Statement A, Parts I to IV. Statement B, Parts I and II. Statements C, D, E, F and G. Supplementary Statement No. II. I have the honor to submit the Police Administration Report of the G. I. P. Railway for the year 1899, together with the statements noted in the margin.

- 2. Mr. Henderson was in charge of the office of the Superintendent of Police throughout the year.
- 3. (a) The total number of Police cognizable cases reported during the year was 710 as against 526 in the previous year, showing an increase of 181 cases during the year, which is explained in the following two paragraphs. Including pending cases of the previous year, the number of cases for disposal was 751 as against 560 in the year before.
- (b) Four hundred and fifty-eight Police cognizable cases under Indian Penal Code alone were reported during the year as compared with 365 in 1898. Including pending cases of the previous year, the number for disposal was 495 as against 392 in 1898. The increase in reported crime is due to fluctuations in the offences noted below.

The increase in crime is chiefly due, it would appear, to famine which began about September and was severely felt on parts of the line, especially in Poona, Sholapur, Nandgaon and Bhusaval Districts.

(c) There is an increase of 171 cases of true reported crime (of which number 91 are under Indian Penal Code alone) as compared with the year 1898, the increase being mainly due to the above cause and in part to a decrease of two per cent. in the number of excluded cases.

There has been a considerable increase in the number of thefts from stations and goods sheds and running trains while there is a decrease in thefts from passengers.

(e) Of Police cognizable cases under Class VI, 252 were reported during the year as against 161 in the preceding year. They comprise—

Others.

The increase is chiefly noticeable in the offences under the Railway Act and will be explained further on. There is a small increase of 9 cases under A'bkari and Opium Acts which is ascribed to the employment of special opium agency at Bhusaval during the year which resulted in more cases of opium smuggling being brought to light.

Three of the four offences of placing obstructions on the line were committed by children. The case of removing key from permanent way was not the work of a dismissed gangman. The Superintendent states that this class of offence at one time so prevalent has been almost stamped out. Out of 7 cases of throwing stones, only 1 was convicted. These offences are difficult of detection, and are generally the work of children herding cattle. There is an increase of 21 in cases of drunkenness which, the Superintendent says, was perhaps due to people resorting to drink as a means of securing immunity from plague. The increase of 34 cases under "Nuisances" is due, the Superintendent says, to stringent measures taken to put a stop to the practice of committing nuisance within Railway limits.

The total number of cases pending at the close of the year under report was C5 as against 40 in the previous year.

The increase of 25 cases is due to the general increase in crime. Of the 33 cases pending under investigation by the Police, 4 were reported in October. 11 in November, and 18 in December 1899.

5. The number of excluded cases during the year was 102 as against 90 in the year before. Of this number 74 were under Indian Penal Code and 28 under Class VI. Of the 102 excluded cases, 11 were missing goods cases which were brought on the crime register as thefts but which were subsequently proved to be cases in which the loss was due to leakage, wrong counting, short loading or cross-booking. Thirty-two cases were excluded after trial. The

percentage of excluded cases to cases for disposal is 13.53 as against 16.07 in the preceding year.

- 6. Of the total number of excluded cases, riz., 102, only 1 case was declared maliciously false as against 3 in the previous year. No prosecution could be taken in this case as the complainant died of plague.
- 7. Neither in this year nor in the previous year was Section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code applied and compensation awarded to the accused.
- 8. Undetected cases numbered 181 as against 130 in the year 1898. Of this number 172 were under Indian Penal Code and 9 under Class VI as compared with 121 and 9, respectively, in the preceding year. The percentages of cases remaining undetected to true cases disposed of are given below.

Of the 181 undetected cases a large number, viz., 149, come under the head of "Thefts".

- 9. (a) The Police had, during the year under report, to deal with 751 cases as against 560 in the previous year. Of this number, 102 were excluded, 181 remained undetected. Four hundred and three cases were decided by trial, of which 388 ended in conviction. Sixty-five cases remained over at the close of the year.
- (b) The percentage of real cases ending in conviction to true cases disposed of during the year was under "All classes" 66 43, under Indian Penal Code 49 16, and under Class VI 94 19 as compared with 68 53, 56 09, 93 66, respectively, in the previous year.
- (c) Similar percentages of cases ending in conviction to cases decided by trial are as under.

other information was 676 as against 518 in the preceding year. Twelve persons were in Police custody or on bail at the beginning of the year. Of the 676 persons, 22 were released without being brought to trial, giving a percentage of 3.25 as against 4.05 in the previous year. The corresponding figures under Indian Penal Code alone were 394 and 3.80, respectively, as against 323 and 5.57 in the year 1898. Twenty-one persons were released by the Magistrato's order before trial as against 12 in the preceding year. Eleven persons were on bail or in Police custody at the close of the year. Six hundred and thirty-four were sent up for trial and 9 were under trial at the beginning of the year—a total of 643 as against 514 in the previous year. Six hundred and seventeen persons were tried during the year, of whom 536 were convicted. Twenty-five were under

trial at the close of the year. The percentages of persons convicted to persons tried are as under.

Notwithstanding an increase in the number of persons arrested and the number of cases to deal with, there has been a very marked improvement in the percentages of convictions obtained. The results as shown by these percentages must be considered as distinctly satisfactory and creditable to the Police. The decrease in the number of persons released without being brought to trial, notwithstanding the larger number arrested, indicate greater care on the part of the Police in not making unnecessary arrests.

- 12. Under the head of "Serious crimes," there was I murder, I dacoity and 5 robberies. As regards the murder case, the Superintendent remarks that there were in reality 2 cases of murder in both of which the dead bodies were placed on the Railway line. One of them occurred between Kalyán and Demauli. It was most successfully followed up and detected with the assistance of the Thána District Police. Of the 8 accused concerned in the case, 3 were sentenced to be hanged and 4 to transportation. This case was after detection transferred to the District Police return. The other case remained undetected. The dacoity case also remained undetected as no one could identify the dacoits, nor the property, which was mostly grain. Of the 5 robbery cases, only 2 ended in conviction, 2 in discharge and 1 remained undetected.
- 13. The amount of property stolen during the year under report was Rs. 9,008 as against Rs. 12,287 in the preceding year. Including property worth Rs. 1,445 which remained over at the close of last year, the total amount to be accounted for was Rs. 10,543 as compared with Rs. 12,873 in the year 1893. Recoveries amounted to Rs. 3,855 as against Rs. 3,713, giving a percentage of 36.56 as against 28.84 in the previous year. Property was stolen in 390 cases and recovered in 213. Here again there has been a marked improvement and it is the more noteworthy, inasmuch as last year showed a very material improvement on the preceding year, when the result stood at the disgraceful percentage figure of 11.42. That the value of property stolen should have materially decreased and the amount recovered improved in a year when the effects of famine were being felt for some months is a result for which the Police deserve credit. During the year under report, property to the amount of Rs. 1,648 which was stolen in other districts was recovered by the Police of the G. I. P. Railway. This is satisfactory.

