REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1920.

1. This report and the statements appended to it relate to the Presidency proper and do not include the figures for Sind.

Statement No. I (Civil). 2. Area and population.—The figures for area and population are those of the Census of 1911.

3. Judicial Staff.—The permanent civil judicial staff employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1920 consisted of 8 High Court Judges; 3 Joint Judges (including the Additional Judge); 15 District Presidency Small Cause Court (including an additional Judge); 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges; 22 First Class Subordinate Judges and 109 Second Class Subordinate Judges (including 2 Inspecting Subordinate Judges and 8 Registrars of District Courts). In addition the Cantonment Magistrates of Belgaum, Ahmednagar and Ahmedabad and the Registrar of the Small Cause Court of Poona exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also 4 Inamdars and Jahagirdars exercising the powers of Subordinate Judges under Regulation XIII of 1830.

The Honourable Sir Norman Cranstoun Macleod, Knight, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 11th March 1920 and from 12th April to 31st December 1920. His Lordship was on privilege leave from 12th March to 11th April 1920. During this period the Honourable Sir Joseph John Heaton, Knight, acted as Chief Justice.

Puisne Judges.

The Honourable Sir Joseph John Heaton, Knight, from 1st January to 11th March 1920 and from 12th to 22nd April 1920. His Lordship officiated as Chief Justice from 12th March to 11th April 1920, and retired from 23rd April 1920.

The Honourable Sir Lallubhai Asharam Shah, Knight, from 1st to 11th January and from 12th February to 31st December 1920. His Lordship was on privilege leave from 12th January to 11th February 1920.

The Honourable Mr. Justice A. B. Marten, from 1st January to 31st December 1920.

The Honourable Mr. Justice M. H. W. Hayward, from 10th February to 6th June and from 25th October to 31st December 1920. His Lordship was engaged in inspecting the subordinate Civil and Criminal Courts in the Presidency from 1st January to 9th February 1920. His Lordship was on combined leave from 7th June to 24th October 1920.

The Honourable Mr. Justice E. M. Pratt, from 1st January to 6th June and from 7th July to 31st December 1920. His Lordship was on privilege leave from 7th June to 6th July 1920.

The Honourable Mr. Justice A. M. Kajiji, from 1st January to 11th November and from 12th to 31st December 1920. His Lordship was on privilege leave from 12th November to 11th December 1920.

The Honourable Mr. Justice C. G. H. Fawcett, from 23rd April to 31st December 1920. His Lordship was appointed a Puisne Judge from 23rd April 1920.

The Honourable Mr. Justice L. C. Crump officiated as a Judge of the High Court from 1st January to 31st December 1920.

The Honourable Sir-Chimanial H. Setalwad, Knight, officiated as an Additional Judge of the High Court from 7th June to 11th October and resigned his office from 12th October 1920.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

4. Original Suits instituted.—The number of civil suits pending on the Statement No. VII. Original Side of the High Court at the end of 1919 was 2,667 including 47, suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes; and the number instituted during 1920 was 3,803, pa # 490-1

including 54 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 195 (including 2 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) restored during the year, making a total of 6,670 for disposal in 1920.

Of the suits instituted during 1920:

- 2,725 were for money or moveable property including 54 received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes.
 - 510 were for immoveable property.
 - 94 were for specific relief.
 - 12 related to religious and other endowments.
 - 9 were matrimonial suits, and
 - 458 were other suits not falling under any of the above heads.

The value of suits for specific money claims was Rs. 3,46,10,662-11-4 as compared with Rs. 7,72,51,313-9-3 in the previous year.

5. Original Suits disposed of.—The number of suits decided in 1920 was 2,921 including 20 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes, and the number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 3,749 including 83 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number pending at the close of the year exceeded the number pending at the close of the previous year by 1,082. There were 1,499 suits pending over one year showing an increase of 1,005 on the figures of the previous year.

Of the suits decided:—

- 967 were dismissed for default or want of prosecution, including 8 Small Cause Court transferred suits.
 - 15 were withdrawn with leave.
- 587 were determined by compromise, including 4 Small Cause Court suits.
 - 32 were decreed on confession.
- 776 were decreed ex-parte, including 1 Small Cause Court suit.
- 23 were dismissed ex-parte, including 1 Small Cause Court suit.
- 276 were decreed after contest, including 3 Small Cause Court suits.
- 83 were dismissed after contest, including 2 Small Cause Court suits.
 30 were disposed of by reference to arbitration, including 1 Small Cause
- 30 were disposed of by reference to arbitration, including 1 Small Cause Court suit.
- 95 were disposed of by reference to Commissioner.
- 37 were disposed of by transfer to stayed list.

6. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of 1919 was 14 and the number instituted during 1920 was 21 and one suit was restored, making a total of 36 for disposal in 1920. The value of the suits instituted during 1920 was Rs. 82,60,267-12-2 as compared with Rs. 30,49,557-8-2 in the previous year. Of these 36, 19 were decided and 17 remained pending at the close of the year 1920.

Of the suits decided:—

- 1 was dismissed for default or want of prosecution,
- 9 were determined by compromise.
- 7 were decreed ex-parte.
- 2 were decreed after contest.

There were two suits pending over one year at the close of the year.

- 7. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of 1919 was 2 and none was instituted during 1920; of these two, one was dismissed for default or want of prosecution and the other was referred to the Commissioner after contest and none remained pending at the close of the year.
- 8. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of 1919 was 12 and the number instituted during 1920 was 12, making a total of 24 for disposal in 1920. Of these, 8 were decided and 16 remained pending at the close of the year 1920. There were 4 suits pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided :-

- 1 was withdrawn with leave.
- 5 were decreed ex-parte.
- 2 were decreed after contest.

