P R E F A C E

Reduction in regional imbalances of educational development is a major objective of the National Programme of Education. To promote this programme, it is necessary to collect statistics of educational development in the different regions of the country periodically and to publish them for information by all concerned.

The Ministry of Education publishes annually statistics of educational development in the different States of the Indian Union. But as imbalances of educational development between one district and another are far more pronounced than those between one State and another, it was decided to collect district wise statistics of educational development in the districts also every five years. Accordingly, district wise statistics were collected and published, for the first time, for the year 1960-61.

This study is now being repeated for the year 1965-66 and it is proposed to bring out a separate volume for each State containing the district educational statistics of every State. It will contain statistics for the year 1965-66 along with comparative data for the year 1960-61. To make inter district comparisons possible, important indices such as enrolment ratio, percentage of trained teachers, per capita expenditure on education, etc., will also be included.

This is the ninth volume of the series of 16 volumes for all the States of the Union (except Nagaland) and is devoted to the educational statistics of districts in Maharashtra State. It is based on the data collected from the State Department of Education.

I take this opportunity to express my appreciation of the co-operation and help received from the State Department of Public Instruction, Maharashtra, and other educational authorities in the State and the Statistical and Information Division which has prepared this Report.

I - INTRODUCTORY

in

The Ministry of Education and Youth Services publishes the statistics of education, India annually in their publications 'Education in India, Vol. I and Vol. II'. These publications give the statistics at the national and State levels, but do not provide district-wise statistics.

2. To fill up this gap, the National Council of Educational Research and Training brought out a volume entitled 'Educational Statistics: District-wise' giving the benchmark of educational data of various kinds for all districts for the year 1960-61. To make inter-district comparison possible, some important indices such as enrolment ratios, percentages of trained teachers and per capita expenditure on education were also given. These comparative statements show a wide range of variation between districts in every respect.

3. It has now been decided to have a similar review of educational development in the districts for the year 1965-66. Such periodic reviews are necessary for several reasons. For instance, they help to judge the effectiveness of the measures taken to correct regional imbalances at the district level. Secondly, such collection and publication of data on different aspects of education at the district level will help the preparation of educational development plans for all districts which can be adopted, as recommended by the Education Commission as the principal unit for administration, planning and development of school education.

4. This review will be divided into sixteen volumes - one volume being devoted to the educational statistics of the districts in every State (except Nagaland). The present volume, which is the ninth in the series, gives the data for each of the districts of Maharashtra on number of educational institutions, pupils, teachers, expenditure, etc., at all levels of education. It also gives the rate of growth in different sectors from 1960-61 to 1965-66 and some important indices of education.

II - SUMMARY

5. The district statistics of Maharashtra for 1960-61 and 1965-66 given in the following give a clear idea about the disparities in educational development among the 26 districts Maharashtra.

PRIMARY CLASSES:

6. A synoptic view of the relative position of the 26 districts as regards the provision of schooling facilities at the primary stage is given in Table I. This table gives the enrolment ratios in classes I-V for the years 1960-61 and 1965-66 and the ranking of the districts according to their position with respect to the enrolment ratios:-

7. Between 1960-61 and 1965-66 i.e. within a period of five years the enrolment in classes I at the State level has increased from 69.8 to 92.4, but the growth in the individual districts is varied. In 1960-61 in 10 districts it was less than the average ratio at the State level. By 1966 the number of such districts increased to 11. However, in three of them, namely, Dhulia, Kolhapur and Thana the enrolment ratio was very near the State average. The other 8 districts are Aurangabad, Bhandara, Bhir, Chanda, Nanded, Osmanabad, Parbhani and Yeotmal.

MIDDLE SCHOOL CLASSES:

8. Table 2 gives the enrolment ratio of various districts in classes VI-VIII for the years 1960-61 and 1965-66 and also gives ranking of the districts according to their enrolment ratio:

9. During the period 1960-61 to 1965-66 the enrolment ratio in middle school classes has increased from 29.6 to 39.3 in the State as a whole. But the district-wise growth has been somewhat uneven. However, the relative position of the different districts as regards enrolment ratio is varied. In 1960-61 the enrolment ratio in 17 districts was less than the overall State average, whereas in 1965-66 also in almost in the same 17 districts the enrolment ratio was less than that of the overall State average. The lowest enrolment ratio in 1965-66 was around 23.

HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATION:

10. Table 3 gives the enrolment ratio in classes IX-XI for the 26 districts of Maharashtra for the year 1960-61 and 1965-66 along with their ranking according to their enrolment ratio in these classes:-

11. During the period 1960-61 to 1965-66 the enrolment ratio in classes IX-VI increased from 16.1 to 21.8 at the State level. As in the case of previous stages, the increase in the enrolment ratio varied from district to district. In 1960-61, only in 5 districts the enrolment ratio exceeded the State average. In 1965-66, however, the enrolment ratio in 9 districts exceeded the State average. These districts are Greater Bombay, Jalgaon, Kolhapur, Nagpur, Poona, Sangli, Satara, Thana and Wardha.

ALL SCHOOL CLASSES:

12. The enrolment ratio in classes I-XI has been worked out and is given in Table 4. This also gives the ranking of the districts according to their achievement as indicated by their enrolment ratio:-

13. Taking school stage as a whole, the enrolment ratio for the State was 49.0 in 1960-61 and 59.6 in 1965-66. In 1960-61 in 12 districts, namely, Ahmednagar, Akola, Aurangabad, Bhandara, Bhir, Buldana, Chanda, Dhulia, Nanded, Osmanabad, Parbhani and Yeotmal the enrolment ratio in classes I-XI was less than the State average. In none of the districts the enrolment ratio exceeded 70. The highest ratio achieved was in Greater Bombay 66.5. In 1965-66 again, the enrolment ratio was less than the State average in Ahmednagar, Akola, Aurangabad, Bhandara, Bhir, Buldana, Chanda, Dhulia, Kolhapur, Nanded, Osmanabad, Parbhani, Sholapur, Thana and Yeotmal. For this year also the enrolment ratio did not exceed 80 in any of the districts. The highest ratio achieved was in Greater Bombay 79. One could see that taking the school stage as a whole, these 15 districts are backward as they have below the State average enrolment ratio.

HIGHER EDUCATION:

14. Table 5 gives the enrolment ratio in higher education classes along with their ranking in the districts of Maharashtra for the years 1960-61 and 1965-66.

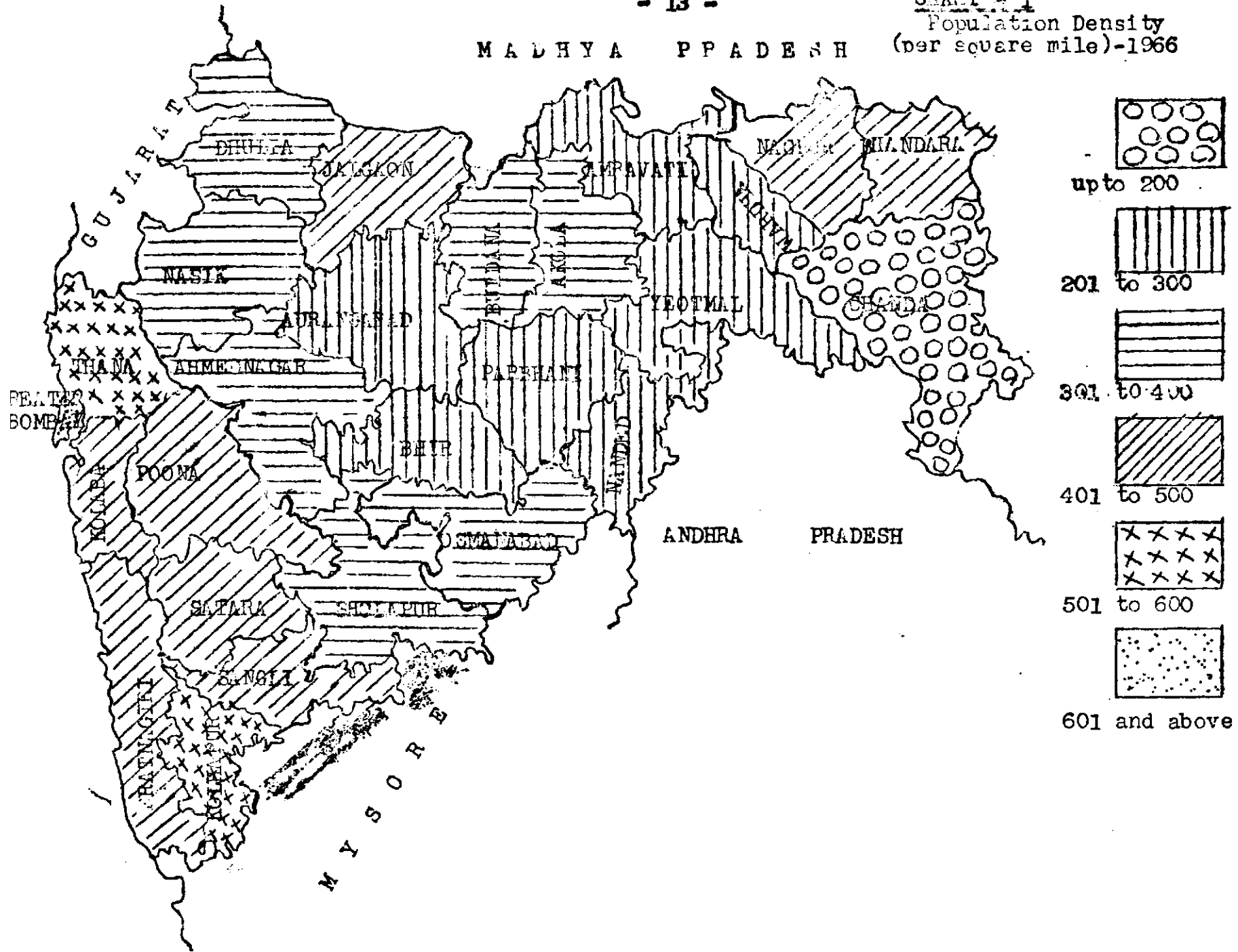
15. During this period, the enrolment ratio for the State as a whole increased from 2.5 to 4.0. However, the increase in the enrolment ratio varied from district to district. In 1960-61 only Amravati, Greater Bombay, Nagpur and Poona the enrolment ratio exceeded the State average. In 1965-66 also the enrolment ratio in districts of Amravati, Aurangabad, Greater Bombay, Nagpur, Poona and Wardha alone exceeded the State average. In all other districts the enrolment ratio in higher education was very much below this average.

