

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1938.

1. Judicial Staff—(Statement No. 1).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Province on 31st December 1938 and engaged partly or wholly in civil cases consisted of 9 permanent High Court Judges, 1 acting High Court Judge, and 1 temporary Additional High Court Judge, 17 District Judges, 12 Assistant Judges (including 3 Assistant Judges under training). a Chief Judge and 5 Judges of the Presidency Small Cause Court, 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges, 22 First Class Subordinate Judges and 93 Second Class Subordinate Judges. In addition, the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Poona and Ahmedabad exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also 3 Inamdars and Jahagirdars exercising the powers of a Subordinate Judge under Regulation XIII of 1830 and 82 Village Munsiffs appointed under the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, XVII of 1879.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE.

The Honourable Sir John W. F. Beaumont, Knight, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 13th June and from 29th July to 31st December 1938. His Lordship was on leave from 14th June to 28th July 1938. During the interval, the Honourable Sir Cecil Patrick Blackwell, Knight, acted as Chief Justice.

PUISNE JUDGES.

The Honourable Sir Cecil Patrick Blackwell, Knight, from 1st January to 11th March and from 15th April to 31st December 1938. His Lordship was on leave from 12th March to 14th April 1938. His Lordship acted as Chief Justice from 14th June to 28th July 1938.

The Honourable Sir Sajba Shanker Rangnekar, Knight, from 1st January to 13th June and from 29th June to 19th November 1938. His Lordship was on leave from 14th June to 28th June 1938 and from 20th November to 19th December 1938. His Lordship retired on 20th December 1938.

The Honourable Mr. Justice R. S. Broomfield, I.C.S., from 1st January to 31st December 1938.

The Honourable Mr. Justice N. P. Engineer acted as an Additional Judge from 1st January to 1st November 1938.

The Honourable Mr. Justice K. C. Sen, I.C.S., from 1st January to 31st December 1938. His Lordship was an Additional Judge from 1st January to 1st November 1938 and acted as a Puisne Judge from 2nd November to 31st December 1938.

The Honourable Mr. Justice D. R. Norman, I.C.S., acted as a Puisne Judge from 14th June to 15th October 1938.

The Honourable Mr. Justice N. S. Lokur acted as an Additional Judge from 21st November to 31st December 1938.

HIGH COURT.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

2. Original Suits for Disposal.—(Statement No. 5).—The number of civil suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of the year 1937 was 1,571 including 18 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number instituted during the year 1938 was 2,152 including 9 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 307 restored (including 1 suit received from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) during the year. The above totals 1,571, 2,152 and 307 make an aggregate of 4,030 for disposal in 1938 as against 4,230 in 1937.

3. Original Suits Disposed of—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits decided was 2,515 including 17 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 1,515 including 11 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. This number is 56 less than the corresponding number at the end of the previous year. Of these 1,515 suits, 309 were ready for trial and in arrear, a decrease of 313 suits in the figure of the previous year. There were 448 suits whose hearing had been pending for over one year. This is a decrease of 89 suits in the figure of the previous year.

The average duration of suits disposed of during the year under report was as shown in the table given below:—

- 4. The number of 1,515 suits left undisposed of at the end of the year 1938 is made up of the suits filed in the following years:—

5. Suits Instituted and Disposed of under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1937 was 11. The number instituted during the year 1938 was 22. Of these 33, 20 were decided and 13 remained pending at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided :-

- 6 were compromised, the average duration being 210 days;
- 14 were decided after full trial, the average duration being 177 days.

There was one suit pending over one year at the close of the year.

- 6. Suits instituted and disposed of under the admiralty and vice-admiralty jurisdiction.—Three suits were pending at the close of the year 1937. One suit was instituted and one was disposed of during the year under report. There were 3 suits pending over one year at the close of the year.
- 7. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial jurisdiction.—There were 7 suits pending at the end of the year 1937 and the number instituted during the year 1938 was 28. Of these 35 suits, 24 were decided and 11 remained pending at the close of the year.

There was one suit pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided :-

- 2 were dismissed or not prosecuted, the average duration being 246 days;
- 16 were decreed ex parte, the average duration being 158 days;
- 6 were decided after full trial, the average duration being 194 days.

8. Insolvency Petitions.—The number of petitions pending at the end of the year 1937 was 1,944 and the number instituted during the year 1938 was 434 and 14 were restored during the year making a total of 2,392 for disposal in 1938. Of these, 862 were decided and 1,530 remained pending at the close of the year 1938. There were 1,131 petitions pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the petitions decided:-

- 835 were decided ex parte, the average duration being 1,058 days; and
 - 27 were decided after full trial, the average duration being 800 days.

• 9. Appeals to the Privy Council.—Five appeals were pending from the previous year and 4 were admitted during the year making a total of 9 for disposal in the year 1938.

