REPORT ON PUBLIC INSTRUCTION IN BOMBAY FOR 1945-46.

CHAPTER I.

GENERAL PROGRESS.

1(1). The year under report was one of steady progress obscured partially by the after-effects of the War, the continued high cost of living and the somewhat unsettled condition of the masses. After

Introduction. the cessation of hostilities there was however ample evidence of an effort made both by official and non-official agencies to utilise all possible resources to recover the lost ground. The increase of 445 institutions and of 95,546 pupils during the year is thus an encouraging feature which augurs well for the post-war plans of educational reconstruction which Government have in view. The total expenditure on Public Instruction increased from Rs. 616·7 lakhs to 723·9 lakhs and the Provincial expenditure also increased from Rs. 240·9 lakhs to 288·6 lakhs which formed 39·9 per cent. of the total expenditure on Public Instruction as against 39·1 per cent. in the preceding year. The following sub-paragraphs summarise the year's progress as revealed by statistics:—

The total number of educational institutions increased by 445 to 21,598 of which 21,312 were recognised and 286 unrecognised. The

(i) **Institutions.** recognised institutions comprised 28 Arts and Science colleges, 19 Professional colleges, 1,100 Secondary schools, 18,263 Primary schools, and 1,902 Special schools. The increase was shared by all types of educational institutions except Primary schools which shewed a drop of 263 most of which were approved schools. Of the 21,657 towns and villages, 13,000 have schools while there are some 127 large villages without schools. The educational needs of 35 of these villages are however served by neighbouring villages with schools.

The total number of pupils in all kinds of educational institutions increased by 95,546 to 1,991,415 of whom 1,430,141 were boys and 561,274 girls. The increase in the number of pupils was shared by all types of recognised institutions. The percentage of male scholars under instruction to the total male population increased from 12·55 to 13·22 and of female scholars from 5·36 to 5·59.

system or by holding some classes in buildings which were ill-suited for school purposes. The dearth of Secondary teachers continued during the year under report as competent graduates could find better appointments elsewhere. Without an appreciable increase in the number of professionally trained teachers and of specialist teachers for the upper standards the work in Secondary schools is not likely to improve. In addition, the class-room work right from Standard IV onwards is dominated by the requirements of the Matriculation Examination, so that most schools lose sight of the real requirements of Secondary Education for pupils of different capacities and aptitudes.

There was steady progress in the field of University education also. The number of Arts and Professional colleges increased by 7 during the year under report and the rush for admission in some of the important colleges was very great. The question of starting another University at Poona was taken up seriously during the year and Government appointed a Committee under the Chairmanship of the Director of Public Instruction to draft the Bill for the Poona University as well as to take all preliminary steps for the starting of the University.

The importance of Adult Education can hardly be overstressed. In addition to the work done by the Adult Education classes throughout the Province, some areas were selected for concentrated effort. An officer of the rank of the Assistant Deputy Educational Inspector was put in special charge of each of these areas and it was his duty to see that all the illiterate adults in that area were made literate. The work done in these areas is reported to be satisfactory. It would not, however, be sufficient to concentrate only on literacy in these centres. These centres should, in reality, be social centres where adults can meet and discuss things of common interest. The main thing in Adult Education is to provide a real and genuine motive for learning new things, including reading and writing. An adult must feel that the Adult Education work is a part of his life and enriches that life, giving it a greater meaning and significance.

There were 5 permanent members of the All-India (I.E.S.) Service of whom 4 were Indians and 1 European. Permanent B. E. S. Class I officers numbered 38 all of whom were Indians.

Mr. S. N. Moos, I.E.S., proceeded on leave from 10th June, 1945, preparatory to retirement. Mr. R. P. Patwardhan officiated as Director of Public Instruction from 10th June, 1945 onwards during the year.

The Provincial expenditure on Direction and Inspection together amounted to Rs. 17,44,876 which formed 6.0 per cent. of the total Provincial expenditure on Education.

CHAPTER III.

UNIVERSITY.

3(1). The constitution, administration and functions of the Bombay University have been described in previous Reports. An account of the Arts and Professional colleges in this Province is given in Chapters IV and V of this Report.

3(2). There were in all 66 Arts, Science and Professional colleges affiliated to the University, (inclusive of 11 colleges newly affiliated during the year) including the School of Economics and Sociology and the Department of Chemical Technology maintained by the University. Of the 66 colleges, 46 with 27,768 students were situated in the Province, 11 with 4,562 students in Indian States and 9 with 3,700 students in Sind.

The total number of students attending the 66 affiliated colleges was 36,030, an increase of 1,115 during the year.

3(3). The total receipts of the University amounted to Rs. 26,29,579 and the total expenditure to Rs. 29,03,310. The Government grant of Rs. 2,12,000 paid to the University for the year was made up of the annual grant of Rs. 1,59,500 recurring and Rs. 52,500 non-recurring. Out of this non-recurring grant, a sum of Rs. 45,000 was paid on account of dearness and war allowance paid by the University to its employees.

3(4). The following table shows the number of students who graduated from the affiliated colleges and of those who obtained the Master's degree during the year :—

The results of the various degree and other examinations of candidates in the British Districts held by the University during the year are given in Government of India table VIII published with this Report.

3(5). The School of Economics and Sociology maintained by the University had 239 students including 54 research students. Of the latter, 18 were engaged in research for the degree of M.A., one for M.Sc. (Agri.), and 35 for the Ph.D. During the year one student submitted a thesis for the M.A. degree and seven for the Ph.D. Of these 5 were accepted and the results of the remaining three were awaited. The school has a good library, which provides facilities for research in Economics and Sociology, comprising about 29,000 volumes, which is widely used not only by scholars but also by Government Departments and by Commercial and Industrial concerns in the City. The Agricultural Economics Section of the School began functioning actively during the year.

3(6). The Department of Chemical Technology maintained by the University is the only Centre in this Province for Technological training and research, and had 169 students, an increase of 17 during the year. Of these, 119 were reading in the degree classes, and 50 were engaged in research. Fifty-three students appeared for the B.Sc. (Tech.) examination held in March, 1946, and 43 passed. Nine students qualified for higher degrees by research.

The Department conducted a number of important investigations in industrial research which were subsidised by various industrialists, individual organisations and Government Departments. There were also in operation in the Department some schemes of research in dyes, under the auspices of the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research.

3(7). The Foreign Universities Information Bureau is composed of the Vice-Chancellor and seven other members appointed by the Syndicate to represent the various branches of University education. The Bureau not only gives expert advice and help to students seeking admission to Indian and Foreign Universities, but it also serves as a channel through which inquiries and applications from students from this Province are forwarded to educational institutions in Foreign countries.

There has been a very marked increase in the number of applications for admission to educational institutions in the United Kingdom and the U. S. A. During the year the Bureau received 418 applications as against 103 in the preceding year. About 2,500 documents were issued to students on various matters connected with Indian and Foreign Universities and about 4,500 written enquiries were replied to, besides a very large number of inquiries made in person.

3(8). The year continued to be one of steady work and progress and no distracting influences had been at work to divert students from their studies, sports and other healthy activities.

Discipline.

3(9). The following is a brief summary of the important events connected with the University during the year:—

(1) The University instituted a new degree—Bachelor of Textiles—in the Faculty of Technology.

(2) During the year, the University Senate passed a resolution laying down the minimum terms and conditions of service of the teaching staff in affiliated colleges (old and new) with a view to furthering academic efficiency and ensuring security of tenure. The fulfilment of these requirements is now laid down as one of the conditions for affiliation of new colleges.

Establishment of other Regional Universities.—The recommendations of the Maharashtra University Committee (Jayakar Committee) were under the consideration of Government during the earlier part of the year. As a result, Government came to the conclusion that a strong case existed for the decentralisation of the University of Bombay's functions by the establishment of more Universities and that Poona possessed ideal advantages for a University. Government, therefore, expressed its readiness to establish a University at Poona, of a mixed type (as recommended by the Jayakar Committee), viz. with both teaching and affiliating functions, to undertake the requisite legislation for the purpose and to give financial assistance to the extent recommended by the Committee (viz. Rs. 5 lakhs non-recurring and Rs. 2½ lakhs recurring). A Conference was accordingly held in February, 1946, at Poona to consider the steps necessary to bring into being the new University. As recommended by the Conference, a Committee with the Director of Public Instruction as Chairman, was appointed towards the end of the year (March, 1946) to take the necessary steps viz. to draw up a detailed scheme on the basis of which the adhesion of the Poona Colleges to the proposed University could be secured, to select a site and to draft a bill for the Poona University for the consideration of Government.

CHAPTER IV.

ARTS AND SCIENCE COLLEGES.

4(1). The number of Arts and Science colleges in this Province increased during the year by 5 to 28 and the number of students in them by 912 to 20,889. Five Arts colleges viz. the R. P. Gogate College, Ratnagiri, Pratap College, Amalner, Narayanrao Topiwalla College, Bassein, Moolji Jaitha Arts and Science College, Jalgaon, and Vijay College, Bijapur, were affiliated to the Bombay University during the year. The Sophia College, Bombay, is the only Arts College for Women in this Province. Of the 28 Arts and Science Colleges, including the University School of Economics and Sociology, Bombay, and the Deccan College Post-graduate and Research Institute, Poona, 5 are maintained by Government, one by the Bombay University, three by Christian Missions and 19 by other educational bodies.

4(2). The total expenditure on Arts and Science colleges increased by over Rs. 7.73 lakhs to over 47 lakhs and was met from the following sources :—

The Grants-in-aid paid to Arts and Science colleges during the year amounted to Rs. 1,59,000, the same as last year.

4(3). The important Research Institutes in Arts are the Deccan College and Arts Research Institutes- the Kannada Research Institutes.

The Deccan College Post-graduate and Research Institute, Poona, carries on research in Oriental languages, Linguistics, and Indian History. The Institute had 43 students, including 3 women. During the year four students were declared eligible for the Ph.D. A grant of Rs. 75,013 was paid to the Institute for 1945-46.

During a part of the year under report Dr. H. D. Sankalia worked as Field Director of the Archaeological expedition to Brahmapuri, at the invitation of the Kolhapur Government. The expedition brought to light a number of antiquities.

The Kannada Research Institute, Dharwar, is intended for research work in the cultural history of the Karnatak. The work consists mainly of collection

of basic material, development and interpretation and publications. The Museum and the Institute Library provide valuable material for advanced research. During the year 15 students were working for the Ph.D. under the guidance of the Director of the Institute. Three extension lectures on the various aspects of Karnatak History were delivered by the Director for the benefit of the students. Several manuscripts, sculptures, coins, etc., were added to the collection at the Institute during the year.

4(4). The main Science Research Institutes are the Department of Chemical Science Research Institutes. Technology maintained by the Bombay University and the Royal Institute of Science, Bombay. An account of the former is given in Chapter III.

The Royal Institute of Science, Bombay, specializes in Science teaching and research. The number of students at the Institute increased during the year by 25 to 286 of whom 210 were reading in the Degree classes and 76 were post-graduate students. Research work was carried on both by the staff and the students. Thirteen papers in the various Departments of Science were published during the year, while 22 were in the press.

The Institute celebrated its Silver Jubilee during the year. The occasion was marked by a meeting which was inaugurated by His Excellency Sir John Colville and addressed by Sir S. S. Bhatnagar. A Silver Jubilee Commemoration Volume, a Science Exhibition and Popular lectures on Scientific subjects were other features of the Celebrations.

4(5). The following table gives the number of students who passed the degree examinations in Arts and Science held in 1944-45 and 1945-46 from the colleges in the British Districts of this Province:—

CHAPTER V.

PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES.

5(1). This Chapter deals with Professional colleges in this Province affiliated to the Bombay University. An account of Professional schools such as Technical and Industrial schools, Commercial schools and classes etc. is given in Chapter IX.

Introduction.

There were 13 Professional colleges affiliated to the Bombay University during the year under report (2 more than in the previous year) and the number of students rose by 456 to 6,879. The two newly started colleges are the Sir Currimbhoy Ebrahim Memorial Dental College and Hospital, Bombay, and the Veterinary College, Bombay. A statistical summary of the Professional colleges is given in subsidiary table No. 1 published in the Supplement to this report. An account of the various types of Professional colleges is given in the following paragraphs:—

5(2). The College of Engineering, Poona, which is the only institution of its kind in this Province maintains classes for both the degree and the diploma courses in Civil, Mechanical and

Engineering.

Electrical Engineering. An account of the Diploma classes is given in Chapter IX. To meet the P. W. D. Post-War demand for trained Engineers, the number of fresh admissions to the Degree classes was raised from 100 to 150 since the last year. These classes now have 429 students as against 339 in the preceding year. The revised course extending over a period of 3½ years in Civil and Mechanical and Electrical Engineering was introduced with effect from June, 1944. To cope with the increased number of students and the requirements of the revised courses, an additional staff comprising 4 Professors, 8 Lecturers and Assistant Lecturers, 4 Demonstrators and 4 minor posts was sanctioned during the year.

