REPORT ON PUBLIC INSTRUCTION IN BOMBAY, 1915-16.

I.—UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGIATE EDUCATION.

University.—Two special convocations were held in order to confer the honorary degree of LL.D. on Mr. Dadabhai Navroji and Lord Hardinge respectively; Sir Pherozeshah

Events of the year.
Mehta, on whom the Senate had resolved to confer the same honour, did not live to receive it. The regulations were revised in respect of the Preliminary Scientific Examination, for the purposes of which seven Arts Colleges have been recognized in the Faculty of Medicine; and in respect of the examinations in Agriculture, the degree of Master of Agriculture being instituted. The University lectures for the benefit of M.A. students, and the grant of subsidies to investigators in various branches of knowledge were continued; and, as a part of the University development scheme, a course of six lectures on "Aryan Origins" was delivered by the Rev. Dr. J. H. Moulton. A conference of the heads of affiliated colleges was held for the first time.

2. In connection with the transition to the new academic year a series of supplementary examinations was held in March 1916. The supplementary examinations of March 1915. the result being published after the commencement of the year under report. As this was a purely transitory arrangement, and as the results were of little interest (most of the candidates having already failed in November 1914), it has not been thought necessary to include the figures in General Table VI. Instead are given the results of the examinations of March 1916. The effect of this in the case of the examinations in law and medicine, which are held twice a year, is that on the present occasion the results of three examinations are combined in the Table instead of two as usual.

3. As the results of the supplementary examinations are not given in the Table, they will be recorded here. Results of the supplementary examinations. At the Matriculation 1,011 passed out of 4,214. At the Intermediate in Arts 192 passed out of 478. For the B.A. 45 passed out of 139 under the old rules. Under the new rules 51 offered themselves for honours, of whom 7 secured a second class, 20 passed only, and 24 failed; at the pass examination 66 out of 175 were successful. At the Intermediate in Science 6 out of 17 passed under the old rules, and 19 out of 40 under the new; for the B.Sc. 10 passed out of 21. For the M.A. 50 passed out of 103; for the M.Sc. one appeared and failed. In Engineering 13 out of 19 passed the first Examination, 9 out of 17 the second (Civil), and 5 out of 18 the final (Civil).

4. For the Matriculation Examination of March 1916 Rajkot was constituted an additional centre, making six in all. Matriculation, 1916. The number of candidates was 4,828, of whom 2,339 passed, the percentage being 48; the percentage in November 1914 was only 30. Thus the candidates had no reason to be dissatisfied; but the examiners complained of the "deplorable ignorance of geography" revealed by the history papers, and of an apparent neglect of Sanskrit grammar. Amongst the candidates were 144 girls, of whom 81 were successful. The first-place on the list was taken by a boy from the Garud High School, Dhulia.

5. In all the Arts Colleges taken together there were 2,415 students in the first year; of these 2,351, together with 140 ex-students, appeared for the college certificate examination, and 1,438 passed (57 per cent.). First and second years. There were 1,538 students in the second year; of these 1,481, together with 128 ex-students, appeared for the Intermediate Examination in Arts, and 958 passed (59 per cent.). Amongst those successful were 15 ladies. The report of the examiners in English asserts that the outstanding feature was not so much the ignorance of English displayed as the extraordinary carelessness of the majority of the candidates; 95 per cent. of

them appear to believe that the criterion of merit in an answer is its length,—an idea which makes them not only indifferent to all sense of proportion, but also “utterly careless about legibility, spelling, grammatical correctness, idiom, logical coherence and cogency, and even intelligibility.”

“The general irrelevancy of answer to question was a marked feature of the work of the candidates. The handwriting, spelling, and punctuation of about 35 per cent. was so utterly bad that nobody would dream of giving these men employment in any decent office, even in the humblest clerical positions. All the defects noted were brought out in a concentrated form in the essays.”

6. At the B.A. examination 260 were examined for honours; of these 15 secured a first class, 127 a second, 69 passed only, and 49 failed. Of 494 who took the pass examination 270 were successful. Thus 754 in all were examined for the B.A. degree, of whom 19 per cent. secured honours, and 36 per cent. failed. The successful ladies were seven in number. The examiners in Philosophy record the impression that “the second class now represents very great varieties of attainment.” The examiners in English were struck by the poor quality of the work. Slovenly dirty writing is still frequent, some papers being almost illegible; spelling mistakes are extraordinarily common, proper names being spelt wrong even when they occur in the question paper. I have emphasized these examiners’ reports, because they bear out the opinion of all who have to examine the work done in the schools, and show that the slovenly, inaccurate work of the school-boy is inevitably carried into the college course, with results that must surely affect the future of those who have to earn a living thereafter.

7. At the Intermediate Examination in Science 54 passed out of 117; for the B.Sc. 18 passed out of 26 under the old rules, and 16 out of 27 under the new. For the M.Sc. 3 passed out of 4. For the M.A. 54 passed out of 137 in languages, history, or philosophy; and 29 out of 53 in mathematics or science. This was announced to be the last examination under the old rules, and consequently a good many ill-prepared candidates seem to have presented themselves; at any rate the examiners in History thought their batch considerably below the average. “Some appeared to have picked up the little they knew” of Indian history “from Marathi compilations.” “In Politics the number of long answers—in one case two books full—of mere talk, in the vain hope of taking in the examiner, was a marked feature—a species of intellectual dishonesty.”

8. The Intermediate Examination in Commerce was held in both October 1915 and March 1916; 103 passed. In Law 182 passed the first examination, and 165 the second. In Agriculture 20 out of 31 passed the first examination, 23 out of 23 the second, and 23 out of 29 the final. In Civil Engineering 41 out of 63 passed the first examination, 33 out of 53 the second, and 36 out of 75 the final. The second examination was held in Mechanical Engineering for the first time, when 3 appeared and all passed. The Medical examinations are complicated, and do not lend themselves to a brief statement like this.

9. Arts Colleges.—The total number of students in the seven Government and aided colleges increased from 3,475 to 4,702; Fergusson College had 1,440, Wilson 1,017, St Xavier’s 767, Gujarat 580, Elphinstone 343, Deccan 269, and Sind 256. This number included 190 Jains, 161 Mahomedans, 50 Lingayats, and 2 belonging to the depressed classes. If we take the number of candidates sent up for the Honours B.A. and the percentage who secured a first or second class, the colleges stand in the following order:—Sind 77 (but no first class), Elphinstone 76, Gujarat 66, Deccan 57, St. Xavier’s 54, Fergusson 47, and Wilson 46.

10. Mr. A. L. Covernton resumed the principalship of Elphinstone College in October, and Mr. Bain that of Deccan College in November. At the former there were three Marathas, to one of whom a first-year scholarship was awarded; at the latter sixteen, of whom two held scholarships in the third-year class. The Sanskrit manuscripts in Elphinstone College were found to have been neglected, and to be infected

with some form of animal life; they were in consequence brought to Poona and disinfected, and the opportunity was taken to unite some other loose collections with the Deccan College library, which was thus enriched with about 1,900 additional manuscripts. The first volume of the descriptive catalogue of the manuscripts, which has been in hand since 1900, was at last published; but experience has shown the design of this catalogue to be impracticable, and further work on it has been abandoned in favour of a card index of a more modern type. Gujarat College lost its greatest benefactor by the death, in March 1916, of Sardar Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal, Bart., C.I.E., whose gifts to it had amounted to ten lakhs of rupees. The permission granted by Government to resume the teaching of B.A. science here was much appreciated; but the results in respect of the B.Sc. course were disappointing. The herbarium was enriched by presents from Mr. J. Marten of Mussoorie and Mr. L. J. Sedgwick, I.C.S., the latter of whom also contributed much valuable assistance. The beautiful little Sydenham Library is now in use.

11. The principals of Wilson and St Xavier's Colleges make no remarks on the year's work. At Fergusson College a new hostel for 100 residents was opened; also a large hall for the first year's practical work in physics. Considerable progress was made at the Dayaram Jethmal Sind College with the scheme for the improvement of the science teaching; and a swimming bath was constructed. This college was remarkably successful in His Excellency the Governor's prize competition for essays on the war, securing both the first prizes and one of the others.

12. **Professional Colleges.**—The new engineering laboratory at the College of Engineering is now practically complete, and (except in the hydraulic section) the machinery has been erected and tested; the staff and the recurring grants required have been sanctioned. In January 1916 Mr. C. Graham Smith was appointed Professor of Engineering, relieving Professor Cree Brown, who went to the chair of Mechanical Engineering. The number of students in the University classes was 189, and in other classes 122; there was one Maratha scholar in the Workshop, who was doing well.

13. At the Government Law School the number of students decreased from 461 to 365, of whom 125 were in the first year and 210 in the second; the decrease was due to the shifting of the B.A. examination from November to March. Improvements were made in the library, which was overhauled and catalogued by the principal and a lawyer friend in their spare time. A committee was appointed jointly by Government and the University to consider the needs of the School in the light of the suggestions made by Sir Alfred Hopkinson.

14. At the Sydenham College of Commerce and Economics the number of students increased from 143 to 185; but the principal complains that it is encumbered with a class of youths who have no real aptitude for a business career of any kind, and who apply for admission merely because they make the mistake of supposing that they can obtain a degree here more easily than at an Arts college, or that they will somehow drop into a "soft job" at the end of their course.

II.—SECONDARY EDUCATION.

15. **Programme.**—Owing to the general curtailment of expenditure little could be done with the suggestions for the improvement of secondary education outlined in 1911, and referred to in this place in preceding reports. The following is a brief record of such progress as was made :—

(1) *New high schools.*—Rs. 4,862 were transferred to the Public Works Department for the completion of the building of the new high school at Jalgaon, and Rs. 1,150 for the acquisition of land for its hostel.

(2) *Construction or extension of buildings.*—Work on the new building for the Násik high school was resumed. Rs. 6,119 were transferred to the Public Works Department for the construction of a headmasters' office, masters' common room, and library and reading-room for the high school at Belgaum.

(6) *Additional teachers.*—Two were sanctioned for Sátára.

(7) *Playgrounds.*—Seven acres of land were acquired for the improvement of the playground at Kárwár, but they have to be made fit for use. Rs. 3,040 were spent on improving the compound of the Surat high school, and Rs. 2,550 on additional land for the playground at Nadiád.

(10) *Laboratories and scientific equipment.*—The new laboratories at Belgaum and Bijápúr were completed, and Rs. 22,460 were spent on scientific equipment in Government high schools.

(11) *Hostels.*—Over Rs. 19,000 were expended on additions or improvements at a number of places; whilst larger works involved an expenditure of Rs. 23,737 at Sholápúr, Rs. 11,964 at Shikárpur, and Rs. 10,661 at Nadiád.

16. **High schools for boys.**—These increased (by the addition of an English-teaching school at Belgaum) from 110 to 111, of which 21 were Government, 4 municipal, and 86 under private management. The number of pupils increased from 37,739 to 37,766; but these figures fail to take account of the boys who left their schools in March in order to appear for the Matriculation or School Final. The Anglo-Vernacular schools were again 94 in number; their pupils were 33,824.

17. **Government high schools for boys.**—The number of schools remained 21; the number of pupils fell from 7,353 to 6,826. The causes assigned are the withdrawal of the Matriculation and School Final candidates, and the fact that new admissions were not made owing to the change of year. That there was no great difference in the number actually attending in the course of the year is indicated by the circumstance that the average monthly attendance was actually higher by five (7,406).

