## INTRODUCTORY.

In consequence of the separation of Burma from India with effect from lst April 1937, the trade of Bombay with Burma has been included in the foreign trade tables and excluded from the coasting trade tables.

A separate table showing the figures of trade between Bombay and Burma in the more important commodities during each of the five years 1934-35 to 1938-39 has been inserted as an Appendix B.

## PART I.

## General Summary

The recession in trade and business which began in the latter part of 1937-38 continued during the year under review. The tension between the totalitarian and democratic States in the West and the Sino-Japanese conflict in the East helped to undermine confidence which had already received a rude shock towards the end of 1937. The level of prices which had commenced to fall in the latter part of $1937-38$ remained low during the year under report and accentuated the unsatisfactory position by reducing the purchasing power of the country. A noteworthy feature of the year was that although raw cotton, a princpal article of the export trade, registered a rise of over 4 per cent. in quantity, it showed a drop of 5 per cent. in value. The decrease in the total value of exports was the combined result of lower commodity prices and smaller demand for Indian produce even at lower prices. Industrial activity in the country, however, remained remarkably steady, although other countries have shown signs of slackening. In the cotton textile industry in particular, the position was satisfactory, but grave doubts have been expressed as to whether it will continue to be so in view of the additional burdens which that industry, in common with others, will be called upon to bear as the result of some of the new taxes.

The aggregate value of the foreign trade of the Province of Bombay amounted to Rs. 111.31 crores as compared with Rs. $135 \cdot 42$ crores last year, the value of merchandise being Rs. $97 \cdot 15$ crores as against Rs. $114-41$ crores and that of treasure being Rs. $14 \cdot 16$ crores as against Rs. $21 \cdot 01$ crores in the previous year.

Import Trade.-The total value of imports of merchandise on private account into the Province of Bombay amounted to Rs. $60 \cdot 15$ crores, showing a fall of Rs. 13.59 crores or over 18 per cent. from the figure for the last year. The value of imports of treasure (gold and silver) on private account was Rs. $1 \cdot 66$ crores against Rs. $2 \cdot 55$ crores last year. The fall in imports of merchandise was spread over most of the principal articles such as cotton raw, artificial silk, motor vehicles, metals and ores, cotton manufactures, wool manufactures (including yarn and knitting wool), machinery and millwork, dyeing and tauning substances, silk manufactures (including silk yarn), paper and pasteboard, instruments and apparatus, etc., silk raw (including waste) and hardware, the only articles showing noticeable increases being cotton twist and yarn and sugar.

Variations in the more important articles of import have been separately commented upon in Part II. Of the other articles, the following showed noticeable variations. Imports of seeds declined by Rs. 18.42 lakhs due mainly to smaller arrivals of copra or cocoanut kernel from Ceylon. The total value of impoits of apparel dorlined by Rs. $15 \cdot 03$ Lakhs due mainly to increasing manufacture in India of cheaper varieties of apparel such as shirts, blouses,
jumpers, etc. Imports of fruits and vegetables decreased from Rs. 86.44 lakhs to Rs. $70.95^{\circ}$ lakhs due chiefly to smaller arrivals of dates from Muskat and Iraq. Arrivals of almonds from Turkey Asiatic decreased by Rs. $5 \cdot 3$ lakhs but those from Italy increased by Rs. $6 \cdot 39$ lakhs. Imports of glass and glassware recorded a fall of Rs. $14 \cdot 41$ lakhs due to the market being overstocked, and the building boom was not so great as last year. Haberdashery and millinery also showed a fall of Rs. $11 \cdot 88$ lakhs owing to the market being overstocked, diversion to other ports and expansion of the local industry. Imports of tea declined from $2,888,030 \mathrm{lbs}$. to $1,411,692 \mathrm{lbs}$. owing chiefly to smaller arrivals of green tea from China. Arrivals of cotton fents were less by 775,396 lbs. in quantity and by Rs. $7 \cdot 55$ lakhs in value, on account of smaller despatches from the United Kingdom, the United States of America and Japan, while there were no imports of fents of silk, artificial silk and mixtures as against $213,151 \mathrm{lbs}$. last year. The fall of Rs. 6.51 lakhs under leather was chiefly due to smaller arrivals of tanned skins and other manufactured articles and that of Rs. 6.4 lakhs under stationery is attributable partly to heavy stocks and partly to the increasing output and popularity of articles of Indian manufacture. Under grain, pulse and flour, imports of rice, almost entirely from Burma, decreased by Rs. 49.61 lakhs but those of wheat, entirely from the Commonwealth of Australia and Canada, increased by Rs. 46.7 lakhs. Imports of spices increased by Rs. 7.94 lakhs owing to larger arrivals of cloves from Zanzibar and of betelnuts from the Straits Settlements and Ceylon.

Export Trade.-The total value of exports (including re-exports) of merchandise on private account amounted to Rs. $36 \cdot 22$ crores showing a fall of Rs. 3.68 crores or 9 per cent. from the figure for the preceding year. Exports of treasure (gold and silver) also fell from Rs. $18 \cdot 42$ crores to Rs. $12 \cdot 19$ crores, shipments of gold being valued at Rs. 11.92 crores as against Rs. 17.85 crores last year. The fall in exports of merchandise was shared by shipments of both Indian produce and manufacture and foreign merchandise, the articles contributing to the fall in the former being cotton raw, cotton manufactures, hides and skins, metals and ores, leather, manures, oils, tobacco, bristles, and wool raw and manufactures and to that in the latter being chiefly skins raw, other textile manufactues, metals and ores, spices, vehicles and silk manufactures.

