REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1930.

- 1. This report and the Statements appended to it relate to the Presidency proper and not to Sind.
- 2. Judicial Staff—(Statement No. 1).—The Judicial staff employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1930 and available for Civil cases consisted of 10 permanent High Court Judges and 1 temporary Additional Judge; 17 District Judges; 12 Assistant Judges (including 4 under training); a Chief Judge and 5 Judges (including one temporary Additional Judge) of the Presidency Small Cause Court; 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges; 22 First Class Subordinate Judges and 99 Second Class Subordinate Judges. In addition, the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Ahmedabad and Poona exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also 3 Inamdars and Jagirdars exercising the powers of a Subordinate Judge under Regulation XIII of 1830 and 93 Village Munsiffs appointed under the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, Act XVII of 1879.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE.

The Honourable Sir Amberson Barrington Marten, Knight, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 16th June 1930 and resigned from 17th June 1930.

The Honourable Sir John W. F. Beaumont, Knight, was appointed Chief Justice in succession to the Honourable Sir Amberson Barrington Marten and presided over the High Court from 20th June to 31st December 1930. During the interval the Honourable Mr. Justice G. D. Madgavkar, I.C.S., officiated as Chief Justice.

HIGH COURT.

I. ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

- 3. Original Suits for disposal—(Statement No. 3).—The number of civil suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of the year 1929 was 3,491 including 65 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number instituted during the year 1930 was 2,783 including 14 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 391 (including 1 suit received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) restored during the year. The above totals 3,491, 2,783 and 391 make an aggregate of 6,665 for disposal in 1930 as against 5,912 in 1929.
- 4. Original Suits disposed of—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits decided was 3,348 including 23 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 3,317 including 57 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. This number is 174 less than the corresponding number at the end of the previous year. Of those 3,317 suits, 2,158 were ripe for hearing and in arrear, a decrease of 182 suits over the figure of the previous year. There were 2,016 suits whose hearing had been pending for over one year. This is a decrease of 144 suits on the figures of the previous year.

Of the suits decided :-

426 were disposed of with contest.

The average duration of contested and uncontested suits disposed of in the year 1930 was 410 days and 302 days respectively.

6. Suits Instituted and Disposed of under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1929 was 13. - 11. References to take accounts, etc.—The number of references to take accounts, to make enquiries, as to estates to be administered or partitioned, as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on question of title or questions affecting minors in proposed terms of settlement, to settle conveyances, and in like matters, pending at the commencement of the year 1930 was 244, 209 references were filed in 1930 in the office of the Commissioner for taking accounts making a total of 453 for disposal. The number of references disposed of by him during the year 1930 was 290.
- 12. Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.—During the year 511 petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, 28 pauper petitions for leave to sue or defend in forma pauperis, 30 petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 36 petitions under the Indian Trust Act, 28 references under the Land Acquisition Act and 395 petitions under the Guardian and Wards, Lunacy and Arbitration Acts, etc., making in all 1,028, were filed for disposal.

- 13. Awards under the Indian Arbitration Act, 1899.—The number of awards filed during the year was 230.
- 14. Applications for execution of Decrees, etc.—The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 967 and the number of applications filed during the year was 2,192 making a total of 3,159 for disposal. Of these, 498 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts, in 230 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 186 satisfaction was obtained in part and 978 were wholly infructuous, making a total of 1,892 and 1,267 remained at the close of the year 1930.

Number of Darkhasts (Decrees or Orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 60. Number of Decrees received from the other Courts for execution during the year was 81.

^{25.} Results of appeals—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—Of the 267 appeals from Original Decrees decided, 58 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 209, the decrees of the lower Courts were confirmed in 156, modified in 19 and reversed in 31, and 3 cases were remanded. Of the 970 appeals from Appellate Decrees decided, 464 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 506, the decrees of the lower Courts were affirmed in 359, modified in 32, reversed in 104 and 11 cases were remanded.

(Statement No. 8).—Of the 74 appeals from orders decided, 21 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 53, the orders of the lower Courts were affirmed in 32, modified in 5, reversed in 14 and 2 cases were remanded.

