REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF EOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1933.

- 1. This report and the statements appended to it relate to the Presidency proper and not to Sind.
- 2. Judicial Staff (Statement No. 1).—The Judicial staff employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1933 and available for civil cases consisted of 10 permanent High Court Judges and 1 temporary Additional Judge; 17 District Judges; 11 Assistant Judges (including 3 Assistant Judges under training); a Chief Judge and 5 Judges of the Presidency Small Cause Court; 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges; 22 First Class Subordinate Judges and 88 Second Class Subordinate Judges. In addition, the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Ahmedabad and Poona exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also 3 Inamdars and Jagirdars exercising the powers of a Subordinate Judge under Regulation XIII of 1830 and 91 Village Munsiffs appointed under the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, XVII of 1879.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE.

The Honourable Sir John W. F. Beaumont, Knight, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 18th June 1933 and from 21st July to 31st December 1933. His Lordship was on leave from 19th June to 20th July 1933. During the interval the Honourable Mr. Justice W. T. W. Baker, I.C.S., officiated as Chief Justice.

Puisne Judges.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Mirza Ali Akbar Khan, from 1st January to 18th June 1933 and from 17th October to 31st December 1933. His Lordship was on leave from 19th June to 16th October 1933.

The Honourable Mr. Justice N. J. Wadia, I.C.S., acted as a Puisne Judge from 19th June to 16th October 1933. His Lordship was a Puisne Judge from 6th December 1933 to the end of the year.

The Honourable Mr. Justice H. V. Divatia acted as an Additional Judge from 19th June to 31st December 1933.

The Honourable Mr. Justice P. B. Shingne acted as a Puisne Judge from 27th March to 22nd April 1933 and again from 19th June to 17th October 1933.

The Honourable Mr. Justice F. B. Tyabji acted as a Puisne Judge from 19th June to 24th August 1933.

HIGH COURT.

I. ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

- 3. Original Suits for disposal (Statement No. 3).—The number of civil suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of the year 1932 was 2,920 including 59 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number instituted during the year 1933 was 1,954 including 13 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 177 (including 3 suits received from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) restored during the year. The above totals 2,920, 1,954, and 177 make an aggregate of 5,051 for disposal in 1933 as against 5,321 in 1932.
- 4. Original Suits disposed of (Statement No. 5).—The number of suits decided was 2,453 including 21 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 2,598 including 54 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. This number is less by 322 than the corresponding number at the end of the previous year. Of these 2,598, 1,931 were ripe for hearing and in arrear, a decrease of 77 suits over the figure of the previous year. There were 1,655 suits whose hearing had been pending for over one year. This is a decrease of 305 suits on the figures of the previous year.

6. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1932 was 12. The number instituted during the year 1933 was 8. Of these 16 were decided and 4 remained pending at the close of the year. The former were all decided after full trial, the average duration being 344 days.

There were 2 suits pending over one year at the close of the year.

- 7. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty Jurisdiction.—One suit was pending at the close of the year 1932. Two were instituted during the year under report. None was disposed of during the year. There was I suit pending over one year at the close of the year.
- 8. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial Jurisdiction.—There were 5 suits pending at the end of the year 1932; and the number instituted during 1933 was 11. Of these, 11 were decided and 5 remained pending at the close of the year 1933. There was no suit pending over one year at the end of the year.

Of the suits decided:-

- 5 were decreed ex parte, the average duration being 69 days,
- 1 was compromised, the duration being 32 days.
- 5 were decreed after full trial, the average duration being 126 days.

9. Insolvency Petitions.—The number of petitions pending at the end of the year 1932 was 2,091 and the number instituted during the year 1933 was 815, making a total of 2,906 for disposal in 1933. Of these, 943 were decided and 1,963 remained pending at the close of the year 1933. There were 1,200 petitions pending over one year at the close of the year 1933.

Of the petitions decided :-

864 were decided ex parte, average duration being 551 days.

79 were decided after full trial, average duration being 747 days.

10. Appeals to the Privy Council.—Six appeals were pending from the previous year and 3 were admitted during the year, making a total of 9 for disposal in the year 1933.

