

Sir.

I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report on the working of Co-operative Societies in the Province of Bombay for the year ending 30th June 1938.

#### I. ADMINISTRATION.

#### GAZETTED STAFF.

Registrar.—The gazetted staff of the Department saw several changes during the year under report. I was in charge of the office of the Registrar till 11th June 1938, when Mr. S. M. Ikram, I.C.S., who held the post of the Deputy Registrar took over charge from me and acted as Registrar for the remainder of the year.

Deputy Registrar.—Mr. S. M. Ikram, I.C.S., held the post till 11th June 1938 when he was appointed to act for me. Thereafter the post was held in abeyance till the end of the year.

Personal Assistant.—The post of the Personal Assistant to the Registrar which was retrenched in 1932 as a measure of economy was revived under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 6734/33, dated 12th May 1938, and Mr. D. A. Shah, Assistant Registrar, was appointed in the post from 9th June 1938.

Assistant Registrars.—The post of the Assistant Registrar, Land Mortgage Banks, who was doing duty as Personal Assistant to the Registrar, was abolished from 9th June 1938, and the work was entrusted to the Deputy Registrar. The post was, however, again revived from 24th June 1938, in place of the post of the Deputy Registrar which was held in abeyance. The temporary post of the Assistant Registrar in charge of Co-operative Training and Education terminated from 1st August 1937, and Mr. Nayak who held the post was placed on special duty for a period of three and a half months for work in connection with the revision of the Co-operative Societies Manual in the post created under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 6480, dated 17th June 1937. Under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7353/33, dated 15th February 1938, a post of Assistant Registrar was created for a period of three months for work in connection with the reorganization of the co-operative movement and Mr. D. A. Shah was appointed to hold it. Mr. Shah was also placed in charge of the scheme for Co-operative Training and Education in addition to his other duties on termination of the special post held by Mr. Nayak.

#### SUBORDINATE STAFF.

3. Under G. R., R. D., No. 8672/28, dated 9th May 1938, Government sanctioned the employment of 24 additional sub-auditors and ordered the reduction of 7 posts of Auditors. As, however, the orders of Government could not be given effect to before the close of the year, the permanent strength of Auditors, Sub-Auditors, Agricultural Organisers and the Weaving staff continued to be the same as last year. Out of the four temporary posts of Agricultural Organisers, which were sanctioned under G. R., R. D., No. 3289/33, dated 22nd April 1936, under the Sugar Excise Subsidy Scheme of the Government of India, one was retrenched with effect from 9th March 1938 and another was held in abeyance from 28th April 1938.

#### SPECIAL TEMPORARY STAFF.

4. The agency of the Special Recovery Officers for the recovery of co-operative societies' dues was continued throughout the year. In August 1937, Government directed that the recovery of co-operative societies' dues by coercive process should be stopped until the next harvest. The Collectors concerned were accordingly requested to discontinue the establishments of the Special Recovery Officers, as the establishments of the Special Recovery Officers did not hold out any prospects of being self-supporting in the absence of the use of the coercive processes. The posts of the Special Recovery Officers at Bijapur, Belgaum, Satara, Ahmednagar, Poona, West Khandesh, Nasik, Broach and Surat were accordingly held in abeyance. In the districts of Kanara, Dharwar, Sholapur, East Khandesh and Bombay, the posts were not discontinued, as it was found that the Special Recovery Officers could usefully be employed in attending to the preliminary work of execution proceedings during the period of suspension of coercive measures. In districts where the posts of Special Recovery Officers were held in abeyance, Collectors were requested to revive the posts a month before the period of suspension of coercive process terminated. The posts were revived in the months of December and January.

Under G. R., R. D., No. 354-A, dated 26th September 1937, the post of the Special Mamlatdar for Bhil Societies at Dohad was abolished with effect from 1st October 1937, and in its place, a post of Special Supervision Officer in the grade of Rs. 135—5—180 was sanctioned. The post of the Special Officer for organization of the Bhil area in the West Khandesh was continued throughout the year.

The Special Liquidation Officers at Poona, Dharwar, Sholapur, Bijapur and Jalgaon were continued throughout the year. A post of Special Liquidation Officer with headquarters at Belapur for the liquidation work of Societies in Liquidation in the canal tracts of the Ahmednagar District was created for a period of one year with effect from 1st July 1937 on the Provincial Co-operative Bank agreeing to contribute Rs. 2,500 towards the cost of the Special Liquidation Officer and his establishment.

<sup>12.</sup> Suppression of Corruption.—The orders issued by Government from time to time in regard to the elimination of corruption have been communicated to the officers of the Department and suitable action has been taken whenever any lapses are noticed on their part. In one case, as a result of a departmental enquiry, an officer of the rank of an auditor in the Department was found to be responsible, amongst other things, for submission of false diaries and preferment of false claims for travelling allowance. He has been dismissed from service. No complaints have been received against any of the officers of the Department regarding inadequate payment for supplies while on tour.

#### II. SUMMARY OF GENERAL PROGRESS.

13. Season.—The co-operative-movement passed through another year, which was characterized by unsatisfactory agricultural conditions prevailing in several parts of the Province. The general failure of rains in Sholapur and Bijapur districts and excessive rainfall in

almost all the districts of Gujarat did damage to standing crops and rendered the outlook very depressing to agriculturists. As a consequence, collection of land revenue in many places was suspended. The prices of agricultural produce continued to be very low. In the circumstances, it was too much to hope that the movement should show upward progress everywhere.

15. The decline in the number and the working capital of the Central Banks is due to the winding up of the Nasik District Central Co-operative Bank, Limited. The decline in the number of agricultural societies and their membership is due to the continuance of the policy of rectification and consolidation pursued by the Department. The owned capital and working capital of the agricultural societies show an increase. Non-agricultural societies are maintaining their record of steady progress.

An analysis of the figures in the above statement will show that the position of the agricultural societies, in so far as it relates to the repayment of loans due by their members, is not satisfactory, as the overdues amount to nearly 53 per cent. of the demand. Various causes such as adverse agricultural conditions, slump in prices of commodities and the protection given to the agriculturists under the Small-Holders Relief Act have contributed to the decline in recoveries and increase in the percentage of overdues during the year under report.

- 20. Government appointed under its Government Rosolution, Revenue Department, No. 7363/33, dated 6th September 1937, Mr. Vaikunth L. Mehta, Managing Director of the Provincial Co-operative Bank, and the Registrar of Co-operative Societies to examine and report on the present position of the co-operative movement in the Province of Bombay and to make specific recommendations regarding the future lines of development. The terms of reference were:—
  - (1) The proper method of dealing with such of the assets of agricultural credit societies and their central financing agency as have become frozen;
  - (2) The system of education and propaganda, finance, audit, supervision, and official and non-official control;
- (3) The development of non-credit co-operation, especially for the purpose of better farming, the marketing of agricultural produce and the organization of secondary occupations and cottage industries.

The Joint Report was submitted to Government of 30th October 1937 and the orders of Government on the recommendations in the Joint Report are embodied in Government Resolutions, Revenue Department, No. 7363/33/1622, dated 27th January 1938 and No. 7363/33, dated 15th March 1938.

22. With the registration of 12 societies and cancellation of 28 societies, the total number of societies at the close of the year shows a decrease of 16 over the previous year's figure. Of the 12 new societies registered, four were in the Southern Division, five in the Central Division, one in the Khandesh Division, and two in the Bombay Division. The small number of fresh registrations is due to the policy followed with regard to fresh registration according to which all proposals are subjected to a very

careful scrutiny and no society is ordinarily registered, unless it holds out fair prospects of successful working. The main criteria which are required to be fulfilled are explained in the paragraph dealing with the constitution of rural primaries. During the year registration in 10 cases was refused and 33 cases were pending final disposal at the close of the year. As regards cancellation, the policy which is now followed is that a society which continues to be in D class continuously for three years has consistently made losses and whose arrears of interest exceed an amount equivalent to three years' interest should be taken into liquidation. No society is, however, ordered to be wound up unless it is given a fair chance of improving its affairs and unless all attempts at revival through special devices such as grant of relief to debtors under the scheme of concessions and more effective control after suspension of the members of the managing committee where they have become lax, prove futile. Not withstanding a decrease in the number of societies, there is an increase in the total working capital which is due to the increase in the reserve and other funds. The decrease in members' deposits is due to their conversion into share capital in consequence of the adoption of share system bye-laws by a large number of societies, resulting in a corresponding increase in share capital. The decrease in membership is partly due to the cancellation of societies.

