REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE EXCISE DEPARTMENT IN THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1937-38.

Note.—Throughout the report, the figures in rectangular brackets wherever placed in juxtaposition to those given for the year under report, refer to the previous year (1936-37).

CHAPTER I.

ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES.

The following were the principal features of the Excise system and arrangements during the year 1937-38 :—

(1) The rationing system was continued for country spirit except in the Fixed Fee Areas mentioned at item 13 below, the total ration for the Province, being the same as for 1936-37, the district being the unit of rationing, (*vide* Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 2741/33, dated 21st December 1934). This ration was distributed by Collectors, the annual ration for each shop being fixed at the beginning of the year, and adjustments made from time to time between shops as required. No monthly ration for shops was fixed.

(2) All licenses for the retail sale of country spirit, opium and hemp drugs and for the "on" sale of foreign liquor were disposed of by auction sale except in the case of opium shops in Bandra, Kurla and Ghatkopar, and in the Town and Island of Bombay, which were disposed of by tender for 3 years from 1st April 1936 (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5615/33, dated 6th January 1937) and in the case of country spirit shops in the areas mentioned at item No. 13 below.

As changes in Excise Administration were contemplated, toddy licensees were offered the continuation of their shops and booths for 3 months (August to October 1937) on payment of a fixed fee equivalent to 5/24 of the previous year's fee for urban and 3/24 for rural shops and booths. The shops and booths of licensees who refused this offer were disposed of by auction. The licensees paid $\frac{1}{4}$ th of the annual tree-tax for the period. For the period subsequent to this all toddy shops and booths with the exceptions mentioned below, were auctioned for the remaining 9 months (November 1937 to July 1938) and $\frac{3}{4}$ th of the annual tree-tax was charged to the licensees, provided the trees tapped were the same as those tapped during the first three months (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 6878/33, dated 6th July 1937).

The shops and booths in (1) Jambusar and Wagra Talukas of the Broach and Panch Mahals District, (2) Shevgaon and Newasa Talukas of the Ahmednagar District, (3) Ankola and Kumta Talukas of the Kanara District were auctioned for five months only from November 1937 to March 1938. Those in Ahmedabad City were auctioned for six months from November 1937 to April 1938.

If in disposal by auction, there were no bids, or the bids offered were inadequate, Collectors were instructed then to dispose of the licenses by tender or negotiation (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5615/33, dated 6th January 1937).

(3) The monthly instalment system for the recovery of license fees of country spirit and toddy shops and booths, sanctioned experimentally for the Town and Island of Bombay, was continued for 1937-38 (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, Nos. 6378/33, dated 25th January 1937 and 6878/33, dated 6th July 1937) and that sanctioned for the mofussil districts in respect of Excise licenses of all classes except foreign liquor and toddy for 1936-37 was continued for a further period of two years from 1st April 1937 (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 3740/33, dated 25th January 1937).

(4) The experimental reduction in the limit of possession, sale and transport of country spirit from three bottles to one bottle was continued in :—

(a) the Municipal, Cantonment and notified areas of the Ahmedabad (except Ahmedabad City), Kaira, Ahmednagar, Nasik and Kolaba Districts ;

(b) the Municipal and other urban areas of the West Khandesh District ;

(c) the Municipal areas of the Jalgaon, Amalner and Chalisgaon Talukas of the East Khandesh District ; and

(d) the urban areas of the Kanara and Dharwar Districts ;
and that from six bottles to three in the rural areas of the Kanara and Dharwar Districts.

The experimental reduction in the limit of possession, sale and transport of country spirit from three bottles to one in the urban and notified areas of the Bijapur District was discontinued and the former limit of three bottles restored.

The limit of possession, sale and transport of country spirit was reduced from three bottles to one in the urban areas and from six bottles to three in the rural areas of the Sholapur District (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 6515/33, dated 6th January 1937).

The limit was also reduced from six bottles to two bottles in the Shahapur and Murbad Talukas, and the Wada and Mokhada Pethas

of the Thana District and in the Jawhar State (Government memorandum, Revenue Department, Nos. 6253-C/33/23664, dated 21st January 1937 and 6253-C/33, dated 8th February 1937).

(5) The experimental closing hour of 9 p.m. of country spirit shops in Ahmedabad City was continued (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5615, dated 6th January 1937).

(6) The following changes in the strength of country spirit were sanctioned during the year.

Ahmedabad.—The sale of 25° U.P. and 30° U.P. was discontinued at all shops, except at the five border shops of Adalaj, Bhuvardi, Wanch, Talod and Modasa which were allowed to sell 25° U.P. in addition to 40° U.P. and 60° U.P.

Panch Mahals.—The sale of 25° U.P. and 60° U.P. was sanctioned at the thirteen border shops of (1) Shehere, (2) Timba, (3) Jhalod, (4) Kalol, (5) Malav, (6) Derol Station, (7) Jantral, (8) Halol, (9) Champaner, (10) Vaswel, (11) Kanjri, (12) Shivrajpur and (13) Adadra, and the remaining shops were restricted to the sale of 40° U.P. and 60° U.P. only.

Surat.—The sale of 30° U.P. and 60° U.P. was sanctioned experimentally throughout the District except in Surat City where the strengths allowed were 30° U.P. and 40° U.P.

Thana.—The strength experimentally raised from 40° U.P. to 30° U.P. was restored to 40° U.P. as an experiment.

Ratnagiri.—30° U.P. at the six shops of (1) Pachal, (2) Khasepatan, (3) Kasarda, (4) Ghonsari, (5) Phonda and (6) Belve on the Kolhapur State border was abolished and 40° U.P. substituted for it.

Kanara.—The sale of 30° U.P. in Supa Peta and 40° U.P. and 60° U.P. in the rest of the District was sanctioned experimentally for the year.

Dharwar.—The sale of 40° U.P. and 60° U.P. only was sanctioned experimentally throughout the District.

Bijapur.—The sale of 30° U.P. and 60° U.P. was sanctioned experimentally throughout the District.

Belgaum.—The sale of 30° U.P. and 60° U.P. was sanctioned experimentally throughout the District, except at the Kankumbi shop which was allowed to continue to sell 25° U.P. only.

Sholapur.—The sale of 30° U.P. and 60° U.P. was sanctioned experimentally at all the border shops except at Kem, Ula and Kondi which were allowed to sell only 40° U.P. and 60° U.P.

