# GOVERNMENT OF THE CENTRAL PROVINCES AND BERAR

### REVENUE DEPARTMENT

#### Nagpur, the 10th June 1938.

Read-

Report of the Commissioner, Berar, on the revenue administration of Berar and the report of the Settlement Commissioner and Director of Land Records on the department of Land Records and Settlements in Berar for the year ending the 31st July 1937.

### RESOLUTION

The revenue year 1936-37 was a better year than Berar has experienced since 1929. The rains started earlier than usual and ample rain for sowing was received by the third week of June. From the first week of July to the first week of August there was little rain and cultivators were able to keep weeds in control with the minimum of expense. The course of the monsoon was extremely favourable until the end of October. But heavy rain in November caused severe damage to a crop that gave promise of being the best that had been harvested for very many years. Though cotton was not so seriously damaged as juar, its quality was affected. In the end a crop slightly below normal was harvested. Cotton prices were also better and during the heavy marketing period averaged over Rs. 200 per khandi of ginned cotton.

2. With improved prices, better crops, and lower expenses of cultivation, the condition of the cultivators was better than in previous years, though indebtedness continued as before to be their main burden. The extremely favourable condition of the early monsoon so far reduced the demand for field labour for weeding that labourers passed through a short period of severe hardship and test works were started in parts of the Amraoti district. But this temporary distress passed very rapidly and normal labour conditions soon returned.

Government continued its permanent measures 3. for alleviation of the cultivator's lot. So much of the produce of the cultivator as was necessary for his maintenance and for cultivation continued to be exempt from attachment, and the rules requiring transfer of execution of civil court decrees to the Collector, who is specially charged with the responsibility of obtaining the best possible terms, continued in force. During the year under review the number of debt conciliation boards was increased from nine to twelve, and these boards settled debt amounting to Rs. 126 lakhs for Rs. 76 lakhs, and in addition to this they liquidated much debt by the transfer of a part of the debtor's land. Rs. 21,342 were spent on rural communications and rural water-supply out of the Government of India grant. With a better year the demand for taccavi, both agricultural and land improvement, was less keen, but 3.64 lakhs of agricultural loan were advanced during the year and 0.51 lakhs of land improvement loan.

The better circumstances of the year were 4. reflected in the figures of collections of land revenue. The year started with arrears amounting to 22 per cent of the current demand, but by the end of the year the lag had been reduced to 12.9 per cent and collections amounted to 108.5 per cent of the current demand. In all 108 lakhs out of a total demand (current and arrears) of 121 lakhs were collected. The total number of coercive processes used was 11,698 and of sales 1,733. In all, processes were used against no more than 3 per cent of the total number of occupants. This number is by no means excessive, considering the difficulties created by the slackening of the revenue paying conscience of the people.

5. The land records report indicates that the maintenance of boundary marks was not satisfactory owing to inadequate use by tahsildars of their powers to bring home to occupants their responsibility for their maintenance. The supervision of land records work by revenue officers again shows no improvement. Government considers that in view of their multifarious duties it is difficult for them to devote adequate attention to land records and the question of reviving some posts of Assistant Superintendents of Land Records held in abeyance is being considered. 3

The re-organization scheme of nazul maintenance has since been sanctioned and Government trusts that substantial improvement in the standard of nazul maintenance will result therefrom.

6. Though the year was a better one than those immediately preceding it, the difficulties caused by the depression and the succession of indifferent crops reaped since 1929 still continued. The Provincial Government acknowledges with gratitude the good work done by the Commissioner of Berar, the Deputy Commissioners and their staff in difficult circumstances.

### REPORT ON THE REVENUE ADMINISTRATION OF BERAR, FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1937

### PART I.—AGRICULTURAL CONDITIONS OF THE YEAR 1936-37

1. Character of the season.—The rainfall registered at each district headquarters was as follows :—

Sufficient rain for sowing operations fell earlier than usual and by the third week of June there had been ample for successful germination. Unfortunately, Yeotmal had excessive rain during this month from which the crops never wholly recovered. There was little rainfall from the 1st week of July until the end of the first week of August. This break enabled the cultivators to keep weeds in control with the minimum expense. The course of the monsoon continued to be very favourable until the end of October. A little damage was caused in Yeotmal by heavy rain in the first week of November. But this district was fortunate in escaping most of the heavy rain of the second half of the month. This heavy rain in the other three districts caused considerable damage to a bumper crop of juar. The damage to the cotton crop was not so great as the first and, in places, the second picking had been completed. But the quality of the cotton was affected and what promised to be the best crop for many years was reduced to a little below normal.

A certain amount of local damage was caused by the flooding of rivers and by exceptionally heavy rain in the Melghat. Remission of land revenue to the extent of Rs. 16,952 and suspension to the extent of Rs. 8,310 were sanctioned for these areas.

2. Rabi sowings were made under favourable conditions and the season was, on the whole, a favourable one for the winter crops. 3. Area sown with cotton and juar is compared as follows :---

The cotton market statistics do not give a very accurate return of the crop as in certain areas a considerable amount of cotton is taken straight to the factories. The factory figures are given below :—

The normal outturn in column (2) has been calculated by applying the district normals to the areas sown. Factories do not, of course, deal only with the district crop. But these figures are probably the nearest approach which can be made to an accurate return of the actual outturn and are far more accurate than any estimates.

It will be seen that the Buldana estimate was considerably below and the Akola and Yeotmal estimates slightly below the actuals. The factory figures show that the crop in Amraoti, Akola and Buldana was about normal. The unreliability of estimates by the public is seen in the district council reports. The Amraoti district council gave the average outturn of cotton as eight annas, while the Buldana council reported that the October rain destroyed the whole of the kharif crop and left very little chance for the rabi crop.

The decrease was due partly to the fact that the 1935-36 area was larger than usual and partly to the favourable conditions of the early monsoon months.