Of the above 9 appeals:—

- 2 were allowed by the Privy Council and the High Court Decrees appealed from were set aside.
- 2 were decided by the Privy Council who confirmed the Decrees of the Appeal Court.
- 2 were pending before the Privy Council in England (including 1 despatched during the year).
- 3 were pending in the Bombay High Court.

11. References to take accounts etc.—The number of references to take accounts, to make enquiries as to estates to be administered or partitioned, as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on questions of title, on questions affecting minors in proposed terms of settlement, to settle conveyances and in like matters, pending at the commencement of the year 1933 was 125, 205 references were filed in 1933 in the office of the Commissioner for taking accounts, making a total of 330 for disposal. The number of references disposed of by him during the year 1933 was 197.

In addition to the above, during the year the Commissioner took and passed accounts of 255 Receivers and 28 Liquidators and passed 26 accounts for depositing moneys on behalf of minors with the Accountant General, filed under High Court Rule 439. He settled

besides 12 warrants for sale of immoveable properties attached, filed under High Court Rule 501 and 23 conveyances.

- 12. Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration etc.—During the year 445 petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, 48 Pauper petitions for leave to sue or defend in forma pauperis, 48 petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 23 petitions under the Indian Trusts Act, 1 reference under the Land Acquisition Act and 112 petitions under the Guardians and Wards, Lunacy and Arbitration Acts etc., making in all a total of 677 were filed for disposal.
- 13. Awards under the Indian Arbitration Act, 1899.—The number of awards filed during the year was 94.
- 14. Applications for Execution of Decrees etc.—The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 1,070, and the number of applications filed during the year was 1,802, making a total of 2,872 for disposal. Of these, 381 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts, in 185 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 197 satisfaction was obtained in part and 1,052 were wholly infructuous making a total of 1,815 applications disposed of and 1,057 applications remained pending at the close of the year.

Number of Darkhasts (Decrees or Orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 62.

Number of Decrees received from other Courts for execution during the year was 104.

Appeals from the High Court Decrees under section 15 of the Letters Patent.

18. (Statement No. 7).—Thirty-one appeals from decrees on the Original Side of the High Court were filed during the year and 24 were

pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 55, 35 were decided and 20 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was less by 5 than in 1932. These 35 appeals were decided as under:—

25. Results of appeals (Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—Out of the 384 appeals from original decrees decided, 47 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Out of the remaining 337, the decrees of the lower Courts were confirmed in 238, modified in 39, reversed in 57 and 3 cases were remanded. Of the 832 appeals from appellate decrees decided, 386 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 446 the decrees of the lower Courts were confirmed in 291, modified in 63, reversed in 78 and the remaining 14 appeals were remanded.

(Statement No. 8).—Of the 75 appeals from orders decided, 24 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 51, the orders of the lower Courts were affirmed in 28, modified in 6, reversed in 15 and 2 appeals were remanded.

During the year under report, 5 appeals under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, were filed and 3 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of these 8 appeals, 3 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 5, the orders of the lower Courts were confirmed in 3 and reversed in 1. One appeal remained pending at the close of the year.

CIVIL COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

- 29. Appeals instituted (Statement No. 7).—4,323 appeals were instituted in 1933 showing a decrease of 202 as compared with the previous year. The number of appeals instituted was greater in 8 districts and smaller in 10 districts. There was noticeable increase in Poona (70). In the remaining 7 districts the variations were less than 50. The decrease on the other hand was noticeable in Satara (179), Dharwar (73) and East Khandesh (68). The remaining 7 districts show decreases below 50.
- 30. Appeals disposed of (Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—4,369 appeals were disposed of during the year including 125 by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate powers. These two figures are respectively smaller by 520 and 96 than the corresponding figures of the previous year. There was an increase in the disposals in 6 districts, the greatest being in Kaira (147), followed by Thana (80). In the remaining 4 districts the increase was below 50. On the other hand there was a decrease in the disposals in 11 districts, the greatest being in Bijapur (138) followed by Ahmednagar (136), Dharwar (102), Ahmedabad (85), Broach and Panch Mahals (76), Kanara (75), Satara (62) and West Khandesh (58). In the remaining 3 districts the decrease was less than 50. One district (Kolaba) showed no change.
- 31. Appeals pending (Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—There were 4,157 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being less by 37 than at the end of 1932.

