REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1932.

- 1. This report and the statements appended to it relate to the Presidency proper and not to Sind.
- 2. Judicial Staff—(Statement No. 1).—The Judicial staff employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1932 and available for civil cases consisted of 10 permanent High Court Judges and 1 temporary Additional Judge; 17 District Judges; 10 Assistant Judges (including 3 Assistant Judges under training); a Chief Judge and 5 Judges of the Presidency Small Cause Court; 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges; 22 First Class Subordinate Judges and 88 Second Class Subordinate Judges. In addition, the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Ahmedabad and Poona exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also 3 Inamdars and Jagirdars exercising the powers of a Subordinate Judge under Regulation XIII of 1830 and 92 Village Munsiffs appointed under the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, Act XVII of 1879.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE.

The Honourable Sir John W. F. Beaumont, Knight, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 19th June 1932 and from 11th July to 31st December 1932. His Lordship was on leave from 20th June to 10th July 1932. During the interval the Honourable Mr. Justice Mirza Ali Akbar Khan officiated as Chief Justice.

PUISNE JUDGES.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Mirza Ali Akbar Khan, from 1st January to 19th June 1932 and from 11th July to 31st December 1932. His Lordship officiated as Chief Justice from 20th June to 10th July 1932.

HIGH COURT.

I. ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

- 3. Original Suits for disposal—(Statement No. 3).—The number of civil suits pending on the original side of the High Court at the end of the year 1931 was 3,086 including 68 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number instituted during the year 1932 was 2,029 including 6 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 206 (including 1 suit received from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) restored during the year. The above totals, 3,086, 2,029 and 206 make an aggregate of 5,321 for disposal in 1932 as against 6,026 in 1931.
- 4. Original Suits disposed of—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits decided was 2,401 including 16 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 2,920, including 59 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. This number is 166 less than the corresponding number at the end of the previous year. Of those 2,920 suits, 2,008 were ripe for hearing and in arrear a decrease of 20 suits over the figure of the previous year. There were 1,960 suits whose hearing had been pending for over one year. This is an increase of 8 suits on the figures of the previous year.

6. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Testamentary and intestate jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1931 was 8. The number instituted during the year 1932 was 21. Of these 17 were decided and 12 remained pending at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided 4 were compromised and 13 were decided after full trial, the average duration in both the cases being 173 days.

· There were 3 suits pending over one year at the close of the year.

7. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty Jurisdiction.—One suit was pending at the close of the year 1931. I was instituted during the year under report. Of the 2 suits, one was decreed by consent, its duration being 210 days, and I remained pending at the close of the year 1932.

There was 1 suit pending over one year at the end of the year.

8. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chirf Matrimonial Jurisdiction.—There was no suit pending at the end of the year 1931; and the number instituted during 1932 was 9. Of these 4 were decided and 5 remained pending at the close of the year 1932. There was no suit pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided :--

- 3 were decreed ex parte, the average duration being 66 days, and
- 1 was decreed after full trial, the duration being 209 days.

9. Insolvency Petitions.—The number of petitions pending at the end of the year 1931 was 2,623 and the number instituted during the year 1932 was 775, making a total of 3,398 for disposal in 1932. Of these, 1,307 were decided and 2,091 remained pending at the close of the year 1932. There were 1,372 petitions pending over one year at the close of the year 1932.

The average duration of the petitions disposed of during the year under report was as shown in the table below:—

10. Appeals to the Privy Council.—Eight appeals were pending from the previous year and 2 were admitted during the year, making a total of 10 for disposal in the year 1932.

Of the above 10 appeals:-

- 1 was allowed by the Privy Council and the High Court decree appealed against was discharged.
- 3 were decided by the Privy Council who confirmed the Decrees of the Appeal Court.
- 5 were pending before the Privy Council in England (including 4 despatched during the year).
- 1 was pending in the Bombay High Court.

- 11. References to take accounts etc.—The number of References to take accounts, to make inquiries as to estates to be administered or partitioned, as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on questions of title, on questions affecting minors in proposed terms of settlement, to settle conveyances, and in like matters, pending at the commencement of the year 1932 was 154, 217 references were filed in 1932 in the office of the Commissioner for taking accounts making a total of 371 for disposal. The number of references disposed of by him during the year was 236.
- 12. Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration etc.—During the year 495 petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, 29 pauper petitions for leave to sue or defend in "forma pauperis", 22 petitions under the Indian Companies' Act, 44 petitions under the Indian Trust Act, 6 references under the Land Acquisition Act and 102 petitions under the Guardians and Wards, Lunacy and Arbitration Acts, etc., making in all 698 were filed for disposal.
- 13. Awards under the Indian Arbitration Act, 1899.—The number of Awards filed during the year was 96.
- 14. Applications for execution of Decrees etc.—The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 1,309 and the number of applications filed during the year was 1,971 making a total of 3,280 for disposal. Of these 455 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts, in 221 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 252 satisfaction was obtained in part and 1,282 were wholly infructuous making a total of 2,210 and 1,070 remained pending at the close of the year.

