## REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1921.

1. This report and the statements appended to it relate to the Presidency Proper and do not include the figures for Sind.

Statement No. I (Civil).

2. *Area and Population.*—The figures for area and population are of those of the census of 1921.

3. *Judicial Staff.*—The permanent civil judicial staff employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1921 consisted of 8 High Court Judges (including the Additional Judge); 15 District Judges; 3 Joint Judges; 10 Assistant Judges (including 2 under training); a Chief Judge and five Judges of the Presidency Small Cause Court (including an Additional Judge); 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges; 22 First Class Subordinate Judges and 117 Second Class Subordinate Judges (including Inspecting Subordinate Judges, Registrars of District Courts and Leave Reserves). In addition, the Cantonment Magistrates of Belgaum, Ahmednagar and Ahmedabad and the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Ahmedabad and Poona exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. The post of the Registrar of the Small Cause Court of Ahmedabad was created with effect from the 27th June 1921. There were also 4 Inamdars and Jahagirdars exercising powers of Subordinate Judges under Regulation XIII of 1830.

The Honourable Mr. Justice A. B. Marten from 1st January to 5th June 1921 and from 17th October to 31st December 1921. His Lordship was on leave from 6th June to 16th October 1921.

The Honourable Mr. Justice M. H. W. Hayward from 1st to 3rd January 1921. His Lordship was appointed a Member of the Executive Council of His Excellency the Governor of Bombay from 4th January 1921.

The Honourable Mr. Justice E. M. Pratt from 1st January to 31st December 1921.

The Honourable Mr. Justice A. M. Kaji from 1st January to 31st December 1921.

The Honourable Mr. Justice C. G. H. Fawcett from 1st January to 31st December 1921.

The Honourable Mr. Justice L. C. Crump officiated as a Judge of the High Court from 1st to 3rd January 1921, and was confirmed as a Puisne Judge with effect from 4th January 1921. His Lordship was on leave from 6th June to 16th October 1921, and was engaged in inspecting the subordinate Civil and Criminal Courts in the Presidency from 6th November to 16th December 1921.

The Honourable Mr. Justice J. B. Kanga officiated as an Additional Judge of the High Court from 14th February to 31st December 1921.

The Honourable Mr. Justice C. A. Kincaid officiated as a Judge of the High Court from 6th June to 16th December 1921.

The Honourable Mr. Justice N. W. Kemp officiated as a Judge of the High Court from 6th June to 15th October 1921.

### HIGH COURT.

#### *Original Jurisdiction.*

4. *Original suits instituted.*—The number of civil suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of 1920 was 3,749, including 83 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes, and the number instituted during 1921 was 5,435, including

62 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes, and 201 (including 4 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) restored during the year, making a total of 9,385 for disposal in 1921.

5. *Original suits disposed of.*—The number of suits decided was 5,128, including 51 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes, and the number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 4,257, including 98 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number pending at the close of the year exceeded the number pending at the close of the previous year by 508. There were 1,605 suits pending over one year, showing an increase of 106 on the figures of the previous year.

Of the suits decided :—

1,598 were dismissed for default or want of prosecution, including 25 Small Cause Court transferred suits.

18 were withdrawn with leave.

994 were determined by compromise, including 8 Small Cause Court suits.

49 were decreed on confession.

1,402 were decreed *ex-parte*, including 9 Small Cause Court suits.

66 were dismissed *ex-parte*, including 3 Small Cause Court suits.

597 were decreed after contest, including 3 Small Cause Court suits.

176 were dismissed after contest, including 1 Small Cause Court suit.

44 were disposed of by reference to arbitration, including 1 Small Cause Court suit.

163 were disposed of by reference to Commissioner, including 1 Small Cause Court suit.

21 were disposed of by transfer to stayed list.

6. *Suits instituted and disposed of under the testamentary and intestate jurisdiction.*—The number of suits pending at the end of 1920 was 17 and the number instituted during 1921 was 19, making a total of 36 for disposal in 1921. Of these 36 suits, 23 were decided and 13 remained pending at the close of the year 1921.

Of the suits decided :—

2 were dismissed for default or want of prosecution.

8 were determined by compromise.

2 were decreed *ex-parte*.

1 was dismissed *ex-parte*.

8 were decreed after contest.

2 were disposed of by transfer to stayed list.

There were 6 suits, pending over one year at the close of the year.

7. *Suits instituted and disposed of under the Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty jurisdiction.*—The number of suits pending at the end of 1920 was none, and seven were instituted during 1921 and one was restored during the year, making a total of 8 for disposal in 1921. Of these 8 suits, 1 was dismissed for default or want of prosecution, 6 were decreed *ex-parte*, and 1 remained pending at the close of the year 1921. There was no suit pending over one year at the close of the year.

8. *Suits instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial Jurisdiction.*—The number of suits pending at the end of 1920 was 16 and the number instituted during 1921 was 7, making a total of 23 for disposal in 1921. Of these, 7 were decided and 16 remained pending at the close of the year 1921. There were 9 suits pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided :—

- 1 was dismissed for default or want of prosecution.
- 5 were decreed *ex-parte*.
- 1 was decreed after contest.

9. *Insolvency cases*.—The number of cases at the end of 1920 was 1,570 and the number instituted during 1921 was 969, making a total of 2,539 for disposal in 1921. Of these, 597 were decided and 1,942 remained pending at the close of the year 1921. There were 1,023 cases pending over one year at the close of the year 1921.

