**REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE EXCISE  
DEPARTMENT IN THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY  
FOR THE YEAR 1939-40.**

*Note.*—Throughout the report, the figures in rectangular brackets wherever placed in juxtaposition to those given for the year under report, refer to the previous year (1938-39).

**CHAPTER I.**

**ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES.**

The following were the principal features of the Excise system during the year 1939-40 :—

(1) The rationing system was continued for country spirit except in the Fixed Fee Areas mentioned at item (12) below. The total ration for the Province was the same as for the previous year, the district being the unit of rationing. This ration was distributed by Collectors, the annual ration for each shop being fixed at the beginning of the year and adjustments made from time to time between shops as required. No monthly ration for shops was fixed, except for certain shops on the borders of Prohibition Areas and Dry Areas.

(2) The system of double auction sanctioned for the disposal of licenses for the retail sale of country spirit, opium and hemp drugs in the previous year was discontinued. Attempts were made to dispose of all such licenses first by auction. Wherever no bids were offered, or the bids offered were inadequate, the licenses were disposed of by tender or negotiation. The only exceptions to this system were shops affected by prohibition measures introduced into the areas referred to in item (13) below, and those country spirit shops in fixed fee areas mentioned in item (12) below. Shops affected by Prohibition were continued to the existing licensees, or failing that disposed of by auction or negotiation up to the date from which prohibition schemes were introduced. The country liquor shops in the fixed fee areas were given by selection for fixed fees. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 9685/33, dated 5th January 1939.)

(3) All toddy licenses, except those licenses which were affected by prohibition measures, were disposed of for the toddy year ending 31st July 1940 by auction first. In cases where there were no bids or the bids offered were inadequate, the licenses were disposed of by tender or negotiation. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 946/39, dated 10th July 1939.)

(4) The monthly instalment system for the recovery of license fees in respect of all classes of excise licenses, except foreign liquor and

toddy, sanctioned for the mofussil was continued as a permanent measure in all Districts except Ratnagiri, where the quarterly instalment system was continued. In the case of toddy licenses, the system of quarterly instalment was continued for all the Districts. (Government Resolutions, Revenue Department, No. 9685/33, dated 5th January 1939 and No. 946/39, dated 10th July 1939.)

(5) The opening and closing hours of country spirit, toddy, hemp drugs and opium shops remained unchanged, except that (a) all liquor shops in District and Taluka headquarter towns were ordered to be closed from 1-30 p.m. to 4 p.m. and (b) the opening hour of hemp drugs and opium shops in Bombay City was changed from 6-30 a.m. to 8-30 a.m. for the period from 1st April 1939 to 31st July 1939. (Government Resolutions, Revenue Department, No. 9685/33, dated 5th January 1939 and No. 946/39, dated 10th July 1939.)

(6) The limits of possession, sale and transport of country spirit remained unchanged except in the areas mentioned below, where the limits were fixed as shown against them :—

(11) The sale of country spirit in sealed bottles in Nasik City, Godhra Town and Satara City and Cantonment was continued.

(Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7906/33, dated 16th February 1939.)

(12) The experimental Fixed Fee System with maximum selling prices, which was in force in the undermentioned areas, was continued in—

(1) Panch Mahals Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District;

(2) Sugwa Range of the Kolaba District;

(3) Nawapur, Petha and part of the Nandarbar Taluka of the West Khandesh District; and

(4) Peint Mahal of the Nasik District.

(13) The "Dry Area" and "Prohibition Area" schemes were extended as follows:—

(a) Prohibition was introduced in the Town and Island of Bombay, Bombay Suburban District and that part of the Thana Mahal which is encircled by the Bassein-Thana Creek from 1st August 1939.

(b) The "Ahmedabad Dry Area" comprising Ahmedabad City and Suburbs was converted into a "Prohibition Area", and the "Prohibition Area" scheme was extended to the rest of the Daskroi Taluka from 1st August 1939.

(c) The Broach Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District comprising the Jambusar, Wagra, Broach and Ankleshwar talukas was converted into a "Prohibition Area", and a 3 mile shopless belt was created round it from 1st September 1939.

(d) The "Kanara Dry Area" comprising the Kumta and Ankola talukas was converted into a "Prohibition Area"; the "Dry Area" scheme was extended to the rest of the Kanara District and a 3 mile shopless belt was created round it from 1st September 1939.

(e) The "Ahmednagar Dry Area" comprising the Newasa and Shevgaon talukas and the Pathardi Mahal was converted into a "Prohibition Area"; and the "Dry Area" scheme was extended to the rest of the Ahmednagar District, except Akola and Jamkhed talukas, from 1st September 1939.

(f) The "Bardoli Total Prohibition Area", comprising Bardoli Taluka and part of the Mandvi Taluka, was extended by the inclusion of Valod Mahal, and a 3 mile shopless belt was created round it from 1st April 1939.

(14) With effect from 1st August 1939, all excise, except opium and hemp drugs, shops and tree-foot booths were kept closed in the following areas on the days shown against them :

(a) Sholapur City and Two mill pay days and the day following.

(15) Toddy shops and booths in all the Municipal areas in the Province were closed on the Holi and Muharram holidays. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7952/33, dated 4th March 1939.)

(16) All permanent refreshment stall license granted to cinemas and theatres were discontinued. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7952/33, dated 4th March 1939.)

(17) Orders were passed that no temporary refreshment stall licenses should be issued for the sale of foreign liquors at all forms of entertainments. (Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 1122-C/39, dated 24th June 1939.)

(18) 26 liquor shops in Nandurbar and Shahada talukas and Nawapur Petha of the West Khandesh District were managed



departmentally. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 304/39, dated 25th March 1939.)

(19) The liquor warehouses at Sirsi, Kumta, Kodibag, Ahmednagar and Broach were closed from 1st September 1939. (Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 18-C/33, dated 3rd June 1939.)

(20) The scheme for the departmental collection of mhowra flowers, which was in force in the Nawapur Petha and the Nandurbar Taluka of the West Khandesh District and the Peint Mahal of the Nasik District, was continued in these areas. The scheme was extended to Sakri and Taloda talukas of the West Khandesh District and the Murbad and Shahapur talukas and Mokhada Petha of the Thana District. (Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 8146-C/33-II, dated 22nd December 1939.)

(21) The cost price of opium supplied from the Gazipur factory to Indian States was fixed at Rs. 18-6-0 per seer. (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 3746/24, dated 28th November 1938.)

(22) Importation of denatured spirit in excess of one pint into the Province of Bombay across the customs frontier otherwise than through any customs port or land customs station, was prohibited for all persons excepting those holding licenses to sell denatured spirit. (Government Notification, Revenue Department, No. 25/33, dated 12th February 1940.)

(23) The payment of fixed annual contribution of Rs. 1,43,750 under section 63 of the Bombay Abkari Act, 1878 (V of 1878) to the Bombay Municipality was discontinued. (Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 7884-C/33, dated 6th December 1938.)

(24) Orders were issued that liquor shops and toddy shops should not be located within a distance of 100 yards from police lines, a police station, a police outpost or a police chowkey. These orders, however, do not apply to existing shops. If such shops are operating within 100 yards of such police buildings, they should be removed to other localities wherever practicable. (Government Resolution, Home Department, No. 1314/4, dated 4th February 1939.)

In the body of the report all statistics of consumption and revenue relate to British Districts only.

## CHAPTER II.

### COUNTRY SPIRIT.

2. *Sale Strengths.*—The sale strengths prescribed for country spirit were the same as in the previous year, namely, 25° U.P., 30° U.P., 40° U.P. and 60° U.P. 65° U.P. strength was introduced in West Khandesh District during the year. The sale of 25° U.P. or 30° U.P. was allowed

at shops near the borders of Indian States, and in certain areas to facilitate the control of illicit distillation and illicit importation. The policy of discouraging the consumption of strong spirit, by restricting a certain number of shops in each district to the exclusive sale of weak spirit, was continued in places where such a policy had proved successful.

3. *Receipts from still head duty.*—The revenue from still head duty fell to Rs. 56,14,518 [90,24,997]. The decrease was mainly in Bombay City and in the districts of Ahmedabad, Broach, Bombay Suburban, Kanara and Ahmednagar and was due to the introduction of Prohibition measure in these districts.

