ADMINISTRATION REPORT

OF THE

SALT DEPARTMENT

MADRAS PRESIDENCY

FOR

1927-1928.

CHAPTER I.

Administration.

Several important administrative changes were made during the year under review:—

(1) The reduction of establishment charges payable by Excise and Modified Excise licensees and lessees.

Upder Section 43 of the Madras Salt Act, 1889, licensees in Excise and Modified Excise Factories were liable to pay annually to the Government so much of the charges for the establishments maintained at the Factory for purpose of protection and collection of revenue as were in excess of five per cent of the duty realised on the salt sold in the Factory in the preceding official year. On a representation from some of the licensees that the rule operated harshly on them owing to the reduction of duty on salt and the increase which had occurred in the cost of establishments since the framing of the rule, Section 43 of the Act was amended, empowering the Central Board of Revenue to fix the percentage of establishment charges to duty realised in excess of which the charges will become payable by licensees. In pursuance of this power, the Board fixed the percentage tentatively at 10 with effect from 3rd April 1927 and the measure has, as was anticipated, afforded substantial relief to several excise factories and minor modified excise licensees. While on the 1st April 1927 there were 14 factories paying a cess of 1 anna or more per maund, 30 factor es paying 1 anna a maund and 2 factories paying no cess, the number on 1st April 1928 was 6 factories paying a cess of 1 anna or more, 36 factories paying a cess of 1 anna a maund and 9 factories not liable to any cess. In respect of modified excise lessees the relief was even more pronounced, the number of cases in which excess establishment charges were leviable being only 6 in 1927-28 as against 22 in 1926-27.

(2) The revision of the rules for the ssue of duty free salt for industrial purposes.

The changes introduced by the revised rules were (i) that an applicant for supply of duty free sult for ndustrial purposes should submit a separate application and pay the prescribed fee in respect of each of the factories or works for which the supply is required and (ii) that he should execute a bond and agreement in the prescribed form if the application is granted. The revised rules were brought into force from 1st October 1927.

(2) The abolition of brine tests.

Prior to the year under review the Department had insisted on the observance of certain rules connected with the manufacture of salt both in monopoly and excise factories in order to ensure in the interests of the consumer that a reasonably clean and chemically pure article was put on the market. The most important of these rules were:-(1) That salt should not be scraped when the density of the brine in the pans exceeded 30° Beaume. (2) that salt should not be scraped in less than one inch of brine, (3) that the bitterns should be eliminated after every third or fourth scraping, (4) that salt should be scraped only in the mornings and evenings. With effect from October 1927 all the four rules were abolished in excise factories, while in monopoly factories the first was abolished and the other three retained. Thus in excise factories all departmental supervision over the manufacture of salt has been abolished though certain rules have been framed enabling the Department to refuse to store salt containing more than 5 per cent. of magnesium salts or dirt. It remains to be seen whether these rules together with the element of competition between licensecs will be sufficient to ensure that a reasonably clean and pure article is sold to the consuming public.

(4) The abolition of the system of bag storage of salt.

The storage and sale of salt under the system of bag storage which had been permitted from the year 1917 was discontinued with effect from about the end of May 1927. The system of bag storage was popular with licensees and merchauts as it enabled them to dispose of the salt o the new season quickly as manufacture progressed, without having to incur the heavy expense of storing and covering, incidental to heap storage. The retail merchants who se'll salt by measure and not by weight also benefited to some extent as under the bag storage system the salt underwent less handling and crushing and in consequence gave a greater number of measures per maund than heaped salt. Bag storage and sales were under the rules allowed only up to the close of the season, and as the abolition of the system has not been in force for the full season of 1927, no definite opinion can be formed regarding results on the sale of sa't during the year under review.

(5) The conversion of monopoly factories into modified excise.

From the season of 1928 the monopoly factories of Calinga-patam, Chinnaganjam North and Manakkudi and the monopoly blocks in the Chinnaganjam South and Kattumavadi (Lakshmi Pans) factories were converted into modified excise. This is in accordance with the policy of the department in recent years to close monopoly factories wherever they cannot be worked economically under that system and are not definitely needed, and to depend on the dittam reserved from modified excise factories for the control of prices, if necessary. The only factories still working under the monopoly system are those in the Ennore Circle, a small block in the Karambalam factory for the French Supply and parts of the Polavaram and Kattumavadi actories!

(6) The revision of pay of officers.

Prior to 1st April 1927 Inspectors of the Department were in a graded scale of pay, while Assistant Commissioners were in a time-scale of Rs. 600—50—800 with one Assistant Commissioner in the selection grade on Rs. 900 and Assistant Inspectors were on a time scale of Rs. 150—5—200—10 250. With effect from 1st April 1927 the Inspectors also were brought on to a time scale of pay which was fixed at Rs. 300—30—540, and revised time-scales for Assistant Commissioners of Rs. 600—50—900 with one appointment in the selection grade on Rs. 1,000—100—1,200, and for Assistant Inspectors of Rs. 150—10—200—15—275 were sanctioned.

