Subject.—Annual Administration Report for 1934-35.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit my Annual Administration Report on the working of Co-operative Societies in the Bombay Presidency for the year ending 30th June 1935. This is the 31st Annual Report. Owing to the change in the closing date of the Co-operative Year from 31st March to 30th June (sanctioned under G.R., R.D., No. 1866/33 of 30th January 1934) the present report covers a period of 15 months from 1st April 1934 to 30th June 1935.

I—ADMINISTRATION.

Gazetted Officers.

2. Registrar.—I continued to hold charge of the office of the Registrar throughout the year.

Assistant Registrars.—Amongst the gazetted staff the sudden death due to heart failure of Mr. A. C. Desai, Assistant Registrar, Co-operative Societies, Bombay, in November 1934 deprived the movement of a keen and zealous worker. His death also necessitated several changes in the postings of Assistant Registrars. Mr. S. G. Almoula was transferred from Surat to Bombay, Mr. D. A. Shah from Poona to the Northern Division and Mr. N. P. Bhagwat from Khandesh to Poona. Mr. R. S. Patil, Agricultural Organiser, who had officiated as Assistant Registrar, Khandesh, during the earlier part of the year during Mr. Bhagwat's absence on leave, was again appointed to officiate as Assistant Registrar, Khandesh. Mr. Shah soon after he took over as Assistant Registrar, Northern Division, had to proceed on long leave owing to ill-health and Mr. C. N. Amin, Senior Auditor was appointed to officiate as

Assistant Registrar vice Mr. Shah. Mr. Huli proceeded on a year's leave out of India from May 1935 whereupon Mr. R. S. Patil was trans ferred from Khandesh to the Southern Division and Mr. N. V. Nayak, Senior Auditor, was appointed to officiate as Assistant Registrar, Khandesh. In Sind Mr. M. A. Awan, Assistant Deputy Registrar, officiated as Deputy Registrar during the absence on leave of Khan Bahadur Azimkhan and during the period of his appointment as Officiating Collector, Thar Parkar. Khan Bahadur Azimkhan reverted to the department in November 1934 and continued to hold the Deputy Registrar's post till 21st May 1935 when he permanently severed his connection with the department in his appointment as Manager, Sind Encumbered Estates. Mr. N. M. A. Siddiki, B.A., First Grade Deputy Collector, has been appointed to succeed Khan Bahadur Azimkhan as Deputy Registrar in Sind.

Owing to the policy of rectification which is being pursued by the department, both I and my Assistants had to undertake arduous touring throughout the year as is evident in the sub-joined table:—

Special Auditors.—There has been no change in the posting of the four Special Auditors stationed at Bombay, Karachi, Poona and Dharwar. Mr. Karmarkar, Special Auditor, Poona, was on leave for four months from March 1934 during which period Mr. K. G. Prabhu, Senior Auditor, officiated as Special Auditor. I should, however, like to add that owing to the development of the Urban Movement in this Presidency, the

Special Auditors' work has been increasing enormously and I trust Government would agree to the proposals recently submitted by me regarding the reinforcement of the Special Audit Staff by addition of one more Special Auditor to the cadre.

3. Deputy Registrar.—The post of an Additional Deputy Registrar to assist the Registrar which was administratively sanctioned in G.R., R.D., No. 6768/24, dated 10th October 1927, has not yet been filled up owing to financial stringency. I have already recommended to Government that this post might be filled up with effect from the next financial year and I trust Government will acquiesce in this proposal, as otherwise it will be impossible for the Registrar to keep pace with the growing volume of work.

Subordinate Staff.

4. There has been no change in the strength of Auditors, Sub-Auditors, Agricultural Organisers and Weaving Inspector, except that with a view to cope with the increased work in connection with Land Mortgage Bank and pending the appointment of a Special Assistant Registrar for Land Mortgage Banks, Government were pleased to sanction the appointment of one of the Auditors on Special Duty in the Registrar's Office from January 1935.

Special Temporary Staff.

5. Under G.R., R.D., No. 354-A, dated 10th July 1935, Government have sanctioned the continuance of the post of the Special Mamlatdar for Bhil Societies at Dohad up to 1st July 1937. The Special Mamlatdar has also been directed to work out a scheme for the organisation of Bhils in West Khandesh District.

The offices of the Special Liquidation Officers for Nira Canal and Ahmednagar were closed down during the year. The liquidation work in the Nira Canal tract was transferred to the Auditor, Dhond Division, and with a view to facilitate his work his Head-quarters were transferred from Poona to Baramati and the work in Nagar District has been entrusted to Union Supervisors. At the close of the year there were in all five Special Liquidation Officers, one each at Poona, Dharwar, Sholapur, Bijapur and Jalgaon.

Under G.R., R.D., No. 3482/28, dated 15th July 1935, Government have sanctioned the continuance of the Special Recovery Staff up to 28th February 1936. During the year under report there was no increase in the strength of the Special Recovery Officers. But on the other hand, the post of the Special Recovery Officer at Ahmedabad and one of the posts at Poona had to be held in abeyance from June 1935, so that at the close of the year there were in all 20 Special Recovery Officers. Except in Ahmedabad, Godhra and Kaira, the recoveries effected by these Special Recovery Officers have been very satisfactory and it is likely that this establishment will have to be continued for some time to come.

Honorary Staff.

6. During the year under report, the movement was deprived of the services of 5 District Honorary Organisers and 1 Taluka Honorary Organiser. Appointment of 1 District Honorary Organiser and 2 Taluka Honorary Organisers was, however, made, the total strength being 1 Divisional Honorary Organiser, 60 District Honorary Organisers and 58 Taluka Honorary Organisers. The cost on account of their Travelling Allowance was only Rs. 6,318-6-0 as against Rs. 7,157 during the previous year. These officers have been rendering useful service to the movement and some of them have even been doing their work without any allowances.

I have to mourn the loss of an eminent co-operator in the person of the late Mr. G. K. Devadhar. He was one of the great co-operators of India, and his wide experience, sincerity and enthusiasm for co-operation are too well known. The movement has suffered a severe loss by his demise.

7. Appendix A contains the list of outstanding workers whose services deserve special mention. Among these some persons deserve special mention.

Sir Chunilal V. Mehta, K.C.S.I., and Sir Lallubhai Samaldas are the pillars of co-operation in this Presidency. Their spirit of service and their devotion to co-operation are an inspiring force in this Presidency.

In their limited spheres, Mr. Jamshed N. R. Mehta, Professor V. G. Kale, Dewan Bahadur C. M. Gandhi and Dewan Bahadur C. N. Mehta continue to render signal services to the cause of co-operation.

Rao Saheb V. C. Jadav and Sardar Khan Bahadur V. P. Bhiladwalla have considerably developed the urban movement in Gujerat.

Mr. P. V. Desai continues to work wholeheartedly for the development of co-operative housing in Ahmedabad.

Messrs. M. S. Bali of Belgaum and S. P. Pandit of Sirsi are among our outstanding workers in the Karnatak.

The societies are generally in the habit of putting off the payment of audit fees till the close of the year with the result that the arrears are abnormal feature. In view of the change in the co-operative year, steps are now being taken to see that the audit fees recoverable in a particular co-operative year are recovered before the close of the corresponding financial year.

II—SUMMARY OF GENERAL PROGRESS.

Agricultural Season.

The season was on the whole below normal. In the Konkan the rainfall was normal but ill-distributed. This, in addition to a wave of cold and frosty weather, damaged the crops. But the prices of money crops improved slightly, so that the damage was partially made up. In the Karnatak, the rainfall was adequate except in certain regions. But owing to untimely rains, frost and mists in January, crops were damaged. However, better prices ruled. In the Deccan, the rainfall and the crops were normal, January frosts having done only slight damage. Prices, however, were low. In Bombay, irregular rainfall, and January frost damaged the crops. Losses were not even made good by any rise in the prices. In the Gujarat, the rainfall was fair but all money crops were badly damaged by frost. In Sind, insufficient rains, and January frost damaged the two rabi crops and one kharif crop.

The increase in the number of members, the working capital and the reserve fund of all the societies, in spite of reduction in the number of agricultural societies, indicates the results of the policy of rectification and consolidation pursued by the Department.

