REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1929

1. This report and the statements appended to it relate to the Presidency proper and not to Sind.

2. *Judicial Staff*—(Statement No. 1).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1929 and available for Civil Cases consisted of 10 permanent High Court Judges and 1 temporary Additional Judge; 17 District Judges; 10 Assistant Judges (including 3 under training); a Chief Judge and 5 Judges (including one temporary Additional Judge) of the Presidency Small Cause Court; 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges; 21 First Class Subordinate Judges and 101 Second Class Subordinate Judges. In addition, the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Ahmedabad and Poona exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also 3 Inamdars and Jagirdars exercising the powers of a Subordinate Judge under Regulation XIII of 1830 and 93 Village Munsiffs appointed under the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, Act XVII of 1879.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE.

The Honourable Sir Amberson Barrington Marten, Knight, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 9th June and from 17th October to 31st December 1929. His Lordship was on leave from 10th June to 16th October 1929 during which period the Honourable Sir Norman Kemp officiated as Chief Justice.

PUISNE JUDGES.

The Honourable Sir Charles Gordon Hill Fawcett, Knight, I.C.S., from 1st January 1929 to 28th June 1929. His Lordship was on special duty till 14th March 1929, after which His Lordship assumed and relinquished charge of his office as Puisne Judge on 15th March 1929 and proceeded on leave preparatory to retirement.

The Honourable Sir Norman Kemp, Kt., from 1st January to 9th June and from 17th October to 31st December 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice C. P. Blackwell, from 1st January to 7th April and from 15th April to 31st December 1929. His Lordship was on leave from 8th to 14th April 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice S. S. Patkar from 1st January to 31st December 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice W. T. W. Baker, I.C.S., from 1st January to 9th June 1929 and from 17th October to 31st December 1929. His Lordship was on leave from 10th June to 16th October 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice S. J. Murphy, I.C.S., from 1st January to 31st December 1929. His Lordship acted as a Judge from 1st January to 14th April 1929 and was appointed a Puisne Judge from 15th April 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice S. S. Rangnekar from 1st January to 31st December 1929. His Lordship acted as an Additional Judge from 1st January to 14th April 1929 and was appointed a Puisne Judge from 15th April 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice R. S. Broomfield, I.C.S., from 16th November to 31st December 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice J. D. Davar acted as an Additional Judge from 1st January to 14th April 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice B. J. Wadia acted as an Additional Judge from 21st January to 13th April 1929 and as a Puisne Judge from 10th June to 16th October 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Balak Ram, I.C.S., acted as a Puisne Judge from 18th March to 14th April 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice K. McI. Kemp acted as Puisne Judge from 10th June to 16th October 1929 and as an Additional Judge from 21st October to 31st December 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice A. C. Wild, I.C.S., acted as Puisne Judge from 10th June to 15th November 1929.

The Honourable Mr. Justice F. W. Allison, I.C.S., acted as a Puisne Judge from 10th June to 16th October 1929.

HIGH COURT.

I—ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

3. *Original Suits for disposal*—(Statement No. 3).—The number of civil suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of the year 1928 was 3,060 including 68 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number instituted during the year 1929 was 2,620 including 16 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 232 (including 1 suit received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) restored during the year. The above totals 3,060, 2,620 and 232 make an aggregate of 5,912 for disposal in 1929 as against 5,636 in 1928.

4. *Original Suits disposed of* (Statement No. 5).—The number of suits decided was 2,421 including 20 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 3,491 including 65 suits received by transfer from

the Bombay Court of Small Causes. This number is 431 more than the corresponding number at the end of the previous year. Of the 3,491 suits, 2,340 were ripe for hearing and in arrear, an increase of 413 suits over the previous year. There were 2,160 suits whose hearing had been pending for over one year. This is an increase of 535 suits on the figures of the previous year.

Of the suits decided :—

2,111 were disposed of without contest.
310 were disposed of with contest.

The average duration of contested and uncontested suits disposed of in the year 1929 was 184 days and 127 days respectively.

6. *Suits Instituted and Disposed of under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.*—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1928 was 11. The number instituted during the year 1929 was 17. Thus the total for disposal in 1929 was 28. Of these, 15 were decided and 13 remained pending at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided :—

7. *Suits Instituted and Disposed of under the Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty Jurisdiction.*—2 suits were pending at the close of the year 1928. None was instituted during the year under report. Of the 2 suits, one was dismissed with contest and one remained pending at the close of the year 1929.

8. *Suits Instituted and Disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial Jurisdiction.*—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1928 was 4 and the number instituted during 1929 was 8 making a total of 12

for disposal in 1929. Of these, 7 were decided and 5 remained pending at the close of the year 1929. There was no suit pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided :—

9. *Insolvency Petitions.*—The number of petitions pending at the end of the year 1928 was 3,953 and the number instituted during the year 1929 was 1,048 making a total of 5,001 for disposal in 1929. Of these 1,675 were decided and 3,326 remained pending at the close of the year 1929. There were 2,367 petitions pending over one year at the close of the year 1929.

