctuations in the receipts of the other estate. A statement giving the amount of land revenue assessed and of income derived this year from land is appended to this report as required by Government Resolution No. 6323, dated 25th June 1907, Revenue Department.

4. The increase of expenditure in the Devargaon estate (No. 3) is due to Expenditure. (a) increased cost of living owing to high prices, (b) transfer of *kadim* hakdars' dues from column 18 to column 16 and (c) payment in satisfaction of Civil Courts' decrees. In the Samner estate (No. 4) the increase in column 18 is due to the payment of half the income of the estate to a sub-sharer: the Collector does not explain why such a payment was not made last year, if there is a sub-sharer entitled to receive it. In the case of Ghadge estate (No. 8) the increase of about Rs. 450 in column 15 is due to the monthly allowance of the minor having been raised from Rs. 100 to Rs. 200 since April 1907: the decrease in column 16 is due to the fact that Government dues for two years were paid last year; the increase under column 17 is due the payment of two instalments of Rs. 2,000 each of the debt to Sávantvádi State; and the decrease under column 18 is due to the fact that Rs. 15,000, advanced by the Sávantvádi State to the minor Ghadge for his education and the marriage of his sister, were paid last year to the minor's mother; while there was no such payment this year. The decrease under column 15 for Usufali's estate (No. 11) is accounted for by the fact that large arrears of maintenance had to be paid last year. In the case of the minor Giram (No. 12), the purchase of promissory notes of the value of Rs. 2,000 and expenditure on the minor's marriage account for the large increase under the head "other expenditure". There were no important fluctuations in expenditure in respect of the remaining estates.

5. The practice of leasing out the agricultural lands and houses of minors, where possible, was continued during the year Management of immove- able property. under report. The season was not on the whole favourable and hence the recoveries made were smaller than those in the previous year. The house belonging to the minor Usufali (Sholápur District) is still in the possession of the minor's creditors. Any deductions from the previous year's statement of immoveable property are explained in column 7 of the statement.

6. There is a decrease of Rs. 1,364 under the head "moveable property" Moveable property. owing to this amount of cash having been wrongly shown in this column of last year. The moveable property belonging to the Kolewadikar minors (No. 10) was handed over to the elder minor Krishnarao according to the orders of the Civil Court.

7. The Akola and Khándesh estates are free from debt. The Haste estate Liabilities of the estates. (No. 5) has a debt of Rs. 1,200. In the case of the Devargaon estate, debts were satisfied as the funds allowed; but no special arrangements have been made for liquidation. In the Samner estate, no debts could be paid owing to lack of funds, and it is doubtful whether the heavy debt can ever be paid off. As regards the two new estates (Nos. 6 and 7) in the Poona district no liabilities have yet been reported. Of the Sátára minors, only the Ghadge estate is in debt, and Rs. 4,000 were paid during the year in liquidation. The Sholápur estates are not in debt.

8. The elder of the two Akola minors is being educated in the vernacular Education of minors. school at Vadale Bk. in the Shevgaon taluka. The Matkar minor, whose age is nearly eleven, attends the vernacular school at Sháháda, and a tutor has been engaged to give him private education at home: this minor is reported to be making good progress and the Collector found him to be a bright boy with good manners. All the minors in the Násik district are being educated in the Násik High School at

their conduct is reported to have been good. Of the two Poona minors Mokáshi, who is only 6 years old, is still with his mother, and information has not yet been obtained about Shindkar. In Sátára the elder Bokil and the elder Deshpande have now left school, while their younger brothers continue to attend the Sátára High School. The minor Usufali attends the Commercial Municipal School at Sholápur and is reported to be making good progress. The minor Giram is too young to attend school and a private tutor has been engaged for him.

9. An appeal against a decree in a suit decided in favour of the Devargaon minors was filed during the year under report, and is pending in the High Court. Four suits were filed, on behalf of the minor Giram, in the Civil Court, to obtain possession of lands. Of these, three were decided in favour of the minor and the fourth is still pending. In respect of the other estates, there was no litigation.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit my report on the administration of the estates of minors and others in my Division for the year ending 31st July 1908.

*Assumption and relinquishment of estates.*

2. The total number of estates under Government management at the commencement of the year was 22. Of these Nos. 1 in Belgaum and 18 in Dhárwár were released during the period concerned and arrangements are being made by the Collector of Dhárwár for the restoration of estates Nos. 14 and 15 as the minors attain majority. Three new estates—Nos. 12 and 13 in Belgaum and No. 25 in Kolába—were assumed during the year, thus bringing the present total to 23. No. 5 (2) is not a separate estate; but as Jijajirao appeared to possess an interest in the Nipáni Desai's non-watan property and as both of them had jointly incurred large liabilities, the former was declared a Government ward.

In the case of estate No. 3 only, is the person of the minor under the sole guardianship of the Collector; the minor owner of estate No. 25 is under the care and supervision of the Polico Pátíl of Pen and in all other cases the guardians are relatives of the respective minors.

Of the 23 estates under management the owners of 17 are minors. Nos. 4, 5, 6 and 10 were taken under management under section 9 and Nos. 7 and 13 under section 10 of the Court of Wards Act. Estate No. 2 was taken under Regulation VIII of 1827.