4. *License Fee.*—Receipts from license fees for the right of retail vend of country spirit at shops fell to Rs. 29,13,621 [46,39,698]. The decrease was mainly in Bombay City and in the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira, Broach, Bombay Suburban, Kanara, Ahmednagar and West Khanesh. It was chiefly due to the introduction of Prohibition measures.

5. *Revenue and Consumption in the Akrani Tract.*—The Excise Administration in the Akrani Mahal continued in the charge of the Forest Department. The Departmental Distillery at Dhadgaon continued to be worked under the supervision of an Excise Assistant Inspector. Liquor was sold by departmental shop keepers at a fixed price of annas 4 a bottle. The sale proceeds of spirit amounted to Rs. 53,316 [41,367] showing an increase of Rs. 11,949. Liquor was issued at 60° U.P. up to 31st January 1940, but from 1st February 1940 the strength was changed to 65° U.P., the selling price remaining the same. The consumption of liquor increased to 45,544 bulk gallons [27,445] due—

- (1) partly to the waning of the temperance movement inspired by the teachings of the late Gula Maharaj ;
- (2) partly to visits by Bhils from the shopless area of Taloda.

6. *Working of the Contract Supply System.*—Since 1st April 1929 with one exception there has been no contract supply system in any part of the Province, and all liquor with three exceptions is supplied by the Government Central Distillery at Nasik Road through its departmental local warehouses. The three exceptions are—

- (1) The Akrani which as noted above is supplied from the Dhadgaon Government Distillery ;
- (2) The manufacture at Chowka in the Ratnagiri District of Kaju liquor for supply to the Malwan Warehouse ; and
- (3) An outstill shop at Redi which provides toddy and kaju spirits to meet competition of cheap liquor in the adjoining Goa territory.

7. *Working of the Mhowra Flowers Act.*—This was the tenth year of the extension of section 18-B of the Bombay Abkari Act relating to mhowra flowers to the whole of the Province.

No licenses for the retail sale of mhowra flowers were granted during the year. The grant of permits for possession of mhowra flowers was restricted to genuine trade and industrial purposes and for feeding cattle. 247 [703] cases of illicit possession of mhowra flowers were detected during the year in Ahmedabad 28 [91], Kaira 75 [111], Panch Mahals 51 [284], Broach 0 [2], Thana 11 [32], Kolaba 5 [9], Nasik 4 [25], West Khandesh 18 [73] and East Khandesh 55 [76]. The abnormal fall in the number of cases detected is attributed to a bad mhowra flowers season. The scheme for departmental collection of mhowra flowers which was in force in the Nawapur Peta and the Nandurbar Taluka of the West Khandesh District and the Peint Mahal of the Nasik District was continued. The scheme was extended to Sakri and Taloda talukas of the West Khandesh District and to Mokhada Petha and Murbad and Shahapur talukas of the Thana District. Several Depots were opened and the mhowra flowers were purchased at the following rates :—

The collection was 22,212 maunds in the West Khandesh and 5,016 maunds in Thana districts.

8. *Country Liquor Shops*.—The number of shops for the retail vend of country spirit decreased to 1,626 including one Government Depot [1,754] at the beginning of the year. With the introduction of Prohibition measures in various parts of the Province, the number further decreased to 1,257 including 30 Government Depots.

9. *Advisory Committees*.—The various Excise Advisory Committees in the Province held 512 meetings at which 702 recommendations were made. Of these 549, i.e., 78·2 per cent. were accepted. The remaining recommendations related in most cases to special hours of sale for shops in particular areas.

10. *Opening and closing hours*.—The opening hour of sale was 10-30 a.m. as in the previous year. The closing hour remained the same as in the previous year, namely 8-30 p.m. everywhere, as regards the shops which were open during the whole of the year.

In (i) the City of Bombay and (ii) the Bandra Municipal and Santa Cruz Area the closing hour was 9 p.m. until the shops were shut on the introduction of Prohibition.

11. *Consumption*.—Appendix "A", column 11, shows in terms of proof gallons the sale of country spirit at shops. There was a decrease of 279,692 proof gallons or about 28 per cent. compared with the previous year. The decrease in consumption was mainly in the districts

of Ahmedabad (19,203), Broach (12,024), Bombay Suburban District (25,012), Bombay (208,468), and Kanara (10,120) and was due to the introduction of Prohibition measures in these areas. The total ration for 1939-40 was 1,769,342 proof gallons. The consumption for the whole province was 40.4 per cent. of the ration.

12. *Administration of Distilleries and Warehouses.*—One Central Distillery and, in the beginning of the year, 33 warehouses were maintained. The following 5 warehouses were, however, closed from 1st September 1939, as the areas which they served were declared to be dry areas :—

1. Ahmednagar, Ahmednagar District.
2. Broach, Broach and Panch Mahals District.
3. Kumta, } Kanara District.
4. Kodibag, }
5. Sirsi, }

In addition to the above, the Sewri and Thana Warehouses were partially closed for the purposes of issue of country liquor to the licensed vendors from 1st August 1939.

The issues to retailers in the British Districts of duty paid spirit amounted to 702,274 proof gallons excluding 14,075 proof gallons issued from the Government Distillery at Dhadgaon and 2,559 proof gallons issued from the outstill at Redi as against 978,446 proof gallons in the previous year.

The seasonal contract distillery at Chowka in the Ratnagiri District which was opened in the year 1934-35 for the manufacture of kaju liquor had an outturn of 2,288 proof gallons [2,326]. Kaju liquor is issued from the Malwan Warehouse to shops in Vengurla Petha and Malwan and Deogad Talukas. The total issues of kaju liquor during the year amounted to 2,350 proof gallons.

13. *Retail sale in excess of the prescribed limit.*—Permits for the sale of country spirit in excess of the prescribed limits on special occasions were granted in the Broach and Panch Mahals, Surat, Thana, Bombay Suburban, Kanara, Dharwar, Belgaum, East Khandesh and West Khandesh Districts, for the following quantities :—

14. *Departmental Depots in West Khandesh.*—26 country liquor shops in Nawapur, Nandurbar and Shahada Talukas were converted into Government depots, where weak (60° or 65° U.P.) liquor was sold for "off" consumption at prices compatible with the purchasing capacity of

the Bhils. 11 Depots were opened first from 1st May 1939, one from 1st July 1939 and the remaining depots from 1st November 1939.

Literate managers were appointed to the depots with instructions to carry on anti-drink propaganda amongst the Bhils.

Aerated waters and tea were made available at four important depots viz. Nawapur, Chinchpada, Visarwadi and Khandbara.

One Chief Inspector, one Sub-Inspector, 26 Managers for depots and a few Petty Officers and Constables, and Hamals were employed at the depots.

It is most satisfactory to be able to observe that these departmental selling arrangements, conducted on a much more extensive basis than ever previously attempted, have proved a considerable success.

15. *Taloda Taluka Shopless Area, and the Special Fixed Fee Area.*—The fixed fee system with the maxima selling prices for the shops in Nawapur Petha and part of the Nandurbar Taluka in force during the preceding year was continued during the year under report except for the 26 shops converted into Departmental shops as described. The Taloda shopless area was continued for another year.

16. *Temperance Movement.*—The Bhil Seva Mandal continued its propaganda work, and initiated a dramatic company for the performance of plays in the Bhil dialect regarding the anti-drink movement in the Bhil villages of the West Khandesh District.

In order that the purchase price of Mhowra flowers paid to Bhils may be usefully spent, cloth depots were opened along with mhowra flowers depots. At these depots, ready made articles such as coats, shirts, caps and other articles as for instance saris and blankets were kept on sale and sold at slightly above cost price. Later on during the year, it was decided to run cloth depots along with departmentally managed depots for sale of country liquor. The idea underlying the arrangement was to put before the Bhil the opportunity of spending his money on something useful instead of spending it on drink. The scheme proved most popular as will be evidenced from the sale proceeds which amounted to Rs. 8,531.