The more important articles of exports of Indian produce and manufacture and of re-exports of foreign merchandise have been separately dealt with in Part II. As regards the other articles, the following deserve comments. Exports of postal articles further declined from Rs. 2.02 crores to Rs. 1.83 crores due chiefly to smaller exports to the United Kingdom, France and Aden and Dependencies. Shipments of manganese ore fell from 118, 410 tons to 51,725 tons in quantity and from Rs. $29 \cdot 80$ lakhs to Rs. 11.54 lakhs in value. The decline in exports is due to an excess in the world's available production of manganese ore and the inability of Indian exporters to compete with exporters from other countries such as Russia, Gold Coast, etc., who are able to place larger quantities of ore on the European markets at lower prices. Shipments of leather also fell from Rs. $35 \cdot 83$ lakhs to Rs. $25 \cdot 21$ lakhs mainly as the result of smaller demand from the United Kingdom for leather unwrought and skins tanned or dressed, while the decrease of from Rs. $19 \cdot 22$ lakhs to Rs. $13 \cdot 83$ lakhs in the exports of wool manufactures is chiefly attributable to reduced
takings of carpets and rugs by the United Kingdom. The decrease of Rs. 7-83 lakhs in the exports of tobacco was entirely due to reduced demand for unmanufactured tobacco from Aden and Dependencies and that of Rs. 7-22 lakhs in the shipments of bristles represented smaller despatches to the United Kingdom. Exports of fruits and vegetables on the other hand increased from Rs. $22 \cdot 7$ lakhs to Rs. 29.77 lakhs chiefly on account of larger shipments of onions to Burma, Straits Settlements and Ceylon and those of cotton manfactures from Rs. 9.95 lakhs to Rs. 16.2 lakhs mainly owing to better demand for other sorts of manufactures from the Straits Settlements. Exports of myrabolans also improved from $512,777 \mathrm{cwt}$. to $715,499 \mathrm{cwt}$. in quantity and from Rs. 19 lakhs to Rs. $25 \cdot 42$ lakhs as a result of increased demand from the United States of America, the United Kingdom and France. Under spices, exports of ginger increased but those of cardamoms decreased.

Coasting Trade.-The total value of the private coasting trade excluding treasure of the Province further declined from Rs. $42 \cdot 76$ crores to Rs. $41 \cdot 12$ crores or by about 4 per cent. both imports and exports sharing in the fall. Imports decreased from Rs. $18 \cdot 16$ crores to Rs. $17 \cdot 34$ crores owing mainly to the reduced arrivals of cotton raw. Imports of seeds also decreased fromRs. 1.09 crores to Rs. 78 lakhs. Noticeable increases were recorded in the imports of coal, coke and patent fuel ( + Rs. 22.87 lakhs), wheat ( + Rs. 21.59 lakhs) and spices ( + Rs. 17.92 lakhs). The export trade decreased from Rs. $24 \cdot 6$ crores to Rs. $23 \cdot 78$ crores owing mainly to the reduced shipments of foreign merchandise.

Prices.-The average prices of most of the important commodities of import and export were lower than those during last year excepting those of iron and steel, woollen piecegoods and silk piecegoods in the case of imports and of cotton seed and cotton coloured piecegoods in the case of exports.

Distribution.-Of the total foreign trade in merchandise, the proportion of the trade with the British Empire amounted to $49 \cdot 41$ per cent. The share of the United Kingdom, however, increased from $24 \cdot 18$ per cent. to $25 \cdot 09$ per cent. The shares of Japan and the United States of America declined from 19.7 per cent. to $17 \cdot 6$ per cent. and from $7 \cdot 22$ per cent. to $5 \cdot 23$ per cent. respectively, but that of Germany improved from 7•07 per cent. to $7 \cdot 08$ per cent.

Subordinate Ports.-There are 74 subordinate Customs ports in the Province and for administrative purposes they are grouped under 28 talukas, which are again grouped under 6 Ranges (vide Appendix A).

Trade at the subordinate ports with foreign countries is negligible and is restricted mainly to dried fruits such as cashewnuts, cashew kernels, dates, rice and cotton raw. Foreign private imports were valued at Rs. $34 \cdot 1$ lakhs
 lakhs last year, the decrease in imports being mainly due to smaller arrivals of rice from Burma and of cashewnuts from Portuguese East Africa. The increase in exports is attributable to larger shipments of cashew kernels to the United States of Amercia and of cotton raw to China.

The coasting trade mainly represents the movements of Indian produce and manufacture from the subordinate ports to and from ports in other provinces as also between themselves. The total value of this trade increased from

Rs. $5 \cdot 74$ crores to Rs. 5.92 crores, imports falling from Rs. $2 \cdot 93$ crores to Rs. 2.91 crores, but exports rising from Rs. $2 \cdot 81$ crores to Rs. $3 \cdot 01$ crores.

Miscellaneous.-(a) Shipping.-The total number of vessels which entered inwards was 710 of $3,439,207$ tons as against 733 of $3,380,914$ tons, and of those which cleared outwards was 632 of $3,190,651$ tons as against 667 of $3,234,258$ tons last year. The tonnage of steam vessels of British, Japanese and American nationalities decreased, while the tonnage of steam vessels of Italian, Norwegian, German, Greek, Danish and other Nationalities increased. There was no change in the tonnage of steam vessels of French Nationality.

British Empire.--Imports fell by Rs. 3.66 crores over the figures of last year. Exports were greater by Rs. $12 \cdot 45$ lakhs but re-exports were less by Rs. $1 \cdot 68$ crores. Exports (including re-exports), however, decreased from Re. 18.85 crores to Rs. 17.30 crores.

United Kingdom.-There was a fall in imports from Rs. $17 \cdot 10$ crores to Rs. $14 \cdot 31$ crores. The chief articles which contributed to the fall were cotton piecegoods (excluding fents) (-Rs. $47 \cdot 04$ lakhs), cotton spinning machinery (-Rs. $33 \cdot 68$ lakhs), motor omnibuses-chassis (-Rs. $26 \cdot 18$ lakhs), wool manufactures (-Rs. $24 \cdot 67$ lakhs), sugar machinery (-Rs. $19 \cdot 60$ lakhs), iron and steel (-Rs. $11 \cdot 84$ lakhs) and rubber manufactures ( - Rs. $11 \cdot 11$ lakhs). Exports (including re-exports) were less by Rs. 49.74 lakhs. The fall was mainly due to reduced shipments of hides and skins-raw (-Rs. 1.49 crores). There was an increase in shipments of seeds ( + Rs. $104 \cdot 89$ lakhs), cotton raw ( + Rs. $22 \cdot 25$ lakhs) and groundnut cake ( + Rs. $12 \cdot 60$ lakhs).