18. These schools taken together sent up 774 candidates for the Matriculation, of whom 449 passed, or 58 per cent. The Dhulia school secured the first place in the list; the Godhra school passed 16, and the Ratnágiri school 15, out of 18. For the School Final they sent up 403 candidates, of whom 186 passed, or 46 per cent. At the drawing examinations they sent up 195 candidates for the elementary grade, of whom 102 passed; and 119 for the intermediate grade, of whom 73 passed. The number of boys benefiting by total or partial exemption from fees was 514 of advanced classes, 156 Mahomedans, and 275 of other backward classes; 135 free studentships remained vacant for want of suitable applicants.

19. Amongst the headmasters Messrs. Turner and Griffith joined the army; Messrs. N. L. Phadke and R. H. Deshpande retired. School excursions were abruptly curtailed as a measure of economy; but the idea has caught on, not only with the older boys for whom they were designed, but also with the younger boys and even with vernacular school boys, many of whom now persuade their teachers to take them on short and inexpensive trips at their own charges. Our thanks are due again to all who have co-operated. At Nadiád parents were found to be apathetic in attending gatherings, so a new system is being tried. Each standard holds a gathering once a year, when the boys are the hosts, and their parents or guardians, together with the monitors of the other standards, are the

guests; recitations are given, and light refreshments served. A very old grievance is illustrated by the remark that "Standard IV-B at Dharwar has had eight masters during the year." Of the manual training class at Belgaum the examiner remarked that the drawings were neat, and the exercises satisfactory; the exhibition of articles made was quite extraordinary, and reflected great credit on Mr. Kulkarni and his assistant. At Belgaum also the new hostel was taken into use; here on Wednesdays and Saturdays a kind of *conversazione* was held, at which stories were told, complaints were ventilated, and the welfare of the hostel and its inmates generally was discussed. Mr. Kelkar is praised for his work in this connection; but Mr. Miller feels, as others have done, that some emolument besides free quarters should be given to the superintendents of large hostels, as their work is very arduous and their responsibilities are great.

20. Moral instruction is given in most of the schools on the same lines as formerly; Poona reports that the change from English to Marathi as the medium is giving good results, as the boys now follow with ease, take part in discussion, and reproduce stories of their own, which they never did before. At Dhulia Mr. Kazi, the headmaster, has organized 17 teams for different games, English and Indian, and himself joins in playing football. Mr. Terigundi is congratulated on his sustained efforts to interest boys out of school at Dharwar. Mr. Miller's scout system continues to be popular at Belgaum, where 378 are enrolled; and was formally introduced with the permission of Government at Karwar in January. At Karachi, which is purely a day school, Mr. Grieve has divided the boys of standards IV—VII into "houses" named after four famous men associated with Sind, namely, Napier, Outram, Jacob, and Frere. Each house is represented by several teams, and is managed by a house-master, three other masters, and the captains. Competitions are held in cricket, football, hockey, and study; there is a special system of scoring, and each year there will be a champion house. It is claimed that the system lays no extra strain on the boys, and in no way interferes with the ordinary work of the school, while it encourages *esprit de corps*.

21. It is reported that the science laboratory at Poona is very neatly arranged, but so dark that the boys will probably develop an abnormal delicacy of touch which may be of use to them hereafter. At Nasik the ceiling of the science room is so low that it caught fire from the blast lamp, which was perhaps the only occasion when the occupants could see what they were doing. Mr. Kazi, the headmaster at Dhulia, frequently visits the laboratory and is the first *non-science* headmaster to have grasped some of the main points to be looked for. Of Ahmedabad the Inspector of science-teaching writes:—

"For Mr. Doshi's work in the classes I have nothing but praise. In addition to observing the main purpose of the course, viz., practical work by the boys themselves, he has paid particular attention to the way in which they have recorded their results. Work of such a high degree of neatness and accuracy I have never before seen approached in any subject. I feel that these results are in themselves full justification of my contention that the disgraceful slovenliness prevalent in nearly all the work in Indian high schools is due, not to lack of capacity for neatness on the part of the boys, but to the lack of proper insistence and suitable instruction on the part of the masters. This high school is one of the very few to which I recommend other schools to send their masters actually to see apparatus and methods of work."

22. Mr. Miller has made some comments on the work of the five schools in his division, which probably apply with equal force to most of the others. After *premis*ing that there is a great deal in the high school work which is good, for instance the tone of the boys and the physical side of their education, he remarks that the schools as a whole are not successful in passing large numbers of boys in the Matriculation and School Final examinations, which he attributes mainly to the fact that the masters are not nearly strict enough in exacting good work from the boys; it is very seldom that a master is found who insists upon tidy and accurate work, and the unpleasant word *slovenly* characterizes most of the work in the upper standards. An inspection even of the mathematical notebooks reveals

a state of unreasoned untidy work which is bound to produce many failures. A good deal of the copywriting in some schools is entrusted to the drawing master, who is not at all interested in the subject, and the mistake is made of devoting two full periods to it in a week, and neglecting it for the other days; no small boy can write very carefully for 40 minutes on end, and it would be better to give a few minutes to it every day. On the subject of geography Mr. Miller remarks that it continues to offer great difficulties both to teachers and taught; masters are constantly in trouble because they have no means of finding out interesting details of a foreign country except a dull geography book or a duller map. The remedy for this seems to me to be the supplying of school-libraries with interesting descriptive and illustrated books; but it is seldom that one sees such in them. Instead the shelves are crowded with elaborate editions of English classics, expensive encyclopædias, and the like, in most cases of no earthly use for illustrating lessons. When economy was enjoined the very first grant that some headmasters abandoned was the small, but vitally important, library grant. Others shelter themselves behind the "list of books sanctioned for libraries," as if they had no power to purchase anything else; and it has even been asserted recently in the Legislative Council that aided schools also were limited by this list. This appears to be a complete misconception. The list is a concourse of fortuitous atoms, submitted at various times by publishers, who are not in the habit of sending illustrated books of travel for approval; it is issued more by way of bringing to the notice of headmasters books that they might not otherwise hear of or see than for any other reason. If headmasters would apply to some of the principal publishers for lists of books of travel, or books descriptive of foreign countries, and then buy some of them, they could easily afford some assistance to the teachers of geography.

23. **Municipal high schools for boys.**—These remained four in number, situated respectively at Pandharpur, Hubli, Kaira, and Sakkur, and call for no special remarks. The number of pupils decreased from 1,064 to 1,030.

24. **Aided Anglo-Vernacular high schools for boys.**—The number of these remained 54; the number of pupils increased from 17,091 to 17,657.

25. At the Wilson high school in Bombay the Belgaum scout system has been introduced on a small scale, being managed principally by a 6th standard boy who went to Belgaum to learn about it. The general complaint in Bombay continues to be the difficulty of obtaining teachers who are not mere birds of passage. The authorities of the New English School at Poona have a regular course of lectures in psychology and method, but the frequent changes in the staff make training difficult. At the Nutan Marathi Vidyalaya, also at Poona, there were more than 20 teachers who had not put in a year's service at the school. A warning had to be given to the Poona Native Institution on the subject of accommodation, equipment, and general efficiency; but the governing body has been making strenuous efforts, in the face of considerable difficulties, to place the school on a better footing. Of the ten schools in the southern division five are mission schools, and the discipline in four of these was found to be unsatisfactory. In eight the upper standards are very weak, and the knowledge of English is far below the proper level. In all the outstanding feature is the lack of trained masters; and it is impossible to expect better results until more room is provided in the Secondary Training College.

26. In consequence of the financial situation it was notified that no additional schools could be taken on the aided list, that no grants could be reassessed, and that even building and equipment grants already promised would be suspended in those cases where no expenditure had yet been actually incurred. Some adverse comments have been excited by the circumstance that in the central division the European schools received their usual grants, whilst the non-European schools sustained some reduction, and an attempt has been made to exhibit this as a case of racial favouritism, though the allotments are entirely distinct and the divisional inspector at the time was himself an Indian. Hence it seems worth while to explain what actually occurred. Year by year the total

allotment for grants-in-aid is sub-divided between the four divisional inspectors and the inspector of European schools in proportion to their requirements; in 1915-16 the new inspector of drawing claimed and was conceded the right of sanctioning drawing grants, and in consequence each of the five allotments was reduced by a proportionate sum to make up an allotment for him. In an ordinary year the allotments never suffice, and towards the end of the year the inspectors report their requirements, and the deficiency is made up as far as possible by reappropriation from savings in other directions. In 1915-16 the inspectors were warned that owing to the general curtailment of the budget it would probably not be possible to find savings for reappropriation, and that they must make their original allotments go round as far as possible. They were instructed to pay grants in full to primary schools, training classes, and girls' schools; and to make a reduction if necessary in the grants to boys' secondary schools. These schools were warned accordingly; but in the end all the inspectors just managed to make their allotments go round with the exception of the officiating inspector of the central division. This officer had manipulated the distribution of his allotment in the preceding year in such a way that he was threatened with a large deficiency in 1915-16, and he represented this deficiency as being double of what it really was, so that it appeared hopeless to attempt to meet it by reappropriation. If he had represented the correct amount (which was something over Rs. 12,000), and that this was mainly due to the withdrawal of Rs. 10,000 for drawing grants, an effort would have been made to find the money even at the last hour; but the true state of affairs was only recently cleared up by Mr. Marrs after his return to duty. The boys' schools nominally had their grants reduced by one-fifth; but as they received in addition "supplementary" grants and drawing grants which they had not received in the preceding year, I hope that in most cases the actual loss was not nearly so great. At any rate, in the cases of two very large schools which I enquired into I found that the net reduction was only about Rs. 280, or two per cent. of the whole. Now that the matter has been cleared up, and that grants have been withdrawn from all the Basel Mission schools, I hope that it will be possible to make good this deficiency in the central division in the current year, and Government have already been approached for a necessary reappropriation.

27. Unaided Anglo-Vernacular high schools for boys.—The number of these remained 15; the number of pupils decreased from 8,317 to 8,311. The largest of these schools, the New High School of Bombay, which had an average monthly number of 2,266 boys, celebrated its silver jubilee, when the principals were presented by past and present pupils with Rs. 10,500, which they intend to spend on buildings in some hill-station for the use of their teachers. They already have a provident fund for the teachers which amounts to over Rs. 42,000. The Tutorial High School of Bombay is noteworthy for having a number of girls, and seven lady teachers.

28. Middle schools for boys.—The number of these increased from 258 to 274, of which 6 were Government, 4 local board, 55 municipal, and 209 under private management; there was a decrease of 1 municipal (at Chopda in Khandesh), and an increase of 17 private. The number of pupils increased from 20,731 to 22,095. The Anglo-Vernacular schools were 244 in number, with 18,430 pupils.

29. Attendance at the four Government schools in this Presidency remained 1,304. The boys benefiting by total or partial exemption from fees were 70 of the advanced classes 14 Mahomedans, and 54 of other backward classes; 33 free studentships were vacant for want of suitable applicants. At the Elphinstone school for the first time in its history excursions were attempted. Some of the new teachers took every opportunity to attend the trained teachers' classes, and also to invite the trained teachers to their own classes for mutual observation and criticism. At Surat also excursions were made to local sights. The Ahmedabad school exhibits some activity in new directions, such as the growing of plants, the making of relief and other maps, and the game of Meccano, interest in which has spread to some of the parents. The Poona Camp school has started a co-operative society which made a net profit of about six per cent.

30. The Depressed Classes Mission school at Parel has started a scout system, the effect of which, especially with regard to regularity of attendance, is said to be admirable.

Other schools.