(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—The number of appeals pending for more than a year rose from 837 to 1,019.

32. Results of appeals (Statement No. 7).—The results of decisions of appeals in the lower Courts during the year were as follows:—

In 755 cases or 17.3 per cent. of the whole, the appeals were either summarily dismissed or not prosecuted; in 2,260 or 51.7 per cent. the judgments of the lower Courts were affirmed; in 520 or 11.9 per cent. they were modified; in 613 or 14 per cent. they were reversed and in 218 or 5 per cent. the appeals were remanded. The remaining 3 appeals were disposed of by transfer.

- 33. The average duration of appeals in the lower Appellate Courts which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 121 days while that of the appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed and remanded was 358 days.
- 34. Miscellaneous appeals (Statement No. 8).—514 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 192 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 706, 498 were disposed of during the year and 208 remained pending at its close. The number of pending appeals was more by 16 than in the previous year.
- 35. The average duration of miscellaneous appeals in the lower Appellate Courts which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 94 days whereas that in appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed and remanded was 193 days.

CIVIL COURTS IN THE MOFUSSIL SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

36. Changes in jurisdiction.—As a measure to reduce public expenditure the following change in jurisdiction was effected during the year under report:—

With effect from 2nd October 1933 the linked Subordinate Courts of Sangola and Malsiras in the Sholapur district were abolished, and the talukas of Sangola and Malsiras were included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Pandharpur in that district (vide Government Notification, Home Department, No. 1427/3, dated 2nd September 1933).

37. Original suits instituted (Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1933 was 1,73,538, a decrease of 3,954 over the figure of the previous year.

The decrease occurred in money suits to the extent of 2·1 per cent. while it was 2·7 per cent. in title and other suits, the number of money suits being 1,47,208 as against 1,50,407 in 1932 and that of title and other suits being 26,330 as against 27,085 in 1932.

(Statement No. 4).—The total value of suits instituted in 1933 amounted to Rs. 5,32,23,969, a decrease of Rs. 3,45,364 on the total for 1932.

38. Local distribution (Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1933 showed an increase in 8 districts and a decrease in 10 districts. There was an appreciable increase in East Khandesh (1,215) followed by Dharwar (716). In the remaining 6 districts the increase was below 500. The decrease on the other hand was noticeable in 5 districts being 1,866 in Poona followed by Broach and Panch Mahals (1,678), Kaira (1,432), Surat (980) and Ahmednagar (723). The decrease in the other 5 districts was below 500.

(Statement No. 3).—The largest number of suits instituted during the year was in East Khandesh (19,830). In no other district except West

Khandesh, Poona, Nasik, Kaira and Ahmedabad did institutions exceed 10,000. Institutions ranged between 5,000 to 10,000 in Thana, Sholapur, Dharwar, Broach and Panch Mahals, Satara, Ahmednagar, Belgaum, Bijapur, Ratnagiri and Surat. Kolaba showed 3,518 suits as instituted while the lowest figure 3,415 came to the share of Kanara.

39. Number of suits disposed of (Statement No. 5).—In addition to 1,73,538 suits instituted during the year and 73,225 suits pending from the previous year, 2,631 suits were revived or received on remand or review or by transfer, making a total of 2,49,394 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of during the year was 1,75,017 an increase of 1,804 over the figure of the previous year.

Of the total number of suits decided during the year, viz., 1,75,017, Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals (that is Courts of Subordinate Judges) disposed of 1,48,403 suits, Small Cause Courts 11,967, District Courts 590, Village Munsiffs' Courts 14,000 and the remaining 57 suits were disposed of by Unpaid Tribunals (that is Inamdars and Jagirdars).