Number of Darkhasts (Decrees or Orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 66.

Number of Decrees received from other Courts for execution during the year was 87.

II. APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appeals from the High Court Decrees under section 15 of the Letters Patent.

- 18. (Statement No. 7).—Thirty-three appeals from Decrees on the Original Side of the High Court were filed during the year and 31 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 64, 40 were decided and 24 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was less by 4 than in 1931. These 40 appeals were decided as under:—
 - 3 were dismissed or not prosecuted.
 - 22 decrees of the Courts of First Instance confirmed.
 - 7 Decrees of the Courts of First Instance modified.
 - 8 decrees of the Courts of First Instance reversed.

There were 2 appeals pending over a year at the end of the year.

The average duration of the appeals which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 253 days and that of the appeals which were confirmed, modified and reversed was 215 days.

- 19. (Statement No. 8).—Forty-two appeals from orders on the Original Side were filed during the year and 9 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 51, 28 were decided and 23 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of such appeals disposed of was more by 7 than in 1931. The disposals of these appeals were as follows:—
 - 5 dismissed or not prosecuted.
 - 7 orders of the Courts of First Instance confirmed.
 - 2 orders of the Courts of First Instance modified.
 - 14 orders of the Courts of First Instance reversed.

There was one appeal pending over a year at the close of the year.

The average duration of appeals from orders which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 218 days and that of the appeals which were confirmed, modified and reversed was 228 days.

- 20. (Statement No. 7).—On the Appellate Side, 37 Letters Patent Appeals from High Court decrees were filed during the year and 33 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 70, 29 were decided and 41 (including 19 over a year old) remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was less by 10 than in 1931. The disposals of these appeals were as under:—
 - 16 dismissed or not prosecuted.
 - 6 decrees appealed against confirmed.
 - 2 decrees appealed against modified.
 - 5 decrees appealed against reversed.

- 22. Appeals decided—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—The disposals of first appeals show a decrease of 204 over the figure of the previous year; while those of second appeals and appeals from orders show an increase of 407 and 51 respectively.
- 23. Appeals pending—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—At the close of the year 1,351 first appeals, 1,707 second appeals and 65 appeals

from orders were pending. The aggregate total of pending appeals is less by 176 than in 1931.

25. Results of appeals—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—Out of the 364 appeals from Original decrees decided, 65 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 299, the decrees of the lower Courts were confirmed in 210, modified in 36 and reversed in 53. Of the 1,184 appeals from Appellate Decrees decided, 532 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 652, the decrees of the lower Courts were affirmed in 463, modified in 38, reversed in 129 and 22 cases were remanded.

(Statement No. 8).—Of the 107 appeals from orders decided, 34 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 73, the orders of the lower Courts were affirmed in 43, modified in 8, reversed in 15 and 7 cases were remanded.

During the year under report 6 appeals under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, were filed and 6 were pending at the beginning

of the year. Of these 12 appeals, 1 was dismissed, 4 were confirmed, 1 was modified and 3 were reversed and 3 remained pending at the close of the year.

No Reference under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, was filed during the year under report.

CIVIL COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

- 29. Appeals instituted (Statement No. 7).—4,525 appeals were instituted in 1932 showing a decrease of 550 as compared with the previous year. The number of appeals instituted was greater in four districts and smaller in 14 districts. There was noticeable increase in Satara (86). In the remaining 3 districts the variations were less than 50. The decrease on the other hand was noticeable in Poona (119), Bijapur (73), Dharwar (72), Nasik (70), Belgaum (61), Ahmednagar (61) and Kolaba (50). The remaining 7 districts show decreases below 50.
- 30. Appeals disposed of (Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—4,889 appeals were disposed of during the year including 221 by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising appellate powers. These two figures are respectively smaller by 461 and 53 than the corresponding figures of the previous year. There was an increase in the disposals in 8 districts, the greatest being in Bijapur (114) followed by Kolaba (71). In the remaining 6 districts the increase was below 50. On the other hand there was a decrease in the disposals in 10 districts, the greatest being in Satara (433) followed by Sholapur (100), West Khandesh (86) and Kaira (51). In the remaining 6 districts the decrease was less than 50.
- 31. Appeals pending (Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—There were 4,194 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being less by 344 than at the end of 1931.