- 9, Prize Cases.—In the previous years, in cases against three ships orders had already been made for delivery to the Director of the Royal Indian Marine on behalf of the Secretary of State for India in Council upon requisition. Two of the above cases were disposed of condemning the ships during the year 1919 and the remaining one was disposed of condemning the ship during the year under report.
- 10. Insolvency Cases.—The number of cases at the end of 1919 was 1,339 and the number instituted during 1920 was 794, making a total of 2,133 for disposal in 1920. Of these, 563 were decided and 1,570 remained pending at the close of the year 1920. There were 802 cases pending over one year at the close of the year 1920.

· Of the cases decided:—

11. Appeals from the Original Jurisdiction against Decrees.—The number of appeals pending from previous year was 33 and 53 new appeals were preferred in 1920 to the Appellate Side of the Court, making a total of 86 for disposal in 1920. Of these, 65 were decided and 21 remained pending at the close of the year.

Of the appeals decided:

- 7 were dismissed for default or otherwise not prosecuted.
- 5 were decided ex-parte and decrees of the Courts of first instance were confirmed.
- 32 were decided after contest and decrees of the Court of first instance were confirmed.
- 8 were decided after contest and decrees of the Courts of first instance were modified.
- 10 were decided after contest and decrees of the Courts of first instance were reversed.
- 3 were decided after contest and the cases were remanded to the Courts of first instance.

12. Appeals against Orders.—The number of appeals against Orders pending from the previous year was 4 and 18 new appeals were preferred to the Appellate Side of the Court, making a total of 22 for disposal in 1920. Of these, 13 were decided and 9 remained pending at the close of the year.

Of the Appeals decided :-

- 2 were dismissed for default or otherwise not prosecuted,
- 1 was decided ex-parte and the order of the Court of first instance was confirmed,
- 6 were decided after contest and orders of the Courts of first instance were confirmed,
- 1 was decided after contest and the order of the Court of first instance was modified,
- 3 were decided after contest and orders of the Courts of first instance were reversed.
- 13. References from the Bombay Court of Small Causes.—No reference was made during the year and none is pending at the close of the year.
- 14. Appeals to the Privy Council.—Sixteen appeals were pending from the previous year, and six were admitted during the year, making a total of 22 for disposal during the year.

Of these:-

- 1 was decided by the Privy Council who referred it back to the High Court.
- 8 were pending before the Privy Council in England (including 2 despatched during the year),
- 13 were pending in the High Court.

- 15. References to take accounts, etc.—The number of references to take accounts, to make enquiries as to estates to be administered or partitioned, as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on questions of title, on questions affecting minors in proposed terms of settlement, to settle conveyances, and in like matters pending at the commencement of the year 1920 was 111. One hundred and eleven references were filed in 1920 in the office of the Commissioner for taking accounts, and 111 references were disposed of by him during the year 1920.
- 16. Conveyances and Sureties.—During the year 1920 the Commissioner for taking accounts settled two conveyances and inquired into the sufficiency of sureties in four cases. The Prothonotary and Registrar settled no conveyance and inquired into the sufficiency of sureties in 8 cases and got the bonds executed in 8 cases. The Registrar further inquired into the sufficiency of sureties in 247 Testamentary matters in which administration bonds were executed.
- 17. Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.—During the year \$68 petitions for probate and letters of administration, 21 pauper petitions for leave to sue or defend in forma pauperis, 34 petitions, under the Indian Companies Act, 26 petitions under the Indian Trusts Act, 12 references under the Land Acquisition Act, and 298 under the Guardians and Wards, Lunacy, and Arbitration Acts, etc., making in all 1,259 were filed for disposal.
- 18. Orders on Motions or Applications.—During the year 2,339 orders on motion were passed by the Court in suits, 503 in Insolvency matters, 13 in Parsi Chief Matrimonial matters, and 26 in Testamentary matters.

Besides these, 7,345 orders in suits and miscellaneous matters were made by the Judge in Chambers and Prothonotary and 4,380 applications for postponement of suits were granted by the Prothonotary, making in all 11,725. In addition to these 44 orders were made by the Appeal Court.

19. Applications for the execution of Decrees, etc.—The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 382 and the number of applications filed during the year was 1,149 making a total of 1,531 for disposal. Of these, 155 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts; in 105 satisfaction was obtained in part, and 944 were wholly infructuous, making a total of 1,225, and 306 remained pending at the close of the year 1920.

Number of darkhasts (decrees and orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 14.

Number of decrees received from other Courts for execution during the year 1920 was 43.

20. Duration of Siltings.—One Judge sat for 134 days for the hearing of Original and Testamentary suits and applications and for 10 days in the Appeal Court of two Judges for hearing appeals from the Original Side. One Judge sat for 21 days for the hearing of original suits and applications and Chamber matters and for 8 days in Criminal Sessions. One Judge sat for 143 days for the hearing of original suits and applications and Chamber matters for one day in Criminal Sessions. One Judge sat for 12 days for the hearing of the original suits and applications and for 22 days in Criminal Sessions and for 17 days in the Appeal Court of two Judges for hearing appeals from the Original Side. One Judge sat for 74 days for the hearing of original suits and applications and Chamber matters and for 22 days in Criminal Sessions. Suits from the Original Side occupied a Bench of two Judges for 11 days and appeals from the Original Side occupied a Bench of two Judges for 30 days.

24. Appeals under section 15 of the letters patent.—53 appeals from decrees on the Original Side were filed during the year and 33 were pending at its commencement. Of the total 86, 65 were decided and 21 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was more by 4 than in 1919.

Of the 1,243 appeals from appellate decrees decided, 517 were uncontested, of which 498 were dealt with under Order XLl, rule 11, of the Civil Procedure Code. 726 appeals were heard and determined after contest, with the result that 524 decrees of the lower courts were affirmed, 158 reversed, 30 modified and 14 remanded.

Of the 62 appeals from orders decided, 25 were uncontested of which 21 were dealt with under Order XLI, rule 11, of the Civil Procedure Code, and 37 were decided after contest, with the result that 23 orders of the lower courts were affirmed, 13 reversed and one modified.

