Annual Report on the working of the Co-operative Societies Act (II of 1912) for the year 1927-28 (1st July 1927 to 30th June 1928).

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the annual report on the working of the Co-operative Societies Act in the Madras Presidency for the year ending 30th June 1928.

I.—Administration and Touring.

2. I was in charge of the department throughout the year.

I spent 242 days on tour, inspected a large number of societies including Central Banks, Local Unions and District Federations and attended various conferences and informal meetings of co-operators. The Committee announced in G.O. No. 1366, Press, Development, dated 1st September 1927, met in September, toured in October and November throughout the Presidency and

of Co-operative Societies as against 9 in the previous year. The Government sanctioned the appointment of four additional Deputy Registrars temporarily. Only one circle, Rajahmundry comprising East and West Gōdāvari, was, however, formed during the year. Three new Deputy Registrars were appointed and the orders of the Government are awaited on the proposal to increase the number of Deputy Collectors lent to this department.

In my report for 1926-27 I expressed the opinion that there must be one Deputy Registrar for every district. The Committee on Co-operation have agreed with me and recommended that there should be one Deputy Registrar for each district except Madras and the Nilgiris and the question is under the consideration of the Government.

- 5. In accordance with G.O. Mis. No. 1434, dated 13th September 1927, Honorary Assistant Registrars were appointed during the year only for the supervision of societies for depressed and backward classes and for special types of non-credit societies. There were 21 Honorary Assistant Registrars on 30th June 1928, as against 231 on the 30th June 1927. Their names are given in Appendix 12.
- 6. There were 24 Assistant Registrars' sections besides the special agency section in charge of Subordinate staff. an Extra Assistant Registrar in the previous year. In their Order No. 1917, Development, dated 18th November 1927, the Government sanctioned the formation of two new sections for West Godavari and Ramnad and the appointment of two Assistant Registrars with the necessary staff. In their Order No. 1941, Miscellaneous (Development), dated 1st April 1928, the Government have sanctioned till 31st March 1929 the appointment of three Assistant Registrars on Rs. 150 to conduct classes at three centres in the Presidency for the training of the official and the nonofficial staff. There were eight vacancies in the Assistant Registrars' cadre, five due to the creation of the Assistant Registrars' posts referred to above, two due to the promotion of two existing Assistant Registrars as Deputy Registrars and one to the termination of the probation of an Assistant Registrar. Of these, two were filled up by direct recruitment, four by promotion from the grade of Senior Inspectors and two remained vacant at the end of the year.

The additional establishment sanctioned during the year as seen from the statement is as follows:—

(a) Two Assistant Registrars on Rs. 150—5—200—10—250 for the two new sections of West Gōdāvari and Rāmnād.

(b) Three Assistant Registrars on Rs. 150 till 31st

March 1929 for conducting training classes;

(c) Fourteen senior Inspectors on Rs. 80—4—100 in addition to the ten senior Inspectors sanctioned in 1926 for the supervision of non-credit societies;

(d) One senior Inspector-clerk on Rs. 80 for my office

till 31st March 1929;

(e) Four senior Inspector-clerks on Rs. 80, one for

each of the newly created Deputy Registrars' offices.

(f) Four Inspector-clerks on Rs. 40-4-60-2-80, two in each of the offices of the Assistant Registrars. West Gödävari and Rāmnād.

(g) Eight Inspector-clerks on Rs. 40 for work in the office of the newly created Deputy Registrars. Only three were employed during the year.

(h) Seventy-six Inspectors on Rs. 40 till 31st March 1929; 24 for liquidation; 48 for administration and four for

audit work.

(i) Four routine clerks on Rs. 35-60 for work in the offices of the Assistant Registrars, West Godavari and Ramnad.

- (j) Nineteen routine clerks on Rs. 35-60. Sixteen for the offices of the four newly created Deputy Registrars temporarily till 31st March 1929. Of these, only four were employed during the year, the formation of the other circles having been deferred. Three routine clerks are for the three Assistant Registrars for conducting training classes.
- (k) Ten additional Inspectors on Rs. 40-4-60-2-80 for work under the Commissioner of Labour, Madras, to assist in organization and supervision of depressed classes societies.
- (1) Ten Inspectors on Rs. 40—4—60—2—80 for a period of one year from 1st April 1928 for the development and supervision of several loan and sale societies in the districts.

Senior Inspectors have been sanctioned at the rate of two for each district except West Gōdāvari and Rāmnād for credit and non-credit work respectively. The appointment of two Senior Inspectors for non-credit work has been since sanctioned in G.O. Mis. No. 1590, dated 20th September 1928. Requests have been made for considerable additional staff to enable the department to cope with the very great amount of work thrown on it by the growth and ramifications of the movement and the orders of the Government are awaited. The augmentation of the administrative staff asked for is, I consider, the absolute minimum that can be expected to cope with work which cannot be evaded.

7. The total amount spent from the public funds for the co-operative movement in the Presidency during the financial year 1927-28 is Rs. 7,72,743, comprising the following items:—

This represents : 50 per cent of the total working capital as compared with : 55 in the previous year.

II.—SUMMARY OF PROGRESS.

- 8. The general summary of progress of all the societies in the Presidency is shown in Appendix No. 1.
- 9. The following extract from the report of the Director of Agriculture indicates the nature of the seasonal conditions during the year:—

"The south-west monsoon commenced on the West Coast early on the 27th May and gave heavy rainfall from June to September with breaks now and then. In the Circars, the monsoon became active about the middle of June and gave generally good and well-distributed rainfall afterwards till the 6th October. The Deccan and Nellore received good rains except in August. The rainfall in Coimbatore and Trichinopoly was normal. Most of the other districts had fairly good rains in June and September, but the rainfall was poor in the intervening months. On the whole, the south-west monsoon was up to or above the average except in South Arcot and Tanjore.

"The north-east monsoon appeared over the Madras Coast on the 20th October but was feebly marked. Its activity was more or less confined to the south till the 31st October. A depression formed on the 30th October between the Andamans and the Coromandel Coast. It developed into a cyclonic storm which crossed the coast near Nellore between the 1st and 2nd November. With the progress of the storm rainfall was widespread in the Circars and Deccan and on the Madras coast. The most devastating fury of the storm was experienced in Nellore where men and cattle perished and considerable havoc was done to buildings and trees, in addition to a serious breakdown of communications, and rains continued in the district till the 19th November. Heavy rain was received between the 6th and 9th November in the Presidency except the Circars and the Deccan. The monsoon practically came to a close thereafter although there was slight rainfall in parts of the Carnatic and Southern districts. Thus the north-east monsoon was unsatisfactory in most districts, especially in Chingleput, South Arcot, the Central districts (Coimbatore excepted), Tanjore and Malabar.

"On the whole, the year was generally favourable in the Circars, and on the West Coast, fairly favourable in the Deccan, and not so favourable in the other districts."

The favourable condition in the Circars and on the West Coast was reflected in the good collection of dues to societies over that area except Malabar District.

10. The Committee on Co-operation recommend that immediate attention should be given to rectification if possible of all dormant societies or failing this to liquidation.

The work of consolidating the existing societies is being

attended to. The additional Inspectors sanctioned for administration and liquidation were appointed late in the year and were undergoing training. The results of their work will be perceptible if at all only in the current year, but most of them have again been absorbed into the audit staff.

The organization of credit societies is in the hands of unions and during the year 1,112 agricultural societies were The expansion and consolidation was in general registered. proceeding together. The districts which showed the greatest expansion were North Arcot, South Arcot, Chingleput, Ganjam and Tinnevelly, the number ranging between 71 and 108 in these districts. In the districts of South Kanara, Chittoor, Madras, Nilgiris and Ceded Districts much attention was paid to the rectification of the existing societies and there was very little expansion by the organization of new societies. The districts of Tinnevelly and Coimbatore were affected by drought and Government sanctioned special staff to overhaul societies in the affected taluks and to organize new societies and to afford credit facilities to the One senior Inspector and three junior Inspectors sanctioned in G.O. Mis. No. 448, dated 30th March 1927, worked for four months from April to July 1927 in Tinnevelly.

Four junior Inspectors were sanctioned in G.O. No. 1331, Development, dated 6th September 1927, for special work in the parts of Erode and Palladam taluks affected by drought. Enquiries were held in 34 societies and extensions of the period of repayment of loans were given by 21 societies to

their members.

11. At the beginning of the year there were 13,357

Societies (all classes).

societies of all classes. During the year 1,260 societies were registered as against 1,455 in the previous year and the registration of 107 as against 71 societies was cancelled. Of the societies registered during the year 26 were unions, 1,112 agricultural societies and 122 non-agricultural societies. There were thus 14,510 societies of all classes on the last day of the year under report.

12. Excluding the membership of the local supervising unions, audit unions and the district federations, the number of members on 30th June 1923 in the remaining societies was 838,186 which gives an average of 64 members per society as in the

previous year. The total number of members on 30th June 1928 bears a percentage of 2·1 to the population of the Presidency as it was in the last census as compared with 1·94 on 30th June 1927.