*Income.*

3. *Belgaum District.*—Estate No. 2.—Out of the total income of Rs. 12,067 the land revenue demand alone amounted to Rs. 12,066, of which Rs. 11,327 were recovered against Rs. 11,220 in 1906-1907. Of the arrears of previous years Rs. 526 were recovered and all the arrears dating since 1843 which amounted to Rs. 27,136 have been written off as irrecoverable except Rs. 129.

Estate No. 3.—The land revenue recoveries amounted to Rs. 25,875 against Rs. 21,424 in the year previous and this is due to the recoveries of rent of watan lands restored to the estate under the Watan Act. The increase under "other sources" is mostly due to the earnest-money received on the sale of timber belonging to the estate and to the higher price received from the mango crop.

Estate No. 4.—The nominal income is stated to be Rs. 2,396, of which Rs. 482 were received by the heirs of the ward, who is now dead, and the rest is taken by the mortgagees.

Estate No. 5.—The nominal land revenue demand is Rs. 23,227; but the demand on the lands in the ward's possession was Rs. 8,994 against Rs. 7,764 in 1903-1907. Rs. 7,907 were recovered and a small amount of Rs. 270 was remitted; the balance could not be recovered owing to the contentions of certain sub-alienees and tenants.

Estates Nos. 6, 8 and 10.—The bulk of the property is with mortgagees in possession.

Estate No. 7.—The land revenue demand was Rs. 43,258 against Rs. 39,523 in the previous year and the recoveries were Rs. 33,118 against Rs. 28,115. Rs. 1,558 were remitted and a sum of Rs. 2,868 was suspended. An amount of Rs. 1,413 on account of arrears of past years was recovered and Rs. 1,216 being arrears of previous years were remitted. The increase in the amounts of demands and recoveries is stated to be due to the demesne lands which were cultivated privately by the late Sir Desai, being let for cash rents and better offers for them.

Estate No. 9.—The minor has no landed property. He gets a monthly allowance of Rs. 85 from his uncle, the Jahagirdar of Here.

Estate No. 11.—Calls for no remarks.

Estate No. 12.—The land revenue demand was Rs. 8,072 and 48½ khandis of rice (1 khandi = 1,920 seers of 80 tolas), of which Rs. 7,210 and 39½ khandis of rice were recovered. Of the arrears of Rs. 3,498 and 41 khandis of rice, Rs. 359 and 2 khandis of rice were recovered.

*Dhárwār District.*—This season was more favourable than the preceding one and, therefore, the rents were recovered in the case of estates Nos. 17, 20 and 21. The apparent decrease in the income of estates Nos. 14, 15, 16, 18, 19 and 22 is due to the fact that last year's figures included recoveries of dues of previous years, a feature which is absent this year. Estate No. 23 has not yet come under Government management owing to litigation. There has been an apparent increase in the income under column 14 in the case of estate No. 14. It represents the interest on Government promissory notes. The variations in the case of other estates are immaterial.

*Kánara District.*—The fluctuations here again are too small to need any comment.

*Kolába District.*—The minor's property is reported to consist in few pots and ornaments together worth Rs. 86. The Collector has been asked to report the means of maintaining the minor after this small amount, which is now devoted for her maintenance, is exhausted; and to state whether she cannot be entrusted to the care of her relatives if she has any.

#### *Expenditure.*

4. *Belgaum District.*—Estate No. 2.—The total expenditure was Rs. 9,154 against Rs. 17,585. The noticeable variations are:—Rs. 5,000 were paid in part payment of a decree for Rs. 41,084 while in the year previous the payment on this account was of Rs. 10,000. In 1906-1907 Rs. 4,000 were spent in connection with Baba Maháráj's daughter's marriage which expenditure was absent in the year of report.

Estate No. 3.—The increase is noticeable under the first three columns under expenditure. The allowance of the step-mother of the minor was increased from Rs. 1,200 to Rs. 2,000 from January 1903 and Rs. 19,021 were paid in satisfaction of claims against Rs. 6,647 in the previous year.

Estate No. 5.—The total expenditure was Rs. 11,656 against Rs. 2,477 in 1906-1907. The Desai is given an allowance of Rs. 250 a month and Jijajirao Rs. 40. Rs. 3,208 were paid in satisfaction of claims against none last year.

Estate No. 6.—A sum of Rs. 8,049 was expended during the year against Rs. 47 in the previous one. Rs. 6,000 were paid to redeem lands in the Jamkhandi State yielding an annual income of Rs. 1,087.

Estate No. 7.—The difference is chiefly due to Rs. 8,096 paid less this year on account of claims. Rs. 2,686 were paid proportionately towards the cost of the establishment under the Collector for the managed estates. Rs. 780 were paid under the Court's order to remove an embankment erected by the late Sir Desai in another man's land. Rs. 547 were paid this year to a merchant who supplied gram and other necessaries to the widow of the Desai during her stay in Belgaum.

Estates Nos. 8 to 11.—The fluctuations here are too small to need any comment.

Estate No. 12.—In this case the figures are the results of the first year's working and, therefore, call for no remarks.

