SIR.

I have the honour to submit the following Report on the state of Crime and working of the Police in the several Districts of the Southern Division for the year 1871.

2. The Statements A to G prescribed for transmission with

this Report are appended for the information of Government. The additional Statements as per margin, required to accompany this Report by the orders of the Government of India, received with Government Endorsements No. 2633 and No. 4283, dated respectively the 8th July

and 30th October 1871, are also appended.

3. The total strength of the Police of all grades employed in the Southern Division, which contains an area of 44,174 square miles, and a population in all of 66,31,386 souls, was 6,734, which gives a proportion of one Policeman to 6.56 square miles, and of one Policeman to 984.76 of population. Deducting, however, that portion of the constabulary employed solely on internal duties, such as guarding Jails and Treasuries, and as orderlies, personal escorts, &c., from the total strength, the proportion of Police is, as regards area, 1 to 9.57 square miles, and as regards population, 1 to 1436.60 souls only.

- 4. The difference in the total strength of the year as compared with that of the preceding year, is due to the 50 Policemen hitherto voluntarily contributed by the municipality of Púna for duty in that city having been amalgamated with the regular Police, consequent on the municipality having been called upon, under Bombay Act I. of 1871, to defray the cost of the Police employed therein, in proportion to its annual income.
- 5. The only alteration that was effected during the year consisted in the transfer of an Inspectorship of Police from the Belgaum to the Kanara District, in which the need for the services of an Officer of this grade was found to be greater than in the Belgaum District.
- 6. The following table shows the aggregate number of all crimes ascertained to have been committed during the year in the entire Division, and the proportion it bears to the area and population of the several Districts:—

10. It will be seen from the subjoined Tables Nos. I. and II. that the large number of acquittals and consequently smaller number of convictions connected with the year's operations, has chiefly been in cases not cognizable by the Police, i.e., those in which arrests were made under directions from the magistrates, upon information obtained either through the Police or otherwise. Of the total number of non-cognizable cases for the Division, viz., 16,143, the Police were employed in arresting, serving summonses, &c., in 10.887, leaving 5,256 as the number investigated by the Magistrates without Police intervention in any form. The number of persons brought before the Magistrates in the former class of cases was 22,775, of whom 5,731 only, or 25 per cent., were convicted on trial: the acquittals giving the large percentage of 75. So also the number of persons brought before the Magistrates without Police intervention was 11,189, of whom only 3,235, or 29 per cent., were convicted, leaving 7,747, or 71 per cent. as the number acquitted. It is obvious that the union of such very unfavourable returns with those for cognizable cases in which the Police are primarily and principally responsible, must vitiate a percentage calculated on the combined return for all classes of cases, however favourable the other returns may be.

- 12. I regret, however, not to be able in the year now under review to record a continuance in the general improvement observable last year as regards proportion of convictions to arrests in cognizable cases. It is true that there is an improvement in five out of the nine districts contained in the Southern Division, and that in Dharwar there is the very creditable percentage of convictions of 73 per cent.; but, on the other hand, in the other four districts there is a very serious falling off, which is not explained to my satisfaction by the District Officers. This reflects unfavourably on their respective charges, and seriously diminishes the results from the whole division, so that the percentage only of 58 is attained, or a diminution of 3 per cent. from the percentage of last year, which was certainly not so large as to claim special merit under that head.
 - 13. But while I do not hesitate, in the hope of effecting correction and improvement in these parts fo the Police system, which may be weak, to point out symptoms of partial failure, I believe that other changes have taken place, which, though they do not altogether explain the failure of the Police to secure conviction in a greater proportion of arrests for offences, serve to diminish the anxiety which apparent deficiency in detective success might tend to raise.
 - 14. It cannot, I think, be doubted that much sewer offences are concealed than formerly, and that the Police are more active and more successful in bringing offences to light. It is undoubtedly a great discouragement to Police Officers of all grades to find that owners of stolen property will not give evidence in some cases, unless there be a fair prospect of recovery of a considerable proportion of that which has been stolen; yet the supineness of well-to-do persons in Kanara on this point is brought prominently to notice in the report of the District Police Superintendent, Major MacGillavry. This circumstance is adduced in extenuation of the small recovery of stolen property in Kanara, but it illustrates the want of public spirit with which our establishments have to deal, and similar reticence in other classes of offences will unavoidably render the task of securing conviction of many classes of offenders a very difficult task for the Police.
 - 15. I regret also to observe that there is an increase of amount of property stolen over the amount in the previous year, and that the percentage of recoveries has slightly retrograded.

16. The percentage for Poona last year was extraordinarily good, and it is most creditable to find the percentage in the pre-Ahmadnagar and Ratnagiri follow next sent year as high as 72. with the high percentage of 64 each, the former showing a considerable improvement. Kanara which, for reasons peculiar to the features of the country, and the social distribution of a number of the better class of cultivators, presents special difficulties, shows a creditable improvement from 27 to 36 per cent. Sholapur, which had a very bad figure last year, has improved, while Belgaum, Dharwar, Kaládgi, and Sátára have fallen to so low a figure as to bring comparative discredit on the charges themselves, and to seriously lower the average percentage of recoveries for the division. Even with all these disadvantageous admissions, I believe the recovery of 47 per cent. will not receive further diminution of credit, but rather the reverse, by reference to the similar returns of other Police administration in India.

 In charge of the Police of this district! Lieutenant A. B. Portman, up to 15th February 1871; Captain H Daniell, from 16th February to 25th November, except from 30th March to 29th April, when he was on privilege leave, and Mr. Keyser, Magistrate, F.P., was in charge of the office; Major R. M. Bounde, from 26th November to end of the year.
- 19. During the year 1871 there was an increase of 378

 Crime. crimes cognizable by the Police, as compared with the previous year. This increase was chiefly in petty thefts, caused, it is stated, by the severe distress among the poorer classes during the latter months of the year, owing to a want of rain and consequent failure of crops. The percentage of stolen property recovered by the Police rose, however, from 54 in 1870 to 64 in 1871, and the percentage of convictions to men brought to trial from 50 in 1870 to 59 in 1871.
- According to the comparative statement attached to this report, ten murders are stated to have Murders. been committed in this district during the year under report; but Captain Daniell states that this statement is incorrect, inasmuch as only eight murders occurred in 1871. The ninth case, it is stated, was struck off the Crime Register, but entered in the returns and comparative statement, owing to certain accused persons having been apprehended in connection with the supposed offence. The tenth was a murder committed in 1870, but the accused having been apprehended and brought to trial in 1871, the crime appears on the returns as though it had occurred in the year 1871. The result of the Police inquiries into the eight cases of murder has been more satisfactory during the year under report than in the previous year. The following is a short resume of the murders and the result of the Police inquiry in each case:--

I.—This was the murder of a man by his wife and a man with whom she had criminal intercourse. Both the accused were convicted and sentenced to transportation for life.

IL—On the 8th March 1871, at Mouze Alkooti, Taluka Parnair, a woman was murdered by a man who kept her and believed her unfaithful to him. The accused was convicted and sentenced to death. This sentence was commuted by the High Court to transportation for life.

III.—On the 7th May 1871, at Mouze Bhondre, Taluka Párnair, a man was murdered by his uncle on account of a land dispute. The accused was convicted and hanged.

- IV.—On the 7th August 1871, at Jamgaum, Taluka Párnair, a prostitute was murdered for the sake of her jewels and ornaments. Three men were apprehended by the Police, one was discharged by the Magistrate, one was acquitted and discharged by the Sessions Court, and the third was convicted and sentenced to death, but the sentence was commuted to transportation for life by the High Court.
- V.—On the 7th August 1871, at Saharabad, Taluka Rahooree, a woman was murdered by a man who had kept her on account of her having left him and gone under the protection of another man. The accused was convicted and hanged.
- VI.—On the 5th October 1871, at Pedgaum, Taluka Shreegonda, a man was murdered by his wife and a man with whom she had criminal intercourse. The man was acquitted and discharged by the Sessions Court, and the woman was convicted and hanged.
- VII.—On the 23rd August 1871, at Ahmadnagar Cantonment, a man was murdered by his wife and a man, as in case No. VI. The man was acquitted and discharged by the Sessions Court, and the woman was convicted and sentenced to transportation for life.
- VIII.—On the 21st December 1871, at Ahmadnagar Cantonment, a woman was murdered by a man who had kept her, but whom she had left. The accused was committed to the Sessions Court, but the case was not finally disposed of before the close of the year
- IX.—In July 1871, at Parnair, a woman was supposed to have been murdered. The Police apprehended three men, and consequently the case appears in the statements; but the Magistrate being satisfied that no murder had been committed, the crime was struck off the register.
- X.—This was the Gat Deela murder case, which occurred in the Sheogaum Taluka on the 4th May 1870. Four men were apprehended for this offence in the year under report, and committed for trial; but the case for the prosecution broke down in the Sessions Court, owing chiefly to the length of time which had elapsed since the commission of the offence, and the accused were acquitted and discharged.

- 21. There were only two cases of culpable homicide in the Culpable Homicide. year under report, against 5 in the previous year. In each case there was a single offender, who was duly apprehended, convicted, and punished by the Sessions Court.
 - 22. There were four dacoities in 1871 against one in 1870;

 Dacoity. the following are the details of these dacoities:—
 - I.—This case occurred in October 1870, but owing to a mistake on the part of the Subordinate Magistrate of the Taluka concerned (Ankola), this offence was not entered in the register of 1870. The offenders, 16 in number, were apprehended in December 1871. Nine of the accused were released by the Magistrate, and seven were committed for trial. This case was pending in the Sessions Court at the close of the year. The accused were all kolies of the Ankola Taluka, belonging to the notorious family of Bhangria.
 - II.—The second case was a trifling robbery of grain by a large number of starving Mangs and Mhars. Twenty-two persons were apprehended; but as the grain was taken from a Jowaree stack in the middle of a field, it was impossible for the Police to obtain satisfactory evidence against the accused, who were very willing to be sent to jail in order to secure food: they were all released by the Magistrate.
 - III.—The third case was an attack upon the house of the Koolkurnee of Mahaladeri, Taluka Ankola, by some Mhars, who were disturbed in their operations by the villagers, and left without carrying off any property. Six men were apprehended, of whom four were convicted in the Sessions Court, and 2 were released by the Magistrate.
 - IV.—The fourth case was a grain robbery similar to the 2nd case reported above. 15 persons were apprehended, of whom 1 was released by the Magistrate, 6 by the Sessions Court, and 8 were convicted at the Sessions Court and sentenced to various terms of imprisonment.
- 23. Two cases of kidnapping appear in 1871. One of these occurred in the Cantonment of Ahmadnagar, where a boy stated he had been carried off to an out-of-the-way spot by a man who tried to steal

the ornaments on his person. The accused was apprehended, but released on bail, as no property had been lost nor injury done to the child, on whose evidence no great reliance could be placed. The second case occurred in the Sheogaum Taluka, where a woman complained that a man with whom she had a quarrel, had carried off her 10 months' old male child. The Police at once recovered the child; but the accused was released under Section 153 of the Criminal Procedure Code.

- 24. No cases of kidnapping for immoral purposes occurred in this district. Captain Daniell states that the Police in the Northern Talukas near the railway were especially warned to be on the look-out for cases of this description, but no report was ever made of a child missing.
- 25. One member of the Police Force was judicially punished during the year under report. This was a Head Constable, 4th class, who released a man accused of theft, on receiving a small bribe. This fact having been ascertained by the Chief Constable of the Taluka, the Head Constable was convicted and sentenced to pay a fine of Rs. 75, and, consequent on his conviction, his name was struck off the Police Rell.
- 26. Favourable mention is made by the District SuperintendSubordinate Officers deservent of Police of Inspectors Messrs. Vining of special notice. ent of Police of Inspectors Messrs. Vining of special notice. ent, who was in charge of the A Division
 until the early part of December, and Shumsoodin Ali Khan, who
 held charge of the B Division until June, when he was replaced by
 Mr. Motilal Mohunlal. In reference to Mr. Vincent, Captain Daniell states that "he is a most excellent Police Officer in every
 way, and bears the highest character among all classes, from highest to lowest, official and non-official, in the Zilla." The conduct of
 the Chief Constables, it is stated, was satisfactory during the year,
 and many of these officers having performed their duties with
 great efficiency, they nearly all deserve mention with credit.
- 27. The percentage of members of the force who can read and write, including Chief Constables, is 25.88. Captain Daniell states that "every encouragement is given to men at Head Quarters to attend the school; but the duties of the Reserve are very heavy, or, rather, constant, and it is impossible to excuse men from duty for the purpose of attending school. In new enlistments preference is given to lads or men who have attended school; but not many educated men offer themselves to enter the service as constables. Having a

certain amount of education, they think themselves competent to perform the duties of Police Officers on Rs. 20 per mensem and upwards, without any previous training in the department."

28. There were 50 cases of suicide in 1871, against 25 in Suicidesand Accidental Deaths. the preceding year, and 114 cases of accidental deaths against 77 in 1870. The following are the details of the cases pertaining to the year 1871:—

- 30. Lieutenant-Colonel G. E. Thomas was in charge of the Police of this district throughout the year; but the report is submitted by Mr. Macpherson, Supernumerary Assistant, who was in charge when it became due.
- 31. In murders and culpable homicides taken together there is an increase of 6 cases, there being 20 in 1871 against 14 in 1870. In dacoities, robberies, and receiving stolen property, there is a slight decrease, the numbers being 6,53, and 9 in 1871, against 7,59, and 11, respectively, in 1870. In thefts there is an increase of 20 cases, the number being 470 in 1871 against 450 in 1870. The percentage of convictions in cognizable cases is more favourable than last year. The percentage of recovery of stolen property has, however, fallen off from 58 in 1870 to 47 in 1871, which is unsatisfactory.

Murders.

32. The following are the details of the 18 cases of murder reported during the year under report:—

- I.—At Goomchinnurdee, Mahal Hookeree, on the 17th February 1871, a woman, while watching her field, was attacked and beaten with clubs by two men. The woman died the same night. The crime is supposed to have been committed in consequence of a dispute about the right of occupancy of the field. Two men were apprehended and committed to the Sessions Court, but were acquitted.
- II.—The dead body of a woman was found in the lands of Murigoree, Taluka Sumpgaon, on the 18th January 1871. A Punchnama was held. There were marks of severe wounds caused by a sickle on the back of the head, right eye, and elbow. The deceased was a prostitute, and latterly was reduced to such a wretched condition as to be compelled to beg alms to support herself. Some ornaments of small value, stated to have been worn by her the day before her death, were missing when the body was found. From this it appears probable that the woman was murdered for the sake of her ornaments. Minute inquiries were instituted, but evidence could not be found sufficient to justify the case being forwarded to the Magistrate.
- III.—At Bedkihal, Taluka Chikodee, on the 15th March 1871, a man, after taking his dinner at his sister's house, set out to return to his home at Nuvinhal. The sister not

hearing of her brother's safe arrival for some days, made inquiries, and found his clothes and his head separated from the body lying in a sugar-cane field about a mile from the village. There was, however, no blood on the clothes nor the ground round about. This led to the surmise that, after murdering the deceased, the perpetrators of the offence must have brought the body from the scene of crime and cast it into that field to render detection difficult. Minute inquiries were therefore made by the Police, and it was discovered that the deceased had an intrigue with the wife of one Peergowda, who, with three of his friends, was arrested and committed to the Sessions Court, where they were acquited.

- IV.—A man had in his keeping a woman whom he proposed to marry by the ceremony of "pat" (remarriage of a woman who has previously been married); but she refused her consent, and on the man's insisting, she agreed to pay Rs. 15 to one Fakeera for killing him. They all travelled together from Sumpgaon, and on the night of the 14th April 1871 halted at a temple on the bank of the Guddikeree Tank, near Hubli. During the night, while the man was asleep, the woman and Fakeera killed him, crushing his head with a large stone and castrating him. They were sentenced to death and executed.
- V.—On the 30th April 1871 one male and two female beggars, after crossing the river near Gowrwad, Taluka Chikodee, were accosted by two men (father and son), who claimed the "dhoter" worn by one of the women, and attacked and wounded her on the head with an axe, from the effects of which she died. The men were apprehended and committed to the Sessions Court; one of them was sentenced to death, and the other to transportation for life.
- VI.—At Karudgé, Taluka Chickodee, on the night of 28th April 1871, four men called one Vittoo to assist them in manuring a field; on his arrival one of them knocked him down, another seized him by the throat, and a third crushed his breast with stones, and after thus rendering him insensible, they all tied the body in a cumblee and threw it into a well. It appeared, on inquiry, that there was ill-feeling between one of the prisoners and the deceased, who had a few days before put a severe pressure

- on him for payment of a debt. Of the four prisoners, one turned Queen's evidence, and three were sentenced to death by the Sessions Court. The High Court quashing the sentence, ordering two of the prisoners to be released, and the third to be transported for life.
- VII.—At Betgiree, Taluka Gokak, on the 10th May 1871, while two men (father and son) were under custody of a shetsundee on a charge of robbery, one of them (the son) attempted, without permission, to go home. The shetsundee stopped him. Provoked at this, the accused, assisted by his father, knocked the shetsundee down, beat him, and ran away. The Shetsundee died from the effects of the beating. The father was apprehended and committed to the Sessions Court, but was acquitted. The son committed suicide by drowning himself in a nalla.
 - VIII.—On the 11th May 1871 an inhabitant of Hookeree, who 6 or 7 days previously had left his mother at home and gone to the Gokak market, informed the Police that his mother was missing. Shortly afterwards a shet-sundee gave information that he had found the corpse of a woman in his field two miles from the town of Hookeree. The Chief Constable proceeded to the spot and saw the corpse, which was recognized to be that of the complainant's mother, tied to the trunk of a tree with two stones placed on the breast. Several men were apprehended on suspicion and sent before the Magistrate, but were discharged.
 - IX.—At Chikalgood, Mahal Hookeree, a man who was in the habit of finding fault with his son's behaviour, was murdered by his son and one Rama on the 14th June 1871, and his body was thrown into the river. The Police have been unable to apprehend the son; but Rama was apprehended and sentenced to death and executed.
 - X.—At Kokutnoor, Taluka Atlıni, the mistress of a man named Bussya quarrelled with him on account of an intrigue which she had with one Suttya, and she, on the 31st May 1871, with the aid of 4 others, killed Bussya while he was asleep. Of the offenders, 3 have been sentenced to transportation for life, and 2 to five years' rigorous imprisonment each.