13. The working capital of all societies as shown in Appendix I on the last day of the year was Rs. 1,522.97 lakhs as compared with Rs. 1,334.34 lakhs in the previous year. The total working capital employed in the movement without taking into account the investments of one society in another amounted to Rs. 820.94 lakhs at the end of the year consisting of the following items:—

There was thus an increase of Rs. 93.55 lakhs of net working capital. The owned capital in the movement is Rs. 226.79 lakhs, i.e., 28.1 of the net working capital against 27.1 in the last year.

14. As regards the repayments by primary societies to central banks, there has been a marked improvement under the current interest, while under the principal due, the percentage of arrears has increased from 20·18 in the previous year to 22·50 in the year under report as may be seen from Appendix No. 1, Sections II and III. As regards the repayments by members to their societies, the position is slightly better than in the previous year under both principal and interest.

In non-agricultural societies the arrear interest stood at 48.20 per cent. The special staff employed in certain districts by federations for the rectification work in dormant societies have done good work in this direction. With the arrangements pressed on federations and central banks to pool the supervision fund in the district and to control the supervising staff of the districts, better results may be hoped for. I have dwelt at length on this question in paragraph 16.

Oentral banks. Special deposits by local boards, municipalities, etc., formed 35 per cent of the total working capital of central banks. To prevent competition among central banks for these deposits it was laid down that no central bank may receive deposit from a local board or municipality from outside the district in which such central bank operates unless the central banks in that district have had the option and have expressed their inability to take the deposit at four per cent. A further restriction was also imposed on the acceptance of such deposits, limiting it to four times the paid-up share capital plus reserve fund and the rate of interest to four per cent in any case.

Certain central banks have suggested that this four per cent limit should not be applied to the provident funds of local and municipal employees deposited in central banks on the ground that a higher rate of interest is to the benefit of the local and municipal employees and I have had to point out that the co-operative central banks are there to obtain funds for co-operative societies at the lowest possible rate and are not intended as charitable institutions. The Provident fund deposits are not obtained for periods exceeding three years and should therefore be taken on the same terms as other deposits for the same period. If deposited for more than three years more than four per cent might reasonably be paid.

Unless district central banks which accept these large deposits regulate their financial arrangements with great care, embarrassment may result when large deposits representing a considerable portion of their total working capital are not renewed on maturity or replaced by fresh deposits of similar amount. The central banks have therefore been recommended to accept such deposits in instalments not repayable in one lump and for such periods that repayment is due when central banks are receiving their principal repayments of loans.

A strong recommendation has been made to central banks to employ paid secretaries in place of the honorary officers who, though many of them have done admirable work, are naturally unable in view of other demands on their time to devote their whole attention to the business of the bank which now need a full-time secretary. The recommendation has been endorsed by the Townsend Committee, accepted by the Bankers' Conference and in many banks already acted on.

16. The number of district federations was the same as in the previous year, i.e., 19. It has been since decided to register two federations in the Ganjām District, one for the area financed by the Ganjām Co-operative Banking Union, Ltd., and the other for the area financed by the Aska Central Bank and proposals to form a federation for the area covered by the Tanjore District Bank, Kumbakōnam, are under discussion. A federation has been since registered for Tinnevelly District. The portion of Rāmnād District which is financed by the Srīvilliputtūr Bank has no federation.

Out of the 19 federations, those at Vellore, Cuddalore and Conjeeveram have not provided for any representation of central banks on the general body or the board of management of the Federation. If the federation is to be the recognized exponent of non-official co-operative opinion in the district it should encompass all co-operative activities in the district.

One of the outstanding features of the period has been the attempt made to cope with the growing tide of overdues by the improvement of supervision and the Townsend Committee have made very clear recommendation in regard to certain matters on which differences of opinion had arisen.

Expression has on several occasions been given to a complaint that the department has suddenly dropped supervision and it has been pointed out on more than one occasion that this is not correct. The need for co-operative supervision brought supervising unions into existence in 1915 and they were gradually developed and extended until now they cover practically the whole Presidency. With the growth of the movement, the official staff available for supervision as distinct from the statutory duty of audit, dwindled gradually over 5 or 6 years until the field staff of inspectors were completely absorbed in audit and there were none available for supervision. This was realized by the non-official element only after it became an accomplished fact. Hinc illue lachrymae. But it is certain that the culmination of this gradual process brought home to the non-official bodies the need to improve the supervision.

There is no room for doubt that this delegation of supervision to non-official bodies proceeded at too rapid a pace and the situation is being alleviated by the appointment of administrative inspectors and inspectors for liquidation work for each district. The supervising unions were unable to fill the gap and satisfy the full requirements. Overdues increased and there was a general complaint from central banks. Organization of new societies was not accompanied by adequate care and instruction nor in many cases were the supervisors appointed by unions able to fulfil their duties adequately.

At an early stage federations or district councils of supervision were registered in a few districts and in the last 3 or 4 years more active steps have been taken to form one in each district to stimulate and co-ordinate the work of unions but in the form in which they were then organized being federation of unions with only such funds as could be got from unions, they were able to exert very little influence on the supervision in their districts. The constitution has however been considerably modified, the scope of their work amplified and some of them are now bodies of considerable influence. They are intended to deal with the supervision and organization of co-operative societies in all its aspects working through the unions in so far as rural co-operative societies are concerned. The federations representing the combined interests of co-operative societies in each district should encompass all societies and must therefore admit as members, unions, whether for audit or supervision, special societies not included in unions, the financing banks and individuals of prominence whose knowledge and experience

would be a source of strength to such a representative body. Similarly the control will be in the hands of elected representatives and co-opted individuals. It should have under its control the pooled supervision fund of the district contributed by the primary societies and the financing banks while the paid staff should similarly be constituted as a district cadre appointed, dismissed or transferred by the federation. detailed supervision of primary societies will, it is intended, continue as hitherto under unions to which the requisite funds for supervision will be allotted. The governing body of the federation will control the work in general, but the routine work must be in the hands of a paid staff and in addition to the supervisors required for each union, the federation must maintain a reserve for leave, training and special work, the whole under an adequately paid chief executive officer. The federation itself must take up the work of instructing the panchayatdars and other rural co-operative workers.

This is the model at present aimed at, but no attempt is made to bring about rigid conformity with the model in all details. It is intended that these federations should combine all interests in the district and in view of the great importance of the financial aspect should include strong representation of the central banks. At the same time they form the link between village co-operation and the provincial union.

There were a number of persons vociferous in the opinion that these federations, when they had barely started their Another body of opinion derided them as work, had failed. superfluous organization. Certainly two influences have militated strongly against their efficiency, firstly, personal jealousies and secondly reluctance on the part of defaulters to give any support to a supervising body which will persuade them to mend their ways. But in districts where they have become efficient and active, their influence has been The Townsend Committee was already strongly shown. unanimous in recommending that supervision should vest in the federation and not in central banks and was only divided in its opinion of what should happen if this supervising structure broke down. This contingency has not yet arisen. In one or two localities there still lingers a certain amount of propaganda to support the view that central banks should take complete charge of supervision and there are still a few persons interested in the matter anxious to reopen a question of policy which I can only regard as

settled. I am unable to see how a bank executive committee with a paid secretary fully engaged in running the bank can be expected to add to its duties the large amount of additional work involved in supervising some hundreds of co-operative societies. They have several of them got their administrative section with a small field staff of inspectors as recommended by the Townsend Committee, but these are intended only to supplement the information which the bank has of its clients from other sources and to put the whole of the information before the management in a convenient form. No bank has seriously attempted the task of supervising all the societies in their area either directly or through unions and though one or two have undertaken "rectification" work in small areas it has been apparently tacitly recognized that the task of supervision is not one which central banks can completely undertake conveniently.

In view of the reluctance on the part of some of the leading institutions I have refrained from urging that the district officers of this department should have a definite place in federations though I have suggested to one or two that Deputy Registrars or Assistant Registrars might with advantage be co-opted; I think, however, that a closer association of departmental officers with these bodies would improve the co-relation of the departmental inspector's work with that of supervisors and facilitate the work of both. It is customary, however, for the departmental officer to attend federation meetings and the relations are generally most cordial.

In accordance with the principles I have stated above, certain necessary changes in the model by-laws of primary societies, central banks, unions and district federations were found essential and these have been communicated to the several bodies for acceptance. Only 7 of the 19 federations have at present any direct control over the entire supervision fund of the district though in many others the budget of the unions is being considered and approved by the federations. I trust that the other federations too will soon amend their by-laws. Rectification work with special grants from central banks was carried out particularly by the federations at Chingleput, Coimbatore, Vellove, South Kanara, Madura and South Arcot.

Besides the recurring grant of Rs. 1,200 to the Provincial Co-operative Union and Rs. 1,000 to each of the two district federations of South Kanara and Chingleput, Government allotted a sum of Rs. 13,000 to the remaining federations and the Hood Institute, and the whole of this was distributed by me proportionately to the advance made by them in regard to the arrangement for holding the training classes. A sum of Rs. 13,310 as against the total Government grant of Rs. 16,200 was actually spent. Besides this, they also spent from their own funds and from donations a sum of Rs. 8,900 towards the same object. Classes were held in 243 centres at which 2,501 societies participated with 8,917 panchayatdars of rural societies attending such meetings.

