RESOLUTION

1. The number and classification of jails remained the same as in previous years. The statistics of the year include figures relating to civil disobedience prisoners and cannot therefore be compared usefully with the figures of the last year when the movement had ceased. The daily average number of prisoners of all classes rose from 4,847.89 to 5,665.12 out of whom 2,748 prisoners were accounted for by the civil disobedience movement.

2. The Advisory boards continued to do good work and 51 prisoners were released on their recommendation. As a measure of economy meetings of the boards are now held at Nagpur and Raipur only, instead of at six district headquarters.

3. The Governor in Council regrets to note the large increase in the number of short sentences and the number of youthful and adolescent offenders, which has been brought about by convictions for offences connected with the civil disobedience movement which, as before, freely enlisted the services of immature and impressionable young men. The infliction of short sentences cannot, however, be too strongly deprecated and must be avoided as far as possible. The Governor in Council desires to impress upon the District Magistrates the importance of exercising sustained vigilance in the matter.

4. The increase in the number of jail punishments, was due partly to the increase in the jail population and partly to the determination of certain

civil disobedience prisoners to defy authority, necessitating in the case of the Amraoti jail the adoption of special measures. It is therefore satisfactory to find that a high standard of discipline was maintained in all the jails in a year which was none too easy for jail administration.

5. In spite of the increase in the jail population, there was a decrease of Rs. 76,244 in the total expenditure and the average cost per prisoner dropped from Rs. 161-10-0 to Rs. 124-14-0 in the year under report. Economy in administration as well as the general fall in prices have contributed to this decrease. On the other hand the trade depression resulting in lower prices and smaller demand for jail products has made serious inroads on the receipts from jail industries. The Governor in Council notes with pleasure that the net cost per prisoner shows a substantial decline.

6. The record of health during the year has been unusually satisfactory despite the increase in the population. The death rate fell to 8.12 per mille the lowest on record so far and is an indication of the care exercised by the superintendents and medical officers.

7. The Governor in Council desires to place on record an appreciation of the good work done by Colonel Powell and the officers and all ranks serving in the department during a year of exceptional difficulty in which the unpopular nature of their duties has been brought into prominence. The contents of the report and the names selected for mention indicate that Colonel Powell has been very successful in maintaining the morale of his department.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of this resolution be submitted to the Government of India in the Home Department, and that a copy be forwarded to the Inspector-General of Prisons, for information and also that it be published in the *Central Provinces Gazette*.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit herewith my report on the administration of the Jail department for the year ending the 31st December 1932.

2. I held charge of the department throughout the year.

3. There was no change in either the number or in the classification of jails.

4. **Special features.**—The second civil disobedience movement started in January, so that the department was faced with abnormal conditions throughout the year. It was decided to concentrate these disturbers of the peace in special jails and the Amraoti jail was chosen for C class. At the end of January and the beginning of February large numbers from Nagpur and Wardha were concentrated there and by the middle of February the jail was full, the numbers exceeding the normal capacity as measured by berths.

These prisoners on arrival showed their determination to disobey rules, and the jail staff failed to maintain

adequate discipline. Mr. Harvey who had been selected to succeed Mr. Forde at the Akola Jail at the beginning of the year was hurriedly sent to Amraoti in April; by the exercise of firmness and impartiality he restored order in a short time. The civil disobedience prisoners as on the last occasion were recruited mainly from the unemployed and youthful elements of the population. The majority were below the average in physique and a great many were sufferers from chronic diseases of which venereal is the most common.

5. On this occasion a number of women were admitted. These were concentrated at the Nagpur central jail. Here again the less desirable elements of the population were well represented. In jail they gave little trouble and their discipline was good. On the whole the civil disobedience prisoners, apart from the short period in Amraoti, where discipline was bad, behaved themselves well, and gave less trouble to the jail staffs than in 1930-31. With a few exceptions officials and warders acted with loyalty, forbearance and tact, and discipline in the jails affected was maintained.

6. A very noticeable feature of the stay in jail of civil disobedience prisoners is the remarkable improvement in health that the large majority show. This fact is probably due to the better feeding, better housing, better discipline, and more regular hours that these young men enjoy in jail and to the enforcement of more healthful and sanitary habits in general.

