# REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE EXCISE DEPARTMENT IN THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1938-39.

Note.—Throughout the report, the figures in rectangular brackets wherever placed in juxta-position to those given for the year under report, refer to the previous year (1937-38).

#### CHAPTER I.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES.

The following were the principal features of the Excise system and arrangements during the year 1938-39.

- (1) The rationing system was continued for country spirit except in the Fixed Fee Areas mentioned at item No. (17) below. The total ration for the Province was the same as for 1937-38, the District being the unit of rationing (vide Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 2741/33, dated 21st December 1934). This ration was distributed by Collectors, the annual ration for each shop being fixed at the beginning of the year and adjustments made from time to time between shops as required. No monthly ration for shops was fixed.
- (2) All licenses for the retail sale of country spirit, opium and hemp drugs and for the "on" sale of foreign liquor were disposed of by auction sale except (a) in the case of opium shops in Bandra, Kurla and Ghatkopar, and in the Town and Island of Bombay, which were disposed of by tender for 3 years from 1st April 1936 (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5615/33, dated 6th January 1937); and (b) in the case of country spirit shops in Fixed Fees Areas mentioned at item No. (17) below. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7219/33, dated 13th January 1938.)
- (3) All toddy licenses except in the areas mentioned at item (4) below were disposed of for the full year ending 31st July 1939, by auction first. In cases where there were no bids or the bids offered were inadequate, they were disposed of by tender or negotiation.
- (4) The toddy licenses in the Kanara and Ahmednagar Districts, in the Broach Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District and in the Valod Mahal of the Surat District were diposed of by auction up to 31st March 1939 only. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 8802/33, dated 24th June 1938.)
- (5) The experimental instalment system for the recovery of license fees of country spirit and toddy shops and booths in the Town and Island of Bombay was made permanent. (Government Resolutions, Revenue Department, No. 6378/33, dated 22nd November 1937, and No. 8802/33, dated 24th June 1938.)
- (6) The system of recovering license fees by quarterly intalments in the case of country spirit, hemp drugs and opium licenses was worm Bk D 32-1

reintroduced in the Ratnagiri District. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7219/33, dated 14th March 1938.)

- (7) The experimental reduction in the limit of possession, sale and transport of country spirit from three bottles to one, sanctioned in the following areas, was made permanent:—
  - (a) The Municipal, cantonment and notified areas of the Ahmedabad District (excepting Ahmedabad City), and of the Districts of Kaira, Ahmednagar, Nasik and Kolaba;
  - (b) The Municipal and other urban areas of the West Khandesh District;
  - (c) The Municipal and urban areas of the Jalgaon, Amalner and Chalisgaon Talukas of the East Khandesh District;
- (d) The urban areas of the Kanara and Dharwar Districts. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7219/23, dated 13th January 1938.)
- (8) The reduction from six bottles to three was made permanent in the rural areas of Kanara and Dharwar Districts. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7219/33, dated 13th January 1938.)
- (9) The limit of possession, sale and transport of country spirit was reduced from six bottles to three in the rural areas of the Kaira District; and the limit of one bottle was prescribed for all other urb in areas of the East Khandesh District. (Government Resolution, Rovenue Department, No. 7219/33, dated 13th January 1938.)
- (10) The limit of possession, sale and transport of toddy was reduced from six bottles to three in the Dharwar District and in the Belgaum Taluka of the Belgaum District. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 8802/33, dated 24th June 1938.)
- (11) The experimental reduction in the limit of possession, sale and transport of denatured spirit from six bottles to two in the Pen and Panvel Talukas of the Kolaba District and five gallons to 2 bottles in the Belgaum District was made permanent. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7219/33, dated 13th January 1938).
- (12) The limit of possession, sale and transport of denatured spirit was reduced to 2 quart bottles in the Junnar Taluka and Ambegaon Petha of the Poona District. (Government Notifications, Revenue Department, Nos. 9685/33 and 9685/33(a), dated 25th February 1939.)
- (13) The following changes in the strength of country spirit were sanctioned during the year;
  - (a) The experimental strengths of country spirit sanctioned in the Broach Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District, in the Surat, Thana, Kanara, Dharwar, Belgaum, Bijapur, Sholapur, Satara, Ahmednagar, Nasik, East Khandesh and West Khandesh (except Nawapur Petha and part of Nandurbar Taluka) Districts were continued.

- (b) The sale of 40° U.P. was allowed experimentally in the Broach Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District in addition to 30° and 60° U.P.
- (c) The sale of 40° U.P. was allowed experimentally at the Khandbara, Nizampur and Bhadwad shops in the Nandurbar Taluka and at all shops in the Nawapur Petha of the West Khandesh District. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7219/33 dated 13th January 1938).
- (d) The sale of 25° U.P. at the 13 border shops in the Panch Mahals Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District was discontinued and that of 40° and 60° U.P. was allowed throughout that sub-division. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7219/33 dated 14th March 1938.)
- (14) The following changes in the rates of still head duty were sanctioned during the year.
  - (a) The experimental reductions in the rates of still head duty in the Kolaba (except Sugwa Range), Kanara, Dharwar, Belgaum, (except for 30° U.P.), Bijapur, Satara, Nasik (except Peint Mahal), East Khandesh (except at the Jalgaon and Amalner town shops), West Khandesh and Ahmednagar Districts were continued;
  - (b) The rate of 30° U.P. was raised to Rs. 8-15-0 per proof gallon throughout the Belgaum District, except at the Kankumbi shop.
  - (c) The rate for the Jalgaon and Amalner town shops in the East Khandesh District was raised to Rs. 7-8-0 per proof gallon. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7219/33 dated 13th January 1938).
- (15) The sale of 40° U.P. kaju liquor in sealed bottles and pints was sanctioned at certain centrally situated shops in all Talukas of the Ratnagiri District. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department No. 7219/33 dated 14th March 1938.)
- (16) The rationing of toddy trees was abolished in the Ratnagiri District for two years from 1st April 1938. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7219/33 dated 13th January 1938.)
- (17) The experimental Fixed Fee system with maximum selling prices introduced in the following areas was continued for one year:
  - (1) Sugwa Range of the Kolaba District.
  - (2) Dohad Taluka and Jhalod Mahal of the Broach and Panch Mahals District.
    - (3) Peint Mahal of the Nasik District.
  - (4) Nawapur Petha and part of the Nandurbar Taluka of the West Khandesh District; and

(5) Godhra and Kalol Talukas and Halol Mahal of the Broach and Panch Mahals District.