Of these 9 appeals:—

- 2 were decided by the Privy Council who confirmed the Orders of the Appeal Court.
- 1 was decided by the Privy Council and the High Court Order appealed from was set aside.
- 1 was pending before the Privy Council in England. The Record was despatched in 1938.
- 5 were pending in the Bombay High Court.

10. References to take accounts, etc.—The number of references to take accounts, to hold sales of immoveable properties directed to be sold by the Court under Mortgage Decrees or otherwise, to make inquiries as to estates to be administered and those to be partitioned, as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on question of title to settle conveyances, to frame Schemes in Charity matters, on questions affecting minors in respect of proposed terms of settlement, as to whether suits filed by next friends were for the benefit of the minor plaintiffs and in like matters pending on 1st January 1938 was 177 and 174 references were filed in 1938 in the Office of the Commissioner for taking accounts making a total of 351 for disposal. The number of references disposed of by him during the year 1938 was 154, leaving 197 pending at the close of the year.

In addition to such references the Commissioner took and passed a large number of accounts of Receivers and Liquidators which in the year under report numbered 129 and 11 respectively.

During the year under report under High Court Rule 516, 18 warrants for sale of immoveable properties attached were filed before and settled by the Commissioner and under Rule 454, 25 accounts for depositing moneys on behalf of minors with the Accountant General, High Court, Bombay, were filed and passed by the Commissioner. The Commissioner also settled during the same period 15 Conveyances.

- 11. Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.—During the year 631 petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration and Succession Certificates, 65 Pauper Petitions for leave to sue or defend in forma pauperis, 39 petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 31 petitions under the Indian Trust Act, and 185 petitions under the Guardian and Wards, Lunacy and Arbitration Acts, etc. making a total of 951 were filed for disposal.
- 12. Awards under the Indian Arbitration Act, 1899.—The number of Awards filed during the year was 177.
- 13. Applications for Execution of Decrees—(Statement No. 13).—The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was

603 and the number of applications filed during the year was 1,568, making a total of 2,171 for disposal. Of these, 322 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts, in 390 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 53 satisfaction was obtained in part and 657 were wholly infructuous making a total of 1,422 applications disposed of, and 749 applications were pending at the close of the year.

The number of Darkhasts (Decrees or Orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 41.

The number of Decrees, etc., received from other Courts for execution during the year was 219.

II. APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appeals from High Court Decrees under Section 15 of the Letters Patent.

17. (Statement No. 7.)—Twenty-six appeals from decrees on the Original Side of the High Court were pending at the beginning of the year and 27 were filed during the year. Of the total 53, 44 were decided and 9 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was more by 3 than in 1937.

These 44 appeals were decided as under:—

- 2 Dismissed or not prosecuted.
- 19 Decrees of the Courts of First Instance confirmed.
- 3 Decrees of the Courts of First Instance modified.
- 16 Decrees of the Courts of First Instance reversed.
- 4 Cases were remanded to the Courts of First Instance.

There was no appeal pending over a year at the close of the year.

The average duration of appeals which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 133 days and that of appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed or remanded was 229 days.

18. (Statement No. 8).—Twenty-four appeals from Orders on the Original Side were filed during the year and 26 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 50, 40 were decided and 10 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of such appeals disposed of was more by 5 than in 1937.

The results of these 40 appeals were as follows:-

- 6 Dismissed or not prosecuted.
- 23 Orders of the Courts of First Instance confirmed.
 - 2 Orders of the Courts of First Instance modified.
 - Orders of the Courts of First Instance reversed.

There were 3 appeals pending over a year at the close of the year.

The average duration of the appeals which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 189 days and that of the appeals which were confirmed, modified or reversed was 119 days.

- 19. (Statement No. 7).—On the Appellate Side, 53 Letters Patent Appeals from High Court Decrees were filed during the year and 27 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 80, 39 were decided and 41 (including 9 over a year old) remained pending at the close of the year. The number of Appeals disposed of was more by 1 than in 1937. The results of these Appeals were as inder:—
 - 4 Dismissed or not prosecuted.
 - 30 Decrees confirmed.
 - 1 Decree modified.
 - 4 Decrees reversed.

The average duration of the Appeals under the Letters Patent which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 38 days and that of the appeals which were confirmed, modified or reversed was 188 days.

The disposals of Appeals from Orders remained stationery; being 84 for both the previous year and this year.

^{22.} Appeals pending—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—At the close of the year, 689 First Appeals, 1,275 Second Appeals and 62 Appeals from Orders were pending. The aggregate total of pending Appeals is less by 378 than in 1937.

24. Results of Appeals—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—Out of the 489 Appeals from Original Decrees decided, 64 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Out of the remaining 425, the decrees of the Lower Courts were confirmed in 286, modified in 49, reversed in 83 and 7 Appeals were remanded. Out of the 1,115 Appeals from Appellate Decrees decided, 331 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 784, the decrees of the Lower Courts were confirmed in 572, modified in 51, reversed in 159 and the remaining 2 Appeals were remanded.