7. B class male prisoners were concentrated at Raipur and Akola jails in the early months of the movement, latterly they have been accommodated in Seoni. A few only have given trouble. Owing to the difficulty of supervising interviews and the proved passage of contraband at interviews special arrangements were made early in the year to keep an open work wire-screen between the prisoners and their friends as has always been the practice with ordinary prisoners. The alternative was a thorough search of the prisoners and their relatives before and after interviews. This was not considered practicable.

8. Those who have not taken interviews on account of the screen have made full use of the privilege of writing extra letters in lieu of interviews. Several have also intimated to jail superintendents how useful the

screen was as providing a pretext for their relatives to stop wasting money on railway fares. This special screen has caused considerable outcry, but it has entirely stopped the passage of prohibited articles.

Towards the end of the year a special committee was appointed by Government to report on the problems arising out of the civil disobedience movements as they affected jails.

9. Discipline has been maintained on the whole but I regret to find latterly that jail superintendents and jailers are more inclined than formerly to take the line of least resistance, and to give in to troublesome and influential prisoners for the sake of peace. There is undoubtedly considerable nervousness on the part of officers and warders in enforcing strict discipline. This I attribute to the constant attacks on individual officers and jail administration in general made in the yellow press of the province. I have done what I could to keep up morale, but there remains a feeling that service in the Jail department is "all kicks and no half pence".

10. As a measure of economy, full use was made of the rule empowering the Inspector-General to grant sixty days special remission. Accordingly all convicts whose conduct in jail had not been bad were granted special remission in January. This meant the immediate release of a large number and the shortening of the sentences of the vast majority. Further special remission was granted during the year to prisoners admitted after January and again at the beginning of this year to all deserving prisoners. This shortening of sentences has a very good effect on the general conduct of all prisoners. It has also been found by experience that the great majority of those so rewarded do not return to jail again. There is only one limitation to the grant of remission in general and that is that ordinary and special remission must not exceed one-fourth of the original sentence.

11. A very marked feature of the year has been the increase in the number of persons admitted under the Excise Act. A change seems also noticeable in the type of prisoner. Formerly excise prisoners were old or feeble individuals chiefly from jungle tribes, now many of these persons are youthful and their general physical condition is good. Repeated convictions and classifications as habitual are also common. This seeming

manufacture of habitual law breakers is very much to be regretted.

12. In spite of the increase in the number of prisoners and the inevitable temporary overcrowding, that took place in some of the smaller jails the health of the prisoners was excellent. In the Amraoti jail where the average lock up was more than double that of recent years the mortality was nil and this with the average daily sick was the best record for the past 30 years. The credit for this happy condition of affairs is mainly due to Mr. Harvey the Superintendent, Major Carrey, I.M.S., the Medical Officer and the medical staff.

13. Discharged Prisoners' Aid Society.—As usual in times of political trouble the activities of the society have had to be curtailed. The Nagpur branch is however still doing useful work under the able guidance of Mr. R. W. Fulay, M.L.C. Government has not been in a position to give a grant as in former years. The grants already made provide a capital of Rs. 10,000 from the interest of which grants are made to deserving ex-prisoners. Well-wishers in Nagpur have also raised considerable sums by concerts, etc. There is great scope for work amongst those trained at Narsinghpur and it is hoped that local branches will give more attention to this subject when normal times return. The appointment of probation officers in touch with the society and its ideals would greatly help the efforts to place boys in suitable situations.

CHAPTER I.—JUDICIAL

14. General summary.—The year opened with 4,678 prisoners of all classes showing a decrease of 1,840 as compared with the figure for the year previous, and the number received during the year was 22,507, making a total of 27,185. The number discharged from all causes was 21,886, leaving a balance of 5,299 prisoners at the close of the year with a daily average population of 5,665.12.

15. The convict population at the beginning of the year was 3,926 males and 177 females as compared with 5,614 males and 171 females in the year 1931. The number imprisoned during the year was 8,952 males and 450

females against 6,116 males and 241 females in the preceding year.