III - AREA AND POPULATION

16. Maharashtra State consists of 26 districts. The total area of the State is 1.19 lakh sq. miles. Excluding Greater Bombay, whose area is only 186 sq. miles, the area of the other 25 districts varies from 2429 sq. miles in Wardha to 9200 sq. miles in Chanda. The population of Maharashtra was 395.54 lakhs in 1961. It is estimated to have increased to 449.31 lakhs by 1966. The increase in population is observed in all the districts. In 1965-66 the population in the different districts varied from 7.20 lakhs in Wardha to 28.05 lakhs in Poona, excluding Greater Bombay where the estimated population in 1966 was 47.15 lakhs.

17. The population density per sq. mile which was 334 in 1961 has increased to 378 by 1966. Greater Bombay which had a density of population of 24568 per sq. mile in 1961 is estimated to have increased to 25349 by 1966. In the case of other districts the population density per sq. mile, in 1966, varied from 153 in Chanda to 578 in Kolhapur. The population density in 1966 was less than 200 in one district, 200-300 in 7 districts, 300-400 in 7 districts, 400-500 in 8 districts and more than 500 in 3 districts. The density of population and the sex ratio of population in the different districts of Maharashtra is given in Statement I.

18. The total population of the State in 1966 is estimated as 449.31 lakhs. Of this 58.60 lakhs was in the age-group 6-11 consisting of 29.60 lakhs boys and 29.00 lakhs girls. The children in the age-group 6-11 formed 13.0% of the total population of the State. In the case of boys they formed 12.7% and in the case of girls 13.4%. The population in the age-group 11-14 in 1966 is estimated to 31.13 lakhs consisting of 15.93 lakhs boys and 15.20 lakhs girls. This formed 6.9% of the total population of the State. The boys in this group formed 6.9% of the total male population and the girls formed 7.0% of the total female population of the State. Again the population in the age-group 14-17 is estimated as 28.26 lakhs consisting of 14.68 lakhs boys and 13.58 lakhs girls. The population in this age-group formed 6.3% of the total population. The boys in this age-group formed 6.3% of the total male population and girls in this age-group formed the same 6.3% of the total female population of the State. In the age-group 17-23 the population in the State is estimated to be 48.92 lakhs, consisting of 25.66 lakhs boys and 23.26 lakhs girls. They formed 10.9%, 11.0%, and 10.7% respectively of the total population, the male population and the female population of the State. Thus the total population in the school going age-group 6-23 adds to 166.91 lakhs. This formed 37.1% of the total population at the State level. The boys in this age-group formed 36.9% of the male population and the girls 37.4% of the female population. The distribution of the population in the different age-groups, district-wise, is given in Statement II-A & B separately for 1961 and 1966.

19. Of the total population, 22.27 lakhs (11.35 lakhs males and 10.92 lakhs females) belong to the Scheduled Castes community at the State level. The population of the Scheduled Tribes was 23.97 lakhs (consisting of 12.12 lakhs males and 11.85 lakhs females). Thus 11.7% of the total population of the State belong to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribe communities. In the case of males these communities formed 11.5% and in the case of females 11.9%. The district-wise distribution of percentage of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes population to the total population is given below:-

IV - LITERACY

20. General literacy rate in Maharashtra i.e. the number of literates per thousand of population was 298 in 1961. The literacy rate of males was 420 and the females 168 for the State as a whole. In 1961 the literacy rate was less than at the State level in 17 of the 26 districts. In the case of males and females separately, the literacy rate was less than the State average in the same 17 districts. The literacy rate among the districts varied from 151 per thousand of population in Nanded and Bhir to 351 in Nagpur. However, in Greater Bombay the literacy rate was 586 per thousand of population. The district-wise position is given in Statement IV.

V - TOTAL NUMBER OF EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, ENROLMENT, TEACHERS AND EXPENDITURE INSTITUTIONS:

21. The total number of educational institutions at the State level in Maharashtra was 62,567 in 1960-61. This increased to about four times to 2,30,765 by 1965-66. The number of institutions has increased at an annual cumulative rate of 22.9%. The increase in the number of institutions is observed in all the districts except in Greater Bombay and Satara. However, taking 1960-61 as base, the increase was more than 300% in Solapur, Nasik, Kolhapur, Dhulia, Buldana and Ahmednagar. The percentage was less than 100 in Akola, Amravati, Bhandara, Chanda, Nagpur, Nanded, Osmanabad, Sangli, Thana, Wardha and Yeotmal.

22. The high increase in the total number of institutions is mainly due to the increase in the adult education schools during the period.

ENROLMENT:

23. The total enrolment in the educational institutions at the State level was 56.58 lakhs in 1960-61 which increased to 81.96 lakhs by 1965-66. Of the enrolment in 1960-61, 37.39 were boys and 19.19 lakhs were girls; whereas in 1965-66, 51.71 lakhs were boys and 30.25 lakhs were girls. The enrolment has increased at an annual cumulative rate of growth of 7.3%. The increase in enrolment during the period is observed in all the districts and in both boys and girls except in the District of Satara. At the same time, at the State level as well as in all the districts, the rate of increase in enrolment of girls during the period was more than that of boys. The increase in enrolment was the highest in Osmanabad, Bhir and Parbhani districts, taking both boys and girls together and was lowest in Poona, Ratnagiri and Greater Bombay excluding Satara where there was a decrease.

24. The sex ratio of enrolment i.e. the number of girls enrolled for every 100 boys was 51 in 1960-61 and 59 in 1965-66. In 1965-66 the sex ratio varied from 74 in Greater Bombay to less than 40 in Aurangabad, Nanded and Parbhani. The following table gives the district-wise sex ratio and percentage enrolment to the total population:-

25. The total enrolment in all recognised educational institutions as a percentage of the total population increased from 14.3 to 18.2 at the State level during the period. The percentage enrolment has increased considerably in all the districts excepting Satara where there was a decrease. The percentage enrolment in 1965-66 was the highest in Greater Bombay (22.7), followed by Ahmednagar (21.9), Poona (21.3), Jalgaon (20.9) and Satara (20.4) and was the lowest in Chanda (12.4).

TEACHERS:

26. The total number of teachers in all educational institutions increased from 1.6 lakhs to 2.3 lakhs during the period. This shows a cumulative rate of growth of 7.2%. (The shows a cumulative rate of growth of 7.2%.) The percentage of women teachers which was 23.1 in 1960-61 increased to 24.9 by 1965-66. Among the districts the percentage of women teachers in 1965-66 varied from around 9% in Bhir, Nanded and Osmanabad to 37.5% in Thana and 52.7% in Greater Bombay.

27. The number of teachers per thousand population was 4.1 in 1960-61. This increased to 5.1 by 1965-66. In 1965-66, the number of teachers per thousand population varied from 3.2 in Parbhani and 3.8 in Bhir to 6.9 in Nagpur. However, in Greater Bombay the number of teachers per thousand population was 7.8 in 1965-66.

EXPENDITURE:

28. The total expenditure on all recognised educational institutions in the State was Rs. 35.56 crores in 1960-61 which increased to Rs.59.33 crores by 1965-66. The expenditure has increased at an annual cumulative rate of growth of 10.0%. The increase in the expenditure during the period is evident in all the districts. However, taking 1960-61 as base, the percentage increase in the expenditure during the period is more than 100% in Bhir, Chanda, Kolhapur, Nanded, Osmanabad, Parbhani, Wardha and Yeotmal. The percentage increase was the minimum in Poona, Amravati and Greater Bombay.

29. The expenditure on education per head of population increased from Rs.9/- to Rs.13.1 during the period. The expenditure per capita on education increased in all the districts. In Greater Bombay the per capita expenditure was Rs.33.5 in 1965-66. Among the other districts the per capita expenditure was more than the State average in Amravati, Nagpur and Poona. The per capita expenditure was the lowest in Parbhani (Rs.6.5). The district-wise details of expenditure are given in statement V-B.

30. Statement V-B also gives in columns 24-27 the percentage distribution of expenditure by sources in 1965-66. At the State level 56.6% of expenditure was met from Government funds.

The next important source was fees which contributed 27.2% of the total expenditure. The Local Boards contributed 9.2% and other sources 7.0%. Among the districts also the pattern of financing of educational expenditure remains more or less the same.

VI. PRE-PRIMARY EDUCATION

INSTITUTIONS & ENROLMENT:

31. The number of pre-primary schools in Maharashtra showed slight decrease during the period from 527 to 448. In 1965-66 there were at least ^{Pre-}2/primary schools in every district. However, in Greater Bombay there were 113 of them, followed by Nagpur (69) and Poona (24). The total enrolment in pre-primary schools in 1965-66 was 31,863 of which around 10,000 were in Greater Bombay. The enrolment in pre-primary school classes (in schools as well/ ^{as} in attached classes) decreased from 34,440 to 33,860 at the State level. This decrease was mainly due to the decrease in enrolment in these classes in districts like Bhandara, etc.

