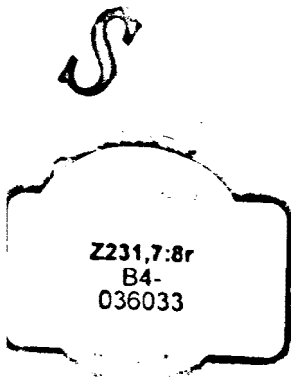

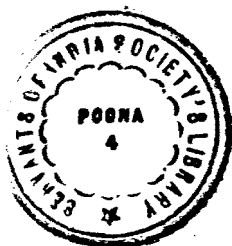

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1939.

1. *Judicial Staff*—(Statement No. 1).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Province on 31st December 1939 and engaged partly or wholly in civil cases consisted of 10 permanent High Court Judges, 1 temporary Additional High Court Judge, 17 District Judges, 1 Joint Judge, 11 Assistant Judges (including 1 Assistant Judge under training), a Chief Judge and 5 Judges of the Presidency Small Cause Court, 1 Provincial Small Cause Court Judge, 23 First Class Subordinate Judges and 95 Second Class Subordinate Judges. In addition, the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Poona and Ahmedabad exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also 3 Inamdars and Jahagirdars exercising the powers of a Subordinate Judge under Regulation XIII of 1830 and 81 Village Munsiffs appointed under the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, XVII of 1879.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE.

The Honourable Sir John W. F. Beaumont, Knight, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 11th June and from 28th July to 31st December 1939. His Lordship was on leave from 12th June to 27th July 1939. During the interval, the Honourable Mr. Justice R. S. Broomfield, I.C.S., acted as Chief Justice.

PUISNE JUDGES.

The Honourable Sir Cecil Patrick Blackwell, Knight, from 1st January to 11th June and from 15th October to 31st December 1939. His Lordship was on leave from 12th June to 14th October 1939.

The Honourable Mr. Justice K. B. Wassoodew, from 1st January to 31st December 1939.

The Honourable Mr. Justice M. A. Somjee from 1st January to 31st December 1939.

The Honourable Mr. Justice K. C. Sen, I.C.S., from 1st January to 31st December 1939. His Lordship acted as a Puisne Judge from 1st January to 28th February 1939 and was an Additional Judge from 1st March to 31st December 1939.

The Honourable Mr. Justice N. S. Lokur, from 1st January to 14th October 1939. His Lordship was an Additional Judge from 1st January to 28th February 1939 and acted as a Puisne Judge from 1st March to 14th October 1939.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Indarnarayan Brijmohanlall acted as a Puisne Judge from 12th June to 14th October 1939.

HIGH COURT.

I. ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

2. *Original Suits for Disposal*—(Statement No. 5).—The number of civil suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of the year 1938 was 1,515 including 11 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number instituted during the year 1939 was 1,933 including 6 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 270 restored (including 1 suit received from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) during the year. The above totals 1,515, 1,933 and 270 make an aggregate of 3,718 for disposal in 1939 as against 4,030 in 1938.

3. *Original Suits Disposed of*—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits decided was 2,253 including 10 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 1,465 including 8 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. This number is 50 less than the corresponding number at the end of the previous year. Of these 1,465 suits, 395 were ready for trial and in arrear, an increase of 86 suits over the corresponding figure of the previous year. There were 517 suits whose hearing had been pending for over one year. This is an increase of 69 suits on the figure of the previous year.

The average duration of suits disposed of during the year under report was as shown in the table given below :—

5. *Suits Instituted and Disposed of under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.*—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1938 was 13. The number instituted during the year 1939 was 17. Of these 30, 16 were decided and 14 remained pending at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided :—

- 3 were dismissed or not prosecuted, the average duration being 304 days ; and
- 13 were decided after full trial, the average duration being 242 days.

There were 3 suits pending over one year at the close of the year.

6. *Suits instituted and disposed of under the Admiralty and Vice-admiralty jurisdiction.*—Three suits were pending at the close of the year 1938. None was instituted and three were disposed of during the year under report.

There was no suit pending at the close of the year.

7. *Suits instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial jurisdiction.*—There were 11 suits pending at the end of the year 1938 and the number instituted during the year 1939 was 18. Of these 29 suits, 18 were decided and 11 remained pending at the close of the year.

There was no suit pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided :—

- 1 was compromised, the average duration being 187 days ;
- 8 were decreed *ex parte*, the average duration being 173 days ;
and
- 9 were decreed after contest ; the average duration being 231 days.

8. *Insolvency Petitions.*—The number of petitions pending at the end of the year 1938 was 1,530 and the number instituted during the year 1939 was 292 and 16 were restored during the year making a total of 1,838 for disposal in 1939. Of these, 615 were decided and 1,223 remained pending at the close of the year 1939. There were 955 petitions pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the petitions decided :—

- 554 were decided *ex parte*, the average duration being 1,058 days ;
and
- 61 were decided after full trial, the average duration being 705 days.

9. *Appeals to the Privy Council.*—Six appeals were pending from the previous year and 4 were admitted during the year making a total of 10 (including one under the Income-tax Act) for disposal in the year 1939.

Of these 10 appeals :—

- 1 was decided by the Privy Council who confirmed the Order of the Appeal Court.
- 6 were pending before the Privy Council in England. The records of all being despatched during the year under report.
- 3 were (including one under Income-tax Act) pending in the Bombay High Court.