Non-cognizable Crime.

14. The total number of non-cognizable crimes on the G. I. P. Railway decreased from 387 in 1898 to 131 in the year 1899. The decrease is chiefly noticeable on the portion of the line passing through the Town and Island of Bombay, where only 65 cases have been returned as having been reported during the year as against 345 in the previous year. The Chief Presidency Magistrate, Bombay, is unable to explain the cause of decrease. Of the 131 cases, 8 were taken up by the Magistrates of their own motion on the portion of the line passing through the Poona District against none in the previous year on the whole line. As in the previous year, no case was referred to the Police for investigation. Including 2 cases of the previous year, the number of cases for disposal was 133 as against 389 in the previous year. Seventy-six cases ended in conviction and 29 in discharge or acquittal. Twenty-seven cases were dismissed without trial. In connection with the above cases, 158 persons appeared before Courts, of whom 18 were discharged or acquitted, 85 convicted, 54 discharged without trial and one person was under trial at the close of the year. The percentage of conviction is 57.43 as compared with 56.35 in the year 1895.

General Supervision and Registration of Bad Characters.

15. (a) Special duty Constables travel in plain clothes with night passenger and goods trains and exercise a supervision over the movements of bad characters.

(b) During the year 14 persons were prosecuted as being bad characters with the results described below.

The percentage of conviction is satisfactory and shows a noticeable improvement on past and previous years. Of the 14 persons, 5 belonged to the Bhampta class, 2 were habitual house-breakers and the remaining 7 to the Bhil class in the Násik District. All of them had previous convictions.

The above figures would appear to indicate that sufficient attention is not paid by the G. I. P. Railway Police to identification of previous offenders and the classification of habituals. The Superintendent is being addressed on the subject.

16. Four cases were tried during the year in the Court of Sessions, 2 of them ended in conviction and 2 in discharge. Seven persons were concerned in these cases, 2 of whom were convicted and 5 discharged or acquitted.

Statement D.—Return of Professional Crimes.

- 17. Of the 9 thefts in passenger trains, 2 were committed by Bhamptas of the Deccan and the remaining 7 by pick-pockets of Bombay.
- 18. (a) The Police force on the G. I. P. Railway was comprised of 103 officers and 512 men—the same as in the previous year. This force was maintained at a cost of Rs. 145,286. In addition to the above force, 62 Police Rámoshis (52 permanent and 10 temporary) were employed during the year at a total cost of Rs. 4.470. The number of men employed on plague duty during the year was 42. The number of extra armed Police sanctioned for the purpose of preventing grain robberies on the line was 10 head constables and 40 men. The number of Railway stations on the line remained unaltered, viz., 128. No new Railway station was opened during the year.
- 19. (a) The total number of punishments inflicted during the year was 169 as against 137 in the previous year. This number comprised 7 dismissals, 156 departmental punishments of fine, degradation, suspension and 6 judicial punishments.
- (b) In no case was dismissal ordered for receiving bribes or suppression of crime. Departmental punishments were awarded generally for petty offences such as sleeping or remaining absent on duty, absence without leave, breach of discipline, &c., &c.
- (c) Of the 6 judicial punishments 3 were for thefts, 1 for breach of plague rules, 1 for criminal breach of trust, and 1 under the District Police Act. \$2054—2 c. i. p. g.

- (d) The percentage of total number of punishments to total strength is 27.52, that of dismissals alone being 1.14 and departmental punishments, including dismissals, 26.54. The corresponding percentages for last year were respectively 22, 2, and 21.
- 20. The force contains 93 officers and 314 men who can read and write as compared with 90 and 320 in the previous year. The percentage of education among officers is 91 and among men 61 as compared with 88 and 62, respectively, in the previous year. The average percentage for the three years preceding the year under report is 91 for officers and 62 for men.
- 21. Fourteen officers and 10 men obtained rewards in connection with the investigation and detection of crime and also in cases under Opium and A'bkári Act. The number of officers and men rewarded by promotion for specially good service was 14. In the preceding year none were so rewarded. One hundred good service tickets were awarded as compared with 208 in the previous year.

- 22. (a) The health of the force was on the whole fairly good; the percentage of sickness being 46.8 compared to 71.2 in the year 1898.
 - (b) There were 24 deaths among the Police during the year, of which 18 were from plague.

All the officers and men, except one, who have been enlisted as educated, can read and write the vernacular language of the Railway. This number includes 3 officers and 2 men who can read and write English.

- 24. The Superintendent of Police reports that men were specially selected and trained as drill instructors. The Superintendent has effected a considerable improvement in the drill of the Head-quarter Force, as I had an opportunity of judging at a recent inspection of the Head-quarters when the drill and movements of the men were in marked contrast to what I had observed at my previous inspection.
- 25. Sixteen licenses were issued on the G. I. P. Railway for possession of fire-arms, all applications having been first referred to the Superintendent of Police for opinion.
- 26. Four prisoners escaped during the year as compared with 1 in the year 1898. Two escaped from the custody of the Railway Police and two from that of the District Police while within Railway limits. One of the prisoners who escaped from the custody of the Railway Police was re-captured at once.
- 27. General efficiency and conduct of the Police.—The Police, what with plague measures, increase of crime due to Famine during the latter part of the year, and the signallers' strike which lasted for 9 weeks, have had unusual difficulties to contend with during the year. Notwithstanding this they have on the whole carried out their duties in an efficient and satisfactory manner and been able to show an improved record of results.
 - 28. The number of serious crimes reported during the year was 7, viz.:
 - 1 Murder.
 - 1 Dacoity.
 - 5 Robberies.