Of the cases decided :—

- 187 were disposed of *ex-parte*.
- 401 were dismissed *ex-parte*.
- 5 were decided after contest.
- 4 were dismissed after contest.

10. *References from the Bombay Court of Small Causes*.—Two references were made during the year and were decided in the same year.

11. *Appeals to the Privy Council*.—Twenty-one appeals were pending from the previous year, two were admitted during the year and one was restored by order of the Privy Council during the year, making a total of twenty-four for disposal during the year.

Of these :—

- 3 were decided by the Privy Council who confirmed the decrees of the High Court.
- 1 was decided by the Privy Council who set aside the decree of the High Court.
- 1 was decided by the High Court passing a decree in terms of the award.
- 13 were pending before the Privy Council in England (including 9 despatched during the year).
- 6 were pending in the High Court.

12. *References to take accounts, etc.*—The number of references to take accounts, to make inquiries as to estates to be administered or partitioned, as to debts and encumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on questions of title, on questions affecting minors in proposed terms of settlement, to settle conveyances, and in like matters pending at the commencement of the year 1921 was 111. 149 references were filed in 1921 in the office of the Commissioner for taking accounts, and 101 references were disposed of by him during the year 1921.

13. *Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.*—During the year 769 petitions for probate and letters of administration, 21 pauper petitions for leave to sue or defend in *forma pauperis*, 34 petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 25 petitions under the Indian Trusts Act, 2 references under the Land Acquisition Act and 335 petitions under the Guardian and Wards, Lunacy and Arbitration Acts, etc., making in all 1,186 were filed for disposal.

14. *Applications for the execution of decrees, etc.*—The number of applications pending at commencement of the year was 306 and the number of applications filed during the year was 1,580, making a total of 1,886 for disposal. Of these, 197 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts; in 171 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 24 satisfaction was obtained in part, and 1,123 were wholly infructuous, making a total of 1,515, and 371 remained pending at the close of the year 1921. Number of darkhasts (decrees

or orders) disposed of during the year in which immovable property was sold, was 4. Number of decrees received from other Courts for execution during the year 1921 was 53.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

I.—*High Court.*

18. *Appeals under Section 15 of the Letters Patent.*—123 appeals from decrees on the Original Side were filed during the year and 21 were pending at its commencement. Of the total 144, 88 were decided and 56 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was more by 23 than in 1920.

Statement No. X, Part I.

Of the appeals decided :—

- 14 were dismissed for default or otherwise not prosecuted.
- 1 was decided *ex-parte* and decree of the Court of first instance was confirmed.
- 41 were decided after contest and decrees of the Courts of first instance were confirmed.
- 12 were decided after contest and decrees of the Courts of first instance were modified.
- 18 were decided after contest and decrees of the Courts of first instance were reversed.
- 2 were decided after contest and the cases were remanded to the Courts of first instance.

19. Twenty-nine appeals from orders on the Original Side were filed during the year and 9 were pending at its commencement. Of the total 38, 31 were decided and 7 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was more by 18 than in 1920.

Of the appeals decided :—

- 2 were dismissed for default or otherwise not prosecuted.
- 17 were decided after contest and orders of the Courts of first instance were confirmed.
- 6 were decided after contest and orders of the Courts of first instance were modified.
- 6 were decided after contest and orders of the Courts of first instance were reversed.

20. On the Appellate Side, 75 appeals from decrees were filed during the year and 48 were pending at its commencement. Of the total 123, 95 were decided and 28 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was less by 22 than in 1920.

Of the appeals decided :—

- 69 were decided *ex-parte* and decrees appealed against were confirmed.
- 21 were decided after contest and decrees appealed against were confirmed.
- 1 was decided after contest and the decree appealed against was modified.
- 4 were decided after contest and decrees appealed against were reversed.

## II.—Appeals from the Subordinate Civil Courts.

21. *Appeals to the High Court from Subordinate Courts.*—The statement in the margin shows the number of first and second appeals from decrees, and appeals from orders, of the Provincial Courts of Original and Appellate jurisdiction which came before the High Court

and were decided during the year. The institutions of first and second appeals were less by 202 and 107, respectively, than in 1920, and that of appeals from orders was more by 9 than in that year.

22. *Appeals decided.*—The disposals of first appeals and appeals from orders show an increase of 148 and 11, respectively, and that of second appeals shows a decrease of 331, on the figures of the previous year.

23. *Appeals pending.*—At the close of the year, 447 first appeals, 409 second appeals and 60 appeals from orders were pending. The aggregate total of the pending appeals is less by 287 than in 1920.

24. *Civil work of the High Court.*—The following statement shows in detail the civil business which has come before, and disposed of by, the High Court in its appellate jurisdiction during each of the past four years :—

25. *Results of Appeals.*—Of the 459 appeals from Original decrees decided, 52 were uncontested, being dismissed for default, withdrawn, compromised, heard *ex-parte* or dismissed under Order XLI, Rule 11, Civil Procedure Code. Of the appeals decided after contest, decrees of lower Courts were confirmed in 212, reversed in 49, modified in 133 and remanded in 13.

Of the 912 appeals from appellate decrees decided, 440 were uncontested, of which 411 were dealt with under Order XLI, Rule 11, Civil Procedure Code. 472 appeals were heard and determined after contest, with the result that 360 decrees of the lower Courts were affirmed, 69 reversed, 27 modified and 16 remanded.