During the year, 139 societies were liquidated and only 99 were registered.

Liquidation of Agricultural Societies was resorted to as an extreme measure, when there was no hope of their revival. Registration of 28 credit societies indicates the rising popularity of the rural credit societies. Considerable attention is now paid to non-credit co-operation and, as a result, 29 societies have been registered during this year. The

cancellation of a very large number of millhand societies, catering to the needs of the employees of the Currimbhoy Mill Group, accounts for the liquidation of 32 societies. The popularity of housing societies is indicated by the fact that 12 new societies were registered during the year, and, as a matter of fact, the depression has given great stimulus to house-building activity. Two cattle insurance societies were amalgamated into one and similarly also 4 Urban Banks were amalgamated with the existing Banks. Four Central Banks were also amalgamated in Sind and this accounts for the decrease in the number of Central Banks shown in the table in paragraph 11.

The rate of decrease in the number of societies has been checked and the increase in the number of members and in the working capital and the reserve fund, and particularly the decrease in the overdues, are very satisfactory.

The total owned capital has increased by 94 lakhs and if we take only the share capital and the reserve fund, they amount to 397 lakhs and this contributes to the stability of the movement at the present time.

- 16. During the year, 65 agricultural credit societies were liquidated and 28 were registered. The total number of societies has been reduced to 4,465. There is now a very keen demand for registration of credit societies in the rural areas. The policy of consolidation and rectification has led to growth of popularity of these societies. The general standard of management of these societies has been improved. The past abuses are being rectified and loans are advanced with greater care and caution. Undesirable members are being weeded out and confidence has been revived by prompt finance for productive purpose. There is a keen demand for registration of more societies and applications for this purpose are pouring in.
- 17. The membership shows a decrease as a cirult of weeding out of undesirable members, and the decrease in the working capital is due to the liquidation of several societies. The increase in the reserve fund is an index of the general condition of these societies. The members' deposits have decreased by about 10 lakhs, but this is partly due to the conversion of the deposit-system societies to the share-capital societies, and partly to the withdrawal by the members of their accumulated resources in order to meet their personal requirements.

While the amount due for collection in 1934-35 was only 5 lakhs more than that in 1933-34, the recoveries this year exceeded those of last year by about 28 lakhs. The fresh finance given by societies also represents similar increase. The overdues show a decrease of only 2½ lakhs, but this is due entirely to the unsatisfactory mode of extending the period of repayment of loans adopted by the societies. out last year the practice followed by these societies is haphazard and not always related to the repaying capacity of the borrowers. agricultural season this year was poorer than last year and, in addition, there was extensive damage done by frosty weather in January and February of this year. In spite of that, it will be seen that the amount under extension this year is 21 lakhs below that of last year. The societies under their byelaws have not a free hand in this respect. In certain cases the extension of the date of repayment requires the approval of the Central Bank, and, as pointed out last year, several Central Banks have the habit of sitting on the fence rather than taking any decision in this respect. They are naturally afraid that any premature decision in this respect may prejudice the recoveries and in several cases I personally saw that even at the end of the year the Central Bank had not come to any decision with regard to the proposal of the society to extend the period of repayment. With an extended use of the demand and recovery statements, as introduced by me, I feel that in the future we shall get a clearer picture of the movement in this respect.

But, as I have stated, these figures are misleading and I think that the cash recoveries are a better index of the liquid position of the societies than the customary figure of overdues. This year, the cash recoveries of societies are about 30 per cent. as compared with 21 per cent. last year. The fresh finance has also increased from 55 lakhs to 84 lakhs, and this is a very welcome feature of the movement at present.

Out of 4,485 societies 602 societies had no arrears, 350 had arrears up to 10 per cent., 541 had arrears from 11 to 25 per cent., 748 had arrears from 26 to 50 per cent., and the rest had arrears over 50 per cent.

21. The policy of rectification and consolidation of societies is being pursued by the Department. The supervision of the Department and the Supervising Unions and the inspection of the Central Banks is more strict, with the result that several abuses are being gradually corrected. The overdues in societies are being scrutinised in relation to the assets and the repaying capacity of the borrowers, and pressure is being put for recovery of frozen or insecure loans. Steps for checking stagnation of societies, as detailed in paragraphs 21 and 22 of the last year's report, continue. With the co-operation of the Central Banks, fresh finance according to the repaying capacity of the borrower is given promptly and loans are now given on easier instalments for the purchase of bullocks, costly implements and other small agricultural improvements. The concession scheme introduced experimentally in some districts last year has been extended to almost all the districts in the Presidency proper this year. Under this scheme, a society can reduce its landing rate of interest, provided it collects the overdue and current interest from almost all the members and a certain specified percentage of the principal outstanding. The reduction in the lending rate is graduated in a manner that all the profit earned by the society during the year is absorbed. The broad fact is that the rate of interest is reduced without involving the society in any loss during that year, but the condition that the interest must be recovered from at least 80 per cent. of the members, has helped to a great extent to revive the co-operative character of these societies. The members exercised mutual pressure for repayment of overdue and current interest, so that all the members may be eligible

or the reduced rate of interest. The bond between the members which was getting loosened has again become closer, and several instances have been quoted wherein members of societies went round from door to door, urging repayment of dues of societies, so that all the members of the society may be eligible for the reduced rate of interest. The collection of the overdue interest has also put fresh hope and vigour in the societies, and the low rate of interest, which in some cases was as low as 4 per cent., has definitely established co-operative societies, in those districts where the scheme has been worked with success, as the most popular institutions in the rural areas.

- 22. I have not yet got detailed figures from all the divisions, but in the Poona Division, in the non-canal areas in the 4 districts of Poona, Satara, Ahmednagar and Sholapur, 480 societies out of total 653 took advantage of the concession scheme. The recoveries on account of principal and interest this year were 20.8 and 7.8 lakhs as against corresponding figures of 9.7 and 2.8 lakhs last year. The agriculturists saved 1.7 lakhs in interest charges by the reduction in the lending rate of interest. In the Canal areas, the weakest spot in the Division, the concessions were made more liberal. The Provincial Bank lowered its lending rate to 4 per cent. and below under certain conditions. The societies in return reduced their landing rate to a maximum of 6 per cent. and have earned Rs. 40,000 as rebate from the Bank. There were 64 societies with 2,169 debtors, out of whom 1,104 borrowers availed of the concessions.
- The Concession Scheme.—The Scheme of concessions throughout the Presidency proper has caught the imagination of the members who are making every effect to pay off their liabilities. As an instance, I might quote that in Shirpur Taluka, where the situation was one of anxiety on account of heavy interest arrears, a good harvest and liberal concessions stimulated the members to pay off a large portion of principal as well as interest arrears. The total recoveries of principal and interest were 2.8 and 1.1 lakhs as against .5 and .5 lakhs of last year. Fresh finance was 1.7 lakhs as against .3 lakh last year. In the Southern Division, recoveries of principal have increased from 16 lakhs to 22 lakhs, and fresh finance was only 8 lakhs. The scheme requires concentrated and enthusiastic propaganda for its success, and as this is not available in all the districts in an equal degree, the results have varied in different districts, but in the Karnatak (with the exception of Bijapur) and in the Deccan and the Khandesh, the scheme has had a very enthusiastic response, while in Gujerat and in Nasik, the damage done by frost militated against the success of the scheme. The scheme is being continued for another year also, but in those districts wherein the scheme has been worked for two years, a modified form has now been introduced to enable building up of the reserve fund also.

Side by side the provision of facilities for fresh finance and the reduction in the lending rate of interest, coercive steps are being taken to recover the outstandings from wilful defaulters.