7. Classification of area (Appendix I).—The reduction of the total number of villages by three was due to the discovery of a mistake made in 1929 when three uninhabited jagir hamlets in the Buldana district were absorbed into an inhabited jagir village. Other variations in the figures shown in this appendix call for no comment.

Condition of the agricultural classes.—This de-8. pends so much on the prices of the main money crop that an attempt has been made to compare the prices during the marketing season with those in the previous two years. Prices, of course, vary considerably according to the quality of the cotton. But, generally, as all buying in Berar is based on the Bombay Oomra Hedge contract, the figures of these contracts can be taken as a reliable basis of comparison. A statement of the weekly figures given in the Bombay Cotton Annuals for the six main marketing months of the last ten years has been added to the statements accompanying this report. These statistics have to be compared with the cart arrivals in the markets in order to obtain a reliable estimate of the prices obtained by the cultivators. In the table below the percentage of arrivals in each month to the total arrivals of the season has been shown :---

From this table it will be seen that in 1935-36 the heavy marketing started late. Nearly 60 per cent of the crop was marketed in January, February and March and after January the 3rd (Rs. 203) the Oomra contract was never above Rs. 190 and averaged about Rs. 180. In the year under review, heavy marketing started in November and 63 per cent of the crop was marketed before the end of January. During this period the Hedge contract ranged from 196 to 212 and averaged over 200. These figures show that, even after making allowance for deductions on damaged cotton, there was considerable improvment in prices during the heavy marketing period. Prices were still higher in March and April. But only the fortunate few who had retained part of their crop, benefited thereby.

Improved prices, better crops and lower expenses of cultivation enabled the cultivators to reduce the burden of arrears of land revenue. Favourable conditions undoubtedly also facilitated the settlement by debt conciliation boards of a large amount of debt by the transfer to the creditors of small portions of the debtors' property.

9. The condition of agricultural cattle was generally good. Fodder was cheap and there was a sufficiency of water.

10. Condition of the labouring classes.—The almost ideal conditions of the earlier part of the monsoon reduced the demand for field labour and labourers passed through a short period of considerable hardship. Test works were started in parts of the Amraoti district. But these only served to show that the situation had passed as quickly as it had arisen.

11. The year was, on the whole, a healthy one, although in parts of the division there were mild epidemics of cholera and small-pox.

12. Measures of improvement.—During the year there was an addition of three debt conciliation boards at Akot, Murtizapur and Malkapur. Of the nine previously established, the Yeotmal board completed its operations. Since the close of the year orders have been issued for the establishment of boards at Pusad, Ellichpur, Daryapur and Khamgaon.

The boards settled Rs. 126 lakhs of debt for Rs. 76 lakhs to be paid in instalments. In addition the boards have arranged for the conciliation of much debt by transfer of part of the debtors' lands. Mr. Mushran and the Amraoti and Chandur boards have been pioneers of this form of conciliation, which is so suitable to Berar conditions. Since their establishment, these two boards have arranged for the liquidation of Rs. 53 lakhs of debt by the transfer of 21,500 acres.

During the year Rs. 21,342 were spent on improvement of rural communications and rural water-supply from Government of India grants. 13. The Agriculture Department carried out its activities as usual. Successful demonstrations were held at several places. The improved variety of verum is becoming popular especially in the Akola and Buldana districts. There was also considerable response to the propaganda for the improvement of live-stock.

Licenses for 14. crop protection were freelv The damage done to the main crops by pig granted. and other wild animals is inconsiderable in Berar. The condition of producing pig tushes, etc., was rigidly en-There are no pig killing associations in any disforced. trict except Yeotmal. The one at Sarati in the Wun taluq has accounted for a number of pig. Mr. Damle of Wun who continued to have the privilege of unrestricted shooting in the Phisky reserve arranged for the killing of a number of these animals. A new pig killing club has been formed at Kupti in the Pusad taluq.

15. Relations between Government and the public.—The relation between Government and the public remained cordial throughout the year.

16. Loans granted under the Agriculturists' Loans Act.—The total outstandings at the commencement of the year amounted to Rs. 7.14 lakhs [Rs. 5.90 lakhs]. The total advance made during the year aggregated Rs. 3.64 lakhs [Rs. 4.94 lakhs]. Collections amounted to Rs. 5.92 lakhs [Rs. 3.7 lakhs] including a sum of Rs. 3,229 remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 4.86 lakhs which includes an adjustment of Rs. 173 effected in the Buldana district on refund bills. Out of the balance, Rs. 1.33 lakhs was overdue. Recovery works out at 83 per cent [63] of the total outstandings.

17. Loans granted under the Land Improvement Loans Act.—A sum of Rs. 2.35 lakhs (Rs. 2.20 lakhs) was outstanding at the commencement of the year. Rs. 0.51 lakhs (Rs. 0.87 lakhs) was advanced during the year. Recoveries amounted to Rs. 0.93 lakhs (Rs. 0.72 lakhs) which includes a remission of Rs. 1,101, leaving a balance of Rs. 1.95 lakhs, of which Rs. 0.63 lakhs was overdue at the close of the year. The closing balance includes a sum of Rs. 566 on account of adjustment made on refund bills in the Buldana district.

Rs. 51,198 (Rs. 42,969) under the Agriculturists' Loans Act and Rs. 20,266 (Rs. 16,516) under the Land Improvement Loans Act were recovered as interest during the year.

The first table shows that the year started with arrears amounting to 22 per cent of the current demand. At the end of the year the carry-over had been reduced to 12.9 per cent. In the third table, the taluqs have been arranged according to the percentage of arrears to current demand at the beginning of the year in order to show the difficulties which confronted each Tahsildar and the manner in which he dealt with them. This table shows striking differences in the legacies from previous years. For instance, Murtazapur started the year with 52 per cent in arrears and Amraoti 29 per cent, Yeotmal 33 per cent and Darwha 9 per cent, Balapur 48 per cent and Khamgaon 25 per cent.