Of the 73 appeals from orders decided, 23 were uncontested, of which 19 were dealt with under Order XLI, Rule 11, Civil Procedure Code, and 50 were decided after contest, with the result that 28 orders of the lower Courts were affirmed, 14 reversed, 4 modified and 4 remanded.

26. *Appeals to the Privy Council.*—At the opening of the year, 16 appeals to the Privy Council were under preparation for despatch to England and 15 applications for leave were pending for orders. Eighteen new applications were filed during the year. Of the total number of applications for leave, 10 were rejected, withdrawn or compromised, in 7 leave was granted and 16 applications for leave remained pending at the close of the year. During the year, 2 appeals were despatched to England, 2 appeals were withdrawn and 12 appeals were under preparation.

27. *Results of appeals to the Privy Council.*—During the year, 2 appeals from this Court were decided by the Privy Council, with the result that they were dismissed with costs. Two appeals were pending before the Privy Council at the end of the year.

#### *Appellate Courts subordinate to the High Court.*

28. *Appeals instituted.*—4,477 appeals were instituted in 1921, showing an increase of 69, as compared with the previous year.

The number of appeals instituted was larger than in the previous year in 6, and smaller in 10, districts.

The largest increases were in Satara (131), Poona (72), Bijapur (56), Thana (39) and Dharwar (32), while there were noticeable decreases in Belgaum (64), Ahmednagar (47), Ahmedabad (43) and Khandesh (36). In the remaining districts the variations were less than 25.



29. *Appeals disposed of.*—3,496 appeals were decided during the year, of Statements No. X (Part I) and No. XIV. which 159 were disposed of by First Class Subordinate Judges and Small Cause Court Judges. These figures are less by 789 and 18 than the corresponding figures of the previous year. The number of appeals disposed of after contest (2,625) was less by 667 than in 1920. The number of appeals dismissed under Order XLI, Rule 11, Civil Procedure Code, was 559, being less by 115 than in 1920.

The increase in disposals was spread over in five districts and was the greatest in Kanara (140), followed by Satara (73) and Bijapur (61). On the other hand, there was a noticeable decrease in Khandesh (324), Nasik (124), Poona (119) and Belgaum (116).

30. *Appeals pending.*—There were 5,084 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being more by 981 than at the end of 1920. Statement No. X, Part I.

The number of appeals pending for more than a year rose from 1,025 to 1,512.

31. *Results of appeals.*—The results on the decision of the lower Courts of the appeals decided during the year were as follows:—In 2,309 cases, or 66 per cent. of the whole, the judgment of the lower Court was affirmed; in 332 cases, or 9·5 per cent. it was modified; and in 486 cases, or 13·9 per cent. it was reversed. 160, or 4·6 per cent. were remanded and 209, or 6 per cent. were either not prosecuted or dismissed for default.

32. *Miscellaneous appeals.*—213 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 97 were pending at its commencement. Of the total 310, 203 were disposed of during the year, and 107 remained pending at its close. The number pending was more by 10 than in the previous year. Statement No. X, Part II.

#### ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

##### I.—*Civil Courts in the Mofussil subordinate to the High Court.*

33. *Changes in Jurisdiction.*—During the year under report there were no changes in the constitution and territorial jurisdiction of the Civil Courts in the Presidency. The jurisdiction of the Small Cause Court, Ahmedabad, was raised from Rs. 500 to Rs. 1,000, with effect from 2nd August 1921. Also the limit of Small Cause Court powers of Subordinate Judges was revised and increased Small Cause Court powers were given to individual Subordinate Judges to expedite disposal of cases.

*Original suits instituted.*—The number of suits instituted in 1921 was 114,575, showing a decrease of 3,367 on the figures of the previous year. Statement No. VII.

The decrease occurred in money and title suits to the extent of 2·2 and 5·4 per cent. respectively, the number of money suits instituted being 92,412, against 94,509 in 1920, and that of title suits being 22,163 against 23,433 in 1920. Statement No. VII.

The total value of suits instituted in 1921 amounted to Rs. 3,94,73,932, showing an increase of Rs. 57,43,125 on the total for 1920. Statement No. VIII.

34. *Local distribution.*—The number of suits instituted in 1921 was larger than in the previous year in 6, and smaller in 10, districts. Statement No. VII.

The increase was most marked in the districts of Khandesh (954), Surat (582), Sholapur (574) and Bijapur (543), and occurred chiefly in money suits. The largest number of suits was instituted in Khandesh (19,573) where the number of money suits (17,436) was the heaviest in the Presidency. In no other district except Ahmedabad and Poona did institutions exceed 10,000. Statement No. VII.

Institutions were between 9,000 and 10,000 in the district of Nasik, between 6,000 and 7,000 in Thana, between 5,000 and 6,000 in Sholapur, Satara, Dharwar, Surat, Ratnagiri and Ahmednagar, between 3,000 and 4,000 in Belgaum, Bijapur, Kolaba and Broach, while Kanara with 2,969 shows the lowest figure.

35. *Number of Suits disposed of.*—In addition to the 114,575 suits instituted during the year and the 53,326 suits pending trial from the previous year, 1,442 suits were revived, or received on remand or review, making a total of 169,343 for disposal.

Statement No. IX, Part I. The number of suits disposed of was 117,766, an increase of 1,221 on the figure of 1920.

Of the total number disposed of, 108,204 were disposed of by Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals, that is, Courts of Subordinate Judges, 8,942 by Small Cause Courts, 597 by District Courts and 23 by Unpaid Tribunals, that is, by Inamdars and Jahagirdars.

