REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE STATE OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1950.

1. *Judicial Staff*—(Statement No. 1) :—The Judicial Staff employed in the State of Bombay on 31st December 1950 and engaged partly or wholly in civil cases consisted of 11 permanent High Court Judges, a Principal Judge and 5 Judges of the City Civil Court, Bombay, 23 District Judges, 27 Assistant Judges, a Chief Judge and 9 Judges of the Presidency Small Cause Court, 3 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges, 40 Civil Judges (Senior Division) and 230 Civil Judges (Junior Division). In addition, the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Poona and Ahmedabad exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge.

The Chief Justice.

The Honourable Mr. Justice M. C. Chagla, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 31st December 1950.

Puisne Judges.

The Honourable Mr. Justice E. Weston, was on duty from 1st January to 17th January 1950. His Lordship was appointed Chief Justice of the East Punjab High Court, Simla, from 18th January 1950.

The Honourable Mr. Justice N. H. C. Coyajee, was on duty on 1st and 2nd January 1950 and from 17th January 1950 to 31st December 1950. His Lordship was on leave from the 3rd January to 16th January 1950.

The Honourable Mr. Justice G. S. Rajadhyaksha, was on duty from 1st January to 23rd April 1950 and from 4th September to 31st December 1950. His Lordship was on deputation to the Government of India, Ministry of Communication, as Chairman of the Air Transport Inquiry Committee from 24th April 1950 to 3rd September 1950.

The Honourable Mr. Justice N. H. Bhagwati, was on duty from 1st January to 31st December 1950.

The Honourable Mr. Justice R. S. Bavdekar, was on duty from 1st January to 31st December 1950.

The Honourable Mr. Justice P. B. Gajendragadkar, was on duty from 1st January to 31st December 1950.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Y. V. Dixit, was on duty from 1st January to 15th February 1950 and from 16th April to 31st December 1950. His Lordship was on leave from 16th February 1950 to 15th April 1950.

The Honourable Mr. Justice S. R. Tendolkar, was on duty from 1st January to 2nd April 1950, from 23rd April to 23rd October 1950 and from 26th October to 31st December 1950. His Lordship was on leave from 3rd April 1950 to 22nd April 1950 and on 24th and 25th October 1950.

The Honourable Mr. Justice H. K. Chainani, was on duty from 1st January to 31st December 1950.

The Honourable Mr. Justice J. C. Shah, was on duty from 1st January to 31st December 1950.

The Honourable Mr. Justice D. V. Vyas, was on duty from 6th March 1950 to 31st December 1950.

HIGH COURT.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

3. *Original Suits for Disposal*—(Statement No. 5).—The number of Civil Suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of the year 1949 was 2,254. The number instituted during the year 1950 was 1,793 and 140 suits were restored during the year. The above figures 2,254, 1,793 and 140 made an aggregate of 4,187 suits for disposal in 1950.

4. *Original Suits disposed of*.—The number of suits disposed of during 1950 was 1,646. The number left undisposed of at the end of the year was therefore 2,541. Of these 2,541 suits, 1,703 were ripe for hearing. The manner of disposal of suits was as follows :—

6. *Suits Instituted and disposed of under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.*—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1949 was 17. The number instituted during the year 1950 was 14. Of these 31 suits, 22 were disposed of and 9 remained pending at the close of the year.

Out of the 22 suits disposed of, 11 were decided after full trial and 11 were disposed of without any contest.

There were 4 suits pending over one year at the close of the year. The corresponding figure for the previous year was 5.

7. *Suits Instituted and disposed of under the Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty and Prize Jurisdiction.*—One suit was pending at the close of the year 1949 under the Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty Jurisdiction. One suit was instituted and none was disposed of during the year under report. Thus two suits remained pending at the close of the year 1950.

Five causes in Prize Court were pending at the close of the previous year. All of them were disposed of during the year 1950.

8. *Suits Instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial Jurisdiction.*—There were 11 suits pending at the end of the year 1949 and the number instituted during the year 1950 was 35.

Of these 46 suits, 37 were disposed of and 9 remained pending at the end of the year under report.

There was no suit pending over a year at the close of the year under report.

Of the suits disposed of:—

1 was dismissed for non-appearance of parties.
 2 were withdrawn with leave.
 24 were decided *ex-parte*.
 10 were decided after contest.

9. *Insolvency Petitions.*—The number of Petitions pending at the end of the year 1949 was 795 and the number filed during the year 1950 was 153, making a total of 948 for disposal in 1950. 167 were disposed of and 781 remained pending at the close of the year under report.

Of the petitions disposed of, 164 were decided *ex-parte* and 3 were decided after full trial.

10. *Insolvency Notices.*—The number of Notices under section 9 (1) of the Presidency-Towns Insolvency Act, 1909, pending from the previous year was 48. The number of such notices issued during the year 1950 was 303 making a total of 356 for disposal. Of these 356 notices, 316 were disposed of and 40 remained pending at the close of the year.

These 316 notices were disposed of as under:—

- 6 were withdrawn,
- 5 were set aside,
- 58 were dismissed under rule 52 (d) of the Bombay Insolvency Rules,
- 244 were disposed of by filing affidavits of services, and
- 2 were dismissed.

11. *Appeals to the Privy Council.*—One appeal which was pending in the Privy Council at the close of the previous year, was subsequently transferred to the Supreme Court of India for disposal.

12. *Appeals to the Supreme Court of India.*—Fifteen appeals were pending at the end of the previous year and 11 were admitted during the year 1950, making a total of 26 (including 8 under the Indian Income Tax Act) for disposal in the year under report.

Of these 26 appeals, 10 were disposed of as under:—

- 2 were allowed with costs.
- 8 were dismissed with costs, and thus there were 16 appeals pending at the end of the year under report.

In 7 appeals records have been despatched to the Supreme Court of India.

13. *Income-tax References and Applications.*—17 References under section 66 of the Income-tax Act, 1922, were pending at the close of the year 1949, and 46 were filed during the year under report. Of these 63, 35 were disposed of during the year and 28 remained pending at the close of the year.

There were 5 applications under section 66 (3) of the Income Tax Act, pending from the previous year and 40 were presented during the year 1950. Out of these 45, 32 were disposed of during the year under report and 13 remained pending at the close of the year.