Of the cases decided :—

1,581 were determined without contest.

9 were disposed of by suspending the discharge after contest.

85 were dismissed after contest.

10. *Appeals to the Privy Council.*—Five appeals were pending from the previous year and 1 was admitted during the year making a total of 6 for disposal in the year 1929.

Of the above 6 appeals :—

1 was decided by the Privy Council who confirmed the Decree of the Appeal Court.

5 were pending before the Privy Council in England (including 3 despatched during the year and 1 in which liberty to Appellant has been given to apply to the Privy Council for leave to Appeal in *forma pauperis*).

11. *References to take accounts, etc.*—The number of references to take accounts, to make inquiries, as to estates to be administered or partitioned, as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on question of title or questions affecting minors in proposed terms of settlement, to settle conveyances, and in like matters pending at the commencement of the year 1929 was 267, 195 references were filed in 1929 in the Office of the Commissioner for taking accounts, making a total of 462 for disposal. The number of references disposed of by him during the year 1929 was 242.

12. *Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.*—During the year 504 petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, 17 Pauper petitions for leave to sue or defend in *forma pauperis*, 22 petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 39 petitions under the

Indian Trust Act, 30 references under the Land Acquisition Act and 440 petitions under the Guardian and Wards, Lunacy and Arbitration Acts, etc., making in all 1,052, were filed for disposal.

12A. *Awards under the Indian Arbitration Act, 1899.*—The number of awards filed during the year was 231.

13. *Applications for Execution of Decrees, etc.*—(Statement No. 13).—The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 819 and the number of applications filed during the year was 2,478, making a total of 3,297 for disposal. Of these, 475 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts, in 247 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 231 satisfaction was obtained in part, and 1,327 were wholly infructuous, making a total of 2,330 and 967 remained at the close of the year 1929.

Number of Darkhasts (Decrees or Orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 45. Number of Decrees received from the other Courts for execution during the year was 83.

Appeals from the High Court Decrees under Section 15 of the Letters Patent.

17. (*Statement No. 7.*)—Thirty-five appeals from decrees on the Original Side of the High Court were filed during the year and 32 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 67, 45 were decided and 22 (including 2 over a year old) remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was more by 2 than in 1928. These 45 appeals were decided as under :—

- 32—Decrees of the Courts of First Instance confirmed ;
- 3—Decrees of the Courts of First Instance modified ;

18. (*Statement No. 8.*)—Thirty-six appeals from Orders on the Original Side were filed during the year and 19 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 55, 37 were decided and 18 (including 4 over a year old) remained pending at the close of the year. The number of

such appeals disposed of was more by 8 than in 1928. The disposals of these appeals were as follows :—

19. (*Statement No. 7*).—On the Appellate Side, 95 Letters Patent Appeals from High Court Decrees were filed during the year and 32 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 127, 65 were decided and 62 (including 12 over a year old) remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was more by 10 than in 1928. The disposals of these appeals were as under :—

(*Statements Nos. 7 and 8*).—The statement in the margin shows the numbers of first and second appeals from decrees and appeals from orders of the Provincial

Courts of Original and Appellate Jurisdiction, which came before the High Court and were decided during the year. The institutions of first appeals were less by 208 and those of second appeals were more by 117 than in 1928, and the institutions of appeals from orders were less by 1 than in that year.

21. *Appeals decided—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8)*.—The disposals of first and second appeals and of the appeals from orders show a decrease of 182, 186 and 25 respectively on the figures of the previous year.

22. *Appeals pending*—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—At the close of the year 1,537 first appeals, 1,473 second appeals and 65 appeals from orders were pending. The aggregate total of the pending appeals is more by 505 than in 1928.

24. *Results of appeals*—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—Of the 195 appeals from Original Decrees decided, 69 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 126, the decrees of the lower Courts were confirmed in 82, reversed in 12 and modified in 28, and four cases were remanded. Of the 909 appeals from Appellate Decrees decided, 535 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 374, the decrees of the lower Courts were affirmed in 280, reversed in 56, modified in 30 and 8 cases were remanded.

(Statement No. 8).—Of the 62 appeals from orders decided, 19 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 43, the orders of the lower Courts were affirmed in 26, reversed in 9, modified in 2 and 6 cases were remanded.

During the year under report, three appeals under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, were filed and two were pending at the beginning of the year. Of these five cases, one was dismissed or not

prosecuted, one was decided, the order of the lower Court being confirmed and three appeals remained pending at the close of the year.

One reference under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, pending at the beginning of the year under report was disposed of during the year.

Under the powers given to the Registrar of the High Court, 514 applications under the Civil Procedure Code were disposed of by him.

25. *Appeals to the Privy Council.*—At the opening of the year, 7 applications for leave to appeal were pending orders. Four new applications were filed during the year. Of these 11 applications for leave to appeal, 8 were rejected and in 1 the Rule was made absolute and two remained pending at the close of the year. During the year four appeals were despatched to England.