The revised strengths of country spirit and the rates of still head duty sanctioned for these areas from 11th May 1938 were as follows:—

- (18) The "Dry Area" scheme was introduced in the following areas:—
  - (1) Ahmedabad City and Suburbs from 21st July 1938.
  - (2) Jambusar and Waghra Talukas of the Broach and Panch Mahals District;
  - (3) Ankola and Kumta Talukas of the Kanara District, and
  - (4) Newasa and Shevgaon Talukas and Pathardi Mahal of the Ahmednagar District. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 982/24 dated 28th January 1938.)
- (19) Total Prohibition was introduced from 1st August 1938 into the Bardoli Taluka and part of the Mandvi Taluka of the Surat District. (Government Notification, Revenue Department, Nos. 982/24 and 982/24 (a) to (g) dated 30th July 1938.)
- (20) The sale of country spirit in sealed bottles was allowed as an experimental measure in Nasik and Satara Cities and Godhra Town. (Government Resolutions, Revenue Department, No. 7906/33 dated 31st January 1938 and 15th February 1938).
- (21) All Excise shops (excluding Opium and Hemp Drugs shops) in the Town and Island of Bombay were closed from August 1938 and certain Excise shops (excluding opium and hemp drugs shops) in the southern part of the Bombay Suburban District were similarly closed from January 1939 on the monthly pay day fixed by the Bombay Millowners' Association for mills employing 1,000 or more operatives in the Town and Island of Bombay and on the next following day.

(Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 982/24 (Confl.) dated 11th February 1938 and Government Memoranda, Revenue Department, No. 7936-C/33 dated 7th January 1939 and 22nd February 1939.)

  - (23) The sale of masala liquor was discontinued from 11th May 1938 in all the Fixed Fee areas mentioned at item No. (17) above except in Godhra and Dohad Towns of Broach and Panch Mahals District. (Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 3302-C/33 dated 7th June 1938.)
  - (24) The experiment of departmental collection of mhowra flowers undertaken in the previous year in the Nawapur Petha and Nandurbar Taluka of the West Khandesh District was extended to the whole of the West Khandesh District and to the Murbad and Shahapur Talukas and Mokhada Petha of the Thana District. (Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 8146/33-II of 20th February 1939.)
  - (25) The cost price of opium supplied from the Ghazipur factory to Indian States was fixed at Rs. 19-4-0 per seer for 1938-39. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 3746/24 dated 25th November 1937.)
  - (26) The provisions of sections 2 to 31 of the Bombay Opium Smoking Act, 1936, were brought into force from 3rd June 1938. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 4414/24 dated 31st May 1938.)
  - (27) Importation of denatured spirit into this Province via Goa and Daman Frontiers and Virangam Land Customs Line was restricted to a quantity not exceeding one pint. (Government Notification, Revenue Department, No. 25/33 dated 7th September 1938.)
  - (28) The limit of possession, sale and transport of Bhang, Ganja and Charas was reduced to 10, 3 and 1 tolas respectively in the Town and Island of Bombay. (Government Notification, Revenue Department, Nos. 6348/33 and 6348/33 (a) dated 16th September 1938.)

In the body of the report all statistics of consumption and revenue relate to British districts only.

#### CHAPTER II.

#### COUNTRY SPIRIT.

- 2. Sale Strengths.—The sale strengths prescribed for country spirit were the same as in the previous year, viz. 25° U. P., 30° U. P., 40° U. P., and 60° U. P. The sale of 25° U. P. or 30° U. P., was allowed at shops near the borders of Indian States, and in certain areas to control illicit distillation and illicit importation. The policy of discouraging the consumption of strong spirit by restricting a certain number of shops in each district to the exclusive sale of weak spirit was continued in places where such a policy had proved successful.
- 3. Receipts from Still-head duty.—The Revenue from still-head duty fell to Rs. 90,24,997 [94,46,214]. The decrease was mainly in Ahmedabad, Surat and West Khandesh Districts, where Prohibition measures were introduced during the year. There was an increase in Bombay City and Thana District due to increased consumption, and in Panch Mahals Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District due to enhanced still-head duty rates, but the increase in these places was off-set by the decrease in the former.
- 4. License fees.—Receipts from license fees for the right of retail vend of country spirit at shops fell to Rs. 46,39,698 [59,96,956]. The decrease was mainly in Ahmedabad, Surat and West Khandesh Districts and in Bombay City. In Ahmedabad and Surat Districts it was due to introduction of Prohibition measures, while in West Khandesh it was due to surrender of certain shops in Taloda and Nandurbar Talukas, and grant of concessions in respect of payment of license fees to other shops affected by the Late Gula Maharaj's temperance movement and to the grant of shops in the Nawapur-Nandurbar special arrangements area on fixed fee. In Bombay City the decrease was due to less realizations and recoveries having been made in the previous year.
- 5. Revenue and Consumption in the Akrani Tract.—The Excise Administration in the Akrani Mahal continued in charge of the Forest Department. The Departmental Distillery at Dhadgaon continued to be worked under the supervision of an Excise Assistant Inspector. Liquor was sold by departmental shop-keepers at a fixed price of annas 4 a bottle. The sale proceeds of spirits amounted to Rs. 41,367 [63,908], showing a decrease of Rs. 22,541. The consumption of liquor which continued to be issued at one strength, namely, 60° U. P. decreased to 27,445 bulk gallons [43,010] due (i) partly to the temperance movement inspired by the teachings of Gula Maharaj, (ii) partly to the economic difficulties of the people caused by the failure of the mango crop, and (iii) partly to the Bhangore Fair, which is usually held in April every year, being held in March 1938.
- 6. Working of the Contract Supply System.—Since 1st April 1929 with one exception there has been no contract supply system in any

part of the Province, and all liquor with three exceptions is supplied by the Government Central Distillery at Nasik Road through its departmental local warehouses. The three exceptions are:—

- (1) The Akrani which as noted above is supplied from; the Dhadgaon Government Distillery.
- (2) The manufacture at Chowka in the Ratnagiri District of Kaju liquor for supply to the Malwan Warehouse; and
- (3) An outstill shop at Redi which provides toddy spirit to meet competition of cheap liquor in adjoining Goa territory.
- 7. Working of the Mhowra Flowers Act.—This was the ninth year of the extension of Section 18-B of the Bombay Abkari Act relating to mhowra flowers to the whole of the Province.