The fall in the figure of fresh finance is particularly marked in the Khandesh Division where the total loans advanced amounted to Rs. 27 lakhs as against 37 lakhs of the previous year. In other divisions the position in this respect is very much the same as in the previous year, except that the Bombay Division shows satisfactory improvement. In the Khandesh Division, there is a considerable fall to the extent of nearly Rs. 10 lakhs, which was mainly due to the unfavourable condition of the agricultural season. The position with regard to recovery of interest does not show any improvement and is aggravated by the heavy arrears in Canal Societies of Nagar and Poona districts.

The large increase in the number of D class societies is due to the strict classification enforced at audit, which is based mainly on the percentage of overdues. Out of the 3,715 societies, 1,372 societies have overdues ranging between 10 and 25 per cent., 1,102 societies have overdues ranging between 25 and 40 per cent. and 1,028 societies have overdues exceeding 40 per cent.

A combination of various factors such as ignorance of the agriculturists in the principles and practice of co-operation, defective organization of societies, paucity of public-spirited and honest workers, defective supervision in the initial stages coupled with indiscriminate finance, bad agricultural seasons and continued agricultural depression has been responsible for the present state of affairs in societies. The most important factors, viz., bad agricultural seasons and continued agricultural depression, which bring into prominence the other defects, are beyond the control of the Co-operative Department or co-operative societies and individual co-operators, and it would not be too optimistic to hope that coupled with a favourable season and a rise in prices, the movements will show marked improvement in the position of its agricultural The whole problem has been engaging the attention of co-operators who, so far as it lies in their power, continue to make efforts to bring about the rehabilitation of the movement by removing causes of stagnation and deterioration. The lines on which this process of rehabilitation could be worked out have been laid down, and during the year under report, a beginning in this direction was made. The Supervisors, Bank Inspectors and Auditors were instructed to examine the outstandings of each society with the object of determining the extent of its frozen. doubtful and bad debts. These investigations were completed in the case of 3,392 societies out of the total number of 3,702 societies.

- The process of rehabilitation aims at making the position of the societies as clear as possible regarding the reality of their assets in the form of loans outstanding. With a view to facilitate the recovery of loans, the concessions offered to debtor-members were substantial according to the nature of the debts classified. Liberal remissions of interest are allowed after examination of each individual case. In the case of doubtful debts, it is laid down that all recoveries should be credited to principal and accrued interest shown in a suspense account and recovered later if and when possible, and the concession to stop further accrual of interest on doubtful debts should be allowed individually, if there is a genuine attempt to make repayments. In order that the agriculturists may not lose their lands or may get them back even after they have passed into the hands of societies, societies were asked to enter into hire purchase bonds with members if adequate assess and repaying capacity existed for the purpose. In the case of bad debts, societies were advised to obtain sanction for writing off such bad debts against the reserve fund. The total losses written off during the year amounted to Rs. 55,591. The measure of success in this task of rehabilitation depends to a large extent upon the sympathy and readiness of the Central Financing Agencies to lend a helping hand to the financially weak societies by granting concessions to them commensurate with the concessions which the societies are advised to grant to their indebted members.
- 28. The policy of the grant of concessions to members of co-operative societies should not be construed as an encouragement to contumacious defaulters. With a view not to leave any room for such misunderstanding, Government issued a Press Communique after the close of the year, making it clear that it was not the desire of Government that debtor members of co-operative societies should withhold repayment of their loans and that Government would take necessary steps to effect recoveries from contumacious defaulters.
- 29. Under the Small-Holders Relief Act which is an important piece of legislation affecting vitally the economic welfare of the agriculturists, benefits in regard to the sale of lands are

given to small-holders as defined in the Act, and they have also been extended to the agriculturist members of co-operative societies (vide Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 8151/33, dated the 1st April 1938), and accordingly, debtors of co-operative societies, who are small-holders, are entitled to stay of proceedings for sale of lands on payment to the society of one year's interest on the amount for the recovery of which the land is sought to be sold. The benefits were extended even to those agriculturist members of co-operative societies who are not small-holders, but the standard of minimum payment for their eligibility for the benefits was fixed higher, i.e., two years' interest on the amount due for recovery.

- 32. With the cancellation of one society under Godavari Canal and the registration of another society in the area, the total number of societies remained unchanged. The reconstruction work in eight societies recently registered in place of the societies ordered to be wound up was continued with a view to help solvent members of the old societies and also in order to facilitate the recoveries in societies under liquidation. It is yet too early to guage the results of reconstruction achieved through the agency of these societies.
- 33. While a percentage of overdues has increased from 77 to 83 per cent. the policy of restricted finance has resulted in reducing the total burden of debt by Rs. 17,754. The recoveries on account of interest work out at 45 per cent. of the total outstandings. Concessions at 40 per cent. and more under special cases of compromises were granted in these societies. On an average one year's interest has been received. The classification of debts which is in progress indicates a rise in the figure of bad and doubtful debts from Rs. 2,20,293 to Rs. 3,61,173. The reduction in the amount locked up in lands is due to the fact that vigorous attempts are in progresss to transfer the lands to the original owners under the hire-purchase system, and where they are not willing to come forward, to sell them by public auction. The reduction in the figure of deposits is due to adjustments against loans outstanding.
- 34. The Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank continued to charge preferential rates of interest of 4 per cent. on old outstandings, and in the case of weak societies a further reduction was allowed on the basis of repayments on a sliding scale.

- 36. In West Khandesh both share capital and reserve fund record an increase over the last year's figure. The decrease in the figure of fresh finance from Rs. 41,400 to Rs. 18,603 is due to the fact that no fresh advances were made to societies in Nawapur Peta and finance to members of societies in Nandurbar taluka was restricted. The overdues show an increase from Rs. 53,790 to Rs. 70,440. Attempts are being made to improve the working of the societies through the appointment of a special officer.
- 37. In the Panch Mahals, the working of the societies showed satisfactory results during the year under report. The recoveries are substantial and there is a reduction in the percentage of overdues from 49 to 46 per cent.
- 38. (ii) Other Societies.—In addition to the above societies which cater for the Bhil population in West Khandesh and the Panch Mahals, there is a number of other credit societies which cater for the needs of employees of local bodies. Their membership, though largely consisting of backward classes, is not, however, exclusively restricted to those classes. The following table gives some salient figures about the position and working of these societies:—

- 39. As regards the development of the backward tracts, the report submitted by the Special Enquiry Officer for Partially Excluded Areas indicates the lines on which the system of rural credit in these areas could be organized. I have separately submitted my remarks on the recommendations of the Special Enquiry Officer, which are now under the consideration of Government.
- 40. Tagavi Loans.—In view of the decision of Government not to make any fresh allotment under the Land Improvement Loans Act, no fresh loans were advanced, though small loans for amounts less than Rs. 400 were allowed from the funds of the Provincial Bank chiefly for construction or repairs of wells and made repayable in three to five instalments. Loans for land improvement in excess of the above limit are obtainable from the Land Mortgage Banks.

### Constitution of Rural Primaries.

- 41. The year under report witnessed an orientation in policy with regard to the constitution and functions of rural primaries. In Leastet A (3) (containing the revised model bye-laws for agricultural credit societies) which has been drafted in accordance with the orders contained in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7363/33, dated the 15th March 1938, several important changes have been introduced, though the fundamentals of the existing organizations have been preserved as far as possible. The standard of outside borrowing limit as compared to members' assets and share capital has been revised so as to permit outside borrowings on a restricted scale. The lending business is restricted to short-term loans and intermediate-term loans for periods not exceeding five years. The bye-laws also aim at a broadening of the basis of the primary so as to increase its utility to its members. Provision is accordingly made in the bye-laws that the members should sell their produce through a co-operative marketing agency wherever available. The thrift aspect of the institution is emphasized by a provision for compulsory deposits at harvest time.
- 42. Multi-Purpose Societies.—The multi-purpose societie constitute a further stage in the evolution of agricultural credi societies. The Joint Report recommended the organisation c multi-purpose societies and suggested that where marketin

facilities or suitable bazars were available in the immediate neighbourhood, a multi-purpose society for a group of villages within a radius of five miles could be registered on an unlimited liability basis. Government has accepted this recommendation and ordered that it should be implemented in an experimental way.