- XI.—At Neechunkee, Taluka Sampgaon, on the 19th June, 1871, the corpse of a woman, the servant of one Goorsatapa, and residing in his house, was found in a well in his field. In the house was found a blood-stained cloth belonging to the woman, and some fragments of glass bracelets near it. On inquiry it was discovered that the deceased had given information to the husband of one Doondawa, that his wife was in the habit of committing adultery, and the evidence elicited seemed to point to the conclusion that Doondawa contrived to have the deceased murdered by one Fakeera, who was apprehended and committed to the Court of Sessions, but was acquitted.
- XII.—On the night of the 5th July, 1871, one Goodchapa, who had been residing for some days in a "mutt" outside the village of Maldinee, Taluka Gokak, was found dead in the "mutt," with wounds on his forehead and throat. Suspicion fell upon six men, of whom one died subsequently from natural causes, and the remaining five were committed to the Sessions Court, but acquitted.
- XIII.—On the 13th November, 1871, in the Belgaum Cantonment, a washerman, on account of family dissensions, made a murderous attack upon his wife, mother-in-law, and brother-in-law, maiming them in different ways with two knives. He then left the house, and was followed along the road by a crowd of people who were attracted by the disturbance, when, suddenly turning round, he stabbed one man and one woman with the knives, and they both died almost immediately. The prisoner was apprehended and sentenced to death, and has been executed.
- XIV.—On the night of 14th November, 1871, a man was watching his field at Yeksumbé, Taluka Chickodi, when a number of Mhars attacked and beat him, and carried away his crop. The man was carried home by one Sidapa, and died the next day. Seventeen persons were apprehended, of whom one turned Queen's evidence; three were sentenced to transportation for life, three to eight years', and one to seven years' rigorous imprisonment. The remainder were acquitted.
- XV.—At Shingarkope, Taluka Parasgud, on the 25th and 26th October 1871, a man beat his wife, accusing her of adultery, and she, on the 30th idem, administered poison in bread to her husband, who died six hours afterwards.

- She was apprehended and sentenced to death, and has been executed.
- XVI.—On the 5th December, 1871, while a woman was grazing cattle in the lands of Sangolee, Taluka Sampgaon, a man made her some immoral overtures, and on her refusal to consent, killed her with a hatchet. He has been sentenced to transportation for life.
- XVII.—At Sownduttee, on the 26th December, 1871, one Goorbassapa took a girl 14 years of age, who lived with a prostitute, to his house, and strangled her for the sake of her ornaments. He has been sentenced to death.
- XVIII.—On the 9th March, 1871, the Chief Constable of Shapur, Illakha Sanglee, gave information to Mr. Inspector Kyte that the corpse of a woman was lying in the nulla between Marihal and Soolibhavee. The Belgaum Taluka Chief Constable, the Inspector, and the Shapur Chief Constable went to the spot and made inquiries, and the evidence elicited tended to show that one Bavakhan had murdered the deceased between Moodji and Soolibhavee, on her refusal to consent to an immoral proposal. It was doubtful whether the crime was committed in the Sanglee Illakha or Belgaum Taluka. However, sanction was obtained for the case to be tried by British authorities. The case terminated in the discharge of the accused by the Magistrate.
- 33. Of the two prisoners in the Kunburgee case, which was pending trial at the end of last year, one has been sentenced to 3½ years' rigorous imprisonment and the other discharged.
- 34. One Geerya wullud Demusk was forwarded to the Magistrate for trial on a charge of causing grievous hurt in having, at Hoonurgee, Taluka Chickodi, on the 11th September 1871, wounded a woman and her child with a cutting instrument. Subsequently, the child having died from the injuries received, the prisoner was tried by the Sessions Court on the charges of culpable homicide and attempt to murder, and was sentenced to 10 years' rigorous imprisonment.
- 35. At Moodulgee, Taluka Gokak, on the 13th November 1871, a man, while firing at a mark, accidentally shot a man. He was charged with an offence punishable under Section 304A of the Indian Penal Code, and fined Rs. 20.

- 36. There were six cases of Dacoity during the year under report, the details of which are given below:—
- I.—At Ingulgee, Mahal Moorgode, on the 18th November 1871, a boy, while tending cattle, was attacked and beaten by seven men, who drove away the cattle, valued at Rs 300. Some persons were apprehended, but discharged by the Magistrate.
- II.—At Desnoor, Taluka Sampgaon, on the 16th September 1871, two men, while grazing their cattle, were attacked by five others who pelted them with stones and carried off the cattle. Five men were arrested, of whom two were discharged by the Magistrate and three acquitted by the Sessions Court.
- 111.—At Yergopee, Taluka Sampgaon, on the night of the 30th December 1871, eight men entered the field of one Bussya bin Shivlinga, and, after wounding him with a "vilee" (a cutting instrument), stole some jowaree, a cumblee, and a dhotee worth Rs. 3. The case was pending inquiry at the end of the year.
- IV.—At Makanmurdee, Taluka Sampgaon, on the 24th December 1871, five men beat the complainants Annapa and Venkapa, and robbed them of a silver "kuddora," valued at Rs. 37. The case was pending at the end of the year.
- V.—At Govinkope, Taluka Sampgaon, on the 1st April 1871, a number of men carried off the cotton crop in the field of one Narayenpooreehana. They were not apprehended, as the case involved a question concerning the right of occupancy of land.
- VI.—On the road between Hooleekotul and Gundigwad, Taluka Beedee, on the 28th May 1871, eight men were reported to have robbed one Nagapa of cash (Rs. 1,103-8-0). On inquiry by the Police, the complaint turned out to be without foundation, and no arrests were made.
- 37. Only one case occurred during the year under report.

 The crime is stated to be of rare occurrence in this district; but orders have been issued to the Police to be vigilant in its detection and suppression.
- 38. This district was not visited during the year by any wandering tribes from the zillas; but there are many resident predatory classes, such as Kummays, Beruds, Korvees, &c.

The District Superintendent of Police states that " the Korvees are a wandering tribe, and occasionally commit petty thefts; the Kummays are professional burglars; and the Beruds are professional cattle-stealers and highwaymen, and abound in the talukas of Sampgaon, Gokak, Parasgud, Belgaum, and Mahal Hookeree. Few offences are committed either by the Kummays or Korvees; but the Beruds are troublesome, and there is reason to suppose that many cases of cattle-stealing occur which are never reported to the Police. It seems that the Beruds are in the habit of stealing cattle and restoring them to their owners on payment of half their value; if, however, the owner reports his loss, the cattle are killed and eaten, therefore owners prefer paying this black mail to coming forward and complaining. Steps have been taken to check this practice, but the obstacles in the way of the Police are serious, as there is too much reason to suspect that the Patels are, in many instances, in league with the Beruds." The evil in this instance is one with which, I consider, the Police are able to compete, and they should strain every nerve to do so. Any supposed complicity on the part of the Patels should at once be reported to the Magistrate.

- 39. No extraordinary detective ability, it is stated, has been displayed by the Force during the year.
 - 40. All the posts, with few exceptions, were visited by the Inspection.

 District Superintendent of Police during the year.
- 41. The present head-quarters lines have been condemned by the Sanitary Commission. Improved lines, on the new site handed over to the Police, are very urgently required. Plans and estimates for new lines have recently been submitted to Government.
- 42. The general conduct of the Police has been good. During the year seventeen Officers and nineteen Constables were departmentally punished. One Constable was judicially punished, under the Police Act, for insubordination, and one for criminal breach of trust.
 - Cases of Torture.

 43. One Constable was judicially punished for having used torture to extort a confession.
- 44. The village Police has been considerably reduced durvillage Police. ing the last few years. The Acting District Superintendent of Police states that "they have generally rendered good service, but in many villages are

open to suspicion of couniving at crimes. Much depends upon the character and influence of the village Patel, and upon the position of the suspected parties."

- 45. The education of the men is reported to be improving.

 General Remarks

 It is stated that about 110 men can now write reports, &c., in good style, and that about 210 more can read and write indifferently. Mr. Macpherson states that, "with few exceptions, the men have been taught to read and write since joining the Force, service in which does not appear sufficiently attractive to induce men of any education to enter it."
- 46. There were 70 cases of suicide and 189 cases of acci
 Suicides and Accidental deaths during the year 1871, against 35 and 194, respectively in the preceding year. The following are the details of the cases relating to the year under report:—

48. Captain T. J. Wise was in charge of the Police of this district throughout the year.

the year under report there has been a decrease in the number of cognizable cases, and that the convictions in these cases are one per cent. better than in the previous year. This percentage, the District Superintendent of Police remarks, would have been much higher still, but for the minor offences included in cognizable cases, in which the Sub-Magistrates summon many people, without the interference of the Police, and discharge them after inquiry. This, he adds, spoils the percentage of convictions, and he gives the following instances, relating to the year under report:—

"Under Sections 447 and 448, thirty-five persons were summoned by the Magistrates, and eight apprehended by the Police; of this number only eight were convicted, or 18

per cent."

"Under Sections 406 to 408, out of twenty men summoned or apprehended by the Police only three were convicted, or

15 per cent."

"Under Sections 341 to 344 there were thirty-three persons summoned and eight arrested by the Police, in all forty-one, of which number five only were punished, or 12 per cent."

50. The percentage of stolen property recovered shows an increase, it having been 36 per cent. in the year under report

against 27 in 1870.

51. In cognizable and non-cognizable cases there is a decrease this year in the number of cases, but an increase in the number of arrests. In non-cognizable cases, out of 1,804 persons summoned by Magisterial Officers direct, only 420 were punished, or 23 per cent.

Murders.

Head-Constable, 3rd Class, named Kecheo Sawunt, of the Hullial Division. One Babatee Yella was busy stealing some ornaments from the person of a young child, when the child suddenly began crying out to its mother, upon which he struck it a blow that knocked it down senseless in the road. Thinking he had killed the child, Yella ran away and hid himself in a sugar-cane field, whither he was followed by the Police. The deceased Head-Constable having placed his men round the field, entered it alone to arrest Yella, who, socing the Head-Constable coming, and finding escape impossible, suddenly snatched up a large wooden clod-crusher and

struck the Head-Constable on the head, who died that night from the effects of the blow. Yella was captured by the Police, and sentenced to death by the Sessions Court.

Dacoities. 53. The following are the details of the six cases of Dacoity reported:—

- I.—On the morning of the 31st January three Pindarces, with three tatoos, carrying Rs. 7,000, belonging to a Sowcar in Sirsi, were proceeding to that town from Hungul, in the Dharwar Collectorate, where they had halted the previous night, when they were stopped about 8 o'clock A.M.; just inside the Kanara boundary, by a band of men, and looted of Rs. 5,000,—one tattoo with Rs. 2,000 succeeding in getting away. These Pindarees were on a small cross country footpath at the time they were looted, and the place is surrounded by heavy jungle, extending for many miles. The District Superintendent of Police carried on the inquiry personally, and some men (bad characters) who had been seen near the spot were arrested; but the case could not be proved against them, as nothing but cash was stolen.
- II.—On the 19th February two men were stopped on the road near Dassunkope, and beaten and robbed of a small amount of property by some Wudders. This case was traced, and seven persons apprehended by the Police; of these, one was admitted as Queen's evidence, and the other six sentenced to long terms of imprisonment by the Sessions Court.
- III.—On the evening of the 16th March four men were stopped on the road, about 7 miles from Sirsi, and robbed of Rs. 480. The loot was, no doubt, committed by some of the many gamblers and blackguards of Sirsi, who followed the complainants from that town, they having just received the amount stolen for cattle sold. The District Superintendent of Police had, it is reported, personally superintended the inquiry into this case; but it could not be traced.
- IV.—On the night of the 4th April four houses were broken into in the village of Hulkeree, in the Sirsi Taluka, and property of the value of Rs. 4,069-7 stolen. The Police were unsuccessful in tracing this dacoity at the time, but afterwards recovered Rs. 977 in the house of a liquor-seller in the Dharwar District, a noted thief and receiver of stolen property. Two men were apprehended, but they escaped conviction, although the complainants swore to

the property; but the evidence they produced regarding

it was faulty.

- V.—On the night of the 29th August the houses of two Brahmins living at Sheegahully, in the Sirsi Taluka, were broken into, and Rs. 2,619-4 stolen. Mr. Inspector Sooban Rao, who was then at Sirsi, together with the Sub-Magistrate, reached the spot within a few hours, and succeeded in apprehending all the offenders and recovering Rs. 2,140-8-0. In this case seven men were apprehended by the Police, and five of them committed to the Sessions Court.
- VI.—On the night of the 8th December six men went to rob cocoanuts in the garden of one Shesgiri, of Kolikone, who, with his wife, was beaten, when trying to prevent them.

 They have all been apprehended and committed to the Sessions Court for dacoity.
- 54. In addition to the above detailed decoities of 1871, the Police were successful in tracing two dacoities that occurred in In the former of these, property to the value of 1867 and 1869. Rs. 854 was found, and four men apprehended; but the case broke down, as, when before the Magistrate, the complainant stated that, owing to the length of time that had elapsed since he was looted, he could not swear to the property, although it was like his. property was recognized and picked out by a relation of complainant's, whom he himself had deputed to accompany the Police. The District Superintendent of Police states he has no doubt that the property did belong to complainant, but being a very rich man, and willing to sacrifice the amount rather than have to go to Karwar, with several of his relations, to give evidence in the Sessions Court, the case broke down. Captain Wise further believes it probable that the prisoners' relations agreed to return the whole of the property to the complainant, if he did not prosecute, so that he would get off his journey to Karwar, and be no loser by taking this courso. In this case, property of the value of Rs. 16,000 was looted; and Captain Wise adds that it is of common occurrence in this district for men to refuse to recognize property if the amount recovered is only a small portion of that looted. The second dacoity traced was one that occurred at Silloor in June 1869, and in this case twelve men were apprehended, ten of whom were sentenced by the Sessions Court to rigorous imprisonment for 8 years each.
 - 55. No case occurred under this head during the year under report. The District Superintendent of Police observes that "no special agency

has been employed to suppress the crime of kidnapping, and there does not appear to be much of it going on in this district."

- 56. In this district the chief criminal classes were described at length in last year's report, paras.

 66 and 67; and in reference to these Captain Wise now adds as follows:—
 - "As will have been learnt from the details given, nearly the whole of the dacoities were committed in the Sirsi Talu-There are a great number of bad characters in this town, who gamble day and night, and replenish their empty purses by robbery and crime of all kinds. I have applied to have the Gambling Act introduced into this town, as there can be no question about its being required, and suggested that, as there was no resident Magistrate, F. P., these powers might be delegated to the Principal Sub-Judge, or to the 1st Class Magistrate who resides there; but Government refused to grant this. sent to the District Magistrate a nominal roll of the worst characters and gamblers of Sirsi, and also of the Chinamen and others of Karwar, and requested that these people, who are like a plague to all honest residents, might be brought under the provisions of Section 27 of Regulation 12 of 1827; but this was also refused. I am glad to say that in this year a burglary of Rs. 1,500 was brought home to a man named Mama, long known as the chief robber of Sirsi, and he has been sentenced to 5 years' rigorous imprisonment."
- 57. Inspector Sooban Rao Salvee, it is reported, has done good service in detecting crime, and has received certificates from the Sessions Court, commending him for the way in which he has traced out and sent up his cases. Chief Constables, 1st Class, Lingoo Soobrao, and 3rd Class, Shamrao Gunesh, are also good detective officers.
- 58. In the year under report all the Police Buildings were repaired before the rains, and a new Station-house built at Munchikery, at a cost of Rs. 213-8-0. Captain Wise further remarks as follows:—
 - "As I have already brought to notice, a new Station-house is urgently required at a place named Herragooty, as the present one will not last through another monsoon, and the Police will have no place to live in. I had commenced this building; but on finding that my budget estimate

for petty construction and repairs had been cut down from Rs. 2,000 to the small sum of Rs. 800, I was obliged to stop the work at once. I would respectfully submit that the above sum is not sufficient for this district, where there are no less than 52 Station-houses to be kept in repair and rebuilt when required, and the average rainfall is nearly 100 inches. All prisoners from Sirsi, Sidapur, Coompta, Honore, and Butkut must halt for a night at Herragooty, and there is no accommodation, unless I am allowed to rebuild the station already commenced."

The Superintendent's representation on this subject was met by Government increasing the sum at the disposal of that officer for petty construction and repairs by an additional grant of Rs. 700.

- General Conduct.

 Constable and five Constables have been punished judicially, and of these two were sentenced to one month's simple imprisonment only, and one to a fine of Rs. 10 for small offences.
- Subordinate Officers kept up his name as a hard-working, good deserving of special Police Officer. The following officers are also notice.

 Favourably noticed by Captain Wise, for the way in which they have worked during the year, their percentages of detections and recovery of stolen property being above the average:—
 - 1. Chief Constable, 1st Class, Lingoo Soobrao (Coompta)— Detections 48 per cent.; property recovered 60 per cent.
 - 2. Chief Constable, 2nd Class, Gunesh Ramchunder (Sidápur)
 —Detections 67 per cent.; property recovered 45.
 - 3. Head-Constable, 1st Class, Shaik Ally (Súpa)—Detections 70 per cent.; property recovered 92.
 - 4. Chief Constable Munjunathaya (Sirsi)—Detections 63 per cent.; recovery of property 46.

This last named Officer, it is stated, has also worked hard and well at Sirsi in following up and endeavouring to trace dacoities to a long distance, having been out, "together with Chief Constable Gunesh Ramchunder," the greater part of the monsoon, and has suffered much from fever in consequence.

General Remarks. 61. In the way of general remarks, Captain Wise writes as follows:— "The difficulty of getting a good Police from the only classes that will come forward to enlist in Kanara is well known to you, and it is in a great measure owing to their being obliged to serve in all parts of a district noted for being unhealthy and feverish; many of the Polico stations being situated on lonely roads in the dense jungle, where the men have to go a long distance for their food, and the water is very bad. The worst of these posts are relieved every month; but even with this arrangement, I have known every man come in at the end of, or during, the month with severe fever, and go into hospital. I think the returns for this year bear me out in stating that the Kanara Police are improving, and it is worthy of remark that during the past year not a single accusation has been made against any member of the Force for having ill-used or attempted to extort confessions from prisoners,—and such cases were only too common in former years."

I consider this testimony to the conduct of the Police, in a matter to which abuse of their authority is so often charged against them, very creditable to the Department in Kanara, and to Captain Wise and Major MacGillavry, who have been Superintending Officers during the year.

62. There were 22 cases of suicide and 184 cases of accidental Suicides and Accidental deaths in 1871, against 17 and 166 respective-leaths.