- 40. Results of suits decided (Statement No. 5).—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 19,894 or 11.4 per cent., were disposed of without trial, 37,687 or 21.5 per cent. were disposed of ex parte, 17,444 or 10 per cent., on admission of claims, 43,326 or 24.7 per cent., by compromise, 55,355 or 31.6 per cent., after full trial, 731 or .4 per cent., on reference to arbitration and 580 or .3 per cent., by transfer. Of the 55,355 decided after full trial, 50,469 or 91.2 per cent. resulted in favour of the plaintiffs and 4,886 or 8.8 per cent., in favour of the defendants.
- 41. Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jagirdars (Statement No. 5).—The Unpaid Tribunals disposed of 57 original suits; in 1932 the figure was 61.
- 42. Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges (Statement No. 5).—The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 1,48,403, an increase of 2,828 over the figure of the previous year. The increase is chiefly in the number of cases decided under the Small Cause Court procedure, which increased by 2,509. The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 70,435 and under the Small Cause Court procedure, 77,968.
- 43. Suits disposed of by Small Cause Court Judges (Statement No. 5).—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 11,967 suits, a decrease of 680 on the total of the previous year's disposals.
- 44. Suits disposed of by District and Assistant Judges (Statement No. 5).—The District Courts disposed of 590 original suits, that is, 23 more than in 1932.
- 45. Suits disposed by Village Munsiffs (Statement No. 5).—The Village Munsiffs disposed of 14,000 suits, showing a decrease of 363 over the figure of the previous year.
- 46. Pending suits (Statement No. 5).—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 74,377 as against 73,225 in the previous year.

(Statements Nos. 5 and 14).—Of the pending cases, 8,078 had been pending for more than a year; this shows an increase of 1,598 on the figure of the previous year. Of the suits pending over a year, 11 were in the Courts of Inamdars and Jagirdars, 259 in the Courts of the Village Munsiffs, 7,728 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges; 47 in Small Cause Courts and 33 in the District Courts, the figures showing as compared with those of the previous year an increase of 10, 27, 1,537, and 32 suits respectively in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges and Small Cause Courts; and a decrease of 8 in the District Courts.

The number of suits pending over a year was the largest in Satara (1,237) followed by Poona (1,059), Ahmedabad (1,046), Belgaum (777), Surat (606), Ahmedagar (555), Dharwar (528), East Khandesh (474), Kaira (432), Sholapur (320), Thana (248) and Nasik (245). The figures for the remaining districts are less than 200.

47. The average duration in days of suits decided in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and in the District Courts is as shown in the tabular statement given below:—

- 49. Miscellaneous cases (Statement No. 6).—The number of institutions and disposals of miscellaneous cases fell from 13,415 to 13,339 and from 13,251 to 13,126 respectively, while that of pending cases rose from 6,948 to 7,246. Of the 13,126 miscellaneous cases disposed of, 2,336 were disposed of without trial, 2,284 were disposed of ex parte, 1,042 on admission of claims, 301 by compromise, 7,124 after full trial, 11 on reference to arbitration and 28 by transfer. Of the 7,124 cases decided after full trial, 4,805 or 67.4 per cent. were decided in favour of the plaintiffs.

III. BOMBAY SMALL CAUSE COURT.

51. (Statements Nos. 3 and 4).—The figures of suits instituted, disposed of and pending at the close of the year 1933 in the Presidency Small Cause Court were 35,086, 35,312 and 5,622 respectively. The figures of institutions and disposals show an increase of 1,503 and 2,312 respectively when compared with the figures of the previous year, while the figures of suits pending at the close of the year show a decrease of 226 over those of the previous year.

(Statement No. 4).—There was an increase in the institutions of suits under all the heads. The total value of litigation also showed an increase for the year under report. The figure was Rs. 67,46,735-10-0 as against Rs. 66,19,554-15-10 in the preceding year.

- 52. Mode of disposal (Statement No. 5).—Of the 35,312 suits disposed of, 512 were decided without trial, 11,699 were decided ex parte, 13,866 on admission of claims, 6,812 by compromise, 2,280 after full trial and 143 on reference to arbitration.
- 53. The average duration in days of suits disposed of without trial was 30; of those decided ex parte, 32; of those decided on admission of claims, 38; of those decided by compromise, 42; of those decided after full trial, 61 and of those decided on reference to arbitration, 59.
- 54. Execution of Decrees (Statement No. 13).—Of the 31,568 applications for the execution of decrees that were before the Court during the year (including 5,755 pending from the previous year), 27,163 were disposed of and 4,405 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the last figure 1,091 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of, 11,079 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted; 15,270 were returned as wholly infructuous and 814 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realised was Rs. 13,14,755-2-11 as compared with Rs. 13,40,226-2-9 in the previous year.