- 24. The Special Recovery Officers, sanctioned under G.R., R.D., No. 3482 '23, dated 13th February 1932, have been continued throughout the year. They have recovered Rs. 26,37.327 and had actually to sell the land only in respect of Rs. 12,13,654. They have greatly contributed to disperse an erroneous impression held by members of societies that a society would not be able to recover money from them. The Special Recovery Officers have been of considerable assistance to the movement and have generally been doing their duties with considerable tact and persuasion.
- 25. I think there is enough evidence to show that the rural credit movement in the Presidency proper has not only been revived but awakened to a sense of its importance. The depression in spirits which hung heavily over the movement when the economic depression first started, has been slowly giving way to considerable enthusiasm among all the ranks of the movement, and there is a determination among the members of rural societies to get the best out of the co-operative movement. The movement, as has been expressed, after the period of "dry-docking for repairs" has now been rendered "sea-worthy", and unfortunately, the only obstacle in further development of the rural credit movement is the lack of adequate staff. My office staff is entirely inadequate for the growing demands of the movement, and I have already moved Government for assistance in this respect.
- 26. Canal Societies.—During the year, three societies were taken in liquidation, leaving 73 at the end of the year. Attention was concentrated on these societies with the result that there is considerable improvement. Although the position yet is one of anxiety, particularly for the Provincial Bank, which has financed these societies, the outstandings have been reduced by about 2 lakks in spite of liberal finance of over 2 lakhs as compared with Rs. 69,000 during the previous year. The overdues are reduced from 13 lakhs to 9 lakhs and the recoveries this year have been over 3 lakhs as compared with over 1 lakh last year. These results have been achieved largely by co-ordination of workers in these societies under the Auditor, Baramati, who has been given temporary assistance in this respect. Formerly, the supervising unions and the Provincial Bank were not moving hand in hand, but now full co-ordination between the societies, the unions and the Provincial Bank has been secured through an Auditor who has been specially selected for this purpose. Their work has been fruitful because of the very generous concessions given by the Provincial Bank in these areas. The rate of interest has been reduced to 4 per cent, and even further reduction is provided in a sliding scale according to the repayment by each society. The societies have passed on the full benefit of this reduced rate of interest to the members and very liberal concessions have been given. As the Auditor had been posted in the month of April, the full results of the change of arrangement will, I hope, be seen to a greater effect during the next year. The improvement in the price of gul has also substantially helped in the process of reconstruction. Satisfactory improve-

ment has been made in the position of these societies, but as I have stated, a great deal still remains to be done.

The number of societies has increased by 2, but there is a slight fall in the number of members and working capital. The increase in the reserve fund is, however, satisfactory. The problem of these societies is largely dependent on the system of supervision adopted for these societies. On the one hand, close supervision and guidance are necessary, but on the other hand, the societies are so small that they are not in a position to contribute to any appreciable extent towards the expenses of such supervision. There is a great demand for registration of more Bhil societies in the Khandesh. The Special Mamlatdar has already been deputed to devise a system of supervision for these proposed societies and if the necessary financial assistance both from Government and from the Provincial Bank is available, it will be possible to meet the demand of the Bhils of Khandesh for co-operative credit for members of this community.

29. Societies for Depressed Classes and Aboriginal Tribes.—The main figures are given below:—

There is a satisfactory increase in the number of societies, their members and the working capital of these societies. However, such societies reserved for members of backward communities find considerable trouble in making headway. Trained workers are not available and the security for the loans is too inadequate. I personally feel that for agricultural members of these communities the village society is a much better agency for credit. Contact with members of other communities has educative value, and as I have stated already, members of these communities find ready admission in the ordinary village societies.

- 30. Tagavi Loans.—During the year loans were advanced to 10 members totalling Rs. 8,400 and out of which Rs. 2,850 were utilised for construction of wells, Rs. 4,850 for installation of pumps and Rs. 700 for construction of bunds. During the year Rs. 25,000 were allotted by Government for this purpose. Owing to the meagre demand for this type of loan and in view of the large resources of the Provincial Bank, Government have decided to cancel the allotment during the current year.
- 31. Land Mortgage Banks.—The provision of long term credit through the agency of Land Mortgage Banks has been a long-felt want in this Presidency. Three Banks had been registered, one each at Pachora, Broach and Dharwar, as far back as 1928 as an experimental measure. At the Co-operative Round Table Conference held in June 1933 in Poona, it was urged that a scheme for the organisation of land mortgage banks should be taken up on an extensive scale with a view to relieve rural

indebtedness. As a result of the deliberations of this Conference, Government appointed a Committee consisting of the following non-officials under the chairmanship of the Registrar:—

In connection with the work of this Committee I was also deputed to study the system in the Madras Presidency. The Committee carefully explored the ground for land mortgage banking and came to the conclusion that land mortgage banks are very necessary for relief of agricultural indebtedness and there is every possibility of their success, if organised on sound lines.

- 32. On the recommendations of the Committee, Government sanctioned the registration of ten Primary Land Mortgage Banks with an apex Bank at Bombay. Accordingly, at the close of the year banks at the following centres were registered:—
 - (1) Poona, (2) Karad (Satara District), (3) Nasik, (4) East Khandesh, (5) West Khandesh, (6) Surat, (7) Borsad (Kaira District), (8) Belgaum, (9) Hubli (Dharwar District) and (10) Karwar (North Kanara District).

The selection has been restricted to places which are not liable to scarcity and famine and wherein the co-operative movement has made appreciable progress. At the last budget session of the Legislative Council, a resolution was also passed, approving of the proposal to guarantee the principal and interest on the debentures to be floated by the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank to the extent of Rs. 50 likhs. At the time of writing this report the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank has just come into existence and it is expected that the primary banks will now set to work in right earnest.

33. The Land Mortgage Banks herald the dawn of a new era for the agriculturists in this Province. It is gratifying to note that the scheme has been well received both by the public and the press. The banks, however, require careful and business-like management and with a view to secure this, certain safeguards have been adopted. The bye-laws provide for the nomination of the Board of Directors by the Registrar for the first three years. They also provide for the sanction of the Registrar for all loans from the Provincial to Primary Banks and from Primary Banks to individuals in the initial stages. The Land Valuation Officers are also lent hands from the Department. With a view to enable the Banks to meet a part of the cost on account of the employment of these officers, Government have

agreed to give a cash subsidy of Rs. 5,000 per annum to be distributed

equally between the Banks.

34. Zamindari Banks.—During the year the Zamindari Bank at Karachi, which could not work owing to difficult conditions, was cancelled and the Zamindari Bank at Hyderabad commenced its active operations. The subjoined table shows the figures:—

The membership, the share capital and the working capital show satisfactory increase. These Banks, out of a total demand of 12.9 lakhs, recovered 2.8 lakhs and gave fresh finance of 3.7 lakhs. The recoveries, which constitute 21 per cent. of the outstandings, should be considered as satisfactory in view of the adverse agricultural season due to considerable damage done by frost. These Banks fill an important role in the economic life of the District, although they cannot extend their operations further owing to unsettled conditions. Their membership is fairly selective and their working on the whole may be considered as fairly satisfactory.

(b) AGRICULTURAL NON-CREDIT SOCIETIES.

- 35. General.—The agricultural non-credit institutions are a vital link in the chain of rural economy, but as stated in the previous reports, it is hardly possible to push on these activities, on anything like a large scale with the limited staff at the disposal of this department. At present the sale societies are the most outstanding feature of this type of co-operative activity though the increase in the number of co-operative protection and fencing societies is also a very hopeful sign. A scheme for the organisation of sugar-cane growers on a co-operative basis is also under contemplation in this Province and as Government of India propose to subsidise it by means of a subvention from the sugar excise, it will not be long before it is launched.
 - 36. Cotton.—Cotton sale societies continue to make steady progress. During the year under report 2 more societies were registered—one in Broach District and the other in Surat while four societies in Surat District which were in a moribund condition had to be wound up. The total number of societies was 26 as against 28 at the close of the previous

year. The following table indicates the volume of business done by them during the year:—

As the figures relate to a period of 15 months, the increase in sale is not very appreciable. In the Southern Division, the Hubli Cotton Sale Society continued to do good business under the able guidance of Rao Bahadur C. S. Shirahatti. In spite of low yields, this society has been able to sell 28,137 dokras, out of which 7.828 were sold by auction and the remaining by private treaty. This business alone resulted in a net profit of over Rs. 16,000 to the society. The Gadag Cotton Sale Society has also been maintaining very good record, having earned a commission of nearly Rs. 24,000 during the year under report. The Bijapur Cotton Sale Society has not been able to show much progress, but the Bailhongal Cotton Sale Society has now tided over the difficulties caused by the boycott and is now definitely on the upward grade and during the year under report it sold 8,000 maunds of cotton valued at Rs. 64,286 and grains valued at Rs. 36,000 through its dep5t at Belgaum and realised in all a commission of over Rs. 2,500.