Satara.—The experimental raising of the strength from 40° U.P. to 30° U.P. in the Talukas and States sanctioned in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, Nos. 9628/28, dated 16th January 1933, and 1142/33, dated 12th December 1933, was continued and all the shops in these areas, as well as the nine border shops selling 30° U.P. were allowed to sell 60° U.P. in addition.

Poona.—The sale of 30° U.P. at the Ambegaon shop was abolished and 40° U.P. substituted for it.

Ahmednagar, Nasik, East Khandesh and West Khandesh.—The sale of 25° U.P. and 30° U.P. was abolished experimentally and the sale of 40° U.P. and 60° U.P. introduced throughout these Districts except the Nawapur Petha and part of the Nandurbar Talukas of the West Khandesh District.

The existing strengths, 25° U.P. and 60° U.P. of Masala spirit, were continued, either strength or both, being supplied according to local demand (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5615/33, dated 6th January 1937).

(7) The following rates of still-head duty were sanctioned during the year.

Ahmedabad.—A uniform rate of Rs. 3-12-0 per proof gallon was sanctioned for the whole of the District except for Ahmedabad City and 6 miles round and the Daskroi Taluka.

Kaira.—A uniform rate of Rs. 3-12-0 per proof gallon was sanctioned for the whole of the District.

Thana.—The rate for 40° U.P. was fixed in proportion to that on 60° U.P. throughout the District, except in Wada and Mokhada Pethas, Shahapur and Murbad Talukas and the Jawhar State, where the rates were reduced by 50 per cent. (Government Memoranda Nos. 6253-C/33/23664, dated 21st January 1937 and 6253-C/33, dated 8th February 1937).

Ratnagiri.—The rates were restored to those prevailing in 1933-34, viz., Rs. 4-8-0 per bulk gallon of 40° U.P. and Rs. 3-0-0 per bulk gallon of 60° U.P. (i.e. Rs. 7-8-0 per proof gallon).

Kolaba (except Sugwa Range), Kanara, Dharwar, Belgaum, Bijapur, Satara, Nasik (except Peint Mahal), East Khandesh and West Khandesh (except Nawapur Petha and part of Nandurbar Taluka).—The experimental reductions in the rates in these Districts sanctioned in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 9628/28, dated 16th January 1933 and 1142/33, dated 12th December 1933 were continued.

Poona.—The rate for the Ambegaon shop was reduced to Rs. 7-8-0 per proof gallon.

Shclapur.—The rate for all border shops and shops in illicit distillation areas was fixed at Rs. 9-11-0 per proof gallon and that for the rest of the District was continued at Rs. 11-4-0 per proof gallon.

Ahmednagar.—The reduced rate of Rs. 7-8-0 per proof gallon for the Kopergaon shop was made permanent and the rates for the Pathardi shop and the Ankola Taluka were reduced to Rs. 7-8-0 per proof gallon as an experimental measure.

Wherever 40° U.P. was sanctioned in place of 25° U.P. and 30° U.P., the duty on 40° U.P. was fixed in proportion to that on 60° U.P. or where 60° U.P. was not sold, the duty on 40° U.P. was reduced in proportion to that on the higher strength. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 6515/33, dated 6th January 1937.)

(8) The revised rates of tree-tax on toddy producing trees sanctioned in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 890/28, dated 12th June 1933, were made permanent. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 6878/33, dated 6th July 1937.)

The rate of tree-tax in the Akrani Mahal of the West Khandesh District was reduced to Re. 1 from 1st August 1937. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 890/28, dated 14th June 1937.)

(9) The rationing of toddy trees was abolished in the Ratnagiri District. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5615, dated 6th January 1937.)

(10) The experimental reduction in the limit of possession, sale and transport of denatured spirit from six bottles to two in the Pen and Panwel Talukas and five gallons to two bottles in the rest of the Kolaba District, and five gallons to three bottles throughout the Belgaum District, sanctioned in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, Nos. 2741/33, dated 21st December 1934 and 4187/33, dated 16th January 1936) was continued. The limit was also reduced from 1 gallon to 3 bottles in the Halyal Taluka of the Kanara District and from five gallons to two bottles in the Kalyan, Bhiwandi, Shahapur and Murbad Talukas and Wada and Mokhada Pethas of the Thana District and from 5 gallons to one gallon in the rest of the Thana District. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5615/33, of 6th January 1937.)

(11) The experimental reduction in the limit of possession, sale and transport of charas from 3 tolas to one tola in Ahmedabad City was made permanent. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5615/33, dated 6th January 1937.)

(12) The cost price of opium supplied from the Ghazipur Factory to Indian States was fixed at Rs. 19-7-0 per seer for 1937-38. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 3746/24, dated 24th November 1936.)

(13) The fixed fee system with maximum selling prices for the Sugwa Range of the Kolaba District and the Dohad and Jhalod Mahal of the Broach and Panch Mahals District, sanctioned in Government

Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 3326-C/33, dated 5th February 1936 and Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 3202-C/33, dated 27th February 1936, was continued for one year. (Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, Nos. 3326-C/33, dated 21st January 1937, 3302-C/33, dated 7th January 1937.)

The fixed fee system with maximum selling prices was also extended to the—

- (1) Peint Mahal of the Nasik District ;
- (2) Nawapur Petha and part of Nandurbar Taluka of the West Khandesh District ; and
- (3) Godhra and Kalol Talukas and Halol Mahal of the Broach and Panch Mahals District,

with effect from 1st November 1937 to 31st March 1939. The strengths of country spirit and the rates of still-head duty sanctioned for these three areas were as follows :—

(14) The discontinuance of the system of rationing of trees allotted to toddy shops sanctioned in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5372/33, dated 18th June 1936, was continued for two years more from 1st August 1937. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 6878/33, dated 6th July 1937.)

(15) The concession of tapping trees in one District for transport of toddy for sale in another District was continued (*vide* Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 6878/33, dated 6th July 1937).

(16) The levy of license fee on toddy trees tapped for domestic consumption in the Patan Taluka and Shirola Petha of the Satara District was abolished. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 6878/33, dated 6th July 1937.)

(17) A transfer fee of Rs. 2 for change of site or name in the case of D. D. License No. 1 and Re. 1 in the case of D. D. License No. 2 was levied. (Government Notification, Revenue Department, No. 375/33, dated 24th January 1938.)