Mr. Henderson visited the scenes and made personal investigation in .6 cases, and in the remaining case he was unable to do so, being engaged in another case. The scenes of the following other crimes were visited and personal investigation made by Mr. Henderson:—

- 3 Thefts in passenger trains:
 - 1 Of Rs. 186 in cash at Chalisgnou.
 - 1 Of gold watch valued at Rs. 550 at Igatpuri.
 - 1 Of ornaments valued at Rs. 717 at Manmad.
- 1 Theft of station cash at Karabgaon, Rs. 166-6-3.
- 9 Grain robberies.
- 1 Murder at Demauli, fully detected and transferred to the District Police.
- 1 Descrity at Vilad, finally disposed of as coming under Section 338, Indian Penal Code.
- 29. There were 8 Police Stations and 84 outposts during the year as against 8 Police Stations and 85 in the previous year, the difference of one outpost is due to the abolition of the temporary outposts at Ehegaon Viaduct and Tilati and the reestablishment of the outpost at Karkalla. All the Police Stations and outposts were inspected by Mr. Henderson during the year. Eight Police Stations were twice visited and inspected. Of the outposts, 33 were visited and inspected twice, and 10 more than twice. Mr. Henderson has been very active in visiting and inspecting his stations and outposts during the year. The improvement in this respect has been very marked and in contrast to the previous year when the want of activity on the part of the Superintendents concerned formed the subject of unfavourable comment.
 - 30. There were no accidents to trains during the year.
- 31. Twenty-five men were provided with quarters during the year and 257 are still without quarters. The Superintendent of Police again brings to notice the inconvenience feltowing to want of quarters for the Police in the Town and Island of Bombay. The matter has been reported separately to Government and steps are now being taken with a view to secure a site.
 - 32. There were four fires, one of them on a train, which the Police helped to extinguish. The newly built Police lines at Raver were completely destroyed by fire through an accident.
 - 33. There were 18 accidents to cattle.
 - 34. The whole of the G. I. P. Railway line in the Bombay Presidency is fenced, except the Bársi Light Railway, a portion of the Dhond and Manmad District, and the Campoli Branch. Only one case of accident to cattle occurred on the unfenced portion. No portion of the line was fenced during the year. The total length of the line remaining unfenced at the end of the year was 38 miles.
 - 35. The orders of Government regarding dismissed gangmen were carefully attended to. No dismissed gangman was found concerned in any case of mischief on the Railway during the year.
 - 36. The arrangement of lighting goods sheds is reported to be still defective.
 - 37. The system of checking seals of wagons continued to be satisfactory.
- 38. The Police had to serve 247 summonses and 28 warrants as against 547 and 50, respectively, in the previous year. But the number of missing goods cases referred to the Police for information was abnormally high, viz., 1,175, as compared with 210 in the previous year. The increase is to a great extent due to the want of care on the part of the Traffic Department in the loading, despatch of goods, &c., due to considerable increase in traffic.
- 39. An important event during the year was the strike of Railway Signallers which lasted for about 9 weeks. Mr. Henderson and his Police during this period did good work in keeping a careful watch over the movements of the strikers and preventing their doing harm. This was duly acknowledged by the Company. At the conclusion of the strike the General Traffic Manager reported to the Agent as follows:—"It is entirely due to them (the Police) that

the strikers did not cause more confusion than they did by tampering with instruments, line, wires, &c. We had sufficient cases to show their mischievous inclination in this direction had they been allowed the opportunity." The Agent in forwarding this to the Inspector-General of Police wrote as follows:—"The Company cordially endorses the views expressed by the General Traffic Manager and, in conveying to you my special thanks, would desire to add that my Board highly appreciate the invaluable assistance rendered not only to this Railway but to the public generally."

40. Mr. Henderson is an indefatigable officer, who takes the keenest interest in his work and never spares himself. To his constant energy and zeal are, I consider, to a great extent, traceable the improved results which are discernible this year in the administration of the G. I. P. Railway Police.

Statement A, Parts I to IV. Statement B, Parts I to II. Statements C, D, E, F and G. Supplementary Statement No. II. I have the honour to submit the Police Administration Report of the Southern Marátha Railway for the year 1897, together with the statements noted in the margin.

- 2. Mr. Warden was in charge of the office of Superintendent of Police throughout the year.
- 3. (a) The total number of cognizable cases reported during the year under "All classes" was 158 as against 155 in the previous year—an increase of only 3 cases. These cases were taken up upon report and investigated by the Police. None were taken up by the Station Officer. Including pending cases of the previous year, the number of cases for disposal was 163 as against 169 in the previous year. The decrease is chiefly noticeable under Class VI.
- (b) Of Police cognizable cases under Indian Penal Code alone, 111 were reported during the year as compared with 100 in the year 1898. The increase is chiefly owing to the rise in the number of cases of house-breaking with intent to commit theft and thefts of 7 and 13 respectively. On the other hand there is a decrease of 2 under 'Dacoities', 1 under 'Robbery' and 9 under 'Receiving Stolen Property'.
- (c) Deducting excluded cases, a comparison of true cases for disposal shows an increase of 11 cases during the year under Indian Penal Code, while the number under Class VI shows a decrease of 7 cases.

Seven of the 13 cases occurred in December 1899, which accounts for the noticeable increase of cases pending at close of 1899.

- 5. The number of excluded cases during the year was 49 as against 59 in the year before. Of this number 39 were under Indian Penal Code and 10 under Class VI.
- 6. Of the 49 excluded cases 3 were declared maliciously false. In one of them the sanction of Magistrate to prosecute was granted, but the prosecution was not instituted during the year under report pending a reference to the District Magistrate. In one case the Superintendent accorded sanction to prosecute, but the accused was acquitted.
- 7. In no case was any compensation awarded to the accused under Section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code as in the previous year.
- 8. Undetected cases numbered 28 as against 19 in the previous year, 24 being under Indian Penal Code and 4 under Class VI as against 18 and 1 in the year 1898. The percentages of cases remaining undetected to true cases disposed of are given below.

9. The Police had during the year under report to deal with 163 cases. Of this number, 49 were excluded, 28 remained undetected, 72 were decided by trial, of which 70 ended in conviction; 13 cases were pending at the close of the year. One case was transferred to the Goa Territory. The percentage of cases under "All classes" ending in conviction to true cases disposed of during the year was 70 as against 77 in the preceding year; while similar percentage under Indian Penal Code was 61 as against 65 and under Class VI 86 as against 93. The percentages of cases ending in conviction to cases decided by trial are 80.68 under "All classes", 75.47 under Indian Penal Code and 88.57 under Class VI during the year as against 80, 72 and 91.11 in the previous year.