The abnormal increase in the admissions is due to the recrudescence of the civil disobedience movement which resulted in the conviction of 2,748 persons up to the end of the year.

During the year 83 prisoners were received on transfer from jails outside the province, some to serve their sentence and others for release. This number includes 7 prisoners received back from the Andamans on account of ill-health. They had been sent to the settlement as volunteers.

Of the 8,910 prisoners discharged during the year, 784 were on appeal, 1,558 on expiry of sentence, 6,209 under the remission rules, 289 by order of Government, 6 were transferred to the mental hospital, Nagpur, 29 were executed and 35 died.

The number remaining at the close of the year was 4,504 against 4,103 or 401 more than in the preceding year. The daily average population of convicts rose from 4,187.64 to 5,002.95 in 1932.

16. Advisory Boards were held at the Jubbulpore, Nagpur, Raipur, Akola, Amraoti and Narsinghpur jails. 304 cases were placed before the Boards for consideration, 59 were recommended for release and 51 prisoners were actually released by orders of Government. During the latter part of the year, the local Government accepted my recommendation, on the grounds of economy and general utility, to discontinue Advisory Board meetings at the Akola, Amraoti, Jubbulpore and Narsinghpur jails. The cases of prisoners at those jails entitled to come up before the Advisory Boards are sent to Raipur in the case of Jubbulpore and Narsinghpur and to Nagpur in the case of Akola and Amraoti.

17. Of the 9,402 convicts imprisoned during the year, 67 were Christians, 849 Muhammadans, 5,119 Hindus, 193 Jains, 3,174 all other classes as compared with 31, 784, 3,025, 71 and 2,446 respectively, in the previous year.

18. The number of juveniles admitted during the year increased by 73 and the number of adolescents also

increased by 975. This abnormal increase was due to the civil disobedience movement. The increase in the admission of literate prisoners from 1,095 to 3,358 in the year under report is also chiefly due to the above movement. 539 professional persons were admitted as against 284 in 1931.

19. Narsinghpur.—The Borstal Institution has made very considerable progress during the year. In April, the Superintendent Mr. P. V. Marathe had to be placed in charge at Akola. He had done well at Narsinghpur. He was replaced by Syed Masum Ali the Deputy Superintendent, the latter post being held in abeyance. He has carried on the good work and fully justified his selection. In March the Government agricultural farm of 88 acres was taken over. It has since been worked without any addition of staff with the aid of the boys, and the farm buildings have been used to accommodate an assistant jailer thus freeing Government of the charge for rent for a bungalow for the superintendent. The whole farm has since been fenced, cattle sheds and buildings repaired and wheat and gram crops planted. It is hoped to feed the boys for at least six months off these crops as well as supplying special varieties of seed grains to local cultivators. It is thus hoped to make this farm a paying proposition. The new well and pump in the main garden are working well and good sugarcane, orange, guava and vegetable crops have been obtained.

The industrial side is doing well under the improved management of the Raipur carpenter Mr. Solomon. The school was well reported on by the Inspector. Sign painting on wood and glass is a flourishing industry. The fife and drum band has now been increased by three bag-pipes and produces a fine volume of sound.

There is an increasing demand for boys to work on license, 17 were so released during the year. I have recently received a requisition for 10 more to work in a local sugar factory and have partially satisfied the demand on the recommendation of the Director of Agriculture.

Football and hockey matches are regularly played with outside teams.

The placing of boys in good situations after release is still difficult but some success has been achieved.

20. The figures below show the number of admissions under the different periods of imprisonment as compared with the figures of the previous year :—

21. The number of reconvicted prisoners rose from 1,045 to 1,064 in the year under report. The ratio per cent to the total number of convicts admitted was 13 against 18 in the preceding year. There was an increase in the number imprisoned for the first time in default of furnishing security under section 110 of the Criminal Procedure Code from 113 to 178 in 1932.

Of the 117 youthful offenders under 15 years of age admitted during the year, two had been convicted previously.