The College continued to train skilled artisans for the Labour Department of the Government of India. A special training class for sub-overseers required for the P. W. D. was also conducted in the College from August, 1945.

5(3). In addition to the Sydenham College of Commerce and Economics, Bombay, which is maintained by Government, three colleges of Commerce are maintained by public bodies.

Commerce.

Of the four colleges, two are in Bombay, one in Ahmedabad and one in Poona. The demand for admission to these colleges is rapidly increasing. The number of students in these 4 colleges increased by 81 to 2,941. The Principal, Sydenham College of Commerce and Economics, Bombay, reports that on account of the favourable conditions created by the war, students graduating from the college have had no difficulty in securing well-paid employment, but that these favourable conditions might not continue long, especially as, with four other Commerce colleges in the Province, the number of Commerce graduates turned out annually would soon be large.

5(4). The College of Agriculture, Poona, which is the only institution of its kind in this Province is under the control of the Department of Agriculture. The College prepares students

Agriculture.

for the Degree of B.Sc. (Agri.) of the Bombay University and also undertakes Post-graduate work. The College aims at training at least 100 Agricultural graduates annually. To meet the demand for trained personnel for Post-War schemes for agricultural development in this Province the number of admissions was further increased from 150 to 250 during this year. There was also a corresponding increase in the teaching staff. The College had 439 students on the

rolls as against 307 in the preceding year. Several additional buildings were also constructed in connection with the expansion of the College.

5(5). There were 2 Medical Colleges in this Province. The Grant Medical College, Bombay, which is under the control of the **Medicine.** Medical Department had 765 students and the G. S. Medical College which is maintained by the Bombay Municipality had 588.

5(6). Apart from the Government Law College, Bombay, which is maintained **Law.** by this Department, there are four Law Colleges maintained by public bodies. The number of students in all these colleges increased by 96 to 1,290.

5(7). Government maintained two colleges for Secondary teachers—one in **Secondary Training Colleges.** Bombay and the other at Belgaum. A College for Secondary teachers is also maintained in Poona by the Shikshan Prasarak Mandali. The number of students in these colleges decreased by 14 to 213.

5(8). The following **Examinations.** table compares the number of students who passed the Professional Degree examinations in 1944-45 and 1945-46 from colleges in the British Districts:—

CHAPTER VI.

SECONDARY EDUCATION.

6(1). In this Province the term "Secondary" is applied to schools and classes in which English is taught, whereas in other Provinces the figures for Secondary education include pupils in Primary Middle Schools. This Chapter deals mainly with Secondary schools for boys, an account of Secondary schools for girls being given in Chapter XII and of European schools in Chapter XIII.

6(2). There were 1,100 Secondary schools (including English classes attached to Primary schools) for boys and girls, an increase of 85 Schools and Pupils. during the year. The number of pupils also increased by 31,325 to 263,514. The Government of India tables published with this Report give combined statistics of all types of Secondary schools. The following table compares the number of Secondary schools and pupils during the last two years :—

It will be seen that the increase in the number of Secondary schools and pupils was shared by all the Divisions. The increase was due to normal expansion. Appendix I of this Report gives the classification of boys and girls in Secondary schools by various communities.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS FOR BOYS.

6(3). The number of Secondary schools for boys, excluding European schools, increased by 72 to 908 of which 409 were High Schools, 208 Middle Schools and 291 English Classes attached to Primary schools. The number of pupils in these 908 institutions

increased by 27,960 to 222,859 of whom 201,274 were boys and 21,585 girls. The following table compares the distribution of the schools and the pupils by each Division :—

It will be seen that while the number of Government Secondary schools remained the same viz. 18, the number of pupils in these schools increased by 322 to 5,060. This increase was due to normal expansion. The drop in the number of Municipal schools was due to the transfer of a few Municipal Secondary schools to private management. To meet the growing demand for admission into Secondary schools,

several schools which were opened during the year were taken on the list of recognised schools and some unaided schools were given grant-in-aid during 1945-46. This accounts for the increase in the number of aided schools and decrease in the number of unaided schools. There was an all-round increase in the number of pupils under instruction in all types of Secondary schools except unaided schools.

The number of candidates who appeared for the Matriculation examination held in April, 1946, from schools in the British Districts, increased by 5,810 to 28,312 of whom 13,696 or 48·4 per cent. passed. The following table compares the results for the last two years :—

The Elementary and the Intermediate Drawing (Grade) examination were held during the year at 172 Centres in the Province. The number of candidates at these examinations is steadily increasing. The following table gives the results of the examinations :—

It is gratifying to note that in spite of the great scarcity of Drawing materials, the number of candidates appearing for the Drawing Examinations is steadily increasing every year.

6(4). Government maintain 18 Secondary schools of which one is a Middle Government Secondary School. Of the 17 High Schools, 10 follow the ordinary Secondary school course leading to the Matriculation examination of the Bombay University, while the following seven have been converted into Vocational schools :—

Of the 5,060 pupils in Government Secondary schools, 1,826 were in Vocational schools, an increase of 167 over the previous year. This increase is an encouraging feature and an indication of the steadily increasing popularity of the Vocational course.

Apart from the seven Government Vocational schools eight Vocational schools are maintained by private bodies. Of these seven are commercial schools attended by 586 pupils. Grants amounting to Rs. 11,965 were paid to three of these eight schools during the year.

6(5). Of the 890 non-Government Secondary schools for boys, 392 were High Schools and 498 Middle Schools, including 291 English Secondary Schools and English Classes attached to Primary schools. A large majority of the English classes cater to the educational needs of small places in which it is difficult to maintain Secondary schools. These classes bridge the gulf between the rural Primary schools and the Secondary schools for children of the rural communities, who would otherwise have been cut off from the benefits of secondary and higher education.

Most of the Secondary schools have introduced the Government Provident Funds Scheme and a large number of schools have, with the sanction of the Department, adopted rules regulating the terms of employment and conditions of service of the teaching staff.

An additional sum of Rs. 5,50,000 was provided by Government during the year for maintenance grants to Secondary schools and it was therefore possible to shift ahead the Datum Line year and to pay grants at a little higher rate and also to award small token grants to schools recently recognised. With the prospect of a further addition to the provision, it is hoped that the managements will be in a position to maintain a fairly high standard of education.

In addition to the financial relief in the form of maintenance grants, a special grant was paid to schools on their expenditure on dearness allowance at 30 per cent. during the year. This has enabled the schools to pay dearness allowance to their teachers at a higher rate. If the services of teachers are to be retained in the schools, the payment of dearness allowance to them at Government rates is quite necessary, as the cost of living is going up rapidly. The question of increasing the rate of dearness allowance further on certain conditions is under the consideration of Government.

6(6). The total expenditure of all Secondary schools for boys (A. V. and E. T.) increased by Rs. 25·9 lakhs to over Rs. 135·3 lakhs. The following table shows the sources from which it was met :—

It will be seen that with the increase in the average cost of educating a pupil in a Secondary school from Rs. 56·3 to Rs. 60·9 the cost to Government also increased from Rs. 8·4 to 10·4. The increase in the total cost was due partly to the liability involved in giving increments to teachers and partly to the abnormal rise in the cost of apparatus and other school requisites.

6(7). The special facilities provided by Government for pupils of the various

Special facilities.

communities attending Secondary schools include free-studentships, scholarships, fee-grants, remission of room rent in hostels attached to Government Secondary schools etc. Free-studentships in Government Secondary schools were available during the year for 5 per cent. of the pupils of the Advanced classes, 25 per cent. of the pupils of the Intermediate classes, 75·0 per cent. of the pupils of the Backward classes (excluding the scheduled classes) and 20 per cent. of the Muslim pupils. Under the scheme of free-studentships, the total financial liability of Government is limited to 15 per cent. of the number of pupils in Government schools in each Division.

Pupils of the Scheduled classes, if eligible, are admitted free in Government Secondary schools. Children of the Konkani Maratha communities, of Indian Soldiers and followers, and of school mistresses are admitted free to Secondary schools. The loss in fees sustained by non-Government Secondary schools in attending these privileges to their pupils is made good by Government by the payment of special fee grants. The fee grants paid during the year amounted to Rs. 74,368. Provision has also been made for several sets of special scholarships payable in High and Middle Schools for pupils belonging to non-Advanced communities. To enable pupils of the various communities to secure admission into Government Secondary schools, percentages of admission have been fixed for the various communities.

In addition to the special facilities mentioned above, additional facilities are given to pupils of the Backward classes attending Secondary schools from out

of the special provision of Rs. 2,93,000 earmarked for this Department for ameliorative measures for the Backward classes [*vide* paragraph 15 (6) of this Report].

6(8). The following table gives the number and percentage of graduates and the professionally trained teachers in Secondary schools for boys and girls :—

It will be seen that although the total number of teachers increased by 953 to 9,791 and the number of the trained teachers by 342 to 4,632, the percentage of the trained teachers fell from 48.5 to 47.3 during the year. Similarly, the number of graduates increased by 303 to 4,330, but the percentage of graduates to the total number of teachers fell from 45.6 to 44.2. The number turned out by the Training Colleges is not proportionate to the number of teachers recruited every year to meet the increasing demand for admission to Secondary schools. Further more owing to the recruitment of several teachers to war services, the Secondary Training Colleges were not able to get a sufficient number of trainees. Of the three Training Colleges for Secondary teachers, the Secondary Training College, Bombay only one had its full complement during the year, while the other two colleges had only about 50 per cent. of their usual strength. Owing to the present economic condition managements are reluctant to send a sufficient number of teachers for training but it is hoped that when conditions return to normal it should not be difficult for them to depute teachers for training in larger numbers.

In addition to the Training Colleges preparing students for the B.T. degree, there are 8 recognised Training Centres for teachers, mostly non-graduates, wishing to appear for the Departmental S.T.C. Examination and for the T.D. instituted by the Bombay University. The results of these examinations are given in Government of India Table VIII published with this Report. It is becoming increasingly difficult for Government as well as non-Government schools to attract graduate

teachers, who prefer more lucrative services. The present scales of pay for Secondary teachers can hardly be said to be satisfactory and will have to be considerably revised to meet the abnormal economic conditions, which have become more or less stationary. Unless decent salaries are offered to teachers in Secondary schools young men with talent will not be attracted to the teaching profession.

6(9). The course of study for the various standards of Secondary schools have been embodied in Schedule D of the Grant-in-aid Code. Secondary schools follow generally the courses laid down in the Schedule. Schools are however allowed to make suitable alterations in these courses to meet their special requirements. A few schools have, in addition to the ordinary Secondary school course, made provision for instruction in Agriculture, Industrial or Commercial subjects. A special grant towards the expenditure incurred by managements in connection with teaching of these subjects is paid by Government. The fact remains, however, that very few managements have cared to adopt alternative courses or introduce vocational courses or "modern sides". The conversion by Government of some of their High Schools into vocational institutions have, however, encouraged a few schools to make similar efforts. Their number is not very large but with a suitable system of grants-in-aid to cover recurring and non-recurring expenses, other managements are likely to follow the example.

6(10). There are four School Book Committees and a Provincial Board for Education in Hindustani for the consideration of books in the regional languages. An account of the work done by these Committees is given in Chapter VII. In addition to these Committees the Provincial School Book Committee of which the Director of Public Instruction is President, considers books used in Secondary schools. Owing to continued shortage of paper and to the need of every possible economy in its use no new books were considered by the Committee during the year.

6(11). The reports received from the Heads of Secondary schools shew that greater interest is evinced by teachers and pupils in Secondary schools in educational broadcasting. The Radio is now used in some schools as a regular agency through which useful information on various subjects of academic and general interest is broadcast to pupils. The programmes for schools broadcast by the All-India Radio are popular to with interest, but the number of schools having radio receiving sets is still small due mainly to the abnormal increase in prices. Of the 25 Government Secondary schools 21 are equipped with radio sets, while only 104 out of a total of 224 Secondary schools for boys and girls have their own sets.

6(12). During the year under report the Board was reconstituted for a further period of three years, from 1st April, 1945. The Board held four meetings during the year and apart from the conduct of the School Leaving Certificate Examination, considered various matters connected with the modification of the syllabus, etc.

The School Leaving Certificate Examination was held from 4th April to 13th April, 1945, at fifteen Centres in the Province. The number of candidates entered for the examination increased by 63 to 1,024. Of the 984 candidates who appeared for the examination, 419 or 42.6 per cent. passed. Of these 41, were placed in Grade I, 113 in Grade II and 265 in Grade III.

In regard to the equivalence of the School Leaving Certificate, the pupils taking technical subjects prescribed for the examination continued to enjoy the concessions already granted for the admission to the V. J. Technical Institute, Bombay, and the Diploma Course of the College of Engineering, Poona. While the Certificate in Vocational subjects continues to be recognised by the Bombay University for the purposes of admission to the University courses, decision on the question of granting equivalence to the general School Leaving Certificate has again been postponed by the University. The holding of the Lokashala examination has been postponed for the duration of the war. Candidates who failed at the School Leaving Certificate examination in English (Group I) but satisfy the conditions of the Lokashala examination are eligible for the Lokashala Certificate. During the year 68 Certificates were awarded.