Several schools of this class have been trying to get themselves converted into full high schools; unfortunately the managers do not always understand that the days are past when a room, a teacher, and some boys were sufficient to constitute a 6th or 7th standard. Every headmaster who presents candidates for the Matriculation now has to certify that they have completed satisfactorily the course in science laid down by the University; this course involves practical work in a laboratory, and covers two years. Hence there is really no longer any justification for the recognition of six-standard schools; a school ought to have five standards or seven, and the Department has begun to recognize a 6th standard only on condition that the managers are prepared to follow it by a 7th in the succeeding year. Then again managers seem to think it sufficient to apply just as the school year is beginning, or even a few months after it has begun, for the recognition of a 6th standard, or a 7th, or both, stating that they have set aside such and such a sum for the provision of scientific apparatus. They ignore the circumstance that in these times it takes many months to obtain a supply of scientific apparatus and chemicals—even if they can be procured at all—and that in all probability the school year will have drawn to an end before their new standards have got to work on the prescribed course. It is futile for managers to apply for recognition unless they are able to guarantee that their headmaster will be in a position to give an honest certificate to those whom he sends up for the Matriculation. The University itself has intimated that the period of transition may be considered to be over, and that it expects the regulations to be complied with strictly in future.

31. **Secondary education in general.**—The change in the date of the Matriculation has created a number of difficulties in high school administration, which cannot be said to have been solved satisfactorily as yet. Mr. Marrs remarks that few of the schools do anything to encourage teachers to study the theory and practice of their profession; but the fact is that teachers well enough qualified to benefit from training are difficult to recruit. The most urgent problem seems to be how to make teaching a profession to which men and women will stick; for without an element of permanence in the teaching staff revised curricula and schemes for training can effect little.

Un solved problems.

32. In the meantime perhaps the most important development taking place in the secondary schools at present is the development of practical work in science in the higher standards. On this in its various aspects Mr. Pratt has submitted an interesting report which I proceed to summarize. During the past year the work of the various high schools has not been of the same nature throughout. Some have been carrying out very good class work; others have spent the time in preparatory equipment; others again have merely marked time. In respect of buildings most schools have made commendable efforts to provide suitable rooms for the practical work; but there are still some which have not risen to the occasion, and where boys are crowded together in a hot and foetid atmosphere, and in a manner which effectually prevents any proper work. Furniture again is very variable in its nature and quantity; but a clearer understanding is gaining ground of the essential features of school laboratory furniture, of which ample table space and storage room are two of the chief. In the purchase of apparatus much greater perspicacity has been shown; and from time to time suggestions with regard to apparatus are received which are worthy of general circulation. On the other hand in the framing of timetables there is a dearth of both intelligence and adaptability; the N. J. High School at Karachi perhaps possesses the best arrangements. As regards the teachers, the best work is being done by those who attended Mr. Pratt's training classes, and who worked hard during that short period. Until financial conditions permit of more training being undertaken inefficient or inexperienced men are encouraged to visit those laboratories where work is proceeding along right lines. But practically every science master has been found to be keen on his work and interested in it. In this work quality has been authoritatively given

precedence over quantity. The boys seem to take an interest in it when it is not too difficult; but it is obvious that only the simplest work can be expected for some years to come, as the boys are clumsy with their hands and quite unaccustomed to individual thought and effort. Much attention has been given to the recording of the results, and in a few cases (notably the Government high schools at Karachi, Ahmedabad, and Jalgaon) good work is being done. It is hoped that this will prove the nucleus of an attempt to overcome the unutterable slovenliness which pervades almost all the written work in Indian high schools; this will no doubt be a matter of years, but even now the science work is beginning to show signs of neatness.

33. **High schools for girls.**—The number of these remained 31, of which two were Government, and the rest under private management; the number of pupils increased from 4,346 to 4,449. The Anglo-Vernacular schools were 16 in number, with 2,133 pupils.

34. The attendance at the High School for Indian Girls at Poona, which is controlled by the Maharashtra Female Education Society, decreased slightly from 320 to 307. In the Government school at Ahmedabad the number rose from 173 to 207. There were ten Mahomedaus at Ahmedabad, only one at Poona. Both schools earned fairly good reports.

35. With regard to the Anglo-Vernacular schools in Bombay Miss Corkery remarks that the chief point of interest has been the zest with which the new science course has been taken up in the higher standards. This was quite contrary to the preconceived opinion of the managers, who decided that the syllabus was impossible for girls; but the girls themselves have decided otherwise, and the science lessons are the most popular of all the subjects in the timetable. The work in the lower standards has not been so successful, chiefly because the teachers themselves are not yet at home with it; but the same may be said of most of the boys' schools.

36. It has long been felt to be a drawback that practically the only secondary course available for girls was the matriculation course designed for boys. At my suggestion, and in consultation with the heads of the schools, Miss Corkery has drafted a set of alternative standards which provide for the inclusion of some "domestic" subjects. These have for the present been laid aside pending their coordination with the primary course; pending also the provision of facilities for the teaching of the domestic subjects, for which apparently the schools look to Government. In the meantime the Government of India have drawn attention to the general subject of girls' education, including curricula, and a vast number of opinions on the subject have been collected; from these it appears that even the ladies are not completely agreed as to the extent to which domestic subjects should be encouraged in the school course. So far as the Bombay schools are concerned, the majority of them teach the matriculation course. The Girton high school and the Alexandra Institution teach the minimum of vernacular, and spread the course over nine standards so as to redistribute the mathematical syllabus. The Chanda Ramji school does not sacrifice the vernacular, but lightens the work in the lower standards to some extent by the introduction of a preparatory class (this applies also to the Motlaba Wadia school at Broach). The Princess high school discontinues the vernacular after the second standard, introduces domestic economy, nature study, and civics, and follows a lower standard of mathematics; the course is excellent in design, but it is difficult to obtain teachers who can handle it intelligently, and so it is liable to relapse into cram. As for domestic subjects the Empress high school, the United Free Church Mission school, and the Emmanuel girls' high school lead the way in needlework; the Rattanbai F. Panday school teaches a course of laundry work which is well organized and of practical value; and the two schools of the Parsi Girls' School Association arrange for a useful series of cooking lessons, the girls doing all the work and cleaning up afterwards.

37. **Middle schools for girls.**—The number of these decreased from 50 to 49, all under private management; the pupils decreased from 3,931 to 3,839. The number of Anglo-Vernacular schools was 22, with 1,157 pupils.

38. **Outside of Bombay and Poona secondary schools for girls would not exist in the central division without the help of missions, and those that do exist have very few girls in them, in spite of all that we have heard lately about a supposed ardent desire for an extension of facilities for the education of girls.** Even the Vanita Visram class at Surat dwindled from 37 to 10. A municipal class was opened at Thana and has 17 pupils. There is an English class at Malvan, to which some of the masters from the local high school devote a couple of hours in the morning; and the training college for women at Dharwar conducts an English class for ladies, in which the attendance increased from 7 to 29. But these are not to be counted as regular schools. Out of 8,160 students receiving secondary education in all kinds of institutions in the southern division only 44 were girls. In Sind the fine new building of the Kundanmal school at Hyderabad was opened by Lady Willingdon in December 1915.

39. **Girls' secondary education in general.**—The teachers who had the advantage of attending the course of physical training mentioned last year, in which they learned the first principles of Swedish drill, are eager for a second course. The Girls' Athletic Association of Bombay maintains its popularity, and has been able to organize friendly competitions at shorter intervals; but the schools are still labouring under the grievance of having no central playground.

40. **Schools for Europeans and Anglo-Indians.**—The number of schools for Europeans decreased from 45 to 44, owing to the amalgamation of two at Poona. The number of pupils increased from 4,244 to 4,278, of whom 3,672 were Europeans or Anglo-Indians. If to this number are added 1,064 attending the English-teaching schools, the total number of European and Anglo-Indian pupils comes to 4,736; last year it was 4,846. The total expenditure amounted to Rs. 6,26,933, towards which 34 per cent. were contributed from provincial revenues, and 38 per cent. from subscriptions and endowments. The proportion of the former fell because, owing to a change of date, many schools could not claim a drawing grant in the year; and also because the special maintenance grants sanctioned for the Cathedral schools came to an end. Out of 44 schools 21 have hostels attached to them. The European high school examination was passed by 32 only out of 53, the candidates not being up to the usual average. The number appearing for the four kinds of Cambridge Local Examination increased from 347 to 426; the number passing from 176 to 212. The three training classes for mistresses contained 49 students, of whom 14 were in receipt of stipends. Building grants amounting to over Rs. 3,00,000 were paid during the year.

41. **Mr. Dudley remarks that there are no new developments to report; all that can be said is that the schools are carrying on. Their work has suffered, their finances have suffered, and the supply of masters seems to have come to an end. The excitement and the suspense have produced in many a spirit of restlessness, though it is true that Geography and Needlework have received a great impetus. Six teachers in English or Scotch schools obtained commissions in the army, and one of these has been killed in action in Mesopotamia; in addition many past students of the European schools are serving in various capacities, and each school is keeping its Roll of Honour. Some of the Roman Catholic schools suffered a good deal on account of the internment of German or Austrian members of the staff. Substitutes had to be provided who were often young men with no teaching experience; but Government furnished Rs. 10,000 towards the additional expenditure.**

42. **The number of English-teaching schools remained 40; a new school was registered at Karwar, but the Convent school at Ahmedabad had to be closed on account of the internment of members of its staff. The number of pupils declined from 8,263 to 8,109. A revised curriculum for schools of this class (Schedule C of the Grant-in-aid**

(Code), which had been long under consideration, was sanctioned by Government; it may, however, take some years to work up to it owing to deficiencies in the teachers.

43. Of the girls' schools almost all now adopt the Cambridge Local syllabus; for those pupils who wish to take the matriculation course it has been found possible to combine the classes in most subjects, separate hours being devoted to the English textbooks. The Byculla Education Society's school has introduced nature study in the lower standards; and the domestic science course gains in value by the inclusion of regular lessons in cooking. St. Joseph's Convent school at Bandra is now comfortably settled in its new building; the needlework taught here is excellent, and cooking is popular. Of the English-teaching schools Queen Mary's is the best housed and staffed, and its kindergarten can hold its own with the most advanced. Several of the schools have been assiduous in working for the War Fund.

III.—PRIMARY EDUCATION.

44. **Programme.**—Owing to the financial situation very little progress could be made with the suggestions for the improvement of primary education outlined in 1911 and referred to in this place in preceding reports.

(1) *Giving trained teachers their full Code pay.*—During the year Rs. 10,547 from the Darbar grant were distributed amongst the District Local Boards to defray the cost of pay and pension contribution on account of additional trained teachers sent out from the various training colleges.

(2) and (3) *Extra accommodation and equipment for existing schools.*—The expenditure incurred from the free building and equipment grants previously sanctioned was Rs. 21,492 by the District Local Boards and Rs. 24,321 by Municipalities. The total amount spent by these bodies is now Rs. 1,49,939 out of an allotment of Rs. 13,60,100.

45. **Primary schools for boys.**—The number of these decreased from 9,929 to 9,797; the number of pupils from 594,728 to 588,790. If we refer to the different heads we find that there was an increase of 2 Government, 14 Municipal, and 4 unaided schools, and a decrease of 16 Local Board and 136 aided schools. The decrease of Local Board schools was due to the closing of schools for bad attendance; the decrease of aided schools was due partly to plague, partly to bad attendance, and partly to a change of classification by which some of them were transferred to the head "Other Special Schools". The fall in attendance was largely due to plague.