*Dhárwad District.*—The rise in the cost of maintenance in the case of estates Nos. 14 and 19 is due to the arrears of past years paid this year and the decrease in the case of Nos. 18, 20 and 22 is accounted for by the fact that the last year's figures included arrears of the previous year.

Under column 16 the increase is noticed in the case of estate No. 21 and it is explained by the fact that there were no suspensions or remissions this year, and in consequence the whole of the current year's demand and the suspended instalments of the previous years had to be paid. The decrease in the case of Nos. 14 to 18 and 20 is explained by the fact that the last year's figures included the payments of arrears of previous years.

The increase under "other expenses" in the case of No. 18 is due to the Court expenses; that in the cases of Nos. 21 and 22 to Javal (hair-cutting) and marriage expenses respectively of the minors; while that in the case of No. 20 is due to the payment of remuneration of two dancing girls who performed service in the temple of Shri Venkatesh at Nargund for the minor's deceased mother.

*Kánara District.*—The decrease under "other expenditure" is only nominal, last year a Government Promissory Note of Rs. 500 having been purchased. Rs. 100 were spent on account of the illness of the minor.

In Kolába the expenditure of the minor is met by disposing of the pots and ornaments.

#### *Management of immoveable property.*

5. None of the lands are under departmental management. The houses and lands are leased out for a term of years at fixed rents.

#### *Moveable property.*

6. The only estates, the moveable property of which is in charge of the Collector of Belgaum, are Nos. 3, 7 and 9. Ornaments and other articles belonging to estate No. 1 were delivered to the Desai at the time of his and his brother's marriages. The remaining ornaments of the Tallur Desai are still in the safes of the Sirsangi Desgat. The Collector will be asked to take early steps to restore them to the owner. The box containing the valuables of the Here boy was brought from Kolhápur and has been deposited in the Huzúr Treasury at Belgaum, and it has not yet been opened. The inadvisibility of keeping such a box for a long time without examining its contents, will be brought to the notice of the Collector. Moveable property pertaining to other estates needs no remarks.

#### *Liabilities.*

7. The estates practically free from debt are 9, 11, 12, 14, 15, 17, 21, 24 and 25. Estate No. 7 owes Rs. 28,200 to Government on account of tagái loans. No loans were raised for any of the estates except No. 6 for which Rs. 8,000 were borrowed at 6 per cent. from the Sir Desai of Wantmuri. In the case of Nos. 2, 3, 16 and 19 arrangements have been made for the discharge of debts out of their income. Estates Nos. 4, 5, 8, 10 and 16 are heavily involved. An application for the grant of a loan of Rs. 1,75,000 to the Nipáni Desgat Estate was submitted to Government, but they in their Memo. No. 6509 of 29th June 1908, have asked me to report whether the amount or any part of it required to clear the estate can be raised by loan at a reasonable interest in the open market and if not, whether it will be a fit case for a loan by Government under Government Resolutions Nos. 8037 of 13th October 1896 and 11193 of 16th November 1907. A report on these points is awaited from the Collector.

#### *Education.*

8. The Kowjalgi boy attends the Sirdars High School at Belgaum and is in 2nd Standard. His progress and conduct are reported to be satisfactory. The



Here minor resides with his co-guardian at Kolhápur and attends the Rajaram High School there. He is also in the 2nd Standard and is doing well. Nothing has been said by the Collector regarding the education of Saheb Pachha (No. 8) who presumably attends no school. The Collector will be requested to take steps, if possible, towards educating this boy. Wards Nos. 18, 20 and 23 attend no school. No. 14 failed at the last Matric Examination and is now studying privately. The other minors in Dhárwár are studying at places mentioned in column 6 of the statement, and are believed to be making fair progress. The Sirsi minor is attending the Kárwár High School and is in the Matric class. His conduct is said to be good and his progress fairly satisfactory.

### *Litigation.*

9. Estate No. 2.—It appears that the two decrees for Rs. 4,427 and 861 referred to in the last year's report were personal decrees against Baba Maháráj's widow, Tai Maháráj, now dead. The fresh suit brought against the tenant for quit-rent is still pending.

Estate No. 5.—Appeals were made by the plaintiffs in the two suits decided in favour of the estate, but they were dismissed. Two suits are reported to have been decided against the estate. The decretal amounts in these cases have, however, not been given by the Collector. An appeal against one of the decisions is pending. Four darkhásts were filed against the estate. One of them was rejected, in two instalments were granted and in one the execution was stayed on a private compromise.

Estate No. 7.—Two suits on money bonds filed in 1906-1907 were decided in favour of the estate. Twenty-two suits were filed during the year, of which 11 were decided in favour of the estate and 7 are pending. Four suits involving an amount of Rs. 730 were decided against the estate. Of the two appeals filed against the estate, one was dismissed and the other is pending as well as the execution proceedings in connection with 9 decrees.

Estate No. 10.—The appeal made to the Sánгли State Court on behalf of the estate was dismissed and the suit against the estate in the Belgaum Sub-Judge's Court is still pending.

Estate No. 12.—Eight suits on money bonds and promissory notes in aggregate for Rs. 445 were filed on behalf of the estate, of which 4 were decided in favour of, 2 against the estate and 2 are pending. Two suits on mortgage bonds for Rs. 265 brought in favour of the estate are pending.