- 31. Appeals to the Privy Council.—At the opening of the year, 8 appeals to the Privy Council were under preparation for despatch to England and 14 applications for leave were pending for orders. Fourteen new applications were filed during the year. Of the total number of applications for leave, 10 were rejected or withdrawn, in 3 leave was granted and 15 applications for leave remained pending at the close of the year. During the year one appeal was despatched to England and 10 appeals were under preparation. Of the 10 appeals under preparation 3 were admitted in 1918, 4 in 1919 and 3 in 1920.

Statement No. X (Part I). The number of appeals instituted was larger than in the previous year in 9, and smaller in 7, districts.

The largest increases were in Ahmednagar (90), Surat (60), Kanara (57), Thana (39) and Sholapur (35), while there were noticeable decreases in Poona (42), Satara (38) and Ratnagiri (32). In the remaining districts the variations were less than 20.

34. Appeals disposed of.—The number of appeals decided (4,285) was less by Statements Nos. X (Part I) 599 than in 1919. The decrease in disposals was general in all the appellate Courts in the Districts. The decrease in the disposals by Subordinate Judges and Small Cause Court Judges was 422, as compared with the previous year, as they could not dispose of more appeals owing to their own congested files of suits. The number of appeals disposed of after contest (3,292) was less by 525 than in 1919. The number of appeals dismissed under Order XLI, rule 11, Civil Procedure Code, was 674, being more by 33 than in 1919.

The increase in disposals was spread over 7 districts and was the greatest in Sholapur (194), followed by Ahmednagar (136) and Dharwar (97). On the other hand, there was a noticeable decrease in Satara (598), Ahmedabad (198), Ratnagiri (154) and Thana (83).

35. Appeals pending.—There were 4,103 appeals pending at the close of the Statement No. X (Part I). year, the number being more by 123 than at the end of 1919.

The number of appeals pending for more than a year fell during the year from 1,045 to 1,025.

36. Results of appeals.—The results on the decision of the lower courts of the appeals decided during the year were as follows:—In 2,896 cases, or 67.6 per cent. of the whole, the judgment of the lower court was affirmed; in 392 cases, or 9.1 per cent. it was modified; and in 573 cases or 13.4 per cent. it was reversed. 226, or 5.3 per cent. were remanded and 198 or 4.6 per cent. were either not prosecuted or dismissed for default. The results are more favourable to the lower courts than in the preceding year.

37. Miscellaneous Appeals.—241 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 132 were pending at its commencement. Of the total 373, 276 were disposed of during the year, and 97 remained pending at the close of the year. The number pending was less by 35 than in the previous year.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

I.—Civil Courts in the Mofussil subordinate to the High Court.

- Changes in Jurisdiction.—During the year under report changes were effected in the constitution and jurisdiction of some of the Civil Courts in the Presidency as under:—(1) With effect from 19th June 1920 the Second Class Subordinate Judges' Courts at Jalgaon and Alibag, and with effect from 1st July 1920 the Second Class Subordinate Judge's Court at Nadiad were abolished, and First Class Subordinate Judges' Courts were established in their stead. (2) The Court of the Subordinate Judge of Haveli was abolished from 1st August 1920 and its jurisdiction over the Haveli Taluka was transferred to the Court of the First Class Subordinate Judge, Poona. (3) The Court of the Second Class Subordinate Judge of Surat was abolished with effect from 1st September 1920 and the villages of the Chorasi, Bardoli and Mandvi Talukas which had heretofore been included within its jurisdiction were transferred to that of the First Class Subordinate Judge, Surat, the Second Class Subordinate Judge being appointed Joint Subordinate Judge, Surat. (4) The Court of Small Causes, Surat, was also abolished from 1st September 1920 and a second First Class Subordinate Judge was provided for the First Class Subordinate Court, Surat. (5) A new Subordinate Civil Court was established at Hukeri in the Belgaum District with effect from 15th September 1920 for a period of two years and the existing jurisdictions of the Subordinate Civil Courts of Gokak, Athni and Chikodi were re-distributed. (6) The Subordinate Courts of Kaira and Dohad continued to be linked till the end of the year. (7) With effect from 20th August 1920 the Court of the Jahagirdar of Saswad was discontinued.
 - 39. Original suits instituted.—The number of suits instituted in 1920 was statement No. VII.

 117,942, an increase of 14,055 on the figures of the previous year.

The increase occurred in money and title suits to the extent of 16.4 and 3.1 per cent., respectively. The number of money suits instituted was 94,509, against 81,169 in 1919, and that of title suits was 23,433, against 22,718 in 1919.

The total value of suits instituted in 1920 amounted to Rs. 3,37,30,807, showing a decrease of Rs. 53,02,968 on the total for 1919.

40. Local Distribution.—There was an increase in the number of suits in-**Statement No. VII.** stituted in 1920 in all districts with the exception of Kanara.

The increase was most marked in Ahmedabad, Khandesh, Poona, Nasik, Ahmedagar and Thana Districts and occurred chiefly in money suits. The largest number of suits was instituted in Ahmedabad (18,858), where the number of money suits (16,659) was the heaviest in the Presidency proper. In no other district except Khandesh, Poona and Nasik did institutions exceed 10,000.

Institutions were between 6,000 and 7,000 in the districts of Ahmednagar,

Thana and Ratnagiri, between 5,000 and 6,000 in Sholapur,
Satara and Dharwar, between 4,000 and 5,000 in Surat
and Belgaum, and between 3,000 and 4,000 in Kolaba, Kanara, Broach and
Bijapur, the last named district having the lowest figure (3,028).

41. Nature of suits instituted.—The majority of suits instituted was, as usual, for small sums, as the following figures show:—

Of the suits classified as title and other suits 24.6 per cent. were mortgage suits, 46.3 per cent. were for immoveable property, and 7.6 per cent. were for specific relief.