(Statement No. 8).—Out of the 84 Appeals from Orders decided, 23 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 61, the orders of the Lower Courts were affirmed in 38, modified in 1 and reversed in 22.

During the year under report, 1 Appeal under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, was filed and 4 were pending at the beginning of the year. Out of these 5 Appeals, in 3 the decrees of the Lower Courts were confirmed, in 1 the Decree of the Lower Court was reversed and 1 remained pending at the close of the year.

There was no reference under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, during the year under report.

25. Appeals to the Privy Council.—At the opening of the year, 3 applications for leave to appeal were pending orders. Thirty-two new applications were filed during the year. Of these 35 applications, 3 were summarily rejected, in 10 Rule was made absolute, in 4 Rule was

discharged, I was withdrawn and 17 remained pending at the close of the year. During the year, the records of 2 Appeals were sent to the Privy Council.

- 26. Results of Appeals to the Privy Council.—During the year, 2 Appeals were decided by the Privy Council. The decrees of the High Court were confirmed in these 2 Appeals. Two appeals were pending before the Privy Council at the end of the year.

CIVIL COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

- 28. Appeals instituted—(Statement No. 7).—4,616 appeals were instituted in 1938 showing a decrease of 386 in the figure of the previous year. The number of appeals instituted was greater in 5 districts, less in 12 districts and equal in 1 district. There was a noticeable increase in Satara (121) and Belgaum (60). In the remaining 3 districts increases were less than 50. A decrease on the other hand was noticeable in Sholapur (174), Ahmednagar (134), Ahmedabad (131) and Ratnagiri (64). The remaining 8 districts show decreases below 50. In East Khandesh district, the number of appeals instituted was the same as that in 1937.
- 29. Appeals disposed of—(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—4,287 appeals were disposed of during the year including 77 by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate powers. The figure of total disposals shows an increase of 108 as compared with that of the previous year; the figure of disposal by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate powers shows a decrease of 75 in the corresponding figure of the previous year. There was an increase in the disposals in 10 districts, the greatest being in Satara (145), followed by Belgaum (105), Ahmedabed (104), Dharwar (70) and Sholapur (61). In the remaining 5 districts, the increase was below 50. On the other hand there was a decrease in the disposals in 8 districts, the greatest being in Ratnagiri (124), followed by Poona (122), Kolaba (79) and Thana (60). The remaining 4 districts show decreases below 50.
- 30. Appeals pending—(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—There were 5.617 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being greater by 345 than at the end of 1937. The number of appeals pending for more than a year rose from 1,246 to 1,843.
- 31. Results of Appeals—(Statement No. 7).—In 624 cases or 14.6 per cent. of the whole, appeals were either summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, in 2,345 or 54.7 per cent. the judgments of the lower Courts were affirmed, in 476 or 11.1 per cent. they were modified, in 602 or 14 per cent. they were reversed and in 234 or 5.5 per cent. the cases were remanded for a fresh hearing. The remaining 6 appeals were disposed of by transfer.
- 32. The average duration of appeals in the lower Appellate Courts, which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 157 days while that of the appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed or remarded was 370 days.
- 33. Miscellaneous Appeals—(Statement No. 8).—595 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year, 1 was revived and 362 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 958, 648 were disposed of during the year and 310 remained pending at its close. The number of pending appeals was less by 52 than that in the previous year.

34. The average duration of miscellaneous appeals in the lower Appellate Courts, which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 91 days while that in appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed or remanded was 187 days.

CIVIL COURTS IN THE MOFUSSIL SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

35. Constitution of Courts and Change in Jurisdiction.—With effect from 1st November 1938, the Subordinate Court of Vengurla in the Ratnagiri District, abolished by Government Notification, Home Department, No. 3707/2-VI, dated the 29th October 1931 was restored. The Court shall be presided over by each of the Subordinate Judges of the Courts of Rajapur, Devgad and Malvan for such period in a year as the District Judge of Ratnagiri may, subject to the control of the High Court, direct in this behalf.

15 villages forming the Vengurla Petha which had been heretofore included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Malvan in the said district were excluded therefrom and included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the said Court of the Subordinate Judge of Vengurla.

31 villages which had been heretofore included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Deogad were excluded therefrom and included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Malyan.

24 villages which had been heretofore included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Rajapur were excluded therefrom and included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Deogad.

(Vide Government Notification, Home Department, No. 7896/3-II, dated the 22nd October 1938.)

36. Original suits instituted—(Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1938 was 1,35,060 showing a decrease of 6,311 in the figure of the previous year.

There was a decrease in money suits to the extent of 5.5 per cent. while in title and other suits it was to the extent of 1.1 per cent. the number of money suits being 109,616 as against 115,647 in 1937 and that of title and other suits 25,444 as against 25,724 in 1937.

(Statement No. 4).—The total value of suits in 1938 amounted to Rs. 4,13,96,577, there being a decrease of Rs. 27,44,988 from the total of 1937.