6(13). The term of the Board of Secondary Education having expired in Board of Secondary March, 1945, it was reconstituted during the year. Education. The Board met thrice during the year and considered various questions connected with Secondary and Vocational Education. The Board also appointed a new Sub-Committee for Technical syllabuses consisting of the following persons:—

1. The Deputy Director of Industries, Bombay.
2. The Principal, V. J. Technical Institute, Matunga, Bombay.
3. The Head Master, Northcote Technical High School, Sholapur.

The Standing Sub-Committees appointed by the Board to revise the syllabuses in the various subjects for High Schools, continued their work of compiling notes, etc. on the teaching of these subjects and reports were received from the following Sub-Committees: -

1. The Report of the Sub-Committee for Commercial subjects.
2. The Report of the History and Geography Sub-Committee.
3. The Report of the General Science and Mathematics Sub-Committee on Mathematics.

The reports were recorded by the Board and it was decided to take up consideration of these reports when the reports from all the Sub-Committees were ready.

The Board considered the recommendations of the Sargent Report for Post-War development of education in India and submitted to Government the Board's views on proposals. The Board also submitted to Government a proposal recommending minimum scales of salaries for teachers of Secondary High Schools and suggesting a change in the procedure for the administration of grants-in-aid to Secondary schools with a view to ensuring the enforcement of the minimum scales recommended.

6(14). The Provincial Board for Education in Hindustani was reconstituted Provincial Board for during the year under report and Messrs. D. V. Potdar Education in Hindustani. and B. D. Verma were re-elected as Chairman and Member-Secretary respectively. The Board met five times during the year and considered various matters connected with education in Hindustani. The expenditure of the Board increased by Rs. 1,694 to Rs. 4,633. This was due mainly to the increase in the number of Members of the Board, and the consequential increase in expenditure on travelling allowance.

Efforts are made to encourage literature in Hindustani. The sum of Rs. 600 sanctioned by Government during the year for the encouragement of Hindustani literature was fully utilized.

CHAPTER VII.

PRIMARY EDUCATION.

7(1). In this Province a "Primary School" is defined as one in which instruction is imparted wholly through the mother-tongue and which teaches the whole or a part of the course leading to the Primary

Introduction. School Certificate Examination. The Primary school course covers a period of eight years and consists of two stages, viz. the Elementary or the Lower Primary stage comprising the Infants and Standards I-IV and the Upper Primary stage comprising Standards V-VII. The Primary School course for girls similar to that for boys.

There is a certain amount of overlapping between Primary standards V-VII and Secondary standards I-III in this Province. In the case of English Teaching schools the Infants and Standards I-III are regarded as Primary standards for the purposes of grant and statistics.

7(2). The total number of Primary schools under all managements decreased by 263 to 18,263. The number of pupils, however, increased by **Schools and Pupils.** 44,043 to 1,608,238 of whom 1,131,051 were boys and 477,187 were girls. The following table compares the number of schools and pupils in them for 1944-45 and 1945-46 :—

A study of this table will shew that there was an all round increase in the case of District Local Board and Municipal schools, both boys and girls, but that there was a substantial decrease in the case of aided and unaided schools, the net result being a decrease of 263 Primary schools. Unlike previous years when the decrease was due mostly to the closure of a number of Voluntary schools aided by the Department direct, it would appear that during the year under report the decrease is accounted for mainly by schools which were aided by the Local Authorities. The only explanation that can be offered is perhaps the more lucrative jobs that the Primary teachers in charge of aided schools have been able to find in connection with post-war activities and the difficulty which the Primary teachers in charge of aided schools find in maintaining themselves and the schools on the small pittance that they get from the Local Authorities by way of grant. As anticipated in the last year's report, the liberalising of the scales of grant to Voluntary schools has resulted in an increase in the number of Voluntary schools (*i.e.* mass Literacy schools) from 4,722 in 1944-45 to 4,812 in 1945-46 and it is hoped that this salutary effect will continue to be felt in future as well—particularly in view of the following orders passed by Government during the year under report :—

(1) The capitation grant was revised by Government Resolution, Educational Department, Nos. 7449 of 28th April, 1945 and 7th February, 1946.

(2) The maximum grant to a one-teacher school was raised to Rs. 300 from Rs. 200.

(3) Teachers of individual Voluntary schools were allowed a bonus of Rs. 4 per mensem instead of the dearness allowance.

(4) Regular attendance scholarships to some Aboriginal and Hill Tribes children and Bad Climate allowance to teachers in about 500 Voluntary schools were continued during the year.

(5) Book grants and graded scholarships were given to Tilor Kunbi pupils in the Ratnagiri District.

(6) All Backward Class schools in villages with a population of less than 700 were taken over for aid by Government from the Local Authorities.

It is a matter of significance, however, that in spite of the drop in the total number of Primary schools, there has been a very substantial increase of over 44,000 in the number of pupils including about 15,000 girls. It is also not without significance that in spite of the decrease in the number of aided schools, the number of pupils actually shows an increase even in the aided schools.

7(3). The following table gives the distribution of boys and girls in the different Stages of Instruction: Standards of Primary schools on 31st March, 1946 :—

Compared with the preceding year there is a slight deterioration in the case of boys so far as the percentage of pupils in Standards V-VII is concerned. The position in the case of girls has remained unchanged. It is also interesting to notice that the percentage of pupils in the Infants class is higher in the case of boys in 1945-46 than in the preceding year whereas in the case of the girls, the position is the reverse. The following table gives the percentage of pupils passing Standard IV to the number in Standard I four years earlier :—

As is well known this comparison is not without its defects and is only a rough yard stick for finding out wastage. The figures show in a general way that only 42·2 per cent. of the boys and 33·3 per cent. of the girls who were in Standard I four years earlier were able to complete the Lower Primary stage during the year under report. If one remembers that, as a rule, pupils in urban areas normally complete the course in much larger numbers than those in rural areas and that pupils belonging to certain advanced classes also complete the course in much larger numbers than those belonging to the non-advanced classes, one can realise what an amount of wastage there must be, even according to this rough and ready method of calculation, in the case of the rural areas and the non-advanced classes of the population. There is an urgent need for adopting, generally, remedial measures for the liquidation of the enormous wastage now occurring in Primary education. Some of these measures are already in execution and it is hoped that with the introduction of universal compulsory education, it will be possible to avoid this wastage.

7(4). Direct expenditure on Primary schools increased by over Rs. 40 lakhs to about Rs. 317 lakhs. The following table gives the sources from which it was met :—

It will be seen that there was a slight decrease in the percentage of expenditure from Government funds to the total expenditure during the year 1945-46 as compared with the preceding year. Nevertheless, there was an increase from Government funds of over Rs. 21 lakhs or about 14·1 per cent. over the preceding year's expenditure. There was also a very substantial increase both in the case of District Local Board funds and fees, the increase being 29·6 per cent. in the case of the former and 18·3 per cent. in the case of the latter. In the case of the Municipalities, the percentage to the total cost was smaller in 1945-46 than in 1944-45 but as in the case of Government funds the expenditure rose by over Rs. 9 lakhs or 12·9 per cent. during 1945-46 than in 1944-45.

The total average cost of educating a pupil in a Primary school increased from Rs. 17-12-0 in 1944-45 to Rs. 20 in 1945-46 and the cost to Government from Rs. 9-10-0 to Rs. 10-13-0. The increase was due mostly to the grant of dearness allowance to teachers at an increased rate and, to some extent, to the more liberal

grants paid to the Voluntary schools. Subsidiary tables IV and V published in the Supplement to this Report give details of the cost per pupil in Primary schools for boys and girls under different managements.

7(5). The total fee collection in Primary schools increased during the year by Rs. 3,50,913 to Rs. 22,66,719 which formed 7.2 per cent. of the total expenditure on Primary schools as against 6.9 per cent. in the preceding year.

Fees.

No child is kept out of school for inability of the parent or guardian to pay fees. All girls and also children of the Backward classes and of school mistresses are exempt from the payment of fees. Children of soldiers and of Konkani Marathas in the Kolaba, Ratnagiri and Kanara districts are also admitted free. Children in Primary schools also continue to avail themselves of the war concessions sanctioned by Government to children and dependents of men who took part in the present war.

7(6). Appendix III of this Report gives details of the housing arrangements of District Local Board and Municipal Primary schools for boys and girls. Of the 11,942 schools only 3,654 had buildings of their own which means that since the year 1944-45 a number of schools ceased to have their own buildings. The remaining schools met in rented or rent-free buildings many of which are reported to be unsuitable for the purposes of schools. So long, however, as difficulties of finance and high cost of building materials continue, little improvement in this direction is likely to be effected.

School Buildings.

During the year, Government spent about Rs. 50,000 on buildings put up by Local Authorities. No amount was, however, placed at the disposal of the District Building Committees during the year as no new projects were undertaken by these Committees. Some 11 buildings were, however, completed by these Committees during the year, while no buildings were constructed under the building scheme financed by Sir Purushottamdas Thakordas.

7(7). There were 47,076 teachers in Primary schools under all managements, an increase of 535 during the year. Of the total number, 37,629 were men and 9,447 women. The following table compares the qualifications of these teachers in the last 2 years :—

It will be seen that the number of trained teachers increased by 909 during the year. The percentage of trained teachers increased from 45.4 to 46.9 in the case of men and 54.9 to 56 in the case of women and 47.3 to 48.7 in the case of men,

and women together. The percentage of trained teachers is thus growing higher every year and if the pace of this increase appears to be low it is due to the fact that along with the increase in the number of trained teachers, there is also an increase in the number of untrained teachers owing to the starting of new Primary schools both by the Local Authorities and by agencies managing Voluntary schools aided direct by the Department. It is a very happy augury, however, that of the increase of 535 that took place during the year, women accounted for as many as 402. This shows that the move is in the right direction and that women who are generally recognised as particularly efficient and suitable for handling the little children in schools are taking much greater interest in this profession from year to year.

The Training institutions were working as usual to their full capacity and every year sees the opening of more training institutions and it is to be hoped that in due course the output of training institutions will be so great that it will outpace the normal addition of untrained teachers to the cadre of Primary teachers thus resulting in a speedy increase in the percentage of trained teachers in the total cadre.

7(8). The new teachers appointed after 1935 were paid according to the scale of Rs. 25— $\frac{1}{2}$ —30—1—40 sanctioned by Government in 1940 during the year under report. Some Local Authorities also paid a personal allowance to teachers in lieu of the Head Masters' and 1st Assistants' allowances paid before 1938.

Primary teachers can supplement their income to some extent by private tuition with the permission of the School Board or by conducting Night classes for adults or by working for the Postal or other Departments for which they get an allowance ranging from Rs. 4 to Rs. 12 p.m. With a view to extending financial relief to teachers, Government desired that dearness allowance should be paid by Local Authorities to Primary teachers under their control upto the limits laid down by Government for their own employees. As stated in the last report, the Local Authorities had been unable to do much in this direction on financial grounds. Government, therefore, issued orders in Government Resolution, Educational Department, No. 7172 of 22nd March, 1945, to the effect that the District Local Boards which were levying Local Fund Cess at 2 annas in the rupee should be paid the full share of dearness allowance grant at the rates sanctioned by Government for their own servants irrespective of the rates paid by the District Local Boards to their Primary teachers. Accordingly 7 District Local Boards availed themselves of the concession sanctioned in the above Government Resolution. During the year under report, in accordance with the orders issued in Government Resolutions, Educational Department, No. 7803 of 13th February and 18th February 1946, all Local Authorities (District Local Boards and Local Authority Municipalities) were compelled in exercise of the powers conferred by Section 27B of the Primary Education Act, 1923 (newly inserted in January, 1946) to pay dearness allowance to their Primary teachers at the rates sanctioned by Government for their own servants.

7(9). The shift system continued to be in vogue during the year under report in many areas. This device had to be adopted firstly in order to save accommodation and secondly to reduce the number of teachers in each school. The question of housing schools in suitable buildings has continued to be acute in many districts and this system enables two classes to be held in one class-room. The shift system has been reported to have been adopted to a very large extent in the districts of East Khandesh, Kaira, Dharwar and Kanara. The output of trained teachers also is limited and it has become necessary to carry on with one or two teachers short of the actual requirements. The system was

confined to Infants and Standard I of the Primary schools and has been found to be particularly useful in the case of one-teacher schools where the teacher has otherwise to attend to several classes simultaneously. With the proposed introduction of compulsion in all the districts, this system has to be resorted to practically in every district as it will be impossible to find extra accommodation immediately for the large number of children who will be brought into school under the compulsory scheme.

7(10). The revised curriculum for Primary schools introduced in 1940-41 is being followed progressively in all Local Authority schools. The revised course was extended to standard V during the year.

Curriculum.

The simplified course specially drawn up to meet the needs of small village schools is being followed by the majority of Voluntary schools and one-teacher schools.