- 55. Coercive Process (Statement No. 13).—In order to enforce the execution of decrees, imprisonment was ordered in 535 cases and sale of moveables in 806. Both these figures show an increase of 221 and 103 over the figures of the previous year.
- 56. Applications to the Full Court (Statement No. 14).—There were 357 applications for disposal before the Full Court during the year of which 324 were disposed of and 33 remained pending at the close of the year.

GENERAL.

57. As compared with the figures of 1932, the number of suits instituted in the Subordinate Judges' Courts decreased by 2,268 whereas the number of suits disposed of showed an increase of 2,828; the number of regular suits disposed of was more by 319 and that under Small Cause Court jurisdiction was more by 2,509. With the number of revived suits and those pending at the end of the last year, the total number of suits pending shows an increase from 65,170 to 66,477 and the number of suits pending over a year shows an increase from 6,191 to 7,728.

The number of appeals disposed of by the District Courts decreased by 520. The First Class Subordinate Judges exercising appellate powers disposed of 125 appeals as against 221 in 1932. The total number of appeals pending in the District Courts decreased from 4,194 to 4,157.

The figures of suits instituted and disposed of on the Original Side showed a decrease of 39 and 307 respectively on the figures of the previous year. The number of suits pending decreased from 5,029 to 4,573.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court the total number of institutions and disposals of appeals showed a decrease of 106 and 364 respectively on the figures of the previous year. The total arrears of appeals fell from 3,167 to 3,154.

- 58. Inspection.—During the year under report the District Judges inspected the following Courts of Subordinate Judges: Viramgam, Dholka, Dhandhuka and Gogha in the Ahmedabad District; Parner, Shevgaon and Karjat in the Ahmednagar District; Bijapur and Bagalkot in the Bijapur District; Dharwar, Hubli and Haveri in the Dharwar District; Umreth and Borsad in the Kaira District; Karwar, Kumta, Sirsi and Honavar in the Kanara District; Yawal and Bhusawal in the East Khandesh District; Nandurbar and Amalner in the West Khandesh District; Yeola and Satana in the Nasik District; Talegaon and Saswad in the Poona District; Deorukh, Rajapur and Malwan in the Ratnagiri District; Patan, Islampur and Dahiwadi in the Satara District; Sangola, Malsiras and Barsi in the Sholapur District; Surat and Olpad in the Surat District and Alibag in the Thana District.
- 59. Judicial Conference.—A judicial conference was held during the year under report in the East Khandesh District and all the Subordinate Judges and a majority of Pleaders in the district attended the same.
- 60. Receipts and Charges of the High Court.—For the year 1933, the total receipts as shown in paragraphs 15 and 28 were Rs. 19,53,842-11-6 on the Original Side and Rs. 1,96,298-1-0 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 21,50,140-12-6. The total charges as shown in the same paragraphs were Rs. 8,37,575-0-8 on the Original Side and Rs. 4,16,158-0-0 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 12,53,733-0-8. The difference between these two aggregates shows an excess of receipts over expenditure of Rs. 8,96,407-11-10. This excess includes the Probate and Administration Duty (the cost of collecting which is borne by the High Court) but is exclusive of the excess of receipts over expenditure of the office of the Official Assignee which amounted for the period 1st January to 26th October 1933 to Rs. 33,279-9-5. In the expenditure no sum is charged for rent or upkeep of the High Court buildings and other matters which would have to be brought into account in ascertaining a net profit. On the other hand no allowance is made for the criminal work which occupies much judicial time and brings in no revenue and which is naturally not productive of any revenue.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1933.

1. Judicial Staff (Statement No. 1).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Presidency on the 31st December 1933 and available for criminal cases consisted of 10 permanent and 1 temporary High Court Judges, 17 Sessions Judges, 7 Additional Sessions Judges, 1 Assistant Sessions Judge, 20 District Magistrates, 6 Presidency Magistrates, 367 other First Class Magistrates, 393 Second Class Magistrates, 200 Third Class Magistrates, 131 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889 and 241 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act IX of 1920.

In addition to the above there were 18,737 Police Patils in the Presidency exercising powers under section 14 of the Village Police Act VIII of 1867, of whom 416 were invested with powers under section 15 of that Act.

There were also 52 Benches of Magistrates inclusive of 4 in the City of Bombay constituted from 442 Honorary Magistrates.