- 64. Mr. G. T. Giertsen was in charge of the Police of this district from 1st January to 5th October 1871; Mr. J. R. Middleton, Magistrate, F. P., from 6th October to 7th November 1871; and Captain F. P. Bartholomew from that date to the end of the year.
- Crime. Crimes during the year under report, as compared with 1870. The percentage of convictions in murders and thefts, however, exceeds that of the former year, while in cases of dacoity and robbery, the average convictions were less.
- 66. There were sixteen cases of murder during the year under report against 10 in 1870. In six cases convictions were obtained; in five cases eighteen accused persons were acquitted in the Sessions Court, and the remaining five cases still remain undetected. The following are the details of these murders:—
 - I.—On the night of 5th March, 1871, a young man, 28 years old, by name Basya Lingayet, was killed at Kamanhullee, in Bankapur Taluka, while sleeping in his field, by means of a hatchet. Five accused were arrested on strong suspicion, but were released on bail. Mr. Giertsen, who personally investigated this case, remarked as follows:— "From the inquiries I made on the spot, it appears that Basya was very much disliked, being strong, quarrelsome, and impudent to men and women, so that his death was looked upon as a good riddance. He had quarrelled with the owners of some neighbouring fields, by stopping up the water-course running through his field into theirs; had quarrelled about a sheep; quarrelled about women; was finally accused of having killed by witchcraft a young man of the village a few days previously, he having used in a quarrel with the mother some strong language which, after the shortly-following death of her son, was interpreted to protend that misfortune. Five accused had been arrested on strong moral suspicion, but not a scrap of evidence being forthcoming under present conditions of village feeling, they were all released on bail."
 - II.—The body of a man, Naga, a Mhar of Malgoond, in Hangal Taluka, was found in a field, about one mile from that village, with his right arm broken and a wound in the neck. On the 13th April the deceased had that morning

- borrowed one rupee and gone to Aloor, about 3 miles off, to pay it to a tailor, to whom he owed two rupees. It appears that some quarrel took place between the tailor and the Mhar at Aloor, when the latter was killed, and his body placed in a field, where it was afterwards found. No clue has been obtained.
- III.—The body of a woman, fearfully mutilated, was found outside the village of Kirasoor, in Hubli Taluka, on the 28th April. The deceased had, on the 24th April, gone out to pick cotton, and returned in the evening: she was not seen afterwards. She had carried on an intrigue with a Mussalman of Hebsoor, and, on his account, it is supposed that the husband and his brothers killed her. Two prisoners, Bhurma and Doorga, were acquitted by the Sessions Court.
- IV.—On the evening of the 7th June the wife of a Lumbance of the Candbogoor Tanda was killed by three Lumbances of the same Tanda, by beating her on the back and head with a heavy stick. Three prisoners were convicted, of whom one was sentenced to death, and two to transportation for life.
- V.—Murder of a young man at Tewur Mellechullee, on the 10th June, at 8 r.m., in a field near Hulsoor, in Bankápur Taluka. There were many eye-witnesses. In the house of one of the accused was found a hatchet, with blood stains, and in the house of another a blood-stained dhotur. Six prisoners were acquitted by the Sessions Court.
- VI.—This was a case of infanticide in June 1871. In Hubli, in an old well, was found the body of an infant, about two days' old. The offence, probably, was committed by some travellers. The District Superintendent of Police states that it is now impossible to detect it.
- VII.—On the road near Yedgood, in Kod Taluka, was found, on the 5th July 1871, mutilated parts of a human body, and sleeves of a coat. From these the body was identified by the deceased's sister as that of Doondappa, Coolkurneo of Bilhullee, who had left the village on the second morning. This murder, it is said, was committed through enmity. Six persons were arrested, of whom three were convicted and sentenced to transportation for life by the Sessions Court.

- VIII.—Suspicion of murder. On the 15th of July, at Govinhal, in Bankapur Taluka, a human body was found in a nulla. The flesh was half eaten away: apparently the body had been 8 or 10 days in the water, and from the clothes it was supposed to be that of a man. One end of the dhotur was tied up round his waist, and at the other end, in the water, was a big stone. The body was afterwards recognized by the deceased's sister as that of Doorga, Tulwar of Hoolgoor, who had lately lived in the house of Chenbussya Gowda at Siswunhal, and had not been seen sinco the evening of the 10th July, when he had left Hoolgoor to go to Siswunhal. The case still remains undetected.
 - IX.—On the 21st of August, 1871, the body of a man, tied in a kumblee, was found in a well a Utteegehree, in Bankapur Taluka. It was identified as that of Fukeera bin Bhurmunnee, 25 years old. There were marks of many wounds on the body. The inquiry by the Police threw suspicion on a ryot, Rayeppa, whose curbee stack the deceased had burnt on the 5th of August; and it came out that he had employed three men, promising each Rs. 50, to kill the deceased. On the 16th evening, at 9 r. M., these four men went to Fukeera's (deceased) house, and called him out under pretext of having a burglary in hand, and afterwards murdered him. Four persons were arrested, of whom two were convicted and sentenced to transportation for life; the other two were acquitted by the Sessions Court.
 - X.—A tribe of Hern shikarces—wandering and stealing vagabonds—were, on the night of the 7th September, in fields near Dymapur, in Ron Taluka, attacked and robbed of property, valued at Rs. 60, by fifteen robbers. Two of them were severely beaten, of whom one died on the 10th from its effects, and the second died a few days afterwards. Eight prisoners (Bedurs) had been sent up; but no property or corroborating proof was found. The prisoners were acquitted by the Sessions Court.
 - XI.—On the 23rd September a man named Bedur Mulla, of the village of Chin Moolgoond, in Kod Taluka, disappeared, and his body was found in a well in a garden on the 3rd October. Two stones were tied to the body to sink it. There were marks of blows, as if inflicted by clubs, on the crown of the head and forehead. Five

prisoners were sent up, of whom one was discharged by the Magistrate, F. P.; two were convicted and sentenced (one to death and the other to transportation for life); and the other two were acquitted by the Sessions Court.

XII.—At Holi Munnoor, in Ron Taluka, a man had been murdered, on the 6th October, by strangulation. Two persons were arrested and sent up to the Magistrate, of whom one was discharged by the Magistrate, and the other acquitted

by the Sessions Court.

XIII.—At Boojrook-Kodeehullee a woman named Sunguwa was murdered on the night of the 17th October by thieves, who had broken into the house and carried off Rs. 1,644 worth of ornaments and money. There was a mark of a blow on her eye, and a knife and stick were thrust into her mouth. Fifteen men were made prisoners, of whom six were convicted of murder and dacoity, and sentenced to limited terms of imprisonment.

- XIV.—On the 8th November, 1871, a woman was murdered at Hereekop, in Karajgi Taluka. From inquiry it was known that the deceased had called upon two men, Hunma and Kencha. From this suspicion fell on them, and they were apprehended. They acknowledged that she had come to them, and gave the following reason:—That they wished her to make a false complaint against two men, Hoossein and Mohideen, and had, therefore, beaten her, so as to make a good case; they gave her a wound with a durathi (knife for cutting grass), but wounded her more severely than they thought, and she died; they then cut her throat, with the intention of bringing a charge of murder against the other parties, and placed the corpse in the field of the men they intended to bring the charge against. Four persons were apprehended and sent up, of whom two, Hunma and Kencha, were convicted and sentenced to death.
 - XV.—Murder of a woman, Kurry Yellowa, at Byadgi, in Ranibednur Taluka. It appears that a man named Kurwutty, of Byadgi, was charged with theft, and when the Police went to apprehend him he resisted them, and escaped. Afterwards he appeared before the Chief Constable at Ranibednur, and accused the Police of having murdered his aunt. This being a suspicious case, the Foujdar and all the parties concerned were removed from the Taluka, and the Bankapur Foujdar was sent to make

inquiries. From these inquiries, it appeared that on the morning of the 10th a Policeman went to apprehend Kurwutty, who resisted the Police and escaped. The woman, it is stated, was alive and well at this time, and was afterwards seen by witnesses bringing water from the well. At 3 r.m. the accused returned, and was seen by two persons, Tippunna and Meera Saheb, to take deceased by the hand and drag her into the house; that she said "Don't kill me, don't kill me;" that they supposed he was only beating her, and went about their business. The accused came next morning to the Chief Constable and reported the death of the woman, which was caused by her throat being cut. The knife was found in the house: but there was no evidence that she was even hit by the Police. This case was committed to the Sessions Court, where, however, the accused was acquitted.

XVI.—The body of a man named Somya, of Surleshwur, in Hangal Taluka, was found in the bounds of Baleehullee. From inquiry it appears that on the 18th November the deceased Somya and Chennapa, of the same village, went away to buy a bullock. The body had four wounds from a durathi. Two persons, Lingappa and Chennapa, have been lately apprehended; the latter acknowledged that he had been concerned in the murder. The case

was pending at the close of the year.

Os. There were nine dacoities during the year under report, pacities.

Dacoities.

against five in 1870. In two cases only were convictions obtained; in three cases the accusted were acquitted by the Sessions Court; in one case the prisoners were discharged by order of Magistrate; and the other three cases still remain undetected. The number of persons arrested in these dacoities was 68, of which seven were discharged by order of the Magistrate, six were convicted, and the rest (65) acquitted. The particulars of these dacoities are as follows:—

I.—On the 31st December (evening) some cartmen from Koompta and two men returning from Chick-Bassoor market, and a ryot of Soodumbee, who went to their assistance, were plundered by a gang of Lumbanees of property valued at Rs. 17-5-0. Three of the complainants were beaten. Fifteen Lumbanees of a Tanda at Hirehanjee were arrested at Mudloor. Most of the property robbed was recovered; but the prisoners were acquitted by the Sessions Court.

II.—On the night of the 6th of February, 1871, a gang of 20 to 25 Hern Shikarees attacked four men in a field, near Kotumachgi, beat them, and carried off jowaree to the value of about Rs. 24. Some Shetsundees went after them. Most of the jowaree was recovered. There were twenty prisoners, nineteen of whom were committed for trial, of whom four were punished under Section 395, and four sentenced to limited terms of imprisonment.

III.—On the evening of the 25th April a Brahmin, proceeding on a tattoo from Kaládgi towards Deweekop, was way-laid by ten to twelve robbers, severely beaten, and robbed of some clothes and Rs. 60 in cash; three men coming immediately behind him were also robbed of clothes and Rs. 8 in cash. They arrived completely naked at Doweekop, 5 miles from Kaládgi, and about \(\frac{1}{2}\) a mile from the scene of crime. The complainants could not identify the robbers, who probably were Wuddurs. One prisoner, Hunna bin Gella, was acquitted at the Sessions.

IV.—On the 27th May, at midnight, the house of Tircuppa, at Bevinhullee, in Ranibednur Taluka, was broken into by about twenty robbers, who carried away Rs. 200 in cash and clothes worth Rs. 26,—in all Rs. 226: no injuries were inflicted on the men of the house. In this case there were six prisoners, all of whom were discharged

by the Magistrate, F. P.

V.—At Sooleehuttee, in Kaladgi, on the night of the 17th June 1871, twenty to twenty-five robbers entered forcibly the house of a Wuddur, living about 100 yards outside the village. One of the neighbouring Wuddurs ran to the village for assistance. The robbers on finding that assistance was coming, made off. Complainant stated that he had been beaten, and had lost Rs. 295 worth of property. Five persons were apprehended and sent up to the Magistrate for trial, of whom only two were committed to the Sessions, where they were convicted and sentenced each to 4 years' rigorous imprisonment.

VI.—On the 14th of August, 1871, at about 10 P.M., seven men were returning from the Moondurgee market to their villages, with two carts and two bullocks carrying loads. On the road near Burdoor, ten to twelve robbers, coming from the Yeklaspur direction, suddenly appeared, armed with sticks, and beating three of the travellers took away their clothes, &c., worth Rs. 21½; no one was recognised

on account of the darkness of the night. The Patel of Burdoor and Police went to the spot immediately, but could not succeed in obtaining any clue to the robbers. This case remains undetected.

VII.—On the 24th of August, 1871, at about 4 r. m., one man and four women, returning from Allawur, were, about one mile from that village, set upon by five or six robbers, armed with sticks, and robbed of property and ornaments valued at Rs. 128. One of the women was severely beaten.

This case is still undetected.

VIII.—On the night of 11th of September, 1871, near Kurhutty, in Nawalgund Taluka, four persons going towards Hubli were robbed of Rs. 201 by some eight or nine thieves, apparently Wuddurs; no other violence was used. Of the stolen property, a part, valued at Rs. 73, was found on the road shortly after, when the Police commenced inquiry. The assailants could not be identified.

This case also remains undetected.

IX.—On the night of the 26th September, 1871, some 30 Kulkowrees entered a house in the village of Bunnoor, in Bankápur Taluka, a few miles from Seegaum, and forcibly took away 10 sheep, after beating the woman of the house and slightly wounding her husband with a sickle. The Patel and villagers came to the rescue, but were kept at bay by the robbers throwing stones at them, by which a few were slightly hurt. The Patel sent in the meantime a prompt report to Seegaum, and the Chief Constable with some Policemen, Foot and Mounted, started at once, and near Gotgudee they captured four Kulkowroes in their huts, in the jungle, and several afterwards by instalments, as they happened to come in. Altogether 21 prisoners were sent up to the Magistrate for inquiry, of whom 18 were committed to the Sessions Court, where, however, they were acquitted.

68. As regards these dacoities, Captain Bartholomew makes

the following remarks, in which I fully concur:-

"This is exceedingly bad, and though the excuse may be made that the night was too dark for the dacoits to be recognized, yet it shows negligence on the part of the Police in not patrolling their districts sufficiently, and keeping their eye on the travelling tribes, by whom most of these crimes are committed. In four cases the dacoits were known to be professional thieves." Kidnapping, their homes for immoral purposes. The offenders in both cases were apprehended. Four children were also, it is stated, kidnapped, not for immoral purposes, but for the sake of their ornaments. In these cases the offenders were likewise apprehended, and in one case conviction was obtained. Captain Bartholomew states that the Chief Constables have been ordered to keep a strict watch on prostitutes and others who are likely to kidnap children for immoral purposes.

Detective Ability. 70. As regards detective ability, Captain Bartholomew observes as follows:—

"I cannot find that any men have, up to the present, been employed as detectives, or that any measures have been taken to pick out such men from the Force; and the native officers are unable to give me the names of any men suited for that purpose. I hope to be able to find some during the present year. There was also no provision made in the budget for Secret Service, and without some pecuniary inducement men will not readily undertake the work: a few Rupees ready cash as a reward would do much more good than prospective promotion; besides, men who would be of use as detectives are often unfit for promotion."

Captain Bartholomew, who is new to the district, has noticed the case of Bodrow Hummunt, who, on account of his success in detecting crime, had been, at the recommendation of the District Superintendent, restored to the grade of Chief Constable. The Dharwar Police have failed of success in the detection of dacoities, for which the district has rather a serious notoriety, but in respect to other heinous offences, has shown fair detective capacity. The Dharwar District has two Inspectors under the Superintendent, one of whom has a very high reputation for detective ability, and Captain Bartholomew will, it is hoped, make good use of the means at his disposal. It was the duty of the District Superintendent to make the usual provision for Secret Service in his Budget.

71. A well was constructed near the head-quarters lines at Buildings. Dharwar, at a cost of Rs. 60. Repairs were also effected to an outpost station-house, situated on the road between Gadak and Annigshree, at a cost of Rs. 27-5-6.

72. A strong prima facie case was brought against Chief

General Conduct. Constable Hoossein Meeya of having tampered with the post book, in order to conceal some irregularities, and he was consequently dismissed. Besides this,

1 officer and 33 men were dismissed; 12 officers and 90 men punished departmentally; and 1 officer and 5 men punished judicially.

- 73. One Head Constable, 1st class, Sheik Imam, one Head Constable, 4th class, and two Constables were charged with having tortured some accused, in order to extort a confession. The accused were, however, acquitted at the Sessions. As it is believed that this was a got-up story, the Policemen have been re-instated in their appointments.
- 74. Favourable mention is made by Captain Bartholomew of one Constable who saved the life of a man while attempting to commit suicide, and of three Constables for activity in apprehending convicts in a murder case.
- 75. There are 2,657 Shetsundees, of whom 2,386 are remune-rated in land assessed at Rs. 46,904-11-3 and 271 in eash, amounting to Rs. 7,574. The District Superintendent of Police states that these men are very useful as guards to villages, and trustworthy as to property placed in their charge; but that they are often in league with robbers, and have not much intelligence.
- 76. 306 Policemen attended the Police School during the year, and of these, 71 have learnt to read and write, while 202 can only read a little and sign their names. Thirty-three men attended school for the purpose of making themselves acquainted with the Police Rules.
- 77. There were 51 out-posts in the preceding year; but in Out-posts.

 January 1871 another post was established at Sclowdee, in the Nawalgund Taluka, at the request of the District Magistrate, consisting of one Head Constable, 3rd class, and three Constables.
- General Romarks. Bartholomew, remarks that having been appointed to this district only towards the close of the year, he can scarcely record an opinion as to the causes of the increase of crime. At the same time, he states that the increase in the crimes of theft and dacoity is attributable to the number of wandering tribes who have been driven from the Hyderabad Districts by scarcity, and that this opinion is borne out by the fact that the people robbed by dacoits almost always declare that the offenders were Lumbanees. He adds that a stricter system of patrolling has been instituted, and that with the information regarding wandering tribes which will be afforded by the

new census, he hopes that a diminution of these crimes may be expected.

79. There were 82 cases of suicide in 1871 against 81 in Suicides and Accidental 1870, and 163 cases of accidental death during the year against 186 in the year preceding. The following are the details of the cases relating to the year under report:—

S1. The following Officers were in charge of the Police of this district during the year under report:—

Captain G. H. F. Codrington, from 1st January to 20 March

1871.

- Mr. W. Allen, Assistant Collector and Magistrate, from 21st March to 1st April 1871.
- Mr. J. F. Armstrong, District Magistrate, from 2nd April to 2nd October; and
- Mr. E. Airey-Jones, from 3rd October to end of the year.
- 82. There has been an increase in the number of cognizable cases reported during the year; there being Crime. 944 in 1871 against 683 in 1870. centage of convictions to men brought to trial has, however, greatly fallen off, viz., from 65 in 1870 to 45 in 1871. The percentage of stolen property recovered also shows a slight falling off-from 35 in 1870 to 32 in 1871. From these unsatisfactory results, it is perceived that the Police have been less successful, both in convictions and recovery of stolen property, during the year under report, than in the previous year. Two reasons are assigned by the District Superintendent of Police for the falling off in these percentages. The first is that the Superintendency of the Police had passed through many hands;—the District Magistrate, Mr. Armstrong, was left in charge for six months, and he could not, in addition to his own heavy duties, exercise that close and active personal supervision over the officers and men of the Force which a special officer would do. The second reason given is that the great scarcity of food during the latter part of the year in the northern Talukas of this district tended to engender crime.
 - 83. There were 6 cases of murder in 1871 against 10 in 1870.

