Sir,

I have the honour to submit the report on the Administration of Minors' Estates in the Northern Division for the year ending 31st July 1911.

2. At the commencement of the year 66 Estates were under management, 44 in Ahmedabad, Kaira and Broach of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer and 22 of Collectors. Of the former, six were released from management, *viz.* Nos. 1, 25, 26, 41, 42 and 43, but management, except in the case of No. 26, was continued under Section 28 of the Gujarát Tálukdárs' Act. Of the estates managed by Collectors, two in Broach (Nos. 56 and 58) were released, the former was restored as the minor came of age, while the latter was transferred to the District Court as the minor died without heirs. In the case of Estate No. 52 the minor died leaving a minor widow; the estate therefore continued under management. Only one new estate (No. 49) came under management during the year by the Collector of Kaira. The number under management at the close of the year was 59 :—

Statement A appended gives the usual particulars with regard to each Estate.

*Income.*

3. In the Dhandhuka Táluka, where a great many of the estates are situated, the crops were much damaged by "frost" and little revenue could be recovered. One estate in Broach also suffered appreciably. The advantage of leasing estates becomes very apparent in such circumstances. Excluding the income of estates which were released from management during the previous year, there is a difference of about Rs. 20,000 in the income realised between this year and last.

The most important fluctuations under the head "Income from other sources," which is less by nearly Rs. 10,000 than last year, are explained in the "Remarks" column of Statement A.

A Statement (B) giving information regarding the area, assessment and gross income of land (on which full assessment is paid) belonging to each Estate is also attached.

*Maintenance Allowance.*

4. As compared with the previous year the figures show a decrease of over 5,000 due mainly to the exclusion of figures for Estates which were released from the Tálukdári Settlement Officer's management last year and the large reduction in the case of the Mogar Estate of Shivsing Gumansing who was paid part of the allowances in advance.

The balance is made up of small amounts.

*Other Expenditure.*

5. Particulars have been given in the Statement: the total increase of Rs. 10,000 is due mainly to marriages and expenses on litigation.

The Government dues were wholly suspended in the case of the Pipli and Advál Estates and suspension of half was allowed to the Lolia Estates under the orders of the Collector of Ahmedabad on account of damage to the crops. The amounts suspended have been added to the figures in column 23 of the Statement. Otherwise the Government demands were duly paid.

In Kaira the Sinhuj Estate could not pay the land revenue demand.

*3.—Management of Immoveable Property.*

Of the Estates in the Tálukdári Settlement Officer's charge 23 were managed departmentally while the remaining 21 were leased. Of the latter, 8 are situated in Dhandhuka Táluka, 5 in Viramgám, 4 in Dholka, 2 in Gogha and 2 in Thásra. The distribution of leased estates is wider and the number is larger.

The Bhetasi Estate in Kaira has been given out on annual leases, but the Sinhuj Estate is too scattered to be leased.

Both the Estates with the Collector of the Panch Maháls are administered by Japtidárs on behalf of the Collector. The village records of the Metral Estate still remain to be prepared according to the Survey rates.

In order to improve cultivation the Collector of Broach has introduced triennial instead of annual leases and the experiment will be extended to all Estates if it proves successful.

Certain rather serious defects in the management of the Zadeshwar Estate are engaging the careful attention of the Collector who hopes to secure better results with the new rules for management which he has drafted.

*Moveable Property.*

6. The aggregate total value of moveable property belonging to the Estates was Rs. 89,210 as against Rs. 1,13,383 in the preceding year.

*Liabilities of Estates.*

7. The liabilities of all Estates at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 2,98,731 of which Rs. 47,592 are due to Government and Rs. 2,51,139 to other creditors. These figures compare favourably with last year and the original debts.

The character of the season prevented rapid progress in repayment of Government debts, but the reduction of the debt by Rs. 13,000 may be regarded as satisfactory. A large portion of this, Rs. 5,369, was repaid by the Dholka Estate of Shermian Bapumian on account of arrears of jama and local fund cess which at the end of last year amounted to Rs. 11,924 (*vide* paragraph 7 of the Commissioner's report for the year 1909-10).