The federations at Mangalore and Malabar have been publishing Kannada Sahakari and Parasparasahayi in Kanarese and Malayalam. The Nellore District Federation published during the year a monthly co-operative journal.

17. The Madras Provincial Co-operative Union, Ltd., continued the publication of the Madras Bulletin of Co-operation in English and Tamil. The Provincial Conference was held under its auspices this year in Rajahmundry and it conducted a training class for co-operative workers at which 43 candidates underwent training for a period of three months and 36 passed. The union received a Government subsidy of Rs. 1,200 for the purpose.

The Andhra Sahakara Sammelanam located at Rajahmundry continue publishing the Telugu Journal "Sahakaramu" as usual. The management of its affairs has of late not been satisfactory and the question of putting it on a satisfactory footing is engaging my consideration.

The Hood Co-operative Institute, Tanjore, which was registered towards the close of 1926-27 conducted two training classes for supervisors and inspectors during the year. Rural training classes for educating panchayatdars of societies were held in twelve centres and the number of societies that were represented and the number of societies' panchayatdars who were trained were estimated at 12 and 13S respectively. The institute received a Government subsidy of Rs. 2,000 for both the purposes.

18. Another feature of this year's working was the institution of regular classes at different centres to give instruction to the paid staff of co-operative workers. Classes for supervisors had previously been given by the Provincial Co-operative Union in Madras.

The first was opened at Tanjore by the Co-operative Institute there. The instruction was given by a paid staff, the superintendent being a retired Deputy Registrar assisted by a commercial instructor. This was followed shortly afterwards by a course at Coimbatore run by the federation, instruction being given by a trained teacher with long co-operative experience assisted by a commercial instructor. These classes were for three months and included teaching in Co-operation, Auditing, Book-keeping and Banking on a syllabus which was approved by the Registrar. The pupils included supervisors, bank clerks, departmental inspectors and private persons of whom several have since been appointed as inspectors.

These classes promised to be of great use and were followed by three classes at Tanjore, Anantapur and Bezwada. That at Tanjore was run by the institute, at Anantapur the federation provided the necessary funds while at Bezwada it was managed by a retired Deputy Collector with funds contributed by various co-operative societies. The teaching was in the hands of a staff in each case headed by an Assistant Registrar lent for the purpose and assisted by one or more other instructors.

These classes were a success and helped to provide for a very definite need, namely, the regular instruction of the paid staff in all branches of work which officers employed by banks, federations, unions, etc., and the department would be required to do. The regular course laid down in the syllabus was supplemented by a few lectures on Co-operative Law, Revenue Law and Procedure and other laws with which a co-operative worker should have some acquaintance. It was found desirable to extend these classes to four menths and to make them more regular and permanent. Arrangements were accordingly made to start five classes simultaneously at Vellore, Tanjore, Coimbatore, Anantapur and Bezwada to cover the whole Presidency and to end at the same time with a common examination. These classes together with one conducted by the Provincial Co-operative Union to fill in the time before a more extended central course is opened at Madras are now in progress. It is intended that each of these five centres should have a regular co-operative school of instruction with a permanent staff of teachers at each, and that all persons appointed as inspectors or supervisors shall either before or immediately after appointment be sent for instruction to one of these classes. It is hoped to enlarge

the scope of these courses to provide special instruction for bank clerks and others for whom the full course may not be essential.

Proposals have been placed before the Government for the institution of a Central School at Madras running a year's course in conjunction with the Government School of Commerce, which already provides instruction in those technical subjects of Accountancy and the like with which the co-operative workers must be familiar.

19. The year commenced with 388 unions including Propagandist Unions, Federations and Audit Unions and 26 unions were registered during the year against 20 in the previous year, bringing the total to 414 at the end of the year. 11,544 primary societies with a membership of 739,928 were affiliated to the unions as against 10,709 with 664,653 members at the end of the previous year. The total working capital of the affiliated societies rose from Rs. 6,34,13,675 in the previous year to Rs. 7,14,51,821. A statement comparing the average size of the union in each district with their average working capital and expenditure for the last two years is furnished below:—

It is quite essential that the existing unions whose area of operations is unwieldy should be reduced to manageable proportion. This was pointed out in the reports of the previous years and appreciable reduction in the area of operation has been effected in several districts. Other districts require attention in this respect. Although in some cases local conditions prevent the splitting up of unions at once, the general principle that unions are more efficient where the operations are restricted to a small compact area and where the number of affiliated societies does not exceed 25 should be kept in view and steps taken to reduce where funds permit the wide area of jurisdiction so as to enable the unions to carry out all their duties properly.

The unions, besides supervising the existing societies, are responsible for the co-operative development of the area in their charge and the organization of credit societies has been left to them. In almost all the districts the loan applications from the primary societies are complied with by the financing bank on the recommendation of the union and references to the department are becoming fewer. The efficiency of the unions depends upon the interest of the governing body members of the union and the ability of the supervisor. The supervisors have been trained hitherto by the Assistant Registrars but there was no examination. Arrangements have since been made to train the supervisors in the training

schools and federations have been requested to pool the supervision fund, form a district cadre of supervisors and to engage a well paid efficient executive officer to check the work of the union supervisors.

20. The trading activities are carried out by the agricultural primary credit societies as agents for the joint purchase of the agricultural, domestic and other requirements of their members and for the joint sale of their produce. Besides these there are a number of non-credit societies for the purchase of the requirements and sale of the produce of their members. The extent to which these societies achieved their object is exhibited in Appendix I, Section I. The total purchases as owner were Rs. 25.41 lakhs as against Rs. 25.13 lakhs in the previous year and the sales as owner amounted to Rs. 26 66 lakhs as compared with Rs. 25.53 lakhs in the preceding The joint purchases and sales made by these societies as well as credit societies in the capacity of agents to their members amounted to Rs. 1.84 lakhs and Rs. 4 lakhs as against Rs. 1.66 lakhs and Rs. 4.94 lakhs respectively in the previous year. Considering the low level of education in rural areas, the undeveloped capacity for trade organizations and the difficulty in securing for the management of this special business the services of persons possessing the necessary experience and knowledge the results are not unexpected. The societies formed to advance loans on crops in godowns to enable ryots to hold up the produce for a more favourable market have worked successfully. advances for the year were Rs. 13:16 lakhs against Rs. 9:34 lakhs in the previous year. Out of the budget allotment of Rs. 25,000 for the construction of godowns in loan and sale societies only two societies were advanced a loan of Rs. 1,500 for the construction of godowns. In consultation with the Director of Public Health specifications for the construction of godowns to make them rat and fire proof were drawn up and communicated to all loan and sale societies in November Since the close of the financial year a sum of Rs. 4,000 was sanctioned to two other loan and sale societies.

Every district has now a senior Inspector to look after the non-credit work under the control of the Deputy Registrar. In addition, 10 junior Inspectors are attached to the selected loan and sale societies for their supervision and for intensive work.

- 21. At the beginning of the year there were 57 societies of labourers with the object of taking Labour contract societies. labour contracts and thereby to find Three societies of this kind were work for their members. added during the year bringing the total to 60 at the end of the year with 3,746 members. During the year, these societies secured contracts for Rs. 2,37,563. They actually completed within the year work valued at Rs. 3,16,727 as compared with Rs. 3,03,130 for the previous year. of Rs. 2,48,894 was paid as wages. The societies had also to employ a certain number of non-members for the work. The wages paid to members amounted to Rs. 96,886 as against Rs. 1,28,357 in the previous year. Though Government have drawn the attention of all local bodies and the departments of Government having works for execution to the existence of these co-operative labour societies and to employ them to execute works whenever possible, patronage from public bodies has been very slight. The societies in the Tanjore and Trichinopoly districts took up contract works and turned out Rs. 2,09,564 and Rs. 47,856 worth of work respectively during the year. Next to the societies in the Trichinopoly circle, the societies in the Madras circle and South Kanara have contributed largely to the output of work. Though the possibilities of societies of this type have been clearly demonstrated, they have to contend against the powerful competition of private contractors from outside. Within the societies themselves in a few instances inadequate organization, indifferent business methods and sometimes disunion among the leaders lead to difficulties more or less acute.
- 22. The number of societies at the end of the year was nine, as in the previous year. The total acreage for reclamation was estimated at 2,482. Inclusive of 123 acres reclaimed during the year, the total extent cleared comes to 737 acres. In most of these cases the actual work of reclamation was carried out by the societies as a whole on behalf of members. In some of the smaller blocks, however, where the difficulty of sand clearance was not so great, the societies merely financed the members leaving them to make their own individual arrangements to clear the sand. These societies are financed by the Government and the total amount of loan outstanding in the last day of the year was Rs. 1,81,076 as against Rs. 1,26,955



at the end of the previous year. The scheme to dig higher level channels to obviate the necessity of clearing land to the original level, was sanctioned by Government in January 1928. The extent of land to be brought under the high level channel scheme is 905 acres and the work has, however, to be kept in abeyance, as lands have not been acquired by the Revenue Department and handed over to the Public Works Department to enable them to start the digging of the high level channel.