British Possessions.-Imports declined from Rs. 16.88 crores to Rs. 16.01 crores, and exports from Rs. 8.48 crores to Rs. $7 \cdot 43$ crores. There were less imports from Burma of rice not in the husk (-Rs. $49 \cdot 60$ lakhs) and kerosene (-Rs. $47 \cdot 35$ lakhs), while imports of wood and timber and petroleum showed an increase of Rs. $17 \cdot 31$ lakhs and Rs. 11.75 lakhs respectively. Kerosene and petroleum from Barhein Islands showed an increase of Rs. 11:39 lakhs and Rs. $9 \cdot 19$ lakhs respectively. Imports of cotton raw were more from Kenya Colony by Rs. $35 \cdot 37$ lakhs while those from Anglo-Egyptian Sudan and Tanganyika territory were less by Rs. $76 \cdot 56$ lakhs and Rs. $34 \cdot 39$ lakhs respectively. Imports of copra and kernel from Ceylon declined by Rs. 16.46 lakhs and of tallow from Australia by Rs. $13 \cdot 44$ lakhs. Wheat from Australia improved by Rs. 42.75 lakhs. Exports of cotton piecegoods to Burma, Bahrein Islands, Straits Settlements and Ceylon, and of linseed to Australia showed decreases, while those of twist and yarn to Burma, Hongkong and Straits Settlements showed an increase.

Foreign Countries.-Imports declined from Rs. 39.76 crores to Rs. 29.84 crores and exports (including re-exports) from Rs. 21.05 crores to Rs. $18 \cdot 92$ crores.

Europe.-Imports from all the Continental countries except Italy declined, those from Union of Socialist Soviet Republic (Russia) showed a marked decline from Rs. $39 \cdot 75$ lakhs to Rs. $7 \cdot 10$ lakhs. There were no imports of kerosene as against worth Rs. $38 \cdot 11$ lakhs during last year. Exports to all the Continental countries except France, the Netherlands, Sweden and Norway also showed decline. The principal articles which contributed to the fall in imports were dyeing and tanning substances, copper and motor cars from Germany, iron and steel from Belgium and paper and pasteboard from Sweden. There was an increase in the imports of artificial silk yarn from Italy. Exports of cotton raw to Germany, Belgium and Italy, of seeds to France and Italy, of manganese ore to Belgium declined while those of cotton raw to France, seeds to Germany and the Netherlands showed an increase.

Asia.-Imports as well as exports (including re-exports) declined, the former by Rs. $4 \cdot 25$ crores and the latter by Rs. $43 \cdot 05$ lakhs. Imports from Japan of artificial silk piecegoods. goods of artificial silk mixed with other
materials, artificial silk yarn, cotton piecegoods-coloured, silk piecegoods, goods of silk mixed, silk raw, silk yarn, woollen piecegoods, apparel, textile machinery other sorts, and haberdashery showed decline while those of cotton piecegoods, grey showed an improvement. The total imports from China showed an increase of Rs. 40.08 lakhs, chief imports were that of cotton twist and yarn ( + Rs. $33 \cdot 30$ lakhs). Imports of kerosene from Persia were more by Rs. $29 \cdot 65$ lakhs. Exports of cotton raw, iron and steel, old for remanufacture to Japan were less; those of cotton raw to China were more.

Africa.-Both imports and exports declined chiefly due to less imports from Egypt of cotton raw and smaller exports of cotton piecegoods-grey and coloured-to the same country.

America.-Imports as well as exports were less. Imports were nearly half of those for the previous year, due mainly to smaller arrivals of cotton raw, motor omnibuses, motor vans and lorries and motor cars. The fall in exports was mainly due to smaller shipments of raw hides and skins and of seeds.

Cotton raw.-Imports during 1937-38 were abnormal and so there was surplus stock causing decline in imports during the year under report, by about 29 per cent. both in quantity and value. The figures were, however, higher than those in the three years 1934-35 to 1936-37. Imports from all supplying countries except Kenya Colony showed decreases, those from the United States of America being 4,460 tons valued at Rs. $36 \cdot 51$ lakhs as against 28,987 tons valued at Rs. $2 \cdot 19$ crores last year. Imports from Kenya Colony, increased from 46,138 tons to 52,052 tons in quantity and from Rs. $4 \cdot 08$ crores to Rs. 4.43 crores in value.

Cotton twist and yarn.-The imports recorded an increase of nearly $8 \frac{3}{4}$ million lbs. in quantity and of Rs. $33 \cdot 52$ lakhs in value over that of the preceding year, due partly to better demand from the Indian textile mills which were working double shifts and partly to lower replacing costs of the Chinese yarn. Imports from China amounted to over 5 million lbs. valued at Rs. $34 \cdot 66$ lakhs as against $157,200 \mathrm{lbs}$. valued at Rs. $1 \cdot 36$ lakhs only. Supplies from - Japan also increased from $9 \frac{1}{2}$ million lbs. to over $13 \frac{1}{2}$ million lbs. but those from the United Kingdom decreased from 974,022 lbs. to $606,440 \mathrm{lbs}$. Imports of yarn of lower counts were negligible.

Cotton piecegoods.-The total imports of cotton piecegoods further declined by nearly $9 \frac{1}{2}$ million yards or 4.6 per cent. in quantity and by Rs. $84 \cdot 64$ lakhs or nearly 21 per cent. in value, as compared with the figures for the preceding year. Grey goods improved owing to lower prices in Japan but white and coloured goods declined, due partly to the local products being offered at attractive prices, especially whites, and partly to higher replacing costs in the United Kingdom and Japan. The total imports of cotton piecegoods from Japan increased by nearly $4 \frac{1}{2}$ million yards in quantity but dropped by Rs. 30.49 lakhs in value. The increase in quantity was due to increased supplies of grey and white cloths, facilitated by the cheaper prices at which these qualities were found obtainable. The drop in the total value was due principally to a reduction in the imports of coloured piecegoods. A prohibitive price level in the previous year in the overseas Export market combined with a relatively easier market in India in indigenous products was mainly responsible for this reduction. Imports from the United Kingdom decreased by over 13 million yards in quantity and by Rs. 47 -05 lakhs in value. Imports of grey goods from Japan, chiefly longcloths and shirtings, increased from $48 \frac{1}{2}$ million yards to nearly 71 million yards but those from the United Kingdom decreased from over 4 million yards to nearly $2 \frac{1}{2}$ million yards due chiefly to smaller supplies of jaconets including madapollams, etc. Imports of white goods from Japan also increased by $\frac{1}{2}$ million yards but those from the United Kingdom decreased by nearly 21 million yards. Imports of coloured goods both from Japan and the United Kingdom fell by nearly $18 \frac{1}{2}$ million yards and over $9 \frac{1}{4}$ million yards respectively. The decrease of Rs. 16.91 lakbs in the imports of other cotton manufactures was mainly due to smaller arrivals of other manufactures, hosiery, blankets, thread and lace and net.