37. Local distribution—(Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1938 showed an increase in 6 districts and a decrease in the remaining 12 districts. The increase was not appreciable in any of the districts being less than 500. The decrease on the other hand was noticeable in 6 districts, being 1,813 in Thana, followed by 1,316 in Dharwar, 724 in Kaira, 675 in Sholapur, 538 in Nasik and 513 in Belgaum. The decrease in the remaining 6 districts was below 500.

(Statement No. 3).—The largest number of suits instituted during the year was in Poona (15,879). Institutions exceeded 10,000 in East Khandesh, Ahmedabad and West Khandesh and ranged from 5,000 to 10,000 in Nasik, Kaira, Satara, Thana, Sholapur, Broach and Panch Mahals, Ahmedagar, Dharwar, Ratnagiri, Belgaum and Surat. Bijapur and Kolaba showed 3,773 and 2,726 suits as instituted while the lowest figure 2,295 came to the share of Kanara.

38. Number of suits disposed of—(Statement No. 5).—In addition to 135,060 suits instituted during the year and 66,099* suits pending from the previous year, 2,512 suits were revived or received on remand or by transfer making a total of 203,671 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of during the year was 135,451, a decrease of 14,793 in the figure of the previous year.

Of the total number of suits decided during the year, viz., 135,451, Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals (i.e., Courts of Subordinate Judges) disposed of 109,089 suits, Small Cause Courts 13,717, District Courts 350, Village Munsiffs' Courts 12,244 while the remaining 51 suits were disposed of by Unpaid Tribunals (i.e., Inamdars and Jahagirdars).

- 39. Results of suits decided—(Statement No. 5).—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 15,854 or 11.7 per cent. were disposed of without trial, 26,980 or 19.9 per cent. were disposed of ex-parte, 17,851 or 13.2 per cent. on admission of claims, 32,330 or 23.8 per cent. by compromise, 41,165 or 30.3 per cent. after full trial, 532 or 0.4 per cent. on reference to arbitration, and 739 or 0.5 per cent. by transfer. Of the 41,165 decided after full trial, 36,760 or 89.3 per cent. resulted in favour of the Plaintiffs and 4,405 or 10.7 per cent. in favour of the Defendants.
- 40. Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jahagirdars—(Statement No. 5).—The Unpaid Tribunals disposed of 51 original suits; in 1937 the figure was 44.

^{*}The figure shown as pending at the end of the last year was 66,121, as the number of suits pending in the Court of the Village Munsiff, Tasgaon in the District of Satara was shown as 79 last year. But, on inspection, the District Judge, Satara, directed the Village Munsiff, Tasgaon, to take the number of suits pending in his Court at the end of the year 1937 as 57. Hence, the difference of 22 in the figure.

- 41. Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges —(Statement No. 5).—The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 109,089, a decrease of 13,829 as compared with the figure of the previous year. The decrease was noticeable in the number of cases decided under both the ordinary and Small Cause Court procedure, the number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure being 58,106 and under the Small Cause Court procedure 50,983.
- 42. Suits disposed of by Small Cause Courts—(Statement No. 5).— The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 13,717 suits, a decrease of 178 in the figure of the previous year's disposals.
- 43. Suits disposed of by District and Assistant Judges—(Statement No. 5).—The District Courts disposed of 350 original suits, a decrease of 228 in the figure of the previous year.
- 44. Suits disposed of by Village munsiffs—(Statement No. 5).—The Village Munsiffs disposed of 12,244 suits showing a decrease of 565 suits as compared with the figure of the previous year.
- 45. Pending suits—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 68,220 as against 66,121 in the previous year.

(Statements Nos. 5 and 14).—Of the pending cases, 9,398 had been pending for more than a year; this shows an increase of 214 on the figure of the previous year. Of the suits pending over a year, 7 were in the Courts of Inamdars and Jahagirdars, 108 in the Courts of the Village Munsiffs, 9,116 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges, 95 in the Small Cause Courts and 72 in the District Courts, the figures showing as compared with those of the previous year an increase of 11, 237 and 20 respectively in the Courts of Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges and District Courts and a decrease of 54 in the Small Cause Courts. The figure of suits in the Courts of Inamdars and Jahagirdars pending for more than a year remained unchanged.

The number of suits pending over a year was largest in Ahmedabad (1,363), followed by Poona (1,267), Satara (964), Belgaum (840), Ahmednagar (815), Dharwar (767), Kaira (487), Surat (410), Sholapur (409), Thana (406), East Khandesh (377), Broach and Panch Mahals (255), Nasik (251) and West Khandesh (242). The figures for the remaining districts are less than 200.

46. Duration of suits—(Statement No. 5).—The average duration in days of suits decided in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jahagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause

47. Execution Proceedings—(Statement No. 13).—There were 115,218 applications for execution pending from the previous year and 180,203 new applications were filed during the year. Out of the total number of applications before the Courts, 175,406 were disposed of during the year and 120,015 remained pending at its close. The disposals of the applications were as under:—

25,290 cases disposed of wherein realisation was complete;

50,593 cases disposed of wherein realisation was partial; and

98,691 cases disposed of as wholly infructuous.