42. Number of suits disposed of.—In addition to the 1,17,942 suits instituted during the year and the 50,510 suits pending trial from the previous year, 1,419 suits were revived, or received on remand or review, making a total of 169,871 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of was 116,545, an increase of 14,780 on the figure of 1919.

Of the total number disposed of, 103,809 were disposed of by Paid Sub
Statement No. IX (Part I).

Divisional Tribunals, that is, Courts of Subordinate

Judges, 11,955 by Small-Cause Courts, 728 by District

Courts and 53 by Unpaid tribunals, that is, by Inamdars and Jahagirdars. The
figures show an increase in the disposals by all classes of Courts except Unpaid

Tribunals.

43. Results of suits decided.—In the suits disposed of during the year, plain
Statement No. IX (Part I). tiffs were unsuccessful in 18,956 cases, or 16.3 per cent.; in 24,950 cases, or 21.4 per cent., a compromise was effected.

Plaintiffs were successful in 72,639 cases, or 62.3 per cent. The results are somewhat more favourable to plaintiffs than in the preceding year in which the percentage of successful plaintiffs was 60.7.

Of the 51,361 suits decided on contest, 45,078, or 87.8 per cent. resulted in favour of plaintiffs, and 6,286, or 12.2 per cent., in favour of defendants.

- 44. Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jahagirdars.—The unpaid Tribunals disposed of 53 original suits, of which 18 were contested.

 Statement No. IX (Part I). The latter shows a decrease of 14, as compared with the previous year.
- 45. Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges.—The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 103,809, an increase of 13,996 on the figures of the previous year. The increase was in cases decided both under the ordinary procedure and in the exercise of Small Cause Court powers, and was spread over both contested and uncontested suits. The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 61,903, and under the Small Cause Court procedure 41,906; of these, 48.2 per cent. and 39.6 per cent., respectively, were contested. The percentage of suits decided after contest both under the ordinary and Small Cause Court procedure shows an increase as compared with the previous year.
 - 46. Suits disposed of by Small Cause Court Judges.—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 11,955 original suits, of which 4,485 were contested. The latter shows an increase of 502, as compared with the previous year.

- 47. Suits disposed of by District Joint and Assistant Judges.—The District Courts disposed of 728 original suits, of which 403 were contested. The latter shows a decrease of 89, as compared with the previous year.
- 48. Average duration of suits.—The average duration of suits (contested and uncontested) decided by the several classes of Courts is given in the following statement:—

The results show general increase in the average duration of both contested and uncontested suits under the Small Cause Court procedure decided by Subordinate Judges and in that of uncontested suits decided by Small Cause Court Judges. There was, on the other hand, an appreciable improvement in the Courts of District, Joint and Assistant Judges and of Subordinate Judges under the ordinary procedure.

49. Pending suits.—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 53,326, against 50,510 in the previous year. The increase is chiefly due to larger institutions during the year.

Of the pending cases, 5,213 had been pending for more than a year, and 20,588
for more than 3 months. There was an appreciable

reduction in the number of suits pending over one year
while there was an increase of over 1,500 in suits pending
for more than 3 months. Of the suits pending for over one year, 163 were in
the Courts of District Judges, 63 in the Courts of Small Cause Court Judges, 2 in the
Courts of Jahagridars and Inamdars and 4,985 in the Courts of Subordinate
Judges, the figures showing a decrease of 129, 728 and 31 and an increase of 43,
respectively, as compared with 1919.

The number of suits pending over a year was largest in Satara (942), followed by Ahmedabad (814), Poona (535), Ratnagiri (459), Khandesh (410) and Belgaum (375). As compared with the figures of the previous year the number of year old suits shows a marked decrease in Poona and noticeable increase in Ratnagiri and Khandesh.

50. Execution proceedings.—There were 45,998 applications for execution of decrees pending from the previous year, and 110,504 applications were made during the year. Realization was complete in 27,593 cases and partial in 28,200. In 56,606 !cases proceedings were returned as infructuous and 43,187 remained pending at the close of the year, while 916 were disposed of by transfer. Execution proceedings were markedly unsuccessful in Broach and Ahmednagar, the percentages of totally infructuous proceedings being 63.4 and 57.4, respectively. The total amount realized in Courts other than Small Causes Courts was Rs. 49,23,521-11-4 5/6.

Debtors were imprisoned in 143 cases; moveable property was sold in 573 and immoveable property in 1,991 cases.

- 51. Insolvency proceedings.—The number of applications before the Courts for declaration of insolvency was 776, out of which 463 were disposed of. Of these, 30 were transferred to another Province or withdrawn, 396 were granted and 37 rejected.
- 52. Miscellaneous cases.—The number of miscellaneous cases instituted rose from 8,698 to 9,217. The number disposed of rose from 8,734 to 9,166 and that of pending rose from 3,077 to 3,128. Of the cases disposed of, 1,760 were withdrawn, compromised or decreed.

on confession. 2,725 were decided ex-parte, and 4,681 were contested. Of the total number of such cases disposed of after contest 3,089 or 66 per cent. were disposed of in favour of plaintitis.

II.—Bombay Small Cause Court.

53. The number of suits instituted and decided in the Presidency Court of Small Causes during 1920, and the number pending at its close were 25,902, 25,470 and 4,800, respectively. Institutions show a decrease of 143 and disposals an increase of 237, while the number pending was more by 432 than in 1919.

The decrease in institutions occurred only in suits not exceeding Rs. 50 and Rs. 100.

The total value of the litigation was Rs. 79,54,123, as against Rs. 71,96,701 in the preceding year.

The average duration of contested and uncontested suits was 89 and 55 days,

respectively. The figures for 1919 were 71 and 48,
respectively.

54. Mode of disposal.—Out of the 25,470 suits disposed of, 1,164 were dismissed

Of the 4,800 suits remaining under trial at the close of the year 1,170 had been pending for more than three months, against 1,355 so pending at the close of the preceding year.