TEACHERS

32. The total number of teachers in pre-primary schools also decreased from 1,351 to 1,188 at the State level. Of this number in 1965-66, 1,134 were women. In all the districts also the number of women teachers as compared to men teachers was very high. Of the total number of teachers 72.2% were trained in 1960-61. The corresponding percentage in 1965-66 was 71.8. The percentage of trained teachers exceeded 75% in eleven districts. The percentage of trained teachers was the minimum in Poona (23.1%) followed by Patnagiri (39.1%). In all the remaining districts the percentage of trained teachers was over 50%.

EXPENDITURE

33. The total direct expenditure on pre-primary schools increased from 16.9 lakhs to nearly Rs.20 lakhs during the period. This increase in the expenditure is evident in all the districts excepting Akola, Amravati, Aurangabad, Phandara, Fuldana, Chanda, Dhullia, Nagpur, Osmanabad, Satara, Thana and Wardha.

34. Of the total enrolment in pre-primary classes in 1965-66, 1496 (4.4%) were from Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes Communities. Of this 826 were boys and 670 were girls. In all the districts the number of Scheduled Castes boys and girls enrolled in pre-primary classes was less than 100 excepting in Nagpur where it was 107. In districts like Aurangabad, Phir, Nanded and Parbhani the number of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes students in pre-primary Classes was less than 10.

VII - PRIMARY EDUCATION

INSTITUTIONS:

35. The total number of primary schools in Maharashtra increased from 25418 to 28665 during the period under consideration. The increase in the number of primary schools is shared by all the districts excepting Jalgaon, Kolhapur, Nasik, Poona, Satara, Thana and Ratnagiri, where there was a decrease in the number of primary schools in 1965-66 as compared to 1960-61. This decrease may be due to the ungrading of primary schools into that of a higher level. The highest increase in the number of primary schools was in Chanda district.

36. The area served by a primary school in sq. miles decreased from 4.7 to 4.1 during the period. In greater Bombay there was ^a primary school for every 0.2 sq. mile of area in 1965-66. The average area served by a primary school, among the other districts in 1965-66, was more than the state average in Ahmednagar, Amravati, Chanda, Dhulia, Jalgaon, Nasik, Osmanabad, Poona, Patnagiri, Sangli, Satara, Sholarur and Yeetmal. The area served by a primary school was the lowest in Thana, Kolaba and Nagpur.

37. The population served by a primary school in the State increased from 1,556 to 1,567 during the period. In 1965-66 a primary school served a population of about 4900 in Greater Bombay. Among the other districts, the population served by a primary school varied from around 2500 in Jalgaon to less than 1000 in Bhir, Nanded and Chanda. The district-wise details are given in Statement VII.

ENROLMENT:

38. Enrolment of classes I-V at the State level was 39.49 lakhs in 1960-61. This increased to 51.94 lakhs by 1965-66. This shows a growth rate of 5.4% per annum. The growth rate of enrolment in these classes for boys during this period was 4.8% and that of girls was 6.5%. Taking 1960-61 ^{as base} the percentage increase in the enrolment during the period in the different districts varied from 10% in Patnagiri to 86% in Chanda, taking both boys and girls together. In the case of boys the percentage increase during the period varied between 9% in Patnagiri to 65% in Chanda and in the case of girls from about 17% in Satara to 140% in Chanda. The sex ratio of enrolment i.e. the number of girls enrolled for every 100 boys was 64 at the State level. in the different districts the sex ratio varied from 83 in Greater Bombay to 39 in Aurangabad.

The table below gives the percentage enrolment in 1965-66 taking 1960-61 as base in the different districts, alongwith the sex ratio of enrolment in classes I-V. The detailed statistics district-wise are given in Statement VIII.

39. The percentage enrolment in classes I-V to the total population in the age-group 6-11 gives an index of the facilities created for primary stage of education. In Maharashtra this percentage increased from 69.8% to 87.1% during the period taking both boys and girls together. In the case of boys the increase was from 87.8% in 1960-61 to 107.2% in 1965-66 and in the case of girls from 51.7% to 70.0%. There is appreciable variation in the percentage enrolment in the different districts in 1965-66. Taking both boys and girls together, the percentage enrolment was more than 100 in Jalgaon, Kolaba, Patnagiri and Sangli; 90 to 100% in Ahmednagar, Akola, Amravati, Greater Bombay, Nagpur, Nasik, Poona, Satara and Wardha; 80 to 90% in Buldana, Chanda, Dhulia, Kolhapur, Sholapur, Thana and Yeotmal; 70 to 80% in Bhandara and Osmanabad and was less than 70% in Aurangabad, (64.4), Bhir (62.2), Nanded (62.3) and Parbhani (61.1). In the case of boys the percentage enrolment was more than 100 in 20 of the 26 districts. In the other districts it varied between 83.4% in Parbhani to 94.5% in Osmanabad. In the case of girls the percentage enrolment in none of the districts was more than 100, excepting Greater Bombay. In Greater Bombay the percentage of boys enrolled was less than the percentage of girls enrolled to the corresponding total population. In the other districts the percentage enrolment was 80-90% in Jalgaon, Nagpur and Wardha; 70-80% in Ahmednagar, Akola, Amravati, Kolaba, Poona, Patnagiri, Sangli and Satara; 60-70% in Buldana, Dhulia, Kolhapur, Nasik, Sholapur and Thana; 50-60% in Bhandara, Chanda, Osmanabad and Yeotmal and was less than 50% in Aurangabad (36.5), Bhir (37.1), Nanded (37.5) and Parbhani (39.1).

SCHEDULED CASTES AND SCHEDULED TRIBES

40. Of the total enrolment in classes I-V in 1965-66 7.05 lakhs (4.81 lakh boys and 2.23 lakh girls) belonged to the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes communities. They formed 13.6% of the total enrolment in these classes. Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes boys formed 15.2% of the total enrolment of boys and the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes girls formed 11.1% of the total enrolment of girls. Among the districts there is a large variation in the percentage enrolment of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes to the total enrolment in these classes. This is due to the variation in the total population of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in the various districts. Among the districts the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes population formed 41.6% of the total population of the district in Dhulia, followed by 31.7% in Thana and 28.1% in the Nasik. On the other hand, in Bhandara, Ratnagiri and Wardha these communities formed only 2-3% of the total population.

41. Among the districts the percentage enrolment of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes to the total enrolment in classes I-V was highest in Chanda (32.6%), followed by Dhulia (28.6%), Bhandara (25.5%), Yeotmal (23.5%) and Nasik (22.2%). On the other end in Ratnagiri the students of these communities formed only 3.3% of the total enrolment in these classes.

42. The following table gives the extent of coverage of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in classes I-V, district-wise. The extent of coverage is defined as:

This shows that the enrolment of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in Classes I-V is similar the enrolment of all students in comparison to the respective total population.

43. At the State level the extent of coverage was 116.2% taking both boys and girls together thereby showing that the enrolment of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in classes I-V is more than their percentage to the total population. Among the boys the extent of coverage was 132.2% and among the girls 93.3% at the State level. In the districts, taking both boys and girls together, and separately for boys and girls, the extent of coverage was more than 100 in Akola, Amravati, Aurangabad, Bhandara, Buldana, Kolaba, Greater Bombay, Nagpur, Parbhani, Poona, Patnagi Sangli, Satara, Wardha and Yeotmal. Among the other districts the extent of coverage of boys was more than 100 while that of girls was less in Bhir, Jalgaon, Nanded, Osmanabad and Sholapur. The extent of coverage of boys was only 57.8% in Kolaba and 68.2% in Thana. The extent of coverage of girls was 51.6% in Dhulia, 58.8% in Kolaba, 64.8% in Nasik, 69.6% in Bhir and 70.4% in Ahmedna.

TEACHERS

44. The total number of teachers in primary schools in Maharashtra increased from 50.4 thousand to 60.2 thousand during the period. The growth rate in the number of teachers during the period 3.5% per annum as compared to the percentage rate of growth of enrolment of 5.4%. Taking 1960-61 base, the number of teachers showed an increase varying from 1.6% in Sholapur to 70.5% in Chanda among the districts. However, in Bhandara, Kolhapur, Patnagiri and Satara the number of teachers 1965-66 was less than that in 1960-61.

45. In 1960-61 at the State level, 20.1% of the teachers were women and by 1965-66 this percentage increase to 23.9. The percentage of women teachers among the districts varied appreciably. In Bhandara, Bhir, Jalgaon, Nanded and Osmanabad the percentage of Women teachers

less than 10. In Greater Bombay women teachers formed 68.7%, in Poona 38%, in Nagpur 32%, in Thana 27% and in Amravati, Sangli, Sholapur and Wardha between 21 to 24% and in all other districts the percentage of women teachers was between 10-20% in 1965-66.

46. The percentage of trained teachers among the teachers in primary schools was 49.8% in 1960-61 and 69.3% in 1965-66. Among the districts, considering all the teachers in 1965-66, the percentage of trained teachers was more than 80 in Amravati, Buldana, Greater Bombay, Nagpur and Wardha; was 70-80% in Akola, Jalgaon, Nasik and Satara and was 50-70% in Ahmednagar, Bhandara, Chanda, Dhulia, Kolaba, Kolhapur, Osmanabad, Poona, Patnagiri, Sangli, Sholapur, Thana and Yeotmal and in other districts it was less than 50%, the lowest being in Nanded 35%. Similar variation is observed in the case of trained teachers among the men and women teachers separately also.

EXPENDITURE

47. The total direct expenditure on primary schools in Maharashtra increased from Rs.693.03 lakhs to 1000.31 lakhs during the period 1960-61 to 1965-66. This gives a cumulative annual growth rate of 7.3%. The direct expenditure on primary schools increased in all the districts of the State. However, the highest increase taking 1960-61 as base, was in Parbhani (115), followed by Nanded (108). On the other hand in Amravati the percentage increase was only 6.