17. *Closure of Excise shops on pay days in certain areas.*—The scheme to close liquor and toddy shops on pay days and the following day for Mills and Railway workshops and Municipalities was introduced in :—

- (1) (i) Dhulia, (ii) Chalisgan, (iii) Jalgaon and (iv) Amalner towns and 10 miles round ;
- (2) Sholapur City and Taluka ; and
- (3) Hubli City and 10 miles round .

with effect from 1st August 1939.

Under the scheme the owners of mills and the Agent, M. and S. M. Railway were requested to fix one or two days on which their employees would be paid wages every month. Thus in Dhulia, Chalisgaon, Jalgaon, Amalner and Sholapur the employees fixed two days, whereas in Hubli only one day was fixed for paying the wages. The result was that in the former areas liquor shops had to be closed for three days—two mill pay days and the day following—while in Hubli the shops had to be closed for two days only.

The owners of the mills at Dhulia, Chalisgaon, Jalgaon, Amalner, Sholapur and Hubli Cities, the Presidents of the Chalisgaon and Amalner Municipalities and the Agent and General Manager, M. & S. M. Railway, deserve the thanks of this Department for having fixed a common day or days for the disbursement of the pay to their mill operatives, sweepers and Railway workshop operatives working in the areas.

The scheme appears to be generally beneficial to the labouring classes.

### CHAPTER III.

#### TODDY.

18. *Revenue*.—The revenue under this head derived from (1) tree-tax on trees tapped for toddy and (2) license fees for the retail sale of toddy, decreased to Rs. 43,01,962 [Rs. 61,84,522].

19. *Tree-tax*.—Receipts from tree-tax amounted to Rs. 16,89,888 [Rs. 22,29,954]. The decrease was due to the introduction of the Prohibition measures in the Province.

20. *License Fees*.—The realizations from license fees amounted to Rs. 26,12,074 [Rs. 39,54,568]. The decrease of Rs. 13,42,494 was due to the Prohibition measures introduced in the Province and lack of competition at the auctions.

21. *Trees licensed for tapping*.—The number of trees licensed to be tapped for toddy during the year under report and in the previous year is given below :—

The decrease is due to the introduction of Prohibition measures in the Province.

22. *Toddy Licenses.*—The licenses granted during the year under report and in the previous year were as follows:—

The decrease in the number of shops and booths is due to their reduction in pursuance of the Prohibition policy of Government.

23. *Consumption.*—A decrease of 2,761,150 gallons is reported. The decrease is due to the introduction of Prohibition measures in the Province. The procedure of paying surprise visits to toddy shops and booths was continued, and 1,512 samples of toddy were sent to the Chemical Analyser for analysis. One sample was found to contain Saccharine. No sample was found to contain Chloral Hydrate.

24. *Retail sale permitted in excess of the prescribed limit.*—Permits for the sale of toddy in excess of the prescribed limits were granted on special occasions and 2,484, 9,143, 20, 4,900, 273 gallons were sold under such permits in Surat, Thana, Belgaum, Sholapur and West Khandesh Districts respectively.

25. *Manufacture of Gul.*—The All-India Village Industries Association opened centres at Hosur (Belgaum District), Bordi (Thana District) and Atgaon (Surat District), for imparting instructions in the manufacture of gul from toddy. Mr. S. B. Patel was allowed to tap 400 trees at Mamakwada (Thana District) for the manufacture of gul from toddy. He was exempted from payment of the charges for the Excise establishment posted to supervise the operations, on the understanding that he provided the Excise Officer in charge with full information and accounts regarding all expenses incurred during the process of manufacture. This was done with a view to obtain reliable data from which to draw conclusions whether gul manufacture in this Province was an economic proposition. His report was still pending at the close of the year.

26. In the Kanara District 5 licenses were granted for the manufacture of gul against 7 in the previous year.

## CHAPTER IV.

## FOREIGN LIQUOR.

(Potable and Non-potable, including those of Indian manufacture.)

27. *Revenue.*—The revenue under this head mainly consists of (1) duty on Indian made liquors ; (2) license fees for the sale of such liquors as well as imported liquors ; and (3) vend (pass) fee on foreign liquors :—

(a) imported at the port of Bombay ; or

(b) imported into the Province of Bombay from other parts of British India and Indian States and foreign possessions ; or

(c) manufactured in the Province.

During the year under review the revenue under (1) amounted to Rs. 5,47,426 [9,41,409] (columns 11, 14, 18 and 19 of Imperial Return I). The revenue under (2) and (3) decreased to Rs. 18,80,815 [19,08,851] (columns 12, 15, 20, 21, 21A and 21B of Imperial Return I). The decrease of Rs. 4,22,019 in the total revenue as compared with the previous year was mostly due to the Prohibition measures enforced in various parts of the Province during the year.

28. *Imports and Consumption of Foreign Liquor.*—The imports of foreign liquors into Bombay City by sea, compared with those of the previous year, were as follows :—

Exports to other Provinces were made from these imports, as Bombay is the distributing centre for almost the whole of India. The following table gives statistics of sales in the Province of foreign liquors in the year

The decrease in consumption of all sorts of potable foreign liquors was mainly due to the enforcement of Prohibition in various parts of the Province. The largest decreases occurred in Bombay and the Bombay Suburban, Ahmedabad, Kanara and Broach Districts. There was a considerable fall in the consumption of fermented liquors in the Ahmednagar District.

The consumption of all kinds of foreign liquor in the Thana District during the year under review showed an appreciable increase over that of the previous year. This increase was due to the diversion of the custom from the Bombay Prohibition Area to the easily accessible foreign liquor shops at Kalyan, Bhiwandi and Bassein in the Thana District, after the Town and Island of Bombay and the Bombay Suburban District were declared Prohibition Areas with effect from 1st August 1939.

In Poona District too the consumption, especially of fermented liquor, has greatly increased. This increase was largely due to customers from the adjoining Prohibition Areas.

29. *Canteen Tenant System Licenses.*—The number of canteen tenant licenses issued at the beginning of the year under report fell to 36 [41], but subsequent to the introduction of Prohibition in certain areas of the Province the number increased to 44.

30. *Spirituos Medicinal and Toilet Preparations.*—Six firms (five already in existence and one newly opened during the year), in Bombay were manufacturing spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations in bond. The concessional rate of duty of Rs. 5 per proof gallon was levied on purely

medicinal preparations and a rate of Rs. 17-8-0 per proof gallon was levied on toilet preparations as against the full rate of Excise duty which is Rs. 25-10-0 per proof gallon. The total quantity of rectified spirit used in the manufacture of spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations in bond was 46,913 [40,879] proof gallons. Spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations were imported from Bengal and the Central Provinces, and the Baroda, Cochin and Bansda States.

31. *Rectified Spirit and Medicated Wines.*—The sales out of bond of rectified spirit and absolute alcohol were 977 [753] gallons (Column 14 of Imperial Return IV). The quantity of rectified spirit obtained free of duty by the Government Medical Stores, Bombay, from the Government Central Distillery, Nasik Road, was 24,848 [26,474] proof gallons. No accounts of medicated wines are required to be kept and hence Column 16 of Imperial Return IV is blank.

32. *Licenses.*—The number of licenses for the sale of foreign liquor decreased to 2,974 [3,258] at the beginning of the year (Columns 7, 8, and 21 to 30 of Imperial Return III), but after the enforcement of Prohibition in parts of the Province the number increased to 4,947.

As a measure for the furtherance of temperance, Government did not renew from the beginning of the year any of the permanent refreshment stall licenses granted for the sale of foreign liquor at cinemas and theatres. In view of the decision to discontinue issue of licenses for entertainments, only 22 temporary refreshment stall licenses were issued during the year compared with 345 in the previous year (Column 27 of Imperial Return III).

The increase of almost 1,500 in the total number of foreign liquor licenses issued during the year in comparison with those of the previous year was mainly due to the large number of licenses that were granted in prohibition areas for (i) the sale of eau-de-Cologne, (ii) the sale of brandy, rum, champagne, medicated wines, arishtas and asavas by chemists on medical prescriptions, and (iii) the possession of rectified and denatured spirits in excess of two quart bottles for use in arts and industries (Columns 28 and 29 of Imperial Return III). Such licenses were not required previously, but were necessary on account of the restrictions imposed to enforce prohibition.