In Gujarat, the Cotton Sale Societies are increasing in popularity, as they secure better prices and lower ginning and pressing charges. Unfortunately for the societies, the crops were badly damaged by the frost in January, which not only affected the quality of cotton but diminished the yield. However, favourable conditions of the market compensated the cotton growers, as the average price per bhar of cotton realised was Rs. 125 to Rs. 142 as against Rs. 101 to Rs. 107 of the previous year. The Hansot Group and the Purshottam Group Ginning Societies are proving a great boon to the cotton growers as practically all the cotton brought in for sale to the societies is ginned at the factories installed by these societies. The former has realised a profit of Rs. 2.500 while the latter has earned commission to the extent of Rs.6,000. The Farmers Co-operative Pressing Factory at Surat has also done remarkably well during the short period of its existence. It has invested nearly Rs. 85,226 in its machinery and during the cotton season it undertook ginning of

nearly 32,000 maunds of cotton and pressed about 5,000 bales. In Khandesh, the Pachora Cotton Sale Society sold 11,593 maunds of cotton valued at Rs. 96,567 and made a net profit of Rs. 396 as against Rs. 472 of the previous year.

Although the sale societies are playing an important part in rural economics, their further progress is considerably hampered by various difficulties. For example, there are at present no proper facilities for grading and pooling, and up-to-date information as regards marketing conditions is not always available. I am considering the question whether a Wholesale Society should not be registered, which would serve as a clearing house of information and work as a Federation of the sale societies by co-ordinating their activities and giving them adequate facilities in marketing.

I describe below the salient features of some of these societies deserving special mention.

Gul.—The Haveli Taluka Gul Sale Society could not make much business during the year under report, the quantity sold being only one-fourth that of the previous year. However, as the prices of Gul had improved considerably, the society could earn sufficient commission to cover its working expenses.

Tobacco.—Nippani Sale Society is on the verge of collapse, as neither the growers nor responsible leaders are forthcoming to manage its affairs. Its reconstitution as a Sale Union is under consideration.

Chilly.—The working of the Byadgi Chilly Society is not very satisfactory. But the Tarapur-Chinchani Chilly Society in Thana District has been doing good work and has actually extended the scope of its business by undertaking the sale of Tomatos and Brinjals.

Mango.—The two Mango Sale Societies in Ratnagiri District have been working well.

Paddy.—The Palghar Paddy Sale Society sold nearly 22,000 maunds of paddy realising Rs. 35,700 and earned a net profit of Rs. 572. Its progress is much hampered for want of proper storage facilities. In Sind the Malir and Shikarpur Grain Sale Societies were able to do substantial business during the year under report. The fate of the Jacobabad Grain Society is still hanging in the balance. Attempts are being made to amalgamate it with the Shikarpur Zamindari Bank and if this does not materialise, the society will have to close its doors.

Arecanut.—The Sirsi Totgars and Kumta Arecanut Sale Societies in Kanara District have been working satisfactorily. The societies have, however, yet wider scope for doing useful work if propaganda is carried on to attract members' produce for sale.

38. Purchase and Sale Unions.—The Nira Canal Purchase and Sale Society is being well-managed. It has a large amount of owned capital and it earned a commission of Rs. 5,633 and a profit of Rs. 4,709. Apart from the sale of members' produce, it undertakes supply of oil cake and chemical manures to the agriculturists. The Saswad Mali Purchase and Sale Society is managed by members of the Mali Community who have very progressive outlook, and are also businesslike. The Warna Valley Sale Union has not been able to exercise proper control over its four branches at different centres, with the result that it is working at a loss. In Nasik Division the financial position of the Malegaon Vibhag Purchase and Sale Union is not satisfactory owing to litigation with non-members. The West Khandesh Purchase and Sale Union which was in a bad condition has been revived and during the year under report it sold members' produce valued at over Rs. 4 lakhs and earned a commission of nearly Rs. 5,000.

Two Fruit Sale Societies were registered during the year under report—one at Rahuri in Nagar District and the other in Gujerat, known as the Southern Gujerat Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Association. The problem of co-operative sale of perishable articles bristles with difficulties which are not experienced with regard to the sale of ordinary agricultural produce. With a cautious and businesslike management these societies, however, bid fair to be a success; the Gujerat Association has actually made a profit of Rs. 423 during the short period of its existence.

- 39. Crop Protection Societies.—Crop protection activities are concentrated mostly in Khandesh and during the year under report six more societies were registered, the total number of societies of this type at the close of the year being 14. The total area included in the area of operations of the 13 societies working in Khandesh is 43,593 acres and the protection of crops in that area is secured at a total cost of Rs. 17,383 which works out roughly at 6 annas per scheme. The progress achieved in this respect is indeed commendable, and what is gratifying to note is that even absentee landlords join in the scheme of crop protection. There are in all 3,927 members, of whom 260 are absentee owners.
- 40. Fencing Societies.—These societies are becoming very popular particularly in Dharwar District. The cultivators have realised the necessity of fencing not only from the point of view of economic gain but also of averting danger to their own lives. During the year under report two more societies were registered, the total number at the close of the year being 16. The total length of the fence and stone wall put up by the societies in Dharwar comes to 59.293 yards and the area protected by these fences is 20,493 acres. It is interesting to note that 12 societies in the District are connected in one line of about 25 miles running from Bommigatti to Dhundshi.

- 41. Land Improvement Societies.—One more society was registered during the year under report, viz. the Balkuli Dam Construction and Irrigation Society in the Kanara District. It has made a good beginning, having secured an area of 173 acres in its scheme.
- 42. Machinery and Implement Societies.—Four more societies were registered during the year under report, three in the Sholapur District and one in Nagar District raising the total number of societies of this type to 33. These societies are becoming popular in the Central Division and particularly the societies working in the Nagar District have maintained steady progress. In the Sholapur District the Pandharpur Taluka Implement Society is well-managed and deserves special mention. Unfortunately, the societies in the Southern Division have not been faring well as their activities overlap with those of the Taluka Development Associations.
- 43. Catile-breeding Societies.—There were 17 Cattle-breeding Societies at the close of the year, one more society having been registered in the Southern Division where this type of co-operative activity is gaining in popularity. The Shidhenur Cattle-breeding Society deserves again special mention for having maintained its record of good work. The total grazing area maintained by the societies in the Southern Division is 1,375 acres and if a bigger area is made available there is scope for the organisation of more societies.
- 44. Taluka Development Associations.—The Associations are increasing in popularity and during the year under report four new Associations came into existence. Two Associations in Sind had, however, to be wound up, as having carried out intensive propaganda work in their respective areas, there was little further scope for their activities. The following table indicates comparative figures of progress of the Associations:—

The Associations are concentrating their activities mostly in the direction of giving advice to agriculturists on agricultural improvements, introduction of new types of seed, implement and manure and holding demonstrations and exhibitions. Some of the Associations have also purchased premium bulls and given them to cultivators to popularise the breeding of better type of cattle. With these beneficent activities which are so essential for the welfare of the rural masses, the associations are verily playing an important part in the programme of rural uplift. There is, however, a tendency on the part of some associations to utilise the institutions as a convenient platform for party politics. Such a tendency deserves to be checked and as a measure of safeguard the associations have been advised, in consultation with the Director of Agriculture, to adopt a bye-law providing for the suspension of the Managing Committee by the Registrar in cases of emergency.

- 45. The Khudabadi Amil and the Khoja Ismailia Agricultural Associations deserve special mention. The former has acquired an area of 849 acres and settled four of its members thereon. This has resulted in a saving of Rs. 7,000, the interest on which is proposed to be utilised for the purpose of awarding scholarships to students of agriculture. The association has not yet been able to do anything in connection with the establishment of an institution for training students in agriculture as contemplated, as it has not yet secured a suitable piece of land. The association is, however, maintaining a small library where agricultural literature is available for the benefit of the members. The Khoja Ismailia Association has remarkable record of work to its credit. It has a membership of 150, while about 1,000 people have settled in the Colony. The members are tilling the land themselves on modern methods recommended by the Agricultural Department.
- 46. The Wilson Anti-Famine Institute, Bijapur, continues to do good work under the Presidentship of the Collector.