36. *Results of suits decided.*—In the suits disposed of during the year, plaintiffs were unsuccessful in 20,076 cases, or 17 per cent.; in 24,092 cases, or 20·5 per cent. a compromise was effected. Plaintiffs were successful in 73,598 cases, or 62·5 per cent. These results were almost as favourable to plaintiffs as in 1920.

Of the 52,320 suits decided on contest, 45,554 or 87·1 per cent. resulted in favour of plaintiffs, and 6,766, or 12·9 per cent. in favour of defendants.

37. *Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jahagirdars.*—The Unpaid Tribunals disposed of 23 original suits, of which 6 were contested, as against 18 in 1920.

38. *Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges.*—The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 108,204, an increase of 4,395 on the figures of the previous year. The increase was in cases decided in the exercise of Small Cause Court powers, and was spread over both contested and uncontested suits, while there was a slight decrease in the number of cases decided under the ordinary procedure. The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 61,327, and under the Small Cause Court procedure 46,877; of these, 49·4 per cent. and 39 per cent. respectively, were contested. The percentage of suits decided after contest under the ordinary procedure shows a slight increase, while that of suits decided under the Small Cause Court procedure shows a slight decrease, as compared with the previous year.

39. *Suits disposed of by Small Cause Court Judges.*—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 8,942, original suits, of which 3,497 were contested. The latter shows a decrease of 988, as compared with the previous year.

40. *Suits disposed of by District, Joint and Assistant Judges.*—The District Courts disposed of 597 original suits, of which 266 were contested. The latter shows a decrease of 137, as compared with the previous year.

41. *Pending Suits.*—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 51,577, as against 53,326 in the previous year.

Of the pending cases 5,844 had been pending for more than a year, and 25,360 for more than three months. There was an appreciable reduction in the number of suits pending for more than 3 months, while there was an increase of 631 in suits pending for over one year. Of the suits pending for over one year, 217 were in the Courts of District Judges, 5,611 in the Courts of Subordinate Judges, and 16 in the Small Cause Courts, the figures showing an increase of 54 and 626 and a decrease of 47, respectively, as compared with 1920.

The number of suits pending over a year was the largest in Ahmedabad (899), followed by Satara (811), Belgaum (664), Poona (620), and Ahmednagar (515). As compared with the figures of the previous year the number of year old suits shows a marked increase from 261 to 515 in Ahmednagar and from 375 to 664 in Belgaum, while a noticeable decrease from 290 to 162 in Bijapur.

42. *Execution Proceedings*.—There were 43,187 applications for execution of decrees pending from the previous year, and 102,918 applications were made during the year. Realization was complete in 23,460 cases and partial in 25,609. In 49,033 cases proceedings were returned as infructuous, and 47,817 remained pending at the close of the year, while 186 were disposed of by transfer. The total amount realized in Courts other than Small Cause Courts was Rs. 43,36,492-9-5½.

Statement No. XI.

Debtors were imprisoned in 129 cases; moveable property was sold in 616 and immoveable property in 1,831 cases.

Statement No. XI.

43. *Insolvency Proceedings*.—The number of applications before the Courts for declaration of insolvency was 798, out of which, 470 were disposed of. Of these, 54 were transferred to another Province or withdrawn, 303 were granted and 113 rejected.

Statement No. XII.

44. *Miscellaneous cases*.—The number of miscellaneous cases instituted rose from 9,217 to 9,442. The number disposed of rose from 9,166 to 9,517 and that of pending fell from 3,128 to 3,053. Of the cases disposed of, 1,599 were withdrawn, compromised or decreed on confession, 2,841 were decided *ex-parte*, and 5,077 were contested. Of these 5,077 cases disposed of after contest, 3,424 or 67·4 per cent. were decided in favour of Plaintiffs.

## II.—Bombay Small Cause Court.

45. The number of suits instituted and decided in the Presidency Court of Small Causes during 1921, and the number pending at its close, were 25,418, 25,598 and 4,620, respectively. Institutions show a decrease of 484, and disposals an increase of 128. The number of suits pending at the end of the year was less by 180 than in 1920.

Statement No. VII.

The decrease in institutions occurred only in suits not exceeding Rs. 10, 50 and 100.

Statement No. VIII.

The total value of the litigation was Rs. 90,64,428, as against Rs. 79,54,123 in the preceding year.

The average duration of contested and uncontested suits was 90 and 50 days, respectively, the figures for 1920 were 89 and 55 respectively.

46. *Mode of disposal*.—Of the 25,598 suits disposed of 1,020 were dismissed for default or want of prosecution, or were withdrawn with leave, 20,818 were decided without contest in the manner shown in the margin, 3,760 were decided after contest or upon reference to arbitration.

Of the 4,620 suits remaining under trial at the close of the year, 1,397 had been pending for more than three months, against, 1,170 so pending at the close of the preceding year.

Statement No. IX, Part I.

47. *Execution of decrees*.—Of the 12,631 applications for the execution of decrees dealt with during the year, including 1,234 pending from the previous year, 11,585 were disposed of and 1,046 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the latter, 136 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of 4,743 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 6,403 were returned as wholly infructuous, and 439 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realized was 16,12,438, as compared with Rs. 14,24,755 in the previous year.

48. *Coercive processes.*—In order to enforce the execution of decrees imprisonment was resorted to in 110 cases and sale of moveables in 262. The former is more by 8 and the latter less by 41 than those of the preceding year.

