RESOLUTION

The Jail Department was faced during 1930 with problems of an unusual nature owing to the abnormal situation created by the civil disobedience movement. As a result of the movement, nearly 4,000 more prisoners were admitted to jail than in the previous year. The number of prisoners admitted who had no employment was conspicuous and over 1,000 were adolescents. These factors no doubt help to explain the large number of prisoners committed to jail in default of payment of fine only, as well as the substantial increase in the number of short terms of imprisonment. The increase in jail population taxed the available accommodation to the fullest extent, and with this and other demands on the resources of the jails, it is to the credit of the staff that discipline was so well maintained with resort to relatively fewer punishments than usual. In contrast to the increase of admissions as a whole the number of reconvicted prisoners shows a substantial fall, which was probably due to the favourable economic position of the labouring classes. The number of women imprisoned during the year also decreased slightly. On the other hand the increase in the number of juveniles in recent years is disquieting.

2. The general standard of health of prisoners on admission was lower than the average in ordinary years in consequence of the influx of a large number of prisoners of a type different from the usual, so that there was some increase in the daily average of prisoners reported sick. But the physical condition of prisoners while in jail and at the time of release was maintained at the normal standard.

3. Pre-occupation with urgent demands and the increasing financial stringency inevitably postponed the

development of the schemes for the betterment of prison régime which the report mentions. A new classification of prisoners according to their ordinary status and mode of life, however, was introduced during the year and, while it adds to the difficulties of jail administration in respect of accommodation and guards, it has not found favour with all prisoners. It will be easier to appreciate the results of its working when it has been in operation for a period in normal times. Welfare work amongst female prisoners was continued in Nagpur and Jubbulpore Central Jails and Government endorses the Inspector-General's appreciation of the beneficent work of the ladies who devote their time and interest to this object. The appointments of schoolmasters, which had to be postponed in the previous year, were made in the larger jails during the year. It is hoped that their efforts will stimulate the demands for schooling on the part of illiterate prisoners and that their lot in jail will be ameliorated and their outlook on life for the future improved by what they learn in school.

4. Despite the increased strain on the staff, the outturn and efficiency of jail industries were well maintained and, considering the circumstances of the year, the results of the sale of jail products were satisfactory.

5. The Governor in Council has noted with pleasure the tribute which the Inspector-General has paid to the Civil Surgeons in charge of jails and the names of the officers of all ranks whom he has commended for their good work in a year of exceptional difficulty for the whole department. The Governor in Council thanks Col. Powell and Major Jatar, who held charge for eight months of the year, for their efficient control and successful administration of the department.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of this resolution be submitted to the Government of India in the Home Department and that a copy be forwarded to the Inspector-General of Prisons for information and guidance; and also that it be published in the Supplement to the *Central Provinces Gazette*.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit herewith my report on the administration of the Jail Department for the calendar year ending 31st December 1930.

2. I held charge from 1st January to 20th February 1930 and during my absence on leave, *i.e.*, 21st February to 17th October 1930 Major N. S. Jatar, I.M.S., officiated for me. I took over from Major Jatar on the 18th October and held charge of the Department to the end of the year.

3. The number of jails was the same as in the previous year, *i.e.*, two Central, ten district and nine subsidiary.

4. The year has been an unsettled one. Several jails have from time to time suffered from overcrowding. That the standard of discipline has on the whole been maintained is very creditable to the jail staffs as many of the more influential persons admitted to jail in connection with the Civil Disobedience Movement made strenuous efforts to undermine both the discipline of the prisoners and the morale of the jail staffs.

In the above circumstances and their attendant financial embarrassments it is only natural that all schemes for improving the provincial prison régime had to be curtailed or abandoned.

The Council voted the money to work the Borstal Institution on satisfactory lines but the most important item in the arrangements, the construction of a lock-up to take local adult prisoners, had to be given up. School masters were appointed to all the larger jails, during the year, and the ordinary jail staffs have thus been relieved of the extra duty of supervising the jail schools,

The Children Act passed three years ago, and without doubt the most important part of our scheme to prevent young persons from taking to a life of crime, has not yet been taken into use on account of financial stringency.

The Discharged Prisoners' Aid Society has made no progress during the year and very little work has been done. It is increasingly difficult to find work in industrial concerns for persons who have been in jail. As, however, the vast majority of our ordinary prisoners work on the land, the industrial depression has not affected the Jail Department to any extent.