48. The per capita expenditure on primary schools in the State was Rs.1.8 in 1960-61 and has increased to Rs.2.2 by 1965-66. Among the districts the per capita expenditure in 1965-66 was Pe.1/- or less in Ahmednagar, Jalgaon, Kolhapur, Sangli and Satara. The per capita

expenditure was more than Rs.3/- in Akola, Amravati, Chanda, Greater Bombay, Nagpur, Nanded and Wardha; was between Rs.1-3 in other districts. Only in Nagpur and Wardha the per capita expenditure was between Rs.4-5.

49. The total direct expenditure on primary schools formed 19.5% of the total direct expenditure on education in Maharashtra in 1960-61. By 1965-66 this percentage decreased to 16.7. Among the districts the percentage expenditure on primary schools was around 41% in Chanda and Parbhani. On the other hand in Ahmednagar, Dhulia, Greater Bombay, Jalgaon, Kolhapur, Nasik, Poona, Ratnagiri, Sangli, Satara and Sholapur this percentage expenditure was less than that at the State level. In the other districts it varied between 17 and 40%.

50. The cost per student in primary schools was Rs. 47.8 at the State level in 1965-66. This varied from Rs. 32.7 in Ahmednagar to Rs.52 in Wardha and 71.8 in Greater Bombay. The cost per student was less than Rs.40/- in six districts; Rs.40-50 in 17 districts and more than Rs.50/- in three districts. The cost per student has a direct relation with the pupil-teacher ratio. Pupil-teacher ratio was higher in those districts where the cost per student was lowest. The pupil-teacher ratio among the districts varies between 30 in Amravati and Chanda to 44 in Jalgaon. The table below summarises the position:

VIII MIDDLE SCHOOLS

INSTITUTIONS

51. The number of middle schools in Maharashtra generally consisting of Classes V-VIII increased from 9,446 to 13,427 during the period. This shows a cumulative annual rate of increase of 7.0%. Among the districts, taking 1960-61 as base, the number of institutions have increased in all the districts. However, the increase was very high in Aurangabad, Phandara, Phir, Nanded, Osmanabad and Parbhani districts. However, in Nasik, Amravati, Sangli and Sholarur districts the increase was only nominal.

52. On the average there was a middle school for an area of 12.6 sq. miles in 1960-61. The coverage of a middle ^{School} decreased to 8.8 sq. miles by 1965-66. In all the districts also the area served by a middle school decreased during 1965-66 as compared to 1960-61. In Greater Bombay, there was a middle school for an area of 0.3 sq. miles. Among the other districts, in Kolharur, Nanded and Patnagiri, the average area served by a middle school was 2-4 sq. miles. On the other hand, in Poona the average area was 60.7 sq. miles and in Chand 38.2 sq. miles. In other districts the area served by a middle school varied between these limits.

53. On the average, at the State level, a middle school served a population of 4,187 in 1960-61 and 2,346 in 1965-66. The improvement in the population served by a middle school is observed in all the districts. In Greater Bombay, a middle school on the average served a population of 2,300. Among the other districts the population served by a middle school was more than 2,000 in Nagpur, Nanded and Parbhani. In Kolharur, Patnagiri and Satara the

was a middle school for every 2,000 population or less. This wide variation in the population served by a middle school depends mainly on the density of population in the different districts.

ENROLMENT

54. The total enrolment in the middle schools in Maharashtra in 1965-66 was 34,91,400. The enrolment was the highest in Greater Bombay district and was the lowest in Wardha district.

55. The enrolment in Classes VI-VIII in the State in 1960-61 was 7.48 lakhs. This increased to 12.23 lakhs by 1965-66 at a cumulative growth rate per annum of 9.6%. In the case of boys the growth rate was 9.0% and in the case of girls 11.2%. Taking 1960-61 as base, the increase in enrolment is appreciable in all the districts during the period. The highest increase, however, was in Osmanabad followed by Bhir, Parbhani, Nanded and Aurangabad in this Order. The lowest increase in the enrolment during the period was in Sangli, Amravati and Greater Bombay. The increase in enrolment during the period is appreciable both in the case of boys as well as girls in all the districts.

56. The sex ratio of enrolment i.e. the number of girls enrolled for every 100 boys was 40 at the State level. In the different districts the sex ratio varied from 71 in Greater Bombay to 16 in Parbhani in 1965-66. The following table gives the percentage enrolment in 1965-66 with 1960-61 as base and the corresponding sex ratios

in the Age-Group 11-14 (1965-66)

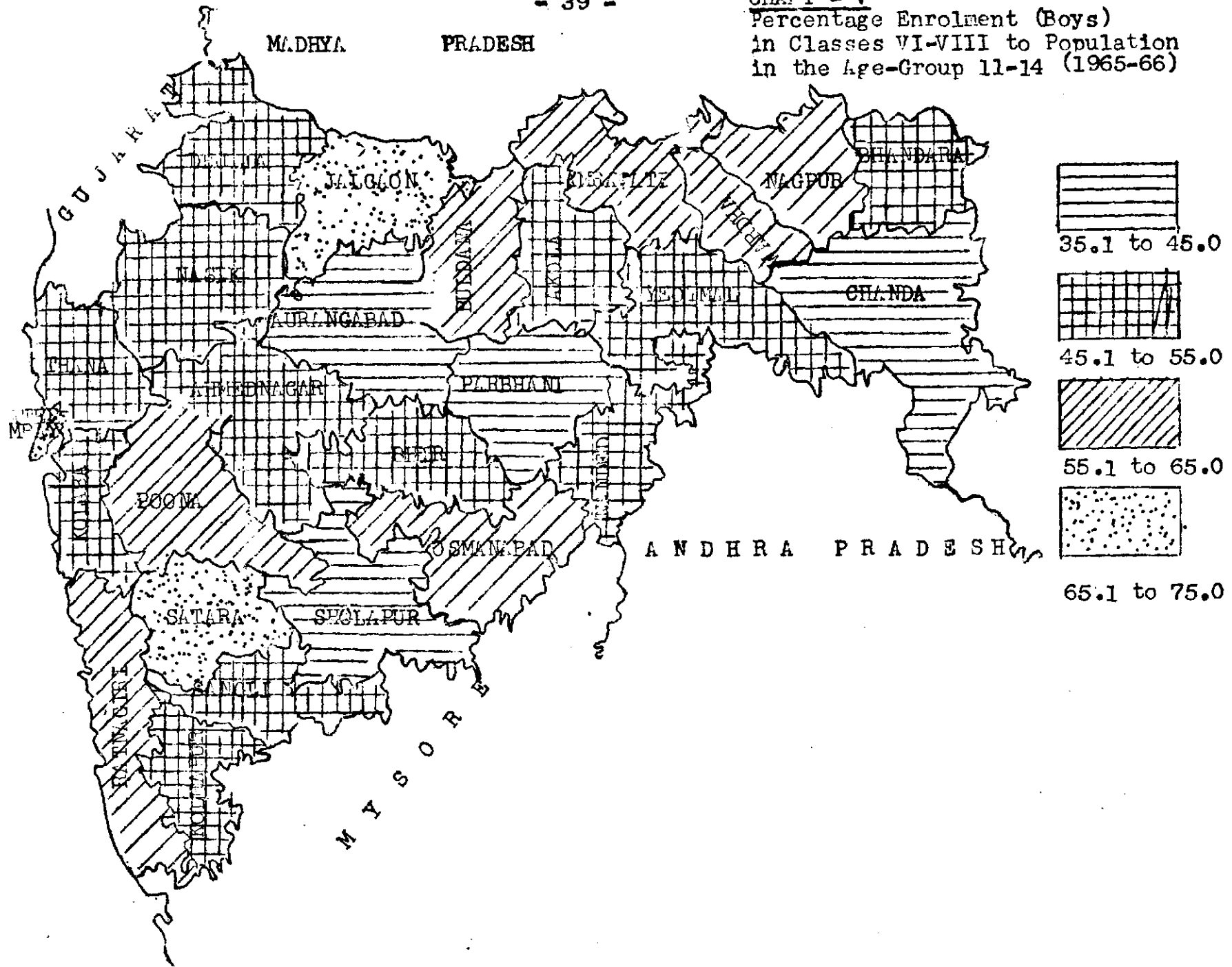
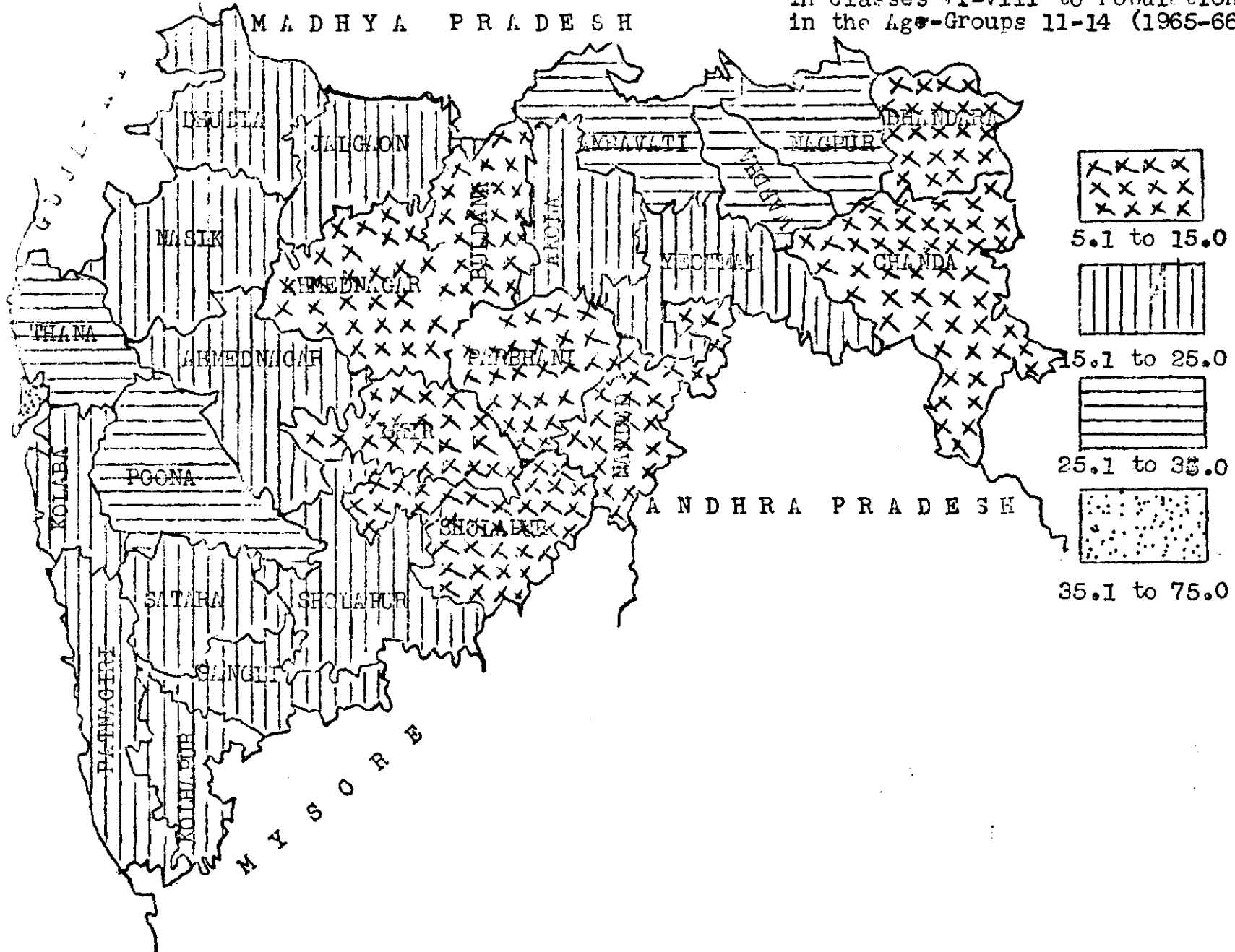