7(11). The Scheme of Basic Education continued to work during 1945-46 according to the programme chalked out in 1944. The period of training teachers for Basic Education was extended to two years. Arrangements were made for the teaching of two crafts *viz.* (i) Agriculture and (ii) Spinning and Weaving. The distribution of students between the two crafts was roughly 50 : 50. The syllabus for Basic schools was also revised. During 1945-46, the scheme was extended to standard VI and this year it has been introduced in standard VII. Thus out of 50 Basic schools in the Province 27 are fully developed Basic schools of which 21 have weaving and 6 have agriculture as the Basic craft. The lower classes *i.e.* standards I-IV have Spinning as well as Kitchen, Gardening as crafts to enable the schools to develop into Weaving or Agricultural Basic schools. Of the 21 schools with weaving as the basic craft in the upper standards three have introduced wool weaving and the remaining 18 have cotton weaving. Pupils in these schools have begun turning out fairly decent material in the form of carpets, towels, scarfs, etc. which are marketable and fetch good prices.

The number of pupils receiving Basic Education increased by 325 to 3,048. There were 205 teachers working in the Basic schools and of these 176 were trained while 29 were untrained. Provision for the training of teachers required for Basic schools is made at three Basic Training Centres at Katargam, Loni and Dharwar. During the year 78 teachers including 8 Matriculates were under training at these 3 centres.

The revised syllabus mentioned above was also introduced in all Agricultural bias schools numbering 141 and they are now treated as Basic schools with Agriculture as the craft. The Head Masters of these Agricultural bias schools were given short courses of training in the fundamentals of Basic Education. Eight such short courses were held in different parts of the Province and 131 teachers were put through them.

The number of agricultural bias schools during the year was 141 and the number of pupils reading in them 7,317. The number of pupils who appeared for the Primary School Certificate Examination with agricultural bias during the year was 1,419 as against 1,220 in the preceding year and the number of pupils who passed the examination was 587 against 553 in the preceding year.

The question of teaching through a craft is a complicated one and much of the educational criticism against the scheme arises out of this problem. It was, therefore, considered desirable to draw up a model scheme for the guidance of teachers showing how the subject matter of the different subjects to be taught in Basic schools could be correlated to craft activities. A conference of the staff of all the three Basic

Training Centres was, therefore, held for about a fortnight and a scheme of activity programmes was drawn up. This is being printed and is expected to help materially ordinary teachers working in Basic schools. The scheme is merely suggestive and is open to modifications in the light of experience gained in future. These programmes are being tried in the Practising schools attached to Basic Training Centres and the Principals of Basic Training Centres have been asked to make notes of any modifications made in the scheme.

Periodical group conferences in different compact areas and conferences of all teachers in each compact area continued to be held as in the past.

Children in Basic schools carried out during the year under report, as usual, social activities such as the celebration of festivals, the observation of a Health Day, a library day, a Physical Education Day and the entertainment of the village people with recitations, dialogues and exhibitions. They also rendered according to their capacities social service to the community at the time of fairs and epidemics and took part in the Grow More Food Campaign. Their progress in academic work was also satisfactory. Of the six children who competed for scholarships for Middle schools, two secured them.

Only one meeting of the Advisory Board with the Adviser to Government as Chairman was held during 1945-46. A report on the progress of Basic Education in the Province from November, 1938 to April, 1945, was published by Government.

7(12). Since the taking over by Government of the entire Inspecting staff, a change has been made in the system of examinations of

Examinations.

Primary schools. Under the present system the examination work is organised by the School Board Administrative Officer in consultation with the Deputy Educational Inspector and the Government Inspecting staff. Ordinarily the examination of Primary schools is left to Head Masters and the results are scrutinised by the Inspecting Officers at the time of the annual inspection.

The Primary School Certificate examination which terminates the Primary school course is held annually at various centres. The Primary School Certificate is the minimum qualification for Primary school teachers and for admission to Primary Training Institutions and to the lower grades of the public service. The following table gives the results of the examinations for boys and girls held in 1945-46 :—

It will be seen from this table that there has been all round increase in the number of candidates both for boys and girls in the regional languages as well as in Urdu appearing for the Primary School Certificate Examination.

7(13). The number of School Co-operative Societies decreased during the year from 621 to 598. These Societies are run by pupils under the

School Co-operative Societies and Libraries. supervision of teachers and help to inculcate the principles of self-help, co-operation and thrift. The activities of these Societies have slackened to some extent owing to shortage of paper and the rise in the cost of books and writing material.

The educative value of school libraries cannot be overemphasized. Most of the First Grade schools maintained by the Local Authorities are equipped with pupils' libraries. In the East Khandesh district some 166 such libraries are maintained by the District Local Board. Central libraries are also maintained by the District Local Boards of Poona, East Khandesh and Kaira for the benefit of children attending schools in rural areas. In the Surat district over 400 libraries have been attached to Village schools under the Sir Purushottamdas Thakordas Library Scheme.

7(14). No books other than those sanctioned by the Department are allowed

School Book Committees. to be used in any Government or approved school or any school maintained by a Local Authority. There are five School Book Committees dealing with books in Marathi, Gujarati, Kannada, Urdu and Hindustani.

The following table gives details of the work done by these Committees during the year :—

Owing to the conditions created by the war, there was a general restriction on the sanctioning of books as text books with the result that hardly any publisher brought out new books. With the improvement in the position as a result of the

cessation of hostilities, it is expected that these Committees will be able to resume their normal activities in the near future.

7(15). The administration of Primary schools in Bombay City is governed by the City of Bombay Municipal Act and the schools are managed by a Schools Committee of the Municipal Corporation.

There were 631 Primary schools in the City of Bombay maintained and approved by the Municipality as against 619 in the preceding year. The number of children attending these schools increased during the year by 5,945 to 168,651. The increase was due partly to normal expansion and partly to the influx of outside population in the City.

There were 3,548 ordinary teachers of whom 2,709 or 76·4 per cent. were trained. The trained element rose by about 4·2 per cent. during the year.

The total direct expenditure of all Municipal and approved schools in Bombay City increased by over Rs. 12·0 lakhs to Rs. 76·7 lakhs. A grant of Rs. 9,68,853 was paid to the Municipality during the year.

7(16). Under Section 116 of the Cantonment Act, 1924, it is the duty of every Cantonment Authority, so far as funds at its disposal permit, to make reasonable provision within the Cantonment area for the establishment and maintenance of Primary schools. Under Section 117 of the same Act it is the discretionary function of the Cantonment authority to make provision for furthering educational objects by measures other than the establishment and maintenance of Primary schools.

There are six Cantonments in this Province and all of them either maintain their own schools or pay grants to approved schools. During the year there were 43 Primary schools in the Cantonment areas, of which 13 were maintained and 30 approved by the various Cantonment authorities. There were 7,847 pupils under instruction in all these schools, a decrease of 13 during the year. All Primary schools in Cantonment areas are inspected by Government Inspecting Officers. The existing provision for the educational needs of the residents of the Cantonment areas might be regarded as adequate on the whole.

Appendix IV of this Report gives further details of the schools maintained or aided by the various Cantonment authorities.

7(17). Under the Bombay Primary Education Act, 1923, it is open to a Local Authority to introduce compulsion in its area. The Bombay Municipality has introduced compulsion in all its Wards and this scheme is governed by the City of Bombay Municipal Act. In addition to the Bombay Municipality four District Local Boards and 11 Local Authority Municipalities have introduced compulsion wholly or partially in their areas.

Appendix V published with this Report summarises the effect of the schemes of compulsion introduced by the various Local Bodies. These details shew that the progress made leaves much to be desired. This is due mainly to the reluctance of the Local Authorities to adopt all possible coercive measures which they are authorised to take under the Act. Unless the full supervising machinery is set in motion and the penalties of the Law available under the Act are fully invoked, no scheme of compulsion is likely to be effective.

7(18). The working of the Primary Education Act of 1938 continues to be fairly **Working of the Primary Education Act.** satisfactory even though there are occasions when the relations between the School Boards and the Administrative Officers get a little strained due mainly to attempts by members of the School Board to interfere in the legitimate duties of the Administrative Officer. The Boards are still smarting under the changes made by the amendment of 1938 giving powers to the Administrative Officers that were originally exercised by the Boards themselves. The Administrative Officers often find it difficult to control the School Board office establishment because of the control which the Boards themselves can exercise over the clerical staff. This naturally prevents the Administrative Officers from maintaining the School Board office in a state of efficiency. Some of the School Boards in the Northern Division which had been superseded in 1942 and the period of whose supersession had been extended from time to time, continued under supersession during the year. Government, however, issued orders that the period of supersession of these Boards should be limited to the end of April, 1946.

7(19). The term of office of the Board that was constituted in January, 1943, **Provincial Board of Primary Education.** expired in the month of January, 1946, and a new Board was constituted as per G.R., E.D., No. 6481 of 25th February, 1946. Professor D. R. Gadgil was re-elected President of the Board. The Board held 4 meetings during the year under report—one in Bombay and three in Poona. Three of these meetings were held in the regime of the old Board and one of the new Board.

During the year a deputation of the Board waited upon the Adviser to Government and explained to him the proposals of the Board in connection with Post-War Educational Reconstruction. On the recommendation of the Board, Government sanctioned dearness allowance to all primary teacher pensioners from the date on which pensioners of all departments got this relief. The Board also considered the following important questions :—

- (1) Equivalence of Basic standards with ordinary standards of Primary schools.
- (2) Introduction of the revised syllabus for Basic Training Centres in ordinary Training institutions.
- (3) Report on the investigation into the problem of lapse into illiteracy in the Satara District by Professor D. R. Gadgil.

The Board also submitted to Government two reports on the administration of Primary Education and Government's scheme of Post-War Educational Reconstruction so far as Primary Education was concerned.

The Board's library is being gradually expanded. Books worth Rs. 82 were purchased during the year and a few more were secured from Government departments and educational institutions. The library continues to serve as a useful source of reference to post-graduate students and others.

CHAPTER VIII.

TRAINING OF TEACHERS.

(1). Separate institutions are maintained for training teachers for Secondary schools and Primary schools. Graduates are admitted to institutions for training teachers for Secondary schools while Primary school certificate holders and Matriculates are admitted to the Training Institutions for primary teachers.

I. *Training of Secondary Teachers.*

There are six institutions for this purpose of which 2 are situated in native states. Five of these prepare teachers for the degree of B.T. and are affiliated to the University of Bombay while one trains graduates for Physical Education and issues a Diploma of its own. There are two Normal Schools for training women teachers for European and English Teaching Schools and a Diploma is issued to successful candidates by the Department. Diploma in Teaching known as T. D. is also issued by the University of Bombay. Similarly a Certificate known as Secondary Teachers' Certificate is issued by the Department after testing candidates (graduates as well as non-graduates) in Theory and Practice of Teaching. During the year under report there were eight institutions training Secondary teachers for T. D. and S. T. C.

II. *Training of Primary Teachers.*

The number of Primary Training Institutions during the year increased by 5 to 53 and the number of students under training by 272 to 4,895. Government opened three new Training Colleges at Panvel, Wai and Talikot with the object of increasing the output of trained teachers and two new training institutions were opened by private bodies. Of the 53 training institutions, 49 are ordinary training institutions, one is a Vocational Training College where instruction in Agriculture and Carpentry is imparted in addition to ordinary subjects, and 3 are Kindergarten Training Schools for preparing teachers for pre-primary education. There are three Basic Training Institutions also. The following table gives the number of students by communities :—

8(3). The expenditure on Primary Training Institutions for Men and Women increased by Rs. 1,40,440 to Rs. 9,12,560 which was partly due to the opening of 3 new Government Training Institutions on which an amount of Rs. 39,343 was spent and partly due to the increase in grants paid to non-Government Training Institutions. The expenditure on grants to non-Government Training Institutions during the year under report was Rs. 1,77,114 as against 1,56,996 in the previous year.

8(4). The curriculum of studies introduced in 1939 was followed in all training institutions except the Basic Training Institutions which followed a special syllabus. This course was extended to 2 years and during the year under report 2 years' training course was introduced at Katargaon and Dharwar while on account of the difficulty of accommodation, the old course of one year was followed at Loni. The one year's training course was meant for those who had already had their training in ordinary Training Institutions for one year or Matriculates while that of 2 years was meant for those who had no previous training. In all Basic Training Institutions emphasis is laid on training teachers to teach children through one or two crafts as far as possible. In the Training institutions, trainees are required to give a certain number of

practice lessons 20 in the First year and 25 in the second year. They are given practice in multiple-class teaching also.

8(5). Permanent teachers deputed by Local Authorities received duty pay during **Duty Pay, Stipends,** their period of training while temporary teachers or fresh candidates admitted for training received a stipend of Rs. 12 per mensem. The women candidates, however, received a stipend of Rs. 15 per mensem. No fees are charged in Government Training institutions but the non-Government institutions charge fees which in the case of Backward Class students and in the case of teachers deputed to these institutions by Local Authorities are paid by Government. Deserving students from the Backward Classes are given scholarships of the value of Rs. 15 per mensem tenable for the full course of training. The number of such scholarships for Backward Classes during the year under report was 140.