10. The following table shows the action of the Police in dealing with certain crimes under Class VI:—

In the preceding year, of the 22 cases reported under Abkari and Opium Acts 21 ended in conviction.

- 11. 133 persons were arrested by the Police suo motu during the year under report under "All classes" as compared with 119 in the previous year. None were in Police custody or on tail at the beginning of the year under report. Of the 133 persons, 4 were released without being brought to trial—a percentage of 3.007 as against 1.68 in 1898. Under Indian Penal Code the number of persons for disposal was 96 as against 75 in the previous year. Four were released without being brought to trial. Four persons were arrested by the Police under Magistrate's order.
- 12. The total number of persons for disposal during the year was 145: of this number 4 were released without being brought to trial, 3 were on bail or in Police custody, and 18 were under trial at the close of the year. One person was transferred to the Portuguese Territory. The remaining 119 persons were tried, of whom 94 were convicted, giving the percentage of 78:90 as against 75:93 in the preceding year. Similar percentages under Indian Penal Code and Class VI are as under:—

The falling off in results under this percentage test as regards Indian Penal Code cases is unsatisfactory and has not been sufficiently explained by the Superintendent.

- 13. Four serious crimes were reported during the year, viz., one dacoity, one robbery, one bouse-breaking and theft of property valued at Rs. 1,393, and one of simple theft of property valued at Rs. 1,223. The case of robbery ended in conviction and that of simple theft in discharge. The other two cases were pending at the close of the year. The case of house-breaking and theft has since resulted in a conviction.
- 14. The amount of property stolen during the year was Rs. 6,349-9-7 as compared with Rs. 4,414-2-7 in the preceding year. Including property worth Rs. 2,119-7-0 from the previous year, the total to be accounted for was Rs. 8,469-0-7 as against Rs. 4,462-3-1 last year. Recoveries amounted to Rs. 2,724-12-6 as against Rs. 2,069-11-9, giving a percentage of 32.20 as compared with 46.39 in the previous year. Property was stolen in 68 cases and recovered in 46—a percentage of 68 as against 87 last year. While there has been a large increase in the amount of property stolen during the year under report, the percentage of recoveries shows a considerable falling off. The Superintendent attributes the non-success of the Police partly to increase of thefts owing to famine and partly to dislocation of the force due to prolonged employment of experienced men on plague duty. Though famine might lead to an increase of crime it would not impair the detective resources of the force. I think there are some grounds for the Superintendent's latter contention; but whatever the cause may be, there is a noticeable falling off during the year under report in the success of the Police in dealing with crime generally.

Non-cognizable Crime.

15. There is an increase from 11 in the year 1893 to 22 in the year 1899 in the number of non-cognizable crimes reported on the Southern Marátha Railway. This number comprises 20 cases reported under the Railway Act on the portion of the line passing through the Sátára District against none in the previous year. As in last year none of the cases were referred to the Police for investigation. All the cases were tried with the result that 5 ended in discharge or acquittal and 17 in conviction. In connection with these cases 22 persons appeared before Courts, of whom 17 were convicted and 5 discharged or acquitted. The percentage of conviction was 77 as compared with 70 in the previous year.

Supervision over Bad Characters.

16. (a) The Superintendent reports that owing, he fancies, in part to the better lighting of trains, Bhámptas gave little trouble during the year, having committed only two thefts. No doubt plague inspection arrangements to a great extent interfered with the Bhámptas' ordinary plan of operations. No suspicious foreigners were found travelling on the line.

- 17. One sessions case was committed during the year. The accused had been convicted by the First Class Magistrate, but on revision the Sessions Judge was of opinion that the sentence passed was inadequate and ordered the case to be committed to his Court for trial. This was done, and the accused was subsequently acquitted.
- 18. (a) The sanctioned strength of the force is 52 officers and 296 men, but the actual number entertained at the end of the year was 49 officers and 262 men. The 34 men sanctioned for the workshops at Hubli and 3 sanctioned for special duty under Government Resolutions No. 3368, dated 3rd August, and No. 4478, dated 27th October 1897, were not entertained for the reasons explained last year, namely, because the shops have not yet been taken over as lines for the men to be posted there are not ready, and the 3 men sanctioned to accompany night trains were not required, as many of the passenger trains were cancelled owing to decrease in traffic.

(b) The total cost of the force was Rs. 63,738 or Rs. 3,961 more than in the previous year, due, Mr. Warden explains, to the facts that in 1893 no portion of the pay of Mr. Holland (who held charge of the Superintendent's Office during Mr. Warden's absence on leave) was charged to the Railway, and a large amount was, during the year under report, spent on great coats. Fifteen Police Ramoshis too were entertained at a cost of Rs. 1,603-10-11.

The expenditure on account of temporary men for plague and famine duty was Rs. 1,998-1-3, their number being on an average 25 per month on plague duty and 12 on famine duty.

- 19. Punishments numbered 49 as against 78 in the previous year and included 5 dismissals, 42 departmental punishments and 2 judicial punishments; in no case was dismissal awarded for receiving bribes or suppressing crime. Two men were dismissed as they were strongly suspected of having committed theft. Departmental punishments were awarded generally for petty offences such as sleeping on duty, absent without leave, &c. Two constables were convicted of thefts. The percentage of the total number of punishments to total actual strength is 15.35, that of dismissals alone being 1.61 and departmental punishments including dismissals, 15.21. Similar percentages for the last year were respectively 25.16, 1.29 and 25.16.
- 20. Forty-two officers and 159 men can read and write as compared with 44 and 157 in the provious year, giving percentages of 80 and 60 as against 91 and 59. Fourteen educated men were calisted during the year.

The average percentage for the three years proceeding the year under report is 93 for officers and 62 for men.

21. None of the officers or men were rewarded during the year in connection with the investigation or detection of crime, nor did any receive promotion for special services. A constable of the Southern Marátha Railway force was however, presented with Rs. 50 by the District Superintendent of Police, Dhárwár, for his plucky behaviour in a case of dacoity; while another constable received Rs. 2 from a Magistrate in an ábkári case.

Eighteen good service tickets were bestowed by the Superintendent of Police, and 5 by Magistrates.