- (Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—The number of appeals pending for more than a year rose from 795 to 837.
- 32. Results of appeals (Statement No. 7).—The results of the decisions of appeals in the lower Courts during the year were as follows:—

In 728 cases or 14.9 per cent. of the whole, the appeals were either summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, in 2,499 or 51 per cent. the judgments of the lower Courts were affirmed, in 606 or 12.4 per cent. they were modified, in 749 or 15.3 per cent. they were reversed, in 301 or 6.1 per cent. the appeals were remanded and the remaining 6 appeals were disposed of by transfer to the High Court.

- 33. The average duration of appeals in the lower Appellate Courts, which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 104 days while that of appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed and remanded was 332 days.
- 34. Miscellaneous Appeals (Statement No. 8).—469 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 182 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 651, 459 were disposed of during the year and 192 remained pending at its close. The number of pending appeals was more by 10 than in the previous year.
- 35. The average duration of miscellaneous appeals in the lower Appellate Courts, which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 76 days whereas that in appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed and remanded was 149 days.

CIVIL COURTS IN THE MOFFUSIL SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

- 36. Changes in Jurisdiction.—As measures to reduce the public expenditure the following changes were effected during the year under report:—
 - (a) With effect from 1st January 1932 the Courts of the Subordinate Judges of Vadgaon and Junnar in the Poona District were linked together and presided over by one Subordinate Judge, and the post of the Additional Second Class Subordinate Judge, Poona, who was in charge of the Court of Vadgaon also, was abolished (vide Government Notification, Home Department, No. 3707/2-VI, dated 6th November 1931).
 - (b) With effect from 1st January 1932, the Courts of the Subordinate Judges of Pen and Roha in the Thana District were linked together and presided over by one Subordinate Judge (vide Government Notification, Home Department, No. 3707/2-VI, dated 23rd November 1931).
 - (c) With effect from 1st January 1932, the jurisdictions of the Subordinate Judges' Courts of Pimpalgaon, Malegaon, Satana and Yeola in the Nasik District were redistributed with the result that

the post of the Joint Subordinate Judge, Malegaon, was abolished (vide Government Notification, Home Department, No. 3707/2-VI, dated 22nd December 1931).

- (d) With effect from 1st February 1932, the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Tasgaon in the Satara District was abolished, some villages in the Tasgaon Mahal being transferred to the jurisdiction of the Vita Court and the remaining to that of the Islampur Court. The Courts of Vita and Dahiwadi were linked and presided over by one Subordinate Judge. The posts of the Joint Subordinate Judges working at Satara and Vita were abolished (vide Government Notification, Home Department, No. 3707/2-VI, dated 1st February 1932, and Government Erratum, Home Department, No. 3707/2-VI, dated 8th February 1932).
- 37. Original Suits instituted (Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1932 was 177,492, an increase of 8,569 over the figure of the previous year.

The increase occurred in money suits to the extent of 5 per cent., while it was 5.1 per cent. in title and other suits, the number of money suits being 150,407 as against 143,210 in 1931 and that of title and other suits being 27,085 as against 25,773 in 1931.

(Statement No. 4).—The total value of suits instituted in 1932 amounted to Rs. 5,35,49,333, an increase of Rs. 29,68,160 on the total for 1931.

38. Local Distribution (Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1932 showed an increase in 14 districts and a decrease in the remaining 4 districts. There was an appreciable increase in 6 districts, the greatest being in East Khandesh (1,868) followed by Sholapur (1,503), Kaira (1,487), Ahmednagar (993), Nasik (878) and Satara (682). In the remaining eight districts the increase was below 500. The decrease on the other hand was not much marked, being 258 in Kolaba, 256 in Surat, 159 in Poona and 141 in Ahmedabad.

(Statement No. 3).—The largest number of suits instituted during the year was in East Khandesh (18,625). In no other districts except Poona, West Khandesh, Kaira, Nasik, Ahmedabad, Broach and Panch Mahals and Sholapur did the institutions exceed 10,000. Institutions ranged between 5,000 to 10,000 in Thana, Ahmednagar, Satara, Dharwar, Surat, Belgaum and Ratnagiri districts. Kanara showed only 3,579 suits as instituted while the lowest figure (3,100) came to the share of Kolaba.

39. Number of suits disposed of (Statement No. 5).—In addition to 177,492 suits instituted during the year and 66,258 suits pending from the previous year, 2,758 suits were revived or received on remand or review or by transfer, making a total of 246,508 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of during the year was 173,213, a decrease of 943 over the figure of the previous year.

Of the total number of suits decided during the year, viz. 173,213, paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals (that is Courts of Subordinate Judges) disposed of 145,575 suits, Small Cause Courts 12,647, District Courts 567, Village Munsiffs' Courts 14,363 and the remaining 61 suits were decided by the Unpaid Tribunals (that is Inamdars and Jagirdars).