Rural Uplift.

- .47. Recently rural uplift has become a subject of very great importance. The village panchayat has been officially recognised as the village agency for rural uplift. But agricultural co-operative societies also have many opportunities of promoting village improvement which they are actually doing. Village improvement can be achieved by schemes involving much research and heavy capital expenditure which can only be undertaken by Government, and by organised bodies whose objective is generally to improve the village and to instil into the villager the desire for self-improvement.
- 48. Agricultural societies can promote rural uplift in three ways. Credit societies and some non-credit societies make contributions towards

village improvement. In Bombay, in the year under report, apart from liberal contributions to earthquake funds and the Jubilee Fund, 472 societies have contributed Rs. 50,310 for education, sinking of wells and allied purposes. Agricultural non-credit societies of the type of Implement Societies, Crop Protection Societies, Sale Societies and the Taluka Development Associations, all in their own way enhance the economic well-being of the villager. But the societies which are specially concerned with rural uplift, particularly the moral awakening of the villager, are the Better Living and Rural Reconstruction Societies. The number of such societies has increased from 7 to 14; of the new societies there being 4 in Satara, 1 in Ahmednagar and 2 in West Khandesh. When the villagers begin to appreciate the benefits of Better Living Societies, their number will yet increase. Among the existing societies three deserve special mention. Through the initiative of the Kallabbe Rural Reconstruction Society, Ltd., North Kanara, much work is being done for the ultimate good of the villager, in the shape of raising of enclosure walls round cultivation, building of roads communicating with the town of Kumta, repairing of tanks and nalas, sinking of wells, consolidation of holdings, clearing of wastes, protection of crops—particularly betel-nuts against Koleroga disease and monkeys,- cultivation of new crops, reduction of expenditure on ceremonious occasions, referring of disputes to arbitration, etc. The Aravade Better Living Society, Satara, is also doing work on much the same lines. The Mirjole Village Reconstruction Association, Nasik, organised two handicraft exhibitions and also built 800 feet of road.

Banking.

49. General.—The existence of surplus resources in excess of the requirements continues to be the chief feature of the working of the co-operative banks. This favourable feature of the money market has been utilised for lowering the rates of interest on deposits which at present are on a par with those of the best joint stock banks. The demand for advances from members of societies continues to be slack, though it has shown some improvement, and the low return on investments has prevented the banks from reducing their lending rate to the extent that they would have otherwise done.

The outstanding event during the year has been the institution of the Reserve Bank of India, but as its agricultural credit section has not yet been organised, it is difficult to say to what extent it will be able to assist the co-operative movement in this Province.

The institution of Land Mortgage Banks will to a very large extent help the central banks by liquefying frozen assets and to that extent will expand the credit of the agricultural movement.

(2) Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank.

50. The comparative position of the Bombay Provincial Bank can be seen from the following table— $\,$

The working capital shows a slight decline as a definite resul: of the policy of discouraging fixed deposits. The rates on deposits have been lowered considerably and to-day only 2 per cent. is paid on fixed deposits for a year.

The loans outstanding to individuals constitute chiefly the loans to members of rural societies against the security of gold or agricultural produce and the increase in this respect is very satisfactory. The decrease in the figure of loans to societies is the result of a policy of reducing the liabilities of societies in accordance with the reduction in the repaying capacity of the members of such societies.

The investments of the Bank show a decline, but this is made up by the increase in the figures with regard to cash holdings of this Bank. The net profits show a large increase, but it must be remembered that the figures for 1934-35 refer to a period of 15 months and that this figure has been further swollen as a result of some refund of income-tax which the Bank received during this year.

It will be noticed that the cost of management has been gradually brought down from 1.7 per cent. of the working capital to 1.2 per cent. in 1933-34 and the figure for 1934-35 is also satisfactory if we remember that it refers to a period of 15 months.

The dividend declared this year was 5 per cent. per annum as against 4 per cent. of the last year. This was more as a gesture indicating to the shareholders that the Bank was now well out of the morass and that the condition of the Bank is highly satisfactory. At the same time, Rs. 90,000 were contributed to the Reserve for Doubtful Debts, which now stands at a high figure of Rs. 3,55,000 and Rs. 10,000 were given as a rebate to societies in conjunction with the concession scheme.

The lending rate was also reduced by about 1 per cent. all round and in the canal societies a special rate of 4 per cent. was introduced with a view to stimulate repayments.

The Bank pursues a systematic policy of assessing bad and doubtful debts and has got ample cover for such debts. In the dry tract the working of the concession scheme was supported by the Bank by reduction in the rate of interest, and in the canal area, as outlined above, it has initiated a bold policy, which, judging by the results so far, has achieved a considerable success.

- 51. The relations between the Provincial Bank and its affiliated Banks and Societies were very cordial and responsive. Eleven out of 16 Central Banks had arrangements for overdraft with the Provincial Bank and only one Central Bank had arrangements for cash credit. The Provincial Bank transacted business with a larger number of societies this year and this is a very hopeful sign.
- 52. The Bank continues to be well managed under the able and distinguished guidance of Sir Chunilal V. Metha and Mr. V. L. Mehta.

(3) District Central Banks.

53. The number of District Central Banks during the year was reduced by 4 owing to amalgamation of Central Banks in Sind. The following table gives figures for Central Banks, excluding figures for the Bombay Provincial Bank only:—

It will be noticed that there is a satisfactory increase with regard to working capital, share capital and particularly as regards reserve fund. The loans outstanding to societies have been slightly reduced, while loans given to individuals chiefly against the security of gold, gilt-edged securities and agricultural produce have nearly doubled. The surplus resources either invested or kept on short-term deposits with Banks have practically kept on the same level. The profits and the cost of management indicate that the ratio to working capital is practically kept on the same level, as the figures for 1934-35 relate to a period of 15 months. No Central Bank declared a dividend in excess of 6 per cent. in spite of the fact that the profits warranted the declaration of a higher dividend and this must be considered as very satisfactory. The lending rate on an average varied from $6\frac{1}{2}$ to 8 per cent., the scale being graduated according to the credit of each society with the District Central Bank.

54. A consolidated statement of all the Central Banks including the Provincial Bank is given for the last 5 years as under:—

These figures include loans to agricultural as well as to non-agricultural societies. It will be noticed that the recoveries this year were largely in excess of the recoveries last year and that the increase in the fresh

finance shows that confidence between the members and societies has been revived.

- 55. Only one Central Bank, viz., the Kaira Central Bank, was obliged to borrow from the Bombay Provincial Bank. This Bank has gradually rehabilitated itself and it is fortunate that this year it worked at a slight profit. The Nasik Central Bank has also got more confidence of the public, and is able to raise all the money required by it locally. All the other Central Banks did not borrow from the Bombay Provincial Bank this year.
- 56. The rate of interest payable on deposits has been reduced by all the Central Banks, but the lending rate does not show corresponding decrease, chiefly owing to the fact that some of the Central Banks have borrowed in the past at a higher rate, so that the average borrowing rate has not decreased substantially. However, good societies can still borrow from the Central Banks at 6 to $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., while those which have not been able to discharge their liabilities regularly have to pay a little higher interest. The Central Banks continue to follow the policy of opening branches in the rural areas, wherever possible, in order to keep in closer touch with the societies and to tap local resources. Through these branches they are also able to offer facilities for finance against the deposit of agricultural produce, and this type of business is being gradually developed, though it has to be done on very cautious lines.
- 57. The relations between the Central Banks and the Agricultural Societies are fairly cordial, although in some cases the Central Banks follow an ultra-conservative policy. In some Central Banks, unfortunately, local party politics hold sway, with the result that there is constant friction between some societies and the Central Banks. However, all efforts are being made to urge all co-operative societies and banks to eschew party feelings and work entirely for the economic betterment of the agriculturists.
- 58. The Sind Provincial Bank, constituted by amalgamation of 4 Central Banks, has worked fairly satisfactorily during the year. The merger has contributed to the stability of this Bank and also gives added security to the depositors. Unfortunately, the recoveries were badly affected owing to damage by frost.

(4) Non-Agricultural Credit Societies.