The most important settlement made during the year was in the case of the Estate of Umarkhan Modji (No. 20 above) whose large debt to the nephews of the Chief of Pátádi was settled for a sum of Rs. 47,000: Rs. 39,000 of which were to be paid by a transfer of half the minor's Estate to the Darbár and Rs. 8,000 to be paid in cash. Of the latter amount Rs. 5,360 were paid during the year. The settlement was arranged by the Tálukdári Settlement Officer personally with the creditors and the Darbár with extreme difficulty.

#### *Education.*

8. Two minors attend the Sádra Scott College, 12 the Dhandhuka Jubilee Hostel, 4 the King Edward Hostel at A'nand, 1 the Broach High School, 9 village schools, while two receive private tuition at home. Thakore Ranjitsingji of Metral has now left the Dohad farm to continue his studies in the elements of scientific agriculture at the Government farm, Surat.

The indifference of their guardians stands in the way of the education of other wards of school-going age. The new hostel at Dhandhuka, which is in course of construction at a cost of Rs. 27,000, is said to be capable of accommodating 80 boys. Government have given for it the District bungalow and a rent-free site.

The A'nand Hostel was closed in the month of March owing to plague, but was reopened in the middle of April.

It is intended, however, to remove the hostel to Nadiád. This step has been necessitated by repeated failures to secure a satisfactory staff of teachers and the unwillingness of the A'nand Municipality to take the hostel. Nadiád is not quite so favourably situated geographically, but it offers the advantage of a High School and staff under the control of the Educational Department.

#### *Litigation.*

9. The suit filed by the paternal relatives of the Jalila minor Bai Amarbai, referred to in the previous year's report, was decided in favour of the minor. The plaintiffs, however, have filed an appeal in the High Court.

A civil suit brought against the Thakore of Metral in the Panch Maháls is pending in the District Court, Ahmedabad.

Six civil suits were filed by the Olpád Estate of Bai Keval (No. 66) for the recovery of the minor's dues of about of Rs. 1,556, three of which were successful.

Besides the above and the Bhetasi Estate of Lalji Mansukh (No. 47), the Adadra Estate of Bai Parvati (No. 54), and the Zadeshwar Sagir (No. 63), no other Estates were involved in any kind of litigation during the year.

Litigation charges amounted to about Rs. 1,793.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the report on the Administration of Minors' Estates in the Central Division for the year ending 31st July 1911.

Assumption and reliquish-  
ment of estates. 2. I attach a statement A showing the estates now under the guardianship of Collectors in this Division. The number of these estates is small.

Information regarding the guardians of the persons of the minors has been given in the remark column of the statement.

3. The total income of estates from land was Rs. 7,367 as against Rs. 6,300 in the previous year. The increase is chiefly due to the leasing of all lands this year of Mokashi minor (No. 4), to the collection of arrears of past years due to estate No. 5 (Shindkar), and to the large income brought in by the sale of mango fruit belonging to estate No. 6 (Usafalli). The income from other sources shows a decrease of Rs. 837 and the facts to which it is due are explained where necessary in the remark column of statement A. A statement giving the amount of land revenue fully assessed and of income derived this year from land is appended to this report as required by Government Resolution No. 6323, dated 25th June 1907, Revenue Department.

The increase or decrease noticed in each estate is noted in the remark column of statement A. The only estate burdened with liabilities is that of Mokashi minor (No. 4). No steps were taken to discharge them during the year for want of funds and this fact accounts for the considerable decrease under that head. A similar decrease is to be noticed under the head "other expenditure" and is due to the non-payment of allowances due to the step-mothers of Shindkar minor (No. 5) and of the share due to the co-sharer of Mokashi minor (No. 4).

5. The practice of leasing agricultural lands and houses of the minors, where possible, was continued during the year. Most of the houses do not fetch any rent as some of them are occupied either by the minors or their relatives and some are situated in small villages where there is no demand for them. Some lands in the possession of Giram minor (No. 7) had to be restored during the year to the vendor in a redemption suit brought against him.

6. As regards moveable property, there was increase of Rs. 77 in the case of estate No. 1 and a nominal decrease of Rs. 200 in that of No. 5. The variations are explained in the remark column of statement A.

7. The arrangements for the education of all the minors except Dhangar (estate No. 2) are all reported to be satisfactory. Education. A special teacher was engaged for the Matkar Jághirdár (estate No. 3). The Collector reports that this minor has much improved since he was brought to Dhulia. The Giram minor (No. 7) for whom a private tutor had been engaged to give him education at his village, has since been brought to Sholápur.