10. *Income-tax References.*—Five references under section 66 of the Income-tax Act, 1922, were filed during the year under report and were disposed of in the same year.

There were also 3 applications presented under section 66 (3) of the Income-tax Act, and none was disposed of during the year.

11. *References to take accounts, etc.*—The number of references to take accounts, to hold sales of immoveable properties directed to be sold by the Court under Mortgage Decrees or otherwise, to make inquiries as to estates to be administered and those to be partitioned, as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on question of title, to settle conveyances, to frame Schemes in charity matters, on questions affecting minors in respect of proposed terms of settlement, as to whether suits filed by next friends were for the benefit of the minor plaintiffs and in like matters pending on 1st January 1939 was 197 and 159 references were filed in 1939 in the Office of the Commissioner for taking accounts making a total of 356 for disposal. The number of references disposed of by him during the year 1939 was 165, leaving 191 pending at the close of the year.

In addition to such references the Commissioner took and passed a large number of accounts of Receivers and Liquidators which in the year under report numbered 247 and 33 respectively.

During the year under report under High Court Rule 516, 19 warrants for sale of immoveable properties attached were filed before and settled by the Commissioner and under Rule 454, 18 accounts for depositing moneys on behalf of minors with the Accountant General, High Court, Bombay, were filed and passed by the Commissioner. The Commissioner also settled during the same period 20 conveyances.

12. *Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.*—During the year 537 petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration and Succession Certificates, 88 Pauper Petitions for leave to sue or defend in *forma pauperis*, 44 petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 25 petitions under the Indian Trust Act, 10 references under the Land Acquisition Act and 174 petitions under the Guardian and Wards, Lunacy and Arbitration Act, etc., making a total of 878 were filed for disposal.

13. *Awards under the Indian Arbitration Act, 1899.*—The number of Awards filed during the year was 102.

14. *Applications for Execution of Decrees—(Statement No. 13).*—The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 749 and the number of applications filed during the year was 1,341, making a total of 2,090 for disposal. Of these, 313 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts, in 212 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 83 satisfaction was obtained in part and 806 were wholly infructuous making a total of 1,414 applications disposed of, and 676 applications were pending at the close of the year.

The number of Decrees, etc., received from other Courts for execution during the year was 197.

The number of Darkhasts (Decrees or Orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 53.

The Court fees for taxation during the year amounted to Rs. 60,548-15-0. This sum is also included in the items "fees realised".

*This figure includes Rs. 1,96,100 being the income of the office of the Court Receiver and Liquidator. This figure of income is subject to an adjustment that may be required to be made if any sums charged by the Court Receiver and Liquidator are wholly or partially disallowed by the Commissioner for taking accounts and his decision, if appealed from, is upheld by the Court or the Judge in Chambers.

HIGH COURT.

II. APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appeals from High Court Decrees under Section 15 of the Letters Patent.

18. (*Statement No. 7.*)—Nine appeals from decrees on the Original Side of the High Court were pending at the beginning of the year and 17 were filed during the year. Of the total 26, 14 were decided and 12 remained pending at the close of the year.

The number of appeals disposed of was less by 30 than in 1938.

These 14 appeals were decided as under :—

- 3 Decrees of the Courts of first instance modified.
- 6 Decrees of the Courts of first instance confirmed.
- 5 Decrees of the Courts of first instance reversed.

There was no appeal pending over a year at the close of the year.

The average duration of appeals which were confirmed, modified or reversed was 176 days.

19. (*Statement No. 8.*)—Twenty-three appeals from Orders on the Original Side were filed during the year and 10 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 33, 19 were decided and 14 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of such appeals disposed of was less by 21 than in 1938.

The results of these 19 appeals were as follows :—

- 6 Dismissed or not prosecuted.
- 8 Orders of the Courts of first instance confirmed.
- 1 Order of the Court of first instance modified.
- 3 Orders of the Courts of first instance reversed.
- 1 Case was remanded to the Court of first instance.

There were 3 appeals pending over a year at the close of the year.

The average duration of the appeals which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 354 days and that of the appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed or remanded was 143 days.

20. (*Statement No. 7*).—On the Appellate Side, 39 Letters Patent Appeals from High Court Decrees or Orders were filed during the year and 41 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 80, 37 were decided and 43 (including 14 over a year old) remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was less by 2 than in 1938. The results of these Appeals were as under :—

- 9 Dismissed or not prosecuted.
- 16 Decrees confirmed.
- 11 Decrees reversed.
- 1 Case was remanded to the Court of First Instance.

The average duration of the Appeals under the Letters Patent which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 183 days and that of Appeals which were confirmed, reversed or remanded was 386 days.

22. *Appeals disposed of—*(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—The disposals of First and Second Appeals and those of Appeals from Orders show respectively a decrease of 77, 220 and 24 in the corresponding figures of the previous year.

23. *Appeals pending—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).*—At the close of the year, 607 First Appeals, 1,305 Second Appeals and 56 Appeals from Orders were pending. The aggregate total of pending Appeals is less by 58 than in 1938.