43. The past experience in this province has shown that the credit dispensed by the credit society cannot be properly controlled, if it is divorced from supply and sale. The objects of the multipurpose society have, therefore, been kept wide, so as to include supply and sale, though with regard to credit, its sphere of operation is restricted to finance for normal cultivation needs and intermediate finance to a limited extent. In addition to the provision for credit, the society aims at supplying such agricultural requisites as seed, manures, feeding stuffs, etc., and also domestic and other requisites to members and at organizing arrangements for the joint sale of the produce.

A beginning in this direction was made by the registration of a multi-purpose society at Gorhe.

## Supervision.

44. The number of District Boards of Supervising Unions stands at 15. Kolaba, Ratnagiri and Broach continue to be without any board. Ninety-five Supervising Unions and one society has been affiliated to these Boards. The staff of these Boards consists of 2 senior supervisors, 112 supervisors and 19 assistant supervisors. The control of these Boards over the Supervising Unions has been useful to a certain extent in regulating the work of the latter.

The number of Supervising Unions stands at 95 with 3,051 agricultural and 58 non-agricultural societies affiliated to them.

45. The results of the changes and arrangements sanctioned under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 10056/28, dated 15th April 1936, vary according to different areas. In certain areas, such as Gujerat, District Boards, according to the new scheme, have not started functioning. In other areas, like the Southern Division, results have been comparatively encouraging. The results regarding improvement of efficiency of supervisors too have not been uniform and provision for leave and provident funds could not be made on account of insufficient funds.

During the year under report, the Unions helped considerably in the classification of loans into frozen, bad and doubtful on the lines laid down in the Registrar's circular.

# Land Mortgage Banks.

46. A separate statement B (1) showing the operation of land mortgage banks is appended.

The number of primary land mortgage banks working in the Province at the close of the year was 13. There were no fresh registrations of primary land mortgage banks during the year.

There was a steady increase in the business of the land mortgage banks during the year under report. In the case of the old land mortgage banks, viz. Dharwar, Pachora and Broach, the work done was mostly in respect of revaluation of cases which were proposed to be transferred from the Provincial Co-operative Bank to the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank. The Dharwar Land Mortgage Bank took a long time in adopting the suggestion made in pursuance of Government orders advising the Bank to restrict the area of operation to Dharwar and Kalghatgi Talukas. The share capital of the land mortgage banks increased from Rs. 1,99,673 to Rs. 2,27,390, the increase being mostly due to the purchase of additional shares by the borrowing members in proportion to the amount of loans advanced to them. The practice of recovering subscriptions towards shares from "B" class members has been abandoned by most of the banks and instead, a provision has been made in the bye-laws of the banks, levying only a small fee for admission of persons to membership in "B" class. "B" class members are those who, being coparceners with the borrowing members, are required to join in the execution of mortgage deeds passed in favour of the land mortgage banks.

- 49. From the statement it will be seen that during the year under report the number of members has increased from 6,562 to 7,654. The amount of loans advanced to members has gone up from Rs. 6,65,072 to Rs. 13,60,470 exclusive of the loans advanced previously by the Provincial Co-operative Bank to the three old Banks. The number of applications received by the primary banks during the year was 1,284. Of these 688 applications were recommended for loans to the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank. The total amount outstanding with members of the primary banks at the end of the year was Rs. 16,63,344.
- 50. Out of the total loan advanced to borrowers, Rs. 1,77,146 including interest were due for repayment, Rs. 46,299 in principal and Rs. 60,849 in interest were recovered during the period leaving a balance of Rs. 69,998 and the amount overdue from members in all the banks is Rs. 60,658 including interest. The overdues are to be found to a large extent in the old banks, viz. Dharwar, Pachora and Broach Land Mortgage Banks. Steps have been taken to institute

- arbitration proceedings against defaulters and to obtain awards against them. The amounts under award appear large as the banks were obliged to recall the whole loan from defaulters though some instalments had not fallen due. Extensions are given in deserving cases provided the borrower pays at least full interest.
- 51. With the progress in their business, the income of the banks has began to grow and seven of them were able to show profit in their working at the close of the year. The working of the Dharwar Land Mortgage Bank is extremely slack and leaves much to be desired. It is a matter for regret that serious irregularities and frauds were noticed in the working of the Hubli Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank. Steps were taken for supersession of the Board of Directors of the Bank after the close of the year.
- 52. All the new Land Mortgage Banks registered in 1935 were given a subsidy of Rs. 500 for the third year in succession towards the cost of the land valuation officers who are lent hands from the Co-operative Department.
- The number of applications received by some banks showed a tendency to decrease while the rigidity of the test applied by the Land Mortgage Banks in granting loans to the applicants may scare away a certain class of borrowers. The banks in their own interest have to make a thorough scrutiny of the cases coming before them in order to safeguard their funds. No loans are recommended unless there is sufficient security and also adequate repaying capacity to ensure punctual payment of loans and the title to the lands taken as security is certified to be clear and marketable. These precautions are necessary in order that the Banks may maintain their credit with the investing public from whom funds are raised through the Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank for Attempt is made to conciliate debts and the financing borrowers. total amount of remissions obtained by conciliation effected during the year in respect of debts redeemed with the help of loans given by the banks amounted to Rs. 1,06,297.

# Provincial Land Mortgage Bank.

- 54. Sir Govindrao B. Pradhan, Kt., J.P., was nominated as the President of the Bank by Government under by-law 33 of the Bank. Mr. V. B. Mardhekar, M.A., continued to work as Managing Director of the Bank.
- 55. Six Board meetings and eleven Executive Committee meetings were held during the year. There was no material change in the constitution of the bank.
- 56. The paid-up share capital of the bank rose from Rs. 3,74,300 to Rs. 3,94,700 during the year. The increase in the share capital was mainly due to the purchase of shares by the primary banks in the proportion of 5 per cent. of their borrowing from the bank. No additional shares were issued to individuals or Co-operative Societies. During the year the bank received 633 loan applications for Rs. 11,20,570 out of which 526 loan applications for Rs. 7,32,920 were sanctioned and 31 loan applications for

- Rs. 1,17,355 were rejected. The Bank received, since its inception, 1,472 loan applications for Rs. 26,05,963 out of which 1,178 loan applications for Rs. 16,33,350 were sanctioned and 86 loan applications for Rs. 2,83,175 were rejected. One hundred and fifteen loan applications for Rs. 2,38,438 were pending with the bank at the close of the year. The total amount actually advanced by the bank up to 30th June 1938, was Rs. 13,03,830.
- 57. The loans advanced by the bank were mainly for redemption of debts and in a very few cases loans were given for land improvement and purchase of lands. The majority of loan applications sanctioned were for sums less than Rs. 2,000.
- 58. Sanction was received during the year from Government to the debenture trust deed authorizing the bank to float its first series of debentures for Rs. 20 lakhs. Though it was originally intended to float debentures at 3 per cent., it was decided in view of the change in the condition of the money market, to offer the debentures at 3½ per cent. The debentures were issued to the public on the 5th May 1938 by advertising the prospectus in daily papers. Response was very encouraging. The Co-operative Banks have subscribed to the extent of Rs. 3,80,600 and the rest viz. Rs. 12,74,600 have been subscribed by Insurance Companies, Bank and private individuals during the period the debentures were kept open for subscription by the public.

The work regarding transfer of assets and liabilities of the land mortgage department of the Provincial Co-operative Bank to the Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank was in progress during the year. A large number of cases where loans were given in the past by the Pachora Land Mortgage Bank and the Broach Land Mortgage Bank by borrowing from the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank, were transferred to the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank during the year.

59. Government has by a notification issued under No. 6576/24, dated 1st April 1938, granted a concession to the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank by declaring that transfers of debentures of the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank are exempted from stamp duty.

### (b) AGRICULTURAL Non-CREDIT SOCIETIES.

60. General conditions.—During the year under report, 15 new societies were registered, while the affairs of two societies were ordered to be wound up.

The following paragraphs deal with some of the important types of non-credit societies.