5. During the year a new classification of prisoners was introduced under the orders of the Government of India. All prisoners are now classified according to their original mode of living when out of jail and for this purpose they have been divided into three classes: A, B and C.

The introduction of the new classification entails the necessity for greater segregation of prisoners which in its turn calls for more accommodation in jails and a bigger staff to guard the separated classes.

The Commissioner, Nagpur division, in his forwarding note on the annual report writes as follows:—

“Major Jatar complains that the new classification of prisoners, which was intended to remove racial discrimination, has caused much heart-burning among the “C” class prisoners many of whom resent their exclusion from class “B”, and has thereby added considerably to the difficulties of jail administration. The significance of this complaint is emphasised when it is remembered that, as observed by the Deputy Commissioner, Bhandara, many civil disobedience prisoners courted arrest and incarceration in jail with the avowed object of breaking jail discipline. The inability of the jails to increase their staff simultaneously with the increase in the number of civil disobedience prisoners, was another factor which tended to encourage indiscipline among the prisoners. But on the whole all the jails in the division emerged from the unprecedented strain to which they were exposed, with success.”

The Superintendent, Central Jail, Nagpur, gives an interesting summary of prisoners received in his jail for offences connected with the Civil Disobedience Movement. Of the 561 persons admitted, 50 per cent were unemployed before the offence was committed. Only 7 per cent were cultivators.

Taking age incidence, 226 were between the ages of 16 and 21, and 12 were under 15 years of age.

The maximum sentence awarded was 18 months. Only 56 had been in jail before in connection with previous political agitations.

### CHAPTER I.—JUDICIAL.

6. General summary.—The following table shows the distribution of prisoners of all classes confined in the jails for the past two years :—

The year opened with 4,169 prisoners of all classes, showing a decrease of 238 as compared with the figure for the previous year. There was an abnormal increase of 6,951 in the total number of admissions under all classes during the year. Nineteen thousand five hundred and twelve were discharged in 1930 or 5,051 more than those discharged in 1929 from all causes, leaving a balance of 6,518 prisoners of all classes against 4,407 in 1929.

There was an increase in the daily average population from 4,314.55 to 4,971.13.

7. The convict population at the opening of the year was 3,466 males and 165 females as compared with 3,689 males and 210 females, the previous year.

The number of convicts imprisoned during the year was 8,563 males and 179 females against 4,749 males and 208 females in 1929.

The abnormal increase in the admissions is due to the Civil Disobedience Movement, which resulted in the conviction of 3,861 up to 27th December 1930.

During the year the number of prisoners received by transfer from jails outside the province decreased from 72 to 64; almost all these prisoners were received for release.

Of the 6,345 convicts discharged during the year, 828 were on appeal, 1,999 on expiry of sentence, 2,724 under the remission rules, 714 by order of Government (*i.e.*, 13 on account of sickness, 59 on recommendation of the Advisory Board and the remaining 642 on amnesty), 8 were transferred to the Mental Hospital, Nagpur, 3 escaped, 29 were executed and 40 died.

The number remaining on the last day of the year was 5,785 or 2,154 more than in the previous year.

The daily average strength was 4,406.27 against 3,796.83 in 1929.

8. Of the 8,742 direct admissions of convicts during the year, 37 were Christians, 678 Muhammadans, 5,525 Hindus, 184 Buddhists and Jains, and 2,318 all other classes against 32,635, 2,362, 29, and 1,899, respectively, in the year previous.

The abnormal increase in short sentences is due to the Civil Disobedience Movement, Excise and Railway Acts.

The figures given below show the number of persons admitted to jails to serve sentence not exceeding three months :—

- (a) Number admitted to jails to serve sentence who have received substantive sentence of imprisonment. 954
- (b) Number admitted to serve sentence in default of payment of fines where the substantive sentences consist of fines only. 805

There has been a decrease in imprisonments exceeding 5 and 10 years from 56 in 1929 to 43 in 1930 and from 4 to 1.

11. The number of reconvicted prisoners was 761 against 909 in 1929. The decrease is due possibly to better agricultural conditions and cheaper food. The ratio per cent to total number of convicts admitted was 8 against 18 in the year previous. There was an increase in the number imprisoned for the first time in default of furnishing security under section 110 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, viz., from 73 to 1,054.