46. **Government primary schools for boys.**—These increased from 16 to 18, and the number of pupils from 1,933 to 2,054. On the one hand a factory school at Poona was closed, and a police school at Dharwar was transferred to the District Local Board; on the other hand two day and two night schools for children of the criminal tribes in the Bijapur district were opened under the control of the Assistant Collector on special duty (Mr. Starte), who was allotted an additional grant of Rs. 3,000 per annum for three years from educational funds.

47. The factory school referred to above was closed because the mill to which it was attached was closed. As regards factory schools in general, a syllabus of studies for such schools was approved by Government in November 1915, and ordered to be introduced into all of them. By the end of March four mills in Bombay had adopted it, but none in Ahmedabad. The Government school at Sholapur was closed from December onwards on account of plague; that at Gadag could not make much progress because of the constant departure of boys to be enrolled as full-time workers and the arrival of others. Six of the private mill schools in Bombay were visited by Mr. Marrs, who thought two of them worse than useless. In one case 30 pupils out of 43 were present in a room of about 15' X 10', so close to the engine house and so noisy that teaching was conducted under the most serious disadvantages. In the other case the school was held in a place where looms were working and where the noise was so deafening that conversation was impossible; and yet one master was supposed to teach 72 pupils. The children seem to be constantly moving from one mill to another, and only occasionally and temporarily find themselves at a mill where there is any sort of school.

48. **Local Board schools for boys.**—The number of these decreased from 7,094 to 7,078; the number of pupils from 392,579 to 384,857. The decrease in schools is mainly accounted for by the closing for bad attendance of 10 schools in Kanara, 8 in Nasik, and 7 in East Khandesh; Sind on the other hand shows an increase of 10 schools. The fall in attendance was almost wholly due to plague. Out of 7,539 schools (including some for girls) in the Presidency and Sind 34 per cent. now have buildings of their own. The percentage of cesspayers' children was 68 in the southern division, 62 in the central, and 57 in the northern.

49. In the case of Sind it was finally decided not to recognize any distinction between full primary and rural standards, and a revised syllabus of studies for boys' schools was

published in June 1915 (Schedule H of the Grant-in-aid Code). In the presidency proper 1,462 local board schools (with 171,589 pupils) were following the curriculum prescribed for full primary schools; and 4,622 (with 163,967 pupils) that prescribed for rural schools. A certain amount of agitation continued on the subject, which found expression in a Resolution moved in the March meeting of the Legislative Council. The Resolution was defeated, but it is understood that Government are reconsidering the whole question, and it is not necessary to go into it further here, beyond remarking that Revenue officers were invariably consulted on the conversion of ordinary into rural schools, and the lists issued were those corrected by them.

50. From Sind Mr. Hesketh reports that the schools built according to the type design, though not beautiful, are generally satisfactory, and are provided with adequate compounds; to reduce expense only the school itself and a small bit of adjoining ground are enclosed, and the main compound has only its corners marked by pillars. Plans and estimates are being prepared for new schools, so that there may be no delay when the financial situation improves. Small improvements are being made in equipment, and more attention is being paid to the attitudes of the pupils in reading or writing. Petty difficulties, however, arise and sometimes prove too much for the masters. In some cases it had not occurred to them to lengthen the cords of pictures or maps in order to utilize the new picture-rods provided; in another case football was not played, as the only available ground was at a distance, and it was considered difficult to arrange for the football to be taken care of during the night. Special attention is being paid to handwriting, good use is being made of the school libraries, and definite progress has been made in the cultivation of school gardens; in one case a master and his boys had dug a well 22 feet deep.

51. Municipal schools for boys.—The number of these increased from 770 to 784, and the number of pupils from 108,695 to 113,677; all but 27 were teaching the full primary curriculum. Very few municipalities send masters or mistresses to be trained at their own expense; they rely entirely upon loans from the Department, and then grumble when the Department finds it difficult to lend them the trained teachers that they want, or insists upon any of its ordinary requirements.

52. Aided schools for boys. The number of these decreased from 1,989 to 1,853, and the number of pupils from 87,810 to 83,671. Some of these schools were closed on account of plague, and others for want of popular support; in addition there has been a change of classification by which aided Sanskrit, Persian and Arabic, and music schools have been transferred to the head "Other Special Schools". There is nothing of special interest to add under this head.

53. Unaided schools for boys.—The number of unaided schools increased from 60 to 64, and the number of pupils from 3,711 to 4,531. In Sind there is a tendency to establish Brahmacharyas, to which boys are brought young and where they are practically cut off from their parents. The others do not call for any remarks.

54. Night schools.—These increased from 127 to 133, but the number of pupils fell from 3,742 to 3,535. It is alleged that in some parts, at least, villagers are prompted to apply for such schools by the teachers of day schools who have an eye to the special allowance; but such schools rarely thrive. It will be seen that the average number of pupils in a school is only 26.

55. Private schools.—The number of these increased from 1,928 to 2,061, and the number of pupils from 39,107 to 44,651. The number classed as advanced was 168, with 3,490 pupils; the number classed as elementary was 1,795, with 37,951 pupils; and the number "not conforming to departmental standards" was 98, with 3,210 pupils. The advanced are such as teach Arabic, Persian, Sanskrit, or any other Oriental classical language; the elementary are those which teach a vernacular or the Koran. The private mill schools, already mentioned under paragraph 47, fall under this head.

56. Primary schools for girls.—These increased from 1,057 to 1,093, and the pupils from 77,258 to 81,351. But among these were 2,168 boys; if we deduct these, the number of girls in girls' schools was 79,183. There were also 45,497 girls in boys' schools; so that the total number of girls under instruction in primary schools was 124,680. The correct figure for the preceding year was 119,999, so that there was an increase of 4,681 girls. Government schools remained seven in number; Local Board schools increased by 15, Municipal by 16, aided by 4, and unaided by 1.

57. The practising school attached to the training college for women at Poona showed excellent results; a revised curriculum was introduced experimentally, the main features of which were the inclusion of stories from Ramayana and Mahabharata, and the addition of composition in the lower standards. In the Central Urdu Girls' school, also at Poona, the number of pupils increased from 73 to 91; but this being a *purdah* institution, no one really knows what takes place in it. In the practising school at Hyderabad the English class has been discontinued as the staff is inadequate even for the Sindhi work.

58. In the central division the experiment was tried of paying small scholarships to girls in order to induce them to stay longer at school, and the results were sufficiently promising to lead Government to continue the experiment. In the Poona district seven girls passed the Vernacular Final examination, and in Nasik one. The Marathi girls' school at Yeola, staffed with only one exception by women, is highly praised for its efficiency. Mr. Miller cries for women for the training college, women for the work of inspection, ladies' committees for the general encouragement of girls' education; but he does not say where they are all to come from. Miss Corkery picks out the children of the municipal Gujarati school at Jambusar as the cleanest and tidiest she saw in Gujarat. Miss Brooke suggests more attention to the planting of shady trees in the compounds of municipal schools in Sind, so that *purdah* women and girls from the neighbouring houses might take the air in seclusion and safety.

59. Examination results in primary schools.—The total number of primary schools decreased from 10,986 to 10,890; and that of pupils from 671,986 to 670,141. The number of pupils in the upper primary stage (*i.e.*, standards III—VII) increased from 100,552 to 108,494; the girls amongst them increased from 8,531 to 9,730. In the lower primary stage the number reading printed books increased from 322,659 to 372,224; the girls amongst them increased from 50,365 to 63,600. The number not reading printed books decreased from 248,775 to 189,423; the girls amongst them from 61,103 to 51,350. These changes in the lower primary stage were partly due to a change of classification intended to bring the practice of all the divisions into line. The number of pupils presented in the higher standards was as follows:—In standard V 19,614, of whom 11,849 passed; in standard VI 9,997, of whom 5,652 passed; and in standard VII 4,298, of whom 2,352 passed. The passes show an increase of 1,425 in the 5th standard, of 383 in the 6th, and of 371 in the 7th.

60. General.—No less than 101 conferences of teachers were held in the Poona, Satara, Nasik, and Khandesh districts in order to make the rural standards better understood, as well as to improve the teaching of certain subjects. In addition 23 weekly meetings were held by Mr. Ghanekar at Satara during the rains. In the Kanarese districts 19 conferences were held, besides 11 in Ratnagiri and Kolaba. They dealt with physical education, means of securing the co-operation of the parents, etc.; model lessons were given, papers were read and discussed, and a considerable amount of interest and enthusiasm was aroused. The public were invited to attend, and Revenue officers also attended. In the matter of type designs for buildings, open-air schools, or schools for tuberculous children no particular progress has been made. Some co-operative credit societies have been started; and excursions have been undertaken to places of interest.

IV.—EDUCATION OF SPECIAL CLASSES.

61. **Gira'sia and Ta'lukda'ri schools.**—The number of Talukdári pupils was as usual highest in the Ahmedabad district, which returned 1,072 pupils, 771 being boys and 301 girls. The figure for the preceding year was 1,149; the decrease is attributed to the prevalence of famine conditions. In Kaira, Panch Maháls, and Broach the number increased from 123 to 159. The special schools for the sons of well-to-do Talukdárs, established at Godhra, Wadhwan, and Sádra, are reported to be doing well; as also the hostels at Dhanduka and Nadiad.

62. **Mahomedans.**—In British districts the total number of Mahomedan pupils under instruction increased from 150,638 (including 30,147 girls) to 152,523 (including 31,434 girls). Those under public instruction increased from 124,752 (including 22,271 girls) to 125,768 (including 23,283 girls). There were 161 (including 1 girl) in arts, and 53 in professional colleges; 4,830 (including 107 girls) in secondary schools; 119,835 (including 23,115 girls) in primary schools; 279 (including 48 girls) in training institutions; and 610 (including 12 girls) in special schools. This shows a slight increase in colleges and training institutions, and an increase of about 900 in primary schools; but a decrease of 132 in secondary schools. This was probably due to the general causes affecting the returns from secondary schools, already mentioned. The proportion of Mahomedan pupils to the total number of pupils in secondary schools was 8.25 per cent., the proportion in the high stage being 6.12 per cent., and that in the middle stage 9.67. I notice that 96 passed the matriculation, 31 the Intermediate, 20 the B.A., 2 the B.Sc., and 1 the M.A.; 3 passed examinations in engineering, and 2 in law. The School Final examination was passed by 25; and the Vernacular Final by 512, of whom in the Presidency proper 134 out of 357 passed in the vernacular of the division, and 127 out of 276 through the medium of Urdu.

63. The question of instruction through the medium of Urdu continues to be the chief topic of interest under this head. In Urdu in the central division. the central division the number of Urdu schools for boys increased from 220 to 224, and the number of Urdu classes attached to Maráthi schools from 37 to 45. The number of pupils attending institutions of both kinds rose from 17,760 to 18,087, showing an increase of 327; but if we take account of the 33 schools closed for plague, the total increase comes to 2,243 pupils. The teaching staff was strengthened by the employment of 26 more trained teachers; but over 50 per cent. of the teachers are still wholly unqualified. Their difficulties as regards Urdu textbooks, maps, etc., are gradually disappearing; and in a year or two many of the trained teachers and some of the untrained ones will be able to do justice to the new standards. But apprehensions are entertained by many members of the Mahomedan community as to the practical effect of the new course on their interests. The remedy suggested is that Maráthi should be made a compulsory subject, and that mathematics also should be taught through that language. Again, in the smaller places, where the number of Mahomedan boys is not enough to justify the opening of a full primary school, the introduction of these standards cuts them off from all possibility of completing the primary course by joining a Maráthi school. But it is the Urdu classes attached to Maráthi schools which have been most adversely affected, most of them being in charge of incompetent and unqualified men who cannot reasonably be expected to teach the new course. These difficulties were of course pointed out in advance to the Mahomedan leaders and their Conferences, but their demand for Urdu standards was not shaken thereby. In the course of his tour Shaikh Bakarali, the special Deputy for the Urdu schools of this division, gave 30 addresses on various subjects, mostly after 10 p. m. when the Mahomedans had finished their evening prayers. East Khándesh takes precedence of all other districts in the matter of Urdu education; many of the teachers have mastered the technical terms in Urdu, and are exerting themselves to teach through that medium, but they are severely handicapped by want of books. Sádra as usual brings up the rear; the new standards have been introduced, but the majority of the teachers can hardly put two sentences together in good Urdu. The Bombay municipal schools

teach a syllabus of their own, with Gujarāti as a compulsory subject, and Koran as the first lesson in the morning; only one teaches the full course.