No licenses for the retail sale of mhowra flowers were granted during The grant of permits for possession of mhowra flowers was restricted to bona fide trade and industrial purposes and for feeding cattle. The number of cases of illicit possession of mhowra flowers detected during the year was 703 [518]. In Ahmedabad, Kaira, Broach, the Panch Mahals, Thana, Kolaba, Poona, Nasik, West Khandesh and East Khandesh Districts the number of cases was respectively 91, 111, 2, 284, 32, 9, 0, 25, 73 and 76 in 1938-39 as compared with 72, 106, 2, 120, 58, 30, 12, 19, 50 and 49 in 1937-38. During the year under report the scheme for departmental collection of mhowra flowers in the Nawapur-Nandurbar Talukas introduced in March 1938 was continued and worked most successfully. Several Depots were opened and the mhowra flowers were purchased direct from the Bhils at a rate of Rs. 1-4-0 per maund. As a result of the successful working of the scheme, 48,029 maunds of mhowra flowers were collected in the area as against 5,952 maunds collected by the Contractors in the previous year. Departmental collection was also introduced in the Peint Mahal of the Nasik District, where also it was a success.

Encouraged by the successful results obtained by the departmental collection during the mhowra season of 1938, arrangements were made to extend the scheme to Sakri and Taloda Talukas of the West Khandesh District and to the Mokhada Petha and Murbad and Shahapur Talukas of the Thana District from 15th March 1939.

- 8. Country liquor shops.—The number of shops for the retail vend of country spirit decreased to 1,754 [2032]. With the introduction of Dry Area scheme in Ahmedabad with effect from 21st July 1938, the number of shops further decreased to 1,729 including one Government shop.
- 9. Advisory Committees.—The various Excise Advisory Committees in the Province held 551 meetings at which 777 recommendations were made. Of these 643 i.e., 82 per cent. were accepted. The rejected recommendations related in most cases to special hours of sale for shops in particular areas.

- 10. Opening and Closing Hours.—The opening hour of sale was 10-30 a.m., as in the previous year. The closing hour remained the same as in the previous year namely 8-30 p.m. everywhere, with the exception of—
  - (1) The Cities of Bombay and Ahmedabad.
  - (2) The Bandra Municipal and Santra Cruz Cantonment areas where it was 9 p.m.
- 11. Consumption.—Appendix "A" Column 11, shows in terms of proof gallons the sale of country spirit at shops. There was a decrease of 1,36,237 p.gs. or about 12 per cent. compared with the previous year. The decrease in consumption was mainly in the districts of Ahmedabad (40518), the Panch Mahals (17260), Surat (19891) and West Khandesh (56727). The decrease in Ahmedabad was due to the introduction of the Dry Area Scheme in the Ahmedabad City. The decrease in West Khandesh was due to the anti-drink movement among the Bhils. Maychis and other tribes inaugurated by the late Gula Maharaj, and the subsequent closure of shops in the Taloda-Mewas area, and the temperance propaganda carried on by the Bhil Seva Mandal of West Khandesh. The decrease in Panch Mahals was due to the enhancement of the maximum selling rates with effect from 11th May 1938. The decrease in Surat District was due to the introduction of Total Prohibition in the Bardoli Taluka and the closure of some shops in the District. The total ration for 1938-39 was 17,69,342 p.gs. The consumption for the whole Province was about 56.2 per cent. of the ration.
- 12. Temperance Movement.—There was no organised temperance movement in the Province except in the West Khandesh and Kanara Districts and Ahmedabad City. In West Khandesh the late Gula Maharaj started a movement towards the social, cultural and economic uplift of the Bhil community. He used to give an address every week on Monday night during what was called the "Arti Ceremony", laying special emphasis on the necessity to abstain from drinking liquor. Thousands of Bhils attended the "Arti Ceremony" and the results of the preaching of Gula Maharaj were immediately felt, as is evidenced by the fact that the sales in Taloda, Nandurbar and Shahada Talukas dropped considerably. Gula Maharaj died on 19th July 1938. But the Bhil Seva Mandal of West Khandesh carried on successfully his teaching to abstain from drink. In order to assist the movement Government ordered the closure of all liquor shops in the Taloda Taluka. A Special Officer for Bhil Uplift work was also appointed by Government.

In Ahmedabad the Prohibition Department conducted extensive propaganda against drink, on the introduction of the Dry Area Scheme in Ahmedabad City. Similarly the Congress Committee, Kumta Taluka in Kanara District carried on anti-drink propaganda on the introduction of the Dry Area scheme in the Kumta-Ankola Talukas of the Kanara District.

Various Taluka Congress Committees and the Bhil Seva Mandals in the Province also carried on general propaganda against drink.

13. Administration of Distilleries and Warehouses.—One central Distillery and 33 Warehouses were maintained. The issues to retailers in the British Districts of duty-paid spirit amounted to 9.78,446 p.gs., excluding 10,978 p.gs. issued from the Government Distillery at Dhadgaon and 3,424 p.gs. issued from the outstill at Redi against 11,18,948 p.gs. in the previous year.

The seasonal contract distillery at Chowka in the Ratnagiri District which was opened in the year 1934-35 for the manufacture of kaju liquor had an outturn of 2,326 p.gs. [2088]. Kaju liquor is issued from the Malwan Warehouse to shops in Vengurla Petha and Malwan and Deogad Talukas. The total issues of kaju liquor during the year amounted to 2,544 p.gs.

14. Retail sale in excess of the prescribed limit.—Permits for the sale of country spirit in excess of the prescribed limits on special occasions were granted in all districts except Ratnagiri, Bijapur, Sholapur, Poona, Ahmednagar and Nasik for the following quantities:—

#### CHAPTER III.

#### TODDY.

- 15. Revenue.—The ervenue uder this head derived from (1) tree-tax on trees tapped for toddy and (2) license fees for the retail sale of toddy, decreased to Rs. 61,84,522 [66,45,578].
- 16. Tree-tax.—Receipts from tree-tax amounted to Rs. 22,29,954 [22,76,745]. The decrease is not great.
- 17. License fees.—The realizations from license fees amounted to Rs. 39,54,568 [43,68,833]. The decrease of Rs. 4,14,265 was partly due to the closure of a number of shops and booths and partly to a general lack of competition at the auctions.

18. Trees licensed for tapping.—The number of trees licensed to be tapped for toddy during the year under report and in the previous year is given below:—

The decrease is due partly to the closure of a number of toddy shops and booths and partly to the fact that a larger number of trees was tapped in the year 1937-38 as only ½ of the tree-tax was levied on the trees tapped during three months of that year. The latter reason also explains why the decrease in the tree-tax revenue is not as great as the decrease in the number of trees tapped would suggest.