25. *Results of Appeals*—(*Statements Nos. 7 and 8*).—Out of the 412 Appeals from Original Decrees decided, 63 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Out of the remaining 349, the decrees of the Lower Courts were confirmed in 237, modified in 45, reversed in 63, and 4 Appeals were remanded. Out of the 895 Appeals from Appellate Decrees decided, 350 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 545, the decrees of the Lower Courts were confirmed in 389, modified in 35, reversed in 103 and the remaining 18 Appeals were remanded.

(*Statement No. 8*).—Out of the 60 Appeals from Orders decided, 21 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 39, the Orders of the Lower Courts were affirmed in 27, modified in 1 and reversed in 11.

During the year under report, 3 Appeals under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, were filed, and 1 was pending at the beginning of the year. Out of these 4 Appeals, 3 were dismissed or not prosecuted and 1 remained pending at the close of the year.

There was no reference under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, during the year under report.

Under the powers given to the Registrar and the Deputy Registrar of the High Court, 255 Applications under the Civil Procedure Code (Act V of 1908) were disposed of by them.

26. *Appeals to the Privy Council*.—At the opening of the year, 17 applications for leave to appeal were pending orders. Eighteen new applications were filed during the year. Of these 35 applications, 2 were summarily rejected, in 9 Rule was made absolute, in 11 Rule was discharged and 13 remained pending at the close of the year. During the year, the records of 3 Appeals were sent to the Privy Council.

27. *Results of Appeals to the Privy Council.*—During the year, 2 Appeals were decided by the Privy Council. The decrees of the High Court were confirmed in these 2 Appeals. Three appeals were pending before the Privy Council at the end of the year.

CIVIL COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

29. *Appeals instituted*—(Statement No. 7).—4,375 appeals were instituted in 1939, showing a decrease of 241 in the figure of the previous year. The number of appeals instituted was greater in 9 districts and less in the remaining 9 districts. There was a noticeable increase in Belgaum (111), Ahmednagar (66) and Dharwar (51). In the remaining 6 districts increases were less than 50. A decrease on the other hand was noticeable in Satara (146), East Khandesh (88), Ahmedabad (83), Ratnagiri (72), Poona (67) and West Khandesh (52). The remaining 3 districts showed decreases below 50.

30. *Appeals disposed of*—(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—4,601 appeals were disposed of during the year including 31 by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate powers. The figure of total disposals shows an increase of 314 as compared with that of the previous year ; the figure of disposal by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate powers shows a decrease of 46 in the corresponding figure of the previous year. There was an increase in the disposals in 13 districts, the greatest being in East Khandesh (153), followed by Bijapur (114), Thana (99), Belgaum (95), Ahmednagar (89), Kaira (72), Ahmedabad (57), Kanara (53) and West Khandesh (53). In the remaining 4 districts, the increase was below 50. On the other hand there was a decrease in the disposals in 5 districts, the greatest being in Nasik (210), followed by Satara (96) and Poona (70). The remaining 2 districts showed decreases below 50.

31. *Appeals pending*—(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—There were 5,407 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being less by 210 than at the end of 1938. The number of appeals pending for more than a year rose from 1,843 to 1,885.

32. *Results of Appeals*—(Statement No. 7).—In 631 cases or 13·7 per cent. of the whole, appeals were either summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, in 2,537 or 55·1 per cent. the judgments of the lower Courts were affirmed, in 597 or 13 per cent. they were modified, in 625 or 13·6 per cent. they were reversed and in 206 or 4·5 per cent. the cases were remanded for a fresh hearing. The remaining 5 appeals were disposed of by transfer.

33. The average duration of appeals in the lower Appellate Courts, which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 191 days while that of the appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed or remanded was 407 days.

34. *Miscellaneous Appeals*—(Statement No. 8).—582 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year, 4 were revived and 310 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 896, 616 were disposed of during the year and 280 remained pending at its close. The number of pending appeals was less by 30 than that in the previous year.

35. The average duration of miscellaneous appeals in the lower Appellate Courts, which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 70 days while that of appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed or remanded was 226 days.

CIVIL COURTS IN THE MOFUSSIL SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

36. *Constitution of Courts and Change in Jurisdiction.*—With effect from the 8th August 1939 the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Vengurla was linked with the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Malwan. This Court is hereafter to be presided over by the Subordinate Judge of Malwan who is to hold the Court at Vengurla during such period as the District Judge of Ratnagiri may subject to the control of the High Court direct in this behalf. The Subordinate Judges of Deogad and Rajapur are also to be Joint Subordinate Judges for the linked Court of Vengurla and they and the Subordinate Judge of Malwan are to work at Vengurla each for such period as the District Judge, Ratnagiri, may, subject to the control of the High Court, direct in this behalf.

(*Vide* Government Notification, Home Department, No. 7896/3-II, dated the 8th August 1939.)

37. *Original suits instituted*—(*Statement No. 3.*)—The number of suits instituted in 1939 was 129,370 showing a decrease of 5,690 in the figure of the previous year.

There was a decrease in money suits to the extent of 5·6 per cent., while in title and other suits there was an increase to the extent of ·6 per cent., the number of money suits being 103,762 as against 109,616 in 1938 and that of title and other suits 25,608 as against 25,444 in 1938.

(*Statement No. 4.*)—The total value of suits in 1939 amounted to Rs. 4,44,32,222, there being an increase of Rs. 30,35,645 over the total of 1938.

