I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the working of the Bombay City Police for the year 1908, together with the usual statements as appendices prepared in the forms prescribed in Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 4561, dated the 6th September 1905.

2. Mr. II. G. Gell, M.V.O., was in charge of the office of the Commissioner of Police, Bombay, with Mr. R. M. Phillips as Deputy Commissioner,

throughout the year.

Crime.

3. The total number of cognizable offences reported during the year 1908, was 47,557, exclusive of cases under Chapter VIII, Criminal Procedure Code, as compared with 50,724 cases in 1907 and 53,551 in 1906. Of this total of 47,557 cases, 40,824 were reported to the Police and 6,733 to the Magistracy. The figures for the triennial period ending with the year 1908 are as follows:-

The figures for the year under report show a decrease of 4,155 Police cases which is due to a fall of 4,692 cases in Class VI and a rise of 537 in cases under the Indian Penal Code. The decrease in Class VI is due to the fall in the number of cases of cruelty to animals, gambling, and of cases under the Police Act. This result is in great measure the result of a series of deterrent punishments inflicted by the Honorary Presidency Magistrates.

4. The non-cognizable offences reported to the Magistrates direct numbered 9,450 as against 9,330 in 1907 and 8,776 in the year 1906.

The totals of cognizable and non-cognizable cases for the triennial period ending with the year 1903 stand as follows:-

- 6. The total number of cognizable cases reported to the Police under all classes was 40,821 as compared with 41,979 in the year 1907 and 47,923 in 1906. Including 4 cases pending from the preceding year, the total number of offences dealt with by the Police during 1903 was 40,823. Of this number, 37,923 ended in conviction, the percentage working out to 9288 as against 94.47 in 1907 and 94.77 in the preceding year.
- 7. Under the Indian Penal Code (Classes I to V) there were 4,793 cases which with 4 cases pending from the preceding year made up 4,799 cases for disposal, as compared with 4,258 and 4,377 for 1907 and 1906 respectively. Out of 4,799 cases 3,804 ended in conviction, giving a percentage of 79°26 as against 75°91 in 1907 and 74°97 in the year 1906.
- 8. Under Class VI there were 36,029 cases as compared with 40,721 in the year 1907 and 43,546 in 1906. Out of these, 34,119 resulted in conviction, giving a percentage of 94.69 as compared with 96.41 and 96.76 in the years 1907 and 1906 respectively.

#### Excluded cases.

9. Excluded cases under all classes numbered 1,369 as compared with 1,226 in the year 1907 and 1,050 in 1906. Of these, 135 were under the Indian Penal Code and 1,234 under Class VI as compared with 183 and 1,043 respectively in the year 1907. The Indian Penal Code cases show a decrease of 43, while Class VI shows an increase of 191 cases, in consequence of cases in which the accused concerned not having responded to their recognizances being struck out by the Magistracy.

#### False cases.

10. Out of the 1,369 excluded cases, only 22 were declared to be false as compared with 61 in 1907 and 66 in 1906. In 13 false cases compensation ranging from Rs. 7 to Rs. 40 was awarded by the Magistrates under Section 553, Criminal Procedure Code to the accused for vexatious complaints.

#### True cases.

11. During the year under report 39,386 Police cases under all heads were classed as true cases as against 43,638 and 46,373 in the years 1907 and 1906 respectively. Out of the 39,886 cases 37,923 resulted in conviction, giving a percentage of 96.28 as compared with 97.26 and 96.83 in the years 1907 and 1906 respectively.

Under the Indian Penal Code the true cases numbered 4,010 as against 4,030 in the year 1907 and 3,237 in the year 1906. Of this total number of true cases, 3,804 ended in conviction, giving a percentage of 82.51 as compared with 80.32 in 1907 and 79.05 in 1906.

In Class VI there were 34,776 true cases as against 39,668 and 42,725 in 1907 and 1906 respectively. Of this year's true cases, 34,119 ended in conviction, giving a percentage of 95.11 as against 93.97 in the year preceding and 98.62 in the year 1906.