- 40. Results of suits decided (Statement No. 5).—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 20,792 or 12 per cent. were disposed of without trial; 35,827 or 20.7 per cent. were disposed of ex parte; 15,945 or 9.2 per cent. on admission of claim; 41,722 or 24 per cent. by compromise; 57,366 or 33.1 per cent. after full trial; 898 or .5 per cent. on reference to arbitration and 663 or .4 per cent. by transfer. Of the 57,366 decided after full trial, 52,393 or 90.1 per cent. resulted in favour of the plaintiffs and 4,973 or 8.6 per cent. in favour of the defendants.
- 41. Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jagirdars (Statement No. 5).— The unpaid Tribunals disposed of 61 original suits; in 1931 the figure was 67.
- 42. Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges (Statement No. 5).—The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 145,575, an increase of 887 over the figure of the previous year. The increase is chiefly in the number of cases decided under the Small Cause Court procedure. The figures of suits decided under the Small Cause Court procedure show an aggregate increase of 5,817 suits. The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 70,116 and under the Small Cause Court procedure, 75,459.
- 43. Suits disposed of by Small Cause Court Judges (Statement No. 5).—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 12,647 suits, a decrease of 1,647 on the total of the previous year's disposals.
- 44. Suits disposed of by District and Assistant Judges (Statement No. 5).—The District Courts disposed of 567 original suits, 12 more than in 1931.
- 45. Suits disposed of by the Village Munsiffs (Statement No. 5).— The Village Munsiffs disposed of 14,363 suits, showing a decrease of 189 suits over the figure of the previous year.
- 46. Pending suits (Statement No. 5).—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 73,295 as against 66,258 in the previous year.

(Statement No. 14).—Of the pending cases, 6,480 had been pending for more than a year; this shows a decrease of 271 on the figure of the previous year. Of the suits pending over a year, 1 was in the Court of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, 232 in the Courts of the Village Munsiffs, 6,191 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges; 15 in Small Cause Courts and 41 in the District Courts, the figures showing as compared with those of the previous year, a decrease of 4, 25, 201, 14 and 27 suits respectively in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges, Small Cause Courts and the District Courts.

The number of suits pending over a year was the largest in Poona (1,041) followed by Satara (949), Belgaum (898), Ahmedabad (581), Surat (558), Kaira (322), Dharwar (298), Thana (298), East Khandesh (286), Broach and Panch Mahals (241) and Ahmednagar (205). The figures for the remaining districts are less than 200.

47. The average duration in days of suits decided in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and the District Courts is as shown in the tabular statement given below:—

48. Execution Proceedings (Statement No. 13).—There were 88,091 applications for execution pending from the previous year and 181,149 new applications were filed during the year. Out of the total number of applications before the Courts, 167,731 applications were disposed of during the year and 101,509 remained pending at its close. The disposals of the applications were as under:—

380 cases disposed of by transfer;

28,773 cases disposed of wherein realization was complete;

52,060 cases disposed of wherein realization was partial;

86,518 cases disposed of as wholly infructuous.

The total amount realised in Courts other than Small Cause Courts was Rs. $86,49,534-5-4\frac{1}{2}$.

Debtors were imprisoned in 521 cases, moveable property sold in 1,056 and immoveable property in 5,470.

49. Miscellaneous cases (Statement No. 6).—The number of miscellaneous institutions and disposals fell from 13,544 to 13,415 and from 13,776 to 13,251, respectively, while that of pending suits rose from 6,686

to 6,948. Of the 13,251 miscellaneous cases disposed of, 2,195 were disposed of without trial; 2,505 were disposed of ex parte; 1,055 on admission of claim; 361 by compromise; 7,096 after full trial; 1 on reference to arbitration and 38 by transfer. Of the 7,096 decided after full trial, 4,699 or 66.2 per cent. were decided in favour of the plaintiffs.

50. The average duration in days of miscellaneous cases decided in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and the District Courts is as shown in the tabular statement given below:—

III. BOMBAY SMALL CAUSE COURT.

51. (Statements Nos. 3 and 4).—The figures of suits instituted, disposed of and pending at the close of the year 1932 in the Presidency Small Cause Court were 33,583, 32,993 and 5,848 respectively. The figures of the institutions and disposals show a decrease of 5,361 and 6,685, respectively, when compared with the figures of the previous year, while the figures of suits pending at the close of the year show an increase of 590 over those of the previous year.

(Statement No. 4).—There was a decrease in the institutions of suits not exceeding Rs. 10, 50, 100, 500, 1,000 and also in the case of suits above Rs. 1,000 but not exceeding Rs. 2,000.

The total value of the litigation showed a decrease for the year under report. The figure was Rs. 66,19,554-15-10 as against Rs. 75,51,797-11-2 in the preceding year.