38. *Local distribution*—(*Statement No. 3.*)—The number of suits instituted in 1939 showed an increase in 2 districts and a decrease in the remaining 16 districts. The increase was not appreciable in any of the districts being less than 500. The decrease on the other hand was noticeable in 3 districts, being 1,224 in East Khandesh followed by 983 in Kaira and 549 in Poona. The decrease in the remaining 13 districts was below 500.

(*Statement No. 3.*)—The largest number of suits instituted during the year was in Poona (15,330). Institutions exceeded 10,000 in West Khandesh, East Khandesh and Ahmedabad and ranged from 5,000 to 10,000 in Nasik, Satara, Sholapur, Kaira, Thana, Broach and Panch

Mahals, Dharwar, Ahmednagar, Belgaum and Ratnagiri. Surat, Bijapur and Kolaba showed 4,709, 4,228 and 2,362 while the lowest figure 2,281 came to the share of Kanara.

39. *Number of suits disposed of*—(Statement No. 5).—In addition to 129,370 suits instituted during the year and 68,220 suits pending from the previous year, 2,453 suits were revived or received on remand or by transfer making a total of 2,00,043 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of during the year was 133,278, a decrease of 2,173 in the figure of the previous year.

Of the total number of suits decided during the year, viz., 133,278, Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals (i.e., Courts of Subordinate Judges) disposed of 108,604, Small Cause Courts 12,651, District Courts 582, Village Munsiffs' Courts 11,401 while the remaining 40 suits were disposed of by Unpaid Tribunals (i.e., Inamdars and Jahagirdars).

40. *Results of suits decided*—(Statement No. 5).—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 16,430 or 12·3 per cent. were disposed of without trial, 26,265 or 19·7 per cent. were disposed of *ex parte*, 15,553 or 11·7 per cent. on admission of claims, 32,449 or 24·3 per cent. by compromise, 41,679 or 31·3 per cent. after full trial, 441 or 0·3 per cent. on reference to arbitration, and 461 or 0·3 per cent. by transfer. Of the 41,679 decided after full trial, 36,693 or 88·03 per cent. resulted in favour of the Plaintiffs and 4,986 or 11·9 per cent. in favour of the Defendants.

41. *Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jahagirdars*—(Statement No. 5).—The Unpaid Tribunals disposed of 40 original suits; in 1938 the figure was 51.

42. *Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges*—(Statement No. 5).—The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 108,604, a decrease of 485 as compared with the figure of the previous year. The decrease was noticeable in the number of cases decided under both the ordinary and Small Cause Court procedure, the number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure being 57,922 and the Small Cause Court procedure 50,682.

43. *Suits disposed of by Small Cause Courts*—(Statement No. 5).—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 12,651 suits, a decrease of 1,066 in the figure of the previous year's disposals.

44. *Suit disposed of by District and Assistant Judges*—(Statement No. 5).—The District Courts disposed of 582 original suits, an increase of 232 over the figure of the previous year.

45. *Suits disposed of by Village Munsiffs*—(Statement No. 5).—The Village Munsiffs disposed of 11,401 suits showing a decrease of 843 suits as compared with the figure of the previous year.

46. *Pending suits*—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 66,765 as against 68,220 in the previous year.

(*Statements Nos. 5 and 14*).—Of the pending cases, 9,588 had been pending for more than a year ; this shows an increase of 190 in the figure of the previous year. Of the suits pending over a year, 6 were in the Courts of Inamdars and Jahagirdars, 162 in the Courts of the Village Munsiffs, 9,338 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges, 16 in the Small Cause Courts and 66 in the District Courts, the figures showing as compared with those of the previous year an increase of 54 and 222 respectively in the Courts of Village Munsiffs and Subordinate Judges and a decrease of 1, 79 and 6 respectively in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jahagirdars, the Small Cause Courts and the District Courts.

The number of suits pending over a year was largest in Ahmedabad (1,328), followed by Poona (1,283), Ahmednagar (1,090), Satara (1,015), Dharwar (713), Sholapur (485), Surat (457), Thana (453), Kaira (428), Belgaum (413), East Khandesh (396), Ratnagiri (354), Broach and Panch Mahals (297) and West Khandesh (232). The figures for the remaining districts are less than 200.

47. *Duration of suits*—(*Statement No. 5*).—The average duration in days of suits decided in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jahagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and the District Courts is as shown in the tabular statement given below :—

48. *Execution Proceedings*—(*Statement No. 13*).—There were 120,015 applications for execution pending from the previous year and 166,923 new applications were filed during the year. Out of the total number of applications before the Courts, 168,665 were disposed of during the year and 118,273 remained pending at its close.

Debtors were imprisoned in 183 cases, moveable property sold in 690 and immoveable property in 5,351.

49. *Miscellaneous cases*—(Statement No. 6).—The number of institutions and disposals of Miscellaneous cases fell from 13,296 to 12,661 and from 13,257 to 12,932 respectively. The number of Miscellaneous cases pending at the close of the year fell from 7,665 to 7,488. Of the 12,932 miscellaneous cases disposed of, 2,336 were disposed of without trial, 1,616 were disposed of *ex parte*, 1,029 on admission of claims, 423 by compromise, 7,512 after full trial and 16 by transfer. Of the 7,512 cases decided after full trial, 5,269 or 70·1 per cent. resulted in favour of the Plaintiffs.