8. During the year, 5 suits and 4 darkbásts for decree already passed were filed in the Civil Court on behalf of the Akola minor (No. 1). With regard to the estate of minor Litigation. Giram (No. 7) 5 fresh suits were filed on his behalf. These and 4 of the last year, which were pending at the beginning of the year, were all decided—7 in favour of the minor and 2 against him. Besides 9 suits have been instituted during the year against the minor; all are still pending. In respect of the other estates there was no litigation.

I have the honour to submit the report on the Administration of Minors' Estates by district officers in the Southern Division for the year ending 31st July 1911.

*Assumption and Relinquishment of Estates.*

2. I attach a statement A showing the estates under the management of Collectors in this division.

At the commencement of the year the total number of estates actually under Government management was 12,—5 in Belgaum, 6 in Dhárwár and 1 in Kánara. The estate of Saheb Pacha valad Shabusaheb in the Belgaum District was transferred (*vide* Government Resolution No. 3012 of 25th March 1911) during the year to the management of the Court of Wards, while the estate—No. 11 in the statement—of Keshav Bhikapa, Patil of Alnawar, has been taken under management and the lands have been let out for cultivation. Though the estate No. 8 was made over to the elder of the two minors on his attaining majority, under the orders of the District Court as he undertook to look after his younger brother, the cash in deposit could not be handed over before the end of the year. Thus the number of estates under Government management at the close of the year was the same as that at the beginning of the year.

Information regarding the guardians of the minors has been given in the remarks column of the statement referred to above.

*Income.*

3. *Belgaum District.*—The income realised from land was Rs. 12,039, as against Rs. 7,724 and 15 maunds of jowári in the previous year. The increase which has been shared by all the estates except estate No. 2 testifies to the satisfactory agricultural conditions of the year. The large increase under "gross income from other sources," column 14, in the case of estate No. 2 is due to the transfer of cash in the custody of the Deputy Názir of the District Court as a result of the Collector's proposal referred to in the last year's report.

The progress made in the realisations of rents from land during the year is satisfactory. Out of a total demand of Rs. 12,691 and 72 maunds of jowári, including Rs. 2,148 and 56 maunds of jowári of the arrears of the previous years, collections have been made to the extent of Rs. 11,823 and 57 maunds of jowári. Rs. 66 have been remitted. The outstanding balance for collection at the end of the year under report was only Rs. 802 and 15 maunds of jowári; steps for the recovery of this balance are reported to be in progress.

*Dhárwár.*—There has been an increase under "income from land," column 13, in the case of estates Nos. 5, 6 and 9, which is due to the favourable season which allowed of the recovery of the arrears of previous years, and in the case of estate No. 6 it was also due to higher bids received from the tenants to whom the lands were given on the expiry of the terms of previous leases. There is an

apparent decrease in the case of estates Nos. 7 and 10 which is due to the fact that a larger amount of suspended and unsuspended arrears was recovered during the previous year than during the year under report. In the case of both of these estates, the current demand has increased as the lands were leased at higher rates. As estate No. 8 was restored early in April, the rents were not collected by Government agency, hence the apparent decrease.

The increase in the case of estates Nos. 6 and 10 under "income from other sources" column 14, is due to a fresh source of income in the shape of interest on promissory notes: Rs. 5,000 and 10,000 respectively having been invested during the year under report. In the case of estate No. 10 the income on account of interest is Rs. 382; but ground rent which amounted to Rs. 398 during the previous year was collected to the extent of Rs. 98 only during the year under report and the balance has yet to be recovered. In the case of other estates, the variations are too small to need comment.

*Kánara.*—The income during the year was derived mainly from rents on land and interest on Government promissory notes of the value of Rs. 2,500. All the rents were collected. The cash balance belonging to the estate rose from Rs. 1,110 at the beginning of the year to Rs. 1,354 at its close, though an additional expenditure of Rs. 13 was incurred during the year, for the minor's travelling expenses from Kárwár to Sirsi.

#### *Expenditure.*

4. *Belgaum.*—The expenditure in the case of estate No. 1 represents the cost of maintenance and education of the minor and his sister and amounted to Rs. 1,267 as against Rs. 843 in the preceding year. The increase is due to the higher fees charged by the Candy's School for Sardárs' Children to which the minor is sent.