Statement No. XI.

#### GENERAL.

49. As the result of increasing the limit of Small Cause Court powers of Subordinate Judges, there was a marked increase in the disposals of Small Cause suits and some decrease in the number of suits disposed of in the ordinary jurisdiction. But on the whole there was an increase of 1,200 in the total number of suits disposed of by the Subordinate Courts in the Mofussil during the year, and the total number of suits pending at the end of the year decreased by over 1,700. The number of suits pending for more than a year, however, increased from 5,200 to 5,800 odd.

The number of appeals disposed of by the District Courts were about 800 less than in the previous year, and the appeals pending on the file increased by nearly 1,000, as the result of reducing the number of Assistant Judges by Government. On the Appellate Side of the High Court the total disposals, though smaller than in the preceding year, were larger than the total institutions during the year, with the result that there was a considerable reduction in the arrears; and the Judges ordinarily constituting the Second Division Bench of the Appellate Side, were almost exclusively engaged throughout the year in clearing off arrears of suits on the Original Side of the High Court. Although there was a marked increase in the total disposals on the Original Side from 3,500 to 5,700, the total arrears increased from 5,300 to 6,200, notwithstanding the employment of additional staff of Judges on that Side, owing to the marked and progressive increase in the total institutions from 4,800 in the year 1920 to 6,600 during the year.

50. *Inspection.*—In the course of the Inspection tour which commenced on 6th November 1921 and ended on 16th December 1921, the Administrative High Court Judge inspected the following Civil and Criminal Courts:—District and Sessions Judges' Courts and First Class Subordinate Judges' Courts and the City Magistrates' Courts of Ahmedabad, Surat, Broach, Thana and Nasik, the Small Cause Court of Ahmedabad and the Court of the Cantonment Magistrate of Ahmedabad.

The Courts of 40 Subordinate Judges were inspected by District and Assistant Judges and Inspecting Subordinate Judges.

51. *Receipts and Charges of the Civil and Criminal Courts.*—The total receipts of all the Courts (Civil and Criminal) have risen from Rs. 72,56,021 to Rs. 75,94,052, and the total charges from Rs. 55,60,991 to Rs. 60,62,248. The latter figure includes Rs. 12,38,819 being the adjustment, contribution, payment to officers of other Provinces and Foreign Service Payments. These figures are supplied by the Accountant General, Bombay, in accordance with Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 5042, dated 11th August 1893.

52. The District Judges of Belgaum, Dharwar, Khandesh, Nasik, Poona, Surat and Thana assembled Judicial Conferences of the Judges subordinate to them where points touching the practice and procedure of Civil Courts were discussed.

**REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL  
JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY  
DURING THE YEAR 1921.**

1. *Area and Population.*—The figures for area and population are those of the census of 1921.

2. *Judicial Staff.*—The Criminal Judicial Staff, employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1921, consisted of 8 High Court Judges; 15 Sessions Judges; 6 Additional Sessions Judges; 4 Assistant Sessions Judges; 352 First Class Magistrates; 354 Second Class Magistrates; 290 Third Class Magistrates; and 318 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889.

In addition to the above, the number of Police Patels in the Presidency exercising powers under Section 14 of the Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, was 21,375. Out of these, 398 have also been invested with powers under Section 15 of the said Act.

There were 55 Benches of Magistrates, inclusive of those in the City of Bombay, constituted from among 457 Honorary Magistrates.

3. *Offences reported.*—There were 157,208 criminal offences reported during the year, showing a decrease of 11,180 on the figures of 1920. In the district of Ahmedabad and in the City of Bombay there was a noticeable decrease in the number of offences reported during the year, while on the other hand there was a slight increase in the district of Broach. Of the total number of offences reported, 45,449 were under the Indian Penal Code and 111,759 under Special and Local Laws.

4. *Complaints dismissed (Section 203 Criminal Pro. Code) and complainants fined (Section 250, Criminal Pro. Code).*—The number of complaints dismissed under Section 203 was 7,924, and the number of complainants fined under Section 250 was 393.

5. *Cases found to be true.*—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 148,251 were found to be true, and the number of cases brought to trial, including those found to be true and pending from the previous year, was 152,333. Compared with 1920, the number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show a decrease of 12,645 and 10,416 respectively.

6. *Murders reported as true.*—Out of 612 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 210 were murders. The corresponding numbers in the previous year were 617 and 185.

**ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.**

*I.—Presidency Magistrates' Courts.*

7. *Cases in Presidency Magistrates' Courts.*—The total number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of Presidency Magistrates and before the Benches of Honorary Presidency Magistrates was 81,202. This number is less by 4,334 than that of 1920. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 70,999 or 928 less than in 1920, while cases under the Penal Code fell from 13,609 to 10,203. The increase under the former head was most marked in offences under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (XI of 1890) which rose from 12,487 to 13,875. The number of offences under the Motor Vehicles Act rose from 567 to 1,111, under the Prevention of Gambling Act from 601 to 1,134, and under the Public Conveyances Act from 5,444 to 5,649. There was a noticeable decrease in offences under the City of Bombay Municipal Act and under the Opium Act which fell from 15,907 and 518 to

12,796 and 157, respectively. As regards offences under the Penal Code, there was a decrease in offences of wrongful restraint and wrongful confinement, of criminal force and assault and of theft which fell from 1,080, 2,261 and 4,087 to 136, 1,401 and 3,006, respectively. On the other hand there was no noticeable increase in any other class of offences.