23. The number of land mortgage banks on 30th June 1928 was 18 as against 10 in the previous year. The number of members on the last day of the year was 1,024 with a paid-up share capital of Rs. 60,787. Debentures issued by the various land mortgage banks and the amount of debentures taken up by the public and Government are shown below:—

I have submitted proposals with draft by-laws for the formation of a Central Land Mortgage Bank at Madras with individuals and primary Land Mortgage Banks as members to issue debentures as a floating charge on the value of the mortgages transferred to the Central Land Mortgage Bank by the primary Land Mortgage Banks.

24. There are two types of such societies: (1) those for keeping channels in good repair, and (2) those for irrigating lands jointly with the aid of power pumps. There were 8 societies for carrying out kudimaramat work and 9 for the purpose of irrigation

The Government have in G.O. Mis. No. 286, dated 8th February 1928, laid down the procedure in the execution of kudimaramet work of the co-operative societies. The work should be attended to by co-operative societies formed for the purpose regularly and systematically. In regard to

non-member ryots, if they neglect to render the customary aid in conjunction with the members of the society in obedience to the notice issued by the Tahsildar, their contribution should be levied under section 6, Act I of 1858, and paid to the society doing the work. It is trusted that the ryots will take advantage of the Government Order and form co-operative societies to attend to the regular execution of kudimaramat work.

The pump irrigation societies are eligible for long term loans from Government for the installation of the necessary plant and machinery. The Melpattambakkam society in the South Arcot District got a loan of Rs. 2,700 for the purpose.

25. To the 11 milk supply societies which were in existence at the beginning of the year, Milk supply societies. 9 more were added during the year. They were confronted with the difficulty of transport of the milk to Madras. For some time they used the ordinary passenger buses for transport. Later on, Government lent them an old Ford lorry, the working of which, however, was They could not bring the milk in time to not satisfactory. Madras, while on some occasions it broke down and the milk went sour before it could be got to Madras. The societies therefore formed themselves into a union for sale of their milk and approached the Madras Corporation and the Government for financial help to buy two lorries. union is located in Madras and is called "The Madras Milk Supply Union." The Government were pleased to sanction a loan of Rs. 15,000 to the union for the purchase of lorries, milk cans and cream separators. One lorry, cans and vessels were purchased before the close of the year, and the other lorry has been purchased since. The societies sold during the year 31,000 Madras measures of milk worth about Rs. 15,500. Practically the whole work was done in the latter half of the year. The societies had and have to work against difficulties. When the supply of milk was large in the first half of the year there were no facilities for transport and when they obtained these facilities summer was rapidly approaching and the supply falling. With the advent of the rainy season again the supply is going up. If the milk is to be sold to the general public, it has to come early in the morning to Madras at 5-30 or 6. This means that the milkmen will have to get up from their bed very early at about 3 a.m. This they have to do day after day and it is

contrary to their custom. They are not early risers. Before the societies came into existence some of these men used to hand over their milk at about 7 or 7-30 to village dealers who carried it to Madras through railway trains at about 10 a.m. and sold it to coffee hotels. The union cannot rely entirely on hotels for the disposal of its milk and has therefore to bring the milk to Madras early in the morning for sale to the general public. Further the milk has to be disposed of within two or three hours after it is brought to Madras and it is found sometimes difficult to dispose of the entire quantity in so short a period. Only pasturisation of milk and cold storage can help the union in this respect. There is a proposal before me to buy a pasturising plant and I am writing to the Corporation of Madras in regard to that proposal. I may also come to Government for help.

To ensure the purity of the milk supplied, the members of each village society bring their animals to a central place in the village and milk them in clean vessels under the strict supervision of a superintendent appointed by the union. The milk is then bulked and put in cans, sealed and handed over at the nearest road-side where the motor lorry of the union picks it up. The lorry takes the milk with that of other societies to Madras, where the Dairy Expert of the Union receives it and after examination distributes it to the

several sale depots and hotels...

The District Board, Chingleput, has given free of cost to one of the milk supply societies a stud animal for the use of the members of that society as well as the neighbouring societies. The thanks of these societies are due to the Board.

26. An impetus was given during the year to the formation of co-operative societies for students. Students can by co-operation obtain their stationery, books and other things on more advantageous terms than through a small retailer. The students would benefit and at the same time they would have among them a practical demonstration of the management of a co-operative society. Minors have no legal power to contract and consequently cannot become members of a society, much less can they take a responsible part in the management of one. A set of model by-laws was framed and circulated for adoption by such societies. Membership was thrown open to students above 18 years of age and to the

college or school staff while students below 18 years were admitted as associates on payment of an entrance fee. Teachers are allowed to participate, but the chief responsibility must be with the students themselves. Students admitted as associates are allowed to attend the general body meetings and take part in the discussion but have no power to vote. The Director of Public Instruction was kind enough to instruct his educational officers to render all possible assistance in the formation of these societies in greater numbers. There were on 30th June 1928, 46 such societies as against 26 in the previous year. There were 2.551 students with 496 teachers in these societies of whom 961 were minors admitted as associates. Their paid-up share capital was nearly Rs. 4,000 and they transacted business in the purchase and distribution of stationery to the extent of Rs. 20,682 and effected a saving of Rs. 1,876 which works out at 9 per cent and paid as bonus on the sales Rs. 174. The net profit for the year was Rs. 1,715.

27. There were 15 societies at the end of the year as against 13 in the previous year. Only six of these, two in Tanjore and four in Trichinopoly did any active work.

The Tanjore Demonstration Society showed that an acre of

The Tanjore Demonstration Society showed that an acre of double crop land gave by improved method a net income of Rs. 78 while by the old method an acre yielded Rs. 45. An acre of single crop wet land gave a net income of Rs. 48 by the old method while it gave Rs. 62 by the improved method. The Lalgudi Sivagnanam Society demonstrated that an acre of double crop wet land gave an income of Rs. 153 by the old method but Rs. 224 by the improved The other societies also have yielded similar The Lalgudi Sivagnanam Agricultural and Industrial Society supplied to members and non-members seed, manure, etc., to the value of Rs. 37,938. The Marudur Society distributed 1,206 lb. of selected seeds to members. The Tanjore Demonstration Society distributed 9 tons of superphosphate and 29½ bags of ammonium sulphate and 2,160 measures of seed. The Moolangudi Demonstration Society distributed 80 bags of superphosphate and 70 bags of ammonium sulphate and 13 bags of kavalai seeds and 2.436 measures of paddy seeds.

In February last there was a conference of Deputy Registrars and Deputy Directors of Agriculture. It was



agreed at the conference that more societies should be organized in several districts to supplement work on demonstration plots but should be registered only after consideration of a joint report from co-operative and agricultural officers on the prospects of success.

The difficulty of finding men capable and willing to devote much time and trouble to running such societies and the land available for the purposes in places approved of by the Agricultural Department, renders it impossible to

develop these activities rapidly.

28. There were 63 societies exclusively for weavers and 76 credit societies of which more than 60 per cent were weavers. Their transactions are shown in Section III-C of Appendix No. 8. Their working capital increased from Rs. 1,32,032 to Rs. 1,52,413 and the divisible profit from Rs. 3,442 to Rs. 3,752.

There are in general two classes of weavers-

(a) those who buy their yarn, weave their cloth and sell it either locally or through a merchant.

(b) those who get advances in cash and yarn from merchants small or large, weave the cloth and deliver it back to the weaver.

The output of weavers could be greatly enhanced could a steady market be found and the market would be better if the weaver could be relied on to turn out cloths of standard quality and guaranteed uniformity in a steady supply. Those who work on their own, are difficult to organize. They are ill-educated, poor and unreliable. Those who work on advances get only a poor cooly wage and are generally so indebted that they are bound to the master weavers or petty merchant. To give them sufficient loans. to relieve them of their debt would be an enterprise that no bank could contemplate with equanimity. The Committee on Co-operation expressed the opinion that steps so far taken to help the weavers' community are not adequate and that a knowledge of weaving and of the many connected problems cannot be acquired in a few months' training. The key to the problem has been stated by them to be (1) marketing the textile products; and (2) the possibility of guaranteeing quality to the agencies which undertake the marketing. The appointment of a textile expert has been advocated by them. The main problem is one of

marketing and for this it is not so much a man with technical knowledge of weaving that is required but one with a knowledge of the business side of the matter. This is under the consideration of Government. It is under contemplation to open a central depot in Madras for the marketing of the weavers' products. The Special Inspector trained by the Industries Department was attached to the Special Officer for the survey of Cottage Industries. He reverted to the Co-operative Department with effect from 31st August 1927. Owing to illness he was on leave till the end of February and is now in the regular line in this department.

29. In accordance with one of the resolutions passed in Egg production and sale the First Indian Poultry Conference held in Calcutta in December 1926, that Co-operative Societies in India should be approached with a definite scheme for marketing poultry and poultry products, I circularised all Deputy Registrars to investigate the possibilities of organizing co-operative egg production and sale societies, in the neighbourhood of large towns, to collect the eggs produced by their members and sell them fresh. One society was registered in Valarpuram in the Chingleput District. It started work towards the close of the year and was in correspondence with the Deputy Director of Live-Stock Cattle Farm, Hosūr, for the supply of good breed of hens.