The increase in the case of estate No. 2 is due to the fact that maintenance and other charges for 1909-10 which were incurred by the Deputy Nazir did not appear in the Collector's statement last year.

The total expenditure of estate No. 3 is Rs. 3,929 against Rs. 7,023 in the previous year. The decrease is mainly due to the payment in the previous year of arrears of Government dues amounting to Rs. 1,850 and discharge of debt to the extent of Rs. 1,227.

The increase in the case of estate No. 4 is due to the fact that past year's figures relate only to the period from January 1910 when the estate first came under the Collector's management.

*Dhárwár.*—*Column 15.*—The increase in the case of estate No. 6 is due to the payment of last year's charges during the year under report. The decrease in the case of estates Nos. 5 and 7 is due to the fact that some charges remain to be paid for want of vouchers from the recipients, and that in the case of No. 10 is partly due to the same cause and partly to the fact that during the previous year a larger amount of arrears was paid than during the year under report. The decrease in the case of estate No. 8 is accounted for by the restoration of the estate early in April last.

*Column 16.*—The increase in the case of estate No. 5 is due to the payment of arrears of previous years. The decrease in the case of Nos. 7 and 9 is accounted for by the fact that a larger amount of arrears was paid off during the previous year. An amount of Rs. 727 is still due from estate No. 9. Some lands in one village have been leased for a sum less than the assessment. The estate is also otherwise encumbered; and the question of liquidating the debts, etc., is under consideration by the Collector. In the case of estate No. 8, Government dues were paid by the minor after the estate was restored to him.

*Column 17.*—In the case of estate No. 5, the increase is due to the fact that an instalment of Rs. 700 which could not be paid during the previous year for want of funds was paid during the year under report. In the case of No. 6 the elder minor Srinivas Rao borrowed a sum of Rs. 130 from a Sávkár by

pawning a necklace of his wife, and squandered it. When the fact came to notice, the ornament was redeemed by paying the amount. The decrease in the case of No. 7 is due to the fact that during the previous year two years' instalments of repayment of debts were paid, whereas during the year under report the instalment due only for the year was paid. The variations in the case of other estates being small call for no remarks.

*Column 18.*—The decrease in the case of estates Nos. 6 and 10 is due to the absence of any special items of expenditure, such as those incurred during the previous year and that in the case of No. 8 is due to the restoration of the estates in April last. The decrease in the case of estate No. 5 is due to non-payment of law charges for want of vouchers.

*Kánara.*—The total expenditure during the year consisted of the additional expenditure mentioned above and the cost of maintenance and the school fees of the minor and land revenue assessment of Rs. 520.

#### *Management of immoveable property.*

5. The existing practice of leasing agricultural lands and houses was continued during the year.

#### *Management of moveable property.*

6. *Belgaum.*—The moveable property belonging to estates Nos. 1 and 2 is in the Collector's charge. It consists of gold, silver and pearl ornaments which are kept in the Huzúr Treasury. An inventory has been made.

*Dhárwár.*—The balance in cash at the credit of estates Nos. 6 and 10 is large and the Collector reports that steps are being taken for its proper investment.

*Kánara.*—There is no variation in the management of the moveable property referred to in the previous annual report. Arrangements have been made for the purchase of one more promissory note of Rs. 1,000 in the current year out of the cash balance which will be, as usual, deposited with the Accountant-General, Bombay.

#### *Liabilities.*

7. *Belgaum.*—All the estates are free from debt, except No. 3 which is indebted to the extent of Rs. 79,981. The estate is under the Collector's management under Regulation VIII of 1827 and no loans can be raised for the liquidation of debt. Since the close of the year an amount of Rs. 5,000 is reported to have been paid off from current revenues in full satisfaction of a decree for Rs. 10,000, reducing thereby the total debt of the estate to Rs. 69,981.

*Dhárwár.*—In the case of estates Nos. 5, 7 and 9 the arrangements made to pay off a large portion of the debts by instalments is reported to be working well. The two creditors in the case of estate No. 5 mentioned in the last year's report being unwilling to effect a compromise have filed suits in a Civil Court. The Government Pleader is reported to have been instructed to appear on behalf of the minor. Estate No. 5 is heavily encumbered and it will take many years to free it. Although liabilities against estate No. 9 are not large, the net income is small, as the lands are situated in the Mallad. Debts are being paid off according to the Collector's report as funds permit. In the case of estate No. 7 the minor has now attained majority and steps are being taken to restore the estate to him.