- 22. The percentage of sickness fell from 03 in 1898 to 39. There were 5 deaths, 4 of which were due to plague.
- 23. Fourteen educated and 13 uneducated men were enlisted during the year.
- 24. At my inspection of the Head-quarters Police in the month of April of the year under report, I found the drill of the men with and without arms was very fairly good, considering the little time they have had to give to it owing to the special circumstance of the year.
 - 25. Under the Arms Act no licenses were issued or renewed.
 - 26. There was no escape from the custody of the Railway Force.

General Conduct and Efficiency of the Force.

- 27. The general results obtained on the Railway during the year do not compare favourably with the previous year and for this the Superintendent has given no satisfactory or sufficient reason. Although crime was almost stationary, there has been a falling off in detection and percentages of conviction in cases and persons have decreased. There is an increase in the amount of property stolen while recoveries have fallen considerably.
- 28. Of the 4 serious crimes Mr. Warden visited and personally investigated 2. His reasons for not visiting the other 2 were sufficient. Mr. Warden also enquired into three theft cases.
- 29. Mr. Warden visited and inspected all 0 of the Police stations and 43 of the 46 outposts in his charge.

- 30. Of the 8 accidents to trains none were of a serious nature. There were in addition 30 minor accidents connected with shunting operations, none of which called for Police interference. In 2 cases persons were killed by being run over by trains. One of these Mr. Warden personally enquired into.
- 31. Fifty-one new quarters for Police, including 2 for Chief Constables, were built during the year, and 10 more rooms were made over for Police use. Accommodation is still required for 144 men (including 3 Chief Constables).
 - 32. The Police helped in two cases to extinguish fire during the year.
- 33. Eighty-one head of cattle were run over or knocked down and 186 found straying on the line were impounded. In four instances prosecutions were instituted and resulted in convictions.
 - 34. No line fencing was erected during the year.
- 35. The system of supervising dismissed gangmen remained unaltered. None were suspected of raischief.
- 36. The Superintendent reports a continued improvement in the lighting of carriages and stations.
- 37. He, however, again complains of the defective scaling of wagons, and has brought the matter to the notice of the Traffic Department.
- 38. One hundred and thirty-one summonses were served by the Police and 8 warrants of arrest and 2 for the recovery of fine were executed. Mr. Warden alludes to the extra work the Police had to perform in connection with plague preventive measures, and considers that they have, under the somewhat trying circumstances, performed their duties on the whole cheerfully and well. Mr. Warden remarks that the two Inspectors, Messrs. Stokes and Cowan, have discharged their duties to his entire satisfaction, and the Head Clerk, Mr. Rege, and Mr. M. R. Kamat, the Sheristedár, have both performed their duties most conscientiously.
- 39. There were 497 cases of missing goods as against 226 in the previous year. The Superintendent explains that the number of missing goods cases reported during the year is not excessive when compared with the number in the previous years, viz., 1895, 1896 and 1897. In 1898, there were fewer references made to the Police, as all enquiries into missing goods cases were ordered to be made by the Traffic Department.
- 40. The Superintendent tenders his best thanks to the Agent, Major Burn Murdoch, for the kindly manner in which he has dealt with any matter connected. with the force coming before him; and to the Traffic Manager and other officers of the Railway for their cordial assistance on all occasions.
- 41. In accordance with the order of Government contained in their No. 2188, dated 24th March 1896, I have submitted the following statistics for the Kolhapur State Railway:—

- 2. The number of true Indian Penal Codo cases for disposal during the year rose from 66 to 77, while that under "other offences"—Class VI—fell from 44 to 37. The increase in the former is mainly noticeable in cases falling under Classes III (house-breaking with intent to commit theft) and V (thefts) and is ascribed by the Superintendent of Police to famine and dislocation of the force, owing to prolonged employment of experienced men on plague duty.
- 3. Of the total number (114) of real cognizable cases for disposal, 101 were disposed of, leaving 13 cases pending. Under the Indian Penal Code, while the percentage of convictions to true cases decided by trial rose from 72 to 75.17, that of convictions to total true cases disposed of fell from 65 to 61. The percentage of persons convicted to persons tried also shows a fall off,—the figures being 56.48 against 64.77 in the previous year. As regards cases falling under Class VI, the percentages of conviction to cases disposed of and decided by trial declined from 93 and 91.11 to 86 and 88.57, while that of persons convicted to persons tried improved a little, being 89.18 against 88 last year.
- 4. In none of the excluded cases was Section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code made use of.
- 5. There were 56 cases of theft against 42 in the year previous. The number of thefts from stations and goods-sheds increased from 37 to 50, that of thefts from running trains from 3 to 4, while that of thefts from passengers remained the same, viz., 2. One of the thefts from running trains and two from passengers are reported to have been detected and ended in conviction. Out of the property stolen (Rs. 8,462) recoveries amounted to Rs. 2,725 or 32.20 per cent. against 46.39. There is a similar fall in the percentage of cases in which property was recovered. This was 68 as against 87 in 1898.
- 6. As regards the working of Chapter VIII of the Criminal Procedure Code, 5 cases were taken up against 4 in the preceding year, all of which ended in conviction.
- 7. The strength of the force during the year was the same as in the proceeding year. The total cost of the force, however, shows an increase of Rs. 3,961 over the preceding year, which is explained in paragraph 18 (b) of the report.
- 8. Fewer punishments were inflicted during the year. None of the officers or men obtained any reward or promotion for special services. The number of good service tickets bestowed fell from 32 to 23.
 - 9. No explanation has been given by the Superintendent, of his omission to visit 2 of the 4 serious crimes and 3 out-posts.
 - 10. The attention of the Railway Authorities may be invited to the necessity for completing the line-fencing and to the defective scaling of wagons pointed out by the Superintendent of Police.
 - 11. The undersigned concurs in the remarks made by the Inspector-General of Police in paragraph 27 of the report, and hopes that better results will appear next year.

- (b) Of Police cognizable cases under 'Indian Penal Code' alone, 1,141 were reported during the year as compared with 829 in the year 1598. The Superintendent is unable to explain the increase in the number of cases under the first three Acts, but that under the Railway Act he attributes to cases which were formerly treated as non-cognizable now being treated as cognizable.

There is a further increase under both the heads of 42 and 16 cases, espectively, under "All classes", chiefly due to the large increase of crime reported towards the latter part of the year for investigation.