26. *Results of appeals to the Privy Council.*—During the year nine appeals were disposed of by the Privy Council out of the 21 appeals pending before it against the decisions of the High Court. Out of nine appeals decided, the decisions of this High Court were confirmed in six and reversed in three.

CIVIL COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

28. *Appeals instituted*—(Statement No. 7).—5,658 appeals were instituted in 1929, showing an increase of 97 as compared with the previous year. The number of appeals instituted was larger in 11, and smaller in 6 districts. There were noticeable increases in East Khandesh (74), Ratnagiri (65) and Ahmednagar (57). In the remaining 8 districts the variations were less than 50. The decrease, on the other hand, was noticeable in West Khandesh (120), Belgaum (73) and Broach (41). The remaining three districts show decreases below 30.

29. *Appeals disposed of*—(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—5,791 appeals were disposed of during the year including 633 by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate Powers. These two figures are greater by 816 and 432 respectively than the corresponding figures of the previous year.

There was an increase in the disposals in nine districts, the greatest being in Belgaum (384), followed by Sholapur (274), Thana (265) and Nasik (173). On the other hand there was a decrease in the disposals in eight districts, the greatest being in Ahmedabad (297), followed by Broach (93). In the remaining six districts, the variations were less than 50.

30. *Appeals pending*—(Statement No. 7).—There were 5,433 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being less by 133 than at the end of 1928.

(Statement No. 14).—The number of appeals pending for more than a year fell from 1,508 to 1,102.

31. *Results of appeals*—(Statement No. 7).—The results of the decision of appeals in the lower Courts during the year were as follows :—

In 670 cases, or 11·6 per cent., of the whole, the appeals were either summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, in 3,136 cases or 54·1 per cent., the judgments of the lower courts were affirmed, in 696 or 12 per cent., they were modified, in 1,005 or 17·4 per cent., they were reversed and in the remaining 284 cases or 4·9 per cent., the appeals were remanded.

32. The average duration of appeals in contested appeals in the lower appellate courts was 443 while that in uncontested appeals was 89.

33. *Miscellaneous appeals*—(Statement No. 8).—436 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 166 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 602, 425 were disposed of during the year and 177 remained pending at its close. The number pending was more by 11 than in the previous year.

34. The average duration of days in contested miscellaneous appeals in the lower Appellate Courts was 143 whereas that in uncontested appeals was 54.

CIVIL COURTS IN THE MOFUSSIL SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

35. *Changes in Jurisdiction*.—During the year under report, a change was effected in the jurisdiction of one of the Civil Courts in the Presidency as under :—

Out of the linked courts of Karmala and Madha in the Sholapur District the Court of Karmala was abolished with effect from 3rd January 1929 and the 123 villages of the Karmala taluka were included in the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Court of Subordinate Judge of Madha. (*Vide* Government Notification, Home Department, No. 2466/2 dated 17th November 1928.)

36. *Original suits instituted*—(Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1929 was 1,70,440 an increase of 14,472 on the figures of the previous year. The former figure includes 10,072 suits instituted in the Village Munsiffs' Courts in the Districts of Ahmednagar, Dharwar, Khandesh (East and West), Poona, Satara and Sholapur, the figures of which have not been shown in the report for 1928 but have been added from this year, as per Government of India's Notification No. F.-296/IV-25 Judicial dated 15th August 1928.

The increase occurred in money suits to the extent of 10·9 per cent. while it was of 1·6 per cent. in title and other suits, the number of money suits being 1,42,334 as against 1,28,313 in 1928 and that of title and other suits being 28,106 as against 27,655 in 1928.

(*Statement No. 4.*)—The total value of suits instituted in 1929 amounted to Rs. 5,21,71,853 a decrease of Rs. 56,139 on the total for 1928.

37. *Local distribution*—(*Statement No. 3.*)—The number of suits instituted in 1929 showed an increase in 14 districts and a decrease in the remaining three districts.

There was no appreciable increase in any district except Kaira (955). In other districts, *viz.*, West Khandesh (3,395), Poona (2,483), Satara (2,043), Dharwar (1,213), Sholapur (1,036) and Ahmednagar (1,006) the increase was only due to the inclusion of institutions of the Village Munsiffs' Courts which were not shown in the previous year.

(*Statement No. 3.*)—The largest number of suits instituted during the year was in East Khandesh (19,374). In no other district except Poona, West Khandesh, Kaira, Nasik and Ahmedabad did the institutions exceed 10,000. Institutions ranged between 5,000 to 10,000 in Ratnagiri, Dharwar, Belgaum, Sholapur, Bijapur, Ahmednagar, Satara, Thana, Surat and Broach and Panch Mahals. Kanara showed only 3,775 suits as instituted while the lowest figure 2,965 came to the share of Kolaba.