#### *Education.*

8. *Belgaum.*—All the Wards except No. 3 are minors of school-going age. No. 1, Hanmantrao Dadasaheb, resides at Kolhápúr, with Meherban Sar Lashkar who is a co-guardian, and is attending the Sardárs' School there. Mr. Candy, Principal of the School, writes that the boy is doing steady, good work.

Wards Nos. 2 and 4 attend the primary schools in their respective villages of Sholápur and Sankeshwar of the Hukeri Táluka. They are also reported to have made satisfactory progress in their studies.

*Dhárwár.*—Ward No. 7 is attending the Arts College, Poona. Of the Wards entered at Serial No. 8, the eldest did not attend any school and the estate has been restored to him on his attaining majority. The other minors are being educated in the schools mentioned in column 6. The progress and conduct of the eldest of the minors (Srinivasa Rao) of estate No. 6 is not good. He has been reported to have fallen into evil company. An attempt was made to remove him from the evil surroundings and to send him to the New English School, Poona, but the manager of that institution did not like to have him under his control as he is rather dull and not amenable to control. The Collector reports that steps are being taken to give him private tuition and to restrain him from associating with bad companions. The conduct and progress of the other Wards are reported to be fair.

*Kánara.*—The minor who was in the seventh (Matrio) class in the Kárwár High School not being permitted from the High School to go up for the Matriculation Examination has left the school for good and gone back to Sirsi permanently. There is no hope of his appearing for the examination and his studies may therefore be taken to have ended. His progress at school was not, it appears, up to the mark, but his conduct is reported to have been good. He is now under the superintendence of the guardian of his person and is said to be trying to learn the management of his property and household.

#### *Litigation.*

9. *Belgaum.*—During the year under report an application was filed before a Conciliator on behalf of estate No. 3 for the recovery of Rs. 438. Two suits filed against the estate in the Athni Sub-Judge's Court for the recovery of Rs. 6,450 are still undecided. There was no litigation of importance in respect of other estates.

The two suits under the Mámlatdárs' Courts Act referred to in the last year's report were decided in favour of the estate, the injunction sought having been granted.

*Dhárwár.*—The suit against estate No. 5 referred to in the previous year's report is still pending. Two more suits by creditors have been filed in the First Class Sub-Judge's Court, Dhárwár. In the suit against estate No. 6 referred to in the last report the plaintiff (mortgagor) has preferred an appeal to the High Court against the District Judge's decision and it is still pending. One of the sharers in the Hebli Saranjám has filed a suit in the District Court making the Secretary of State and the minor defendants. It is sought to set aside the order of Government passed in Government Resolution No. 2436, dated 12th April 1904, Political Department.

The criminal complaint against the minor's estate kárkún at Hebli (estate No. 10) has resulted in his conviction and sentence for a term of 8 months' rigorous imprisonment and a fine of Rs. 150.

The statement B prescribed by paragraph 7 of Government Resolution No. 6323, dated 25th June 1907, is appended.

HONOURABLE SIR,

I have the honour to submit the report on the Administration of Minors' Estates by district officers in the Province of Sind for the year 1910-11.

The usual statements I and II are appended.

*Assumption and relinquishment of estates.*

2. The number of estates under the guardianship of the Collectors and Deputy Commissioners at the commencement of the year was 20, including the one referred to in paragraph 2 of the last year's report as virtually out of management. The action of the estate-owner in selling the land without the sanction of the Collector is still under inquiry, and the Collector has been requested to dispose of it as soon as possible. Of the 20 estates two were transferred to the Court of Wards and four were released, three of them on account of the owners attaining majority, and one owing to the death of the minor. No new estate was taken up during the year, the number under guardianship at the close of the year being 14. There was no estate under guardianship in the Thar and Parkar District.

3. The persons of all the minors were in charge of their relatives and friends.

*Income.*

4. There was an income of Rs. 1,134 from land against Rs. 5,780 in the previous year. The falling off is due to two large estates in the Hyderabad district having been released last year on account of attainment of majority. The income from other sources was Rs. 2,189 as against Rs. 1,416. The most noticeable variations under this head of income are in estates Nos. 10 and 12, but the fluctuations are not of income properly so called, the decrease in the former being due to the realization last year of Rs. 800 from sale of a house, and the increase in the latter to the sale during the year under report of 24 acres of land for Rs. 1,500 to discharge the liabilities of the estate, and to the receipt of Rs. 380 from Government on account of takavi for the construction of a sluice.