---

## CHAPTER V.

### INTOXICATING DRUGS OTHER THAN OPIUM.

33. *Cultivation and Outturn of Ganja.*—The cultivation of hemp for the production of ganja was restricted to only one village of Mehekari in the Ahmednagar District. The number of licenses granted, the area

cultivated, and the quantity produced during the year under report as compared with the year 1938-39 were as follows:—

The average yield per acre was 12·4 maunds as against 8·6 maunds in the previous year. The increase in the average yield during the year under report was due to the timely rain and favourable climatic conditions throughout the season.

The most noticeable decrease in the consumption of ganja was in Broach, Bombay, Kanara, Dharwar, Sholapur, Satara, Poona, Ahmednagar

and East Khandesh districts. The decrease in Broach, Bombay, Kanara, and Ahmednagar districts was due to the introduction of Prohibition measures. The decrease in Dharwar District was due to the closure of 6 hemp drugs shops, while high selling prices charged by licensees and the reduced purchasing capacity of the people were responsible for the fall in consumption in Sholapur, Satara, Poona and East Khandesh districts. There was also a fall in the consumption of bhang and charas in Ahmedabad and Bombay owing to Prohibition. In Sholapur and East Khandesh however sales of bhang increased. The increase was due to substitution of bhang for ganja on account of the high price of ganja. The decrease in other districts is small.

36. *Revenue*.—The revenue from intoxicating drugs is derived from—

- (1) quantitative duties on—
  - (a) issues from warehouses, and
  - (b) imports from other Provinces,
 and
- (2) license fees.

The duty and license fees amounted to Rs. 6,25,597 [10,21,579] and Rs. 4,21,541 [5,44,955] respectively.

37. *Vend licenses*.—The number of vend licenses at the beginning of the year under report was 669 [693]. Of these 20 were wholesale and 649 retail. 94 retail shops were closed during the year under report on account of the extension of Prohibition measures to some of the districts, thus reducing the total number of licenses to 575 [682]. There was at the beginning of the year 1 Government depot for the sale of hemp drugs at Ahmedabad. 11 additional depots were opened during the course of the year, i.e., 3 at Ahmedabad, 3 in Bombay Suburban District, and 5 in the Town and Island of Bombay.

---

## CHAPTER VI.

### DANGEROUS DRUGS.

38. *Vend licenses*.—During the year under report the number of licenses granted was as follows :—

(1) 193 [181] D.D.1 licenses for the manufacture, possession and sale of manufactured drugs otherwise than on prescription. The number increased to 199 after the introduction of Prohibition measures in the various parts of the Province.

(2) 1,346 [1,100] D.D.2 licenses for the possession and sale on prescription of manufactured drugs. The number rose to 1,364 after the measures taken in various parts of the Province for the enforcement of Prohibition.

(3) 222 [270] D.D.3 authorisations to approved practitioners for the possession of coca derivatives for use in exercise of their profession but not for sale.

39. *Imports and issues in the Province.*—The quantity of cocaine and its allied drugs imported during the year under review fell to 7 lbs. 10 ozs. 64½ grains (Avoirdupois standard weight) [9 lbs. 14 ozs. 329 grains). The quantity sold under licenses decreased to 11 lbs. 5 ozs. 66½ grains [17 lbs. 15 ozs. 347 grains]. The statistics of cocaine transactions are given below :—

## CHAPTER VII.

### OPIMUM.

40. *Realizations from opium issued from depots.*—Opium issued from Depots realised Rs. 9,11,115 as shown in the District Treasury accounts plus a sum of Rs. 1,416 representing the gain on opium supplied to Zanzibar. Of this sum, Rs. 1,99,855 represented the cost price paid to the Government of the United Provinces, and the balance of Rs. 7,11,260 was the gain on sales. From the last figure, namely Rs. 7,11,260 an expenditure of Rs. 5,171 representing the conveyance and packing charges of opium, has to be deducted. The net profit to Government thus amounted to Rs. 7,06,089 (inclusive of duty) [7,22,394].

41. *Sales in British Districts.*—The total issues in British Districts amounted to 10,877 seers [13,084] (column 17 of Imperial Return IV) and actual sales were 10,931 seers [13,159]. The decrease of 2,228 seers was due to a fall in consumption in all the Districts of the Province except Dharwar, Bijapur, Poona and Nasik. The decrease is attributed mainly to the extension and introduction of Prohibition measures in certain parts of the Province, and partly to the high selling rates charged by licensees and also in certain areas to poor economic conditions. In the Thana District the increase in consumption of 61 seers is chiefly due to the attraction of Bombay custom to certain parts of the Thana District, when the Town and Island of Bombay and Bombay Suburban

District were declared Prohibition Areas with effect from 1st August 1939. In Poona and Nasik districts the rise of 121 and 53 seers respectively was due to the low selling rates prevailing at some shops in the districts. The variation in other districts is very small and needs no comment.

42. *License Fees.*—The fees realised for retail vend in British Districts fell to Rs. 5,22,130 [7,32,194] (column 26 of Imperial Return I). The decrease is due partly to the enforcement of Prohibition measures in certain areas of the Province and partly to less realisations at the auctions for want of competition.

43. *Retail shops.*—The total number of licenses for sale of opium fell to 661 [673] at the beginning of the year under report as shown in column 31 of Imperial Return III. The total number of licenses discontinued in the beginning was 12 of which 9 were closed in Ahmedabad District and one in each of the districts of Dharwar, Kaira and East Khandesh. The number decreased further to 575 after introduction of Prohibition in certain areas of the Province. Thus at the end of the year under report the total number of licenses was 575. In the beginning there was one Government Depot at Ahmedabad for the sale of opium, but on the extension of Prohibition measures the number rose to 13.

44. *Supplies to Indian States.*—The total quantity of opium supplied to Indian States was 4,100 seers [4,461].

45. *Manufacture and issue in Baroda State.*—The area under poppy cultivation in Baroda State was 248 acres 19 gunthas [253 acres 8 gunthas]. The opium in hand at the commencement of the year was 30,075 seers and that manufactured during the year under report was 927 seers. The total issues to licensed dealers fell to 2,555 seers [2,797]. The stock held at the end of the year was 28,148 seers exclusive of 299 seers loss by dryage.

46. *Total Excise Opium Revenue.*—The Excise opium revenue was Rs. 14,33,245 [17,33,376]. The decrease of Rs. 3,00,131 was mainly due to the introduction of Prohibition and to some extent to the low bids realised at the auctions.

47. *Consumption of Opium for Veterinary and quasi-veterinary use.*—The quantity of opium used for veterinary and quasi-veterinary purposes during the year under review was 37 lbs. 11 ozs. 12 drs. and 16  $\frac{31}{800}$  grains [41 lbs. 14 ozs. 2 drs. 17  $\frac{1}{16}$  grs.]

48. *Measures to check the administration of Opium to children.*—The Bombay Presidency Health and Baby Week Association continued their activities, as in previous years, to warn mothers against the danger of administering opium to babies. Warnings were given by means of magic lantern lectures on infant welfare, by health talks to mothers, and by demonstration of cinema films on maternity and child welfare. The Association held three exhibitions and six cinema shows in Bombay City for the benefit of industrial workers. There are 50 centres in the Province where maternity and child welfare work is done, and the health visitors in charge of these centres are instructing mothers not to drug

babies with opium. The Lady Inspector of Factories reports through the Chief Inspector of Factories, Bombay, that 628 children attended creches in Bombay in the year under report against 605 in the previous year. In 115 cases opium drugging is reported to have stopped.