- 59. During the year, 11 Uchan Banks were cancelled and 8 came into existence. Out of a total demand of 4.6 crores they recovered 3.9 crores, and this indicates their financial stability as well as the extent of their utility to the public.
- 60. Salary-earners' Societies.—During the year, owing to strikes and the liquidation of the Currimbhoy Mills, 29 Millhand Societies were cancelled. But apart from that, salary-earners' societies are gaining

in popularity and working very efficiently. Most of them are self-supporting. The facility of recovery either through the pay-sheet or at the time of the disbursement of the pay is helpful both to the Society as well as to the borrower, and the insistence on compulsory deposits or contribution to share capital has inculcated the habit of thrift. These institutions have considerable educative value and popularise the banking habit among men of limited means.

51. The following table shows the figures with regard to Urban Banks:—

The figures indicate a rapid expansion as regards the number of members, share capital, working capital and the reserve fund. Most of the Banks are in a stable position, but there are a few which have sacrificed expansion to stability, and the departmental control of these Urban Banks becomes all the more difficult, as in most cases the advice of the Department is evaded, with the result that it is mostly like closing the stable door after the horse has fled. However, this occurs only in case of a few Banks. On the whole, the credit of these Banks is extraordinarily good and their management competent and efficient. The lending rate of interest is also being reduced, and it is a matter of congratulation that most of these Banks, in view of the limitation on the rate of dividend payable to shareholders, utilise part of their profits for giving free services to their members. Some Banks have free reading rooms, others make extensive grants for charities and some others provide for provident fund of their members, and one Bank, particularly this year, has provided for medical advice and supply of medicines to their members and their families at a nominal cost. The Shamrao Vithal Bank and the Gujerat Brahma-Kshatriya Bank give cheap loans for expenses in connection with the education of the children of the members and also give scholarships to enable the boys of their community to pursue higher studies. The Surat People's Co-operative Bank has organised an Emporium to assist the

marketing of the products of weavers and other artisans in the district, and the members of the Rajwade Mandal Co-operative Bank voluntarily contribute 25 per cent. of their dividend to assist historical research conducted by the Rajwade Mandal.

- 62. The urban credit movement in this Province has shown very steady progress, and would show still further progress if I had more staff at my disposal for giving necessary guidance to these Banks.
- 63. The Supervising Union of Urban Banks in Gujerat worked satisfactorily to the mutual benefit of all the Banks concerned, and it is hoped that more Unions like this would come into existence in other parts of the Presidency also.
- 64. Bombay Co-operative Insurance Society.—The Society completed its fifth year and enrolled 1,402 new members. 1,432 new proposals were accepted, assuring a sum of over 10 lakhs. All the proposals assuring to the extent of Rs. 1,60,715 referred to rural areas only. The amount of claims paid during the year was only Rs. 5,061 and the Assurance fund of the Society increased from Rs. 27,871 to Rs. 71,623.

The Non-Agricultural Credit Societies have been associated with the Insurance Schemes of the Society and give facilities to their members for such insurance and in return obtain substantial commission from the Insurance Society. The rural side of the Society is not so well developed, but it is being taken up now, as the position of the Society becomes stabilised.

The Society during the short period of its existence has secured a foothold in the insurance world, and its future development seems to be secure, as it supplies a special need under special circumstances. It, however, requires to be stimulated, and I expect efforts will be made in this direction now. It is very necessary to link insurance with agricultural credit by the co-operative societies and by the land mortgage banks, if this could be done at a reasonable cost.

65. The District Cattle Insurance Society in Broach continues to work satisfactorily.

B. CONSUMERS' MOVEMENT.

(i) Co-operative Stores.

66. A comparative statement is as follows:-

The position of the Stores Societies, while not quite as satisfactory as in the previous year, is not a matter for despair, as the few societies that are working are showing within their own limited sphere signs of progress. As stated in the previous reports, these societies are not capable of showing substantial progress, as it is difficult to secure members' loyalty to these institutions. Apart from this factor, local difficulties, unhealthy competition in the market and the competition of middlemen also retard their progress to a considerable extent. In spite of these difficulties, however, most of the stores have worked with profit. The Municipal Sweepers Stores at Karachi has proved very popular amongst the sweepers and during the year under report it effected sales to the extent of Rs. 32,234.

(ii) Housing Societies.

67. The Housing Societies, particularly those in Karachi and Ahmedabad, are making great headway and during the year under report as many as 12 societies came into existence. Out of these 8 are at Ahmedabad, two in Karachi, one in Poona and one at Godhra. The Harijans have set a good example by organising a society for themselves which bids fair to be a success. The society owes its existence to the assistance given by the Poona Municipality. The following table gives the main statistics regarding Housing Societies:—

- 68. There are, however, certain disquieting factors which are thwarting the progress of these societies. The societies in Bombay have to face a difficult problem owing to the economic depression which has resulted in vacancies in their tenements to quite an alarming extent and consequent inability to meet their credit obligations. The large area of land acquired by these societies during the boom period has also considerably embarrassed their financial position, as the societies are experiencing great difficulties in disposing of the plots. The Vasanta Theosophical Co-operative Housing Society, whose progress was for a time thwarted by internal dissensions, is now being put on its legs. But the Ahichhatra Sahakari Mandal is now past the stage of revival and will have to be taken into liquidation. All attempts to resuscitate the St. Joseph's Guild Co-operative Housing Society at Ahmednagar have also proved futile and as a last resort, the property of the Society had to be put up for auction, but it could not be sold for want of bidders. The Bishop of Nasik has agreed to purchase the property outright and Government are likely to incur a loss in the transaction.
- 69. The question of finance to Housing Societies has not yet been satisfactorily solved. As, however, Government have decided not to incur fresh commitments in this respect, all new societies are registered

on the distinct understanding that they will not get any loan from Government for construction of houses. Consequently, the Housing Societies are making their own arrangements for finance either through Insurance Companies or private parties. In Sind, the Sind Provincial Co-operative Bank has financed Housing Societies to the extent of over Rs. 3 lakhs, but the nature of its funds does not warrant its undertaking this type of finance for a period exceeding 10 years. The rate of interest charged, viz. $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., is also very high. In Madras, the formation of a Central Co-operative Building Society which will raise long term money by means of debentures secured on the mortgage of houses transferred to it by primary building societies is contemplated. It is a matter for consideration whether in view of the growing demand for Housing Societies in this Presidency and in view also of the existing easy conditions of the money market, we should not also make a move in this direction.

(iii) House Reconstruction Societies.

70. There is nothing particular to note about these societies except that the problem now is mainly one of recovery of loans advanced to them by Government. In Gujerat, in spite of adverse agricultural seasons, recoveries to the tune of Rs. 13,362 were effected during the year under report. In Sind, the financial position of the societies is not very sound, as almost all the societies are situated in the Fuleli tract which has been adversely affected by the construction of the Lloyd Barrage. Adjustments of standard of living have become necessary, and the problem of recoveries of these instalments has been very difficult. The Department had, therefore, to concentrate special efforts on recoveries and it is gratifying to note that during the year under report recoveries to the extent of Rs. 31,845 were effected, reducing the total liabilities to Government to Rs. 2,70, 452.

C. PRODUCERS' MOVEMENNT.

(i) General.

71. The comparative statement is as follows:—

Two societies were cancelled during the year under review. Of the remaining, very few are in a really prosperous condition, while some of them continue to be lethargic as before. The obvious implication is

that such societies would respond only to improvement in world conditions. The figure in the total value of articles produced shows a slight increase. Though little progress was possible, there is still a profit of Rs. 1,214.

(ii) Weavers' Societies.

72. The comparative statement is as follows:—

These societies continue to struggle bravely. The curtailment in the purchasing power of the agriculturists, the keen competition of the mills and the general illiteracy and the backwardness of the weavers keep these societies down. However, the registration of district industrial associations in Dharwar, Poona and Nagar Districts would greatly assist these societies. They would cheapen the cost of production by securing raw material at cheap rates and by the supply of improved appliances. The facility of marketing the finished product through the agency of these associations would enable the weaver to get better price for his finished goods and the expert guidance as regards the marketable patterns will, I hope, enable the weaver to hold his own against the competition of the mills.