One suit against No. 17 and 2 against No. 22 are pending in the Civil Courts. There was no litigation as regards other estates in Dhárwár, Kánara and Kolába Districts.

10. The statement called for in paragraph 7 of Government Resolution No. 6323 of 25th June 1907 accompanies. For the reasons given in the last year's report the statement does not show the lands of the Nipáni Estate paying full assessment to Government. For the same reasons the bulk of land belonging to estate No. 12 and paying full assessment to Government has been omitted from the statement.

### *General remarks.*

11. All the important estates are in Belgaum in which district some estates are of first class importance and the Collector has a personal Assistant to help him in the management; good work is being done in clearing some estates from debt; others are unfortunately hopelessly involved.

12. I have not put this report in the form sanctioned by Government Resolution No. 9606 of 21st ultimo, as it was practically ready when the Government Resolution was received. With reference to the new form I suggest that the great desideratum is that the financial condition of each estate should be easily ascertainable from the report and statements. If however the details

as to income, expenditure, &c., are given for each estate separately in the report, then you can only ascertain the financial position of each estate by referring to several parts of several separate paragraphs of the report and to the statement. Explanations, therefore, of the figures given in the statements should be given in a column of remarks or in an appendix to the statement separately for each estate instead of as now in the report for each head. The report itself should deal only in totals for all the estates.

13. I regret I did not make this proposal when I signed the joint letter proposing the rules and forms now sanctioned. It did not occur to me till I came to deal with the report now sent.

HONOURABLE SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Report on the Administration of Minors' Estates in the Province of Sind for the year 1907-1908. The usual statements Nos. 1 and 2 are appended.

*Assumption and relinquishment of Estates.*

2. The number of estates under the guardianship of the Collectors and Deputy Commissioners at the commencement of the year was 79, of which 9 were released during the year, (4 in the Lárkána District, 3 in the Sukkur District, and 2 in the Upper Sind Frontier District,) on the owners attaining majority. Ten new estates were added during the year, (2 in the Karachi District, 3 in the Hyderabad District, 3 in the Lárkána District, and 2 in the Thar and Párkar District,) so that the total number of estates under guardianship at the close of the year was 80 as shown in Statement No. I. In pursuance of the proposals approved in Government Resolution No. 4007, dated 21st April 1908, arrangements are in progress for the transfer of some of these estates to the management of the Court of Wards for Sind.

3. Out of the 80 estates under guardianship, in the case of 5 estates only are the persons of the minors under the guardianship of District Officers, the owners of the remaining estates being in charge of their relatives and friends.

*Income.*

4. There was an increase of Rs. 991 in the income of estate No. 1—a non-agricultural estate—owing chiefly to the recovery of a sum of Rs. 931 due to the minors under a Civil Court decree. Estates Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 7 are under leases. The slight variations observable comparison with last year's figures in the income of the first two of these estates are due to ordinary fluctuations in the area brought under cultivation. The decrease against estate No. 4 is due to the postponement of the recovery of the lease-money in consideration of the losses suffered by the lessee owing to the poor inundation of the year. The income of estate No. 7 from land is made up of the following items:—

As explained in the last report, of the income estate No. 5 represents the assessment paid by the minor's uncle who manages the lands and maintains the minor from the produce. Estates Nos. 6, 8 and 9 were worked departmentally,



as no arrangements for leasing them could be made during the year. Estates Nos. 6 and 8 have since been leased, but there is still a difficulty in getting a fair offer for No. 9 owing to there being a dispute over the property. The "other income" of estate No. 8 comprises the following items:—

5. All the estates in this district, except No. 16, show a decrease in the gross income from land. This result is ascribed by the Collector to "less cultivation caused by deficiency of water-supply." The increase appearing against estate No. 16 is merely nominal, being due to the fact that the corresponding figure in the preceding year's statement did not include the amount of assessment paid by the lessee direct to Government. The figure in column 13 against estate No. 17 represents only the assessment paid by the lessee, the lease-money due for the year not having been recovered within the year. The income from "Other sources" amounted to Rs. 2,273, as against Rs. 5,574 in the preceding year. The bulk of the preceding year's receipts consisted of recoveries of debts due to minors. There were fewer debts to recover this year, hence the falling off above noticed.

6. In this district, as elsewhere, the receipts from land on the whole show a considerable falling off, owing to contraction in cultivation. Some of the estates (Nos. 25, 28, 35, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42 and 43) show an increase, but, except in the case of estates Nos. 25 and 40, the increases are all small. In the two cases excepted, the recovery of the ensuing year's lease-money in the year under report accounts for the increase. Under the head "Other income," the only fluctuations of importance are the increases in the case of estates Nos. 24, 25, 38 and 40, and the decreases in Nos. 27, 30 and 45. The increase in estates Nos. 24 and 25 is due to enhanced receipts from interest on securities and, in the case of estates Nos. 38 and 40, to recoveries of debts. The removal of some buildings which fetched fairly good rents in the preceding years caused the decrease in estate No. 27, while in the case of estate No. 45 the decrease is due to the absence of recoveries of debts, which made up the bulk of last year's figures. No explanation has been given by the Collector as regards the decrease in estate No. 30, but it is presumably due to the preceding year's figures having included arrears of interest.