## CHAPTER VIII.

### FINANCIAL RESULTS.

49. *Revenue.*—The gross realisations for the year (Imperial Return I) are contrasted below with those of the previous year :—

50. *Expenditure*.—Exclusive of compensation paid to Indian States in respect of their Abkari and Hemp Drugs leases (Rs. 5,24,041), the expenditure for the year (Imperial Return II) was Rs. 31,44,278 [35,33,198]. The decrease is due (i) to the discontinuance of the payment of the compensations (a) to the Bombay Municipality for loss of revenue which it previously derived from shop licenses (Rs. 1,43,750) and (b) to the District Local Boards in the Province in lieu of one anna cess on Excise revenue which they were formerly allowed (Rs. 6,185) and (ii) to decreased expenditure under “Contingencies and Special charges other than Rewards” (Rs. 2,49,342). The figures of expenditure include the price paid to the Government of the United Provinces for opium supplied to the Department, and the charges for Excise establishment in Collectors’ offices paid by book adjustment to the head “25, General Administration”. The cost of opium is fully recouped from the sale proceeds of opium. The gross expenditure including the compensation paid to Indian States referred to above, amounted to Rs. 36,68,319 [Rs. 40,64,542]. If the item relating to the cost of opium is excluded, it being fully recouped in the sales to licensees and others, the gross expenditure would be Rs. 33,91,591 [37,39,003]. The net revenue of the year after deducting refunds (Rs. 1,71,964) and the gross expenditure (Rs. 36,68,319) from the gross revenue (Rs. 1,99,16,213), decreased by Rs. 84,08,784, i.e., from Rs. 2,44,84,714 to Rs. 1,60,75,930.

51. *Recovery of Excise revenue by coercive process*.—Coercive processes had to be resorted to for the recovery of Excise revenue in all the districts of the Province except Surat, Broach and Panch Mahals and Ahmedabad.

52. The details of the arrears outstanding, collections made during the year and the balance to be recovered, will be found in columns 3, 6 and 10 respectively of Appendix “E” to this report. The total amount of arrears at the beginning of the year was Rs. 4,00,472. Out of this Rs. 1,65,370 were collected during the year under report, and Rs. 39,953 were written off as irrecoverable. The net arrears at the end of the year, including those for the previous year, amounted to Rs. 3,75,652, the chief arrears being in the districts of West Khandesh (Rs. 54,070), Belgaum (Rs. 45,053), Thana (Rs. 35,958), East Khandesh (Rs. 32,185), Kolaba (Rs. 32,041), Sholapur (Rs. 27,733) and Poona (Rs. 23,256). The remissions and amounts written off show an appreciable decrease, the total amount being only Rs. 39,953 as against Rs. 1,16,626 in the last year.

## CHAPTER IX.

### OFFENCES.

*(Exclusive of the Offences detected by the Police Department in the Bombay Prohibition Area from 1st August 1939.)*

53. *Offences against the Abkari Law*.—The total number of cases detected was 8,714 [7,857]. Of these 6,788 [6,955] related to liquor,



and 1,921 [899] to hemp drugs. Details will be found in columns 8 and 14 of Appendix "F".

54. *Liquor cases.*—The total number of liquor cases detected during the year under report shows a decrease of 167 cases compared with those of the previous year. The number of cases detected under "illicit distillation" shows a decrease of 485, the number of such cases detected during the year under report being 3,091 (3,576). The decrease was mainly in the districts of Thana (217), West Khandesh (181), Panch Mahals (93), Nasik (66), Bijapur (57), Surat (51), and Ahmedabad (30). The decrease was however counter-balanced to some extent by an increase in the District of Kaira (160) and the Town and Island of Bombay (97).

The decreases in the number of detected cases of illicit distillation were due to a variety of causes operating in each District.

In Thana the departmental collection of mhowra flowers reduced the quantity of that base available for distillation in certain areas. But in those parts of the District where molasses is available as a base, the inadequacy of the Excise staff reduced the possibilities of detection.

In West Khandesh also departmental collection decreased the possibilities of detection. There was also an increased tendency to distillation in the forest where it is more difficult to detect than in the villages.

In Panch Mahals offences decreased owing to a poor mhowra flower season.

In Nasik offences declined owing to the introduction of the fixed fee system in the Peint Mahal, in consequence of which sales of licit liquor increased considerably.

In Bijapur patrolling was effective in keeping down excise offences.

In Surat the failure of the mhowra crop took away the distilling base.

In Ahmedabad also the mhowra crop failed. Cheap liquor obtainable in adjoining States reduced the attractions of illicit distillation. The establishment of an outpost at Adalaj gave additional facilities for detection.

The increase in the Kaira District was due to the greater vigilance of the Excise staff.

The number of cases of illicit distillation detected in the Town and Island of Bombay was 102 (5). Cases under "illicit importation, exportation and transportation" increased to 426 [407]. Those under "illicit possession" increased to 2,564 [1,840] and those under "unlicensed sale" decreased to 106 [134]. Cases under "other miscellaneous offences" decreased to 601 [998].

*Cases of drunkenness.*—Convictions for drunkenness numbered 2,656 [2,661] (Appendix "G", columns 2 and 3). Of these 864 [1,422] occurred in Bombay City.

55. *Hemp Drugs cases.*—The number of cases relating to hemp drugs increased to 1,921 [899]. The increase was mainly in the Town and Island of Bombay (625), the districts of Ahmedabad (376), Ahmednagar (62) and Kanara (32). The increase in the Town and Island of Bombay, and in the districts of Ahmedabad and Ahmednagar was due to the Prohibition measures, and that in the Kanara District was due to the detection of many cases of possession of ganja in excess of the prescribed limit by the pilgrims going to Gokarn for the Mahashivaratri fair.

56. *Cocaine cases.*—Cases relating to cocaine were 5 [5]. The cocaine traffic was mainly confined to Ahmedabad where 4 [0] cases were detected. The total quantity of cocaine seized amounted to 24 ozs. 397½ grains [7 ozs. 165 grs.]

57. *Offences against the Opium Law.*—The number of opium cases detected in British territory was 1,358 [688] (column 29, Appendix "F"). The number of cases of illicit possession detected in British territory was 1,032 [475], and that of cultivation, manufacture and illicit sale was 51 [41], 62 [36] and 49 [30] respectively. The number of cases of illegal import increased to 110 [63]. Six cases of transport of opium were detected in Bombay, and in the districts of Surat and Ahmednagar during the year under report. There were no cases of illegal export of opium during the year under report. The contraband opium seized in British territory amounted to 54 seers, 15 tolas and 170 ⅝ grains [75 seers, 7 tolas and 161 grains].

58. *The Excise Intelligence Bureau.*—The Excise Intelligence Bureau continued to compile and disseminate information regarding the movements and methods of inter-provincial smugglers and offences against the Excise, Opium and Dangerous Drugs Laws.

The Finger Print Branch of the Bureau received during the year 1,864 [436] finger impression slips of excise offenders for identification. Previous convictions were traced in 198 [53] instances. At the close\* of the year the Bureau had on its records finger prints slips of about 37,475 excise convicts.

59. *Allegations of corruption.*—Six cases of allegations of corruption against ten members of the constabulary staff of this Department were enquired into during the year. Of these, two allegations involving three constables were not proved.

An Excise constable was dismissed from service for receiving illegal gratification from a drug dealer. One Excise Naik died before the enquiry was completed. The remaining five men were either reduced or suitably fined.

## CHAPTER X.

THE DRY AND PROHIBITION AREA SCHEMES AND OTHER  
PROHIBITION MEASURES.*Bombay Prohibition Area Scheme.*

60. With effect from 1st August 1939 Prohibition was introduced into the Town and Island of Bombay, the Bombay Suburban District and that part of the Thana Mahal which is encircled by the Thana-Bassein Creek.

The summarized details of the system introduced were :

(a) All country liquor, toddy, hemp drugs and opium shops were closed.

(b) The import or transport into the area of country liquor, toddy, hemp, or opium except for through transport, or on behalf of Government, or under special permission from the Commissioner was prohibited.

(c) The possession of toddy or charas within the area by any person was also prohibited. Similarly the possession of country liquor was forbidden except for sacramental purposes by the Parsees. The possession of foreign liquor, including tonic wines, arishtas, asavas and the like was prohibited, except under a permit or a prescription from a Registered Medical Practitioner or approved practitioner. The possession in any quantity of ganja, bhang or opium was likewise prohibited except under a permit or license.

(d) The number of shops for the retail and wholesale sale of foreign liquor was drastically curtailed. The holders of wholesale licenses, were required to maintain Excise establishment for supervising their operations.