The total value of the imports of machinery and millwork fell by Rs. 63.5 lakhs or by nearly 12 per cent. during the year under report. This decline is attributed partly to the growing manufacture in India of certain types of machinery as, e.g., looms, bobbins, pumping machines etc., and partly to heavy arrivals of reconditioned machinery of a lower value. Imports of textile machinery decreased from Rs. $2 \cdot 13$ crores to Rs. 1.88 crores, cotton spinning machinery decreased from Rs. $98 \cdot 77$ lakhs to Rs. $67 \cdot 59$ lakhs due entirely to a a decline in imports from the United Kingdom; cotton textile machinery, other sorts increased from Rs. 18.75 lakhs to Rs. 31.94 lakhs, but imports of other textile machinery, other sorts, recorded a fall. The total imports of machinery and millwork from the United Kingdom decreased from Rs. 3.4 crores to Rs. $2 \cdot 77$ crores, and those from Japan from Rs. 32.07 lakhs to Rs: 22.02 lakhs, but those from Germany increased f om Rs. 67.89 lakhs to Rs. $85 \cdot 48$ lakhs.

The total value of imports of metals and ores improved by about 51 per cent. during the year 1937-38 due to large arrivals of iron and steel, copper, aluminium, lead and tin. Larger imports under iron and steel were due to anticipations of war prevailing during that year owing to the disturbed and uncertain European situation. During the year under report the total value of imports under metals and ores recorded a fall of Rs. $1 \cdot 07$ crores or 27 per cent. The fall was due to smaller arrivals of iron and steel, copper, aluminium, tin and lead. The fall was partly due to the heavy imports in the previous year and partly to the progress in the domestic iron and steel industry. All items under the head iron and steel contributed to the fall under that head, the more noticeable being bars other than cast steel and corrugated galvanised sheets and plates. The fall under bars was due to smaller despatches from Belgium, Luxemburg, France and the United Kingdom and that under corrugated galvanised sheets and plates to reduced supplies from the United Kingdom and Belgium. Smaller arrivals from the principal supplying countries except Belgium were responsible for the fall in the imports of nails, rivets and washers. The shares of all principal supplying countries except Japan and the United States of America in the total imports of iron and steel declined, that of the United Kingdom from 36,819 tons valued at Rs. $90 \cdot 22$ lakhs to 29,812 tons valued at Rs. $78 \cdot 38$ lakhs, of Belgium from 22,034 tons valued at Rs. $41 \cdot 68$ lakhs to 10,808 tons valued at Rs. $22 \cdot 6$ lakhs, of Luxemburg from 7,142 tons valued at Rs. $11 \cdot 95$ lakhs to 1,489 tons valued at Rs. 2.84 lakhs, of France from 7,330 tons valued at Rs. 10.87 lakhs to 3,008 tons valued at Rs. $5 \cdot 37$ lakhs and that of Germany from 13,437 tons valued at Rs. 28.09 lakhs to 9,815 tons valued at Rs. $24 \cdot 93$ lakhs. The share of Japan, though it improved from 6,704 tons to 7,116 tons in quantity declined from Rs. $18 \cdot 18$ lakhs to Rs. $17 \cdot 07$ lakhs in value, but that of the United States of America increased from 1,799 tons to 2,050 tons in quantity and from Rs. $5 \cdot 22$ lakhs to Rs. $5 \cdot 82$ lakhs in value. The fall in the imports of copper during the year under report is noticeable as compared to the imports of last year. It may be noted, however, that the imports during last year were abnormal due to heavy speculation and reckless indenting on account of the tendency of the prices to rise owing to the demand from the United Kingdom and the other European countries for the metal for armaments. The fall was almost entirely due to smaller arrivals of sheets from the United Kingdom and Germany, imports from the former being $1,701 \mathrm{cwt}$. valued at Rs. 69 lakh as against $63,184 \mathrm{cwt}$. valued at Rs. 27.99 lakhs and from the latter $4,052 \mathrm{cwt}$. valued at Rs. 1.56 lakhs against $55,264 \mathrm{cwt}$; valued at Rs. $23 \cdot 08$ lakhs last year. Smaller supplies of aluminium circles from Japan, the United Kingdom and Germany were mainly responsible for the decrease in imports of aluminium while the decreases under tin and lead are accounted for by less imports from the Straits Settlements and Burma respectively. The increase in the imports of brass is attributable to more arrivals of mixed or yellow metal for sheathing from Germany and the United Kingdom, imports from Japan being only 600 $\mathbf{c w t}$. as against $12,549 \mathrm{cwt}$. last year. Imports of zinc or spelter from the United Kingdom, Poland and Germany increased but those from Belgium decreased.

The total imports under this head showed a fall of Rs. $1 \cdot 17$ crores or about 31 per cent. from the figures for the last year. Encouraged by the trade of $1936-37$ and the first half of $1937-38$, the manufacturers anticipated increased demand for 1938-39, but these hopes were not fulfilled. Depression set in earlier than expected and sales began to decline with consequent decrease in imports. Fall in imports of motor cars was due chiefly to smaller shipments from the United States of America which sent 2,286 cars valued at Rs. $43 \cdot 65$ lakhs as against 3,327 cars valued at Rs. $60 \cdot 44$ lakhs last year and from Germany, which sent 723 cars valued at Rs. $12 \cdot 47$ lakhs as against 1,463 cars valued at Rs. $25 \cdot 01$ lakhs last year. Imports from Canada also decreased from 862 to 554 in number and from Rs. $14 \cdot 79$ lakhs to Rs. $10 \cdot 24$ lakhs in value and those from the United Kingdom from 2,444 to 2,178 in number and from Rs. $52 \cdot 12$ lakhs to Rs. $44 \cdot 19$ lakhs in value. The fall in motor omnibuses was mainly due to smaller arrivals of chassis from the United States of America and the United Kingdom, imports from the former being 4,185 valued at Rs. $52 \cdot 12$ lakhs against 8,332 valued at Rs. $91 \cdot 8$ lakhs and from the latter 422 valued at Rs. $14 \cdot 25$ lakhs as against 2,162 valued at Rs. $41 \cdot 92$ lakhs last year. The decrease in imports of parts of mechanically propelled vehicles was almost entirely due to smaller arrivals from the United States of America. Imports of motor cycles from Germany, however, increased from 355 to 536 in number and from Rs. $\cdot 83$ lakh to Rs. 1.37 lakhs in value.