 Murders. The particulars of the cases relating to the year under report are as follow:—
 - I.—On the 4th January, 1871, a man named Diamagowda, of Bidnal, in the Bagewadi Taluka, had a quarrel with one Ishwarappa, and three others, who beat and killed him. They were all arrested, but only two sent up to the Magistrate for trial, by whom one was discharged and the other committed to the Sessions Court, where he was also acquitted.
 - II.—At Hosoor, Badami Taluka, on the 20th March 1871, a woman named Trimalawa, distracted by some disease, threw herself, with her child in her arms, into a well at

the above place. There was not water enough to drown the woman, but the child was taken out dead. She was committed to the Sessions, under Sections 302 and 309 of the Indian Penal Code. Under Section 309 she was sentenced to 7 days' imprisonment, and under Section 302 she was acquitted.

III.—On the 11th April a man named Menjee, of Konur, Mudebihal Taluka, stabbed his wife in the stomach, and then stabbed himself in the same place. The wife died in

the evening, and her husband shortly afterwards.

IV.—A barber named Kasim, of Jialward, Sindgi Taluka, having quarrelled with his mistress, one Sungawa, cut her throat, and then his own: she died at once. He was arrested, and sent to the Kakulgi Hospital, where after some time he died also.

V.—On the 16th August a man named Buday Saheb, of Sawanhallee, Bíjápur Taluka, murdered his child by dashing it against the ground. He was committed, under Sections 302 and 304 of the Indian Penal Code, to the Sessions Court, where he was tried under the former Section only,

and acquitted.

- VI.—A Police Constable named Ismael, at the Algoondee post, Bagalkot Taluka, to gratify some private passion, shot a Mahar woman named Mulkee with his musket, as she was cutting grass in a field, on the 21st August. The Patel reported the matter to the Chief Constable, and soon after the Constable himself did the same, saying that he had killed her accidentally, while firing at a hare. The fact that her clothes were burnt by the discharge showed the value of this plea. He was committed to the Sessions Court under Section 302, where he was sentenced to be hanged.
- 84. There were two cases of dacoity during the year under report, the details of which are briefly stated as follows:—
- I.—On the 16th of July, at midnight, three men were watching cattle in the fields, in different places, when a band of eight men came and attacked them severally, robbing them of some silver ornaments and clothes, valued at Rs. 37-8. Five men of the Lamano caste were arrested by the Chief Constable, and confessed to the crime. They declared that the rest had gone, with the property stolen, into the "Moglai" country. On trial before the Magis-

trate they retracted the confession, and were discharged. No other evidence has since turned up.

II.—In consequence of considerable scarcity which had prevailed for some time in the Sindgi and Indi Talukas, and in the Moglai Zillas of Afzalpur and Shiroapur adjoining, bands of men, it was said, had roved the latter regions, and committed several robberies of a violent character for some time previous. On the 30th November four men of one of these gangs entered British territory, and committed a robbery with violence on the high road between Almela and Bunmuhallee, in the Sindgi Taluka, and escaped across the frontier. nights after this a band of twenty-six men, including the above four men, all armed, crossed the Bhima from the Afzalpur Zilla, and made an attack upon the village of Sumbewad, which stands upon the British bank, and where there is a ford. The robbers used great violence, wounding several persons, including little children, stoning the inhabitants indiscriminately who came within reach, and burning one man with a torch. They finally made off across the river again, carrying with them property valued at Rs. 380, in clothes, ornaments, grain, &c. The District Superintendent of Police, on receipt of intelligence of this dacoity, started at once, and reached the spot on the 11th. The Inspector had already commenced an active inquiry, and after much trouble, caused by a want of energy and goodwill on the part of the Afzalpur authorities, the majority (21) of the offenders were arrested by the Moglai authorities, and finally made over to British custody; -- property valued at Rs. 256 was at the same time recovered. The prisoners were committed to the Sessions Court by the District Magistrate, and they were awaiting their final trial at Belgaum at the close of the year. Subsequent representations to the authorities of His Highness the Nizam have resulted in very satisfactory arrangements for the prevention of such crime having been made by these authorities. Patrols of Mounted and Foot Police have also been instituted by the District Superintendent of Police along the frontier, since which no similar crimes have been committed.

85. There were three cases of culpable homicide in 1871 against Culpable Homicides four in 1870. The particulars of the cases pertaining to the year 1871 are as follow:—

I.—On the 21st May, 1871, at Kamatgi, Taluka Hungund, a woman named Dayamawa komo Hoochia poisoned her husband by putting poison into his food, from the effects of which he died. She was committed, under Section 304 of the Indian Penal Code, to the Sessions Court by the F. P. Magistrate, where she was sentenced to trans-

portation for life.

H.—At Bijapur, on the 23rd September 1871, a woman named Luxoomee was arrested on a charge of having administered poison, in sugar, to a girl named Soobawa, who died from eating the same. She was committed by the F. P. Magistrate to the Sessions Court, under Section 304, Indian Penal Code, but was acquitted by the Judge

for want of sufficient proof.

111.—On the 9th November, 1871, at Hudulsung, Indi Taluka. a man named Elia bin Ghuntepa so severely beat a woman, named Krishna, in a quarrel arising from an intrigue, that the latter died a few days afterwards. offender was arrested, and committed to the Sessions Court, where he was awaiting his trial at the close of the year.

There was no case of kidnapping for immoral purposes 86

during the year under report. Kidnapping

87 In this district it is stated that it has never been the custom for the Patels to take daily musters of Bad Characters the bad characters of their villages, although all such are duly registered and described, with details, in their bad character books. Mr. Jones suggests that "a daily muster at night-fall by the Patel or Head-Constable, where there is a post, or the Chief Constables when on tour, would contribute greatly to strengthen the hands of the Police, and would ensure an acquaintance on the part of the latter with the bad characters of a district, which they seldom do; or, indeed, without difficulty can acquire now." I think the arrangement suggested is a good one, so long as it is not in practice made to include Police surveillanco over persons generally, because they merely belong to certain castes or tribes without settled habits. The check would be a wholesome one if restricted, as it is apparently intended to be, to such bad characters only as have undergone punishment for offences indicating a wanton disregard of the law.

88. The District Superintendent of Police reports as follows as regards the wandering tribes in this Wandering Tribes.

district:

- "There is a considerable number of wandering tribes in this zillah, most of them coming and going, as the humour suits them. The principal are the Lambanees, the Brinjarees, and the Wuddurs. They profess a variety of trifling occupations-chiefly mat and basket-making: they mostly encamp on the outskirts of towns, in mat huts. The Kaikadi caste is very similar, but usually resident in the towns. The chief object of all (but the Brinjarces) is doubtless successful crime-not that they are very daring; but there is room for surprise that the Lambanees, who chiefly commit highway robberies, do not do so more frequently than they do, as opportunities abound. The Kaikadis chiefly affect house-breaking, at which they are exceedingly skilful. Here, too, the reckless local customs, as to the method of keeping money and valuables in the house, leads one to wonder that crime is not more frequent. It would almost seem as if, differing from the conventional opinion of the general public, these tribes herein were paying a tribute to Police efficiency. They certainly are well fitted to judge. The Brinjarces are at times numerous in the district, but are in the main peaceable and law-abiding."
- 89. The want of real detective ability in the Police is everywhere apparent. Mr. Jones suggests that a Detective Ability. small special detective force might be created for the Kaladgi district, without extra expense, by converting one of the two head-quarters Chief Constableships into a Detective Chief Constableship, and letting the other man do all the head-quarters work, and draw his horse allowance as compensation. officer, assisted by a small body of picked men, he would assign the duty of detecting offences wherever the regular Police of the locality has failed to discover the offenders to any extent; and he thinks that such an arrangement would also prove beneficial in stimulating the local Police to exertion, as where the services of this special force are in greater requisition, the inference will be that the Police are most wanting in ability to cope with the requirements of their charge. There is, however, he states, an insufficiency of Policemen in the district to enable him to organize such a force from the present strength, without endangering its efficiency in other respects. But if Mr. Jones is convinced of the feasibility of his proposed plan, I think he should be permitted to try it, for which purpose the sum allotted to him for secret service will furnish additional means. Mr. Airey-Jones is in error regarding the two

head-quarters Chief Constableships. The provision at Kaladgi is the same as in the other districts; but there will be no objection to his employing the town Chief Constable to aid the Inspector and the other detective staff in the districts: detective capacity must be sought in particular individuals, and not in appointments under the Superintendent.

- 90. The District Superintendent of Polico has visited every Inspection.

 Taluka, including the outlying State of Gajendraghar, on the Dharwar frontier.
- The district is, it is stated, almost devoid of any Police 91. At head-quarters the men use buildings. Buildings. the old Infantry Lines, which Mr. Jones, differing in opinion from his predecessor, considers to be not capable of affording full accommodation. These Lines, which furnish accommodation for 200 men, are, in my opinion, ample—in fact, more than the head-quarters strength actually requires; and I should be satisfied if the Police were as well housed at all the head-quarters stations—for instance, Ratnagiri, where the Lines are dilapidated, and Dharwar and Belgaum, where they are inferior to the Lines at Kaládgi. In one or two other places also in the district, old Lines, vacated by former small Military detachments, have been availed of. Two sets of quarters for treasury guards are in course of construction at the new kutcheris at Bagewari and Sindgi; and new Lines have also been recently sanctioned for construction at Other similar requirements will also have to be met, as means will allow, according to the emergency in each case.
- 92. The progress is stated to have been pretty fair during the year. The average number of men at head-quarters is about 170. Of these, 28 can read and write an ordinary letter or report, and 25 can read the 1st and 2nd Books, Marathi Series. The District Superintendent of Police further observes as follows:—
 - "The men are taught according to the 1st and 2nd Standard Books furnished by the Deputy Educational Inspector of this District. The men in the 1st class are also, by my instructions, practised in reading Police reports from the old daftars. The men in this District are many of them from pure Marathi-speaking localities, others from where Canarese is the sole language, which makes their instruction rather more difficult than it would otherwise be, especially as—to a large proportion of Mahomedans also—the one or the other dialect is almost a strange tongue.

The school was inspected by the Deputy Educational Inspector, who passed one man in the 2nd, and two in the 1st standard. He suggested that instruction should . be confined to Canarese, as being the official and chieflyspoken language, which suggestion has been complied with, though some of the men will not progress so fast. attendance at the school is compulsory, but is necessarily irregular, as there are only just enough men for the work, and that number was greatly lessened at the end of the year, before the inspection took place, by the establishment of special posts along the Moglai frontier. Had the full head-quarters strength been present, the result of the examination would have been more satisfactory. In the rains, when all the head-quarters men are in, and the Superintendent can overlook the school, good progressmay be expected."

93. With the exception of Nilkant Rao, Chief Constable of Indi, whose conduct brought him under rebuke, fine, and transference to the less important charge of Kaladgi town, all the officers of the superior grades are stated to have maintained a fair average of good conduct. Among the lower grades, however, 1 officer and 36 men were dismissed; 12 officers and 64 men were punished departmentally with fine, degradation, or suspension; and 1 officer and 7 men were

punished judicially during the year under report.

Cases of Terture.

94. No cases of torture were brought to notice during the year.

96. There were 65 cases of suicide and 163 cases of acci-

dental death during the year under report, against 62 and 168 respectively in the predental Deaths.

Officers in Charge.

- 98. The following Officers were in charge of the Police of this district during the year under report:—
- Captain H. S. Daniell, from 1st January to 12th February, and from 26th November to end of the year.
- Lieutenant-Colonel J. II. Henderson, from 13th February to 20th November 1871.
- 99. There has been an increase of 704 in the number of both cognizable and non-cognizable cases reported during the year, the number being 5,110 in 1871 against 4,406 in 1870. This increase is stated to be confined chiefly to offences of a trivial nature, which does not call for any particular explanation. Colonel Henderson, however, remarks that the vigilance exercised by the Police under his control, both in the detection and prevention of crime and the apprehension of offenders, have not in any degree diminished.
- 100. From Statement B it is observable that the percentage of convictions to men brought to trial has fallen from 64 in 1870 to 46 in the year under report. The percentage of recovery of stolen property has also fallen from 80 in 1870 to 72 in 1871. The Police have, therefore, been less successful, both in convictions and recovery of stolen property, than in the previous year. The percentage of recoveries is, however, good, and will bear comparison with almost any body of Police.
- 101. There were twenty-three cases of murder during the year under report against fifteen in the preceding year. Of these twenty-three cases, four are stated to be cases of aiding and abetting murder. The particulars of these twenty-three cases are as follows:—
 - I.—On the 27th February, 1871, a boy named Bhaoo bin Bapoo Sonar, aged 9 years, was murdered in the jungle of Púnpree, near Survey No. 127, by Gunga kome Balla and two others; their object, from the result of inquiries made, being to rob the ornaments which the deceased had on his person. The accused were apprehended and sent up to the Magistrate for trial, who committed them to the Sessions Court, where they were discharged for want of sufficient evidence.
 - II.—One Pirtai kome Balla was charged with the offence of aiding and abetting the commission of the above murder of Bhaoo bin Bapoo Sonar, with a view of depriving the child of his ornaments. The culprit was apprehended,

- and ultimately committed to the Sessions Court for trial, where she was discharged.
- III.—On the 13th March, 1871, two girls, named Chimnee and Kashee, aged about 8 and 10 years respectively, while in the jungles near Biby, Taluka Khed, were attacked by one Nana bin Pandoo. One of the girls was stoned to death by this man, whose object in committing this crime appears, from inquiries made, to have been to rob the ornaments which these girls wore. The man was eventually arrested by the Police, and committed to the Sessions Court for trial, where he was convicted and sentenced to transportation for life.
- IV.—On the 23rd March, 1871, in the temple of Ram, at Munchur, Taluka Khed, a woman of the name of Soondur kome Gunputsing was beaten to death by her husband, with a stick, owing to his having suspected the deceased to have been on terms of criminal intimacy with other men. The accused was apprehended by the Police, and tried and sentenced by the Sessions Court to be hanged.
- V.—On the 25th April, 1871, in the city of Poona, one Kurmalan wullud Musuntee Punjabee cut a woman's throat, and inflicted other severe injuries on her body, from the effects of which she died instantaneously. The cause for the murder was that the woman, who had been in the keeping of the man for several years, subsequently proved unfaithful to him. The murderer was arrested, and committed to the Sessions Court for trial, where he was convicted, and is now undergoing penal servitude.
- VI.—On the 5th May, 1871, one Miguel Gomes, a Christian, was murdered by Rama wullud Dadward and another on the Koosoor Ghaut, in the Mawal Taluka, with the object of robbing deceased of his property. The accused parties were arrested and sent up for trial, and eventually were convicted and sentenced by the Sessions Court to transportation for life.
- VII. and VIII.—On the night of the 18th June, 1871, Private Patrick Smith, of Her Majesty's 83rd Regiment, shot with a revolver two Privates of the same Regiment, named Roberts and Carrol. The former was shot dead on the spot, and the latter survived for a few days, but subsequently died from the effects of the injuries he received. Every effort was made to ascertain the cause of

- this double murder, but without avail. Private Smith, the murderer, was arrested, and committed by the Cantonment Magistrate for trial before the High Court, by which tribunal he was sentenced to be hanged.
- IX.—On the 1st July, 1871, the daughter of one Chimneo kome Thukmul came by her death under the following circumstances:—It appears that some medicine was administered to her by one Gija bin Takmul and twelve others, for the purpose of causing miscarriage. The medicines administered to the woman not having had the desired effect, it was alleged that the woman was afterwards burnt alive, so that the matter might be kept secret. The accused (thirteen in number) and three Policemen were arrested. One of the accused was made an approver, and the remainder were committed to the Sessions Court for trial, where they were all acquitted and discharged for want of sufficient evidence.
- X.—On the 4th July, 1871, one Dhondee kome Fakcera was murdered by her husband and another person. The murderers were arrested and sent up to the Magistrate for trial, who discharged one of them and committed the other to the Sessions Court, by which tribunal he was convicted and sentenced to be hanged.
- XI.—On the 4th July, 1871, one Bapu Deshmook was murdered by Tookaji and two others in the jungle of Kuran, Taluka Juner. It appears that a dispute arose between the deceased and the murderers regarding a tree, which resulted in the deceased being murdered. The accused were committed to the Sessions Court for trial, where they were acquitted, the evidence adduced not being considered sufficiently conclusive.
- XII.—Essu bin Nawjee and Dhondi bin Gungajee were charged, under Section 109 of the Indian Penal Code, with aiding and abetting the commission of the above murder of Bapu Deshmook. The accused were ultimately committed to the Court of Sessions for trial, but were discharged for want of substantial evidence.
- XIII.—On the 22nd August, 1871, one Babun wullud Cassim and seven others murdered one Mookta bin Munajee Chowdury, in the village of Bapoode, at about 11 o'clock in the night, whither they appear to have proceeded for the purpose of committing robbery, in which,

however, they were unsuccessful, owing to the deceased having accidentally seen them, he having gone out of his house at the time for a natural purpose, and the accused parties being evidently thwarted in the execution of their design, murdered the deceased, so that no trace might be forthcoming as to their identification when apprehended. After the commission of the deed, the parties left the place, but were soon afterwards tracked and arrested by the Police. Three of the accused parties were discharged by the Magistrate, and the remaining five were committed by him for trial before the Sessions Court, where they were eventually discharged, the Court finding that the evidence adduced was not sufficient to establish a charge of murder against them.

- XIV.—On the 8th September, 1871, Andoo bin Bapoo and soven others murdered one Hurry wullud Krishna with the handle of an axe. From inquiries made, it was ascertained that a criminal intimacy existed between the deceased and the wife of one of the accused parties, who evidently designed the murder of the above-mentioned individual, and carried the design into execution, with the assistance of his other accomplices. The offenders were arrested and committed by the Magistrate for trial before the Sessions Court, where they were discharged for want of substantial evidence.
- XV.—Mahadu wullud Janaji, Govinda wullud Janaji, and Genu wullud Janaji, were apprehended on a charge of aiding and abetting the commission of the above murder on the 18th September 1871. The accused were discharged by the Sessions Court, to which they were committed to take their trial.
- XVI.—On the 14th September, 1871, in the Khed Taluka, one Sudasew Junarden was beaten to death with sticks by Dhurma wullud Rowjee and eleven others. The cause of the murder appears to have arisen from an ill-feeling existing between the deceased and the murderers, in reference to some monetary transaction. Eleven of the accused were apprehended by the Police, and sent to the Magistrate for trial, who discharged three of them, and committed eight to the Sessions Court. Of this number, four were discharged, and four convicted and sentenced to be hanged.