(e) Five Departmental Drugs Depots in the Town and Island of Bombay and one each at Kurla, Thana, and Bandra were opened for the sale in sealed packets of drugs to addicts holding permits granted on the recommendation of a Government doctor.

61. A system for the possession of foreign liquor by holders of permits and authorisations was introduced.

Two Committees were appointed, one for recommending the grant of foreign liquor permits to persons of non-Indian domicile, and the other comprising eminent doctors in Bombay for recommending the grant of foreign liquor permits to Indians on grounds of health.

Persons of non-Indian domicile could, on recommendation, obtain from a retail "off" shop 7 units per month, a unit being equal to :

1 quart bottle of spirits of 26 $\frac{2}{3}$  ozs.,

or

3 quart bottles of wine or vermouth,

or

9 quart bottles of beer, cider or stout

or any smaller quantities of the above making up one unit.

A person of Indian domicile could subject to the maximum of 7 units, obtain the quantities recommended by the Medical Committee.

Rulers of Indian States and Ambassadors and Diplomatic Envoys and Consuls of foreign States visiting the Prohibition Area were granted foreign liquor permits under orders of Government in each case, subject to the limitation of 7 units.

Temporary permits available for 7 days and on renewal for 7 days more, were granted to persons of non-Indian domicile making a short stay in Bombay. The quantity of foreign liquor allowed for consumption was limited to  $1\frac{1}{2}$  units for the week.

Special arrangements were made at certain Railway Stations and at the Ballard Pier to issue permits to visitors in order to save them from having to proceed to the Permit Office.

Arrangements were also made to issue such permits at three leading Bombay Hotels.

62. The rates of assessment on retail sale of foreign liquor were increased to :

- Rs. 24 per dozen quarts of spirits,
- Rs. 8 per dozen quarts of wines,
- Rs. 2-4-0 per dozen quarts of fermented liquors.

63. Permits for the use of foreign liquor were issued as under :—

(a) *To persons of Non-Indian Domicile—*

64. A Government doctor was appointed at the J. J. Hospital to examine applicants and to make recommendations for the grant of drug permits. Only one drug could be recommended and that too within the maximum prescribed by Government. No permits were granted to minors.

The following number of drugs permits were issued from 1st August 1939 to 31st March 1940 :—

65. Authorities to possess foreign and country liquor for sacramental purposes were given to Priests and private persons of the Parsi community in accordance with the recommendations of a Committee representing that community.

Authorities to possess port wine, Palestine wine or raisin wine were granted to members of the Jewish community in accordance with the recommendations of a Committee representing that community.

Such authorities were issued monthly.

I desire to express my appreciation of the assistance given by those Committees.

Authorities for sacramental wine for members of the Christian community were given for the period ending at the close of the year.

66. Small quantities of brandy, rum, champagne or stout for medicinal purposes were allowed to be purchased from licensed chemists on prescriptions from Registered Medical Practitioners or approved practitioners.

Similarly tonic wines and arishtas and asavas could be obtained from licensed chemists on medical prescription from Registered Medical Practitioners or approved practitioners, the quantities allowed on each prescription being restricted to one quart bottle.

67. A Committee was appointed, under the Chairmanship of the Surgeon-General with the Government of Bombay, to classify preparations containing spirit for the purposes of determining what Excise restrictions were required to be imposed on sale. The members of the Committee comprised the Chemical Analyser to Government, one member nominated by the Bombay Medical Council, two members nominated by Government from amongst the manufacturers and importers of pharmaceutical and toilet preparations, and one member nominated by Government to represent Vaidyas and Hakims.

68. Possession of rectified spirit including absolute alcohol and commercial spirits e.g., methyl, amyl, butyl, isopropyl and the like in any quantity, without a permit from the Excise Department was prohibited; and licenses or permits for the possession and use of these for scientific, industrial, medical and medicinal purposes were devised.

The sale of eau-de-Cologne without an Excise license was also forbidden.

69. The following clubs were permitted to stock foreign liquor on behalf of their permit holding members according to the "units" allocated by each such member, and to serve the foreign liquor to the

permit holding members and their guests holding similar permits :

- (1) Royal Bombay Yacht Club.
- (2) Bombay Club.
- (3) Byculla Club.
- (4) Bombay Gymkhana.
- (5) Wodehouse Club.
- (6) Japanese Club.
- (7) United Services Club.

70. The public were requested to declare their stocks of intoxicants purchased and possessed by them prior to 1st August 1939, and arrangements were made for the deposit of the stock beyond a limit prescribed by the Commissioner at either the Sewri or Thana Liquor Warehouse.

71. The Preventive Excise work in the area was transferred to the Police and a number of Excise Officers and Constables were transferred to the Police Department. Some men from the constabulary staff were transferred to Ahmednagar and Broach Prohibition Areas.

72. The Excise charges in the Prohibition Area were, as a result of the transfer of the above work to the Police, reorganised as described below :

#### I. IN BOMBAY.

The old 16 Divisions in Bombay were reduced to 5 Divisions, and three additional posts for foreign liquor and drugs permit offices and Foreign Liquor Bonded Warehouses were created. All the Divisional Sub-Inspectors were withdrawn, except at Railway Stations, but Officers were posted at all the Bonded Warehouses of the Trade and Import licensees. The Liquor Warehouse, Sewri, was closed for issue of Liquor to the licensees, and the three Sub-Inspectors were reduced, but a post of an Assistant Inspector was created.

#### II. IN BOMBAY SUBURBAN DISTRICT.

The posts of Sub-Inspectors at Bandra and Borivli were abolished.

#### III. IN THANA.

The Sub-Inspector, Thana, was transferred to Dombivli.

The liquor warehouse at Thana was closed for issue of liquor to licensees, but continued to be a supply depot for the coastal warehouses.

The Departmental Drugs Depot was located in the Warehouse, and the post of the Sub-Inspector was converted into that of an Assistant Inspector.

73. Two Boards, one called the Prohibition Propaganda Board and the other Central Board of Prohibition Volunteers were constituted for the purposes of carrying on Prohibition propaganda, and for assisting the Police in the performance of their preventive work.

These organisations carried on an extensive propaganda and greatly assisted the work of Prohibition. Accounts of the work done by them have appeared in periodical reviews published by them.

74. The following special arrangements were made to protect the Prohibition arrangements in Greater Bombay and Thana. Certain country liquor, opium and hemp drugs shops were auctioned for 1939-40 subject to the condition that the ration should be based on the average sale at the shops for the last three years plus 10 per cent. and that the allocation of the ration should be monthly. The only liquor shops so rationed were 10 in Bassein Taluka ; 4 in Kalyan Taluka ; 2 in Bhiwandi Taluka ; and 1 in Thana Mahal. The opium, hemp and drugs shops in Bassein, Virar and Kalyan towns were similarly rationed.

75. There was a big increase in the consumption of country liquor in the tracts abutting upon the Bombay Prohibition Area in the south and west. On Saturdays and Sundays particularly large numbers of persons belonging to the classes who form the chief consumers of country liquor, went by steamer across the harbour to Mora in the Uran Petha in the Kolaba District, and by train or motor omnibus to such places as Kalyan, Bhiwandi and Bassein in the west of Thana District.

Special Excise arrangements were found necessary in both south and west to deal with this increased consumption. Demand for increased rations by licensees in several cases was refused.

In order to check illicit sales in the Uran Petha a Sub-Inspector was appointed for about two months on special duty. Subsequently a Havildar with a party from Panwel was put on special duty at Mora.

76. The Prohibition Research Advisory Board was appointed to investigate the effects of prohibition within the Bombay Prohibition Area. In view of the fact that the Commissioner of Excise was subsequently appointed Chairman of the Committee, it would not be advisable for me to prejudice the issue by making any remarks at this stage.

But those anxious to ascertain some of the results of Prohibition may have recourse to the administration report for the year ended 31st December 1939 by the Police Commissioner of Bombay, who was in charge of the preventive work arising out of the policy.