7. Estates Nos. 51, 52 and 53 realized no income from land. No. 67 is a non-agricultural estate, and no comparison is possible in the case of estates Nos. 65 and 66, as the previous year's figures are not available. Of the remaining estates, Nos. 57, 60 and 64 show an increase. The cause is not explained by the Collector, but the increase in the case of the first two is insignificant. In the case of the last it is probably due to increased cultivation. All the other estates show a decrease on account of the deficiency of water-supply. The lease money due from the lessees of estates Nos. 55, 56, 62 and 63 could not be realized in full and this caused a further decrease in the figures of income shown against them. The sum of Rs. 9,765, appearing in column 13 against estate No. 55, includes Rs. 600 received by the minor in adjustment of his claim to a house of disputed ownership. As regards "Other income", noteworthy variations appear in the case of estates Nos. 55, 59, 62, 63, 56 and 64 only. The first four show increases due, in the case of estates Nos. 59 and 63 to recovery of old debts, and in that of the other two to receipts from the sale of landed property. The decrease in estate No. 56 is due to diminished receipts of the estate-owner's Patádári and in the case of No. 64 to the previous year's receipts having included the sale-proceeds of a house.

8. The income from land in the case of both the estates which have been under guardianship since the commencement of the year (*viz.*, Nos. 68 and 69) has diminished. The apparent excess in the case of the former over the preceding year's figures is wholly accounted for by the fact that the latter figures represented but a part of the lease-money due for the year. The other income of estate No. 68, which consists of interest on securities, remains unaltered. Estates Nos. 70 and 71 have been recently taken up, and the figures of income shown against them do not require explanation.

9. All the estates show a decrease in the income from land. In the case of estates Nos. 75, 77 and 78 the decrease is attributable to the low inundation of the year. Estate No. 78 was under a lease which expired during the year. Arrangements for re-leasing it have been completed, but, as the lease-money has not been received, the income shows a falling off. Estate No. 74 is managed by the minor who appropriates the produce, the value of which, not being known, has not been included in column 13. The agricultural land comprised in estate No. 80 was hitherto owned by the minor in co-partnership with others. In the year under report his share was separated and leased; and this has caused a slight diminution in the income of the estate. As regards income from "Other sources," there was none in the case of estate No. 71, the sum of Rs. 43 realised last year being the balance of a fine payable to the minor under a judgment in a *Jirga* case. The sum of Rs. 805 appearing in column 14 against estate No. 76 represents the value of the produce of a garden recovered under a Civil Court decree from a person who had wrongly appropriated the produce. The "Other income" of estate No. 78 consists of rent realized from a shop; that of estate No. 79 of interest on promissory notes.

#### *Expenditure.*

10. There has been hardly any fluctuation in the cost of maintenance (column 15). The figures in column 16 (Government dues) represent mostly the amount of assessment paid by the estate owners or on their behalf by the lessees. The expenditure under this head depends upon the area brought under cultivation in each year; the variations in it do not therefore call for any further explanation. The difference of Rs. 16 between the figures in columns 10 and 16 against estate No. 8 represents interest on takávi loans granted to the minor. The only important item under the head "Other expenditure" is the sum of Rs. 1,306 appearing against estate No. 1. It is composed of the following expenditure:—

11. Except in the case of estate No. 13 the cost of maintenance has been practically the same as in the previous year. No maintenance allowance was given to the owner of estate No. 13 in the year under report, as he has been allowed to manage his lands himself under the Collector's supervision. The expenditure under the head "Government dues" shows a falling off of Rs. 2,240 owing to a decrease

in the area under cultivation. The figure appearing in column 16 against estate No. 18 includes a sum of Rs. 32, being the occupancy price of certain land purchased for the minor. The decrease under "Other expenditure" is due to smaller expenditure having been incurred in the year under report on law-suits and funeral ceremonies than in the previous year. The large decrease in the case of estate No. 20 is accounted for by the fact that the owner had purchased a house in the preceding year, which cost him Rs. 1,300, and no such expenditure was incurred on his behalf in the year under report.

12. The only variations in the cost of maintenance requiring explanation are those in the case of estates Nos. 31 and 38. The Lárkána District. owner of the former, who used to be maintained by his grandmother, got married this year, and now receives a regular monthly allowance, which in the year under report aggregated to Rs. 880. The allowance of the owner of estate No. 38 has been stopped on his ceasing to attend the Madressah. Under the head "Government dues", the increases observable in the case of estates Nos. 24, 28 and 34 are due to the payment of past year's arrears. In the remaining estates the fluctuations are the result of increase or decrease in cultivation. The details of the sum of Rs. 4,307, representing the total "Other expenditure" of the estates in this district, are given below:—

13. The cost of maintenance shows an increase owing to the owners of estates Nos. 59, 60, 61, 64 and 66, formerly maintained by their relatives, having been paid fixed maintenance allowances for the first time in the year under report. The increases under the head "Government dues" in the case of estates Nos. 57, 61 and 62 are due to this year's figures including arrears of Land Revenue paid by the lessees. Of the sum of Rs. 9,015 appearing in column 17 (discharge of liabilities) Rs. 8,500 were paid on behalf of estate No. 62 alone in satisfaction of a Civil Court decree. The more important items of the expenditure shown in column 18 are detailed below:—

(a) Marriage expenses amounting to Rs. 5,000 in the case of estate No. 57.