38. *Number of suits disposed of*—(*Statement No. 5.*)—In addition to the 1,70,440 suits instituted during the year and 68,767 suits pending from the previous year (in the latter figure are included 123 Miscellaneous cases, which were transferred to Statement No. 5 from Statement No. 6, being treated as Regular suits and the figure of arrears before the Village Munsiffs' Courts of those Districts, which were not previously shown), 2,132 suits were revived or received on remand or review making a total of 2,41,339 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of during the year was 1,67,401 an increase of 13,425. The former figure includes those decided by the Village Munsiffs' Courts.

Of the total number of suits during the year, *viz.*, 1,67,401, Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals (that is, Courts of Subordinate Judges) disposed of 1,43,934 suits, Small Cause Courts 11,812, District Courts 410, Village Munsiffs' Courts 11,169 and the remaining 76 suits were decided by Unpaid Tribunals that is (Inamdars and Jagirdars).

39. *Results of suits decided*—(*Statement No. 5.*)—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 22,517 or 13·5 per cent. were disposed of without trial; 69,006 or 41·2 per cent. without contest; 74,644 or 44·6 per cent. with contest and 1,234 or ·7 per cent. by compromise.

Of the 74,644 suits decided on contest, 67,733 or 90·7 per cent. resulted in favour of the Plaintiffs and 6,911 or 9·3 per cent. in favour of the Defendants.

40. *Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jagirdars*—(*Statement No. 5.*)—The Unpaid Tribunals disposed of 76 original suits of which 47 were contested. In 1928, the figures were 51 and 26 respectively.

41. *Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges—(Statement No. 5).*—The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 1,43,934 an increase of 3,429 on the figures of the previous year. The increase is chiefly in the number of cases decided under the ordinary procedure and appears in contested suits only. The figures of suits decided under the Small Cause Court Procedure show an aggregate increase of 2,969 there being a decrease of 1,273 in contested suits and an increase of 4,242 in uncontested suits. The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 76,821 and under the small cause procedure 67,113. Of these, 54·5 and 39·5 per cent. respectively were contested. The percentage of suits decided after contest both under the ordinary and the small cause procedure shows an increase of ·6 and a decrease of 3·9 respectively as compared with that of the previous year.

42. *Suits disposed of by Small Cause Court Judges—(Statement No. 5).*—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 11,812 suits an increase of 439 on the total of the previous year's disposals. Of these, 7,381 were decided uncontested and the remaining 4,431 suits were disposed of after contest. The former shows an increase by 1,430 while the latter a decrease of 991 as against those shown in the previous year.

43. *Suits disposed of by District and Assistant Judges—(Statement No. 5).*—The District Courts disposed of 410 original suits of which 246 (47 less than last year) were contested.

44. *Suits disposed of by the Village Munsiffs—(Statement No. 5).*—The Village Munsiffs disposed of 11,169 suits out of which 2,695 were decided after contest.

45. *Pending Suits—(Statement No. 5).*—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 73,938 including those before the Village Munsiffs' Courts as against 66,579 shown in the previous year which comes to 68,767 after the inclusion of 123 Miscellaneous Cases treated as suits and the inclusion of 2,065 suits pending at the beginning of the year under report before the Village Munsiffs' Courts of those Districts which had not given statistics of the Village Munsiffs' Courts in the previous year.

(*Statement No. 14*).—Of the pending cases, 6,533 had been pending for more than a year; this shows an increase of 1,153 over the figure of the previous year. Of the suits pending over a year, 3 were in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, 212 in the Courts of the Village Munsiffs, 6,187 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges, 62 in the Small Cause Courts and 69 in the District Courts, the figures showing as compared with last year an increase of 911 and 44 suits in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges and in the Small Cause Courts, and decrease of 4 and 10 in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars and in the District Courts.

The number of suits pending over a year was the largest in Poona (1,245) followed by Satara (755), Ahmedabad (496), Ahmednagar (406), East Khandesh (397), Broach (355), Kolaba (340), Belgaum (335), Kaira (318), Surat (317), Nasik (314), Dharwar (289) and Ratnagiri (284). The figures for the remaining districts are less than 200.

46. The average duration in days of suits both contested and uncontested was 181 and 97 in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, 135 and 81 in the Courts of the Village Munsiffs, 290 and 135 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges, 177 and 129 in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and 355 and 148 in the District Courts.

47. *Execution Proceedings*—(Statement No. 13).—There were 64,853 applications for execution of decrees pending from the previous year besides 616 applications pending before the Village Munsiffs' Courts of those Districts which had not given any figures of the Village Munsiffs' Courts in the previous year, 1,54,568 new applications were filed during the year. Out of the total number of applications before the Courts, 1,49,186 applications were disposed of during the year and 70,851 remained pending at its close. The disposals of the applications were as under :—

The total amount realized in Courts other than Small Cause Courts was Rs. 96,56,545-4-6½.

Debtors were imprisoned in 486 cases, moveable property sold in 968 and immoveable property in 3,831.