- 5. The number of excluded cases during the year was 108 as against 79 in the previous year. Of this number, 87 were under Indian Penal Code and 21 under Class VI. Of the 108 cases, 56 were excluded after trial. The percentage of excluded cases to cases for disposal is 7.14 as against 7.1 in the preceding year.
- 6. Of the total number of excluded cases, viz., 108, 11 were classed as 'maliciously false.' In two of them, sanction of the Magistrate to prosecute was applied for and granted; both cases ending in conviction. In one case sanction to prosecute was accorded by the Superintendent of Police, but was not finally disposed of at the close of the year.
- 7. As in the previous year, in no case was Section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code applied to and compensation awarded to the accused.
- 8. Undetected cases numbered 556 as against 428 in the preceding year. Of this number, 539 were under Indian Penal Code and 17 under Class VI as against 411 and 17, respectively, in the previous year. The percentages of cases remaining undetected to true cases disposed of are given below.

It is satisfactory to note that notwithstanding the increase in crime, the percentages of undetected cases have slightly improved. A large number of undetected cases, viz., 66 and 451, respectively, come under the heads of Housebreaking and Thefts.

- 9. (a) The Police had during the year under report to deal with 1,511 cases: of this number, 108 were excluded, 556 remained undetected. 724 cases were decided by trial, of which 664 ended in conviction. 119 cases were pending at the close of the year.
- (b) The percentage of real cases ending in convictions to true cases disposed of during the year was under "All classes" 51.87; under Indian Penal Code, 41.59, and under Class VI, 89.45, as against 47.91, 39.78 and 80.70, respectively, in the previous year.

11. The number of persons arrested by the Police upon the report or other information was 1,124 as against 689 in the preceding year. One person was in Police custody or on bail at the beginning of the year. Of the 1,125 persons for disposal, 27 were released without being brought to trial, giving a percentage 2.40 as against 2.32 in the previous year. The corresponding figures under Indian Penal Code alone were 786 and 3.05, respectively, as against 508 and 3.14 in the year 1898. Three persons were released by the Magistrate's order before trial as against 4 in the year before. Nine persons were on bail or in Police custody at the close of the year. 1,086 persons were sent up for trial and 17 were under trial at the beginning of the year—a total of 1,103 as against 682 in the previous year. 1,027 persons were tried during the year, of whom 832 were convicted, 76 were pending at the trial at the close of the year. It is satisfactory to note that notwithstanding a large increase in the number of persons for disposal, the success of the Police in dealing with them as in onses, has been more than maintained.

- 12. Under 'Serious crime' there was one case of culpable homicide which ended in discharge, one case of datoity which remained undetected. There were 11 cases of robbery, of which 8 remained undetected and 3 ended in conviction. The Police have again been very unsuccessful in dealing with serious crime and are badly in need of detective ability.
- 13. (a) The amount of the property stolen during the year under report was Rs. 43,759 as compared with Rs. 28,238 in the previous year. Including property worth Rs. 1,468 involved in pending cases of the previous year, the total amount to be accounted for is Rs. 45,227 as against Rs. 29,403. Recoveries amounted to Rs. 17,519, giving a percentage of 38.73 as against 42.29 in the year 1898.

Property was stolen in 1,069 cases and recovered in 609.

- (b) During the year under report, property to the amount of Rs. 5,191 which was stolen in other districts was recovered by the Police of this Railway: this is satisfactory.
- 14. (a) No recognized bad characters reside within Railway limits, but a general supervision is exercised by the Police. No suspicious foreigners were noticed on the line.

15. Five cases were tried during the year in the Court of Sessions, 4 ending in conviction and 1 in discharge or acquittal. The number of persons concerned in these cases were 5, of whom 4 were convicted and 1 was discharged or acquitted.

Non-cognizable Crime.

- 16. The total number of non-cognizable crimes reported on the line has increased from 149 in the year 1893 to 167 in the year under report. The increase is chiefly noticeable in the number of cases under the Railway Act, the figures being 137 in the year 1899 as compared with 107 in the previous year. Only 11 cases were referred to the Police for investigation as against 26 in the previous year. In connection with the non-cognizable crimes dealt with, 205 persons appeared before the Court during the year under report as against 176 in the preceding year, of whom 177 were convicted and 22 acquitted or discharged. Four persons were discharged after appearance without trial. The percentage of convictions was 86 as against 85 in the year 1893.
- 17. (a) The Police force on the whole Railway comprized 208 officers and 1,067 men. It shows an increase on the strength shown in the previous year as detailed below.

Ten officers and 37 constables sanctioned for the Tapti Valley Railway—vide Government Resolution No. 4918 of 29th October 1898, Financial Department;

One constable for Railway Offices—Government Resolution No. 3716 of 8th August 1899, Financial Department;

Two Constables for Elphinstone Crossing—vide Government Resolution No. 8223 of 9th November 1899, Judicial Department;

or a total increase of 10 officers and 40 constables.

- (b) The above force was maintained at a total cost of Rs. 2,38,508 as against Rs. 2,24,376 for the previous year. The increase being due to the additional Police sanctioned and fluctuation in exchange compensation allowances.
- (c) In addition to the above force, 192 Police ramoshis (94 temporary and 98 permanent) were employed during the year at a total cost of Rs. 14,550. The increase was due to employment of extra men on account of heavy Railway traffic.

An additional force of the following strength was also employed during the year for duty connected with plague at a total cost of Rs. 7,532:—

Five head constables and 55 constables on the R.-M. Railway.

Two head constables and 32 constables on the B. B. & C. I. Railway.

There was an increase of 17 Railway stations due to opening of 12 stations on the new Tapty Valley Railway, 3 stations on the Rajpipla Railway, and 2 road-side stations on the R.-M. Railway: the total number of stations on the whole Railway being 347 during the year.