In twelve taluqs the lag from the preceding year was less than 10 per cent—in other words, what would be expected after an indifferent year. In eleven of these taluqs the lag was reduced considerably. In Jalgaon alone (Mr. Kathawate) the lag increased. In the remaining 10 taluqs, collection work was best in Murtazapur (Mr. Moharir, Mr. Bonde and Mr. M. D. Joshi), Chandur (Mr. Najibuddin) and Amraoti (Mr. Mohammad Akbar).

19. The collection of cesses rose from Rs. 17.10 lakhs to Rs. 19.34 lakhs. Fluctuating collections fell from Rs. 1.0 lakh to Rs. 58,000, as the preceding year's income'was inflated with the receipts from sales of H class lands in Yeotmal. Miscellaneous collections fell from Rs. 2.92 lakhs to Rs. 2.67 lakhs. If the arrear collections of nazul rent in Amraoti town in the preceding year are excluded, it will be seen that there was actually an increase of revenue from these sources. The following table gives the revenue from town and village sites :--

20. The demand on account of jaglia and mahar cess on non-agricultural incomes inclusive of arrears of previous years amounted to Rs. 12,379 [Rs. 17,751]. Rs. 11,677 was recovered and Rs. 123 remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 579 [Rs. 1,114] at the close of the year. The decrease in the demand reflects the economic conditions of the preceding year (1935-36).

21. The demand on account of special school rate inclusive of arrears, was Rs. 91,956 [Rs. 1,32,533]. Rs. 86,774 was realized and Rs. 1,989 remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 3,193 at the close of the year. Of the balance, Rs. 2,114 are outstanding in the Amraoti district alone.

22. Coercive processes.—The following table gives the details of processes :—

Before it was abolished, the process of detention in civil jail was used in three cases in Balapur taluq. The vigorous measures which had to be taken in the Amraoti district during the preceding year made collection work comparatively easy in the year under review. The increase in processes and sales in the Akola and Buldana districts was inevitable in view of the large amount of unauthorized arrears in these districts. In each district, many of the holdings sold had not been cultivated for several years. In Buldana particularly, the large number of sales includes many cases which were really cases of relinquishment. The Deputy Commissioner, Yeotmal, has made an interesting analysis of the 90 sales of holdings in his district. Only 56 of these were confirmed. Twenty-one of the occupants who lost their holdings had failed to pay land revenue for 4 years or more, 16 for 3 years and the remaining 19 for 2 years.

The figures of the total number of occupants have been taken from a return which was recently required by Government. The figures for this return had to be collected quickly and may not be quite accurate. But they illustrate the real difficulty of collection work in

Berar where each Tahsildar has to deal with a very large number of occupants. 11,698 processes appear to be a large number for the division. But when it is considered that most recovery cases involve two or more processes against one occupant and that the number of processes amounted to less than 3 per hundred occupants, it is clear that very little pressure was used to collect 108.5 per cent of the normal demand.

Only Rs. 1,207 was levied in the whole division as penalty under section 137, Berar Land Revenue Code. It is for consideration whether this power should not be more extensively used as is done in the Bombay Presidency.

24. Cost of collection (Appendix IV).—Out of Rs. 10,31,713 payable to village officers as emoluments for collection of Government and other dues, Rs. 10,19,674 were distributed leaving Rs. 12,039, of which a sum of Rs. 9,219 was withheld in the Akola district for various reasons. The average emoluments of all kinds paid to patels was Rs. 79.6 [Rs. 79.6] and to patwaris Rs. 250.3 [Rs. 257.9].

Copying fees to the extent of Rs. 15,836 [Rs. 17,733] were also paid to patwaris during the year.

25. The total number of patels and patwaris actually working during the year decreased by 5 and 9 respectively. The number of villages in which the offices of patel and patwari were held in rotation was 1,159 [1,114] and 334 [331]. The increase in the former appears to be due to incorrect figures reported in the past from the Amraoti and Buldana districts.

26. Three malik patels and 2 malik patwaris were dismissed with forfeiture of watan and 7 patels and 4 patwaris without forfeiture of watan for misappropriation of Government dues.

For other offences such as neglect of duty, grave misconduct or failure to qualify within a prescribed period, 13 patels and 19 patwaris were dismissed during the year.

The number of patels and patwaris otherwise punished during the year was 92 [91] and 86 [100] respectively.

The number of unqualified patwaris increased from 233 to 253, the increase being shared by all districts.

There has been an alarming increase in the number of defalcations by village officers detected since Mr. Greenfield insisted in 1934 on proper inspection of village accounts by revenue inspectors. In the last four years nearly 200 cases have been detected and reports of defalcations continue to come in. It is clear that the system of checking village accounts is defective. Mr. Parmanand, I.C.S., was deputed to examine the system in the Bombay Presidency in February 1937. The various proposals made in his interesting report are being examined.

#### PART III.—REVENUE CASE WORK

27. Revenue cases (Appendix V).—The disposal of revenue case work in each district was as follows :—

The reduction in the number of pending cases in the Amraoti and Yeotmal districts was satisfactory. The increase in Akola was covered by the number of recovery cases which inevitably remained unfinished in view of the heavy arrears in this district. The statistics of Collectors' cases show the relief that has been given in this class of case work by the debt conciliation boards. 1,844 new cases were registered compared with 5,924 in the preceding year. The number of cases pending was reduced from 7,916 to 6,707, the reduction being mainly in the Amraoti and Akola districts. The reduction would, of course, have been considerably greater had it not been for the stay of many cases through applications to debt conciliation boards.

It is unfortunate that the prescribed form does not give details of cases, under class 72-A, of recovery of The instalments fixed by debt conciliation boards. statistics have been obtained separately. But it is doubtful whether these are reliable as a variety of practice regarding the registration of these cases was found at inspections. Deputy Commissioners report that 2,208 applications for recovery were received during the year. Of these, 754 were in Mehkar taluq and 652 in Basim. Four hundred and forty-three were carried over from the previous year (427 in Mehkar). Of the total 2,651 for disposal, 1,354 were finished and 1,297 were pending at the end of the year (541 Mehkar, 315 Basim). These statistics illustrate the difficulty in recovery of these instalments even during a normal year.

