I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the working of the Police of the Northern Division during the year 1880. The usual statements as per margin are appended.

2. The amendment of Statement A., Part I., as recommended by the three Commissioners jointly, and sanctioned in Government Resolution No. 7137, dated 22nd October 1880, has resulted in a radical change in the way in which the statistics of cognizable crime are exhibited in the above statement, inasmuch as the return has been converted from a record of *all* crime, except cases struck off, into one of crime, (*including* cases struck off,) in which the Police were employed. No comparison, therefore, with the figures of the previous year is possible.

3. Other changes have also been introduced to show the extent to which the Police have availed themselves of the provisions of sections 117 and 125, Criminal Procedure Code, and to amplify some of the existing columns so as to distinguish between *cases* and *persons* dealt with by the Police *suo motu* or by order of the Magistrate. Although this information has been furnished in the returns of this Division for the past two years in additional columns at the end of Statement A., Part I., still some confusion appears now to have arisen owing to the inclusion of "*false*" cases in column 4, but instructions were issued from this office from time to time with a view to secure uniformity, and copies of these were also furnished to the Commissioners, Central and Southern Divisions and Sind.

4. The dates of reports of the Superintendents of Police and the endorsements of the District Magistrates forwarding them, as also of the references from the former relating to discrepancies discovered on examination of the returns, are shown below:—

These figures show a large decrease in 1880, but, as I have explained above, the cognizable cases taken up by Magistrates directly have been omitted this year and the results are therefore misleading. However, including such cases, a return of which I subsequently obtained for the sake of comparison, the results are as follows :—

6. A decrease in crime is thus apparent in all districts except Ahmedabad and Kolába, where there has been a slight increase. The net decrease is 1,765 as shown above, and is due to the favourable season. The increase in Ahmedabad is in non-cognizable offences under the head "Special laws not cognizable by the Police." The increase in Kolába is principally in minor offences against property and under the Forest Act, and partly under non-cognizable offences.

7. The return of cognizable cases taken up directly by the Magistrates which I obtained shows some curious results, as will be seen from the following figures :—

The large number of cases in Thána, in which complaints are made direct to the Magistrate as compared with the other districts, is striking. The great proportion of these appear to be cases of hurt, but it is curious that only in this district complainants should go direct to the Magistrate. Thána is almost the only district in which the provisions of section 117 of the Criminal Procedure Code have been ordinarily availed of, and a stricter application of the provisions of this section will no doubt lead to the same results in other districts. Attention will be called to this matter as it does not appear from the figures in column 7 of Statement A. that the Magistrates discourage applications to themselves.

Although the normal state of crime before 1878 has not been attained, it is satisfactory to observe the large decrease during 1880, and the anticipations of my predecessor that a reaction has set in have been realized.

9. The following is a comparison of the number of persons arrested during the year under report and the preceding year. Arrests in struck-off cases are not included in this table :—

10. The figures include arrests made in non-cognizable cases for which the Police are not responsible, and their action in making arrests will be better dealt with under cognizable crimes.

11. From the table in para. 5 it will be seen that the percentage of convictions to arrests is 55 against 50 in the previous year. It is the highest percentage that has been obtained for the Division during the past 12 years, but it must be borne in mind that the persons concerned in cases taken up directly by the Magistrates in cognizable cases have this year not been included in the returns. Kaira takes the lead with a percentage of 73; Panch Maháls comes next, though its percentage has fallen from 77 to 67. Ahmedabad and Surat show an improvement and occupy the same places as in the preceding year. Thána, which was last, is fifth, with a far better percentage, and Broach and Kolába occupy the last place, showing a very low proportion of convictions.

12. The number of persons arrested is less by 11,280 than in the previous year, but the figures do not afford a fair comparison as the persons concerned in cases disposed of by the Magistrates on complaint to themselves direct have not been taken into account this year as previously observed.

14. The steady increase during 1877 and 1878 was partially arrested during 1879 and the large falling off in 1880 is very satisfactory.

15. The following table shows the proportion of cognizable crime to the population of each district:—

Taking the Division as a whole the proportion is 1 crime to 378 persons against 1 to 237 persons in the preceding year. No very accurate conclusions, however, can be drawn from these figures. If, for instance, the large number of cognizable cases taken direct by the Thána Magistrates are included, that district will show a proportion of 1 crime to every 160 persons. The judicial statistics would afford better data for comparison. The relative criminality of the adjoining districts of Kaira and Ahmedabad is very striking, but the former is a compact and comparatively rich district, while the latter is an extensive and sparsely inhabited country, interspersed with foreign territory, and partly wild and unsettled country. The apparent disparity between the two Konkan districts of Thána and Kolába is explained above. The marked pre-eminence of Thána is doubtless owing to the habits of drunkenness of the people, and I have every confidence that under the new A'bkári arrangements crime in this district will soon show a sensible decrease.

16. The following table is a brief abstract of Statement A., Part I., showing the percentage of cases in which convictions were obtained to cases investigated and cases decided; also of convictions to apprehensions, but for the reasons given

in para. 2 *supra* the figures of the preceding year, except as to the number of offences, have been omitted as no comparison is possible and it would be only misleading to give them. Table II. has also been omitted as cases taken up directly by the Magistrates have not been included in the following statement:—

This table exhibits a satisfactory falling off in cognizable crime in all districts except Kolába, where there has been a small increase, which has already been explained in para. 6 *supra*.

It is higher in the last year than it has ever been, but it must be borne in mind that persons arrested and convicted in cases taken up directly by the Magistrates are not taken into account this year and that comparison with former results is consequently difficult.

The latter is the better test of the success of the Police, and, all cases in which they were not employed having been omitted, the results are creditable to the four first-named districts, where convictions exceeding 50 per cent. have been obtained. It is especially creditable to Thána, which has risen from the last place in the preceding year to the first this year. The result is partially explained by the system alluded to as obtaining in Thána. Very many of the petty hurt cases dealt with direct by the Magistrates were formerly discharged

and the Thána totals thus kept down. Such cases have been eliminated this year, and this district benefits thereby. Broach and Kolába still remain at the bottom and show a very low percentage.

19. The following comparative statement shows the result of the actual operation of the Police. The figures in the column "By order of Magistrate" do not include cases taken up directly by the Magistrates as in the previous year, and the latter have accordingly been omitted as no comparison is possible, but those in the columns "By Police *suo motu*" remain unaffected by the change in the manner of recording cognizable crime, and represent results for which the Police are strictly responsible :—

As compared with the preceding year the Panch Mahál District, which was the best, has changed places with Kaira which occupied the second place; the remaining districts occupy the same places as in 1879. Broach and Kolába are still at the bottom and have fallen off from 53 and 43 per cent. to 43 and 40 per cent. respectively, which is not at all creditable. Kaira has improved considerably, having risen from 69 to 79 per cent., while Panch Maháls has slightly fallen off. Thána and Ahmedabad maintain the same percentage as last year. Surat has also improved, being 62 against 59 in 1879. This, in my opinion, is perhaps the most important table in this report.

Kolába maintains the same percentage as last year, but it must be remembered that comparatively few persons arrested are brought to trial (*vide*

para. 20) and it is only to be expected, therefore, that the proportion of convictions should be high on the number thus dealt with. Panch Maháls, Thána, and Ahmedabad have fallen off slightly, while Broach and Surat show an improvement though still occupying the lowest places.

22. The table given below shows the number of cases committed to the Sessions Court for trial and how they were disposed of. Considering that the usual complaint is that cases committed to the Sessions Court are not unfrequently let off on unimportant technicalities, the high percentage of convictions obtained in Ahmedabad, Thána, Kolába, Kaira and the Panch Maháls, is creditable. In Surat a higher percentage was obtained last year, but in Broach the percentage is as low as 44, it being 69 in the preceding year. The percentage of persons convicted is not quite so satisfactory :—

From the first table it will be seen that 29 per cent. of the cases reported were struck off. The greatest proportion was in Kaira, Broach and Thána and the smallest in the Panch Maháls. It is not satisfactory to find so many cases struck off, but the effect of the proposals of the Committee sanctioned by Government recently will be ascertained next year. It is very unsatisfactory to find that in Panch Maháls and Ahmedabad one in every four and in Kaira and Kolába one in every five cases remain undetected. Surat shows a remarkably low percentage, only 7 per cent. remaining undetected for the year under report.

Thána, Panch Maháls, Surat and Kolába appear to have followed up and detected the largest number of cases of former years, while Kaira, Broach and Ahmedabad would seem to have almost entirely overlooked such cases. But I am not prepared to arrive at any such conclusion, and without going into the details of a large percentage of these undetected cases I am afraid it is impossible to judge fairly the action of the Police in this matter.

25. From Table II. it will be seen that the number of persons discharged in cases struck off is very low in all districts except Surat, Broach and Kaira (where it is exceptionally high, especially in the first-named district). This indicates that arrests are rarely made in the districts of Ahmedabad, Panch Maháls, Thána and Kolába in false cases. This is as it should be, and it is to be hoped that Surat, Broach and Kaira will hereafter show an improvement in this respect. Kaira exhibits the highest percentage of persons convicted, viz., 70 per cent., and Broach the lowest, its percentage being only 36; the other districts show: Panch Maháls 64, Thána 61, Ahmedabad 50, Surat 49, Kolába 39. The comparatively high percentage of *acquittals* in Surat and Broach is no doubt remarkable as noted in para. 30 of last year's report.

The large number of cases entered against Kaira is probably owing to the fact that in a considerable number of cases the Magistrate has sent for the parties and held a personal enquiry before complying with the request of the Police to have the complaints struck off.

It is clear that the Police are discovering the advantages of attention to this section and the improvement in Broach, Panch Maháls, Kaira and Kolába is satisfactory. The neglect by Ahmedabad and Surat of the orders enjoining more attention to this important section is to be regretted.

The decrease in serious crime as evidenced by this statement is most satisfactory. The decrease under murder, culpable homicide, dacoities, robberies, thefts and receiving stolen property is considerable. A few cases of kidnapping in the Panch Maháls have tended to increase the number of offences under this head, and there is an increase of one case under attempt at murder.

The decrease in murders is 22 cases, viz., in Thána 10, Ahmedabad 9, Panch Maháls and Kolába 2 each, and Surat 1, while Kaira shows an increase of two cases and Broach has the same number as last year. Some of these cases will be mentioned in Part II. of this report.

30. Dacoities have fallen off from 154 in 1879 to 41 this year. In Thána there are 63 cases less, Kolába 10, Panch Maháls 29, Ahmedabad 6, no cases in Surat and Broach, and 4 cases occurred in Kaira this year.

The decrease of murders and dacoities in Thána is very remarkable. The latter is doubtless owing to a good season and cheap food, and I cannot but attribute the former in some degree to the new A'bkári arrangements already alluded to, by which the price of country liquor has been considerably increased. As drunkenness decreases so will many forms of crime, and *homicide* especially.

31. There has been a decrease of 74 cases under robberies, and this is common to all districts except Kaira, where there was an increase of 12 cases.

Robberies.

32. There were 3,090 cases this year against 5,548 in the previous year, or a decrease of 2,458 cases in thefts. This falling off is general and it is especially noticeable in Thána and Ahmedabad as will be seen from the following statement. These results are only such as were to be expected during a season in which the demand for labour was brisk and the price of all necessaries of life moderate :—

The extremely low percentage both in Police and Magistrates' cases in the four last districts contrasts very unfavourably with that obtained in the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira and Panch Maháls. In Broach out of 467 persons tried for non-cognizable offences no less than 383 were acquitted. In Thána again 76 per cent. were acquitted. These statistics, however, will come under the consideration of Government when reviewing the usual Judicial statements.

PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED.

37. The following statement shows the value of property stolen and recovered with the percentage of recoveries in 1879 and 1880 in cognizable and non-cognizable cases. The large decrease in the value of stolen property is due to the diminished number of cases of dacoity and other offences against property, and partly also to the stolen property in cases taken up directly by the Magistrates having been omitted. The decrease amounts to Rs. 2,35,314 and is common to all districts. The percentage of recoveries has improved from 36 to 40 this year. The low percentage in Kaira and Panch Maháls contrasts unfavourably with the other districts. It is not creditable to the Police of a district that only 4 annas in the rupee should be recovered as in these two

districts. But I am not sure that uniformity prevails in the mode of recording values and recoveries. For instance, if the offences of theft and receiving stolen property are committed in respect of the same property, is the latter shown twice over? and if so, and a conviction is obtained for one offence only, is the recovery shown against both? Applied to the results of a single year the test of recoveries of property is an eminently unfair one, but if the results of a series of years are examined a reasonably fair opinion may be formed. Taking the last three years in the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira, and the Panch Mahals, I find the average percentage of recoveries to be 67, 34 and 35 respectively, and I consider that these results reflect strongly on the efficiency in this respect of the Police of the two latter districts.

Statement C.

38. Only one case has been entered in this statement. The details as given by the Superintendent of Police are as follows:—

“A notorious prisoner, who had been transported and afterwards made approver, escaped from Mount Abu three years ago, and since practised as a thug in Baroda, Broach, Cambay, Kaira, and Ahmedabad, and taught others the art. He was convicted with his associates on charges under sections 311, 401, 302, 303, 307, 326 and 328, Indian Penal Code, and was finally convicted under section 326 and transported for life.”

Statement D.

39. This is a statement of additional Police employed for the protection of persons and property at large fairs and jattras. No extra Police were entertained for this purpose during the year under report.

40. Captain Humphrey, the Superintendent of Police, Ahmedabad, reports that there are now no proclaimed “Bahirwatias” (outlaws) in the district, those of the once turbulent villages of the Chival having been arrested or given up by their relatives, and in consequence the punitive post placed in the villages of Sinaj, Vithalpur and Gunjala have been largely reduced.

A punitive post was established at the village of Lagdana in the Ahmedabad District owing to the refusal of the villagers to assist the Superintendent of Police while in hot pursuit of eight dacoits on the 2nd December 1879. Seven of these have since been arrested, two have already been sentenced to seven years' imprisonment, five are awaiting trial and one is still at large.

Another punitive post was established at Samarkha in the Kaira District in consequence of the misconduct of the villagers towards the Christian inhabitants.

The punitive post at the village of Kathi-ni-Aniali has recently been abolished, the village having been resumed by Government owing to the default of the purchaser, the judgment-creditor of the Talukdár.

Statement E.

41. The total sanctioned strength of the Police of all grades in the Northern Division, including the Superintendents of Police and their Assistants, is 5,033 and the population of the Division is 4,008,351, or one Policeman to 796 inhabitants. This force is maintained at a cost of Rs. 8,24,521. It was distributed on the last day of the year as follows:—

The difference in the sanctioned strength of the Police as compared with the previous year is owing to the A'bkári Police in Surat and Thána not having been included, and to certain reductions having been made in the Panch Maháls in order to provide an Account Office under the new organization sanctioned in Government Resolution No. 7137, dated 22nd October 1880.

42. The following statement shows the proportion of Police to area and population of the whole Division excluding Native States, Cantonments and Railways, and for each district separately:—

Statement F.

43. The whole force is divided into two branches, the *armed* consisting of 2,198 men and the *unarmed* 2,826 men. The armed men are supplied with the sappers carbine, only 50 men in the Surat Punitive Police Post being armed with breach-loading carbines of the Snider pattern. The unarmed men have all swords (Royal Navy cutlass and country swords) and batons, but when employed on duty in towns they do not wear their swords.

PUNISHMENTS.

44. The following table shows the punishments which were inflicted on the men of the force in the several districts of the Division:—

45. The departmental punishments in Ahmedabad and the Panch Maháls are heaviest, but the Superintendents' explanation as to the necessity for this severity is satisfactory. In the Panch Maháls 74 men were suspended mostly on account of indebtedness.

REWARDS.

46. The following table exhibits briefly the manner in which good service has been rewarded and the number of recipients of rewards :—

47. Substantial rewards in the way of promotion are, it will be seen, freely given in Broach, Ahmedabad, Kaira, and the Panch Maháls, and to a limited extent in Surat; but it is remarkable that none whatever were given in Thána and Kolába. Either the returns are prepared in a faulty manner, *all* promotions being entered in other districts as *rewards*, or the Superintendents in these two districts have neglected to reward good service. It is impossible to suppose that in a force consisting of some hundreds of men deserving cases do not exist.

EDUCATION.

48. The following statement shows the state of education in each district and exhibits a general improvement as compared with the preceding year. Attention has recently been drawn to the orders of Government directing that only men who are able to read and write should be promoted to the grade of Head Constable, and it is hoped that as far as possible these orders will be adhered to and stimulate the lower grades to greater exertion in acquiring the required standard of education; but the duties are so heavy that the men can afford little time to attend the Police school, and it being difficult to obtain recruits it is impossible to insist upon *educated* men only being enlisted :—

ENLISTMENTS, RESIGNATIONS, &c.

50. Five hundred and sixteen men were enlisted during the year, the largest number being in Ahmedabad. The proportion of men under ten years' service is larger than that above that limit, being 2,436 against 1,957. One hundred and thirty-one men resigned against 95 in 1879 and 137 in 1878, but the number of men dismissed have risen from 87 to 138 this year. Eighteen men deserted and of these 14 belonged to the Panch Maháls, where the quasi-military corps is recruited from the Bhils, and it is not a matter of surprise that desertions sometimes take place.

Statement G.

51. The following is a brief abstract of this statement showing the different castes of the officers and men constituting the force of the Division as contrasted with the preceding year. All the Superintendents and their Assistants are Europeans, three are military officers, and the rest belong to the uncovenanted service:—

POLICE BUILDINGS.

52. The amount of expenditure on Police Buildings is Rs. 21,419 against Rs. 22,541 in the previous year. The expenditure by the Public Works Department, out of the above sum was Rs. 16,556, and departmentally Rs. 4,156 on repairs and Rs. 707 on petty construction.

SUICIDES AND ACCIDENTAL DEATHS.

53. The number of suicides and accidental deaths which occurred in each district in given below. These are highest in Surát, the Panch Maháls and Thána. The number under the column "other causes" is very considerable. These embrace all accidental deaths other than those specially enumerated in the preceding columns, but it would appear that the proportion in Kaira, Surát, and Thána is abnormally high compared with the average in other districts, and the attention of the Magistrates of these districts will be called to the fact:—

54. The returns received from the several Superintendents and their Assistants are appended to this report and the following is a brief abstract of them:—

55. This return does not give a favourable impression of the activity displayed by the several Superintendents in making personal investigations, but in reviewing their reports in Part II. the excuses offered for not visiting each scene of crime will be better weighed and considered.

56. I have only here to observe that no pressure is put on the several Superintendents regarding *inspection of posts*, in order that these officers may have leisure to visit the scenes of important crimes. It is not clear, however, that the latter duty, on which Government have repeatedly laid considerable stress, is in all districts carried out satisfactorily. Opinions appear to differ materially as to what are serious crimes:—thus in Surat only 8 of such offences are shown in this statement, presumably the 8 cases of murder and homicide reported by the Superintendent. But besides these there must have been other cases of a sufficiently serious nature to require the early and personal attention of the Superintendent. It is often given as a reason for not visiting scenes of crime that the offender has been apprehended and has confessed his guilt. But I believe that in many important cases convictions are lost by the Police being satisfied with confessions and neglecting to work up corroborating evidence.

57. I would take this opportunity in placing on record my opinion that it would be well if Magistrates, when in the neighbourhood of any important crime, would more frequently visit the place and hold (not mere informal investigation, but) regular enquiry, recording evidence before it can have been tampered with. Such practice was more common in former years than at present. I know that the work of Magistrates has greatly increased, but I am strongly of opinion that a morning ride to a scene of crime and the recording, then and there, of fresh untainted evidence would often tend to elicit the real truth, would materially assist the Police, and would often save the Magistrate himself future trouble.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS.

58. As the Division was not under my charge during the year for which the report is submitted, it would be hardly within my province to attempt a more elaborate review of the results.

59. The few additional remarks I desire to offer are on general subjects and not with reference to any particular district.

60. It appears to me that the growing importance of the Salt, A'bkári, and Opium revenues requires that special notice should be made in future by the Superintendents regarding the amount of success that has attended the action of the Police in their duty with respect to these laws during the year under report.

61. I have already noticed that there is at present no uniformity with respect to treating promotions as rewards. I think it should be clearly understood in future that only promotions made for special good service should be thus shown. Ordinary promotions by virtue of seniority are not properly speaking "rewards."

62. With the exception of a passing allusion to the subject by the Superintendent of Kaira, no other officers have remarked on a matter which I consider a very important one and one bearing very materially on Police success, viz., the treatment of habitual criminals. On the one hand, the Police avail themselves far too little, in most districts, of the provisions of the law for precautionary measures, and, on the other hand, I am quite sure that much harm is done by the

inadequate sentences too often passed by the lower grades of the Magistrates in cases of second convictions.

63. If Government should be pleased to call for a statistical return (similar to that in use in Bengal) showing the sentences awarded by the Courts of this Presidency in such cases, it would probably be seen that the provisions of section 315 of the Criminal Procedure Code are often neglected, and that habitual criminals are too often thrown back on society *after a short detention in jail* (which to many of the criminal classes is not unpleasant). This mistaken leniency is merely a premium on crime.

64. I would suggest that in future reports the number of escapes from Police custody should be accounted for, and the punishments awarded for proved neglect of duty in such cases reported. Too much prominence cannot be given to such cases.

65. I must not omit to notice the very general complaint of the Superintendents regarding the difficulty of obtaining a good class of men as recruits. The fact is that the pay of this department has not kept pace with the general rise in the rate of wages in this Presidency. Horse-keepers and menial servants are paid at a higher rate than the Police, and the consequence is, increasing difficulty in obtaining good men. I fear that in many cases the Superintendents have to enlist unsuitable and weakly men in order to keep the force up to its strength, and the result is, that the old standard of respectability, efficiency, and intelligence is not maintained.

3. There were 7 cases of murder against 16 of last year; in two cases convictions were obtained, one is pending, one is undetected, and three were acquitted. The undetected case referred to is thus described by the Superintendent:—

“On the 10th January the dead body of a man with the feet tied together was found in the Khán Taláv in Dholka. The body had been in the water some seven or eight days and was much decomposed. The body was not recognized by any one, but from the fashion of the hair it was supposed to be that of a Káthiáwári. From enquiries, there is reason to suppose that the body was that of a man named Mawji Kesra, who was previously living in the village of Ruggad and who had disappeared for some time; the clothes resemble those that the missing man used to wear. This case has been under strict enquiry, but no reasonable suspicion can be attached to any one.”

Homicides.

4. The Superintendent states:—

"Homicides have increased from six to eight. They do not require any special remarks. Convictions were obtained in two cases, one is pending, in three cases the accused were acquitted, one is undetected and one struck off as no crime by order of the Magistrate."

5. Of the eight cases of attempts at murder, five were struck off by order of the Magistrates as no crime, one case was acquitted, one convicted and one remains undetected.

Attempt at murder.

Dacoities.

6. As regards dacoities Captain Humfrey writes:—

"I am glad to be able to report that during this year dacoities have almost ceased, there being but four in the whole district, of which three were committed in the Modasa district and one in the taluka of Sanaud.

"All these dacoities have been of a trivial character, and though technically dacoities inasmuch as five men were concerned, yet in most cases sticks were the only weapons used, and but small sums (in one case as little as Rs. 3) were taken. This must be attributed, no doubt, in a measure to the favourable season, but a great portion of the credit is due to the system of patrolling which is now kept up both by Savars and foot-Police, but more especially by the Savars in the talukas of Virangam, Sanaud and Dholka. This system after much trouble is, I think, now efficient and will yearly become more so."

Decrease in cognizable offences.

7. Regarding the decrease in cognizable crimes the District Magistrate observes:—

"Captain Humfrey has no doubt rightly attributed the large decrease in crime generally to more favourable seasons and prices, and the cessation of the specific offences of an organized character to the efficiency of his patrol system and the capture of criminal outlaws."

Mr. Richey further adds:—

"It may, I think, be anticipated that, with the extension of railway communication and the growth of organized government in the Baroda State and Kathiawar, organized dacoity and highway robbery will die out, but at present on the western frontier we must depend upon the vigilance of the stipendiary Police to keep out dacoits."

The decrease reported is specially noticeable when it is remembered that last year was the great marriage year in Gujarat. Unusually large number of people visited their friends in distant villages during these occasions, and in such times crime is often rife. Owing to the favourable nature of the season also there was a large increase in the number of visitors to the large fairs, and on such occasions highway robberies were formerly common.

8. The Superintendent reports a case of extortion by a party of approvers of the Thuggi and Dacoity Department:—

Extortion.

"In February 1880 a party of Thuggi and Dacoity Department Naibs came into the district with instructions to arrest certain dacoits whom one of their informers professed to recognize. They were permitted to go on this duty and proceeded to Virangam. There they grossly abused their powers by extorting money on threats of laying information against many men both rich and poor as being concerned in dacoities. This was reported to me in March and I informed the District Magistrate. The party were sent back to Baroda. On enquiry into the case it was found that they had extorted money in many cases, but as they were known to be Government servants no complaints were at first made. I enquired carefully into the matter and found that they had instituted a regular system of extortion, and if they could not obtain money in some cases they were content to be paid in food.

"I then, after enquiring into the different cases, decided to take up sixteen in which not only were the Naibs included but also some of the friends of the informer Ranchodji. These cases were sent up to the Magistrate and out of 34 men concerned 24 were convicted. Charges were brought against three Police constables, but they were, on trial before the Magistrate, acquitted."

Captain Humfrey does not mention what sentences were awarded, but the conviction of these men is satisfactory, and it is to be hoped that their punishment was exemplary.

9. The amount of property stolen is Rs. 46,600 of which Rs. 24,508 has been recovered. The Superintendent observes that the percentage of recoveries is slightly worse than last year:—

Stolen property.

"But it is owing to one robbery of a large sum which was committed at Mandal on the border of Kathiawar not being reported for a month after it took place owing to the absence of the owner of the house, and in this time the thieves had ample time to make away with their plunder in foreign territory. Another reported case of Rs. 1,000 is no robbery at all,

but the Police have as yet, owing to the various circumstances, been unable to prove the complaint a false one, but I have hopes of this being done ere long."

Notwithstanding the decrease the result of the year is very fairly good.

10. As already remarked in Part I. the punishments are much severer this year. This is partly owing to the very rigid system of patrolling, and Captain Humfrey further explains :—

Punishments.

"The men, as most large bodies of men are, were conservative and averse to any change, more especially one which involved so much extra work on themselves. I trust, however, by this time that they have become reconciled to the inevitable and will require less punishment as time goes on.

"It must be borne in mind that year by year more work, both in the shape of education, drill and efficiency in detecting crime, proficiency in musketry is demanded from the Police, while the source from which recruits are drawn and their rates of pay remain the same. Therefore, while so much is demanded, some men must necessarily fail in their duties and consequently have to be punished.

"This year being a year of plenty more leave was granted, as during the famine leave could not be given, and as a consequence men were fined for overstaying their leave, which is entered as a punishment and which serves to swell the return."

I hope that Captain Humfrey may find himself able to reduce this long roll of punishments next year.

Drill.

11. The Superintendent reports on the subject of drill as follows :—

"During the year drill has been carried on regularly and the men at head-quarters and who have gone through instruction are smart and well set up and know their drill well. But a limited number, however, can get into head-quarters even during the rains, and those in the districts for a couple of years at a time, no doubt, get rusty, but that it is only reasonable to expect. The Mounted Police I can report has improved very much both in drill and appearance.

"They have at the commencement of the year received new belts, pouches, &c., which were sadly needed.

"They have gone through a regular course of riding and troop drill and riding school, and in consequence, the horses are now as well broken as the cavalry horses. A great many of the horses being country breeds were unsteady in the ranks. I therefore gelded several and intend to geld as many more as are of a suitable age when opportunity occurs.

"The Mounted Police will compare favourably with any district in the Presidency as regards their smartness, efficiency and particularly their horses.