During the year 79,543 cases were disposed of, of which 22,702 were by Stipendiary Magistrates and 56,841 by Benches of Honorary Magistrates. Only 1,607 cases were pending at the close of the year. Of the total number of cases disposed of, the cases of 176 persons were committed to the High Court, and the remainder were finally decided by Magistrates.

Statement No. IV.

The number of witnesses examined before these Magistrates fell from 146,102 to 126,901.

8. *Results of trials.*—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Magistrates was 88,931. Of the persons tried, 15,373 were acquitted or discharged, 71,713 were convicted, 11 died, 41 were transferred, 176 were committed to the High Court, 10 were sent to the Military Authorities and 1,607 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Penal Code, 5,885 were convicted and 8,438 acquitted or discharged. The results of trials before each of the two classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

Of the persons convicted, 4,123 were punished with rigorous imprisonment, 1,556 with simple imprisonment, 59,020 with fine and 457 with whipping. Seventy-six sentences of imprisonment were, in the case of youthful offenders, commuted to detention in a Reformatory School, 5,911 convicted persons were warned and discharged, 12 were sent to the Leper Asylum at Matunga and 544 were released on probation of good conduct under Section 562, Criminal Procedure Code.

Statement No. V.

9. *Miscellaneous Proceedings.*—In addition to these sentences, 18 persons were required to furnish security for good behaviour under Chapter VIII of the Criminal Procedure Code, of whom 14 were imprisoned in default of the same.

Thirty-one complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under Section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code, the accusations having been found to be frivolous or vexatious. Proceedings for maintenance under Chapter XXXVI of the Criminal Procedure Code were taken against 66 persons, and orders were made against 8; the rest having been discharged.

Proceedings under Chapter XLII of the Criminal Procedure Code for forfeiture of bail or recognizance were taken in the case of 1,137 persons, and orders were made absolute against all of them.

## II.—Magistrates, including Village Officers and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards outside Bombay.

Statement No. IV.

10. During the year 66,452 cases were disposed of by these tribunals as against 70,850 in 1920.

In addition to the cases shown above, District and Sub-Divisional Magistrates decided 194 cases referred to them under sections 347 and 349 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, as against 115 in the preceding year.

The number of cases decided during the year was less by 4,398 than in 1920. The number of cases disposed of by Subordinate Stipendiary Magistrates, Honorary Magistrates, Benches of Magistrates and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards show a marked decrease of 3,146, 448, 803 and 74, respectively, as compared with their disposals in 1920.

The number of cases disposed of by Chief Magistrates of Districts was 20 as against 35 in the preceding year.

11. *Results of trials.*—Of the total number of cases shown in the preceding paragraph, the cases of 1,016 persons were committed or referred to the Sessions, and the remainder, involving 108,660 persons were finally disposed of by the various tribunals. 52,126 or 48 per cent. out of the total 108,660 were convicted and 56,534 or 52 per cent. were acquitted or discharged.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before Magistrates, Village Officers and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards at the close of 1921 was 6,337, as compared with 8,888 in 1920.

Of the persons shown above as convicted, the numbers tried summarily were 4,622 by Benches of Magistrates ; 6,554 by Subordinate Stipendiary Magistrates ; 1,907 by Honorary Magistrates ; 534 by Special Magistrates ; 3 by Chief Magistrates of Districts ; and 259 by Village Officers.

Besides the above, 872 persons were sentenced to rigorous or simple imprisonment on failure to furnish security for good behaviour. In the cases of 21 youthful offenders the sentence of imprisonment was commuted to one of detention in a Reformatory School. 2,331 persons were ordered to find or give security or recognizance to keep the peace or sureties for good behaviour.

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 3,811 were for terms not exceeding 15 days ; 6,939 for terms not exceeding 6 months ; 1,893 for terms not exceeding 2 years and 5 for a term exceeding 2 years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 386 persons as against 342 in the preceding year.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 3,68,831. Rs. 3,20,883 were realised, of which Rs. 29,142 were paid as compensation to complainants.

13. *Miscellaneous proceedings under the Code of Criminal Procedure.*—In addition to criminal trials the following were the more important classes of work dealt with by Magistrates in the mofussil:—

Statement No. III.

Two hundred and ten proceedings under Chapter VIII, Criminal Procedure Code, to prevent a breach of the peace, involving 944 persons, were disposed of. The numbers of cases and persons involved therein were more by 81 and 502, respectively, than those in the preceding year. Of the persons concerned, 542 were required to execute bonds to keep the peace, in addition to the persons mentioned in the preceding paragraph as having been similarly bound down on conviction. The number of persons dealt with for this purpose was largest in Bijapur (335), Sholapur (148) and Kaira (122). There was a noticeable increase in the number of proceedings of this class in the districts of Sholapur and Kaira from 1 to 68 and 16 to 31 respectively, while there was no marked increase or decrease in any other district.

In 716 cases, 1,846 persons were called upon to show cause why they should not give security to be of good behaviour, and orders were made absolute against 1,426, while 420 persons were discharged. Out of 1,426 persons, 876 failed to give the required security and were imprisoned in default, 4 after reference to the Courts of Session under section 123 of the Code, and 872 under orders of Magistrates.

Proceedings for the abatement of nuisances under Chapter X of the Code were taken in 37 cases, involving 39 persons, of whom 5 were discharged, orders having been made absolute against the rest.