14. *References to take Accounts.*—The number of references pending in the office of the Commissioner for taking Accounts, on 1st January 1950 was 114. 118 references were filed during the year under report, making a total of 232 for disposal. The number of references disposed of by the Commissioner during the year 1950 was 98, leaving 134 pending at the close of the year.

In addition to such references the Commissioner investigated and passed accounts of Receivers in 117 cases and of Liquidators in 43 cases.

During the year under report, 10 warrants of sale of immoveable properties were lodged in the Commissioner's office under High Court Rule 533, 23 accounts were filed with the Commissioner under rule 470 for ascertaining the amounts to be deposited with the Accountant General, High Court, Bombay, on behalf of minors. The Commissioner also settled 3 conveyances during the year.

15. *Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration and other Miscellaneous Petitions.*—During the year, 791 petitions for probate, for Letters of Administration, for Succession Certificates etc., 35 Petitions for leave to sue or defend in *forma pauperis*, 424 petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 49 petitions under the Trust Act, 411 petitions under the Guardian and Wards Act, 7 petitions under the Lunacy Act and 102 petitions under the Indian Arbitration Act were filed, making a total of 1,819 petitions for disposal.

20 References under the Land Acquisition Act were filed during the year under report.

16. *Awards under the Indian Arbitration Act, 1940.*—The number of Awards filed during the year was 102.

17. *Applications for Execution of Decrees—(Statement No. 13).*—The number of applications for execution of decrees or orders pending at the commencement of the year 1950 was 245 and the number of applications filed during the year was 694 making a total of 939 for disposal. Of these, 103 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts. In 154 applications, satisfaction was obtained in full and in 9 satisfaction was obtained in part, 235 applications were wholly infructuous making a total of 639 applications disposed of and 270 applications were pending at the close of the year.

The number of Decrees, etc., received from other Courts for execution during the year was 47.

The number of Darkhasts (applications for sale in Decrees and Orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 17.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

20. *Appeals from the High Court Decrees under Clause 15 of the Letters Patent—(Statement No. 7)*.—Eight appeals from Decrees on the Original Side of the High Court were pending at the beginning of the year under report and 25 were filed during the year. Out of the total of 33 appeals, 22 were disposed of and 11 remained pending at the close of the year.

The number of appeals disposed of was less than in 1949 by 3.

These 22 appeals were decided as under:—

2 were remanded to the Court of first instance.
4 Decrees of the Courts of the first instance were modified.
13 Decrees of the Courts of the first instance were confirmed.
3 Decrees of the Courts of the first instance were reversed.

There was no appeal pending for more than a year at the close of the year.

21. *Appeals from Orders—(Statement No. 8)*.—91 Appeals from Orders on the Original Side were filed during the year under report and 31 were pending at the beginning of the year. Out of the total of 122 appeals, 64 were decided and 58 remained pending at the close of the year 1950.

The number of such appeals disposed of was more than in 1949 by 11.

These 64 appeals were decided as under:—

22. (*Statement No. 7*).—On the Appellate Side, 54 Letters Patent Appeals from High Court Decrees were filed during the year and 49 were pending at the beginning of the year. Out of the total 103, 53 were decided and 45 (including 21 over a year old) remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was less by 21 than in 1949. The results of the appeals were as under :—

Nos. 7 and 8).—The statement in the margin shows the numbers of First and Second Appeals from Decrees and Appeals from Orders of the Subordinate Courts of Original and Appellate Jurisdiction, which came up before the High Court and were decided during the year. The insti-

tutions of First Appeals and Second Appeals were less by 34 and 73, respectively, than in 1949. The number of the institution of the Appeals from Orders was the same as in 1949. Besides, 6 Special Second Appeals and 12 Judicial Committee Appeals were instituted during the year. 25 Special Second Appeals were disposed of and 15 remained pending at the close of the year. 11 Judicial Committee Appeals were disposed of and 26 remained pending at the end of the year.

24. *Appeals disposed of—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8)*.—The disposals of First Appeals, Second Appeals, and the Appeals from Orders show, decrease of 355, 635 and 50 respectively, when compared to the corresponding figures in the previous year.

25. *Appeals pending—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8)*.—At the close of the year, 1,420 First Appeals, 1,237 Second Appeals and 102 Appeals from Orders were pending. The aggregate total of pending Appeals is more by 167 than in 1949.

27. *Results of Appeals—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).*—Out of 470 Appeals from Original Decrees decided, 63 were summarily dismissed or not prosecuted. Out of the remaining 402, the decrees of the Lower Courts were confirmed in 236, modified in 60, reversed in 79, and 14 appeals were remanded for retrial while 13 were returned for presentation to the proper Court. Out of the 1,529 appeals from Appellate Decrees decided, 938 were summarily dismissed or not prosecuted. Out of the remaining 593, the decrees of the Lower Courts were confirmed in 381, modified in 63, reversed in 121, while 10 were returned for presentation to the proper Court and 13 were remanded for retrial.

(Statement No. 8).—Out of the 90 Appeals from Orders decided, 50 were summarily dismissed or not prosecuted. Out of the remaining 40, the orders of the Lower Courts were confirmed in 19, modified in 2, and reversed in 19.

During the year under report, 13 appeals under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, were filed and 2 were pending at the beginning of the year. Out of these 15 appeals, 3 were summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, in 7, the awards under appeals were confirmed, thus making total of 10 as decided during the year and 5 remained pending at the close of the year.

There were 9 References pending at the close of the year 1949, and 15 References were filed during the year 1950 as detailed below, making up a total of 24 References for disposal. Out of these 24, 21 were disposed of during the year as detailed below :—

Under the powers given to the Registrar and the Deputy Registrar of the High Court, 278 applications under the Civil Procedure Code (V of 1908) were disposed of by them.

28. *Appeals to the Supreme Court.*—There were 59 applications for leave to appeal pending at the end of 1949. 65 new applications were filed during the year under report. Out of these 124 applications, Rule was made absolute in 32 and was discharged in 47. 7 Applications were withdrawn, 4 were rejected, 1 application was dismissed for non-prosecution and 33 remained pending at the close of the year.