64. The inspectress of Urdu girls' schools in the central division reports an addition of 10 schools (two of which were formerly classes). The number of girls in boys' schools fell from 2,973 to 2,633; but the total of Mahomedan girls receiving instruction in primary schools increased from 6,996 to 7,271. The inspectress states that the Mahomedan population in Local Board areas in this division is 24,811; the number of Local Board schools and classes for girls is 20, and the number of pupils in them 922. On the other hand the total Mahomedan population in Municipal areas (exclusive of Bombay) is 120,027; the number of Urdu girls' schools in such areas is 29, and the number of pupils 1,832. Thus in Local Board areas there is one school per 1,240 of Mahomedans, but in Municipal areas per 4,139; and the proportion of girls under instruction in Local Board areas is 36 per 1,000, whilst in Municipal areas it is only 15 per 1,000. The inspectress however speaks warmly in favour of the Bombay Schools Committee, which has opened a normal class for women.

65. In the southern division the number of Urdu schools and classes increased from 280 (wrongly given last year as 276) to 285, of which 27 were intended for girls. The number of pupils rose from 15,192 to 15,418 and would have been more but for the disturbance caused by plague. The number of trained teachers increased by 16, but nearly 60 per cent. of the total number of teachers are still unqualified. Mr. Bangi, the special Deputy, remarks that greater familiarity has taken the edge off the new standards in some towns, but they have not yet made themselves agreeable to the majority of Musulmans; in particular those of the two Konkan districts are strongly opposed to them, owing to their unsuitability to local conditions and the uselessness of Urdu in practical life.

66. In the northern division there is as yet no special Deputy who can give a general view of the position of Urdu schools as a whole. The Educational Inspector reports that the new standards are undoubtedly unpopular with the large majority of the people. The teachers themselves are obliged first to explain in Gujarāti a lesson in arithmetic or science or geography, and afterwards to go over it again in Urdu with the assistance of dictionaries and books of reference. The Inspector suggests that Taluka and Municipal Boards should be permitted to choose either the old or the new standards according to their needs.

67. As regards the complaint that children are diverted from public primary schools to mosque schools to the detriment of their education, the Inspector throws the responsibility mainly upon the ignorance or indifference of the parents as to what is best for their children. At the same time it is reported from Thāna that the number of mosque schools in that district has been much reduced by arrangements being made to teach Koran reading in most of the Local Board, Municipal, and aided Urdu schools; and there seems no reason why a similar policy should not be followed in other districts also.

68. In Sind the results of attaching mullas to a few Local Board schools in each district were fairly promising, and Government sanctioned the continuance of the experiment in not more than ten schools of each district, exclusive of Hyderabad and Thar and Parkar. In July 1915 Government appointed a special committee, presided over by the Educational Inspector, to consider generally the question of Mahomedan education in Sind; and the report of this committee has since been received. In Local Board schools the number of Mahomedan boys increased by only 2 per cent., but that of girls by 60 per cent.; the percentage of Mahomedan masters was 44. Greater strictness was exercised in the registration of mulla schools, and these are now returned as 493 for boys and 78 for girls; the pupils were 10,889 boys and 4,328 girls; and the total expenditure was Rs. 1,03,121, of which Rs. 28,394 came from Provincial Funds. After two years' trial the post of special Deputy for mulla schools was made permanent, and a saving was utilized to provide him with a third assistant so that he might include the

Hyderabad district as well as Nawabshah in the sphere of his operations. Mr. Abdul Hak, the Deputy in question, has submitted an interesting report from which it appears that the number of schools with over 40 pupils has increased from 2 a couple of years ago to 25, and now the somewhat difficult problem arises of supplying the mullas with assistants. The "Mulla Code" has been revised, and competent mullas have been allowed to teach even beyond the 4th standard. Out of 129 mullas 67 have attended a special training class, and 5 have passed the Vernacular Final examination. Thirteen one-day conferences were held, which proved very useful; lantern lectures were also given. A simple timetable has been supplied to all schools, and 63 mullas now send in monthly returns of attendance; some keep inward and outward registers, and even apply for leave of absence.

69. It may have been gathered from some of the foregoing paragraphs that the most urgent requirement is the provision and training of a better class of teachers for Mahomedan schools.

The Poona training college for men sent out 33 certificated Mahomedans, of whom 13 passed with Urdu as their second language: 22 competed for entrance and 18 were admitted. The Dhulia training school sent out 13 men, but all had taken Persian as their second language; 29 appeared for the entrance examination, but only 12 were admitted. At Dhárwar 9 men secured third-year certificates, and some more must have been sent out with first or second year ones; 33 appeared for the entrance examination, of whom 10 were admitted here, and 4 were sent to the Urdu training class at Ahmedabad, an institution which does not commend itself much to them, partly because of its distance, and partly because it qualifies only for a first-year certificate. Proposals were made for bringing this class to Poona, and giving it a two years' course, but they were negatived on account of financial difficulties; at the end of the year there were 37 pupils in it at Ahmedabad, of whom 23 came from the northern division, 5 from Bombay City, 5 from the southern division, and 4 from the central.

70. **Aboriginal and Hill Tribes.**—The total number of pupils increased from 21,833 to 21,944; 33 of them passed the Vernacular Final examination. The number of special schools or classes maintained for these people was 20 in Poona, 19 in West Khándesh, 8 in Koliba, 3 in Dhárwar, 9 in Belgaum, 4 in Bijapur, and 18 in the northern division, making 91 in all. In addition there are special boarding-houses for Kolis at Ghoda and Ambegaon in Poona, and Peint in Násik; for Bhils at Nandurbár and Kukurmunda in Khándesh; and for Kátkaris at Neral in Kolába. At the Vernacular Final examination the Káli-paraj school at Godsamba passed 9 out of 9; the Bhil school at Dehad 5 out of 7; the Koli and Bhil school at Diva 8 out of 11; and the training school at Mokhada in Thána 8 out of 12. In Bombay city the number of pupils was 39, mostly the children of fishermen; six of them were girls. In Sind there is a school for Hurs (a criminal tribe) at Sanghar, with 18 pupils.

71. **Depressed classes.**—The number of pupils declined from 28,681 to 28,493; presumably part of this was due, as in other cases already mentioned, to plague or scarcity, but it seems that a certain amount of it must be put down to the circumstance that some of them are now classed as Indian Christians. Information was called for this time as to the number of special schools or classes maintained for these people, and it is learnt that there are 576 such, of which 213 are local board, 84 are municipal, and 279 are under private management. The number of pupils in these was 15,126; the number in ordinary institutions was 13,367. Of the total number 2 were in colleges, 278 in secondary schools, 27,887 in primary schools, 27 in training institutions, and 299 in other schools. The number who appeared for the Vernacular Final was 49, but only 19 passed. A girl belonging to this class passed the entrance examination of the Mahalaxmi training college for women at Ahmedabad, and is now attending it. Owing to the change in the academic year no middle school scholarship examination was held, and hence no special scholarships for the depressed classes were awarded; a former scholar in Kolába, who had reached the third standard, found the English course too much for him, and was advised to complete the vernacular course instead.

V.—SPECIAL INSTRUCTION.

72. The number of institutions for special instruction increased from 119 to 154, and the number of pupils from 6,837 to 10,127. The rise in the number of schools is mainly due to an increase of 16 in drawing classes, of 4 in commercial classes, and of 14 in "other special schools," to which head have been transferred a number of Sanskrit and other schools formerly classed elsewhere.

73. **The training of secondary teachers.**—At the Secondary Training College 9 students were awarded a first class diploma, and 23 one of the second class. There were six qualified applicants from aided institutions, of whom five were admitted. Mr. Fraser notes that during his tenure of office no school in the City of Bombay has ever sent a teacher to be trained, nor have any Bombay teachers ever availed themselves of the opportunity of attending lessons at the College; and yet within ten minutes' walk there are at least 4,500 boys in secondary schools (exclusive of the two Government schools), and their teachers must number at least a hundred. The courses of lectures for outsiders were discontinued as the response to them in preceding years had been so small. The students gave three lantern demonstrations at the Lady Hardinge War Hospital for the benefit of the wounded. A number of headmasters of Government schools and Deputy Educational Inspectors were again deputed to the college for a month at a time to observe its methods, and one period was specially set apart in each week for an exchange of views; Mr. Fraser's impression was that the headmasters were too preoccupied with questions of discipline and organisation to have time or energy to spare for questions of method, and that the improvement of method must be the work of the younger generation. The college has now completed ten years of existence, during which time it has trained 316 teachers; eighteen of these came from aided schools, fifteen from Native States, and five were ladies.

74. The probability of the College being extended continues to be somewhat remote, and the experimental training class in Poona was continued under Mr. Acharya and Mr. Sane on the same lines as before. The number of schools taking advantage of it increased from four to six. Thirteen teachers were under training, of whom eight are said to have completed the course. The instructors are not satisfied with the qualifications of the men placed under them for training, and point out that in some of the schools no prospects of promotion are held out to encourage teachers to undergo training.

75. Revised rules for the Secondary Teachers' Certificate examination were published in January, and were intended to secure more attention to the practical work of preparation. A candidate is now required to have given under the supervision of the head of the institution 15 lessons, notes of which must be submitted at the time of the practical examination.

76. **The training of vernacular teachers.**—The Poona training college had 287 students, of whom 11 belonged to the depressed classes, and one to an aboriginal tribe; the Dhulia training school 170. At the certificate examinations (which include outsiders) 305 passed in the first year, 222 in the second, and 85 in the third. The Ahmedabad college had 294 students, of whom 56 were Mahomedans; at the certificate examinations 189 passed in the first year, 88 in the second, and 42 in the third. The Dhārwar college had 310 students, of whom 38 were Mahomedans, and 3 of depressed classes; at the certificate examinations 134 passed in the first year, 161 in the second, and 40 in the third. The Hyderabad college had 149 students. The annual examination here was shifted from December to May, so none was actually held during the year under report; but at the examination held immediately afterwards 81 passed in the first year, 46 in the second, and 18 in the third. As regards the entrance examinations, 119 out of 426 were admitted at Poona, 85 out of 237 at Dhulia, 110 out of 804 at Ahmedabad, and 153 out of 505 at Dhārwar;

at Hyderabad there is no entrance examination. Of Mahomedans 53 were admitted out of 127, and of the depressed classes 7 out of 12; in both cases it seems that grace marks had to be given freely. The Poona students were persuaded to remove with their own hands twelve cartloads of rubbish from a bit of vacant land, which was then utilized as a playground. At Dhárwár Mr. Ramabrahma, a nature-study expert from Mysore, was added to the staff. Elsewhere the year seems to have been uneventful.