50. *Duration of Miscellaneous cases*—(Statement No. 6).—The average duration in days of Miscellaneous cases decided in the Courts of Inamdars and Jahagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and in the District Courts is as shown in the tabular statement given below :—

III. BOMBAY SMALL CAUSE COURT.

51. (*Statements Nos. 3 and 5*).—The figures of suits instituted and disposed of during the year and of suits pending at the close of the year 1939 in the Presidency Small Cause Court were 25,641, 26,176 and 5,342 respectively. The figures of institutions, disposals and of suits pending at the close of the year show a decrease of 840, 386 and 535 respectively when compared with the figures of the previous year.

(*Statement No. 4*).—There was a slight increase in the institutions of suits not exceeding in value Rs. 10 while there was a decrease in all other kinds of suits. The total value of litigation showed a decrease for the year under report. The figure was Rs. 54,70,001-7-11 as against Rs. 57,97,925-8-2 in the preceding year.

52. *Mode of disposal*—(*Statement No. 5*).—Of the 26,176 suits disposed of, 263 were decided without trial, 8,064 were decided *ex parte*, 10,120 on admission of claims, 6,142 by compromise, 1,526 after full trial, 55 on reference to arbitration and 6 by transfer.

53. The average duration of suits disposed of without trial was 35 days, of those decided *ex parte* 37, of those decided on admission of claims 51, of those decided by compromise 40, of those decided after full trial 90, of those decided by reference to arbitration 60 and of those decided by transfer 40.

54. *Execution of Decrees*—(*Statement No. 13*).—Of the 18,706 applications for the execution of decrees that were before the Courts during the year (including 2,992 pending from the previous year), 15,879 were disposed of and 2,827 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the last figure, 1,002 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of 6,719 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 6,767 were returned as wholly infructuous and 2,393 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realized was Rs. 9,40,401-1-5 as compared with Rs. 8,29,726-3-8 in the previous year.

55. *Coercive Process*—(*Statement No. 13*).—In order to enforce the execution of decrees imprisonment was ordered in 13 cases and sale of moveables in 695. The figure for imprisonment was the same as that for the previous year while the figure for sale of moveables shows a decrease of 86 when compared with the corresponding figure of the previous year.

56. *Applications to the Full Court*—(*Statement No. 14*).—There were 370 applications for disposal before the Full Court during the year, of which 341 were disposed of and 29 remained pending at the close of the year.

GENERAL.

57. As compared with the figures for 1938, the number of suits instituted in and disposed of by the Subordinate Judges' Courts decreased by 4,124 and 485 respectively; the number of regular suits disposed

of was less by 184 and that under Small Cause Court Jurisdiction was less by 301. With the number of revived suits and those pending at the end of the last year, the total number of suits pending shows a decrease from 59,087 to 57,232 and the number of suits pending over a year shows an increase from 9,116 to 9,338. The number of appeals disposed of by District Courts increased by 314. The First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate Powers disposed of 31 appeals only as against 77 in 1938. The total number of appeals pending in the District Courts decreased from 5,617 to 5,407.

The figures of suits instituted and disposed of on the Original Side of the High Court showed a decrease of 377 and 517 respectively as compared with the corresponding figures of the previous year. The number of suits pending decreased from 3,072 to 2,713.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court, the total number of institutions of appeals and that of disposals showed a decrease of 10 and 324 respectively as compared with the figures of the previous year. The total arrears of appeals fell from 2,068 to 2,012.

58. *Inspection.*—During the year under report, the District Judges inspected the following Courts of Subordinate Judges; Dhandhuka and Viramgam in the Ahmedabad District; Rahuri and Parner in the Ahmednagar District; Ankleshwar, Godhra and Dohad in the Broach and Panch Mahals District; Karwar and Honavar in the Kanara District; Amalner and Shirpur in the West Khandesh District; Satana and Sinnar in the Nasik District; Junnar, Khed and Saswad in the Poona District; Dapoli, Devgad and Malwan in the Ratnagiri District; Patan in the Satara District and Mahad in the Thana District.

59. *Judicial Conference.*—No Judicial Conference was held in any of the districts during the year under report.

60. *Receipts and Charges of the High Court.*—For the year 1939, the total receipts as shown in paragraphs 15 and 28 were Rs. 17,40,516-12-4 on the Original Side and Rs. 1,80,775-8-5 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 19,21,292-4-9. The total charges as shown in the same paragraphs were Rs. 9,20,470-6-0 on the Original Side and Rs. 5,20,945-15-0 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 14,41,416-5-0. The difference between these two aggregates shows an excess of receipts over expenditure of Rs. 4,79,875-15-9. This excess includes Probate and Administration duty (the cost of collecting which is borne by the High Court). In the expenditure no sum is charged for rent or upkeep of the High Court Buildings or certain other matters which would have to be brought into account in ascertaining a net profit. On the other hand no allowance is made for Criminal work which occupies much Judicial time and is not productive of any revenue.

**REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL
JUSTICE IN THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY
DURING THE YEAR 1939.**

1. *Judicial Staff*—(*Statement No. I*).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Province on 31st December 1939 and engaged partly or wholly in Criminal cases consisted of 10 permanent High Court Judges, 1 temporary Additional High Court Judge, 17 Sessions Judges, 7 Additional Sessions Judges, 4 Assistant Sessions Judges, 19 District Magistrates, 11 Presidency Magistrates, 367 other First Class Magistrates, 183 Second Class Magistrates, 187 Third Class Magistrates, 159 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889 and 454 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act VI of 1933.