55. Execution of decrees.—Of the 11,943 applications for the execution of decrees dealt with during the year, including 1,047 pending from the previous year, 10,709 were disposed of and 1,234 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the latter, 70 were more than 3 months old. Of the applications disposed of, 4,482 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 5,833 were returned as wholly infructuous and 394 were transferred to other Courts.

Statement No. XI. The total amount realised was Rs. 14,24,755, as compared with Rs. 13,39,403 in the previous year.

50. Coercive Processes.—In order to enforce the execution of decrees imprisonment was resorted to in 102 cases and sale of moveables in 303. These figures are less by 52 and more by 38, respectively, than those of 1919.

GENERAL.

- 57. There was a further and larger increase in the number of original suits instituted in the Subordinate Courts in the Mofussil during the year, and although the disposals were greater than in the previous year there was a considerable increase in the pending file. A substantial reduction was, however, effected in the number of suits more than a year old. There was also considerable increase in the number of suits pending at the end of the year in the Presidency Small Gause Court although assistance of an Additional Judge was given from 5th February 1920. On the Appellate Side of the High Court the total disposals of appeals though smaller than in the preceding year were larger than the total institutions during the year, with the result that there was a considerable reduction in arrears, and the Judges constituting the Second Division Bench of the Appellate Side were engaged for a period of about three months in clearing off arrears of suits on the Original Side of the High Court.
- 58. Inspection.—In the course of the Inspection tour, which commenced on 3rd November 1919, and ended on 9th February 1920 the Administrative High Court Judge inspected the following Civil and Criminal Courts between

1st January and 9th February 1920:— District and Sessions Judges' Courts and First Class Subordinate Judges' Courts and the City Magistrates' Courts of Ahmednagar, Nasik, Khandesh, Surat, Ahmedabad, Broach and Thana, the Small Cause Courts of Surat and Ahmedabad and the Court of the Cantonment Magistrate of Ahmedabad.

- 59. The Courts of 53 Subordinate Judges were inspected by District and Assistant Judges and Inspecting Subordinate Judges.
- 60. Receipts and charges of the Civil and Criminal Courts.—The total receipts of all the Courts (Civil and Criminal) have risen from Rs. 61,92,682 to 72,56,021 and the total charges from Rs. 50,09,411 to Rs. 55,60,991. The latter figure includes Rs. 12,91,711 being the fixed adjustment, contribution and payment to officers of other Provinces. These figures are supplied by the Accountant General, Bombay, in accordance with Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 5042, dated 11th August 1893.
- 61. The congestion of civil files was partially dealt with by the appointment of Additional First Class Subordinate Judges at Ahmedabad, Dharwar, Dhulia, Poona and Surat and by the deputation or appointment of Joint or Additional Second Class Subordinate Judges to the following places during the whole or part of the year under report, viz., Ahmedabad, Nadiad, Borsad, Ahmedagar, Sangamner, Belgaum, Athni, Gokak, Chikodi, Bijapur, Bagalkot, Muddebihal, Broach, Dharwar, Haveri, Hubli, Dhulia, Jalgaon, Nasik, Pimpalgaon, Yeola, Poona, Haveli, Chiplun, Malwan, Satara, Islampur, Wai, Karad, Sholapur, Barsi, Surat, Bulsar and Thana.
- 62. The District Judges of Ahmedabad, Nasik, Sholapur, Surat and Thana assembled Judicial Conferences of the Judges subordinate to them where points touching the practice and procedure of civil Courts were discussed.
- 63. During the year the post of the Inspecting Subordinate Judge of Poona, Satara, Sholapur and Ahmednagar and the posts of Sheristedars of the District Courts of Poona, Satara, Sholapur and Ahmedabad were abolished and Registrars selected from the cadre of the Subordinate Judges were appointed to the District and Sessions Courts of Poona, Satara, Sholapur and Ahmedabad. The post of Sheristedar of the District Court of Ahmednagar was abolished and the incumbent of that post was appointed Registrar of the District and Sessions Court of Ahmednagar outside the cadre of Subordinate Judges. Owing to the appointment of Registrar to the District and Sessions Court of Ahmedabad was removed from the charge of the Inspecting Subordinate Judge of Surat and Broach and the District of Khandesh was assigned to him in lieu of Ahmedabad.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF DOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1920.

- Statement No. 1 (Criminal).

 1. Area and Population.—The figures for area and population are those of the census of 1911.
- 2. Judicial Staff.—The Criminal Judicial Staff, employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1920, consisted of 8 High Court Judges, 15 Sessions Judges; 6 Additional Sessions Judges; 5 Assistant Sessions Judges; 326 First Class Magistrates; 354 Second Class Magistrates; 290 Third Class Magistrates; and 301 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889.

In addition to the above, the number of Police Patels in the Presidency exercising powers under section 14 of the Village Police Act VIII of 1867, was 21,433. Out of these, 383 have also been invested with powers under section 15 of the said Act.

There were 55 Benches of Magistrates, inclusive of those in the City statement No. 1 (Criminal). of Bombay, constituted from among 433 Honorary Magistrates.

- 3. Offences reported.—There were 168,388 criminal offences reported during the year, showing an increase of 16,470 on the figures of 1919. In the district of Ahmedabad and in the City of Bombay there was a noticeable increase in the number of offences reported during the year, while on the other hand there was a marked decrease in the districts of Surat and Thana. Of the total number of offences reported, 51,613 were under the Indian Penal Code and 116,775 under Special and Local Laws.
- 4. Complaints dismissed (section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and complainstatement No. II. ants fined (section 250, Criminal Procedure Code).—The number of complaints dismissed under section 203 was 6,595, and the number of complainants fined under section 250 was 667.
- 5. Cases found to be true.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 160,896
 were found to be true, and the number of cases brought
 to trial, including those found to be true and pending
 from the previous year, was 162,749. Compared with 1919, the number of cases
 found to be true and the number brought to trial show an increase of 15,754 and
 15,385, respectively.
 - 6. Murders reported as true.—Out of 617 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 185 were murders. The statement No. 11. corresponding numbers in the previous year were 566 and 200.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

I.—Presidency Magistrates' Courts.