77. The Poona training college for women had 102 students, of whom four were Mahomedans; at the certificate examinations (which include outsiders) 47 passed in the first year, 59 in the second, and 14 in the third. Government training colleges for women. The Mahaláxmi college at Ahmedabad had 148 students, of whom twelve were Mahomedans; at the certificate examinations 49 passed in the first year, 58 in the second, and 22 in the third. At Dhárwár there were 76 students, of whom two were Mahomedans and one was a Dhed; at the certificate examinations 10 passed in the first year, 13 in the second, and 6 in the third. The Hyderabad college had 43 students; 22 passed in the first year, 19 in the second, and 7 in the third. As regards the entrance examinations, 23 out of 26 were admitted at Poona, 45 out of 91 at Ahmedabad, and 41 out of 45 at Dhárwár. Want of accommodation led to a reduction of numbers at Poona in both the training college and the practising school; but the institution was active. Monthly meetings are held which are attended by municipal teachers and students from other normal schools, and a publication is issued which has over 500 subscribers. In aid of various funds connected with the war a fancy bazaar was organized in September 1915, which realized Rs. 4,050; and entertainments given by the practising school realized about Rs. 120. At Ahmedabad there was an increase in numbers due to an increase in municipal scholars. The Dhárwár college undertook an excursion to the Gersappa Falls, which gave Miss McAfee an opportunity of visiting some of the girls' schools in Kánara and of giving the mistresses some hints. A gathering of women teachers was held which was attended by 152 from all the four Kánarese districts. The Saturday afternoon class for women teachers continued to be carried on; it is regrettable that the Hubli municipality refused to pay the railway fares of their teachers, who were thus obliged to discontinue their attendance, and to cut themselves off from all hope of improvement. A quarterly magazine was started in October, which already has 560 subscribers. Miss McAfee also conducted a weekly class for instructing the teachers in Dhárwár in needlework and cutting out; and helped with the afternoon class for teaching English to married ladies, the number in which has increased from 7 to 29.

78. The local normal classes—seven in the central division and six in the northern—intended to give untrained teachers, at a minimum of expense, some knowledge of method and management, continued their work, the utility of which is not questioned. The corresponding continuation classes in the southern division were also renewed, except in Kánara; in this district and in Kolaba the stipends offered are not taken advantage of fully. The special class in the Hyderabad training college was closed as a measure of economy. Local normal classes.

79. The Union Training School at Ahmednagar had 63 students, and passed 11 out of 20 presented for examination. The Other training institutions. United Free Church Mission at Poona, St. Monica's at Ahmednagar, the Zenana Mission at Manmád, the Seva Sadan at Poona, and the Seva Sadan at Bombay (newly recognized), all prepared candidates for the certificate examinations of the Poona training college for women. The Irish Presbyterian Mission training college for men at Ahmedabad was closed for want of funds; but the aided normal classes for women at Ahmedabad and at Godhra continued to do satisfactory work. At Karáchi there are a Church of England Zenana Mission training class, which received its first grant in the year under report; and a municipal normal class, the standard of which is rather lower. The Bombay municipality has also opened a normal class for women, which meets in the evening and is chiefly attended by untrained teachers afraid of being displaced by trained women.

80. The total number of primary teachers increased from 20,521 to 21,033; that of men from 19,332 to 19,763, and that of women from 1,189 to 1,270. Women were therefore 6 per cent. of the whole. The percentage of trained men rose from 36.6 to 38.5, and that of trained women from 51 to 55. I notice that amongst the women untrained assistants who have passed a qualifying examination decreased from 91 to 39, apparently owing to some change of classification in the northern division, which last year returned 69 under this head, and this year only one. The fact is that the "qualifying examination" prescribed for men, namely the Vernacular Final, is scarcely applicable to women, who hardly ever appear for it; and there is some doubt as to what should be considered the "qualification" in their case.

81. The average pay of teachers showed a general decline which is presumably connected in some way with the fact that no grants for the improvement of pay could be given during the year. Whereas no assistant should get less than Rs. 9, the Educational Inspector of the southern division has shown Rs. 8 as the average pay of an untrained and unqualified assistant, and has thus brought down the average for the Presidency to Rs. 8-13-10. Perhaps the employment of "pupil-teachers" on low pay is responsible for this, but the anomaly should have been noticed and explained.

82. **Sir J. J. School of Art, Bombay.**—The number of pupils declined from 370 to 358, of whom 94 were in the Elementary Drawing School, 100 in the Painting classes, 27 in the Modelling classes, 25 in the Drawing teachers' class, 11 in the Special Shading class, and 101 in the Draughtsman classes. The special examination for students of this School was discontinued in consequence of the establishment of the Government Art Examinations open to all Art students; the tests applied were of a higher standard than those required in the former School examination, but 135 passed out of 207. In the Reay Art Workshops the number of students increased from 165 to 175. The Pottery Department had five students; the saving effected here in the fuel consumption by the alterations made in the preceding year in the big biscuit oven exceeded expectation, and the fire-bricks burnt in the oven were acknowledged by competent authorities to be superior to those of foreign manufacture. Fifteen persons interested in the manufacture of pottery called at the laboratory for advice.

83. **Drawing and Fine Art.**—The number of drawing classes increased from 221 to 237, but the number of pupils declined from 43,661 to 42,788. The former Schedule I of the Grant-in-aid Code was replaced in July 1915 by a revised and elaborated schedule, or "scheme for the encouragement of Art," comprising:—

1. Rules for the encouragement of Drawing in schools.
2. Rules for the encouragement of Drawing and Painting, Design, Modelling, and Architecture.
3. Rules for the encouragement of Applied Art.
4. Rules for the Training and Examination of Teachers of Drawing and Art.

The old first-grade examination in Drawing was abolished; the place of the second and third-grade examinations was taken by the new Elementary and Intermediate Grade examinations. The opportunity was taken to reduce the number of centres from 103 to 60 within the Bombay Presidency, and from 95 to 44 outside it. It was natural to expect a reduction in the number of candidates in consequence. In the case of the Elementary examination, however, there was an increase of 363 in the number of candidates in the Bombay Presidency; many who would in the ordinary course have appeared for the first-grade examination attempted the higher examination instead, and this no doubt tended to bring down the percentage of passes. For both the examinations there was a considerable falling off in the number of candidates from outside the Presidency. On the whole 1,392 candidates out of 3,495 passed the Elementary test, or 40 per cent.; and 759 out of 1,441 the Intermediate, or 52 per cent.

84. Examinations comprising three grades in Drawing and Painting, and in Architecture, and one grade in Modelling, together with the Drawing Teachers', Drawing Masters', and Art Masters' examinations were held for the first time according to the new Schedule, all being conducted at the School of Art itself. In Drawing and Painting 23 passed out of 38; in Modelling 2 out of 3; and in Architecture 47 out of 85. Seventeen out of 27 qualified as Drawing Teachers, 5 out of 8 as Drawing Masters, and 5 out of 10 as Art Masters.

85. The experience of the past year has shown Mr. Hoggarth that the work in connection with the examinations takes up by far the greater part of his time, and that in consequence the work of inspecting and reporting on the teaching of drawing in schools has to take a minor place. This is of course regrettable, as the teaching of drawing in schools is in need of constant attention. Even in Bombay itself only 10 out of 70 aided schools could be visited, and that chiefly for examination purposes; this was due partly to want of time, and partly to the refusal of a conveyance allowance such as is granted to every other inspecting officer working in that city. With a view to bringing before the drawing teachers the type of instruction required, four meetings were held, which were attended by 66 teachers at Bombay, 12 at Karachi, 12 at Shikarpur, and 17 at Hyderabad. Drawing, like science, requires a teacher who possesses some organizing ability and who is a disciplinarian; in these two qualities the average drawing teacher at present appears to be lacking. Some seem almost incapable of making any individual effort, and will reply that they do not teach drawing from natural leaves because they have none, when hundreds of leaves can be seen from the window of the room. In some cases the equipment is distinctly good, but it is stored away in cupboards where it cannot even be seen, and there seems no attempt to use it. The admirable plates of the "Journal of Indian Art," even when supplied to the school, are not utilized. In Sind however the question of the pupils' equipment has been tackled with some success, and the Mission High School of Karachi is mentioned as being particularly efficient in this respect; the discipline of the boys on entering and leaving, the organisation and distribution of the materials, and the arrangements for storing the drawing books are alike commendable. Yet even in Sind two large and pretentious schools have recently been built in neither of which is there a room suitable for the drawing lessons; and these are not the only cases in which the principle of erecting the building first, and endeavouring to adapt it to requirements afterwards, seems to have been followed. To return to the subject of the teachers, there are 259 in Government and aided secondary schools in the British districts of this Presidency; of these 15 have passed through the normal school of the School of Art, 125 have obtained the drawing teacher's certificate without attending the normal school, 96 have the old third-grade certificate, 7 have the old second-grade certificate, 7 have the old first-grade certificate, 5 have non-Indian qualifications, and 4 have no qualification at all, that assigned for one of them being that "he once appeared for the first-grade examination." The progress of drawing in the schools is undoubtedly suffering for this lack of properly trained teachers, as also for the lack of proper supervision and guidance to keep them from lapsing into a mechanical groove; but with over 250 secondary schools on the list it is impossible for one officer to give the necessary attention to them, even if he had not the examinations to conduct as well. The attitude of headmasters, too, is not always sympathetic; and in one school it was found to be the practice to discontinue the drawing lessons as soon as the annual inspection by the Educational Inspector was over, though probably the Inspector himself was kept in ignorance of this fact.

86. In June 1915 a School of Drawing and Design was opened at Ahmedabad. Its classes are being conducted under some difficulties in the hall of the Government high school. Although some good work is being done, there has been too much of an attempt to obtain showy results by short cuts; and any one who visits the gallery will perceive the inadvisability of putting a drawing teacher in charge and leaving him to his own resources.

87. **Sloyd.**—Owing to the financial situation Government found it necessary to restrict the programme drawn up for the introduction of Sloyd teaching; and at the conclusion of the training of the first batch of teachers the arrangement by which the services of Mr. S. Srinivas Ráo were borrowed from the Mysore Darbár was terminated. Of the twenty teachers deputed for training one gave up the course, fifteen qualified in both wood and paper work, and four in paper work only. The teachers were posted to the Dhárwár, Ahmedabad and Hyderabad training colleges, and to the Dhárwár, Belgaum, Sholápur, Bijápur, Dhulár and Sátara high schools; and work in paper has been introduced. Facilities for work in wood exist at present only at Dhárwár, Belgaum and Hyderabad; the training of the other teachers has been thrown away. The amount spent in the course of the year on alterations to buildings and on equipment came to Rs. 37,716.

88. **Technical and Industrial education.**—At the entrance examination of the Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute in June 1915, 125 candidates presented themselves, and 114 were admitted. The total was thus brought up again to 336, including students from all parts of India. The session terminated in February 1916, when 62 certificates were awarded in addition to 38 previously awarded for the Motor Mechanics class, which was closed in 1915. In the Textile department some very advanced work in weaving is now carried out; but for the handloom weaving class it is difficult to get the sons of genuine weavers to hold the scholarships offered.