29. *Results of Appeals to the Supreme Court.*—Two appeals were pending before the Privy Council at the end of the year 1949 and were then transferred to the Supreme Court. Similarly 4 appeals were pending before the Federal Court at the end of the year 1949 and were then transferred to the Supreme Court. During the year 1950, the records of 14 appeals were sent to the Supreme Court. Out of these 20 appeals, 4 appeals were decided by the Supreme Court. Out of these, the decisions of this High Court were reversed in 2 and confirmed in 1. One appeal was allowed to be withdrawn. 16 appeals remained pending at the end of the year under report.

CIVIL COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

31. *Appeals Instituted*—(Statement No. 7).—8,832 appeals were instituted during the year 1950, showing an increase of 1,393 over the figure of the previous year. The number of appeals instituted showed an increase in 19 districts and decrease in 6 districts. There was a noticeable increase in Kolhapur (356), followed by Baroda (317), Ahmedabad (309), Satara South (221), Mehsana (210), Bijapur (125), Poona (118), Kanara (92), Nasik (67) and Banaskantha (51). In the remaining 9 districts the increase was below 50. On the other hand decrease was noticeable in Kaira (245), followed by Sholapur (168), Broach (121), Kolaba (92) and Surat (53). In the remaining one district the decrease was below 50.

32. *Appeals disposed of*—(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—7,777 appeals were disposed of during the year including 43 by Civil Judges (Senior Division) exercising Appellate Powers. The figure of the total disposals shows an increase of 369 as compared with that of the previous year. The figure of disposal by Civil Judges (Senior Division) exercising Appellate Powers shows a decrease of 187 on the corresponding figure of the previous year. There was a rise in the disposals in 17 districts, the highest being in Satara South (312), followed by Kolhapur (262), Baroda (169), Poona (129), Bijapur (114), Mehsana (108), East Khandesh (107), Surat (101), Dharwar (79), Belgaum (69), Ahmednagar (68), Ahmedabad (65) and Kanara (50). In the remaining four districts the increase was below 50. On the other hand, there was a decrease in the disposals in 8 districts, the greatest being in Satara North (731), followed by Kolaba (222), Thana (179), Kaira (53) and Sholapur (50). In the remaining three districts the decrease was below 50.

33. *Appeals pending*—(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—There were 10,803 appeals pending at the end of the year, the number being greater by 542, than that at the end of 1949. The number of appeals pending for more than a year has risen from 3,295 to 3,347.

34. *Results of Appeals*—(Statement No. 7).—In 1,343 cases or 17·3 per cent. of the whole, appeals were either summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, in 3,705 cases or 47·6 per cent., the judgments of the lower Courts were affirmed, in 761 or 9·8 per cent., they were modified, in 1,185 or 15·2 per cent., they were reversed and in 510 or 6·6 per cent., the cases were remanded for a fresh hearing. The remaining 273 appeals were disposed of by transfer.

35. The average duration of appeals in the lower Appellate Courts, which were summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, was 253 days; while that of the appeals in which the decrees were confirmed, modified, reversed or cases remanded was 462 days.

36. *Miscellaneous Appeals*—(Statement No. 8).—3,280 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 1,794 were pending at the beginning of the year and 10 were received otherwise. Of the total of 5,084, 2,393 were disposed of during the year and 2,691 remained pending at its close. The number of pending appeals was greater by 1,227 than that in the previous year.

37. The average duration of miscellaneous appeals in the lower Appellate Courts which were summarily dismissed or not prosecuted was 249 days; while that of the appeals in which orders were confirmed, modified, reversed or remanded for retrial was 320 days.

CIVIL COURTS IN THE MOFUSSIL SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

39. *Original Suits instituted—(Statement No. 3).*—The number of suits instituted in 1950 was 96,766, showing an increase of 20,097 over the figure of the previous year.

There was an increase in Money Suits and Title and other suits to the extent of 15.3 per cent. and 27.09 per cent. respectively. The number of money suits being 51,855 as against 43,926 and that of title and other suits being 44,911 as against 32,743 in 1949.

(*Statement No. 4.*)—The total value of suits in 1950 amounted to Rs. 9,20,94,299, there being an increase of 1,99,49,853 over the corresponding figure of 1949.

40. *Local distribution—(Statement No. 3).*—The number of suits instituted in 1950, showed an increase in 23 districts and decrease in only 2 districts. The highest rise was noticed in Thana (2,173), followed by Ahmedabad (2,022), Belgaum (1,736), Ahmednagar (1,499), Satara North (1,353), Sholapur (1,216), Bijapur (1,194), Poona (1,070), Baroda (992), Banaskantha (907), Mehsana (871), Panch Mahals (844), Kolhapur (705), Nasik (574), East Khandesh (566) and Surat (553). In 7 districts, the increase was below 500. The decrease on the other hand was noticeable only in Broach District being (1,009). The decrease in Satara South was below 500.

(*Statement No. 3.*)—The largest number of suits instituted during the year was in Poona being (4,197), followed by Ahmedabad (3,419), Sholapur (6,059), Thana (5,934), Ahmednagar (5,272), Belgaum (4,793), East Khandesh (4,340), Dharwar (4,065), Kaira (4,031) and ranged from 3,000 to 4,000 in Nasik, Satara North, Surat, Baroda, Mehsana, Bijapur, Ratnagiri, West Khandesh; from 2,000 to 3,000 in Kanara, Satara South, Kolaba and Kolhapur; and from 1,000 to 2,000 in Panch Mahals, Banaskantha and Broach. The Lowest figure of 513 was noted in Sabarkantha.

41. *Number of Suits disposed of—(Statement No. 5).*—In addition to 96,766 suits instituted during the year, and 70,173 pending from the previous year, 5,472 suits were revived or received on remand or by transfer making a total of 1,72,411 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of during the year was 97,504, which shows an increase of 20,105 over the corresponding figure of the previous year.

Of the total number of suits decided during the year, viz., 97,504, Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals (i.e., Courts of Civil Judges) disposed of 86,734 suits, Small Cause Courts 7,641, District Courts 3,042, Village Courts 79, while 8 suits were disposed of by Unpaid Tribunals (i.e., Inamdars and Jahagirdars).