48. *Miscellaneous Cases*—(Statement No. 6).—The number of miscellaneous institutions rose from 12,880 to 13,003. That of miscellaneous disposals fell from 13,004 to 12,335, whereas that of pending cases rose from 5,249 to 6,008, the former figure having excluded 123 miscellaneous cases treated as suits. Of the cases disposed of, 1,911 were decided without trial, 3,692 without contest, three on reference to arbitration and 6,729 after contest. Of these 6,729 contested cases, 4,474 or 66·5 per cent. were decided in favour of the plaintiffs.

49. The average duration of days in contested and uncontested miscellaneous cases was 244 and 123 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges, 96 and 61 in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and 175 and 92 in the District Courts.

III.—BOMBAY SMALL CAUSE COURT.

50. (Statements Nos. 3 and 5).—The figures of suits instituted, disposed of and pending at the close of the year 1929 in the Presidency Small Cause Court were 39,291, 37,675 and 6,358 respectively. The institutions, disposals and the number of suits pending show an increase of 5,062, 3,535 and 1,616 respectively over the figures of the previous year.

(Statement No. 4).—There was an increase in the institutions of suits not exceeding Rs. 1,000 in value whereas a decrease occurred in the case of suits above Rs. 1,000 but not exceeding Rs. 2,000.

The total value of the litigation showed an increase for the year under report. The figure was Rs. 82,96,308-9-6 as against Rs. 76,90,605-13-0 in the preceding year.

51. *Mode of disposal*—(Statement No. 5).—Of the 37,675 suits disposed of, 635 were decided without trial, 32,489 without contest, 4,508 after contest and 43 on reference to arbitration.

52. The average duration in days in both contested and uncontested suits was 52 and 38.

53. *Execution of Decrees* (Statement No. 13).—Of the 24,697 applications for the execution of decrees that were before the Courts during the year (including 2,066 pending from the previous year) 21,239 were disposed of and 3,458 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the latter figure, 606 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of, 8,255 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 12,074 were returned as wholly infructuous and 910 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realized was Rs. 15,75,290-0-6 as compared with the Rs. 12,81,425-7-7 in the previous year.

54. *Coercive process*—(Statement No. 13).—In order to enforce the execution of decrees, imprisonment was ordered in 443 cases and sale of moveables in 703. Both these figures show an increase of 101 and 35 over the figures of the previous year.

GENERAL.

55. As compared with the figures of 1928, the number of suits instituted and disposed of in the Subordinate Judges' Courts in 1929 increased by 3,862 and 3,429 respectively, the number of regular suits disposed of being more by 460 and those under Small Cause Court Jurisdiction being more by 2,969. With the number of revived suits and those pending at the end of the last year the total number of suits pending shows an increase from 61,114 to 65,315 (the former figure being further increased by the inclusion of 9 miscellaneous cases treated as suits). Similarly the number of suits pending over a year shows an increase from 5,276 to 6,187.

The number of appeals disposed of by the District Courts increased by 816. The First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate Powers disposed of 633 appeals as against 201 in 1928. The total number of appeals pending in the District Court decreased from 5,566 to 5,433.

The figures of suits instituted, disposed of and pending on the Original Side of the High Court showed decreases by 354, 217 and 194 respectively on the figures of the preceding year.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court the total number of institutions and of disposals of appeals showed a decrease of 40 and 382 respectively on the figures of the preceding year. The total arrears of appeals on the Appellate Side increased from 2,604 to 3,140.

56. *Inspection.*—During the year under report, the District Judges inspected the following Courts of Subordinate Judges : Dhandhuka in the Ahmedabad District ; Jamkhed, Kopargaon, Karjat, Shevgaon and Parner in the Ahmednagar District ; Chikodi, Gokak, Hukeri and Athni in the Belgaum District ; Bagalkot and Bijapur in the Bijapur District ; Godhra and Dohad in the Broach District ; Gadag, Hubli, Haveri and Dharwar in the Dharwar District ; Umreth in the Kaira District ; Nandurbar, Shirpur, Amalner and Dhulia in the West Khandesh District ; Vadgaon, Talegaon and Junnar in the Poona District ; Dapoli, Chiplun and Devrukh in the Ratnagiri District ; Karad and Patan in the Satara District ; Pandharpur, Madha, Akluj and Sholapur in the Sholapur District and Panvel, Murbad, Bhiwandi and Alibag in the Thana District.

57. *Judicial Conferences.*—The District Judges of Bijapur, Kanara and West Khandesh assembled Judicial conferences of the Judges subordinate to them and points touching on the practice and procedure of Civil Courts were discussed.

58. *Receipts and Charges of the High Court.*—For the year 1929, the total receipts of the High Court as shown in paragraphs 14 and 27 were Rs. 18,48,579-9-7 on the Original Side and Rs. 2,08,137-13-5 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 20,56,717-7-0. The total charges as shown in the same paragraphs were 8,23,978-5-5 on the Original Side and Rs. 4,54,200-12-9 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 12,78,179-2-2. The difference between these two aggregates shows a net profit of Rs. 7,78,538-4-10. This profit includes the Probate and Administration Duty (the cost of collecting which is borne by the High Court) but is exclusive of the net profit shown on the working of the office of the Official Assignee, which amounted for the year 1929 to a further sum of Rs. 73,037-8-4.