"Their horses are of a well bred, useful stamp, that enables me to demand and to get from them much hard work in the way of patrolling."

I am of opinion that only geldings should be used for the Mounted Police in all districts.

The District Magistrate remarks regarding the Mounted Police :—

"They are now the best mounted and drilled Police that I have seen."

12. The Superintendent speaks highly of his Inspector Ráo Sáheb Náráyan-ráo Krishna, and with two or three exceptions he states that the other Inspector and Chief Constables have conducted their duties satisfactorily.

Conduct of the force.

13. Captain Humfrey has shown a commendable amount of activity in visiting the scenes of serious crime and his reasons for not personally investigating other serious offences are satisfactory, but in some cases reports appear to have reached him as late as ten days after the crime. I have recently desired the Superintendent to make better arrangements for information reaching him promptly.

Serious crime.

Mr. Maclean appears to have received 8 reports of serious crime and investigated four personally, but in three of these he does not appear to have been as prompt in starting for the scene of the crime as might have been desired.

It is not creditable to Mr. Adams that out of 15 cases reported to him he only visited four and three of these with no great promptitude. It is not a sufficient excuse that the accused were arrested. It may happen that the Police do not arrest the proper persons, and at any rate the presence of the Superintendent or Assistant would ensure a good case being made out against the accused.

14. Captain Humfrey has submitted a carefully prepared and well written report, and I consider that credit is due to him for this year's work.

General results. 17. The Superintendent writes on the general results of the year:—

“There has been a decrease of 396 offences and an appreciable increase in the percentage of cases and persons convicted, while the amount of property stolen has decreased by Rs. 13,391 but the recoveries have only slightly decreased.”

Murder. 18. There were 15 cases of murder as against 13 in the previous year. The Superintendent classes them as follows:—

In three cases the accused were discharged, in three others they were acquitted and in five cases convictions were obtained, but in only two were capital sentences passed. Three cases remain undetected and in one case the accused, after killing a woman with whom he was on terms of intimacy, stabbed himself and jumped into a well out of which he was taken alive but died subsequently. The undetected cases are as follows:—

“At Dewan, taluka Borsad, the body of a parched-grain-dealer was found under circumstances which led to the belief that he had been drowned or poisoned. No clue whatever has been obtained regarding the perpetrators.

“In another a Kunbi was struck at night by a man with a dagger and died on the way to the hospital. No clue has been obtained regarding the offender.

“In the third a Kunbi and his son were watching their field at night when two men came into the field, apparently with the intention of stealing. They struck the Kunbi with sticks which resulted in his death. A reward of Rs. 100 has been offered for information which will lead to the detection and conviction of the offenders.”

The District Magistrate justly remarks:—

“It seems hardly satisfactory that in two out of every three murders there should be no conviction.”

19. There only were two cases under this head against twelve in 1879. In one, conviction was obtained and in the other, the accused absconded.

20. One case occurred in which a mounted constable was charged with extorting confession. The offender was sentenced to two years' rigorous imprisonment.

Kidnapping. 21. Three cases occurred under this head and in all convictions were obtained. In the preceding year there were four cases.

22. Of the four cases of dacoity which occurred during the year two were detected and the accused were convicted. One remained under enquiry at the end of the year and one remains undetected.

23. Robberies have increased from 18 to 30 this year. Thirteen of these were with hurt. In 20 cases convictions were obtained and 8 remain undetected.

24. The Superintendent writes:—

“*Stolen Property*.—The smallness in recoveries is in some measure due to one case, in which property valued at Rs. 809 was recovered by the Police after much time and trouble, having been transferred to the district in which the original offence was committed, which consequently deprived the Police of the benefit of their labour, and to another large theft of Rs. 1,934 committed on the 28th December in which the offenders were detected, but owing to the property having been carried away into the Gaikwar's territory no trace of it could be found.

"In the report for 1879, I represented that complainants considerably exaggerate their losses, thinking that the activity of the Police is proportioned to the value of the property stolen. Several such instances have come to my knowledge, in which the complainants, on finding that they have been detected in making a false statement, immediately declare that it was made under misapprehension and so escape with impunity, but in other cases their statements have to be accepted, and the consequence is that the returns are, to some extent, burdened with losses which never occurred.

"I reiterate the above as other instances have come to light during the past year, in which complainants have not only exaggerated their losses but in one case buried the property, and after making a hole through the wall lodged a complaint of house-breaking and theft in order to make away with property entrusted to the complainants."

There is some truth in the above, but the practice is not peculiar to Kaira and the small proportion of recoveries is not creditable to the Police.

Vagrancy and bad character. 25. Under this head the Superintendent reports:—

"I have endeavoured to apply the provisions of sections 504 and 505 to known bad characters in the district as one means of suppressing crime, but owing to the apathy of the people and reluctance with which they give evidence, probably through fear of future injury, only 11 cases have been brought before the Magistrates, of which nine were required to furnish security for good behaviour and two remained pending at the end of the year.

"In cases where satisfactory grounds have been shown for requiring security, it would materially strengthen the hands of the Police if substantial security were required instead of small sums of 100 rupees which can be obtained without difficulty from the proceeds of past thefts or from associates in crime."

With reference to the above the District Magistrate points out that:—

"It is the duty of a Magistrate proceeding under sections 504 and 505 of the Procedure Code to demand reasonable security, and Mr. Duggan's remarks will have force only if he can point out cases in which bad characters have forfeited their securities."

Drill 26. On the subject of drill the Superintendent states:—

"The Foot Police at head-quarters are drilled morning and evening by the drill masters who were instructed with the 15th Regiment N. F., and during the monsoon, which is the only time the Superintendent can devote any attention to the subject, I had all the available Foot and Mounted Police out regularly. Owing, however, to men having been detached on escort and special duty at a time when the daily sick in hospital ranged to 85, the drill of the Foot Police only extended to Part I. of the Field Exercise.

27. Mr. Duggan speaks well of his Inspector and states that with a few exceptions the conduct of the Chief Constables has been generally good and that the newly appointed are promising young men.

28. Mr. Duggan visited the scenes of 17 out of 37 cases, but some of his reasons for not visiting the remaining 20 cases are not altogether satisfactory. I have already remarked that the arrest of persons supposed to be implicated in the crime is hardly a reason why the case should not be personally worked up; and I do not consider that the preparation of the annual criminal returns is a sufficient reason for omitting to visit the scene of serious crime.

31. The Superintendent again this year attributes the falling off in crimes to the "very good season and consequent cheapness of food."
Decrease in crime.

32. It is very satisfactory to observe that in this wild and comparatively uncivilized district there were only two cases of murder.
Murder. In the previous year only four occurred and in 1878 there were nine cases. In both cases this year, convictions were obtained. The first case was a most deliberate murder. Two boys in charge of cattle were carried away and murdered by thieves in order to suppress the clue to the theft. The second was a case of wife murder owing to intrigue.

33. Under this head there were three cases against two in the preceding year. Convictions were obtained in two and one was struck off as no crime.
Attempt at murder.

34. There were three cases of administering stupefying drugs to cause hurt. One case was struck off, in one, the accused was discharged, and one case remained pending at the end of the year.
Poisoning.

35. Dacoities have decreased from 38 to 12 this year, but it is unsatisfactory to observe that 7 cases remain undetected. The Superintendent offers the following explanation:—
Dacoity.

"These dacoities are all perpetrated by men from over the border—the Godhra, Kálol, Hálol and Jámbughoda—being as a rule committed by Náikrás and others from the Udeypur State, the Police of which State, from being without pay for months and months, are quite demoralized and totally inefficient. The dacoits therefore once across the border are safe."

The District Magistrate remarks that, if it were not for the disgraceful state of affairs in Chota Udepur State, there would have been scarcely any dacoities.

36. Under this head there is a decrease of 24 cases. Convictions were obtained in eight cases, in four cases the accused were discharged, one case was struck off as no crime, and the remaining three cases are undetected. Regarding these cases the Superintendent remarks that they "only differ from dacoities in that the complainants in their descriptions of the crime limited their estimates of the number of offenders to less than five persons."
Robberies.

37. There was an increase of eight cases of abduction, only three cases having occurred in the previous year. In nine cases Bhil girls of 13 or 14 years old were abducted, in one case a woman of 20 years of age and in another a boy of about 13 years. In six cases convictions were obtained. Three cases were pending at the end of the year and in two the accused were discharged. This crime appears to be on the increase, and, in future convictions, the Government Pleader should be instructed to press for exemplary punishment.
Abduction.

38. The low percentage of stolen property recovered, the Superintendent explains,—
Stolen property.

"Is due to two cases in Godhra, each Rs. 2,000. Into both of these I enquired, and I am sure that the amounts stated to have been stolen are grossly exaggerated. In fact one of them, a house-breaking case, I believe to have been a false complaint altogether, whatever was lost having been made away with by some of the family in some family dispute. As the total amount stolen in Godhra was Rs. 5,000, of course these two cases raised the whole percentage of the district."

39. Some attention appears to have been given to the working of the Opium Act, but sufficient discretion was not exercised in the arrest of suspected persons. Out of 25 persons arrested, 10 were discharged without trial.
Opium.

40. Regarding drill the Superintendent reports:—
Drill.

"Drill was steadily carried on all through the rains either under the Superintendent or Assistant.

"There was parade twice a day; the Foot-Police were taken as far as section 48, squad drill, and manual and platoon, while the Gujarát Bhil Corps were practised in battalion manoeuvre. In the various talukas qualified drill masters daily take drill through the year, but I attach, myself, little value to drill as taught by drill masters under the above circumstances without European supervision. The Chief Constables and Head Constables all dislike drill and take as little interest in it as possible.

"The Mounted Police have been through the single Ride Sword Exercise and Part II., movement by fours."

The District Magistrate remarks:—

"Lieutenant-Colonel LaTouche is most indefatigable in attending to the important matter of drill."

Conduct of Officer.

41. Regarding his Assistant Mr. Spence, Lieutenant-Colonel LaTouche reports:—

"He gave me entire satisfaction in the performance of his duties. Prompt, careful and methodical, his clerical work, both English and vernacular, was very creditable to him and seldom, if ever, had to be returned to him for correction or revision. The performance of his more active duties was also very satisfactory. He visited all his posts two and three times over in the year. His marching 80 men at one hour's notice from Dohad to Godhra in 29 hours (43 miles) during the Udepur case, I had the honour to bring to your notice. I attribute a great deal of the men's appearance and discipline and steadiness in drill to Mr. Spence's interest in his work and the knowledge he had acquired of it."

The District Magistrate also writes regarding the same officer that he agrees with Lieutenant-Colonel LaTouche that "a smart and intelligent officer is lost to the Police in Mr. Spence."

42. Out of 14 cases reported to Lieutenant-Colonel LaTouche only two cases—the most serious of all—were personally investigated on the spot. The remaining cases, though technically serious crime, were not of importance and the Superintendent was at a distance from the scene of some of these cases.

Mr. Spence, though he visited only 6 out of 15 cases reported to him, has given reasons for omitting to personally investigate the remaining.

43. The report for the year is creditable to Lieutenant-Colonel LaTouche.

46. It will be seen from para. 63, page 23 of last year's report, that both the late Acting Superintendent and my predecessor had occasion to remark very unfavourably on the Police of this district. It is much to be regretted, therefore, that so many changes in the personnel of the Superintendent had to be made

during the year under report. The District Magistrate writes that he "need scarcely point out that the effect of such frequent changes must be prejudicial to the efficiency of the Police and the proper administration of the department."

47. The Superintendent (Captain Dickson, who submits the report,) attributes the decrease in crime to the "improvement in the crops," and points out that the largest decrease is in minor offences against property and that there is also a considerable falling off in serious offences against person and property.

Murders.

48. Four cases are recorded against five in the previous year under this head. Captain Dickson writes:—

"The number of crimes of this class have decreased the last two years, as in 1878 eleven cases of murder were reported. The Borahs, among whom formerly there were constant cases of murder, seem to be less vindictive than they used to be."

Of the four cases, two were the result of quarrels, one on account of gain, and in one case the mother threw her two children into a well, a man having offered to support her if she made away with the children. All these cases were committed to the Sessions Court and discharged owing to the want of evidence. The Superintendent offers the following explanation:—

"The Police have not been successful in obtaining convictions chiefly owing to the difficulty in obtaining reliable evidence. In many cases the evidence given before the Magistrate would be sufficient to obtain conviction, but if some time elapses before the case is tried by the Sessions Court the evidence entirely changes. This is principally owing to the witnesses being bribed on their arrival in Broach before they appear before the Sessions Judge; and in some instances the friends of accused consult some person, who arranges with the witnesses that they should state that they were persuaded by the Police to give false evidence against the accused. This bribery, of course, is carried on in all districts, but from my former experience it is carried on a much larger scale in this district, and is partly owing to the characters of the people and also because they are better able to afford the money required."

I cannot suppose that all the cases referred to were lost owing to the causes shown. The fact is that the Sessions Courts require a higher standard of proof than can well be offered in India. Many cases, however, are lost by reason of careless working up, or of the inefficient prosecution before the Courts. The District Magistrate should satisfy himself as to the efficiency of the Government Pleader at Broach. It is a scandal that in no single case of murder committed to the Sessions was a conviction obtained.

Culpable homicide. 49. There were three cases of culpable homicide against four in 1879. In all convictions were obtained.

Highway robbery. 50. One case of highway robbery occurred during the year, but the property carried away was worth only annas five!

Dacoity. 51. There were no cases of dacoity.

52. Property valued at Rs. 52,671 was destroyed by fire as compared with Rs. 21,969 destroyed in 1879. The heaviest loss is due to a large factory at Palej having been destroyed. The estimated loss is Rs. 40,000. The cause of this fire is attributed to ill-feeling towards the Pársi owners.

Insufficiency of the Police force. 53. Captain Dickson writes:—

"I can only repeat what has been said by former District Superintendents, that the number of Police is not sufficient for the duties they are expected to perform. On occasions of extra guards and escorts being required, there is not a single man left off duty at the headquarters and this may last for some days and is hard on the men.

"It has been reported by all Superintendents that the number of Police allotted for Broach town is quite insufficient, and, to perform the duties, it is necessary to have almost every man on duty during the night, and, consequently, it is impossible to expect the duties to be performed in a satisfactory manner, or for the men to be clean and smart during the day. The numerous (changes of) Superintendents and Inspectors during the year have not tended to improve the men, and, as Mr. Holland stated in last year's report, it is probable that most of the Superintendents had different views as regards what Police should be."

Conduct of the Police.

54. On this point Captain Dickson observes :—

“ As regards the working of the men I can only give information from the records, as I resumed charge at the commencement of the present year. When there are so few men to perform the duties, the only punishments that can be given are fines or dismissal. The former is likely to make a man work less willingly and the latter is only resorted to in serious cases. Drill as a punishment is preferable if the man can be spared from his duties, which is seldom. One officer and 15 men were dismissed. Fifteen officers and fifty-four men fined, degraded or suspended. One officer and four men were punished judicially.”

Enlistment.

55. Captain Dickson remarks on this subject as follows :—

“ It is very difficult to enlist good men. As a rule, the men from other districts only come because they are bad characters and looking out for any sort of employment, and I agree with Mr. Holland that it is a mistake to enlist from Broach, as there are already too many of the low class of Musalmen in the force, and they always turn out bad and, as a rule, are in connection with the bad character of the town.”

Drill.

56. Regarding the efficiency of the men in drill, Captain Dickson makes the following observations :—

“ There are so few Police at head-quarters, that with the escort of treasure and prisoners it often occurs that men are not relieved from their guard for days together. It is only the recruits, therefore, who are drilled regularly. The officers and men with some exceptions drill fairly well.”

57. The Superintendent writes well of his District Inspector, Mr. Abas Ali Khán, but considers the newly appointed City Inspector unsuited for a place like Broach. Of the Chief Constables he mentions Motilál Dwárkádás, who is a Patidár Kunbi by caste, as an active and clever Police Officer.

58. Mr. Holland visited one of the two cases reported to him. Mr. Jardine who succeeded him visited all the four cases reported while he was in charge. Out of the nine cases reported to Mr. Goldsmid, he visited the scenes of two only, and his reasons for not visiting the rest are not altogether satisfactory.

60. Superintendent of Police ... < { H. KENNEDY, Esquire, from 1st January to 4th April.
F. H. WARDEN, Esquire, from 5th April to 17th June.
H. SCANNEL, Esquire, from 18th June to 31st December.

61. The Superintendent gives the following reasons for the falling off in crimes in the Surat District :—

“ A fair rainfall in 1879 ensured a good harvest in 1880 and the prices of grain were much lower. Again, in 1880 the rainfall was most seasonable and everywhere good harvests were expected. The price of grain fell lower than it has been for perhaps 20 or 25 years, and the poor classes found ample employment in the fields.”

62. There were three cases of murder as compared with four in the previous year. In one case a conviction was obtained, and, in another, accused was acquitted by the Sessions Court owing to one of the witnesses, an eye witness, having retracted his statement before the Committing Magistrate. The Session Judge, however, sanctioned the prosecution of this witness for perjury and was of opinion that the murder was actually committed. The third case remains undetected. The Civil Surgeon gave it as his opinion that the deceased died from natural causes, but the second Class Magistrate, who made personal inquiries into the case, was of opinion that it must have been a violent death, “ because there was blood coming from the

nose and the sheet which was found on the body of the deceased had not been removed." The First Class Magistrate declined to strike off the case, and the Police having failed to obtain any clue to the perpetrators the case remains as undetected.

63. The number of culpable homicides have decreased from ten in 1879 to five during the year under report. Two cases were struck off as no crime, in two cases the accused were acquitted and in the fifth a conviction was obtained. In one of the cases in which a judgment of acquittal was recorded, four lives were lost by the bursting of a boiler in a cotton ginning factory.

Dacoities. 64. There were no cases of dacoity during the year under report.

Minor offences against the person. 65. Under this head the Superintendent reports:—

"In this class there were 534 cases reported, of which 236 were struck off as no crime, leaving 298 against 415 of 1879, or a decrease of 117. The bulk of the cases struck off were hurt cases; on the smallest quarrel or assault in which a push or slap is given, a complaint of hurt is forthcoming. The complainant has not to pay 8 annas for a stamp on his petition or 2 annas for a *kárkun* to write it. He has, however, the chance of getting his adversary under Police enquiry, and perhaps arrested and tried. When a complaint is made the Chief Constable sends the complainant to the nearest medical man, and if no hurt is found on his person and there is no other evidence, the case is sent to the Magistrate to be struck off. This could easily be done by the Magistrate himself, and thus relieve the Police of many enquiries."

66. The Superintendent appears to have entirely overlooked the provisions of section 117, Criminal Procedure Code, and the circulars issued on the subject by the late Acting Commissioner Mr. H. N. B. Erskine. In these petty cases of hurt, if the Police availed themselves of the discretionary power vested in them and referred the complainant to the Magistrates, there would be considerable reduction in the labour of the Police. The Superintendent's attention has been drawn to the orders on the subject, and he has been directed to see that the provisions of the law are intelligently carried out by his subordinates. I have, however, always been of opinion that these petty "hurt" cases should not be retained among "cognizable crimes."

67. The Superintendent states that "very excellent service was done by the Police in breaking up three gangs of 'professional robbers.'" These are described as follows:—

"One gang was arrested through the exertions of Mr. Mansukhrám Mulji, District Police Inspector, Lallubháí Hathising, Chief Constable of Bárdoli, and Sardárhán, Faujdár of Velacha Táluka, Gáekwári territory. Three Bhils were arrested and two receivers of stolen property; seven cases of house-breaking and theft were brought to light, and property, value Rs. 1,169, recovered out of Rs. 2,433 stolen; one Bhil only was discharged, one was sentenced to 12 years' and the other to 3 years' rigorous imprisonment. The receivers of stolen property were also sentenced to three years' and one year's rigorous imprisonment respectively.

"Another gang consisting of 7 Bhils and one Dubla under the leadership of three notorious robbers (1) Morár Bhána, (2) Kuveria Vesta, and (3) Bijla Suria, were arrested during the current year for offences committed in 1879 and 1880, by Mr. Nánábhái Cowasji, District Police Inspector, assisted by Lallubháí Hathising, Chief Constable of Bárdoli. This gang had committed four thefts with house-breaking in this district, for which two have been punished, one with 14 years' and another with 6 months' rigorous imprisonment. The rest are awaiting their trial in the Sessions Court."

There are several other charges against this gang for offences committed in foreign territory.

"A third gang consisting of Dublas was arrested in the Bulsár Táluka by Chief Constable Bhagwándás Thákordás, assisted by Head Constable Morád Abu Mahomed; by this, 11 cases of house-breaking and theft were detected. The prisoners were old offenders and two were sentenced to transportation for life and one to 14 years' rigorous imprisonment."

68. Mr. Scaunell reports that "in the Surat City the extra Police have proved most useful under the control of Khán Baháduv Yusaf Ali Alabaz."

- Fires. 69. One large fire occurred in the city of Sarat, when the damage done was estimated at Rs. 16,612.
70. Mr. Scannell speaks in very high terms of his Inspectors, Khán Bahádur Yusaf Ali, Khán Sáheb Nánábhái Cowasji, and Res Sáheb Mansukhrám Mulji, and specially mentions Chief Constables Lallubháí Hathising, Hamidudin Mahomed, Bhagwándás Thákordás.
71. The District Magistrate, in forwarding the Superintendent's report, has complained that only two cases of serious crime were personally investigated by Mr. Scannell.
- I will not repeat the Magistrate's remarks here, as the subject is already before Government. I agree to a certain extent with the Magistrate, but have no doubt that, as attention has been drawn to the subject, Mr. Scannell will in future give no cause for complaint.
72. Mr. Scannell's report has been prepared with care, and is evidence of the interest he takes in his work.

- Decrease of crime. 75. Regarding the decrease of crime the District Magistrate remarks:—

“There has been a decided decrease in crime when the results of the past are compared with those of the preceding year, but it should be remembered that in 1879 the reported crime of the district was abnormally high, owing to the large bodies of dacoits wandering about, and to the general unsettled state of the district affording encouragement to the criminal classes to commit offences which, under ordinary circumstances, they would not have thought of perpetrating.

“The price of grain fell so low towards the end of the year, and still continues so low, that I anticipate a still more marked decrease, especially in petty thefts, during the current year.”

76. There were 18 cases of murder during the year under report against 21 in the previous year. Of these seven were struck off as no crime. In four cases convictions were obtained, in three, accused were discharged by the Sessions Court. One case, in which a husband beat his wife so that she died, was subsequently decided as culpable homicide, and punished with three years' rigorous imprisonment. In one case, the Sessions Court sentenced the accused to suffer the extreme penalty of the law, but the High Court subsequently reversed the sentence; in another case, the accused committed suicide, and the last case remains undetected, but it was a difficult case to trace, the body of the deceased (who was apparently strangled) having been found in a field, and no clue to the offenders could be obtained. It appears strange that as many as seven cases in which action was taken by the Police as supposed murders were subsequently ascertained to be “no crimes.”

77. There were eight cases of culpable homicide against six in the preceding year; in one case the accused was discharged by the Sessions Court, one was pending before that Court at the end of the year, and another case was struck off as no crime. Convictions were obtained in the remaining cases, as also in the case above referred to as having been reported as murder, and subsequently decided as culpable homicide.

78. One case of attempt at murder occurred in which the hamál of the Roman Catholic Chapel at Thána was found lying very severely wounded. The culprit, a Koli, was traced and apprehended by the Thána Police in Bombay and was sentenced to three years' rigorous imprisonment.

Attempt at murder.

Dacoity.

79. Major Payne writes:—

"Although 17 offences were committed which came under this head, they were all insignificant and but for five men and over being engaged would have come under theft."

Stolen property.

80. Major Payne remarks:—

"There has been a very considerable decrease, nearly Rs. 1,20,000, in the value of property stolen, but I regret exceedingly that there has also been a decrease of over 7 per cent. in recoveries."

On this subject the District Magistrate observes:—

"Much less property was stolen during the year, but the large amount stolen in 1879 and the high percentage of recoveries was attributable to the large Palaspeh dacoity, in which nearly a lakh of rupees of jewellery was stolen and almost wholly recovered by Major Daniell of the Poona Police, when he routed the gang of dacoits above the Kessur Ghát on their return with the booty."

Inefficiency of the Police.

81. Major Payne observes as follows regarding the Police of the Thána District:—

"The force is decidedly wanting in detective ability, and I am unable to mention any officer who has shown any aptitude as a detective, since I joined this district.

"The great fault of the majority of the members of the Thána Police is their apathy, but I must do them the justice to say that towards the end of the year there was an improvement, and I hope in time to instil some energy into them.

"The force appears to have been carelessly recruited, but I imagine this is owing in a great measure to the difficulty in obtaining good men. Service in the lower grades of the force is not popular, and I find that the majority of those who present themselves for enrolment in this district are undersized, weakly men, who have failed in obtaining service in other departments of Government. Few really able-bodied young men are obtainable and I find some difficulty in keeping the force up to the established strength.

"Whatever the shortcomings of the Thána Police may be, I think it but right to bring to notice that it is impossible to make a fair comparison between the working of the Police in the Konkan and those of other districts, as the latter receive immense assistance from the Village Police; whereas in the Konkan there are no Village Police, and the work falls solely on the District Police who have to rely entirely on their own shrewdness to detect and apprehend offenders, who in other districts are, in the majority of cases, known to the Village Police."

The District Magistrate adds:—

"Major Payne points out with much truth (general remarks) the unfairness of instituting comparisons between the Konkan and other Police forces owing to the large help afforded the latter by the Village Police which do not exist in the Konkan. Another cause is no doubt attributable to the excessively unhealthy climate of these parts which lays up such a large number of men for the greater portion of the year, and a third cause which decidedly influenced the efficiency of the force during the past year was the frequent changes in the Superintendents, Mr. Yates, Major Brown, and Major Payne having been successively in charge of the office."

Drill.

82. On this subject the Superintendent reports:—

"Regular instruction in drill was commenced in this district on the 1st August 1880, and up to date very considerable progress has been made by those at head-quarters, and I purpose during the coming monsoon, to withdraw every available man from the districts to undergo instruction at head-quarters. With the exception of Subhedár Khushálsing, Chief Constable in charge of head-quarters, not a single Chief Constable knows any drill."

Education.

83. The Superintendent states as regards education as follows:—

"The force is very deficient of men who have received any education. Of the whole force only 51 officers and 60 men, making in all 111 out of a total of 841, or an average of only 13 per cent., who can read and write. There was a school at head-quarters, but I found it attended only by a few children. The school-master was a second class Head Constable and a Pársi and a very indifferent Maráthi scholar. The school was examined in November last by the Deputy Educational Inspector, who reported the school-master as inefficient. I accordingly removed and sent him to duty. I do not propose appointing another school-master until I return to head-quarters for the monsoon, when I intend resuscitating the school and hope to make it an efficient one for the instruction and training of Police Officers and men."

On the same subject the District Magistrate remarks:—

“Education is, I regret to say, in a very backward state, but Major Payne, who has already got rid of the inefficient Pársi school-master, promises to take the matter in hand during the monsoon, when I trust matters will be improved.”

84. The Superintendent states that the conduct of the force generally has been good, but both the Superintendent and District Magistrate are not well pleased with the two District Inspectors. Of the Chief Constables, the Superintendent specially mentions Chief Constables Balwant Ráwji as the most energetic and efficient, Bábáji Govind and Bálsáwant Amrut Sáwant.

The District-Magistrate makes the following remarks regarding Major Payne's services:—

“I have much pleasure in bringing to your notice the great attention which the present Superintendent, Major Payne, has given to the general improvement of the force during the five months he has been in charge. He has visited the scene of all the most serious offences. He has taken the greatest trouble in recruiting and drilling the men, &c.”

85. The return shows a large number of cases not visited by the Superintendent. This is not altogether satisfactory, but Major Payne is responsible for only a portion of these cases.