- XVII.—On the night of the 17th October, 1871, at Kirkee, a fight took place between one China Swamee bin Tanapa, Madrasee, and one Krishna Swamee bin Ram Swamee. The latter had a knife in his hand at the time, with which he inflicted several wounds on the deceased China Swamee, who immediately afterwards died from the effects of the injuries he received. The murderer was arrested and committed by the Cantonment Magistrate to the Sessions Court, where he was convicted and sentenced to penal servitude.
- XVIII.—On the morning of the 27th November, 1871, the body of a woman named Sukoo kome Narayen was discovered in her house. An inquest was held by the Chief Constable on the body of the deceased, and the only conclusion that could be arrived at was that deceased came by her death by having poisoned herself with opium. The District Inspector, Mr. Abdool Kadur, however, having inquired into the case, arrested four persons, and sent them up for trial before the Magistrate, on a charge of murder. The Magistrate, however, discharged the accused for want of sufficient evidence.
- XIX.—On the 2nd December, 1871, one Gunnoo bin Vittoojee was murdered at Rak, Taluka Purandhar, by Nana bin Vittoojee; the cause of the murder being attributed to the fact of the deceased having been on terms of criminal intimacy with the aunt of the murderer. He was arrested and committed for trial to the Sessions Court, where he was convicted, and sentenced to undergo 6 months' rigorous imprisonment.
- XX.—On the 8th December, 1871, at Kurnuj, Taluka Mawal, a man named Vittoo bin Anajee murdered his mother. He was arrested; but the Magistrate before whom he was sent for trial transferred him to the Lunatic Asylum for treatment, as the man was insane.
- XXI.—On the 13th December, 1871, in the jungle of Monje Mahaloonga, Peta Ambegaum, Taluka Khed, one Luxmee Yessajee and five others murdered one Munajee Gunojee, who it appears had, previous to the murder, filed a Civil suit against the accused; and this evidently was the motive which actuated the accused in committing the murder. They were arrested by the Police and

- sent up for trial; but the Magistrate dismissed the case, for want of sufficient evidence to establish the charge of murder against these parties.
- XXII.—On the 25th December, 1871, in the village of Assaney, Peta Ambegaum, Taluka Khed, one Jubajee wullud Chaojee was murdered by Noojee wullud Dewkajee and two others. These parties were arrested, and sent up for trial to the Magistrate; but the trial had not terminated at the close of the year.
- XXIII.—One Dhondi wullud Yamaji Gowari was charged, under Section 109 of the Indian Penal Code, with the offence of aiding and abetting the commission of the above murder of Jubajee wullud Chaojee. The accused was apprehended and sent to the Magistrate for trial, who discharged him for want of sufficient proof.
- 102. There were five cases of Dacoity during the year 1871, against three in 1870. The details of these five cases are as follows:—
- I.—On the night of the 25th April, 1871, the house of one Dhondoo bin Balajee was forcibly entered by six persons, and property worth Rs. 65 was taken away by them. They were arrested by the Police, and sent up for trial before the Magistrate, by whom they were committed to the Sessions Court, by which tribunal the accused were discharged for want of sufficient evidence.
- II.—On the 28th April, 1871, one Johora wullud Hareeram, Marwaree of Mahalunga, Taluka Khed, was attacked in his house by Nawjia wullud Pandoo and nineteen others, and robbed of property worth Rs. 164. Of these parties, Nawjia wullud Pandoo was arrested, with Rs. 20 worth of the stolen property. He was sent up for trial before the Magistrate, who tried and sentenced him, under Section 411 of the Penal Code, to 2 years' rigorous imprisonment. Steps are being taken for the apprehension of the remainder of this gang.
- III.—On the 9th June, 1871, at 3 P.M., one Dhondee bin Nana Gadgey was attacked on the highway, near the village of Dhunkowady, by Mohamed wullud Sheikjee and four others, and robbed of property worth Rs. 8. These offenders were arrested, and the stolen property recovered. The

- case was committed to the Sessions Court for trial, and dismissed by that tribunal for want of sufficient evidence.
- IV.—On the night of the 22nd September, 1871, the house of one Kashi bin Yessu, Mali of Shikarpur, Taluka Sirur, was attacked by robbers, some 10 or 11 in number, and property worth Rs. 172-8-0 was taken away. Inquiry was still in progress at the close of the year.
- V.—On the 3rd October, 1871, one Rama Bace kome Trimbuck Gopal Deshpande, of Chinchwud, was attacked by Ramshet bin Bhaooshet and eight others, and robbed of property worth Rs. 226-14-0. Property worth Rs. 102 was recovered by the Police, and the offenders were also arrested. The Magistrate who tried the case dismissed six of the parties, and committed the remaining three to the Sessions Court for trial. Of these, one was transported for 7 years, and the other two were sentenced to two years and six months' rigorous imprisonment each.
- 103. The District Superintendent of Police states that strict injunctions have been issued to the Police, with a view to the suppression of the crime of kidnapping for immoral purposes, and that the public are, through the instrumentality of the Police, warned not to allow children to go about unprotected.
 - 104. The grant for petty construction and repairs to Police buildings for the year under report was Rs.

 Buildings 4,000, of which Rs. 1,350 are stated to have been expended.
- 105. The attendance at the Police School during the year is reported to have been satisfactory. The District Superintendent of Police states that there are 124 Policemen who are making satisfactory progress in simple reading and writing, and that 198 Policemen are proficient in reading and writing. He further adds as follows:—
 - "I have endeavoured to impress upon the members of the Force the absolute necessity which exists for their acquiring a knowledge of reading and writing, and of those portions of the several Acts in force, defining the duties of the Police, and I have reason to believe that I have succeeded in this endeavour, inasmuch as there seems to be a general desire on the part of the men to obtain

the above knowledge. I hope in my next annual report to be able to report the favourable result of my efforts in the above object."

- 106. Two Policemen were judicially punished during the year under report,—they were Constables of the 3rd and 4th Classes, and both were tried and convicted, the former for receiving a gratification, and the latter for receiving stolen property. Thirty-five Policemen were punished departmentally, the nature of the offence in each case being negligence of duty.
- Municipal Police. cipality now make an annual contribution towards the maintenance of the Police located in the city. Under this arrangement the contribution, commencing from the 1st April 1871, amounts to Rs. 27,541, being at the rate of Rs. 20 per cent. of the gross revenue of the Municipality. The fifty 3rd Class Policemen originally allowed by the city Municipality, are now, under the recent orders of Government, borne on the roll of the Poona District Police, and consequently form a portion of the regular Police, and are paid for by the Municipality. The annual total cost, namely, Rs. 4,800, for the maintenance of these 50 Policemen, is, therefore, included in the annual total cost of the regular Police Force.
- 108. The following Table shows the number of Police Patels village Police. and Village Watchmen employed in the district, and the manner in which they are remunerated for their services:—

Messrs. Treun and Abdool Kadur, as to the zealous and able manner in which these two Police Officers perform the duties entrusted to them. He also speaks favourably of the manner in which the

other subordinate officers and men of the Force, generally, conducted their duties during the year.

- 110. It is stated that there has been no change in the General Remarks. Supervision exercised over the Police. The two Inspectors exercised the same amount of supervision over the men under their immediate control, as they did in previous years. The arrangement in reference to the amount of supervision exercised over the Reserve Force, and the nature of duties devolving on this Force, was the same as in the previous year, and is found to work well.
 - 111. There were 47 cases of suicide and 247 cases of accidental death in 1871, against 33 and 209 respectively in 1870. The following are the details of the cases relating to the year 1871:—

Officer in Charge. 113. Major R. Johnstone was in charge of the Police of this district throughout the year.

114. The total number of cognizable cases ascertained to have been committed during the year under report was 831, being a decrease of 173 as compared with the number in 1870. 1,424 persons were arrested and 483 were convicted and committed. The percentage of convictions to arrests is very unsatisfactory, having fallen from 39 in 1870 to 34 per cent. in 1871. The percentage of recovery of property stolen has, however, slightly improved, being 64 against 62 per cent. in the previous year.

Murders. 115 There were only 2 cases of murder in 1871, against 7 in 1870, the details of which are as follows:—

- I.—On the 8th of May, 1871, a Brahmin named Abajee Ramchandra Kelkar, Khot of Taleghar, Mandangad Peta, while returning to his house was waylaid and murdered by three of his villagers: enmity was the cause of the murder. The accused were arrested, and sent up for trial, and committed to the Sessions. One of the accused was sentenced to transportation for life, and the other two discharged.
- II.—On the 16th of December, 1871, one Raynak bin Jaonak, Mhar of Soorlé, Mandangad Peta, was murdered by a Mohamedan with a "koita." The accused was arrested, sent up for trial, and committed to the Sessions. No reason is assigned for the murder. The case was pending investigation before the Magistrate at the close of the year.
- Dacoitica. On the night of the 8th of September, 1871, a gang of seven persons broke open the house of one Baya, wife of Sukha Tawda, of Kalowde, in the Chiplun Taluka, and after frightening and maltreating the inmates of the house, took from their persons jewellery valued at Rs. 90-14-0: jewellery to the value of Rs. 40-6-0 was recovered. Six persons were arrested, sent up for trial, and committed to the Sessions. Four accused were sentenced to 5 years' rigorous imprisonment, and two to 7 years. No. 7 accused has absconded; his inoveable property has been attached, and a reward of Rs. 50 has been offered for his arrest.

Kidnapping. 117. There were no cases of this kind during the year under report.

Detective Ability.

118. The detective ability of the Police Force is stated to be equal to the requirements of the district.

- 119. The inspection of the Police stations is stated to have been well carried out by the District Superintendent of Police.
- Buildings for the accommodation of the Police at headquarters and at some other Police stations and outposts are stated to be in a very dilapidated condition. Plans and estimates for new lines at headquarters have since been sanctioned by Government.
- 121. The general conduct of the Force is reported to have been good. The District Superintendent of Police states that two Constables were punished judicially, and eight Officers and thirteen Constables with fine. These fines, he states, were chiefly for stupidity or carelessness, and that none of the cases in which the fines were inflicted call for any special notice.
- 122. There were 31 cases of suicide against 25 in the preceding year, and 372 cases of accidental Suicides and Accidental deaths against 238 in 1870. The details relating to these cases for the year 1871 are as follows:—

- 124. The following officers were in charge of the Police of this district during the year 1871:—
 - (1). Major Harpur, from 1st January to 31st August 1871.
 - (2). H. B. Boswell, Esq., District Magistrate, from 1st September to 18th October 1871.
 - (3). J. H. Todd, Esq., Supernumerary Assistant Collector, from 19th October to 15th December 1871.
 - (4). Major Coles, from 16th to 31st December 1871.

The report for the year has been submitted by the last named officer.

- 125. The total number of offences reported to have been committed during the year is 3,652, being an increase of 49 as compared with the previous year. In connection with these offences, 6,381 persons were arrested, and 2,483, or 39 per cent., were finally convicted. In the year 1870 the percentage of convictions was 38.
- 126. In 1,634 cognizable cases taken up by the Police, 2,321 persons were arrested; of these, 1,688 were brought to trial, and 1,123, or 66 per cent., were finally convicted. In 1870 the percentage in these cases was 65; a very slight improvement is, therefore, observable.
- 127. In 2,018 non-cognizable cases taken up by Magistrates, 4,060 persons were arrested, of whom 1,560, or 33 per cent., were convicted. In 1870 the percentage of convictions in these cases was 32; here also a slight improvement is observable.
- 128. The value of property stolen is Rs. 37,466, being more by Rs. 8,676 than in the preceding year. The amount recovered is Rs. 13,730, or 31 per cent. less than in the year 1870, which is very unsatisfactory. The reason assigned by the District Superintendent of Police for this decrease, is that much of the property lost has been computed from statements of complainants in cases, as yet, undetected, and supposed to be greatly exaggerated.
- 129. In the comparative statement of heinous crimes, an increase is observable during the year under report, except in murder cases; but the increase is considered by the Superintendent to be not so great as to call for special notice.
- 130. In five out of the eight cases of murder reported this year, convictions were obtained. In one, the accused were discharged by the F. P. Magistrate and the Sessions Court, and the remaining two were pending at the close of the year. These cases,

however, have since been disposed of, viz., in one case the accused was convicted and executed, and in the other, six accused were discharged by the F.P. Magistrate for want of proof. The following is a brief account of these murders:—

- I.—On the 4th January, at Churegaum, in the Karar Taluka, one Abai, woman, of Majgaum, murdered her illegitimate child, an infant of a few days' old, by throwing it into a well, where it was found drowned. Abai admitted that the child was hers, and that she had thrown it into a well to get rid of it, and in the presence of a Punch, pointed out the well in which the body had been discovered. The accused was sentenced to death by the Court of Sessions; but the sentence was commuted by the High Court to transportation for life.
- II.—On the 24th February, 1871, Krishna bin Mookunda Gaikwad was poisoned by arsenic mixed with his food. The deceased, with two of his friends, went to his motherin-law Kasai's house, at Sidhewadee, Taluka Tasguam, to fetch his wife home. Kasai invited them to take their meal with her, and she prepared it herself. After having partaken of it, they all three became very ill with vomiting and purging, and Krishna died in the course of the night, but the other two recovered. Kasai and her daughter, the wife of the deceased, carried on criminal intimacy with two men, Babajee and Tookaram, and these two men and Kasai combined together to poison the husband when he came to fetch his wife away. The accused woman Kasai was convicted and sentenced to death by the Court of Sessions, and the two men were discharged by the Magistrate, F. P., for want of proof. The sentence on Kasai, woman, was afterwards commuted by the High Court to transportation for life.

III.—On the night of the 26th April, 1871, at Pet, Taluka Walwa, one Harree wullud Jotes Chambar murdered his wife, by cutting her throat with a rapeo or cobbler's knife. Haree was convicted and sentenced to death by the Court of Sessions; but the sentence was commuted

by the High Court to transportation for life.

IV.—On the night of the 18th May, 1871, in the city of Satara, one Pandoo bin Maloo Tambolce murdered his kept mistress Vittai, by smashing her head with a grinding-stone while she was asleep. The accused on being apprehended confessed his guilt, and was convicted and executed.

- V .- On the 18th June, 1871, at Shirta, Taluka Walwa, one Rajee, woman, attempted to poison one Muloo bin Aojee Chowgoola and his family, at the instigation of her paramour Nana Chowgoola, brother of Mulloo, owing to illfeeling existing between them. On the same day Muloo's wife ground some flour for the daily meal, and went out to fetch water. Rajee, woman, availing herself of the opportunity, went to Muloo's house when no one was there, and mixed some arsenic in the flour. On the return of Muloo's wife she made bread, and sent some of it to Soobhana, servant of her husband, who was at work He ate it and died. Muloo, his wife, and children also partook of some of the bread, and were violently sick, but recovered. The woman Rajee was pardoned and admitted as Queen's evidence, and Nana ' .Chowgoola was convicted and sentenced to death by the Sessions Court.
 - VI.—On the 15th July, 1871, at Akhulkhope, Taluka Tasgaum, one Buhiroo bin Nana was murdered in a shed out in a field, and his body, weighted with stones, thrown into the Krishna River, which was not found owing to the depth of water. The deceased was a man of bad character, and was strongly suspected of having on several occasions set fire to stacks and destroyed crops, and had consequently incurred the ill-feeling of the villagers. Four men were apprehended on the evidence of eye-witnesses, but were discharged by the Magistrate, F. P., for want of proof. They were again apprehended, and committed for trial to the Court of Sessions; but all were discharged.
 - VII.—On the 23rd November, 1871, at Yelavee, Taluka Tasgaum, one Raoo bin Dajee murdered his brother's wife Mohuna with a sickle, owing to an improper intimacy she had with one Nana, Patel of the same village. Raoo, on being apprehended, produced the weapon, and confessed his guilt. The case was pending at the end of the year before the Sessions Court; but subsequently the accused was sentenced to death by the Court of Sessions.
- VIII.—The last and eighth case was the murder of a Brahmin, named Rughoonath Junardhun Pendsey. The deceased left the village of Wulwun, Satara Zillah, for the village of Ambolce, in the Ratnagiri District, where he had some money transactions. On search being made by the Police, his body was found in the jungles within the

limits of Wulwun village, with some of his clothes on and near him. It is stated that some of the villagers at Amboleo were at enmity with him, owing to some money transactions, and that the deceased had lodged a complaint against them. The case was pending inquiry at the close of the year. Subsequently, however, six persons were apprehended on suspicion, and sent to the Magistrate, F. P., for trial, but they were discharged for want of proof. Further inquiries are being made by the Police.

- 131.—There were three cases of culpable homicide during the Culpable Homicides. year under report, the particulars of which are as follows:—
 - I.—On the morning of the 13th January, 1871, one Krishna Sonar, of Dhebewadee, in Taluka Patan, administered poison in sugar and gave it to Sukharam, a lad of 13 years of age, who after eating it died. A case was prepared against the accused Krishna, and he was committed to the Magistrate, F. P., but was discharged for want of proof.
 - II.—On the night of the 31st January, 1871, while one Mahadoo, Powar of Akulkhope, in Taluka Tasgaum, was going to his field late at night, he saw a man running away from it with a small earthen pot in his hand, containing fire, and believing that he intended to set fire to his stacks, he overtook him and struck him on the head with a stick he had in his hand, from the effects of which the man fell down and died shortly afterwards. The accused Mahadoo was convicted and sentenced to one year's rigorous imprisonment by the Court of Sessions.
 - III.—On the 24th August, 1871, at Bucherce, Taluka Malsiras, one Mhatarjee Dhungar having allowed his sheep to graze in a field belonging to Rama Dhungar, of the same village, they had a quarrel amongst themselves, whereupon Govinda, son of Mhatarjee, struck Rama on the head with a stick, from the effects of which Rama died the next day. Govinda bin Mhatarjee was convicted and sentenced to 7 years' rigorous imprisonment by the Court of Sessions.
- 132. In addition to the above detailed cases of culpable homicide, there was one which occurred on the 23rd of June, 1868, the particulars of which are as follows:—

- Two men, Sukhoo Patel and Gunoo Buhiroo, while at work in their fields had a dispute about a piece of land. Gunoo told Sukhoo not to sow on the land under dispute; but he disregarded him, and continued his operations, whereupon Gunoo threw a stone at Sukhoo, which struck him, and he fell down dead. Gunoo at once absconded. He was subsequently discovered by the Police in the Poona District, and apprehended in July 1871, when he was committed to the Sessions Court, where he was discharged.
- Two cases of dacoity occurred during the year under report, and one that occurred in 1868, in Dacoitics. which one of the offenders remained at large, was also finally disposed of during the same period. In one of the two cases relating to the year under notice, three accused persons were convicted and sentenced to 5 years' rigorous imprisonment each, and in the second case, all the accused were discharged by the Court of Sessions for want of proof. The third dacoity case occurred in May 1868, and in that year thirteen persons were convicted and sentenced—one to 7 years' rigorous imprisonment, and twelve to 3 years' rigorous imprisonment each, by the Court of Sessions. One Harce, of the same village, however, who was implicated in this case, and had absconded, was apprehended in Bombay in 1871, and committed to the Court of Sessions, by which he was discharged finally for want of sufficient proof.
- 134. There were 29 cases of robbery, or 16 cases more than in the preceding year; 73 persons were arrested and 16 convicted.
- 135. Of thefts there were 960 cases, 62 more than in 1870. In these, 1,087 persons were arrested, of whom 681, or 62 per cent.; were convicted.
- 136. Under the head of "Receiving Stolen Property" there were 29 cases, or an increase of 15 cases over the previous year; 39 persons were arrested and 27, or 69 per cent., were convicted, which is satisfactory.
- 137. During the year there were 15 cases of rape, or an increase of 15 cases over the previous year; 24 persons were arrested, of whom 10, or 41 per cent., were convicted; 3 were pending trial at the close of the year, and 11 were acquitted.
- 138. Under the head of "Serious Mischief" there were 44 cases—5 more than in the previous year; 28 persons were arrested, but only 3 were convicted; 24 were discharged, and 1 was pending trial at the close of the year. The number of convictions in

these cases is by no means satisfactory. The offence, however, is one of which there is commonly no eye-witness, and which affords little facility for identification of the offenders.