42. *Results of suits decided—(Statement No. 5).*—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 18,037 or 18·5 per cent. were disposed of without trial, 17,200 or 17·6 per cent. were disposed of *ex-parte*, 5,471 or 5·6 per cent. were disposed of on admission of claims, 20,528 or 21·05 per cent. by compromise, 29,413 or 30·2 per cent. after full trial, 491 or ·5 per cent. on reference to arbitration and 6,364 or 6·5 per cent. by transfer. Of the 29,413, decided after full trial, 22,107 or 75·16 per cent. resulted in favour of plaintiffs and 7,306 or 24·84 per cent. resulted in favour of defendants.

43. *Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jahagirdars—(Statement No. 5).*—The unpaid Tribunals disposed of 8 original suits; in 1949 it was 2.

44. *Suits disposed of by Civil Judges—(Statement No. 5).*—The number of original suits disposed of by Civil Judges was 86,734 showing an increase of 17,355 as compared with the figure of the previous year. The increase was noticeable in the number of cases decided under both the ordinary and Small Cause Court procedure, the number of cases decided under the ordinary procedure being 68,911 and under the Small Cause Court procedure 17,823.

45. *Suits disposed of by Small Cause Courts—(Statement No. 5).*—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 7,641 suits, which shows an increase of 2,190 over the corresponding figure of the previous year.

46. *Suits disposed of by District and Assistant Judges—(Statement No. 5).*—The District Courts disposed of 3,042 original suits, thus showing a rise of 630 over the corresponding figure of the previous year.

47. *Suits disposed of by Village Courts—(Statement No. 5).*—The Village Courts disposed of 79 suits which was less by 76 suits than the number of suits disposed of by them during the previous year.

48. *Pending suits—(Statement No. 5).*—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 74,907 as against 70,172 in the previous year.

(*Statements Nos. 5 and 14.*)—Of the pending cases 17,584 had been pending for more than a year, this figure is less by 1,055 than that of the previous year. Of the suits pending over a year, 2 were from unpaid tribunals, 9 were in the Village Courts, 16,947 in the Courts of Civil Judges, 103 in Small Cause Courts and 518 in the District Courts, the figures showing as compared with those of the previous year, decrease of 4; 940; 1 and 117 in the Courts of Inamdars and Jahagirdars, Courts of Civil Judges, Small Cause Courts and District Courts, respectively, while there was an increase of 7 in the Village Courts.

The number of suits pending over a year was largest in Ahmedabad (2,574), followed by Poona (1,249), Surat (1,117), Satara South (1,000), Shclapur (1,051), Kaira (954), Bijapur (934), Belgaum (814), Baroda (814), Ahmednagar (779), Kolhapur (768), Mehsana (646), Nasik (613), Dharwar (607), Thana (596), East Khandesh (557), Ratnagiri (553), Satara North (531), Kanara (296), West Khandesh (257), Panch Mahals (214), Kolaba (204), Broach (162), Banas Kantha (131), Sabar Kantha (122).

49. *Duration of suits*—(Statement No. 5).—The average duration in days of suits decided in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jahagirdars, Village Courts, Courts of Civil Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and the District Courts is as shown in the tabular statement given below :—

50. *Execution Proceedings*—(Statement No. 13).—There were 42,326 applications for execution pending from the previous year and 50,413 new applications were filed during the year. Out of the total number of applications before the Courts, 51,264 were disposed of during the year and 41,475 remained pending at the end of the year. The disposals of applications were as under :—

- 5,238 cases by transfer ;
- 12,317 cases disposed of wherein realisation was complete ;
- 12,761 cases disposed of wherein realisation was partial ; and
- 20,948 cases disposed of as wholly infructuous.

The total amount realised in Courts other than the Small Cause Courts was Rs. 51,87,938-5-8.

Debtors were imprisoned in 41 cases while moveable property was sold in 988 cases and immoveable property in 611.

51. *Miscellaneous Cases*—(Statement No. 6).—The number of institutions and disposals of Miscellaneous cases rose from 14,236 to 18,103 and from 13,830 to 17,457, respectively. The number of Miscellaneous cases pending at the end of the year rose from 11,436 to 12,275. Of the 17,457 Miscellaneous cases disposed of, 4,395 were disposed of without trial; 1,807 were disposed of *ex-parte*, 1,215 on admission of claims, 1,276 by compromise, 7,831 after full trial, 3 on reference to arbitration and 930 by transfer. Of the 7,831 cases decided after full trial, 5,468 or 69.8 per cent. resulted in favour of plaintiffs.

52. *Duration of Miscellaneous cases—(Statement No. 6).*—The average duration in days of miscellaneous cases decided in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jahagirdars, Village Courts, Civil Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and in the District Courts is as shown in the tabular statement given below :—

BOMBAY SMALL CAUSE COURT.

53. *(Statements Nos. 3 and 5).*—The figures of suits instituted and disposed of during the year and of suits pending at the close of the year 1950 in the Presidency Small Cause Court were 16,388, 14,026 and 11,173 respectively. The figures of institutions, disposals and suits pending at the close of the year, disclose an increase of 1,703, 570 and 2,362 respectively, when compared with the figures of the previous year.

(Statement No. 4).—There was fall in the institution of suits in value not exceeding Rs. 10; while there was a rise in the number of suits of all other categories. The total value of litigation showed an increase for the year under report. The figure was Rs. 84,22,700-7-2 as against Rs. 71,13,583-1-10½, in the preceding year.

54. *Mode of disposal—(Statement No. 5).*—Of the 14,026 suits disposed of, 711 were decided without trial, 4,606 were decided *ex-parte*, 2,634 on admission of claims, 4,819 by compromise, 1,235 after full trial and 21 on reference to arbitration.

55. The average duration of suits disposed of without trial was 63 days, of those decided *ex-parte* 95, of those decided on admission of claims 89, of those decided by compromise 91, of those decided after full trial 185 and of those decided on reference to arbitration 209 days.

56. *Execution of Decrees—(Statement No. 13).*—Out of the 7,112 applications for the execution of decrees which were before the Courts during the year (including 1,427 pending from the previous year), 5,464 were disposed of and 1,648 remained pending at the end of the year. Of the last figure, 506 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of 1,347 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 3,335 were returned as wholly infructuous and 782 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realised was Rs. 17,16,430-1-6 as compared with Rs. 13,97,642-0-4 in the previous year.