#### True and false cases and their proportion to cases reported.

12. True and false cases of all descriptions, including 4 cases pending from the previous year, numbered 39,386 and 1,369 respectively as compared with 43,698 and 1,226, respectively, in the preceding year and 46,879 and 1,050, respectively, in the year 1906. The proportion of true and false cases reported during the year was as follows:—

## Proportion of true crime to population.

13. The population of Bombay according to the census taken by the Bombay Municipality in February 1906 was 977,822 and with the number of true crimes standing at 39,386 the proportion of crime to population stands at 1 to 21.82 as compared with 1 to 22.37 persons in the preceding year and 1 to 20.85 in the year 1903.

## Proportion of true crime to Police.

14. The proportion of true crime to Police stands at 16.81 to 1 as compared with 19.34 to 1 in 1907 and 20.78 to 1 in the year 1906 respectively.

## Result of trial by classes.

- 15. Class I.—Offences against the State, Public Tranquility, Safety and Justice.—Under this class there were 60 cases during the year under report as against 24 in 1907 and 36 in 1906. This shows an increase of 36 cases which were for the most part cases falling under the head of "Rioting or unlawful assembly" (Serial No. 9). These were the natural outcome of the disturbed condition of the City at the time of the Mohorrum celebration and of the trial of Bal Gangadhar Tilak. Of the 60 cases for the year under review 49 ended in conviction, giving a percentage of 81.66 as compared with 83.33 and 88.88 in 1907 and 1906 respectively.
- 16. Class II.—Serious offences against the person.—There were under this class 377 cases for disposal as compared with 283 cases in 1907 and 376 in 1906, an increase of 94 distributed under the following heads of crime:—

Out of the total of 377 cases 250 ended in conviction, giving a percentage of 66.31 as against 66.78 in the preceding year and 69.94 in the year 1906.

- 17. Class III.—Serious offences against person and property or against property only.—Under this class there were 539 cases for disposal as compared with 376 cases in 1907 and 494 in 1906. The increase of 163 cases is principally due to a larger number of cases of "Lurking house-trespass or house-breaking (Serial No. 29). Out of the 539 cases 326 ended in conviction, giving a percentage of 64.82 as compared with 60.10 in the preceding year and 58.44 in the year 1906.
- 18. Class IV.—Minor offences against the person.—Under this class there were 23 cases for disposal as compared with 30 in 1907 and 32 in 1906. This shows a decrease of 7 cases. Out of the 23 of this year's cases 12 resulted in conviction, giving a percentage of 52:17 as compared with 50:00 in 1907 and 59:37 in the year 1906.
- 19. Class V.—Minor offences against property.—There were under this class 3,708 cases for disposal, including 4 pending cases from the preceding year, as compared with 3,551 in the preceding year and 3,498 in 1906. This class shows an increase of 217 cases which is mainly noticeable under the head of "Theft, ordinary" (Serial No. 31) which alone shows an increase of 212 cases. Out of 3,798 of this year's cases 3,165 ended in conviction, showing a percentage of 83.07 as compared with 78.48 in the preceding year and 77.58 in the year 1906. The large increase of 212 cases is mostly due to domestic thefts which are not easily detected as the property stolen is either small cash or articles which are of common use amongst people and which it is very difficult to identify. Many people engage domestic servants without ascertaining their previous history and the result is that these servants after a short stay decamp with such valuables as they can lay hands upon.

20. Class VI.—Other offences not specified above.—Under this class there were 36,029 cases for disposal as compared with 40,721 in 1907 and 43,546 in 1906. This class shows a decrease of 4,692 cases and is mainly attributable to a general decrease in the Police and Gambling Acts cases and cases under the Cruelty to Animals Act. Out of the 36,029 cases 34,119 resulted in conviction, showing a percentage of 94.69 as compared with 95.41 in the preceding year and 96.77 in the year 1906.