The total imports of silk piecegoods and goods of silk mixed with other materials declined by more than 23 per cent. in quantity and 21 per cent. in value and those of artificial silk piecedgoods by nearly 70 per cent. in quantity and by 57 per cent. in value as compared with the figures for the previous year. The fall in the imports of the former is attributable to the following causes, viz., (a) heary stocks were carried forward from the previous year and demand was comparatively poor, (b) during the latter part of 1937-38 export prices in Japan increased steadily with the result that buyers were cautious, and (c) increased demand for locally made products. The fall in imports of artificial silk piecegoods was due to the increasing keen competition by the local industry and to a continuous increase in prices in Japan. Imports of artificial silk tafettas and shioze have practically stopped.

The total value of imports under this head fell by over 17 per cent. In anticipation of a European war, stocks of dyes, particularly of the cheaper varieties, were imported in $1937-38$ in excess of actual requirements with the result that, during the year under review, there was considerable decrease in the imports of alizarine, congo red, metanil yellow, sulphur black and others. The small increase in the imports of Vat dyes chiefly from Switzerland and the United Kingdom was due to depleted stocks and increasing demand for them on account of ability to withstand light and bleaching. The total value of the imports of dyeing and tanning substances from Germany was Rs. 1.28 crores as against Rs. 1.75 crores and that of the imports from Switzerland Rs. $28 \cdot 5$ lakhs against Rs. $18 \cdot 75$ lakhs last year. Imports of congo red from Germany declined from $838,839 \mathrm{lbs}$. to $67,734 \mathrm{lbs}$. while there were no imports from Japan as against $65,048 \mathrm{lbs}$. last year. The decrease in the imports of saffron is attributable to the civil war in Spain which is the largest supplier and to the arrival in the Indian market by the land route of saffron of Persian origin.

Although the total imports of kerosene recorded a fall of over $4 \frac{1}{2}$ million gallons in quantity and of Rs. $18 \cdot 67$ lakhs in value as compared with the figures for the previous year, imports during the year were still higher than in any of the years 1934-35 to 1936-37. Imports of kerosene in bulk from Iran, the Bubrein Islands, and the United States of America recorded noticeable increases, while Rumania, Borneo (Dutch) and British Borneo sent nearly $\frac{1}{2}$ million, $6 \frac{1}{2}$ million and 6 million gallons respectively against nil last year. Imports from Burma, however, decreased from over $29 \frac{1}{4}$ million gallons to less than 16 million gallons, while there were no imports from Sumatra as against over $5 \frac{1}{4}$ million gallons last year. The total imports of petrol decreased from 283 million gallons to over 27 million gallons in quantity but increased from Rs. $86 \cdot 18$ lakhs to Rs. $101 \cdot 08$ lakhs in value. Imports from the Bahrein Islands and Burma increased from over $\frac{3}{4}$ million gallons to nearly $3 \frac{1}{2}$ million gallons and from over $11 \frac{1}{2}$ million gallons to 124 million gallons respectively but those from Iran decreased from over $14 \frac{3}{4}$ million gallons to $11 \frac{1}{2}$ million gallons while there were no imports from Rumania as against $1 \ddagger$ million gallons last year. Imports of lubricating oils from the United States of America declined from nearly 3 million gallons to $2 \frac{1}{2}$ million gallons but those from Burma amounted to over $1 \frac{3}{4}$ million gallons valued at Rs. $18 \cdot 84$ lakhs as against nil last year.
13. INSTRUMENTS AND APPARATUS.


The fall of Rs. $32 \cdot 7$ lakhs under this head from the figure for the previous year was distributed amongst the sub-heads except optical and other kinds. The decrease in imports of electrical instruments and apparatus was due mainly to an overstocked market. The reduction in imports of photographic instruments and apparatus was the result of smaller shipments from the United States of America. Imports of wireless apparatus from the Netherlands which were valued at Rs. $2 \cdot 06$ lakhs as against Rs. $7 \cdot 43$ lakhs during 1937-38 were less by Rs. $5 \cdot 37$ lakhs.

The number of parcels assessed increased from 163,907 to 182,251 and that of letter mail packets decreased from 34,712 to 28,564 . The specified articles are (1) jewellery, (2) precious stones, (3) cinematograph films, (4) gold and silver thread, (5) cigarettes, and (6) watches. Figures of imports of these articles by post are included under the relative trade heads.

Precious stones and pearls, unset.-The total value of imports of precious stones which in 1937-38 had risen to 48 per cent. over that for the year 1936-37 fell from Rs. 99.17 lakhs to Rs. 93.73 lakhs, out of which Rs. 83.36 lakhs represented the value of diamonds shipped almost entirely from Belgium. The fall in value was due to uncertainty of the European situation from about September 1938 and the consequent tendency to restrict imports to immediate requirements. Imparts of diamonds from Belgium were less by Rs. $5 \cdot 28$ lakhs and those from the Straits Settlements by Rs. 4.06 lakhs but those from the Netherlands were more by Rs. 1.72 lakhs. Imports of pearls amounted to Rs. 6.6 lakhs as against Rs. 8.78 lakhs last year. Imports from the Bahrein Islands were less by Rs. 1.91 lachs.

Prices of paper advanced in the year 1937-38 due to abnormal demand on account of unsettled political conditions in European and heavy speculative buying of raw materials for manufacturing paper. This buying had its repercussion in India during 1937-38. Stocks were heavily ordered and laid in. Two new paper mills were started during the year 1938 and the older mills also took steps to increase their efficiency by installing new and upto date machinery and also by extending the range of production. The cumulative effect on the imports during $1938-39$ was a decline by 283,973 cwt. in quantity and by Rs. $36 \cdot 1$ lakhs in value. This decline was chiefly due to smaller imports of printing paper from Germany, Austria, Japan, the United Kingdom and C zechoslovakia and of packing and wrapping paper from Sweden and Germany. Supplies of this paper from Sweden were $58,818 \mathrm{cwt}$. valued at Rs. 8.46 lakhs as against 120,685 cwt. valued at Rs. $17 \cdot 67$ lakhs last year.

## 16. HARDWARE.



The increase in the total value of imports of Hardware during 1937-38 was the result of the high level of the prices of base metals from December 1936 to the end of 1937. A reaction was natural and caused a drop in prices which was reflected in the reduced total value during the rear under review. Imports from all the principal supplying countries showed a decline. All items recorded a decrease except builders' hardware which increased from Rs. $8 \cdot 6$ lakbs to Rs. 11.76 lakhs due chiefly to larger supplies from Germany. The share of the United Kingdom in the total imports under hardware fell from Rs. $34 \cdot 9$ lakhs to Rs. 31.43 lakhs, of Germany from Rs. 33.54 lakhs to Rs. $94 \cdot 33$ lahbs and that of Japan from Rs. $9 \cdot 67$ lakhe to Rs. $5 \cdot 37$ lakhs.