89. The vacancy caused in the Committee of Direction by the death of Sir Pherozezshah Mehta was filled by the appointment of Mr. D. E. Wacha to represent the Trustees of the Victoria Jubilee Institute. The Committee had undertaken the control of 18 schools, but of these the Baramati Industrial School was removed from the list as it did not appear to be doing any useful work at all. For the inspection of these schools the services of the staff of the Victoria Jubilee Institute continued to be utilized. The examinations were conducted under the rules framed in the preceding year, and under the direct supervision of the examiners who also carried out the inspection or examination of five schools not under the control of the Committee. The grants recommended for payment during the year aggregated Rs. 47,926; proposals were made for revising the principles on which such grants are calculated. Inspection charges amounted to Rs. 7,739; examination charges to Rs. 6,644; and establishment and other charges to Rs. 2,781.

90. The number of schools or classes registered under this head decreased from 57 to 53, and the number of pupils from 4,347 to 3,767; the independent institutions were 25 in number, with 1,838 pupils, and the rest were classes attached to other institutions. The number of schools examined on behalf of the Committee of Direction was 19. In six cases all the candidates examined were successful; these were the schools at Dhulia and Jacobabad, the Mission schools at Borsad and Nadiad, the Mahajan Home at Surat, and the Depressed Classes Mission Industrial Class at Parel. Five schools passed from 90 to 98 per cent. of their candidates; three passed from 80 to 87 per cent.; two passed 76 and 77 per cent., respectively; two passed 67 and 69 per cent., respectively, and the rest were brought up by the Ratnágiri School of Industry, which passed only 56 per cent.

91. In connection with the conversion of the Victoria Jubilee Institute into a central technological institute round which the lesser institutions should be grouped, it was proposed by Government to institute scholarships for the pick of the mofussil students, tenable at the Institute. For the present one scholarship for mechanical engineering and one for textile work have been allotted to the Ranchhodlál Chhotalál Institute of Ahmedabad, and one for mechanical engineering to the Parekh Institute of Surat; the scholarships are of the value of Rs. 30 per mensem, and are tenable for three years, and the holders will be admitted to the second year's course of the central Institute.

92. In Sind the Church of England Zenana Mission maintains an industrial school for women at Karachi and another at Sukkur; and the Hindu Reform Association maintains one at Hyderabad. These three are aided; there are two others which at present are only recognized. The Karachi school, which is intended for widows, had 19 on the roll. Some of the younger and more intelligent women have proved fit for being trained as teachers; the rest devote themselves to embroidery, and there is a marked improvement in their appearance and manners. The Sukkur school is mostly attended by poor Mahomedan women, widows or deserted by their husbands; there were 23 on the roll, but so far none have shown sufficient capacity to be trained as teachers. The Hyderabad school had 4 students only, but useful work is being done in the making of shirts and children's frocks and caps.

93. The sum sanctioned by Government for encouraging cooking competitions in Sind was held up on account of the financial situation, but a private donor gave Rs. 20 at Tatta for a competition in which seven girls took part. The Jacobabad municipality also gave Rs. 20 in prizes, for which eleven girls competed; the mothers were invited to attend the distribution, and most of them did so. Eleven girls competed for Rs. 25 allotted for this purpose at the Kundanmal Girls' School at Hyderabad. In all these cases the quality and cleanliness of the work are praised.

94. **Reformatory schools.**—At the David Sassoon Institution the number of boys declined from 211 to 190, of whom 130 attended the Kohinur Mills; the general work and management of the institution are reported on favourably. Eleven boys escaped during the year, of whom five were recaptured. Out of 200 boys discharged during the last four years 5 have been reconvicted, and 131 are known to be engaged in honest occupations; 43 are pursuing those learnt in the school. In the course of the year the Committee proposed that Government should bear the entire cost of the institution, whilst the Committee retained the entire control of it; Government did not see any reason for altering the existing status of the institution, but undertook to make good any reasonable deficit in its budget, provided that the Committee did not incur any new expenditure without previous sanction.

95. At Yeravda the year 1915 opened with 131 boys and closed with 116, of whom four were serving out on license. About half a dozen more are entrusted with outdoor work, and gave no trouble. Eleven boys escaped during the year, but were all recaptured. Of 146 boys discharged during the last three years four have been reconvicted, and 79 are known to be engaged in honest occupations; 32 are pursuing those learnt in the school.

96. **Commercial education.**—The Sydenham College has been dealt with separately. The number of recognized schools or classes was 40, and the number of pupils 1,552. It has been laid down that none but recognized classes should be allowed to send up candidates for the London Chamber of Commerce examinations. These were held as usual in 1915. The number of entries for the senior certificate fell from 692 to 625, of whom 258 passed; the number of entries for the junior certificate fell from 129 to 99, of whom 30 passed. The results were decidedly better than in the previous year, owing probably to greater discrimination in the sending up of candidates.

97. **Schools for defectives.**—The number of schools remained five, but the pupils increased from 149 to 169, of whom 39 were girls. A boy from the American Mission School for the Blind secured a prize of Rs. 15 in a musical contest open to all schools in Bombay, in which 150 competitors took part. In the Victoria Memorial school a boy was able to read English by the Braille system about as quickly as a fourth standard boy can in an ordinary school.

98. **Other special schools.**—As already stated a number of Sanskrit and other schools have this year been transferred to this head from the head "Primary Schools." In all there were 39 schools, with 3,600 pupils, the subjects taught

being either Sanskrit, or Persian and Arabic, or music. This seems the most convenient place for introducing the additional tables called for by the Government of India in their letter accompanying Government Order No. 1239, dated the 11th May 1916. I understand this to be what was required, though the tables do not appear to be of much general interest, and the figures relating to "private institutions" cannot be depended on.

VI.—ADMINISTRATION AND MISCELLANEOUS.

99. **Administration.**—Mr. A. L. Covernton proceeded on leave in April 1915, and was succeeded as Deputy Director by Mr. F. B. P. Lory, to whom along with Messrs. K. G. Joshi and K. S. Vakil, and many patient and industrious clerks and typists in my office, I have to express my acknowledgments for all the assistance they have afforded me. Mr. G. B. Brahmé, who was acting as Assistant to the Director, died in February 1916. Ráo Bahádur G. N. Khare was acting as Educational Inspector in the central division throughout the year, and retired at the end of it, when Mr. F. W. Marrs returned from leave most of which he had spent in the British army. In the northern division Ráo Bahádur J. G. Shastri was Educational Inspector throughout the year, and retired at the end of it. Mr. A. C. Miller acted as Educational Inspector in the southern division, where the Dhárwár Deputy, Mr. K. B. Bendigiri died in August 1915. Mr. Hesketh continued to be Educational Inspector in Sind. The posts of Deputy Educational Inspector for Mulla schools in Sind, and of Inspectress of Urdu girls' schools in the central division were made permanent.

100. There were of course many minor changes in the inspecting staff due to leave vacancies and transfers. Mr. Miller writes of his subordinates that they had done very creditable work throughout the year.

"The work is extremely heavy, and is getting heavier every year. They are expected not only to inspect schools but to pay surprise visits, to interest villagers in education, to address the public on the subject of the war, and to give magic lantern exhibitions. Some of the districts are short of inspecting officers, in some travelling is extremely difficult, in some malaria prevails, and the lot of inspectors is unenviable in most ways; yet they do their work, and many do it extremely well. An effort is now being made to make reports on schools more constructive, and I think this may help masters to improve their schools."

The annual returns show that in addition to the regular inspection special or surprise visits were paid to a number of schools in every district except Ahmednagar, where (owing perhaps to the number of schools to be inspected) no additional visits appear to have been paid at all. It is an unfortunate result of the present financial situation that an increase of the inspecting staff which is overdue in some districts cannot be given.

101. A conference of the Educational Inspectors, Inspectresses, and others was held in my office in September 1915. Except in some of the districts of the northern division conferences of teachers are now freely held by the inspecting officers; for the guidance of these in their term conferences were held at headquarters, and instructions have in some cases been issued.

102. **Accountancy Diploma Board.**—This body, which was referred to in paragraph 19 of the last report, submitted in September 1915 a scheme for the award of a Government Diploma in Accountancy on the basis of which auditors' certificates may be issued.

103. **Departmental examinations.**—The number of candidates at the Vernacular Final examination increased from 7,834 to 8,176; but the number of passes declined slightly from 3,560 to 3,515, the percentage being not quite 43. I notice that the percentage was 59 in Sind, 49 in the northern division, and 36 in the other two divisions. The number examined included 19 girls, of whom 14 passed. Revised rules for this examination were published in June 1915. At the supplementary School Final examination held in March 1915, there were 605 candidates from British districts, of whom 123 passed; at the regular examination of March 1916 there were 1,221 candidates, of whom 459 passed (37 per cent.). For the Secondary Teacher's Certificate 81 were examined, and 57 passed.

104. **Cambridge Senior Local Examination.**—This examination has been regularly held for the benefit of pupils from European schools, but in 1914 an agitation was started for the purpose of getting it thrown open to Indians not attending such schools. With the concurrence of the Cambridge Syndicate it

was decided to open a new centre for such candidates in Bombay from December 1915. From the number of previous applications it was estimated that there might be 50 candidates. The Cambridge Syndicate intimated their willingness to hold the examination if there were 15 candidates paying £1 each; in the end it was held although only 12 candidates were registered. Of these only eight appeared, and only one passed. The examination is of course far better suited to the course followed in European schools than to our Anglo-Vernacular curriculum.

105. Physical education.—The two aided gymnasia in Bombay were attended by 143 and 32 pupils respectively, 52 per cent. of these being Parsis. A fairly good use seems to have been made of the new gymnastic apparatus supplied to schools; football has made its appearance in West Khândesh, and at Ahmednagar Mrs. Mead has introduced two games for girls. Skipping and games of ball are popular amongst girls in Sind. Slightly more attention is being paid to personal cleanliness amongst the pupils. Mr. Miller remarks that except in a few schools the idea of drill is entirely misunderstood, and that as at present performed the exercise is without value except that it takes the boys into the open air for a short time.

106. Moral education.—A meeting of the consultative committee was held in Poona in September 1915, when 20 members were present. Papers were read by Dr. J. J. Modi and Shri Mahabhogwat, and a model lesson was given to a class from the Poona high school by Mr. Deshpande, the headmaster of the Dhârwar high school. The Gujarâti version of the first volume of Mr. Enthoven's extracts was published in the course of the year. In most of the Government secondary schools moral lessons are given at stated periods during the week, and so also in the vernacular training institutions. As regards the primary schools the only systematic steps appear to be taken in the central division, where inspecting officers endeavour to guide teachers in the matter, and themselves give model lessons. In Gujarât they "continued to impress upon the teachers the necessity of utilising the various subjects of the curriculum as a vehicle of teaching the broad principles of morality and social rectitude," and in the southern division the teachers were "instructed to give moral instruction to the boys by personal example." The number of school co-operative societies continues to increase.

107. Visual instruction.—The stereoscopic pictures are freely used, but will be more valuable when the vernacular explanations (about the production of which by the publishing firm there has been great delay) are available. At times a school-master's wife has been seen exhibiting and explaining the pictures to her friends, which is a somewhat unexpected development. The lanterns distributed to the inspecting staff have on the whole been well used; lectures were given in 252 places in the central division, 217 in the northern, 174 in Sind, and only 125 in the southern division. Amongst individuals Messrs. A. A. Kadri and C. M. Shah (Panch Mahâls), R. S. Dikshit (Poona), V. S. Toro (West Khândesh), and N. B. Thadani (Hyderabad) are specially commended; Mr. Toro indeed has prepared at considerable cost of time and money a series of slides illustrating the history and geography of his district. I notice that, whilst most of the Deputies elsewhere took a share in this work, in the northern division only two did so; and in the big Ahmedabad district only one junior member of the staff did anything. The Dhârwar Deputy got some of his headmasters to handle the lantern themselves, and to give lessons with its help. The lectures were generally popular with the children and their parents, and the officers concerned are asking for spare apparatus and more sets of slides. Slides continued to be circulated to the Government high schools; but an intimation has reached me through an independent exponent of Indian opinion that the assistant masters resent being asked to attend after school hours to give lectures to the boys. I have to express my cordial thanks to Mr. V. N. Ghate for relieving me and my office of a great deal of correspondence and work in this connection even after his transfer to Dhârwar.