In addition to the above, there were 19,283 Police Patils in the Province exercising powers under section 14 of the Bombay Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, of whom 411 were invested with powers under section 15 of that Act.

There were 6 Benches of Honorary Magistrates in the City of Bombay constituted from 137 Honorary Magistrates.

2. *Offences Reported*—(*Statement No. II*).—There were 3,30,823 Criminal offences reported during the year, an increase of 33,223 over the figure of 1938. There was an increase in the number of offences reported in the City of Bombay and the districts of Ahmedabad, Sholapur, Kolaba, Poona, Thana, Surat, Dharwar, Nasik, Bombay Suburban District, Kaira, East Khandesh, Bijapur, Ratnagiri, Ahmednagar and West Khandesh while there was a decrease in the remaining 4 districts. The increase was most noticeable in the City of Bombay, namely, 14,820 followed by decreases of 5,554 in Ahmedabad, 2,878 in Sholapur, 1,974 in Kolaba, 1,628 in Poona, 1,581 in Thana, 1,240 in Surat, 1,151 in Dharwar, 923 in Nasik, 908 in the Bombay Suburban District, 677 in Kaira and 555 in East Khandesh; the remaining 4 districts showed increases of less than 500. On the other hand, there was a decrease in Satara of 647; in the remaining 3 districts the decrease was below 500. Of the total number of offences reported, 55,636 were under the Indian Penal Code and 2,75,187 under Special and Local Laws.

3. *Complaints Dismissed (section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and complainants fined (section 250, Criminal Procedure Code)*—(*Statement No. II*).—The number of complaints dismissed under section 203 was 4,499 and the number of complainants fined under section 250 was 131.

4. *Cases found to be true*.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 3,19,184 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial excluding those withdrawn and including those pending from the previous year was 3,39,639. The number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show an increase of 32,286 and 37,331 respectively in the figures of 1938.

5. *Murders reported as true.*—Out of 1,041 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 315 were murders of which 181 ended in conviction. The corresponding figures for 1938 were 1,048, 276 and 144. The 315 murders may be classified as under :—

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

I. PRESIDENCY MAGISTRATES.

6. *Cases in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 11).*—The number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates excluding pending cases was 23,429 and in those of the Honorary Presidency Magistrates was 1,39,872 making a total of 1,63,301. This number is greater by 7,977 than that of 1938, when the corresponding figures were 20,435 and 1,34,889, making a total of 1,55,324. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 1,61,254 or 16,369 more than that of 1938 and the number of cases under the Indian Penal Code was 11,569 or 1,130 more than that of 1938. There was a very marked increase under the former head in offences under the Indian Opium Act which rose from 26 to 218. The number of offences under the Bombay Abkari Act rose from 275 to 644. The decrease was most noticeable in offences under the Indian Companies Act which fell from 46 to 10. The number of offences under the Indian Motor Vehicles Act fell from 3,535 to 3,321. As regards offences under the Indian Penal Code, there was a considerable increase in offences of Theft which rose from 1,471 to 2,028. The number of offences of Hurt rose from 1,483 to 1,822. The decrease was most noticeable in offences of contempt of the Lawful Authority of Public Servants which fell from 1,010 to 603. The number of offences of Criminal Force and Assault fell from 1,490 to 1,369.

(*Statements Nos. 2 and 9*).—During the year, 1,63,301 regular and 205 miscellaneous cases were disposed of and 9,522 regular cases remained pending at the close of the year.

7. *Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).*—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Presidency Magistrates was 1,81,097. Of the persons tried, 23,898 were acquitted or discharged, 1,46,782 were convicted, 146 were committed to the High Court, 27 died, 131 were transferred to other Provinces, 6 were handed over to the Military Authorities and 10,107 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for Offences under the Indian Penal Code, 4,401 were convicted and 8,955 were acquitted or discharged.

The results of trials before each of the three classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below :—

8. *Punishments—(Statement No. 12)*—Of the persons convicted, 3,069 were punished with imprisonment, 1,35,421 with fine, 9 with whipping, 7,036 convicted persons were released after admonition and 1,247 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code. 187 persons were sent to the Leper Asylum at Matunga.

The fines imposed aggregated Rs. 5,14,217-4-0. The total amount realized was Rs. 3,18,714-1-0 of which Rs. 20,662-9-7 were paid as compensation to complainants.

II. MAGISTRATES, VILLAGE OFFICERS, ETC.

9. *Results of trials—(Statement No. 9)*.—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these tribunals was 2,36,082. Of these, the cases of 929 were committed to the Sessions or referred to higher authorities and of the remaining 2,35,153, the cases of 2,02,990 were finally disposed of by the various tribunals. Of the total of 2,02,990, 1,29,257 or 63·7 per cent. were convicted and 72,703 or 35·8 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, 183 persons died, 846 escaped during trial and 1 was transferred.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before these tribunals at the close of the year was 32,163 as compared with 25,906 in 1938.

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 2,358 were for terms not exceeding 15 days, 5,729 for terms not exceeding 6 months, 1,092 for terms not exceeding 2 years and 205 for terms above 2 years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 111 persons ; in 1938 the figure was 156.