8(6). As Government decided to train all teachers, the selection for training was generally made on the principle of seniority and age. During **General.** the year under report the output of trained teachers from Government and non-Government Training institutions was 1,228 men and 809 women as against 1,686 men and 684 women in 1944-45. During 1943-44 owing to disturbances and war conditions very few men teachers joined the Training institutions especially in Northern Division and Southern Division and that accounts for the fall in the output of men teachers. The Central Committee consisting of officials and non-officials conducted the Training College Certificate examinations and the results were satisfactory.

CHAPTER IX.

SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND CLASSES.

9(1). Schools and classes for imparting instruction in Technical, Industrial, Commercial, Medical and Art subjects are maintained in the Province. The standard of instruction and the qualifications for admission vary according to the nature and duration of the courses. Some of these schools are under the administrative control of other departments. Information of these institutions is given below :—

Technical, Agricultural and Commercial Vocational Schools (Secondary) are not included in the above list. These schools are classed as Secondary Schools and information regarding them is given in the Chapter on Secondary Education.

There was an all round increase in the number of institutions and also in the number of pupils attending these schools except in the case of gymnasia where the number of institutions went down by 5 though the number of pupils increased by about 1,700.

A—Commercial Schools.

9(2). These institutions provide instruction in various commercial subjects and prepare candidates for the London Chamber of Commerce and Government Commercial Diploma and Certificate Examination. Persons employed in commercial firms take advantage of the evening classes maintained by some institutions. Owing to the shifting of the Elphinstone Technical High School to Mirzaon on account of the exigencies of war, the Day and Evening Classes maintained at that institution remained closed.

For the London Chamber of Commerce Certificate examinations held during the year under report 952 entries were registered. Sixty-six candidates appeared for the Government Commercial Diploma Examination of whom 29 passed while 456

appeared for the Certificate Examination of whom 322 passed. 43 candidates appeared at the Higher Proficiency Examination in Shorthand of whom 26 passed, 3 of these attained a speed of 160 words per minute.

B—Technical and Industrial Schools.

9(3). The Diploma Classes attached to the College of Engineering, Poona, provided instruction in Civil and Mechanical Engineering. The demand for admission to these classes continued to be keen and a good many applicants had to be rejected. Forty-four appeared for the Diploma Examination in Civil Engineering and 22 Mechanical and Electrical Engineering of whom 43 and 20 respectively passed.

9(4). The Technical and Industrial Schools are under the control of the Department of Industries and remarks on the progress of these institutions will be found in the report published by that department.

9(5). In addition to the schools under the control of the Department of Industries 57 Industrial schools and classes were recognised by this Department. Most of these classes were for Women and imparted instruction in Needle work, First Aid, etc. These classes were given grants which amounted to Rs. 21,170.

9(6). The V. J. Technical Institute managed by a Board of Trustees conducted courses in Mechanical Engineering, Electrical Engineering, Textile Manufacture, Technical and Applied Chemistry and Sanitary Engineering and Plumbing, each lasting for a period of 4 years. A large number of students were admitted this year to make technically trained men available for the different post-war schemes. The expenditure incurred on this institution was Rs. 3,32,183 against which Government paid more than Rs. 1,25,000.

9(7). The general control of Technical and Industrial Training vests with the Board of Technical and Industrial Training. There were 87 institutions under its control where 2,017 boys and 371 girls received instruction. An amount of Rs. 66,752 was spent in grants-in-aid to these institutions and the Board incurred an additional expenditure of Rs. 17,616 on inspection and examinations.

9(8). In addition to the technical institutions mentioned above, two Technical High Schools, viz. the Elphinstone Technical High School, Bombay, and the Northcote Technical High School, Sholapur, are maintained by this Department. These schools prepare candidates for the Departmental School Leaving Certificate Examination. Apart from these schools, there are five other Government Technical and Industrial Schools with 566 pupils, under the control of the Director of Industries. In addition to these schools, the Government Apprentice Scheme was in operation in the Cities of Bombay and Ahmedabad with 440 apprentices under training. During the year 163 candidates were apprenticed to Mills and Workshops. The scheme provides for intensive practical training for three to five years and offers an opportunity for an industrial career for young men who have received general High School Education

A batch of 16 cadets of the I. M. M. Training Ship "Dufferin" was admitted to the evening classes of the Government Apprentice Scheme for theoretical training.

C—Agricultural Schools.

9(9). To impart instruction in Agriculture, the Department of Agriculture maintained two Agricultural schools at Dhulia and Devihosur where young lads after passing the Primary School Certificate Examination were admitted and given a course of training for 2 years. Two similar schools were also run by private bodies at Rajapur in the Ratnagiri District and at Puntamba in Ahmednagar District. These schools were recognised by the Department and paid a grant amounting to Rs. 11,650.

D—Medical Schools.

9(10). Eleven Medical Schools imparted instruction in medicine. Of these 3 prepared candidates for the L. C. P. and S. and the rest gave instruction in Dentistry Ayurvedic medicine and Surgery. A Diploma Course in Veterinary Science leading to the G. D. V. C. was maintained in Bombay. There were 44 students in this class of whom 21 obtained the Diploma during the year under report.

E—Art Schools.

9(11). The Sir J. J. School of Art conducted the courses in Fine Art, Commercial Art, Architecture, Sculpture, etc. It also conducted courses for training teacher for Drawing and also conducted Evening classes for professional artists, art students and art loving public. 769 persons attended these two courses. A full account of the progress of the School will be found in the Report published by the Director of the School.

9(12). A Drawing and Design class was maintained at the R. C. High School, Ahmedabad, where 48 students belonging to the different **Drawing and Design** artisan classes attended. Some of the old students of these **Glasses.** classes have started their own firms of engravers, sign-board painters and calico printers. A School of Art is also run at Dharwar under a private management.

F—Language Schools.

9(13). The number of these schools increased by six and the number of students attending them by about 400. These schools give instruction mostly in Sanskrit, Arabic and such other languages.

G—Music Schools.

9(14). Quite a large number of students took interest in Music schools this year and the number increased from 188 in 1944-45 to 538 during the year under report.

H—Gymnasia.

9(15). There was again a drop of 8 schools this year though the number attending the Gymnasia increased to 7,735 as against 6,050 in 1944-45. Grants amounting to Rs. 14,910 were paid to these gymnasia during the year.

CHAPTER X.

ORIENTAL STUDIES.

10(1). The study of a classical language begins in Standard IV of a Secondary school and continues up to the degree examination in Arts. **Study of Classics.** Candidates for the Matriculation have the option of choosing an Oriental classical language as a second language and although the majority of the pupils prefer Sanskrit or Persian, provision for instruction in other Oriental languages also exists in some of the institutions. Of the 15,902 candidates who passed the Matriculation examination of 1946, with an Oriental language, 11,135 passed with Sanskrit, 2,582 with Persian and 169 with Arabic, while 2,216 passed with other Oriental languages.

The results of the degree examinations in Arts also show that Sanskrit and Persian retain their popularity, though Ardhamagadhi is gathering force. During the year under report, 200 candidates obtained the B.A. degree with Sanskrit, 45 with Persian, 19 with Ardhamagadhi and 7 with other Oriental languages. Seventy-nine candidates obtained the M.A. degree with Sanskrit, 9 with Persian, 21 with Ardhamagadhi and 5 with other Oriental languages.

Apart from the instruction in Oriental languages imparted in ordinary educational institutions, there are special institutions known as Pathashalas for the study of Sanskrit and Makhtabs for the study of Persian and Arabic. There were 25 Pathashalas with 952 pupils and 30 Makhtabs teaching Persian and Arabic with 3,024 pupils. The number of Pathashalas and the number of pupils attending them decreased considerably during the year under report.

Most of the Pathashalas follow an elementary course in Sanskrit, in addition to Vedic studies, while only a few maintain a high standard of instruction and prepare candidates for the examinations of the Calcutta Sanskrit Association and for the Elementary and Intermediate examinations of the Government Sanskrit College, Benares. Notable among these are the Pathashala at Poona and the Sanskrit Colleges at Poona and Hubli. The instruction imparted in the Makhtabs is mainly restricted to the reading of the Koran.

10(2). Among the Institutes which aim at the advancement of research in **Oriental Institutions.** Oriental learning, the Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute, Poona, the Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute, Poona, the K. R. Kama Oriental Institute, Bombay, and the Bombay Branch of the Royal Asiatic Society may be specially mentioned. These Institutes maintain valuable libraries of rare manuscripts, books, etc. which are lent to scholars in India and abroad. Scholarships and prizes are awarded for original research and eminent scholars are invited to deliver lectures on Oriental subjects. The work of bringing out an authoritative and critical edition of the Mahabharata which the Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute has been carrying on for the last several years is of the highest importance and can be reckoned as perhaps the most outstanding effort being carried on at present in the field of Oriental research. Pioneer work of sterling merit is also being done by the Dharmakosha Mandal of Wai and the Vaidik Sanshodhan Mandal of Poona, while the Kaivalyadharm of Lonavla is carrying on valuable research in Yogashashtra. The Geervan Vagvardhini Sabha of Poona, which arranges periodical lectures in Sanskrit by eminent scholars on matters of topical interest, is also doing good work in the direction of encouraging the study of Sanskrit.

The Bharatiya Vidya Bhawan in Bombay is a centre of post-graduate studies and research in Indological and allied subjects. Besides conducting the various Shastric and Gita examinations, the Bhawan also brought out some research publications in Sanskrit and Prakrit and enriched its library by the addition of important collections and rare manuscripts.

There are also other Research Institutes or Societies which continue to do useful work in their own fields. In the domain of historical research, the Bharata Tilhas Sanshodhak Mandal of Poona, the Indian Historical Research Institute at St. Xavier's College, Bombay, the Karnatak Historical Research Society, Dharwar, the Rajdwade Sanshodhan Mandal of Dhulia are all doing good work. The Mimansa Vidyalaya, Poona, is interested in a critical study of the Mimansa Shastra.

The Kannada Research Institute, Dharwar, aims at research in Kannada literature and antiquities, while the Gujarat Research Society likewise aims at the promotion of research in all branches of knowledge, with reference to Gujarat. The Gujarat Vernacular Society, particularly its post-graduate and research department, has also been doing very useful work.

While, therefore, a fair amount of work in the field of Oriental studies and research is being done at present, as will be apparent from the above account, the fact remains that a much more conscious and organised effort requires to be undertaken to stimulate and maintain interest in this subject, particularly among schools and colleges, and to co-ordinate the scattered work being done now. It is true that proficiency in Oriental studies does not now-a-days command the same market value as proficiency in the Sciences or in subjects like Economics which have assumed a growing importance in the business world of today. For the same reason, even the study of modern European languages, particularly French and German, is growing in favour with the students to the relative disadvantage of classical Indian languages.

The remedy would seem to lie in active State encouragement and support for efforts directed at the advancement of Oriental studies. One such effort is the proposal of the Tilak Maharashtra Vidyapeeth to start a Sanskrit College in Poona, to organise and establish Sanskrit Pathashalas in the Province and to institute and conduct Sanskrit examinations, all of which are calculated to give a good impetus and encouragement to Sanskrit learning.

CHAPTER XI.

VISUAL INSTRUCTION.

11(1) Visual instruction is in charge of a special Deputy Educational Inspector in the Bombay Educational Service Class II who supervises the working of the Magic lanterns maintained by the Department and arranges for the preparation and distribution of slides and lecture notes. He also holds a training course in Visual Instruction for Secondary teachers at the Secondary Training College, Bombay, guides teachers and Inspecting Officers in lantern lecturing work and himself delivers lantern lectures. The question of putting this Department on a sound basis to enable it to carry on increased activities is under the consideration of Government.

11(2). The Deputy Educational Inspector for Visual Instruction had in his charge 153 projectors of which 118 are Magic lanterns showing slides, 34 projectors showing films and a Cinema projector with an electricity generator. Of the 153 projectors, 44 were used by Government Secondary Schools, 30 by Government Training Institutions, 71 by Inspecting Officers, one was lent to the Literacy Officer, Bombay, 4 were with the Deputy Educational Inspector for Visual Instruction and 3 had been returned to the Visual Instruction office for repairs.

The District and Municipal School Boards had 19 projectors of their own and the non-Government Institutions had 105.

11(3). The Department has 663 sets comprising 29,687 slides, 94 film-strips and 59 16M.M. Cinema films. During the year 16 new sets of slides with 656 slides on various useful subjects were purchased. Of the 663 sets of slides, 464 are with descriptive lecture notes. These sets are distributed by the Deputy Educational Inspector for Visual Instruction to educational institutions, Inspecting Officers and also to other Departments as and when required.

11(4). The Inspecting Officers and the staff of Government educational institutions delivered 4,735 magic lantern lectures as against 4,433 in the preceding year.

The District School Boards of Thana, Satara, East and West Khandesh have magic lanterns of their own, but the Deputy Educational Inspector's report shews that with the exception of the District School Board, West Khandesh, no magic lantern work was done during the year. Similarly, of the 13 Municipal School Boards which have their own magic lanterns, 6 Boards kept their lanterns idle. The Deputy Educational Inspector's report further shews that only 42 out of the 105 non-Government Secondary schools used their projectors, only a few schools having done excellent lantern lecturing work during the year.