52. Mode of disposal.—Of the 32,993 suits disposed of, 671 were decided without trial; 11,053 were decided ex parte; 11,990 on admission of claim; 6,230 by compromise; 3,019 after full trial and 30 on reference to arbitration.

- 53. The average duration in days of suits disposed of without trial was 25, of those decided ex parte, 28; of those decided on admission of claim, 34; of those decided by compromise, 36; of those decided after full trial, 51; and of those decided on reference to arbitration, 53.
- 54. Execution of decrees (Statement No. 13).—Of the 28,698 applications for the execution of decrees that were before the Courts during the year (including 3,513 pending from the previous year), 22,943 were disposed of and 5,755 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the latter figure, 1,403 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of, 8,812 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted; 13,257 were returned as wholly infructuous and 874 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realised was Rs. 13,40,226-2-9 as compared with Rs. 15,36,635-14-9 in the previous year.

- 55. Coercive process (Statement No. 13).—In order to enforce the execution of decrees, imprisonment was ordered in 314 cases and sale of moveables in 703. Both these figures show a decrease of 155 and 6 over the figures of the previous year.
- 56. Applications to the Full Court (Statement No. 14).—There were 328 applications for disposal before the Full Court during the year of which 317 were disposed of and 11 remained pending at the close of the year.

GENERAL.

57. As compared with the figures of 1931, the number of suits instituted and disposed of in the Subordinate Judges' Courts in 1932 shows an increase of 9,776 and 887 respectively, the number of regular suits disposed of being less by 4,930 and that under Small Cause Court jurisdiction being more by 5,817. With the number of revived suits and those pending at the close of the year, the total number of suits pending shows an increase from 58,570 to 65,170 while the number of suits pending over a year shows a decrease from 6,392 to 6,191.

The number of appeals disposed of by the District Courts decreased by 461. The First Class Subordinate Judges exercising appellate powers disposed of 221 appeals as against 274 in 1931. The total number of appeals pending in the District Courts decreased from 4,538 to 4,194.

The figures of suits instituted and disposed of on the Original Side showed a decrease of 475 and 341 respectively, on the figures of the previous year. The number of pending suits decreased from 5,718 to 5,029.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court the total number of institutions showed a decrease of 96, and the total number of disposals showed an increase of 248 over the figures of the previous year. The total arrears of appeals on the Appellate Side fell from 3,338 to 3,167.

There were five Courts sitting on the Appellate Side from 20th January to 4th March 1932 and 7 Judges were sitting during that period. There were 2 Division Benches and 3 Judges sat singly. This may be said

to be an unusual feature as normally there are only 3 Courts on the Appellate Side. The five Courts on the Appellate Side were necessary in view of the large arrears of civil work, but in view of the fact that there are only 10 permanent Judges and one Additional Judge in this High Court it was not possible to spare as many as 7 Judges for the Appellate Side for a very long time. The disposal of civil work during the said period was as follows:—57 appeals from Original Decrees, 390 appeals from Appellate Decrees, 25 appeals from Orders, I appeal under the Letters Patent, 2 Review Petitions, 58 Civil Revision Applications and 7 Civil References.

Another new feature to be noticed in the present report is the changes introduced in annual statements Nos. 5 to 8 in accordance with the instructions issued by the Government of India. The main changes are the following. The terms "contested" and "uncontested" in reference to civil cases have been eliminated with the result that the average duration of such cases (both in respect of suits and appeals) which was shown in the previous reports, has not been shown in this report. A new column headed "Otherwise received" has been added to all the four statements above referred to, which includes also the cases received in a manner not specially provided for by any column of the said statements. Similarly a new sub-head "By transfer" has been added to all the four statements. In the revised statements Nos. 5 and 6 under the heading "Number of suits disposed of" seven different sub-heads are shown instead of four as in the old statements. the average duration being shown against the number disposed of under each sub-head. The sub-head "Without trial" gives further particulars such as "Cases dismissed under Order IX, rules 3 and 8" and "otherwise". In statements Nos. 7 and 8 the average duration of appeals disposed of is now shown under different headings whereas in the previous reports it was shown in respect of contested and uncontested appeals only.

- 58. Inspection.—During the year under report the District Judges inspected the following Courts of Subordinate Judges: Newasa and Kopargaon in the Ahmednagar District; Athni in the Belgaum District; Bagalkot and Muddebihal in the Bijapur District; Gadag in the Dharwar District; Chalisgaon and Erandol in the East Khandesh District; Nandurbar and Shirpur in the West Khandesh District; Pimpalgaon and Sinnar in the Nasik District; Baramati and Khed in the Poona District; Karad and Vita in the Satara District; Madha and Pandharpur in the Sholapur District; and Bulsar in the Surat District.
- 59. Judicial Conference.—No Judicial Conference was held during the year under report.
- 60. Receipts and Charges of the High Court.—For the year 1932, the total receipts as shown in paragraphs 15 and 28 were Rs. 20,71,879-7-1 on the Original Side and Rs. 1,79,360-6-8 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 22,51,239-13-9. The total charges as shown in the same paragraphs were Rs. 7,72,565-8-7 on the Original Side and Rs. 4,05,295-1-3 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of