(7) During the year the Government of India delegated to the Collector, Assistant Commissioners and Inspectors certain financial powers under the Civil Account Code and in other matters connected with the administration of the Department—Government of India orders C. No. 201-Salt—26, dated 19th April 1927 and 14th June 1927. The powers cover a wide range from powers connected with ordinary cont agent and other expenditure governed by the Civil

Account Code to powers formerly exercised by the Commissioner and the subordinate officers of the old combined department under the Salt Act and under specific delegations made by the Local Government. Most of these powers were exercised by the Collector under delegations made by the Madras Government after the separation of the 'Salt' from the 'Excise' Department but consequent on the transfer of the administrative control of the Department from the Provincial to the Central Government with effect from 1st January 1926 these powers were renewed and in some cases modified or enhanced.

2. Personnel.—Mr. J. B. Brown, I.C.S., continued in charge of the administration of the Department throughout the year. Mr. E. W. Truter held the office of Secretary to the Collector of Salt Revenue until the 4th January 1928 when he retired and was succeeded by Mr. W. G. Baldrey. Mr. H. L. Prager was Assistant Commissioner, Central Division throughout the year except for a period of two mouths from 13th October 1927 when he went on leave and Mr. W. G. Baldrey acted for him. Messrs. L. K. Fearon and B. M. Marriott continued in charge of the Northern and Southern Divisions respectively throughout the year.

CHAPTER II.

Establishment.

- 3. Appendix A shows the sanctioned strength of the establishment at the beginning and at the end of the year. There was no change during the year in the sanctioned strength though the cost per annum shows an increase which is due to the revision of pay of Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors from 1st April 1927. As a sequence to the abolition of brine tests and the cessation of departmental supervision over manufacture, orders of the Central Board of Revenue were obtained to reduce the staff of Sub-Inspectors and peons tentatively for one year. The reduction comprised 24 Sub-Inspectors' posts permanent and 27 Sub-Inspectors and 62 peons' posts temporary. As the reduction is tentative only and the establishment has not been permanently surrendered, Appendix A which shows the sanctioned strength as it stood on 31st Narch 1928 does not take account of it.
- 4. Punishments.—The total number of punishments imposed on officers of the department was 644 (350) and the percentage of punishments to the total strength was 18-99 (10-32). The marked increase in the number of punishments during the year was mainly due to the fact that a large number of peons who had no permanent appointment had to be fined for sleeping on guard duty as it was found that extra maramath work was not a sufficiently deterrent punishment. The increase was to

a small extent due also to a greater number of fines imposed on Sub-Inspectors for carelessness in storage work.

5. Resignations.—One clerk, one petty officer and 14 peons resigned their appointments.

CHAPTER III.

Manufacture.

6. The season of 1927 was on the whole very favourable for sait manufacture. Except at the Polavaram Factory where manufacture was retarded on account of the submerging of the pans and channels by unexpected floods from the Agency hills in the beginning of March 1927 and at the Manambadi Factory where it was frequently interrupted by rain, the output in all the factories in the Presidency was far greater than that in the previous year. During the year the monopoly factories of Manakkudi in the Vattanam Circle and Sarahad II of the Karambalam Factory in the Cheyur Circle were left unworked as there was ample monopoly stock in these factories to meet requirements. The Muthuraghunathapatnam Excise Factory in the Vattanam Circle which was under orders of closure and the Cheyur Factory in the Cheyur Circle which is worked only every alternate year were not worked during the vear.

In November 1927 a severe cyclone passed over the factories situated in the Districts of Kistna, Guntur and Nellore. As manufacture had closed long before November in the factories of the Northern Division, the cyclone did not affect the output, but it caused considerable damage to salt heaps and buildings especially in the factories of the Krishnapatnam Circle. The damage to buildings including the quarters for the staff in the Krishnapatnam factories was so great that the headquarters of the Circle had to be temporarily moved from Krishnapatnam to Tada.

7. The quantity of sa't manufactured in the year was nearly 147\$ lakhs of maunds or 16\$ lakhs of maunds more than the quantity produced in 1926. Of this quantity, about 21\$ lakhs of maunds belonged to Governmen: and the balance to the licensees The stock on hand at the beg ming of the year was 58\$ lakhs of maunds and the quantity imported during the year, mainly from the Bombay Presidency was about 15\$ lakhs of maunds. The total stock of salt available for consumpt on was therefore 221\$ lakhs of maunds. The quantity issued during the year amounted to nearly 189\$ lakhs of maunds as aga nst 136 lakhs of maunds in 1926-27. The increase in issues was mainly due to larger exports during the year to Orissa and the Central Provinces from the Ganjam Factories where the output in the 1927 season was nearly 1\$\$ times that of the previous season and the selling prices very low. The stock of salt at the end of the year, excluding the ascertained

wastages which amounted to 8 lakhs of maunds, was 74 lakhs of maunds as against 58 lakhs of maunds at the end of 1926-27. The high wastage in the year was due to the heavy damage caused to salt heaps in the factories of the Krishnapatnam and Chinnaganjam Circles by the cyclone of November 1927 mentioned above.