- 139. There were only four cases of house-breaking or house-trespass; six persons were arrested and two, or 33 per cent, convicted. There is a considerable decrease under this head of offences, as compared with last year, which is gratifying to those engaged in the working of the Police.
- 140. "Grievous Hurt."—There were 39 cases under this head, in connection with which 102 persons were arrested, and 50 convicted.
- 141. Though a slight increase is observable under each head of offences shown in the comparative statement of the year 1870 with that of 1871, there has been no material difference in the amount of crime or in the working of the Police. No crime of an extraordinary nature occurred during the year.
 - 142. There were three cases of kidnapping during the year under report. They are stated to be cases Kidnapping. of mere abduction, in which no immoral motive appears to have existed.
 - Buildings. 143. No new lines were constructed during the year under report.
- 144. The general conduct of the Police was, on the whole, good; 106 men of the total strength were punished, of these, 9 judicially by Magistrates for petty offences, and 97 departmentally.
- 145. At the head-quarters a school is established, where the School. men and their children are taught to read and write and receive instruction in the Police Codes. 154 Policemen can read and write well, and 147 can read and write a little. Major Coles states—"that more attention is being paid to this important subject."

- 150. Captain F. T. Stock was in charge of the Police of this district from 1st January to 11th March, and Lieutenant C. Hay from 12th March to end of year.
- Crime. cases reported during the year under report, the number being 1,776 in 1871 against 1,988 in 1870. The results of the working of the Police in bringing the accused to punishment are, however, less satisfactory than in the previous year; the percentage of convictions to men brought to trial being 58 only against 78 in 1870. There is a regretable increase in the number of cases of dacoities, robberies, thefts, and of receipt of stolen property. This increase, the District Superintendent of Police attributes to a bad agricultural season, resulting in a consequent scarcity of provisions. A large number of the offences entered were grain robberies committed during the night by starving people, in which cases little evidence was obtainable.
- 152. There is a decrease in the amount of property stolen, and the percentage of recovery shows an improvement,—it being 43 in the year under notice against 31 in 1870.
- 153. The number of murders is the same as the last year,

 Murders.

 being 16 in each year; but two out of those
 for the year under report are stated to have
 been struck off by order of the Magistrates, which reduces the
 number to 14 in 1871 against 16 in 1870. The particulars of
 these 14 murders are as follows (and it will be seen that in only 4
 of these cases convictions were obtained, and that in one the
 accused committed suicide before being finally tried by the Sessions
 Court):—
 - I.—On the night of the 24th January a woman named Tookawa kom Bussappa was found dead in her house at Sulgar, Taluka Sholápur, with a wound on her head. An inquest was held on the body, and the jury were of opinion that deceased had committed suicide. From further inquiries, however, it appeared that she was murdered and robbed by thieves. Three persons were arrested, of whom one was admitted as Queen's evidence, and two were committed to the Sessions Court, where they were finally acquitted.
 - II.—On the night of the 1st March one Rama bin Konojeo Torrowlay, of Matchnoor, Taluka Pandhurpur, whilst

- watching his field was murdered by thieves. One Abdoola wullud Laddoo, who was suspected to have committed the offence, was arrested and committed to the Sessions Court, where he was acquitted for want of sufficient proof.
- III.—On the 3rd March one Rama bin Sudhoo, inhabitant of Meerjunpoor, Taluka Barsee, murdered two boys named Rama bin Dusratha and Girjia bin Dusratha, sons of his master Dusratha bin Vittoba. The accused suspected his wife of having illicit intercourse with his master. He was apprehended and committed to the Sessions Court; but before his trial came off he committed suicide in the jail.
- IV.—On the morning of the 31st March the body of one Pundhirinath, alias Appa a Gosaye, was found in the bed of the River Bhima, at Gopalpura, near Pandhurpur. The deceased appeared to have been murdered for the sake of the ornaments he generally wore, which were missing. A man named Khundoo bin Huree, of Pandhurpur, who was suspected to have committed the offence, was apprehended and brought to trial, but was acquitted by the Sessions Court.
- V.—On the 6th April, at Soordre, Taluka Barsee, one Buhiroo bin Deojee, a Mahar, was found murdered in a field which he was engaged to watch at night. The murder was supposed to have been committed by Koonbees, on account of the Mahar's poisoning their cattle. Four Koonbees were arrested; but all were discharged.
- VI.—On the 20th April the body of one Khundoo bin Malloo, of Barsee, was found in a well tied in a kumblee, with stones attached in order to sink it. When taken out the corpse was found to be in an advanced state of decomposition. Deceased's wife stated that her husband had been missing for seventeen days, and had been for some years on bad terms with his brothers Munnoo and Sutwa, and two others, named Koosha and Purwutta. Munnoo and Sutwa (after confessing to having committed the murder) pointed out where they had concealed the turban and dhootee of deceased, which were found on their information. They further stated that Koosha and Purwutta had assisted them in murdering deceased, by strangling him. All four were arrested and sent up. The Magistrate discharged two, and committed the other two

- to the Sessions Court, where they also were discharged for want of proof, particularly as to the identity of the body.
- VII.—On the night of the 23rd May a boy, aged about 8 or 9 years, named Amerchand Goojur was murdered at Sholápur, and his body thrown into a nulla near the Collector's Kutcherry. On inquiry it was found that a servant of the father of the deceased, named Tookaram bin Deojee, with his two sisters, committed this murder for the sake of the ornaments worn by the child, all of which they produced. They were arrested and were, on trial, convicted and sentenced to death by the Sessions Court. The High Court confirmed the sentence against Tookaram, but commuted that of the women to transportation for life.
- VIII.—On the 30th May a man named Bhugwanta was found lying senseless near the village of Sowdee, Taluka Kurmulla, with a wound on his head. He remained in that state for three days, after which he died. A man named Naroo Bappoojee (who was supposed to have had criminal intercourse with deceased's wife) was arrested, and the case was committed to the Sessions by the F. P. Magistrate. The Sessions Court, however, acquitted the accused for want of proof.
- IX.—On the night of the 8th August one Babajee, a carpenter in the town of Sholapur, murdered his wife in a fit of jealousy, by cutting her with an axe. The accused was arrested, and was convicted and sentenced by the Sessions Court to be hanged. The sentence was carried out after confirmation by the High Court.
- X.—On the 23rd August, in the Commissariat Lines at Sholapur, a man named Nursoo bin Rama, a Mahar, entered the house of one Mahadoo bin Messoo, Mahar, and struck him with a club on the head whilst asleep: the man died from the effects soon after. The murderer was arrested, and confessed his guilt, stating that he murdered deceased because he was carrying on an intrigue with his wife. He was committed to the Sessions, where he was convicted and sentenced to death.
- XI.—On the 10th September the body of a man named Duree bin Khundapa, of Khoopsungee, Taluka Sangola, was found in a dry well near the village. There were marks of

heavy blows found about the head, from the effects of which he appeared to have died. Inquiries tended to show that deceased was murdered by his wife and one Venkajee Koolkurnee, who were both carrying on illicit criminal intercourse; a man named Dadoo wullud Imam, of the same village, was also apprehended for assisting in disposing of the body. The accused were all committed to the Sessions by the Magistrate, where, however, they

were acquitted.

XII.—On the night of the 2nd October the body of one Sungowa kom Gudgiappa, of Sulgar, was found in her house, and two stones by her side stained with blood, with which she was supposed to have been murdered. The Police Patel, Venkatrao bin Gopalrao, and one Raya bin Dhondee were suspected to have committed the murder. They were both arrested and sent up before the F. P. Magistrate, who discharged the Police Patel and committed Raya bin Dhondee to the Sessions Court, where he was finally acquitted.

XIII.—On the night of the 30th May one Sudoo bin Maina, Chambar of Yowlee, Taluka March, murdered his wife by dropping a heavy stone on her head whilst asleep. The accused was arrested and sent up before the Magistrate, who committed him to the Sessions Court, where he was convicted and sentenced to death. He was exe-

cuted at Mohel.

XIV.—On the 19th August one Ooma kom Mahadoo, the wife of Mahadoo bin Edoo, was murdered by her husband at Mathura, Taluka Sangola. The case was only inquired into after the lapse of some days, owing to the Chief Constable's neglect in not having reported it, and taking no measures to detect it. Every endeavour was made to bring the murderer to light; but it was too late—the greater portion of the evidence having disappeared. Mahadoo bin Edoo was sent up before the Magistrate on what evidence could be obtained, but was discharged, as it was considered insufficient. The Chief Constable was subsequently tried for neglect of duty, and was sentenced to pay a fine of Rs. 100, which was remitted on appeal. The Chief Constable died while under suspension.

- grain robberies, committed by five or more persons. The details of these cases are as follows:—
- I.—On the 1st August three men were attacked near the town of March by a number of men, who after beating them carried away a purse containing Rs. 100. Every inquiry was made, but the Police were unsuccessful in tracing the offenders.
- II.—On the night of the 5th August, seven Bunias were attacked at Achegow, Taluka Sholápur, and robbed of property worth Rs. 83. Great delay occurred in information reaching the Police, as the complainants, who were residents of foreign territory, proceeded to their village without making a report of the occurrence. Seven persons were arrested, who were ultimately convicted and sentenced by the Sessions Court to 2 years' rigorous imprisonment each.
- III.—On the 7th August, at Pooluj, Taluka Pandharpur, about 50 men attacked the granary of one Ameechund Goozur, and carried away grain worth Rs. 793. Five men, who were committed to the Sessions in this case, were acquitted, the Court being of opinion that the case was one arising from disputed possession, and therefore one for civil action.
- IV.—At Pooluj, on the same day, the same men attacked the granary of one Manickchand Goozur, and carried away grain worth Rs. 300. Five men were committed to the Sessions, and were acquitted on the above grounds, viz., that of disputed possession.
- V.—On the 9th August, at the village of Patroolee, Taluka Kurmalla, the garden of one Vittoo bin Jotee was attacked by a number of men, who after beating the gardeners carried away about a maund of Indian corn. Five persons, who were sent up before the Magistrate, were discharged, the evidence against them being insufficient to warrant a conviction.
- VI.—On the night of the 24th August, at the village of Munjreewadee, the house of one Ansoo bin Dusratta was attacked by about 30 or 40 men, and property consisting of grain and clothes, valued at Rs. 182, robbed.

- Thirty-two persons were committed to the Sessions; but they were all released, the evidence being deficient.
- VII.—On the night of the 17th September, at the village of Mahisgow, Taluka March, the house of one Gopalla was attacked by thieves, and grain valued at Rs. 7 was carried away. Seven men were committed to the Sessions in this case; three were convicted and sentenced to 1½ year's rigorous imprisonment, and the others were acquitted.
- VIII.—On the night of the 7th November, at the village of Lahoo, Taluka March, the garden of one Babajee was attacked by a number of men, who, after beating the gardeners, carried away a maund of rice, valued at Rs. 5. The Police were unsuccessful in tracing the perpetrators.
- IX.—On the night of the 16th November five persons entered the house of one Malkoo bin Luximon, of Wutwutch, Taluka Sholápur, and carried away a bullock. Of the five persons committed to the Sessions in this case, one was convicted and sentenced to undergo 3 years' rigorous imprisonment, the others were released.
- X.—On the night of the 18th November, at the village of Patkooleh, Taluka March, the house of one Gopal Krishna was attacked by a number of men, who after wounding five men carried away property valued at Rs. 45-8-0. Three accused in this case were committed to the Sessions, where they were acquitted.
- XI.—On the night of the 25th November the house of one Dusratta bin Sadoo, of Kamtee, Taluka Sholapur, was attacked by five thieves, who carried away property worth Rs. 29-15-0. The persons who committed this offence are the same as were apprehended in the following case.
- XII.—On the night of the 25th November one Mulikjee wullud Dawuljee, whilst travelling with his bullock, loaded with chillies, was attacked by five men, near Kamtee, Taluka Sholapur, who carried away his bullock, saddle, and chillies. The five men were apprehended, with the bullock, saddle, and chillies, and were committed to the Sessions, where they were acquitted.
- XIII.—On the night of the 29th November about ten persons fell upon the field of one Narayen bin Gopalla, of Mijoon-

- sondeh, Taluka Sholapur, and after binding the gardener, robbed him of one earring and one blanket, also of a quantity of carrots, worth Rs. 44-4-0. The ten persons were arrested, but were discharged by the Magistrate, as the evidence was not sufficient.
- XIV.—On the night of the 17th December, at the village of Karkul, Taluka Sholápur, two men, named Sungappa and Malsidda, were attacked in their fields by about seven men, who, after beating them, carried away a turban and a kumblee, valued at Rs. 2. The Polico were unsuccessful in tracing the perpetrators in this case.
- XV.—On the night of the 19th December, at the village of Huttoor, Taluka Sholapur, two men named Mahadoo and Suddoo were attacked in their fields by about ten men, who carried away grain valued at Rs. 3. The Police were unsuccessful in tracing the perpetrators of this offence.
- XVI.—On the night of the 23rd December, near the village of Wulsong, Taluka Sholapur, one Appia bin Ballia was attacked in his field by a number of men, who after beating him carried away a kumblee and a sword. The Police have not succeeded in tracing the offenders.
- XVII.—On the 24th December one Nursinga bin Muncram, of Nimburgee, Taluka Sholapur, was attacked in his field by two persons, who after beating him carried away ears of corn worth Rs. 5-6-0. Of the two accused committed to the Sessions in this case, one was convicted and sentenced to undergo 3 years' rigorous imprisonment, and the other was acquitted.
- 155. No offence of kidnapping for immoral purposes was committed during the year under report. The District Superintendent of Police states that he has not found it necessary to adopt any special measures regarding this crime.

Criminal Classes. 156. The supervision of released convicts is stated to have been attended to.

157. Lieutenant Hay observes that detective ability is sadly Detective Ability. wanting in this district; a few men have displayed intelligence in this respect, and have been encouraged.

- 158. All the Talukas were visited and inspected by the Dis-Inspection. trict Superintendent of Police during the year under report, and the Inspectors and other officers are stated to have kept up to this part of their duty.
- Buildings. Police lines are greatly wanted at the outposts. He states that there are Police buildings at only three outposts, and that the Police, for the most part,
 put up in the village chowries, while those with families have
 to hire houses in the villages. This matter is engaging attention.
- 160. The District Superintendent of Police states that the proportion of men who could read and write was very small when he joined this district, and there was no school to teach them. He has now established a school at the head-quarters, which is attended by 7 Head Constables and 26 Constables. The entire separation of the Sholápur Police from the Poona Constabulary was only effected in 1870, on Sholápur being formed into a separate Collectorate.
- General Conduct.

 bad; going to sleep on sentry and absence without leave were common offences amongst the men of the lower grades; this, in a great measure, was owing to a want of strictness on the part of superior officers, who, with very few exceptions, had shown great want of zeal and interest in the conduct of the men under them. A few severe examples have, however, made a marked change for the better. Three Chief Constables were tried by Magistrates for different offences, one of whom was convicted, and two acquitted. They were all worse than useless, and have since been got rid of;—one was pensioned, the other resigned, and the third died. Besides these, one Head Constable and thirteen Constables were also convicted by Magistrates of various offences.

- 165. During my tour I visited the head-quarters of the Dharwar, Kanara, Belgaum, and Satara District Police, where I inspected the men at head-quarters, their lines, and Police schools—except at Belgaum, where new lines for the men are urgently needed, and regarding which application has been already submitted to Government; the accommodation for the Police at head-quarters in the other districts visited is sufficient. At Dharwar it is in contemplation to hand over to the Police the lines at present occupied by the military, on the removal of the latter to another site.
- 166. The question of providing lines for the men at the smaller outposts is engaging attention, and they will be provided for gradually as funds are obtained for the purpose.
- 167. In conclusion, I have much pleasure in mentioning that the District Superintendents of Police have all performed their

duties efficiently. Some of the districts, notably Kaládgi, were for a considerable portion of the year under review without the requisite services of a District Superintendent of Police; but the newly-appointed officers now in charge, especially Mr. E. Airey-Jones, at Kaládgi, have done their best in the matter of effectual supervision, since their appointment, to endeavour to keep their charges up to the standard of efficiency.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Police Report of 1871 for the Northern Division of the Presidency. I have to apologise for the great delay in its submission. The statements were new to the Superintendents, and had to be sent back over and over again for correction, and so the work of compilation was constantly retarded.

- 2. The division is shown to have an area of 36,794 square miles, with a population of nearly five mil-Statement E. lions. It is divided into nine districts, with a distinct Police force for each, with a Superintendent at its head. The District of Khandesh has two Assistant Superintendents, one for the charge of the Bhil Corps, and the other because of the great extent of the district; for the same reason Ahmadabad has one Assistant Superintendent also, and in the Panch Mahals an Assistant is in charge of the Bhil Corps. The total strength of the Police in the division is 7,227 men, which gives an average of one man to every five square miles, and one man to every 690 persons of the population. The total cost to Government is nearly 121 lakhs per annum, including the cost of Police establishments; but as the Muncipalities of Ahmadabad and Surat contribute to the cost of the Police employed within those towns, Rs. 46,261 is recovered from them.
- 3. In the Panch Mahals, Rs. 3,918 is received from the Rewa Kanta Agency, for whom a small body of Police is employed, but as this body is not a part of the District Police, but from what

is known as Extra Guards, their number and cost should have been excluded from the statement. In Tanna the small Municipality of Kelve has paid Rs. 480 for some years—ever since the liability of municipalities to pay for their Police was first discussed. As no other Municipality except Ahmadabad and Súrat pays for Police, it would be right to relieve Kelve from this charge until it is brought forward as a part of a general measure, now that the operation of the Non-Agricultural Cess Act has been suspended. The receipt of Rs. 5,744 in Násik is on account of the small body of Police maintained from the revenues of the Peint State.