59. *Receipts and Charges of all the Civil and Criminal Courts in the Presidency.*—The total receipts of all the Courts (Civil and Criminal) in the Presidency have fallen from Rs. 90,56,597 to Rs. 88,97,450 and the total charges from Rs. 62,68,244 to Rs. 62,46,290. These figures have been supplied by the Accountant General, Bombay, in accordance with Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 5042 dated 11th August 1893. They show a net profit for the year of Rs. 26,51,160.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1929

1. *Judicial Staff*—(Statement No. I).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Presidency on the 31st December 1929 and available for Criminal Cases consisted of 10 permanent and 1 temporary High Court Judges; 17 Sessions Judges; 6 Additional Sessions Judges; 1 Assistant Sessions Judge; 343 First Class Magistrates; 410 Second Class Magistrates; 238 Third Class Magistrates; 164 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889; and 250 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act IX of 1920.

In addition to the above, there were 19,639 Police Patils in the Presidency exercising powers under section 14 of the Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, of whom 579 were invested with powers under section 15 of that Act.

There were also 44 Benches of Magistrates inclusive of four in the City of Bombay constituted from 456 Honorary Magistrates.

2. *Offences reported*—(Statement No. II).—There were 216,999 criminal offences reported during the year, an increase of 5,089 on the figures of 1928. In the districts of Belgaum, Bijapur, Poona, Ahmednagar, Nasik, Surat and Ahmedabad, there was a noticeable increase in the number of offences reported during the year but a noticeable decrease in the districts of Dharwar, Sholapur and in the City of Bombay. Of the total number of offences reported, 52,828 were under the Indian Penal Code and 164,171 under Special and Local Laws.

3. *Complaints dismissed (Section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and complainants fined (Section 250, Criminal Procedure Code)*—(Statement No. II).—The number of complaints dismissed under section 203 was 7,967 and the number of complainants fined under section 250 was 345.

4. *Cases found to be true*.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 2,08,077 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial excluding those withdrawn and including those pending from the previous year was 2,03,137. The number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show an increase of 4,806 and 3,630 respectively on the figures of 1928.

5. *Murders reported as true*.—Out of 805 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 204 were murders of which 127 ended in conviction. The corresponding figures for 1928 were 796, 269 and 173. The 204 murders may be classified as under:—

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

I.—PRESIDENCY MAGISTRATES' COURTS.

6. *Cases in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 11).*—The number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates was 20,883 and in those of the Honorary Presidency Magistrates 78,183 making a total of 99,066. This number is less by 4,092 than that of 1928 when the corresponding figures were 22,561 and 80,597 making a total of 1,03,158. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 89,594 or 3,207 less than that in 1928 whereas cases under the Indian Penal Code fell from 10,357 to 9,472. The decrease under the former head was most marked in offences under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act which fell from 27,317 to 22,863, and under the Public Conveyances Act which fell from 8,284 to 5,962. The number of offences under the City of Bombay Municipal Act fell from 9,542 to 9,404, under the Prostitution Act from 97 to 73; under the Opium Act from 78 to 62 and under the Indian Railways Act from 452 to 435. On the other hand there was a noticeable increase in offences under the City of Bombay Police Act which rose from 42,518 to 45,452 and under the Prevention of Gambling Act which rose from 967 to 1,834. The number of offences under the Abkari Act rose from 365 to 453, under the Indian Arms Act from 29 to 64, under the Factories Act from 33 to 88, under the Indian Lepers Act from 61 to 135, under the Motor Vehicles Act from 2,347 to 2,368, under the Criminal Tribes Act from 104 to 131 and under the Prisoners' Act from 4 to 17. As regards offences under the Indian Penal Code there was a noticeable increase in offences against the Public Tranquility which rose from 28 to 123 and in offences affecting the Public Health, Safety, Convenience, Decency and Morals which rose from 191 to 260. The number of offences affecting life rose from 85 to 105, under Mischief from 34 to 57 and under Extortion from 15 to 24. There was slight increase in offences under Contempts of the Lawful Authority or Public Servants which rose from 13 to 21. In those of Criminal Force and Assault from 1,653 to 1,659 and of relating to Marriage from 129 to 133. The decrease on the other hand was most marked in the number of offences under Criminal Intimidation, Insult and Annoyance, which fell from 1,386 to 898 and under Cheating which fell from 584 to 444. The number of offences under Theft fell from 1,986 to 1,888, those under Criminal Breach of Trust from 787 to 695, under Criminal Trespass from 500 to 442, under Defamation from 212 to 187 and under Wrongful Restraint and Wrongful Confinement from 140 to 100. There was a slight decrease in offences under Criminal Misappropriation of Property which fell from 126 to 94, in those of Unnatural Offences from 14 to 6, of Kidnapping, Forceful Abduction, Slavery and Forced Labour from 64 to 56 and in offences relating to Documents and to Trade or Property Marks from 60 to 55.