*Ahmedabad Dry and Prohibition Area Schemes.*

77. The Dry Area system introduced from 21st July 1938 was continued up to 31st July 1939 in Ahmedabad City, Cantonment and 27 surrounding villages. With effect from 1st August 1939 the system was changed from the Dry Area Scheme to the Prohibition Area Scheme and extended to the whole of the Daskroi Taluka.

The details of the Prohibition scheme put into force from 1st August 1939 were generally similar to those of the Bombay Prohibition Area, as a result of which the following alterations were effected in the Dry Area arrangements in existence up to 31st July 1939:

(a) Import, export, transport and possession of charas and toddy were prohibited.

(b) The country liquor permit system was discontinued except for the Parsees for sacramental purposes.

(c) The issue of foreign liquor permits to persons of Indian domicile was stopped except on grounds of health.

(d) Licenses granted to clubs for the sale of foreign liquor to their members and their guests holding permits were discontinued, but the Ahmedabad Gymkhana was allowed to serve liquor on the premises of the club to their permit holding members within the quantities (units) allocated by them to the club.

(e) Three additional departmental drugs depots at Adalaj, Kanbha and Nandej were opened in the Daskroi Taluka. They were subsequently closed from 29th February 1940 as the sales were found to be negligible.

(f) The sale of eau-de-Cologne was licensed.

(g) The rates of assessment on retail sale of foreign liquor were increased, as in the case of Bombay to:

Rs. 24-0-0 per dozen quarts of spirits.

Rs. 8-0-0 per dozen quarts of wines.

Rs. 2-4-0 per dozen quarts of foreign fermented liquors.

(h) five country liquor shops, three hemp drugs shops and nine opium shops were closed in the Ahmedabad District.

78. -With the object of protecting the Prohibition arrangements in the Ahmedabad District the country liquor shops at Kanij, Radhu and Navagaon, and the opium shop at Navagaon in the Kaira District were closed. Similarly the country liquor shops in the towns of Kaira, Mehmedabad, Matar and Nadiad were closed, and a Government depot



at each of the places was opened where liquor in sealed quart bottles was sold for "off" consumption. The Government Depots commenced working from 1st August 1939.

Unlike Bombay, the Excise preventive work remained with the Excise Department and some additional Excise staff was sanctioned with effect from 1st August 1939.

79. The following table shows the number of permits and authorisations for country liquor, toddy, foreign liquor, hemp drugs and opium issued during the period from (1) 1st April 1939 to 31st July 1939 and (2) 1st August 1939 to 31st March 1940 :

*Broach Dry and Prohibition Area Schemes.*

81. The Dry Area scheme introduced from 1st April 1938 was in force in Jambusar and Wagra Talukas of the Broach and Panch Mahals District up to 31st August 1939. With effect from 1st September 1939, Prohibition was introduced into the Broach Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District throughout the talukas of the Jambusar, Wagra, Broach and Ankleshwar. The following were the principal arrangements :—

(a) All country liquor, toddy including booths, hemp drugs and opium shops in the Broach and Ankleshwar Talukas were closed, those in Jambusar and Wagra having already been closed during the previous year. A retail "off" shop was retained at Broach and all other shops in the Sub-Division were closed. No liquor or drugs for private consumption was allowed to be brought from outside.

(b) The rates of assessment on retail sale of foreign liquor were, however, retained at the old rates, namely :

(c) A shopless zone of about three miles was created round the area and country liquor, toddy including tree-foot booths, hemp drugs and opium shops in the Kaira and Surat Districts falling within the radius of 3 miles were either closed or transferred to other places.

(d) Departmental drugs depots were opened in the offices of the Mamlatdars, Jambusar, Wagra, Broach and Ankleshwar where opium, ganja and bhang in sealed packets were issued to addicts holding drugs permits granted on the recommendation of the local Registered Medical Practitioners.

(e) The Prohibition preventive as well as propaganda work remained with the Excise Department.

The post of the Excise Inspector, Broach, was converted into a Chief Inspector's post and a small additional staff was sanctioned.

The Liquor Warehouse, Broach, was closed.

(f) The following figures show the number of permits issued in the Prohibition Area during the year under report :—

82. During the first five months of the Financial year under report Newasa and Shevgaon talukas with Pathardi Mahal continued to be Dry Areas. With effect from 1st September 1939 they were converted into Prohibition Areas and the remaining talukas of the Ahmednagar District, except Akola Taluka and Jamkhed Mahal, were declared Dry Areas.

83. The following arrangements were introduced. All the country liquor, hemp drugs, opium and toddy shops including tree-foot booths in the newly created Dry Areas were closed; and Excise and opium shops in the Poona and Sholapur and Nasik districts coming within a radius of 3 miles of the Dry Area were either closed or transferred to other places.

All the foreign liquor shops in the Dry Area with the exception of one "off" and one "on" shops were closed. These two shops which are in Ahmednagar Cantonment were allowed to sell foreign liquor to troops and persons holding permits only.

The Ghodnadi opium and hemp drugs shops and the Dhond opium and hemp drugs shops were rationed on the basis of sales for the past three years, while the Dhond country liquor shop was auctioned for 3 months in the first instance, with a ration calculated on the basis of the average sales for the three months of the corresponding period of the past three years.

The country liquor shop at Ghodnadi in the Poona District was closed and converted into a Departmental depot where 40° U.P. and 60° U.P. plain and 25° U.P. and 40° U.P. masala liquor was sold in sealed quart bottles at fixed selling prices. The country liquor border shops were also allowed to sell country liquor in sealed bottles.

The transport of country liquor within the prescribed free limits was allowed only in quart bottles bearing Government seals or capsules.

84. The Liquor Warehouse, Ahmednagar, was closed for the issue of country liquor to licensees, but a packing depot for packing drugs to be sold to addicts was opened there. The post of the Excise Inspector was transferred elsewhere.

85. The Excise territorial charges were redistributed, and the post of the Excise Inspector, Ahmednagar, converted into that of a Chief Excise Inspector with jurisdiction over the Dry and Prohibition Areas. There was also a small increase in the staff.

86. The following figures show the number of permits and authorisations issued for the purchase, possession and consumption of

intoxicants in the Prohibition Areas and Dry Areas during the year under report :—

*Kanara Dry and Prohibition Area Schemes.*

88. The Ankola and Kumta talukas of the Kanara District, which were brought under the Dry Area Scheme during the last year, remained Dry Areas up to 31st August 1939 when they were made into Prohibition Areas and the rest of the Kanara District was turned into a Dry Area.

As a result of the above conversion all the Excise shops in the rest of the Kanara District that were running up to 31st August 1939 were on 1st September 1939 closed and departmental drugs depôts in Mamlatdars' and Mahalkaris' offices were opened for the sale of the drugs to drug addicts.

A shopless belt of three miles was created round the Dry Area by the closure or transfer of Excise shops in the adjoining Belgaum and Dharwar Districts, while the sale of country liquor in sealed bottles for transport into Dry Areas was allowed at 5 shops in the Dharwar District and one shop in the Belgaum District.

89. Other features of the systems were as follows :—

(a) The Liquor Warehouses at Kumta, Kodibag and Sirsi were closed with effect from 1st September 1939.

(b) The post of the Excise Inspector, Karwar, was converted into that of a Chief Inspector with jurisdiction over the whole district. The constabulary staff was augmented to some extent.

(c) The number of permits and authorisations issued for the purchase, possession and use of intoxicants in the Prohibition areas and Dry Areas during the year under report were as follows :—

90. The Bardoli Total Prohibition Scheme described in paragraph 60 of the Excise Administration Report for 1938-39 was, with effect from 1st April 1939, extended to Valod Mahal.

A shopless belt of three miles was created round the Total Prohibition Area, and some of the Excise and Opium shops in the Mandvi and Jalalpur Talukas falling within the belt were closed while some were transferred to other places.

REVIEW OF PROHIBITION AND DRY AREA SYSTEMS OUTSIDE  
GREATER BOMBAY.

92. In all the different systems the Excise force has shown much resourcefulness and ingenuity in facing the difficulties which they have encountered. The degree of success achieved has naturally varied with the internal and external conditions of each area.