## Serious crime generally.

- 21. During the year under report there were 14 cases of murler and attempt at murder as compared with 7 in the preceding year and 16 in the year 1906. Out of the 14 cases 8 resulted in conviction, 2 in acquittal, 2 cases were transferred, one remained undetected, and one was pending at the close of the year. Out of the 3 cases of culpable homicide, 2 ended in conviction and 1 in acquittal.
- 22. During the year under report there was 1 case of infanticide as against nil in 1907. The accused woman was committed to the Sessions but was acquitted.

- 24. During the year under report the Coroner held 438 inquests as compared with 347 in the preceding year, showing an increase of 91 inquests.
- 25. In accordance with the directions contained in Government Resolution No. 5819, dated the 16th September 1902, the Police disposed of 312 cases of simple accidental deaths as compared with 225 of such cases in 1907 and 221 in 1906.

#### Sessions cases and persons.

26. During the year 1908 the Sessions Court tried in all 58 cases as compared with 40 in the preceding year and 41 in the year 1906. Out of these, 41 resulted in conviction, 5 in acquittal, and 12 cases were discharged. These cases involved in all 70 persons; of whom 50 were convicted, 8 acquitted, and 12 discharged.

#### Undetected cases.

27. Six hundred and four cases remained undetected at the close of the year 1908, as compared with 644 cases in the preceding year and 659 in the year 1906. The percentages in connection with these cases for the triennial period are as given below:—

## Action of the Police in dealing with offences under Abkari, Salt, Customs and Opium Laws.

28. During the year under report, 51 cases were reported to the Police under the Abkari Act as compared with 35 cases in the preceding year and 36 in 1906. All but 4 cases ended in conviction. Out of the 54 persons involved

in these cases only 4 were acquitted, the rest being convicted. Under the Opium Act there were reported 5 cases implicating an equal number of persons; all of whom were convicted. No offence under the Salt Act was reported during 1908 as against nil in 1907.

## Persons in Police cases.

29. During the year under report 44,054 persons were arrested by the Police, and with 4 pending from the previous year the total number of persons for disposal was 44,058 as compared with 48,101 in the preceding year and 51,344 in the year 1906. Out of 44,058 persons for disposal 41,546 were convicted, the percentage working to 94.29 as against 95.55 in the preceding year and 95.95 in the year 1906. The precentage of persons convicted to persons tried for the triennial period ending with the year 1908 was as follows:—

## Persons released without trial.

30. Under section 73 of the City of Bombay Police Act (IV of 1902), the Commissioner of Police cancelled bail bonds in the case of 5 persons as compared with 16 in the preceding year and 20 in 1906.

## Disposed of by trial.

31. During the year under report 4,924 persons were tried in connection with cases falling under the Indian Penal Code (Classes I to V). Of these, 4,410 were convicted, showing a percentage of 89.56 as compared with 88.10 in the preceding year and 90.35 in the year 1906.

Under Class VI, 39,065 persons were tried. Of these, 37,136 persons were convicted, showing a percentage of 9506 as compared with 9633 in the preceding year and 9701 in 1906.

## Direct cognizable crime.

## (a) Cases.

32. During the year under report the total number of Magistrate's true cases amounted to 6,733 as compared with 5,745 in the preceding year and 5,628 in 1906. Out of 6,733 cases 6,195 ended in conviction, giving a percentage of 92.00 as compared with 91.37 in the preceding year and 93.42 in 1906.

### (b) Persons.

33. The number of persons concerned in the above direct cases was 6,949 as compared with 5,924 in the preceding year and 5,787 in 1906. Out of the 6,949 persons 6,299 persons were convicted showing a percentage of 90.61 as compared with 89.77 in the preceding year and 91.75 in 1906.