The improvement under this head noticed last year was not maintained. Owing to cheap rates and keen competition of Japanese hoisery and woollen piecegoods demand for foreign wool fell off. As regards woollen manufactures, there were heavy imports during the last year and stocks remained unsold for want of satisfactory demand. Imports of raw wool from the United Kingdom were slightly better in quantity but lower in value while those from other supplying countries were smaller both in quantity and value. Imports of knitting wool from Japan increased from $280,137 \mathrm{lbs}$. to $419,823 \mathrm{lbs}$. in quantity and from Rs. $6 \cdot 25$ lakhs to Rs. $7 \cdot 85$ lakhs in value. Imports of woollen and worsted piecegoods from Japan decreased from 2,642,573 yards valued at Rs. $33 \cdot 5$ lakhs to 662,662 yards valued at Rs. 6.82 lakhs and those from the United Kingdom from 947,316 yards valued at Rs. $23 \cdot 95$ lakhs to 518,318 yards valued at Rs. $13 \cdot 1$ lakhs. Arrivals of goods of wool mixed with other materials from the United Kingdom also fell from 1,523,166 yards to 792.608 yards in quantity and from Rs. 21.93 lakhs to Rs. $12 \cdot 38$ lakhs in value and those from Japan from 459,046 yards to 143,543 yards in quantity and from Rs. $5 \cdot 42$ lakhs to Rs. 1.87 lakhs in value. Imports irom Italy, however, improved from 78,546 yards to 120,650 yards in quantity and from Rs. $1 \cdot 2$ lakhs to Rs. $1 \cdot 71$ lakhs in value. The fall under blankets and rugs was due to smaller arrivals from Italy and Japan and that under shawls and lohis to less imports from Germany. Imports under other sorts from the United Kingdom decreased but those from Italy and Poland increased.
18. DRUGS, MEDICINES AND CHEMICALS.


[^4]The total imports under this head showed a decrease of Rs. $\mathbf{1 2 \cdot 7 5}$ lakhs or over 6 per cent. only, which is attributable partly to the general recession in trade and partly to reduction in prices of chemical and chemical preparations necessitated by competition by Italy and Germany. The decrease of Rs. 4•64 lakhs under "Drugs and Medicines" is chiefly accounted for by smaller supplies of proprietary and patent medicines from Germany and the United Kingdom. Supplies of "other sorts" from these countries, however, showed increases. The decrease of Rs. 8. 11 lakhs under "Chemicals and chemical preparations" was chiefly due to smaller imports of sodium compounds from Germany and the United Kingdom and of "other sorts of chemicals" from Germanv.
19. SUGAR.


The failure of the sugarcane crop and the consequent rise in the price of sugar manufactured in India, which approximated to the level of Java sugar account for the rise in imports which were more marked at the close of the year. Imports from Java amounted to 8,006 tons valued at Rs. $9 \cdot 58$ lakhs as against 197 tons valued at Rs. 28 lakh in the preceding year. Imports of beet sugar also amounted to 2,150 tons valued at Rs. $2 \cdot 74$ lakhs against 736 tons valued at Rs. 81 lakh, supplies from the Netherlands being more by 564 tons in quantity and by Rs. 8 lakh in value. The United Kingdom also sent 850 tons of the value of Rs. $1 \cdot 13$ lakhs against nit last year. Increased imports are anticipated during the coming year.
20. LIQUORS.


The decrease of 132,412 gallons and of Rs. $8 \cdot 89$ lakhs in the total imports under this head was spread over all the items. It was due to the general deterioration in the economic condition of the people, more intensive propaganda against the drink evil and the uncertainty in the trade on account of the declared intention of the Provincial Government to eradicate the drink evil. Imports of bottled beer from the United Kingdom and Japan decreased by 39,537 gallons and 26,988 gallons respectively but those from the Netherlands increased by 13,868 gallons. The fall in imports of Brandy was due to smaller imports from France, Germany and the United Kingdom and that in Gin and Whisky to smaller arrivals mainly from the United Kingdom. Less receipts of Still Red Wines from Spain, of Sherry, Madeira and Marsala and Port from the United Kingdom account for the decrease in wines. A considerable fall in the imports of Wines and Spirits is anticipated during 1939-40 as the result of the decision of the Government of Bombay to introduce prohibition in the island and suburbs of Bombay.

The decrease of Rs. $18 \cdot 81$ lakhs in the value of the imports under this head was mainly due to the increased manufacture in India of tyres-both motor car and cycle-and of a number of other articles of rubber. Heavy stocks imported last year due to war scare also contributed to the decrease. The decrease in number, viz., 25,843 and of Rs. $13 \cdot 45$ lakhs in value in the imports of motor covers is attributable to smaller arrivals from the United Kingdom and the United States of America. It is believed that a large factory for the manufacture of rubber tyres and tubes will be set up shortly in Bombay and so a further fall in the imports under this head may be anticipated.

## D.-FOREIGN TRADE-EXPORTS.

Re-exports of foreign merchandise which had been successively increasing for the last four years declined during the year under report from Rs. $6 \cdot 58$ crores to Rs. $4 \cdot 62$ crores, i.e., by nearly 30 per cent. The fall as against the figures of $1936-37$ was however only 5 per cent. Hides and skins -raw, other textiles manufactured, metals and ores, spices, vehicles, fruits and vegetables and silk manufactures were the principal articles contributing to the decline. Re-exports of cotton raw and cotton twist and yarn, however, showed small increases. Re-exports of hides and skins-raw consisting chiefly of Persian raw skins decreased from 353 tons to 211 tons in quantity and from Rs. $3 \cdot 64$ crores to Rs. $2 \cdot 18$ crores in value due almost entirely to smaller shipments to the United Kingdom. Re-exports of other textiles manufactured (mainly artificial silk goods) decreased chiefly on account of less demand from most of the consuming centres, except Ceylon and Iraq and those of metals and ores owing entirely to smaller shipments of iron or steel old for remanufacture to Japan. The decrease in the re-exports of spices was chiefly due to smaller shipments of other sorts of spices to most of the principal buying countries, while that under vehicles is attributable to smaller demand for other kinds (which includes motor cars, trucks and chassis, etc.) chiefly from Burma and Ceylon. The fall in the re-exports of fruits and vegetables is attributable mainly to reduced demand for other sorts from the United States of America. The increase under cotton raw was due to larger re-exports to the United Kingdom and China and that under cotton twist and yarn to larger shipments to Burma.