28. Appeals and revisions (Appendices VI and VII).— The record of appellate and revisional work is shown in the following table :—

Disposal has been generally prompt and satisfactory. The smallness of the increase in Akola shows the efficient way in which Mr. Ramadhyani dealt with the arrears which accumulated during Mr. Kamath's illness.

29. Revenue records.—Elimination is reported to be up to date in district and tahsil offices.

30. Nazul records.—No new nazul settlement operations were taken up during the year. A restricted settlement of the Balapur town was completed and a final report submitted. The maintenance of nazul records continues to be in an unsatisfactory state in the districts of Amraoti and Buldana and the need for strengthening the staff is emphasized in the district reports.

The B volumes of district gazetteers are up to date.

#### PART IV.—OTHER HEADS OF ADMINIS-TRATION

of land (Appendix IX).—16,549 31. Alienation acres of land changed hands as the result of civil court decrees, and 206,065 [202,106] through ordinary transactions in 1,117 and 26,985 cases, giving on an average price of Rs. 49 [Rs. 56] and Rs. 75 [Rs. 66], respectively per Transfers resulting from the sales of holdings for acre. arrears of land revenue rose from 403 to 707. It is interesting to compare this figure with the number of sales (1,436) which took place. Some of these sales were of course confirmed after the end of the year. But it is clear that many defaulters saved their property either by making the prescribed deposits or in appeal. The average price fetched for the land transferred was only Rs. 7 [Rs. 11] per acre. The lowness of this figure is mainly due to the fact that most of the land which was sold was of poor quality and had either been badly cultivated or not cultivated at all for several years. It is well known also that although such land is sold free of encumbrances, people are very reluctant to bid for land which is mortgaged.

32. Tours and inspections.—Mr. C. M. Trivedi, C.I.E., O.B.E., I.C.S., was in charge of the division until 12th November 1936, when I relieved him. Mr. Trivedi spent 15 days on tour. I toured 53 days.

I inspected the Amraoti and Yeotmal district offices and 11 out of the 22 tabsils.

The district charges were held by the following officers:-

November 1936 to 31st July 1937. Buldana district—(1) Mr. D. V. Rege, I.C.S., from 1st August 1936 to 31st March 1937 and (2) Mr. K. N. Nagarkatti, I.C.S., from 1st April 1937 to 31st July 1937.

Yeotmal district—(1) Mr. K. R. Joshi from 1st August to 3rd September 1936, (2) Rai Bahadur C. L. Verma from 4th September to 2nd October 1936, (3) Mr. H. V. Kamath, I.C.S., from 3rd October to 21st October 1936 and (4) Mr. M. I. Rahim, I.C.S., from 22nd October 1936 to 31st July 1937.

33. The Deputy Commissioners toured as follows:-

Amraoti-50 days.

Akola-120 days.

Buldana-86 days.

Yeotmal-87 days.

Mr. Farquhar had to cancel an extensive tour in January owing to an accident.

The Deputy Commissioners, Akola and Yeotmal, inspected all tahsils and subordinate courts. The Deputy Commissioner, Amraoti, inspected five out of six tahsils and the Deputy Commissioner, Buldana, inspected three tahsils and cursorily looked into the affairs of the remaining two. The Sub-Divisional Officers inspected all tahsils in their charges but Mr. Rizvi, Sub-Divisional Officer, Akola-Murtizapur, recorded no notes of his inspections.

34. Condition of tenants in izara villages.—The Deputy Commissioner, Yeotmal, has held detailed inquiry into the condition of both permanent and temporary tenants in izara villages and considers that there is no need for special measures for the protection of permanent tenants. The temporary tenants continue to pay high competitive rents. But the statistics obtained do not support the view that lands in these villages are going out of cultivation on account of rack renting.

35. Condition of aboriginals.—The aboriginal cultivators of the Melghat suffered severely from the excessive rain at the end of November which affected both kharif and rabi crops. Full or half suspensions were granted in 41 villages. 15

36. Notice of officers.—The whole revenue staff. responded admirably to the extra strain imposed on them in the organization of the general elections. It is also very creditable to all concerned that in spite of the fact that these elections took place during the earlier and important period of the collection season, the arrears were reduced very considerably by the end of the year. No district charge was held by one officer continuously during the year. Amongst the Deputy Commissioners, Mr. Ramadhyani did conspicuously good work for a junior officer in charge of a heavy district, the work of which had increased abnormally owing to Mr. Kamath's illness.

### REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE DEPART-MENTS OF LAND RECORDS AND SETTLE-MENTS IN BERAR FOR THE YEAR END-ING THE 31st JULY 1937

[NOTE.—In this report the figures in brackets appearing immediately after those for the year under report refer to the previous year.]

Mr. Jayaratnam held charge of the departments till the 22nd March 1937 when I succeeded him.

#### I.—LAND RECORDS ESTABLISHMENT

2. Revision of establishment.—The sanctioned strength of the establishment remained unchanged during the year.

3. Measures taken to improve the prospects of the staff.—Financial considerations prevented any such measures being undertaken during the year.

#### II.—LAND RECORDS WORK

4. Changes in the system of land records.— The important changes introduced were—

- (i) The existing form (XV) of encroachment register has been revised so as to give more precise information in regard to detection and reporting of encroachment.
- (ii) In order to effect a complete check of changes in assessment the survey clerk has been required to send a list of kamjasti patraks to each tahsildar every year on 15th August.
- (iii) Revised instructions have been issued for the proper accounting of the cesses and land revenue in case of part recovery.
- (iv) Instructions have been issued for recording of pigs in the titamma and for distinguishing between sugarcane crushers worked by power and those worked by bullocks.