CHART - VI

57. The percentage enrolment in classes VI-VIII to the total population in the age-group 1-14 gave an index of facilities created for middle stage education. In Maharashtra the percentage enrolment in classes VI-VIII to the corresponding population increased from 29.6 in 1960-61 to 39.3 in 1965-66. In the case of boys the percentage enrolment increased from 41.0 to 54.8 and in the case of girls from 16.6 to 23.0. There is a large variation in the percentage enrolment of boys and girls to the corresponding population in the different districts of the State. Taking both boys and girls together, this percentage enrolment in 1965-66 was the highest (70.5) in Greater Bombay. Among the other districts the highest enrolment ratio obtained was 49.3 in Nagpur and 47.7 in Jalgaon. On the other hand, the lowest enrolment ratio was 23.2 in Chanda, 24.6 in Parbhani and 26.6 in Aurangabad. Among boys again, the highest enrolment ratio was in Greater Bombay (70.2). Next in order was Satara (67.3), Jalgaon (65.2), Ratnagiri (64.2) and Nagpur (63.5). The lowest enrolment ratio was in Chanda (26.6), followed by Parbhani (41.2) and Aurangabad (43.3). In the case of girls again, the enrolment ratio was the highest in Greater Bombay (70.9). Among the other districts the enrolment ratio was the highest in Nagpur (34.5) followed by Thana (29.9), Aurangabad (29.5). The lowest enrolment ratio was in Parbhani (6.9) followed by Nanded (8.2) and Aurangabad (8.5). The enrolment ratio was less than 10 in 4 districts, between 10-20 in 12 districts and more than 20 in the others. The district-wise details are given in Statement XIII. It can be seen that the enrolment ratio in middle stage of education is very poor in Chanda, Parbhani, Aurangabad, Bhir and Nanded as compared to the other districts.

TRANSFER RATE FROM PRIMARY STAGE TO MIDDLE STAGE:

58. Generally the transfer rate from primary stage to middle stage is calculated with the enrolment in class VI in a particular year as a percentage of enrolment in Class V in the previous year. However, since the class-wise enrolment is not available district-wise and also because the district-wise statistics are not available for consecutive years, the transfer rate here has been calculated with the enrolment in classes VI-VIII as a percentage of enrolment in classes I-V in the same year. The transfer rate calculated as stated above are given below.

59. At the State level the transfer rate as defined above has increased from 18.9% to 23.5% during the period under consideration, both boys and girls taken together. In the case of boys, the transfer rate has increased from 22.1% to 27.5% and in the case of girls from 13.5% to 17.3%. At the all-India level the transfer rate was 22.1% for boys and 14.8% for girls and 19.6% for both sexes together in 1962-63. This has increased to 23.8%, 15.6% and 20.8% respectively by 1965-66.

ENROLMENT OF SCHEDULED CASTES AND SCHEDULED TRIBES

60. Of the total enrolment in Classes VI-VIII in 1965-66, 1.31 lakhs students belong to the SC&ST communities. Of this number 1.05 lakhs were boys and 0.26 lakhs girls. The total enrolment of SC&ST students in these classes varied very much among the districts. This variation is naturally due to the variation in the population of SC&ST in these districts. The SC&ST communities formed 41.6% of the total population in Dhulia, 31.7% in Thana and 28.1% in Nasik. On the other hand, these communities forms less than 6% of the total population in Akola, Phandara, Puldana, Greater Bombay, Nagpur, Patnagiri and Satara districts. At the State level 11.7% of the total population belonged to SC&ST.

61. The SC&ST students formed 10.7% of the total enrolment in Classes VI-VIII. In the case of boys they formed 12% and in the case of girls 7.5%. Among the districts, taking both boys and girls together, the percentage of Scheduled Castes' students varied from 31.3% in Chanda, and 29.5% in Phandara and 25.8% in Nagpur to less than 5% in Greater Bombay, Kolaba and Patnagiri. Among the boys and girls separately also the percentage enrolment of SC&ST in these classes varied similarly.

62. The extent of coverage of SC&ST was 91.5 at the State level. In the case of boys the extent of coverage was 104.3 and in the case of girls 63. Taking both boys and girls together the extent of coverage was more than 100 in 13 districts. However, in Dhulia, Kolaba and Thana the extent of coverage was less than 40%. In the case of boys the extent of coverage was more than 100 in 15 districts and was very low in Dhulia, Kolaba and Thana districts. In the case of girls the extent of coverage was more than 100 in only 9 districts. In Bhir, Dhulia, Kolat Nasik and Thana districts the extent of coverage was less than 40.

TEACHERS

63. The total number of teachers in middle schools in Maharashtra in 1960-61 was 64,239 consisting of 48,671 men and 15,568 women. The corresponding number of 1965-66 was 94,582 consisting of 70,322 men and 24,260 women. This increase in the number of teachers shows an annual cumulative rate of growth of 7.6%. In the case of men teachers the rate of growth was 7.3% and in the case of women teachers 8.7%. The increase in the number of teachers during the period was observed in all the districts of the State. Taking 1960-61 as base, the percentage increase in the number of teachers was the highest in Osmanabad followed by Parbhani, Bhir and Aurangabad. In these districts the percentage increase was more than 150% during the period. The increase in the number of teachers was the lowest in Amravati (22.5%)

64. The percentage of women teachers among the total number of teachers was 24.2 in 1960-61 in the State which increased to 25.6 by 1965-66. Among the districts of the State, in Greater Bombay the percentage of women teachers in 1965-66 was 60.5. In the others this

centage varied from 7.3% in Osmanabad and Parbhani to 41.9% in Thana and 35.1 in Poona. In six districts out of 26 the percentage of women teachers in 1965-66 was less than 10.

65. Trained teachers formed 72.8% of the total number of teachers in the State in 1960-61. The corresponding figure for 1965-66 was 83.7. In the case of men teachers this percentage increased from 71.7 to 84.3 and in the case of women from 76.1 to 82.1 during the period. Among districts, taking all the teachers together, the percentage of trained teachers was more than 90% in Amravati, Dhulia, Greater Bombay, Jalgaon and Sangli. 70-90% in Ahmednagar, Akola, Solapur, Kolaba, Kolhapur, Nagpur, Nasik, Poona, Patnagiri, Satara, Sholapur, Thana and Wardha. 50-70% in Aurangabad, Bhandara, Chanda, Osmanabad and Yeotmal. However, in Bhir, Nanded and Parbhani the percentage of trained teachers was 47.1%, 37.6% and 46.8% respectively only. The percentage of trained teachers among men and women teachers also followed more or less the same pattern. The detailed data are given in Statement XV.

EXPENDITURE:

66. The total direct expenditure on middle schools in Maharashtra increased from Rs.937.4 lakhs to Rs.1675.1 lakhs during the period at a cumulative annual rate of growth of 113%. The expenditure on middle schools increased in all the districts of the State. However, the increase in the expenditure was more than 200% during the period with 1960-61 as base in Aurangabad, Bhandara, Bhir, Nanded, Osmanabad and Parbhani. The percentage increase was the highest in Wardha district (33.1%).

67. The per capita expenditure on middle schools at the State level increased from Rs.2.4

to Ps.3.7 during the period. In 1965-66 the per capita expenditure was Ps.6.9 in Greater Bombay; Ps.5.5 in Satara; Ps.4 to Ps.5 in Ahmednagar, Dhulia, Jalgaon, Kolaba, Kolharur, Poona, Patna, Sangli and Sholapur; Rs.3 to Ps.4 in Akola, Amravati, Bhandara, Nasik and Thana and Rs.2 to 3 in Buldana and Yeotmal and less than Rs.2 in the other districts. The lowest per capita expenditure on middle schools was in Parbhani (Ps.1.0) followed by Nanded (Rs.1.2).