#### Non-cognizable crime.

#### (a) Cases.

34. The total number of non-cognizable cases for disposal during the year under report amounted to 9,474 as compared with 9,354 in the preceding year and 8,789 in the year 1906. Out of 9,474 cases for disposal 3,080 ended in conviction, giving a percentage of 32.51 as compared with 35.56 in the preceding year and 38.03 in 1906. The remaining 6,394 cases were disposed of as follows:—

## (b) Persons.

35. In connection with the above non-cognizable cases, 12,506 persons appeared before the Courts as compared with 12,519 in the preceding year and 11,529 persons in 1906. Out of the 12,806 persons that appeared before the Courts 3,376 were convicted, showing a percentage of 26.37 as compared with 29.03 in the preceding year and 31.89 in 1906.

## Property stolen and recovered.

37. During the year under report the total value of property alleged to have been stolen in Police cognizable cases amounted to Rs. 3,18,530 as compared with Rs. 3,07,088 in the preceding year and Rs. 3,91,255 in 1906. The total value of the property recovered amounted to Rs. 1,96,524 as compared with Rs. 192,046 in the preceding year and Rs. 2,03,812 in the year 1906, giving a property of 55,529 as compared with C. 152 in the year 1906, giving a percentage of 56.38 as compared with 62.53 in the preceding year and 51.70 in 1906.

The number of cases in which property was stolen amounted to 3,910 and those in which it was recovered numbered 3,341, giving a percentage of 85.41 as compared with 83.73 in the preceding year and 83.72 in the year 1906.

### General results of working.

- 38. The following are the salient features of the year's history of crime:-
  - I .- A rise in the number of offences under the Indian Penal Code (Classes I to V).
  - II. A decrease in the number of offences under the Police and Local Acts (Class VI).
  - III.—An increase of offences in Classes I, II, III and V.

  - IV.—A decrease of offences in Classes IV and VI.
    V.—A slight falling off in the percentage results of convictions in Classes I, II and VI.
  - VI.—A rise in the percentage results of convictions in Classes III, IV and V.
  - VII.—A rise in the percentage of cases in which properly was recovered.

Arms, Explosives, Petroleum and Motor Vehicles Acts.

#### (a) Arms Act.

39. During the year under report, the licenses of the 36 firms dealing in arms and ammunition in Bombay were renewed by the Commissioner of Police, and a renewal was also granted by Government in the case of the 8 firms selected to deal in rifled breech loading arms and ammunition. Of the latter, 5 are licensed to deal in ammunition for rifles of the prohibited bores. The shops and godowns of these dealers were regularly inspected throughout the year and stock taken at least once a month, when the quantity of arms and ammunition on hand was found to be correct, and agreed with the stock and sale books, which were well and carefully kept.

Three successful prosccutions were instituted during the year under section 19 (f) of the Indian Arms Act and one under 19 (c) and (a).

40. The subjoined Table A gives the number of licenses and permits issued by the Commissioner of Polico under the Arms Act and shows an increase of 229 licenses over the year 1907 and Table B shows to what community the licensees for the possession of arms (item 8, Table A) belong. In the latter Table anincrease of 16 licenses will be noted, 46 licenses were cancelled or were not renewed for the year 1908 (Table B 1) due to the licensees either depositing their guns in office, being made Justices of the Peace or leaving for other districts or dying; thus leaving 427 renewed licenses. Sixty-two new licenses were issued during 1908 and this increase is due to honorary members of the Poona Volunteer Corps taking out licenses in accordance with Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 3768, dated the 16th July 1908. The total number of Possession licenses therefore for 1908 amounted to 489.

## (b) Explosives Act.

41. The magazine and godowns of the various license-holders under the Explosives Act were inspected as often as possible during the year and were found to be maintained in accordance with the orders of Government.

Under this Act, 203 licenses were renewed and 4 new licenses under Form "B" and 1 under Form "F" were granted during the year (vide Table "C" below) showing a decrease of 2 licenses since 1907.

Three persons were prosecuted under the Explosives Act Rules, one of whom was acquitted.

## (d) Motor Vehicles Act.

43. During the year under report 195 cars were registered, making a total of 1,071 motor vehicles registered since the year 1905, out of which approximately 661 were running in Bombay City. Twelve numbers were cancelled during the year, the cars having been either broken up or sent out of the Presidency.