5. Condition of boundary marks of survey numbers and progress in the single boundary marks system.—The boundary marks inspected by revenue inspectors during the year under report compare with those in the previous year as follows :--

The number of marks inspected has declined in all districts except Yeotmal. The decrease in Akola is explained as due to the revenue inspectors having reverted in the talugs in which second revision settlements were impending to the normal amount of checking on the postponement of revision settlements. In the Amraoti district revenue inspectors are frequently employed on the recovery of Government dues and on other miscellaneous duties, while in Buldana the decrease is attributed to revenue inspectors' misapprehension of the rules. The percentage of marks found out of repair has increased in all the districts. Wilful defaulters have been punished in Buldana and Yeotmal districts and a penalty amounting to Rs. 1,153 was levied in the former and Rs. 192 in the latter district. The maintenance of boundary marks cannot, on the whole, be regarded as satisfactory since the percentage of marks in disrepair is high. The responsibility for their maintenance can only be brought home to the occupants by the adequate use by tahsildars of their powers.

The work in connection with the single boundary mark system was completed in one village of Amraoti district and partly done in one of Akola. In the other two districts no progress could be made.

6. Testing of village papers (Statement A).— The details of the boundary marks and crop inspections done by superintendents of land records, their assistants and revenue inspectors are as below :—

Inspections of boundary marks by superintendents of land records, Amraoti and Buldana, by the assistant superintendent of land records and revenue inspectors in Amraoti and by the assistant superintendent of land records, Yeotmal, have fallen off. This is attributed as due to the land records staff being busy with elections for the Provincial Legislative Assembly. Crop inspections by superintendents of land records of all the districts and by assistant superintendents of land records, Buldana and Yeotmal, show an improvement. In Akola and Amraoti there has been a slight drop. The average crop inspection by revenue inspectors has deteriorated as compared with the preceding year. The decrease is striking in Buldana district.

Inspection of land records work by tahsildars, Akola and Basim, and particularly of the latter, has been inadequate. The check of tahsildars and naib-tahsildars in Âmraoti has declined. The reason assigned is that these officers find it difficult to devote adequate attention to the check of land records in view of heavy increase in collection work and their other multifarious duties. The deputy commissioner has therefore again suggested the revival of the second post of assistant superintendent of land records. The inadequacy of inspections by tabildars and naib-tahsildars in the Yeotmal district is explained by the deputy commissioner to their pre-occupation with election work. In Buldana district, however, tahsildars and naibtahsildars attained the minimum standard of check in spite of Legislative Assembly elections, although the deputy commissioner remarks that he is not satisfied with the quality of the work performed by the tahsildars and naib-tahsildars of Khamgaon and Jalgaon. Check by sub-divisional officers could not improve on account of other more important work.

#### III.—CONDUCT OF THE LAND RECORDS STAFF

7. (a) Conduct and discipline of patwaris.—The number of patwaris has on the whole decreased owing to the clubbing of charges in the Amraoti district. Only four patwaris, three in Akola district and one in Yeotmal district, were suspended for non-residence. In the Buldana district not a single patwari was punished on this account.

The number of punishments inflicted has slightly decreased. Punishments were inflicted mostly for embezzlement, misconduct, neglect of duty and bad work. The 23 patwaris shown as dismissed, include one who was removed for bad work. Of the remaining, 10 were dimissed for defalcation and the Commissioner, Berar, observes—

"There has been an alarming increase in the number of defalcations by village officers detected since Mr. Greenfield insisted in 1933 on proper inspection of village accounts by revenue inspectors. In the last four years nearly 200 cases have been detected and reports of defalcations continue to come in. It is clear that the system of checking village accounts is defective. Mr. Parmanand, I.C.S., was deputed to examine the system in the Bombay Presidency in February 1937. The various proposals made in his interesting report are being examined ".

An additional class had to be opened at Amraoti owing to rush of private candidates. The results of the examination were satisfactory in the districts of Akola, Buldana and Yeotmal. The results were not out in Amraoti before the close of the year. Private candidates were admitted on payment of the prescribed fees.

8. Revenue inspectors.—The staff which includes measurers is fully qualified except two—one in Amraoti and the other in Yeotmal, both of whom have sat for the examination. Two revenue inspectors were reduced for bad work and the increments of four were stopped for bad work and general indiscipline and of one for purchasing land in the name of his wife without permission. Seven revenue inspectors were warned for neglect of duty. The good conduct allowance of one revenue inspector was stopped for bad work. Otherwise the conduct and discipline of revenue inspectors continued to be generally satisfactory.

9. Superintendents of land records and assistant superintendents of land records.—The details of touring done by these officers are—

The touring of superintendents of land records, Akola and Amraoti, and of assistant superintendents of land records, Amraoti and Yeotmal, fell short of the prescribed minimum. The short touring in Amraoti is explained as due to the holding of a refresher course and to work in connection with elections and in Yeotmal to changes in the post of assistant superintendent of land records. The deficiency in Akola is not explained. A departmental enquiry was held against S. M. Ibrahim, superintendent of land records, Akola, for continued gross neglect of duty and his increment has been withheld until he obtains a satisfactory report from the deputy commissioner. The assistant superintendent of land records, Akola (Alimuddin), was warned for disobedience of orders.

#### IV.-UTILIZATION OF LAND RECORDS

10. Circle note-books.—These books have been written up to date in all the districts except in the forest villages in the Buldana district.

#### V.-MISCELLANEOUS

11. Detection of encroachments (Statement B.).—The number of encroachments detected by revenue inspectors during the year compares with the previous year as follows :—

The detection of encroachments has decreased in Akola and Buldana districts, but the district reports do not explain the reason why.

The attention of the supervising revenue officers was again drawn to the importance of correct statistics of live-stock. The checking done indicates some improvement in this direction but there is a great lee-way to be made up in the method of collecting information as is apparent from the percentage of mistakes in Buldana district. 13. Measurement work (Statement C).—The number of cases disposed of by revenue inspectors during the year under report and in the preceding year compare as below :—

Measurement cases in general have increased in all districts except in Yeotmal. The increase is noticeable under the heads "disputes for fixing marks", "measurement of land for public purposes" and "miscellaneous".