The amounts of fines imposed and realized during the year were Rs. 9,22,564-15-6 and Rs. 6,88,277-9-5 respectively. A total sum of Rs. 22,481-14-6 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to the above, 131 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code as against 133 last year.

III. COURTS OF SESSION.

11. *Results of trials*—(*Statement No. 9*).—There were 2,148 persons or 107 more than in 1938 under trial. The cases of 1,858 were decided while those of 290 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the 1,858 persons tried, 944 or 50·8 per cent. were convicted, 866 or 46·6 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, the cases of 41 were referred to the High Court under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 6 persons died and 1 escaped during trial.

12. *Punishments*—(*Statement No. 12*).—The following sentences and orders were passed by the Courts of Session :—

Fines to the amount of Rs. 20,577-0-0 were imposed by Courts of Session as compared with Rs. 13,777-0-0 in the preceding year. The total realization amounted to Rs. 5,870-9-0 as compared with Rs. 9,727-0-9 in 1938 and the total amount of fine paid as compensation was Rs. 340-0-0 as against Rs. 796-0-0 in 1938.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appellate Courts Subordinate to the High Court.

I. APPEALS.

13. (*Statement No. 2*).—The number of appeals decided during the year was 2,794 as against 2,767 in the preceding year, an increase of 27.

14. *Magistrates' Courts*—(*Statement No. 10*).—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 2,477. Of these, the appeals of 270 were summarily dismissed and sentences on 1,084 were confirmed after admission making a total of 1,354 wholly

unsuccessful appellants or 54·7 per cent. Of the remaining, 243 or 9·8 per cent. obtained a modification of sentences passed on them and 750 or 30·3 an annulment. The cases of 128 appellants were otherwise disposed of and 2 persons died pending decision of their appeals. As compared with 1938, the results were less favourable to the appellants.

15. *Sessions Courts*—(*Statement No. 10*).—During the year, the number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Session was 2,326. The appeals of 644 (27·7 per cent.) were summarily dismissed and those of 1,682 (72·3 per cent.) were admitted. Of the above 1,682 appellants, 757 (45 per cent.) were wholly unsuccessful; 365 (21·7 per cent.) were partially successful; 520 (30·9 per cent.) were wholly successful; the cases of 38 appellants (2·3 per cent.) were otherwise disposed of; 1 person (0·05 per cent.) died pending the decision of his appeal; and the case of 1 appellant (0·05 per cent.) was transferred to another Province.

If admitted appeals only are considered, these results were on the whole less favourable to the appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants during the year being 52·6 as against 60·2 in 1938.

II. SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

16. *Magistrates' Courts*—(*Statement No. 10*).—The cases of 400 persons who applied for revision or against whom applications were made by complainants came before the District Magistrates for revision. The number was less by 39 than in 1938. The applications in the case of 285 were rejected and those in the case of 90 were otherwise disposed of.

17. *Sessions Courts*—(*Statement No. 10*).—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 1,557 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Session during the year. The number was less by 60 than in 1938. Applications in the case of 1,260 were rejected and those in the case of 297 were otherwise disposed of.

HIGH COURT.

I. ORIGINAL JURISDICTION—(HIGH COURT SESSIONS).

18. *Commitments to the High Court*—(*Statement No. 9*).—Ninety-eight cases in all were brought to trial at the High Court Sessions during the year. Of these, 97 cases were decided during the year and 1 remained pending at the end of the year. These 97 cases occupied in all 134 days. This may be compared with 92 cases occupying 127 days in 1938.

Altogether 144 persons were tried, of whom 96 were convicted, 47 were acquitted and 1 person remained under trial at the end of the year.

19. *Punishments*—(*Statement No. 12*).—The following sentences were passed :—

The fines imposed during the year amounted to Rs. 1,620 and fines realized during the year amounted to Rs. 1,020. Out of the amount realized, Rs. 320 were paid as compensation to complainants.

II. APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

20. (*Statement No. 10*).—Forty-four appeals were pending before the High Court at the beginning of the year from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year, 491 appeals were preferred and 476 decided leaving 59 pending at its close. The numbers of appeals preferred and decided during the year were less by 6 and 40 respectively than those of the preceding year and the number of appeals pending at the close of the year was more by 15 than that of the preceding year. Of the appeals preferred against sentences 365 were from Courts of Session, 90 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates and the remaining 36 were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittal.

21. *Results of Appeals*.—Three hundred and fifty-two appeals against sentences passed by Courts of Session were decided. The sentences were upheld in 310 cases, reversed in 24 and modified in 16, and 1 appeal was returned for presentation to the proper Court. In the remaining 1 appeal papers were forwarded to Government for consideration of the steps to be taken under the Indian Lunacy Act.

Ninety-three appeals against sentences passed by Presidency Magistrates were decided. The sentences were upheld in 74 cases, reversed in 13 and modified in 5. One case related to property.

Thirty-one appeals by the Local Government against orders of acquittal involving 64 accused were disposed of by the High Court during the year.

In 15 appeals involving 22 accused, the High Court set aside the orders of acquittal in respect of 20 and convicted them and in respect of 2 accused, the appeal was dismissed.