In the Nilgiris improved leghorn fowls were introduced in the Badaga villages during the year and they are gradually spreading to a number of villages in the neighbourhood. The advantages of keeping a superior breed of poultry is slowly being appreciated there.

30. The number of prosecutions for offences, committed by the office-bearers of the co-operative societies is gradually increasing year by year. There were 56 prosecutions as against 23 in the previous year. Of these 45 were launched at the instance of the department and 11 at the instance of the societies. Only 23 of these were decided and the accused were convicted in 16 cases. The prosecutions related to criminal breach of trust, forgery and falsification of accounts. It is an erroneous idea to think that if honorary workers are punished for cases of embezzlement honest men will take fright or co-operative societies as a whole be discredited. I cannot find

any reason to suppose that the increase in the number of prosecutions indicates an increase in criminal tendencies. Cases are being handed over to the police for prosecution rather more freely than formerly and increased activity has brought more cases to light. As pointed out by the Committee on Co-operation every possible step should be taken to protect members of primary societies and others from losses caused by misfeasance and that in all cases where there is a reasonable chance of convictions, prosecutions should be launched and offenders brought to trial.

As a safeguard in the Central Banks I draw the attention of all Central Banks to the following business precepts

and to the risks they run by ignoring them:—

(i) Cash on hand should not exceed an amount to be specified in the by-laws or rules as required for immediate use and all surplus to such small requirements should be lodged either in the Treasury or in the Imperial Bank.

(ii) The cash should not be under a single key—any considerable amount of cash should be under double lock.

(iii) Cash held by the bank apart from some kept in the Treasury or in the Imperial Bank should be in a safe and in no circumstance should it be kept outside the bank by

any member of the staff or management.

In regard to primary societies the duties and responsibilities of president and secretaries in regard to cash balance were definitely laid down and circulated and every society was asked to enact a subsidiary by-law to prescribe the amount of cash that the treasurer of the society may keep with him taking into consideration the circumstances of each society.

It is contended by some that a certain amount of cash has to be kept in the primary society to be disbursed as loans but it seems to me that there is no general necessity for this, provided arrangements are made to enable societies to get cash readily. A current account system was indicated as one possible method of facilitating this.

31. In my last report I classified the societies affiliated to unions into A, B, C, D, E and F on Classification of societies. the basis of the percentage of overdues (from members) to demand as under:—

Class A up to 5 per cent of overdues.

Class D up to 60 per cent of overdues.

E above 60

F societies which have granted no loans within the last 12 months including all dormant societies.

In the year under report I found it necessary to adopt the following two systems of classification. Societies were proposed to be classified into A, B, C and D as suggested in the ninth Conference of Registrars held at Bombay in 1926 on the basis of the help derived by them. They are also to be classed into I to VI on the basis of actual collections to demand:—

I. 95 per cent and over.II. 70 per cent ,,

III. 55 per cent

IV. 40 per cent

V. Below 40 per cent.

VI. Dormant societies which have not given any loans in the last 12 months.

VII. Societies to which no loans have yet fallen due.

This was to provide a correct view of the actual financial The list of societies classified in this manner is appended to this report. I do not think the classification into A, B, C and D can be very reliable in the first year—the classification in each district is done by a different officer and depends largely on personal opinion. This I think accounts to a considerable extent for the marked disparity among the districts.

32. The Committee on Co-operation presided over by Mr. C. A. H. Townsend, c.I.E., I C.S., Committee on Co-operapresented their report on January 1928 and the Government published their report on 21st February 1928. In view of the many doubtful issues raised by the Committee in respect of recent developments and of the clear indication of the necessity for reorganization I was asked to direct for the present my entire attention to the reorganization of the movement and not to the further development of non-credit activities and also to concentrate my attention on matters which are of vital importance such as the recommendations regarding supervision, inspection and the staff to be provided by Government. I have submitted my remarks separately on all the 248 recommendations. Final reports on a few recommendations are yet pending as they are yet under scrutiny and information required is being collected.

III.—Working of Societies.

(a) The Madras Central Urban Bank, Ltd. (Provincial Bank).

33. The tabular statement given below shows the transactions of the Provincial Bank during the last five years:—

- 34. The total share capital of the bank rose to Rs. 5,96,350

 from Rs. 5,95,770. No preferential shares of individuals were redeemed during the year. The amount of shares held by individuals and Central Banks at the end of the year was Rs. 18,400 and Rs. 5,77,950 against Rs. 18,400 and Rs. 5,77,370 respectively at the end of the previous year. Individual members are 184 and all the Central Banks except the Christian Central Co-operative Bank, Ltd., and 29 primary societies are members.
- 35. There was considerable expansion in the transactions of the bank under all heads. The bank under all heads. The deposits of individuals rose from Rs. 47.59 lakhs to Rs. 56.95 lakhs while the deposits of local boards and municipalities, etc., rose from Rs. 25.07 lakhs to Rs. 27.82 lakhs at the end of the year. Deposits of all kinds increased from Rs. 116.97 lakhs to Rs. 125.46 lakhs. During the year, the Madras Central Urban Bank offered for sale 5 per cent debenture bonds to the amount of Rs. 5 lakhs at 95 to attract long term money, and the debenture money on 50th June 1928 amounted to Rs. 1.83 lakhs.
- 36. Loans to the extent of Rs. 65.91 lakhs of which
 Rs. 12.51 lakhs went to individuals,
 were issued during the year as compared
 with Rs. 58.37 lakhs in the previous year. The total of
 loans outstanding amounted to Rs. 85.51 lakhs, of which
 Rs. 3.11 lakhs were due from individuals on the security of
 their deposits, as compared with Rs. 74.73 lakhs in the
 previous year.
- 37. The direct indebtedness of primary societies to the Madras Central Urban Bank was further reduced from Rs. 5,000 at the beginning of the year to Rs. 1,500 at the end. It is hoped that the entire outstandings under this head will be realised during the current year.
- 38. The net divisible profit of the Madras Central Urban

 Bank for the year comes to Rs. 2,61,463

 against Rs. 2,05,848 in spite of the fact
 that the bank reduced the lending rate to 6 per cent to Central
 Banks which reduced the rate of interest on borrowings from
 individuals and local boards to 5½ and 4 per cent. The

increase in profits is due to the increase in transactions and the reduction of the rate of interest on deposits. The highest rate of interest on deposits paid by the bank is only $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

Overdraft with the Imperial Bank of India rendered great assistance to the movement particularly in regard to the provision of fluid resources by allowing overdrafts to the Central Banks as well as to the Madras Central Urban Bank at a flat rate of 6½ per cent. During the year an additional overdraft of Rs. 40,000 was sanctioned to the Sree Konaseema Co-operative Central Bank, Ltd., while the overdraft granted to the Anantapur District Bank was reduced to Rs. 50,000 at my instance. Thus the overdrafts allowed amounted to Rs. 36.66 lakhs at the end of the year as compared with Rs. 36.76 lakhs at the end of the

previous year. The overdrafts are given on the condition that they will be utilized only as cover for deposits or as short term loans repayable within a year.

45. During the year the Government issued orders permitting the Central Banks to take Fluid resources. credit for the overdraft allowed by the Madras Central Urban Bank in their fluid resources and requiring them to maintain fluid resources for the overdrafts granted by them to societies to serve as cover for deposits by non-members. The committee on co-operation has recommended that these banks should have less on the Imperial Bank for fluid resource and steps are being taken to increase their owned fluid resource. It has been recommended that they should put more of their funds into Government paper but the anomalous position arises that, if they invest their spare cash in Fixed Deposit in the Madras Central Urban Bank, they do not have to pay interest on it while, if they buy Government paper they render themselves liable to income-tax. A set off of the interest paid on money invested is only allowed if it can be shown that specific sums were borrowed at a certain rate and reinvested in Government promissory notes, but this is rarely possible. A bank may usefully invest surplus fund and floating balances largely in Government paper, but if it does so, it must apparently pay income-tax on the full amount of interest received on such Government paper.

Half-yearly reports in respect of each central bank are being received to find out if any central bank failed to maintain the required standard and the days for which there was deficiency with the amount of such deficiency. During the half-year ending 31st December 1927, 15 out of the 31 Central Banks did not maintain the prescribed standard for the whole period, the maximum amount of deficiency being Rs. 2,98,690 in one case while it was only nine Central Banks in the next half-year with the maximum deficit being Rs. 98,160. Two reasons (viz.), anticipation of renewal of deposits and inadequacy of collections, are generally assigned for failure to maintain the prescribed standard of fluid resources. The attention of the Central Banks has been drawn to the fact that it is quite unsound to bank on the supposition that a deposit is going to be renewed. Central Banks have been advised to stop issuing further loans when the fluid resource available is just up to the limit and to make arrangements in advance to maintain

adequate fluid resource for the deposits falling due.

46. The movement has continued to attract even to a larger extent the deposits of local boards and municipalities in spite of the fact that the rate of interest thereon was not allowed to exceed 4 per cent. At the end of the year the deposits from local boards and other special sources amounted to Rs. 161.07 lakhs as compared with Rs. 138.62 lakhs at the end of the previous year.