(18) Kaira District and Panch Mahals Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District were separated from the Ahmedabad Division, and a new Division known as Kaira Division was formed with headquarters at Godhra, with effect from 1st May 1937 (*vide* Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7479/28, dated 28th October 1936 and Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 7479-C/28, dated 3rd April 1937).

(19) The Bonded Liquor Warehouse at Mundhwa was transferred to Poona from 1st July 1937.

(20) The Excise Department undertook as an experiment the departmental collection of mhowra flowers in the Nawapur Petha and Nandurbar Taluka of the West Khandesh District. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 8146/33, dated 5th March 1938.)

2. In the body of the report all statistics of consumption and revenue relate to British Districts only.

CHAPTER II.

COUNTRY SPIRIT.

3. *Sale Strengths.*—The sale strengths prescribed for country spirit were the same as in the previous year, viz. 25° U.P., 30° U.P., 40° U.P., and 60° U.P. The sale of 25° U.P. or 30° U.P., was allowed at shops near the borders of Indian States and in certain areas to control illicit distillation and illicit importation. The policy of discouraging the consumption of strong spirit by restricting a certain number of shops in each district to the exclusive sale of weak spirit was continued in places where such a policy had proved successful.

4. *Receipts from Still-head Duty.*—The revenue from still-head duty increased to Rs. 94,46,214 [Rs. 91,20,275] (Imperial Return I column 2) due to the large issues of country spirit in some districts, especially in West Khandesh, Surat, Thana, Nasik, Dharwar and Ahmedabad.

5. *License Fees.*—Receipts from license fees for the right of retail vend of country spirit at shops fell to Rs. 59,96,956 [Rs. 64,06,420]. The decrease was due to lack of competition at the auctions in most districts. In the districts of Kaira, Kolaba, East Khandesh, Ahmednagar and Thana there was some competition but this was more than counter-balanced by the absence of competition in other districts owing to adverse economic conditions. The decrease in the West Khandesh was due to the change in the system of disposal of shops in the Nawapur Petha and in part of Nandurbar Taluka with effect from 1st November 1937. Here 22 shops were auctioned for 6 months and were then given on proportionate license fees for the month of October 1937, and on nominal license fee for 5 months commencing from 1st November 1937, instead of being auctioned as usual for the whole year. The big drop in the Ahmedabad District was due to the fact that during the year 1937-38 no advance

collections on account of license fees were made from the Ahmedabad City and 8 adjoining country liquor shops as it was decided to declare Ahmedabad City a "Dry Area" with effect from 19th May 1938 and therefore the shops were continued to the old licensees on payment of fees calculated on the actual issues of country liquor from the warehouse.

6. *Revenue and Consumption in the Akrani Tract.*—The country spirit arrangement in the Akrani continued in the charge of the Forest Department. Liquor was supplied by the small departmental Distillery at Dhadgaon and sold by departmental shopkeepers at a fixed price of annas 4 a bottle. The sale proceeds of spirit in the area amounted to Rs. 63,747 [Rs. 60,326] showing an increase of Rs. 3,421. The consumption of liquor, which is issued at one strength only viz. 60° U.P., increased to 42,498 bulk gallons [40,218] due partly to improved road communications which assisted the movement of crops to town markets with consequent better prices and partly to the construction of roads and other works by Government which provided additional employment for a number of the inhabitants. The output of the Dhadgaon Distillery fell short of the demand, and 3,762 bulk gallons of 60° U.P., liquor manufactured at the Nasik Distillery had to be imported, part of the way by head loads, for issue to shops in the Akrani.

7. *Working of the Contract Supply System.*—Since 1st April 1929 with one exception there has been no contract supply system in any part of the Province, and all liquor with three exceptions is supplied by the Government Central Distillery at Nasik Road through its departmental local warehouses. The three exceptions are :

- (1) The Akrani which as noted above is supplied from the Dhadgaon Government Distillery ;
- (2) The manufacture at Chowka in the Ratnagiri District of Kaju liquor for supply to the Malwan warehouse ; and
- (3) An outstill shop at Redi which provides toddy spirit to meet competition of cheap liquor in adjoining Goa territory.

8. *Working of the Mhowra Flowers Act.*—This was the eighth year of the extension of Section 18-B of the Bombay Abkari Act relating to Mhowra flowers to the whole of the Province of Bombay.

Eight licenses for the retail sale of mhowra flowers were granted in the Panch Mahals Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District during the year. The grant of permits for the possession of mhowra flowers was restricted to *bona fide* trade and industrial purposes. The arrangement whereby licenses, passes and permits are issued only by Excise Officers under the control of Superintendents of Excise, continued to work satisfactorily. The extension of the provisions of Section 18-B of the Bombay Abkari Act to the whole Province has helped to control illicit traffic in mhowra flowers and to check illicit distillation. The number of cases of illicit possession of mhowra flowers detected during the year under report was 518 [729]. In the Ahmedabad, Kaira, Broach, the Panch Mahals, Surat, Thana, Kolaba, Poona, Nasik, West Khandesh and East Khandesh Districts the number of cases was respectively 72,

106, 2, 120, 0, 58, 30, 12, 19, 50 and 49 in 1937-38 compared with 88, 97, 2, 107, nil, 148, 18, 2, 53, 100 and 114 in 1936-37, the decrease is due to the restrictions imposed by the Act becoming more widely known. The arrangements made in the previous years to purchase as much as possible of the Province's produce of mhowra flowers even at somewhat higher rates than those paid for the produce of Indian States, were continued. Special district contracts were granted for the supply of mhowra from the Panch Mahals, Ahmedabad, Kaira, West Khandesh, Thana and Nasik districts to the Government Central Distillery, Nasik Road. The right of collection of mhowra in the Government forests of the Nasik and West Khandesh districts was again purchased by this Department from the Forest Department, in order to facilitate the grant of local contracts for their collection and supply. The Forest Department made departmental arrangements for the collection and supply of mhowra flowers from Peint Mahal of the Nasik District. To reduce the supplies available for illicit distillation, a scheme for the departmental collection of mhowra flowers in the Nawapur Petha and Nandurbar Taluka of the West Khandesh District was started from 15th March 1938. A rate of Rs. 1-4-0 per maund was paid to the Bhils and Mavchis who brought in mhowra flowers and collections were satisfactory. Fuller comment must however be reserved for next year's report.