8. During the year extensive areas held under modified excise leases in the Gokurkudda, Sumadi and Pundi Factories of the Ganjam District were relinquished by the lessees with a view primarily to concentrate manufacture in limited compact areas and save establishment charges payable by them to Government. Out of 4 platforms in the Gokurkudda Factory the area worked under platforms II, III and IV totalling about 329 acres was relinquished. As a result, the Gokurkudda Factory was abolished and platform No. I of that factory was added to the Humma Factory which was renamed as Ganjam Factory with effect from 1st April 1928. There is however a small quantity of salt left on platform II of the Gokurkudda Factory and the lessee has been given time for its removal till the end of September 1928. Pending the complete removal of this salt, the abolition of the Factory has not been given full effect to, but only the establishment absolutely necessary for guarding and for sales on platform II is now employed at Gokurkudda. In the Sumadi Factory the lessees Messrs. Hari Ram and Krishnamur hi Rao Nayudu have between them relinquished 415 acres, while in the Pundi Factory the Rajah of Parlakimedi relinquished what was known as the 100 acre extension. The establishment at Pundi also has been reduced consequent on the relinquishment, but full effect to the reduction has not been given pending complete removal of the salt by the lessee. The total cultivable occupied area left after these relinquishments in the factories of the Ganjam Circle was 1,737 acres and the output in this area if worked fully will be more than adequate to meet the demands on the factories whose market is chiefly in Orissa and in places adjoining but beyond the Presidency limits.

During the year the sa't in the Muthuraghunathapatnam Factory in the Ramnad District, which was under orders of closure, was completely removed by the 1st February 1928 and the establishment sanctioned for that factory was completely withdrawn from that date.

9. During the year manufacture under the monopoly system was permitted at Calingapatam, Polavarom, Ch'nnaganjam North and South, the Ennore Factories and Kattumavadi and a quantity of nearly 20 lakhs of maunds was stored. The right of Government to purchase salt from modified excise licensees at a fixed rate of Kudivaram was exercised only in a few factories where a dittam had been fixed under the 'Outright purchase' clause of the leases. These factories were Gokurkudda, Yundi, Mulapeta, Balacheruvu and Guruzanapalli and the total quantity purchased was 149,656 maunds against 239,125 maunds in the previous year. As the excise prices were low during the year, there was no necessity for Government to purchase the full dittam quantity fixed for the year and the portion of the dittam fixed under the 'lien dittam' clause of the leases was accordingly released.

10. The wholesale prices of excise salt fell on the average from 5 annas per maund in 1926-27 to 3 annas 5 pies in 1927-28. A s milar decrease is noticeable in the case of Government salt, the average price being 4 annas 10 pies against 6 annas 1 pie in 1926-27. The fall in the average excise prices was due to a successful manufacturing season and the large output in the year which stimulated competition among the licensees to dispose of their surplus stocks. In the circumstances there was no occasion for Government to control and regulate excise prices and the prices of Government salt were fixed at more or less the cost of production. At the Chinnaganjam North and South Factories and at Vedaranniyam however a departure had to be made and the issue prices reduced to below the cost of production as the salt at Vedaranniyam was old and belonged to the 1924 season and that at Chinnaganjam North and South had to be disposed of as quickly as possible owing to the conversion of the factories into modified excise from the reason of 1928.

11. The retail prices at the headquarter stations varied on the average from 1 anna 1-2 pies to 2 annas 1-5 pies a Madras measure of 120 tolas. The prices in 1926-27 were higher and ranged from 1 anna 1-2 pies to 2 annas 3-1 pies a Madras measure. The price exceeded 2 annas a Madras measure only in the Nilgiris. It is satisfactory to note in this connection that the retail price at Vizagapatam which was more than 2 annas on the average during 1925-26 and 1926-27 fell to 1 anna 8-6 pies in the year under review. This result is due to the new extension opened at Balacheruvu in the year 1926 and to the energy displayed by the lessee in working the extension.

CHAPTER IV.

Distribution and consumption.

12. The total quantity of salt issued from the salt factories or ordinary consumpt on during the year under report was 12,339,032 (11,742,319) maunds. Of this quantity 61,910 (64,310) maunds were issued to the French Government, 387,296 (414,286) maunds to the Travancore Durbar, 221,584 (141 104) maunds to the Fisheries Department and 375,772 (448,114) maunds were exported by sea to Colombo. The balance of 11,292,470 (10,674,505) maunds was distributed by rail or road for ordinary consumption in the areas usually supplied, viz. the Madras Presidency, and the Indian States within its borders, part of Behar and Orissa, the Central Provinces, the Nizam's Dominions, Mysore and Coorg. The supply from local sources to areas within the Presidency was supplemented by 1,185,049 (1,389,509) maunds imported by sea mainly from the Bombay Presidency into the West Coast Districts and 354,205 (385,506) maunds imported from Bombay and Goa by rail. From the same sources 649,673 (651,479) maunds were imported by rail into Mysore. The imports by sea into South Kanara and Malabar

show a considerable decrease compared with last year. The decrease may be attributed chiefly to large stocks of salt imported in previous years and to some extent to replacement of Bombay salt by Madras (Tuticorin) salt.

 There was no export of salt during the year to Calcutta under bond either by sea or by rail.

Owing to the dullness of the market and to the increased output and sale of locally produced salt in Ceylon, the exports to Colombo show a decrease of about 72,000 maunds.