86. The Superintendent's report is a well written and interesting one, and shows that he has given much attention to his duties.

89. Regarding the increase of crime the Superintendent or the District Magistrate do not offer any explanation. The Superintendent merely remarks that, owing to the alterations made in the manner of exhibiting the criminal statistics, no comparison with the figures of the preceding year can be made. But in concluding his report the Superintendent brings to notice the large number of thefts and cases of house-breaking in the town of Pen, which, he thinks, are no doubt carried on by people there.

90. Only one case of murder occurred during the year, and one of great barbarity and brutality, an old man while asleep having been murdered by being beaten over the eye with a blunt instrument used for breaking up betelnuts. He was a very inoffensive feeble old man, and made no struggle to save his life. His adopted son who had absconded was suspected, traced to Indore, committed to the Sessions Court and sentenced to be hanged, but was let off by the High Court.

91. There were two cases of attempt at murder, in both of which ground glass was mixed with food, in the first case by the wife to kill her husband and in the second case by one wife to kill the second wife. In the former a conviction was obtained, in the latter the woman was discharged.

92. Three cases of culpable homicide are recorded. In one of these cases the Police entirely failed to bring the offender to justice. In the second case, a conviction was obtained. Culpable homicide. The third case is thus described by the Superintendent:—

“It occurred in the Mángaon Táluka. It appears that certain information was received by the Chief Constable that a party of Rámoshis were concealed in a temple near the road leading to Dúsgaon. They had been trying to dispose of stolen property and were said to be armed. It was supposed that some of them were Rámoshis who had lately escaped from the Sátára Police. The Chief Constable proceeded to the spot with a party of Police to arrest them. The Police loaded their carbines with blank ammunition with the exception of one constable, who having just come off escort duty had his carbine charged with ball cartridge. The Police were pelted with stones, one striking the constable whose carbine was loaded over the forehead. The constable stated that one of the men then came at him with a sword to cut him down when he discharged his carbine in self-defence, killing him. A sword and gun were found on the spot, which the men captured stated to the Magistrate belonged to the party. Some of the party escaped. The case, however, was not clear and the constable Bhávo Powár was therefore sent up for trial before the District Magistrate who discharged him.”

93. There has been a considerable decrease in the number of dacoities, only seven having occurred against seventeen in 1879, but all these were more or less of an organized nature and were committed by gangs from 6 to 20 men. In one case the Superintendent says the “most dangerous man in the district” was concerned. He was apprehended and sentenced to ten years’ transportation. Convictions were obtained in four cases, one was pending at the end of the year, in another, the accused were acquitted by the Sessions Court and one remains undetected. Regarding this case the Superintendent says:—

“The inmates of the house were all women, and I have doubts as to the dacoity having been committed at all. I am inclined to think that this matter was something connected with one of the women in the house. No violence was used. There is a large night traffic on the road, and in spite of all inquiries and effort on the part of the Police no trace of the crime has ever been discovered.”

94. Only one case is recorded under this head. It occurred on the Roha and Nágotna road. A Bhátia of Bombay was overtaken by two men and robbed of Rs. 66 in cash and notes. The accused were subsequently arrested and convicted. Highway robbery.

95. On this subject the Superintendent makes the following remarks:— Drill.

“I would beg to point out the difficulties there are to contend with in putting men through drill instruction in this district. It may be put down that from November until June a very small modicum of drill is gone through; in fact, regular drill is simply impracticable during that time so long as the force is so weak and the duties so heavy. During the cold season there are not enough men to carry on the regular duty, much less to go through a regular course of drill. The men are thus kept on double duty continually, treble duty often. It is often the case that out of the guards at head-quarters perhaps some 8 or 9 men only are relieved. This must operate badly on the efficiency and smartness of the force. But under the present arrangement I can see no help for it. It must also be recollected that during the monsoon for four months, the only time that there are men available for instruction, the weather is such that drill can only be carried on in a small shed.”

96. The Superintendent and the District Magistrate speak highly of the District Police Inspector, and the former specially mentions Chief Constables Shitárám Trimbak, David Haiem and Shitárám Nilkant. Mr. FitzGerald adds that the conduct of the Police has been on the whole good. Conduct of the force.

97. Out of 11 cases Mr. FitzGerald visited two cases only and his reasons for omitting to visit all the remaining are not entirely satisfactory. For instance, case No. 4 was certainly a case in which the Superintendent should have gone to the spot. Serious crime.

98. The District Magistrate’s review of the Police Report is confined to an endorsement of the Superintendent’s commendation of the Inspector and to a remark that the behaviour of the people of Pen is not at present such as to require a punitive post there.

I should be glad to see District Magistrates taking a little more interest in this Police Report and somewhat more pains to review it. They are better able to judge of the success that has attended the year's operations than the Commissioner can be, and these reports should not pass through their hands without some expression of their opinion. The forwarding remarks of all the Magistrates, except Messrs. Richey, Campbell, and Mulock, are this year of a merely formal and cursory nature.

COGNIZABLE AND NON-COGNIZABLE CRIME.

4. The total number of offences of all descriptions, including cases subsequently struck off as no crime, reported to have been committed in the several districts of the Division during the year is 29,863, which is an increase of 1,138 cases as compared with the previous year, in the figures of which, however, struck-off cases were not included. Thus compared, the Sâtara, Nâsik, Poona and Khândesh districts show an increase of crime to the extent of 1,307, 706, 570 and 496 cases respectively, while the Sholâpur and Ahmednagar districts show a decrease amounting to 1,149 and 772 cases respectively.

5. The subjoined table shows the extent of cognizable and non-cognizable crime in each district and the results of the year's operations in contrast with the same for the previous year:—

6. As already explained, the comparatively large increase in the number of cognizable offences for the year is due to the inclusion this year in the returns for the first time of cases struck off as no crime, and which will be referred to hereafter in dealing with cognizable offences. If these cases, which for the Division amount to 5,632, are deducted for the sake of comparison, the number of true cases for the year under report is found to be 25,436, which compares favourably with the statistics of crime of the last three years 1877, 1878 and 1879, though somewhat in excess of that of the preceding six years 1871 to 1876, as will be seen from the following figures :—

7. The total number of persons arrested in connection with the cases reported for the year under review was 36,481, of whom 18,059 or 49 per cent. were convicted, against a percentage of 58 convicted in the previous year. This falling off in the percentage of convictions extends to every district of the Division, Sholapur being foremost where the fall is 30 per cent. The fall in Ahmednagar and Khândesh is 12 per cent. ; in Násik it is 9 per cent. ; and in Poona and Sâtára 3 per cent.

8. The subjoined table shows the proportion of cognizable and non-cognizable crime to area and population of the entire Division in contrast with the same for the year preceding :—

9. From the above it will be seen that the proportion of cognizable and non-cognizable crime for the year is as 1 to 1·32-square miles, against 1 to 1·37 in 1879 ; and as 1 to 174·88 of the population against 1 to 181·80 in the preceding year. Thus the comparison is unfavourable to the year under report.

COGNIZABLE CRIME.

10. The total number of cognizable offences, including cases afterwards struck off as no crime, reported to have been committed during the year, was 23,724. The number in 1879, exclusive of struck-off cases, was 21,886. The result thus compared is an increase of 1,838 cases for the Division in the year under report. The following table shows the number of cases for each district separately, and for the entire Division, in contrast with the same for the preceding year :—

The above comparison shows an increase in the number of cognizable offences of the year in the districts of Sátára, Poona, Násik and Khândesh, amounting to 1,483, 922, 917 and 261 cases respectively, and a decrease in the districts of Sholápur and Ahmednagar, amounting to 1,100 and 645 cases respectively.

13. Thus compared there is for the whole Division an increase under classes II., IV. and VI. to the extent of 120, 2,806 and 166 cases respectively; and a decrease under classes I., III. and V. of 76, 379 and 799 cases respectively.

14. Under Class I., "Offences against the State, &c.," there is a decrease in all the districts of the Division, the largest decrease of 29 cases occurring in Sholápur, and the least of 5 cases in Ahmednagar.

15. Under Class II., "Serious offences against the person" an increase occurs in all the districts of the Division except Sholápur, where there are 40 cases less than in the previous year. The aggregate increase in the other districts amounts to 120 cases.

16. Under Class III., "Serious offences against person and property, &c.," Násik and Khândesh show an increase of 100 and 16 cases respectively; while the remaining districts of Sholápur, Poona, Ahmednagar and Sátára, show a decrease of 246, 162, 44 and 43 cases respectively. The aggregate decrease for the Division amounts to 379 cases.

17. Under Class IV., "Minor offences against the person," an increase occurs in every district giving an aggregate for the Division of 2,806 cases. The largest increase of 1,339 cases appears against Sátára and the smallest of 47 cases

against Ahmednagar. The increase in this class of offences is almost entirely

due, as is apparent from the figures shown in the margin, to an increase in the number of cases of simple hurt. The Police returns are, as remarked by the District Magistrate, Násik, Mr. Ramsay, much swollen by the inclusion of cases of simple hurt among cognizable offences. As a rule, the Police have very little to do with these cases, but their number sadly interferes with the value of the returns. The new Criminal Procedure Code will remove this evil.

18. Under Class V., "Minor offences against property," there is a decrease of 799 cases for the Division made up by decreases in the districts of Sholápur, Khándesh and Sátára to the extent of 1,082, 166 and 79 cases respectively, counterbalanced in part by increases of 249, 231 and 48 cases in the districts of Násik, Ahmednagar and Poona respectively.

19. And under Class VI., "Other offences," there is an increase in all the districts except Ahmednagar, where a decrease appears of 886 cases. The increase for the Division amounts to 166 cases. Offences under the Forest Act and Excise Laws have undoubtedly helped to a great extent to increase the number of cases in this class.

20. In the above comparisons cases struck off as "no crime" have necessarily been included in the number of cognizable offences shown to have been committed during the year of report; if all such cases are omitted the contrast with the year 1879 will stand as follows:—

21. The above comparison shows that except in Násik cognizable offences have generally fallen in number, the largest decreases appearing in the Ahmednagar, Sholápur and Sátára districts, which speaks well for them.

22. The following table shows the number of cases of cognizable crime, and among them the number of cases struck off the registers as "no crime" by order of the Magistrates, in contrast with the same for the preceding year. It also furnishes details of the number of persons arrested and of the number arrested and discharged in struck-off cases both in this and in the preceding year:—

24. It will be seen that there is in the total number of cognizable cases brought on the crime registers of the year a decrease for the Division of 3,542 cases as compared with the preceding year, the number being 24,477 for the year under notice against 28,019 in 1879; and that the number of cases struck off the registers as "no crime" has likewise decreased from 5,783 in 1879 to 5,632 in 1880. This decrease in the total occurs in the four districts of Násik, Khândesh, Ahmednagar and Sholápur, and amounts to 405, 320, 76 and 43 cases respectively. In the districts of Sátára and Poona there is an increase of 520 and 173 cases respectively.

25. The total number of persons released during the year, as concerned in cases struck off the registers as "no crime," has already slightly decreased, the number being 972 in 1880 against 1,022 in 1879. In the districts of Poona, Sholápur and Násik the number is less by 93, 65 and 55 respectively, but in Ahmednagar and Sátára it is more by 153 and 10 respectively. In Khândesh the number is the same (272) for both the years 1879 and 1880.

26. The total number of cognizable cases, including cases reported in previous years and brought under enquiry during the year as well as cases struck off as "no crime," amounted for the year to 24,477; and of these 23,305 were investigated by the Police during the year, and 99 were pending investigation at the close of the year. The total number of cases decided during the year was 13,166, and in 9,119 of these convictions were obtained. There is a slight fall in the percentage of convictions to cases decided from 71 in 1879 to 69 in 1880. The following table shows the results for each district in the year of report, in comparison with the same for the year 1879 :—

27. The figures in the above table show a very favourable improvement in the percentage of cases in which convictions were obtained to cases decided, except in the Násik District, where it has risen from 62 per cent. in 1879 to 88 per cent. in 1880. There is also a slight improvement in Sátára of one per cent.; but in the remaining four districts of the Division there is a falling off in the percentage amounting in Ahmednagar and Khándesh to 9 per cent. each, and in Sholápur and Poona to 5 and 3 per cent. respectively.

28. The total number of persons arrested in cognizable cases investigated during the year was 27,976; and of this number 19,466 or 70 per cent. were brought to trial, and 13,300 or 68 per cent. were convicted against 66 per cent. in the preceding year. This slight improvement in the percentage for the Division is due to the high percentages obtained in Násik and Khándesh, where they have risen from 52 and 70 per cent. in 1879 to 85 and 87 per cent. respectively in the year under report. In the remaining districts of Ahmednagar, Sholápur, Poona and Sátára the percentage has fallen, the greatest fall, 12 per cent., occurring in Ahmednagar and the least, one per cent., in Sátára. The percentage of convictions to arrests for the Division has, however, fallen from 57 in 1879 to 48 in 1880, the fall occurring in every district of the Division but chiefly in the Ahmednagar and Khándesh Districts, as will be seen from the subjoined table:—

30. From the above figures it will be seen that except in cases of kidnapping, which show an increase of three cases, there is a decrease in all the other offences specified as compared with the preceding. In the figures relating to the year under report and shown in the above table, cases struck off as "no crime" are included. Deducting all such cases, the comparison with the figures of the previous year shows a further decrease in all these offences, as will be seen from the following :—

31. Thus there were for the Division 48 true cases of murder in the year under report against 89 in the previous year, or a decrease of 41 cases. The largest decrease appears in the Sholapur District, in which only 4 cases are returned against 25 in 1879. Poona, Ahmednagar and Násik show a decrease of 6 cases each, the number being 11, 10 and 2 against 17, 16 and 8 respectively in the preceding year. In Sátára there is a decrease of 2 cases, the number being 9 in 1880 against 11 in 1879. Khándesh shows the same number of murders (12) for both the years 1879 and 1880. Of the 48 cases of murder, 4 were committed by robbers, 9 by poisoning, and the remaining 35 are due to other causes. The percentage of cases of murder in which convictions were obtained to cases decided has considerably improved, it having risen from 49 in 1879 to 61 in 1880. This is due to the favourable results obtained in all the districts of the Division except Poona, where it has fallen from 55 in 1879 to 41 per cent. in 1880. The percentage of convictions to arrests for the whole Division shows a slight improvement of one per cent., but looking at each district separately Násik, Khándesh, Poona and Sátára show a falling off in the percentage from 55, 59, 20 and 76 in 1879 to 25, 45, 18 and 75 respectively in 1880, while in Ahmednagar it is stationary, being 33 per cent. for both years. Sholapur alone shows an improvement, the percentage having risen in that district from 15 in 1879 to 46 in 1880.

32. There were 21 true cases of culpable homicide in the year under report against 38 in the previous year. There is a decrease of 5 cases in each of the districts of Khándesh and Sholapur; in Ahmednagar there is a decrease of 4 cases; and in Poona and Sátára a decrease of 3 each, Násik alone showing an increase of 3 cases. The percentage of convictions to cases decided has fallen from 69 in 1879 to 60 in 1880. Taking individual districts, the result is that the percentage has fallen in Khándesh, Poona and Sátára from 86, 80 and 75 in 1879 to 50, 67 and 67 respectively in 1880; in Ahmednagar conviction was not obtained in any of the cases; in Násik the percentage is the same (100) as in the previous year; and in Sholapur only the percentage has risen

from 62 in 1879 to 100 in 1880. In connection with these cases 41 persons were arrested, of whom 13 or 31 per cent. were convicted, 25 were acquitted and released, and 3 were awaiting trial at the close of the year.

33. In cases of dacoity there is a decrease of 127 cases as compared with the preceding year, the number of true cases being 34 in 1880, against 161 in 1879. A decrease occurs in every district of the Division, the largest being in Poona, for which 14 cases are returned against 70 in 1879; Sholapur shows only 2 cases against 40 in 1879; Sátára, 3 cases against 17; Khándesh, only 1, against 11; Ahmednagar, 8 against 14; and Násik, 6 against 9 in 1879. The percentage of cases in which convictions were obtained to cases decided for the Division has risen from 77 in 1879 to 86 in 1880. This improvement in the percentage occurs in the four districts of Khándesh, Poona, Ahmednagar and Sholapur, but in the Násik and Sholapur districts there is a falling off of 25 and 10 per cent. respectively. Three hundred and sixty-eight persons were arrested in connection with these dacoities, and there were 48 persons who were awaiting trial at the close of the previous year. Of these 183 or 50 per cent. were convicted, 166 were acquitted and released, and 9 were awaiting trial at the close of the year.

34. There were 106 true cases of robbery for the Division in 1880 against 216 in 1879, or a decrease of 110 cases. There is a decrease in all the districts except Násik, where there is an increase of one case as compared with the previous year. The decrease in Poona amounts to 35 cases, in Ahmednagar to 20 cases, and in Sholapur, Khándesh and Sátára to 19, 18 and 16 cases respectively. In the percentage of convictions to cases decided there is an improvement, it having risen from 50 in 1879 to 61 in 1880. This rise in the percentage occurs more or less in all the districts except Sholapur, where it has fallen from 82 per cent. in 1879 to 50 per cent. in 1880. The total number of persons arrested in these cases of robbery, including 7 who were pending trial at the end of the previous year, was 185, and of these 74 were convicted, 101 were acquitted and released, and 10 were pending trial at the close of the year. The percentage of convictions to arrests has slightly fallen from 41 in 1879 to 40 in 1880. As regards individual districts there is an improvement in the percentage in the four districts of Khándesh, Sátára, Poona and Násik, of 15, 9, 3 and 2 per cent. respectively, but a falling off in the districts of Sholapur and Ahmednagar of 34 and 25 per cent. respectively.

35. There is a considerable decrease in the number of "Thefts" as compared with the preceding year, the number of true cases being 5,027 in 1880 against 8,623 in 1879. The decrease in the year under notice extends to all the districts of the Division, the largest (1,110) occurring in Sholapur and the smallest (250) in Násik. The percentage of cases convicted to cases decided, as also the percentage of convictions to arrests, has fallen for the Division, in the case of the former from 79 in 1879 to 74 per cent. in 1880, and in that of the latter from 70 to 58 per cent. Taking each district separately there is a falling off in the percentage of cases convicted to cases decided in all the districts of the Division except Násik, in which it has improved from 82 in 1879 to 97 per cent. in 1880. The percentage of convictions to arrests has, however, fallen in every district of the Division.

36. The crime of "Receiving stolen property" also shows a decrease of 136 cases for the whole Division, the number of true cases being 386 in 1880 against 538 in 1879. The decrease occurs in all the districts of the Division except Sátára, the largest decrease of 59 cases being in Ahmednagar and the least decrease of 24 cases being in Khándesh, Sátára alone showing an increase of 10 cases. The percentage of cases convicted to cases decided, as well as the percentage of convictions to arrests, shows a slight improvement of 1 per cent. as compared with the preceding year, the former having risen from 79 in 1879 to 80 per cent. in 1880, and the latter from 67 to 68 per cent.

37. Under the head "Kidnapping or abduction" there were 30 cases reported to have occurred during the year; of these, 15 were struck off as no crime, leaving only 15 to compare with the previous year, in which there were 27 cases. There is a decrease in all the districts of the Division except Sátára,

in which 5 cases were reported, but 4 of these were struck off, leaving 1 against none in the previous year; in Sholapur only one case, which has been struck off as no crime, was reported against 6 in 1879; Poona shows a decrease of 3 cases as compared with the previous year; Khándesh shows a decrease of 2 cases and Ahmednagar and Násik a decrease of one case each. Of the 15 true cases that occurred in the Division, 8 pertain to the Poona District, and in 5 of these the accused were charged with kidnapping females for immoral purposes. In the remaining 10 cases children were decoyed chiefly for the purpose of stealing their ornaments. The percentage of cases convicted to cases decided, as well as the percentage of convictions to arrests, shows a considerable fall as compared with the previous year. The former has fallen from 65 per cent. in 1879 to 38 in 1880, and the latter from 52 to 30 per cent.

NON-COGNIZABLE CRIME.

38. The following table, which is an abstract of Statement A., Part II., shows the number of non-cognizable offences committed during the year and the results of the year's operations for each district in contrast with the same for the preceding year:—

39. It will be seen that the total of non-cognizable offences for the year shows a decrease of 700 cases as compared with the preceding year, the number being 6,144 in 1880 against 6,844 in 1879. The decrease occurs in all the districts of the Division except Khándesh, where an increase of 215 cases is to be noticed.

40. In these 6,144 non-cognizable offences 8,505 persons were arrested or summoned, of whom 4,758 or 56 per cent. were convicted and 3,722 or 44 per cent. were acquitted or released. These percentages are not as favourable as those of the preceding year, in which they amounted to 62 and 38 per cent. respectively. This falling off in the percentage has occurred in every district of the Division except Poona, where the percentage is the same (69) for both the years 1879 and 1880.

41. The following statement furnishes details for each district and shows separately the results obtained in cases in which the Police were employed from those in which the Police were not employed for both the present and the preceding year:—

42. It will be observed that only 293 of the total number of non-cognizable cases for the Division, or an average of 5 per cent., were referred to the Police for investigation, and that the remaining 5,851, or 95 per cent., were taken up by the Magistrates without the intervention of the Police. In the 293 cases in which the Police were employed, 438 persons were arrested or summoned, of whom 220, or 50 per cent., were convicted and 215, or 49 per cent., were acquitted or released. Here also there is a slight fall in the percentages, as compared with those of the preceding year, in which they were 51 and 48 respectively. In the 5,851 cases taken up by the Magistrates, 8,067 persons were arrested or summoned, of whom 4,538, or 56 per cent., were convicted and 3,507, or 43 per cent., were acquitted and released. These percentages also show a large falling off as compared with the previous year, in which they amounted to 63 and 37 per cent. respectively.

43. The value of property stolen during the year under report amounted to Rs. 3,18,281 for the whole Division, or Rs. 2,39,136 less than in the preceding year. The amount recovered was Rs. 1,23,762, or Rs. 63,450 less than in the year 1879. The following statement shows the value of property stolen and recovered, with the percentage of recoveries for each district, in contrast with the same for the preceding year and for the year 1878:—

44. The above table shows that in Sátára and Poona there is considerable improvement in the percentage of recoveries, which has risen 31 and 20 per cent. respectively as compared with the previous year. Although Poona shows a better percentage as compared with 1879, still it is less than that attained in 1878. Sholápur and Ahmednagar also show an improvement of 4 and 1 per cent. respectively as compared with 1879, but Khândesh and Násik show a decrease of 14 and 12 per cent. respectively. Taking the Division as a whole, there is an improvement of 7 per cent., the total of recoveries being 40 per cent. in 1880 against 33 in 1879. This, though favourable as compared with the previous year, is still below what has been attained in the 8 years preceding 1879, as will be seen from the following figures:—

45. In explanation of the considerable fall in the percentage recovery of stolen property in the Khándesh District, the District Superintendent of Police states that the amount of loss has been very small in all cases of a serious nature, and that it is in house robberies that the chief losses occur; and although the number of offences has been less, the amount of property has been more in proportion, as the number of cases in which property was stolen was 1,411 and recovered in 881 against 1,832 and 1,238 in the previous year. This goes to show that the value of the property stolen was considerably more in 1879, but that the residue left unrecovered is nearly the same in both years.

46. As regards the falling off in the percentage of recoveries in Násik District the District Magistrate Mr. Ramsay observes:—

“The percentage of stolen property recovered is not good, but I do not blame the Police for this. It is notorious that torture is commonly resorted to to induce confessions and delivery of stolen property; and I think it would be bad policy to take severe notice of want of success in this respect. There is much luck in the matter, and when total value only is recovered one single case where the property involved is of large value (and these often are the hardest cases to detect being the work of trained thieves) will spoil the average for the whole year. Averages are always a fallacious test, and in this respect especially so in my humble opinion.”

Statement C.

47. This statement refers to professional crimes that come under the cognizance of the Thugee Department. None such occurred in the Division during the year, and the District Superintendent of Police, Khándesh, has erred in showing therein the only case of dacoity committed in that district during the year. This dacoity was committed by a gang of 25 Bhils of surrounding villages, all of whom were arrested. The Magistrate at the preliminary trial released 3 and committed the remaining 22 to the Court of Sessions, where 14 of them were convicted and sentenced, 6 to transportation for life, and 8 to 7 years' rigorous imprisonment each, the remaining 8 being discharged for want of evidence.

Statement D.

48. During the year under report 73 fairs were held in this Division, viz.,

were any special Police employed for the protection of person and property, small detachments of Police from the regular forcē of the district being generally found sufficient to maintain order during the fairs. At A'landi 35 men were employed for eight days at a cost of Rs. 92 to the Municipality of that town.

49. Under the provisions of section 16 of the Bombay District Police Act VII. of 1867, one Punitive Police Post was established in two villages of the Násik District, one in the Poona District and four in the Sátára District, during the year under report. The punitive posts in the Sátára District were quartered at the expense of 39 villages in the Wái, Khatáv, Mán, Karád and Khánápur tálukas, at which dacoits obtained food and shelter. The punitive post established in the Násik District was due to the conduct of the people of the villages of Shenward and Padli in the Igatpuri Táluka in connection with grain robberies from Railway trains, while the punitive post in Poona was rendered necessary by the conduct of the people of the village of Jogowdi in the Bhimthadi Táluka in giving shelter and assistance to the gang of dacoits under Tátia Makáji. On the other hand the two punitive posts in the Násik District and two in the Sátára District, established in the preceding year, were withdrawn during the year on the expiration of the periods for which they were quartered; the punitive post established at Kalambi in 1878 and continued at an increased strength and cost to the inhabitants of that village in 1879, was also discontinued during the year, while the punitive posts quartered for two years at certain villages in the Purandhar and Haveli tálukas in the Poona District and Bhor State were continued during the year.

Statement E.

50. The total sanctioned strength of the Police force, including the Superintendents and Assistant Superintendents of Police employed in the several districts of the Central Division, which contain an area of 39,351 square miles and a population of 5,223,238 souls, was 5,742. The total cost of this force including contingencies amounted for the year to Rs. 9,01,073, of which Rs. 8,92,663 were defrayed from the Provincial Revenues and Rs. 9,120 from Municipal and other sources. The general distribution of the Police on the last day of the year was as follows:—

The District Magistrate, Násik, states that the area of that district as lately computed by the Survey Department is considerably below that hitherto recorded, and that the revised figures will alter the proportion in the tables for next year:—

52. The above table shows that the average proportion of the whole Police force to the area and population of the Division is 1 Policeman to 6·85 square miles and 1 Policeman to 909·65 souls. If, however, the portion of the constabulary employed on other than general Police duties be deducted, the proportion becomes 1 Policeman to 9·88 square miles and 1 Policeman to 1,337·16 of the population.

Statement F.

53. Of the entire force of the Division, 2,738 are armed with fire-arms, 1,603 are armed with swords only or swords and batons, and the remaining 1,393 are provided with batons only.

54. During the year under review 11 officers and 85 men were dismissed the Police force against 10 officers and 89 men in the preceding year. Five officers and 42 men were punished judicially against 10 officers and 35 men in the previous year, and 150 officers and 739 men were punished departmentally by fine, suspension or degradation against 107 officers and 525 men in the year 1879. Of the officers and men punished judicially, 10 men were punished by Magistrates under the District Police Act; 3 men under sections 330, 331 and 348 of the Indian Penal Code; 2 officers and 2 men under Chapter IX. of the same Code; and 3 officers and 27 men for other offences. The departmental punishments are rather heavy in all the districts of the Division except Ahmednagar. In Poona they are stated chiefly to represent small fines inflicted on the men for non-attendance at drill, and in the other districts they consist principally of forfeitures of pay for overstaying leave or delaying to join at outpost stations. On the other hand, by way of reward 68 officers and men were promoted and 241 received money rewards. The number rewarded in the previous year was 540, 401 of whom received promotion and 139 money rewards. A large number of

officers and men of the Sátára District Police were recipients of the money rewards sanctioned by Government for the arrest of dacoits, members of organized gangs, who were arrested and brought to justice, but for whom no rewards had been proclaimed.