The Deputy Educational Inspector for Visual Instruction conducted the teacher-training course in Visual Instruction at the Secondary Training College, Bombay, and in connection with the practical part of the course he gave ten lectures on all

the aspects of Visual Instruction. During the year the Deputy Educational Inspector visited 98 institutions in 50 different places in the Province, and delivered 217 magic lantern lectures on various subjects including 66 lectures connected with adult education. In connection with the film-strip shows, the Deputy Educational Inspector reports--“Film-strips on general information supplied by the Director of Information, Bombay, were exhibited to school pupils and the public through school teachers in 50 Taluka places on the film-strip projectors supplied by the same officer. Under this scheme 3,539 shows were in all given to school pupils and the public and about 350,000 persons on the aggregate saw and enjoyed these shows.”

CHAPTER XII.

EDUCATION OF GIRLS.

12(1). The total number of educational institutions for girls increased by 87 to 2,293 and the number of pupils in them by 16,223 to 324,144. In addition to these, there were 249,061 girls attending boys' schools, raising the total number of girls under instruction in all kinds of educational institutions to 561,274, an increase of 23,315 girls over the preceding year. It is satisfactory to note that the increase in the number of girls during the year was shared by all Divisions and also by all types of recognised educational institutions. The total number of girls under instruction formed 5.59 per cent. of the total female population of the Province. The following table gives details for each Division :—

12(2). It is not possible to give separate figures of expenditure on the education of girls as nearly 45 per cent. of the girls attend boys' schools. The total expenditure on all types of educational institutions for girls increased by Rs. 17,86,179 to Rs. 1,21,61,037 of which 35.1 per cent. was met from Government funds, 28.0 per cent. from Board funds, 23.6 per cent. from fees and 13.3 per cent. from other sources.

12(3). In the field of higher education, a steady progress is noticeable from year to year. During the year under report, 4,118 women were attending Arts and Science colleges and 467 Professional colleges,

an increase of 248 and 37 women respectively over the preceding year. The following table compares the figures for 1944-45 and 1945-46 :—

These figures shew that although a large majority of the women prefer the Arts and the Science courses, the number of those taking the Professional degree courses is steadily rising. The degrees in Medicine and Education continue to be popular. That some girls are gravitating towards Agriculture and Engineering Colleges is a noteworthy feature of the past two or three years. This is in accordance with the spirit of the modern times when women desire to hold their own in every sphere of human activities.

12(4). The Indian Women's University which has done some pioneering work in the field of higher education of women has 342 women in the **S. N. D. T. Indian Women's University.** four affiliated colleges in Bombay, Poona, Ahmedabad and Baroda. The University has also 14 Secondary schools affiliated to it and these schools have an enrolment of 4,845 girls. The colleges prepare pupils for the degree examinations of the University while the Secondary schools prepare pupils for the Entrance Examination of the University and also for the Matriculation Examination of the Bombay University. The question of granting statutory recognition to this University is under the consideration of Government at present and a Committee is sitting to examine and report on that question.

Persons holding the Entrance Examination Certificate of the University are now admitted to Government and semi-Government service on the same terms as those holding the Matriculation examination certificate of the Bombay University and those holding the degree of G.A., P.A. and the D.T. of the Indian Women's University on the same terms as those holding the degrees of B.A., M.A. and B.T. of the Bombay University. The University is in receipt of an annual Government grant of Rs. 5,000.

12(5). The number of Secondary schools for girls increased during the year by 14 to 178 of which 7 (High schools) were maintained by **Secondary Education.** Government and one by the Ahmedabad Municipality, 18 English Classes were maintained by other Local Bodies and 152 Secondary schools (including 11 English Classes) were maintained by private bodies.

The number of pupils in Secondary schools for girls also rose by 3,495 to 37,586 of whom 36,288 were girls. In addition, there were 22,184 girls in Secondary schools for boys, raising the total number of girls receiving Secondary education to 58,472, an increase of 5,877 girls during the year.

12(6). There is no separate Secondary Training College for Women in this Province and for preparation for the B.T. degree women students attend the Secondary Training Colleges affiliated to

Teachers. the Bombay University. Eighty-three women were attending the three Secondary Training Colleges in this Province and 82 obtained the B.T. degree during the year. The number of women teachers in Secondary schools is steadily increasing. Of the 2,277 women teachers in Secondary schools, 1,284 are trained and 936 are graduates. In spite of this increase there is still a dearth of women teachers. The main difficulty is that women generally do not stick to the teaching profession after marriage, though in recent years their number is increasing. The Inspectress of Girls' Schools, Bombay Division, remarks—

“ Even in Bombay City and Suburbs, there are hardly any schools staffed entirely by women. Men teachers are employed in Girls' schools for various reasons. There is a feeling among heads of schools and educational societies that subjects like Science and Mathematics are handled more efficiently by men than women and some of the older and bigger Girls' schools employ men for these subjects. It is also true that it is difficult to find women teachers for these subjects. But schools which do employ properly trained women teachers for these subjects find that on the whole their Mathematics and Science work compares quite favourably with that in other schools where these subjects are in charge of men teachers. Some other schools have experienced men teachers for the Matric and the Pre-Matric classes because they feel that the girls can be coached up better for the Matriculation Examination by these experienced teachers. Most Societies that run schools find that the staff can have greater stability with men teachers. Women teachers, if unmarried, often leave school to get married and the young married women teachers cannot put in steady work. They go on maternity leave and even after they return to work find the regular full-time school work somewhat strenuous and need casual leave constantly. A few schools follow a definite policy of not employing married women teachers, for they find that their needs of leave interfere considerably with the routine work of the schools.”

12(7). Most of the Secondary schools for girls follow the syllabus prescribed for Boys' schools and send up Girls for the Matriculation examination of the Bombay University. A few girls' schools have introduced, with the sanction of the Department, special curricula to meet the special requirements of girls. Few schools realize, however, that Homecraft is an essential part of a girl's education. The craze for the School leaving and the Matriculation certificate is so great that most of the private girls' Secondary schools are not interested in an all-round general and practical education for girls. Government High schools for Girls, however, pay considerable attention to needle-work, music, etc.

Of the 5,204 girls who appeared for the Matriculation examination held in April, 1946, 2,552 or 49·0 per cent. passed. Thirty-four girls appeared for the Departmental School Leaving Certificate Examination and 13 passed.

12(8). The number of Primary schools for girls increased during the year by 25 to 1,793 and the number of pupils in them by 10,789 to 273,270 of whom 9,905 were boys and 263,365 girls. In addition, there were 213,822 girls attending Primary schools for boys, raising the total number of girls under instruction in Primary schools to 477,187 as against 462,474 in the preceding year.

Of the 477, 187 girls under instruction in Primary schools, only 39,787 or 8·3 per cent. were in the Upper Primary stage and 437,400 or 91·7 per cent. in the Lower Primary stage of instruction. In spite of the steady increase in the number of pupils attending Primary schools, those who reach Standard IV is still extremely low. Of the number in the Lower Primary stage viz. 437,400, only 43,274 were in Standard IV. This number formed only 9·1 per cent. of the total number of girls under instruction in Primary schools as against 8·8 per cent. in the preceding year. This shows that wastage is steadily diminishing. In any case, even 2 or 3 years' schooling will make considerable difference to a girls outlook on life and consequently to the happiness of the family.

12(9). The revised syllabus for Primary schools which is being adopted **Curriculum for Primary Schools.** progressively was introduced in standard VI during the year.

Drawing and Needle-work are taught in all girls' schools, while provision for Domestic Science exists in all First Grade schools. Instruction in Music and Hindustani is also imparted in some schools.

The Simplified course issued by the Department is being followed in small village schools.

12(10). The number of girls appearing for the Primary School Certificate examination has been steadily increasing from year to year. **Primary School Certificate Examination.** Of the 9,030 girls who appeared for the examination during the year (including 492 for the Urdu Primary School Certificate Examination) 3,989 or 43·2 per cent. passed as against 3, 234 or 38·9 per cent. out of the 8,314 who appeared last year.

12(11). The total number of women teachers in all kind of Primary schools for girls rose by 402 to 9,447 of whom 5,286 or 6·0 per cent. **Primary teachers.** were trained, and 4,161 or 44·0 per cent. untrained. Although the percentage of trained teachers has increased from 54·9 to 56·0 during the year, it is still considerably low. To accelerate the rate of the present output of trained teachers various measures are being taken. These include the expansion of the existing Training Institutions, the opening of new Training Institutions and the award of more liberal grants to non-Government Training Institutions.

12(12). Appendix V of this Report gives details of the housing arrangements of Primary schools. **School Buildings.** The figures given in the Appendix shew that conditions in respect of the housing of Primary schools continue to be generally unsatisfactory. Owing to the conditions created by the war, it has not been possible to bring about any improvement in this direction either through the District Building Committees or through philanthropic effort.

12(13). An account of the Training Institutions for Women is given in Chapter VIII. **Special Institutions.** Apart from the Training Institutions, there were 57 special institutions which hold special classes in various useful arts and crafts for girls and grown-up women who cannot attend ordinary educational institutions.

12(14). The statistical tables published at the end of this report shew that in spite of the after-effects of the war a steady progress was made in all branches of girls' education during the year. **General.** The increase of 87 girls' educational institutions and of 23,315 pupils is an indication of the growing desire of parents to send their daughters to schools. The proposed compulsory measures to be introduced in all districts within the next ten years or so will, no doubt, bring about the educational advance of girls; but in the meantime much leeway remains to be made up.

CHAPTER XIII.

ANGLO-INDIAN AND EUROPEAN EDUCATION.

13(1). **European Schools** are governed by a special Code of Regulations and separate provision for grants to these schools is made in the **Instruction.** Educational budget. Although these schools are intended principally for European and Anglo-Indian children, they are allowed to admit non-Europeans upto a limit of 40 per cent.

13(2). The Railway School at Dohad which was recognised during the year **Schools and** raised the total number of schools for Europeans and Anglo-Indians to 34 of which 31 are Secondary Schools, 2 are Training **Pupils.** Institutions and one is a Commercial school maintained by the Y. W. C. A. for girls wishing to follow a business career.

The number of pupils in these schools increased by 52 to 6,459 of whom 3,968 were Europeans and Anglo-Indians and 2,491 belonged to various other communities. In addition to the 3,968 European and Anglo-Indian pupils in European schools there were 1,378 pupils of these communities in other educational institutions raising the total number of European and Anglo-Indian pupils under instruction to 5,346, an increase of 201 pupils over the preceding year.

13(3). The total expenditure on Anglo-Indian and European Education **Expenditure.** increased during the year by Rs. 1,91,324 to Rs. 21,07,333 and was met from the following sources :—

13(4). Of the 403 teachers in European schools, 340 or 84.3 per cent. were **Teachers.** trained. There was a small decrease of 28 in the number of teachers during the year. This was due to the fact that some teachers accepted employment in connection with the war whose vacancies remained unfilled for want of suitable substitutes.

There are two European Training Institutions for women in this Province viz. St. Mary's Training College, Poona and St. Margaret's Training College, Bombay. These institutions prepare candidates for the Bombay European Schools Teachers, Diploma and for the Departmental Kindergarten Examination. Sixty-three students were under training in these institutions during the year. Twenty stipends of Rs. 40 per mensem are awarded annually to Anglo-Indian and European students under training at these institutions.

There are no European Training Institutions for Men in this Province but teachers from schools in this Province are admitted to the Chelmsford Training College at Ghoragalli in the Punjab. No student from this Province was deputed to the college during the year.

13(5). The Cambridge Local Examinations, the Departmental Kindergarten and the Bombay European Schools Teachers' Diploma Examinations. Examinations were held during the year at various Centres in this Province. The following table compares the results of the examinations held in 1944 and 1945 :—

In accordance with the provisions of the Code of Regulations for European Schools, Senior and Junior Scholarships of the value of Rs. 30 and Rs. 12 per mensem respectively are payable to pupils in European schools on the results of the Cambridge examinations. During the year four fresh Senior scholarships and nine Junior scholarships were awarded. All the 17 students who were in receipt of the Senior scholarships during the year were attending the various Arts and Professional colleges and the 17 Junior scholarship holders were attending Secondary schools. The total expenditure on scholarships amounted to Rs. 7,246 as against Rs. 7,482 in the preceding year.

13(6). Eight institutions for boys and thirteen for girls had hostels attached to them. The number of hostels remained the same but that of boarders increased during the year by 40 to 1,982 of whom 996 were boys and 986 girls. Boarding grants amounting to Rs. 1,12,480 were paid to orphan and destitute children of whom 425 were boarders and 278 day scholars.

The Y. M. C. A., Bombay, continues to maintain a hostel for apprentices working in Workshops and firms. A grant of Rs. 3,605 was paid to the Hostel during the year. The hostel for women apprentices maintained by the Y. W. C. A. received a grant of Rs. 585.

13(7). Manual training, Domestic Science, etc. find an important place in the curriculum of some of the European schools, while physical instruction and medical inspection receive special attention in all the schools. Provision for games and sports is made in all schools and most of the schools have Boy Scout Troops or Girl Guide companies.