The measurement work of sub-divisions has deteriorated. The number remaining for measurement at the close of the year has increased from 1,143 to 3,784. Of these Buldana accounts for 2,080 and Yeotmal 1,521. An additional staff of measurers was sanctioned for Yeotmal at the close of the year to clear off the arrears and it is hoped that they will diminish considerably by the close of the year. The Buldana report does not indicate the reason for the large increase in arrears.

14. Correction of survey records.—Survey records were corrected by the survey clerks as usual. Special staff was engaged for repairing and re-writing old damaged records in Amraoti and Yeotmal and for re-writing them in Akola at a cost of Rs. 745. In Amraoti the work was in progress at the close of the year and the details of cost have not been reported.

15. Check of vital statistics (Statement D).—The land records staff checked vital statistics in 6,586 [6,661] villages. The number of mistakes detected fell to 439 [614]. Closer supervision accounts for the reduced number of mistakes.

16. Issue of sanads for landi mprovement.— Three [14] sanads were granted during the year.

17. Degree of accuracy attained in the record of rights (Statement E-I).—The re-writing of the record of rights was done in 219 villages of Akola at a cost of Rs. 439, in 195 villages of Amraoti and in 228 villages of Yeotmal districts. No expenditure was incurred in the last named district while the Amraoti report is silent on the subject. No re-writing was done in Buldana district.

Statement E-I indicates the amount of certification work and the number of errors in the record of rights. The total number of entries for certification rose to 123,861 [115,147] and the balance remaining uncertified at the close of the year to 26,350 [21,321]. The entries remaining uncertified compare with those of the two preceding years as follows :--

Arrears have increased in all the districts except Akola. In Akola although the balance has decreased by about 250 entries, the arrears are still heavy and are said to be due to the failure of superintendent of land records and assistant superintendent of land records to do adequate certification work. In Amraoti the large increase in arrears is stated to be due to inadequate certification done by the tahsildar and naibtahsildar, Ellichpur. No reasons are given in the Buldana district report. In Yeotmal the arrears are explained as due to the tahsildars, naib-tahsildars and revenue inspectors being busy in connection with the election arrangements. No special certifying officer was appointed in any of the districts during the year.

18. Maintenance of town survey Statements E-II and F.—No town was settled or brought under maintenance during the year. The term of appointment of the two temporary surveyors for Akola and Amraoti sanctioned last year was further extended for another year. The question of augmenting the nazul staff is under consideration.

Statement E-II indicates that the number of entries for certification were almost equal to those of the preceding year 7,818 [7,779] but the balance remaining uncertified at the close of the year dropped slightly to 2,122 [2,356]. Of the balance Amraoti is responsible for more than half 1,232 and Akola for 347 entries. Practically the whole of the certification work was done by nazul surveyors as usual. The superior land record staff did not certify a single entry and the tahsil staff did only 21 entries. The arrears of sub-division measurement are the heaviest in Amraoti in spite of an additional surveyor having been sanctioned for this town; this has not been explained in the district report.

The improvement made in the inspection of traverse marks is very slight, the number inspected being 15,628 out of 17,277 as against 15,296 out of 18,199 in the previous year. The number of marks found either missing or out of repair was 54 [44]. Although the partalling of base lines shows a slight improvement, the balance left is by no means small. The amount of partalling done by the superintendents of land records and assistant superintendents of and records has declined, not a single partal having been run by these officers in the Yeotmal district. The detection of encroachment has fallen considerably in Amraoti d strict while it has improved in Akola and Yeotmal districts. All the nazul charges except Akola civil station were inspected during the year by superintendents of land records or assistant superintendents of land records. Proposals for the strengthening of the nazul staff and providing for technical supervision have been administratively approved by Government and it is hoped that the scheme will be brought into force with effect from April next.

19. (a) Enquiry into the value of land.—The table below gives comparative figures of the average multiples on assessment of consideration for sales and leases for the past six years :—

The selling prices of land show a further fall as compared with last year's figures mainly due to continued economic depression.

Letting values of land have stagnated. The sale and lease statements of the selected village were carefully prepared according to the instructions issued and were scrutinized by the superior land records staff and also by other revenue officers.

(b) Enquiry into the profits of agriculture.-In the Akola district two holdings were changed during the year as the old ones ceased to be typical. Out of the 25 selected holdings only two worked at a loss amounting to Rs. 10-11-9 and Rs. 37-8-3. The highest net profit was Rs. 477-2-0 (Bhamberi) Rs. 326-13-3 (Karla) but the figures of the former are doubtful while that of the latter are reliable. The average net profit per acre for the district comes to Rs. 5-11-4. In Amraoti district only one holding was changed during the year as it had ceased to be typical. Out of the 24 holdings, 22 worked at a profit and only two showed a loss, the figures being Re. 0-10-4 and Re. 0-9-6 per acre. The average profit per acre for the district as a whole works out at Rs. 7-14-3 against a loss of Rs. 2-0-9 per acre in the previous year. The average profit per acre in Buldana came to Rs. 3-8-3 against Rs. 1-12-3 in the preceding year. In the Yeotmal district the number of typical holdings continues to be 21. The average profit per acre for the district works out at Rs. 3-2-9 against Rs. 1-13-5 in the preceding year. The largest profit of Rs. 11-15-6 is vielded by the holding at Kalamb but the Dhanora holding showed a loss of Re, 0-15-3 and that of Jhola Rs. 2-5-9 per acre. The enquiries are reported to be progressing statisfactorily in all districts. I have drawn attention to the desirability of superior revenue officers taking greater personal interest in these enquiries and unless that is done these figures are not likely to be of any great value. The increase in the average profit during the year under report is attributed to the reduced cost of cultivation, better outturn and fair prices of cotton.

#### VI.—SURVEY AND SETTLEMENT

### I.—.Settlement

20. No rural "revenue survey" operations took place during the year under report. A "restricted settlement" of Balapur town was undertaken with the object of protecting the main roads against encroachments which threatened to swallow them up. Financial considerations did not permit of a full-fledged settlement.