Rs. 11,77,860-9-10. The difference between these two aggregates shows an excess of receipts over expenditure of Rs. 10,73,379-3-11. This excess includes the Probate and Administration Duty (the cost of collecting which is borne by the High Court) but is exclusive of the excess of receipts over expenditure shown on the working of the office of the Official Assignee, which amounted for the year 1932 to a further sum of Rs. 39,040-5-11. In the expenditure no sum is charged for rent or upkeep of the High Court Buildings and other matters which would have to be brought into account in ascertaining a net profit. On the other hand no allowance is made for the Criminal work which occupies much judicial time and brings in no revenue, and which is naturally not productive of any revenue.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1932.

1. Judicial Staff—(Statement No. 1).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Presidency on the 31st December 1932 and available for criminal cases consisted of 10 permanent and 1 temporary High Court Judges; 17 Sessions Judges; 6 Additional Sessions Judges; 2 Assistant Sessions Judges; 337 First Class Magistrates; 396 Second Class Magistrates; 225 Third Class Magistrates; 122 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889; and 228 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act IX of 1920.

In addition to the above, there were 19,150 Police Patils in the Presidency exercising powers under section 14 of the Village Police Act VIII of 1867, of whom 413 were invested with powers under section 15 of that Act.

There were also 45 Benches of Magistrates inclusive of 4 in the City of Bombay constituted from 430 Honorary Magistrates.

- 2. Offences reported—(Statement No. 11).—There were 2,24,934 criminal offences reported during the year, an increase of 3,108 over the figures of 1931. In the City of Bombay and in the districts of Belgaum, Bijapur, Broach and West Khandesh, there was a decrease in the number of offences reported during the year while there was an increase in the remaining districts. The increase was most noticeable in the districts of Poona, Sholapur, Ahmednagar, Thana and Ahmedabad. Of the total number of offences reported 49,771 were under the Indian Penal Code and 1,75,163 under Special and Local Laws.
- 3. Complaints dismissed (Section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and complainants fined (Section 250, Criminal Procedure Code)—(Statement No. 11).—The number of complaints dismissed under section 203 was 5,176 and the number of complainants fined under section 250 was 316.
- 4. Cases found to be true.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 2,18,403 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial excluding those withdrawn and including those pending from the previous year was 2,21,570. The number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show an increase of 3,209 and 9,136 respectively on the figures of 1931.
- 5. Murders reported as true.—Out of the 917 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 237 were murders of which 146 ended in conviction. The corresponding figures for 1931 were 886, 232 and 147. The 237 murders may be classified as under:—

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

I. PRESIDENCY MAGISTRATES' COURTS.

6. Cases in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts-(Statement No. 11) .-The number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates was 16,801 and in those of the Honorary Presidency Magistrates 82,178 making a total of 98,979. This number is less by 3,810 than that of 1931 when the corresponding figures were 19,791 and 82,998 making a total of 1,02,789. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 90,972 or 2,992 less than that in 1931, so too the number of cases under the Indian Penal Code was 8,007 or 818 less than that in 1931. The decrease under the former head was most marked in offences under the City of Bombay Municipal Act which fell from 12,109 to 8,647 and under the City of Bombay Police Act which fell from 48,353 to 47,319. The number of offences under the Motor Vehicles Act fell from 3,557 to 2,852, under the Public Conveyance Act from 6.697 to 6.450 and under the Abkari Act from 285 to 66. On the other hand there was a noticeable increase in offences under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act which rose from 18,874 to 20,424 and under the Prevention of Gambling Act from 1.979 to 2.828. The offences under the Criminal Law Amendment Act rose from 191 to 420, under the Railways Act from 1,044 to 1,272 and under the Prostitution Act from 102 to 158. As regards the offences under the Indian Penal Code there was a noticeable decrease in offences under Hurt which fell from 1,797 to 700 and under Theft which fell from 1,672 to 1,520. The offences under Criminal Breach of Trust fell from 818 to 723, under Cheating from 634 to 516, under Wrongful Restraint and Wrongful Confinement from 129 to 91 and under Criminal Intimidation and Annoyance from 553 to 517. On the other hand there was a noticeable increase in offences under Public Tranquillity which rose from 85 to 451 and under Contempt of Lawful Authority which rose from 19 to 293. The offences under Criminal Trespass rose from 372 to 416, under Criminal Force and Assault from 1,440 to 1,469 and under Criminal Misappropriation of Property from 123 to 157.