61. Cotton.—With a registration of a new society in the Panch Mahals, the number of such societies stands at 29. Except the Hubli Cotton Sale Society, all other societies have maintained the progress made. The Gadag Sale Society sold kapas worth Rs. 7,09,976, made profits of Rs. 11,123 and earned commission aggregating to Rs. 13,249. The Purushottam Co-operative Ginning Society ginned 86,987 maunds of cotton. During the course of the year, it installed 18 additional gins, worked on the motive power of electricity supplied by the Rander Electric Supply Company. The ginning charges

earned by the society amounted to Rs. 23,278 and it made a profit of Rs. 9,772. The Farmers' Co-operative Ginning and Pressing Society ginned 36,096 maunds of cotton as against 32,335 of the preceding year. It reduced its ginning rate from Rs. 3-11-0 to Rs. 3-0-0 per bhar. The ginning charges earned by the society were Rs. 10,622. The Sayan Group Co-operative Ginning Society ginned 29,196 maunds of cotton this year and realized Rs. 10,970 as ginning charges. The co-operative societies in Gujerat have been able to sell 12 per cent. of cotton grown in the area:—

A special mention requires to be made of the following societies:—

Chilly.—The Tarapore-Chinchni Co-operative Chillies Sale Society sold 2,076 bags of chillies and tomatoes, earning commission of Rs. 187. The Byadgi Chillies Sale Union is running efficiently in spite of a small fall of business. It sold chillies worth Rs. 20,000, but suffered a loss of Rs. 124.

Manga.—The two mango sale societies at Malwan and Vengurla rendered assistance to the members in packing and shipping the fruit to outside stations.

Fruits and Vegetables.—The Rahuri Taluka Fruit Sale Society is progressing satisfactorily although it caters for the needs of petty merchants only. It has made marketing arrangements by opening a shop in Bombay. The Raver Taluka Co-operative Fruit Sale Society sold plantains valued at Rs. 2,189 and oranges worth Rs. 16,385. The Belgaum Gardeners' Produce and Sale Society is maintaining its progress. It sold vegetables worth Rs. 15,000 and seed worth Rs. 3,000. The Southern Gujerat Vegetable Growers' Association works more as a transport society than a sale society. It earned income of Rs. 717 by export of mangoes. It made a profit of Rs. 665.

Eggs.—The Belgaum Poultry and Egg Sale Society suffered losses: due to an epidemic among the poultry. It sold 2,127 eggs. The other egg sale society at Yelloor is making steady progress. It is concentrating its activities towards improvement of breed of poultry. It sold eggs valued at Rs. 700 and earned profits of Rs. 106.

Arecanut.—Both the arecanut societies are in North Kanara which abounds in betel-nut gardens. The total sales of these societies amounted to Rs. 1,77,431 and profits made were Rs. 1,350.

Paddy.—The only paddy sale society in Palghar Taluka sold 312 tons of rice and earned commission of Rs. 1,065. Its net profit was Rs. 326.

Cattle Breeding Societies.—There are 14 such societies in Karnatak Division and 4 in other divisions. The total membership of these societies was 628. These societies maintained 14 stud bulls and 601 cows. The number of calves born during the year was 136.

Dairy Societies.—There was no increase in the number of dairy societies, but the membership increased from 831 to 897. The total number of milking animals owned by these societies was 1,342. The quantity of milk supplied by members during the year was 377,227 lbs. The aggregate profit of these societies was Rs. 709.

Fencing Societies.—The Dhadne Co-operative Society in Sakri Taluka is not working properly. The societies in Dharwar District are all situated in compact areas and are working well. The fencings put by them cover a large area. The total number of such societies was 16 as against 15 in the last year. The membership totalled 1,510. The length of fence or wall was 77,249 yards and the area protected by fence was 19,663 acres.

Crop Protection Societies.—The number of these societies increased from 20 to 23. The societies have invested small amount in guns, spray pumps, nets and other articles used for protection of crops. The income of these societies during the year was Rs. 25,620 and expenditure was Rs. 17,346. The societies earned a profit of Rs. 1,910. Most of these societies are in Khandesh Division and proving very beneficial to villagers.

Land Improvement Societies.—The number of these societies was 10 as against 8 of the previous year. The number of members was 547 and area covered by such societies comprised 4,872 acres.

Area improved during the year was 30 acres at a cost of Rs. 1,643. The cost of management was Rs. 1,362 and the profits earned amounted to Rs. 2,548. The Yelavigi Waddars' Land Improvement Society continues to do good work. 210 acres of waste land were brought into cultivation, divided into plots and distributed amongst members. The Maharajpeth Joint Cultivation Society suffered a handicap due to lack of irrigation facilities.

Dam Construction Society.—Two of the three such societies in North Kanara are doing well. They construct dams for stopping the ingress of salt water in the river water, keeping the latter fit for cultivation.

Machinery and Implement Societies.—Their number increased from 24 to 30. The machinery used consists of power-crushers etc. and implements used were ploughs, drills etc. of the improved type. The sales effected by these societies amounted to Rs. 5,568 and total commission earned on consignment accounts was Rs. 319. Profits amounted to Rs. 1,187.

Manure Societies.—These societies sell oil cakes, fish manures, bone-meal, chemicals etc. The value of manure sold was Rs. 2,523. The cost of management of the societies was Rs. 472 and the profits earned totalled Rs. 328.

Seed Societies.—The number of seed societies increased from 25 to 26. These societies sold cotton, corn, sugarcane and other seeds of Rs. 5,588. Their working capital was Rs. 23,294 and they made a profit of Rs. 667.

The main activities of these societies are directed towards introduction of improved variety of sugarcane, storage of onions and sale of vegetable products. The sugarcane growers' societies subsidized from the Sugar Excise Scheme were successful in bringing large areas under improved variety of cane sets.

Purchase and Sale Unions.—The Lasalgaon Purchase and Sale Union sold produce worth Rs. 38,800 and earned a commission of Rs. 511. The arrangements for storing produce is made by hiring godowns. The agency opened at Taloda was continued to afford marketing facilities to members of Bhil societies. The Union acts as an agent for sale of its members' produce on commission basis and supplies seeds to members as well as non-members. The Union sold cotton, oil seeds, groundnuts and cereals of the aggregate amount of Rs. 3,32,810 and supplied other requisites valued at Rs. 42,274. The commission earned by the Union was Rs. 5,031 but it suffered a loss of Rs. 1,659. The Pachora Taluka Purchase and Sale Society, with its jurisdiction extending to Pachora Taluka and Bhadgaon Petha, worked on a self-supporting basis. The total business transacted by the society amounted to Rs. 88,436. It earned a commission of Rs. 528. The society holds open sales and weighments are made on a weighing bridge.

64. Taluka Development Associations.—Only two new associations were registered in the year under review, bringing the total number to 105. The total membership of the associations was 30,641. Their income consists of subscriptions from members, societies, grants from Government, donations from local bodies etc. Comparatively extensive areas of operations and loose membership have limited the utility of the Associations for intensive work. They have been trying to introduce improved methods of agriculture, to improve the breed of cattle and poultry and to do other rural uplift work. Several of them receive grants from village uplift committees and subsidies from Government.

#### (2) Banking in General.

66. Hitherto all non-agricultural credit societies with a working capital exceeding Rs. 50,000 were classed as "Banks" irrespective of the fact whether they undertook any banking business as such. This criterion of discriminating banks from societies was not

satisfactory in all respects. Government has now directed that the use of the word "Bank" should be restricted to societies which do the business of banking as defined in section 277-F of the Indian Companies Act and have a paid-up share capital of not less than Rs. 20,000.