7. Cases in Presidency Magistrates' Courts.—The total number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of Presidency Magistrates and before the Benches of Honorary Presidency Magistrates was 85,536. This number is greater by 12,422 than that of 1919. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 71,927 or 10,485 more than in 1919, while cases under the Penal Code rose from 11,672 to 13,609. The increase under the former head was most marked in offences under the Bombay City

Municipal Act (III of 1888) which rose from 10,669 to 15,907. The number of offences under the Bombay City Police Act rose from 31,814 to 35,141, under the Public Conveyances Act from 4,645 to 5,444, under the Motor Vehicles Act from 211 to 567, under the Railways Act from 53 to 148, under the Abkari Act from 226 to 452 and under the Rent Act from 28 to 360. On the other hand there was no noticeable decrease in any other class of offences. As regards offences under the Penal Code, there was an increase in offences of wrongful restraint and wrongful confinement and of criminal intimidation, insult and annoyance which rose from 138 and 977 to 1,080 and 1,503 respectively. On the other hand, there was a noticeable decrease in offences of criminal force and assault which fell from 2,837 to 2,261.

During the year 85,373 cases were disposed of, of which 31,255 were by stipendiary Magistrates and 54,118 by Benches of Honorary
Magistrates. Only 137 cases were pending at the close
of the year. Of the total number of cases disposed of, the cases of 90 persons
were committed to the High Court, and the remainder were finally decided by
Magistrates.

The number of witnesses examined before these Magistrates rose from Statement No. 11. 120,401 to 146,102.

8. Results of trials.—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Magistrates was 95,340. Of the persons tried, 22,945 were acquitted or discharged, 72,142 were convicted, 14 died, 12 were transferred and 90 were committed to the High Court Sessions. One hundred and thirty-seven remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Penal Code, 7,443 were convicted and 12,664 acquitted or discharged. The results of trials before each of the two-classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

Of the persons convicted, 3,895 were punished with rigorous imprisonment,

2,139 with simple imprisonment, 58,199 with fine and
555 with whipping. Seventy-seven sentences of imprisonment were, in the case of youthful offenders, commuted to detention in a Reformatory School, 6,666 convicted persons were warned and discharged, 99 were sent to the Leper Asylum at Matunga, and 501 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code.

9. Miscellaneous Proceedings.—In addition to these sentences, 28 persons were required to furnish security for good behaviour under Chapter VIII of the Criminal Procedure Code, of whom 11 were imprisoned in default of the same.

Twenty-one complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code, the accusations having been found to be frivolous or vexatious. Proceedings for maintenance under Chapter-XXXVI of the Criminal Procedure Code were taken against 62 persons, and orders were made against 10, the rest having been discharged.

Proceedings under Chapter XLII of the Criminal Procedure Code for forfeiture of bail or recognizance were taken in the case of 879 persons, and orders were made absolute against all of them.

II.—Magistrates, including Village Officers and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards outside Bombay.

'10. During the year 70,850 cases were disposed of by these tribunals as against Statement No. IV. 70,337 in 1919.

In addition to the cases shown above, District and Sub-Divisional Magistrates decided 115 cases referred to them under sections 347 and 349 of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

The number of cases decided during the year was more by 513 than in 1919. There was an increase in the disposal of cases by Benches of Magistrates, Special Magistrates, and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards who disposed of 1,130, 204 and 53 more cases, respectively, than in the preceding year. The number of cases disposed of by Subordinate Stipendiary Magistrates, Honorary Magistrates and Village Officers show a decrease of 506, 304 and 55, respectively, as compared with their disposals in 1919.

The number of cases disposed of by Chief Magistrates of Districts and District and Sub-Divisional Magistrates were 35 and 115 as against 22 and 137, respectively, in the preceding year.

11. Results of trials.—Of the total number of cases shown in the preceding paragraph, the cases of 1,437 persons were committed or referred to the Sessions, and the remainder, involving 124,468 persons, were finally disposed of by the various tribunals. 56,148 or 45·1 per cent. out of the total 124,468 were convicted, and 57,651 or 46·3 per cent. were acquitted or discharged.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before Magistrates, Village Officers and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards at the close of 1920 was 8,888 as compared with 5,802 in 1919.

The general results of trials before Magistrates of each class are as follows:—

Of the persons shown above as convicted, the numbers tried summarily were 4,936 by Benches of Magistrates; 9,263 by Subordinate Stipendiary Magistrates; 3,172 by Honorary Magistrates; 1 by a Special Magistrate and 282 by Village Officers.

12. Punishments.—The sentences passed on persons convicted were as Statement No. v. follows:—

Besides the above, 712 persons were sentenced to rigorous or simple imprisonment on failure to furnish security for good behaviour. In the case of 34 youthful offenders, the sentence of imprisonment was commuted to one of detention in a Reformatory School. 2,325 persons were ordered to find or give security or recognizance to keep the peace or sureties for good behaviour.

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 3,237 were for terms not exceeding fifteen days; 7,655 for terms not exceeding six months; 1,628 for terms not exceeding two years and 1 for a term exceeding two years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 342 persons as against 341 in the preceding year.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 3,72,141. Rs. 3,34,871 were realised, of which Rs. 19,408 were paid as compensation to complainants.

13. Miscellaneous Proceedings under the Code of Criminal Procedure.—
In addition to criminal trials, the following were the more important classes of work dealt with by Magistrates in the mofussil.

One hundred and twenty-nine proceedings under Chapter VIII, Criminal Procedure Code, to prevent a breach of the peace, involving 442 persons, were disposed of. The numbers of cases and persons involved therein were less by 32 and 132, respectively, than those in the preceding year. Of the persons concerned, 317 were required to execute bonds to keep the peace, in addition to the persons mentioned in the preceding paragraph as having been similarly bound down on conviction. The number of persons dealt with for this purpose was the largest in Bijapur (108). There was no noticeable increase in the number of proceedings of this class in any of the districts, while there was a marked decrease in Broach and Kaira as compared with 1919.