*Expenditure.*

5. Out of the total expenditure of Rs. 3,031, Rs. 283 were paid towards maintenance allowance, Rs. 586 on account of Government dues, Rs. 1,550 for the discharge of liabilities, and Rs. 612 on account of other miscellaneous expenditure. The total land revenue demand fell during the year to Rs. 619 from Rs. 4,020 in the previous year owing to the release of the two large estates referred to in paragraph 4. The land revenue demand was paid in full

in the case of all estates, except Nos. 7 and 9 of which the crop was a failure. Variations in the land-revenue demand are due to fluctuations in the area cultivated.

*Management of immoveable property.*

6. Of the 14 estates under guardianship three were managed departmentally, 6 were leased, and 2 had no immoveable property. The remaining three estates (Nos. 1, 4 and 19) are accounted for in the remark column of statement II.

Buildings which are not used by the minors for their own residential purposes are let out on rent, where possible.

*Moveable property.*

7. The estates in the Karáchi and the Upper Sind Frontier districts have no moveable property. The moveable property of other estates remained unaltered and continued in the charge of their owners and their relations.

*Liabilities.*

8. Of the 14 estates under management, seven (in the Lárkána and Sukkur districts) were subject to liabilities amounting to Rs. 8,610, of which Rs. 1,500 were paid during the year. There was a further reduction of Rs. 1,285 on account of rebate allowed by the creditors of estate No. 12. Measures are in progress for discharging the liabilities of estate No. 9. The estates in the Karáchi, Hyderabad and Upper Sind Frontier districts are free from debt.

*Education.*

9. Of the 16 male minors whose estates are under guardianship, five only are reported to be receiving education. As mentioned before, the persons of the minors are not under the guardianship of the district officers.

*Litigation.*

10. The appeal filed on behalf of Musamat Mahomed Dini (estate No. 13), referred to in the previous year's report, is still undecided, but the estate has been discharged on account of the death of the minor. A fresh suit was filed by one Thakumal against estate No. 14 for the recovery of Rs. 510, which was dismissed. There was no litigation in respect of any other estate.

RESOLUTION.—These reports deal with the administration by executive officers, under certificates of guardianship given by District Courts, of minors' estates exclusive of those under the control of the Courts of Wards which have been made the subject of a separate review. In Sind during the course of the last two years the management of most minors' estates, including all the most important, has been transferred from the Collectors and Deputy Commissioners to the Court of Wards, and at the close of the year under review only 14 small estates with a total income of under Rs. 3,000 were under the administration of the heads of districts.

2. In the Presidency proper there were 85 minors' estates under management at the beginning of the year. During the year two new estates came under superintendence, while in nine cases estates were released or their management continued under conditions which removed them from the scope of the reports under review. Accordingly the year closed with 78 estates under management, of which 38 are under the Tálukdári Settlement Officer.

3. The estates in the Dhandhuka Táluka and one estate in Broach suffered considerably in income on account of the damage done to crops by frost. Otherwise the season was a prosperous one, and the collection of Government dues from the estates is recorded as Rs. 58,000 out of a demand of Rs. 61,000. Against this demand the income of the estates from the lands on which the demand was levied was Rs. 1,61,000. The separate details given for fully assessed lands show the income earned was Rs. 26,344, while the Government assessment payable was Rs. 10,871. Income from sources other than land was Rs. 47,000, so that the total income of the year was Rs. 2,08,000. The total expenditure amounted to Rs. 1,93,000, of which a sum of Rs. 58,000 already referred to was on account of Government dues, while Rs. 32,000 were expended on maintenance and Rs. 27,000 in the discharge of liabilities.

4. The debts shown as payable by all estates at the close of the year amounted to about 4 lákhs as compared with original liabilities of 6½ lákhs at the dates the estates came under management. Excepting one heavily indebted estate in the Southern Division, the liabilities are mostly on account of the estates in charge of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer who was handicapped in his debt settlement operations for the year by the character of the season in Gujarát.

5. The education of wards of school-going age depends largely on the attitude of the minors' guardians. Generally, however, the arrangements made are suitable to the circumstances of the minors.