The deposits held by the district banks from non-members and members amounted to Rs. 331.91 lakhs against Rs. 295.91 lakhs in the previous year, an increase of Rs. 36 lakhs. These deposits represent 61 per cent of the total working capital as compared with 62 per cent in the previous year. The borrowings from the Provincial Bank by the Central Banks were Rs. 84.62 lakhs, which is 15 per cent of their working capital as compared with 16 in the previous year.

47. The increase in book profits as well as divisible profits compared with the previous year was appreciable in Bellary, Coimbatore, Cuddapah, Ganjām, Gōdāvari, Sree Konaseema, Kurnool, Salem and Tinnevelly District Banks. With the exception of Chittoor and South Kanara Central Banks the rest will be in a position to declare dividend at the maximum rate of 9 per cent.

48. The percentage of balance to demand for principal, arrear interest and current interest due Demand, collection and to the district banks are shown in Appendix No. 4, section II. It will be seen therefrom that the principal arrears under long and short term loans were nil in Aska Central Bank and less than 10 per cent in Ramachandrapuram, Sree Konaseema and Ellore Central Banks, while they were very high in Anantapur, South Arcot, Hospet, Chittoor, Cuddapah, Malabar and Salem under long term loans, the percentage being in excess of 50 per cent. Under short term loans, the arrears were not heavy except in the case of Hospet, Chittoor and Cuddapah District Banks. With regard to the collection of interest all the district banks have done well with the exception of Chittoor (17 per cent), Cuddapah (14 per cent), Malabar (13 per cent) and Nellore (14 per cent). Constant attempts are being made to increase the proportion of short-term business.

There was substantial increase in share capital in almost all districts. The increase is particularly satisfactory in North Arcot, Chingleput and Gōdāvari East.

- 51. The total divisible profit earned by the societies during the year amounted Profits. Rs. 9,69,952, as against Rs. 9,25,842 in the previous year. The total loss not yet recouped by societies on the last day of the year amounted to Rs. 10,97,999 as compared with Rs. 9,51,495 in the previous year. The book profits of all agricultural credit societies for the year amounted to Rs. 39,92,239 as compared with Rs. 34,04,471 in the previous year. Four hundred and eighty-five out of 11.966 societies were not really started on work before the end of the year. Of the remaining 11,481 societies, 4,889 worked at a loss when overdue interest is excluded from the profits, and 1,318 societies only worked at a loss amounting in all to Rs. 56,040 when overdue interest is included in the profits. Of the societies started during the year, viz., 433 were responsible for a loss of Rs. 7,864. The remaining loss, viz., Rs. 48,176 relates to 885 old societies and the average loss for a society comes to Rs. 54.
- 52. A statement of loans given by agricultural societies during the year, classified according to purpose, value, security and period will be found in Appendix No. 2, which also contains the corresponding figures for the previous year. The following statement shows the amount of loans given during the last five years for (1) productive purposes, (2) non-productive purposes, and (3) paying off prior debts.

It may be seen therefrom the percentage of total loans issued during the year to the working capital was 44 per cent. The amount of loans granted for non-productive purposes has unfortunately increased to Rs. 443 lakhs. The amount of loans given by the agricultural credit societies during the year for short term purposes was Rs. 107:31 lakhs (42.32 per cent) while that for long term was Rs. 146.25 lakhs (57.68 per cent). The amount borrowed from Central Banks was Rs. 76.20 lakhs and Rs. 129.97 lakhs respectively under short term and long term. A greater portion was thus for long term. The amount of loans outstanding against members was Rs. 129.43 lakhs under short term and Rs. 378.99 lakhs under long term while the amounts due to Central Banks were Rs. 82.85 lakhs and Rs. 355.47 lakhs. The societies have been furnished with a general guide of what constitutes short term and long term loans and how the purposes may be classed under these heads in order to facilitate their work in granting loans to members.

The system of advancing loans on the pledge of produce and paying the Government kist in lump to the village munsif or the taluk treasury was tried in 11 societies of the Kaikalur Union area in Kistna District. The aggregate amount of kist so remitted by the societies came to Rs. 20,843 and the Revenue Divisional Officer of the division has reported that the system has worked well. The system will be extended to other districts also this year. The amount of loans given for repayment of kist increased from Rs. 13,78,000 in 1926-27 to Rs. 15,47,000 in 1927-28.

The total amount of loans issued on the security of movables outstanding on 30th June 1928 amounted to

Rs. 11.45 lakhs as against Rs. 7.04 lakhs in the previous year and 2.53 in the year before last.

In the previous year and in the year before last, the number of unions falling in this category, i.e., less than 12 per cent principal and 10 per cent interest overdue was 7 and 3 respectively and the number has now increased to 18. It is very gratifying to note that the Vizianagram union in the Vizagapatam District continues to maintain a high place as in the previous reports. There was an increase in the percentage of overdues both under principal and interest in the Ottappidaram Union in the Tinnevelly District, the percentage being 15 under principal (short and long term) and 9 under current interest as against one per cent and 2 per cent respectively in the previous year. It is hoped that the union will reduce the arrears to a minimum in the current year and maintain level of efficiency as in previous years. Except for a slight deterioration in the collection of arrear interest, the percentage of overdues to demand both under principal and current interest has decreased. Appendix No. 5, Section 1 gives details for each district. It may be seen therefrom that Ganjām, Gödāvari East, Gödāvari West and Vizagapatam have shown the best results in regard to the collection of principal both under long and short term loans. Overdues are very heavy in Anantapur, Arcot South, Chittoor, Cuddapah, Kurnool, Malabar, the Nilgiris and Salem as the percentage of balance to demand ranges from 50 to 85 per cent. I trust the district federations and local unions in these districts will take necessary steps to reduce the arrears and show satisfactory results in the current year. regards interest, collections of current interest were satisfactory in the districts of Ganjām, Godāvari East, Godāvari West and Vizagapatam and in arrear interest Godavari East and Godavari West showed fair results. The central banks in the districts of Arcot North and Arcot South have given extensions of time to societies but the societies in these districts have not in their turn showed a similar concession to their members. This is very irregular as was repeatedly pointed out and ought not to continue. To combat the overdues in primary societies, the unions and federations should do their work efficiently and systematically and I have urged on them the necessity of prompt attention to this important matter on which the success of the movement largely depends. these societies are now required to open a register of overdue loans and to transfer all overdue cases to that register. Each primary society affiliated to a union was asked to send to the union every month a statement to show the demand. collection and balance of loans due from its; members, Each union in its turn arranged for collections especially in societies where the arrears were very heavy and the panchavat weak. At the same time the unions were requested to prepare a consolidated statement for all their affiliated societies and send it in duplicate to the District Federation. The District Federation was similarly furnished with statements in duplicate from non-affiliated societies. A copy was given to the central banks to keep them informed of the state of arrears in each society. I am glad to notice that this arrangement had a wholesome effect and I would again press on these institutions the necessity of devoting their attention still more to the collections in primary societies. One of the treasons for the overdues as the Committee on Co-operation has observed is the defect in the present organization under which no facilities are granted for the prompt disposal of short term loan applications. Cultivators do not repay their loans as they think that if they do so they will be unable to obtain the money they require in time for their next cultivation season. The delay was generally in the union where the governing body never met frequently to dispose of loan applications. With a view to the loan applications being dealt with, with the utmost promptitude and to facilitate loans being got quickly unions were advised to have committees formed consisting of 2 or 3 directors at the union headquarters, in widespread unions and if possible the member in charge of a society which sends a loan application to deal with all loan applications quickly either by meeting or by circulation and holding over for the next directors' meeting only those applications on which there was any disagreement. To develop short term business and foster the co-operative finance of agriculture the system of forecasts for the whole year devised years ago was not pressed as it had failed but a modified proposal was recommended. I issued circular instructions to all societies, unions and financing banks to make sufficiently early an application for a loan estimated to be enough to provide for cultivation other short term needs, preferably six expenses and weeks in advance before the commencement of the culti-This estimate together with the necessary vation season. panchayat resolutions for borrowing the amount from the financing bank and loan applications in duplicate and pro-notes, etc., were to be sent through the union to the financing bank. This application should be dealt with in the ordinary course, but the bank would pass orders allowing the loan to be drawn on for four months between specified dates—any amount not so drawn to lapse. Delay in the

registration of pro-notes by primary societies has been obviated by the Central Banks agreeing to accept unregistered pro-notes of primary societies for short term loans. Again delay in the drawal of money required further hinders short term business. This can be avoided and simplified by developing current account banking through local urban banks in which primary credit societies can have current accounts.

The total working capital was Rs. 1,86,225 and the net profit and loss were Rs. 4,092 and Rs. 20,055 respectively against Rs. 1,69,186 and Rs. 3,001 and Rs. 17,051, respectively in the previous year. Of the five agricultural and industrial societies, the Kallakurichi Agricultural and Industrial Society worked satisfactorily during the year. The total income of the main factory and its three branches was Rs. 32,203 against Rs. 21,630 in the previous year. The working expenses amounted to Rs. 18,864 against Rs. 19,612 in the previous year. The society earned a net profit of Rs. 3,348 as compared with Rs. 2,012 during the previous year. In addition to rice hulling decortication of groundnut, sugarcane crushing and manufacture of jaggery, etc., the society supplied groundnut oil to the expeller worked in the premises of the society by the Industries Department as an experimental measure.