At the meeting of the Inter-Provincial Board of Anglo-Indian and European Education held in Delhi in January, 1946, Bombay was represented by Mr. S. H. Prater. The Inspector of European Schools also attended the meeting by invitation.

The Provincial Board for Anglo-Indian and European Education met four times during the year and considered several matters connected with Anglo-Indian and European Education. In November, 1945, the Commission appointed by the Inter-Provincial Board for Anglo-Indian and European Education visited this Province. The Commission paid visits to educational institutions, met the representatives of the Provincial Board and of the Anglo-Indian Association and the heads of schools.

The office of the Inspector of European Schools which was so far located in Poona was shifted to Bombay during the year and amalgamated with that of the Educational Inspector, Bombay Division.

The Inspector of European Schools makes the following general remarks on the state and progress of Anglo-Indian and European Schools during the year under report :—

“ The number in several schools still shows an increase over pre-war days and this is due not only to normal factors but partly to evacuees and partly to the continuance of children who might ordinarily have proceeded to Britain. They are, however, rapidly finding their way back to England. With their departure, the percentage of the non-Europeans element has necessarily begun to go up in the different schools. To make possible the admission into the European schools here of the children of Indian officers—civil and military—transferred to Bombay on duty, the Board recommended the raising of the percentage from 40 to 45.

The war has put the boys' schools to much inconvenience as several of them have had to release some of their masters at short notice and make temporary arrangements. Nor has it been easy to find suitably qualified substitutes. But with the cessation of hostilities the masters and mistresses began to return and the position in the schools while not yet quite satisfactory, has shown some improvement.

Otherwise the year may be regarded as one of steady progress, growing consolidation and cautious preparation for the shape of things to come.”

CHAPTER XIV.

EDUCATION OF THE INTERMEDIATE AND BACKWARD CLASSES.

14(1). This Chapter deals with the state and progress of pupils of the Intermediate and the Backward Classes attending various kinds of educational institutions. The Intermediate Classes include Muslims and the four main sections of Intermediate Hindus, viz. the Marathas, the Cultivating Classes, Artisans and Lingayats. The Backward Classes comprise the Scheduled Classes, the Aboriginal and Hill Tribes and "Other Backward" Classes. Combined statistics of pupils of the Intermediate and the Backward Classes are given in Appendix I published with this Report.

For the purposes of proper comparison the figures of the Intermediate classes for the previous year have been revised by the addition of Muslims to the Intermediate classes which were hitherto shown separately.

The Intermediate classes form 66.01 per cent. and the Backward classes 22.3 per cent. of the total population of this Province. During the year under report 8.6 and 5.1 per cent. of the population of the Intermediate and the Backward classes respectively was under instruction as against 8.2 and 4.8 per cent. respectively during the preceding year. The Intermediate classes under instruction formed 59.5 per cent. and the Backward classes 11.9 per cent. of the total number of pupils of the various communities under instruction.

Intermediate Classes.

14(2). The following table gives the number of pupils belonging to the Intermediate classes under instruction in various kinds of recognised educational institutions in 1944-45 and 1945-46 :—

It will be seen that the number of pupils of the Intermediate classes increased by 55,069 to 1,168,876 or 4.9 per cent. as against an increase of 1.8 per cent. in the preceding year. The increase was shared by all types of educational institutions.

14(3). For the education of the Intermediate classes special facilities have been provided by Government. Fifty per cent. of the Special Facilities. places in Government Secondary Schools have been earmarked for these classes.

Special Government scholarships are awarded to pupils belonging to these classes in various kinds of educational institutions. In all there are 305 sets of Middle School scholarships and an equal number of sets of High School scholarships for the Intermediate classes. This means that there is one set of Middle School and High School scholarships for every 45,000 population of the Intermediate classes as against one such set for 42,000 of the Backward class population. Freestudentships are also granted in Government Secondary schools to the extent of 20 per cent. of the total number of pupils of these classes.

Teachers of the Intermediate classes employed in Government, District Local Board and Municipal Primary Schools increased during the year by 646 to 18,101. This number formed 38.5 per cent. of the total number of primary teachers.

Backward Classes.

14(4). The following table compares the number of pupils of the Backward Classes under instruction for 1944-45 and 1945-46:—

It will be seen that there was an increase of 13,164 pupils of the Backward classes under instruction in various kinds of recognised institutions and the increase was shared by all types of institutions. The increase in the number of pupils of these classes in colleges and secondary schools is noteworthy and shews the general awakening among members of the Backward Classes for higher education.

The number of teachers of the Backward classes employed in Government, District Local Board and Municipal Primary schools increased during the year by 88 to 3,518. This number formed 7.5 per cent. of the total number of primary teachers.

14(5). Various special facilities have been given by Government to pupils of Backward classes. These facilities include (a)

Special Facilities.

exemption from the payment of fees in Primary schools and Government Secondary schools, (b) Special Government scholarships in Primary and Secondary schools and Arts and Professional colleges, (c) exemption from the payment of examination fees at the High and Middle School Scholarship examinations, and (d) concessional fee rates for the Primary School Certificate Examinations for Boys and Girls. In addition to these facilities, the Backward Class Department gives financial help in the form of lump scholarships to poor and deserving pupils.

The places reserved for the Backward classes are 20 per cent. in Government Secondary Schools, 7 per cent. in the College of Engineering, Poona, and 10 per cent. in other Government Professional colleges. An adequate number of teachers from the Backward classes (including the Scheduled classes) is admitted into Training Institutions also.

Some of the District Local Boards also award scholarships to deserving pupils attending Primary schools and make a free distribution of clothes, books, slates and writing material.

A special Backward Class Hostel is maintained by Government in Poona under the control of the Backward Class Officer. It had 61 boarders on 31st March, 1946. This hostel is meant for all Backward class pupils including the Scheduled classes. In addition there are 73 hostels maintained by private bodies for the Backward classes which receive grants-in-aid from the Backward Class Officer. Backward class pupils are also admitted to some of the hostels maintained for other communities.

The Backward Class Officer keeps in close touch with officers of this Department as well as officers of the School Boards in regard to questions pertaining to the difficulties experienced by these classes.

In 1942 Government appointed an adhoc Committee to advise them on the various needs of the Backward classes and to suggest the ways and means of utilizing the funds earmarked by Government for ameliorative measures for the educational uplift of these classes. On the recommendation of the Committee various educational facilities have been provided for the education of these classes with effect from 1943-44 for a period of five years in the first instance. These facilities include the opening of new hostels and the expansion of the existing ones, conversion of primary schools in Backward areas into Agricultural bias schools, the grant of scholarships, freestudentships and stipends, etc. to pupils in various kinds of educational institutions and other facilities, such as provision of mid-day meals to children, award of prizes to pupils, and allowances and bonuses to teachers. During the year a total expenditure amounting to Rs. 2,45,337 was incurred on various ameliorative measures for these classes.

14(6). Under the Criminal Tribes Act several Settlements and Free Colonies have been established by Government

Settlement Schools.

for the Criminal Tribes which are under the control of the Backward Class Department. At the end of the year there were 12 Settlements and 17 Free Colonies with a total population of over 14,000 persons.

Day and Night Schools are maintained for the benefit of the children of these tribes. Some 2,367 children are attending these schools. The Backward Class Officer reports that the progress of education in Settlement and Free Colony Schools during the year was satisfactory.

CHAPTER XV.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

15(1). **Physical training** is compulsory for the first and second year classes of Arts, Science and Commerce colleges affiliated to the Bombay University. Physical education now forms an integral part of the general education imparted in Primary and Secondary schools and the subject is included in the time-table of such schools. Of the 1,100 Secondary schools (including 320 English classes attached to Primary schools), 744 have playing fields while of the 13,407 Primary schools maintained or aided by the Local Authorities, 4,060 have play-grounds. The existing arrangements for open playing fields and for medical inspection are inadequate but the difficulties are being gradually overcome. Special grants are sanctioned to schools on their expenditure on physical education which includes provision for equipment and medical inspection. The expenditure incurred by Government during the year on objects connected with physical education amounted to over Rs. 2·22 lakhs.

The Physical Education Day was organised on 22nd December, 1946, under the auspices of the Board of Physical Education at 105 Centres. The reports received by the Board shewed that about 117,000 pupils participated in the activities organised on that day.

15(2). The Government Training Institute for Physical Education, Kandivli, serves as a Training Centre for graduate teachers in Physical education. The Institute provides for the training of about 100 graduates and also for Short-term courses for under-graduates. During the year only 50 students applied for admission of whom 45 were selected. Of the 41 students who actually joined, 2 dropped out and 39 including 5 women completed the course. A first sight it would appear from these figures that the Training Institute for Physical Education, Kandivli, is not popular. In fact it is very popular and doing excellent work. The inability on the part of the Institute to attract more trainees is due entirely to factors which are beyond its control. These factors are mainly economical. Firstly there is paucity of graduate teachers in Secondary schools with the result that many schools are unable to depute any teachers to this Institute. Secondly the financial position of Secondary schools is so precarious that they are unable to hold out any hopes of rise in pay to those teachers who could, with advantage, be deputed. And lastly the financial position of the teachers itself is so unsatisfactory that they are unable to maintain themselves at the Institute and their families at home on the poor pay they receive, even assuming that the managements of their schools are willing to depute them on their full pay—an assumption which is not correct in many cases.

The Short-term course which was held in abeyance for the last three years for want of accommodation at the Physical Training Institute was held during the year at Nasik. Provision for the training of 100 candidates was made and of the 99 candidates who were actually admitted, 96 completed the course.

15(3). **Gymnasias** which are not attached to particular institutions and which conform to the rules in the Grant-in-aid Code are recognised as Special institutions and are aided under certain conditions. On 31st March, 1946, there were 84 recognised Gymnasias with an enrolment of 7,735 pupils. Grants amounting to Rs. 14,910 were paid to these institutions during the year.

15(4). The Board of Physical Education held five meetings during the year and considered various matters connected with physical education. During the year the Chairman of the Board visited a number of institutions at different places and held meetings to discuss various problems relating to physical education and received suggestions for its improvement. The inspiration for organized physical activities in schools throughout the Province comes, in the main, from the Chairman of the Board—Swami Kunalayananda.

15(5). The following table shows the strength of the two Battalions of the The U. O. T. C. U. O. T. C. :—

The reports of the Commandants show that students took keen interest in the Military training given to them and that the facilities offered by the University by way of exemption helped in maintaining the interest throughout the year. Cadres were held as usual to prepare candidates for the A and B War Certificates. Of the 621 and 130 candidates from the two Battalions who appeared for the A and B Certificates, 352 and 110 respectively passed.

15(6). Both the Boy Scouts and the Hindustan Scout Association continued their normal activities throughout the year. Schools have the choice to affiliate their Scout troops to either of the Associations and the expenditure incurred by managements on Scouting is admitted for the purposes of the Government grant for Physical education. The total strength of the Boy Scout Association increased from 23,234 to 25,948 while the number of boy scouts of the Hindustan Scouts Association decreased from 28,060 to 25,631. A grant of Rs. 18,071 was paid to the two Associations during the year.

15(7). The Bombay Girl Guides Association and the Girl Scout Section of the Hindustan Scout Association had a total strength of 4,498 and 11,415 respectively. A grant of Rs. 4,883 was paid to the two Associations during the year.

15(8). Of the 27,977 students (including 4,942 women) in affiliated colleges who were examined medically during the year, 9,821 or 35.1 per cent. were placed in Class A, 17,906 or 64.0 per cent. were placed in Class B and 250 or 0.9 per cent. were placed in Class C.

The medical examination of pupils in Government Secondary schools is held by Government Medical Officers, while several non-Government schools have introduced a proper system of medical examination. Of the 780 Secondary

schools (excluding English classes) 595 have made arrangements for the medical examination of their pupils. Of the 150,393 pupils in these schools, 127,609 were examined medically during the year.

In Primary schools under the control of the Local Authorities the aim is to have a child subjected to a medical examination at least twice during the Lower Primary stage. Only 13 Local Authorities have, however, so far been able to introduce a general scheme of medical inspection. The Bombay Municipality has a well organised system of medical examination which includes arrangements for treatment also.

CHAPTER XVI.

THE BORSTAL SCHOOL, DHARWAR, AND SCHOOLS CERTIFIED UNDER THE BOMBAY CHILDREN ACT, 1924.

16(1). The Bombay Borstal Schools Act, 1929, deals with young offenders over sixteen years of age and persons committed under this Act are detained in the Borstal School, Dharwar. This institution is the only one of its kind in this Province and is under the control of the Jail Department. It has been classified as a Reformatory School in the General Educational tables published with this Report.

Provision for the custody, protection and treatment of destitute and delinquent children (16 years of age and under) is made under the Bombay Children Act, 1924. Children dealt with under this Act are committed either to Certified schools or entrusted to the care of relatives or other fit persons. The Backward Class Officer is the Chief Inspector of Certified Schools, while officers of this Department inspect the educational work of these schools.