55. In the year under report 543 officers and 995 men are returned as able to read and write against 480 officers and 776 men in the previous year. The following table shows the progress of education in each district in the present and the preceding year :—

56. It will be observed that there is an improvement in the percentage for the Division and also in every district except Sholapur, where the percentage has fallen from 13.81 in 1879 to 11.50 in 1880.

Statement G.

57. At the close of the year under report there were in the entire Police force of the Division 10 Europeans, 13 Eurasians and the rest natives of the country. Of the Europeans 6 are Superintendents of Police, 4 being Military and 2 uncovenanted officers; and of the remaining 4 Europeans, 2 are uncovenanted Assistant Superintendents of Police and 2 Inspectors of Police. Of the Eurasians 2 are Inspectors and the rest subordinate officers. Of the natives, 960 are officers and 4,703 are constables. The following is an abstract of the different religions and castes of the various officers and men employed in the several districts of the Division, and it shows the percentage proportion they bear to the total strength as it stood on the last day of the year, in contrast with the same for the preceding year :—

It will be observed that Maráthas and Mahomedans predominate. The larger employment of Rámoshís in the Police force is a satisfactory feature.

58. The total expenditure incurred on Police buildings during the year under report was Rs. 16,537-4-6 against Rs. 13,285-15-10 in the previous year. Of the sum of Rs. 16,537-4-6, Rs. 11,972-7-11 were expended from the Public Works Department Budget grant, viz., Rs. 6,664-11-1 on repairs and Rs. 5,307-12-10 on new constructions; while the expenditure from the Police Budget grant amounted to Rs. 4,564-12-7, of which Rs. 3,303-13-4 were expended on repairs and Rs. 1,260-15-3 on new buildings. Thus the total expenditure incurred by both the departments amounted on an average to Rs. 2-14-6 per man against Rs. 2-5-2 per man, or annas 9 and pies 4 per man more than in the preceding year.

59. The following is an abstract of the returns furnished by the District Superintendents of Police, showing the number of serious crimes in their respective districts, distinguishing those the scenes of which were personally visited by them from those to which no visits were made. A general statement embodying the Superintendents' returns is appended :—

60. From the above abstract it will be seen that in Ahmednagar, out of 24 cases entered in the return only 8 were visited, 3 by Mr. Goldsmith and 5 by Captain Babington. In Násik, of the 16 cases, the scenes of 6 were visited by the Superintendent, 4 by Major Wilson, and 2 by Mr. Prescott while he was Acting Superintendent in that district. In Poona there were 32 cases and of these only 10 were visited, 2 by Mr. Cotgrave and the remaining 8 by Mr. Prescott. In Sátára the number of cases was 13 and of these only 3 were visited by Major Codrington. In Sholápur there were 13 cases and of these the scenes of 6 were visited, 3 by Mr. Adams and 3 by Lieutenant Macpherson. As regards Khândesh, there were 11 cases in the District Superintendent's personal charge, the scenes of none of which were visited by the Superintendent, who, however, states that all the scenes of serious crimes were visited by his most experienced Police Inspector in charge of the western tálukas. There were 12 cases in the First Assistant Superintendent's charge and of these the scenes of 6 were visited, 3 by Mr. Gibbs and 3 by Mr. Dickinson. Of the 8 cases that occurred in the Second Assistant Superintendent's charge, 2 only were visited by Mr. Davies.

61. In those cases in which the scene of crime was not visited in person by the Superintendent or the Assistant Superintendent in Khândesh, explanation is given by them as to the reason of the omission. As regards Khândesh the Acting Superintendent Mr. Dickinson, in forwarding the returns for that district, urges that practically it would be fruitless for the Superintendent of Police while on his annual tour of inspection in the eastern tálukas to attempt to visit all scenes of crimes in the extreme west. I cannot admit that this is a sufficient reason for the Superintendent wholly neglecting to visit the scenes of crime on all occasions. Subordinate Police Officers must not be left too much to themselves, and an occasional unexpected visit to the scene of a crime cannot but prove of great benefit in the direction and control of the actions of the subordinate Police.

62. The peace of the districts forming this Division was generally undisturbed by dacoity or serious crimes, such as those that were rife and caused so much anxiety and trouble in the year preceding. One by one the dacoits still at large have been captured and brought to justice, and the moral effect of the measures taken has, no doubt, been to induce the evil exposed to a more settled course of conduct.

63. I would, in conclusion, observe that the results of the year's Police operations show that there has been no deterioration but an improvement in the detection of crime of a serious nature in the districts generally of this Division. The Sholápur District has, from the exigencies of the service, been at a disadvantage in the matter of supervision, and it is hoped that this district may be less unfortunate in this respect in future.

64. The drill and discipline of the Police are receiving due attention, and I am fairly well satisfied with the manner in which the Superintendents of Police have taken this important matter in hand.

65. I trust that Government will agree with me in considering the general results of the year's operations to be on the whole satisfactory, and such as to commend to favourable notice the officers holding the appointments of Police Superintendent in this Division.

2. Mr. F. L. Goldsmid held the office of Superintendent of Police of this district from January to 28th May 1880, and Captain S. Babington from 29th May to the end of the year.

3. During the year under report, 2 officers and 12 men were dismissed the force against 3 officers and 8 men in the previous year; 5 men were punished judicially against 2 officers and 4 men in 1879; and 5 officers and 48 men were punished departmentally against 5 officers and 30 men in the preceding year. On the other hand, 79 officers and men received promotion during the year, and 4 officers and men received money rewards.

4. The number of officers and men returned as able to read and write during the year is 65 and 189 respectively; being an increase of 2 officers and 30 men as compared with the previous year. The District Superintendent of Police, Captain Babington, states:—

“I am at present able to get more than sufficient educated recruits, and, therefore, with the exception of a few Bhils, &c., whom I enlist to maintain the due admixture of races in the force, I do not now entertain any men who cannot read and write, or who do not come up to standard as regards height and chest measurement.”

Four officers and 32 men were under instruction during the year.

5. No new buildings were constructed during the year under report. From information received from the Examiner of Barrack accommodation. Public Works Accounts and from the Accountant General, however, it appears that a sum of Rs. 1,016-2-9 was expended by the Public Works Department in repairing Police buildings valued above Rs. 1,000, and that Rs. 234-11-0 were expended in the repair of Police buildings departmentally from the Civil Budget allotment during the year.

6. The total number of cognizable and non-cognizable offences ascertained to have been committed during the year was 4,065 against 4,837 in the previous year, showing a decrease of 772 cases. In cognizable offences there is a decrease of 645 cases, the number being 3,628 in 1880 against 4,273 in 1879, and in non-cognizable offences a decrease of 127 cases, the number being 437 in 1880 against 564 in 1879. The decrease in cognizable crime occurs entirely in Class VI. and under "Public and Local Nuisances," the number of offences under this head being 609 in the year under report against 1,546 in the previous year. There is, however, an increase in Classes II., IV. and V. of 12, 47, and 231 cases respectively. Of the 3,628 cognizable cases 3,598 were investigated by the Police, and of these 2,275 were decided, convictions being obtained in 1,485, which gives a percentage of 65 against 74 in the preceding year, or a fall of 9 per cent. The total number of persons arrested in cognizable cases was 4,719, and there were 39 persons pending trial at the close of the year 1879. Of these, 4,036 were put on trial, and 2,098 or 52 per cent. were convicted; the percentage in 1879 was 64. The percentage of convictions to arrests has also fallen from 59 in 1879 to 44 in 1880. In explanation of these results, Captain Babington points out that the Ahmednagar Police, though less in proportion to area than in any other district of the Presidency except Násik, has had to supply men for almost all the line guards hitherto furnished by a complete Regiment of Native Infantry, which much crippled the force at his disposal for regular Police duties. He observes:—

"To provide men for these in addition to the usual escorts, &c., the strength at headquarters had to be increased by withdrawing men from the tálukas, so that really at times the Chief Constables were hard pushed to find any men for detective duty. This, taken in conjunction with the reduction of outposts and centralization of the regular Police, has naturally tended to throw more of the primary detective work and apprehension of prisoners on the village Police, who perhaps were not quite equal to the responsibility. * * *"

7. There were 14 cases of murder during the year under report, against 16 in the preceding year. Of the 14 cases, 3 were struck off as no crime; in 5 cases convictions were obtained; in one case, though the accused were convicted by the Sessions Court and sentenced to death, they were subsequently acquitted on appeal by the High Court; in 2 cases the accused were acquitted by the Sessions for want of sufficient evidence; and 3 cases remained undetected at the close of the year. The following are the particulars of the three undetected cases as reported by the District Superintendent of Police:—

- I.—In February the body of a woman, the kept mistress of one Janubháí, who was then a prisoner in custody of the Police on a suspicion of being implicated in a dacoity, was found in a well near the village of Deolali in the Ráhuri Táluka. Every enquiry has been made personally both by Mr. Goldsmid and Captain Babington but without success. Enquiries are, however, still going on.
- II.—In March a boy by name Balchand, the son of a Márwádi at Kokneh, in táluka Nevása, was murdered for the sake of the ornaments he had on his person by one Raghunáth, who has absconded; and, although strict enquiries have been and are being made for him, he has not yet been arrested.
- III.—In this case four members of a family living in Chitulwedhe, in the Akola Táluka, were suddenly taken ill after partaking of their evening meal on the 16th September, and one of them subsequently died. On examination traces of arsenic were discovered. Although there were grounds for strong suspicion against two men named Ráma Bápu and Ráma Hari, the Police have been unable to bring the crime home to any one.

8. Nine cases of dacoity are reported for the year under notice, against 14 in the previous year. In only 2 of the 9 cases convictions were obtained; in 3 cases the accused were discharged by the Magistrate for want of evidence; and 4 cases remained undetected at the close of the year. The following are the details of the four undetected cases as reported by the District Superintendent of Police:—

I.—On the 2nd January, three houses in the village of Sultánpur, in the Nevása Táluka, were attacked by a band of men said to number about 25, and property to the reported value of Rs. 700 was carried away. No trace of the offenders has as yet been found.

II.—On the 11th January, 7 or 8 men attacked the hut of one Rámáji Sadáshiv, situated about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the town of Nevása, and carried away property to the value of Rs. 26-10-0. The crime is supposed to have originated in a private quarrel, but no proof against the suspected parties could be obtained.

III.—Two persons, who were sleeping in a hut about a mile distant from the town of Pravará Sangam, were attacked on the night of the 16th October by 8 men, and robbed of property to the value of Rs. 2-5-0. No trace of the robbers has been discovered.

IV.—On the night of the 5th November, a gang of men armed with swords and a gun and numbering, it is said, about 15, broke in the house of one Dhondu Vithal at Dharangaon in the Kopargaon Táluka. This case has hitherto remained undetected, but the Superintendent of Police is in hopes that it may yet come to light. Some of the offenders are known to the Police, but the difficulty is to find the property or get reliable evidence. The property is said still to be intact, and a strict watch is being kept for it.

9. At the close of the years 1878 and 1879, there were 318 and 320 cases respectively of undetected crime. Of these, the District Superintendent of Police states, 30 were detected during the year under report and 11 were struck off. The number of persons arrested in these cases was 54, of whom 20, or 37 per cent., were convicted. The number of cases that remained undetected at the close of the year under review is 421.

10. During the year under report, there were 26 cases of suicide and 136 cases of accidental death against 15 and 166 respectively in the preceding year. The following are the particulars of the cases pertaining to the year under notice :—

11. The provisions of the Arms Act are stated to have been duly enforced in the Ahmednagar District, and 584 licenses in different forms were issued during the year under notice. Eleven cases under the Act were prosecuted during the year, in ten of which convictions were obtained.

12. The District Superintendent of Police reports that the question of drill has been engaging his attention, but that owing to the very heavy guard duties which have devolved on the Police he has been unable to do as much as he wished. However, from a return furnished by him it is to be gathered that there are 414 officers and men who have attained proficiency in manual and platoon exercise, company drill, light infantry drill, and guard and sentry duty. Captain Babington adds as follows :—

“Immediately I took charge I ordered in three men from each táluka filling up their places with others from head-quarters. These, in the intervals between their guard duties were put through a regular course of drill, and as they became tolerably proficient they were returned to their tálukas and others brought in; in this way I hope before long to drill the whole force, and, once drilled, a month or perhaps two at head-quarters every year ought to suffice to keep up their knowledge.”

14. The following officers were in charge of the office of District Superintendent of Police during the year under report :—

Officers in charge. Mr. J. H. Dickinson, from 1st January to 5th July 1880.

Major O. Probyn, from 6th July to end of the year.

The office of the First Assistant District Superintendent of Police, Khán-desb, was held by the following officers during the year :—

Mr. H. M. Gibbs, from 1st January to 5th July 1880.

Mr. J. H. Dickinson, from 6th July to end of the year.

And Mr. D. Davies held the office of Second Assistant District Superintendent of Police during the entire year.

15. During the year under report only 2 men were dismissed the force, against 4 men in the previous year; 19 officers and 113 men were punished departmentally, by fine, degradation or suspension, against 10 officers and 38 men so punished in the preceding year; and 3 officers and 10 men were punished judicially and consequently dismissed the force. It is to be regretted that no less than 5 Chief Constables are included in the number of officers degraded and judicially punished during the year for various offences. The District Magistrate remarks that at the beginning of the year something like an epidemic of unscrupulousness was noticeable, and some measures to check it were found necessary and have been successful, as the conduct of the Police for the remaining portion of the year has been unexceptionable.

16. The number of officers and men returned as able to read and write is 147 and 364 respectively, against 146 officers and 337 men in the previous year; and the number of men under instruction during the year was 21, as against 11 in the preceding year.

17. No new buildings were constructed during the year under report. From particulars furnished by the Examiner of Public Barrack accommodation. Works Accounts and by the Accountant General, it appears that a sum of Rs. 2,171-15-3 was expended by the Public Works Department in repairing Police buildings valued above 1,000 rupees, and that Rs. 809-11-11 were expended departmentally in keeping the Police buildings in proper repair from the Civil Budget allotment.

18. The total number of offences cognizable and non-cognizable, ascertained to have been committed during the year under report, was 4,884 against 4,408 in the preceding year, or an increase of 476 cases. In cognizable crime there is an increase of 261 cases, the number being 3,583 in 1880 against 3,322 in 1879. In non-cognizable cases there is also an increase of 215 cases, the number being 1,301 in the year under report against 1,086 in the previous year. Of the 3,999 cognizable cases, including 416 which were reported in the previous year and brought under inquiry during the year, only 2,918 cases were investigated by the Police and decided by the Criminal Courts, the result being that in 1,385 cases convictions were obtained, while in 807 cases the accused were acquitted and discharged by the Criminal Courts; 602 cases were struck off as no crime; 74 cases were compounded and withdrawn; and 50 cases were pending trial at the close of the year. The percentage of cases convicted to cases decided shows a considerable fall from 56 in 1879 to 47 in 1880, which is not satisfactory.

19. The total number of persons arrested in cognizable offences during the year was 4,506, including one received by transfer and 72 brought over from the previous year. Of these 2,558 were brought to trial, and 2,219 or 87 per cent. were finally convicted against 70 per cent. in 1879; 335 were acquitted

or discharged after trial; 1,877 were released without trial; 6 died or were transferred, 2 before and 4 after trial; and 69 were pending at the close of the year, 19 of these being in custody of the Police and 50 in that of the Criminal Courts.

20. There were 13 cases of murder during the year, against 12 in the previous year. In 7 of these 13 cases convictions were obtained. In one of the remaining 6 cases the accused was proved to be a lunatic, and is now in confinement as such; in three cases the accused were acquitted and discharged by the Sessions Court, and in the remaining two cases the offenders, who are known to the Police, have absconded and their arrest is still to be effected. None of these cases is such as to require any special mention.

21. There was only one case of dacoity during the year under notice, against 11 in the previous year. There were, however, 8 cases remaining for disposal at the close of the previous year, making a total of 9 cases to be accounted for; and it is satisfactory to notice that in all of these cases convictions were obtained. In the single case for the year, which is reported to be of purely local origin, all the accused, supposed to have been concerned numbering 25, were arrested, of whom 3 were released by the trying Magistrate and 22 were committed to the Sessions Court, where 14 were convicted and sentenced, 6 to transportation for life and 8 to seven years' rigorous imprisonment, the remaining 8 being discharged for want of evidence.

22. At the end of the years 1878 and 1879 there were 623 and 669 cases respectively of undetected crime. Of the 623 cases pertaining to the year 1878, 21 cases were detected during the year under report, in 19 of which convictions were obtained and in two cases the accused were discharged. Of the 669 cases of the year 1879, 38 were detected and in 31 cases convictions were obtained, the accused in 7 cases being discharged. The number of cases that remained undetected at the end of the year was 811.

23. During the year under report there were 39 cases of suicide and 252 cases of accidental death, against 35 and 232 respectively in the previous year. The following details relate to the year under report:—

24. The provisions of the Arms Act are stated to have been duly enforced in the Khándesh District, and 676 licenses were issued during the year for different purposes. The District Superintendent of Police states that no license has been withdrawn or taken away after issue, but in several cases applications for the possession of arms have been refused on account of the indifferent character of the applicants; and that there are now large numbers of matchlocks in different kacheris which have been taken from or given up by the owners, and which are detained pending the production by the owners of the necessary licenses from the District Magistrate.

25. In the matter of drill, a great improvement is stated to have taken place during the year. At the same time, the District Superintendent of Police observes that it cannot be said that the unarmed Police are at all as efficient as it is hoped they will soon be with the measures which are being taken for their improvement, and he adds as follows:—

“In 1878, a jamádár of the Khándesh Bhil Corps and 10 men were attached to the 15th Regiment N. I. at Málegaon for a period of 6 months, during which time they went through a regular course of drill. The men of the Bhil Corps at head-quarters and at Dhulia are kept constantly at drill, and selected men from this branch of the Police have been sent into the districts to assist in drilling the unarmed Police. Independent of this a Head Constable and 3 men from every táluka have been called into head-quarters

where they are undergoing a regular course of drill, and when reported fit they will return to the district and others called in. It cannot be expected that some of the old Chief Constables can obtain any personal proficiency in the matter of drill, but all are endeavouring to learn what they can, and newly appointed Chief Constables will of course have to show a standard of proficiency much higher than can be expected from Police Officers of over 25 years' standing."

27. Major W. H. Wilson was in charge of the office of Superintendent of Police of this district from 1st January to 25th September 1880. Mr. H. Prescott acted as District Superintendent of Police from 26th September to 12th December, and Mr. H. J. H. Henderson from 13th December to the end of the year.

28. The conduct of the force as a body is stated to have been good during the year. From the returns it will be seen that eleven men were dismissed during the year against 17 men in 1879; that 9 men were punished judicially, 4 under the Police Act and 5 for other offences, against 1 officer and 19 men in 1879; and that 16 officers and 147 men were punished departmentally against 19 officers and 164 men in 1879. Of the number departmentally punished, 3 officers and 14 men were reduced, 11 officers and 86 men were fined for neglect of duty, 8 men were fined for cross-arm drill, while the remaining 2 officers and 39 men were required to forfeit their pay for overstaying their leave or delaying to join their posts. On the other hand, a sum of Rs. 955-8-0 was distributed as money rewards amongst 18 officers and 21 men of the force, and 7 members of the force were rewarded by promotion for good service.

29. The returns show that there are now in the force 81 officers and 113 men who can read and write thoroughly against 68 officers and 102 men in the previous year. The District Superintendent of Police states that these men have been tested according to the prescribed regulations, and that, as is seen from the above figures, there is a decided improvement in education. The number of men under instruction during the year was 72 against 38 in 1879. Mr. Henderson further adds that the daily average attendance at the head-quarter school was 15 men, being 11 in excess of the previous year, but that there has been a small decrease in the attendance of the children.

30. During the year under report lines for the accommodation of the men stationed at Hátgal in taluka Kalvan were provided at a cost of Rs. 631-10-0, and Rs. 384-2-0 were expended in repairing several outpost buildings in the district from the Civil Budget allotment as reported by the Accountant General. The Public Works Department have also expended during the year a sum of Rs. 5,341-15-9, viz., Rs. 4,827-9-3 in providing new lines for the accommodation of the Police stationed at Devlali, Rs. 68-2-1 in providing new shelves in the record room of the Mámlatdár's Kacheri at Peint for the use of the Chief Constable, and Rs. 446-4-5 in repairing Police buildings valued above Rs. 1,000 each. The District Superintendent of Police and the District Magistrate both urge the early construction of the proposed new lines for the Police at head-quarters, which are very much needed,

31. The total number of offences, cognizable and non-cognizable, reported to have been committed during the year under report was 4,386, being an increase of 706 cases as compared with the previous year. In cognizable crime there is an increase of 917 cases, the number being 3,733 against 2,816 in 1879; while in non-cognizable cases there is a decrease of 211 cases, the number being 652 in 1880 against 863 in 1879. The increase in cognizable crime appears in all classes except Class I., which shows a decrease of 6 cases. The increase is chiefly under the headings House-breaking, Theft and Simple Hurt. Under the last-mentioned head there are no less than 1,256 cases in 1880 against 992 in 1879, being an increase of 264 cases; and of these 1,256 cases no less than 1,168 were taken up by order of the Magistrates. In theft and house-breaking cases the increase is 182 and 65 respectively. All the cognizable cases reported for the year under review, together with 12 cases that were pending at the close of the year 1879, or in all 3,745 cases were investigated by the Police during the year. Of these 1,690 cases were decided, and in 1,484 convictions were obtained, giving a percentage of 88 against 62 in 1879.

32. The total number of persons arrested was 4,955, and there were two persons awaiting trial at the close of the year 1879. Seventy-one persons were arrested in cases afterwards struck off. Of the total number arrested 2,542 were brought to trial, and 2,156 or 85 per cent. were convicted. The percentage in 1879 was 52. The percentage of convictions to arrests has, however, fallen from 52 in 1879 to 43 in 1880. Of the above arrests 1,840 were made by the Police, and the remaining 3,115 by order of the Magistrates; and of the latter 2,469 were arrested for simple hurt alone. Of the number arrested by the Police 72 per cent. were convicted, while of those arrested by order of the Magistrates only 27 per cent. were convicted.

33. There were 7 cases of murder during the year against 8 in the preceding year. In 2 of the 7 cases pertaining to the year under report convictions were obtained; in one case a Bhil, who killed his wife in a fit of rage, has absconded, and although a reward of Rs. 100 has been offered for his arrest, he is still at large, and is believed to be wandering in the Nizám's territory, where enquiry for him is still on foot. The remaining 4 cases were struck off by order of the Magistrates. One of these was the case of a woman jumping into a well in order to commit suicide, having first thrown in her two children, a boy and a girl, aged respectively 8 and 5 years. She was, however, rescued and tried for the murder of the children, but was acquitted on the ground of insanity. The second case was that of a man who struck his wife on the head with such force as to cause her death; it was, however, decreed that at the time he committed the act his reason was affected, and consequently he was acquitted of the charge of murder. The remaining two cases were reported as murders by poison, but on *post-mortem* examination it was found that in one case death was the result of opium eating and in the other that death had resulted from disease of the spleen.

34. There were 5 cases of culpable homicide during the year against 2 in the preceding year. In 3 of these 5 cases convictions were obtained. In one case the accused were discharged for want of proof, and the other was pending trial at the close of the year. Of the 13 persons arrested in these 5 cases, 4 were convicted, 6 were acquitted and discharged, and 3 that were pending trial at the close of the year have since been convicted and sentenced, two to ten years' transportation, and one to five years' rigorous imprisonment.

35. There were six cases of dacoity during the year, showing a decrease of three cases as compared with the previous year. In three of these convictions were obtained. In one of the remaining 3 cases the accused were acquitted by the Sessions Court, while the other two were undetected. Of the 38 persons arrested by the Police in these cases, 21, or 55 per cent., were convicted, and 17 were acquitted. The following are the particulars of the two undetected cases as reported by the District Superintendent of Police:—

I.—On the 21st March, 10 or 12 men entered the house of a Márwádi at Gaináre, táluca Málegaon, and after assaulting him, his mother and servant carried away gold and silver ornaments valued at Rs. 423.

II.—On the night of the 30th August in the village of Nausari, taluka Nándgaon, dacoits broke into the house of one Kási walad Gangi, who valued the amount of property stolen by them at Rs. 1,118-4-0. Twelve persons are supposed to have been concerned in this case, but they, it is believed, escaped across the frontier, and no further tidings of them have been obtained.

36. The District Superintendent of Police states that at the close of the year 1878 there were 226 cases of undetected crime, and of these 4 per cent. were detected in 1879. At the close of the year 1879 there were 290 cases, and of these 3 per cent. were detected in the following year. The number of cases that remained undetected at the close of the year under notice is 294.

37. There were 19 cases of suicide and 175 cases of accidental deaths during the year against 26 and 174 respectively in the preceding year. The following are the details of the cases relating to the year under report :—

38. The District Superintendent of Police states that under the Arms Act 833 licenses were issued within the year against 51 in 1879. This number includes old licenses renewed as well as new ones granted, and in all cases the Police are careful to see that persons making applications under the Act are of good character and otherwise fitted to be entrusted to carry arms.

39. During the year under report five members of the Foot Police, who at the close of last year were undergoing a course of drill with the depôt of the 16 Regiment N. I. at Málegaon, are stated to have completed the prescribed test and to be employed as drill instructors. In the same way one Dafedár and one Savár, who were attached to the Poona Horse and qualified themselves in drill exercise with breech-loading carbines, are stated to have been told off to instruct the other men, the Dafedár being placed at head-quarters and the Savár at Málegaon. The District Superintendent of Police states that of the entire force 624 men have received instruction in drill, of whom 375 have been through the course laid down including light infantry drill; that the number of all grades who have not yet received instruction according to the prescribed standard is 115; and that men from each outpost, as they can be spared, are sent to head-quarters for the purpose of receiving the necessary instruction.

41. Major Daniell was in charge of the office of Superintendent of Police of this district from 1st January to 11th May, Mr. G. W. Cotgrave from 12th May to 4th June, and Mr. W. B. Prescott from 5th June to the end of the year.

The office of Assistant Superintendent in connection with the Punitivo Police in the Purandhar and part of the Haveli talukas was held by Mr. H. N. Alexander from 1st January to 29th March, and by Mr. G. W. Cotgrave from 30th March to the end of the year.

42. The returns show that during the year under report 4 officers and 16 men were dismissed the force against 2 officers and 23 men in the previous year; that 1 officer and 7 men were punished judicially against 3 officers and 4 men in 1879; and that 44 officers and 179 men were punished departmentally against 19 officers and 65 men in the preceding year. Mr. Prescott states that these departmental punishments were mainly small fines inflicted on the men for non-attendance at drill. On the other hand, 14 officers and men were rewarded by promotion and 23 by money rewards, against 1 and 77 respectively in 1879.

43. Ninety-two officers and 109 men are returned as able to read and write against 89 officers and 71 men in 1879, showing an increase of 3 officers and 38 men for the year under report. There were no men under instruction during the year, as those who could be spared from duty morning and evening were obliged to attend drill; and the District Superintendent of Police, Mr. Prescott, states that owing to the paucity of men the guards have at times to stand for days together without being relieved, so that the men had had no opportunity of attending the school at head-quarters, even if they desired to do so. An average number of 36 children of Policemen, however, attended the school during the year.

44. Lines for the accommodation of the Policemen stationed at Dhond Barrack accommodation. were constructed during the year at a cost of Rs. 300, and Rs. 315-5-3 were expended in making certain alterations to the Police quarters at Mundwa. A sum of Rs. 1,075-7-0 was also expended on repairs executed departmentally to Police outpost buildings in the Poona District. Thus a total sum of Rs. 1,690-12-3 was expended, as reported by the Accountant General, on new works and repairs from the Civil Budget allotment. A sum of Rs. 1,592-5-1 was also expended by the Public Works Department on repairs to Police buildings valued above Rs. 1,000.