68. The total direct expenditure on middle schools formed 26.4% of the total direct expenditure on education in the State in 1960-61. The corresponding percentage in 1965-66 was 27.9%. Among the districts the percentage expenditure on middle schools to the total direct expenditure on education varied from a minimum of 6.9% in Nagpur followed by 14.5% in Wardha to 51.1% in Kolaba. In 15 of the 26 districts this percentage expenditure was more than the State average.

69. The cost per student in middle schools in 1965-66 was Rs.48/- at the State level. Among the districts, the cost per pupil varied from a maximum of Ps.88.2 in Greater Bombay followed by Rs.66.2 in Nagpur to a minimum of Rs.35.1 in Ratnagiri and Rs.35.7 in Osmanabad. In 12 of the 26 districts the cost per student^{per} annum was more than of State average.

70. The average pupil teacher ratio in middle schools in 1965-66 at the State level was 37. This varied significantly among the districts from 25 in Nagpur to 43 in Ahmednagar. The table below summarises the expenditure on middle schools. Detailed data given in Statement XVI.

IX-HIGH/HIGHER SECONDARY SCHOOLS

INSTITUTIONS:

71. The number of high/higher secondary schools in Maharashtra increased from 2198 in 1960 to 3721 in 1965-66. This shows an increase of 69% over the number in 1960-61. This increase in the number of high/higher secondary schools during the period has been shared by all the districts. Among the districts, the maximum increase in the number of high/higher secondary school during the period was in Bhir District followed by Wardha, Bhandara and Osmanabad. However, in Greater Bombay, Amravati, Buldana, Satara and Sholapur districts the percentage increase during the period was less than 50.

72. On the average there was a high/higher secondary school for every 54 sq. miles in Maharashtra in 1960-61. By 1965-66 the area served by a high/higher secondary school on the average has reduced to 31.9 sq. miles. Among the districts the area served by a high/higher secondary school was the highest in Chanda (143.8 sq. miles) in 1965-66 followed by Yeotmal (65.6 sq. miles). In 14 out of 26 districts the area served by a high/higher secondary school varied from 30 to 50 sq miles; in 8 districts it varied from 10 to 30 sq. miles. In Greater Bombay, however, there was high/higher secondary school for every 0.3 sq. miles.

73. At the State level, the average population served by a high/higher secondary school decreased from 18000 in 1960-61 to 12000 in 1965-66. Among the districts the average population served by a high/higher secondary school varied from more than 15000 in Bhandara, Buldana, Chhatrapati, Dhulia, Kolaba, Parbhani, Sholapur and Yeotmal to nearly 10,000 in Nagpur, Osmanabad, Amravati

ra. In Greater Bombay, however, a high/higher secondary school covered a population of 8500.

ENROLMENT:

74. The total enrolment in high/higher secondary schools in Maharashtra in 1965-66 was 14,52,171. corresponding enrolment in 1960-61 was 8,18,184.

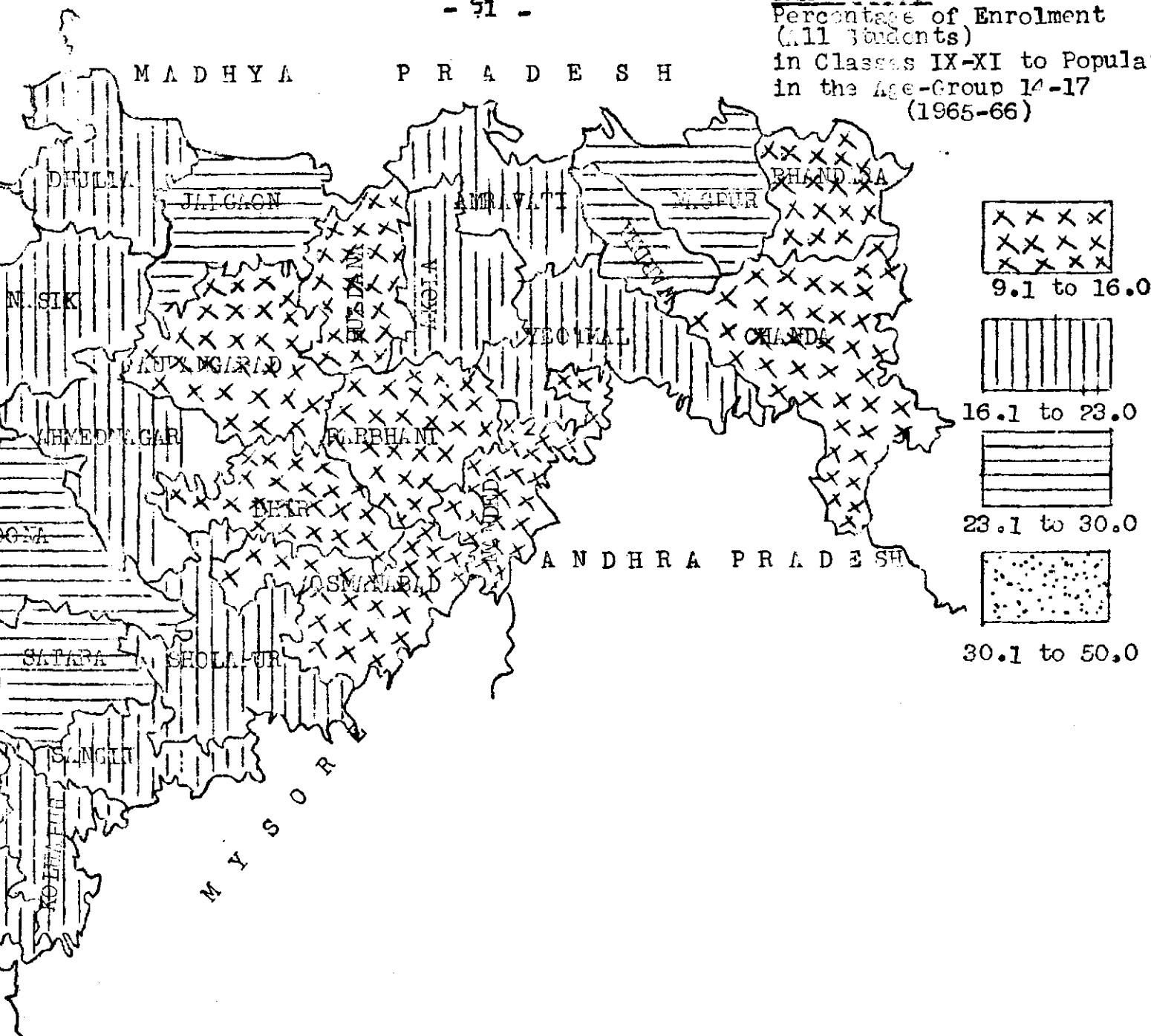
75. The enrolment in classes IX-XI/XII in the State increased from 3.37 lakhs (2.60 lakhs boys and 0.77 lakhs girls) in 1960-61 to 6.16 lakhs (4.64 lakhs boys and 1.53 lakhs girls) in 1965-66. The growth rate of enrolment in these classes comes to 11.7% per annum. The corresponding growth rate for boys was 11.3% and of the girls was 13.1%. Among the districts, taking both boys and girls together, the increase in the enrolment in these classes taking 1960-61 as base, varied very much. Districts like Ahmednagar, Aurangabad, Bhandara, Bhir, Chanda, Nanded, Osmanabad, Parbhani, Solapur, Nagri, Satara, Wardha and Yeotmal the percentage increase during the period was more than 40%. In the other districts also the increase was substantial. The lowest percentage increase during the period being 46% in Greater Bombay. The percentage increase in the enrolment of boys and girls also during the period in the different districts also followed the similar pattern.

76. The sex ratio of enrolment in classes IX-XI/XII in 1960-61 at the State level was 30 girls for every 100 boys. This sex ratio increased to 33 girls for every 100 boys by 1965-66. Among districts the sex ratio in 1960-61 varied from 62 in Greater Bombay to only 9 in Osmanabad. The table below gives the district-wise picture. The detailed statistics are given in Schedule VIII.

77. The percentage enrolment in classes IX-XI/XII of the population in the age-group 14-17 i.e. the enrolment ratio in classes IX-XI/VII increased from 16.1 to 21.8 during the period at the State level. In the case of boys the enrolment ratio increased from 23.1 to 31.6 and in the case of girls from 7.9 to 11.2. Among the districts also there has been appreciable increase in the enrolment ratio of both boys and girls. In 1965-66 the enrolment ratio, taking both boys and girls together, was less than 10 in Parbhani; 10-15 in Aurangabad, Phandara, Bhir, Chanda, Kolaba and Nanded; 15-20 in Ahmednagar, Akola, Buldana, Dhulia, Nasik, Osmanabad, Patnagiri, Sholapur and Yeotmal; 20-25 in Amravati, Jalgaon, Kolharur, Sangli, Satara, Thana and Wardha and more than 25 in Greater Bombay, Nagpur and Poona. In Greater Bombay the enrolment ratio, however, was 49.3. In the case of boys the enrolment ratio was the lowest in Parbhani (16.2) followed by Chanda (17.5), Aurangabad (19.2) and Bhir (19.6) and the highest enrolment ratio was in Satara (40.2) and Jalgaon (40.3). However, in Greater Bombay the enrolment ratio was 52. In the case of girls, however, the enrolment ratio was very low in many districts. Only in six districts the enrolment ratio was more than 10. The highest enrolment ratio was in Poona (16.9), Nagpur (16.1), with the exception of Greater Bombay where it was 45.6. In Bhir, Nanded Osmanabad and Parbhani the enrolment ratio of girls in these classes was less than 3. The district-wise details are given in Statement XVIII.