21. In all 34 appeals and applications for revision were presented during the year and nine are pending disposal.

#### II.—SURVEYS.

22. Rai Sahib Nanak Chand Puri continued as survey officer throughout the year. The posts of assistant survey officer and of two draftsmen remained in abeyance.

23. No traverse work was executed but the detail survey of all the plots adjoining public works department roads in Balapur town was undertaken under the direct supervision of the survey officer. The boundaries of these plots as finally settled were corrected on sheets by the end of May and the settlement was announced in June 1937. In all 17 sheets were prepared. Duplicate copies of fieldbooks were supplie1 to the deputy commissioner, Akola, for the use of the local maintenance surveyor. The inking of one sheet is pending the survey of a plot included in it as the connected case is in appeal.

24. (i) Traces of 53 village and two taluq maps (Ellichpur and Amraoti) were prepared and sent to press for reproduction. Printed copies of 95 village and seven taluq maps (viz., Daryapur, Ellichpur, Murtizapur, Wun, Darwah, Yeotmal and Pusad) were supplied to the deputy commissioners concerned.

(ii) Traces of 16 nazul sheets of Balapur town were prepared and sent to press for reproduction after scrutiny.

25. The survey officer inspected the nazul survey records of Akot, Akola, Ellichpur, Anjangaon and Malkapur towns and instructed the surveyors in the technical part of their duties. The tendency on the part of these surveyors to survey the more recent extensions of towns on the basis of insufficient traverse marks was checked. Except Malkapur and Nandura the survey of Berar towns was found on the whole to be in better condition than that of Central Provinces.

#### III.—PREPARATION OF THE RECORD OF RIGHTS OF NON-IZARA ALIENAT D VILLAGES

26. The work of the preparation of the record of rights of non-izara alienated villages was completed by Mr. Parmanand, I. c. s., officer on special duty, during the year under report.

27. Promulgation of the record of rights, Forms CC and O.—With the promulgation of the record of rights in Forms CC, OA and OB in 48, 21 and 22 villages, respectively, the work of record of rights in 212 villages was completed and the operations were brought to a close on the 10th April 1937. Mr. Parmanand was occupied during the latter stages of his special duty in the disposal of revenue cases dealing with the record of rights of superior holders and in drafting his final report which is in the press.

# NO. 503-3192-XII OF 1939 GOVERNMENT OF THE CENTRAL PROVINCES AND BERAR REVENUE DEPARTMENT

#### Nagpur, the 8th February 1940.

#### Read-

Report of the Commissioner, Berar, on the revenue administration of Berar and the report of the Settlement Commissioner and Director of Land Records on the department of Land Records and Settlements in Berar for the year ending the 31st July 1938.

#### RESOLUTION

The year under review was a difficult one for the Berar agriculturist. His chief money crop, cotton, suffered from excessive rain in July and the early part of August, and again in October, and was further damaged by cold and hail in December. The result was that the outturn was appreciably below the normal, averaging 10 annas and under. The difficulties created by the unfavourable seasonal conditions were aggravated by a further decline in the price of cotton. Juar, the other main kharif crop, fared somewhat better, but the rabi crop was disappointing due to cold and the absence of winter rains. Encouraged by the favourable conditions of the previous year, the area under cotton had increased by over 1.5 lakhs of acres and that under juar decreased by over two lakhs of acres. The comparative failure of the cotton crop was, therefore, a particularly bitter blow.

2. The conditions of the year are reflected in the recoveries of land revenue. The year opened with arrears amounting to Rs. 12.90 lakhs. The recoveries amounted to Rs. 92.84 lakhs, out of the net demand of Rs. 111.60 lakhs. The outstandings at the close of the year thus mounted up to Rs. 18.76 lakhs. On account of the adverse conditions, a sum of Rs. 65,000 was suspended or remitted.

3. In these circumstances, an increase in the number of coercive processes was to be expected. But the figures show that only about 0.2 per cent of the occupants had to part with property, movable or immovable, in the course of recovery proceedings. This fact and the small proportion of the actual sales to the number of warrants of attachment issued bear out the Commissioner's contention that coercive processes were issued with discretion, and that in most cases the threat of coercive processes was enough.

4. In order to relieve cultivators, the amounts distributed under the Agriculturists' Loans Act and the Land Improvement Loans Act had to be increased by Rs. 4 lakhs and Rs. 0.13 lakh, respectively, to Rs. 7.65 lakhs and Rs. 0.64 lakh.

5. All the taluqs in Berar, except Wun, had been brought under debt conciliation proceedings by the close of the year, the number of debt conciliation boards operating during the year having risen from 12 to 18. Debts amounting to approximately Rs. 93 lakhs were conciliated for about Rs. 50 lakhs, while a further Rs. 52 lakhs were satisfied by transfer of land.

The other Government measures for alleviation 6. of the condition of agriculturists included continuation of the orders applying the more liberal scale of relief in the event of poor crop outturns, the exemption from attachment and sale, in execution of decrees, of the portion of crops needed for the maintenance of the cultivator and his family and for his cultivation. In addition, Government granted a permanent rebate of 12<sup>1</sup> per cent to all small cultivators, and an abatement, extending over а period of five years, of 25 per cent of the enhancement imposed at the second revision settlement in the seven talugs in West Berar. Government also sanctioned the writing off of all outstandings up to the 1st August 1937 of resident cultivators owning not more than 25 acres of land in those taluqs.

7. In order to arrest further deterioration in the state of land records, Government decided to revive some of the posts of Assistant Superintendents of Land Records held in abeyance as a measure of retrenchment since 1932, and one such post was revived during the year. The nazul staff was also expanded with a view to improving the maintenance of nazul records. 8. The year was one of exceptional strain on revenue officers, whose actions to secure the interests of the State were subjected to severe and often unmerited criticism. The burden of revenue work imposed upon them grows yearly more onerous as the following statistics reveal:-

#### PART I.—AGRICULTURAL CONDITIONS OF THE YEAR 1937-38

The monsoon of 1937 broke about the second week of June and became fully established by the end of the month. Kharif sowings were consequently late. Germination was generally successful. Heavy and incessant rain throughout July and the first week of August impeded the juar sowings, retarded the growth of cotton plants by hampering weeding and intercultural operations and necessitated resowing in places where the crops were damaged by floods.