22. Recognition of habituals.—The table below shows the recognition of habitual offenders :—

23. There were three escapes during the year, viz., one each from Raipur, Akola and Betul Jails. Two escaped from outgangs and one from inside the jail. All the prisoners were recaptured and prosecuted ; the jail officials responsible were suitably dealt with.

24. The total number of offences committed by convicts rose from 2,910 to 5,981 in 1932. This abnormal increase was due to the determination of the civil disobedience prisoners to break jail rules. In Amraoti alone, the number of offences committed by these prisoners was 1,504.

Offences dealt with by criminal courts fell from 12 to 5 in the year under report. The number of corporal punishments was four against two in 1931 and the ratio *per mille* to the total population rose from 0.05 to 0.08 in 1932.

CHAPTER II.—FINANCIAL

25. In spite of the increase in the daily average population from 4,848 in 1931 to 5,665 in the year under review, the total expenditure incurred in guarding and maintaining the prisoners fell from Rs. 7,83,679 in 1931 to Rs. 7,07,435 or a decrease of Rs. 76,244. The

decrease is chiefly due to the emergency cut in the salaries of officials and to economy in the purchase of clothing and bedding. The 1931 figures were also swelled by the purchase of new muskets. The expenditure would have fallen still further but for the purchase of wheat instead of juar in the Amraoti and Nagpur jails for civil disobedience prisoners. The several economies effected during the year on account of financial stringency also contributed to a great extent to this decrease. The average cost per head during the year was Rs. 124-14-0 the lowest figure during the last 13 years. The following table shows the cost per head for the last 10 years :—

The causes for the important variations under different heads are explained below.

Establishment charges.—The expenditure under this head decreased by Rs. 19,223. This was chiefly due to the emergency cut in salaries and the restricted grant of leave to officials on account of financial stringency.

Dietary charges.—The total expenditure was Rs. 1,69,533 as compared with Rs. 1,63,211 in the previous year or an increase of Rs. 6,322. The increase is due to the rise in the average population by 822. The cost per head, however, fell from Rs. 33-14-0 in 1931 to Rs. 30-0-11 in the year under report.

Clothing and Bedding.—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 50,453 against Rs. 78,174 in the previous year. The figure for 1931 is abnormal for reasons stated in last year's report.

Extraordinary charges.—The total expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 5,948 against Rs. 34,030 in the previous year. The expenditure in 1931 was abnormally high as it included the cost of new muskets and ammunition purchased to replace the old ones.

Industries.—A brief account of the industries carried on in the important jails is given below.

Jubbulpore Central Jail.—The following table gives details of the goods sold during the year as compared with the previous year.

The average number sentenced to labour was 1,099.53. Out of these only 311.26 could be employed on jail manufactures due to lack of orders from Government departments and general trade depression. It was found extremely difficult to find paying employment for a large number of convicts and more had, therefore, to be employed on unremunerative works such as repairing roads, breaking stone, etc. A gang of 100 convicts was lent to the Police department free of charge to improve the land handed over to them and similarly 40 to the Government farm at Adhartal.

At the close of the year the jail had on stock tents and police uniforms to the value of Rs. 40,000.

Nagpur Central Jail.—The gross profit earned during the year was about Rs. 3,000 less in the factory branch and Rs. 5,000 more in the press than last year. The decrease in the profit of the factory is due to the decrease in the sales and also to a reduction in the price of articles.

Rubber Stamps.—On account of representations received from several Government departments, the price of rubber stamps was reduced by 50 per cent. 520 stamps were supplied on indent against 361 in 1931.

Quinine.—The demand for quinine sulphate and quinine hydro-chloride was about the same as in 1931. The demand for chinchona powder and tablets went up by about 55 lbs. apparently because it is cheaper and not less effective than quinine.

Raipur, Akola and Amraoti District Jails.—The industries carried on in these jails were the same as in previous years. For want of sufficient orders from Government departments and the dislocation of work caused by the civil disobedience movement the activities in some of the jails had to be curtailed.

26. The gross profit amounted to Rs. 1,25,573 as compared with Rs. 1,35,175 in the preceding year or a decrease of Rs. 9,602.

The savings to Government by the employment of prison labour amounted to Rs. 60,408 against Rs. 50,715 or an increase of Rs. 9,693.