ENROLMENT OF SCHEDULED CASTES AND SCHEDULED TRIBES

78. The details of enrolment of SC&ST students in classes IX-XI in 1965-66 are given in Statement XIX. Of the total enrolment in classes IX-XI in 1965-66, 58,157 students belong

to SC&ST communities. Of this number 50,803 were boys and 7,354 were girls. The enrolment of SC&ST students in these classes in the different districts varied very much to a large extent depending on the percentage of the SC&ST population in these districts.

79. The percentage enrolment of SC&ST students to the total enrolment in classes IX-XI in 1965-66 was 9.4 at the State level. The percentage of SC&ST population to the total population in the State was 11.7. The percentage enrolment of SC&ST boys to the total number of boys enrolled was 11.0 and the corresponding percentage for girls was only 4.8. Among the districts the percentage enrolment of SC&ST, taking both boys and girls together, varied from 2.6 in Kolaba to nearly 32 in Bhandara and Chanda.

80. The extent of coverage of SC&ST students in these classes was 80.3 at the State level. Among the boys this was 95.7 and among the girls 14.3. Among the districts, the extent of coverage was more than 100 in Akola, Amravati, Aurangabad, Bhandara, Buldana, Chanda, Nagpur, Ratnagiri, Sangli, Satara, Wardha and Yeotmal; was 75-100 in Greater Bombay, Jalgaon, Nanded, Parbhani and Sholapur; 50-75 in Ahmednagar, Phir, Osmanabad, Kolhapur and Poona and less than 50 in other districts, the lowest being in Thana 12.6, followed by Kolaba (25.2). In districts like Akola, Bhandara, Nagpur and Wardha the representation of SC&ST students in these classes is substantially high as compared to their population. The extent of coverage of boys and girls students separately also follows more or less this pattern. The district-wise position of the extent of coverage of SC&ST students is given below:

TEACHERS:

81. The total number of teachers in high/higher secondary schools in Maharashtra has increased from 33100 in 1960-61 to 55244 in 1965-66. The growth rate of teachers during the period is 10.0% per annum. The increase in the number of teachers during the period is observed in all districts. Taking 1960-61 as base, the number of teachers during the period has increased by more than 100% in Aurangabad, Bhir, Nanded, Osmanabad, Parbhani and Wardha. Even in other districts the increase in the number of teachers is substantial.

82. Women teachers formed 24.6% of the total number of teachers in the State in 1960-61. The composition of women teachers increased to 25.7% by 1965-66. Among the different districts in 1965-66 the percentage of women teachers was highest in Greater Bombay 46.9 followed by Thana 41.5 and Poona 34.7. Among the other districts the percentage of women teachers was more than 20 in Nagpur, Ratnagiri, Nasik and Kolaba; 10-20% in Ahmednagar, Akola, Amravati, Aurangabad, Bhandara, Bhir, Buldana, Chanda, Dhulia, Jalgaon, Kolhapur, Osmanabad, Sangli, Satara, Sholapur, Wardha and Yavatmal and less than 10% in Nanded and Parbhani.

83. The percentage of trained teachers among the teachers in the high/higher secondary schools in the State increased from 63.1 to 71.2 during the period. Among the men teachers the percentage of trained teachers increased from 59.3 to 68.5 and among the women teachers from 74.7 to 79.3. In the various districts in 1965-66 the percentage of men teachers was more than the State average in 13 of 26 districts and was less than the State average in the other 13 districts. The percentage of trained teachers among the men was the lowest in Nanded and highest in Poona. Similarly, among the women teachers the percentage of trained teachers was

was more than the State average only in 5 districts. The percentage of women trained teachers was highest in Greater Bombay (86) and the lowest in Parbhani (31.2). Taking all teachers in high/higher secondary schools into consideration, the percentage of trained teachers was more than the State average in 13 of the 26 districts. The percentage of trained teachers was the highest in Greater Bombay (81.6) and was the lowest in Nanded (41.9).

EXPENDITURE:

84. The total direct expenditure on high/higher secondary schools in the State increased from Rs.963.0 lakhs to Rs.4776.0 lakhs during the period. The increase in the expenditure has grown at a rate of 11.8% per annum at the State level. Among the districts also there has been substantial increase in the direct expenditure during the period. The increase in expenditure was the highest in Aurangabad and Nasik (more than 150%) and was the lowest in Greater Bombay (57%).

85. The per capita expenditure on high/higher secondary schools at the State level was Rs.2.4 in 1960-61 which increased to Rs.4.0 by 1965-66. The per capita expenditure has increased more or less to the same extent in all the districts. In 1965-66 the per capita expenditure on high/higher secondary schools was Rs.11.5 in Greater Bombay. Among the other districts the per capita expenditure was the highest in Nagpur (Rs.6.1) followed by Poona (Rs.5.0) and was the lowest in Chanda and Kolaba (Rs.1.9). The direct expenditure on high/higher secondary schools as a percentage to the total direct expenditure in the State increased from Rs.27.1 to 29.6 during the period. Among the districts also similar increase is visible in all the districts

In 1965-66 the expenditure on high/higher secondary schools formed 36.6 in Thana, 35.3 in Nasik and 35.1 in Wardha. On the other hand in Kolaba the expenditure formed only 21.9% of the total education expenditure.

86. The average directed expenditure per student in high/higher secondary schools in 1965-66 at the State level was Rs.122.3. Among the districts it varies from Rs.123.9 in Greater Bombay followed by Rs.123.9 in Kolaba and was the lowest in Parbhani Rs.21.9. In 14 of the 26 districts the per pupil expenditure was less than 100 and in two districts it was even less than Rs.50 - Parbhani and Wardha.

PUPIL-TEACHER RATIO

87. The pupil teacher ratio in high/higher secondary schools was 26 at the State level in 1965-66. There was a large variation among the various districts. The pupil-teacher ratio however varied from 24 in Bhandara, Kolaba, Kolhapur, Nanded, Ratnagiri, Sangli and Satara to 36 in Osmanabad. The table below summarises the position of direct expenditure on high/higher secondary schools and related information. The detailed information is given in Statement XXI.

X - TEACHER TRAINING INSTITUTIONS

88. In 1960-61 there were in all 267 institutions of teacher training in Maharashtra which increased to 345 by 1965-66. Of the 267 institutions in 1960-61, 175 institutions were of school level, 76 were undergraduate colleges and 16 were postgraduate colleges. In 1965-66 the number of school level institutions decreased to 160 and undergraduate colleges increased to 153 and post graduate ^{Colleges to} 32. The abnormal increase in the undergraduate colleges and the slight decrease in the number of schools is because of reclassification of the institutions which was put into effect from 1964-65. In 1960-61 and 1965-66 there was at least one school level teacher training institution in every district. In 1965-66 there were 13 school level institutions in Greater Bombay, 12 in Nagpur and 11 in Poona and Satara. On the other hand, in Buldana and Parbhani there were only 2 each institution each. The undergraduate colleges existed in all the districts, excepting Bhir, Jalgaon, Kolaba, Nanded and Parbhani. The highest number of undergraduate colleges was in Greater Bombay (32) followed by Sangli (12) and Kolhapur (10). In Chanda there was only one such institution. In 1965-66 at least one postgraduate institution existed in all the districts, excepting Bhir, Buldana, Kolaba, Nanded, Thana and Yeotmal.

ENROLMENT

89. The enrolment in teacher training institutions including teacher training classes attached to other institutions increased from nearly 24000 to 29600 during the period. Of the total enrolment in 1960-61 at the State level, 18700 were in school standard

institutions and nearly 5000 were in college standard institutions. By 1965-66 the enrolment in school standard institutions increased to nearly 21000 and of college standard institutions to nearly 9000. The total enrolment in teacher training institutions including attached classes was the highest in Greater Bombay (nearly 4000) followed by Poona (2158). However, in Nanded and Parbhani the enrolment in these institutions was less than 500.

XI- VOCATIONAL AND TECHNICAL SCHOOLS:

90. The number of vocational and technical schools excluding teacher training schools decreased from 711 to 638 during the period. This small decrease is mainly due to the reclassification of some of the schools as undergraduate colleges from 1964-65. In 1965-66 vocational and technical schools existed in all the districts. In Greater Bombay there were 161 of them followed by Nagpur (73) and Poona (34). However, in Bhir, Buldana, Nanded, Osmanabad, Parbhani and Wardha, the total number of vocational and technical schools of various types was less than 10.

ENROLMENT

91. The total enrolment in vocational and technical schools decreased from 55249 to nearly 21000 during the period. In 1965-66 the highest enrolment in these institutions was in Greater Bombay (5329) followed by Poona (2447) and Nagpur (2126). However, in Akola, Amravati, Bhandara, Bhir, Buldana, Chanda, Dhulia, Kolaba, Nanded, Osmanabad, Parbhani, Ratnagiri, Wardha and Yeotmal, the total enrolment in these institutions was less than 500, the lowest being in Osmanabad where it was only 100.

92. The sex ratio of enrolment in these institutions at the State level was 36 in 1960-61 which increased to 81 by 1965-66. In the various districts also the sex ratio i.e. number of girls enrolled for every 100 boys varied from 433 in Nagpur to zero in Osmanabad.

EXPENDITURE:

93. The total expenditure on vocational and technical schools excluding teacher training schools decreased from Rs.159.6 lakhs to Rs.75.32 lakhs during the period. This decrease in the total expenditure at the State level during the period is also mainly due to the decrease in the number of school level institutions because of reclassification of some of them into under-graduate colleges with effect from 1964-65. There is a lot of variation in the expenditure on these schools in the different districts depending on the number of institutions and enrolment.