16(2). There are three Major Certified schools in this Province attended by 1,053 pupils. These schools have been included under "Other Schools" in the statistical returns. The following table gives the enrolment and the average annual cost per pupil of the three Major Certified Schools :—

Certified schools aim at imparting instruction, both secular and vocational, to enable the pupils to earn a living after discharge as a respectable citizen. All the Certified schools provide instruction up to Primary Standard IV or V and at the David Sassoon and Yeravda Industrial Schools. English is also taught. In addition

to literary instruction, provision for certain arts or crafts such as agricultural gardening, dairy farming, spinning and weaving, carpentry, Drawing and Modelling, cooking, etc. is made. All facilities for a corporate life are given in these schools and there is provision also for games. Further details of the working of Certified schools are given in the Juvenile Branch Administration Report published by the Chief Inspector of Certified Schools, Poona.

In addition to the three Major Certified schools mentioned above, there are 20 "Homes" certified under the Bombay Children Act for the custody and protection of destitute, neglected, uncontrollable, victimised, etc. children who are committed by the Juvenile Courts. The work done by the Children's Aid Society in this direction deserves special mention. In addition to the Children's Home at Chembur (a Major Certified School), the Society maintains a "Home" at Chembur with a separate Section for mentally defective children.

There were 489 boys and 433 girls in all these 20 "Homes". These children attend local Primary or Secondary schools if there is no provision for teaching them on the premises, while a few are apprenticed to mills and workshops.

Arrangements are also made in many of these Homes for instruction in certain useful crafts.

CHAPTER XVII.

EDUCATION OF DEFECTIVES.

17(1). The provision for the education of defective children in this Province consists of four schools for the Blind, with 147 children and eight schools for deaf-mutes, with 248 children. The Committee which maintains a school for deaf-mutes at Ahmedabad opened a school for the blind during the year with an enrolment of five children.

All the schools for defectives are maintained by private bodies or individuals and are aided by Government or by Local Bodies. The majority of the schools provide board and lodging for their pupils. The following table compares the number of schools and pupils in 1944-45 and 1945-46 :—

In addition to the 12 schools mentioned above, the Children's Home, Chembur, a Certified School maintained by the Children's Aid Society, (*vide* Chapter XVI) has a separate section for mentally deficient children. There were 55 children, including 12 girls, in this Section.

17(2). The blind receive instruction in the three R's in the regional languages through a Braille Code. English is also taught to some of the **School Work.** pupils. In addition to elementary education, various useful crafts are taught to enable the pupils eventually to earn a living. Provision for vocal and instrumental music is made in schools for the blind.

Lip reading and articulation form the main features of instruction in schools for deaf-mutes. Practical instruction in at least one of the common crafts is also given.

Arrangements for the medical examination of pupils are made in all schools for defectives. Physical drill and games suited to local conditions are encouraged and every possible effort is made to keep the children cheerful. A record of past students is maintained and efforts are made to secure suitable employment for them.

CHAPTER XVIII.

ADULT EDUCATION.

18(1). It seems strange that in a country where literacy is as low as 15 per cent.

Introductory. and was much lower a decade ago, no organised effort should have been made for the spread of literacy amongst the adults for generations. It was left to the popular Ministry which came into power in 1938 to make the first organised attempt at liquidation of adult illiteracy in the Province of Bombay. Since 1938, efforts have continued to be made both by the Provincial Government and public spirited citizens in this Province. The progress, however, has been much slower than anticipated with the result that Government in 1945 came to the conclusion that special efforts should be made to expedite the programme. With this view Government by Government Resolution, Educational Department, No. 7159 dated 4th May, 1945, sanctioned the selection of certain compact areas in the Province for the purpose of concentrated attention being paid to the question of making literate the illiterate adults living in those areas. To begin with, Government selected the following areas for such concentrated activity :—

Bhiwandi Town in the Thana District of the North-East Division.

Patan Taluka of the Satara District, and Belapur Road of the Ahmednagar District in the Central Division.

Thasra Taluka of the Kaira District in the Northern Division, and Athani Taluka of the Belgaum District in the Southern Division.

A Special Adult Education Officer was appointed for each of these compact areas so that he would be available on the spot constantly to attend to this work. His duties included the planning of a programme, propoganda and organisation of classes, supervision of the work done and testing the standard of attainment of new literates, arranging for the holding of continuation classes and starting of village libraries and reading rooms. As a result of the various steps taken during the last few years and more particularly of the special measures adopted as per Government Resolution of 1945 referred to above, the number of institutions for adults on 31st March, 1945, rose to 1,472 as against 818 in the previous year. The number of adults attending these institutions also rose to 36,282 (31,368 men and 4,914 women) as against 20,839 of the preceding year.

18(2). The following table compares the figures of institutions and adults attending them during the years 1944-45 and 1945-46 :—

A glance at this table will show that the number of institutions increased by about 60 per cent. while the number of adults attending them increased by about 80 per cent. The most important factor contributing to this substantial rise in the number of pupils was the fact that compact areas were selected during the year in different parts of the Province for concentrated activity. It will also be seen from the above table that there has been a decrease of 10 institutions under the heading "Schools" but on the other hand there has been an actual increase in the number of adults attending the schools. The number of Literacy Classes, it will be further seen, has nearly doubled itself while the number of students attending them has gone up by over 80 per cent.

Of the total number of pupils in different types of institutions for adults 31,368 were men and 4,914 were women. Among the schools for men, special mention may be made of Alegaonkar's Night School at Kirkee and the Progressive Night School at Poona. With regard to institutions for women, special mention may be made of the activities of the Seva Sadan Society in Bombay and Poona, the Bombay Education League, the Naigaon Social Service Centre, J. B. Wachha High School, Dadar, the Hindu Stree Mandal, Broach and the Mahila Vidyalaya, Surat. All these bodies continued to do useful work in this direction.

18(3). The comparative expenditure on Adult Education during the two years Expenditure. 1944-45 and 1945-46 was as shown below :—

It will be seen from the statement that while in the year 1944-45, Government contributed 53 per cent. towards the expenditure Government contribution in 1945-46 was only 43.3 per cent. As against this other sources made a contribution of 43.7 in 1944-45 and 54.3 in 1945-46. This is an encouraging feature of the year 1945-46 because it shows that the public has now come to realise the importance of Adult Education and that the efforts of Government in this connection are being seconded very substantially by the efforts of the public.

18(4). It was pointed out in the last year's report that there was a continuous drop in the number of literacy classes from year to year. It is very satisfactory to record here, therefore, that during the year 1945-46, as pointed out above, the number of literacy classes nearly doubled

themselves. Of the 1,407 literacy classes as many as 1,227 were for men, while 180 were for women. The number of men attending these classes was 29,202 while that of women was 3,742.

The expenditure on these classes in 1945-46 was Rs. 1,74,307 of which Government contribution amounted to Rs. 92,403. The corresponding figures for 1944-45 were 1,13,109 and 75,773. The number of classes was the highest in the Bombay Division with 661 classes. Obviously this was due to the fact that the City of Bombay formed part of this Division and had as many as 491 classes to its credit. There were 344 classes in the Southern Division while the Central Division had 252. Surprisingly enough comparatively little activity was shown in the North-East Division and the Northern Division where the number of classes respectively were 69 and 81.

Special mention has, in this connection, to be made of the efforts that are being made in the City of Bombay by the Bombay City Adult Education Committee. This Committee was able to turn out 27,623 literate adults during the year 1945-46 and of these 21,887 were men and 5,736 were women. The Committee not only runs Literacy Classes but also post-literacy classes in order to assure that the adults who became literate do not lapse into illiteracy. The total cost of the literacy classes in the City of Bombay during the year was Rs. 1,59,273 approximately of which Government contributed Rs. 54,000. As in the previous year, the Committee continued to publish the "Saksharata Deep" for the use of the newly made adult literates, and in addition, the Committee started two important activities during the year. One of these was Adult Education through films shown at the Kohinoor Cinema and the other was the publication of useful and cheap literature for the working classes and farmers.

As in the previous year, training classes for Adult Education workers for 2 weeks were conducted in the Training College for Men, Poona, and the Training College for Men, Dharwar. There were two such courses at Poona attended by 64 and 29 workers respectively while the class at Dharwar was attended by 48 workers. The teachers who attended these courses were given stipends of Rs. 20 each.

A few important features deserve to be stressed in this connection. It has been observed that of the 20 districts in the Province, the district of Kolaba is the only one which has not a single instance of an illiterate made literate to report. This is most disappointing and shows that no interest is being taken by the people of this district in the problem of adult literacy. It is to be hoped that the public workers of this district will attend to this most important item in future. It would appear from the statistics sent by the Chairman, Provincial Board for Adult Education that in the district of Surat, during the year under report, there were as many as 858 registered Adult Education workers but it would also appear that the number of adults examined for the purposes of the literacy certificates in the district during the year was as low as 10 and that of those 10 only 4 were successful. This shows that the mere presence of a large number of Adult Education workers on the registered list does not by itself mean any guarantee of work being done in a district and it is doubtful whether such people should be allowed to continue on the list when they do not show any enthusiasm for their work in practice. On the other hand, the number of such workers on the list in the Kaira District was only 51 but the number of adults presented at the test was as large as 1,122 of whom as many as 638 received literacy certificates. Even admitting that part of this work was done in the concentrated area of the Thasara Taluka, it is clear that in the Kaira District registered workers were much more active than those in the Surat District. It would also appear that in several other districts, the number of registered adult education workers is bigger than the number of adults presented for the literacy test. The only inference that can be drawn from these statistics is that in addition to registering these workers it is necessary for public spirited people in the district to do a good deal of active propoganda in the cause of adult literacy. It would not be enough to depend only on the Government inspecting staff for this purpose. Taking the Province as a whole including the City of Bombay, there were as many as 6,592 registered Adult Education workers during the year under report and between them they were able to present only 12,623 adults for the Literacy test and that, only 7,152 of them satisfied the test.

18(5). The scheme for the establishment of Village Libraries continue to make steady progress. As against 1,700 libraries during the preceding year, there were 1,982 in the year under report. The grants paid during the year amounted to Rs. 24,477 as against Rs. 20,000 paid during the previous year. By Divisions the Libraries were distributed as under :—

It would appear from these figures that the maximum advantage of this scheme is being taken by the Southern Division where 3 of the districts had over 200 such libraries each, while the fourth had 195 and the fifth 105. As regards the other Divisions, there are 3 districts in the Central Division where the number of libraries exceeds three figures, one such in the Northern Division and none in the North-East Division.

18(6). As in the previous year, the work of Adult Education in the City of
Extension work. Bombay was attended to not merely by the Bombay City Adult Education Committee but also by the Bombay Presidency Adult Education Association. Between them, they attended not only to the problem of making illiterate adults literate but also provided education for better living including such items as sanitation, personal hygiene and general education which would enable those who have completed their Primary Education to seek employment in Bombay. The latter part of the work was done by the Bombay Presidency Adult Education Association by means of extension lectures organised at different times of the year.

The Deputy Educational Inspector for Visual Instruction continued his good work of lecturing with the aid of magic lantern on subjects of social interest and village sanitation, health and hygiene.

The Provincial Board for Adult Education, Bombay Province, carried on its activities as usual. The Board held two meetings during the year.

CHAPTER XIX.

UNRECOGNISED INSTITUTIONS.

19(1). The preceding Chapters of this Report deal with institutions maintained or recognised by the Department. The remarks in this Chapter are confined to unrecognised institutions which are not under the control of the Department. Owing to the ephemeral character of these schools and the reluctance of their managers to submit statistical returns, it is difficult to give comparative statistics of these schools on an authentic basis. The drop of 71 institutions and of 2,878 pupils in unrecognised institutions during the year may thus be attributed partly to the returns not being supplied by some schools and partly to some of the schools having been taken on the list of recognised schools. The following table compares the statistics of these institutions collected by the Educational Inspectors :—

The two colleges shown in the Table are those in Poona and Ahmedabad affiliated to the Indian Women's University. A College is also maintained by this University in Bombay but no statistical returns from the institution were received also during the year. These colleges follow a course leading to the G.A. degree of the Indian Women's University.

With the exception of a few Secondary Schools managed by public spirited bodies and individuals and the schools affiliated to the Indian Women's University, unrecognised Secondary schools are mostly tutorial classes maintained by unemployed teachers. A number of private coaching classes have sprung up in recent years and they are run more as profiteering concerns than as educational institutions. The instruction in such institutions is as a rule confined to coaching and cramming pupils in a few subjects. A large majority of these classes aim at preparing pupils indiscriminately for admission to recognised Secondary schools and this inevitably results in unhealthy competition and rivalry among recognised institutions.

Unrecognised Primary schools are mostly indigenous schools imparting instruction in the 3 R's and serve the needs of small villages in which the Local Authorities or private societies are unable to open Primary schools.

With the exception of a few schools which follow a course of instruction in the Ayurvedic or Yunani system of medicine, unrecognised special schools comprise Pathashalas or Maktabas which follow an elementary course of instruction along traditional lines or classes which impart instruction in certain useful arts or crafts.