(Statements Nos. 2 and 9).—During the year 96,370 regular and 86 miscellaneous cases were disposed of and 2,609 regular cases were pending at the close of the year.

7. Results of Trials—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Magistrates was 1,12,369. Of the persons tried, 10,231 were acquitted or discharged; 98,980 were convicted; 189 were committed to the High Court; 1 died during the trial; 17 were transferred to other provinces; 6 were sent to the Military Authorities and 2,945 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Penal Code, 5,713 were convicted and 7,188

were acquitted. The results of the trials before each of the three classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

8. Punishment—(Statement No. 12).—Of the persons convicted 18,133 were punished with imprisonment, 78,492 with fine and 6 with whipping, 1,151 convicted persons were warned and discharged and 1,198 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code.

The sentences of imprisonment passed were for the following terms:-

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 5,18,468-9-6. The total amount realised was Rs. 3,19,440-8-0 of which Rs. 20,278-8-7 were paid as compensation to complainants.

II. Magistrates Including Village Officers and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards.

9. Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these Tribunals was 1,93,625. Of these the cases of 1,372 were committed or referred to the Sessiens and of the remaining 1,92,253 the cases of 1,76,419 were finally disposed of by the various Tribunals. Of the total 1,76,419, 97,494 or 55·2 per cent. were convicted and 78,386 or 44·4 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, 238 persons died, 144 escaped during their trials and 157 were transferred.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before Magistrates and Village Officers at the close of the year was 15,834 as compared with 15,369 in 1931.

The general results of trials before Magistrates of each class are as shown below:—

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 2,162 were for terms not exceeding 15 days; 10,901 for terms not exceeding 6 months; 3,047 for terms not exceeding 2 years and 55 for terms above 2 years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 183 persons; in 1931 the figure was 118.

The amounts of fines imposed and realised during the year were Rs. 13,17,768-6-8 and Rs. 9,32,452-3-3 respectively. A total sum of Rs. 28,110-14-3 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to the above, 316 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Code of Criminal Procedure as against 248 last year.

III. COURTS OF SESSIONS.

- 11. Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).—There were 2,627 persons or 444 less than in 1931 under trial. The cases of 2,281 persons were decided while those of 346 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the 2,281 persons tried, 1,256 or 55 per cent. were convicted; 962 or 42·2 per cent. were acquitted or discharged; the cases of 58 persons were referred to the High Court under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure; 4 persons died and 1 escaped during trial.
- 12. Punishment—(Statement No. 12).—The following sentences and orders were passed by the Courts of Sessions:—

Fines to the amount of Rs. 41,120 were imposed by the Courts of Sessions as compared with Rs. 78,105 in the preceding year. The

total realisation amounted to Rs. 26,757-8-3 as compared with Rs. 21,711-5-3 in 1931 and the total amount of fines paid as compensation was Rs. 431 as against Rs. 1,385-2-0 in 1931.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appellate Courts Subordinate to the High Court.

I. APPEALS.

- 13. (Statement No. 2).—The number of appeals decided during the year was 2,953 as against 3,484 in the preceding year, a decrease of 531.
- 14. Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 10).—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 2,729. Of these, the appeals of 394 were summarily dismissed and sentences on 1,139 were confirmed after admission making a total of 1,533 wholly unsuccessful appellants or 56·1 per cent. Of the remainder, 448 appellants or 16·4 per cent. obtained a modification of the sentences passed on them and 713 or 26·1 per cent. an annulment. The cases of 35 appellants were otherwise disposed of. As compared with 1931, the results were a little more favourable to the appellants.
- 15. Sessions Courts—(Statement No. 10).—During the year the number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Sessions was 2,345. The appeals of 615 persons (or 26.2 per cent.) were summarily dismissed; 742 appellants whose appeals were admitted were altogether unsuccessful; 390 obtained an alteration of sentences; 568 were acquitted; the cases of 30 appellants were otherwise disposed of. The proportions of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders and completely successful were 57.8, 16.6 and 24.2 respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 42.8, 22.5 and 32.8 per cent. respectively. If admitted appeals only are considered, these results were on the whole a little more favourable to appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants during the year being 55.3 as against 53.4 in 1931.

II. SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

- 16. Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 10).—The cases of 294 accused persons who applied for revision or against whom applications were made by complainants came before the District Magistrates for revision. The number was less by 9 than in 1931. Of the total applications, those of 208 were rejected and those of 86 were otherwise disposed of.
- 17. Sessions Courts—(Statement No. 10).—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 1,056 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Sessions during the year. The number was more by 90 than in 1931. Applications of 807 persons were rejected and those of 249 were otherwise disposed of.

HIGH COURT.