XII - HIGHER EDUCATION

Institutions:

94. The total number of higher institutions including Universities, deemed to be Universities and Institutions of National Importance, increased from 265 in 1960-61 to 473 in 1965-66. Of this total number of higher institutions in 1965-66 at the State level, 170 were Arts and Science colleges, 22 Medical Colleges, 13 Engineering Colleges, 185 Teacher Training Colleges of undergraduate and post-graduate level, 54 other professional colleges, 8 colleges for special education, 14 research institutions and 6 Universities, deemed to be Universities and Institutions of National Importance.

Among the districts, there was at least one Arts and Science College in every district. There were 36 colleges in Greater Bombay, 15 in Nagpur and 10 in Amravati. In other districts, excepting Bhir, Kolaba, Parbhani and Thana, there were 3 or more colleges. Medical colleges existed in 9 districts only. In Greater Bombay there were 11 medical colleges, 3 in Poona and 2 in Nagpur. In the other districts there was one college in each. Engineering Colleges existed in 7 districts of which in Greater Bombay there were 5 colleges and in Nagpur 3.

95. Training Colleges of post-graduate or under-graduate level existed in all the districts excepting Bhir, Kolaba and Nanded. There were 37 colleges in Greater Bombay, 13 in Sangli, 12 in Kolhapur and Nagpur and 11 in Poona. Colleges for other professional education existed in 16 out of 26 districts, with 24 in Greater Bombay, 7 in Poona and 5 in Nagpur. In the other districts, the number colleges was 3 or less. Taking all institutions of higher education, the highest number was in Greater Bombay (119), followed by Nagpur (39) and Poona (36). In 8 districts the number of such institutions was less than 10. The details are given in Statement XXIII.

Enrolment:

96. The total enrolment in the institutions of higher education in the State in 1965-66 was 1.93 lakhs. Of this total nearly 1.3 lakhs were in Arts and Science colleges, 9000 in engineering colleges, 8000 in medical colleges and nearly 7500 in teacher training colleges. In other colleges of professional and special education the enrolment was about 30,000.

There is large variation in the total enrolment in institutions of higher education as well as in the different types of institutions among the districts. This mainly depends on the variation in the number of institutions among the districts. The total enrolment in institutions for higher education was the highest in Greater Bombay (70,851) followed by Poona (21,194) and Nagpur (20,314). In Amravati and Aurangabad the total enrolment varied from 7,000 to 9,000. In all the other districts the enrolment in higher education institutions was less than 7,000. The lowest being in Parbhani and Kolaba where the total enrolment was even less than 1000. The details was given in Statement XXIV.

97. Statement YXV gives the enrolment in higher education by stages. The total enrolment in higher education stage in Maharashtra increased from 1.1 lakhs to 1.9 lakhs during the period. The growth rate of enrolment was 10.9% per annum. In 1965-66 of the total enrolment nearly 1.48 lakhs were boys and 45,000 were girls. Among the districts, taking 1960-61 enrolment as 100, the percentage increase during the period was the highest in Bhandara, Thana and Osmanabad. In almost all the districts the enrolment in higher education stage more than doubled during the period, excepting in Greater Bombay, Kolhapur, Nagpur, Nasik, Poona and Sholapur.

98. At the State level, of the total enrolment, 83,223 (43.1%) students were enrolled in Pre-University/Intermediate classes; 19,070 (9.9%) in B.A. Pass or Honours courses; 11,660 (6.0%) in B.Sc. Pass or Honours courses; 5,664 (2.9%) in post-graduate classes; 8,636 (4.5%) in teacher training and 65,030 (33.6%) in other professional and special education courses.

The enrolment among the districts in the different stages of education varied very much depending on the facilities available. In all the stages of education, the highest enrolment, however, was in Greater Bombay, followed by Nagpur and Poona.

99. The sex ratio of enrolment in the higher education stages, at the state level, was 17 girls for every 100 boys in 1960-61 which increased to 31 girls for every 100 boys by 1965-66. Table below summarises the enrolment in 1965-66 in higher education stages as a percentage of the enrolment in 1960-61, along with the sex ratio of enrolment in 1965-66, district-wise.

100. Statement XXV also gives the enrolment in higher education stage as a percentage of the population in the age-group 17-23 (enrolment ratio) at the State level. This enrolment ratio increased from 2.5 to 4.0 during the period. In the case of boys the increase was from 4.0 to 5.8 and in the case of girls from 1.1 to 2.0. Among the districts, in 1965-66, taking both boys and girls together, the enrolment ratio was the highest in Greater Bombay (12.8) followed by Nagpur (11.0), Poona (7.3), Amravati (5.8) and Wardha (4.9). In all the other Districts the enrolment ratio was less than 5. In Kolaba, Parbhani, Ratnagiri and Thana districts it was even less than 1. In the case of girls again the enrolment ratio was the highest in Greater Bombay (11.6) followed by Nagpur (4.7) Poona (3.7) and Amravati (2.0). In all the other districts this enrolment ratio was less than 2. In 18 of the 26 districts it was even less than 1.

Enrolment of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes

101. There were 15234 students of SC&ST communities studying in higher education classes in Maharashtra in 1965-66. This consisted of nearly 14200 boys and around 1000 girls. The total number of SC&ST enrolled in the different districts varied according to their total population and also the facilities available for higher education.

102. The SC&ST students formed 7.9% of the total enrolment in higher education classes at the State level in 1965-66. In the case of boys they formed 9.6% and in the case of girls 2.3. Among the districts taking both boys and girls together, this percentage varied from 33% in Aurangabad followed by 30.4% in Yeotmal to less than 1% in Parbhani.

103. The extent of coverage of SC&ST students in higher education stage was 67.5 at the State level in the case of both boys and girls together. In the case of boys the extent of coverage was 83.5 and in the case of girls only 19.3. Among the districts, taking all students, the extent of coverage was more than 100 in Akola, Amravati, Aurangabad, Bhandara Buldana, Chanda, Nagpur, Satara, Wardha and Yeotmal; was between 50 to 75 in Greater Bombay Jalgaon, Kolaba, Nanded and Sholapur; between 25 to 50 in Ahmednagar, Kolhapur, Osmanabad Poona, Ratnagiri and Sangli and less than 25 in the other districts. In Thana and Parbhani the extent of coverage was even less than 10. In the case of boys and girls separately also the trend is almost the same, only in the case of girls the extent of coverage in many of the districts is less than 50.

Teachers:

104. Statement XXXVII gives the district-wise statistics of teachers in institutions of higher education in Maharashtra. The total number of teachers in these institutions was 6,792 in 1960-61 which increased to 10,672 by 1965-66.

105. Out of the total number in 1960-61, a great majority (5871) were men. In 1965-66 also the same continues, namely, 8807 of the total number were men. The increase in the number of teachers is shared by all the districts during the period. In 1965-66 the highest number of teachers in higher education institutions was in Greater Bombay (4009) followed by Poona (1360) and Nagpur (1191). In all the other districts the number of teachers in these institutions was less than 1000. In 7 of these districts the number of

teachers was 100 or less. At the State level, of the total number of teachers in 1965-66 6,253 (58.6%) were in colleges for general education, 3,693 (34.6%) were in colleges for professional education, 594 (5.6%) in University and research institutions and 132 (1.2%) in colleges for special education.

Expenditure:

106. The total direct expenditure on institutions of higher education, at the State level, increased from Rs.694 lakhs to Rs.1160 lakhs during the period. This has increased at a cumulative rate of growth ^{of} 11.3% per annum. The total direct expenditure on higher education has increased substantially in all the districts. The increase in the expenditure taking 1960-61 as base, was the highest in Thana followed by Bhandara, Kolhapur, Wardha and Ratnagiri districts and was the lowest in Nasik, Aurangabad and Greater Bombay. Of the total direct expenditure in 1965-66, 37.5% was on Arts and Science Colleges, 11.6% on Medical Colleges, 11.2% on Engineering Colleges, 2.9% on Teacher Training Colleges of different levels, 10.4% on other colleges, 5.2 on Boards of Education and 20.5% on University and Research Institutions. The percentage expenditure on different types of institutions of higher education varied between districts substantially.

107. The direct expenditure on higher education institutions as a percentage of the total direct expenditure on education in the State, decreased from 19.5 to 19.3 during the period at the State level. The percentage expenditure on higher education in 1965-66, was the highest in Poona 40.2 followed by Nagpur 38.7, Greater Bombay 28.6, Kolhapur 24.2

and Aurangabad 21.8. Among the other districts in three, namely, Sangli, Akola and Am this percentage was between 10 and 20 and in others it was less than 10.

108. The average direct expenditure per student per annum in 1965-66 was Rs.325.5 Arts and Science Colleges, Rs.1,424.4 in Engineering Colleges; Rs.1,678 in Medical Coll and Ps.641 in Teacher Training Colleges of post-graduates level. The cost per student the different types of institutions of higher education varied substantially among the districts. In the case of Arts and Science Colleges the direct expenditure per student varied from Rs.186.2 in Yeotmal and Ps.191.7 in Akola to Rs.772.6 in Kolaba and Rs.458 in Parbhani. Similarly, in the case of teacher training colleges of post-graduate level the cost per student varied from Ps.1802.4 in Ratnagiri and Rs.1396.1 in Akola to betw Rs.300 & Rs.400 in Bhandara, Amravati, Satara, Sangli and Wardha.

109. The variation in direct expenditure per student mainly varies according to the pupil-teacher ratio. In the case of Arts and Science Colleges, in Kolaba where the direct expenditure per student was the highest, the teacher pupil ratio was only 8 and in Parbhani it was only 13. In the other districts it varied from 16 in Ratnagiri and 18 in Nanded to 28 in Akola.