CIVIL COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

- 29. Appeals instituted—(Statement No. 7).—5,417 appeals were instituted in 1930, showing a decrease of 241 as compared with the previous year. The number of appeals instituted was greater in 6 and smaller in 12 districts. There were noticeable increases in Poona (111), Broach (98), Dharwar (81) and West Khandesh (62). In the remaining 2 districts the variations were less than 50. The decrease on the other hand was noticeable in East Khandesh (147), Thana (132), Sholapur (113), Ratnagiri (68), Belgaum (63) and Ahmedabad (53). The remaining 5 districts show decreases below 30; while the institution in the Kaira district remained unchanged.
- 30. Appeals disposed of—(Statement Nos. 7 and 11).—6,037 appeals were disposed of during the year including 743 by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate Powers. These two figures are respectively greater by 246 and 110 than the corresponding figures of the previous year.

There was an increase in the disposals in thirteen districts, the greatest being in East Khandesh (298) followed by Nasik (267), Ratnagiri (171), Ahmednagar (162), Satara (131), Ahmedabad (115),

Kolaba (105), Kaira (82), West Khandesh (69) and Kanara (60). In the remaining three districts the increase was below 50. On the other hand there was a decrease in the disposals in five districts, the greatest being in Belgaum (263) followed by Sholapur (189) and Thana (136). In the remaining two districts the variations were less than 50.

31. Appeals pending—(Statement No. 7).—There were 4,813 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being less by 620 than at the end of 1929.

(Statement No. 14).—The number of appeals pending for more than a year fell from 1,102 to 1,053.

32. Results of appeals—(Statement No. 7).—The results of the decision of appeals in the lower Courts during the year were as follows:—

In 877 cases or 14.7 per cent. of the whole, the appeals were either summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, in 3,198 cases or 53.4 per cent. the judgments of the lower Courts were affirmed, in 701 or 11.7 per cent. they were modified, in 916 or 15.3 per cent. they were reversed and in the remaining 291 cases or 4.9 per cent. the appeals were remanded. Fifty-four appeals disposed of by the District Court at Sholapur, have not been taken into consideration in the above calculation, as the details of their disposals cannot be had owing to the destruction of records by fire.

- 33. The average duration of appeals in contested appeals in the lower appellate Courts was 360.9 while that in uncontested appeals was 80.8.
- 34. Miscellaneous appeals—(Statement No. 8).—520 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 177 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 697, 490 were disposed of during the year and 207 remained pending at its close. The number pending was more by 30 than in the previous year.
- 35. The average duration of days in contested miscellaneous appeals in the lower Appellate Courts was 160.5 whereas that in uncontested appeals was 56.5.

CIVIL COURTS IN THE MOFUSSIL SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

36. Changes in Jurisdiction.—During the year under report, a change was effected in the jurisdiction of one of the Civil Courts in the Presidency as under:—

The village of Ped hereto included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Vita in the Satara district was with effect from the 1st July 1930, excluded therefrom and included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Tasgaon in the said district. (Vide Government Notification, Home Department, No. 7054/2, dated the 14th June 1930.)

37. Original suits instituted—(Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1930, was 1,60,379 a decrease of 10,061 on the figures of the previous year.

The decrease occurred in money suits to the extent of 5.8 per cent., while it was of 8.9 per cent., in title and other suits, the number of money suits being 1,33,994 as against 1,42,334 in 1929 and that of title and other suits being 25,585 as against 28,106 in 1929. 800 suits instituted in the Courts at Sholapur have been excluded in the above calculation as their details are not available owing to the destruction of records by fire.

(Statement No. 4).—The total value of suits instituted in 1930 amounted to Rs. 5,61,46,905 an increase of Rs. 39,75,052 on the total for 1929.

38. Local distribution—(Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1930 showed an increase in 6 districts and a decrease in the remaining eleven districts. There was no appreciable increase in any of the six districts, being less than 500; but there was marked decrease in the districts of Kaira (2,794), East Khandesh (2,618), Ahmedabad (1,587) and Poona (1,100). In the remaining seven districts the decrease was below 1,000.

(Statement No. 3).—The largest number of suits instituted during the year was in East Khandesh (16,756). In no other district except Poona, West Khandesh, Nasik and Kaira did the institutions exceed 10,000. Institutions ranged between 5,000 to 10,000 in Ratnagiri, Dharwar, Belgaum, Sholapur, Bijapur, Ahmednagar, Satara, Thana, Surat, Broach and Ahmedabad. Kanara showed only 3,416 suits as nstituted while the lowest figure 3,076 came to the share of Kolaba.