19. Toddy licenses.—The licenses granted during the year under report and in the previous year were as follows:—

The decrease is due to the reduction in the number of shops and booths in pursuance of the Prohibition policy of Government.

20. Consumption.—An increase of 1,889,400 gallons of toddy was reported but the figures of consumption of toddy are definitely not to be relied on. The number of trees tapped is a better indication of relative consumption. The increase in consumption cannot be reconciled with the decrease in the number of toddy trees tapped, but merely emphasises the unreliability of the figures of consumption reported by licensees. The procedure of paying surprise visits to toddy shops and booths was continued, and 2,005 samples of toddy were sent to the Chemical Analyser to Government for analysis. Seven of the samples were found to contain chloral hydrate. Licensees whose toddy was found adulterated were punished severely. The surprise visits and the control exercised over the sale of chloral hydrate and other deleterious substances appear to have greatly checked the adulteration of toddy.

21. Retail sale permitted in excess of prescribed limit.—Permits for the sale of toddy in excess of the prescribed limits are granted on special occasions and 4,065, 1,370, 7,471, 20, 910 and 192 gallons were sold

under such permits in Surat, Sholapur, Thana, Belgaum, Broach and

West Khandesh Districts respectively.

22. Manufacture of gul.—The All-India Village Industries Association was permitted under special rules to tap 60 or less toddy trees for the manufacture of gul. The Association opened a number of centres in the Bombay Suburban, Surat, Kolaba, Thana, Belgaum and Kanara Districts for imparting instructions in the manufacture of gul from sweet toddy.

23. In the Kanara District 7 licenses were granted for the manufacture of gul against 14 in the previous year. The decrease is due to the fact that no such licenses (except one at Dhareshwar in the Kumta

Taluka) were granted in the Ankola-Kumta Dry Area.

#### CHAPTER IV.

#### FOREIGN LIQUORS.

(Potable and Non-Potable including those of Indian manufacture.)

24. Revenue.—The revenue under this head chiefly consists of (1) duty on Indian made liquors, (2) license fees for the sale of such liquors as well as imported liquors, and (3) vend (pass) fee on foreign liquors—

(a) imported at the port of Bombay, or .

(b) imported into the Province of Bombay from other parts of British India and Indian States and foreign possessions, or

(c) manufactured in the Province.

During the year under review, the revenue under (1) amounted to Rs. 9,41,409 [Rs. 11,06,066] (columns 11, 14, 18 and 19 of Imperial Return I). The revenue under (2) and (3) decreased to Rs. 19,08,851 [Rs. 22,24,079], (columns 12, 15, 20, 21, 21A and 21B of Imperial Return I). The decrease of Rs. 4,79,885 in the total revenue as compared with the previous year is mostly due to the Prohibition measures enforced in various parts of the Province during the year.

25. Imports and consumption of foreign liquor.—The imports of foreign liquors into Bombay City by sea, compared with those of the

previous year, were as follows:-

Exports to other Provinces were made from these imports, as Bombay is the distributing centre for almost the whole of India. The decrease in consumption of all sorts of potable foreign fiquors was mainly due to the measures taken in various parts of the Province for the enforcement of Prohibition. The largest decreases occurred in Bombay City and the Ahmedabad, Nasik, Surat and Sholapur Districts.

- 26. Canteen tenant licenses.—The number of canteen tenant licenses issued during the year increased to 41 [34].
- 27. Spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations.—Six firms in Bombay were manufacturing spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations in bond at the beginning of the year, but in September 1938, the permission granted to one of the firms was withdrawn as the firm abused the concession by supplying non-duty paid rectified spirit for illicit manufacture of foreign liquor. The concessional rate of duty of Rs. 5 per proof gallon was levied on purely medicinal preparations, and a rate of Rs. 17-8-0 per proof gallon was levied on toilet preparations as against the full rate of Excise duty which is Rs. 25-10-0 per proof gallon. The total quantity of rectified spirit used in the manufacture of spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations in bond was 40,879 [34,690] proof gallons. Spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations were imported into the Province from Bengal and the Central Provinces and the Baroda, Cochin and Bansda States.
- 28. Rectified spirits and medicated wines.—The sales outside bond of rectified spirit and absolute alcohol were 753 [845] gallons, (vide column 14 of Imperial Return IV). The quantity of rectified spirit obtained free of duty by the Government Medical Stores, Bombay, from the Government Central Distillery, Nasik Road, was 26,474 [24,875] proof gallons.

No accounts of medicated wines are required to be kept, and so column 16 of Imperial Return IV is blank.

29. Licenses.—The number of licenses for the sale of foreign liquors fell to 3,258 [3,267] at the beginning of the year under report, (vide columns 7, 8 and 21 to 30 of Imperial Return III). The number decreased further to 3,216 after Ahmedabad was declared a Dry Area with effect

from 21st July 1938. There was notable decrease in the number of commercial spirits and temporary refreshment stall licenses, while there was slight increase in the number of denatured spirit licenses.

#### CHAPTER V.

#### INTOXICATING DRUGS OTHER THAN OPIUM.

30. Cultivation and outturn of Ganja.—The cultivation of hemp for the production of ganja was restricted to the two villages of Pimpalgaon-Landga and Mehekari in the Ahmednagar District. The number of licenses granted, the area cultivated, and the quantity produced during the year under report as compared with the year 1936–37, excluding the year 1937–38 during which there was no cultivation, were as follows:—

The average yield per acre for this year was 10.0 maunds as against 10.6 maunds in 1936-37.

The most noticeable decrease in the consumption of ganja was in Ahmedabad, Bombay Suburban, Kolaba, Kanara, Dharwar, Sholapur,

Satara, Poona, Ahmednagar, Nasik and East Khandesh districts. The decrease in Ahmednagar, Kanara and Ahmednagar districts was due to the conversion of some parts of these districts into Dry Areas, while high selling prices charged by licensees and the reduced purchasing capacity of the people were responsible for the fall in consumption in Bombay Suburban, Kolaba, Dharwar, Sholapur, Satara, Poona, Nasik and East Khandesh districts. In Bombay City, however, sales of ganja, bhang and charas increased owing to competitive selling prices. The decrease in other districts is small.

33. Revenue.—The revenue from intoxicating drugs is derived from

(1) quantitative duties on-

(a) issues from warehouses; and

(b) imports from other provinces; and

(2) license fees.

The duty and license fees amounted to Rs. 10,21,579 [10,65,215] and

Rs. 5,44,955 [6,71,163] respectively.