- 67. As pointed out in the previous administration reports, there has been some conflict of interests between the Central Banks and Urban Banks in the sphere of banking. On account of a plethora of surplus funds which could not be profitably utilised in their own legitimate business of finance to affiliated primaries, the Central Banks were compelled to undertake urban banking business which resulted in some cases in an encroachment on the business of urban banks, and also in overlapping finance. The position in this respect was examined in the Joint Report submitted to Government, and Government has accepted the recommendations made therein that nominal membership for the purpose of advances against produce and valuables may be permitted in a Central Bank, to members of primaries other than urban banks and sale societies affiliated to it and representation of one member on their behalf allowed. As regards loans to individual members of Central Banks, Government has directed that the present practice of advances to individual members against produce and valuables may be continued subject to the following limitations:—
  - (1) absolute limits must be fixed both for individual advance and advances of a particular kind.
  - (2) in areas served by other co-operative societies which would normally handle such business, the minimum limit of advance to an individual should be in excess of the maximum kept by the society and there should be mutual accommodation.
- 68. As regards inland exchange business, Government has accepted the recommendation that Central Banks should not undertake this business in areas served by Urban Banks except by mutual accommodation.
- 69. The following table indicates the extent to which inland exchange business is done through co-operative banks:—

- 72. The year under report witnessed a further decline in the working capital of the Bank to the extent of Rs. 20 lakhs which is ascribed to the following reasons:—
  - (1) Withdrawals by School Boards and Local Boards from their savings deposits to the extent of Rs. 7 lakhs in view of the orders of Government that the provident funds of their employees should be invested in Government securities.
    - (2) Reduction of deposits from co-operative societies.

The reduction in deposits from co-operative societies and banks indicates growing ability on the part of the affiliated institutions to utilize a larger portion of their funds in their own normal business.

- 73. It is gratifying to note that there was a larger demand for investment of the Bank's funds in the movement itself which is evidenced by an increase of nearly Rs. 15 lakhs in advances by way of cash credits and overdrafts. The position of the Bank in respect of its liquid resources continues to be satisfactory. The total demand liabilities of the Bank in current and savings bank accounts amount to Rs. 94 lakhs and the time liabilities to Rs. 75 lakhs. Against these liabilities, the Bank held at the close of the year Rs. 9½ lakhs in cash on hand and in banks, Rs. 22 lakhs in deposits at call and for short periods with approved banks and Rs. 70½ lakhs in Government and other authorized securities.
- 74. Notwithstanding the fall in the working capital, the profits of the Bank for the year showed an increase of Rs. 10,148 over the previous year's figure. This is due mainly to the increased use made of the Bank's funds in advances and the prevailing low rate of interest on deposits owing to continuance of easy money market conditions. The Bank declared a dividend of 5 per cent. which is the same as in previous years.
- 75. As regards the position with regard to fresh finance and recoveries, I reproduce below an extract from the report of the Bank:—
  - "Fresh advances for short-term and intermediate term demands were made to the extent of Rs. 26,35,500 out of which Rs. 5,400 were due to famine loans advanced on account of continued famine conditions, and Rs. 2,61,800 on account of interest and joint expenditure debited and other minor transfer entries. Out of these advances, Rs. 16,77,400 were on account of short-term

demands and Rs. 6,96,300 for intermediate term purposes. Repayments received on account of ordinary loans including the famine finance, which stood at Rs. 53,92,400 at the beginning of the season, came to Rs. 26,12,514, as against the previous year's figure of Rs. 26,80,612. This figure of recoveries is against the stipulated repayments of Rs. 39,28,000 according to the normal credit statements.

Out of the famine advances of Rs. 79,000 the repayments to the extent of Rs. 35,957 could be collected. Out of the total figure of recoveries, Rs. 1,08,400 were on account of the transfer of outstandings of the societies ordered to be wound up or transferred from one Branch to another, during the course of the year. The actual repayments may, therefore, be taken at Rs. 25,04,114 as against the last year's figure of Rs. 24,30,000 giving a percentage of Rs. 46.3 to the total outstandings at the close of the previous year, the corresponding percentage for the last year being 45.2. The amount of unauthorized arrears was Rs. 20,02,313 and this gives a percentage of 40 per cent. to the total short-term investments, the corresponding figures for the previous year being Rs. 16,59,347 and 32.6 per cent. Extensions have, in some cases, been approved where the recovery season had closed by the 30th June 1938. But, for the rabi areas, the work of granting extensions goes on till the end of August and the position regarding the overdues and extended dues cannot, therefore, be presented in their proper perspective by the figures noted above."

- 76. No land improvement loans were advanced during the year under report. The recoveries of such loans from societies and central banks amounted to Rs. 76,550 as against Rs. 30,542 in the previous year. The increase was due to the adjustment by transfer of the amount of the land improvement loan to the extent of Rs. 57,300 in case of the Nasik District Central Co-operative Bank, Limited, in liquidation to "the account of societies in liquidation", and the actual repayments came to Rs. 19,250. The total amount due to the Bank on account of such loans was Rs. 81,398, the balance of amount payable to Government being Rs. 54,600.
- 77. The Deccan Canal Tract continues to cause anxiety to the Bank, as a large amount is locked up in societies in liquidation in this tract and there has been no appreciable progress in the recovery of the frozen loans in this area. The total outstandings from societies in liquidation in this and other areas amount to Rs. 18,90,865, as against Rs. 17,90,174 at the close of the previous year. The figure is inclusive of the outstandings against the Nasik District Central Co-operative Bank in liquidation. As already observed the position with regard to recoveries is not satisfactory though repayments during the course of the year amounted to Rs. 57,397 as against Rs. 47,920 during the previous year. Rules 49 and 50 providing for the transfer of property to societies, under section 59-A have now been finally promulgated. The speeding up of the work of liquidation and firm and expeditious action against contumacious defaulters in societies are measures which are

essential for stimulating recovery of these amounts. In view of Government Communique issued in this regard, clearly pointing out Government's attitude towards contumacious defaulters coupled with concession schemes, substantial recoveries should be forthcoming.

78. The relations of the Bank with the District Central Banks, Urban Banks, Primary Societies and other limbs of the movement continued to be cordial. A cash credit of Rs. 1 lakh and a maximum credit of Rs. 4 lakhs was sanctioned to the East Khandesh Central Co-operative Bank, but was not operated upon as the terms of credit were not finally decided. In addition overdrafts against Government securities and loans against fixed deposits were granted to Central Banks to the extent of Rs. 35,24,000 and the drawings at the close of the year were Rs. 17,58,328. Overdrafts and loans were also allowed to 39 Urban Banks to the extent of over Rs. 13 lakhs against Government securities and fixed deposits with the Bank.

79. The work regarding the transfer of the assets and liabilities of the Land Mortgage Department of the Bank, to the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, is in progress.

#### (4) District Central Banks.

80. Owing to the liquidation of the Nasik District Central Co-operative Bank, Limited, which was ordered to be wound up at the close of the year, the number of Central Banks decreased from 13 to 12. The following table gives comparative figures relating to the operation of the banks:—

81. The paid-up share capital and reserve and other funds record a satisfactory increase. The reduction in deposits from individuals is partly ascribed to the winding up of the Nasik District Central Co-operative Bank which had deposits to the extent of nearly Rs. 7 lakhs at the close of the last year and to a reduction in the rate of interest offered by Central Banks, which are now almost on par with those of well managed Joint Stock Banks and also the decision of Government that the Provident Funds of School Boards should be deposited in Government securities. As regards reduction in the deposits from societies this is particularly marked in Surat District, wherein the deposits of societies amounted at the close of the year to Rs. 1,42,304 as against Rs. 4,04,518 in the previous year. The decline in deposits is naturally reflected in a corresponding reduction in the total figure of working capital. Notwithstanding the reduction in deposits, these central banks have a plethora of surplus funds. It will be noticed that out of the total working capital amounting to Rs. 2,95,38,091 only Rs. 1,08,00,816 are on loans with societies which is a clear index to the fact that the bulk of agricultural societies for whose benefit the central banks are primarily intended are too weak to absorb and employ the major portion of these funds. The financing agencies would, therefore, be well advised in interesting themselves in the organization of arrangements for the supply of agricultural and domestic requisites and sale of agricultural produce so as to extend the maximum economic benefit of the large funds they possess to agriculturists. This aspect of the problem has been considered by Government and in paragraph 14 of Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7363/33,

dated the 15th March 1938, the desirability on the part of central banks to take steps to promote the formation of purchase and sale societies at suitable market places with a view to encourage crop loans and make advances in kind has been emphasised. It has further been suggested that pending the formation of such societies the banks themselves may undertake this work strictly on a commission basis.