14. Appendix 'G' shows the salt traffic in the Madras Presidency as far as it can be ascertained from the Railway and Sea Customs returns corrected by the factory declarations. It was pointed out in the last year's report (vide paragraph 15) that the salt of the Tuticorin factories had begun to compete in the interior districts which had formerly been mainly supplied by the factories situated in the Tanjore and South Areot Districts. During the year the sale of the Tuticorin salt shows an increase in the districts of Tanjore, Coimbatore and the Nilgiris whereas in the South Areot District, it has decreased.

The quantities consigned to Bengal, Central Provinces, Orissa, and the Nizam's Dominions increased from 15,185; 85,668; 966,550; 136,998; in 1926-27 to 19,807; 130,883; 1,151,498; 163,035 maunds in the year. The increases are due to a prosperous season and low selling prices.

15. The consumption of salt per head of population in the year under report was 20.20 lbs. against 20 lbs. in 1926-27 and 20.20 lbs. in 1925-26.

CHAPTER V.

Revenue and Expenditure.

- 16. The total receipts on account of Salt Revenue were Rs. 144-64 (143-12) lakhs. The increase in the revenue compared with the revenue realised in 1926-27 is due to the increased sales in the year. The refunds during the year amounted to Rs. 9,359 (10,605).
- 17. Of the total revenue Rs. 14-12 lakhs represents the duty and the cost price realised in cash, Rs. 127-88 lakhs the duty on salt sold on credit and the balance of Rs. 2-64 lakhs customs duty, cess and fines. There is a decrease of Rs. 2-69 lakhs under cost price of Government salt sold for Home and Inland consumption during the year. This is due partly to a decrease in the issues of Government salt in the year and partly to a reduction in the selling prices of monopoly salt. The percentage of issues of salt under the credit system was 93-8 (94-5).
- 18. Charges.—The total charges amounted to Rs. 18:66 (20:40) lakks of which Rs. 10:50 lakks were the recurring charges for establishments, supplies, services and contingencies of the Department and

Rs. 8-16 lakhs charges for the purchase, transport and storage of salt and the recoverable charges on account of excise licensees' works. The charges in 1927-28 were less as compared with the charges in the previous year mainly under (1) "Purchase of salt Manufacturers" share and (2) "Conveying and Storing salt," while the charges under "Works—Roads" were greater. Owing to the existence of large monopoly stocks and the low excise prices which prevailed in the year, manufacture in monopoly factories was restricted to the actual needs and this accounts for the decrease in expenditure under items (1) and (2). The increased expenditure under 'Roads' was due to the final adjustment of charges on account of the extension of the Railway sidings in the Tuticorin Factories.

CHAPTER VI.

Measures for the protection of the Revenue.

19. Appendix K shows the number of salt cases reported and the action taken on them. There was an increase of 32:38 per cent. in the number of cases reported. The large increase occurs chiefly under 'Possession of spontaneous or swamp salt' in the Chinnaganjam, Krishnapatnam, Ennore and Vattanam Circles and is due mainly to the more efficient patrolling of the swamps and to the greater personal interest taken by superior officers in detection work. It is also probable that the continued high issue price charged for salt in the Fish Curing Yards is making it increasingly tempting for fishermen to collect swamp salt to cure their fish outside the yards.

20. The total number of offences reported (inclusive of undetected cases and undetected scrapings) was 235 (159). The offenders were traced in 222 cases of which 197 cases were sent up for trial. Six cases were pending with the Magistracy at the beginning of the year. Convictions were obtained in 181 cases, 15 cases resulted in acquittal and the remaining 7 cases were pending with the Magistracy at the end of the year. Of the cases traced, 220 cases related to possession of illicit salt or salt earth or to the manufacture of salt by illicit means and the rest to minor offences. The quantity of contraband salt and salt earth involved was estimated at 107 maunds. The average duration of enquiry into cases by Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors was 7-00 (7-74) days.

CHAPTER VII.

Miscellaneous.

21. Saltpetre.—Under the revised Saltpetre rules which were introduced from 1st January 1927 licenses for the manufacture of crude and refined saltpetre are granted for the calendar year, i.e., January to Decem-

ber. It is therefore convenient to take into account figures for the calendar year alone in the case of the Saltpetre Industry. The number of licenses issued during the year 1927 was 81 and the quantity of saltpetre produced was 913 maunds. The quantity of educed salt produced is estimated at 908 maunds of which nearly 773 maunds is reported to have passed into human consumption and the balance used for tanning and private fish curing. It is ascertained from enquiries that the consumption of educed salt has had no harmful effect on the consumers. Six samples of educed salt taken from different representative refineries in the Coimbatore Preventive area were analysed during the year and the percentage of sodium chloride was found to range from 88-10 to 93-23 in three samples while in the remaining three samples it ranged from 81-79 to 86-00.

- 22. Amentics.—During the year the departmental elementary school at the Theethandathanam Factory was closed as the number of children attending the school was very small and as there was a Taluk Board School at a distance of about a mile from the factory. The remaining schools at factories are reported to be working satisfactorily. Tennis and Badminton Courts which exist in most factories continue to be well patronised by the staff for recreation.
- 23. The work of the officers of the Department has been satisfactory. Messrs. W. N. P. Rule, Muhammad Saleh, M. Krishnamurti Rao and C. St. E. K. Taylor did especially good work in Krishnapatnam Circle during the cyclone in November.