One hundred and seventy-nine transfers were effected.

The general numbers shown on the registers for 1908 amounted to 30, all of which are in Bombay City and the cars running under these numbers help to swell the motor traffic on the roads.

Fourteen licenses to ply for hire and 6 certificates of competency were issued for the City as well as 993 drivers' licenses.

In all 111 accidents were due to Motor Vehicles, 9 of which proved fatal. Out of the 47 prosecutions that were instituted under the Act, 41 resulted in conviction.

### Pilgrims.

44. During the year under report 15,272 pilgrims left Bombay for the Hedjaz with passports from this office, while 839 pilgrims left without obtaining such passports. Of the latter, some did not trouble to obtain passports, while others, who only booked steamer passages at the last moment, had no time to apply for passports. The details of those who left with passports are as follows :-

12,791 pilgrims from British territories.
2,189 pilgrims from foreign territories.
292 pilgrims who had obtained passports from different British Civil and Political Officers in India.

Adding the 839 pilgrims mentioned above, the total number of pilgrims who actually left Bombay for the Hedjaz was 16,111.

During the same period 19,230 pilgrims returned from the Hedjiz vid Bombay and were sent to their homes in different parts of India under the usual Police arrangements.

In September 1908 Government appointed a Haj Committee with Mr. II. G. Gell, M.V.O., as its President. The Committee so far have done good work and are endeavouring to help their co-religionists over the many difficulties attendant upon a long and not infrequently trying pilgrimage.

### Deportation of foreigners.

45. Ten foreigners of the class of procurers were deported during the year under report.

A foreigner named Andrea Cordons, who was convicted in a case of counterfeiting King's coin, arrived from Poona and was despatched to Marseilles on the 14th May 1908.

Eight Arabs ordered by Government to remove themselves from British India on the representation of the Honourable the Resident in Hyderabad were sent down to Bombay from Secunderabad and deported.

#### Fires.

46. The total number of fires that took place in the City of Bombay during the year 1908 was 103 and the aggregate amount of property lost or destroyed is estimated at Rs. 35,33,115. The figures for 1907 were as follows :-

The Municipal Commissioner for the City of Bombay states that out of the 103 fires, in no less than 29 fires property to the extent of Rs. 2,000 and upwards was destroyed during the year under report.

## Street accidents.

47. During the year under report 979 persons were injured and 46 were killed in conveyance accidents as compared with 995 injured and 34 killed in the year 1907. The following are the details:—

In addition to the 992 prisioners so identified by this office during the year, 185 other prisoners were identified by the Presidency Bureau, 78 by Simla and 3 by other Bureaux.

Out of the 992 prisoners so identified during the year, 68 were juveniles as against 107 in the preceding year and 60 in the year 1906.

The working of this branch shows that there has been a steady increase of work year by year and the year under report also shows an increase in the number of persons identified by the branch.

#### Bad characters.

50. Under Chapter VIII of the Criminal Procedure Code, there were 8 cases involving 11 persons during the year under report, as against 11 in the preceding year and 16 in the year 1906. Out of the 8 cases for this year 6 resulted in conviction, 1 in acquittal and in 1 case the accused was declared to be a lunatic and sent to the Lunatic Asylum at Ratnágiri. Three of the 7 convicted furnished the requisite security, the remaining 4 being sent to jail in default.

## Criminal classes and influx of suspicious foreigners.

51. Three Harnees were arrested and sent to Ludhiana by order of the Second Presidency Magistrate before whom they were placed. There were seven arrests in 1907.

## Police Establishments.

52. During the year under report the strength was augmented by the addition of 10 Constables (vide Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 2898, dated 30th May 1908).

Similarly 72 officers and men were added to the Force for the replacement of Military Guards by Police Guards (vide Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 3587, dated 7th July 1908).

The quinquennial average of casualties ending with the year 1907 is 190. Out of 38 deaths that occurred during the year 1908, 8 were due to plague as compared with 6 and 12 in the years 1907 and 1906 respectively.