- 2. Offences reported (Statement No. 11).—There were 240,436 criminal offences reported during the year, an increase of 15,522 over the figures of 1932. In the districts of Ahmedabad, Ahmedagar, Dharwar, Kaira, East Khandesh, Nasik and Thana there was a decrease in the number of offences reported during the year while there was an increase in the remaining districts. The increase was most noticeable in the City of Bombay and in the districts of Poona, Sholapur and Surat. Of the total number of offences reported, 50,049 were under the Indian Penal Code and 190,387 under Special and Local Laws.
- 3. Complaints dismissed (section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and complainants fined (section 250, Criminal Procedure Code) (Statement No. 11).—The number of complaints dismissed under section 203 was 6,036 and the number of complainants fined under section 250 was 216.
- 4. Cases found to be true.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 233,305 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial excluding those withdrawn and including those pending from the previous year was 235,950. The number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show an increase of 14,902 and 14,380 respectively on the figures of 1932.
- 5. Murders reported as true.—Out of 961 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 243 were murders of which 149 ended in conviction. The corresponding figures for 1932 were 917, 237 and 146. The 243 murders may be classified as under:—

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

I. PRESIDENCY MAGISTRATES' COURTS.

6. Cases in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts (Statement No. 11) .-The number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates was 19,938 and in those of the Honorary Presidency Magistrates 89,468 making a total of 109,406. This number is greater by 10,427 than that of 1932, when the corresponding figures were 16,801 and 82,178 making a total of 98,979. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 100,828 or 9,856 more than that in 1932 and the number of cases under the Indian Penal Code was 8.578 or 571 more than that in 1932. There was a very marked increase under the former head in offences under the City of Bombay Police Act which rose from 47,319 to 60,610. The number of offences under the Prevention of Gambling Act rose from 1,562 to 1,687, under the Prevention of Prostitution Act from 158 to 238, under the Motor Vehicles Act from 2,852 to 2.934 and the Bombay Abkari Act from 66 to 134. On the other hand there was a decrease in offences under the City of Bombay Municipal Act which fell from 8,647 to 6,340, under the Criminal Law Amendment Act from 420 to 31 and under the Press and Emergency Powers Act from 205 to 29. The offences under the Public Conveyance Act fell from 6,450 to 6,194 and under the Railways Act from 1,272 to 1,146. regards offences under the Indian Penal Code there was an enormous increase in offences of Hurt which rose from 700 to 1,905. Offences of Criminal Breach of Trust rose from 723 to 798. On the other hand there was a big decrease in offences against the Public Tranquillity which fell from 451 to 91 and offences regarding Contempt of Lawful Authority which fell from 293 to 49. Offences of using Criminal Force and Assault fell from 1,469 to 1,375 and offences of Criminal Intimidation and Annovance from 577 to 453.

(Statements Nos. 2 and 9).—During the year 105,812 regular and 78 miscellaneous cases were disposed of and 3,594 regular cases were pending at the close of the year.

7. Results of trials (Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Magistrates was 117,454. Of the persons tried, 10,120 were acquitted or discharged; 102,670 were convicted; 185 were committed to the High Court; 11 were transferred to other Provinces; 3 were sent to the Military Authorities and 4,465 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Penal Code, 3,685 were convicted and 7,534 were acquitted. The results of trials before each of the three classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

8. Punishments (Statement No. 12).—Of the persons convicted, 8,768 were punished with imprisonment, 92,146 with fine and 15 with whipping. 906 convicted persons were released after admonition and 835 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 4,85,679-14-0. The total amount realised was Rs. 3,65,739-1-0, of which Rs. 32,852-7-9 were paid as compensation to complainants.

II. Magistrates, Village Officers and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards:

9. Results of trials (Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these Tribunals was 191,085. Of these the cases of 1,041 were committed to the Sessions or referred to higher authorities and of the remaining 190,044 the cases of 174,637 were finally disposed of by the various Tribunals. Of the total 174,637, 100,963 or 57.8 per cent. were convicted and 72,611 or 41.6 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, 214 persons died, 763 escaped during trial and 86 were transferred.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before these Tribunals at the close of the year was 15,407 as compared with 15,834 in 1932.