27. The total cost of maintenance of prisoners amounted to Rs. 7,07,435 or Rs. 124-14-0 per head and the cash earnings to Rs. 1,42,692 or Rs. 25-3-0 per head. Thus the net cost to Government amounted to Rs. 5,64,743 or Rs. 99-11-0 per prisoner during the year against Rs. 6,17,077 or Rs. 127-4-0 per prisoner in 1931.

28. The following is the statement showing the admissions into hospital, daily average sick, total mortality and ratio of deaths *per mille* for the last two years :—

Of the 1,866 admissions into hospital 1,688 were convicts, 173 undertrials and 5 civil prisoners against a total of 1,665 in the previous year. The increase is due to the admissions of civil disobedience prisoners in a bad state of health.

There were 46 deaths, as compared with 84 in the previous year. Of these 35 were convicts and 11 under-trials.

Jubbulpore Central Jail.—The number of admissions into hospital was 548 against 286 in 1931. Although the admissions were nearly double those of the previous year, the daily average sick rate was 7.96 against 11.25. There were 29 cases of dysentery.

During 1931 there were 12 deaths, whereas this year the number fell to 7.

Nagpur Central Jail.—The number of admissions into hospital fell from 100 to 71. The daily average sick was 2.67 against 4.52 the last year. The mortality dropped from 16 to 8 in the year under report.

Raipur District Jail.—There were 262 admissions into hospital as compared with 341 in 1931, the number of deaths being four against seven last year.

Akola District Jail.—The daily average sick was 11.46 as compared with 9.52 in the previous year. The increase was concomitant with the general increase in jail population during the year. The number of deaths during the year was only two as compared with 13 of last year. Both of them were old and infirm prisoners, admitted to jail in a bad state of health.

Amraoti District Jail.—The total number of admissions into hospital shows a decrease of 17 in spite of the abnormally large population during the year. The general health of the jail population was excellent, there being very little sickness. The average daily sick being 4.69.

It is remarkable that there were no deaths during the year, this is a record not previously attained in the last 30 years.

Chhindwara District Jail.—The number admitted into the hospital was 69 against 39 in the previous year. The daily average sick being 5.31 against 4.51 last year. The increase in the number of admissions into hospital was due to the fact that the year was not a healthy one on account of the greater incidence of malaria. There were five deaths as compared with three in 1931.

Narsinghpur Borstal Institution.—The number admitted into hospital rose from 30 to 76 in the year under report. The increase is due to cases of mumps. There were no deaths.

The figures from the two central jails show the same difference as I noted last year, the admissions to hospital being very much higher in Jubbulpore than in Nagpur, but with a smaller number of deaths. My impression is that one superintendent is more inclined to admit cases of a minor nature to hospital than the other. I am not prepared to say which is the better policy, but my own inclination in a jail is to err on the side of freely admitting suspects rather than keeping them as out patients.

The Amraoti figures are worthy of note when the abnormally high lock-up, and the indifferent health and physical condition of the majority of the prisoners when admitted to the jail are taken into consideration.

Statement No. XV.
Admissions and
deaths from the

29. This statement shows the admissions and deaths from the chief diseases among convicts:—

Dysentery.—There were 189 admissions and five deaths against 226 admissions and 13 deaths in the previous year.

Malaria.—This disease was responsible for 320 admissions and six deaths. There were 246 admissions and four deaths last year.

Tuberculosis of the lungs.—The number of admissions increased by four while the mortality decreased by one.

Pneumonia.—There were 32 admissions and two deaths against 47 admissions and 14 deaths in the year 1931.

Leprosy.—29 lepers remained from last year. 20 more were admitted during the year. Of that number 21 were released during the year. The remaining 28 were under treatment at the close of the year. Most of the lepers have shown definite improvement from the treatment. Three were apparently cured.

The small leper home recently built on the jail land was utilized, two patients being kept there to continue treatment after release.

30. Of the 35 deaths among convicts 10 occurred in the first six months, 13 between first and third year and the remaining 12 above three years of imprisonment.