9. *Country spirit shops.*—The number of shops for the retail vend of country spirit decreased to 2,032 [2,131].

10. *Advisory Committees.*—The various Excise Advisory Committees in the Province held 747 meetings at which 1,021 recommendations were made. Of these 811, i.e. 79 per cent., were accepted. The rejected recommendations related, in most cases, to the closure of shops of which the retention was deemed necessary, or to special hours of sale for shops in particular areas.

10-A. *Opening and closing hours.*—The opening hour of sale was 10-30 a.m. as in the previous year. The closing hour remained the same as in the previous year, viz. 8-30 p.m., everywhere, with the exception of :

- (i) The Cities of Bombay and Ahmedabad ;
- (ii) The Bandra Municipal and Santa Cruz Cantonment areas where it was 9 p.m.

11. *Consumption.*—Appendix "A" column 11, shows in terms of proof gallons the sale of country spirit at shops. There was an increase of 90,820 proof gallons, or about 8·7 per cent. over the previous year. There was an increase in consumption in the Ahmedabad, the Panch Mahals, Surat, Thana, Bombay Suburban District, Bombay. Kolaba, Kanara, Dharwar, Satara, Ahmednagar, Nasik, West Khandesh and, East Khandesh districts, the most noticeable being in Ahmedabad (3,763), the Panch Mahals (24,614), Surat (6,691), Thana (4,530),

Bombay (15,083), Nasik (3,547) and West Khandesh (36,275). The increase in Ahmedabad District was chiefly due to the lowering of selling rates by Ahmedabad City licensees owing to competition between two parties. The increase in the Panch Mahals and the West Khandesh District was due to the introduction, with effect from 1st November 1937, in certain parts of these districts, of special Excise arrangements under which the rates of still-head duty were reduced and the shops disposed of for fixed fees with fixed selling prices. The increase in the Surat, Thana and Nasik districts was due to competition among the licensees and consequent reduction in the selling prices of liquor. The reason for increase in Bombay was the return to normal conditions after the riots in 1936-37. The most noticeable decreases occurred in the Broach (2,281) and the Ratnagiri (3,745) districts. The decrease in the former is attributed to the high selling rates charged by the licensees and in the latter to the increased still-head duty rates and consequent high selling prices of country spirit.

The total ration for 1937-38 was 17,69,342 proof gallons. The consumption for the whole Province was about 63 per cent. of the ration.

12. *Temperance activities.*—No special temperance activities came to notice.

13. *Administration of Distilleries and Warehouses.*—One Central Distillery and 33 Warehouses were maintained. The issue to retailers in British districts of duty-paid spirits amounted to 11,18,948 proof gallons (exclusive of 17,134 proof gallons issued from the Government Distillery at Dhadgaon and 1,677 proof gallons issued from the out-still at Redi) against 10,35,938 proof gallons in the previous year.

The seasonal contract distillery at Chowka in the Ratnagiri District opened in the year 1934-35 for the manufacture of Kaju liquor had an outturn of 2,088 L.P. gallons [2,259] from which 2,060 L.P. gallons were issued from the Malwan Warehouse to shops in Vengurla Petha and Malwan and Deogad talukas.

14. *Retail sale in excess of the prescribed limit.*—Permits for the sale of country spirit in excess of the prescribed limits on special occasions were granted in all the districts except Kaira, Bijapur, Sholapur, Satara, Poona, Ahmednagar and Nasik for the following quantities :—

CHAPTER III.

TODDY.

15. *Revenue*.—The revenue under this head derived from (1) tree-tax on trees tapped for toddy and (2) license fees for the retail sale of toddy, decreased to Rs. 66,45,578 [Rs. 70,99,655].

16. *Tree-tax*.—Receipts from tree-tax amounted to Rs. 22,76,745 [Rs. 24,66,299].

As changes in the Excise policy were under consideration toddy shops and tree-foot booths were disposed of twice during the year under report, first for the period of 3 months ending 31st October 1937 and thereafter for the remaining period of the toddy year. Only $\frac{1}{4}$ th of the annual tree-tax was charged for the trees tapped during the three months ending 31st October 1937.

The decrease in the tree-tax revenue was mainly due to the fall in the tree-tax receipts in the Surat District where a very large number of trees were tapped during the first three months on payment of $\frac{1}{4}$ th of the annual tree-tax. In spite of this concession the licensees seem to have lost money on account of rains during this period, and were therefore, reluctant to take shops and booths for the next nine months. The result was that 18 shops and a number of booths remained undisposed of and there was a decrease in the number of trees tapped. Thus in spite of the increase in the total number of trees tapped during the year under report the tree-tax revenue dropped considerably.

17. *License fees*.—The realizations from license fees amounted to Rs. 43,68,833 [Rs. 46,33,356]. The decrease of Rs. 2,64,523 was due partly to many shops and booths remaining closed in the Surat District and partly to a general lack of competition at the auctions in several districts of the Province.

18. *Trees licensed for tapping*.—The number of trees licensed to be tapped for toddy during the year under report and in the previous year is given below :—

The increase in the number of trees tapped during the year under report is, as explained in paragraph 16, not reflected in increased tree-tax.

19. *Toddy licenses.*—The licenses granted during the year under report and in the previous year were as follows :—

The decrease in the number of domestic consumption licenses was due to the fall in demand for such licenses in the Panch Mahals Sub-Division on account of the reduced price of liquor in the Godhra, Kalol and Halol talukas where the fixed fees system had been introduced. Five toddy shops and one tree-foot booth were closed during the year under report.

In the Town and Island of Bombay 43 tree-foot booths and 1 toddy shop were closed from 1st November 1937 as a step towards the policy of prohibition.

20. *Consumption.*—An increase of 5,82,193 gallons in the sales of toddy was reported, but the figures of consumption of toddy are definitely not to be relied on. The number of trees tapped is a better indication of relative consumption.

With a view to ensure the supply of fresh toddy to the public, transport of toddy from one district to another was permitted subject to the condition that the toddy should reach its destination within 12 hours of its being drawn. Excise Officers not lower in rank than a Sub-Inspector were empowered to destroy any toddy which in their opinion was unfit for human consumption.