(b) Cost of repairs to buildings amounting to Rs. 216 in the case of estate No. 55, Rs. 150 in the case of estate No. 62 and Rs. 133 in the case of estate No. 63.

(c) Fees to pleaders amounting to Rs. 121 in the case of estate No. 54, Rs. 116 in the case of estate No. 55 and Rs. 200 in the case of estate No. 63.

and (d) Payment of a sum of Rs. 160 to the owner of estate No. 59 for starting a shop.

14. The cost of maintenance in the case of estate No. 68 is included in the sum of Rs. 31,520 shown in column 18. The Thar and Párkar District. owners of estate No. 69 were for the first time given a sum of Rs. 241 for their maintenance. No such allowance was paid to the minors belonging to estates Nos. 70 and 71, but enquiries are being made as to

their requirements. The following are the details of the "Other expenditure" incurred by estate No. 63:—

15. The variations in the figures of column 15 (cost of maintenance) are too small to require explanation, except in the case of estate No. 80, the owner of which received a maintenance allowance of Rs. 87 for the first time in the year under report. The expenditure under "Government dues" was smaller owing to the badness of the season. Under the head "Other expenditure" the only item of importance is the sum of Rs. 150 appearing against estate No. 75. It represents the cost of bullocks purchased on behalf of the minor.

*Management of immoveable property.*

16. Out of the 80 estates under management, 58 are wholly under leases for a term of years, and 6 (Nos. 9, 18, 19, 23, 51 and 53) are under departmental management. In 4 estates (Nos. 1, 67, 72 and 79) there are no agricultural lands to lease. The remaining 12 estates are accounted for as under:—

(a) Estates Nos. 6, 8 and 21 have been leased since the close of the year.

(b) Arrangements are being made to lease estate No. 70 which in the meanwhile is being worked departmentally.

(c) Estates Nos. 20, 24 and 25 are partly leased and partly under departmental or private management.

(d) In the case of estates Nos. 5, 13, 26 and 74 the cultivation is carried on by the minors themselves or by their relatives.

(e) The owner of estate No. 14 is dead; his property will be shortly handed over to his mother or other rightful heir as may be decided by the District Court.

17. The season was decidedly unfavourable, and there was a shrinkage of cultivation within the limits of the estates under guardianship.

18. During the year under report the following changes occurred in the properties held by the minors:—

Estate No. 1.—A strip of land measuring 3 square yards was acquired by the Karáchi Municipality.

Estates Nos. 25 and 35.—One acre at a cost of Rs. 173 was purchased for the former estate, and 16 acres for the latter.

Estate No. 55.—One house was surrendered in adjustment of a dispute.

Estate No. 62.—A house was sold to satisfy a Civil Court decree.

Estate No. 63.—An area measuring 15 acres 30 gunthas was acquired.

Estates Nos. 60 and 66.—The decrease in the areas shown in column 9 against these estates is accounted for by the fact that the preceding year's figures represented the total area held by the minor in partnership with others, whereas the areas entered in the present statement are those belonging solely to the minors.

Estate No. 63.—There is a decrease of 262 acres in the area shown in column 9, which is due to forfeiture under the fallow rules and to a slight extent to Survey operations.

Estate No. 78.—37 acres of land lapsed to Government on account of non-payment of fallow assessment.

*Moveable property.*

19. The only fluctuations requiring explanation are the following :—

Estate No. 35.—The increase in column 11 represents the value of ornaments made for the minor in view of her approaching marriage.

Estate No. 55.—The minor owns some ornaments which are deposited at the Huzúr Treasury at Sukkur. Their value has hitherto not been shown in column 11 through oversight.

Estate No. 68.—The excess over the previous year's figures is due to the purchase of dead stock articles, carriage and horses by two of the co-owners who are major, and one of whom practises at Hyderabad as a Barrister-at-Law.

*Liabilities of the estates.*

20. Out of the 80 estates shown in the statement, 53 are unincumbered with any debts. The following remarks are offered with regard to the remaining 27:—

21. The total debts against estate No. 6 amounted to Rs. 1,109, of which  
Karáchi District. Rs. 24 were paid to the debtors from the private funds of the minor and Rs. 225 are not claimed by a decree-holder. The amount is thus reduced to Rs. 860, the claims with regard to which are under enquiry.

The claims against estate No. 7 which are still unsettled, are doubtful and the creditors have been referred to the Civil Court. The liabilities of estate No. 9 have not yet been ascertained.

22. A sum of Rs. 50 was paid on behalf of each of estates Nos. 14 and 16.  
Hyderabad District. The remaining indebted estate (No. 21) has only been recently taken up.