- 82. Position as regards arrears does not show any marked improvement. The figures shown against column 10 are not comparable with those of the last year, as the last year's figure is inclusive of the arrears of the Nasik District Central Co-operative Bank which is now in liquidation. The measure of success in the matter of rehabilitation of agricultural credit societies, which is in progress, will to some extent depend upon the assistance rendered by central banks by way of concessions such as reduction in the lending rates in the case of societies with frozen dues and doubtful debts and also in the case of societies whose financial position is bad, by taking recoveries to principal.
- 83. A disquieting feature of the working of the central banks was the failure of the Nasik District Central Co-operative Bank. affairs of the Bank had deteriorated as early as 1930, and all attempts since made to resusciate its working were largely unsuccessful owing to various factors. The principal among these was the agricultural depression which was unprecedented in its range and duration. Owing to frequent frost and failure of rains the general condition of the agriculturists in the area financed by the Bank was unfavourable and this was naturally reflected in a serious curtailment in the repaying capacity of the affiliated primaries with the result that loans advanced to societies became frozen and long-term, crippling the resources of the Bank and rendering its position in the matter of recovery extremely difficult. In the circumstances, the continuance of the Bank was considered to be undesirable. Following the liquidation of the Bank, steps for reconstruction of societies in the area hitherto served by the Bank, have been undertaken, and Government has already approved a scheme of reconstruction under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 9106/33, dated 5th October 1938, appointing the liquidator of the Bank as the Reconstruction Officer for the area. The failure of the Bank had no repurcussions on the working of other central banks in the Province.
- 84. The Karnatak Central Bank continued to be managed by a Board of Directors nominated by Government under Rule 48 of the Co-operative Societies Rules. The life of this Board which was due to expire in September 1938 has been further extended for a period of six months with a view to enable the Bank to frame suitable election rules. The Kanara Central Bank has no scope for development, as most of the affiliated primaries are self-sufficient and do not require any finance. With a view to enable it to utilise its surplus funds profitably, the Bank has adopted a bye-law permitting godown business and advances against moveables. The chances of the business expanding in that direction are, however,

few as there are urban banks operating at all taluka places. The question of organizing taluka banking unions in the district which would replace the Central Bank is also separately under consideration.

85. Nominal Membership.—Nominal membership for the purpose of advances against produce and valuables is now permitted to a central bank in the case of members of its primaries, other than Urban Banks and sale societies affiliated to it and representation of one member on their behalf allowed. The present practice of permitting central banks to advance loans to individual members against produce and valuable is also continued subject to the limitations which have been mentioned in paragraph 67 above.

Central banks have already been advised to amend their bye-laws accordingly.

- 86. Investments against immoveable properties.—Section 37 of the Co-operative Societies Act permits investments in immoveable properties under section 20(e) of the Indian Trusts Act. Government has now directed that such investments should not be made unless they became necessary in the process of recovery of the normal dues of the banks or for the purpose of construction of a building for their own use with the prior sanction of the Registrar.
- 87. All central banks have accordingly been advised to take steps to adopt a suitable bye-law.
- 88. Government has further directed that if the central banks persist in making such investments, it will have to be considered if such transactions should not be subject to the levy of stamp duty, registration fees and other charges.
- 89. Agricultural Marketing.—The importance of this problem and the part which the central banks should take in this respect is already discussed in paragraph 81 above.

#### BANKING UNIONS.

90. The Joint Report made specific recommendations with regard to the organisation of banking unions which would focus and guide all the co-operative activities in a taluka in addition to providing finance. The membership would consist of agricultural primaries and also individuals who require finance for agricultural purposes in excess of the absolute limits laid down in the case of primaries. In paragraph 13 of Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7363/33, dated 15th March 1938, Government has expressed their readiness to give such assistance as may be necessary to introduce banking unions of this type in one or more talukas experimentally.

## (5) Non-Agricultural Credit Societies.

91. The year under report witnessed a further increase in the number of societies from 653 to 665 and in the total working capital from Rs. 5,37,98,687 to Rs. 5,66,81,354. The position in respect of recoveries is, on the whole, satisfactory. The increase in

members' deposits from Rs. 2,46,03,222 to Rs. 2,57,51,861 is an indication of their growing popularity and the position they occupy as banking organizations.

92. The urban banks in particular have contributed considerably to the development of trade and industry by provision of adequate finance and grant of facilities for remittance of funds and have popularized banking habits in urban areas.

93. The following table shows the main statistics relating to the working of urban banks:—

The decrease in the number of banks is due to the innovation introduced during the year with regard to the classification of urban banks in the light of orders contained in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7363/33, dated the 15th March 1938. Reference to this new method of classification has already been made in paragraph 66 of the report. The figures for the year 1937-38 are, therefore, not comparable with those of the previous year. It will, however, be noticed that the percentage of overdues to loans due in urban banks properly so-called is 30.2 per cent. As compared to this, the percentage in non-agricultural credit societies as a whole is 15.2 which indicates the need for greater vigilance on the part of the urban banks in the matter of recoveries. It should, however, be pointed out that there is also a number of salary earners' societies with a share capital exceeding Rs. 20,000 which also do banking business as defined in section 277-F of the Indian Companies Act. The operations of these societies (which number in all 72) are included in Statement No. A-(1) annexed to this report,

- Salary Earners' Societies.—These societies are growing increasingly popular and fulfil an important role as thrift and credit organizations. Their success is in a large measure due to the facilities that exist for recovery of their dues through pay-sheets and the interest taken by the administrative heads of the Department or office. A noteworthy feature of the working of these societies is the provision adopted by several societies particularly those situated in Bombay providing that every borrower shall take a life insurance policy at least up to the amount of his borrowing. Such a provision while emphasizing the thrift aspect of the institution gives some protection to the surety from the incidence of contingent liabilities.
- 95. The Mill-hands' Societies operating in the industrial area in Bombay deserve special mention for their record of good work. The revival of mills in the Sassoon group, absence of strikes and appointment of a Labour Officer for welfare works have been largely instrumental in stimulating the healthy progress of these societies. Thanks also to the keen interest evinced by the mill authorities, the co-operative credit society in the mill area has come to be regarded not only as a loan distributing agency but as an institution round which all beneficient activities affecting the economic welfare of the mill-hands can be built up. During the year under report efforts were also made to organize societies for mill-hands in Bombay and other industrial centres. The keen interest evinced by the Chief Inspector of Factories was very helpful in this respect.
- 96. Communal Societies.—The smooth working of these societies is greatly affected by the canker of internal dissension, and though there are several societies like the Shamrao Vithal Co-operative Bank in Bombay which have shown appreciable progress, working of the societies as a class cannot be regarded as satisfactory. As pointed out in the last year's report, in view of the communal nature of the society sufficient business is not forthcoming in a limited area, with the consequence that a wide area of operations is sought at the expense and sacrifice of that mutual contact which is so vital to the success of co-operative credit. Government has now directed that urban societies desiring to do banking business among members of one community in an extensive area should be discouraged.
- 97. General Remarks.—While the Urban Credit movement has shown considerable vitality and is showing signs of further development, the need for certain safeguards cannot be overestimated. The urban banks in particular have undertaken varied types of business such as godown business, advances against agricultural produce, and valuables and exchange business. It is, therefore, necessary that individual and total limits for different types of business and maximum total limits for individuals should be provided for in the bye-laws and strictly adhered to. Another factor which threatens to thwart their smooth working is the evil resulting from overlapping membership and finance. Government has, therefore, decided that a second urban society doing banking business should not ordinarily be started within the area of operation of an urban

society doing banking business unless satisfactory arrangements can be made for exclusive membership, prevention of overlapping of finance and demarcation of areas.

#### BOMBAY CO-OPERATIVE INSURANCE SOCIETY.

- 98. During the year under report the society acquired its own building in one of the prominent localities in the Fort area in Bombay at a cost of Rs. 3 lacs. Proposals amounting to Rs. 20 lacs were accepted bringing the total business to nearly Rs. 50 lacs at the close of the year. The life assurance fund records an increase of Rs. 1,20,104 from Rs. 2,46,327 to Rs. 3,66,421. The income of the society from premia amounted to Rs. 2,68,720 which together with Rs. 18,242 from rent, interest on investment and membership fees brought the total income to Rs. 2,86,963 against which the total expenditure amounted to Rs. 1,32,654.
- 99. The Indian Insurance Act which has been recently passed gives a special privilege to the co-operative insurance society inasmuch as it is permitted to issue policies for amounts less than. Rs. 500. It is, therefore, all the more necessary that the society should make vigorous attempts at popularizing insurance in rural areas.
- 100. The Ratnagiri District Co-operative Motor Association had another year of successful working. There is an increase in its membership from 97 to 112. The total insurance fund amounts to Rs. 61,620. The Association has come to be regarded as a model institution of the type in the province and should serve as an impetus for the formation of similar associations in other districts.