In 887 cases, 2,074 persons were called upon to show cause why they should not give security to be of good behaviour, and orders were made absolute against 1,381, while 692 persons were discharged and the case against one person was dropped owing to his death. Out of 1,381 persons, 714 failed to give the required security and were imprisoned in default, 2 after reference to the Courts of Session under section 123 of the Code, and 712 under orders of Magistrates.

Proceedings for the abatement of nuisances under Chapter X of the Code were taken in 11 cases, involving 20 persons, of whom 2 were discharged, orders having been made absolute against the rest.

The number of cases under Chapter XII of the Code, involving questions of the possession of land, decided by Magistrates, was 94, showing a decrease of six on the figures for 1919.

Four hundred and ninety-three complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons, under section 250 of the Code, the accusations having been found to be frivolous or vexatious, while 148 were discharged.

Proceedings for maintenance under Chapter XXXVI of the Code were taken against 315 persons and orders were made absolute against 78, while 237 persons were discharged.

14. Witnesses.—The number of witnesses examined in the Courts of Magistrates in the mofussil was 157,836 as compared with 166,656 in 1919.

III.—Courts of Session.

- 15. Commitments.—The number of cases decided was 800 or 51 less than in Statement No. 1V. 1919.
- 16. Results of trials.—There were 2,180 persons, or 655 less than in 1919, under trial before the Courts of Session. The cases of 1,925 persons were decided, while those of 255 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the 1,925 persons tried, 1,060 or 55·1 per cent. were convicted and 809 or 42 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, and the cases of 47 persons were referred to the High Court under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, while 9 persons died during trial.

17. Punishments.—The following sentences were passed by the Courts of Statement No. V. Session:—

Fines to the amount of Rs. 21,645 were imposed by Courts of Session, as compared with Rs. 29,017 imposed in the preceding year. The total realisations aggregated Rs. 9,413, as compared with Rs. 12,723 in 1919. The amount of fines realised and paid as compensation fell from Rs. 1,010 to Rs. 403.

- 18. Jury Trials.—The number of persons tried by jury was 321 and of the persons so tried, the Sessions Judges approved of the verdict of the jury in respect of 313 persons and disapproved of it in respect of 8 and referred their cases to the High Court under section 307 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. The results of these references are given under the head "Superintendence, Reference and Revision."
- 19. Trials by Assessors.—The number of persons tried with the aid of assessors was 1,376. In the case of 992 persons, the Sessions Judges concurred with the opinion of both the assessors; in the cases of 137 they differed from the opinion of one, and in the case of 247 differed from the opinion of both the assessors. The corresponding figures of 1919 were 1,848, 1,265, 170 and 413, respectively.
 - 20. Duration of Cases.—The average duration of Sessions trials, from the date of commitment to the date of decision, rose from 38.3 days in 1919 to 40 days in 1920.

The duration of cases was the highest in the district of Panch Mahals (61·1), followed by Satara (51), Broach (49·7), Ahmedabad (48·3), Kaira (45·9) and Bijapur (45). There was a marked increase from 39·1 to 61·1 days in Panch Mahals, from 36 to 51 days in Satara, from 36·7 to 45·9 in Kaira, from 39 to 48·3 days in Ahmedabad and from 35 to 42 days in Ratnagiri. On the other hand, there was a noticeable reduction from 79 to 45 days in Bijapur, from 74·4 to 42·2 days in Nasik, and from 51 to 39 in Belgaum.

21. Witnesses.—The number of witnesses in attendance before the Courts of Session in 1920 was 8,070 as against 8,743 in the preceding year.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appellate Courts subordinate to the High Court.

22. Magistrates' Courts.—The number of appeals decided during the year was 1,160 as against 1,264 in the preceding year.

The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 1,736. Of these, appeals of 283 were summarily dismissed, and sentences on 727, whose appeals were admitted, were confirmed, making a total of 1,010 wholly unsuccessful appellants, or 58.2 per cent. Of the remainder, 268 appellants, or 15.4 per cent., obtained a modification of the sentences passed on them, and 436, or 25.1 per cent., their

total annulment. In the cases of 7 appellants, new trials or further inquiries were ordered, and the cases of two persons were referred to the High Court. The cases of 13 appellants were disposed of by transfer. Compared with 1919, the results were more favourable to appellants.

23. Sessions Courts.—During the year, 1,367 appeals were decided, involving 1,976 persons. The appeals of 699 persons or 35.4 per cent. were summarily dismissed; 631 appellants, whose appeals were admitted, were altogether unsuccessful; 222 obtained a reduction or alteration of sentence; 398 were acquitted; and in the cases of 23 appellants, new trials or further inquiries were ordered. The cases of two persons were referred to the High Court, while the case of one person abated owing to his death.

The proportion of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders, and successful in obtaining their reversal, was 67.3, 11.2 and 20.1 per cent., respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 49.4, 17.4 and 31.2 per cent. If admitted appeals only are considered, these results were, on the whole, more favourable to appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants in 1920 being 48.6 against 46.4 in 1919.

SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

Courts subordinate to the High Court.

- 24. Magistrates' Courts.—The cases of 208 accused persons who applied for revision, or against whom applications were made by complainants, came before District Magistrates for revision.

 The number was more by 6 than in 1919. Of the total, applications of 166 persons were rejected, and in the cases of 31 persons new trials or further inquiries were directed. The cases of 11 persons were referred to the High Court.
- 25. Sessions Courts.—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates, and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 716 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Session during the year. The number was more by 184 than in 1919. Applications of 608 persons were rejected. In the cases of 3 persons the proceedings were quashed and in those of 61 new trials or further inquiries were ordered. The cases of 44 persons were referred to the High Court.

HIGH COURT.

I.—Original Jurisdiction.