45. The total number of cases of all descriptions of crime reported to Fluctuation of crime. have been committed during the year under review was 8,166, or an increase of 570 cases as compared with the preceding year. The increase is large in cognizable offences, which numbered 5,081 in 1880 against 4,159 in 1879, and there is an increase under all classes except I. and III., which show a decrease of 8 and 162 cases respectively. The number of cognizable cases given above includes 1,310 cases struck off as "no crime," and excluding these for the sake of comparison the number of cognizable cases for the year is 5,771 as against 4,159 in 1879, or a decrease of 388 cases. In non-cognizable crime there is a decrease of 352 cases, the number being 3,085 in 1880 against 3,437 in 1879. All the cognizable cases reported for the year under notice, together with 37 cases reported in the previous year and brought under enquiry during the year, or in all 5,118 cases, were investigated by the Police; of these 2,095 cases were decided, and in 1,705 convictions were obtained, giving a percentage of 81 against 84 in 1879. The total number of persons arrested in cognizable cases, including 91 who were pending trial at the end of the previous year, was 5,858; of this 3,315 were put on their trial and 2,380, or 72 per cent., were convicted against 77 per cent. in 1879. The percentage of convictions to arrests also shows a slight fall from 46 in 1879 to 41 in 1880.

46. There were 14 cases of murder during the year under report against 17 in the previous year. In only 4 of these 14 cases Particulars of heinous offences. convictions were obtained. In five cases the accused were acquitted and discharged, two cases were struck off as "no crime," one case was pending at the close of the year but has since been satisfactorily disposed of, and two cases remained undetected. In one of these undetected cases the upper portion of the body of a female aged 14 or 15 years was found in a gutter within the limits of the village of Ambethan, taluka Khed; she is believed to have been murdered by her husband, whose arrest has not up to the present been effected. In the other case the corpse of

an infant was found floating in a well near Parbuti. The medical opinion was that death was caused by drowning; up to the present no clue has been obtained.

47. There were 14 cases of dacoity during the year under report against 70 in the preceding year but none of these were of a serious nature. In 11 of these 14 cases convictions were obtained; in one case the accused were acquitted by the Sessions Court; one case in which a dumpy level, the property of the Public Works Department, was stolen from some men who were carrying it along the road near Peth in Khed Taluka, remains undetected; and in one case, which occurred on the 29th December 1880, eight persons have been arrested since the close of the year and are awaiting trial. The number of persons arrested during the year in connection with these dacoities is 82, but as five of these persons are stated to have been punished for rape committed during dacoities, only 77 are shown in the return as arrested. In addition to the 77 arrested there were 19 who were awaiting trial at the close of the previous year, and of the total number 61 persons or 63 per cent. were convicted. A large number of proclaimed offenders concerned in the dacoities committed in the previous year were also arrested and dealt with during the year.

48. The District Superintendent of Police, Mr. Prescott, reports that at the close of the year 1878 there were 883 undetected cases, of which 49 were disposed of during the year under notice and 73 struck off the register by orders of the Magistrates, leaving 761 still undetected; that at the end of 1879 there were 813 cases undetected, of which 39 were satisfactorily disposed of during the year under review and 77 cases struck off the register by order of the Magistrates, leaving 697 still to be disposed of. The number of cases undisposed of at the end of the year under report was 667.

49. During the year under report there were 18 cases of suicide and 218 cases of accidental death against 18 and 229 respectively in the previous year. The following are the details of the cases relating to the year under review:—

50. The provisions of the Arms Act are stated to have been duly enforced in the Poona District, and 312 licenses were issued during the year. The shops of the licensed vendors of arms and ammunition are reported to have been periodically inspected, and the stocks and accounts were examined by the District Superintendent of Police himself and the Inspectors.

51. The Superintendent reports that 179 officers and 806 men have received instruction in drill during the year against 222 in the preceding year; that 30 officers and 112 men have completed parts I. and II. of the Field Exercise Manual, and firing exercise, and guard and sentry duties; and that the remainder have attained various degrees of knowledge. He adds that there has been daily drill at head-quarters, and also at the head-quarters of each taluka, where as many men as can be spared from the outposts are assembled to be taught.

53. Major G. H. F. Codrington was in charge of the office of District Officers in charge. Superintendent of Police during the whole year except from 18th March to 17th May, when he was on privilege leave and Major F. J. Wise was in charge.

54. The conduct of the force during the year is said to have been on the whole satisfactory. One officer and 19 men were dismissed the force during the year, against 2 officers and 24 men in 1879; 1 officer and 10 men were punished judicially, against 3 officers and 2 men in the previous year; and 34 officers and 84 men were punished departmentally by degradation, fine and suspension for offences against discipline and for being absent without leave, against 34 officers and 98 men so punished in the preceding year. On the other hand, 176 officers and men were rewarded, 22 by promotion and 154 by money rewards, during the year.

55. During the year under notice 33 officers and 262 men were under instruction against 265 men in 1879. There are now in the force 136 officers and 175 men who can read and write well, showing an increase of 47 officers and 118 men as compared with the preceding year. The increase in the number of educated men is, Major Codrington states, due to the strict enforcement of the rule that, except for special good service only, those who can read and write shall receive promotion, and to the preference given in entertaining recruits to men who are to some extent educated, provided they are also physically qualified. The District Superintendent of Police states that he visited the school several times during the year and examined the men and boys in the various branches of their studies, and was satisfied that progress was being made. The school was also examined by the Deputy Educational Inspector, who expressed a favourable opinion regarding its condition and the progress of the boys.

56. During the year under report no new buildings were constructed. A re-distribution of the outposts over the whole district was effected in May, when some of the minor ones were abolished and in the others the number of the Police was increased. In the case of those outposts where the number of men was increased, some difficulty was experienced in providing accommodation for the men, who at present put up in dharmshálas or chávdis. Until experience is gained of the suitability of the new outpost stations, house accommodation for the men must be deferred. The head-quarter lines and other buildings above the value of Rs. 1,000 had some petty repairs costing Rs. 1,592-5-1 executed to them by the Public Works Department, and out of the Police Budget allotment for petty construction and repairs Rs. 813-15-5 were expended in repairing Police buildings in various parts of the district.

57. The total number of offences reported to have been committed during the year is 6,114, of which 5,664 are cognizable and 450 non-cognizable against 4,181 and 626 respectively in 1879. There is thus an increase of 1,483 in cognizable and a decrease of 176 in non-cognizable offences. The increase in cognizable crime is due to the inclusion this year, in the returns, of cases struck off as no crime. Deducting, however, such cases, which number 2,088, the number of *bond fide* cognizable offences for the year stands at 3,576 against 4,181 in 1879, or a decrease of 605 cases, occurring chiefly in offences against property. All the 5,664 cognizable cases as well as 192 cases of those reported in the previous year but brought under enquiry during the year, making a total of 5,856 cases, were investigated by the Police, and of them 2,526 were decided, convictions being obtained in 1,719, which gives a percentage of 68 for the year against 67 in 1879. In these 5,856 cases, 5,279 persons were arrested, and there were 66 awaiting trial at the close of the previous year. Of these 4,705 were brought to trial and 2,801, or 59 per cent., were convicted against 60 per cent. in the previous year. The percentage of convictions to arrests also shows a slight fall from 54 in 1879 to 52 in 1880.

58. There were 9 cases of murder in the year under report against 11 in the preceding year. These 9 cases, together with one that was pending trial by the Sessions at the close of 1879, or a total of 10 cases, were investigated by the Particulars of heinous offences.

Police, and in 7 of them convictions were obtained. In two of the remaining three cases the accused were convicted by the Sessions Court, but on appeal they were discharged by the High Court; and in the third case the accused were discharged by the Magistrate, First Class, for want of proof. In connection with these cases 13 persons were arrested, of whom 10, or 77 per cent., were convicted by the Sessions Court, but on appeal 2 of them were discharged by the High Court. Besides these 7 persons were received by transfer from the Poona District charged with the murder of one Gangarám, the informer of Major Wise then employed on special duty. One of these was sentenced to death, 1 to transportation for life, and 5 to transportation for 10 years.

59. There was only one case of culpable homicide in the year under report against four in the previous year. In this case and in another of the two cases that were pending at the end of 1879 convictions were obtained, and in the third the accused was discharged by the Sessions Court. In connection with the case relating to the year under report two persons were arrested, of whom one was acquitted and the other convicted and sentenced to two years' rigorous imprisonment. Of the four accused who were awaiting trial at the close of 1879 one was convicted and sentenced to 18 months' rigorous imprisonment, and the rest were acquitted by the Sessions Court.

60. There were four cases of dacoity in the year under notice, against seventeen in the previous year. In addition to these four cases there were two cases reported in the preceding year and brought under enquiry during the year, making a total of six cases. Of these one was struck off as "no crime" and in the other five cases convictions were obtained. In connection with these six cases 36 persons were arrested and there were ten who were awaiting trial at the close of 1879, besides four others who were concerned in the dacoities committed in 1879 but arrested during the year under review. These were all brought to trial during the year, and of them 41, or 89 per cent., were convicted and sentenced to various terms of transportation. In addition to the above number 29 persons were received by transfer from the Poona District charged under section 400, Indian Penal Code, as belonging to an organized band of dacoits, and of these 25 were convicted and sentenced to various terms of transportation, 3 being acquitted by the Sessions Court and 1 by the Magistrate. One of the dacoities of the year was committed by Tátia Makáji and his gang on the 7th January in the village of Tembhu, taluka Karád, the full particulars of which were duly reported to Government at the time and need not therefore be recapitulated here. Since, however, the capture of Tátia Makáji and his gang in the beginning of the year, dacoity by organized gangs entirely ceased.

61. Major Codrington reports that at the close of the year 1878 the number of undetected cases was 1,319, of which 153 were detected during the course of the following year; that at the end of 1879 there were 1,296 cases remaining undetected, of which 154 were detected; and that the number of undetected cases at the end of the year under notice was 942. He adds as follows:—

"It must be explained that most of these undetected crimes are petty thefts in which property of a trifling or perishable nature has been stolen, and, therefore, there is little, if any, hope of their ultimately being discovered and the perpetrators brought to trial."

62. There were 49 cases of suicide and 317 cases of accidental death during the year under report, against 60 and 317 respectively in the preceding year. The following are the details of the cases pertaining to the year under review:—

63. During the year under report 237 licenses were issued, viz., 125 licenses to possess 194 arms and to go armed for purposes of sport, protection, or display; 87 licenses for guns to kill wild animals which injure human beings,

cattle and crops, and 25 licenses to manufacture and sell gunpowder. The fees collected on account of these licenses amounted to Rs. 211. The District Superintendent of Police further states that the accounts of the shops of 11 licensed vendors of gunpowder, &c., were examined during the year, and that no irregularities worth noticing were found. He adds:—

“All persons who made applications to possess arms *bonâ fide* for the purpose of protecting their cattle and crops from the ravages of wild animals were recommended to the District Magistrate for licenses. There is no doubt that in certain parts of the district deer, hog and other animals do injure the crops, and it is only right that the people should be allowed some weapons in order to protect their property from being injured.”

And to this the Acting District Magistrate Mr. Lee-Warner, in remarking that Mr. Stewart, the District Magistrate, thoroughly concurred in the above opinion, adds:—

“At the same time every officer who has served in Sâtâra during the time of the late dacoities, whether employed in the judicial or other administrative branches of the public service, is strongly convinced of the very serious danger to the public peace which would have ensued, had the possession of arms not been most carefully restricted before the dacoities burst out. It is only necessary to recall to mind the fact that in some of the dacoity cases as at Dhon in the Wâi Tâluka, not less than 80 men were concerned. It is notorious that the outburst of this form of crime is not absolutely devoid of political significance. Any remarkable success obtained by large gangs of armed robbers in the case of a sudden panic or in the absence of proper precautions, would fan into flame the smouldering embers of disaffection and disturbance which the best administration cannot expect entirely to remove. Whilst, therefore, there is a tendency to look with disfavour on acts which interfere with the liberty of the people to possess arms, it is necessary to remember that this district, at any rate, has passed successfully, and with credit to its Police, through a crisis, which might have been much more serious if the policy of Government had not been restrictive and precautionary in the matter of the possession of arms.”

64. On this subject the Superintendent reports that much attention was paid during the year to the important matter of teaching the force, both mounted and foot, their drill; and that for the purpose of instruction as many officers and men as could be spared were being constantly sent to the head-quarters in small batches. In this manner 44 officers and 193 men were brought in from the tâlukas and returned after completing their course in drill; and 32 officers and 43 men on duty at head-quarters and in the town of Sâtâra were also put under instruction. In addition to these, 50 Head Constables armed with Snider carbines were taught by a drill master of the 17th Regiment N. I, the use of breech-loading arms, skirmishing, the new form of attack, &c., and at the end of the course they were able to work well and intelligently together. Major Codrington adds that during his tour through the district he examined the officers and men at each of the tâluka head-quarters and outposts visited by him, and ordered such of them as seemed wanting in a knowledge of drill to head-quarters for the purpose of being put under instruction.

66. During the year the following officers were in charge of the office of Superintendent of Police of this district:—

Mr. H. G. Gell, from 1st January to 14th February 1880.

Lieut.-Colonel F. P. Bartholomew, from 15th February to 15th March.

Mr. A. B. Steward, C. S., Magistrate First Class, from 16th to 21st March.

Mr. J. B. D. Adams, from 22nd March to 9th June and Lieutenant T. R. M. Macpherson, from 10th June to end of the year.

In forwarding the report the District Magistrate observes that—

“It is a matter of regret that the exigencies of the service have necessitated so many changes in the head of the Police during the year in question. So long as such continued changes take place, it is impossible to maintain that control over, and efficiency in, the subordinate Police that it is desirable to have. * * *”

67. I fully concur with the District Magistrate. For some time past Sholápur has been most unfortunate, there being far too frequent changes of Superintendents, and several of these being young and somewhat inexperienced the result has been far from satisfactory. Officers have not been long enough to learn their men and the country, and have, as a consequence, been obliged to rely too much on their establishment. The best Police force in the world would deteriorate and become unsatisfactory under such treatment. No wonder, then, the force is not what it should be and that dismissals and punishments are frequent.

68. Lieutenant Macpherson, who has submitted the report, states that the general conduct of the force has been satisfactory, but Conduct of the force. this statement, looking at the figures in Statement F., seems contradictory, the fact being that 4 officers and 25 men were dismissed the force in 1880, against 3 officers and 13 men in 1879; that 7 men were punished judicially, against 1 officer and 4 men in 1879; and that 32 officers and 169 men were punished departmentally, against 16 officers and 130 men in the preceding year. Thus the number punished departmentally, judicially and by dismissal amounted to 237, or 70 more than the number in the previous year, being nearly one-half of the whole force. The District Magistrate observes that the reason for this may be, and probably is, that in the year under report the Police were more strictly supervised than previously. Against the above it is shown that 20 men received money rewards for good service during the year.

69. The number of officers and men who can read and write is shown to be smaller in the year under review than in the preceding year, there being only 22 officers and 40 Education. men in the force returned as able to read and write, against 25 officers and 50 men in the year 1879. The Acting District Superintendent of Police, Lieutenant Macpherson, states that the school at head-quarters was open during the year and that the daily average attendance was 12; but that this number had slightly increased towards the close of the year as he insisted on all men who were off duty at head-quarters attending the school. Lieutenant Macpherson observes that nearly all the first and second class Head Constables in the district are quite uneducated, and consequently unfit for promotion to the grade of Chief Constable, which to a great extent stops promotion in the lower grades of the Police. The District Magistrate remarks that the educational standard of the force, which is at a low ebb, is due to so many uneducated men having in former years been promoted to the senior grades; and that these men must be passed over by their juniors, or future improvement will be hopeless. This matter is engaging due attention.

70. No new buildings were constructed during the year under report, but from the information furnished by the Examiner of Barrack accommodation. Public Works Accounts it appears that a small sum of Rs. 807-14-9 was expended by the Public Works Department in repairing Police buildings valued above Rs. 1,000 during the year. The District Superintendent of Police, Lieutenant Macpherson, states that lines for the Police are much required at nearly all the outposts, and, as in many places the men live in the villages, it is difficult for superior officers to look after them properly and see that their uniform and accoutrements are kept in proper order. Regarding this matter I hope shortly to address Government on receipt of information as to the requirements of the various districts of this Division.

71. The total number of cognizable and non-cognizable offences reported to have been committed during the year is 2,254, or a decrease of 1,149 cases as compared with the preceding year. The decrease in cognizable cases is 1,100, the number being 2,035 in 1880, against 3,135 in 1879, and extends to all classes of crime except Classes IV. and VI., "Minor offences against the person" and "Other offences," under which there is an increase of 74 and 223 cases respectively. Of the 2,035 cognizable cases more than one-third (776 cases entered in Class VI.) are cases falling under the "Municipal laws, and public and local nuisances," nearly all of which occurred in the city of Sholápur, and show an increase of 214 cases as compared with last year in which the number was 562 only. The non-cognizable crimes show a decrease of 49 as compared with the previous year, the number being 219 in 1880 against 268 in 1879. Of the 2,070 cognizable cases, including 35 which were reported in the previous year and brought under enquiry during the year, 1,662, or 80 per cent., were decided, and in 1,341 of these convictions were obtained, giving a percentage of 81 against 86 in the previous year. The total number of persons arrested in cognizable cases, including 47 who were awaiting trial at the close of the previous year, was 2,552, of whom 2,310 were put on their trial and 1,646, or 71 per cent., were convicted against 78 per cent. in the previous year. The percentage of convictions to arrests has also fallen from 71 in 1879 to 64 in 1880. These percentages do not, however, necessarily indicate that the efficiency of the Police has diminished.

72. There were 5 cases of murder during the year under report against 25 in the previous year. Of the five cases pertaining to the year under report one case was struck off as no offence by order of the First Class Magistrate, in three cases convictions were obtained, and in the remaining one case the accused was discharged by the Sessions Court for want of evidence. This last case is thus described by the District Superintendent of Police:—

"One, Silleman walad Appabhái, mixed some poison in some food which was being prepared for his brother Pirubhái walad Appabhái's family by the latter's wife. Seven members of Pirubhái's family partook of the food and all became violently sick, the servant dying from the effects of the poison. Silleman was committed to the Sessions Court, but discharged for want of evidence."

73. There were five cases of culpable homicide during the year under review against nine in the previous year. In three of these five cases convictions were obtained, in one case the accused was discharged by the Sessions Court, and one case was struck off as no crime by order of the Magistrate.

74. There were two cases of dacoity during the year under report against 40 in the preceding year. The two cases, together with seven others which were reported in the previous year but brought under enquiry during the year, make a total of nine cases dealt with during the year. Of these nine cases eight were decided and in six convictions were obtained, while one case was pending trial at the close of the year. In one of the two cases pertaining to the year under notice the accused were convicted and sentenced to seven years' rigorous imprisonment each, but in the other case, the details of which are as follow, the accused were discharged by the Sessions Court:—

"On the evening of the 21st September one Abáji of Sholápur, whilst returning from his field at the village of Dahitne, was attacked near that village by about 12 men, who drove away his cattle valued at Rs. 101-8-0. Cattle valued at Rs. 83 were recovered and 10 Phásbepárdhis were arrested and committed for trial to the Sessions Court, where, however, they were all discharged."

75. The District Superintendent of Police, Lieutenant Macpherson, reports that at the close of the year 1878 there remained 287 undetected cases, in only one of which (a dacoity) an accused was arrested, and he was discharged by the Magistrate. The number of undetected cases at the end of 1879 was 387, and of these eight were detected during the year under report. Of these eight cases, three were dacoities, one a case of house-breaking, two were thefts, one a case of receiving stolen property, and one a case of grievous hurt. In connection with these cases 21 persons were arrested, of whom 16 were convicted and one was under trial at the end of the year. The number of undetected cases at close of the year under report is 177.

76. There were 36 cases of suicide and 179 of accidental death during the year under notice against 37 and 240 respectively in the previous year. The following are the details of the cases pertaining to the year under report :—

77. During the year under report 847 licenses for arms are stated to have been granted; of these 555 to possess arms and 292 to go armed. Three licenses were also granted for the sale of ammunition. The District Superintendent of Police states that the shops, stock and accounts of the licensed vendors are examined quarterly by the Police Inspector and yearly by the Superintendent of Police.

78. The District Superintendent of Police reports that 56 men were thoroughly instructed in the manual and firing exercises, company and light infantry drill, during the year under review, and 55 men were under instruction and nearly completed their course, and that 86 men were instructed in 1879. He adds as follows :—

“The men are transferred to the talukas as soon as they have completed their course and are relieved at head-quarters by men from the talukas who have not learned their drill. Competent drill instructors are however much required for the taluka stations as well as the head-quarters. Instructors are sent to some of the taluka stations, but they are not really competent men and much cannot be expected from them.

“The shooting of the Police is bad and a short course of musketry instruction is desirable. Many of the men do not understand the use of the sight, and a number of them are apparently afraid to fire their guns off. It is difficult also to score accurately with the canvas target at present used by the Police of most districts, and it would be advantageous if condemned military targets were issued to the Police for use at ball practice, at any rate at the head-quarters of the district. The expense would not be very great, and the gain in accuracy of scoring would be an encouragement to the men to shoot better, particularly now that Government have sanctioned money rewards for good shooting.”

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the administration of the Police of the Southern Division for the year 1880 together with the statements marked A. to N.

2. The Division was up to 20th November under my charge, and during the rest of the year under Mr. Sheppard while I was on special duty under the Government of India.

3. In the following table are shown the dates of the Superintendents' reports, of the District Magistrates' transmitting memoranda, and of the final replies of the Superintendents to references subsequently made to them:—

5. Before commenting on the above figures it is necessary to premise that, to institute a fair comparison between the result of the year under report and that of the previous year, cases struck off in 1879 and persons concerned in them that were not included in last year's return have been taken into calculation.

6. It is gratifying to notice a considerable diminution in crime, there being 13,247 cases against 15,434* or 14 per cent. less than in the preceding year. The decrease is observable in all the districts except Belgaum, where the number of cases is 3,296 as compared with 2,887 in 1879, giving an increase of 409 cases. The increase in Belgaum is, however, to be found chiefly in cases under the head "Special and local laws cognizable by Police" which are 997, or 670 more than last year.

7. Fifteen thousand three hundred and eighty-four persons were arrested in the 13,247 cases reported during the year. Of these 7,866 or 51 per cent. were convicted, which is less by 5 per cent. than last year. This falling off will be explained further on when I deal with cognizable offences alone (*vide* para. 14).

Ratnágiri has obtained the best percentage, viz. 55, showing an improvement of 6 per cent. Next come Belgaum and Kánara each with a percentage of 54; then follow Kaládgi and Dhárwár with percentages of 48 and 45 respectively.

11. It will be seen that there is a falling off in crime throughout the whole Division except in Belgaum, where there appears an increase of 486 cases, the cause of which is stated in para. 6 above. Thus the year under review was very favourable as regards crime owing chiefly to the exceptionally good harvest. The decrease of crime is chiefly observable in "minor offences against property" of which there were only 4,711 cases against 6,996 last year. Necessity no longer drives the poorest of the agricultural population to steal, and crime may be considered to have fallen to its normal level and to be confined to the professional criminal classes.

12. The following statement contrasts the crime of minor offences against property in 1880 with the same in 1879 and justifies the above conclusion:—

13. The offenders in the majority of these cases were mostly habitual criminals, experts in crime and in the modes of evading detection and punishment. This accounts reasonably for the lower percentage of convictions to arrests.

14. The following table shows that the percentage of convictions to arrests in these cases has decreased by 8, which decrease has necessarily lowered the percentage of convictions in cognizable cases as well as that in cognizable and non-cognizable cases taken together (*vide* para. 7 above):—

15. In the whole number of cognizable offences including struck-off cases, 12,257 persons were arrested against 15,156† during the previous year, of whom 6,464 persons were convicted, giving a percentage of 53 against 56. Ratnágiri stands first with a percentage of 59, which shows an improvement of 10 per cent.

All the other districts have declined, Belgaum from 58 to 56, Dhárwár from 48 to 43, Kaládgi from 67 to 51, and Kánara from 59 to 57.

16. The divisional figures of percentage of persons convicted to persons arrested during the last six years are as under:—

From these it will be seen that there has been a steady fall in the percentage since 1878. This year's result, however, shows a marked improvement over that for the years 1876 or 1875 which immediately preceded the famine and in which there were no specially disturbant causes.

17. Of the 6,038 cases decided by Magistrates, convictions were obtained in 4,486 giving a percentage of 74 against 76 last year. Here Dhárwár and Kánara again come first with a percentage of 86. They both, however, have declined by 4 per cent. Belgaum and Ratnágiri follow with percentages of 72 and 71, the latter showing an improvement of 13 per cent. Kaládgi has obtained the worst result, viz. 62 per cent. against 80.

18. The information contained in the subjoined table supplies, in my opinion, better test of the efficiency of the Police than the percentages given above:—

19. The number of true cases, or rather cases retained in the crime register, shows a decrease of 2,094, being 8,768 as opposed to 10,862 last year.

20. The detective ability of the Police may be to some extent gauged from the number of convictions in cases investigated by them of their own motion. Belgaum leads with a percentage of 78. Then comes Kánara which has obtained 55 per cent. In Kaládgi and Ratnágiri the percentages are very low, being only 34 and 30 respectively. Dhárwár comes last with the worst figure of 26.

21. The percentage of convictions of persons arrested by the Police in such cases to the total number of arrests so made is also a fair criterion of the efficiency of the Police. Of the 7,250 persons arrested, 4,848 were convicted, giving a divisional percentage of 67, which is satisfactory. Belgaum heads the list with 77 per cent. Ratnágiri has obtained a creditable percentage of 76; Kaládgi, Kánara and Dhárwár follow with percentages of 65, 60 and 54 respectively.

22. *Class I., Offences against the State, public tranquillity, &c.*—These offences show but a slight increase of 6† cases. There is an increase of 10 cases in Kánara and of 19 in Ratnágiri; Belgaum, Dhárwár and Kaládgi show a decrease of 5, 2 and 16 cases respectively.

23. Twenty-nine offences relating to coin, &c., were reported and in 12 cases convictions were obtained against 7 out of 24† last year.

24. All Revenue Officers of this Division have been specially ordered to give prompt and full information to the Police regarding false or tampered with coins received by them.

25. On inquiry I learn that in the Bágévádi and Muddebihál tálukas of the Kaládgi District there is a class of people called Chaparbands who are expert in counterfeiting coins. In the former táluka there are 49 men, 353 women and 373 children, and in the latter, 20 men, 226 women and 209 children. These Chaparbands, false coiners and utterers as they are, never or very seldom attempt to pass off false coin in the vicinity of their residences. After having prepared a stock of false coin they take long journeys remaining away two or

three years at a time in distant and remote parts of India where they can pass their stock off gradually without much risk of detection.

26. *Class II., Serious offences against the person.*—Serious offences against the person show a net decrease of 73* cases, contributed chiefly by Dhárwár and Kaládgi to the extent of 44 and 34 cases respectively. There is a slight decrease of 5 cases in Kánara and of 4 in Ratnágiri, whereas Belgaum shows an increase of 14 cases.

27. The following statement shows the number of the most serious offences against the person committed during the year under report and the preceding year, and the number of convictions obtained :—

28. There is the considerable decrease of 20 cases in murders, of 1 in attempts at murder, of 10 in culpable homicide, of 9 in grievous hurt, and of 5 in kidnapping.

29. The murders may be classed as follows :—

30. The number of convictions in murder cases is the same as last year, viz. 20, which is about 61 per cent. This result is quite satisfactory. Belgaum displays remarkable success in the detection of this crime. Out of 11 cases reported in that district 8 resulted in convictions and one was disposed of after the close of the year. In this also conviction was obtained. Dhárwár did well with convictions in 7 out of 10 cases. The results of the Kaládgi District are very poor, being only 33 per cent. Only one case occurred in Kánara, which was convicted. Of the two cases in the Ratnágiri District one was acquitted and the other convicted after the close of the year.