#### B. CONSUMERS' MOVEMENT.

# (i) Co-operative Stores.

## 101. The comparative statement is as under:—

The membership, working capital, sales and purchases have increased, while the cost of management has been reduced.

102. In these societies, it is difficult to secure the loyalty of members. The two store societies for the railways' employees of the Northern Division, viz.: Page Co-operative Stores and Bulsar

. . .

Railway Co-operative Association are functioning satisfactorily. Amongst the other well-managed stores are:—(i) the Khopoli Co-operative Consumers' Syndicate, (ii) the South Indian Co-operative Consumers' Society and (iii) the Telegraph Co-operative Consumers' Society. The net profits earned by them are respectively Rs. 832, Rs. 5,226 and Rs. 40. The Gujarati Ladies Sahakari Mandal continues to do useful work. It concentrates its activities on sale of hand-woven and hand-spun cloth in conjunction with other "Women's Associations" and the All India Spinners' Association. Its turnover for the year amounted to Rs. 25,500 and it made profits of Rs. 632.

103. Separate consumers' societies have not thrived at the villages. With the growth of village multi-purpose societies, consumers' societies will not be necessary as it is expected that the multi-purpose societies would be able to supply domestic needs of villagers.

## (ii) Housing Societies.

104. The year under report witnessed a further increase in the number of housing societies from 85 to 93. Ahmedabad continues to be the centre of housing activities. Of the new societies registered, 6 were in Ahmedabad, one in Surat and one in Bombay. The Tribhovan Nagar Co-operative Housing Society registered in Surat is the first of its type in the district. The following table gives the main statistics regarding housing societies:—

- 105. In Bombay and its Suburbs, the factors which have contributed to the present deterioration in the housing societies have been discussed in the previous administration reports. They can briefly be enumerated as under:—
  - (1) The buildings were constructed during the boom period when the cost of building materials was comparatively high.
  - (2) The economic depression which subsequently set in has considerably diminished the demand for tenements and consequently curtailed their income by way of rents. The fact that accommodation at cheaper rates on modern lines is now available has further aggravated the position in this respect.

- (3) The large area of land acquired by the societies during the period has also embarrassed their position, as the societies are experiencing considerable difficulties in disposing of plots.
- 106. A combination of these various factors have affected the position of these societies and at present it is difficult to secure the loyalty of the members to their institutions with the result that the societies are confronted with the double difficulty of balancing their budgets, and of meeting their liabilities punctually. During the year under report a detailed examination of the financial position of the societies financed by Government was made; the examination indicates the urgent necessity for granting substantial relief to some of the societies. The proposals made in this respect are separately under consideration of Government.
- 107. There is a growing tendency on the part of the tenants both members and non-members in housing societies particularly those working on the co-partnership tenancy system to default payment of the rents, and timely steps are not taken by the societies to secure eviction in such cases. As most societies have financed their building schemes with the aid of borrowed capital, it is all the more necessary that their dealings with the tenants should be business-like and that prompt steps are taken to secure eviction of tenants in case of persistent defaults. The necessity for prompt action in such cases was emphasised in a circular during the year under report. Another regrettable feature which threatens to disturb the harmonious working of housing societies is the growing signs of internal dissensions which have necessitated in some cases recourse to arbitration and also protracted litigation.

## (iii) House Reconstruction Societies.

108. The House Reconstruction Societies numbering in all 25 are all concentrated in Ahmedabad district. Owing to the fall in the repaying capacity of the members (who are mostly agriculturists) the total repayments to Government by the societies amounted during the year under report only to Rs. 2,677, reducing the balance outstanding to Rs. 37,450.

#### C. PRODUCERS' MOVEMENT.

#### (i) General.

109. The comparative statement is as under:—

Most of these societies continue to be in a moribund condition. The Dharwar Shoe-makers' Society sold raw materials worth

Rs. 10,586. The Ghodegin Bangle-makers' Society has succeeded in reviving the industry of bangle-making in the village. The society succeeded in obtaining from Government fire wood at a concessional rate for manufacturing cheap, coloured glass. The Sanikatta Salt-Owners' Society is progressing well.

#### (ii) Weavers' Societies.

#### 110. The comparative statement is as under:—

The comparative statement would show that there has been a set-back in the working of the societies. Their number, membership, working capital and profits have fallen. Most of the societies are not working properly and are unable to produce manufactured articles of the variety that could stand mill competition. These societies are also not taking much advantage of the District Industrial Associations and unless they work as "real producing centres" under the aegis of Industrial Associations, there are no prospects of their rendering any useful service to the weavers.

#### -(iii) District Industrial Associations.

Since the inauguration of the marketing scheme for Handloom products, out of the Government of India grant sanctioned under G.R., R.D., No. 355/33 of 26th April 1935, 8 Industrial Co-operative Associations were registered. The affairs of the Poona District Industrial Association, however, were ordered to be wound up in 1937. Out of the seven remaining Associations, the one at Nagar which was one of the earliest to be registered is making satisfactory progress. It produced finished products of the value of Rs. 17,696-4-0. It has established a dye-house. This Association is also carrying out the wool scheme sanctioned under G.R., G.D., No. 238/33 of 20th October 1937. Its share capital as well as membership has increased. It is also guiding the affairs of the Vinchur Producers' Society which is affiliated to it. Sholapur District Central Weavers' Union which was converted into the Sholapur Industrial Association, started work in December 1937, and till June 1938, purchased raw materials of the value of Rs. 16,867 and sold articles worth Rs. 12,995. It made a net profit of Rs. 153. It also had the benefit of securing the Sholapur Weavers' Guild Fund administered jointly by the Registrar,

Co-operative Societies, and Collector, Sholapur. Sholapur is a big handloom weaving centre and it is hoped that with the help of the Government of India grant and the Sholapur Guild Fund, the Association which was already financially strong, will be able to establish its position more firmly and increase its usefulness to weavers. The Kamatgi and Malegaon Associations started functioning very recently. It is found that the workers of these places are taking keen interest in the working of the associations. Hubli Industrial Association, which started functioning from October 1935, supplied raw materials to the extent of Rs. 13,968, and sold finished products worth Rs. 9,025. It earned a profit of Rs. 196. The affairs of the Association had not been satisfactory for some time with the result that it could not carry out the wool scheme sanctioned by Government during the year. The Ahmedabad Association started its business from December 1936 and is progressing slowly. It earned, a profit of Rs. 393 wiping out the loss of the first year of its working. It manufactured articles valued at Rs. 8,948 and sold articles worth Rs. 7,499-6-0. The Yeola Industrial Association started functioning from September 1937, but unfortunately due to difference between the management and the salaried staff its affairs were in a moribund condition. Attempts were made to reconcile the conflicting interests by the Collector of Nasik but without success and the Registrar was constrained to order suspension of the office-bearers and hand over the management to the Marketing Officer, Department of Industries, Bombay, pending formation of a new Board of Directors after the close of the co-operative year.

- 112. Three more Associations, one at Ranebinur, exclusively for Kurubars, one at Belgaum, and third at Dhulia are proposed to be organised. Efforts at forming an association at Bhivandi and another at Sangreshwar for Mahars have failed.
- 113. The Marketing Scheme for Handloom Products sanctioned by the Government of India for a period of 5 years is due to expire in October 1939. During this period, the only association registered in 1935, viz. Nagar Association had been able to obtain an appreciable advantage of the scheme. The other associations are still in infancy and it will be long before they show appreciable results and prove their worth to the weavers.

#### IV. BOMBAY PROVINCIAL CO-OPERATIVE INSTITUTE.

- 114. The membership of the Institute showed an increase of 35 in the number of society-members and a decrease of 43 in individual members. Of the total number of 762 individual members on its roll, 4 were patrons, 8 life members, 25 associates and the rest ordinary members.
- 115. The financial position of the Institute showed no improvement. It received Rs. 33,206 as subscriptions from its members as against Rs. 40,885 last year, and Rs. 18,750 by way of grant from Government. The position with regard to the mortgage of its

building continued to be unsatisfactory, and the Institute with its limited resources is unable to pay regular instalments. The loan outstanding is Rs. 1,59,660.