108. Teachers' Associations.—References have already been made to such associations, chiefly of women teachers. The Bombay association had 113 members, to whom several lectures were given during the year.

109. **Students' advisory committee.**—The executive board met regularly every month. The number of enquiries made in writing was 314, and by personal visits 230. The number of students who proceeded to England with the knowledge of the committee was 24, of whom 8 expressed their willingness to be under the guardianship of Mr. Mallet. The committee note that the prejudice against guardianship is dying away, as it becomes more and more clear that it is not a creation of the Indian Students' Department to hinder the legitimate pursuits of an Indian student, but a requirement insisted on by certain colleges in England in the interests of internal discipline.

110. **Books and vernacular literature.**—During the year revised editions were published of Marāthi readers II, III, IV, and VII; Gujarāti I, II, IV, V, VI, and girls' I and II; and Kānarese III. I noticed a complaint that the Gujarāti Primer was not available; the reason was that a whole consignment was lost in the ill-fated *Maloja*. The annual statement of the Sind book depôt is printed in the Supplement; the sale proceeds fell from Rs. 28,456 to Rs. 19,413 and the nominal cash balance fell from Rs. 21,196 to Rs. 18,971. The Marāthi book committee considered 10 books; the vice-principal of the Poona training college reported on 149, revised 7, scrutinized and corrected 10. The Gujarāti committee had 99 books before it, of which it disposed of 55; the Ahmedabad vice-principal reported on 170. The Kānarese committee had 47 books before it, and disposed of 12, the Dhārwar vice-principal reported on 30, revised 5, scrutinized 8, and translated 3. The principal of the Hyderabad training college reported on 87 books, revised 17, and corrected the proofs of 11. The Urdu committee considered 21 books; the Urdu Deputy for the central division reported on 41, and still has 150 before him, some of them very bulky. The reporting and reviewing work gets heavier and heavier, and all the officers concerned complain that it is impossible to cope with it in reasonable time.

111. The Deccan Vernacular Translation Society rewarded 17 books, rejected 18, and had 59 still to dispose of. The Gujarāt Vernacular Translation Society has a number of books in preparation. Lectures were delivered as usual in connection with the Sassoon Mechanics' Institute and the Dnyan Prasarak Mandali, both of which receive grants. Of Rs. 4,059 sanctioned for the encouragement of literature Rs. 3,908 were spent. The greater part of the *dakshina* fund was spent as usual, and in addition Rs. 2,687 were spent on rewards to authors or the purchase of books, leaving an unexpended balance of Rs. 499.

112. **Libraries.**—The total number of libraries registered in this office increased from 270 to 280, of which 79 were in the central division, 85 in the northern, 92 in the southern, and 24 in Sind.

113. **Donations.**—A donor who wishes to remain anonymous has given Rs. 4,000 for founding certain prizes in connection with the School Final examination, and for promoting moral instruction. Rs. 1,600 were received from the contributors for founding a Dhakji Kashinathji scholarship in the Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute. Mr. G. J. Agashe gave Rs. 1,000 to found a prize in Deccan College in the name of his son. Rs. 6,000 were received from the estate of the late Mr. Haribhai Gulabbhai of Broach district for scholarships. Mr. S. A. Ovalekar gave Rs. 4,000 for a scholarship in the Thāna high school. There were many smaller donations for various purposes, and in addition the Secretaries of the Lord Sydenham Memorial Fund made over the sum of Rs. 1,85,000 for the provision of a suitable site and building for the College of Commerce.

114. **The War.**—Various books and pamphlets on this subject, in English or vernacular, were purchased and distributed; and the Sind school paper continued to publish its war supplement every fortnight. The inspecting officers seem to have taken a great deal of trouble to disseminate correct information by means of lectures and informal talks with the people, and some of them found the large pictures in the Illustrated Times of India very useful in this work. It appears however that the protracted duration of the war has to some extent dulled interest in it, especially as most of the people are little

affected by it, and moreover find it impossible really to appreciate the nature of so colossal a struggle, waged with unfamiliar weapons in unknown regions of the world. A considerable amount of money has been subscribed by educational officers and pupils towards the various funds, for instance, Rs. 1,671 by vernacular masters and the Deputies' offices in the central division, Rs. 5,700 in the northern division, and Rs. 6,900 (for the Belgian Relief Fund) in the southern division. His Excellency the Governor offered ten prizes of the total value of Rs. 500 for the best essays on the subject of the war written by undergraduates of certain colleges, and 145 competed. Of the members of the Indian Educational Service Professor R. Marrs and Messrs. J. T. Turner and C. R. W. Griffith were serving in the army, and Mr. P. C. Wren was invalided to England.

115. **Plague.**—The plague was more in evidence this year and the number of schools closed on this account on March 31 increased from 192 to 370, the number of pupils concerned being 23,141. As many as 1,883 pupils, along with 49 teachers and 4 servants lost their lives from this cause. In some parts, to avoid the closing of schools, they were held under shady trees or in mat-sheds constructed by the people for the purpose.

116. **Supplementary Tables.**—The six subsidiary forms giving full details of colleges and all kinds of schools are printed in the Supplement to this Report as usual.

VII.—IMPERIAL GRANTS.

117. The account given of these grants in chapter VII of the last report is now brought down to March 31, 1916. The serial numbers below are in continuation of those given last year and an asterisk, as before, denotes a non-Government institution.

118. **Eleven lakhs grant of 1911.**—Out of the unpledged balance of Rs. 8,229 shown in paragraph 136 of the last report Rs. 1,745-10-4 were allotted for furniture for the new engineering laboratory of the College of Engineering, Poona. This reduced the unpledged balance to Rs. 6,483-5-8. The actual expenditure however in 1915-16 amounted to Rs. 500 only; and the unexpended balance from this grant on March 31 amounted to Rs. 8,927-5-8.

119. **Three lakhs grant of 1912.**—The unpledged balance of Rs. 61,783 from this grant was, for convenience, dealt with along with the next following grant as stated in paragraph 137 of the last report; and has now been completely disposed of.

120. **Seven and three-quarters lakhs grant of 1913.**—To this were added the balance of Rs. 61,783 just referred to and the sum of Rs. 46,501, being the savings in 1912-13 from the Darbār recurring grant of Rs. 48,000 for hostels. Thus for the erection and equipment of hostels we had altogether Rs. 8,83,284. The unpledged balance from this allotment shown in paragraph 138 of the last report was Rs. 24,360. The following further allotments have been made :—

121. In paragraphs 154 and 155 of the report for 1913-14 the expenditure from the three lakhs grant and the combined allotment for the erection and equipment of hostels was through some misunderstanding shown to be Rs. 1,65,550 and Rs. 15,298 instead of Rs. 97,373 and Rs. 7,475 respectively. The total balance "pledged though not spent" has, therefore, to be raised by Rs. 76,000. The correct figure of expenditure in 1913-14 from the "combined hostel allotment" has now been shown in its proper place, and the difference in the figure of expenditure from the three lakhs grant added at the end.

122. **Thirty-one lakhs grant of 1913.**—At the end of March 1915 there was a total unpledged balance of Rs. 29,727 available for technical education, as shown in the last column of the statement in paragraph 146 of the last report. This amount is still unpledged.

123. *Grant of Rs. 4,00,000 for arts colleges and secondary schools.*—In paragraph 140 of the last report an amount of Rs. 1,32,819 was shown to be reserved from this grant for acquiring a site for the proposed Arts College at Dharwar, and for buildings for the high schools at Larkana, Karwar, or Ratnagiri. The following two allotments have since been made from this balance:—

The unexpended balance shown last year was Rs. 40,73,542: it should have been Rs. 41,59,765. This has now been reduced to Rs. 40,37,878. The smallness of the reduction is entirely due to the circumstances created by the war. We have been allowed to expend non-recurring allotments only when this was absolutely necessary; whilst many schemes involving recurring expenditure have been hung up, so that the recurring allotments are added to the unexpended balance each year.

VIII.—GENERAL SUMMARY.

150. Brief review of the year.—The University inaugurated its new academic year beginning in June and ending in March. For the Arts colleges the period was almost uneventful, except that in the seven Government and aided colleges the number of students increased from 3,475 to 4,702. The students had a good year on the whole, as the Matriculation was passed by 48 per cent. of the candidates, the first year examination by 57 per cent., the Intermediate by 59 per cent., and the B.A. by 64 per cent. The College of Engineering got its new laboratory completed; the needs of the Law School were under consideration by a committee; but the development of the College of Commerce was to some extent arrested by the impossibility of providing any more money.

In the sphere of secondary education development was severely restricted by the need for economy, and the only new direction in which much is being done is that of practical work in science. The Anglo-Vernacular schools for boys were 338 in number, and had 52,254 pupils; those for girls were 38 in number, with 3,290 pupils. There were also 44 European schools, with 4,278 pupils, and 40 English-teaching schools, with 8,109 pupils; the total number of European and Anglo-Indian pupils was 4,736. The curriculum for English-teaching schools was thoroughly revised.

In the sphere of primary education also financial restrictions precluded any grants for opening new schools, improving the pay of teachers, or giving extra teachers to undermanned schools. Building operations were abruptly suspended, not even Rs. 45,000 being claimed in free building or equipment grants. The number of primary schools for boys decreased by 132, the number of pupils by 5,938; this was largely due to plague, partly also to a reclassification of certain schools. On the other hand the schools for girls increased by 36, and the total number of girls in primary schools by 4,681. A special curriculum for factory schools was promulgated, but the schools themselves made little or no progress. A revised curriculum was introduced into the primary schools of Sind.

Mahomedans continued to be agitated by the question of instruction through the medium of Urdu. The number of their boys under public instruction increased by 4 only, the number of girls by 1,012.

The number of children of the "aboriginal or hill tribes" at school increased by 111, whilst the number drawn from the "depressed classes" decreased by 188. For the former 92 special classes or schools were maintained, for the latter 476.

The new examinations in Drawing and other branches of Art were inaugurated. The Sloyd training class was discontinued for the sake of economy. The number of technical or industrial schools or classes decreased by four; but Sind is experimenting with industrial classes for women, and with cooking competitions for girls.

Good work was done in disseminating information about the war, and in collecting money for the various funds. Plague was rife, and took heavy toll of the pupils and their teachers.

The table shows an increase of 88 in the number of institutions and of 9,564 in the number of pupils. In public institutions, that is to say, those under Government inspection, the number of male pupils was 619,789 and the number of female pupils 134,833. The average monthly number on the rolls increased from 731,910 to 750,637. The percentage of all pupils under instruction as compared with the general population of British districts remained 4.

During the year under report there was a net increase of three institutions under Government. On the one hand there were opened four schools for children of the criminal tribes in Bijapur, and an advanced drawing and painting class at Ahmedabad; on the other hand a police school at Dharwar was transferred to the District Local Board, and a Factory school at Poona was closed owing to the closing of the mill.

153. General Tables VI and V for British districts show the results of public examinations and the stages of instruction in schools for general education respectively. The number of pupils learning English was 77,271, the number learning a classical language was 30,265, and the number learning a vernacular language was 715,611.