39. Number of suits disposed of—(Statement No. 5).—In addition to the 1,60,379 suits instituted during the year and 73,938 suits pending from the previous year, 2,223 suits were revived or received on remand or review making a total of 2,36,540 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of during the year was 1,67,362 a decrease of 39 on the figure of the previous year.

Of the total number of suits during the year, viz., 1,67,362, Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals (that is, Courts of Subordinate Judges) disposed of 1,42,079 suits, Small Cause Courts 12,537, District Courts 533, Village Munsiffs' Courts 12,153 and the remaining 60 suits were decided by Unpaid Tribunals that is (Inamdars and Jagirdars).

40. Results of suits decided—(Statement No. 5).—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, excluding 319 suits disposed of by the Courts at Sholapur the details of which cannot be given owing to the destruction of records by fire, 21,937 or 13·1 per cent. were disposed of without trial; 66,638 or 39·9 per cent. without contest; 76,996 or 46·1 per cent. with contest and 1,472 or ·9 per cent. by compromise. Of the 76,996 suits decided on contest the details of 766 suits disposed of by the Courts at Sholapur, are not available for the same

reason; of the remaining 76,230, 69,533 or 91.2 per cent. resulted in favour of the Plaintiffs and 6,697 or 8.8 per cent. in favour of the Defendants.

- 41. Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jagirdars—(Statement No. 5).—The Unpaid Tribunals disposed of 60 original suits of which 31 were contested. In 1929 the figures were 76 and 47 respectively.
- 42. Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges-(Statement No. 5).-The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 1,42,079—a decrease of 1,855 on the figures of the previous year. The decrease is chiefly in the number of cases decided under the Small Cause Court Procedure and appears in uncontested suits only. The figures of suits decided under the ordinary procedure show an aggregate increase of 1,104 there being an increase of 854 in contested suits and a decrease of 66 in uncontested suits. So far as the suits decided under the ordinary procedure are concerned, the details of 316 suits decided by the Courts at Sholapur, are not available owing to the destruction of records by fire and hence they are excluded in the above calculation of contested and uncontested suits under the ordinary procedure. The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 77,925 and under the small cause procedure 64,154. Of these, 55:1 and 42.4 per cent., respectively were contested. The percentage of suits decided after contest both under the ordinary and the small cause procedure shows an increase of ·6 and 2·9 respectively as compared with that of the previous year.
- 43. Suits disposed of by Small Cause Court Judges—(Statement No. 5).—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 12,537 suits an increase of 725 on the total of the previous year's disposals. Of these, 8,368 were decided without contest and the remaining 4,169 suits with contest. The former shows an increase by 987 while the latter a decrease of 262 as against those shown in the previous year.
- 44. Suits disposed of by District and Assistant Judges—(Statement No. 5).—The District Courts disposed of 533 original suits of which 299 (53 more than last year) were contested.
- 45. Suits disposed of by the Village Munsiffs—(Statement No. 5).— The Village Munsiffs disposed of 12,153 suits out of which 3,989 were decided after contest.
- 46. Pending Suits—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 69,178 as against 73,938 in the previous year.

(Statement No. 14).—Of the pending cases, 7,632 had been pending for more than a year; this shows an increase of 1,099 over the figure of the previous year. Of the suits pending over a year, 5 were in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, 266 in the Courts of the Village Munsiffs, 7,226 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges, 49 in the Small Cause Courts and 86 in the District Courts, the figures showing as compared with last year an increase of 2, 54, 1,039 and 17 suits respectively in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, the Village Munsiffs, the Subordinate Judges and the District Courts, and a decrease of 13 in the Small Cause Courts.

The number of suits pending over a year was the largest in Satara (1,418) followed by Poona (967), East Khandesh (694), Surat (566), Ahmedabad (526), Belgaum (512), Kolaba (441), Ahmednagar (395), Sholapur (322), Kaira (315), Nasik (274), Ratnagiri (259), Broach (251), and Dharwar (202). The figures for the remaining districts are less than 200.