The Pillapālaiyam Agricultural and Industrial Society in Coimbatore did not make any appreciable progress. The number of individual members fell by 2, there being 9 societies

and 27 individual members at the end of the year with a paid-up share capital of Rs. 7,328. The working capital of the society amounted to Rs. 8,500 and it earned a net profit of Rs. 283.

There was no improvement in the working of the Tindivanam society. It incurred a loss of Rs. 2,187 and added to the already unoccupied loss of Rs. 17,412. The failure is mainly due to the location of the factory in an out-of-the-way place far away from the town. Steps were taken to revive the society with financial aid under the State Aid to the Industries Act. The newly started Udipi Agricultural and Industrial Society in South-Kanara and the Mēlūr Agricultural and Industrial Society in Madura did practically no work during the year under review. Their working capital were Rs. 11,936 and Rs. 8,970, respectively.

The working of milk supply societies and the only egg production and sale society in the Chingleput District has

already been referred to.

Joint Purchase and Sale.

58. The total joint purchase in the year amounted to Rs. 1,49,209 and resulted in savings to members estimated at Rs. 5,024 whereas the corresponding figures for the previous year were Rs. 1,58,293 and Rs. 5,197, respectively. Foodstuffs, cloth and fish-guano were the principal articles concerned in the joint purchase. The transactions under joint sales were up to Rs. 1,06,284 yielding an approximate gain of Rs. 587 to the members as compared with Rs. 1,35,727 and Rs. 4,632 under the respective heads in the previous year.

Class V.—Cattle Insurance.

59. No addition was made during this year to the number of societies under this class. The transactions of these societies are exhibited in statement E. There were four societies, one in the South Arcot District and three in the Chingleput on 30th June 1928 but none did any material work.

Class VI.—Other Forms.

60. There were at the end of the previous year 300 societies of this class. During the year 49 societies were added by registration and five by transfer from other classes while two societies were removed on account of their dissolution and four were transferred to other classes. There were

The Non-Agricultural Societies have been able to attract considerable deposits, the difference between the deposits on 30th June 1927 and : 0th June 1928 being Rs. 15,96,626. The proportion of borrowings from Central Banks has steadily decreased. Many of the urban banks are offering higher

rates than is necossary to obtain the funds they require and in a few cases there has been a suspicion that high rates have been paid to please the depositors without sufficient attention to the best interest of the bank. These banks have necessarily to pay to deposits a slightly higher rate than Central Banks but I can see no point in attracting local deposits at rates higher than they would be required to pay for loans from the Central Bank.

- 63. On 30th June 1928, 98 societies had more than Rs. 20,000 as deposits and were required to maintain fluid resources under G.O. No. 1237, Development, dated 29th August 1923. Of these 20 failed for some period in the year to maintain the requisite standard. Every quarter the position of these societies is reviewed and such of them as fail to maintain the requisite standard are warned.
- 64. There are one hundred and sixteen societies on thrift basis, one in East Godávari, 110 in South Kanara, 3 in Kurnool and 2 in Madras. They have accumulated a share capital of

Rs. 38,051 against Rs. 24,344 in the previous year. The societies received deposits from members amounting to Rs. 694 under fixed and Rs. 9,436 under provident fund. Out of the savings Rs. 11,084 has been invested in other societies and Rs. 55,231 has been issued as loans to members. These cannot strictly be called thrift societies as provision has been made in their by-laws for borrowings and the societies in South Kanara have lent to members in excess of the savings. The question of exempting thrift societies which provide only for deposits and not for loans from the compulsory maintenance of Reserve Fund is under consideration.

Of the two societies in Madras the Mount Road Firm Employees Society had 520 members and a share capital of Rs. 231. The provident fund subscribed by members amounted to Rs. 5,667. A sum of Rs. 5,222 was deposited in the Christian Co-operative Central Bank at $6\frac{1}{4}$ per cent.

The East Gōdāvari Local Fund Officers' Co-operative Mutual Benefit Fund Society had 460 members and the share capital increased from Rs. 1,397 to Rs. 4,351. The funds were invested in the Central Bank.

The 110 societies in the South Kanara District for field labourers and fishermen had a paid-up share capital of Rs. 33,312 and deposits amounting to Rs. 3,827. Loans to the extent of Rs. 54,395 have been granted to members of these societies.

Municipal Employees' (inferior) societies in Tanjore, Coimbatore and Kistna Districts did useful work during the year by purchasing cloth to the value of Rs. 4,723, foodstuffs Rs. 37,640 and other requirements Rs. 232 and distributing these to members. The savings effected by the members through joint purchase is Rs. 1,101 of which the Tanjore Municipal Employees' Society alone saved Rs. 904. Much of the success of this class of societies is due to the interest

evinced by the chairman of the respective municipal councils and other officers. It has been found from experience that unless the officers take an active interest in their working they do not thrive.

Few municipal councils seem to trouble themselves over

the condition of their poorest employees.

Besides these 1,572 societies there were 364 societies at the end of the year in charge of the Kallar Special Officers, Madura and Tanjore. There were 26,053 members with a paid-up share capital of Rs. 1,13,790. Members' deposits amounted to Rs. 1,272, loads from Central Banks and non-members. Rs. 1,55,631. 73. Some depressed classes societies obtained lands on lease or otherwise for cultivation by members. At the end of the year, 38,471 acres of land were held on lease by these societies against 30,115 acres in the preceding year. Most of lease societies are situated in the districts of Guntūr and East Gōdāvari.

The special problems which they offer centre round organization, supervision and finance. The Townsend Committee on Co-operation recommended in the main that organization and supervision of these societies should be in the hands of the Labour Department in districts where it is working and that the audit should be done by the Co-operative Department. It was found necessary that for intensive and satisfactory supervision there should be one inspector for every 25 depressed class societies. The matter is under consideration.

IV .- RESERVE FUND.

74. The total Reserve Fund will amount to Rs. 82,18,439 compared with Rs. 68,53,649 in the previous year, when the contributions to reserve fund have been made in accordance

with the audit orders on the accounts for the year 1927-28. The total is made up as follows:—

The Madras Central Urban Bank has invested its whole reserve in the Government promissory notes. All the District Banks are now investing their entire Reserve Fund in the Madras Central Urban Bank and the primary societies in the District Banks. As per audit order for 1926-27 the Primary Societies, Agricultural and Non-agricultural were required to invest Rs. 49,58,840 towards Reserve Fund of which Rs. 39,54,144 have been separately invested leaving a balance of Rs. 10,04,696 at the end of the year. The total reserve of all societies has increased by 23.01 lakhs, while their total working capital increased by 18.86 as compared with 21.28 and 17.79 in the previous year.

VI.—SUPERVISION.

76. The number of supervising and audit unions alone increased from 366 to 392 excluding three propagandist unions and nineteen federations. Of the 14,064 primary societies in the Presidency 11,54½ societies were affiliated as against 10,709 in the previous year and 580 societies had not started work by the end of the year. Major portion of the unaffiliated societies are in charge of the Labour Department.

Supervision Fund.

77. The receipts by local supervising unions and federations towards Supervision Fund during the year with the opening balances amounted to Rs. 7,96,887 and expenditure was Rs. 7,07,811 as against Rs. 4,47,214 and Rs. 3,13,829 in the previous year. The total demand for the year on account of Supervision Fund was Rs. 3,46,267 of which primary societies paid Rs. 2,20,670 leaving a balance of Rs. 1,25,597 uncollected at the end of the year. Of the total receipts under Supervision Fund referred to above, the contributions paid by all the central banks amounted to Rs. 1,44,096 (vide Appendix 13). Arrangements have been made in the year under report to strengthen the Supervision Fund contributions by respective bodies and to make it the first charge on remittances.

VII .- DISPUTES AND LITIGATION.

78. Particulars of suits filed and the number of decrees obtained in Civil Courts during the Civil suits. year are furnished in Appendix No. 9, Section I. 1,435 suits were filed during the year against 1,321 in the previous year. In 154 cases claims were satisfied before decree and 1,098 cases were decreed against 1,233 in the preceding year leaving a balance of 496 suits at the end of the year as compared with 277 in the previous year. The amount involved in these suits was Rs. 42,040 as against Rs. 11,087 during the last year. The districts of Anantapur. Madras, Malabar, Tanjore and Trichinopoly have largely contributed to this number. With regard to the decrees outstanding 891 decrees were satisfied during the year leaving a balance of 2,672 decrees pending execution at the end of the year. The amount covered by these decrees was Rs. 1,71,799 as against Rs. 1,50,292 in the previous year,

79. Section II of Appendix No. 9 furnishes details of arbitration references preferred under Arbitration. rule XIV of the rules framed under the 20,444 references were filed in the year. 16,473 references were decreed during the year leaving a balance of 8,359 at the end of the year involving Rs. 7,91,085 as against Rs. 7,23,667 in the previous year. 40,600 decrees were pending execution at the beginning of the year, to which 15,879 were added during the year. 11,140 cases were satisfied during the year leaving a balance of 45,339 cases amounting to Rs. 35,53,588 at the end of the year as against Rs. 32,51,400 in the previous year. The number of decrees pending execution is very large in Anantapur, Arcot North. Chittoor, Kanara South, Tanjore, Trichinopoly and Vizagapatam districts.