ADMINISTRATION REPORT

OF THE

SALT DEPARTMENT

MADRAS PRESIDENCY

FOR

1927-1928.

CHAPTER I.

Administration.

Several important administrative changes were made during the year under review :--

(1) The reduction of establishment charges payable by Excise and Modified Excise licensees and lessees.

Under Section 43 of the Madras Salt Act, 1889, licensees in Excise and Modified Excise Factories were liable to pay annually to the Government so much of the charges for the establishments maintained at the Factory for purpose of protection and collection of revenue as were in excess of five per cent of the duty realised on the salt sold in the Factory in the preceding official year. On a representation from some of the licensees that the rule operated harshly on them owing to the reduction of duty on salt and the increase which had occurred in the cost of establishments since the framing of the rule, Section 43 of the Act was amended, empowering the Central Board of Revenue to fix the percentage of establishment charges to duty realised in excess of which the charges will become payable by licensees. In pursuance of this power, the Board fixed the percentage tentatively at 10 with effect from 3rd April 1927 and the measure has, as was anticipated, afforded substantial relief to several excise factories and minor modified excise licensees. While on the 1st April 1927 there were 14 factories paying a cess of 1 anna or more per maund, 30 factor es paying 1 anna a maund and 2 factories paying no cess, the number on 1st April 1928 was 6 factories paying a cess of 1 anna or more, 36 factories paying a cess of 1 anna a maund and 9 factories not liable to any cess. In respect of modified excise lessees the relief was even more pronounced, the number of cascs in which excess establishment charges were leviable being only 6 in 1927-28 as against 22 in 1926-27.

(2) The revision of the rules for the issue of duty free salt for industrial purposes.

The changes introduced by the revised rules were (i) that an applicant for supply of duty free salt for industrial purposes should submit a separate application and pay the prescribed fee in respect of each of the factories or works for which the supply is required and (ii) that he should execute a bond and agreement in the prescribed form if the application is granted. The revised rules were brought into force from 1st October 1927.

(2) The abolition of brine tests.

Prior to the year under review the Department had insisted on the observance of certain rules connected with the manufacture of salt both in monopoly and excise factorics in order to ensure in the interests of the consumer that a reasonably clean and chemically pure article was put on the market. The most important of these rules were:-(1) That salt should not be scraped when the density of the brine in the pans exceeded 30° Beaume. (2) that salt should not be scraped in less than one inch of brine, (3) that the bitterns should be eliminated after every third or fourth scraping, (4) that salt should be scraped only in the mornings and evenings. With effect from October 1927 all the four rules were abolished in excise factories, while in monopoly factories the first was abolished and the other three retained. Thus in excise factories all departmental supervision over the manufacture of salt has been abolished though certain rules have been framed enabling the Department to refuse to store salt containing more than 5 per cent. of magnesium salts or dirt. It remains to be seen whether these rules together with the element of competition between licensees will be sufficient to ensure that a reasonably clean and pure article is sold to the consuming public.

(4) The abolition of the system of bag storage of salt.

The storage and sale of salt under the system of bag storage which had been permitted from the year 1917 was discontinued with effect from about the end of May 1927. The system of bag storage was popular with licensees and merchants as it enabled them to dispose of the salt o the new season quickly as manufacture progressed, without having to incur the heavy expense of storing and covering, incidental to heap storage. The retail merchants who se!l sait by measure and not by weight also benefited to some extent as under the bag storage system the sait underwent less handling and crushing and in consequence gave a gr.ater number of measures per maund than heaped sait. Bag storage and sales were under the rules allowed only up to the close of the season, and as the abolition of the system has not been in force for the full season of 1927, no definite opinion can be formed regarding results on the sale of sait during the year under review.

(5) The conversion of monopoly factories into modified excise.

From the season of 1928 the monopoly factories of Calinga-patam, Chinnaganjam North and Manakkudi and the monopoly blocks in the Chinnaganjam South and Kattumavadi (Lakshmi Pans) factories were converted into modified excise. This is in accordance with the policy of the department in recent years to close monopoly factories wherever they cannot be worked economically under that system and are not definitely needed, and to depend on the dittam reserved from modified excise factories for the control of prices, if necessary. The only factories still working under the monopoly system are those in the Ennore Circle, a small block in the Karambalam factory for the French Supply and parts of the Polavaram and Kattumavadi actories!

(6) The revision of pay of officers.

Prior to 1st April 1927 Inspectors of the Department were in a graded scale of pay, while Assistant Commissioners were in a time-scale of Rs. 600—50—800 with one Assistant Commissioner in the selection grade on Rs. 900 and Assistant Inspectors were on a time scale of Rs. 150—5—200—10 250, With effect from 1st April 1927 the Inspectors also were brought on to a time scale of pay which was fixed at Rs. 300—30—540, and revised time-scales for Assistant Commissioners of Rs. 600—50—900 with one appointment in the selection grade on Rs. 1,000—100—1,200, and for Assistant Inspectors of Rs. 150—10—200—15—275 were sanctioned.