- 47. The average duration in days of suits both contested and uncontested was 162.4 and 80.4 in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, 65.1 and 86.4 in the Courts of the Village Munsiffs, 305.4 and 142.7 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges, 195.8 and 126.9 in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and 310.1 and 100.8 in the District Courts.
- 48. Execution Proceedings—(Statement No. 13).—There were 70,851 applications for execution of decrees pending from the previous year and 1,60,980 new applications were filed during the year. Out of the total number of applications before the Courts, 1,49,935 applications were disposed of during the year and 81,896 remained pending at its close. The disposals of the applications were as under:—

70 cases disposed of by transfer;

27,929 cases disposed of wherein realization was complete;

47,595 cases disposed of wherein realization was partial; and

73,439 cases disposed of as wholly infructuous.

1,49,033

902 applications disposed of by the Courts at Sholapur have not been included in the above figures, as their details cannot be given owing to the destruction of records by fire.

The total amount realized in Courts other than Small Cause Courts was Rs. 76,73,705-4-4.

Debtors were imprisoned in 450 cases, moveable property sold in 982 and immoveable property in 4,392.

- 49. Miscellaneous Cases—(Statement No. 6).—The number of miscellaneous institutions rose from 13,003 to 13,833, that of disposals from 12,335 to 13,164 and that of pending cases from 6,008 to 6,752. Of the 12,781 miscellaneous cases disposed of excluding 383 decided by the Courts at Sholapur, the details of which are not available owing to the destruction of records by fire, 2,026 were decided without trial, 3,755 without contest, 6 on reference to arbitration, and 6,994 after contest. Of these 6,994 contested cases, 4,725 or 67.5 per cent., were decided in favour of the plaintiffs.
- 50. The average duration of days in contested and uncontested miscellaneous cases was 132 and 81 in the Village Munsiffs' Courts; 182·1 and 121·7 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges; 109·9 and 71·5 in the Provincial Small Cause Courts; and 157·7 and 85·9 in the District Courts.

III. BOMBAY SMALL CAUSE COURT.

51. (Statements Nos. 3 and 5).—The figures of suits instituted, disposed of and pending at the close of the year 1930 in the Presidency Small Cause Court were 41,113, 41,457 and 6,014 respectively. The institutions and disposals show an increase of 1,822 and 3,782 respectively over the figures of the previous year while the number of suits pending shows a decrease by 344 on the figure of the preceding year.

(Statement No. 4).—There was an increase in the institutions of suits not exceeding Rs. 10, 50, 100, 500, 1,000 and also in the case of suits above Rs. 1,000 but not exceeding Rs. 2,000.

The total value of the litigation showed an increase for the year under report. The figure was Rs. 85,27,409-7-7 as against Rs. 82,96,308-9-6 in the preceding year.

- 52. Mode of disposal—(Statement No. 5).—Of the 41,457 suits disposed of, 645 were decided without trial, 36,499 without contest, 4,276 after contest and 37 on reference to arbitration.
- 53. The average duration in days in both contested and uncontested suits was 57 and 36.
- 54. Execution of Decrees—(Statement No. 13).—Of the 28,425 applications for the execution of decrees that were before the Courts during the year (including 3,458 pending from the previous year) 24,856 were disposed of and 3,569 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the latter figure, 500 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of, 9,995 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 13,901 were returned as wholly infructuous and 960 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realized was Rs. 13,93,802-11-0 as compared with the Rs. 15,75,290-0-6 in the previous year.

- 55. Coercive process—(Statement No. 13).—In order to enforce the execution of decrees, imprisonment was ordered in 431 cases and sale of moveables in 590. Both these figures show a decrease of 12 and 113 on the figures of the previous year.
- 56. Applications to the Full Court—(Statement No. 14).—There were 432 applications for disposal before the Full Court, during the year, of which 412 were disposed of and 20 remained pending at the close of the year.

GENERAL.

57. As compared with the figures of 1929 the number of suits instituted and disposed of in the Subordinate Judges' Courts in 1930 decreased by 9,705 and 1,855 respectively, the number of regular suits disposed of being more by 1,104 and those under Small Cause Court Jurisdiction being less by 2,959. With the number of revived suits and those pending at the end of the last year the total number of suits pending shows a decrease from 65,315 to 61,451, while the number of suits pending over a year shows an increase from 6,187 to 7,226.

The number of appeals disposed of by the District Courts increased by 246. The First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate Powers disposed of 743 appeals as against 633 in 1929. The total number of appeals pending in the District Courts decreased from 5,433 to 4,813.