#### Education.

57. During the year under report 198 officers (European and Native) and 596 men were able to read and write as compared with 198 officers and 576 men in the year 1907.

## Recruiting.

59. The number of recruits enlisted during the year 1908 was 165 as compared with 164 in the preceding year and 132 in 1906.

## Resignations.

59. During the year under report there were 31 resignations as compared with 43 in the preceding year and 59 in 1906.

## Drill and Ball Practice.

60. The Drill and Ball Practice was regularly taken by the Head-quarter Sub-Inspector.

#### Police Buildings.

- 61. The Duncan Road Police Accommodation Scheme of the City Improvement Trust was completed and the building was occupied during the year (vide Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 7169, dated the 2nd December 1908).
- The European Officers' Quarters in the Improvement Trust Scheme on Suxxes Road were completed and the quarters have been occupied (vide Government Resolution, General Department, No. 7168, dated the 2nd December 1908).
- A wooden chauki for four men was constructed by the Public Works Department and located on land belonging to City Improvement Trust at the Junction of Falkland Road and Trimbak Parasharam Street (vide Government Resolution, Financial Department, No. 3321, dated the 7th August 1908).

#### Condition of Arms, Accoutrements and Ammunition.

62. They were regularly inspected and kept in proper order.

## General Efficiency and Remarks.

- 63. The following are the most noteworthy events that occurred in the City of Bombay during the year under report:—
  - (1) The Mohorrum disturbances.
  - (2) The "Tilak" trial.
  - (3) The Malabar Hill thefts.
  - (4) Theft of revolvers by Pathans; and
  - (5) Strikes by Mill-hands.

- (1) The Mohorrum festival of 1908 was the cause of uneasiness and trouble to the entire Force and culminated in a serious disturbance on the last day of the festival. A full and detailed report of this disturbance has already been submitted to Government under this office letter No. 2015-6R., dated the 25th February 1908, and Government in their Resolution, Judicial Department, No 1326, dated the 11th March 1908, in appreciating the services of the Police observed that the Commissioner of Police and his officers and men are deserving of commendation for the manner in which they dealt with a situation serious in itself and fraught with danger to the peace of the entire City of Bombay.
- (2) The "Tilak" trial and the industrial strikes which resulted from it presented certain unusual features and kept the City in a very disturbed condition for a considerable period. I do not propose to recapitulate the whole case here but refer Government to Mr. Gell's report in this connection submitted under this office letter No. 10503-6R., dated the 7th August 1908, and to the remarks upon the Police Force which Government passed in their Resolution, Judicial Department, No 5059, dated the 26th September 1908.
- (3) For some time during the year 1968 thefts were committed in European houses on Malabar Hill, and the Commissioner of Police was obliged to offer a reward of Rs. 100 for information leading to the arrest of the culprit. Subsequently the accused Tyebali Alibhoy, a Bohra by caste, was arrested and 20 different cases under Section 380, Indian Penal Code, and one under Section 457, Indian Penal Code, were traced to him. He was convicted under all counts and sentenced to a term aggregating 15 years and 6 days' rigorous imprisonment. In connection with these cases two Marwari receivers of stolen property were also convicted under section 411, Indian Penal Code, and sentenced to long terms of imprisonment and also fine.
- (4) Seven revolvers were stolen from the shop of Essuf Ali Mahomed Ali, a licensed dealer in arms and ammunition. Certain information having been received, Superintendent Mr. Flanagan made arrangements and succeeded in arresting three Pathans and a Pathan boy aged about 12 years and recovering the seven revolvers which were found buried in a wall. All the accused were subsequently placed before the Fourth Presidency Magistrate under sections 457, 380 and 114, Indian Penal Code, and were all convicted and sentenced to different terms of imprisonment.
- (5) During the same period, the mill-hands of 153 mills went on strike. The total number of mill-hands involved was 413,767. On each occasion Police had to be furnished to keep order. The facts and figures mentioned above go to prove that the efficiency of the Force has been maintained at its previous level.