I. ORIGINAL JURISDICTION (HIGH COURT SESSIONS).

18. Commitments to the High Court—(Statement No. 9).—One hundred and fifty-two cases in all were brought to trial at the High Court Sessions during the year including 19 cases pending at the end of the year 1931. Of these 145 cases were decided and 7 remained pending at the end of the year. These 145 cases occupied in all 157 days. This may be compared with 120 cases occupying 166 days in 1931.

Altogether 222 persons were tried of whom 147 were convicted and 75 were acquitted.

The fines imposed during the year amounted to Rs. 9,875 of which Rs. 125 were imposed upon jurors for their non-attendance and fines realised during the year were Rs. 2,875 of which Rs. 125 were realised from the jurors.

II. APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

- 20. (Statement No. 10).—Seventy-six appeals were pending before the High Court at the opening of the year from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year 723 appeals were preferred and 703 decided leaving 96 at its close. The numbers of appeals preterred and decided are less by 84 and 99, respectively, than those of the preceding year whereas the number of appeals pending is more by 20 than that of the preceding year. Of the appeals preferred against sentences, 578 were from Courts of Sessions, 128 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates whereas 17 were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittal.
- 21. Results of appeals.—Five hundred and sixty appeals against sentences passed by Courts of Sessions were decided. The sentences were upheld in 467 cases, reversed in 43 and modified in 44. Two appeals were returned for presentation to the proper Courts; 1 was remanded for re-trial and 3 related to sanction matters.

One hundred and twenty-eight appeals against sentences by Presidency Magistrates were decided. The sentences were upheld in 111 cases, reversed in 13 and modified in 3. One related to sanction matter, The results of appeals as affecting individual appellants were as follows:—

The appeals of 487 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals the sentences of 191 appellants were confirmed, those of 70 altered, those of 84 reversed; 2 persons were asked to approach the proper Courts; 1 was ordered to be re-tried and 1 died during the pendency of the appeal.

In appeals against acquittal orders the orders were confirmed in the case of 5 persons and set aside in the case of 11. Two persons were

ordered to be re-tried.

Fifteen appeals by the Local Government against the orders of acquittal involving 18 accused were disposed of by the High Court during the year. In 10 cases involving 11 accused the High Court set aside the orders of acquittal in respect of all and convicted them. In 2 appeals involving 2 accused the High Court set aside the orders of acquittal and ordered them to be re-tried. In 3 appeals involving 5 accused the High Court upheld the orders of acquittal and dismissed them.

III. SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

- 22. References under section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.—One reference was pending in the High Court at the beginning of the year and 23 were submitted to it during the year. Of these 19 were decided and 5 remained pending at the close of the year. Out of the 19 cases decided involving 38 accused therein, the High Court convicted 10 accused and acquitted the remaining 28. The verdict of the jury was accepted in 9 cases and set aside in 10.
- 23. References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.—Thirty references under this section were submitted to the High Court during the year for the confirmation of death sentences and 2 were pending at the opening. Twenty-seven cases involving 36 accused were decided during the year. The sentence of death was confirmed in the case of 26 persons and commuted to that of transportation for life in the case of 8. The remaining 2 persons were acquitted.

During the year under report, 30 persons were executed in the Presidency.

24. Revision.—One hundred and ten cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 24 were pending at the opening of the year. Of these, 121 were decided during the year and 13 remained pending at its close. The number reported was less by 36 than in 1931. In 27 cases the orders sent up for revision were not interferred with; in 15 cases they were enhanced. Sentences were reduced or altered in 40 cases and reversed in 28 cases. In 10 cases new trials were ordered and in the remaining one case proceedings were quashed.

Orders were passed under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in 336 cases—an increase of 12 on the figures of the previous year. Of

these, 317 came before the High Court on application and 19 were taken up by the High Court on review of the Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion. Of the 317 applications for the issue of Rule, 202 were rejected; of the 113 rules issued, 53 were finally discharged, 47 were made absolute in their entirety, in 13 the orders complained of were modified and the remaining 2 were withdrawn.

In 4 out of 19 cases taken up by the High Court suo motu the orders passed by the lower Courts were not disturbed; in 1 the sentence was enhanced; in 12 the sentences were reduced and in the remaining 2 they were set aside.

- 25. Applications for transfer.—Sixty-nine applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases from one Court or district to another were received during the year, and 7 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of these, 72 were decided during the year and 4 remained pending. Forty-nine were summarily rejected and in 2 transfers were granted without the issue of a rule. In the 14 applications in which rules were issued, transfers were granted in 6 and refused in 8. Seven applications were allowed to be withdrawn.
- 26. Miscellaneous Applications.—Seven applications for bail, 12 for maintenance, 3 for compensation, 14 for disposal of property, 7 for stay of proceedings, 11 for sanction, 2 for Habeas Corpus and 11 for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by the High Court during the year.