In spite of the existing adverse circumstances, however, the Kasoda and Parola Weavers' Societies in Khandesh Division have been doing excellent work. The Hebsur Weavers' Society in Dharwar District during the year sold yarn worth Rs. 25,000 and earned a profit of Rs. 1,572. Most of the societies in Sind are doing credit business only, as there is too much risk in marketing the goods owing to wide fluctuations and lack of patronage for the indigenous articles.

The heavy odds against which these societies have been struggling can be realised by the fact that the drop in the price of the finished articles has been about 39 per cent. The district industrial associations will go a very long way towards putting these societies back on their feet.

IV. THE BOMBAY PROVINCIAL CO-OPERATIVE INSTITUTE.

73. The Provincial Co-operative Institute had another eventful year. Sir Chunilal V. Mehta, K.C.S.I., and Professor V. G. Kale continued to be the President and the Vice-President of the Institute, and Messrs. D. W. Raut and S. S. Malimath were the Honorary Secretaries.

- 74. No decision was arrived at during the year as regards the constitution of the Institute. Several meetings of Committees appointed for this purpose took place, but there appears to be a great divergence of opinion as regards the constitution best suited to carry out the functions of the Institute. A great deal, however, depended on the decision of Government with regard to the proposals of the Supervision Committee in respect of the constitution of the District Supervising Boards. Naturally, it is difficult to frame a suitable constitution for the district branch of the Institute until the constitution of the District Supervising Boards is decided, for otherwise the functions of the two may overlap considerably.
- 75. The actual work turned out by the Provincial Co-operative Institute and its branches was of considerable utility. The journals and the periodicals continued to be published as heretofore; 36 conferences were held throughout the Province convened by district or divisional branches of the Institute. It is really a question to be considered if some limitation on the number of conferences is not necessary. These conferences are a considerable drain on the societies in respect of the travelling allowances payable to representatives of societies attending such conferences.

The three co-operative schools were continued during the year and had 42 pupils on their rolls. Training classes for secretaries were organised throughout the Province and 677 secretaries trained this year. 92 classes for Managing Committee members were held during the year.

- 76. The field staff of the Institute shows great need for improvement. The appointment of propaganda officers vests with the District Branches and sometimes persons with meagre educational qualifications, with no co-operative experience, are appointed as propaganda officers. The propaganda or educative work done by such officers can be easily imagined; but as long as the recruitment of propaganda officers is entrusted to the district branches wherein local influences predominate, it is difficult to secure qualified persons, as the conditions are not attractive enough for good recruits.
- 77. The finances of the Institute continued to be precarious. The expenditure of the Head Office and the Branches was Rs. 90,185, while the income was less by Rs. 5,950. This deficit could have been made up, if the arrears of the subscription of the Institute had been collected. But some societies are reluctant to pay the subscription of the Institute, as they see no tangible results of the activity of the Institute. However, they forget that the work of the Institute is such that tangible results can hardly be shown. The educative work does not yield quick results, but requires patience and perseverance. However, the mismanagement in some branches of the Institute is also responsible for lowering the popularity of the Institute in the rural areas and some societies feel that they are not getting full value for the subscription which they are called upon to pay. The constitution of the Institute is being revised, and it is hoped that in the revised constitution the Institute will gain in utility and popularity in the co-operative movement.

78. All the branches of the Institute have done valuable work of co-operative education and propaganda. Lectures on sanitation, on the value of thrift and economy, and on the necessity of retrenchment in expenditure are given by propaganda officers of all the branches, and in some centres concentrated work is being done for rural uplift, notably at Kallabbe, where the village has been entirely reorganised by the enthusiasm of workers of the District Institute.

V. MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS.

(i) Act, Rules and Byelaws.

- 79. Act.—No amendment has been made in the Co-operative Societies Act, VII of 1925.
- 80. Rules.—It was, however, found necessary to make various amendments to the Bombay Co-operative Societies Rules, 1927. In view of the change in the closing date of the co-operative year, Rules 18 and 19 have been amended so as to provide for the submission of balance-sheets by co-operative societies by 31st July every year instead of 30th April as heretofore. Provision of Rule 27 has been amplified so as to permit investment of funds in the shares of the Reserve Bank of India. This provision is particularly necessary as Section 54 of the Reserve Bank of India Act contemplates the organisation of an Agricultural Credit Department. Provision of Rule 8 has also been relaxed in the case of Land Mortgage Banks so to provide for a maximum limit of borrowing up to 20 times the share capital plus the reserve fund.

(ii) Arbitration.

81. During the year, 13,198 cases were referred to arbitration as against 11,957 of the last year. These added to the pending cases at the beginning of the year, viz. 7,414, brought the total cases for disposal to 20,612, of which 12,434 were disposed of, leaving a balance of 8,178 at the close of the year.

(iii) Liquidation.

82. One hundred and thirty nine societies were cancelled during the year, out of which 65 are agricultural credit, 17 agricultural non-credit, 32 salary earners, 11 urban banks, 1 housing, 6 consumers', 3 producers', 3 others and 1 supervising union. The total number of cancelled societies including those of previous years was, therefore, 861, of which the liquidation of proceedings in respect of 50 societies were completed, leaving a balance of 811, the estimated assets of whose are valued at Rs. 49,21,950 as against the liabilities of Rs. 47,24,849.

These cancelled societies are causing great anxiety, especially owing to the difficulty in disposing of the properties of the members which has delayed liquidation work. The agriculturists have at present no cash and even if there be some with a few, they hesitate to shoulder any odium by purchasing the property of their fellow villagers in distress and the Liquidator has perforce to purchase the properties himself in order to secure the debt. The question of disposal of these lands by sale or hire-purchase is engaging the attention of the Department and the possibilities in this direction are being enquired into. Similarly, the question of reconstituting some of the cancelled societies in consultation with the Bombay Provincial Bank is also under consideration, especially in the canal area of the Poona and Nagar Districts.

(iv) Criminal Offences.

83. Thirty prosecutions were filed during the year as against 43 of the previous year. The total cases for disposal during the year were 52, involving a total amount of over Rs. 1,20,000. In 22 cases conviction was secured, while in one, the accused were acquitted. One case had to be withdrawn for want of sufficient evidence. 28 cases were pending at the close of the year.

It is a matter for gratification to note that the number of fresh cases filed during the year has shown a decrease as effective safeguards are being taken to check the criminal tendencies on the part of the office bearers of societies. The policy adopted by the Department in taking prompt legal steps against the offenders is also responsible to a considerable extent for a decrease in the number of cases, as the fraudulent tendencies are rigorously kept in check. The only safeguard for honest management of societies, however, is a strong public opinion in the societies against such malpractices and greater vigilance on the part of office-bearers of societies in the day-to-day working of the societies.

(v) Relations with Indian States.

84. The relations with the Indian States continued to be friendly.

(vi) School Boys Societies.

85. The number of School Boys' Societies has increased from 805 to 948 and they continue to provide good training ground for future members of societies.

VI. ATTITUDE OF THE PUBLIC.

86. The attitude of the public has been very friendly.

VII. CONCLUSION.

- 87. The note of optimism sounded by me in my last report has been justified. While the urban movement continues to expand steadily on sound lines, the rural credit movement has also been growing in strength and liquidity. The policy of recovery of loans by coercion as well as by conciliation has not only liquefied the frozen loans, but the sympathy shown to borrowers in distress, has revived the popularity of co-operative societies in the rural areas. Lending rates of interest have been generally reduced, without sacrificing financial stability, and fresh finance is adequate and prompt. As a result, bulk of the societies in the Presidency proper are well on the road to recovery, and what is of still greater importance is that there is a distinct revival of enthusiasm for co-operation in the rural areas.
- 88. The institution of land mortgage banks will solve the problem of redemption of old debt, though it is hardly necessary to state that their utility is limited to deserving cases only. The scrutiny for eligibility for finance by these banks is bound to be strict; and in view of some criticism of these banks, it is as well to sound a note of warning that the object of these banks is to enable good and thrifty agriculturists to stand on their feet. These banks cannot be utilsed for any spectacular move to redeem agriculturists, whose liabilities are so great that there is no reasonable expectation of redeeming them, even by providing long-term finance at favourable rates. The operations of these banks will be extended to finance of approved schemes of agricultural improvements, and thus they will also enable the agriculturists to increase the yield from land.
- The grant from the Government of India for educating co-operative workers, and for training the members of societies in the principles and practice of co-operation has come at a most opportune moment, and will materially contribute to the expansion of the movement, which has become inevitable. There is a steady and pressing demand for extension of the benefits of co-operative movement in the rural areas. The agriculturists had stood aloof during the last five years, but the facilities afforded by co-operative societies to their members during the last 2 or 3 years have re-established co-operation in the hearts of the people. Time has really come for a definite programme of expansion, but this can hardly be undertaken with the limited resources at our disposal. The reorganisation of the system of supervision in rural societies, as recommended by the special Committee (if accepted by Government) will secure expansion on sound lines and the large resources of central banks will provide finance for legitimate requirements of rural societies.
- 90. However, the provision of cheap credit is not likely to achieve our goal, unless it is accompanied by a comprehensive programme for