57. *Coercive Process*—(Statement No. 13).—In order to enforce the execution of decrees, moveable property was sold in 98 cases. The figure shows a decrease of 39, when compared with the figure of the previous year.

58. *Applications to the Full Court*—(Statement No. 14).—There were 87 applications for disposal before the Full Court during the year, of which 82 were disposed of and 5 remained pending at the end of the year.

CITY CIVIL COURT, BOMBAY.

59. (Statements Nos. 3 and 5).—The figures of suits instituted and disposed of during the year and of suits pending at the end of the year 1950 in the City Civil Court, Bombay, were 2,335, 1,664 and 2,615, respectively.

(Statement No. 4).—The total value of litigation amounted to Rs. 96,07,298-1-9.

60. *Mode of disposal*—(Statement No. 5).—Of the 1,664 suits disposed of, 519 were decided without trial, 748 were decided *ex-parte*, 50 on admission of claims, 249 by compromise, 70 after full trial, 1 on reference to arbitration and 27 by transfer.

61. The average duration of suits disposed of without trial was 252 days, of those decided *ex-parte* 137, of those decided on admission of claims 129, of those decided by compromise 190, of those decided after full trial 323, of that decided on reference to arbitration 710 and of those decided by transfer 247.

62. *Miscellaneous cases*—(Statement No. 6).—There were 102 miscellaneous cases pending at the commencement of the year, and 197 cases were instituted during the year and 4 cases were received otherwise. Out of these 303, 102 were decided during the year and 201 remained pending at its close. Of the 102 disposed of, 11 were decided without trial, 34 were decided *ex-parte*, 6 by compromise and 51 after full trial.

63. *Execution of Decrees*—(Statement No. 13).—Of the 442 applications for the execution of decrees that were before the Court during the year, 327 were disposed of and 115 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the last figure, 83 were more than 3 months old. Of the applications disposed of, 29 resulted in full satisfaction of the decrees passed, 130 resulted in partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 129 were returned as wholly infructuous and 39 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realised was Rs. 2,58,330-3-9.

GENERAL.

64. As compared with the figures for 1949, the number of suits instituted and disposed of in the Civil Judges' Courts increased by 15,176, and 17,355 respectively. The number of regular suits and that of suits, under Small Cause Court Jurisdiction disposed of during the year under report increased by 16,904 and 451 respectively. With the number of revived suits and those pending at the end of the last year, the total number of suits pending rose from 65,900 to 67,789 and the number of suits pending over a year fell from 17,887 to 16,947.

The number of appeals instituted in and disposed of by District Courts increased by 1,393 and 369 respectively. The number of appeals disposed of in 1949 was 7,403, while the corresponding number for 1950 was 7,777. The disposal of appeals by the Civil Judges (Senior Division) exercising Appellate Powers was 43, whereas in 1949, the disposal was 230. The total number of appeals pending in the District Courts increased from 10,261 to 10,803.

The figures of suits instituted on the Original Side of the High Court went up by 20 and the figures of suits disposed of on the Original Side of the High Court went down by 362 as compared with the figures of the previous year. The number of suits pending increased from 3,083 to 3,342.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court, the total number of institutions and disposals showed decrease of 156 and 1,035 respectively as against the corresponding figures of the previous year. The total arrears of appeals increased from 2,702 to 2,850.

65. *Inspection.*—During the year under report, the District Judges inspected the following Courts of Civil Judges:—Dehgaum, Dhanduka, Viramgaum and Sabalpur in Ahmedabad District; Ahmednagar, Kopargaon, Parner, Pathardi, Sangamner and Shrigonda in Ahmednagar District; Dhanera, Deesa and Tharad in Banaskantha District; Chhota-Udepur, Dabhoi, Karjan and Padra in Baroda District; Ramdurg, Jamkhandi and Muddebihal in Bijapur District; Rajpipla in Broach District; Hubli in Dharwar District; Anand, Balasiner, Borsad, Cambay, Kaira, Kapađwanj and Umreth in Kaira District; Honavar in Kanara District; Pachora in East Khandesh District; Amalner, Dhulia, Nandurbar, Shahada and Shirpur in West Khandesh District; Mabad, Murud, Panvel, Pali and Raha in Kolaba District; Gadhanglaj, Ichalkaranji and Radhanagari in Kolhapur District; Dindori, Kalwan, Nasik and Pimpalgaon in Nasik District; Kolinar, Okhamandal and Radhanpur in Mehsana District; Baria, Sant, Dohad, Kalol and Lunawada in Panch Mahals District; Junnar and Saswad in Poona District; Devrukh and Malvan in Ra nagiri District; Koregaon and Patan in North Satara District; Islampur, Tasgaon and Vita in South Satara District; Barsi, Akalkot and Madha in Sholapur District; Bassein, Bhivandi, Dahanu and Murbad in Thana District.

66. *Judicial Conference.*—Judicial Conferences were held in the Ahmednagar and East Khandesh Districts; They were attended by the Judges and the Pleaders.

67. *Receipts and Expenditure of the High Court.*—For the year 1950, the total receipts of the High Court were Rs. 32,15,447-12-11. The total expenses were Rs. 20,31,589-1-0. The difference between these two items shows an excess of receipts over expenditure by Rs. 11,84,058-11-11. This excess includes probate and Administration duty (the cost of collecting which is borne by the High Court). In the expenditure no sum is charged for the rent or upkeep of the High Court Buildings or certain other matters which would have to be brought into account in ascertaining a net profit.

**REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE
STATE OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1950.**

1. *Judicial Staff—(Statement No. 1).*—The Judicial Staff employed in the State of Bombay on the 31st December 1950 and engaged partly or wholly in Criminal cases consisted of 11 permanent High Court Judges, 24 Sessions Judges, and 28 Additional Sessions Judges, 4 Assistant Judges, 28 District Magistrates, 23 Presidency Magistrates, 399 other First Class Magistrates, 167 Second Class Magistrates, 425 Third Class Magistrates, 6 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act, I of 1889 and 1,225 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act, VI of 1933.

In addition to the above, there were 2,375 Police Patils in the State exercising powers under section 14 of the Bombay Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, of whom 12 were invested with powers under section 15 of the Act.