[^5]The total exports of cotton raw increased by 11,373 tons or over 4 per cent. in quantity but decreased by Rs. $71 \cdot 6$ lakhs or 5 per cent. in value as compared with the figures for the last year. The decrease in value was due to the comparative cheapness in prices of Indian cotton. Shipments to Japan increased from 162,024 tons to 169,010 tons in quantity and from Rs. $9 \cdot 49$ crores to Rs. $9 \cdot 15$ crores in value, and those to the United Kingdom from 9,829 tons to 14,146 tons in quantity and from Rs. $55 \cdot 71$ lakhs to Rs. $72 \cdot 77$ lakhs in value. France and China also took 16,798 tons valued at Rs. $82 \cdot 07$ lakhs as against 7,155 tons valued at Rs. 39,62 lakhs and 13,372 tons valued at Rs. $65 \cdot 69$ lakhs against 9,124 tons valued at Rs. $51 \cdot 47$ lakhs respectively last year. On the other hand, exports to other Continental countries and America except Spain decreased.

[^6]The exports of Indian cotton twist and yarn totalled up to nearly $27 \frac{1}{8}$ million lbs. in quantity and to Rs. $1 \cdot 34$ crores in value. The corresponding figures last year were 28 million lbs. and Rs. $1 \cdot 36$ crores. There was an improved demand for this commodity from Burma, Hongkong, the Straits Settlements and the Phillipines, but Turkey, European and Asiatic, showed less interest than last year.

The total exports under this head fell by 55 million yards or 31 per cent. in quantity and by Rs. $1 \cdot 4$ crores or over 33 per cent. in value, grey goods contributing 20 million yards and coloured goods about $30 \frac{1}{2}$ million yards towards the fall. This fall was partly due to smaller shipments to the principal places of export, viz. Iran and Egypt on account of the restrictions and heavy duties levied by the Iranian and Egyptian Governments and partly to the financial difficulties and political troubles abroad. Exports of grey goods to Egypt declined from over $14 \frac{3}{4}$ million yards to nearly $1 \frac{1}{2}$ million yards and those to Burma from 46 million yards to 42 million yards. Shipments to Nigeria, Tanganyika Territory and Portuguese East Africa also fell by over $1 \frac{3}{4}$ million yards, over $\frac{3}{4}$ million yards and over $\frac{1}{2}$ million yards respectively but those to Straits Settlements and Mauritius and Dependencies rose by nearly 1 million yards and by over $\frac{1}{2}$ million yards respectively. Shipments of coloured goods to Iran decreased from over $6 \frac{3}{4}$ million yards to $1 \frac{1}{2}$ million yards and those to Egypt from over 43 million yards to 59,540 yards only. Exports to Burma also fell from over $21 \frac{1}{4}$ million yards to over $16 \frac{1}{2}$ million yards. Most of the principal Persian Gulf and African ports also reduced their takings while the United States of America took over 2 million yards as against $1 \frac{1}{4}$ million yards last year.

Linseed.-As the result of higher prices of the Argentine product and depleted stocks of linseed oil on the Continent and America, there was a good demand especially from the United Kingdom and as stocks in the market were large, the total exports of this seed exceeded those of last year by 77 per cent.

Groundnut Seed.-The marked improvement in the exports of this seed was due to better demand especially from the Netherlands and Germany owing to the Indian product being cheaper than the African and Chinese varieties. The Union of South Africa also took 2,273 tons valued at Rs. $2 \cdot 78$ lakhs as against 802 tons valued at Rs. $1 \cdot 12$ lakhs last year.

Sesamum Seed.-This seed is gradually losing ground in the export trade at this port on account of reduced cultivation in the Province. Unfavourable condition of the crop, poor stocks, local demand of the seed for oil and preference of groundnut oil in the Marseilles market for soap manufacture have also contributed to the decline.

Castor seed.-The marked decline in the exports of this seed was due to amall stocks in Bombay and other producing centres, poor demand from the consuming countries and the offer by Brazil at cheaper rates.

Cotton seed.-Stocks were small and prices comparatively higher. The Continental market was also captured by Egypt and Russia who are showing great interest.

24-C.-OIL CAKES.


The total exports of oilcakes further improved by 36 per cent. in quantity and by nearly 26 per cent. in value over those in the preceding year, owing chiefly to better demand for groundnut cake from the principal consuming countries in Europe. Shipments of linseed cake and other oilcakes, however: showed slight decreases.

The total exports under this head further improved by 18,998 tons in quantity and by Rs. 17.78 lakhs in value due chiefly to better demand for jawar and bajra from Aden and Dependencies, Other Native States in Arabia, Italian East Africa and French Somaliland and for rice from Kenya Colony, Portuguese East Africa and Union of South Africa. The increase in exports of rice was also due to large stocks of Rangoon crop purchased by Bombay merchants at very favourable rates. The slight increase under wheat flour was chiefly due to better demand from Other Native States in Arabia.

There was a greater demand than last year for superior kinds of Indian raw wool at all the auction sales at Liverpool. Stocks awaiting export were, however, heavy and on account of the general political situation in Europe and the decline in prices of other competing wools, prices of Indian wools toned down with the result that the total exports though greater by over $2 \frac{1}{2}$ million lbs. in quantity were less by Rs. $6 \cdot 03$ lakhs in value.
E.-TREASURE INCLUDING GOVERNMENT TRANSACTIONS.