The total amount realised in Courts other than the Small Cause Courts was Rs. 79.58,343-12-6.

Debtors were imprisoned in 163 cases, moveable property sold in 704 and immoveable property in 5,132.

48. Miscellaneous cases—(Statement No. 6).—The number of institutions and disposals of Miscellaneous cases fell from 13,639 to 13,296 and from 14,129 to 13,257 respectively. The number of Miscellaneous cases pending at the close of the year rose from 7,533 to 7,665. Of the 13,257 Miscellaneous cases disposed of 2,541 were disposed of without trial, 1,799 were disposed of ex-parte, 1,030 on admission of claims, 424 by compremise, 7,427 after full trial, and 36 by transfer. Of the 7,427 cases decided after full trial, 5,142 or 69.3 per cent. resulted in favour of the Plaintiffs.

49. Duration of Miscellaneous cases—(Statement No. 6).—The average duration in days of Miscellaneous cases decided in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jahagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and in the District Courts is as shown in the tabular statement given below:—

III. Bombay Small Cause Court.

50. (Statements Nos. 3 and 5).—The figures of suits instituted and disposed of during the year and of suits pending at the close of the year 1938 in the Presidency Small Cause Courts were 26,481, 26,562 and 5,877 respectively. The figures of institutions, disposals and of suits pending at the close of the year show a decrease of 7,189, 7,426 and 81 respectively when compared with the figures of the previous year.

(Statement No. 4).—There was a slight increase in the institutions of suits exceeding in value Rs. 500 but not exceeding Rs. 1,000 while there was a decrease in all other kinds of suits. The total value of litigation showed a decrease for the year under report. The figure was Rs. 57,97,925-8-2 as against Rs. 66,41,349-4-11 in the preceding year.

- 51. Mode of disposal—(Statement, No. 5).—Of the 26,562 suits disposed of, 239 were decided without trial, 8,268 were decided ex parte, 10,387 on admission of claims, 6,114 by compromise, 1,481 after full trial, 64 on reference to arbitration and 9 by transfer.
- 52. The average duration of suits disposed of without trial and ex parte was 36 days, of those decided on admission of claims 49, of those decided by compromise 39, of those decided after full trial 64, of those decided after reference to arbitration 60 and of those decided by transfer 41.

53. Execution of Decrees—(Statement No. 13).—Of the 21,880 applications for the execution of decrees that were before the Courts during the year (including 3,895 pending from the previous year), 18,888 were disposed of and 2,992 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the last figure, 1,202 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of, 8,746 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 7,519 were returned as wholly infructuous and 2,623 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realised was Rs. 8,29,726-3-8 as compared with Rs. 11,26,761-15-3 in the previous year.

- 54. Coercive Process—(Statement No. 13).—In order to enforce the execution of decrees imprisonment was ordered in 13 cases and sale of moveables in 781. The figures show respectively a decrease of 153 and an increase of 116 when compared with the corresponding figures of the previous year.
- 55. Applications to the Full Court—(Statement No. 14).—There were 402 applications for disposal before the Full Court during the year, of which 386 were disposed of and 16 remained pending at the close of the year.

GENERAL.

56. As compared with the figures for 1937, the number of suits instituted in and disposed of by the Subordinate Judges' Courts decreased by 5.136 and 13,829 respectively; the number of regular suits disposed of was less by 9,134 and that under Small Cause Court Jurisdiction was less by 4,695. With the number of revived suits and those pending at the end of the last year, the total number of suits pending shows an increase from 57,096 to 59,087 and the number of suits pending over a year shows an increase from 8,879 to 9,116. The number of appeals disposed of by District Courts increased by 108. The First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate Powers disposed of 77 appeals only as against 152 in 1937. The total number of appeals pending in the District Courts increased from 5,272 to 5,617.

The figures of suits instituted and disposed of on the Original Side of the High Court showed a decrease of 101 and 41 respectively as compared with the corresponding figures of the previous year. The number of suits pending decreased from 3,536 to 3,072.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court, the total number of institutions of appeals showed an increase of 52, while that of disposals showed a decrease of 127 as compared with the figures of the previous year. The total arrears of appeals fell from 2,435 to 2,068.

57. Inspection.—During the year under report, the District Judges inspected the following Courts of Subordinate Judges; Ahmedabad and Gogha in the Ahmedabad District; Sangamner, Kopargaon and Newasa in the Ahmednagar District; Athni in the Belgaum District; Bijapur in the Bijapur District; Dharwar, Hubli, Gadag and Haveri in the

Dharwar District; Umreth and Borsad in the Kaira District; Kumta and Sirsi in the Kanara District; Nandurbar in the West Khandesh District; Pimpalgaon in the Nasik District; Baramati and Talegaon in the Poona District; Chiplun, Deorukh and Rajapur in the Ratnagiri District; Wai, Karad, Dahiwadi, Tasgaon, Vita and Islampur in the Satara District and Pandharpur in the Sholapur District.