2. *Offences Reported—(Statement No. 11).*—There were 7,96,504 offences reported during the year which shows an increase of 1,19,006 over the figures of 1949. There was an increase in the number of offences reported in Greater Bombay area and in the districts of Baroda, Thana, Surat, Kolhapur, East Khandesh, Mehsana, Sholapur, Satara South, Panch Mahals, Ahmedabad, Nasik, Kaira, Banas Kantha, Kolaba, Broach, Dharwar, Kanara, Sabarkantha, West Khandesh, Belgaum, Ahmednagar, Amreli, and Satara North, while there was a decrease in 4 districts. The increase was most noticeable in Baroda (19,650), followed by Thana (13,019), Surat (10,731), Kolhapur (9,978), East Kandesh (9,146), Mehsana (8,516), Sholapur (7,681), Satara South (6,880), Panch Mahals (6,472), Ahmedabad, (6,360), Nasik (5,113), Kaira, (5,038), Banas Kantha (2,469), Kolaba (2,340), Greater Bombay Area (2,156), Broach (1,735), Dharwar, (1,272), Kanara (1,017), Sabar Kantha (983), West Khandesh (771), Belgaum (717) and Ahmednagar (610). The remaining districts of Amreli and Satara North showed increases below 500. On the other hand there was a marked decrease in the district of Poona being (3,860). The remaining districts of Ratnagiri, Bijapur and Dangs showed decreases below 500. Of the total number of offences reported, 1,45,722 were under the Indian Penal Code and 6,50,782 were under Special and Local Laws.

3. *Complaints dismissed—(Section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and complainants fined (Section 250, Criminal Procedure Code)—(Statement No. 11).*—The number of complaints dismissed under section 203, Criminal Procedure Code, was 2,393 and the number of complainants fined under section 250 of the same Code was 843.

4. *Cases found to be true.*—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 7,59,819 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial excluding those withdrawn and including those pending from the previous year was 8,58,954. The number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show an increase of 1,10,744 and 1,33,641 respectively, over the figures of 1949.

5. *Murders reported as true.*—Out of 2,882 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 672 were murders of which 310 ended in conviction. The corresponding figures for 1949 were 2,014, 603 and 266. The 672 murders may be classified as follows:—

Original Jurisdiction.

I.—PRESIDENCY MAGISTRATES.

6. *Cases in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts*—(Statement No. 11).—The number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates excluding pending cases was 3,49,805. The number is greater by 4,954 than that of 1949, when the corresponding figure was 3,44,851. The number of cases under the Special and Local Laws was 3,21,950 or 3,654 more than that of 1949 and the number of cases under the Indian Penal Code was 47,603 or 2,229 more than that of 1949. There was an increase under the former head in offences under the Railways Act which rose from 16,341 to 33,572, whereas the offences under the City of Bombay Municipal Act, the Public Conveyance Act, City of Bombay Police Act, Prevention of Cruelty Animals Act, Motor Vehicles Act and Criminal Procedure Code showed a decrease and fell from 82,642 to 79,980; 10,436 to 8,951; 98,426 to 94,149; 42,689 to 41,892; 10,489 to 10,261 and 2,682 to 2,252 respectively. The figure of offences under the Bombay Prohibition Act (XXV of 1949) for the months of May to December 1949 was 6,359, while for the whole of the year 1950, it was 9,414. As regards the offences under the Indian Penal Code, there was a considerable increase in the offences of Theft, Criminal Force and Assault, Criminal Trespass and Criminal Intimidation, Insult and Annoyance which rose from 14,639 to 16,117; 3,199 to 3,477; 2,312 to 2,617 and 5,801 to 6,029 respectively, whereas the offences of Criminal Breach of Trust, Cheating and Mischief showed a decrease and fell down from 3,588 to 3,482; 3,538 to 3,347 and 342 to 289 respectively.

(Statements Nos. 2 and 9) —During the year, 3,49,805 regular cases were disposed of and 22,748 remained pending at the close of the year.

7. *Results of Trial*—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Presidency Magistrates was 3,89,400. Of the persons tried, 1,01,241 were acquitted or discharged, 2,64,068 were convicted, 254 were committed to the High Court, 127 died, 64 were handed over to the Military Authorities and 23,646 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Indian Penal Code, 14,709 were convicted and 29,702 were acquitted or discharged.

8. *Punishments*—(Statement No. 12).—Of the persons convicted, 96,856 were punished with imprisonment, 2,54,039 with fine, 419 were released after admonition, 3,314 were ordered to give recognizance in addition to other punishments and 947 were sent to the Leper Asylum at Matunga. The sentences of imprisonment passed were for the following terms:—

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 28,86,232-6-0. The total amount realised was Rs. 24,63,370-1-6 of which Rs. 31,081-9-0 were paid as compensation to complainants.

II.—MAGISTRATES, VILLAGE OFFICERS, ETC.

9. *Results of Trials*—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these tribunals was 6,89,317. Of these, the cases of 1,549 were committed to the Sessions or referred to higher authorities and of the remaining 6,87,768, the cases of 5,07,347 were finally disposed of by the various tribunals. Of the total 5,07,347, 1,81,305 (or 35.7 per cent.) were acquitted or discharged, 3,17,153 (or 62.5 per cent.) were convicted, 726 died, 1,926 escaped and 6,237 were transferred.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before these tribunals at the close of the year was 1,80,421 as compared with 1,46,704 in 1949.

Of these sentences of imprisonment imposed, 19,743 were for terms not exceeding fifteen days, 16,856 were for terms not exceeding six months, 2,504 for terms not exceeding two years and 146 for terms above two years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 1,010 persons; in 1949, the figure was 595.

The amounts of fine imposed and realised during the year were Rs. 64,11,579-10-6 and Rs. 33,64,220-12-9 respectively. A total sum of Rs. 23,964-2-0 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to above, 843 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code as against 198 of last year.

III.—COURTS OF SESSIONS.

11. *Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).*—There were 6,304 persons or 1,863 less than in 1949 under trial. The cases of 5,193 were decided while those of 1,111 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the 5,193 persons tried, 1,279 or 24.6 per cent. were convicted, 3,888 or 74.8 per cent. were acquitted, or discharged, the cases of 16 were referred to the High Court under section 307 or 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 10 persons died.