I may also mention that during the year under report some of the European Inspectors and Sub-Inspectors underwent a course of training in the art of Jui Jitsu wrestling, &c. The services of Mr. Fuginuma were entertained under the orders of Government (vide Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 2978, dated the 4th June 1908) and he gave instructions to 30 European Inspectors and Sub-Inspectors. This art is regularly taught in the training school of the London Police: and considerable advantage would accrue from the regular training of the Bombay Police on the same lines.

64. The good relations existing between the Magistracy and the Police continued during the year under report.

In addition to the three Benches of the Honorary Presidency Magistrates, viz. at (1) Girgaum, (2) Mazagon and (3) Dadar, established under Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 2534, dated the 19th May 1904, a fourth Bench was created and located at the Esplanade Police Court with effect from the 1st April 1908 appointing certain gentlemen to be Honorary Presidency Magistrates with co-ordinate jurisdiction over the whole of the area comprised

within the limits of the Town and Island of Bombay (vide Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 1649, dated the 28th March 1908).

65. As I have only recently taken charge of the office of Commissioner of Police, I am not yet in a position to single out any particular officer for commendation. But I may bring to the notice of Government the great assistance which I have received from Mr. R. M. Phillips, the Deputy Commissioner, since I took charge from him, in a variety of matters connected with the administration of the Force.

RESOLUTION.—The total number of cognizable and non-cognizable cases, which was 60,054 in 1907 fell in 1908 to 57,007 of which 47,557 were cognizable and 9,450 non-cognizable cases. There was an actual increase of 537 in the number of cases under the Penal Code and the reduction in the total was due to a decrease of 4,692 in the number of petty cases of cruelty to animals, gambling and the like which fall under Class VI. The credit for this is ascribed by the Commissioner of Police to the efficiency with which the Benches of the Honorary Magistrates discharged their duties.

- 2. The increase of cases under the Indian Penal Code was distributed over all classes of offences with the exception of those relating to minor offences against the person. The percentage of convictions in cases under the Indian Penal Code has improved in the last three years from 74.97 in 1906 to 79.26 in 1908. The figures of percentage in other cases have not altered much and may be deemed satisfactory. In all 1,369 cases were excluded and of these 22 were declared false. Compensation was granted to falsely accused persons in 13 cases.
- 3. Six hundred and four cases remained undetected at the close of the year as against 644 in the preceding year.
- 4. The result of the year's working may be summed up as a large decrease in petty crime, accompanied by a slight increase in serious crime and but little change in the percentage of success in dealing with it.
- 5. The work of the Criminal Identification Branch continued to expand and 992 persons were identified by means of finger impressions as against 794 in 1907 and 674 in 1906.
- 6. The value of stolen property increased from Rs. 3,07,088 to Rs. 3,48,530. The percentage of recovery fell from 62'53 to 56'38.
- 7. Street accidents resulted in 46 deaths and 979 cases of injury, private carriages other than motor cars being responsible for the largest number of casualties.
- 8. A considerable increase took place in the number of serious fires in the City and property worth Rs. 35,33,115 was destroyed.
- 9. During the year 16,111 pilgrims lest Bombay for the Hedjaz and 18,230 returned via Bombay en routs to their homes in different parts of India to which they were sent under the usual police arrangements.

Government are glad to notice the favourable mention of the labours of the Haj Committee under the Presidency of Mr. H. G. Gell, M.V.O.

10. The Police establishment was increased during the year by 82 officers and men. In common with the rest of the City the force suffered from the unhealthiness of the latter portion of the year and admissions to the Northcote Police Hospital rose from 1,920 to 2,633. Discipline was well maintained, 1,104 rewards being given during the year while there were only 222 punishments against 287 in 1907 and 408 in 1906.

11. The Mohurrum disturbances, the disorder following on B. G. Tilak's trial and the strikes by the mill-hands seriously augmented the ordinary work of the Police force, and the acknowledgments of Government are due to the officers and men for the cheerful spirit in which the extra work was done.