It would appear that the unaccustomed plenty of the jail dietary still tends to swell jail mortality in the early months of incarceration as pointed out by Colonel Lane

many years ago. I myself consider however that physical disabilities often drive men to crime and that this cause is also responsible for deaths in the early months of a man's sentence. The very small mortality amongst female convicts is a constant feature.

Very little use is made in this province of the provisions for the release of very sick prisoners in prospect of death. It is I consider unsound to spread infection by the release of those in the last stages of infectious or contagious diseases like tuberculosis. Those suffering from acute disease are best off in a jail hospital.

31. The number of prisoners awaiting trial in jails
Statement No. on the 1st January 1932 was 551 against
XVII. 686 in the previous year. The number
Undertrials. received during the year was 8,150 or 2,108 more than in
1931.

Of the total number of 8,701 undertrial prisoners dealt with during the year, 3,691 were released, 4,067 were convicted and sentenced, 163 were transferred and 11 died, leaving 769 at the end of the year. The daily average number was 637.15 as compared with 630.45 in the preceding year.

32. Statement B shows the condition of prisoners released from jails during the year.

Out of 8,840 convicts released during the year 64 per cent gained weight, 12 per cent lost weight and 24 per cent remained stationary against 56, 11 and 33 per cent respectively last year.

33. Statement C.—*Remission*.—The total number of convicts released under the remission rules was 6,209 as compared with 3,561 in the preceding year. Fifty nine convicts failed to gain remission on account of bad conduct. All these were sentenced in connection with civil disobedience movement.

34. *Visitors*.—Non-official visits and quarterly Board meetings were regular. Two jails were visited by the Hon'ble the Home Member and two by the Hon'ble the Minister for Public Health. District Magistrates, Sessions Judges and Commissioners have as usual made frequent inspections.

All the jails were inspected by the Inspector-General of prisons during the year.

The religious preachers have also continued to visit the jails to give religious and moral instruction to prisoners.

In Nagpur as usual the Ladies Committee on which Mrs. Deo is a very regular worker visited the female wing once or twice a week, continuing this excellent work even in the hot weather. Their visits are very much appreciated and keep the courage of the female prisoners up during their stay in jail.

The rules for non-official visitors have recently been revised so as to enable them to visit their jails more frequently. When the last set of rules were framed there was considerable misunderstanding. There has never been any restriction on the number of visits which philanthropic workers could pay, such visits have always been encouraged.

35. Many changes have taken place in our jails since I first joined the C. P. Jail department in Jubbulpore in 1910. Then as now Khan Sahib Cursetjee was the ruling spirit in the jail factory. Three of the junior Assistant Jailers are now acting as Superintendents of jails. All classes and types of prisoners were to be found in each jail, though lodged in separate barracks. Now we have habitual and casual jails, tubercular and leper wings, a jail for the old and infirm and a fully organized Borstal Institution. The first jail school in the province was held in the octagon at Jubbulpore under the charge of a young schoolmaster convicted for murder then too young to go to the Andamans, now we have fully organized schools in all the large jails with specially recruited schoolmasters. The two central jails have also schools with school mistresses. We have three carpenter instructors, Assistant Jailors specially trained in agriculture and scouting, and retired army officers as octagon officers.

Discipline all round has very much improved but at the same time the prisoners have more self-respect and punishments are a fraction of what they were.

The working of the Advisory Boards and the liberal granting of special remission have contributed to the result.

The many other changes such as better lighting, recreation such as games and reading, etc., are too numerous to note.

The only portion of our programme that has not yet been carried out is the institution of senior and junior certified schools to work the Children Act passed four years' ago. The Reformatory School at Jubbulpore can be readily adapted as a senior school; buildings may

shortly be available at Kamptee to start a junior school and I have every hope that the project will be carried out. The site, situation and the whole layout are very suitable for the purpose. There is no doubt that efforts must be made as soon as possible to work the Childrens Act and so keep numerous young boys now waifs and strays from taking to a career of crime.

36. The officers of the department have worked with the greatest loyalty and devotion to duty during the year. I find it difficult to select names for special mention. I will confine myself therefore to those who have had the most arduous time on account of the civil disobedience movement and these are—