(7) During the year the Government of India delegated to the Collector, Assistant Commissioners and Inspectors certain financial powers under the Civil Account Code and in other matters connected with the administration of the Department—Government of India orders C. No. 201-Salt—26, dated 19th April 1927 and 14th June 1927. The powers cover a wide range from powers connected with ordinary contagent and other expenditure governed by the Civil

Account Code to powers formerly exercised by the Commissioner and the subordinate officers of the old combined department under the Salt Act and under specific delegations made by the Local Government. Most of these powers were exercised by the Collector under delegations made by the Madras Government after the separation of the 'Salt' from the 'Excise' Department but consequent on the transfer of the administrative control of the Department from the Provincial to the Central Government with effect from 1st January 1926 these powers were renewed and in some cases modified or enhanced.

2. Personnel.—Mr. J. B. Brown, I.C.S., continued in charge of the administration of the Department throughout the year. Mr. E. W. Truter held the office of Secretary to the Collector of Sait Revenue until the 4th January 1928 when he retired and was succeeded by Mr. W. G. Baldrey. Mr. H. L. Prager was Assistant Commissioner, Central Division throughout the year except for a period of two months from 13th October 1927 when he went on leave and Mr. W. G. Baldrey acted for him. Messrs. L. K. Fearon and B. M. Marriott continued in charge of the Northern and Southern Divisions respectively throughout the year.

CHAPTER II.

Establishment.

- 3. Appendix A shows the sanctioned strength of the establishment at the beginning and at the end of the year. There was no change during the year in the sanctioned strength though the cost per annum shows an increase which is due to the revision of pay of Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors from 1st April 1927. As a sequence to the abolition of brine tests and the cessation of departmental supervision over manufacture, orders of the Central Board of Revenue were obtained to reduce the staff of Sub-Inspectors and peons tentatively for one year. The reduction comprised 24 Sub-Inspectors' posts permanent and 27 Sub-Inspectors and 62 peons posts temporary. As the reduction is tentative only and the establishment has not been permanently surrendered, Appendix A which shows the sanctioned strength as it stood on 31st March 1928 does not take account of it.
- 4. Punishments.—The total number of punishments imposed on officers of the department was 644 (550) and the percentage of punishments to the total strength was 18-99 (10-32). The marked increase in the number of punishments during the year was mainly due to the fact that a large number of peons who had no permanent appointment had to be fined for sleeping on guard duty as it was found that extra maranch work was not a sufficiently deterrent punishment. The increase was to

a small extent due also to a greater number of fines imposed on Sub-Inspectors for carelessness in storage work.

5. Resignations.—One clerk, one petty officer and 14 peons resigned their appointments.

CHAPTER III.

Manufacture.

6. The season of 1927 was on the whole very favourable for salt manufacture. Except at the Polavaram Factory where manufacture was retarded on account of the submerging of the pans and channels by unexpected floods from the Agency hills in the beginning of March 1927 and at the Manambadi Factory where it was frequently interrupted by rain, the output in all the factories in the Presidency was far greater than that in the previous year. During the year the monopoly factories of Manakkudi in the Vattanam Circle and Sarahad II of the Karambalam Factory in the Cheyur Circle were left unworked as there was ample monopoly stock in these factories to meet requirements. The Muthuraghunathapatnam Excise Factory in the Vattanam Circle which was under orders of closure and the Cheyur Factory in the Cheyur Circle which is worked only every alternate year were not worked during the year.

In November 1927 a severe cyclone passed over the factories situated in the Districts of Kistna, Guntur and Nollore. As manufacture had closed long before November in the factories of the Northern Division, the cyclone did not affect the output, but it caused considerable damage to salt heaps and buildings especially in the factories of the Krishnapatnam Circle. The damage to buildings including the quarters for the staff in the Krishnapatnam factories was so great that the headquarters of the Circle had to be temporarily moved from Krishnapatnam to Tada.

7. The quantity of sa't manufactured in the year was nearly 1472 lakks of maunds or 162 lakks of maunds more than the quantity produced in 1926. Of this quantity, about 212 lakks of maunds belonged to Governmen: and the balance to the licensees. The stock on hand at the beginning of the year was 582 lakks of maunds and the quantity imported during the year, mainly from the Bombay Presidency was about 152 lakks of maunds. The total stock of salt available for consumpt on was therefore 2212 lakks of maunds. The quantity issued during the year amounted to nearly 1392 lakks of maunds as aga nst 136 lakks of maunds in 1926-27. The increase in issues was mainly due to larger exports during the year to Orissa and the Central Provinces from the Ganjam Factories where the output in the 1927 season was nearly 1½ times that of the previous season and the selling prices very low. The stock of salt at the end of the year, excluding the ascertained

wastages which amounted to 8 lakhs of maunds, was 74 lakhs of maunds as against 58 lakhs of maunds at the end of 1926-27. The high wastage in the year was due to the heavy damage caused to salt heaps in the factories of the Krishnapatnam and Chinnaganjam Circles by the cyclone of November 1927 mentioned above.