23. Out of the sum of Rs. 9,929 owed by estate No. 24 to Government,  
Lárkána District. Rs. 9,168 were paid during the year under report and Rs. 634 were remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 37. The sum of Rs. 358 appearing against this estate in column 17, represents the cost of medicines purchased some three or four years ago, a bill for which was only received during the year of report. A sum of Rs. 100 was paid in liquidation of the Government debts of estate No. 28, and a substantial reduction was effected in the amounts of private debts outstanding against estates Nos. 42 and 45. Negotiations are in progress for the discharge of the debts shown against estates Nos. 25 and 48. The debts of the remaining estates, viz., Nos. 33, 39, 41, 43 and 44, will be discharged as funds permit.

24. The estates still involved in debt are those bearing Nos. 52, 53, 54,  
Sukkur District. 58, 60, 61, 62, 64 and 65. The most notable payment towards the discharge of liabilities is that of Rs. 8,500 in the case of estate No. 62. The rejection by the Civil Court of a Civil Suit pending against this estate, further reduced its liabilities by Rs. 27,950. Including the sum of Rs. 3,277, which has only recently been ascertained to be due by the estate, its net liabilities at the end of the year amounted to Rs. 9,959.

25. The estates in these districts are free from debt. The sum of  
Thar and Párkar and Upper Sind Frontier Dis- Rs. 1,016 appearing in column 23 against estate  
tricts. No. 68 represents the amount of assessment due from the lessees.

*Education of minors.*

26. Of the only two minors (estates Nos. 6 and 9) whose persons are under  
Karáchi District. the guardianship of the Collector, one is too young to go to school; the other is being educated at a village school. Of the remaining minors, only one, Rijhumal, belonging to estate No. 1, goes to school.

27. Of the 19 male minors whose estates are under guardianship, six Hyderabad District. (Sajan of estate No. 11, Jeram of estate No. 15, Obhayo and Nur Muhammad of estate No. 17, and Fakir Muhammad and Saleh of estate No. 21) are receiving education. One (estate No. 23) will shortly be sent to school, one (No. 14) is dead, two (20 and 22) are not yet of school-going age, and the estate of one has been discharged since the close of the year. The rest are of an advanced age and carry on cultivation.

28. Out of the 31 male wards under guardianship, 14 only are being Lárkána District. educated, 1 at the Karáchi Madressah, 3 at the Lárkána Madressah, one at the A.-V. School, Lárkána, and 9 in village schools.

29. There are in all 34 minors, of whom 9 are girls. Of the remaining 25, Sukkur District. twelve go to school; two know the Arabic character, two have learnt the Bania character and five are over the school-going age. Steps will be taken to give some sort of education to the remaining four.

30. Of the male minors under guardianship, Messrs. Ghulam Muhammad and Jan Muhammad (estate No. 1) have attained Thar and Párkar Dis- majority, the rest are all receiving education—Ghulam trict. Hussain (estate No. 68) at the Government High School, Hyderabad, Ahmad Ali Shah (estate No. 69) at Umarnkot and Nihal Khan, Ahsan Ali Khan and Sayad Khan (estates Nos. 70 and 71) at the Pithoro Madressah.

31. As the persons of the minors are not in charge of the Deputy Com- missioner, their education is looked after by their Upper Sind Frontier Dis- relatives. Khush Muhammad (estate No. 80) con- trict. tinues to attend the Jacobabad Boarding School.

#### *Litigation.*

32. The suit pending on behalf of estate No. 1 was decided in favour of Karáchi District. the minor. Three suits were commenced against estate No. 9, one by certain ladies of the minor's family for partition of his property, and the other two by some creditors of the estate for a share in the produce of land belonging to minor. Arrangements have been made to compromise the first suit; the others will have to be defended.

33. The suits reported last year as having been filed on behalf of estate Hyderabad District. No. 20 are still pending. No fresh suits were filed on behalf of or against the minors.

34. Two Civil Suits for partition of property were filed against Sher Lárkána District. Muhammad (estate No. 31), and are being defended. The plaintiffs have proposed a compromise, the terms of which are under consideration.

35. Of the five suits reported as pending last year, Sukkur District. four were decided during the year with the following results :—

(a) The suit on behalf of estate No. 59 was decided in favour of the minor who was awarded Rs. 150.

(b) The suit filed on behalf of estate No. 55 was compromised, the minor receiving Rs. 600 under the terms of the compromise.

(c) Of the two suits pending against estate No. 62, one was withdrawn by the plaintiff, the other was rejected by the District Court.

Three new suits were instituted, one against estate No. 53 for the recovery of a debt, and two against estate No. 55. One of the latter was by the minor's step-mother for her share in the property left by her deceased husband, the other by one Sahibdino for possession of certain agricultural land and its mesno profits.

Two suits were filed on behalf of estate No. 55 against its lessces, and in both of them the minors' claims were upheld by the Court.

36. None of the estates in this district are involved in litigation.  
Tlar and Párkar District.

37. The suits against estates Nos. 73 and 77 have not yet been decided. The three suits filed in the previous year on behalf of estate No. 76 have been decided in favour of the minor. The question of filing a suit on behalf of estate of No. 75 is still the subject of correspondence.