Youthful offenders under 15 years of age number 46 as compared with 36. Of the 46 convicted this year 8 had been previously convicted.

12. Recognition of habituals.—The following table shows the recognition of habitual offenders :—

13. Only three escapes took place during the year, these were adolescents from the Narsinghpur Borstal Institution who were working in outgangs. Such escapes are bound to occur in this Institution where increased liberty is given in the garden and fields.

All three were subsequently captured.

14. Though the numbers of admissions very nearly doubled the number of punishments rose only slightly, i.e., to 4,871 as against 3,749 in 1929. In 12 cases prosecutions were instituted.

Corporal punishment has steadily declined, there being only three cases in the year under report.

## CHAPTER II.—FINANCIAL.

15. The total expenditure incurred in guarding and maintaining prisoners during the year amounted to Rs. 7,74,826 as compared with Rs. 7,07,363 in the preceding year or an increase of Rs. 67,463. The average cost per prisoner per head fell from Rs. 163-15-2 in 1929 to Rs. 155-13-10 in the year under report. The daily average number of prisoners rose from 4,314·55 to 4,971·13.

The causes of important increases or decreases are as explained.

*Establishment charges.*—The total expenditure under this head was Rs. 3,68,153 as compared with Rs. 3,61,189 in 1929 an increase of Rs. 6,964. The increase is due to the entertainment of temporary Assistant Jailors, Assistant Medical Officers and extra Warders in connection with the Civil Disobedience Movement and to the appointment of teachers in the larger jails for the education of prisoners. The appointment of a whole-time Superintendent for Narsinghpur Borstal Institution in the middle of the year also contributed to this increase. The cost per head, however, fell from Rs. 83-11-5 to Rs. 74-0-11 on account of the increase in the daily average number of prisoners.

*Dieting charges.*—The total cost under this head amounted to Rs. 2,17,023 as compared with Rs. 1,81,190 in 1929. The increase of Rs. 35,833 is due to the increase in the prison population and also to the issue of special diet to A and B class prisoners. Purchase of vegetables worth about Rs. 500 a month for the use of prisoners at the Jubbulpore Central Jail in consequence of the transfer of 5 acres of the most fertile portion of the Jail garden to the Police Department for an additional parade ground also contributed to the increase in the expenditure. This extra item is, I am afraid, likely to continue for some years as the heavy estimate prepared by the Agricultural Department to improve the remaining part of the garden is not likely to be carried out as its success is doubtful and money is scarce.

*Clothing and bedding.*—The total amount spent under this head was Rs. 56,839 against Rs. 47,944 in the preceding year. The increase is due to the rise in the population and also to the issue of special clothing for B class prisoners.

*Sanitation charges.*—This head shows an increase of Rs. 5,729 over the figures of the previous year which is due to the following reasons :—

- (1) Payment of Municipal taxes of 1929, in the year under report at Jubbulpore and Raipur.
- (2) Levying for the first time of water tax by the Municipality at Akola.
- (3) Purchase of water at Amraoti, where some of the jail wells ran dry.

*Other miscellaneous services and supplies.*—The total expenditure under this head shows an increase of Rs. 5,803. The crease in is due to the following reasons :—

- (1) The general increase in the jail population.
- (2) The extra lighting charges.
- (3) Cost of furniture for the use of A and B class prisoners.
- (4) Railway freight paid on blankets obtained from outside the province owing to the sudden influx of prisoners.

*Travelling allowances.*—The total expenditure under this head shows an increase of Rs. 3,908. The increase is due to the transfers of whole time Superintendents and to the travelling allowances paid to the Superintendent, Borstal Institution, and teachers who were appointed during the year.

*Extraordinary charges.*—The increase under this head is due to the purchase of brass utensils for cooking and feeding, etc., required for A and B class prisoners, as also to the replacement of a large number of conservancy drums which were condemned during the year.

16. The average number of prisoners sentenced to labour on working days was 4,490·98 as compared with 3,796·47 of the preceding year. The average number of sick prisoners was 72·48 against 38·43 in 1929 and the number of infirms and convalescents was 139·92 against 146·18.