- 18. (a) The total number of punishments inflicted during the year was 225 as against 164 in the previous year. This number comprised 44 dismissals, 167 departmental punishments of fine, degradation and suspensions, and 14 judicial punishments. The increase in the number of punishments during the year is attributed to more strict supervision which was found necessary owing to heavier duties and responsibilities in consequence of extra traffic.
- (b) In no case was dismissal ordered for receiving bribes or suppressing crime. Departmental punishments were generally awarded for petty offences such as sleeping or remaining absent from duty, &c. Of the 14 judicial punishments, 2 were under the Police Act, 10 for thefts, &c., and 2 under the Railway Act.
- (c) The percentage of total number of punishments to total strength is 17.70, that of dismissals alone being 3.46, and departmental punishments, including dismissals, 16.60. Similar percentages for last year were, respectively, 13.43, 1.71, 12.36.
- 19. The force contains 184 officers and 561 men who can read and write as against 172 officers and 489 in the previous year. The percentage of education among officers is 90·19 and among men 52·57 as compared with 88·65 and 47·61, respectively, in the previous year: the average percentage for the three years preceding the year under report is 83·91 for officers and 46·66 for men. 111 educated officers and men were enlisted in the Police of the district during the year as against 84 in the preceding year.
- 20. Eight officers and 10 men of the Police obtained rewards in connection with the investigation and detection of crime. Eight of the Railway Police and 5 of the A'bkari Police received rewards in cases under Salt, Customs, Opium and A'bkari Acts.

The number of officers and men rewarded by promotion for specially good service was 3 as against 4 in the previous year. The number of good service tickets received by the Railway Police was—

- 21. The health of the Police force was on the whole good, the percentage of sickness being 24°34 as against 27°52 in 1898. Out of the 20 deaths among the Police during the year, 5 were from plague on the B. B. and C. I. Railway. The deceased were not inoculated nor were any members of the force.

All the officers and men who have been enlisted as educated can read and write vernacular language of the Railway. None of them can read and write English.

23. Constantly employed as the Police on the Railway are on their various duties, there is not much time for drill and a high standard cannot be expected, but in marching and executing general formations they are on the whole very fairly good.

- 24. One prisoner escaped during the year from the custody of the Railway Police, but was recaptured. The man responsible for the escape was prosecuted and convicted.
- 25. The standard of general efficiency and conduct of the Police has on the whole been good. There has, owing to scarcity over a very large area through which the line passes, been a considerable increase in amount of crime and the number of persons arrested, but the Police have been more successful in coping with it. The large number of thefts committed during the year from running trains and passengers indicate the need for greater vigilance on the part of the Police in controlling the movements of bad characters, but the heavy watch and ward duties in guarding goods at station and sheds leave very few men available for detective and other Police duties in connection with running trains.

27. There were 19 Police stations and 103 outposts during the year under report as compared with 19 and 97, respectively, during the previous year. The increase of 6 outposts is due to new posts having been opened on the Tapti Valley Railway. On the B. B. and C. I. Railway the number of existing Police stations having been found insufficient, additional Police stations have been recommended to Government—vide correspondence ending with this office letter No. 1493, dated 3rd February 1900.*

Mr. Noble inspected all the Police stations and outposts on the R.-M. Railway, but was unable to visit those on the B. B. & C. I. Railway, except 1 Police station and 2 outposts in Bombay, owing to his absence on three months' leave.

28. There were during the year 9 collisions to running trains resulting in loss of 6 lives and 15 persons injured. Of these, 1 was enquired into by the Superintendent of Police, 2 by Assistant Superintendents of Police, and 6 by Inspectors and chief constables. The Superintendent observes that of 9 collisions, only 2 were serious, resulting in loss of life.

Of accidents, such as persons being run over, falling from trains and such like, there were 269, which resulted in the loss of 80 lives and injury to 149 persons. Seven were enquired into by Assistant Superintendents of Police, 14 by Inspectors, and the rest by chief constables.

There were 45 cases of derailment, only one of which was serious, viz., a passenger train on the B. B. & C. I. Railway was derailed owing to the removal of 3 fish-plates. Two persons were killed and 8 injured by the accident. The accused were traced, tried and convicted. The case was enquired into by the Assistant Superintendent of Police.

- 29. All the men were provided with quarters during the year on the R.-M. Railway, but there is still a great want of accommodation on the B. B. & C. I. line. The matter has been separately brought to the notice of Government.
 - 30. The Police helped in 19 cases to extinguish fires.
 - 31. There were 146 accidents to cattle.
 - 32. 23 miles of the Railway line was fenced during the year.

The total length of the line remaining unfenced being 1,004 miles.

- 33. No dismissed gangmen were found concerned in any mischief on the Railway during the year.
- 31. The Superintendent reports that the lighting of stations, and especially at yards, is very deficient, and that the lighting of carriages is open to improvement.
 - 35. The system of checking seals of wagons is reported to be good.
- 36. In accordance with the order of Government contained in their Judicial Memorandum No. 2188, dated 21th March 1896, and No. 2301, dated 25th

REMARKS OF THE COMMISSIONER, NORTHERN DIVISION, ON THE ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE B. B. & C. I. AND R.-M. RAILWAY POLICE FOR THE YEAR 1809.

No. \$69 of 1900.

Camp Broach, 28th April 1900,

The year was marked by an increase of crime under all heads, as might have been expected; robberies, house-breakings with intent to commit theft, thefts, and cases of receiving stolen property showing the largest increases. The percentages exhibit a slight improvement as contrasted with those of the preceding year, but they are still not as good as they might be and the proportion of undetected cases is very high, notably of serious crime with which the Police failed altogether, the only case of daceity and 8 out of 11 robberies remaining undetected. The percentage of stolen property recovered is also very low and in unfavourable contrast with that attained in 1898. The untoward circumstances of the latter half of the year were, however, exceptional and sufficient to mar the results, judged by statistics, of the work of any body of Railway Police, charged with the duties of watch and ward over a line traversing a large area suffering acutely from famine. Extra Police Ramoshis were engaged to the number of 192 to deal with additional work, but their preventive influence must have been limited. The conduct of the Police has deteriorated judging by the increase in punishments, but that again may be due to the trying circumstances of the year. Scenes of serious crimes were promptly visited.

2. The complaint is repeated of want of suitable accommodation for the Police on the B. B. & C. I. Railway and the subject is under the consideration of Government. The men should be properly housed as soon as possible.