26. Commitments to the High Court.—One case was pending at the opening of the year, and 72 cases were brought to trial during the year, all of which were disposed of during the year.

Altogether 96 persons were tried, of whom 64 were convicted and 32 acquitted. The number of witnesses examined was 474 and the average duration of cases from commitment till disposal was 48 days, against 40·1 days in 1919.

II.—Appellate Jurisdiction.

27. At the opening of the year, 157 appeals were pending before the High

Statement No. VI. Court from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts.

During the year, 688 appeals were preferred and 782 decided, leaving 63 pending at its close. The number preferred was less by 155 and that of decided was more by 15 than in the preceding year. The pending file shows a marked decrease of 94.

Of the appeals preferred against sentences, 540 were from Courts of Session and 144 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates. Four appeals were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittal.

28. Results of appeals.—Six hundred and twenty-eight appeals against sentences of Courts of Session were decided. The sentences of the lower Courts were upheldin 504 cases, reversed in 18 and modified in 89. One case was remanded in appeal for retrial and 10 appeals were returned for presentation to proper Courts. There were 6 appeals relating to sanction matters.

One hundred and fifty appeals against sentences by Presidency Magistrates were decided, the sentences being affirmed in 144, modified in 4 and reversed in 2.

The results of appeals decided, as affecting individuals, were as follows:—Appeals of 502 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals, sentences on 192 appellants were confirmed, on 101 reduced or altered and on 39 reversed. In the case of one a new trial or further inquiry was ordered. In appeals against acquittal orders sentences were passed by the High Court on 6 persons.

Four appeals by the Local Government against orders of acquittal were decided during the year. In one case, 3 accused persons were acquitted of offences under sections 381, 414 and 109, by a Sub-Divisional Magistrate. The High Court setaside the order of acquittal and convicted all the accused under those sections and sentenced them each to two years' rigorous imprisonment. In the second case, the accused person was acquitted of an offence under section 381, Indian Penal Code, by a First Class Magistrate. The High Court set aside the order of acquittal and convicting the accused under that section sentenced him to three months' rigorous imprisonment. In the third case in which the accused was acquitted by a First-Class Magistrate of an offence under section 323, Indian Penal Code, the High Court set aside the order of acquittal and convicted and sentenced the accused to pay a fine of Rs. 500, in default to undergo rigorous imprisonment for two months. In the fourth case, one person who was convicted by a First Class Magistrate under section 420, Indian Penal Code, was acquitted by the Sessions Judge. The High Court set aside the order of acquittal and convicted the accused under that section and sentenced him to undergo rigorous imprisonment for one year and topay a fine of Rs. 1,000, in default to undergo rigorous imprisonment for six months. more.

III .- Superintendence, Reference and Revision.

- 29. References under section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.—No reference was pending in the High Court at the opening of the year, and 7 were submitted to it during the year. Five references were decided during the year and two remained undecided at its close. The result of the 5 cases disposed of was that the verdict of the jury was accepted in one case and set aside in 4.
- 30. References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.—Twenty-six references under this section were submitted to the High Court during 1920 for confirmation of death sentences and 4 were pending at the opening of the year. Twenty-nine references in which 43 persons were concerned were decided during the year. The death sentence was confirmed in the case of 23 persons and commuted to transportation for life in the case of 16. The remaining 4 persons were acquitted, their sentences having been reversed.
- 31. Revision.—During the year, 96 cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, and 11 were pending at the opening of the year. Of these, 92 were decided during the year, and 15 remained pending at its close. The number reported was more by 34 than in 1919. In 25 cases the orders sent up for revision were set aside, in one the proceedings were quashed and in 4 new trials were ordered. Sentences were reduced or altered in 27, and enhanced in 8. In the remaining 24 cases the High Court declined to interfere.

Under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, orders were passed in 375 cases, an increase of 46 on the figures of the previous year. Of these, 335 came before the High Court on application and 40 were taken up by the Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion.

Of the 335 applications for the issue of rules, 192 were rejected and 2 were returned to parties. Of 137 rules issued, 63 were finally discharged, 37 were made

absolute in their entirety, in 27 cases the orders complained of were modified and 2 cases were withdrawn; in 7 cases new trials were ordered and in one the proceedings were quashed. Two cases were returned for presentation to Sessions Court and in 2 more miscellaneous orders were passed.

Of the 40 cases taken up by the High Court suo motu, in 25 the orders passed by the lower Courts were not disturbed; in 3 the sentences were enhanced, in 6 reduced and in 5 set aside; the remaining one case was ordered to be committed to the Court of Session.

- 32. Applications for transfer.—Forty-five applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of original cases from one Court or District to another were received. Of these 40 were disposed of and 5 remained pending at the close of the year. Twenty-one were summarily rejected and in 11 cases transfers were granted without the issue of a rule. In 7 cases rules were issued, with the result that transfers were refused in all the cases. One case was allowed to be withdrawn.
- 33. Miscellaneous applications.—Fifteen applications for bail, 5 for stay of proceedings and 6 for disposal of property besides 16 applications for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by the Court during the year.

GENERAL.

- 34. Changes in jurisdiction.—The villages of the Mehwasi Chiefs of the West Khandesh District were included in the Sessions Division of West Khandesh.
- 35. Trials of European British Subjects.—The cases of 477 European British subjects were decided during the year, as against 463 in the previous year. Of these, 474 were dealt with by Magistrates, and 3 by High Court, of whom 2 accused persons claimed to be tried by a mixed jury and one pleaded guilty.

In the cases disposed of, 280 persons were convicted and 197 were acquitted. The convictions of the 280 persons are classified as under:—

Two hundred and one under Special and Local Laws, 42 for offences against property, 19 for offences affecting the human body, 9 for offences affecting the public health, etc., 1 for an offence relating to documents and to trade or property marks, and 8 for criminal intimidation, etc. Of the 477 European British subjects tried in the Presidency, Bombay contributed the largest number (432), as against 395 in the previous year.