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 2,439 were for terms not exceeding 15 days; 6,839 for terms not exceeding 6 months; 1,841 for terms not exceeding 2 years and 25 for terms above 2 years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 182 persons; in 1932 the figure was 183.

The amounts of fines imposed and realised during the year were Rs. 8,99,320-2-3 and Rs. 7,10,405-15-11 respectively. A total sum of Rs. 28,748-6-6 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to the above, 216 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Code of Criminal Procedure as against 316 last year.

III. COURTS OF SESSIONS.

- 11. Results of trials (Statement No. 9).—There were 2,305 persons or 322 less than in 1932, under trial. The cases of 2,036 persons were decided while those of 269 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the 2,036 persons tried, 1,109 or 54.5 per cent. were convicted; 884 or 43.4 per cent. were acquitted or discharged; the cases of 36 persons were referred to the High Court under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure; 5 persons died and 2 escaped during trial.
- 12. Punishments (Statement No. 12).—The following sentences and orders were passed by Courts of Sessions:—

Fines to the amount of Rs. 18,459-5-0 were imposed by Courts of Sessions as compared with Rs. 41,130 in the preceding year. The total realisation amounted to Rs. 16,515-13-6 as compared with Rs. 26,757-8-3 in 1932 and the total amount of fine paid as compensation was Rs. 390 as against Rs. 431 in 1932.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appellate Courts subordinate to the High Court.

I. APPEALS.

- 13. (Statement No. 2).—The number of appeals decided during the year was 2,738 as against 2,953 in the preceding year—a decrease of 215.
- 14. Magistrates' Courts (Statement No. 10).—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 2,761. Of these the appeals of 268 were summarily dismissed and sentences on 1,200 were confirmed after admission making a total of 1,468 wholly unsuccessful appellants or 53·2 per cent. Of the remainder 488 or 17·7 per cent. obtained a modification of the sentences passed on them and 777 or 28·1 per cent. an annulment. The cases of 28 appellants were otherwise disposed of. As compared with 1932 the results were more favourable to the appellants.
- 15. Sessions Courts (Statement No. 10).—During the year the number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Sessions was 2,475. The appeals of 743 persons (or 30 per cent.) were summarily dismissed; 660 appellants whose appeals were admitted were altogether unsuccessful; 412 obtained an alteration of sentences; 606 were acquitted; the cases of 54 appellants were otherwise disposed of and one appellant died pending the appeal. The proportions of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders, and completely successful were 26.7, 16.6 and 24.5 per cent. respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 38.1, 23.8 and 35 per cent. respectively. If admitted appeals only are considered, these results were on the whole more favourable to the appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants during the year being 58.8 as against 55.3 in 1932.

II. SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

- 16. Magistrates' Courts (Statement No. 10).—The cases of 438 accused persons who applied for revision or against whom applications were made by complainants came before the District Magistrates for revision. The number was greater by 144 than in 1932. Of the total applications, those of 262 were rejected and those of 176 were otherwise disposed of.
- 17. Sessions Courts (Statement No. 10).—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed

on them in the Courts of Magistrates and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 1,277 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Sessions during the year. The number was greater by 221 than in 1932. Applications of 985 were rejected and those of 292 were otherwise disposed of.

HIGH COURT.

I. Original Jurisdiction (High Court Sessions).

18. Commitments to the High Court (Statement No. 9).—One hundred and fifty-two cases in all were brought to trial at the High Court Sessions during the year including 7 cases pending at the end of 1932. Of these 145 cases were decided and 7 remained pending at the end of the year. These 145 cases occupied in all 163 days. This may be compared with the same number of cases occupying 157 days in 1932.

Altogether 201 persons were tried of whom 148 were convicted and 53 were acquitted.

The fines imposed during the year amounted to Rs. 6,060 of which Rs. 40 were imposed upon jurors for their non-attendance, and fines realised during the year were Rs. 580 of which Rs. 40 were realised from the jurors.

Besides the Sessions cases two Full Bench appeals against the decision of the Sessions Judge on a certificate by the Advocate General under the Letters Patent were filed and disposed of during the year under report by the Appellate Court on the Original Side. In one appeal the conviction and sentence were set aside and in the other the sentence was modified.

II. APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

- 20. (Statement No. 10).—Ninety-six appeals were pending before the High Court at the opening of the year from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year 740 appeals were preferred and 745 decided leaving 91 pending at its close. The numbers of appeals preferred and decided are greater by 17 and 42 respectively than those of the preceding year whereas the number of appeals pending is less by 5 than that of the preceding year. Of the appeals preferred against sentences, 591 were from the Courts of Sessions, 125 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates and the remaining 24 were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittals.
- 21. Results of Appeals.—Five hundred and ninety appeals against sentences or orders passed by Courts of Sessions were decided. Five hundred and eighty-eight of these were against sentences. The sentences were upheld in 519 cases, reversed in 38 and modified in 30 and one appeal was returned for presentation to the proper Court. The remaining 2 appeals related to sanction matters.

One hundred and twenty-nine appeals against sentences passed by Presidency Magistrates were decided. The sentences were upheld in 124 cases, reversed in 2 and modified in 3.

Twenty-six appeals by the Local Government against the orders of acquittal involving 36 accused were disposed of by the High Court during the year. In 9 appeals involving 12 accused the High Court set aside the orders of acquittal in respect of 11 and convicted them and upheld the order of acquittal in the case of 1 accused. The High Court dismissed summarily 5 appeals involving 9 accused and in 11 appeals involving 14 accused the High Court upheld the orders of acquittal and dismissed the appeals. In one appeal involving one accused the High Court set aside the order of acquittal and ordered the accused to be retried.

The results of appeals as affecting individual appellants were as follows:—

The appeals of 575 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals the sentences of 142 appellants were confirmed, those of 50 altered, those of 57 reversed and one appellant was asked to approach the proper Court.

In appeals against acquittal orders, the appeals against 9 persons were dismissed summarily, the orders were confirmed in the case of 14 persons, set aside in the case of 12 and one person was ordered to be retried.

III. SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

22. References under section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.—Five references were pending in the High Court at the beginning of the year and 9 were submitted to it during the year. Of these, 12 were decided and 2 remained pending at the close of the year. Out of the 12 decided cases involving 13 accused, the High Court convicted 6 accused and

acquitted the remaining 7. The verdict of the jury was accepted in 8 cases and set aside in 4.

23. References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.—Thirty-four references under this section were submitted to the High Court during the year for the confirmation of death sentences and 5 were pending at the opening. Thirty-four cases involving 45 accused were decided during the year. The sentence of death was confirmed in the case of 27 persons and commuted to that of transportation for life in the case of 5. The remaining 13 persons were acquitted.

During the year under report, 32 persons were executed in the Presidency.

24. Revision.—During the year 1933 one hundred and forty-two cases were reported for orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, and 13 were pending at the opening of the year. Of these 136 were decided during the year and 19 remained pending at its close. The number reported was greater by 32 than in 1932. In 39 cases the orders sent up for revision were not interfered with; in 8 cases the sentences were enhanced; in 58 cases the sentences were reduced or altered and in 27 reversed. In 3 cases new trials were ordered and in the remaining one case the proceedings were quashed.

Orders were passed under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in 314 cases—a decrease of 22 on the figures of the previous year. Of these, 307 came before the High Court on application and 7 were taken up by the High Court on a review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion. Of the 307 applications for the issue of rule, 223 were rejected and one was allowed to be withdrawn. Of the 83 rules issued, 39 were finally discharged; 38 were made absolute in their entirety and in 6 the orders complained of were modified.

In 1 out of 7 cases taken up by the High Court suo motu the orders passed by the lower Court were not disturbed; in 2 the sentences were enhanced, in 2 they were reduced and in the remaining 2 they were set aside.

- 25. Applications for transfer.—Fifty-six applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases from one Court or district to another, were received during the year and 4 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of these, 55 were decided during the year and 5 remained pending at its close. 34 were summarily rejected, 2 were allowed to be withdrawn and in 2 transfers were granted without the issue of a rule. In the remaining 17 applications in which rules were issued, transfers were granted in 4 and refused in 13.
- 26. Miscellaneous Applications.—Seven applications for bail, 6 for maintenance, 9 for compensation, 17 for disposal of property, 13 for stay of proceedings, 5 for sanction, 2 for habeas corpus, 3 for security and 22 for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by the High Court during the year.