- The fall of Re. $91 \cdot 25$ lakhs os 65 per cent. in the imports of gold on private account was chiefly due to smaller receipts of sovereigns from the United Kingdom which amounted to Rs. 44,000 only as against Rs. $73 \cdot 48$ lakhs last year. Imports from Other Native States in Arabia, Switzerland and Iraq were also less but those from Aden and Dependencies were more. Imports of gold (bullion) from the United Kingdom also fell from Rs. $11 \cdot 06$ lakhs to Rs. $5 \cdot 84$ lakhs. Imports of silver improved by Rs. $2 \cdot 52$ lakhs due entirely to larger arrivals of bar silver from the Commonwealth of Australia which were valued at Rs. $38 \cdot 09$ lakhs as against Rs. $15 \cdot 43$ lakhs last year. Arrivals of bar silver from the United Kingdom, however, declined from Rs. 77.72 lakhs to Rs. 65.91 lakhs while those from Canada were nil as against Rs. 6.93 lakhs last year. Imports of Government of India rupees from Aden and Dependencies amounted to Rs. 4 lakhs as against Rs. 3,000 only, while those from the other Persian Gulf ports recorded decreases. The total exports of gold further fell from Rs. $17 \cdot 85$ crores to Rs. $11 \cdot 92$ crores or by 33 per cent. Exports of gold (bullion) to the United Kingdom were valued at Rs. $2 \cdot 85$ crores as against Rs. 8.7 crores, those to the United States of America at Rs. 2.78 crores against Rs. $7 \cdot 11$ crores and those to Hongkong at Rs. $4 \cdot 1$ lakhs against Rs. $74 \cdot 08$ lakhs while there were no exports to the Netherlands and Straits Settlements against worth Rs. 16.84 lakhs and Rs. 5.99 lakhs respectively last year. Exports to Ceylon were also valued at Rs. 7 lakh only as against Rs. $9 \cdot 24$ lakhs in the previous year.

Exports of sovereigns increased from Rs. 88.83 lakhs to Rs. $6 \cdot 19$ crores due chiefly to larger shipments to the United Kingdom which amounted to Rs. $5 \cdot 7$ crores as against Rs. $44 \cdot 79$ lakhs last year. Shipments to France also increased from Rs. $11 \cdot 87$ lakhs to Rs. $23 \cdot 44$ lakhs and those to Italy were warth Rs. 7.81 lakhs againstnil in the previous year. Hongkong and the Netherlands, however, took worth Rs. $\cdot 87$ lakh and Rs. $13 \cdot 28$ lakhs as against Rs. $14 \cdot 58$ lakhs and Rs. 16.39 lakhs respectively last year. Smaller demand for bullion from the United Kingdom mainly accounts for the decrease in the total exports of silver. Shipments of Government of India rupees to the Bahrein Islands, however, amounted to Rs. $5 \cdot 72$ lakhs against nil last year. There were no imports and exports of gold on Government account. Imports of silver were valued at Rs. 2,311 against Rs. 3,000 and exports at Rs. 28.38 lakhs as against nil last year. The exports entirely represented silver bullion to the United Kingdom.

25-A. Government transactions.-Imports of stores on Government account declined from Rs. $66 \cdot 94$ lakhs to Rs. $60 \cdot 36$ lakhs. Imports of woollen piecegoods, pinting paper, copper unwrought, iron and steel and cotton manutactures recorded decreases while those of chemicals and arms and ammunition, etc. recorded increases. Exports on the other hand improved from Rs. 9.73 lakhs to Rs. $17 \cdot 63$ lakhs due chiefly to larger shipments of arms, ammunitions, etc.

The total value of the Coasting trade of the Province of Bombay further declined from Rs. $42 \cdot 76$ crores to Rs. $41 \cdot 12$ crores or by about 4 per cent. Imports as well as exports contributed to this decline. Importa fell from Rs. $18 \cdot 16$ crores to Rs. $17 \cdot 34$ crores or by over 4 per cent., and exports from Rs. $24 \cdot 60$ crores to Rs. $23 \cdot 78$ crores or by over 3 per cent. Imports of Indian produce and manufactures amounted to Rs. $15 \cdot 58$ crores as against Rs. $16 \cdot 56$ crores last year. Imports of cotton raw declined from Rs. $6 \cdot 21$ crores to Rs. $5 \cdot 28$ crores owing mainly to smaller receipts from Sind, and those of seeds from Rs. 1.09 crores to Rs. 78 lakh owing to smaller receipts from the British Ports within the Province. Arrivals of coal, coke and patent fuel improved from Rs. $40 \cdot 63$ lakbs to Rs. $63 \cdot 50$ lakhs owing mainly to larger receipts of coal from Bengal ( + Rs. 22.31 lakhs). Imports of wheat improved from Rs. $53 \cdot 82$ lakhs to Rs. $75 \cdot 41$ lakhs owing mainly to larger receipts from Sind ( + Rs. $21 \cdot 33$ lakhs). Coastwise imports of foreign merchandise improved from Rs. 1.60 crores to Rs. 1.76 crores owing mainly to larger receipts of other sorts of fruits and vegetables (foreign) reshipped from Sind ( $\downarrow$ Rs. $12 \cdot 88$ lakhs). The fall in exports from Rs. $24 \cdot 60$ crores to Rs. $23 \cdot 78$ crores was due to reduced shipments of foreign merchandise. Exports of cotton piecegoods decreased from Rs. 9.86 crores to Rs. $9 \cdot 54$ crores. The decrease of Rs. 48.72 lakhs in the shipment of cotton piecegoods to Sind was counter-balanced by increased shipments of Rs. 40.64 lakhs to Bengal. Exports of cotton twist and yarn advanced from Rs. $66 \cdot 23$ lakhs to Rs. $102 \cdot 45$ lakhs owing to larger takings by Bengal. Re-exports decreased from Rs. $6 \cdot 22$ crores to Rs. $5 \cdot 17$ crores owing to the reduced shipments of all the principal articles such as cotton piecegoods (-R. 16.53 lakhs), cotton raw (-Rs. 14•27 lakhs), metals and ores (-Rs. 13.02 lakhs), carriages and carts (-Rs. 16.62 lakhs) and other textiles (-Rs. 11.97 lakhs).

## 33. SUBORDINATE PORTS OF THE BOMBAY PROVINCE.

## Foreign Trade.

The foreign trade of the subordinate ports is comparatively insignificant and is carried on in country craft mainly via Bombay. The total value fell from Rs. 50.78 lakhs to Rs. 44.01 lakhs. Imports declined from Rs. 42.51 lakhs to Rs. $34 \cdot 1$ lakhs, but exports increased from Rs. $8 \cdot 27$ lakhs to Rs. $9 \cdot 9$ lakhs. The decrease in imports was mainly due to smaller arrivals of rice from Burma (-Rs. $7 \cdot 62$ lakhs) and of cashewnuts from Portuguese East Africa (-Rs. $\cdot 7$ lakh). The increase in exports mainly represented larger exports of cashew kernel from Malwan and Vengurla to the United Statea of America ( + Rs. $1 \cdot 23$ lakhs) and of cotton raw to China ( + Rs. $\cdot 74$ lakh).