The number of cases under Chapter XII of the Code, involving questions of the possession of land decided by Magistrates, was 83, showing a decrease of 11 on the figures for 1920.

Two hundred and seventy-six complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Code, the accusations having been found to be frivolous or vexatious, while 126 were discharged.

Proceedings for maintenance under Chapter XXXVI of the Code were taken against 327 persons, and orders were made absolute against 83, while 241 persons were discharged, and the cases of 3 persons were transferred to other Courts.

14. *Witnesses.*—The number of witnesses examined in the Courts of Magistrates in the mofussil was 157,316, as compared with 157,836 in 1920.

15. *Commitments.*—The number of cases decided was 866, or 66 more than in 1920.

16. *Results of trials.*—There were 2,829 persons, or 649 more than in 1920, under trial. The cases of 2,416 persons were decided, while those of 413 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the 2,416 persons tried, 1,337 or 55·3 per cent. were convicted and 1,012 or 41·9 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, and the cases of 54 persons were referred to the High Court under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, while 12 persons died and 1 escaped during trial.

Fines to the amount of Rs. 18,594 were imposed by Courts of Session, as compared with Rs. 21,645 imposed in the preceding year. The total realisations amounted to Rs. 14,142, as compared with Rs. 9,413 in 1920. The amount of fines realised and paid as compensation rose from Rs. 1,010 to Rs. 1,470.

18. *Jury trials.*—The number of persons tried by jury was 405 and of the persons so tried, the Sessions Judges approved of the verdict of the jury in respect of 381 persons and disapproved of it in respect of 24 and referred their cases to the High Court under section 307 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. The results of these references are given under the head “Superintendence, Reference and Revision.”

19. *Trials by Assessors.*—The number of persons tried with the aid of assessors, was 1,784. In the cases of 1,006 persons the Sessions Judges concurred with the opinion of both the assessors; in the cases of 374 they differed from the opinion of one, and in the cases of 404 differed from the opinion of both the assessors. The corresponding figures of 1920 were 1,376, 992, 137 and 247, respectively.

20. *Duration of cases.*—The average duration of Sessions trials, from the date of commitment to the date of decision rose from 40 days in 1920 to 49 days in 1921.

The duration of cases was the highest in the district of Dharwar (79·6), followed by Bijapur (78), Belgaum (71) and Ratnagiri (71). There was a marked increase from 41 to 79 days in Dharwar and from 42 to 71 days in Ratnagiri. On the other hand, there was a noticeable reduction from 51 to 39 days in Satara and from 28 to 12 in West Khandesh.

21. *Witnesses.*—The number of witnesses in attendance before the Courts of Session during the year under report was 10,166 as against 8,070 in the preceding year.

#### APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

##### *Appellate Courts subordinate to the High Court.*

22. *Magistrates' Courts.*—The number of appeals decided during the year was 1,289 as against 1,160 in the preceding year.

The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 1,965. Of these, appeals of 376 were summarily dismissed, and sentences on 792, whose appeals were admitted, were confirmed, making a total of 1,168 wholly unsuccessful appellants, or 59·4 per cent. Of the remainder, 216 appellants, or 11 per cent. obtained a modification of the sentences passed on them, and 572, or 29·1 per cent. their total annulment. In the cases of 7 appellants, new trials or further inquiries were ordered. Two appellants escaped from jail while their appeals were pending. These results were almost as favourable to appellants as in 1920.

23. *Sessions Courts.*—During the year 1,345 appeals were decided, involving 1,823 persons. The appeals of 743 persons or 40·7 per cent. were summarily dismissed; 527 appellants, whose appeals were admitted, were altogether unsuccessful; 209 obtained a reduction or alteration of sentence; 322 were acquitted; and in the cases of 16 appellants, new trials or further inquiries were ordered. The cases of 5 appellants were referred to the High Court, while the case of one appellant abated owing to his death.

The proportion of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders, and successful in obtaining their reversal, was 69·7, 11·5 and 17·7 per cent., respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 48·8, 19·3 and 29·8 per cent. If admitted appeals only are considered, these results were, on the whole, more favourable to appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants in 1921 being 49·1 against 48·6 in 1920.

#### SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

##### *Courts subordinate to the High Court.*

24. *Magistrates' Courts.*—The cases of 193 accused persons who applied for revision, or against whom applications were made by complainants, came before District Magistrates for revision. The number was less by 15 than in 1920. Of the total, applications of 144 persons were rejected, and in the cases of 36 persons new trials or further inquiries were directed. Proceedings were quashed in the cases of 2 persons and the cases of 11 persons were referred to the High Court.

Statement No. VI.

25. *Sessions Courts.*—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates, and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 645 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Session during the year. The number was less by 71 than in 1920. Applications of 542 persons were rejected. In the cases of 10 persons the proceedings were quashed and in those of 71 new trials or further inquiries were ordered. The cases of 21 persons were referred to the High Court. In one case the proceedings abated owing to the death of the accused.

#### HIGH COURT.

##### *I.—Original Jurisdiction.*

26. *Commitments to the High Court.*—No case was pending at the opening of the year, during which 92 cases were brought to trial as against 72 in the preceding year. Of these, 90 were decided during the year, and 2 remained pending at its close.

Statement No. IV.

Altogether 180 persons were tried as against 86 in the preceding year, of whom 128 were convicted, 51 acquitted and one died. The number of witnesses examined was 1,124 and the average duration of cases from commitment till disposal was 47 days against 48 days in 1920.