In 1 appeal involving 1 accused, the High Court dismissed the appeal and issued notice to the accused to show cause why the sentence passed upon him under another section should not be enhanced and after hearing the case enhanced the sentence passed upon him. In 2 appeals involving 2 accused, the High Court referred the matter back to the lower Court to be dealt with according to law. Two appeals involving 15 accused were dismissed summarily and in 11 appeals involving 24 accused the orders of acquittal were upheld and the appeals dismissed.

The results of appeals as affecting individual appellants were as follows :—

The appeals of 337 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals the sentences of 115 appellants were confirmed, those of 35 altered, those of 55 reversed, in 1 appeal involving 2 accused persons the appellants were asked to approach the proper Court and in 1 appeal involving 1 accused person papers were forwarded to Government for consideration of the steps to be taken under the Indian Lunacy Act.

III. SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

22. *References under section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.*—Two references were pending in the High Court at the beginning of the year and 13 were submitted to it during the year. Of these, 13 were decided and 2 remained pending at the close of the year. Out of the 13 decided cases involving 18 accused, the High Court convicted 11 persons, acquitted 6 and in 1 case involving 1 accused person papers were forwarded to Government for consideration of the steps to be taken under the Indian Lunacy Act. The verdict of the jury was accepted in 4 cases and set aside in 9.

23. *References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.*—Thirty-one references under this section were submitted to the High Court during the year for the confirmation of death sentences and 3 were pending at the opening. 29 cases involving 36 accused were decided during the year. The sentence of death was confirmed in the case of 28 persons (of whom 1 person approached the Privy Council and the execution of the sentence passed upon him has been ordered by Government to be stayed) and commuted to that of transportation for life in the case of 5. The remaining 3 persons were acquitted.

During the year under report, 21 persons were executed in the Province of Bombay.

24. *Revision*.—During the year 1939, one hundred and thirty-seven cases under section 438, 1 case under section 341 and 1 case under section 215 of the Code of Criminal Procedure were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates and 15 were pending at the opening of the year. Of these, 136 were decided during the year and 18 remained pending at its close. The number reported was more by 1 than in 1938. In 38 cases the orders sent up for revision were not disturbed, 23 sentences were enhanced, 33 sentences were reduced or altered, 29 sentences were reversed, 2 proceedings were quashed but no new trials ordered, in 6 cases new trials or further inquiries were ordered and the remaining 5 cases were otherwise disposed of.

Orders were passed under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in 334 cases, an increase of 41 over the figures of the previous year. Of these, 315 came before the High Court and 19 were taken up by the High Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion. Of the 315 applications for the issue of rule, 215 were rejected and 3 were allowed to be withdrawn. Of the 97 rules issued, 42 were finally discharged, 37 were made absolute in their entirety and in 14 the orders complained of were modified. In the remaining 4 the sentences were enhanced.

In 7 out of the 19 cases taken up by the High Court *suo motu*, the orders passed by the lower Courts were not disturbed, in 3 the sentences were enhanced, in 4 the sentences were reduced and in the remaining 5 the sentences were set aside.

25. *Applications for Transfer*.—Fifty-one applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases from one Court or district to another were received during the year and 3 were pending at the beginning of the year. Out of these, 49 were decided during the year and 5 remained pending at its close. Twenty were summarily rejected, 2 were allowed to be withdrawn and in 2 transfers were granted without the issue of rules. In the remaining 25 cases in which rules were issued, transfers were granted in 15 and refused in 10.

26. *Miscellaneous Applications*.—Four applications for compensation, 3 for stay of proceedings, 11 for disposal of property, 3 for maintenance, 13 under section 476 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 16 for bail, 1 for Habeas Corpus, 1 under the Bombay Children Act, 1 under the Indian Press (Emergency Powers) Act, 7 under the Contempt of Courts Act and 6 for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by the High Court during the year.

27. *Child Offenders—(Form A)*.—One thousand and thirty-one cases regarding offences committed by children were disposed of during the year 1939. 1,125 boys (out of whom 17 boys were dealt with in more than one manner), 59 girls, 3 parents of 3 boys and a mother of a girl were dealt with under the provisions of the Bombay Children Act, XIII of 1924. Various types of offences under the Indian Penal Code and Special and Local Laws were committed by children. 130 children were acquitted, 323 discharged after admonition, 259 committed to the care of fit persons

and also placed under supervision of Probation officers, 154 committed to the care of fit persons but without supervision, 172 detained in Certified Schools, 23 caned, 18 parents or guardians of children were fined, 88 children were fined and 38 were dealt with in other ways. Out of the total number of cases disposed of, 677 were under the Indian Penal Code and 354 under Special and Local Laws.

28. *Statement of cases in which orders were passed under sections 7, 8 and 15 of the Bombay Children Act, XIII of 1924—(Form B).*—Seven hundred and forty-nine boys and 192 girls (22 children having been dealt with in more than one manner), were dealt with under the provisions of sections 7, 8 and 15 of the Bombay Children Act, XIII of 1924. 383 children were sent to Certified Schools under section 7 (4), 318 were committed to the care of relatives or other fit persons named by the Courts under section 7 (5) with surety bonds, 147 were committed to the care of relatives or other fit persons named by the Courts under section 7 (5) but without surety bonds, 80 were kept under the supervision of Probation officers under section 7 (6), 18 were sent to Certified Schools under section 8, 1 was taken from the charge of a guardian under section 15 and 16 children died, were discharged or struck off the list.