8. During the year extensive areas held under modified excise leases in the Gokurkudda, Sumadi and Pundi Factories of the Ganjam District were relinquished by the lessees with a view primarily to concentrate manufacture in limited compact areas and save establishment charges payable by them to Government. Out of 4 platforms in the Gokurkudda Factory the area worked under platforms II, III and IV totalling about 329 acres was relinquished. As a result, the Gokurkudda Factory was abolished and platform No. I of that factory was added to the Humma Factory which was renamed as Ganjam Factory with effect from 1st April 1928. There is however a small quantity of salt left on platform II of the Gokurkudda Factory and the lessee has been given time for its removal till the end of September 1928. Pending the complete removal of this salt, the abolition of the Factory has not been given full effect to, but only the establishment absolutely necessary for guarding and for sales on platform II is now employed at Gokurkudda. In the Sumadi Factory the lessees Messrs. Hari Ram and Krishnamur hi Rao Nayudu have between them relinquished 415 acres, while in the Pundi Factory the Rajah of Parlakimedi relinquished what was known as the 100 acre extension. The establishment at Pundi also has been reduced consequent on the relinquishment, but full effect to the reduction has not been given pending complete removal of the salt by the lessee. The total cultivable occupied area left after these relinquishments in the factories of the Ganjam Circle was 1,737 acres and the output in this area if worked fully will be more than adequate to meet the demands on the factories whose market is chiefly in Orissa and in places adjoining but beyond the Presidency limits.

During the year the sa't in the Muthuraghunathapatnam Factory in the Ramnad District, which was under orders of closure, was completely removed by the 1st February 1928 and the establishment sanctioned for that factory was completely withdrawn from that date.

9. During the year manufacture under the monopoly system was permitted at Calingapatam, Polavaram, Chinnaganjam North and South, the Ennore Factories and Kattumavadi and a quantity of nearly 20 lakhs of maunds was stored. The right of Government to purchase salt from modified excise licensees at a fixed rate of Kudivaram was exercised only in a few factories where a dittam had been fixed under the 'Outright purchase' clause of the leases. These factories were Gokurkudda, Fundi, Mulapeta, Balacheruvu and Guruzanapalli and the total quantity purchased was 149,656 maunds against 239,125 maunds in the previous year. As the excise prices were low during the year, there was no necessity for Government to purchase the full dittam quantity fixed for the year and the portion of the dittam fixed under the 'lien dittam' clause of the leases was accordingly released.

10. The wholesale prices of excise salt fell on the average from 5 annas per maund in 1926-27 to 3 annas 5 pies in 1927-28. A s milar decrease is noticeable in the case of Government salt, the average price being 4 annas 10 pies against 6 annas 1 pie in 1926-27. The fall in the average excise prices was due to a successful manufacturing season and the large output in the year which stimulated competition among the licensees to dispose of their surplus stocks. In the circumstances there was no occasion for Government to control and regulate excise prices and the prices of Government salt were fixed at more or less the cost of production. At the Chinnaganjam North and South Factories and at Vedaranniyam however a departure had to be made and the issue prices reduced to below the cost of production as the salt at Vedaranniyam was old and belonged to the 1924 season and that at Chinnaganjam North and South had to be disposed of as quickly as possible owing to the conversion of the factories into modified excise from the reason of 1928.

11. The retail prices at the headquarter stations varied on the average from 1 anna 1·2 pies to 2 annas 1·5 pies a Madras measure of 120 tolas. The prices in 1926-27 were higher and ranged from 1 anna 1·2 pies to 2 annas 3·1 pies a Madras measure. The price exceeded 2 annas a Madras measure only in the Nilgiris. It is satisfactory to note in this connection that the retail price at Vizagapatam which was more than 2 annas on the average during 1925-26 and 1926-27 fell to 1 anna 8·6 pies in the year under review. This result is due to the new extension opened at Balacheruvu in the year 1926 and to the energy displayed by the lessee in working the extension.

CHAPTER IV.

Distribution and consumption.

12. The total quantity of salt issued from the salt factories or ordinary consumpt on during the year under report was 12,339,032 (11,742,319) maunds. Of this quantity 61,910 (64,310) maunds were issued to the French Government, 387,296 (414,286) maunds to the Travancore Durbar, 221,584 (141 104) maunds to the Fisheries Department and 375,772 (448,114) maunds were exported by sea to Colombo. The balance of 11,292,470 (10,674,505) maunds was distributed by rail or road for ordinary consumption in the areas usually supplied, viz. the Madras Presidency, and the Indian States within its borders, part of Behar and Orissa, the Central Provinces, the Nizam's Dominions, Mysore and Coorg. The supply from local sources to areas within the Presidency was supplemented by 1,185,049 (1,389,509) maunds imported by sea mainly from the Bombay Presidency into the West Coast Districts and 354,205 (385,506) maunds imported from Bombay and Goa by rail. From the same sources 649,673 (651,479) maunds were imported by rail into Mysore. The imports by sea into South Kanara and Malabar

show a considerable decrease compared with last year. The decrease may be attributed chiefly to large stocks of salt imported in previous years and to some extent to replacement of Bombay salt by Madras (Tuticorin) salt.

13. There was no export of salt during the year to Calcutta under bond either by sea or by rail.

Owing to the dullness of the market and to the increased output and sale of locally produced salt in Ceylon, the exports to Colombo show a decrease of about 72,000 maunds.