A brief account of the special industries carried on in the important jails is given below :—

17. Nagpur Central Jail Press.—During the year 29,144,347 forms were printed against 23,431,610 in 1929. The increase is due to the fact that the number of forms printed in 1929 was below normal, and also to the printing of Census forms during the year. Supplementary indents have gone up from 181 to 193 but were less than in 1928.

One hundred and thirty-four new forms were added to Schedules and 135 kinds were revised.

The gross profits increased from Rs. 32,763 to Rs. 41,823, *i.e.*, by about Rs. 9,000. The cash sales have gone up from Rs. 5,587 to Rs. 6,376.

The amount of savings to Government by employment of prison labour was considerably less as Civil Disobedience prisoners in general were unequal to turning out a full day's work.

*Rubber stamps.*—Four hundred and eighty rubber stamps, worth Rs. 790, were manufactured and sold during the year.

*Quinine.*—The demand for quinine in bulk has gone down by about 95 lbs. As regards tablets the demand for 4 grain tablets has gone down by about 625 lbs.

Five hundred and seventeen indents were received and all were complied with.

18. Jubbulpore Central Jail.—The following table shows the goods manufactured and sold during the year 1930 as compared with those manufactured and sold during 1929 :—

More than 1,500 tents have been made and sold since the tent industry was started in this Jail Factory in 1919.

Owing to the reduction of expenditure by the Local Government some of the tent orders placed at the beginning of the year were subsequently cancelled. But the number of garments taken by the Forest Department, and by the Prison Department for extra warders and prisoners kept the convicts well employed throughout the year. The appointment during the year of an expert tailor to supervise the making of Police, Forest and Jail uniforms has helped considerably to improve the cut of the garments made.

19. Raipur District Jail.—The industries were the same as in the previous year and the demand for jail-made goods is steady. The aggregate cash earnings were Rs. 14,921 against Rs. 16,674.

20. The gross profit amounted to Rs. 1,52,015 as compared with Rs. 1,81,763 in the preceding year, *i. e.*, a decrease of Rs. 29,748.

Statement XII-A.

The savings to Government by the employment of prison labour amounted to Rs. 44,903 against Rs. 43,743 in 1929 or an average of Rs 9-0-6 per prisoner.

21. The total cost to Government for the maintenance of convicts amounted to Rs. 7,74,826 as compared with Rs. 7,07,363 in the preceding year or an increase of Rs. 67,463. The total cash earnings were Rs. 2,10,520 against Rs. 1,83,114 in the previous year, thus bringing the net cost to Government for the maintenance of prisoners to Rs. 5,64,306 as compared with Rs. 5,24,249 in 1929.

Statement XIII.

The average expenditure on the maintenance of a prisoner in jail during the year amounted to Rs. 155-14-0 per annum. Against this expenditure a prisoner earned Rs. 42-6-0 or roughly 27 per cent of his cost to the State. The net cost per prisoner therefore worked out to Rs. 113-8-0 against Rs. 121-8-0 in the previous year.

22. The following is the statement showing the admissions into hospital, daily average sick total mortality and ratio of deaths per mille for the last two years :—

Of 2,000 admissions into hospital 1,848 were convicts, 148 undertrials and 4 civil prisoners against a total of 929 in the previous year. The abnormal increase is due to the Civil Disobedience Movement.

There were 45 deaths as compared with 58 in the previous year. Of these 40 were convicts and 5 undertrials. The death rate per mille fell from 13.44 to 9.05 in the year under report. The daily average sick was 78.41 against 40.83 in 1929.

No death occurred in the following jails :—

Bilaspur, Buldana, Hoshangabad, Chanda, Damoh and Wardha.

**Jubbulpore Central Jail.**—The admissions into hospital fell from 152 to 76, but the number of deaths increased from 11 to 14. There were 8 admissions and 1 death under dysentery as compared with 37 admissions and 3 deaths last year.

**Nagpur Central Jail.**—The number of admissions into hospital was 857 against 130 in 1929. The daily average sick was 39.96 against 4.12 in the last year. The number of deaths was 6 against 9 in the previous year. The death rate fell from 9.57 to 5.57 in the year under review.

**Raipur District Jail.**—There were 269 admissions into hospital as compared with 167 admissions in 1929. The number of deaths increased by 1, the figure being 4 for the year under report.