Against a sum of Rs. 45.59 lakhs accounted for, there remained a sum of Rs. 170.77 lakhs overdue on 30th June 1928. The figure was 153.88 on 30th June 1927. This gives a clear indication that no action to recover overdues has been taken by the societies in a large number of cases. Many societies are most reluctant to take cases to Civil Courts on account of the great delay, expense and difficulty caused in executing the decrees. On the other hand they are prone to obtain an arbitration decree and leave it at that neither pressing for payment nor executing the decree. The pendency of decrees is steadily increasing to serious proportion and further steps are necessary to get them executed rapidly. The matter is under examination, but I cannot view with equanimity the suggestion made that the Registrar

should undertake execution, a suggestion which seems to imply the employment of a hoard of amins and process-servers difficult to control and impossible to discipline.

VIII.—LIQUIDATION.

81. The registration of 107 societies was cancelled during the year. Of these 70 were Agricultural and 19 Nonagricultural credit societies. Liquidation proceedings were completed in 65 societies. A list of the societies under liquidation will be found in Appendix 10. To speed up liquidation proceedings, the Government were pleased to sanction during the year 24 Junior Inspectors who were distributed among 24 districts. It was not expected that these would do all the work of liquidation and they were supplemented by men employed temporarily at the expense of the societies under liquidation by charging \(\frac{1}{2}\) per cent per month on amounts outstanding.

IX.—AUDIT.

82. Audit of all societies with the exception of four was completed before the end of the co-operative year and audit certificates were issued for all societies except for three. With regard to the four societies referred to above, it is reported that the Account books of two societies could not be secured, the accounts of one society (Madura Building Co-operative Society) were lost and had to be rewritten, the account book of one society was with the police.

Attempts have been made during the year to make the audit more methodical, while at the same time providing for periodical meetings to give Inspectors a brief change of occupation to ensure that they keep up to date in their knowledge of instructions and to arrange their further

programme.

They are then therefore required to meet the Assistant Registrar four times in the year for about a week on dates fixed in advance by me. They receive instructions, bring up their difficulties for discussion and settlement, go through departmental circulars and fix the audit programme for the next five months. The programme so arranged give the societies in the order of audit, the actual dates being fixed from time to time a month in advance, and must be rigidly adhered to. It provided in 1927–28 for the final audit of all societies by 31st December 1927 and was, I consider, on the

whole successful. The progress on 31st December 1927 in all districts was as follows:—

The audit in all except four districts was substantially finished by the prescribed time and I cannot find that the quality of audit has suffered. After the completion of the final audit, interim audit was taken up on the same lines with the result that of 12,400 societies the interim audit of 10,074 societies was completed within the year. It has accordingly been possible to get on with the final audit during the current year much more rapidly.

The accounts of the Madras Central Urban Bank, the Madras Christian Co-operative Central Bank, the Salem District Bank, the Madras Southern Mahratta Employees' Society, the Triplicane Urban Co-operative Society, Salem Urban, Chittoor Town and Tirupathi Town Bank were audited by Public Accountants and Auditors. The audit of the remaining societies was done by the departmental staff.

The number of audit unions increased from 10 to 11. Forty-two societies in Madras come under the audit scheme and contributed the amount required for four auditors deputed from the department to audit their accounts.

Government were pleased to approve of my proposal to provide me in the year under report with auditors at the rate of one for 60 societies. A re-distribution of Inspectors for purposes of audit, liquidation and administration was made to take effect from January last.

The existing audit notes of primary societies are now split into interim audit and final audit report. The final audit report contains financial statements and particulars leading up to the preparation of profit and loss account and balance sheet and all the information necessary for the verification of assets and liabilities with special reference to the statutory obligations of the department for audit.

The figures furnished in this report are unaudited except in the case of Central Banks and 4,318 societies. In compiling the figures for the year under review, the audited closing balance has been adopted as the opening balance under each head.

X .- Acts, Rules and By-Laws.

83. During the year under review, the Government amended Rule XIV of the rules framed under the Act legalising the transfer of arbitration references to Assistant Registrars and Honorary Assistant Registrars by the Deputy Registrars. The question of revision of the Act was engaging my attention and I have since submitted to Government a draft bill for amending the law relating to co-operative societies.

In virtue of the powers contained in the by-rule No. VIII-D of the rules issued under Act II of 1912 in the G.O. No. 142-II, dated 31st January 1927, I prescribed the following scale of fees payable by societies towards the cost of their audit:—

(1) Scale for credit societies.—This will be calculated on working capital as it was on the last day of the co-operative year previous to the one for which fees are leviable as follows:—

Eight annas per Rs. 100 of the working capital for the first Rs. 50,000 or part thereof;

Six annas per Rs. 100 for the next Rs. 50,000 or part thereof;

Four annas per Rs. 100 for the next Re. one lakh or part thereof;

Three annas per Rs. 100 for the next Re. one lakh or part thereof;

Two annas per Rs. 100 for the next Re. one lakh or part thereof;

No levy will be made on capital exceeding the last mentioned limit.

Working capital will, for the purpose of this rule, include:—

(1) Paid-up share capital;

- (2) Deposits and loans from individuals and institutions;
- (3) Deposits and loans from other co-operative societies;
- (4) Loans from Government and
- (5) Reserve Fund.
- (2) Scale for purchase, purchase and sale, production and production and sale societies.—This will be based upon the value of goods purchased, produced or sold— $\frac{1}{4}$ per cent on the value of goods purchased, or purchased and sold, or produced, or produced and sold, as the case may be.

(3) Scale for building societies.—These societies will be exempt from the payment of any fee for a period of three years from the date of promulgation of these proceedings.

(4) Scale for printing presses, hostel societies and other miscellaneous classes of societies.—5 per cent on gross income.

XI.—STAFF.

84. Efforts have been made during the year to improve the efficiency of the staff. A number of graduates have been recruited to the inspectorate and clerical staff and all have been given periodical instructions during the quarterly meeting in office routine. Assistant Registrars and their staff have been directed at intervals to go through the Office Manual, learn it and follow it. Regular inspections of offices has further laid stress on this side of the work.

The Deputy Registrars are, I consider, overburdened with the weight and diversity of their duties and the way in which they have done their work during the year under review is worthy of the highest praise. With few exceptions the Assistant Registrars have also acquitted themselves well and though the criticism of the Townsend Committee cannot be passed off as unjustifiable, there is no doubt that as a whole and particularly in individual cases they have worked very hard. I must record my appreciation of the manner

in which the inspectorate staff, many of them with little experience, have worked and loyally done their best to carry out departmental instructions and get through audit with the utmost promptitude.

XII .- MISCELLANEOUS.

- 85. The Sixteenth Provincial Co-operative Conference was held in April 1928 at Rajahmundry under the Presidency of Dr. Radhakamal Mukerjee, M.A., PH.D., University Professor of Economics and Sociology, Lucknow. Mr. Ranganatha Mudaliyar, M.L.C., the ex-Development Minister, opened the Conference. Five sub-committees were formed for the discussion of the subjects which were divided into Rural Credit, Central Banks, Urban Banks, Rural Re-construction and Non-Credit. The resolutions passed by the various Sub-Committees were then considered at the open conference. Among other important resolutions those requiring special mention are—
- (1) the recommendations of the Townsend Committee and the
- (2) starting of rural re-construction centres in the Presidency to bring about a co-ordination of the work of the Agriculture, Co-operative, Labour, Industries, Hygienic and Educational agencies for a collective programme of regional development being initiated through special staff of competent supervisors trained for the work.

Action is being taken in regard to the second of these items by the Provincial Co-operative Union in consultation with the Madras Central Urban Bank.

District Co-operative conferences were also held in Tanjore, Vizagapatam, North Arcot, Salem, West Gödāvari and Malabar. Besides these conferences, a number of taluk and union business conferences were also held.

- 86. There are at present 23 of the Inspectors on foreign service under co-operative institutions, five under central banks, six under federations and seven under audit unions and one under supervising union.
- 87. The Government sanctioned during the year the sums of money noted below to the societies for the maintenance of public libraries:—

88. I must refer with regret to the death of Sir P. Rajagopala Achariyar, the first Registrar of Co-operative Credit Societies, whose able work in the early stages laid the foundation of the movement.

XIII.—ATTITUDE OF THE PUBLIC.

89. The attitude of the public continues to be cordial and the number of honorary workers is increasing. I am indebted to the large number of private gentlemen who have willingly given their time and energy to the development of the movement. I am also indebted to the authorities of the Imperial Bank for their valuable advice on matters of finance affecting the movement. Relations with other departments, principally the Revenue, Labour, Agricultural and Industries continue to be very cordial.

XIV.—GENERAL.

90. Government were pleased to confer the title of Rao Bahadur on M.R.Ry. K. Deivasikhamani Mudaliyar Avargal, the Joint Registrar, during the year in recognition of his valuable contributions to the development of the movement.