(*Statements Nos. 2 and 9*).—During the year 96,676 regular and 519 miscellaneous cases were disposed of and 2,390 regular cases were pending at the close of the year.

7. *Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).*—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Magistrates was 1,06,859. Of the persons tried, 12,354 were acquitted or discharged; 90,900 were convicted; 326 were committed to the High Court; 1 died during the trial; 2 escaped; 28 were transferred to other provinces; 13 were sent to the Military Authorities and 3,235 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Penal Code, 3,885 were convicted and 8,735 were acquitted. The results of the trials before each of the three classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

8. *Punishments—(Statement No. 12).*—Of the persons convicted 6,650 were punished with imprisonment, 81,507 with fine and 4 with whipping, 1,873 convicted persons were warned and discharged, 140 persons were sent to the Loper Asylum at Matunga and 726 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 4,20,280-5-3. The total amount realized was Rs. 3,24,895-15-0 of which Rs. 26,672-5-9 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to these sentences, 1 complainant was ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code.

II.—MAGISTRATES INCLUDING VILLAGE OFFICERS AND SANITARY COMMITTEES AND SANITARY BOARDS.

9. *Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).*—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these Tribunals was 1,65,924. Of these, the cases of 1,069 persons were committed or referred to the Sessions and the cases of remaining 1,64,855 were finally disposed of by the various Tribunals. Of the total, 1,64,855, 74,700 or 45·3 per cent. were convicted and 76,582 or 46·4 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, 171 persons died, 634 escaped during their trials and 5 were transferred.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before Magistrates and Village Officers at the close of the year was 12,763 as compared with 11,759 in 1928.

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 1,432 were for terms not exceeding 15 days; 5,314 for terms not exceeding 6 months; 1,043 for terms not exceeding 2 years and 2 for terms above 2 years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 271 persons; in 1928 the figure was 220.

The amounts of fines imposed and realized during the year were Rs. 8,00,266-11-11 and 6,72,345-5-11 respectively. A total sum of Rs. 41,823-11-0 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to the above, 344 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code as against 332 last year.

III.—COURTS OF SESSIONS.

11. *Results of trials*—(Statement No. 9).—There were 2,137 persons or 209 more than in 1928 under trial. The cases of 1,705 persons were decided while those of 432 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the 1,705 persons tried, 829 or 48·6 per cent. were convicted; 840 or 49·3 per cent. were acquitted or discharged; the cases of 33 persons were referred to the High Court under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 3 persons died during their trials.

12. *Punishments—(Statement No. 12).*—The following sentences and orders were passed by Courts of Session :—

Fines to the amount of Rs. 37,755-0-0 were imposed by Courts of Session as compared with Rs. 41,455 in the preceding year. The total realization amounted to Rs. 19,957-8-4 as compared with Rs. 19,750-2-9 in 1928 and the total amount of fines paid as compensation was Rs. 2,690-8-4 as against Rs. 565 in 1928.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appellate Courts Subordinate to the High Court.

I.—APPEALS.

13. *(Statement No. 2).*—The number of appeals decided during the year was 3,034 as against 3,012 in the preceding year, an increase of 22.

14. *Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 10).*—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 2,526. Of these, the appeals of 348 were summarily dismissed and sentences on 1,239 were confirmed after admission making a total of 1,587 wholly unsuccessful appellants or 62·8 per cent. Of the remainder, 263 appellants or 10·4 per cent., obtained a modification of the sentences passed on them and 627 or 24·8 per cent., an annulment. The cases of 49 appellants were otherwise disposed of. As compared with 1928, the results were not much favourable to the appellants.

15. *Sessions Courts—(Statement No. 10).*—During the year the number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Sessions was 2,329. The appeals of 686 persons (or 29·5 per cent.) were summarily dismissed; 706 appellants whose appeals were admitted were altogether unsuccessful; 366 obtained an alteration of sentences; 532 were acquitted; the cases of 38 appellants were otherwise disposed of and one appellant died during the pendency of his appeal. The proportions of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders and completely successful were 59·8, 15·7 and 22·8 per cent. respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 42·9, 22·3 and 32·4 per cent.

respectively. If admitted appeals are only considered, these results were on the whole less favourable to appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants during the year being 54·7 as against 60·5 in 1928.

II.—SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

16. *Magistrates' Courts*—(Statement No. 10).—The cases of 371 accused persons who applied for revision or against whom applications were made by complainants came before the District Magistrates for revision. The number was more by 133 than in 1928. Of the total applications, those of 306 were rejected and those of 64 were otherwise disposed of; and 1 accused died during the pendency of his application.

17. *Sessions Courts*—(Statement No. 10).—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 1,066 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Sessions during the year. The number was more by 184 than in 1928. Applications of 784 persons were rejected and those of 282 were otherwise disposed of.

HIGH COURT.

I.—ORIGINAL JURISDICTION (HIGH COURT SESSIONS).