- 116. During the year under report, the Institute organized 19 co-operative conferences and conducted 15 training classes for training secretaries and 90 classes for training Managing Committee members.
- 117. The Institute sanctioned donations of Rs. 52,750 made by 590 societies for charitable purposes under Section 42 of the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act.

#### CO-OPERATIVE TRAINING SCHEME.

- 118. The scheme continued to be in the second stage. This part of the scheme contemplates training of the Departmental staff and the employees of the Central Co-operative Banks. The Departmental staff is deputed for training in batches of 17. Each batch usually consists of 4 auditors, 5 sub-auditors, 7 clerks and 1 agricultural organiser. The period of training of each batch is fixed for four months.
- 119. Side by side with this class for 4 months, other classes of shorter duration are also organised for secretaries and managers of urban banks, honorary organisers and land valuation officers.
- 120. A statement showing the number of officers trained during the year is given below:—

#### (C) Classes for Honorary Organizers.

Only one class was held from 1st July 1937 to 15th July 1937, at which 3 Honorary Organisers attended.

## (D) Classes for Land Valuation Officers.

Only one class was held from 22nd November 1937 to 11th December 1937, at which 8 officers attended.

- 121. The syllabus prescribed for this class is sufficiently exhaustive and includes instruction in every branch of the Co-operative Movement.
- 122. The theoretical training of the various subjects at the class is so given as to throw light on several problems with which the officers are usually confronted in their day-to-day work.
- 123. In addition to this training, definite periods are fixed for discussions on the subjects taught at the class. One of the members of the teaching staff conducts these discussions on the subject taught by him. These discussions afford an opportunity to every officer under training to give expression to his views and also to add to his stock of knowledge what he learns from others. These discussions thus prove very valuable.
- 124. In order to take stock of the work done in a week, arrangement for a weekly test is made. Every Saturday a test paper is set to the officers under training. This test paper is again explained to the officers after reading their answers. This system enables the teaching staff to know whether the officers under training are really assimilating the instruction given to them.

- 125. The library of the Registrar containing valuable books is at the disposal of the class. With a view to see that proper use of the library is made by the officers under training at the time fixed for reading definite subjects are given to officers and they are asked to write essays on them. This procedure enables the teachers to know whether the officers have concentrated their reading on the topics given and thus made a real use of the library and the time at their disposal.
- 126. The teaching staff consisted during the year of two Inspectors and one Assistant Inspector.
- 127. The Scheme continued to be in the charge of Mr. D. A. Shah, first as Assistant Registrar, Co-operative Societies, Central Division, Pcona, subsequently as Officer on Special Duty and later as Personal Assistant to the Registrar, Co-operative Societies, Bombay Province, Poona.

#### V. MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS.

- (i) ACT, RULES AND BYE-LAWS.
- 128. Act.—There was no amendment of the Act during the year under report.
- 129. Rules.—Several important amendments and additions were made in the Rules under the Co-operative Societies Act. Rules under Section 59-A to facilitate transfer of property which cannot be sold for want of buyers to Co-operative societies, were sanctioned during the year. The Co-operative Cotton Sale Societies in Gujarat have been exempted from operation of Rule 19 (1), so that the Co-operative year in their case ends on October 31st. This was done to facilitate their account-keeping.
- 130. Bye-laws.—Several important changes have been introduced in the model bye-laws of the agricultural credit societies with a view to secure better working of these societies by restricting outside borrowing limit to one-sixth of the assets of the members or four times the contributions collected by them, whichever is less. Provision has also been made in the bye-laws to prevent long-term finance for periods exceeding 5 years. The bye-laws also aim at broadening the basis of the primary society so as to increase its utility to its members. Bye-laws have accordingly been framed to compel the members to sell their produce through a co-operative sale agency, wherever available. The thrift aspect of the institution is also emphasized by providing for compulsory deposits at the harvest time.
- 131. New model bye-laws were also drafted and promulgated for multi-purpose societies.

#### (ii) Arbitration.

132. Arbitration cases during the year numbered 7,289, which, added to those pending at the beginning of the year, brings the total to 13,089. Out of these, 9,093 cases were disposed of during the year, leaving a balance of 3,996 at the close of the year. Out of the total loans due from members of all classes of societies amounting to Rs. 4,63,00,000, an amount of Rs. 80,90,000 was involved in arbitration which is an increase of nearly Rs. 20,00,000 over the figure for the last year. The increase is due to the fact that societies have now realized that persistent defaulters will not pay unless coercive action is taken. The table given below shows the position as regards the lands which have passed into the hands of societies as a result of execution proceedings:—

The number of societies placed in liquidation during the year under report was 42. The liquidation work of 37 societies was completed, so that the total of societies in liquidation rose from 739 at the beginning of the year to 744 at the end of the year.

Of the 42 societies ordered to be wound up during the year, 28 were agricultural credit societies, 1 central bank, 2 non-credit, 1 salary-earners', 1 non-agricultural, 5 urban credit, 1 consumers' and 3 producers' societies.

134. The estimated assets and liabilities of the societies in liquidation at the close of the year were Rs. 50,07,379 and Rs. 44,81,394 respectively. A statement showing a classification of the liquidators and the amounts of assets and liabilities realised during the year is shown below:—

- 135. The liquidation has continued to be conducted in most cases by Auditors and Sub-Auditors in the Department and by Special Liquidation Officers appointed for the purpose. A fair proportion of cases has been entrusted to non-officials, where suitable persons were available.
- 136. The difficulty in making recoveries of dues and the difficulty of selling the lands transferred to the possession of the liquidators for want of buyers hinder the progress in bringing the liquidation proceedings to a speedy close. Measures for overcoming the difficulties as far as possible are under contemplation.

#### (v) CRIMINAL CASES.

139. The number of offences committed in co-operative societies during the year under report shows an increase. Twenty offences in regard to co-operative societies came under inquiry or trial. This, together with the 14 cases of embezzlement pending at the end of the previous year, brings the total to 34. Out of these, 13 cases were disposed of during the year which ended in conviction and the rest are still under trial.

#### (vi) Suspension of Managing Committees of Societies.

140. The number of societies whose managing committees were suspended at the beginning of the year was 37. The committees of 27 societies were suspended and committees of 18 societies were reinstated during the year. The number of societies of which committees were under suspension at the close of the year was 46.

#### (vii) RELATIONS WITH INDIAN STATES.

#### 141. Relations with Indian States continued to be friendly.

#### (viii) School Boys' Societies.

142. These are unregistered co-operative societies started by School masters of the Educational Department for supplying books, stationery, etc., to school boys. The number of societies existing in the Province during the year under report is as shown in the following statement:—

#### VI. CONCLUSION.

143. A major part of the year constituted a period of reconstruction of the movement based on the recommendations contained in the Joint Report submitted to Government by Mr. V. L. Mehta and the Registrar. In matters which lay within the authority of the Registrar, action was taken immediately. In other matters, action followed Government orders.

- 144. As usual, agricultural co-operative credit societies continued to demand the utmost attention of the Department, central financing agencies and non-official co-operators. Whereas on the one hand, the steps taken for the classification of debts and treatment thereof clarified the position of agricultural credit societies and financing agencies in regard to the nature of this class of their assets and opened the way for dealing with them in an appropriate manner, and thus held out hopes of stimulating recovery work, on the other hand, the stoppage of all coercive processes except during the harvest season and the relief granted to agriculturist-members of co-operative societies on the lines of the Small-Holders' Relief Act served as handicaps to progress of recovery.
- 145. With the advent of legislation in regard to debt composition and regulation of money-lenders, the demand for co-operative credit will tend to be on an unprecedented scale. Steps will, therefore, have to be taken to expand credit in rural areas as much as possible, but it will have to be seen that most of the credit is really short-term and based on more reliable and readily realizable security in the form of crops. Marketing will have to be an invariable concomitant of such credit and, therefore, the agricultural society of the future will be the multi-purpose society.
- 146. Before I close, I should like to record my thanks to Assistant Registrars and other members of the staff for their loyal assistance and strenuous work during the year.