34. Vend licenses.—The number of vend licenses in the year under report was 682 [775]. Of these 20 were wholesale and 662 were retail. 1 wholesale and 92 retail shops were closed during the year under report, 1 wholesale and 11 retail shops having been closed from 21st July 1938, when Ahmedabad was declared a Dry Area. One retail hemp drugs depot was opened by Government in Ahmedabad.

#### CHAPTER VI.

#### DANGEROUS DRUGS.

35. Vend Licenses.—During the year under report the number of licenses granted was as follows:—

(1) 181 [164] D.D. 1 licenses (for the manufacture, possession and sale of manufactured drugs otherwise than on prescription.

(2) 1,100 [927] D.D. 2 licenses (for the possession and sale on prescription of manufactured drugs);

(3) 270 [267] D.D. 3 authorizations to approved practitioners (for the possession of coca derivatives for use in exercise of

their profession but not for sale).

36. Imports and issues in the Province.—The quantity of cocaine and its allied drugs imported during the year fell to 9 lbs. 14 ozs. 329 grains (Avoirdupois standard weight), [12 lbs. 1 oz. 126 17/20 grains]. The quantity sold under licenses increased to 17 lbs. 15 ozs. 347 grains [12 lbs. 10 ozs. 193 grains]. The statistics of cocaine transactions are given below:—

#### CHAPTER VII.

#### OPTUM.

- 37. Realizations from opium issued from Depots.—Opium issued from Depots realised Rs. 10,01,182 as shown in the District Treasury Accounts. Of this sum Rs. 2,72,663 represented the cost price paid to the Government of the United Provinces and the balance of Rs. 7,28,519 was the gain on sales. From the last figure, namely Rs. 7,28,519, an expenditure of Rs. 6,125, representing the conveyance and packing charges of opium, has to be deducted. The net profit to Government thus amounted to Rs. 7,22,394 (inclusive of duty) [Rs. 8,07,439].
- 38. Sales in British Districts.—The total issues in British Districts amounted to 13,084 seers [14,697 seers] and actual sales were 13,159 seers [14,675 seers]. The decrease of 1,516 seers was mainly due to the constitution of Dry Areas in Ahmedabad, Broach, Kanara and Ahmednagar districts and a Total Prohibition Area in the Surat District. The decrease of 114 seers in the Kaira District is attributed to high retail prices charged by licensees. The variation in other districts is very small.
- 39. License fees.—The fees realised for retail vend in British Districts rose to Rs. 7,32,194 [Rs. 6,84,904]. The apparent increase is only due to the payment of fees for opium licenses in Bombay for 1938–39 in the month of April 1938, instead of in March 1938.
- 40. Retail shops.—The total number of retail licenses was 673 [783]. The total number of licenses discontinued was 110, of which 14 were closed in Ahmedabad from 21st July 1938. One retail opium depot was opened by Government in Ahmedabad in the year under report.
- 41. Supplies to Indian States.—The total quantity of opium supplied to Indian States was 4,461 seers [3,178 seers].
- 42. Manufacture and issue in the Baroda State.—The area under poppy cultivation in Baroda State was 253 acres and 8 gunthas [249 acres and 30 gunthas]. The opium in hand at the commencement of the year was 31,747 seers, and that manufactured during the year under report was 1,392 seers. The total issues to licensed dealers decreased to 2,797 seers [3,024]. The stock held at the end of the year was 30,075 seers, exclusive of 264 seers loss by dryage.
- 43. Total Excise Opium Revenue.—The Excise Opium revenue was Rs. 17,33,376 [Rs. 17,88,724]. The decrease of Rs. 55,348 was due to the declaration of some parts of Ahmedabad, Broach, Kanara and Ahmedagar districts as Dry Areas.
- 44. Consumption of opium for veterinary and quasi-veterinary use.—
  The quantity of opium used for veterinary and quasi-veterinary purposes during the year was 41 lbs. 14 ozs. 2 drams and 17 1/16 grs. [45 lbs. 4 ozs. 0 drs. and 5 3/4 grs.]
- 45. Measures to check the administration of opium to children.—The Bombay Presidency Health and Baby Week Association continued their activities, as in previous years, to warn mothers against the danger of

administering opium to babies by means of lectures on infant welfare, by health talks to mothers, and by demonstration of cinema films on maternity and children welfare. The Association held 2 exhibitions and 5 cinema shows in Bombay City for the benefit of industrial workers. There are 47 centres in the Province where maternity and children welfare work is done and the Health visitors in charge of these centres are instructing mothers not to drug babies with opium. The Lady Inspector of Factories reports through the Chief Inspector of Factories, Bombay, that 605 children attended crêches in Bombay in the year under report against 541 in the previous year. In 107 cases opium drugging is reported to have stopped.

#### CHAPTER VIII.

#### FINANCIAL RESULTS.

46. Revenue.—The gross realisations for the year (Imperial Return I) are contrasted below with those of the previous year:—

- Expenditure.—Exclusive of (1) compensation paid 'to Indian States in respect of their Abkari and Hemp Drugs leases (Rs. 5,31,344) and (ii) compensation (a) to the Bombay Municipality for loss of revenue which it previously derived from shop licenses (Rs. 1,43,750) and (b) to the District Local Boards in the Province in lieu of one anna cess on Excise revenue which they were formerly allowed (Rs. 6,185), the expenditure for the year (Imperial Return II) was Rs. 33,83,263 [31,08,406]. The increase is mainly due to increased expenditure under the heads "Pay of officers and establishment" (Rs. 1,55,242), "Allowances other than Rewards" (Rs. 53,627) and "Contingencies and Special Charges other than Rewards" (Rs. 45,810). The increased expenditure was on account of the additional staff entertained for the Dry Areas. figures of expenditure include the price paid to the Government of the United Provinces for opium supplied to the Department, and the charges for Excise Establishment in Collectors' offices paid by book adjustment to the head "22, General Administration". The cost of opium is fully recouped from the sale proceeds of opium. The gross expenditure, including the compensation shown at (i) and (ii) above amounted to Rs. 40,64,542 [39,10,474]. If the item relating to the cost of opium is excluded, it being fully recouped in the sales to licensees and others, the gross expenditure would be Rs. 37,29,003 [35,56,809]. The net revenue of the year after deducting refunds (Rs. 1,72,851) and the gross expenditure (Rs. 40,64,542) from the gross revenue (Rs. 2,87,22,107) decreased by Rs. 33,03,658, i.e., from Rs. 2,77,88,372 in the previous year to Rs. 2,44,84,714.
- 48. Recovery of Excise Revenue by coercive process.—Coercive processes had to be resorted for the recovery of Excise Revenue in all the Districts of the Province except Surat, Thana, Kaira and Panch Mahals.
- The details of the arrears outstanding, collections made during the year and the balance to be recovered will be found in columns 3, 6 and 10 respectively of Appendix E to this report. The total amount of acrears at the beginning of the year was Rs. 4,11,396, out of this Rs. 1,75,345 were collected during the year under report, and Rs. 38,687 were written off as irrecoverable. The net arrears at the end of the year including those for the previous year, amounted to Rs. 4,95,344, the chief arrears being in the Districts of Bombay Suburban (Rs. 50,435), Thana (Rs. 21,698), Kolaba (Rs. 28,733), Dharwar (Rs. 21,503), Sholapur (Rs. 21,949), Poona (Rs. 47,193), Ahmednagar (Rs. 29,972), West Khandesh (Rs. 1,43,879) and East Khandesh (Rs. 39,166). The remissions and amounts written off increased to Rs. 38,687 and Rs. 15,138. The heavy arrears shown against the West Khandesh District are due to the fact that bids received at the auctions have been shown under "demands". These arrears will be greatly reduced if the concessions granted by Government to country liquor licensees in West Khandesh affected by the movement of the late Gula Maharaj, are taken into account.