- 58. Judicial Conference.—No Judicial Conference was held during the year under report.
- 59. Receipts and Charges of the High Court.—For the year 1938, the total receipts as shown in paragraphs 14 and 27 were Rs. 24,26,982-8-0 on the Original Side and Rs. 1,70,391-11-0 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 25,97,374-3-0. The total charges as shown in the same paragraphs were Rs. 10,20,720-1-0 on the Original Side and Rs. 4,87,380-12-10 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 15,08,100-13-10. The difference between these two aggregates shows an excess of receipts over expenditure of Rs. 10,89,273-5-2. This excess includes Probate and Administration duty (the cost of collecting which is borne by the High Court). In the expenditure no sum is charged for rent or upkeep of the High Court Buildings or certain other matters which would have to be brought into account in ascertaining a net profit. On the other hand no allowance is made for Criminal work which occupies much Judicial time and is not productive of any revenue.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1938

1. Judicial Staff—(Statement No. 1).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Province on 31st December 1938 and engaged partly or wholly in Criminal cases consisted of 9 permanent High Court Judges, 1 acting High Court Judge and 1 temporary Additional High Court Judge; 17 Sessions Judges, 7 Additional Sessions Judges, 3 Assistant Sessions Judges, 19 District Magistrates, 10 Presidency Magistrates, 347 other First Class Magistrates, 205 Second Class Magistrates, 192 Third Class Magistrates. 152 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889 and 436 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act VI of 1933.

In addition to the above, there were 19,216 Police Patils in the Province exercising powers under section 14 of the Bombay Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, of whom 429 were invested with powers under section 15 of that Act.

By Government Circular in the Home Department, No. 9517/3, dated the 26th November 1937, all Benches of Honorary Magistrates in the Presidency excluding Bombay City were abolished with effect from the 1st January 1938. But there was 1 Bench of Magistrates consisting of 6 Honorary Magistrates in the Sholapur District till the 31st January 1938. There were 6 Benches of Magistrates in the City of Bombay constituted from 137 Honorary Magistrates.

- 2. Offences Reported—(Statement No. 11).—There were 2,97,500 Criminal offences reported during the year, a decrease of 13,612 from the figure of 1937. There was an increase in the number of offences reported in the districts of Ahmedabad. Nasik, Broach and Panch Mahals, Kolaba, Surat, Poona and Kanara while there was a decrease in the remaining 13 Districts. The increase was most noticeable in Ahmedabad being 9,097 followed by 1,383 in Nasik and 802 in Broach and Panch Mahals; the remaining 4 districts showed increases below 500. On the other hand, there was a marked decrease in the City of Bombay being 12,622, followed by 4,476 in Sholapur, 3,878 in Belgaum, 1,286 in West Khandesh, 1,124 in the Bombay Suburban District and 813 in Thana; in the remaining 7 districts the variation was below 500. Of the total number of offences reported, 51,959 were under the Indian Penal Code and 2,45,541 under Special and Local Laws.
- 3. Complaints Dismissed (section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and Complainants fined (section 250, Criminal Procedure Code)—(Statement No. 11).—The number of complaints dismissed under section 203 was 4,630 and the number of complainants fined under section 250 was 133.

- 4. Cases found to be true.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 2,86,898 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial excluding those withdrawn and including those pending from the previous year was 3,02,308. The number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show a decrease of 17,025 and 14,201 respectively from the figures of 1937.
- 5. Murders reported as true.—Out of 1,048 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 276 were murders of which 144 ended in conviction. The corresponding figures for 1937 were 996, 291 and 142. The 276 murders may be classified as under:—

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

I. Presidency Magistrates.

Cases in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 11).— The number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates was 20,435 and in those of the Honorary Presidency Magistrates was 1,34,889 making a total of 1,55,324. number is smaller by 13,190 than that of 1937, when the corresponding figures were 24,165 and 1,44,349, making a total of 1,68,514. number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 1.44,885 or 13,239 less than that of 1937 and the number of cases under the Indian Penal Code was 10,439 or 49 more than that of 1937. There was a very marked increase under the former head in offences under the Bombay Prevention of Gambling Act which rose from 2,601 to 4,618. The number of offences under the Indian Motor Vehicles Act rose from 2,397 to 3,535. The decrease was most noticeable in offences under the City of Bombay Police Act which fell from 74,002 to 61,939. The number of offences under the Bombay Public Conveyances Act fell from 6,077 to 5,142. As regards offences under the Indian Penal Code, there was a considerable increase in offences of Cheating which rose from 561 to 746. The number of offences under Criminal Misappropriation of Property rose from 248 to 375. The decrease was most noticeable in offences of Criminal Force and Assault which fell from 1,605 to 1,471. The number of offences of Theft fell from 1,605 to 1,471.

(Statements Nos. 2 and 9).—During the year, 1,47,712 regular and 134 miscellaneous cases were disposed of and 7,612 regular cases remained pending at the close of the year.

