## PART I

## Kenya Prisons Annual Report, 1933

## PRISONS DEPARTMENT

## I.—STAFF.

1. The authorized establishment of European Staff for the year was nineteen—the same as for the previous year. European staff.

2. In accordance with the recommendations of the Expenditure Advisory Committee the post of Commissioner was left vacant from the retirement of Mr. C. E. Spencer, I.S.O., on the 27th June until the end of the year; the Assistant Commissioner thus continued to act as Commissioner during that period and an officer, Captain J. H. Frank, M.C., from among the number of Assistant Superintendents was selected as Staff Officer to carry out the duties which would normally have been performed by an Assistant Commissioner. An extra Temporary Chief Officer was engaged to take the place of the Assistant Superintendent transferred to headquarters.

3. The following promotions were made during the year :

Mr. M. Dards to Senior Superintendent of Prisons as from 1st January.

Mr. B. B. Donald to Superintendent of Prisons as from 1st January.

Mr. C. V. T. Harte to Assistant Superintendent of Prisons as from 1st January.

One vacancy each in the posts of Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent were left unfilled.

4. The Superintendents of the three first-class prisons throughout the year were as follows :—

*Nairobi* : Mr. M. Dards from 1-1-33 to 31-8-33; Mr. B. B. Donald from 1-9-33 to 31-12-33.

*Kisumu* : Mr. A. H. Marshall from 1-1-33 to 31-8-33; Mr. M. Dards from 1-9-33 to 31-12-33.

*Mombasa* : Mr. B. B. Donald from 1-1-33 to 31-8-33; Mr. A. H. Marshall from 1-9-33 to 31-12-33.

5. The establishment of the Asian staff of the Department remained unchanged, viz : nine Clerks and four Technical Instructors. Asian staff.