#### CHAPTER IX.

#### OFFENCES.

- 50. Offences against the Abkari law.—The total number of cases detected was 7,857 [7,124]. Of these 6,955 [6,773] related to liquor, and 897 [344] to hemp drugs. Details will be found in columns 8 and 14 of Appendix "F".
- 51. Liquor cases.—The total number of liquor cases detected during the year under report shows an increase of 182 cases compared with those of the previous year. The number of cases detected under "illicit distillation "shows a decrease of 486, the number of such cases detected during the year under report being 3,576 [4,062]. The decrease in the cases under "illicit distillation" was mainly in the districts of West Khandesh (1,175) and Nasik (103). This decrease was, however, counterbalanced to some extent by an increase in the districts of the Panch Mahals (562), Thana (155), Kaira (33) and Ahmednagar (23). The decrease in the West Khandesh District was probably due to (1) continuance of the Special Excise arrangements in the more criminal part of the district, namely, Nawapur-Nandurbar area, (2) the departmental collection of mhowra flowers, (3) the late Gula Maharaj's movement against drinking liquor. The decrease in the Nasik District was due to licit liquor being available at cheap rates, as a result of the introduction of the fixed fee system in the Peint Mahal which increased the sale of licit liquor.

The increase in the Panch Mahals District was probably due partly to high selling rates of liquor, coupled with good crop of mhowra flowers during the year under report, and partly to the vigilance on the part of the Excise staff, while that in the Thana District was due to the vigorous activity of the Excise staff which carried on raids and detected a greater number of illicit distillation cases than in the previous year.

The number of cases of illicit distillation detected in the Town and Island of Bombay was 5 [3]. Cases under "illicit importation, exportation and transportation" increased to 407 [238]. Those under "illicit possession" increased to 1,840 [1,559] and under "unlicensed sale" to 134 [90]. Cases under "other miscellaneous offences" increased to 998 [824].

52. Hemp Drugs cases.—The number of cases relating to hemp drugs increased to 897 [344]. The increase was mainly in the districts of Ahmedabad [334], Bombay [92], East Khandesh [57] and Ahmedagar [33]. The increase in the Ahmedabad District was mainly due to the introduction of "Dry Area" scheme in the Ahmedabad City and Cantonment while in the remaining districts it was due to greater vigilance exercised by the Excise staff.

The total quantity of charas seized in Bombay amounted to 42 lbs. 33 tolas [27 lbs. 34 tolas and 8.5 grains]. The increase in the seizure of charas was due, partly to the large quantity amounting to 24 lbs. and 21 tolas seized in two cases of illicit export, and partly to the detection of a number of cases of sales in excess of the prescribed limit, which was reduced from three tolas to one tola in the year under report.

- 53. Cocaine Cases.—Cases relating to cocaine decreased to 5 [7]. The cocaine traffic was mainly confined to Bombay where 5 [2] cases were detected. The number of cases detected in Ahmedabad was nil [5]. The total quantity of cocaine seized amounted to 7 ozs. 165 grains. [1 tola and 51 grains].
- 54. Offences against the Opium law.—The number of opium cases detected in British territory was 688 [205] (col. 29, Appendix "F"). The number of cases of illicit possssion detected in British territory was 475 [97] and that of cultivation, manufacture and illicit sale was 41 [nil], 36 [5] and 30 [15] respectively. The number of cases of illegal import increased to 63 [59]. 4 cases of transport of opium were detected in Bombay and West Khandesh districts during the year under report. There were no cases of illegal export of opium during the year under report. The contraband opium seized in British territory amounted to 75 seers 7 tolas and 161 grains [45 seers 12 tolas and 38½ grains].
- 55. Cases of Drunkenness.—Convictions for drunkenness numbered 2,661 [2616] (Appendix "G" Cols. 2 and 3). Of these 1,422 [1398] occurred in Bombay City.
- 56. The Excise Intelligence Bureau.—The Excise Intelligence Bureau continued to compile and disseminate information regarding the movements and methods of inter-provincial smugglers and offences against the Excise, Opium and Dangerous Drugs Laws.

The Finger Print Branch of the Bureau received during the year 436 [254] finger impression slips of Exicse offenders for identification and record. Previous convictions were traced in 53 [26] instances. At the close of the year the Branch had on its records finger print slips of about 36,450 Excise convicts.

57. Refresher Courses for Excise Officers and men in the constabulary staff.—The following officers and men were put through the Refresher courses during the year under report.

#### ·CHAPTER X.

#### THE DRY AND PROHIBITION AREAS.

- 58. The Ahmedabad Dry Area Scheme.—(1) The Ahmedabad Dry Area System was introduced from 21st July 1938 and was intended as a preliminary step to the introduction of Prohibition.
- (2) The summarised details of the system introduced were as follows:

The area of the system comprised the Municipal and Cantonment Areas with the addition of twenty-seven suburban villages.

No foreign or country liquor, toddy or drugs were allowed to be possessed within the Dry Area except on permit.

Permits for the consumption of foreign and country liquor and toddy were granted on the recommendation of an unofficial Committee appointed by Government.

The number of permits at the end of March 1939 for foreign liquor granted was 456.

The number of permits for country liquor was 29.

Permits for the consumption of drugs were granted on the basis of certificates from local Registered Medical Practitioners to addicts only. The number of such permits issued were:

Clubs were allowed to sell foreign liquor, for consumption by permit holders only, up to an amount authorised by the Collector.