In Ahmedabad the local force has had the advantage of a larger and more developed organisation than in the other centres. In Ahmedabad alone it has been possible to surround the principal area of liquor consumption with a cordon of outposts, which facilitate a complete system of patrol. In consequence the import of country liquor inside the cordon was efficiently prevented, and the chief difficulties experienced were confined to those of drug smuggling, which is always hard to stop on account of the ease with which drugs can be concealed.

Since August 1939 the position as regards country liquor has become more difficult owing to the inclusion of the old North and South Daskroi Talukas in the prohibition area. This has greatly increased the size of the frontier to be guarded. It was impossible to throw a cordon round the enlarged area. Therefore the internal cordon has been preserved unchanged, and the northern frontier is protected by various outposts placed as near the frontier as conditions admit. There has been a considerable increase in the number of offences of illicit importation and possession of illicit liquor, which have been detected. This is natural in view of the much greater area brought under control since the end of the period covered by last year's report. But the conclusions regarding the general efficiency of the scheme, as enunciated last year, continue to hold good.

93. The chief feature of the Ahmednagar and Kanara systems is the fact that the Prohibition and Dry Areas are traversed by large main roads, and much of the work of the Excise force consists in the control exercised at the points where the roads enter the area by preventing import of contraband.

In the Broach and Kanara Districts one of the principal difficulties to be encountered is smuggling by water. In Thana, which abounds in waterways, preventive control is with the Police. But in Broach the Excise Department has to check smuggling by the Narbada River into Broach City; and in Kanara they have to guard against smuggling both by sea and by creek.

In all these four systems the staff is not adequate to supply a cordon, and smuggling on the frontiers away from the main roads has to be controlled by such patrol system as the size of the staff renders practicable.

94. It is not possible for the Excise Department to advance conclusions as regards the beneficial effect of the Prohibition or Dry Area

systems on the health or domestic budgets of the people among whom the systems are operated. Such conclusions must be based on statistics, and the small Excise forces operating these systems have such a multiplicity of duties that it is impossible for them to supply evidence for drawing comprehensive conclusions about the wide areas under administration. In recognition of this fact Government has instituted Prohibition Research Advisory Boards to investigate in Bombay and Gujerat the social and economic effects of Prohibition.

95. The extent of the results reached by the Department can be estimated to some extent by reference to the tables embodied in this report, which give the figures of convictions obtained for infringement of Excise law. But these figures can only be effectively interpreted by a realisation of the immense extent of the boundary lines which have to be protected night and day, and of the effort and work involved in protection by small detachments of officers and men distributed over the vast forests and plains of the Province.

The work of the Department can be much reduced by help from the public. In Ahmedabad, as in Bombay, the effect of propaganda against drink and drugs has much facilitated the efforts of the preventive section. Similar propaganda in other areas would be of the greatest assistance, as the essence of a Prohibition system is instruction as well as prevention.

## CHAPTER XI.

### GENERAL REMARKS.

96. *Revenue.*—There was a decrease of Rs. 88·07 lakhs in the gross revenue. This decrease was evident generally under all heads of excise revenue except under “Commercial spirits (including medicated wines)” and “Miscellaneous”. The decreases were under country spirit (51·37), toddy (18·83), foreign liquor (excluding commercial spirits) (4·63), hemp drugs (5·20), opium (3·00), fines and forfeitures (0·11) and commercial undertakings (6·30). The increases were under Commercial spirits (0·42) and Miscellaneous (0·96).

97. *Consumption.*—There was a decrease in the consumption of all kinds of liquors and drugs in the Province which can be attributed mainly to the introduction of prohibition measures. Other factors which also contributed to the decrease are mentioned below.

In the case of country spirit, there was a decrease of about 2·80 lakhs proof gallons. This decrease was mainly in the Districts of Ahmedabad, Broach, Bombay Suburban District, Bombay and Kanara where prohibition measures were introduced.

The following is a comparative statement showing the consumption of country spirit in the rural and urban areas of the Province during each of the years 1929-30 and 1935-36 to 1939-40 :—

There was a decrease of 27·61 lakhs gallons in the consumption of toddy.

There was a fall in the consumption of all kinds of foreign liquor, namely, under fermented liquor, 350,213 bulk gallons, wines 9,593 bulk gallons, potable spirits 33,326 bulk gallons and non-potable spirits 67,226 bulk gallons.

The consumption of opium fell by 2,228 seers. This can be attributed partly to the high selling rates charged by some of the licensees as well as, to some extent, to the poor condition of the people.

The consumption of all the three kinds of intoxicating drugs, namely ganja, bhang and charas, showed a marked decrease. The decreases were ganja 5,471 seers, bhang 2,305 seers, and charas 4,694 seers. The decrease was partly due to the high selling prices charged by the licensees and to the reduced purchasing capacity of the people.

98. *Fixed maximum selling prices.*—The experiment of disposing of country liquor shops for a fixed fee with a maximum retail selling price, which was in force in the Panch Mahals Sub-Division of the Broach and Panch Mahals District, the Sugwa Range of the Kolaba District, the Nawapur Peta and part of the Nandurbar Taluka of the West Khandesh District and the Peint Mahal of the Nasik District, was continued in all these areas except at certain shops in the portion of the West Khandesh District referred to above.

The maximum selling prices for 60° U.P. liquor continued at 8 annas per bottle in all these areas except in the Nawapur Peta and part of the Nandurbar Taluka, where the selling rate was 7 annas per bottle and in Godhra Town where it was 11 annas per bottle.

99. *“The Dryad.”*—In February 1940 the building of the motor launch “The Dryad” was completed. The launch was designed for the preven-

tion of smuggling throughout the waterways of the Province over which the Excise Department has control. The launch was built by Messrs. Greaves Cotton & Co. Its measurements are—

and the Engine is 22½ B.H.P. Ruston Oil Engine. It was anticipated that it would prove of great service particularly in the Narbada River, in the Thana creeks and in the Kalanadi River in Kanara. "The Dryad" was launched on 25th January 1940 and is a most valuable addition to the Department for work either in the Prohibition and Dry Areas or in any other area where smuggling is apprehended. "The Dryad" was first sent to Broach and encountered rough weather in its first voyage, during which it proved itself thoroughly sea-worthy. It remained at Broach until the close of the year under report, patrolling the river to a point about ten miles east of the City.

I desire to express my appreciation of the kindness of Messrs. Greaves Cotton & Co., for their excellent and hospitable arrangements in connection with the launching, and for the assistance which they have given throughout in all matters affecting the equipment and welfare of "The Dryad".

100. *Refresher Course for Excise Officers and men in the constabulary staff.*—The following numbers of men were put through the Refresher Course under Police training during the year under report :—

In Ahmedabad the Excise force contains many constables with previous military experience. They can be employed in training less experienced men. It is unnecessary, therefore, to have recourse to Police instructors.

No refresher courses could be held for Officers during the year owing to the additional work imposed on them in prohibition areas and the general shortage of officers resulting from the exigencies of the new systems. But arrangements for revival of the refresher courses of officers were being made at the close of the year.

101. *Staff.*—I was in charge of the Department from 1st April 1939 to 27th September 1939 and again from 10th November 1939 to the

end of the year. Mr. H. F. Knight, C.I.E., I.C.S., held charge from 28th September 1939 to 3rd November 1939 and Mr. R. N. Samarth from 4th November 1939 to 9th November 1939.

Mr. D. Gershone retired from service after about two and half years work as Superintendent of Excise.

New and difficult duties were thrown on many branches of the Department throughout the Province by the wide extension of the prohibition areas. Also the sudden transfer of a number of permanent and acting officers from Excise to the Bombay City Police produced a temporary shortage of trained officers. Superintendents deserve much credit for the way in which they met these difficulties.

I wish to express my appreciation of the work of my Assistant, Mr. Samarth, and of the Chief Account Officer, Rao Saheb Nadkarni who gave me at all times the greatest assistance.

The Head Clerk and Sectional Heads of the Commissioner's Office all worked long hours at high pressure through a year of great administrative changes. Among them the work of Mr. Vadhavkar of the Prohibition Branch was especially praiseworthy.

In conclusion I wish to express my gratitude to Collectors of Prohibition Areas for their valuable advice and suggestions regarding the introduction and administration of the new Excise arrangements in their Districts.