The abolition of rationing of trees to shops has helped to provide a purer and cheaper supply of toddy and to minimise the temptation of adulteration with harmful ingredients. The procedure of paying surprise visits to toddy shops and booths to take samples of toddy for analysis was continued and during the last six months of the year 639 samples were taken of which 11 were found to contain Chloral Hydrate. Licensees whose toddy was found to have been adulterated were severely punished.

These measures appear to have greatly checked adulteration of toddy with deleterious substances. The addition of e.g. sugar and water cannot however be detected.

In Bombay City two tree-foot booths were cancelled for showing false receipts and sales in the account books. The reported increase in the consumption, however, is in consonance with the view that toddy, due to its cheapness, is largely taking the place of country liquor among the poorer classes in a number of districts.

20-A. *Retail sale permitted in excess of prescribed limit.*—Permits for the sale of toddy in excess of the prescribed limits are granted on special occasions, and 175, 552, 3,823, 6,669, 10, 863 and 1,741 gallons

were sold under such permits in Ahmedabad, Broach, Surat, Thana, Dharwar, Sholapur and West Khandesh Districts respectively.

21. *Manufacture of Gul.*—The All-India Village Industries Association was permitted under special rules, to tap 60 or less toddy trees at each of the six centres opened in the Bombay Suburban, Surat, Kolaba, Thana, Belgaum and Kanara Districts for imparting instruction in the manufacture of gul from sweet toddy.

In the Broach and Panch Mahals District a special license was granted, to tap 50 trees free of duty, in order to carry on experiments for the manufacture of gul from sweet toddy.

In the Kanara District 14 licenses were granted for the manufacture of gul against 8 in the previous year, and the number of trees tapped free of duty under these licenses during the year under report was 14,286.

It may be possible to estimate the prospects of this industry by next year.

CHAPTER IV.

FOREIGN LIQUORS (POTABLE AND NON-POTABLE INCLUDING THOSE OF INDIAN MANUFACTURE.)

22. *Revenue.*—The revenue under this head chiefly consists of (1) duty on Indian made liquors, (2) license fees for the sale of such liquors as well as imported liquors, and (3) vend (pass) fee on foreign liquors :

(a) imported at the port of Bombay, or

(b) imported into the Province of Bombay from other parts of British India and Indian States and foreign possessions, or

(c) manufactured in the Province. During the year under review, the revenue under (1) amounted to Rs. 11,06,066 [10,52,143] (columns 11, 14, 18 and 19 of Imperial Return I). The increase was due to increase in the consumption of Indian made foreign liquors generally.

The revenue under (2) and (3) increased to Rs. 22,24,079 [Rs. 20,40,486] (columns 12, 15, 20 and 21 and 21(a) of Imperial Return I).

23. *Imports and consumption of foreign liquor.*—The imports of foreign liquors into Bombay City by sea, compared with those of the previous year, were as follows :—

Exports to other Provinces were made from these imports, Bombay being a distributing centre for almost the whole of India. The following table gives statistics of sales in the Province, of foreign liquor in the year under report, compared with those of the previous year (Imperial Return IV, columns 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 15) :—

The increase in consumption of all sorts of potable foreign liquors was, mainly due to the improved conditions of trade in the Town and Island of Bombay, where the sales of beer increased by 33,000 bulk gallons and that of spirits by 3,600 gallons. The large increase of denatured spirit was due to its greater use in arts and industries as well as for domestic purposes.

24. *Canteen tenant licenses.*—The number of canteen tenant licenses issued during the year increased to 34 [31].

25. *Spirituos medicinal and toilet preparations.*—Six firms in Bombay continued to manufacture spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations in bond for the whole of the year while 2 firms in the mofussil discontinued such manufacture during the year, after working for some time. The concessional rate of duty of Rs. 5 per proof gallon was levied on purely medicinal preparations and a rate of Rs. 17-8-0 per proof gallon on toilet preparations as against the full rate of Rs. 25-10-0. The total quantity of rectified spirit used in the manufacture of spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations in bond was 34,690 proof gallons [31,267 proof gallons]. Spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations were imported into Bombay from Calcutta, Baroda, Central Provinces, Cochin and Bansda States.

25-A. *Rectified spirits and medicated wines.*—The sales other than in bond of rectified spirit and absolute alcohol were 845 gallons [822] (*vide* column 14 of the Imperial Return IV). The quantity of rectified spirit obtained free of duty by the Government Medical Stores, Bombay, from the Government Central Distillery, Nasik Road, was 24,875 proof gallons [24,830].

No accounts of medicated wines are required to be kept and so column 16 of the Imperial Return IV is blank.

26. The number of licenses for the sale of foreign liquors fell to 3,267 [3,366]. The decrease was mainly due to the decrease in the Temporary Refreshment Stall and all other special retail rectified spirit and medicated wines licenses (*vide* columns 7, 8, 24 and 26 to 29 of the Imperial Return III).

There was an increase of 2 licenses in the case of malt liquor and 18 in the case of denatured spirit licenses (*vide* columns 21 and 30 of Imperial Return III).

During the year under report 46 [60] licenses were issued for the manufacture of perfumed spirits and 16 [13] licenses for the manufacture of flavouring essences.

CHAPTER V.

INTOXICATING DRUGS OTHER THAN OPIUM.

27. *Cultivation and outturn of Ganja.*—There was no cultivation of ganja this year as the balance of the previous year's stock was sufficient to meet all requirements.

28. *Issues from warehouses.*—The issues of hemp drugs during the year 1936-37 and those for the year 1937-38 are contrasted below :—

The most noticeable decrease in the consumption of ganja was in Bombay, Sholapur, Ahmedabad, Surat and East Khandesh Districts. The decrease in the Sholapur, Surat and East Khandesh was due to high selling prices

charged by the licensees and the reduced purchasing capacity of the people. The licensees of Bombay City and Ahmedabad District combined for some time and raised the prices of ganja, bhang and charas with the result that sales of these drugs dropped considerably. On the other hand sales of ganja in the Dharwar and Ahmednagar Districts showed an increase owing to competitive selling prices. Consumption of ganja and bhang in other districts was fairly steady.

30. *Revenue.*—The revenue from intoxicating drugs is derived from :—

- (1) quantitative duties on (a) issues from warehouses and (b) imports from other provinces; and
- (2) license fees.