**Akola District Jail.**—The number of admissions into hospital increased by 64 in the year under report. The number of deaths being 2 against 3 last year.



**Amraoti District Jail.**—The number of admissions into hospital increased from 50 to 177. The abnormal increase is due to the admission of a large number of civil disobedience prisoners into hospital for dysentery and malaria. Two deaths occurred, the same number as last year.

**Narsinghpur Jail.**—The number of admissions into hospital was 26 this year against 21 admissions last year and the number of deaths was 1 against 2 in the year previous.

Statement XV. Admissions and deaths from the chief diseases among convicts. 23. This statement shows the admissions and deaths from the chief diseases among convicts.

**Cholera.**—There were 2 admissions and no deaths against 3 admissions and 2 deaths last year.

**Dysentery.**—There were 569 admissions and 4 deaths among convicts as compared with 169 admissions and 8 deaths in the previous year.

**Malaria.**—Out of 339 admissions, there were only 2 deaths as compared with 36 admissions and 2 deaths in the last year.

**Tuberculosis.**—The number of admissions dropped from 34 to 18 this year. The number of deaths was 3 against 10 in the last year.

**Pneumonia.**—Cases decreased to 26 admissions and 5 deaths against 36 admissions and 10 deaths in 1929.

24. This statement shows the mortality among convicts according to the length of time passed in jail. Of the 40 deaths which occurred during the year under report, 23 convicts had been in jail for a period of less than six months at the time of death.

Statement XVI. Mortality among convicts according to length of time passed in jail.

25. There were 460 of both sexes under trial at the beginning of the year; 8,493 or 3,286 more than in the year previous were received during the year, making a total of 8,953.

Statement XVII. Undertrials.

Of the 8,953, 3,808 were released, 4,317 were convicted and sentenced, 137 transferred and 5 died. The number in confinement at the close of the year was 686.

## CHAPTER IV.—GENERAL.

26. This statement shows the nature and amount of accommodation available for each class of prisoners in the jails at the close of the year.

Statement A.  
Accommodation.

The total accommodation available was 6,749, the same as that of the previous year. With the rush of admissions due to the Civil Disobedience Movement, difficulty of accommodation began to be felt in several jails. In the beginning, overcrowding was relieved by bringing into use godowns, worksheds, old cook houses, etc., but as the admissions continued to increase temporary butts were constructed—one at Jubbulpore, four at Nagpur, two at Raipur, one at Akola, and two at Amraoti, each providing accommodation for about 50 prisoners. In Jubbulpore, 105 youthful Civil Disobedience Movement prisoners were transferred to the Reformatory School to relieve congestion.

27. The following table shows the physical condition of the prisoners released during the year as compared with the previous year :—

Statement C.  
Remission.

28. This statement refers to the working of the remission rules.

The total number of convicts released under the remission rules was 2,724 against 2,668 in 1929. The maximum remission gained by any one prisoner during the period of his entire sentence and released during the year was 2,828 days. The maximum amount of gratuity earned was Rs. 50-4-0 against Rs. 25-4-0 in 1929.

29. Education.—Paid schoolmasters were appointed during the year to the larger jails.

Mrs. E. Shott of the Wesleyan Mission continued to visit the female prisoners of the Jubbulpore Central Jail and instruct them in Cottage Industries, etc. The ladies' sub-committee which had been formed in the previous year to look after the welfare of female prisoners in the Nagpur Jail visited regularly twice a week and taught females knitting and sewing, etc. My thanks are due to all the ladies for the voluntary help they have rendered in the reformation and care of prisoners.

30. Religious preachers.—The religious preachers have continued to visit most of the jails at regular intervals. Their spiritual ministrations have been appreciated.

31. Visitors.—Non-official visits and quarterly Board Meetings were regular. His Excellency the Governor visited the Amraoti Jail and the Hon'ble the Revenue Member the Yeotmal Jail during the year. District Magistrates, Sessions Judges and Commissioners of Divisions have as usual visited the jails in their areas.

32. Inspections.—All jails in the Province were inspected by the Inspector-General of Prisons during the year.

33. Notice of Officers.—The year was an unusual one, in that a large number of unruly and undisciplined prisoners were convicted in connection with the Civil Disobedience Movement. The jail staff in all cases has acted with great tact, forbearance, and loyalty in most difficult circumstances.