There has been no addition to the length of the G. I. P. Railway and Southern Marátha Railway lines, but the length of the B. B. & C. I. Railway section has increased by 135 miles owing to the opening of 121 miles of the Tapti Valley Railway and 14 of the Rájpipla line. The number of stations on the G. I. P. and Southern Marátha Railways has remained stationary, viz., 128 and 05, respectively, but that on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways has increased by 17 as explained in my report on that Railway. Similarly, the Police strength on this Railway has increased by 50 men as explained in the report. There is no change in the Police strength on the other two Railways. The number of Rámoshis employed on the B. B. & C. I. and Rájputana-Málwa Railways has increased from 146 to 192 and on the G. I. P. Railway from 48 to 62 in the year under report. On the Southern Marátha Railway only 15 Rámoshis were employed, the same as in 1898. The proportion of the permanent Police force to the miléage is 1.29 on the G. I. P. Railway and 2.07 on the Southern Marátha Railway, the same as in the previous year. On the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways it is 1.85 as against 1.82 in the preceding year. It will be seen that the Southern Marátha Railway is still the worst off in respect to Police strength. There was a large increase of Rs. 0,21,276 on the G. I. P. Railway and of Rs. 55,32,911 on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways in the amount of Railway receipts. The Southern Marátha Railway showed a decrease of Rs. 7,18,489 in this respect.

Considerable increase is noticeable on the G. I. P. and B. B. & C. I and Rajputána-Málwa Railways, which is, as explained in my reports on these Railways, chiefly attributable to famine. On the Southern Marátha Railway crime has practically remained stationary. The increase of crime would seem to be in proportion to the increase in traffic as evidenced by the large increase in the amount of Railway receipts. The class of crime which is most prevalent is theft, and is classified and compared as follows:—

A comparison of the two years' figures will show that increase in thefts is found under "Stations and Goods-sheds and otherwise" and "Running Trains." The increase of thefts from running trains is remarkable on the B. B. & C. I and Rajputána-Málwa Railways, and is no doubt due to famine and the distressed condition of the people over a considerable area through which the line passes. There is a decrease in the number of thefts from passengers on all the Railways.

4. The following percentage table indicates that the results obtained by the Police on the Railways in dealing with cases are on the whole satisfactory. Looking to the results obtained by each Railway separately, the Southern Marátha Railway has obtained the highest percentage, viz., 60, in real cognizable cases under Indian Penal Code, ending in conviction to true cases disposed of; while in cases decided by trial, the highest percentage is obtained on the G. I. P. Railway, viz., 87. The percentages under these two heads show a small improvement on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways. Under Class VI, the G. I. P. Railway shows the best percentages, viz., 94 and 95, followed by the B. B. & O. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways. Those of the Southern Marátha Railway, viz., 86 and 88, though satisfactory, are somewhat lower than those of the previous year. Under All Classes' the percentage of real cognizable cases ending in conviction to true cases disposed of is 70 on the Southern Marátha Railway as compared with 66 on the G. I. P. Railway and 51 on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways. In cases ending in conviction to cases decided by trial, the G. I. P. Railway has the highest percentage, viz., 91, as against 86 on

the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways, and 80 on the Southern-Marátha Railway. As regards persons, the percentage of persons convicted to persons for disposal under Indian Penal Code is 68 on the G. I. P. and B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways. Under Class VI, the Southern Marátha Railway has the highest percentage, viz., 89, as compared with 88 on the G. I. P. and 82 on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways. On the other hand, under "All Classes" the highest percentage, viz., 76, is obtained on the G. I. P. Railway as against 72 on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways and 64 on the Southern Marátha Railway. In persons convicted to persons disposed of by trial, the G. I. P. Railway shows the best percentages, and which are a considerable improvement on those of the previous year. The percentages obtained under this head on the other two Railways also show an improvement as compared with the percentages of the preceding year.

There is a very large increase in the amount of the property stolen on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways though the recoveries have fallen by only 3 per cent. On the Southern Marátha Railway the amount of property stolen is nearly double that of the previous year and recoveries have decreased from 46 per cent. to 32 per cent. On the G. I. P. Railway there is a decrease in the amount of the property stolen and the percentage of recoveries has increased from 28 to 36. This comparative success of the G. I. P. Railway must be regarded as satisfactory. The percentages of recoveries on the three Railways leave much still to be desired, but it must be borne in mind that stolen grain, which comprises a large proportion of the stolen property, is difficult to identify.

It is satisfactory to note that notwithstanding the increase in the number of arrests, the percentage of persons released without trial has decreased on the G. I. P., on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways it has slightly increased from 2.32 to 2.40, and on the Southern Marátha Railway it has risen from 1.67 in 1898 to 3.007 in 1899.

There is a small improvement of 4 per cent. in education on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways; while on the G. I. P. Railway and Southern Marátha Railway the percentage of education has remained stationary. Dismissals show a decrease of 10 on the G. I. P. Railway. On the other hand there is an increase from 21 to 44 on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways. Other Departmental punishments show a considerable increase on the G. I. P. and B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways, while there is a decrease from 74 to 42 on the Southern Marátha Railway. Judicial punishments on the G. I. P. and B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways have practically remained the same. There is a considerable falling off in the number of money rewards and good conduct tickets on the G. I. P. Railway. The number of rewards earned by the Police on the B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways has decreased from 75 to 18, though they received 69 good conduct tickets as against 50 in the previous year. Only two money rewards were earned by the Southern Marátha Railway Police as compared with none in the previous year; on the other hand, the number of good conduct tickets fell from 32 to 23 in the year under report. The percentages of sickness have fallen on all the Railways, the falling off on the G. I. P. and Southern Marátha Railways being remarkable.

10. I have remarked on the deficiency of Polico quarters in my report on each Railway, except the Rajputána-Malwa Railway. The inconvenience from this is chiefly experienced by the men living in the Town and Island of Bombay. I have submitted a special report to Government on the subject, which is, I believe, under consideration.

11. As desired by Government, I submit the subjoined table showing traffic returns on each Railway.

The reports of the G. I. P. and B. B. & C. I. and Rajputána-Málwa Railways were received later than last year and that of the Southern Marátha Railway was received a few days earlier. The District Magistrates' returns were much delayed, though the date prescribed for submission of their returns in Government Resolution No. 3419, dated 17th May 1899, Judicial Department, was 1st February. Some difficulty was experienced this year in preparing the Inspector-General's report on each Railway, as the Superintendents' reports were prepared from the Supplementary Statement No. 1, which was subsequently discontinued by Government Resolution No. 324, dated 15th January 1900, Judicial Department, and the Inspector-General's reports had therefore to be prepared direct from Statement A, Parts III and IV. Form of Statement C (Return of Property Stolen and Récovered) was also changed and a fresh return had to be called for from each Railway in the new form sanctioned in Government Resolution No. 824, dated 15th January 1900, Judicial Department