increasing the productivity of agriculture, and for cheapening its cost. The Taluka Development Associations are doing very useful work for introducing improved agricultural methods, and their number is increasing. Agricultural Implement Societies also supply improved seed, implements and artificial manure on favourable terms. But the development of organisation for sale of agricultural produce has been very slow. The chief difficulty in this respect has been the lack of good workers and trained and reliable staff. The Cotton Sale Societies in Gujerat and in the Karnatak, demonstrate what could be done in this respect, if adequate assistance could be given by Government in the initial stages. The resources at my disposal in respect of staff and grants for this purpose, are however, too limited to provide for a comprehensive programme of expansion.

- The need for strengthening the co-operative movement is all the greater, as besides contributing to the economic development of the country, it affords very valuable training ground for proper exercise of the rights and duties of citizenship. The organisation of co-operative societies on a democratic basis and the proper management of such societies trains the members in the exercise of their votes, in selection of good leaders, in the conduct of general meetings and business committees, and above all, in the dispassionate consideration of questions at issue without considerations of caste or creed. The minorities are disciplined to carry out the decision of the majorities. In these days of disruptive tendencies, the cohesive force generated by these societies can hardly be exaggerated. The members of societies meet in the general meetings and discuss matters of common economic interest. Communal feelings are submerged in an effort to achieve economic improvement. The applicants for loans narrate personal troubles and are often helped by office-bearers of societies. Instances have been reported, wherein, through the instrumentality of societies, reconciliation of members of societies who had been hostile to each other for generations has been effected. The activities of these societies are not limited to credit requirements of their members. Curtailment of expenditure on ceremonial occasions is advocated and the introduction of improved methods of agriculture is greatly facilitated by the facility afforded for common meeting ground. As a result, the village uplift movement has made rapid strides in centres of co-operative societies.
- 92. Unfortunately, party politics have entered into the working of some societies. But this is limited to a few districts in the Karnatak only. However, this tendency is being rigorously checked, and a hopeful feature is that it is discountenanced by the bulk of the members. In majority of the districts party politics and communal considerations do not affect the working of the societies, as the agriculturists, unless influenced by others, are chiefly occupied with matters affecting their economic life.
- 93. The social value of these societies as contributing to a growth of healthy outlook in the rural areas is considerable, and strengthening of the co-operative movement will not only contribute to economic

betterment in the rural areas but will also secure the elements of orderly progress in the country.

94. In conclusion, I should thank all my Assistant Registrars and he staff for their loyal support and co-operation in my effort to revive and revitalise the movement. Mr. N. M. A. Siddiki has brought considerable enthusiasm and activity into the working of the co-operative movement in Sindh. Messrs. C. B. Huli, R. S. Patil and N. V. Nayak put their heart in their work in their respective spheres of operation. Mr. J. G. Saldanha has been of great assistance to me in the working of my office at headquarters.

Letter from the Registrar of Co-operative Societies (Mr. K. L. Panjabi, I.C.S.), No. A.N.R., dated the 29th February 1936—Submitting the Report on the working of Co-operative Societies in the Bombay Presidency (including Sind) for the period of fifteen months from 1st April 1934 to 30th June 1935.

RESOLUTION.—Government note with satisfaction the general improvement during the year under report in the stability of the Co-operative Movement. Particular attention has of late been paid to the rectification and consolidation of the existing societies; and new societies are not allowed to be formed without due care and investigation. This policy seems to have had a stabilising effect on the Movement accompanied with a reviving faith and confidence in it. Although the difficulties in the way of the Movement continue to be numerous and serious, Government feel that the work of the Co-operative Department is along the right lines.

- 2. During the year under report 65 agricultural credit societies were liquidated and 28 registered. There was a consequent drop in the total membership (which was also partly due to the removal of undesirable members) and working capital. But the reserve fund showed an increase of six lakhs and the share capital, of three lakhs. The amount due for repayment was five lakhs more than in the previous year but the actual recoveries were about twenty-eight lakhs in excess of the previous year. There was a decrease of twenty-one lakhs in the amount in respect of which extensions were granted. There was a slight decrease in the overdues. And the fresh finance granted during the year was twenty-nine lakhs more than in the previous year. The position of the agricultural credit societies was thus satisfactory.
- 3. The Concession Scheme under which a society is allowed gradually to reduce its lending rate without any loss, provided it collects the overdue and current interest and 25 per cent. of the principal outstanding from at least 80 per cent. of its members has considerably helped the societies which took advantage of it. The scheme was introduced

experimentally in a few districts in the previous year, but during the year 1934-35 it was extended to almost all the districts in the Presidency proper. Whilst the mutual pressure brought by the members for the repayment of these dues revived the co-operative character of the work of these societies, the recoveries themselves put fresh hope and vigour in the societies. The scheme is being continued for another year but where the scheme has been worked for two years, a modified form is being introduced to enable building up of the reserve fund.

- The necessity for long-term credit through the agency of land mortgage banks to relieve rural indebtedness was long felt. Three banks were registered at Pachora, Broach and Dharwar in 1928. Upon the recommendation of the Co-operative Round Table Conference held in June 1933 at Poona, a Committee was appointed by Government to investigate the question of land mortgage banking in the Presidency. The Committee came to the conclusion that land mortgage banks were necessary to relieve rural indebtedness and had every chance of success if organised on sound lines. On the recommendation of the Committee Government sanctioned the registration of ten primary land mortgage banks in the Presidency proper with an apex bank at Bombay. The banks came into existence during the year under report. Government have, with the approval of the Legislative Council, guaranteed the principal and interest on the debentures to be floated by the Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank to the extent of Rs. 10 lakhs. Also, with a view to enable the banks to meet a part of the cost on account of the employment of Land Valuation Officers, Government have agreed to give a cash subsidy of Rs. 5,000 per annum for three years to be distributed equally between the banks. Government have also undertaken to give a subsidy up to Rs. 10,000 to the Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank for the first year, Rs. 7,500 for the second year and Rs. 5,000 for the third year to meet the deficit, if any, in the cost of the management.
- 5. The Special Recovery Officers were continued during the year under report. They recovered Rs. 26,37,327 but had to sell land only in respect of Rs. 12,13,654. Their appointment has also indirectly improved repayments.
- 6. Of the agricultural non-credit societies the sale societies are outstanding. The cotton sale societies predominate and worked more or less satisfactorily.
- 7. The Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank continues to work satisfactorily under the able guidance of Sir Chunilal V. Mehta and Mr. V. L. Mehta. The number of District Central Banks during the year was reduced by four owing to amalgamation of the Central Banks in Sind. The banks showed a satisfactory improvement with regard to the working capital, share capital and the reserve fund. The loans due from societies showed a decrease while loans given to individuals against valuable securities were nearly doubled. The recovery of loans and the issue of fresh finance were also almost double that of the last year.

- 8. The Urban Banks showed an increase in number, membership, share capital, working capital and the reserve fund. With the exception of a few they were competently and efficiently managed.
- 9. The slow but unmistakable rehabilitation of the Co-operative Movement in the Presidency is due to a great extent to the enthusiasm and work of Mr. Panjabi and his staff and to those non-official gentlemen who unselfishly and courageously work with them. Government wish to record their appreciation of the work of all these gentlemen.