- 4. The strength of the Police is not large, and it is still more weakened by the permanent duties which devolve upon it, such as the guarding of jails, which takes 400 men, and the guarding of lock-ups, treasuries, and the escort of prisoners, which takes 1,400 men, so that the remainder 4,500 men is not sufficient for the effective guarding of the country.
- 5. About half of the Police is armed with fire-arms, 4,000 with swords only, and 70 with batons. I regret to observe such a large number of punishments, which, if added to the resignations and desertions, gives a number higher than one-fourth the strength of the force. It points to the arduous nature of the duties, the exacting supervision exercised, and the unpopularity of the service.
- 6. One-third of the officers are able to read and write, and about one-eighth of the men, which does not speak highly of the educated intelligence of the force; fifteen per cent. of these who are uneducated were under instruction. Broach takes the lead in education, and Mr. Cameron deserves credit for the particular attention he pays to the progress of his men: two-thirds of his officers are able to read and write, and about one-fifth of his men.
 - Statement G. Statement G is more curious than useful, and may be passed over without remark.
- 8. Statement A makes a difference between cognizable and non-cognizable crime. The latter again is divisable into two, viz., cases in which the Police were employed, and cases in which the Police were not employed. The former alone is shown in column 4 of Part 2, but the latter has been altogether excluded from the statement. This omission has been supplied by the Superintendents sending in separate returns showing the result of cases in which the Police were not employed. It includes uncognizable cases which were taken up by Magistrates without the aid of the Police; but I think it should include all cases.

cognizable and non-cognizable, in which the Magistrates acted without the help of the Police, and the return should always accompany the Annual Report. Parts 1 and 2 would then show Police operations, and Part 3 will deal with magisterial work alone.

9. I have compiled a short comparative statement of all crime in the division, which I print below:—

It shows a very large increase in crime, from 26,625 cases in 1870 to 31,013 in 1871, or 16 per cent.; but the convictions, I am glad to observe, have been nearly as good as they were in 1870. The percentage was 42.8 in 1870, and in 1871 it is 41.1, showing a decline of 1.7 per cent. But this, it will be remembered, includes cases which were taken up by the Magistrates without the help of the Police; when these are excluded, the percentage is higher, as I will show further on. The best result is obtained in Ahmadabad, which shows 59 per cent. of convictions; its success in 1870 was equally good, when it showed 60 per cent. Panch Mahals is also very good, showing 51 per cent. against 55 per cent. in the previous year. In Broach, Mr. Cameron has evidently made a vigorous effort, and has brought up his percentage of success from 39 per cent. in 1870 to 49 per cent. in 1871. In Súrat, Kheda, and Kolaba some improvement has been made. But I regret to observe a great falling off—in Khandesh from 53 to 40 per cent., in Nasik from 43 to 37, and in Tanna from 38 to 28.

10. Crime may be said to be stationary in Broach and Khandesh. It has decreased slightly in Kolaba and the Panch

Mahals, but shows a very startling increase in Tanna, from 4,900 cases in 1870 to 7,500 in 1871. Ahmadabad and Násik also show an increase of over 1,000 cases in each district, and Súrat an increase of 300.

11. The following is a statement of cognizable crimes:—

It shows 13,852 cases, besides 218 pending at the commencement of the year. I think the cases pending should be excluded from the statement, and their result shown separately, so that the crime statement should deal only with cases which occur during the year. Of these 13,852 cases, convictions were obtained in 6,784 cases, showing a success of 49 per cent.

- 12. The best result is shown in Ahmadabad, which shows a percentage of success of 73 per cent. of cases tried. Kolaba has worked well in obtaining 72 per cent. Panch Mahals and Súrat follow 69 and 63, respectively. Násik has 55 per cent., Tanna has 53. The rest are a long way below 50 per cent., Broach sharing very badly with only 30 per cent.
- 13. Of the number 19,617 apprehended, 9,279 were convicted, or 48 per cent., and I am sorry to say that the number discharged and acquitted—9,713—exceeds the number convicted. In cognizable cases I think no Superintendent should be satisfied with less then 60 per cent. of convictions out of the number arrested. Panch Mahals has come very near it, it shows 59 per cent., Súrat and Kheda show 56, and Ahmadabad 54. The rest are below 50.

14. There were 10,374 cases of non-cognizable crime in which the Police were employed. I do not know whether the Police rendered material assistance in the investigation of these cases, or whether in many of them they were only employed to serve the summons or execute the warrants. The intention of the form is apparently to show the working of the Police in the detection of crime, and I have therefore requested the Superintendents not to include cases in which the Police were merely employed as process servers; such cases can be shown in the statement of cases disposed of by the Magistrate without the help of the Police. A defect in Part 2 of Statement A is that the number of cases and persons pending at the beginning and end of the year is not shown.

15. There were 22,411 persons concerned in these non-cognizable cases, of whom 14,457 were acquitted, and 7,864 convicted, the percentage of convictions to apprehensions being 35. Khandesh takes the lead, and shows a success of 65 per cent. Ahmadabad has done well, and shows 62 per cent., and Broach 52 per cent.; but Kheda, Tanna, and Kolaba are only able to show 25 per cent.

16. Taking the mean average percentage of success in cognizable cases and non-cognizable cases in which the Police were employed, the general result may be shown as under in the order of success:—

17. The Magistrates took up 6,797 cases without the aid of the Police, in which 12,629 persons were concerned and 4,346 were convicted, equal to 34 per cent.

There is the greatest difference observable in the action of the Magistrates in the several districts—one-third of the whole number of cases being taken up in Súrat alone. In Khandesh, Násik, and Tanna the Magistrates were also very active, but in Broach the Police were employed in every case, and in other districts the independent work of Magistrates was almost nil. No return has been received from Kolaba as yet. I inquired into the cause of this great difference, but beyond stating that the figures represented the facts, the Superintendents have not given any other explanation.

18. The following table gives the particulars of some of the most serious offences:—

There were 104 murders—26 were committed in Tanna, and in 15 cases convictions were obtained; 18 in Ahmadahad, and 13 convicted; 17 in Kheda, and 6 convicted; 12 in Khande h, and 9 convicted. There is a large increase in the number of robberies, 20% cases in 1870 against 328 in 1871. In dacoities there is a decrease from 72 to 64. 16 were committed in Ahmadabad, and in 12 convictions were obtained. Success would be better if prompt assistance were given by the officers of foreign states. 15 cases occurred in Khandesh, and 7 were convicted; they were mostly of grain, caused by high prices and the pressure of famine; in Tanna there were 10 cases, and only 2 convicted.

19. The value of property stolen in cognizable and non-cognizable cases is reported at Rs. 3,64,117; of this, Rs. 1,39,819 were recovered. Details are given in the statement below:—

The recoveries are 38 per cent. on the losses, but as the amount stated as loss must depend on the veracity of the complainants, which is not always to be relied upon, and as the amount recovered is accurately known, it follows that this is a percentage upon a fanciful sum, and therefore quite untrustworthy. But taking the figures as they are, the recoveries in the Panch Mahals are the highest, at 55 per cent., and in Násik at 53; Súrat, Tanna, and Broach are about on a par at 45 per cent. The others are very bad, Khandesh particularly, showing only 22 per cent.

- 20. I will now refer briefly to the returns of each district.
- 21. In Ahmadabad there were 2,261 cases reported and 14 remaining over from last year. 1,836 were investigated, and convictions obtained in 1,333 cases, or 73 per cent., which is one per cent. less than the success achieved in 1870. 1,350 persons were dis-

charged without trial; and out of the 1,990 persons tried, 102 were acquitted by the Magistrates, and 102 by the Sessions Court. The rest were convicted, which gives 90 per cent. of convictions on the number brought to trial.

- I do not understand Statement C, and from the confused way in which the figures are entered by Superintendents in general, I do not think they understand it. For instance in the Ahmadabad return, columns 2 and 3 give 26 cases of dacoity—14 were brought to trial, which should leave 12 cases untried; the Superintendent enters 6 in column 5. The heading of column 2 is "cases committed during previous two years, and in which no conviction was obtained up to beginning of the year". Should cases which have been tried and acquitted be included in the column? I think not; but the form is anything but clear. Again, it evidently excludes cases in which some of the accused have been convicted, and others are still at large or were arrested within the year. In its present form column 2 can only include cases of the two preceding years in which nobody has been brought to trial; hence column 8 can only refer to persons brought to trial within the year. This is shown in the return as 69, but column 14 shows only 38, and the same difference is observable between columns 9 and 15; the former shows 7 persons convicted, the latter shows 6. The form could be improved by column 2 including all cases which occurred in the two years, and a column being added—4-A—to show cases decided in these two years; columns 6 to 12 would then be a record of three years, and columns 13 to 18 should relate to columns 2 and 3.
- 23. The Superintendent reports that of the 18 murders committed, "one-third were on account of women, the remainder for the sake of plunder, or through jealousy and disputes about land". There were 16 cases of dacoity, in 12 of which the offenders were secured and punished. In six cases the robbers were clearly traced into foreign territory, but it is not stated how many of these were convicted.
- 24. The Superintendent writes—"I regret to have to observe that the native subordinates in foreign territory do not aid the Police, but rather place obstacles in the way of their detecting crime and apprehending prisoners, and I would suggest that something should be done to induce them to give every assistance to the Police. At present, if a prisoner is traced into foreign territory, there is every chance of his getting off, owing to the delay and correspondence before he is handed over for trial; and in many cases the Mukhi won't allow any search to be made without an order from the head official of the district. If the treaty between His Highness the

Guikwad and the British Government, dated 6th November 1871, were enforced, I am sure that there would be a great reduction in crime."

- 25. I shall refer to the treaty when I get an opportunity, but at present I am not able to suggest any measure by which the Guikwad or other chiefs of Native states could be induced to pay more attention to the prompt apprehension of criminals who seek shelter within their borders. The Political Agents, no doubt, do their best to assist the Superintendents; but in matters which require prompt action, much time is wasted before they can act in any way.
- 26. The increase of crime in Kheda and be easily accounted for by the late rains, and then the flood, and indeed in some places it was but the activity of the Police that prevented the Kolis breaking out in their old looting expedition. Notwithstanding the increase of crime, it is creditable to the District Police, weak-handed and unsupported as they are by a Village Police, that the percentage of cases convicted to cases detected is 68-28 against 65-92 for 1870."
- 27. There were 17 cases of murder and 2 of homicide. Of these 19 cases, "15 were committed to the Sessions, 2 discharged by the trying Magistrate. In one case the murderer is known, but has absconded, and one case remains undetected" " " " Of these cases "I (Captain La Touche) personally inquired into on the spot, 11. In the cases which were not inquired into by me, it was owing either to the inquiry being completed before I could reach (in several I had started), or to my being at the very time engaged in some other murder case."
- 29. Of the 15 cases committed to the Sessions, 6 were convicted, 4 were acquitted, and 5 remained over at the close of the year. "Of the 5 cases pending before the Sessions, 3 have been waiting trial 4 months, and the other 2 a little less."
- 29. The Magistrate, Mr. Sheppard, in writing of these murders remarks—"I regret that in only six cases convictions have been obtained; but on this point I must observe that the criterion of Police success is, in my opinion, rather in the number of cases committed by the Magistrates than in the final results before the Courts of Session. The delay before the latter court is so great, and the difficulties of obtaining convictions in capital offences in this part of the country so notorious, that I do not apprehend the Police inquiries in these 17 cases being considered unsatisfactory, when it is noticed that in 14 out of 17 the evidence was considered

by the committing Magistrates sufficient to warrant committal. With every desire to avoid personalities, I am compelled to record my opinion, founded on a careful observation of many of these cases, that had these trials been conducted by either of the Sessions Judges in Gujrát, the returns now submitted would not have disclosed results which could be construed into a reflection on the executive Police or the committing Magistrates."

- 30. Regarding the concluding remarks of the Magistrates, I have to add that the proceedings of the Assistant Judge were considered by Government and were not approved.
- 31. Captain LaTouche writes—"I again venture to suggest a photographic apparatus for each Police officer. A small one, with a certain number of prepared dry plates, is got complete for a very trifling sum. The method is very simple; its benefit would be very great." I believe this proposal to use photography as a means of recognizing criminals was considered by Government, and disapproved as unsuited to Indian Police. It requires an educated and accustomed eye to trace a likeness between photographs and the persons or places which they represent. The ordinary native method of tracing an offender by his "pags" or footsteps is more effective, and is suited to native methods. I am quite convinced, from my own experience as a photographer, that the measure could not be carried out with success.
- 32. Captain LaTouche appears to be rather hard on his men, if I am to judge from the return of dismissals and resignations. There were 42 men dismissed, and 101 resigned. The latter could not be helped, as the Magistrate explains that the resignations were the result of a combination to resist the orders of Government regarding the destruction of stray dogs, and the strike was sufficiently punished by the acceptance of the resignations.
- 33. The Panch Mahals during the greater portion of the ranch Mahals. year under review suffered from want of proper supervision, as Captain Westmacott was obliged to give up active work in consequence of his accident in April, and no officer was appointed in his room until the end of the year.
- 34. The returns show that crime was rather less than in the previous year. There were only 842 cases, in which 722 persons were convicted, or 51 per cent. of the number apprehended. It was 55 per cent in 1870. In non-cognizable cases the success was only 43 per cent., but in cognizable cases they did better—in fact the best in the division—at 59 per cent.

- 35. There were four murders—one case was convicted, and 2 were acquitted; in the fourth case the offenders escaped into foreign territory, and the Durbar has been requested to cause them to be arrested. In the one case of dacoity no conviction was obtained. Two cases are shown as convicted in the return; they relate to cases which occurred in the previous years, and were inquired into in 1871. Of 6 cases of highway robbery one only was detected.
- S6. The Magistrate, Mr. Propert, writes—"The arrangements with the Rewa Kanta for the extradition of offenders are very satisfactory, but delay must ensue to a certain extent even when every effort has been made, while the difficulties of obtaining the surrender of guilty persons from the Bengal Agencies in the east and north of the district are very considerable."
- Broach. 2,050 persons convicted, giving a success of 49 per cent. of convictions to apprehensions against 39 per cent. in the preceding year. In cognizable cases alone the success was 49 per cent., and in non-cognizable cases, in which the Police were employed, 52 per cent., or on the whole an average of 50½ per cent.
- 38. Eight murders were committed in the year, and one remained for trial from the past year. Five cases were convicted in the year and one subsequently. Mr. Cameron gives an instance of the daring and unscrupulous way in which the Boras endeavour to compass the ruin of their enemies by making evidence. He remarks of the Karmar poisoning case—"This was one of the most intricate cases of the year, and it gives a fair example of the cunning of the Boras in this district, and the utter want of scruple displayed by them in endeavouring to ruin persons with whom they are at enmity.
- "On the evening of the 7th February an old woman, named Bai Gori of Karmar, was brought on a cot to the Broach Taluka Chief Constable's Kacheri with wounds on the head. Her dying declaration was taken by the Sub-Magistrate, and she gave the names of Umar Wali, Jivá Alábasi, and three other Boras of Karmar as the persons who had assaulted her. On the 10th February she died in the civil hospital. The above persons were prosecuted, but discharged by the Magistrate.
- "After I took charge of this office on the 7th March I re-opened inquiries into this case, and it was discovered that Bai Gori had been wounded by her own relations, and she was induced by them to give the names of Umar Wali, &c., with whom they were at camity.

- "That three days after she made the dying declaration and was getting better, she was poisoned by her son Ali Mithá and two other Boras at the hospital. Ali Mithá was convicted and sentenced to death by the Sessions Court."
- 39. And another instance—"On the 5th of May a Bora named Mohamed Wali of Karmar rode into Broach and presented himself bleeding in the Court of the Huzur Deputy Collector. He accused Mohamed Husain and Musá Amanji of having murdered his sister and assaulted himself. His younger brother went with a similar complaint to the Full Power Magistrate, Mr. Wilson.
- "On inquiry by the Police it appeared that Mohamed Wali murdered his sister with a hatchet just outside his own door, then dashed his head against a wall, and crying out the names of the above persons (with whom he was at enmity about some land dispute) he rode into Broach, occasionally tumbling off in order to bruise himself. Mohamed Husain and Musa wounded their mother immediately to bring a counter-charge against the other side.
- "Mohamed Wali was convicted and sentenced to death. The execution was carried out at Karmar on the 22nd November. One can hardly believe in the utter moral depravity displayed in this case, and the facts as narrated above would be believed in by but few. I may state, however, that there was not the shadow of a doubt of the guilt of Mohamed Wali. He was abused by his own brother and near relations at the scaffold, and I had to order them to desist."
- 40. There were 4 cases of dacoity, all of which were detected and convicted, one after the close of the year.
- 41. The Superintendent remarks—"In most cases of simple assault, complaints are made by either one or both parties of robbery as well, in order to enhance, if possible, the punishment. One case will suffice to show their general tendency for exaggeration. In February last, Mr. Goslin, of the Trigonometrical Survey, had a scuffle with a Bramin; the latter laid a complaint charging Mr. Goslin with assault and robbery."
- 42. There were 4,139 cases in Súrat, which is some increase over the number in 1870: 6,875 persons were apprehended and 2,810 convicted, a percentage of 40 against 39 in the previous year. The percentage in cognizable cases was 56, and in non-cognizable 38, so that Police operations show a success of 47 per cent.
- 43. There were 6 murders, of which three were convicted. One deserves notice. It occurred "near Palsana, a village in His

Highness the Guikwad's territory. On or about the 20th September 1871, one Bhaga Kalian, of Mota in the Bardoli Taluka, was murdered under the following circumstances:—

- "The wife of the deceased, named Mani, had left Motá and proceeded to the house of her paramour, Fakira Naran, of Sisodra of the Jalalpur Taluka. Some time before the murder the deceased went after her, on which she induced her paramour to do away with Fakirá Náran employed a Bawá named Gopáldás Vajiram to hire any one he could, to murder Bhagá Kalián, and promised a reward of Rs. 200 for the purpose, and gave as earnest money Rs. 25 to the Bawa, who engaged Hemta Fakira Pinjara of Palsand, and handed over to him Rs. 17. The Pinjara agreed to kill Bhaga Kalian, and was informed of the date and time his victim was to leave Sisodrá for Motá. While passing through His Highness the Guikwad's territory, the deceased was waylaid by Hemta Fakira and his two accomplices, Rámlá Bhowán and Govind Dayál, all of Palsana, and by them murdered. The complainant in this case was Kalian Ratanji, father of the murdered man. He stated that on hearing of his son's murder he complained to His Highness the Guikwad's officials, but they would not assist him. He then complained to Mr. Yusaf Ali, District Police Inspector. Inquiries were at once commenced, and four out of the six persons concerned in The wife of the deceased and Govind the murder were arrested. Dayal, on hearing that the British authorities had taken up the case, fled and committed suicide. Out of the four prisoners apprehended, two, named Fakirá Narán and Gopaldás Vajirám, were committed for trial to the Sessions Court, where they were sentenced to transportation for life. The other two, named Hemtá Fakirá and Ramlá Bhowán, were handed over for trial to His Highness the Guikwad's officials."
- 44. There were sixidacoities and four convicted. Three cases of kidnapping and four of cattle theft are entered in Statement A, but do not appear in Statement C, because they were not "professional crimes."
- Tanna. 1870. Of these 1,109 were taken up by the Magistrates without the assistance of the Police. This is a very serious increase over the number of crimes reported in 1870, on which the Superintendent, Mr. Griertzen, remarks—"The new form of crime returns increase to a certain extent both the number of offences and of prisoners, as in several instances both count more than once, appearing again and again

as often as charged under different sections, and if convicted under one, the accused may be—and in some instances when a crime is brought alternatively under several sections, must be—acquitted under the others, and the comparison with the returns of former years is to that extent incorrect."