One foreign liquor shop, and one departmentally managed country liquor shop were authorised to supply liquor in bottles to permit holders.

One Drugs Depot under departmental management was also established to sell drugs in small quantities to permit holders.

(3) The staff appointed to administer the scheme in addition to the Excise Superintendent and ordinary District Excise Officers consisted of:

1 Chief Inspector,

4 Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors,

10 Sub-Inspectors,

109 Petty Officers and Constables.

(4) A special Propaganda Department was appointed by Government to carry on a positive programme against drink and drugs in Ahmedabad.

The direction of the programme for taking all measures to fight the drink and drug evil, to provide counter attractions on the temperance side, and to examine scientificially the results of the scheme were under the control of Mr. Gulzarilal Nanda as Honorary Prohibition Commissioner.

In addition to temperance propagandist work organised on a large scale, the Department collected intelligence regarding any activities projected against Excise law, and communicated the results of their enquiries to the Excise Officers for further investigation.

I wish to convey the gratitude of the Department to Mr. Gulzarilal Nanda and his Staff for the great assistance which they gave by their valuable co-operation during the year.

- (5) The preventive work of the scheme was assisted by the institution of a system of 11 out-posts constituting a patrol line surrounding the whole area. This was supplemented by an extensive system of intelligence work under the control of the Chief Inspector.
- (6) During the period under report the total number of cases detected was 916. Of these 219 related to country liquor; 3 to toddy; 29 to foreign liquor; 334 to hemp drugs; 328 to opium; and 3 to cocaine.
- (7) Much additional work necessitated by the wide reaching details of the scheme was performed by Mr. G. G. Drewe, the Collector of Ahmedabad, whose general direction contributed very greatly to the efficiency of the organisation.

Under the control of the Collector, the details of the scheme were administered by the Superintendent of Excise, Mr. H. G. Maclean, ably assisted by the Chief Inspector, Khan Saheb E. H. Udwadia.

- (8) The chief difficulties which had to be faced were illicit distillation within the Dry Area, smuggling of country liquor into the Area from surrounding tracts, and operations by professional drug smugglers from other parts of India.
- (9) Careful arrangements for searching the personal effects of passengers to Ahmedabad by rail or car were brought into effect.

In this connection a debt of gratitude is due to officers of the B. B. & C. I. Railway Company who facilitated arrangements for search at the Ahmedabad Railway Station.

(10) The system has proved a remarkable success.

The import and consumption of liquor and drugs were immediately brought under control, and subsequently preventive and detective action was taken with the greatest effect against any attempt to break down the system.

The principal difficulties were experienced in the detection of drug trafficking by professional smugglers. But even here, the extent of the evil was never within danger of getting beyond control.

The progress of the system was published in fortnightly reportes communicated by Government to the Press.

Valuable evidence is available of the results of the system in the improvement of the means of the Ahmedabad Mill workers; and in the raising of the standard of family comfort by savings effected from money which would otherwise have been spent on drink.

The scheme has been of the greatest use as a preliminary to Prohibition by supplying evidence of the methods and organisation required for the introduction of Prohibition here and elsewhere, as the Department has been able to ascertain from the Ahmedabad results the proper methods of effective and economic control required in the other cases.

- (11) Finally I wish to put on record the cordial and continuous co-operation received from the Government of Baroda in the Bombay Government's prohibition programme in Ahmedabad. The rationing of numerous country liquor border shops, and the transfer to some distance from the border of several shops previously situated on the boundary of Ahmedabad Taluka and Baroda State has contributed very greatly to the success of the Dry Area Scheme.
- 59. The Rural Dry Area Scheme.—(1) The Dry Area Scheme was also put into force in the Jambusar and Wagra Talukas of the Broach District; the Newasa and Shevgaon Talukas and Pathardi Mahal of the Ahmednagar District; and the Ankola and Kumta Talukas of the Kanara District with effect from 1st April 1938.

The details of the system in these areas were generally similar to those of the Ahmedabad Area with the exception that small quantities of country liquor, toddy, or foreign liquor or drugs were allowed to be brought into the areas.

No arrangements were authorised for sale of country liquor or foreign liquor or toddy within these areas.

Permits were issued to addicts to consume limited quantities of drugs on the basis of certificates given by registered medical practitioners; and arrangements were made for the supply of drugs within the Dry Area through private contractors or Government agency. (2) The chief difficulties experienced were as follows:—

Broach Area.—Smuggling of country liquor from adjoining areas.

Ahmednagar Area.—Liquor consumption is small, and so liquor smuggling was not a primary difficulty. The main problem was illicit consumption of drugs, especially ganja. This difficulty was increased in the Ahmednagar area by the fact that it is a ganja cultivating area, and there is always danger of removal of ganja from the standing crop.

Kanara Area.—The liquor problem was rendered more difficult by the long coastal line and the extent of the Provincial Boundary which has to be watched.

- (3) The staff was slightly augmented in all three areas. But the control of details was left with the Superintendents without creation of any Chief Inspectors' posts.
  - (4) The schemes were on the whole successful.

Much credit is due to the Collectors of these Districts who had to devote special attention to the numerous novel problems presented in each tract.

- (5) There was a big increase in the number of prosecutions in each area.
- 60. Bardoli Prohibition Area Scheme.—The chief features of the scheme were:—
  - (1) no consumption of foreign or country liquor including toddy by any person was permitted within the area;
  - (2) no permit or import system of any kind was allowed for country or foreign liquor;
  - (3) for drugs there was a permit system authorising purchase from the Taluka Offices on medical certificates.

The Bardoli scheme was pre-eminently successful and difficulties encountered were soon surmounted.

A small additional staff was appointed for the purpose.

The retiring Superintendent of Excise Mr. D. Gershone devoted great energy to the administration of the system.

61. A noticeable feature of the introduction of the Kanara, Broach and Bardoli Dry Area systems was that the consumption of country liquor in the adjoining British areas showed only a small increase, as compared with the reduction in consumption on account of withdrawal of Excise shops in the areas.

It was also noticeable that the licit consumption of ganja and bhang fell far short of the licit consumption of these drugs in the same areas during the corresponding period of last year. For the consumption of ganja was only 17 per cent, and that of opium only 26 per cent, of the totals of the previous year.