The figures of suits instituted and disposed of on the Original Side of the High Court showed an increase by 92 and 722 respectively on the figures of the preceding year. The number of pending suits decreased from 6,836 to 6,173.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court the total number of institutions and of disposals showed respectively a decrease of 282 and an increase of 129 on the figures of the preceding year. The total arrears of appeals on the Appellate Side increased from 3,140 to 3,265.

- 58. Inspection.—During the year under report, the District Judges inspected the following Courts of Subordinate Judges. Viramgaum in the Ahmedabad District; Parner, Rahuri and Sangamner in the Ahmedangar District; Belgaum in the Belgaum District; Ankleshwar in the Broach District; Muddebihal in the Bijapur District, Gadag, Hubli, Haveri and Dharwar in the Dharwar District; Kaira, Kapadvanj and Borsad in the Kaira District; Karwar, Kumta and Honavar in the Kanara District; Bhusaval, Chalisgaon, Erandol and Yaval in the East Khandesh District; Shirpur and Dhulia in the West Khandesh District; Satana, Sinnar and Malegaon in the Nasik District; Small Cause Court, Poona, and Khed in the Poona District; Wai, Koregaon, Dahiwadi, Tasgaon, Vita, Karad and Patan in the Satara District; Barsi and Madha in the Sholapur District, Bulsar in the Surat District and Thana, Dahanu, Pen, Roha and Mahad in the Thana District.
- 59. Judicial Conferences.—The District Judges of Belgaum, Dharwar and East Khandesh assembled Judicial conferences of the Judges subordinate to them and points touching on the practice and procedure of Civil Courts were discussed.
- 60. Burning of the Civil Courts buildings at Sholapur.—A very lamentable feature of the year under report is the destruction by fire of all the Civil Courts buildings at Sholapur and the records contained therein during the riots on the 8th of May 1930. All the records of judicial cases that were pending had to be reconstructed with the result that a lot of extra work was thrown on the Judges and the clerical staff. Correct details of some of the figures of institutions and disposals could not, therefore, be given in almost all the Statements.
- 61. Robbery in the Court at Hubli.—There was a robbery in the Subordinate Judge's Court at Hubli in the Dharwar District and property worth Rs. 11,000 was stolen and the watchman was killed. The case is being investigated by the Police of the Criminal Investigation Department.
- 62. Receipts and charges of the High Court.—For the year 1930, the total receipts of the High Court as shown in paragraphs 15 and 28 were Rs. 21,14,126-3-0 on the Original Side, and Rs. 1,73,890-15-7 on the Appellate Side, making an aggregate of Rs. 22,88,017-2-7. The total

charges as shown in the same paragraphs were Rs. 8,43,664-6-0 on the Original Side and Rs. 4,58,559-5-3 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 13,02,223-11-3. The difference between these two aggregates shows an excess of receipts over expenditure of Rs. 9,85,793-7-4. This excess includes the Probate and Administration Duty (the cost or collecting which is borne by the High Court) but is exclusive of the excess of receipts over expenditure shown on the working of the office of the Official Assignee, which amounted for the year 1930 to a further sum of Rs. 93,021-5-4. In the expenditure no sum is charged for rent or upkeep of the High Court buildings and other matters which would have to be brought into account in ascertaining a net profit.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1930.

1. Judicial Staff—(Statement No. 1).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Presidency on the 31st December 1930 and available for Criminal Cases consisted of 10 permanent and 1 temporary High Court Judges; 17 Sessions Judges; 8 Additional Sessions Judges; 363 First Class Magistrates; 371 Second Class Magistrates; 243 Third Class Magistrates; 163 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889; and 212 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act IX of 1920.

In addition to the above, there were 19,390 Police Patils in the Presidency exercising powers under Section 14 of the Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, of whom 449 were invested with powers under Section 15 of that Act.

There were also 49 Benches of Magistrates inclusive of four in the City of Bombay constituted from 469 Honorary Magistrates.