14. Appendix 'G' shows the salt traffic in the Madras Presidency as far as it can be ascertained from the Railway and Sea Customs returns corrected by the factory declarations. It was pointed out in the last year's report (vide paragraph 15) that the salt of the Tuticorin factories had begun to compete in the interior districts which had formerly been mainly supplied by the factories situated in the Tanjore and South Arcot Districts. During the year the sale of the Tuticorin salt shows an increase in the districts of Tanjore, Coimbatore and the Nilgiris whereas in the South Arcot District, it has decreased.

The quantities consigned to Bengal, Central Provinces, Orissa, and the Nizam's Dominions increased from 15,185; 85,668; 966,550; 136,998; in 1926-27 to 19,807; 130,883; 1,151,498; 163,035 maunds in the year. The increases are due to a prosperous season and low selling prices.

15. The consumption of salt per head of population in the year under report was 20.20 lbs. against 20 lbs. in 1926-27 and 20.20 lbs. in 1925-26.

CHAPTER V.

Revenue and Expenditure.

16. The total receipts on account of Salt Revenue were Rs. 144-64 (143-12) lakhs. The increase in the revenue compared with the revenue realised in 1926-27 is due to the increased sales in the year. The refunds during the year amounted to Rs. 9,359 (10,605).

17. Of the total revenue Rs. 14-12 lakhs represents the duty and the cost price realised in cash, Rs. 127-88 lakhs the duty on salt sold on credit and the balance of Rs. 2-64 lakhs customs duty, cess and fines. There is a decrease of Rs. 2-69 lakhs under cost price of Government salt sold for Home and Inland consumption during the year. This is due partly to a decrease in the issues of Government salt in the year and partly to a reduction in the selling prices of monopoly salt. The percentage of issues of salt under the credit system was 93-8 (94-5).

18. Charges.—The total charges amounted to Rs. 18:66 (20:40) lakks of which Rs. 10:50 lakks were the recurring charges for establishments, supplies, services and contingencies of the Department and

Rs. 8-16 lakhs charges for the purchase, transport and storage of salt and the recoverable charges on account of excise licensees' works. The charges in 1927-28 were less as compared with the charges in the previous year mainly under (1) "Purchase of salt Manufacturers" share and (2) "Conveying and Storing salt," while the charges under "Works—Roads" were greater. Owing to the existence of large monopoly stocks and the low excise prices which prevailed in the year, manufacture in monopoly factories was restricted to the actual needs and this accounts for the decrease in expenditure under items (1) and (2). The increased expenditure under 'Roads' was due to the final adjustment of charges on account of the extension of the Railway sidings in the Tuticorin Factories.

CHAPTER VI.

Measures for the protection of the Revenue.

19. Appendix K shows the number of salt cases reported and the action taken on them. There was an increase of 32-38 per cent in the number of cases reported. The large increase occurs chiefly under 'Possession of spontaneous or swamp salt' in the Chinnaganjam, Krishnapatnam, Ennore and Vattanam Circles and is due mainly to the more efficient patrolling of the swamps and to the greater personal interest taken by superior officers in detection work. It is also probable that the continued high issue price charged for salt in the Fish Curing Yards is making it increasingly tempting for fishermen to collect swamp salt to cure their fish outside the yards.

20. The total number of offences reported (inclusive of undetected cases and undetected scrapings) was 235 (159). The offenders were traced in 222 cases of which 197 cases were sent up for trial. Six cases were pending with the Magistracy at the beginning of the year. Convictions were obtained in 181 cases, 15 cases resulted in acquittal and the remaining 7 cases were pending with the Magistracy at the end of the year. Of the cases traced, 220 cases related to possession of illicit salt or salt earth or to the manufacture of salt by illicit means and the rest to minor offences. The quantity of contraband salt and salt earth involved was estimated at 107 maunds. The average duration of enquiry into cases by Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors was 7-00 (7-74) days.

CHAPTER VII.

Miscellaneous.

21. Saltpetre.—Under the revised Saltpetre rules which were introduced from 1st January 1927 licenses for the manufacture of crude and refined saltpetre are granted for the calendar year, i.e., January to Decem-

ber. It is therefore convenient to take into account figures for the calendar year alone in the case of the Saltpetre Industry. The number of licenses issued during the year 1927 was 81 and the quantity of saltpetre produced was 913 maunds. The quantity of educed salt produced is estimated at 908 maunds of which nearly 773 maunds is reported to have passed into human consumption and the balance used for tanning and private fish curing. It is ascertained from enquiries that the consumption of educed salt has had no harmful effect on the consumers. Six samples of educed salt taken from different representative refineries in the Coimbatore Preventive area were analysed during the year and the percentage of sodium chloride was found to range from 88-10 to 93-23 in three samples while in the remaining three samples it ranged from 81-79 to 86-00.

22. Amerities.—During the year the departmental elementary school at the Theethandathanam Factory was closed as the number of children attending the school was very small and as there was a Taluk Board School at a distance of about a mile from the factory. The remaining schools at factories are reported to be working satisfactorily. Tennis and Badminton Courts which exist in most factories continue to be well patronised by the staff for recreation.

23. The work of the officers of the Department has been satisfactory. Messrs. W. N. P. Rule, Muhammad Saleh, M. Krishnamurti Rao and C. St. E. K. Taylor did especially good work in Krishnapatnam Circle during the cyclone in November.