##### *II.—Appellate Jurisdiction.*

27. At the opening of the year, 63 appeals were pending before the High Court from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year, 881 appeals were preferred and 846 decided, leaving 98 pending at its close. The numbers preferred and decided were more by 193 and 64, respectively, than in the preceding year. The pending file shows an increase of 35.

Of the appeals preferred against sentences, 685 were from Courts of Session and 190 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates, while 6 appeals were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittal.

28. *Results of Appeals.*—659 appeals against sentences passed by Courts of Session were decided. The sentences of the lower Courts were upheld in 588 cases, reversed in 11 and modified in 52. Four appeals were returned for presentation to proper Courts, and the remaining 4 related to sanction matters.

One hundred and eighty-two appeals against sentences by Presidency Magistrates were decided, the sentences being affirmed in 174, modified in 6 and reversed in 2.

The results of appeals decided, as affecting individuals, were as follows :—

Appeals of 699 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals, sentences on 127 appellants

were confirmed, on 80 reduced or otherwise altered and on 25 reversed. In appeals against acquittal orders, sentences were passed by the High Court on 5 persons, while one person was acquitted.

Five appeals by the Local Government against orders of acquittal were decided during the year. In one case the accused person was acquitted of an offence under section 376, Indian Penal Code, by a Sessions Judge. The High Court set aside the order of acquittal and convicting the accused under that section sentenced him to 5 years' rigorous imprisonment. In the second case, the accused person was acquitted of an offence under section 96 (5) of the District Municipal Act, III of 1901, by a Third Class Magistrate. The High Court set aside the order of acquittal and convicted the accused under that section and sentenced him to pay a fine of Re. 1. In the third case, two accused persons were acquitted of offences under sections 323 and 324, Indian Penal Code, by a Second Class Magistrate. The High Court set aside the order of acquittal and convicted the accused No. 1 under sections 323 and 324 and accused No. 2 under section 323, Indian Penal Code, and sentenced them to pay a fine of Rs. 100 and Rs. 50, respectively. In the fourth case, the accused person was acquitted of an offence under Rule 10 of the Rules under section 20 (2) of the Criminal Tribes Act, III of 1911, by a Bench of Magistrates. The High Court upheld the order of the Bench Magistrate and dismissed the appeal. In the fifth case, the accused person was acquitted of an offence under section 302, Indian Penal Code, by a Sessions Judge. The High Court set aside the order of acquittal and convicted the accused under that section and sentenced him to transportation for life.

### III.—*Superintendence, Reference and Revision.*

29. *References under section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.*—Two references were pending in the High Court at the opening of the year, and 9 were submitted to it during the year. Ten references were decided during the year, while one remained pending at its close. The result of the 10 cases disposed of was that the verdict of the jury was accepted in one case and set aside in 9.

30. *References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.*—Thirty-seven references under this section were submitted to the High Court during the year for confirmation of death sentences, and one was pending at its opening. Thirty-four references, involving 47 persons, were decided during the year. The death sentence was confirmed in the case of 26 persons and commuted to one of transportation for life in the case of 19. The remaining 2 persons were acquitted, their sentences having been reversed.

31. *Revision.*—During the year, 61 cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, and 15 were pending at its opening. Of these, 63 were decided during the year, and 13 remained pending at its close. The number reported was less by 35 than in 1920. In 19 cases the orders sent up for revision were set aside, in 2 the proceedings were quashed and in 5 new trials were ordered. Sentences were reduced or altered in 12, and enhanced in 6. One case was withdrawn and in 18 the High Court declined to interfere.

One case was reported for the orders of the High Court by the Chief Presidency Magistrate under section 432 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and was disposed of during the year.

Under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, orders were passed in 287 cases, a decrease of 88 on the figures of the previous year. Of these, 254 came before the High Court on application, and 33 were taken up by the Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion.

Of the 254 applications for the issue of rule, 196 were rejected. Of 58 rules issued, 22 were finally discharged, 17 were made absolute in their entirety, in 14 the orders complained of were modified, in 3 new trials were ordered and 2 were withdrawn.

In 12, out of the 33 cases taken up by the High Court *suo motu* the orders passed by the lower Courts were not disturbed, in 4 the sentences were enhanced, in 7 reduced and in 9 set aside. One case was ordered to be committed to the Court of Session.

32. *Applications for transfer.*—Fifty-four applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases (51 original cases and 3 appeals) from one Court or district to another were received and disposed of during the year. Thirty were summarily rejected and in 5 transfers were granted without the issue of a rule. In 17 applications rules were issued, with the result that transfers were granted in 10 and refused in 7 cases. Two applications were allowed to be withdrawn.

33. *Miscellaneous applications.*—Eight applications for bail, 3 for stay of proceedings and 6 for disposal of property, besides 38 applications for miscellaneous purposes, were disposed of by the High Court during the year.

#### GENERAL.

34. *Trials of European British Subjects.*—The cases of 588 European British subjects were decided during the year, as against 477 in the previous year. Of these, 579 were dealt with by Magistrates, 8 by Sessions Judges and one by the High Court.

In the cases disposed of, 289 persons were convicted and 299 were acquitted. The convictions of the 289 persons are classified as under :—

Two hundred and twelve under Special and Local Laws, 44 for offences against property, 15 for offences affecting the human body, 17 for offences affecting the public health, etc., and one for offence against the public tranquillity. Of the total 588, Bombay contributed the largest number (525), as against 432 in the previous year.