The duty and license fees amounted to Rs. 10,65,215 [11,39,426] and Rs. 6,71,163 [6,72,529] respectively.

31. *Vend Licenses.*—The number of vend licenses in the year under report was 775 [782]. Of these 21 were wholesale and 754 were retail. 4 shops were opened and 11 were closed during the year under report.

CHAPTER VI.

DANGEROUS DRUGS.

32. *Vend Licenses.*—During the year under report, the number of licenses granted was as follows :

- (1) 164 D. D. 1 licenses (for the manufacture, possession and sale otherwise than on prescription of manufactured drugs);
- (2) 927 D. D. 2 licenses (for the possession and sale on prescription of manufactured drugs);
- (3) 267 D. D. 3 authorizations to approved practitioners (for the possession of coca derivatives for use in exercise of their profession, but not for sale).

33. *Imports and issues in the Presidency.*—The quantity of cocaine and its allied drugs imported during the year under report decreased to 12 lbs. 1 oz. 126 $\frac{7}{8}$ grains (Avoirdupois standard weight), [16 lbs. 2 ozs. 274 $\frac{1}{4}$ grains]. The quantity sold under licenses fell to 12 lbs. 10 ozs. 19 $\frac{3}{4}$ grains [15 lbs. 4 ozs 228 $\frac{1}{4}$ grains]. The statistics of cocaine transactions are given below :—

34. *Cocaine Cases.*—Two cases [4] of illicit possession of cocaine were detected in the City of Bombay during the year under report. As far as can be judged illicit traffic in this drug is under control, due to the vigilance of the staff both of the Cocaine Area and Railway Lines. In the mofussil 4 cases [5] of illicit possession and 1 [2] of illicit sale were detected in the year under report.

CHAPTER VII.

OPIUM.

35. *Realizations from opium issued from Depots.*—Opium issued from Depots realised Rs. 11,03,153 as shown in the District Treasury Accounts plus a sum of Rs. 667, representing the gain on opium supplied to Zanzibar. Of this sum Rs. 2,89,914 represented the cost price paid to the Government of the United Provinces and the balance of Rs. 8,13,239 was the gain on sales. From the last figure, viz., Rs. 8,13,239 an expenditure of Rs. 5,800 representing the conveyance and packing charges of opium, has to be deducted. The net profit to Government thus amounted to Rs. 8,07,439. (inclusive of duty) [8,46,359].

36. *Sales in British Districts.*—The total issues in British Districts amounted to 14,697 seers [15,169 seers] (Column 17 of Imperial Return IV), and actual sales were, 14,675 seers [15,104 seers]. The decrease of 429 seers was due to a fall in consumption in all the Districts of the Presidency except Kaira, Nasik, Surat, Panch Mahals, Ratnagiri, Bombay and West Khandesh. This decrease is attributed mainly to high retail prices charged by licensees and to the poor economic condition of the people. In Bombay the increase of 57 seers is due to the restoration of normal conditions after the riots.

37. *License Fees.*—There was a decrease in the fees realised for retail vend in British Districts to Rs. 6,84,904 [Rs. 8,50,477] (column 26 of Imperial Return I). The appreciable difference in license fees is due to the opium licensees in Bombay having paid their license fees in April 1938 instead of March 1938 in which it is generally paid.

38. *Retail Shops.*—The total number of retail licenses was 783 [828] (Column 31 of Imperial Return III). One additional license was granted while the total number of licenses discontinued was 46.

39. *Supplies to Indian States.*—The total quantity of opium supplied to Indian States was 3,178 [3,864 seers]. (Col. of Appendix D.)

40. *Manufacture and issue in the Baroda State.*—The area under poppy cultivation in Baroda State was 249 acres 30 gunthas [242 acres and 3 gunthas]. The opium in hand at the commencement of the year was 34,396 seers and that manufactured during the year under report was 667 seers. The total issues to licensed dealers decreased to 3,024 seers [3,178]. The stock held at the end of the year was 31,747 seers exclusive of 292 seers loss by dryage.

41. *Total Excise Opium Revenue.*—The Excise opium revenue was Rs. 17,88,724 (inclusive of Rs. 667 gain on opium supplied to Zanzibar) [Rs. 19,90,559]. The decrease of Rs. 2,01,835 is partly due to the opium licensees in Bombay having paid their license fees in April instead of in March in which it is generally paid and partly due to fall in consumption.

42. *Consumption of opium for veterinary and quasi-veterinary use.*—The quantity of opium used for veterinary and quasi-veterinary purposes during the year was 45 lbs. 4 ozs. 0 drams and 5¼ grains [47 lbs. 12 ozs. 6 drams and 14 grains].

43. *Measures to check the administration of opium to children.*—The Bombay Presidency Health and Baby Week Association continued their activities of the previous year to warn mothers against the danger of administering opium to babies by means of lectures on infant welfare and health talks to mothers and by magic lantern slides and cinema films. The Association held 3 health exhibitions and 4 cinema shows in Bombay for the benefit of industrial workers. The aggregate attendance on these occasions was over 5,200. Attempts made to educate the mill workers to bring up healthy children by avoiding the harmful effects of opium are proving successful to some extent and the habit of administering opium to children seems gradually declining in Bombay City. In 231 cases opium drugging is reported to have stopped. The Chief Inspector of Factories, Bombay, reports that 541 children attended creches in Bombay in the year under report against 351 in the previous year. A strict watch was kept over the feeding of infants while at the creches by experienced matrons to see that opium was not administered in some form or other.

CHAPTER VIII.

FINANCIAL RESULTS.