12. *Punishments—(Statement No. 12).*—The following sentences and orders were passed by Courts of Sessions:—

Fines to the amount of Rs. 55,583-11-0 were imposed by Courts of Sessions as compared with Rs. 52,809-0-0 in the preceding year. The total realisation amounted to Rs. 54,459-4-0 as compared with Rs. 43,686-9-3 in 1949 and the total amount of fine paid as compensation was Rs. 1,380-0-0 as against Rs. 425-0-0 in 1949.

IV—CITY SESSIONS COURT, BOMBAY.

13. *Results of Trials—(Statement No. 9).*—There were 487 persons under trial. The cases of 455 persons were decided while those of 32 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the 455 persons tried, 152 or 33·4 per cent. were convicted, 301 or 66·2 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, 1 died and 1 escaped during trial.

Fines to the amount of Rs. 1,08,376-15-0 were imposed by the City Sessions Court as compared with Rs. 27,950 in the preceding year. The total realisation amounted to Rs. 1,02,402-7-0.

Appellate Jurisdiction.

I—APPELLATE COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

15. (*Statement No. 2*).—The number of appeals decided during the year was 4,392 as against 4,346 in the preceding year, which shows an increase of 46.

16. *Magistrates' Courts*—(*Statement No. 10*).—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 889. Of these, the appeals of 110 were summarily dismissed and the sentences on 290 were confirmed after admission, making a total of 400, or 44·9 per cent., wholly unsuccessful appellants. Of the remaining 489,107, or 12·03 per cent. obtained a modification of sentences passed on them and 330 or 37·1 per cent. annulment. The cases of 41 appellants were otherwise disposed of and the cases of 11 appellants were transferred. As compared with 1949, the results were less favourable to the appellants.

17. *Sessions Courts*—(*Statement No. 10*).—During the year, the appeals of 5,253 persons were decided by the Sessions Courts. The appeals of 658 or 12·5 per cent. were summarily dismissed and those of 4,595 or 87·4 per cent. were admitted. Of these 4,595 appellants, 1,558 or 34 per cent. were wholly unsuccessful, 1,122 or 24·4 per cent. were partially successful, 1,718 or 37·4 per cent. were wholly successful, the cases of 196 or 4 per cent. were otherwise disposed of, and 1 person died. If the admitted appeals only are considered, the results were less favourable to the appellants than in the preceding year, the percentage of successful appellants being 62 as against 64 in 1949.

II—SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

18. *Magistrates' Courts*—(*Statement No. 10*).—The cases of 218 persons who applied for revision or against whom applications were made by complainants came before the District Magistrates for revision during the year. The number was more by 57 than in 1949. The applications in the cases of 122 were rejected and those in the cases of 64 were otherwise disposed of. The cases involving 32 persons remained pending at the close of the year.

19. *Sessions Courts*—(*Statement No. 10*).—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 2,759 were decided by the Sessions Courts during the year. The number was less by 80 than in 1949. Applications in the cases of 1,750 were rejected, and those in the cases of 1,008 were otherwise disposed of. One person died and the cases involving 809 persons remained pending at the close of the year.

HIGH COURT.

20. (*Statement No. 10*).—One hundred and forty appeals were pending before the High Court at the beginning of the year from sentences or orders of criminal Courts. During the year, 891 appeals were preferred and 923 were decided leaving 108 pending at its close. The number of appeals preferred, disposed of and pending is less by 53, 35 and 32 respectively than that in the preceding year. Of the 891 appeals preferred, 503 were from the Courts of Sessions, 327 from the Courts of Presidency Magistrates, against sentences or orders and the remaining 61 were preferred by the State Government against orders of acquittal.

21. *Results of Appeals.*—Five hundred and twenty appeals against sentences passed by the Courts of Sessions were decided. The sentences were upheld in 372, reversed in 87 and modified in 45. In 4 cases, there was a remand for retrial and 12 were returned for presentation to the proper Courts. There were 8 appeals regarding disposal of property.

Three hundred and five appeals against sentences passed by the Presidency Magistrates were decided. The sentences were upheld in 225, reversed in 57 and modified in 17 and 5 appeals were remanded for retrial. There were 4 appeals regarding sanction matter.

Eighty-six appeals by the State Government against orders of acquittal involving 291 accused persons were disposed of by the High Court during the year. In 23 appeals involving 57 accused persons, the orders were reversed. Thirty appeals involving 143 accused persons were summarily dismissed. In 27 appeals involving 64 accused persons the orders of acquittal were upheld. In 2 appeals involving 2 accused persons, the orders were modified and 4 appeals involving 13 accused persons, were remanded for retrial.

The result of appeals as affecting individual appellants were as follows:—

The appeals of 559 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals, the sentences of 203 appellants were confirmed, those of 95 were altered, those of 233 reversed, while 12 appeals involving 15 accused persons were returned for presentation to the proper court. 9 appeals involving 10 accused persons were remanded for retrial and 4 appeals involving 4 accused persons were regarding disposal of property.

22. Salaries of the Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges for Appellate Side Criminal work was Rs. 1,54,601-3-11.

SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

23. *Reference under section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.*—Three references were pending in the High Court at the beginning of the year and 12 were submitted to it during the year. All these 15 references were decided during the year. Out of 15 decided cases, involving 34 accused, the High Court convicted 5 persons and acquitted 29. The verdict of the Jury was accepted in 4 cases and was set aside in 11.

24. *References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.*—Sixteen references under this section were submitted to the High Court during the year and 2 were pending at the commencement of the year. 16 references involving 18 accused persons were decided during the year and 2 cases remained pending at the end of the year. The sentence of death was confirmed in the case of 8 persons and that in the case of 1 person was reduced to transportation for life. The remaining 9 persons were acquitted.

During the year under report, 10 persons were executed in the State of Bombay.

25. *Revision.*—During the year 1950, one hundred and seventy cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by the Sessions Judges and the District Magistrates under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 92 were pending at the opening of the year. Of these, 234 were decided and 28 remained pending at its close. The number of reported cases was less by 22 than in 1949. In 10 cases, the orders sent up for revision were not disturbed, in 22, sentences were reduced or altered, in 139, sentences were reversed, in 9, proceedings were quashed and no new trials were ordered, in 18, new trials or further enquiries were ordered and the remaining 36 cases were otherwise disposed of.