#### CHAPTER XI.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

- 62. Revenue.—The gross revenue showed a decrease of Rs. 31.62 lakhs. There was a general decrease under all heads of Excise revenue (except under license fee for opium shops, fines and forfeitures and miscellaneous) namely, country spirit (17.78), toddy (4.61), foreign liquor (4.80), hemp drugs (1.29), gain on sales of opium (1.02) and commercial undertakings (2.74). These decreases were partly counterbalanced by increases under license fee for opium shops (1.47), fines and forfeitures (0.08) and miscellaneous (0.54).
- 63. Consumption.—There was a general decrease in the consumption of liquors, except toddy. In the case of country spirit the decrease of 1.36 lakhs (P. Gs.) was due to—
  - (1) the introduction of Dry Area scheme in the Ahmedabad City and suburbs and total prohibition in the Bardoli Taluka of the Surat District;
  - (2) the anti-drink movement inaugurated by the late Gula Maharaj of Taloda in the West Khandesh District; and
  - (3) the enhancement of maximum selling prices in the Panch Mahals District.

The consumption of toddy increased by 18.89 lakhs gallons, but this figure is as usual unreliable.

There was a fall in the consumption of foreign liquor noticeably in beer 10,488 bulk gallons and in potable spirits 4,404 bulk gallons, and for this decrease the Town and Island of Bombay and the Ahmedabad, Sholapur, Nasik and Surat Districts were mainly responsible.

The consumption of opium decreased by 1.516 seers, due partly to the introduction of Dry and Total Prohibition Area schemes and partly to the high selling prices charged by licensees.

The sales of charas increased by 553 seers due to reduction of selling prices on account of competition in Bombay, but those of ganja and bhang decreased by 2,293 seers and 84 seers respectively, due to the introduction of Dry and Total Prohibition Area schemes in some parts of the Province and high selling prices charged by licensees.

The following statement shows the consumption of country spirit in 1929-30 and during the years 1934-35 to 1938-39 in the rural and urban

The decrease both in rural and urban areas was due to (1) the introdunction of Dry and Total Prohibition Area schemes, (2) the anti-drink movement in the West Khandesh District and (3) the enhancement of selling prices in the fixed fee areas.

64. Fixed maximum prices.—The experiment of disposing of country liquor shops for a fixed fee with a maximum retail selling price for country liquor, started in 1936-37 in Dohad Taluka and Jhalod Mahal of the Panch Mahals Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District and the Sugwa Range of the Kolaba District. During 1937-38 it was extended to the Godhra, Kalol and Halol talukas of the Pranch Mahals Sub-Division, and Nawapur Peta with part of the Nandubar Taluka of the West Khandesh District, and Peint Mahal of the Nasik District. During the year under report the experiment was continued in all these areas as further experience is required before definite conclusions can be drawn.

The maximum selling prices for 60 U.P. liquor fixed during the previous year at different rates for the various areas continued up to 10th May 1938. From 11th May 1938 the selling prices were revised and fixed at annas 8 a bottle of 60 U.P. liquor in all the areas, except in Nawapnr Peta and part of Nandurbar Taluka where the price was fixed at annas 7 a bottle of 60 U.P. liquor.

65. With a view to discourage the mill labourers from wasting their wages on drinks, all liquor shops in the Town and Island of Bombay were closed from August 1938 on mill pay days and the day following. Further, with a view to minimise the possibility of residents of Bombay City rescring to liquor shops in the suburbs, certain liquor shops in the southern parts of the Bombay Suburban District were also closed from January 1939 on mill pay days and the day following. The object in view in closing the liquor shops, namely the prevention of the waste of money by mill hands on drink, was fairly well accomplished.

- 66. During the year under report Government decided that liquor (including toddy) shops in—
  - (1) Sholapur Taluka of the Sholapur District,
  - (2) Hubli City and Cantonment of the Dharwar District,
  - (3) Jalgaon City and Chalisgaon and Amalner towns of the East Khandesh District, and
- (4) Dhulia City of the West Khandesh District, should be closed on mill pay days and the day after on the analogy of the arrangement made in Bombay and Bombay Suburban District. But as the toddy shops were disposed of for the whole year ending 31st July 1939, it was decided to enforce the scheme from 1st August 1939.
- 67. On 14th February 1939 in his Budget speech the Honourable Minister for Finance declared Government's intention to introduce Prohibition in Bombay, Bombay Suburban District and that part of the Thana Mahal which is separated from the main land by the Bassein-Thana Creek.
- 68. Allegations of corruptions.—In all 13 accusations of corruption against officers and subordinates of the Department were enquired into during the year. Of these 8 were proved. The principal penalties inflicted were as follows.

An Excise Inspector was retired from service for claiming from Government sums in excess of what he paid to informers.

An Excise Sub-Inspector was dismissed for extortion.

An officiating Excise Sub-Inspector was dismissed for issue of liquor from a Warehouse without recovery of duty.

Two Excise Constables were dismissed for receiving illegal gratifications.

69. Staff.—Mr. H. F. Knight, C.I.E., I.C.S., was in charge of this Department throughout the year. I took charge from 1st April 1939.

The Department lost a very valuable officer by the retirement of Mr. J. L. Dias, I.S.O., Personal Assistant to the Commissioner. Mr. N. J. Bhaisa, a Superintendent of Excise also retired on 31st March 1939.

I regret to have to record the death of Mr. N. B. Desai, Superintendent of Excise, Nasik Division, who died of heart failure in August.

Officers of the Department have with very few exceptions worked very well in a year made more difficult by changes in Excise policy consequent on the introduction of Dry and Prohibition Areas in the Province. It is impossible to bring to the notice of Government the names of all who have done well during the year, but I wish to indicate certain outstanding cases of merit.

The greatest credit is due to the Commissioner's Personal Assistant, Mr. R. N. Samarth, who has shown exceptional ability in making proposals for adapting the organization of the Department to the new duties which it has to perform.

In Ahmedabad Mr. H. G. Maclean has shown much initiative and drive in the administration of the Dry Area of that District and has received the I. S. O. shortly after the close of the year under report.

In Thana Rao Saheb M. S. Navalkar has continued to show great energy in contending against the difficult problems of illicit distillation which that Division presents.

Mr. N. P. DeSouza, Engineer, was awarded the title of M.B.E., for his good services at the Government Central Distillery, Nasik Road.

As with the officers, so with the staff and constabulary, it is difficult to select names from among so many who have worked well.

But I wish to draw attention to the work of Mr. V. V. Vadhavkar, the Supervisor of the Prohibition Section in my office, who has devoted the most careful thought to solving the novel problems which the introduction of prohibition presents.

I also wish to draw attention to the honour conferred on Jamadar Hayatkhan Sardarkhan who was awarded an Imperial Service Medal for bravery in the performance of his duties.