44. *Revenue.*—The gross realizations for the year (Imperial Return I) are contrasted below with those of the previous year :—

45. *Expenditure.*—Exclusive of (i) compensation paid to Indian States in respect of their Abkari and Hemp Drugs leases (Rs. 5,28,190) and (ii) compensation (a) to the Bombay Municipality for loss of revenue which it previously derived from shop licenses (Rs. 1,43,750) and (b) to the District Local Boards in the Province in lieu of one anna cess on Excise revenue which they were formerly allowed (Rs. 1,30,128) the expenditure for the year (Imperial Return II) was Rs. 31,08,406 [Rs. 32,93,488]. The decrease is mainly due to decreased expenditure under the heads “Contingencies and special charges other than rewards” (Rs. 95,451) and “Depreciation” (Rs. 83,259). The figures of expenditure include the price paid to the Government of the United Provinces for opium supplied to the Department and the charges for Excise Establishment in Collectors’ offices paid by book adjustment to the head “22, General Administration”. The cost of opium is fully recouped from the sale proceeds of opium. The gross expenditure this year, including the compensation shown at (i) and (ii) above, amounted to Rs. 39,10,474 [Rs. 41,46,208]. If the item relating to the cost of opium is excluded, it being fully recouped in the sales to licensees and others, the gross expenditure would be Rs. 35,56,809 [Rs. 37,82,608] a decrease of Rs. 2,25,799. The decrease is due to a decrease in the expenditure under “Contingencies and special charges other than rewards”, “Depreciation” and “Compensation paid to Indian States”. The net revenue of the year, after deducting refunds (Rs. 1,85,876) and the gross expenditure (Rs. 39,10,474) from the gross revenue (Rs. 3,18,84,722) decreased by Rs. 1,51,235, i.e., from

Rs. 2,79,39,607 in the previous year to Rs. 2,77,88,372 in the year under report.

46. *Recovery of Excise Revenue by coercive process.*—Coercive processes had to be resorted to for the recovery of Excise revenue in all districts of the Province except Ahmedabad, Broach and Panch Mahals, Surat, Kaira, Sholapur and the Bombay Suburban District.

The details of the arrears outstanding, collections made during the year and the balance to be recovered will be found in columns 3, 6 and 10 respectively of Appendix "E" to this report. The total amount of arrears at the beginning of the year was Rs. 4,51,504. Out of this Rs. 2,01,865 were collected during the year under report and Rs. 15,138 were written off as irrecoverable. The net arrears at the end of the year including those for the previous year, amounted to Rs. 4,31,894, the chief arrears being in the districts of Bombay Suburban (Rs. 59,361), Kolaba (Rs. 54,421), East Khandesh (Rs. 45,171), Poona (Rs. 43,651), West Khandesh (Rs. 34,847), Ahmedabad (Rs. 34,092) and Broach (Rs. 24,939). The remissions and amounts written off increased to Rs. 15,138 [Rs. 14,126]. There has been a further decrease in the total arrears for collection at the end of the year, the balance due being Rs. 19,610 less than at the end of the previous year. This is largely the result of the successful working of the system of recovery of license fees by monthly instalments which had been introduced in the mofussil in the case of country liquor, hemp drugs and opium shops during the previous year.

CHAPTER IX.

OFFENCES.

47. *Offences against the Abkari Law.*—The total number of cases detected was 7,124 [7,806]. Of these 6,773 [7,327] related to liquor, 344 [468] to hemp drugs and 7 [11] to cocaine. Details will be found in columns 8, 14 and 18 of Appendix "F".

48. *Liquor cases.*—The total number of liquor cases detected during the year under report shows a decrease of 554 cases compared with those of the previous year. The number of cases detected under "illicit distillation" shows a decrease of 416, the number of such cases detected during the year under report being 4,062 [4,478]. The decrease was mainly in the districts of Thana (221) and West Khandesh (179) and is probably due to:—

(1) the 50 per cent. reduction in still-head duty in Shahapur and Murbad talukas, Wada and Mokhada Pethas and Jawhar State in the Thana District, and

(2) the introduction of special Excise arrangements in the more criminal parts of the West Khandesh District resulting in an increase in licit consumption in that District.

The number of cases of illicit distillation detected in the Town and Island of Bombay was 3 [6]. Cases under "illicit importation, exportation, and transportation" increased to 238 [232]. Those under "illicit possession" increased to 1,559 [1,554] and under "unlicensed sale" to 90 [64]. Those under "other miscellaneous offences" fell to 824 [999].

49. *Hemp Drugs cases.*—The number of cases relating to hemp drugs decreased to 344 [468]. The decrease was mainly in the districts of East Khandesh (80), Surat (16), Bombay (13) and Ahmedabad and West Khandesh (12 each). The decrease in East Khandesh was mainly due to the smaller number of petty cases of possession by Railway passengers of drugs in excess of the prescribed limit of import detected at the Bhusawal Railway Station.

The total quantity of charas seized in Bombay amounted to 27 lbs. 34 tolas and 8·5 grains [8 lbs. 11 tolas and 114 grains]. The disturbed conditions of the Town together with the raising of the price of charas brought about an increase in illicit import.

50. *Cocaine cases.*—Cases relating to cocaine decreased to 7 [11]. The cocaine traffic was mainly confined to Ahmedabad and Bombay where 5 [5] and 2 [4] cases were detected respectively. The total quantity of cocaine seized amounted to 1 tola and 51 grains [334 grains].

51. *Offences against the opium law.*—The number of opium cases detected in British Territory was 205 [258] (column 29, Appendix "F"). The number of cases of illicit possession detected in British Territory was 97 [104], and that of manufacture and illicit sale was 5 [25] and 15 [17] respectively. The number of cases of illegal import decreased to 59 [84]. One case of transport of opium was detected in the West Khandesh District during the year under report. There were no cases of illegal export or cultivation of opium during the year under report. The contraband opium seized in British Territory amounted to 45 seers, 12 tolas and 38½ grains [38 seers 79 tolas and 9¼ grains].

52. *Cases of Drunkenness.*—Convictions for drunkenness numbered 2,616 [2,154] (Appendix "G" columns 2 and 3). Of these 1,398 [1,066] occurred in Bombay City.

53. *The Excise Intelligence Bureau.*—The Excise Intelligence Bureau continued to compile and disseminate information regarding the movements and methods of inter-provincial smugglers and offences against the Excise, Opium and Dangerous Drugs Laws.

The Finger Print Branch of the Bureau received during the year 254 [335] finger impression slips of Excise offenders for identification and record. Previous convictions were traced in 26 [45] instances. At the close of the year the Branch had on its records finger print slips of about 35,200 excise convicts.

54. *Refresher Courses for Excise Officers and men in the Constabulary Staff.*—The following officers and men were put through the Refresher Courses during the year under report :—

CHAPTER X.

GENERAL REMARKS.