7. Results of Trials—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Presidency Magistrates was 1,60,152. Of the persons tried, 22,560 were acquitted or discharged, 1,29,217 were convicted, 147 were committed to the High Court, 42 died, 119 were transferred to other Provinces, 2 were handed over to the Military Authorities and 8,065 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Indian Penal Code, 3,410 were convicted and 6,382 were acquitted or discharged. The results of trials before each of the three classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

8. Punishments—(Statement No. 12).—Of the persons convicted, 3,363 were punished with imprisonment, 1,18,685 with fine, 16 with whipping, 6,245 convicted persons were released after admonition and 908 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code. 161 persons were sent to the Leper Asylum at Matunga.

The sentences of imprisonment passed were for the following terms:—

The fines imposed aggregated Rs. 4,91,263-10-2. The total amount realised was Rs. 3,30,151-9-2 of which Rs. 17,242-10-6 were paid as compensation to complainants.

II. MAGISTRATES, VILLAGE OFFICERS, ETC.

9. Results of Trials—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these tribunals was 2,04,199. Of these, the cases of 1,098 were committed to the Sessions or referred to higher authorities and of the remaining 2,03,101, the cases of 1,77,195 were finally disposed of by the various tribunals. Of the total of 1,77,195, 1,09,878 or 62 per cent. were convicted and 66,266 or 37.4 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, 108 persons died, 675 escaped during trial and 268 were transferred.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before these tribunals at the close of the year was 25,906 as compared with 20,828 in 1937.

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 1.761 were for terms not exceeding 15 days, 5.205 for terms not exceeding 6 months, 1.182 for terms not exceeding 2 years and 111 for terms above 2 years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 156 persons; in 1937 the figure was 82.

The amounts of fines imposed and realised during the year were Rs. 8.84,167-13-6 and Rs. 6.57,233-12-10 respectively. A total sum of Rs. 15,505-12-0 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to the above, 133 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code as against 127 last year.

III. COURTS OF SESSION.

- 11. Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).—There were 2,041 persons or 68 more than in 1937 under trial. The cases of 1,817 were decided while those of 224 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the 1,817 persons tried, 919 or 50.6 per cent. were convicted, 847 or 46.6 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, the cases of 46 were referred to the High Court under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 2 persons died, 2 escaped during trial and the case of 1 was transferred to another Province.

The total realisation amounted to Rs. 9,727-0-9 as compared with Rs. 12,503-5-0 in 1937 and the total amount of fine paid as compensation was Rs. 796 as against Rs. 1,194-8-0 in 1937.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appellate Courts Subordinate to the High Court.

I. APPEALS.

- 13. (Statement No. 2).—The number of appeals decided during the year was 2,767 as against 2,786 in the preceding year, a decrease of 19.
- 14. Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 10).—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 2,354. Of these, the appeals of 273 were summarily dismissed and sentences on 983 were confirmed after admission making a total of 1,256 wholly unsuccessful appellants or 53.4 per cent. Of the remaining, 260 or 11.1 per cent. obtained a modification of sentences passed on them and 705 or 29.9 per cent. an annulment. The cases of 113 appellants were otherwise disposed of and the cases of 20 appellants were transferred to another Province. As compared with 1937, the results were more favourable to the appellants.

15. Sessions Courts—(Statement No. 10).—During the year, the number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Session was 2,415. The appeals of 670 persons (or 27.7 per cent.) were summarily dismissed; 659 appellants whose appeals were admitted were altogether unsuccessful, 406 obtained an alteration of sentence, 644 were acquitted, the cases of 34 appellants were otherwise disposed of and 2 persons died pending the decision of their appeals. The proportions of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders and completely successful were 55.03, 16.8 and 26.7 per cent. respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 37.8, 23.3 and 36.9 If admitted appeals only are considered, per cent. respectively. these results were on the whole more favourable to the appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants during the year being 60.2 as against 52.1 in 1937.

II. SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

- 16. Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 10).—The cases of 439 persons who applied for revision or against whom applications were made by complainants came before the District Magistrates for revision. The number was more by 66 than in 1937. The applications in the case of 297 accused were rejected and those in the case of 106 were otherwise disposed of.
- 17. Sessions Courts—(Statement No. 10).—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 1,617 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Session during the year. The number was more by 134 than in 1937. Applications in the case of 1,275 were rejected and those in the case of 342 were otherwise disposed of.

HIGH COURT.

I. Original Jurisdiction—(High Court Sessions).

18. Commitments to the High Court—(Statement No. 9).—Ninety-two cases in all were brought to trial at the High Court Sessions during the year including 2 cases pending at the end of 1937. All these 92 cases were decided during the year. These 92 cases occupied in all 127 days. This may be compared with 93 cases occupying 144 days in 1937.

Altogether 147 persons were tried, of whom 106 were convicted and 41 were acquitted.