31. In attempts at murder the Police have this year been very unsuccessful. There were 11 cases, or 1 less than last year, but convictions were secured only in 3. In Kánara one case was reported and it resulted in conviction. The Ratnágiri District was altogether free from this description of offence.

32. Cases of culpable homicide have gone down from 42 to 32, but the number of convictions has fallen from 16 to 10—not a good result. Kaládgi is the worst; there were 8 cases but no conviction was obtained in any one of them.

The result in Kánara was also bad, convictions having been obtained only in two out of nine cases. Of the remaining districts, Belgaum secured the best percentage of convictions, viz. 56; Dhárwár and Ratnágiri reached 50 each.

33. In grievous hurts, which have decreased by 9 cases, the results are more favourable. Sixty-five cases are entered in the returns and convictions were obtained in 29 of them, giving a percentage of 45 against 34 last year.

34. Kidnapping (sections 363 to 369, Indian Penal Code,) has also decreased by 5 cases, the number being 19 against 24 in 1879, but no conviction was secured. It is not often that the prosecution is successful in these cases.

35. *Class III., Serious offences against property.*—Under Class III. there is a net decrease of 328* cases which is chiefly observable in the Kaládgi District, where these offences have decreased from 483 to 161 cases.

36. *Class V., Minor offences against property.*—Of all the classes in the Return A., Part I., Class V. shows the largest decrease of 2,285† cases which is distributed among all the districts as already detailed in para. 12.

38. There is a decrease of 24 in the number of dacoities, which occurs in Kaládgi, where this crime fell from 43 to 15 cases. The apprehension of the notorious dacoit Uthráj and his gang of Bedars, who have all been convicted and sentenced‡ to rigorous imprisonment for periods varying from 7 to 12 years has had a most beneficial effect in the district, not a single case having been reported since 22nd§ July last. Belgaum shows a decrease of only 6 cases, whereas in Dhárwár and Ratnágiri the crime has increased by one, and in Kánara by 8 cases. Of the 12 cases reported in Kánara 8 were committed by a gang of Bedars from the Belgaum District. This gang consisted of 11 members, of whom one has died, one escaped, and nine have been arrested by the Kánara Police in concert with the Belgaum Police, convicted of every charge and sentenced by the Sessions Court at Belgaum, since the close of the year, to terms of transportation and imprisonment varying from 16

to 3 years. The operations conducted by Colonel McGillivray have been so successful as regards this gang that I am making a special report of the case to Government. In the course of the investigation into the Kánara dacoities, several of this gang were proved to have committed some of the Belgaum dacoities and have been convicted and sentenced for them also. Since the detection of the gang all has been quiet in Kánara.

39. The success of the Police in the detection of this crime during the year reported on may, therefore, be pronounced very satisfactory in Kaládgi, Belgaum, and Kanára where two formidable gangs were promptly hunted down and accounted for to a man. It is true that only 5 cases out of 57 have been convicted, giving a percentage of about 9. But if the results of the trials since the end of the year be taken into consideration, the proportion of convictions will rise very considerably. Ill-success has attended the Dhárwár Police, but Major Hay explains that most of these offences are not dacoities in the strict sense of the term, but highway robberies committed by Lambanis in the dusk of the evening and are difficult to detect, the terrified complainants being unable in the waning light to identify their assailants. Lambanis are very successful in concealing and disposing of stolen property, and will never give information against each other. These people have lost their cattle during the famine and have no trade or means of subsistence. Many of them formerly used to obtain their livelihood entirely by forest depredations, which are now checked.

They are not addicted to hard work, but I trust that the railway works about to commence in the Southern Marátha Country will lead to their gradually settling down as peaceful labourers.

40. Next comes robbery, which has also decreased from 199 cases in 1879 to 166 in 1880. The decrease is spread over all the districts except Kánara which remains stationary. Convictions were obtained only in 19 cases, which is a very poor result indeed.

41. Offences under "theft" and "receiving stolen property" have, as a natural consequence of the reaction from the famine, fallen off by 1,079 and 99 cases respectively.

42. *Class IV., Minor offences against the person.*—There is a net decrease of 249* cases due to Kánara and Ratnágiri, chiefly to the latter, where there is a marked decrease of 346 cases, Kánara showing a decrease of 81 cases. On the other hand there is an increase of 118 cases in Belgaum, of 21 cases in Dhárwár, and of 39 cases in Kaládgi.

43. *Hurt.*—The total number of cases of hurt under section 323, Indian Penal Code, amounts to 2,972 against 3,229† last year. The decrease is to be found in the Konkan districts of Kánara and Ratnágiri, and notably in the latter where the crime fell off from 1,042 to 703 cases. Belgaum shows an increase of 123 cases, Dhárwár of 21, and Kaládgi of 26. It may, however, be remarked that increase or decrease in this crime does not reflect discredit directly on the administration of the Police, because no amount of Police supervision can possibly stop quarrelling.

The amended Bill of Criminal Procedure Code makes this offence "non-cognizable," which is a most desirable reform.

44. *Class VI., Offences under special and local laws and other offences not specified.*—These were 1,974, or 699 more than last year.† Of this increase no less than 646 cases belong to Belgaum. The increase in this class is not a matter for regret; on the contrary it indicates

more energy on the part of the Police in enforcing local and special laws, in which duty they have hitherto been somewhat lax.

45. In the following table is shown the proportion of cases reported by the Police under section 117 of the Criminal Procedure Code to the total number of cases:—

46. If the figure against Dhárwár in column 3 is correct, it is evident that the Police of the Dhárwár District did not sufficiently avail themselves of the discretion allowed them by law. The attention of the District Superintendent has been drawn to this point. On the other hand in Ratnágiri the percentage of doubtful cases reported is exceptionally high. In explanation the District Superintendent of Police, Mr. H. Kennedy, states that in nearly all these cases the Police made full investigation before availing themselves of the provisions of section 117, Criminal Procedure Code, this course on the whole being considered safer in a district where the line between criminal and civil cases is rather narrowly drawn, and where criminal complaints are commonly lodged merely to bolster up or prepare for future civil proceedings (*vide* para. 43 of my report for last year).

47. In the following statement is given the information regarding struck-off cases, persons concerned in them, &c., required by Government Resolution No. 7841 of 27th December 1879, para. 14:—

48. It will be seen that the number of struck-off cases is less than last year by 136, but the proportion of these cases to cases reported has increased by 2 per cent., the figures being 21 as opposed to 19 in the previous year. The largest number (805) belongs to Ratnágiri and is about one-third of the total number 2,613. But it must be remembered that local peculiarities have a great deal to do with these cases, and the Police can scarcely be blamed for an increase in them. The Police are, however, responsible for arrests in false cases, and it is satisfactory to note that the number of these was not high. Of the total number of persons arrested only 1 per cent. were discharged in Belgaum and Kánara, and 2 per cent. in Ratnágiri. The percentages for Dhárwár and Kaládgi were a little higher, being 3 and 4 respectively against 2 last year.

49. On the whole the Police of this Division appear to have acted in regard to these cases with intelligence and discretion.

50. In para. 38 of my last year's report I wrote as follows:—

"I would suggest that in future the results of the Police operations in undetected cases be reviewed for at least two previous years. It seems to me doubtful from the very small proportion which cases reported in previous years and subsequently brought under inquiry bear to the number left undetected, whether after the year closes sufficient notice is taken of them. It is as important that the Police should be persistent in following up undetected crime as that they should be active on its first discovery. There is no greater deterrent to the criminal classes than the knowledge that the pursuit of the Police will never flag or be relaxed, but will be dogged pitiless and unceasing."

51. The statements marked M. and N. fully show the results of the Police operations in undetected cognizable cases standing over from the previous two years. The results are abstracted below, and, in my opinion, show that there is a strong inclination to drop undetected cases when the year in which they occurred has once passed by:—

52. Convictions were obtained chiefly in cases of theft and in minor offences, which formed the greater portion of the undetected cases standing over. The results in Belgaum, Kaládgi, and Ratnágiri in the detection of these cases

are on the whole satisfactory. In Dhárwár and Kánara such cases seem to have engaged little attention. I hope, however, that the Superintendents of Police, on whom the necessity of persistent efforts for detection in after years has lately been impressed, will strive to secure better results in future.

NON-COGNIZABLE CRIME.

53. The following is an abstract of Statement A., Part II., and exhibits the results obtained in non-cognizable offences for each district in contrast with the same for the preceding year:—

54. This species of crime shows a slight increase of 43 cases in the Division, the total number of crimes committed being 2,027 against 1,984 last year.

55. In Belgaum the figures fell from 452 to 375, and in Ratnágiri from 312 to 271; but this decrease is more than counterbalanced by an increase in the remaining districts. In connection with these cases 3,127 persons were apprehended or summoned, of whom 1,402 or 45 per cent. were convicted. This result is less favourable than last year by 9 per cent. All the districts, it is to be regretted, contribute towards this falling off. Belgaum has declined by 10 per cent., Dhárwár by 11, Kaládgi by 8, Kánara by 5, and Ratnágiri by 11. Dhárwár has obtained the best percentage, viz. 52, and Ratnágiri stands last with a percentage of 36 only. The property concerned in these cases is reported to have been recovered.

56. In the subjoined two tables are shown separately the number of non-cognizable cases in which the Police were employed, and those which were taken up direct by Magistrates:—

57. Notwithstanding an increase in the number of cases, the number referred to the Police for inquiry was less than last year by 54. This betokens industry and promptitude on the part of the Magistrates.

58. The percentage of non-cognizable offences in which the Police were employed in the several districts is as follows:—

The percentages are more uniform than last year. Ratnágiri, however, forms an exception. There the percentage has risen from 68 to 73. This is, as I stated in past years' reports, due to the litigious disposition of the people, who generally repair to Police and Magisterial authorities complaining of trespass, land-boundary disputes, right of way and the like. Moreover, as I have frequently stated, the first phase of a dispute as to immoveable property in this district is invariably for one or other of the parties to accuse the other of criminal trespass on the disputed land, or of mischief in removing some wall or fence, or of theft in taking the produce of a disputed field or fruit-tree, with a view to get, by a decision in a criminal case, some better standing ground or evidence for the civil suit to follow. In such deliberate and premeditated complaints reconciliation is an impossibility, and the cases are of necessity referred to the Police for local inquiry.

59. In the 461 cases referred to the Police, 659 persons were apprehended or summoned, of whom 285 or 43 per cent. were convicted as compared with 56 per cent. last year. This falling off is due to Kaládgi and Ratnágiri, which have declined by 30 and 23 per cent. respectively.

60. In the 1,566 cases taken up by the Magistrates direct, 2,468 persons were apprehended or summoned. Of these 1,117 or 45 per cent. were convicted, a result also less favourable than last year by 8 per cent. The decrease is distributed more or less among all the districts in the Division, except Ratnágiri, which shows an increase of 19 per cent.

61. The aggregate value of property stolen and recovered during the year under review and the previous year is given in the following statement:—

62. It is satisfactory to note that the value of property stolen is about Rs. 41,000 less than last year. The percentage of recoveries has, however, fallen by 1 per cent., being 43 against 44 in 1879. Ratnágiri occupies the first place with a percentage of 66 as opposed to 62 last year. Next comes Kánara, which shows a percentage of 62 against 30 in the preceding year. Kaládgi has declined from 45 to 42, Belgaum from 48 to 38, and Dhárwár from 34 to 26, which is the poorest percentage in the Division. The falling off in the last three districts has not been satisfactorily explained and is not creditable to the Police.

63. The special attention of the District Superintendents of Police has been drawn to this important part of their duty, and quarterly returns of stolen property recovered obtained, explaining the chief causes of failure in the recovery. A careful scrutiny of these returns will, I hope, secure better results in future.

Statement D.

64. Police from the regular force and shetsandis and peons noted in the margin were quartered, as usual, at the annual fairs of Yemnur* in the Navalgund and Guddguddapur† in the Ránebennur talukas of the Dhárwár District. The former lasted for four days from 30th March to 2nd April and the latter for three days from 12th to 14th October. The number of people assembled at Yemnur was about 31,000 and that at Guddguddapur about 10,000.

65. During the year under report it was not found necessary to establish any punitive Police Posts and the posts at Hebli and Ingalhalli in Dhárwár and at Guleddgudd in Kaládgi were withdrawn.

Statement E.

66. The total sanctioned strength of the Police including the Superintendents in this Division is 3,469, and was maintained during the year at a cost of Rs. 5,36,215. It was distributed as follows:—

The average proportion of the whole Police force to the area and population of the Division is 1 Policeman to 7 square miles and to 1,233 souls.

68. Of the whole force of the Division, 1,847 are armed with fire-arms, 216 with swords only or with both swords and batons, and 1,401 are provided with batons only.

70. The proportion of punishments has decreased in all the districts except Kaládgi, where it has slightly risen. The percentage in Dhárwár (33) is the highest in the Division, but I have not found that Major Hay is over severe, but the contrary.

Five officers and 31 men were punished judicially against 4 officers and 40 men in the last year.

71. On the other hand, 343 officers and men were rewarded by promotion and 41 by money rewards, the number so rewarded in the previous year being 418 and 56 respectively.

The District Superintendent of Police, Kaládgi, returns only one man as rewarded by promotion. He has evidently acted on the suggestion made in para. 55 of my last report, to the effect that it would be more correct to enter in this statement only those promotions which were made in recognition of special good service and not all promotions made in the ordinary course. This course will be universally adopted in future.

72. Considerable improvement is observable in the education of the Police: 331 officers and 817 men, or 33 per cent. of the whole force, are reported to be able to read and write against 30 per cent. last year. Ratnágiri has a percentage of 53 and stands foremost in this respect. Sixty officers and 702 men were under instruction, as compared with 52 officers and 608 men in the previous year.

74. It will be seen that there were 22 instances of escapes from the custody of the district and village Police during the year under report, of which 9 were in Dhárwár, 7 in Ratnágiri, 3 in Belgaum, 2 in Kaládgi and 1 in Kánara. Out of the 9 persons who escaped from the custody of the Dhárwár Police only 2 were recaptured, which gives a percentage of 22. This would indicate that the Dhárwár Police were as unsuccessful in re-arresting escaped prisoners as they were remiss in allowing escapes from their custody. One of these prisoners was the notorious dacoit Kurvati, who had previously effected his escape from the Dhárwár Jail under circumstances which left considerable doubt as to how far he might not have been aided by the jail guards, and who after his recapture in the year under report again escaped from the custody of the Police while being brought to Dhárwár. I had the satisfaction to report that while he was recently engaged in a burglary he was captured after being mortally injured by two villagers.

75. Of the 7 persons who escaped from the custody of the Ratnágiri Police 5 were recaptured, giving a percentage of 71, which is satisfactory.

76. Three persons escaped in Belgaum of whom, again, none were reapprehended.

77. Kaládgi and Kánara call for no special remark.

78. Due notice has been taken of the conduct of the Policemen found to blame for escape. They have been 29. Seventeen of them were criminally prosecuted and 12 departmentally punished.

Progress in drill, G. R.
No. 4500 of 28th July 1879.

81. The divisional percentage 53 is satisfactory. The results in Dhárwár and Ratnágiri are creditable to the Superintendents. The progress made in Belgaum is fair. But the percentages of Kaládgi and Kánara are very small. In explanation of the smallness of his percentage the District Superintendent of Police, Kaládgi, states that the system adopted in his district is to employ all the drill instructors at head-quarters. Men enlisted and those that come in from the tálukas are enrolled in the various squads, according to the degree of knowledge they possess, and are promoted to more advanced squad as they improve in drill. The first squad, when thoroughly instructed, is passed by the Superintendent and is then split up into small detachments, which are sent to tálukas and a similar number of untaught men brought to head-quarters. By this means every man before being sent into the district receives a thorough instruction in drill. The Superintendent promises that by the end of the current year the greater portion, if not the whole force, will have been thoroughly drilled. In Kánara, as reported last year, a large number of men were drafted to new posts temporarily placed on the Goa Frontier for the purpose of the Portuguese Treaty. The Superintendent, therefore, could not send any men to Dhárwár for instruction in drill till the last monsoon, and these men returned qualified as drill-masters only in October last. The Kánara Police, however, know the old drill, and the Superintendent states that they will be tolerably perfect in the new drill by the end of this year.

Statement G.

82. There were 6 Europeans and 3,394 natives in the force on 1st January 1881. Of the Europeans, 5 were Superintendents, and one the Port Constable at Kárwár; and of the natives 564 were officers and 2,830 men. Including the Superintendents there were 570 officers, of whom 9 were Christians, 194 Mahomedans, 366 Hindus, and 1 African; of 2,830 men, 56 were Christians, 1,140 Mahomedans, and 1,634 Hindus.

Statement H.

83. During the year under report Rs. 18,745 were spent on Police buildings as against Rs. 12,623 the preceding year. The expenditure by the Public Works Department, which is included in the above amount, was Rs. 9,507, and

the remaining Rs. 9,238 were spent departmentally on petty constructions and repairs. The question of providing proper accommodation to the Police is a pressing one, but want of funds has hitherto greatly retarded progress in this matter.

Statement J.

84. This statement shows the number of cases personally investigated by the District Superintendent of Police. The following is an abstract of it, showing at a glance the number of cases in which these officers personally visited the scenes of crime :—

85. In this duty Major Hay in Dhárwár has shown great activity.

86. The District Superintendent of Police, Kánara, also has done exceedingly well, and it was entirely owing to his personal activity that the Bedar dacoit gang was so speedily and satisfactorily disposed of.

87. In Kaládgi, Mr. M. Kennedy, who held charge of the Superintendent's Office for 8 months, visited with remarkable promptitude the scenes of 11 offences out of 19 which occurred during his incumbency. During the remaining period of 4 months when Mr. Yates was Acting District Superintendent, 4 cases of dacoity, 2 of murder, and 1 of culpable homicide occurred, but he did not visit the scene of crime in a single instance. Four dacoities and one murder took place in July, when, Mr. Yates explains, owing to great distance and bad roads, he could not have reached the spots in time to be of use. On the occasion of the other murder he was prevented from visiting the scene by illness; and when the homicide occurred he was absent on unofficial leave. Mr. Yates' explanation is not satisfactory, and he has been directed to pay greater attention to the orders of Government on the subject.

88. Major Payne, who was District Superintendent of Police, Belgaum, from 1st January to 6th March, visited the scene of offence in only one out of 7 cases. As reported last year, he has left nothing on the records to show why he did not visit the scenes of the remaining cases. Colonel Bartholomew visited the scene of three cases out of 16, and the reasons assigned by him for his not having done so in other cases are not generally satisfactory. On one occasion I was obliged to order him by telegraph to go to the scene of a murder committed near him, which he should have visited without being pressed to do so by me.

89. The return of the Ratnágiri District calls for no special remarks under this head.

GENERAL REMARKS.

90. The Belgaum Police have improved considerably during the year under report, but there is still much to be done. The administration in Ratnágiri and Kánara was satisfactory. The Police in the Dhárwár and Kaládgi districts, it is to be regretted, show deterioration. There is, however, much greater difficulty in getting, and afterwards retaining, good men in these districts than in any other.

91. Government are aware that my special duty in connection with the Anglo-Portuguese Treaty rendered it necessary for me to remain at Goa for a considerable portion of the touring season. I had also to accompany the Portuguese Delegate to Calcutta. I, however, visited Belgaum, Dhárwár and Ratnágiri, and inspected the Police lines and schools at these stations. I also

reported to Government the urgent necessity for providing additional accommodation for the men at Dhárwár and submitted proposals, which were approved* and sanctioned by Government. These have since been nearly carried out, and the Police, who were badly off in this respect, are now comfortably lodged.

*Resolution No. $\frac{181 \text{ C.W.}}{450}$ of 7th May 1880.

92. Mr. Sheppard, who was acting for me, visited the Kaládgi District, and inspected the Police lines and the schools at head-quarters. He examined the accounts at head-quarters and in tálukas, and found them generally satisfactory.

93. The examination of the accounts and records showed that there was great laxity of supervision on the part of some of the District Superintendents of Police; but, as forms for these accounts, &c., have been lately fixed under the orders of Government, a thorough inspection of them may be fairly exacted from the Superintendents in future. I have therefore called upon them in future reports to give a brief account of the result of their inspection, and any important points raised by them will be noticed in my own report.

94. In conclusion, I have the pleasure to bring prominently to the notice of Government the names of Colonel McGillivray and Mr. M. Kennedy, who, the one in Kánara and the other in Kaládgi, promptly followed up and captured two separate gangs of Bedar dacoits, who, under less vigorous and active officers, might, in a very short time, have given very serious trouble at a time when the Southern Marátha Country, at no time over-garrisoned, was denuded of troops for the Afghán war.

6. There were 2,921 cases of cognizable crime reported during the year under review against 2,435 in 1879. The increase chiefly appears in cases under special and local laws, which shows that greater attention has been paid to such matters. Non-cognizable crime has decreased from 452 to 375 cases. The amount of property stolen during the year was Rs. 35,554 against Rs. 53,786 in 1879. Of this, Rs. 13,372, or 38 per cent., was recovered, which is less than last year by 10 per cent.

7. There were 11 murders against 13 last year. In 8 of these convictions were obtained, and one was disposed of after the close of the year, which also resulted in conviction. One was discharged and one stands over, the details of which are as follows:—

The owner of a liquor shop at Desur in the Belgaum Taluka complained that a theft had been committed in his house and said that he suspected one Mahádu Kinikar. The patel went to search his house. On this Mahádu ran to the house of one Bharma Shetsandi, seized his sword and attacked the patel, who saved himself in a shop. He then cut down the Shetsandi who was trying to arrest him, and ran off into the hills. His whereabouts have not yet been ascertained.

8. Seven cases of culpable homicide were reported against 9 in the previous year. In 4 cases convictions were obtained during the year, and in one after its close. One was struck off and the remaining one reported to the Magistrate under section 125 of the Criminal Procedure Code, the details of which are as follows:—

On the 2nd January 1880 at Hounápur, taluka Sampgaon, one Rája Thudkod went to the house of one Sewrudráppa to beg. Sewrudráppa was supposed to have pushed him down and he died from the injuries received. On inquiry it appeared that the complaint was trumped up by the Police Patel in consequence of enmity which existed between him and the accused.

9. Under this head there were 13 cases against 19 of the previous year. Of these 13 cases only two have been convicted, two have been discharged by the Magistrate, and two reported to the Magistrate under section 117, Criminal Procedure Code. In the remaining 7 cases no clue has as yet been obtained. This result is by no means creditable to the Police.

10. The number of accidental deaths and suicides reported during the year is 337, or 101 less than last year. The details are as follows:—

13. Major C. Hay was in charge of the office of the District Superintendent of Police throughout the year.

14. Three officers and 17 constables were punished judicially, and 45 officers and 171 constables were punished departmentally, and one officer and 28 constables were dismissed. Major Hay is not a harsh officer, and such a large number of punishments does not speak well for the Police.

Conduct of the force.

15. Eighty officers and 164 constables are reported to be able to read and write, showing an increase of 25 over the last year.

Education.

16. New lines were built at Warur and Taras; sites and old buildings were purchased at Gadag, Shiggaon, and Karajgi, and the buildings were altered and repaired so as to make them convenient habitations for the Police.

Barrack accommodation.

At head-quarters 10 new houses for savárs were completed, and 40 new houses were under construction and 60 old huts were being repaired departmentally. Two buildings in the Fort were also divided into 46 huts and adapted for the Police by the Public Works Department.

17. The returns show a decrease of 682 in cognizable crimes, the number reported being 2,544 against 3,226 in 1879. The non-cognizable crimes during the year were 568, showing a slight increase of 8 cases. The value of the property stolen is reported to be Rs. 61,946, of which Rs. 16,368 was recovered, giving a percentage of 26 against 34 last year.

Fluctuation of crime.

18. There were 10 cases of murder as compared with 19 in the previous year. Two were struck off as no crime, in one the accused were discharged by the Magistrate, and 7 were committed to the Sessions where 5 were convicted and 2 acquitted.

Murders.

19. Four cases under this head were reported against 10 in 1879. One was struck off as no crime, and three committed to the Sessions where conviction was obtained in two and one was acquitted.

Culpable homicide.

20. Of this crime there were 15 cases as compared with 14 in 1879. In 4 cases offenders were committed to the Sessions but conviction was obtained only in one case. One was discharged by the Magistrate, 3 were struck off as no crime, and 7 remain undetected.

Dacoities.

21. There were 133 suicides and 194 accidental deaths, giving a total of 327 against 449 in the last year. The particulars are as follows:—

22. Four hundred and seventy-two licenses to carry arms were issued for 1880. Four licenses to sell ammunition have been granted, 3 in Dhárwár and one in Gadag. The sale of ammunition is almost entirely confined to Europeans for sporting purposes. The stock and accounts of the shops have been examined.

25. The conduct of the force is reported by the Superintendent of Police to have been generally satisfactory. One officer and 5 men were dismissed and 32 officers and 99 men were fined, degraded, &c., departmentally. Only one man was punished judicially.

26. The force is most backward in point of education, which is particularly explained by the district itself being far behind as compared with other districts. Only 38 officers and 66 men are reported to be able to read and write.

27. The district has been much neglected in this matter. No new buildings were constructed during the year under review. Special instructions have been issued to the District Superintendent with a view to provide funds in the ensuing year's budget.

28. The total number of cases of both cognizable and non-cognizable crime amounted to 1,837, showing a large net decrease of 1,288 cases as compared with last year when the number was 3,125. The number of cognizable cases decreased from 2,857 to 1,484 and the decrease is to be found mainly in offences against property. Non-cognizable cases have increased from 268 to 353. The value of property stolen amounted to Rs. 21,158, which is less than one-third of the last year's figure (Rs. 68,042). Rs. 8,954 worth of property was recovered, giving a percentage of 42 against 45 in 1879.

29. There were 9 cases of murder as against 16 last year. Of these 9 cases, 3 were convicted and 4 acquitted by the Court of Sessions. One was struck off as no crime. In the remaining case the accused (3), after conviction by the Court of Sessions, were released on appeal to the High Court. This was a most brutal murder; its details are given below :—

At Kannoli in the Sindgi Taluka, three men entered the house of one Krishnáji Kulkarni, while he, his wife Rádhábái, and their daughter, a child of 3 years of age, were asleep; and with a hammer and a stick beat to death Krishnáji and his daughter and so severely injured Rádhábái that it was doubtful whether she would recover or not. The assailants were disguised, and, without removing any property, decamped leaving behind them a pair of sandals, the hammer and the stick. After a few days Rádhábái recovered and gave the names of three men, by caste Bráhmans, as being the murderers. These men had for a long time previous to Krishnáji's murder been on very bad terms with him. Evidence having been obtained in support of Rádhábái's statement, they were arrested and sent to the First Class Magistrate, who committed them for trial by the Court of Sessions. Two of the accused were sentenced to death and the third to transportation for life.

On appeal to the High Court, I regret to say, that the convictions and sentences were reversed and the accused were released.

It may be noted that the assessors were unanimous in favour of the conviction.

The High Court held that the evidence to connect the sandals found on the spot with one of the accused was exceedingly weak and unreliable, and that the evidence to show enmity on the part of the accused did not establish any recent quarrel nor any sufficient motive for the perpetration of so brutal a murder.

Rádhábái, who was a principal witness for prosecution, professed to have recognised all the three accused; but her previous statement before the Second

Class Magistrate, who examined her when she was believed to be dying, that she *did not recognize* the nocturnal intruders proved fatal to the conviction when considered in the High Court.

The High Court, however, remarked :—

“It is not suggested that there is any other person who had such ill-feeling against the deceased as to have been likely to compass his death; and it is therefore in the highest degree probable that the accused or some or one of them committed the murder.”