55. *Revenue.*—The gross revenue showed a decrease of Rs. 3·83 lakhs. The items mainly responsible for this decrease were country liquor license fees (4·09), toddy license fees (2·65) from opium under cost price, duty (including gain on sales and license fees) (2·01), tree-tax (1·89) and hemp drugs (.76). These decreases were partly counter-balanced by increases under still-head duty (3·26), from foreign liquors under duty and license fees (2·37), and from the sale of spirits at the Nasik Distillery (1·77).

56. *Consumption.*—There was a general increase in the consumption of liquors. In the case of country spirit the increase of .9 lakhs gallons (P. Gs.) was due partly to the return of normal conditions of trade in the Town and Island of Bombay and partly to the introduction of the fixed fee system in special areas of Panch Mahals and West Khandesh Districts. In these latter areas most, if not all, the increase is in substitution of illicit consumption, and does not indicate actual additional consumption of intoxicants.

Figures of consumption of toddy are, as has frequently been noticed, unreliable, but the increase reported as of 5·82 lakhs gallons, may be attributed to the abolition of rationing of toddy trees to shops and to the increased supervision exercised over the toddy trade by the Department.

The consumption of beer and spirits increased by 34,000 and 4,000 bulk gallons respectively. The Town and Island of Bombay is mainly responsible for the increase.

The increase in the consumption of fermented country and foreign liquor is largely due to part of the former country spirit demand being diverted for economic reasons to the cheaper beverages.

Opium sales fell by 429 seers mainly on account of high retail prices charged by licensees generally.

The sales of charas decreased by 814 seers, ganja by 915 seers and bhang by 447 seers. The decrease in consumption of these hemp drugs also was largely due to high retail rates.

The following statement shows the consumption of country spirit in 1929-30 and during the years 1933-34 to 1937-38 in the rural and urban areas :—

Fixed fee areas account for the increase in the rural areas whereas Bombay, Ahmedabad and Surat are responsible for the increase in the urban areas (Bombay + 15,000 proof gallons ; Surat + 45,000 proof gallons ; Ahmedabad + 3,000 proof gallons = Total + 22,500 proof gallons).

57. *Fixed maximum prices.*—The experiment started last year in the Talukas of Dohad and Jhalod in Panch Mahals Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District, and in the Sugwa Range of the Kolaba District of disposing of country liquor shops for a fixed fee with a condition imposed for a maximum retail selling price for country liquor was continued during the year. From 1st November 1937, the system was further extended to :—

the Godhra, Kalol and Halol Talukas of the Panch Mahals Sub-Division,

the Nawapur Peta and part of the Nandurbar Taluka of West Khandesh District, and

the Peint Mahal of the Nasik District.

The experiment appears to have justified itself by the much reduced number of illicit distillation, etc., cases detected in these areas this year, compared with those detected before the introduction of the special arrangements,

58. *Excise Policy*.—During the year under report Government declared their policy of Total Prohibition which it is their ambition to enforce in 3 years. As a first step 1 toddy shop and 43 tree-foot-booths in the Town and Island of Bombay were closed with effect from 1st November 1937. It was also decided to constitute the following “Dry Areas” wherein no shops for the retail sale of country spirit, toddy, potable foreign liquors including spirits, wines and beer would be allowed and where the sale of opium and hemp drugs would be permitted only to addicts producing certificates from Registered Medical Practitioners :—

I. *Rural Dry Areas*—

- (a) Jambusar and Wagra Talukas of the Broach and Panch Mahals District ;
- (b) Newasa and Shevgaon Talukas and Pathardi Mahal of the Ahmednagar District ; and
- (c) Kumta and Ankola Talukas of the Kanara District.

II. *Urban Area*—

Ahmedabad City, Cantonment and 27 suburban villages (*vide* G. R., R. D., No. 982/24 of 28th January 1938).

The necessary preliminary arrangements for carrying the above into effect were undertaken in the year under report.

In view of the Session of the Indian National Congress at Haripura in Bardoli Taluka, all liquor and drugs shops in Bardoli and part of Mandvi Taluka were closed with effect from 18th February 1938 (*vide* G. R., R. D., No. 982/24, dated 12th February 1938) as a preliminary step to the declaration of Total Prohibition in this area at the expiry of the toddy year on 31st July 1938.

11 additional Sub-Inspectors and 114 constables were engaged during the year in order that they should be trained before the Prohibition measures actually came into force.

59. *Allegations of corruption.*—Six accusations of corruption against officers and subordinates of the Department were enquired into during the year. Of these two were found to be baseless, two were not proved, and one was still under enquiry at the end of the year. The remaining case related to a Sub-Inspector obtaining liquor from a licensee without paying for it. The charge was held proved and the officer was dismissed. Instructions were issued in compliance with Government Circular Memorandum P. and R. D., No. 1581/34, dated 25th August 1937 and no breach of these was brought to notice.

60. *Staff.*—The Department lost a most valuable officer by the retirement of Khan Bahadur A. S. Dalal, O.B.E., at the end of the year. Khan Bahadur Dalal had been Superintendent of the Government Central Distillery, Nasik, since its inception in 1922 and the remarkable success of the distillery has been largely due to his experience, knowledge and energy. Mr. G. U. Farrow a very experienced Superintendent also retired at the end of the year.

I regret to have to record the death of Mr. K. N. Wadia, Superintendent of Excise, Poona Division, who died of heart failure in August, while actually at work in his office.

Further I regret to have to record the death of Mr. Lovji Cama, Excise Sub-Inspector, Virar, who was murdered in the execution of his duty, while carrying out a raid for illicit liquor on the village of Narangi in the Thana District.

Officers of the Department have almost without exception worked very well in a year marked by changes in Excise Policy and by preparation for the introduction of Dry Areas in several Districts from 1st April 1938. It is impossible to bring to the notice of Government the names of all officers who have done well during the year, but I would mention however the good work done by Mr. H. G. Maclean, Superintendent of Excise, Ahmedabad Division, in organising the administrative preparations for the introduction of the Ahmedabad Dry Area, and the energy shown by Rao Saheb M. S. Navalkar, Superintendent of Excise, Thana Division, in dealing with a wide spread system of illicit distillation in Bhiwandi, Kalyan and Thana.

The subordinate staff of the Excise Department and constabulary did satisfactory work, and so many officers have shown good results in detection that it would be invidious to mention only a few individually. I would however particularly bring to notice the staff of the Commissioner's office which cheerfully shouldered a very greatly increased burden of work, until within measurable distance of a breakdown.