- 46. As this practice of entering one substantive offence more than once in the return is wrong, I have instructed the Superintendents not to do so.
- 47. The percentage of convictions to the number of persons apprehended is only 28. In fact, with the largest criminal return, Tanna shows the worst results. In cognizable cases alone the Police succeeded in obtaining convictions in 38 per cent. of the persons apprehended, and in non-cognizable cases in which they were employed, in 22 per cent. Major Coles was the Superintendent for four months of the year, Captain Bartholomew for six months, and Mr. Griertzen for two months.
- 48. Mr. Griertzen writes—"The increase of crime with 1,490 cases and of arrests with 3,004 looks formidable, the more so as the number of convictions have actually been reduced by 195; the whole blame for this, or even the greater part, is not, I think, attributable to the Police, which will be apparent by an analysis of the nature of increase.
- "With the exception of additional 150 cases of serious offences against person or property, the increase is chiefly in offences of trifling nature.
- "Under Sections 323, 352, 355, and 358 Indian Penal Code. minor offences against the person, 6,772 persons were arrested or summoned in 2,928 cases, and of these 5,412 were discharged; under Sections 504, 506, 510, criminal intimidation and insult, 1,214 persons were summoned in 294 cases, and of these 949 discharged, showing under these two heads alone an increase over last year of 712 offences 2,320 arrests, and 2,088 acquittals. The percentage of acquittals for these offences has risen from 75 to 80; and while in cognizable cases the percentage of convictions to arrests is 40 per cent., it falls in non-cognizable cases down to about the half or 22 per cent. That so many persons are brought before a Magistrate by his order on little or no evidence, is no fault of the Police; but that it is done, affects unfavourably the whole Police return, and fritters away the time of the men by obliging them to serve such an enormous number of summons. Employing them on unnecessary instead of necessary work, and in a district where 2,500 cognizable cases occur in a year, the Police can have but little time to

spare. Neither does it look well that nearly from out of every five persons, three summoned have been discharged.

- "It must, however, be admitted that the above mentioned 40 per cent. of convictions to arrests is too small, and that the Police have been too much addicted to arresting accused persons without duly considering the evidence. This tendency I observed long before I saw the returns, and have done my best to check."
- 49. Not only in serious offences is there an increase, for Tanna enjoys an unenviable pre-eminence in crime of a more serious nature. There were 26 murders, 5 attempts to murder, 53 cases of grievous hurt, 10 dacoities, 79 robberies, and 1,127 thefts. Of the 26 murder cases, 15 were convicted. Of the 5 attempts to murder, 3 were convicted, 27 cases were convicted out of 53 cases of grievous hurt, of the 10 dacoities 2 only were convicted, and 21 cases were convicted out of 79 robberies, and 553 out of 1,127 thefts.
- 50. The Police in Tanna must be said to have signally failed in their duties. But some allowance must be made for the frequent changes of the Superintendents and to the proximity of Bombay. Almost every case is manipulated by wakils before it comes on for trial, and the great delay between committal by Magistrates and trial by the Sessions Court, enables them to break down the strongest evidence.
- 51. Captain Portman, Superintendent at Kolaba, writes—
 Kolaba. "I hope that on the whole the working of
 the Police and the state of the district will be
 considered satisfactory." I regret I am obliged to differ from
 Captain Portman. The state and efficiency of the Kolaba Police,
 as shown in the return, is very little better than that of the Tanna
 Police. Kolaba can only show 44 per cent. of success in cognizable
 cases and 24 per cent. in non-cognizable cases, or a mean average
 of 34 per cent. in all cases in which the Police were employed. The
 Superintendent has not sent in any return of the cases taken up
 by the Magistrate without the aid of the Police.
- 52. There were 4 murders and one convicted, 3 attempts to murder, 5 dacoities of which 1 was convicted, and 21 robberies. One of the dacoities was committed by the debtors of a firm of Márwádi money-lenders. The bonds were thrown into the river and house ransacked of its other property. The bonds were recovered; but as the informant denied his statements before the Magistrate, the case broke down at Sessions, and the 17 prisoners were acquitted.

- 53. The number of reported crimes in Násik is all told Násik.

 2,828, about 1,000 more than in 1870. Of these the Magistrate took up 1,423 without the aid of the Police. The Superintendent, Captain Scott, attributes the increase to the partial famine, or rather great scarcity which followed the drought in the year and also to the Police "being made better acquainted with their duties now than they were formerly." It appears that Chief Constables formerly used their discretion in entering a crime on the register, "and so many crimes were overlooked, partly from a wish to keep down the appearance of crime and partly because it was believed that offences had not really been committed." If this discretion is exercised elsewhere it shall be stopped forthwith.
- 54. In cognizable cases a success of 44 per cent. was obtained, and in non-cognizable cases 41 per cent.; this gives a mean average of 42 per cent. of success in Police operations. This is somewhat a poor return from a Police who are now so much better acquainted with their duties, and apparently there is room for more improvement.
- 55. There were 9 cases of murder of which 4 were convicted, 2 attempts at murder, 2 describes, 1 convicted, and 3 cases of kidnapping. On the whole Nasik compares favourably with most other districts in its roll of serious crimes.
- Khandesh cases against 3,589 cases in 1870. The success shown is 40 per cent. against 53 per cent. last year; but the Superintendent, Captain Wise, warns me in his report that, as the figures for 1870 were prepared in a different form, the comparison cannot be taken as altogether correct. In cognizable cases a success of 48 per cent. is shown and 65 per cent. in non-cognizable cases, or a mean average of 56 per cent.
- 57. There has been a general increase in serious crime. There were 12 murders and 3 attempts to murder, 15 dacoities, 32 robberies, and 1,273 thefts. On which Captain Wise remarks—"The season has been a most exceptionally unfavourable one, such a one as I have not seen during the 13 years I have been in Khandesh. There was no monsoon, and consequently the crops nearly all failed. The lower classes were willing to work, but there was no labour to be had, while the price of food ran up higher and higher week after week, and had it not been for the importation of large quantities of grain, the distress would have amounted to actual starvation. It is a noticeable fact that in the Dhulé Taluka, a

rather troublesome district, but where public works were at once commenced as soon as the distress began to be felt, there was not a single case of dacoity, and two cases of robbery under Section 392 during the year.

"As regards the large number of dacoities I would remark that none were committed by professional dacoits, and only 3 out of the 15 were of a serious nature, the remainder being the work of a number of half-starved men making raids, and snatching like so many wolves at whatever chance threw in their way. Three, in which grain to the aggregate value of Rs. 59-8-0 was taken up from a Thilari encampment, were committed by a gang of 10 or 12 men in the same hour, and might be called one offence, but for there being three complainants, and consequently they have to be entered as three dacoities, and swell the return accordingly. other were committed on similar jungle encampments, and three in Nawapur Petha, the most unhealthy part of the district, where it is difficult to get men to serve, and where they fall sick as soon as sent there. As an illustration of the state the district was in, and a proof that the poorer classes were driven by hunger to commit crime, I would call attention to dacoity marked 7, detailed below, in which 17 men attacked and severely beat a man in a field and robbed him of one rupee's worth of Indian corn, and would further point out the fact, that the total amount of loss in 12 cases out of the 16 was only Rs. 657-2-0, a sum less than is stolen in some single cases of theft.

.

"There have been 31 cases (of robbery) during the year under report under this head, in which 60 persons were apprehended, of whom 18 were convicted, 41 acquitted, and one remained for trial at the close of the year. The largest amount stolen in any single case was Rs. 443-4-0, while the least was the small sum of annas eight.

"In the district the chief criminal classes are the Bhils, Wanjáras, Pardhis, Mángs, Gárodis, &c.; but the great disliculty the Police have to contend with, is the ease with which robbers and thieves can get rid of their stolen property. Nearly every Sonár in the district is a receiver and melter of stolen ornaments, which they purchase at a great advantage from the thieves; and many rich Sowcars also, who would make a great outcry at the injury done to their 'abru' if their houses were searched by the Police, do not hesistate to take stolen articles when they make money by doing so. These men can do it with impunity, as, if the Police should happen to search them on suspicion and find nothing, there is at

once a complaint to the Magistrate about the zúlum committed on them as respectable men by the Police, who have thus taken away their character. If stolen property should be found, the man to whom it belonged, is bribed by a sum exceeding by some few rupees the value of the ornaments found, not to swear to them in Court, and then the Police suffer again and are accused of having injured a respectable man! The dacoities are committed in the eastern districts chiefly by Wanjárás, who live along the boundary of the Nizam's territory, and who evade pursuit by crossing the border, where information and assistance cannot be obtained willingly. In the west nearly all crime of this description is done by the Bhils, who also cross over into the many neighbouring states to elude pursuit, and divide and get rid of their booty."

- 58. The Superintendents speak in favourable terms of the assistance given them by the Inspectors and the generality of the Chief Constables, and I have to record my sense of the zeal and activity and interest in their duties which is uniformly displayed by all the Superintendents of this Division.
- 59. I am indebted to Mr. Hamilton, my Assistant, for the labourious duty of compiling this Return.

Letter from the Commissioner of Police, S.D., No. A.-2416, dated 30th December 1852—Submits a report on the state of crime and working of the Police in the several Districts of the Southern Division for the year 1871.

Letter from the Commissioner of Police, N.D., No. 291, dated 21st February 1873—Submits a similar report for the Northern Division.

RESOLUTION.—These reports are for the calendar year 1871, and therefore lose much of their interest from the long time that has elapsed since the events to which they relate occurred. Mr. Havelock's letter for the Southern Division is dated 30th December 1872, and Mr. Ashburner's for the Northern Division, the 21st February 1873. The dates on which the reports of the several Superintendents were forwarded with their annual statements are not mentioned, so that Government are not in a position to say whether the delay is attributable to those officers or to the offices of the Police Commissioners; but wherever the blame may lie, it is not creditable to those concerned, and His Excellency looks to the Commissioners to use every endeavour to prevent such unreasonable delay occurring again.

2. The new forms of statements have now been adopted for the first time in the Northern Division; but as the old ones were used for the returns of 1870, the comparison of the statistics has given rise to a good deal of inconvenience and trouble. On examining them, moreover, there appears to be some difference in the manner in which some of the columns are filled in, in the two divisions. For instance, in the Northern Division in Part I. of Statement A., the number of prisoners actually put on trial (Column XV.) corresponds with the total of those acquitted or discharged after trial by the Magistrates or higher Courts (Columns XVI. and XVII.)

and of the persons finally convicted (Column XVIII). In the Southern Division on the contrary, Column XV. comprises the totals in Columns XVI. to XVIII., plus the number shown in Column XXII. as under trial by the Magistrate. Government are of opinion that the method adopted in the Northern Division is correct, and that Column XV. should only embrace those cases in which the trial of a prisoner has been completed and not those in which it is still pending.

3. Looking at the total number of crimes of all descriptions cognizable by the Police during the year, there were in the Southern Division 11,862 as against 11,018 in the previous year, showing an increase of 844 or 7.6 per cent. In the Northern Division there were 13,792 in the current year; but in the returns for 1870 this class of offences has not been shown separately, so that a similar comparison cannot be instituted. Taking cognizable and non-cognizable offences together, the two Divisions contrast as follows:—

This gives an average increase of 16.5 per cent. in the Northern and of 19.2 in the Southern Division, or one of 17.5 over the whole.

4. The difficulty of making out these statistics from the returns is much enhanced by the manner in which the totals in different districts are made up. In some cases the whole of the crimes in a district are added up at the end of the statement relating to it, whilst in others the totals on each sheet only are so, or the totals in non-cognizable cases in which the Police were employed, are occasionally kept separate from those of cases in which their services were not made use of. It should be a standing rule that a total for each district should be shown at the end of its own statement for both classes of cases.

5. The following table exhibits the result of the action of the Police in all classes of cognizable cases in the several districts:—

It is observable that while in the Northern Division there is only one district in which less than half the number brought to trial were convicted, there are three in the Southern Division, and there are none in the latter in which the convictions exceed 80 per cent., while in the Northern Division there are three. Particular

credit is due to the Superintendents* of these three districts and the Police under them for the success of their operations during the year.

The increase in the number of serious crimes is in all the remarkable cases, e. g., Kaira, Násik, and Khandesh in the Northern Division, and Ahmadnagar, Kaládgi, and Sholápur in the Southern Division, attributed by the several Superintendents to the unfavorable nature of the season, which drove many to commit outrages for the sake of procuring food. In the most remarkable case, that of Kaira, in which the thefts increased from 595 to 1,196, the Superintendent states that it was only the activity of the Police that prevented the Kolies breaking out in their old looting expeditions.

7. The percentage of convictions to committals for trial varies considerably in the different districts—

The returns of Poona and Ratnagiri are by no means creditable to Lieutenant-Colonels Henderson and Johnstone; but, as both these officers have now left the Police, it is hoped the Police administration of the districts will improve under their successors. The percentage of convictions in Broach is low, but, as noticed by the Police Commissioner, is improving under the vigorous measures of Mr. Cameron, whose difficulties in dealing with a clever and unscrupulous population and a bad village Police are very great.

- While in the Northern Division the number of murders. attempts to murder, and culpable homicides, although fluctuating in some districts, has remained the same (154) as in the previous year, that in the Southern Division has increased by 18. In the latter on the whole the convictions in investigated cases has increased by $2\frac{1}{3}$, having in 1870 been 39.1 and in 1871 4.16. percentage in the Northern Division in the latter year was 53.8. which exceeds that of the Southern Division by over 12 per cent. The most remarkable cases are those in the Broach District, quoted by the Police Commissioner in paragraphs 38 and 39 of his Their detection reflects great credit on Mr. Cameron report. and his Police. So much is truth sometimes stronger than fiction that if these had been introduced as incidents into the pages of a romance, they would have been considered exaggerated or utterly improbable, and Mr. Cameron's report is accordingly quoted in full:—
 - "38. Eight murders were committed in the year, and one remained for trial from the past year. Five cases were convicted in the year and one subsequently. Mr. Cameron gives an instance of the daring and unscrupulous way in which the Boras endeavour to compass the ruin of their enemies by making evidence. He remarks of the Karmar poisoning case—'This was one of the most intricate cases of the year, and it gives a fair example of the cunning of the Boras in this district, and the utter want of scruple displayed by them in endeavouring to ruin persons with whom they are at enmity.
 - 'On the evening of the 7th February an old woman, named Bai Gori of Karmar, was brought on a cot to the Broach Taluka Chief Constable's Kacheri with wounds on the head. Her dying declaration was taken by the Sub-Ma-

gistrate, and she gave the names of Umar Wali, Jivá Alabasi, and three other Boras of Karmar as the persons who had assaulted her. On the 10th February she died in civil hospital. The above persons were prosecuted, but discharged by the Magistrate.

- After I took charge of this office on the 7th March I reopened inquiries into this case, and it was discovered that Bai Gori had been wounded by her own relations, and she was induced by them to give the names of Umar Wali, &c., with whom they were at enmity.
- 'That three days after she made the dying declaration and was getting better, she was poisoned by her son Ali Mithá and two other Boras at the hospital. Ali Mithá was convicted and sentenced to death by the Sessions Court.'
- "39. And another instance—'On the 5th of May a Bora named Mohamed Wali of Karmar rode into Broach and presented himself bleeding in the Court of the Huzur Deputy Collector. He accused Mohamed Husain and Musa Amanji of having murdered his sister and assaulted himself. His younger brother went with a similar complaint to the Full Power Magistrate, Mr. Wilson.
- On inquiry by the Police it appeared that Mohamed Wali murdered his sister with a hatchet just outside his own door, then dashed his head against a wall, and crying out the names of the above persons (with whom he was at enmity about some land dispute) he rode into Broach, occasionally tumbling off in order to bruise himself. Mohamed Husain and Musa wounded their mother immediately to bring a counter charge against the other side.
- 'Mohamed Wali was convicted and sentenced to death. The execution was carried out at Karmar on the 22nd November. One can hardly believe in the utter moral depravity displayed in this case, and the facts as narrated above would be believed in by but few. I may state, however, that there was not the shadow of a doubt of the guilt of Mohamed Wali. He was abused by his own brother and near relations at the scaffold, and I had to order them to desist.'"

The district of Tanna still enjoys the unenviable notoriety noticed in previous years for cases of violence to the person in various shapes, the number under "hurt" (Section 323) almost equalling that in the whole of the rest of the Division; but the most marked increase in the serious crimes mentioned in the preceding paragraph has been in Poona, in which it has risen from 20 The result of Police action in them, moreover, has been extremely unsatisfactory, for out of the whole 35 cases investigated, including one belonging to the previous year, in only 12 were convictions obtained against 16 out of 82 prisoners brought to trial. In the latter respect Sholapur also takes a bad place, for out of 30 investigated cases (including some from 1870) convictions were only obtained in 6 cases against 8 out of 56 prisoners tried. The district most successful in detection and obtaining convictions in this class of cases has been that of Surat, in which convictions have been obtained against the whole of the prisoners in all the sovcu cases investigated.

The attention of the Police Commissioner, N.D., should be called to the careless manner in which columns XVI. to XXI. of Statement B. for his Division have been prepared. In Tanna and Kolába the value of stolen property is not given at all for 1870, so that it is impossible to ascertain the percentage of recoveries for that year. In Broach the totals of the percentages under the different heads of crime have been added up to represent the percentage under each class, and in Khandesh the precentages have not been calculated at all.

11. The question of the re-organization of the Village Police is at present under the consideration of Government. A Committee composed of the Police Commissioners and some of the most experienced District Magistrates and Superintendents of Police

was appointed to report on this very important subject generally, and more especially on certain proposals relating to it, which were placed before them. The Report has now been submitted, and is at present before Government.