Letter from the Collector of Belgaum, No. 255, dated 21st January 1909:—

"With reference to your No. S.P.—497, dated 18th November last, I have the honour to state that the Collector is not guardian of the person of the minor. His maternal uncle, the Desái of Ankalgi, takes care of him. On inquiry from the Desái I learn that a private teacher is engaged for the boy and that he is studying English. The Desái intends to send the lad to the High School in Belgaum as soon as he has completed the 3rd standard."

Memorandum from the Commissioner, S. D., No. 288, dated 26th January 1909:—

"Submitted to Government for information with reference to the remarks regarding the education of Sáheb Paohha made in paragraph 9 of the Commissioner's report No. 4682 of 15th October last on the administration of the estates of minors and others in the Southern Division for the year ending 31st July 1908."

Letter from the Collector of Kolába, No. 1375, dated 18th March 1909:—

"Referring to your No. 4025, dated the 8rd September last, I have the honour to state that the minor has got one relation only, her elder brother in the Khándesh District, but he is not willing to take care of his sister.

"2. The minor is kept under the care and supervision of the Police Pátíl of Pen, but he being a Mahomedan she takes her food and remains with one Laxmibái, a friend of her mother's. Laxmibái maintains herself by labour, and she says that after the minor's property is exhausted, she would maintain the girl from the wages she would get as she would do her own daughter of about the same age.

"3. The minor is aged eight years and she could be sent to the girls' school in Pen.

"4. The Mámlatdár of Pen reports that there is no objection to allow the minor to remain with Laxmibái, her present guardian, instead of sending her to any home."

Memorandum from the Commissioner, S. D., No. 954, dated 25th March 1909:—

"Submitted to Government with reference to the concluding part of paragraph 3 of this office No. 4682, dated 15th October last.

"2. The Collector is being asked to send the minor to the girls' school in Pen and allow her to remain with Laxmibái, present guardian of the minor."

**RESOLUTION.**—Omitting these estates under the superintendence of the Courts of Wards for which separate reports have been submitted, there were at the beginning of the year in the Presidency and Sind 173 Minors' Estates under management. Of these, fifteen were released during the year, while 21 new estates were taken over, with the result that at the end of July 1908, 183 estates were being managed under Act VIII of 1890, and one under Bombay Regulation VIII of 1827. The Tálukdári Settlement Officer was responsible for the administration of 52 estates—the remainder being under the Collectors.

2. All the noticeable points in connection with the income and expenditure of the individual estates have been mentioned and explained by the Commissioners. In the Presidency proper the season was far from favourable.

while the inundation in Sind is said to have been the worst on record. In the circumstances management was no easy task, and the results achieved are creditable. The total Government demand for land revenue payable on the estates was Rs. 1,50,039, and the collections, inclusive of arrears, Rs. 1,51,594. The estates realised an income of no less than Rs. 3,43,790 from land, or somewhat more than twice the amount of the Government dues. It appears, however, from the statements appended to the reports that in the case of some 40 estates the rent realised was less than twice the assessment, the percentage of such estates being largest in the Central Division and Sind. The income from non-agricultural sources amounted to Rs. 59,828, making the total income for the year Rs. 4,03,618. The expenditure for the same period was Rs. 3,93,874, of which sum, Rs. 73,866 was for maintenance, Rs. 1,51,594 for Government dues, and Rs. 34,715 for liquidation of debts. The balance in cash and securities at the end of the year was Rs. 6,01,768.

3. Practically all the estates in the Central and Southern Divisions were leased out, while in Sind this form of management was followed in the case of 58 out of 80 estates. Government observe with satisfaction that the efforts made in the Northern Division to overcome the opposition of persons interested in the estates and substitute the system of leasing for departmental management have met with considerable success. The arrangements made for the custody and disposal of moveable property appear to have been adequate, save in the case of the Here estate to which the Commissioner, S. D., has drawn attention.

4. At the close of the year the gross liabilities of the estates amounted to Rs. 7,00,913, which figure, it is estimated, represents an approximate reduction of 25 per cent. on their total liabilities at the time of their coming under management. The total indebtedness of the estates in Sind is remarkably small, and there is in that Province scarcely one estate the financial position of which is desperate. Nearly three-quarters of the total liabilities pertain to the estates in the Northern Division where several debts of importance were only brought to light during the past year. It is observed that the outstanding debts to Government are in several cases considerable. For example, the Bápumia Estate (No. 25) owed Rs. 25,000 to Government, and yet found it possible to make considerable advances to other estates. Of the estates the liabilities of which had been definitely ascertained, some 113 in all were free from debt or owed less than one year's income at the end of the year, while 34 were seriously involved.

5. The reports were received from the Commissioners, Northern and Southern Divisions, within a few days of the prescribed date; that of the Commissioner, C. D., was despatched on December 18th, and that of the Commissioner in Sind not until January 20th. Government hope that in future every effort will be made to avoid such delay. With regard to the remarks made by the Commissioner, S. D., in paragraph 12 of his report it should be pointed out that the form of report approved in Government Resolution No. 9606, dated 21st September 1908, was primarily intended to apply only to the estates under the Court of Wards. Government agree with the Commissioner as to the desirability of eliminating from the body of such reports all details which can be adequately explained in the tabular statements, but consider it advisable to make no change in the form of the reports on the administration of minors' estates at least until experience has proved the suitability of the new forms.