- 2. Offences reported—(Statement No. 11).—There were 2,00,266 criminal offences reported during the year, a decrease of 16,733 against the figures of 1929. In the districts of East Khandesh, West Khandesh, Broach and Bombay Suburban there was an increase in the number of offences reported during the year while there was a decrease in the remaining districts. The decrease was most noticeable in the City of Bombay and in the districts of Sholapur, Surat, Thana, Poona and Ahmednagar. Of the total number of offences reported, 49,664 were under the Indian Penal Code and 1,50,602 under Special and Local Laws.
- 3. Complaints dismissed (Section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and complainants fined (Section 250, Criminal Procedure Code)—(Statement No. 11).—The number of complaints dismissed under Section 203 was 6,808 and the number of complainants fined under Section 250 was 273.
- 4. Cases found to be true.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 1,92 479 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial excluding those withdrawn and including those pending from the previous year was 1,86,486. The number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show a decrease of 15,598 and 16,651 respectively against the figures of 1929.
- 5. Murders reported as true.—Out of the 911 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 265 were murders of which 170 ended in conviction. The corresponding figures for 1929 were 805, 204 and 127. The 265 murders may be classified as under:—

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

I. PRESIDENCY MAGISTRATES' COURTS.

Cases in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 11).— The number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates was 22,040 and in those of the Honorary Presidency Magistrates 67,818 making a total of 89,858. This number is less by 9,208 than that of 1929 when the corresponding figures were 20,883 and 78,183 making a total of 99,066. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 80,589 or 9,005 less than that in 1929 whereas cases under the Indian Penal Code fell from 9,472 to 9,269. The decrease under the former head was most marked in offences under the City of Bombay Police Act which fell from 45,452 to 35,046 and under the City of Bombay Municipal Act, which fell from 9,404 to 8,666. The number of offences under he Motor Vehicles Act fell from 2,368 to 2,206, under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, from 22,863 to 22,744, under the European Vagrancy Act, from 80 to 46 and under the Criminal Tribes Act, from 131 to 99. On the other hand there was a noticeable increase in offences under the Abkari Act which rose from 453 to 807 and under the Prevention of Gambling Act which rose from 1,834 to 1,992. The number of offences under the Criminal Procedure Code rose from 20 to 144, under the Railways Act from 435 to 498, under the Public Conveyance Act from 5,962 to 6,017 and under the Factories Act from 88 to 98. As regards the offences under the Indian Penal Code there was a noticeable increase in offences under Hurt which rose from 1,852 to 1,962 and under Cheating which rose from 444 to 542. The number of offences under Criminal breach of trust rose from 695 to 758, under Criminal misappropriation of property from 94 to 118, under Robbery and dacoity from 78 to 99, under offences affecting life from 105 to 119 and under Wrongful restraint and wrongful confinement from 100 to 113. There was slight increase in offences under Contempts of lawful authority or public servants which rose from 21 to 31, under False evidence and offences against public justice from 29 to 35, under the Defamation from 187 to 193 and under Offences relating to weights and measures from 3 The decrease on the other hand was most marked in the number of offences under Criminal force and assault which fell from 2,693 to 1,508 and under offences in Receiving of stolen property which fell from 163 to 93. The number of offences under Thefts fell from 1,888 to 1,836, those affecting the public health, safety, convenience, decency and morals, from 260 to 212 and those against the Public tranquillity from 123 to 85. There was a slight decrease in offences under Criminal trespass which fell from 442 to 430, those relating to documents and to trade or property marks, from 55 to 43, those under Mischief from 57 to 46 and under those relating to Government stamps from 9 to 3.

(Statements Nos. 2 and 9).—During the year 87,192 regular and 145 miscellaneous cases were disposed of and 2,666 regular cases were pending at the close of the year.

7. Results of tria's.—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Magistrates was 99,365. Of the persons

tried, 12,885 were acquitted or discharged; 82,870 were convicted; 273 were committed to the High Court; 2 died during the trial; 17 were transferred to other provinces; 8 were sent to the Military Authorities and 3,310 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons a tried for offences under the Penal Code, 4,153 were convicted and 8,887 were acquitted. The results of the trials before each of the three classes a of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

8. Punishments—(Statement No. 12).—Of the persons convicted, 22,906 were punished with imprisonment, 73,380 with fine and 19 with whipping, 1,609 convicted persons were warned and discharged, 112 persons were sent to the Leper Asylum at Matunga and 1,066 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs, 4,85,808-13-0. The total amount realized was Rs. 3,18,892-15-3 of which Rs. 18,786-11-3 were paid as compensation to complainants.