18. *Commitments to the High Court*—(Statement No. 9).—One hundred and sixty-four cases in all were brought to trial at the High Court Sessions during the year including 11 pending at the end of the previous year. Of these 142 were decided and 22 remained pending at the end of the year. These 142 cases occupied in all 240 days. This may be compared with 126 cases occupying 153 days in 1928.

Altogether 304 persons were tried of whom 180 were convicted and 124 were acquitted.

19. *Punishments*—(Statement No. 12).—The following sentences were passed :—

The fines imposed and realised during the year amounted to Rs. 11,160 and 2,000 respectively including Rs. 60 imposed on and realized from Jurors. Out of the amount realized Rs. 50 were paid as compensation to complainants. In addition to sentence of imprisonment one person was punished with whipping during the year.

II.—APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

20. (*Statement No. 10*).—Seventy-four appeals were pending before the High Court at the opening of the year from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year, 496 appeals were preferred and 514 decided leaving 56 at its close. The numbers of appeals preferred, decided and pending are less by 111, 82 and 18 respectively than those of the preceding year.

Of the appeals preferred against sentences, 415 were from Courts of Session and 68 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates, whereas 13 were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittal.

21. *Results of appeals*.—Four hundred and twenty-seven appeals against sentences passed by Courts of Session were decided. The sentences were upheld in 356 cases, reversed in 29 and modified in 34. Three appeals were returned for presentation to the proper Courts, one related to property matter, three related to sanction matter and one was remanded for retrial.

Seventy-three appeals against sentences by Presidency Magistrates were decided. The sentences were upheld in 66 cases, reversed in 2 and modified in 2. Two cases related to property matter and one to sanction matter.

The results of appeals as affecting individual appellants were as follows:—

The appeals of 376 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals, the sentences of 107 appellants were confirmed; those of 56 altered; those of 43 reversed; 3 persons were asked to approach the proper Courts and the remaining one was ordered to be retried.

In appeals against acquittal orders sentences were passed by the High Court on 8 persons while in the case of 14 persons the orders of acquittal were confirmed.

Fourteen appeals by the Local Government against the orders of acquittal involving 22 accused were disposed of by the High Court during the year. In 7 appeals involving 14 accused the High Court upheld the order of acquittal. In 7 appeals involving 8 accused the High Court set aside the order of acquittal in respect of all and convicted them.

III.—SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

22. *References under section 307 Code of Criminal Procedure*.—Two references were pending in the High Court at the beginning of the year and 11 were submitted to it during the year. Of these, 11 were decided

and 2 remained pending at the close of the year. The latter figure includes one reference involving 10 accused, disposed of as regards 5 accused only by the High Court which disagreed with the verdict of the Jury, and acquitted them, the case regarding the remaining 5 accused having been ordered to be laid before a Third Judge. Out of the 11 cases decided, involving 17 accused therein, the High Court convicted 10 accused and the remaining 7 were acquitted. The verdict of the Jury was accepted in one case while it was set aside in 10.

23. *References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.*—Fifteen references under this section were submitted to the High Court during the year for confirmation of death sentences and 9 were pending at the opening. Twenty-two cases involving 26 accused were decided during the year. The sentence of death was confirmed in the case of 15 persons and commuted to that of transportation for life in the case of 7. Out of the remaining persons, 3 were acquitted and the sentence of death passed on one was commuted to one of 5 years' rigorous imprisonment.

During the year under report 16 persons were executed in the Presidency.

24. *Revision.*—One Hundred and twenty-eight cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 17 were pending at the opening of the year. Of these, 119 were decided during the year and 26 remained pending at its close. The number reported was less by 18 than in 1928. In 19 cases, the orders sent up for revision were not interfered with; in 28 cases they were enhanced. Sentences were reduced or altered in 19 cases and reversed in 35. In 3 cases proceedings were wholly quashed and in 9 cases new trials were ordered. The remaining 6 cases were otherwise disposed of.

Orders were passed under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in 359 cases, an increase of 50 on the figures of the previous year. Of these, 348 came before the High Court on application and 11 were taken up by the High Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion. Of the 348 applications for the issue of Rule, 193 were rejected. Of the 155 Rules issued, 71 were finally discharged, 56 were made absolute in their entirety, in 26 the orders complained of were modified and the remaining 2 were withdrawn.

In 5 out of the 11 cases taken up by the High Court *suo motu* the order passed by the lower Courts were not disturbed, in 2, the sentences were enhanced and in 4, they were reduced.

25. *Applications for transfer.*—Seventy-seven applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases (75 original and 2 appeals) from one Court or District to another were received during the year and 7 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of these, 73 were decided during the year and 11 remained pending. Fifteen were summarily rejected and in 7 transfers were granted without

the issue of a Rule. In the 51 applications in which Rules were issued, transfers were granted in 27, refused in 21 and 3 applications were allowed to be withdrawn.

26. *Miscellaneous applications.*—Eight applications for bail, 1 for bailable warrant, 7 for maintenance, 8 for compensation, 9 for disposal of property, 9 for stay of proceedings, 1 for extradition and 15 for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by the High Court during the year.