Thus there was a failure of justice, but nothing further could be done, and the Police are not to blame.

30. Of culpable homicide there were 8 cases; 5 were struck off as false and one has been reported to the Magistrate under section 117 of the Criminal Procedure Code. Of the remaining two cases one was discharged by the Magistrate and the other acquitted by the Court of Sessions.

31. Under this head 15 cases were reported, of which 5 were false. One was convicted and one acquitted by the Court of Sessions, and 8 remained undetected.

32. The number of accidental deaths and suicides reported during the year was 305, as shown below :—

33. The provisions of the Arms Act have been carefully carried out. Three hundred and twenty-one licenses were granted for possessing and carrying arms and 157 arms were confiscated for want of proper licenses. The accounts of all licensed vendors of powder, &c., were inspected.

35. Lieutenant T. R. M. Macpherson was in charge of the office of District Superintendent of Police from 1st January to 28th May and Lieutenant-Colonel S. F. McGillivray from 29th May to the close of the year.

36. The conduct of the Police during the year is reported to have been good. Two officers and 15 men were dismissed the force, 5 men were punished judicially, and 15 officers and 72 men departmentally; thus altogether 17 officers and 92 men were punished against 27 officers and 82 men last year.

37. Sixty officers and 175 men are able to read and write. The decrease of 17 in the number of officers as compared with the previous year is accounted for by the fact that last year's return included men who could write only Maráthi, whereas in the present return are shown only those who are able to read and write a report in Kánarese.

38. New station-houses were constructed at Mijually in the Mundgod Peta and Bhagwati in the Haliyál Táluka, and accommodation for 14 constables was added to the Siddápur Táluka head-quarter lines. Station-houses at Nilkund and Nidgod in the Siddápur Táluka and Chándwádi in the Supa Peta were in the course of erection. Good Police lines are more urgently required in this district than elsewhere, the climate being proverbially inclement and unhealthy excepting on the sea-coast.

39. The number of cognizable offences reported during the year is 1,834 and of non-cognizable 460, the figures for 1879 being 2,120 and 392 respectively. Thus cognizable crime has decreased by 286 cases, whereas the non-cognizable cases show an increase of 68. The value of property stolen amounted to Rs. 38,182, of which Rs. 23,777 worth of property was recovered, giving a percentage of 62. This is very satisfactory, showing as it does an improvement of 32 per cent. over the previous year.

40. There was only one case of murder, and it resulted in conviction.

41. Nine cases of culpable homicide were reported. Conviction was secured in one, 5 resulted in acquittal and the remaining 3 were discharged by the Magistrate.

42. There were 12 cases of dacoity against 4 last year. Of these 2 were struck off as no crime, one was pending at the close of the year and has since been acquitted, and 9 remain of which no less than 8 were committed by the gang of Bedars referred to in para. 38 of Part I., and in 5 there has been a conviction since the close of the year.

43. There were 28 suicides and 176 accidental deaths during the year. The details are as follows :—

I regret to have again to report an increase, the number of offences during 1880 having exceeded those during 1879 by 141. This increase is mainly attributable to a large increase of crime in the Shikarpur District, as there has been, as the following table shows, a decrease in every other district in the Province. I have excluded "struck-off" cases in this calculation for the sake of comparison with last year's figures; next year these cases will be included.

5. The general increase would have been disappointing were I not satisfied from inquiry made that many cases have this year been entered in the register which would in previous years not have been so. This change is owing to the stricter rules now in force for recording complaints.

6. The number of persons arrested was less than during the previous year by 1,883, but the number of convictions was less by 2,280. The number of

acquittals was, however, also less by 369. The percentage of convictions to arrests was 52·06 against 57·1 last year, the percentage being almost the same as in 1878 :—

8. This table shows a marked increase in crime since the great scarcity of 1878, but the turning point has been passed and in the districts of Karáchi, Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar the decrease in crime during 1880 is marked.

COGNIZABLE CRIME.

9. The number of cognizable offences entered in the crime register during 1880 was, excluding struck-off cases, 13,122 against 12,729 for the previous year and 10,677 in 1878. This steady increase in crime is much to be deplored, but now that the Afghán War is at an end and matters are settling down into their ordinary groove, it may be hoped that the excess of crime, attributable partly to high prices and partly to the large number of the lower classes (including many addicted to crime) attracted during the war to Sind in the hope of finding employment on the Railway works or in other ways, may shortly disappear. A decrease, as the following details show, has commenced everywhere but in the Shikárpur District.

12. This shows a marked falling off in the percentage of convictions to arrests, which is nowhere satisfactorily explained. It may be instructive, however, to notice the descriptions of crime in which increases have been most marked, and the following table shows this as regards the more serious forms of crime :—

13. This statement shows there has been a decrease in the number of cases that find a place in this statement. This is mainly attributable to the large decrease (778) in public and local nuisance cases, but there is also a decrease (146) in cases of ordinary theft and of 90 in cases of house-breaking. There is, however, a large increase in some kinds of crime: there are two dacoity cases (a very rare crime in Sind) and an increase in cattle-thefts amounting to 159, offences against the person other than murder to 53, while the number of murders increased by 13. Thus there has been a marked increase in what may be termed crimes of violence. Still these figures show that we must look elsewhere for an explanation of the increase in the number of cases, and when this is done it becomes apparent that the increase is almost entirely due to an increase in petty hurt cases, a description of crime for which the Police cannot be held responsible. The Superintendents of Police again point out how much the time of the Police is taken up by petty hurt cases, and it is certainly worth while considering whether simple hurt might not with advantage be made a non-cognizable offence.

14. One other reason for an increase is that Magistrates have this year struck off cases with much greater care, and many cases have remained on the register that would last year have been struck out, only 1,206 cases having been struck off against 3,575 last year.

15. The increase in the number of cases against the person is not easily explained and no explanation has been attempted by the Superintendents. The

most serious increase in crime is that under cattle-thefts. This increase is mainly in the Shikárpur District, the increase there being 268. The only explanation I have heard of this sudden increase is that owing to the sudden and most urgent demand for cattle for transport purposes, unusual facilities were afforded for disposing rapidly of stolen cattle, and that many bullocks were stolen and disposed of in this way. This cause may be the true one, or may have had something to do with the increase. There is no positive proof on the subject, as I have not been able to learn that any instances of the kind referred to were discovered by the Police.

16. The following statement gives fuller details regarding Police operations in connection with all cognizable crime, showing how the cases and accused persons concerned in them were dealt with in each district, and in this statement struck-off cases are included and also cases belonging to the previous year inquired into during the year 1880:—

18. The above statement sets forth the actual working of the Police during the year in much greater detail than the statements that preceded it, as it includes all cases reported in previous years but inquired into during the year and cases "struck off" the crime register as "no crime." It also shows the number of cases reported to the Police but dealt with under section 117 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, *i. e.*, in which they merely reported details of a complaint made to them, but did not investigate into the charge, and also the cases inquired into but referred for orders under section 125 of the Code. There were 1,206 cases struck off by order of Magistrates during the year, but this number does not include all cases reported for orders under section 117, nor have the Superintendents anywhere shown how many of these cases were actually struck off. The statement shows that the total number of cognizable cases brought before the Police was 14,722 against 16,631 in 1879. If struck-off cases are deducted, the number of cases taken up by the Police were, in 1880, 13,516, and, in 1879, 13,056, or an excess of 460 in 1880 which is fully explained by the greater care in striking out cases. The number of struck-off cases is far less than last year, 1,206 against 3,575, and the number of persons arrested in such cases 1,410 against 2,871. Still it is evident that had not a stricter system been introduced, there would have been no increase in cognizable crime to explain. From the number of cases struck off or reported under section 117 or 125 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, it would seem that a very large number of complaints are made to the Police without reason; many complaints were on inquiry deemed to be false, or were of so trumpery a nature that the Police did not feel justified in interfering. This betrays a bad state of things, and shows that false complaints, probably for the sake of giving annoyance, have been far too common. It is only by careful superintendence that this can be checked, but it may be hoped that the orders issued regarding making a proper use of the powers conferred by sections 117 and 125 may tend to check this evil.

19. The number of persons arrested was much smaller than in the previous year, only 14,778 against 19,107, but the number convicted was also much smaller; but I will not attempt to draw further conclusions from the figures, as it seems to me the District Superintendents, owing to the recent changes made in the forms, have made some incorrect entries, and any arguments based on them might be only misleading.

Arms Act.

20. Information regarding the working on this Act will be found in Part II.

NON-COGNIZABLE CRIME.

21. To turn now to offences not cognizable by the Police, the following tables show the number of such cases in which the Police were employed and those taken up directly by the Magistrates:—

22. The increase in the number of cases in which the Police were employed is very great and shows, I fear, that the Subordinate Magistrates have, without sufficient consideration, referred petty cases to the Police. The number of cases taken up by Magistrates shows a considerable decrease over the previous year, and the total number of cases is less by 252. The percentage of convictions in the above classes of cases is still low and is specially bad in the Shikarpur District.

24. The above figures, especially those for the Shikarpur and Hyderabad districts, are far from good. The usual explanation is given by the Superintendents that the property stolen in one or two cases in which jewels and property of value was stolen has remained undetected and no part of the property has been recovered. One case of this kind, in which a number of costly jewels are carried off, is quite enough to alter altogether the general result of a district.

STRENGTH OF THE POLICE.

25. The Police force has been increased during the year in consequence of the opening of the Indus Valley State Railway and of the branch line through

Jacobabad to Sibi. The establishment newly sanctioned for these duties is:—

26. The sanctioned strength of the force at the close of the year (including four Superintendents and Assistant Superintendents) was 4,140; the population of Sind according to the census of 1872 was 2,201,241, and the area 46,860 square miles. A large part of this force may be called special, and is not available for general Police purposes. For instance, the frontier force in the Karáchi District is really a quasi-military force kept up to prevent the Biluch tribes from beyond our frontier plundering as they formerly did inside our borders. Again, the force on the Sind, Delhi and Panjáb Railway numbers 2 officers and 105 men, while, as already mentioned, the State Railway Police has a force for duties specially connected with it. In like manner a considerable number of Police are employed solely on jail guards or in large towns where their services are required and paid for by the Municipalities. The following was the distribution of the force at the close of the year:—

28. The District Police force in Sind appears strong in comparison with that in other parts of the Presidency, but, as there are village establishments elsewhere by whom a very large part of the Police work is performed and none in Sind, no real comparison between the two is possible. The real detectives everywhere, except in large towns, are the village Police, and I entirely agree with the remarks made regarding this class by Mr. A. Crawford in his report last year. The want of village establishment in Sind for both Police and revenue purposes has long been admitted, and it may be hoped that the deficiency will ere long be supplied. The want of village Police establishments, too, throws a great deal of miscellaneous work on the District Police, and this renders the service, as pointed out last year, both irksome and unpopular. The following figures show the number of summonses, notices, &c., made over to and served through the Police:—

29. The following statement shows the state of education in the Police force in each district. Only 15 per cent. of the officers and men employed can read and write, and, of those returned as able, I fear many can only do so with difficulty. In the Northern Division last year I see the percentage was 21 and in the Central Division 24; so Sind is still far in the back ground :—

30. A good deal of attention has been paid during the year to the drilling both of the mounted and foot branches of the force. In the Karachi District, as a better drill instructor than was available was found necessary, the services of a pensioned officer of the 29th or 2nd Biluch Regiment were obtained with the sanction of Government to drill the foot Police, but he did not commence drilling the men till after the close of the year, and at Hyderabad the services of a pensioned Subhedar of the 24th N. I. were obtained for a like purpose, while a pensioner from the Sind Horse was entertained to drill the mounted men of the force. In the Thar and Parkar and Shikarpur districts there are also qualified instructors; already a marked improvement is observable in the bearing and drill of the men, and with further teaching a still more decided improvement may be looked for. In the Frontier District, owing to the unusual amount of work thrown on the Police, it was found impossible to attend to their drill.

31. The number of cases of suicide and the number of accidental deaths during the year, contrasted with those of the previous year, is as follows :—

PERSONAL INVESTIGATION OF SERIOUS CRIME.

32. Last year and also in the year preceding, I was compelled to comment somewhat strongly on the want of activity displayed by the Superintendents of Police in the matter of visiting at once the scene of serious crime. In my last report I expressed a hope that I should have a different state of things to report this year. In this I have not been disappointed, for, whereas the number of cases which the Superintendents last year deemed sufficiently important to call for their presence was five only, this year the number amounts to 36. This is a great advance, and I hope that a still further improvement may be noted next year. The districts in Sind are so large and at seasons moving is so difficult, that visiting the scene of crimes at once is more difficult than in districts in the Presidency.

33. During the year there have been changes in the heads of the Police in each district, and thus the annual reports have been furnished by officers without personal knowledge, and this has necessitated many references which has greatly delayed the submission of this report. I was anything but satisfied with the way some of the reports were sent in, but I hope the same complaint is not likely to be repeated.

34. The working of the Police in a Sind district is a more difficult matter than in the Presidency, and requires greater experience and judgment, as, owing to the absence of village officers, a great deal more responsibility is thrown upon the District Police, and much depends on the Superintendent. If he is able to manage the Zamindárs judiciously he may get valuable help from them, but if he does not they render little or no assistance. All the Superintendents have exerted themselves during the year. Mr. Giertzen did good service on the frontier of Biluchistán, and both Messrs. McIver and Henderson worked well. The latter, however, had a very difficult charge, rendered unusually so by the masses of troops, followers, baggage animals, supplies, &c., constantly passing through the district, which required either to be assisted or watched. I do not consider that Mr. Henderson had sufficient experience for so difficult a charge,—a charge I have no hesitation in terming one of the most difficult to be found. If the results attained were not altogether satisfactory, this was not in consequence of neglect or carelessness on his part, but because the charge was too much for him. He has now been succeeded by a still more youthful Superintendent, which is much to be regretted as the charge requires a man with abundant experience.

35. Government, during the year, (Government Resolution No. 7137, dated 22nd October,) passed orders for regulating the introduction of a new system of keeping Police accounts. The changes sanctioned were not, however, introduced during the year and will therefore be noticed in next year's report.

3. There seems to have been some improvement in the conduct of the lower grades in the Police, as only 150 Constables were punished departmentally against 252 in 1880, but the conduct of the officers was far from satisfactory; 65 were punished departmentally against 48 last year. Twenty officers and 25 men were punished judicially against 2 and 4 in the previous year. The force is far from being in good order; many of the officers are of little or no use, and it is found impossible to get men of the stamp required to fill the place of Chief Constable. So long as this class of officers remains inefficient, there is little chance of much real improvement in the general working of the Police.

4. The quarters occupied by the town Police are in good order. The lines used by the armed Police are some old infantry pen-dalls built 35 years ago. They are constructed of mud bricks with a mud roof, but both the wood work and walls are now in a decayed state. The Superintendent is anxious for new lines, but so long as the present ones continue safe I am unwilling to take up the subject of improved accommodation for the Police, as I think there are many other buildings more urgently required, especially new offices for mukhtyárkars. The Police stations throughout the districts are reported by the Superintendent to be in "fair condition."

5. There were, including struck-off cases, 3,551 cognizable cases, or, deducting 495 cases struck off, 3,056 cognizable cases during the year against 3,087 in 1879, showing a decrease of 31. In this year's returns "struck-off" cases are shown which they were not last year; so no comparison is possible except by adding struck-off cases to last year's figures.

This shows a decrease of 31 cases retained on the register, and a decrease of 170 cases in the number struck off altogether. The only really unsatisfactory feature in the return is the increase in cattle-thefts, but this increase did not occur on the Frontier, where there was a decrease, but in other parts. Major Simpson offers no explanation. He writes as follows:—

"Cattle-thefts have increased by 161, ordinary thefts decreased by 35, murder by 3, and highway robbery by 4. The increase in the number of cattle-thefts has led to an increase in the value of property stolen, which amounts to Rs. 94,658 against Rs. 75,156 in 1879. The recoveries have been 52.59 to 57.59 during last year. There were 242 cases in which property under Re. 1 was stolen. The number of persons arrested has decreased by 253, being 3,390 against 3,643 last year. The percentage of convictions to arrests has fallen from 63 to 57. There has, however, been an increase of percentage in the number of persons convicted to persons brought to trial, viz. 88.61 against 87.59 last year."

6. There were 6 murders during the year against 9 in 1879, but 3 of the previous year's cases were disposed of during the year, so that nine were under inquiry. Of this year's cases—

- 2 resulted from intrigues with women. . .
- 2 from jealousy. . .
- 2 from avarice or a desire to obtain ornaments.

In four cases the accused were convicted and in three the murderers, five in number, were sentenced to death, and in the remaining case to transportation for life. One case, in which robbery had been the object, remained undetected and in one the murderer escaped across the border into Kelat territory where he died before his extradition could be arranged for. All three last year's cases resulted in convictions.

7. There were two cases of attempt at murder, in both of which the accused were sentenced to transportation for life. There was also one case of culpable homicide. Three men of the Chuto tribe attacked and beat so severely a man of the Chang tribe who had been

carrying on an intrigue with a woman of the tribe, that he died next day. The three Chutas were convicted and sentenced to be transported, one for life, the two others for 7 and 5 years respectively.

8. One case appears under this head, but it is only technically a dacoity case on account of the number of persons engaged. Five persons stopped a Pathán traveller and demanded Rs. 500 from him, which he gave them. Four of the culprits were convicted and sentenced, two to 7 years' and two to 5 years' rigorous imprisonment. Rs. 250 only were recovered.

9. Three cases were prosecuted under the Arms Act and convictions obtained. Forty-three muskets and 12 swords were confiscated as belonging to various persons who had no license to carry them. Two persons were found in possession of firearms without a license; in one case the gun was suspected to have been stolen. The third case was that of a licensed dealer having exported gunpowder into foreign territory contrary to the conditions of his license. The issue of Government notification of the 1st October 1880, No. 1560, forbidding the export of arms and ammunition to the Persian Gulf, rendered an inspection of vessels leaving Karáchi port for the Gulf a necessity, and under an arrangement made between the Police and the Customs Department every vessel when leaving for the Persian Gulf has been boarded and no arms and ammunition are allowed to pass unless covered by a proper permit or pass.

13. The Kafila trade appears to have been depressed owing to the war in Southern Afghánistan. There were only 30 Kafilas with 600 camels and 40 donkeys during the year. The trade in horses was completely stopped.

14. One hundred and eighty-two fires were reported. The property destroyed is valued at Rs. 30,187-15-9 against 153 fires with a loss of Rs. 14,347 last year; no particular reason has been assigned for the increase. The accidents on the river Indus were less than in the previous year. Only 7 boats were sunk against 19 in 1879. The property lost was valued at Rs. 2,284 against Rs. 16,561 last year.

15. The armed Police have been regularly drilled and have improved considerably. The Police not at head-quarters have also undergone a course of instruction, but owing to their being so scattered they have not the same opportunities as the force at head-quarters.

Frontier Police. 17. The Frontier Police has worked satisfactorily during the year, and the Superintendent of Police reported that—

“Cattle-lifting has very much diminished. Sahib Khan, and Jan Muhammad Chutas, who were always at enmity and the cause of many a disturbance on the Frontier, have for a time become reconciled and the new rulings regarding the pursuit of criminals will tend to make those gentry more cautious.”

During the year 16 cattle-thefts, 1 house-breaking, and 1 ordinary theft were reported. The property lost amounted to Rs. 1,539 of which Rs. 1,529 were recovered.

18. The condition of this fund is more satisfactory than it was last year. Mounted Police Fund. The demands upon it were not so large owing to the mortality among the horses and camels being less; 7 horses died, 2 were cast and 17 purchased at a cost of Rs. 1,035-10-8; 8 camels died, 13 were cast, and 21 replaced at a cost of Rs. 1,237-10-8. The total outlay for horses and camels was Rs. 2,273-5-4. The balance in the fund is Rs. 10,959-13-5 against Rs. 9,861-11-7 in the previous year.

19. The Superintendent visited personally the scene of 14 offences and the Assistant Superintendent is shown to have visited one, Serious crime visited. but of the 14 entered by the Superintendent 7 are in the town and suburbs of Karachi. The district, however, is so very extensive that reports often do not reach the Superintendent for days, when it would be almost useless for him to start off to make personal inquiry. I hope, however, the number of serious cases taken up by the Superintendent in person may steadily increase.

21. Superintendent of Police.—Mr. C. McIver except for 15 days, when the Huzur Deputy Collector was in charge.

22. One officer and 21 men were dismissed and 17 officers and 85 men were punished departmentally. Two Chief Constables were prosecuted, one of whom was convicted by the Sessions Judge under sections 203, 217 and 221 of the Indian Penal Code, but subsequently

acquitted by the Sadar Court. He was reduced and reinstated. On the whole, the conduct of the Police is more satisfactory than in the previous year. The Police Inspectors also appear to have given satisfaction. It was necessary to transfer some officers from the Karáchi to the Hyderabad District and *vice versa*.

23. No new buildings were erected. The accommodation for the Police is on the whole good, and the buildings have been kept in good order from the annual allotment for petty construction and repairs.

24. The number of cognizable cases reported amounted to 4,532 against 4,666 in the previous year, being a decrease of 434. Non-cognizable cases numbered 1,790 against 1,533 in 1879, showing an increase of 257 cases. As the returns for the year under review contain "struck-off" cases, it will be necessary for the purposes of comparison to add "struck-off" cases to the figures for 1879 as shown below:—

From the above it will be seen that there is a decrease of 385 cases retained on the register and a decrease of 637 cases in the number struck off altogether.

25. There were 12 murders reported during the year against 4 in 1879, but of these one case was by order of the Magistrate struck off, leaving the number of true cases at 11. Convictions were obtained in 6 cases and the guilty parties sentenced to death. In 3 others the Police Superintendent is satisfied the real offenders were seized, but the evidence did not satisfy the Judge and the accused were acquitted. One case was pending at the end of the year, and in the remaining case no clue was obtained. There is nothing in the details of these cases to require special notice. In one case the accused, who was sentenced to death, was a private of the 3rd Regiment N. I. He wished to marry a woman, but as she was unwilling he shot her dead with a Snider rifle which he obtained from his lines.

26. One dacoity was reported, but it was an ordinary case of robbery and only shown as a dacoity owing to the number engaged in it.

27. Six hundred and four licenses were granted; 15 were for the manufacture and sale of arms. No prosecutions occurred during the year.

The number of cases undetected in 1879 was very large, but a large proportion was petty thefts during the period of great distress, and these are a class of crime very difficult to detect.

29. There were 10 cases of suicide during the year from hanging, 3 men, 6 women and 1 child. Two hundred and thirty-nine cases of accidental deaths are recorded.

Besides the above there were 396 cases of snake-bite, of which 187 were fatal. In the previous year the number of cases that occurred was 339 and 192 deaths; while a larger number of persons have been bitten in 1880 the death-rate is less.

Losses by fire and on river Indus. 30. The losses by fire amounted to Rs. 12,359-12-0 and sinking of boats on the river and in canals Rs. 1,059.

Drill. 31. Considerable progress was made. The Superintendent states that—

“Special attention has been given to drill. A pensioned savár of the Sind Horse has been instructing the savárs who were ordered into head-quarters in detachments of 12 and 15 and when qualified were relieved by others. In another year I am hopeful that every savár in the district will have qualified, as owing to my frequent absence from head-quarters I am unable to devote full and continuous attention to the drill of the armed Foot and District Police at head-quarters. Sanction was requested and obtained to the appointment of a thoroughly qualified pensioned Subhedár of the 24th Regiment N. I. This officer was appointed to a chief constableness and joined the Police in July last. Being able to give undivided attention to this duty he has improved the Police considerably, and I am glad to be able to report very fair progress in squad and company drill. Firing exercise will be commenced as soon as the new rifles indented for are furnished.”

32. With regard to the armament of the Police, the Superintendent writes that the mounted Police have been supplied with Snider carbines; the Hyderabad Town Police with “Royal Navy cutlasses.” They were first issued to the mounted Police, but were found too heavy in the hilt and too short to be efficiently used on horse-back. The mounted Police are now to be supplied with swords drill curved. The Savárs and Chief Constables have also been supplied with Cawnpur manufactured English pattern saddles.

Mounted Police Fund. 33. The amount available in the fund at the close of the year was Rs. 14,266-2-10. The mortality in horses and camels was less in 1880 than in the previous year; 9 animals died and 11 had to be cast.

35. Mr. H. E. Watson was in charge from 1st January to 6th December 1880 and Major R. I. Crawford from 7th to 31st December 1880.

Conduct of Police. Three officers and 16 men were dismissed from the Police during the year against 1 officer and 11 men in 1879. Seventeen officers and 88 men were punished departmentally and 3 officers and 36 men were punished judicially during the year. This is a very large number and it is attributable to the large number of prisoners who escaped from custody. Forty-six Policemen were put on their trial for neglect in permitting escapes and 32 convicted.

Police buildings. 36. The Police buildings are in good order. The amount expended by the Political Superintendent was Rs. 2,000 and by the Public Works Department Rs. 574-4-8. The necessity for new Police lines at Umarkot has been strongly urged by the Political Superintendent. The Commissioner hopes shortly to see these lines, after which he will be better able to judge if any really urgent need for improvement exists.

Fluctuations in crime. 37. As “struck-off” cases have been included for the first time in Part I., A., the following details are given to render a comparison of this year's with the preceding year's crime possible:—

This exhibits a decrease of 100 cases retained on the register and a decrease of 37 cases in the total under struck-off. This decrease of 137 cognizable cases is satisfactory, but the Political Superintendent adds :—

“ But the fact is that crime is almost double what it was previous to the scarcity of 1878, and though the turning point is now fairly rounded, and a substantial decrease of 137 cases obtained, yet the decrease might not unreasonably have been expected with cheaper food-grains to be much larger, and that it is not so is, I believe, because there was a greatly diminished kharif cultivation in the Eastern Nára Canals, the lands from frequent floods and rabi crops being impoverished, and in the desert the crops failed more or less in all but two tálukas, and also because the return and setting down to honest pursuits must be a gradual process with the people of the poorest classes who took to crime to stave off hunger in 1878.”

38. Murders. There were two cases of murder in the current year and the same number in 1879. In neither case was a conviction obtained.

Attempt at murder. 39. There were two cases against one in 1879.

40. Arms Act. This Act has worked satisfactorily. One hundred and sixty-six licenses were granted to carry arms for sporting purposes and 65 for temporary protection.

41. Undetected cases. The following figures show the “undetected cases” of previous years taken up by the Police in 1878 and 1879. Cognizable cases only are included. The number traced is small :—

42. Opium and salt cases. There were 16 prosecutions for opium smuggling. These have been fairly successful. Contraband opium is frequently imported from foreign territory, but no large importations have yet been detected. The prevention of smuggling is not easy owing to the large extent of frontier to be watched, the character of the country, and the facility with which small supplies of opium can be carried by travellers. There were 34 cases prosecuted under the Salt Act. The salt preventive establishments have worked well and the Political Superintendent is of opinion “that there has been no trade whatever in illicit salt.” To account for this he narrates the natural advantages which the country possesses and offers to facilitate detection, viz. :—

“ A man tampering with a salt deposit leaves behind him evidence in his tracks in the sand that all who run may read for days and even weeks together in a country where every other man is a tracker from his childhood. This is the great deterrent to salt smuggling.”

43. Suicides and accidental deaths. One case of suicide occurred and another of attempted suicide. There were 35 deaths from snake-bite, 27 from drowning, and 15 from other causes.

44. Drill. There are 8 qualified drill instructors in the force. Two hundred and seventeen men are undergoing a regular course of instruction, and other steps are in progress to continue the same to others who will visit the drill centres in small parties.

45. Mounted Police Fund. Twenty-seven horses and 41 camels died during the year against 71 and 69 in the year before. Only 3 horses were cast and no camels. The fund is in a more flourishing condition than in the previous year.