The fines imposed during the year amounted to Rs. 1,000 and fines realised during the year amounted to Rs. 300.

II. APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

- 20. (Statement No. 10).—Sixty-three appeals were pending before the High Court at the beginning of the year from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year, 497 appeals were preferred and 516 decided, leaving 44 pending at its close. The numbers of appeals preferred and decided during the year are less by 115 and 93 respectively than those of the preceding year and the number of appeals pending at the close of the year is less by 19 than that of the preceding year. Of the appeals preferred against sentences, 387 were from Courts of Session, 86 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates and the remaining 24 were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittal.
- 21. Results of Appeals.—Four hundred and four appeals against sentences passed by Courts of Session were decided. The sentences were upheld in 319 cases, reversed in 47 and modified in 26. 4 were returned for presentation to the proper Court and 2 appeals were converted into Revision Applications. In 4 cases, there was a remand for a retrial. The remaining two appeals related to complaints under section 476 of the Criminal Procedure Code.

Eighty-nine appeals against sentences passed by Presidency Magistrates were decided. The sentences were upheld in 81 cases, reversed in 5 and modified in 3.

Twenty-three appeals by the Local Government against orders of acquittal involving 41 accused were disposed of by the High Court during the year. In 11 appeals involving 15 accused, the High Court set aside the orders of acquittal in respect of 14 and convicted them and in respect of 1 accused the appeal was dismissed. Six appeals involving 14 accused were dismissed summarily and in 6 appeals involving 12 accused the orders of acquittal were upheld and the appeals dismissed.

The results of appeals as affecting individual appellants were as follows:—

The appeals of 344 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals the sentences of 113 appellants were confirmed, those of 49 altered, those of 70 reversed and 4 appeals involving 5 accused were remanded for retrial, in 4 appeals involving 4 accused persons the appellants were asked to approach the proper Court and 2 appeals involving 2 accused were allowed to be converted into Revision Applications.

III. SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

- 22. Reference under section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.—One reference was pending in the High Court at the beginning of the year and 12 were submitted to it during the year. Of these, 11 were decided and 2 remained pending at the close of the year. Out of the 11 decided cases involving 15 accused, the High Court convicted 8 persons and acquitted the remaining 7. The verdict of the jury was accepted in 4 cases and set aside in 7.
- 23. References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.—Forty-three references under this section were submitted to the High Court during the year for the confirmation of death sentences and 7 were pending at the opening. 47 cases involving 61 accused were decided during the year. The sentence of death was confirmed in the case of 41 persons and commuted to that of transportation for life in the case of 5. Of the remaining 15 persons, 14 were acquitted and discharged and in the case of 1 accused a retrial was ordered.

During the year under report, 46 persons were executed in the Province of Bombay.

24. Revision.—During the year 1938, one hundred and thirty-eight cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 23 were pending at the opening of the year. Of these, 146 were decided during the year and 15 remained pending at its close. The number reported was less by 39 than in 1937. In 38 cases the orders sent up for revision were not disturbed, 18 sentences were enhanced, 31 sentences were reduced or altered, 46 sentences were reversed, 3 proceedings were quashed but no new trials ordered and in 10 cases new trials or further inquiries were ordered.

Orders were passed under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in 293 cases, an increase of 6 over the figures of the previous year. Of these, 280 came before the High Court and 13 were taken up by the High Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion. Of the 280 applications for the issue of rule, 205 were rejected, the High Court passed no order in one case and 3 were allowed to be withdrawn. Of the 71 rules issued, 37 were finally discharged, 24 were made absolute in their entirety and in 9 the orders complained of were modified. In the remaining one the sentence was enhanced.

In 7 out of the 13 cases taken up by the High Court suo motu, the orders passed by the lower Courts were not disturbed, in 4 the sentences were enhanced and in 2 the sentences were reduced.

25. Applications for Transfer.—Sixty-six applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases from one Court or district to another were received during the year and 6 were pending at the beginning of the year. Out of these, 69 were decided during the year and 3 remained pending at its close. Forty-

seven were summarily rejected, 2 were allowed to be withdrawn and in 4 transfers were granted without the issue of rules. In the remaining 16 cases in which rules were issued, transfers were granted in 6 and refused in 10.

- 26. Miscellaneous Applications.—Five applications for compensation, 5 for stay of proceedings, 12 for disposal of property, 9 for maintenance, 5 under section 476 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 13 for bail, 7 under the Contempt of Courts Act and 22 for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by the High Court during the year.
- 27. Under sub-section 1 of section 46 of the Bombay Children Act, XIII of 1924 and rule 14 of the Bombay Children and Juvenile Court Rules, 1936, a Juvenile Court was established at Ahmedabad presided over by the City Magistrate, First Class, sitting singly or with one or two lady Honorary Magistrates, having jurisdiction over the City of Ahmedabad and the area situated within a radius of five miles from the Head Post Office at Ahmedabad. (Vide Government Resolution, Home Department, No. 5987/3-II, dated the 26th March 1938.)