II. MAGISTRATES INCLUDING VILLAGE OFFICERS AND SANITARY COMMITTEES AND SANITARY BOARDS.

9. Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these Tribunals was 1,67,737. Of these, the cases of 1,096 were committed or referred to the Sessions and the cases of remaining 1,66,641 were finally disposed of by the various Tribunals. Of the total 1,66,641, 74,647 or 41.8 per cent. were convicted and 75,129 or 45.1 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, 231 persons died, 568 escaped during their trials and 10 were transferred.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before Magistrates and Village Officers at the close of the year was 16,056 as compared with 12,763 in 1929.

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 1,415 were for terms not exceeding 15 days; 9,862 for terms not exceeding 6 months; 1,785 for terms not exceeding 2 years and 12 for terms above 2 years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 255 persons; in 1929 the figure was 271.

The amounts of fines imposed and realized during the year were Rs. 10,03,614-7-10 and 6,54,552-1-7 respectively. A total sum of Rs. 29,608-1-9 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to the above, 273 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code as against 344 last year.

III. COURTS OF SESSIONS.

11. Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).—There were 2,410 persons or 273 more than in 1929 under trial. The cases of 1,972 persons were decided while those of 438 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the 1,972 persons tried, 1,091 or 55.3 per cent. were convicted; 844 or 42.8 per cent. were acquitted or discharged; the cases of 30 persons were referred to the High Court under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 7 persons died during their trials.

Fines to the amount of Rs. 58,825 were imposed of which Rs. 22,438 were realized.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appellate Courts Subordinate to the High Court.

I. APPEALS.

- 15. (Statement No. 2).—The number of appeals decided during the year was 2,992 as against 3,034 in the preceding year, a decrease of 42.
- 16. Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 10).—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 2,714. Of

these, the appeals of 251 were summarily dismissed and sentences on 1,274 were confirmed after admission making a total of 1,525 wholly unsuccessful appellants or 56·1 per cent. Of the remainder, 427 appellants or 15·7 per cent. obtained a modification of the sentences passed on them and 736 or 27·1 per cent. an annulment. The cases of 26 appellants were otherwise disposed of. As compared with 1929, the results were more favourable to the appellants.

17. Sessions Courts—(Statement No. 10).—During the year the number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Sessions was 2,538. The appeals of 695 persons (or 27.3 per cent.) were summarily dismissed; 814 appellants whose appeals were admitted were altogether unsuccessful; 466 obtained an alteration of sentences; 546 were acquitted; the cases of 17 appellants were otherwise disposed of. The proportions of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders and completely successful were 59.4, 18.3 and 21.5 per cent., respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 44.1, 25.2 and 29.6 per cent., respectively. If admitted appeals are only considered, these results were on the whole favourable to appellants almost to the same extent as they were in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants during the year being 54.8 as against 54.7 in 1929.

II. Superintendence, Reference and Revision.

- 18. Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 10).—The cases of 201 accused persons who applied for revision or against whom applications were made by complainants came before the District Magistrates for revision. The number was less by 170 than in 1929. Of the total applications, those of 150 were rejected and those of 50 were otherwise disposed of; and 1 accused died during the pendency of his application.
- 19. Sessions Courts—(Statement No. 10).—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 1,275 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Sessions during the year. The number was more by 209 than in 1929. Applications of 1,037 persons were rejected and those of 237 were otherwise disposed of; and 1 accused died during the pendency of his application.

HIGH COURT.

I. ORIGINAL JURISDICTION (HIGH COURT SESSIONS).

20. Commitments to the High Court—(Statement No. 9).—One hundred and seventy-six cases in all were brought to trial at the High Court Sessions during the year including 22 pending at the end of the previous year. Of these, 175 cases were decided and 1 remained pending at the end of the year. The e 175 cases occupied in all 201 days. This may be compared with 142 cases occupying 240 days in 1929.

Altogether 282 persons were tried of whom 189 were convicted and 93 were acquitted.

21. Punishments—(Statement No. 12).—The following sentences were passed:—

The fines imposed during the year amounted to Rs. 4,150 of which Rs. 90 were imposed upon Jurors for their non-attendance, and the fines realised during the year were Rs. 2,060 of which Rs. 60 were realized from the Jurors. Out of the amount realised Rs. 1,566-10-0 were paid as compensation to complainant.

II. APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

22. (Statement No. 10).—Fifty-six appeals were pending before the High Court at the opening of the year from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year, 605 appeals were preferred and 590 decided leaving 71 at its close. The numbers of appeals preferred, decided and pending are more by 109, 76 and 15 respectively than those of the preceding year.

Of the appeals preferred against sentences, 490 were from Courts of Session and 92 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates, whereas 23 were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittal.

23. Results of appeals.—Four hundred and eighty-four appeals against sentences passed by Courts of Session were decided. The sentences were upheld in 409 cases, reversed in 26, and modified in 40. Seven appeals were returned for presentation to the proper Courts; and 2 related to sanction matter.

Ninety appeals against sentences by Presidency Magistrates were decided. The sentences were upheld in 84 cases, reversed in 3 and modified in 1. One case related to sanction matter and 1 was remanded for retrial.

The results of appeals as affecting individual appellants were as follows:—

The appeals of 444 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals, the

sentences of 146 appellants were confirmed, those of 58 altered, those of 54 reversed; 8 persons were asked to approach the proper Courts and the remaining one was ordered to be re-tried.

In appeals against acquittal orders, the orders were confirmed in the case of 12 persons and set aside in the case of 11. In the case of 3 persons out of 11, a re-trial was ordered.

Sixteen appeals by the Local Government against the orders of acquittal involving 23 accused were disposed of by the High Court during the year. In 8 appeals involving 8 accused the High Court set aside the order of acquittal in respect of all and convicted them. In one case involving 2 accused the High Court set aside the order of acquittal and ordered them to be re-tried under section 302, Indian Penal Code and in one case involving 1 accused, it set aside the order of acquittal and sent back the case to the Magistrate for being tried on merits. In 6 cases involving 12 accused the High Court upheld the order of acquittal.

III. SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

- 24. References under section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.—Two references were pending in the High Court at the beginning of the year and 15 were submitted to it during the year. Of these, 14 were decided and 3 remained pending at the cloe of the year. Out of the 14 cases decided involving 34 accused therein, the High Court convicted 8 accused and acquitted the remaining 26. The verdict of the Jury was accepted in 6 cases and set aside in 7 while in 1 case involving 5 accused persons it was accepted in respect of 4 accused and set aside in respect of the remaining one accused.
- 25. References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.—
 Twenty-eight references under this section were submitted to the High
 Court during the year for confirmation of death sentences and 2 were
 pending at the opening. Twenty-seven cases involving 41 accused were
 decided during the year. The sentence of death was confirmed in the
 case of 26 persons and commuted to that of transportation for life in
 the case of 6. The remaining 9 persons were acquitted.

During the year under report 24 persons were executed in the Presidency.

26. Revision.—One hundred and forty-nine cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 26 were pending at the opening of the year. Of these, 136 were decided during the year and 39 remained pending at its close. The number reported was more by 21 than in 1929. In 31 cases the orders sent up for revision were not interferred with; in 16 cases they were enhanced. Sentences were reduced or altered in 37 cases and reversed in 38. In 2 cases proceedings were wholly quashed and in 8 cases new trials were ordered. The remaining 4 cases were otherwise disposed of.

Orders were passed under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in 333 cases—a decrease of 26 in the figures of the previous year. Of these, 316 came before the High Court on application and 17 were taken up by the High Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion. Of the 316 applications for the issue of Rule, 214 were rejected. Of the 102 Rules issued, 43 were finally discharged, 49 were made absolute in their entirety, in 7 the orders complained of were modified and the remaining 3 were withdrawn.

In 8 out of the 17 cases taken up by the High Court suo motu the orders passed by the lower courts were not disturbed, in 2 the sentences were enhanced, in 4 they were reduced and in the remaining 3 they were set aside.

- 27. Applications for transfer.—Ninety-two applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases (91 original and 1 appeal) from one court or district to another were received during the year and 11 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of these, 96 were decided during the year and 7 remained pending. Sixty-four were summarily rejected and in 4 transfers were granted without the issue of a rule. In the 28 applications in which rules were issued, transfers were granted in 5, refused in 22 and 1 application was allowed to be withdrawn.
- 28. Miscellaneous applications.—Eleven applications for bail, 1 for bailable warrant, 10 for maintenance, 5 for compensation, 20 for disposal of property, 7 for stay of proceedings, 4 for sanction, 19 for Habeas Corpus and 24 for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by the High Court during the year.