46. Border States. The Political Superintendent states that the relations with foreign States have been satisfactory, except that recently at Judpur and Jaisalmir the Police have not readily received assistance in tracing and apprehending offenders, and a special representation to the Political Agent has been made by the Political Superintendent, Thar and Párkar.

48. *Superintendent of Police.*—Mr. J. H. Henderson from 1st January to 30th November 1880; Mr. H. M. Gibbs from 1st to 30th December 1880.

49. One officer and 52 men were dismissed, against 1 officer and 72 men in the previous year. Thirty-four officers and 81 men were punished departmentally and 24 men were dealt with judicially, 5 under the Police Act. One hundred and fifty-nine men were rewarded for good service, viz., 157 by promotion and 2 by cash presents. Mr. Henderson, prior to his departure from Sind, remarked favourably on the conduct of his office establishment, who are stated to have worked hard and well. The Inspectors also worked well as usual, except in one instance. Mr. Kushirám, the Inspector of the Mehár Division, had to be transferred to Rohri, and since then his conduct again formed the subject of inquiry.

50. The Police buildings or thánas were kept in good repair from the allotment for petty construction, &c. The amount spent during the year was Rs. 4,991-5-0. No new buildings were constructed during the past year.

51. The following figures for two years show the fluctuations in cognizable crime:—

The number of cases on the register shows an increase in the current year of 912 cases and the amount of "struck-off" cases is less by 1,412 than in the previous year. As I pointed out in my report last year, the system under which cases were struck off in 1879 was very faulty and has now been amended.

52. The number of murder cases has increased from 16 to 20, but one case that occurred in 1879 was inquired into in the year under review. In 3 of these the motive for perpetrating the crime was intrigue, 5 cases were due to jealousy, 3 to revenge, and 9 to other causes. In one of the latter the victim was a man 50 years old, who was employed as a level crossing-keeper on the Kandahar State Railway which passes through the Shikárpur District. He was found murdered in front of the quarters assigned to such servants close to the line. The man, it appears, had some money and the possession of this was no doubt the motive for committing the crime. The suspected persons were arrested, but no clue could be obtained. A reward of Rs. 150 was offered, but nothing further has been elicited. There is nothing of peculiar atrocity in the details of other cases to require special mention. Of the 21 cases inquired into, 3 were struck off by the Magistrate as no crime, leaving 18 real cases. Convictions were obtained in 10 cases; in 3 cases the evidence procured was insufficient and the accused was discharged; in the others no clue was obtained.

53. Four cases of attempt at murder were investigated, being 2 more than last year. Of these 4, two were struck off as no crime, in one the accused was discharged and one was pending at the close of the year. There were 4 cases of culpable homicide against 6 last year. In 2 cases the accused were convicted and in 2 acquitted.

54. The theft of cattle is a very prevalent offence throughout Sind, and seems to be on the increase though serious raids for cattle-lifting have been checked. In the Shikárpur

District the total number of cattle-thefts investigated during the last three years is given by the Superintendent of Police as follows :—

This crime has been increasing every year. In the year under report 831 cases came under investigation to 517 last year, and animals to the value of Rs. 20,023 were stolen with Rs. 17,130 in cattle recovered. The percentage of recoveries has increased from 80·01 in the previous year to 85·55 in the year under report. Six hundred and ninety-three persons were arrested, of whom convictions were obtained in 53·53 per cent. to 64·14 last year, while convictions to persons brought to trial have slightly increased from 84·05 in 1879 to 84·89 in the year under review. In 45 of the cases investigated under this head, 74 professional cattle-lifters were concerned. Of these 50 were convicted, 16 acquitted, 2 released under section 125, Criminal Procedure Code, 1 was at large, and 5 were pending at the end of the year. Property valued at Rs. 1,485 in cattle was stolen with Rs. 1,382 recovered, or 93·06 to 99·72 per cent. in 1879.

55. Four hundred and ninety-six licenses were issued during the year. A separate annual report on the working of the Arms Act is submitted to Government in the Judicial Department.

56. The following shows the number of undetected cases of cognizable crime for the years 1878 and 1879 taken up and inquired into :—

There were 292 cases of snake-bite reported during the year.

59. The number of accidental fires and the value of the property destroyed have greatly increased. There were 556 fires against 329 in 1879, and the loss of property amounted to Rs. 32,291-1-10 against Rs. 18,031-12-1.

60. So much was not done in this line as could have been desired, owing to unusual calls upon the men of the armed Police, nor was it till after the close of the year that the services of a pensioned officer who had served in one of the native Regiments were secured to instruct the armed Police thoroughly in drill.

61. Last year the number of Police under this head was 161; this year it is only 29, showing a decrease of 132 men. This decrease was owing to the application of the provision in section 24 of the Bombay District Municipal Act, that no Municipality is to be called on to pay more than one-half the cost of the Police employed for the security of life and property within Municipal limits.

62. There is a separate force of Railway Police which has been organized during the year. It consists of 19 officers and 89 men. The force was only organized in the month of December 1880, so details regarding its work are not given.

63. The balance at the disposal of the fund at the close of the year was only Rs. 2,754-13-0. Eight horses and 8 camels died and 3 horses and 4 camels were cast during the year.

64. The Superintendent reports that great difficulty has been experienced in obtaining good recruits, especially for the armed Police and for the Railway Police. This the Superintendent explains by stating that the wages given on the Railway are higher and the work lighter than that of the Police.

67. The Superintendent's report which was furnished by Lieut.-Colonel Trevor, who had not been in the district during the year, is very meagre and does not afford full information. Nineteen men were dismissed, 1 officer and 12 men were fined and degraded, and 5 men were punished judicially.

68. The stations and lock-ups have been kept in repair from the annual allotment.

69. The details of 1879 and 1880 show the following differences:—

70. Eight murders were reported but only 5 on inquiry were found to be Murders. murders; of the other cases the death in two cases was shown to have been accidental and in the third case the murder was committed in Kelat territory. Of the five cases retained on the register three were due to intrigues with women and one to revenge, also owing to an intrigue. In another case the Mukhtyárkar of Jacobabad was murdered by the Haváldár of his own office. The murder was committed in consequence of the Mukhtyárkar having publicly used abusive language towards the Haváldár. The Mukhtyárkar was attacked and murdered while asleep at night in the compound of his house. The murderer did not attempt to escape; he was convicted and hanged.

71. There was no case of attempt at murder Attempt at murder. during the past year.

72. The Arms Act was enforced during the year. Two hundred and two Arms Act. licenses were granted during the year as compared with 158 in the year previous.

Read the Annual Reports on the state of crime and working of the Police in the several Districts in the Northern, Southern, Central and Sind Divisions of the Bombay Presidency for the year 1880.

RESOLUTION.—The Police Administration Reports for the year 1880 are submitted by Mr. Erskine for Sind, Mr. Sheppard for the Northern Division, Mr. Robertson for the Central Division, Mr. Crawford for the Southern Division, During the year under review, Mr. Erskine was in charge of Sind, Mr. Reid of the Northern Division, Mr. Robertson of the Central Division, and Mr. Crawford, followed by Mr. Sheppard in November, of the Southern Division.

Crime in General.

2. The fluctuations in crime during the past four years are exhibited in the following statement:—

Throughout the Presidency the number of offences ascertained to have occurred were 6,969 fewer than in 1879, a decrease which is mainly attributed to the agricultural population having generally had a favourable season.

The offences in which the reduction is most noticeable are murders, culpable homicides, dacoities, robberies, thefts, and receipt of stolen property; and such decrease occurs in the Presidency proper.

In Sind there was an increase of 141 over the previous year, which already showed an increase of 1,186. The Commissioner in Sind attributes this to the large increase of crime in the Shikárpur District, but is satisfied after careful inquiry that, owing to stricter rules being now in force, many cases have this year been recorded which would not have been registered in previous years.

Cognizable Crime.

3. It is necessary to note that the Statement A, Part I, has this year been submitted by the Commissioners in the modified form approved in Government Resolution No. 7137 of 22nd October 1880, and instead of being a return of all cognizable crime *except cases struck off*, it now omits cases in which there was no intervention of the Police, and is a return of cognizable crime, in the detection and prosecution of which the Police were employed, including cases struck off.

The statement is now what it purports to be, and gives the result of Police operations in the detection and prosecution of crime and recovery of property stolen.

4. The chief facts in connection with cognizable crime are contrasted in the following statement with those of the previous year :—

The total number of cognizable cases for 1880, including the few transfers from 1879, is 66,378 or 14,073 less than in 1879, but the number of cases struck off as no crime being 13,777 compared with 16,561 in 1879, the number of true cases remaining is 52,601 or 11,289 less than the number for 1879.

5. There has been a decrease of 2,784 in the number of cases struck off.

Cases struck off. Under existing orders, cases can only be struck off as no crime by the Magistrates having jurisdiction of their own motion, or by the District, Divisional or First Class Magistrate in charge of the Taluka, on the application of the Superintendent of Police.

6. The total number of persons arrested has been 71,479 or 25,550 less than in 1879, of these 6 per cent. were arrested in

Arrests. connection with cases struck off compared with 6.5 per cent. in 1879. The orders of Government (G. R. No. 2182 of 9th April 1879) inviting a stricter attention to the provisions of Sections 116 and 117 of the Code of Criminal Procedure have not received uniform attention in the proceedings of the year under review, but it is hoped that the returns of the following year will show that due attention to these sections will reduce the number of arrests in the latter class of cases.

7. The percentage of persons convicted to persons arrested has increased from 51.75 in 1879 to 52 per cent. in 1880. The

Percentage of Convictions to Arrests. increase has taken place in Sind and the Northern Divisions, while in the Central and Southern Divisions there has been a considerable decrease.

Comparing the Divisions with each other, Sind shows the best percentage of convictions to arrests, viz., 55 per cent., and the Central Division the worst, namely, 48 per cent.

8. The percentage of cases in which convictions were had to the total number of cases reported, has been 38 per cent. against

Percentage of Cases resulting in Convictions. 41.25 in 1879, this result being due to a decrease in every Division except the Southern, where the percentage is the same as in 1879.

This decrease may be partly due to the fact that much of the diminution of cognizable crime is due to the lesser number of "casual" offenders whose crime admits more easily of detection and punishment, but Police officers should bear in mind that these difficulties should have been anticipated and the exertions to cope successfully with them proportionately increased.

9. In Sind there has been an increase of 460 in the number of true cognizable cases as compared with those in 1879, whilst, on the other hand, in the Northern, Central and Southern Divisions there has been a marked decrease.

The decrease is partly due to the suppression of the organized gangs of dacoits referred to in the Resolution on the reports of the previous year, but the main cause is the favourable agricultural season already referred to, and the consequent diminution of casual crime.

Non-cognizable Crime.

10. The amount of non-cognizable crime in each Division is shown in the following statement :—

There has been on the whole a decrease of 514 non-cognizable offences in the whole Presidency.

Separating the cases in which the Police were employed (1,830) from those taken up by the Magistrates (17,800), it appears that in the former class there was a decrease of 580 and a percentage of 47.75 of convictions, and in the latter class an increase of 66 non-cognizable cases and a percentage of 48.5 of convictions.

Stolen Property.

11. The following table shows the value of stolen property recovered by the Police, and contrasts the results for 1880 with those for 1879 :—

It appears then that the value of property stolen has amounted to Rs. 10,15,552 as compared with Rs. 15,30,081 in 1879.

All the Divisions have shown a considerable decrease in this respect, except Sind, where the value of property stolen has risen from Rs. 3,05,713 in 1879 to Rs. 3,07,097 in 1880. Taking all the Divisions into account, the value of property recovered is Rs. 4,49,511 as compared with Rs. 6,21,472 in 1879, or 44.26 per cent. in the year under review against 40.61 per cent. in the previous year.

Government remarked last year on the want of success on the part of the Police in connection with this important part of their duty, and it is satisfactory to notice the improvement in this direction.

Strength, Cost and Education of Police.

12. The following table gives the strength and cost of the Police and the number who are armed and percentage of those able to read and write :—

13. The strength, cost, and proportion of armed men of the force is the same as in the previous year. There has been an improvement in the education of the force, the percentage of the wholly illiterate men having fallen from 78 in 1879 to 75 in 1880. Comparing the Divisions with each other, the Southern Division shows the best percentage of men able to read and write, *viz.*, 33, and Sind the worst, 15 per cent. Satisfactory progress has been made in drill.

14. The importance attached to immediate visits by Police Superintendents and Assistant Superintendents to the scene of serious crimes has been already pointed out, and orders on the subject were issued in February 1880. The following statement gives the number of visits of the Superintendents and Assistant Superintendents to the scene of serious crime. The returns for the Central Division do not show in how many cases the visits were made at once :—

This is by no means an indication that these orders have been properly attended to. The excuses offered in many cases cannot be seriously treated as reasons. Government again regret to notice the great remissness in the performance of this part of the duties of some Superintendents and some of their Assistants. The Commissioners should inform the officers to whom these remarks apply that this part of their work will be carefully scrutinized in future.

District Administration.

15. The following statement shows the strength of the Police in each District, the proportion they bear to its area and population, the success which has attended their detection, investigation and prevention of cognizable crime, as compared with their success in the previous year, and the name of the Superintendent in charge at the end of the year :—

There has again been a considerable increase in cognizable crime in Shikárpur, and the increase in Belgaum is also marked. The latter may be attributed to some extent to greater energy on the part of the Police in enforcing local and special laws. Applying, as a test of efficiency, the percentage of convictions to arrests, the Police of Kaira with a figure of 77 have been the most and those of Kolába with a percentage of 39 the least successful. The Police of the Upper Sind Frontier, Broach, Kolába, Khándesh, Ahmednagar, Násik, Poona and Dhárwár have failed in obtaining convictions against more than half of the persons arrested. If, however, the percentage of convictions to cognizable cases is examined as a test of general skill in prosecution, then Sholápur with its percentage of 65, Belgaum with 63, Kánara with 55 and Ratnágiri with 54, stand highest, and Broach and Kolába with their figure of 24, Sátára with 29, Shikárpur with 32, and Poona with 33 stand lowest.

16. The conduct of the Police in Sind appears on the whole to have been good, but there is a marked falling off in the percentage of convictions to arrests in every District, when transfers from previous years are excluded, which is not satisfactory. A good deal of attention has been paid during the year to the drill of both the Mounted and Foot branches of the force. The Commissioner in Sind remarks that owing to the absence of village officers a great deal more responsibility is thrown on the Police in a Sind District and much more being thrown on the Superintendent, there is a greater necessity for experience and judgment than in the Presidency; but in the Konkan also the absence of Village Police has been commented on.

17. At Karáchi there was one change in the appointment of Superintendent and 3 in that of Assistant Superintendent. There was a small decrease (31) in true cognizable cases. Out of 6 murder cases, convictions were had in 4. The Frontier Police is reported to have worked satisfactorily, and cattle-lifting has much diminished. The Assistant Superintendent visited the scene of twelve offences and the Superintendent at once the scene of 12, of which 7, however, were in the town and suburbs of Karáchi: showing that the advantage of a local personal investigation was fully understood when the offence occurred close to head-quarters.

18. In Hyderabad there was a decrease of 385 in true cognizable cases. Convictions were obtained in 6 out of 11 true cases of murder. Special attention has been given to drill and to supplying the Police with better arms, and saddlery. Commendable activity was shown in making local investigations by the Superintendent and the report would have been very satisfactory but for the undue reduction in the percentage of convictions to arrests in true cognizable cases.

Hyderabad.

19. In Thar and Párkar there was a decrease of 100 true cognizable cases; but crime has not yet sunk to anything like its normal amount before the scarcity of 1878. This is attributed to a partial failure of crops in some localities and to the fact that the poorest classes have not at once resumed honest pursuits even where agricultural prosperity has decidedly improved. The Political Superintendent states that the assistance given by foreign States has been satisfactory almost without exception.

Thar and Párkar.

20. In Shikárpur there has been a marked increase (912) in the number of true cognizable cases. In connection with the general increase which this has caused in the returns of the whole Sind District, the Commissioner remarks :—

“The general increase would have been disappointing were I not satisfied, from inquiry made, that many cases have this year been entered in the register which would, in previous years, not have been so. This change is owing to the stricter rules now in force for recording complaints.”

There were 17 “real” murders during the year, and in 10 of these convictions were obtained. The crime of cattle-lifting was been steadily increasing, and should receive special attention from the Superintendent.

21. The report for the Upper Sind Frontier District is furnished by Lieutenant-Colonel Trevor who was not in charge during the year under report, and no remark is called for by the returns for this District.

22. There has been a very satisfactory decrease of crime in Ahmedabad to which a more efficient patrol system has contributed; but on the other hand the percentage of convictions to arrests has slightly diminished. There have been several changes in the appointment of Assistant Superintendent. The Superintendent reports that there are now no proclaimed “Bahirwatiás” (outlaws) in the District, those of the once turbulent villages of the Chuvál having been arrested or given up by their relatives with a consequent reduction of several punitive posts. Special attention has been given to drill and the District Magistrate says that the Mounted Police are now the best mounted and drilled Police that he has seen.

Ahmedabad.

Major Humfrey has shown a commendable activity in visiting the scenes of serious crime, and Government would have been still more pleased if he had insisted on his Assistants showing greater energy and promptitude in this respect. Government concur with the Commissioner in his opinion that the year's work is creditable to Major Humfrey.

23. The report for the Kaira District is very satisfactory. There were 396 fewer cognizable offences, and the percentage of convictions to arrests increased from 68 in 1879 to 77 in 1880. But the small proportion of stolen property recovered is not creditable. Mr. Duggan was the Superintendent throughout the year.

Kaira.

24. There was less crime in the Panch Maháls than in the previous year, and convictions were had in the only 2 murder cases which occurred. Lieutenant-Colonel LaTouche visited the scenes of two serious crimes out of 14 reported, because the rest were only “technically” serious and occurred at a distance. Mr. Spence, his Assistant, visited 6 out of 15. The report is on the whole creditable to the Police of the District and the Superintendent.

25. The Broach Police cannot be said to have improved in efficiency. There was a decrease in cognizable crime especially in offences against person and property, but there was

Broach.

also a considerable decrease in the percentage of convictions to arrests. In the four cases of murder occurring during the year, the accused were discharged for want of evidence. There is nothing before Government to show how far this was due to want of judicial ability in the Magistrates who made the inquiry before commitment and how far to careless working up by the Police; but it is interesting to know that the Police Superintendent made a prompt local investigation in only one of these cases. Of the serious cases reported to them Mr. Holland visited one in two, Mr. Jardine all four, and Mr. Goldsmid two out of nine.

26. The report for Surat is fairly satisfactory showing a considerable decrease in cognizable crime but a slight reduction on the percentage of convictions to arrests. Good service was rendered by the Police in breaking up three gangs of professional robbers, most of whom were successfully prosecuted. Mr. Scannell should be informed that Government expect that he will pay more attention in future to the provisions of Section 117 of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

27. In Thána there has been a marked improvement in the working of the Police, the percentage of convictions to arrests having risen to 63 in 1880 from 39 in 1879. This is partly due to the Police having paid more attention to Section 117 of the Criminal Procedure Code. There were no serious dacoities during the year and the decrease in percentage of stolen property recovered is to some extent explained. Major Payne is reported to have visited the scene of all the serious offences reported to him.

28. In the Kolába District there were 7 dacoities of an organized nature committed by gangs of from 6 to 20 men. The leader of one gang was apprehended and successfully prosecuted. The Commissioner remarks that Mr. FitzGerald has not satisfactorily explained his omission to visit the scenes of serious crime in 9 out of 11 cases. There has been an increase of more than 200 in the number of cognizable cases and the percentage of convictions to arrests has fallen from 47 to 39. This is the reverse of satisfactory, and Government regret that the deterioration noticed last year has shown no sign of abatement.

29. In Ahmednagar great strain was placed on the Police by the unusual number of guards required for duties hitherto performed by Native Infantry, as well as the usual escorts. The Police were indifferently successful in prosecuting 14 murder and 9 dacoity cases; and the percentage of convictions to arrests was reduced from 59 in 1879 to 44 in 1880. Out of 24 cases entered as serious, 5 were visited by the Superintendent and 3 by the Acting Superintendent. It is not stated whether these visits were made promptly.

30. In the Khándesh District there was a sensible reduction in cognizable offences, but the percentage of convictions to arrests is 49 as compared with 63 in 1879. The Police were more successful in the prosecution of murder and dacoity cases. A great improvement is stated to have taken place in the matter of drill. In Khándesh the Superintendent made no local investigations: the First Assistant Superintendents made 3 visits each and the Second Assistant Superintendent made 2 such visits to scenes of serious crime, but how soon after the offence occurred does not appear.

31. In Násik the percentage of convictions to arrests has fallen from 52 to 43. Two of 3 real murder cases were successfully prosecuted: the alleged offender in the third case being still at large. In the six dacoity cases of the year the Police were not equally successful. Attention has been paid to education and drill. In 6 cases the Superintendent visited the scene of crime.

33. In Poona there have been 388 fewer cognizable cases, but the percentage of convictions to arrests has fallen from 46 to 41. This is not creditable to the Police of this District.

The most satisfactory feature in the year's report is the disappearance of serious dacoities by organized gangs. There were 14 cases of dacoity (none being serious) against 70 in the previous year, and the Police were more successful in prosecuting these cases than in the murder cases. In 11 out of 14 of the former, convictions were obtained, whilst in the latter of 11 true cases tried, convictions were had in only 4. It would be interesting to learn how many failures were due to the Police being contented with a judicial confession instead of collecting all the corroborative evidence available. It appears that of 32 cases reported as serious, Mr. Cotgrave visited the scene in 2 and Mr. Prescott the scene in 8.

34. Sátára shows a considerable decrease in cognizable crime, and the percentage of convictions to arrests is only slightly reduced.

Sátára. There were fewer murders and dacoities, and the percentage of successful prosecutions in those which occurred was high. The results of the year are again creditable to Major Codrington who was in charge for the greater part of the year, Major Wise having been in charge for two months. It is however necessary to point out that the scenes of crime in serious cases should have been visited in more instances.

35. In the Sholápur District there were 1,262 fewer cognizable offences.

Sholápur. A marked decrease in the number of murders (5 against 25) and dacoities (2 against 40) was accompanied by far greater success in the prosecution of these crimes; and though the general percentage of convictions to arrests in cognizable cases is 64, instead of 71 in 1879, the application of the test leaves the District third in the list of the most efficient Police forces of the year. There were so many changes in the appointment of Superintendent during the year that it is difficult to say how far these results are due to the officers who acted before 10th June, but Lieutenant Macpherson, who was uninterruptedly in charge after that date, may fairly claim the main share of the credit due to the Superintendent.

36. There were 490 more cognizable cases in the Belgaum District. The

Belgaum. Police were very successful in detecting and prosecuting murder cases, but almost wholly failed in dacoity cases, which is not creditable, but it is only fair to note that the Belgaum Police, in concert with the Kánara Police, arrested most of a gang of 11 Bedars and convictions were obtained against 9 after the close of the year. The percentage of convictions in cognizable cases to arrests was 56 against 59 in the previous year, still comparing well with many other Districts. Comparing the convictions with cases as a test of detective ability this District stands high with a figure of 78. The results altogether are an improvement on the previous year. Colonel Bartholomew should have paid better attention to the instructions conveyed in Government Resolution No. 1024 of 14th February 1890, Judicial Department.

37. In the Dhárwár District the chief set-off to a fall of 6 per cent. in

Dhárwár. convictions to arrests, a low average of detective ability, and a marked failure in prosecuting dacoity cases, is a better success in murder cases and an improvement in drill. The greater efficiency in detecting and prosecuting murder cases may be in part attributed to the great activity of the Superintendent in visiting the scenes of serious crime, which is specially brought to notice by the Commissioner. There was a decrease of 450 in cognizable cases.

38. In the Kaládgi District there has been a considerable decrease in

Kaládgi. cognizable crime, but the fall of 18 per cent. in the proportion of convictions to arrests is very unsatisfactory. The Police were fairly successful in murder cases, but failed signally in detecting dacoity cases. Mr. Kennedy's promptitude in visiting the scenes of serious crime is noticed by the Commissioner. The most important event in this District was the capture of Uthraj, the leader of the Bedar dacoits, and the good services of Mr. Kennedy in connection with the suppression of this gang have already received the acknowledgment of Government.

39. In the Kánara District there has been a decrease of 317 in the number

Kánara. of cognizable cases and the percentage of convictions to arrests has remained almost stationary. There was

only one case of murder and it resulted in conviction. Many of the dacoity cases having been tried after the year was over the returns of convictions in dacoity cases during the year do not admit of fair criticism at present. The operations conducted by Lieutenant-Colonel McGillivray in connection with the gang of 11 Bedars mentioned above in connection with the Belgaum District were so successful as to gain the special acknowledgment of Government.

40. The returns for this District show a great decrease in cognizable crime and a rise of 9 per cent. in the percentage of convictions to arrests, which is satisfactory. Mr. Down was Superintendent for about four months and Mr. Kennedy for the rest of the year.

Ratnágiri.

Conclusion.

41. The main features of the year under review are the marked decrease in the Presidency proper in serious offences against person and property and the almost complete absence of organized robberies by gangs of professional robbers. The general decrease in cognizable crime may be attributed to the suppression of hitherto active organized robber gangs: to the good harvests and consequent cheapness of food and briskness of the market for labour: to an improvement in Police arrangements in some districts: and, in some degree, to abkári arrangements which have in some localities lessened the temptation to drunkenness with its usual evil consequences in stimulating crime.

42. The failure of harvests in Sind in 1878 having come rather later than in the rest of the Presidency, the influence of agricultural prosperity in checking crime and reducing it to its normal proportions has been less appreciable in the year under review and a more careful system of registration has perhaps given an only apparent increase to the offences recorded in some localities whilst other disturbing influences have also existed; but there are indications here also of a tendency towards a return to a normal standard.

43. The efficiency of the Police in the Northern Division and in Sind, as tested by the percentage of convictions to arrests, has improved 6 per cent. and 4 per cent. respectively, whilst the efficiency so tested in the Southern and Central Divisions shows a deterioration of about 3 per cent. in the former and 6 per cent. in the latter Division as compared with 1879. The retrograde tendency in the last two Divisions may be partly attributed to the fact that crime committed in excess of normal standards under the exceptional influences which have been already dwelt on is more easily detected and punished than that committed by the professional classes, and a contraction of crime to previous proportions must be accompanied with greater difficulty in detection and prosecution. But after making all due allowances, it is necessary to point out that this decrease in the Central and Southern Divisions is not entirely placed beyond unsatisfactory comment.

44. His Excellency the Governor in Council desires to record that, reviewing the operations of the Police and general administration of the force for the whole year, he has reason to be satisfied with the results shown in these reports and is specially gratified to notice the marked diminution of crime and the causes to which this satisfactory feature in the history of the year's operations may be attributed.

45. It is also the desire of His Excellency in Council to impress upon all the Police Officers of the Presidency that increasing difficulties call all the more imperatively for the exercise of greater skill, industry and activity. It must be carefully borne in mind that sworn evidence is unfortunately of less value as such in this country than in England from whence our rules of evidence are to a great extent borrowed. One of the consequences of this evil is that it is by no means certain that the truth is uniformly better elicited in a contentious Judicial inquiry than in a prompt and unbiassed local investigation, so that Courts of justice which have often the difficult task to perform of arriving at a final judicial opinion on evidence saturated with "counterbalanced falsehoods," will be far more effectively assisted to a right conclusion by a connected chain of evidence obtained in local Police investigations promptly and intelligently conducted under skilful supervision, than by the incomplete procedure which often

leads to the "unimportant technicalities" referred to by the Police Commissioner of the Northern Division, which are popularly supposed to result in so many abortive prosecutions in serious cases.

46. The operations conducted by Lieutenant-Colonel McGillivray and Mr. Kennedy during the year have been favourably acknowledged in other Resolutions. The good services of Major Humfrey, Major Codrington and Captain Macpherson also call for the commendation of Government, and the Commissioners should be thanked for their interesting reports.