Under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, orders were passed in 679 cases, which record a decrease of 6 over the corresponding figure of the previous year. Of these 679 cases, 649 came before the High Court and 30 were taken up by the High Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise on its own motion. Of the 649 applications for the issue of rule, in 293, rule was issued, 341 were summarily rejected and 15 were allowed to be withdrawn. Of the 293 rules issued, 135 were finally discharged, 119 were made absolute in their entirety, in 32 rule was partly made absolute and the orders complained of were modified. In the remaining 7 cases, rule was made absolute and the sentences were enhanced.

In 25, out of 30 cases taken up by the High Court *suo motu*, the orders passed by the Lower Courts were not disturbed, in 4 the sentences were enhanced and in 1 the sentences were set aside.

26. *Applications for transfer.*—One hundred and eight applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases from one Court of District to another were received during the year and 11 were pending at the beginning of the year. Out of these, 111 were decided during the year and 8 remained pending at its close. Of these 111, 54 were summarily rejected, and in 27 cases, transfers were granted without rules. In the remaining 30 cases, in which rules were issued, transfers were granted in 23 and refused in 7.

27. *Miscellaneous Applications.*—Forty-three applications for stay of proceedings, 1 for disposal of property, 94 for bail, 1 under section 476 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 412 for Habeas Corpus, 18 under Contempt of Courts Act, XII of 1926, 27 for quashing the proceedings, 1 for additional evidence, 4 for expunging remarks, 5 for excusing delay, 44 for leave to appeal to the Supreme Court, 9 under the Indian Press Emergency Powers Act, XXIII of 1931, 2 under the Hindu Bigamous Marriage Act, XXV of 1946, 97 against orders of externment, 6 for the Writs of Certiorari and 44 applications for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by High Court during the year.

28. Parts V and VI of the Bombay Children Act, LXXI of 1948, were made applicable to the following areas in the Dharwar District with effect on and from the 28th August 1950 :—

(A) The Municipal limits of (1) Navalgund, (2) Nargund, (3) Savanur, (4) Gudgeri, (5) Kundgol, (6) Shiggali, (7) Kamadoli, (8) Samsi and (9) Laxmeshwar ;

(B) The head quarters limits of the following Talukas, viz. :—(1) Kalghatgi, (2) Shiggaon, (3) Shirhatti, (4) Ron, (5) Hangal and (6) Hirekerur ;

(C) The village limits of (1) Annigeri and (2) Gajendragad. (*Vide* Government Notification, Education Department, No. 9298, dated the 28th August 1950).

Parts V and VI of the Bombay Children Act, LXXI of 1948, were made applicable to the areas comprised in the Town limits of Bhusawal and Jalgaon and in the Railway Station areas of Bhusawal and Jalgaon in the East Khandesh District. (*Vide* Government Resolution, Education Department, No. 9330, dated the 2nd August 1950.)

Under section 7 of the Bombay Children Act, LXXI of 1948, and rule 14 of the Bombay Children Rules, 1950, a Juvenile Court was established at Jambusar in the Broach District presided over by the Resident Magistrate, First Class, Jambusar, sitting singly or with one or two Lady Honorary Magistrates having jurisdiction over the Municipal limits of Jambusar town.

(*Vide* Government Resolution, Education Department, No. J.N.C. 1150, dated the 24th October 1950.)

Parts V and VI of the Bombay Children Act, LXXI of 1948, were made applicable to the area bounded by the Municipal limits of Barsi Town in the Sholapur District with effect on and from the 13th November 1950.

(*Vide* Government Notification, Education Department, No. B.G.A. 1450, dated the 13th November 1950.)

Under section 7 of the Bombay Children Act, LXXI of 1948, and rule 14 of the Bombay Children Rules, 1950, a Juvenile Court was established at Manmad in Nasik District, presided over by the Resident Magistrate, First Class, Manmad, sitting singly or with one or two Lady Honorary Magistrates, having jurisdiction over the Municipal limits of Manmad Town.

(*Vide* Government Resolution, Education Department, No. J.N.C. 1150, dated the 20th November 1950.)

Parts V and VI of the Bombay Children Act, LXXI of 1948, were made applicable to the area within the limits of Amod Town and within a distance of five miles of the limits of that town in Broach District with effect on and from the 27th December 1950.

(*Vide* Government Notification, Education Department, No. B.G.A. 1450, dated the 27th December 1950.)

29. *Child Offenders—(Form A).*—Six thousand three hundred and forty-one cases regarding offences committed by children were disposed of during the year. Five thousand six hundred and forty-seven boys and four hundred eighty-four girls were dealt with under the provisions of the Bombay Children Act. Various types of offences under the Indian Penal Code and the Special and Local Laws were committed by children. 433 children were acquitted, 1,096 were discharged after admonition, 614 were committed to the care of fit persons and also were placed under the supervision of probation officers, 947 committed to the care of fit persons but without supervision, 623 were detained in certified schools, 1,311 parents or guardians were fined, 434 children were fined and 623 were dealt with in other ways. Out of the total number of cases disposed of, 1,883 were under the Indian Penal Code and 4,458 were under the Special and Local Laws.

30. *Statement of cases in which orders were passed under the Provisions of the Bombay Children Act, 1948, corresponding to sections 7, 8 and 15 of the Bombay Children Act, XIII of 1924—(Form B).*—One thousand nine hundred and thirty-five boys and five hundred and eighty girls were dealt with under the provisions of the Bombay Children Act of 1948 corresponding to sections 7, 8 and 15 of the Bombay Children Act, XIII of 1924. Nine hundred and forty-eight children were sent to certified schools, under section 7 (4), 552

were committed to the care of relatives or fit persons named by the Court under section 7(5) with surety bonds, 701 were committed to the care of relatives or fit persons named by the Court under section 7(5) but without surety bonds, 229 were kept under the supervision of a probation officer under section 7(6), 71 were sent to certified schools under section 8 and 14 were taken from the charge of the guardians under section 15.

31. The following table shows the number of Original and Appellate Criminal Cases disposed of during the years 1949 and 1950 in all Courts in the State of Bombay :—