In Yeotmal, however, there was considerably less rain than elsewhere in the early part of this period.

For the next four weeks there was a break with only light showers. This made it possible to complete the juar sowings and to do the weeding and other field work. The break was slightly too long and heavy rain in the second week of September was very welcome.

This was followed by a period of light showers and sunny intervals which stimulated the growth of crops. More heavy rain in the early part of October affected cotton but improved juar. Then followed a period when the temperature was too high for the late crops until there were hail-storms and a sudden cold wave early in December which led to further deterioration and local damage. 2. Rabi sowings commenced at the normal time resulting in successful germination. But the absence of winter rains and the cold spell adversely affected the crop and the outturn suffered.

Yeotmal had the best crops in the division. Amraoti had a normal juar crop and a better cotton crop than was at first expected. But West Berar suffered considerably. It was necessary to carry out detailed crop enquiries in many parts of the Akola and Buldana districts. Remissions of Rs. 28,292 and suspensions of Rs. 36,791 were sanctioned. The more liberal scale of relief was applied.

There are no reliable statistics of exports and imports of raw cotton which can be applied to the factory figures in order to record accurately the actual outturn. On the eastern border cotton has been attracted to the Bombay factories where watering is not yet prohibited while the higher price of Central Provinces cotton always attracts some of the Amraoti cotton to the Wardha markets. Against this has to be put the imports of Hyderabad cotton to the southern markets of the division. Probably there is little difference between exports and imports. Factory returns are certainly the best available check on crop estimates. These give an outturn only slightly below 10 annas for the division and indicate that the district estimates are below actuals.

The increase is attributable to the character of the monsoon. More wheat was sown because in certain areas the break in August came too late for successful juar sowings.

7. Classification of area (Appendix I).—The number of villages remained unchanged. For convenience of administration 96 villages from Chandur were transferred to the Amraoti taluq with effect from 1st August 1937 in accordance with Revenue Department Notification No. 1882-1000-XII of the 18th May 1937.

There was an increase of 1,026 acres in column 4 in the Amraoti and Akola districts. The latter accounts for 279 acres due to remeasurement of certain villages, while in the former it is reported that the figures in this column along with others supplied last year were incorrect. The decrease in column 16 is also the result of incorrect figures reported in the past. Other variations in the statement call for no comment.

8. Condition of the agricultural classes.—The previous kharif season was one of improved prices, better crops and lower expenses of cultivation. But the 1937-38 season started with a considerable drop in cotton prices. Although there was a definite improvement on the opening prices, all cotton was sold at much lower rates than in the previous year. This, combined with the comparatively poor outturn, has undoubtedly led to further deterioration of the condition of the agricultural classes.

I have appended to the report a statement showing the course of cotton prices during the last 10 years. It will be seen that the Oomra contract averaged about Rs. 156 in January and February 1938, when 61 per cent of the crop was marketed. A rough calculation shows that the drop from the prices of the previous year caused a loss of at least seventy lakhs to the cultivators.

Many suggestions to enable the cultivators to hold up their cotton in the hope of better prices were carefully considered. It was, however, decided that it was neither wise nor possible to take such steps. It is now clear that this decision was sound. The bulk of the crop was actually marketed during the period of higher prices and those, who were able to hold up their cotton and actually did so, had to part with it later at lower prices.

Steps were taken to ensure as far as possible that agriculturists should not be forced to market early through pressure of Government demands. Orders were issued delaying and restricting the collection of arrears from real cultivators and minimizing pressure for the payment of current demand until after the end of January. Government also issued orders for reduction of the demand in the seven revised talugs and from small holders throughout the division, which have resulted in an abatement of the divisional demand by Rs. 4 lakhs. It was in most cases impossible to give effect to these orders during the collecting season. But they were a great encouragement and will afford considerable relief during the current year.

It was realized that cultivators would require more assistance than usual towards the expenses of kharif cultivation and special arrangements were made for the distribution of taccavi. Under the Agriculturists Loans Act, Rs. 7.65 lakhs were distributed, Rs. 4 lakhs more than was given out in the previous year.

Towards the end of the year, Government also approved proposals for remission of considerable arrears due from the smaller cultivators in the revised taluqs, which will reduce their burden by approximately Rs. 1.75 lakhs.

9. The condition of live-stock was generally good. Foot-and-mouth disease and rinderpest were prevalent in a mild form in the Buldana and Yeotmal districts. Fodder and water-supply were generally adequate.

10. Condition of the labouring classes.—The condition of the labouring classes was generally satisfactory. It was anticipated in the western part of the division that there might be a shortage of employment in May and June. A few test works were opened but failed to attract any labour.

11. The year was a healthy one until June, when cholera broke out and spread throughout the division. In the subsequent four months there have been over 23,000 cases and nearly 8,000 deaths. The virulence of this epidemic indicates that there is laxity of supervision of water sources and of sanitation. Revenue Officers must impress on patels their responsibilities and must see that a reasonable standard of sanitation is maintained in every village.

12. Measures of improvement.—With the addition of three debt conciliation boards at Melghat, Balapur and Jalgaon, there were in all 18 boards working during the year under review. The only taluq where no board has been established is Wun where there appears to be no demand for conciliation proceedings.

These boards settled debts of Rs. 92.75 lakhs for Rs.49.66 lakhs to be paid in instalments. They have further arranged for the liquidation of Rs. 52.47 lakhs of debt by transfer of a portion of the debtors' lands to the extent of 27,154 acres.

13. The Agriculture Department carried out its usual propaganda and demonstration work. A number of demonstrations of improved niethods were successfully

conducted in all the districts. The improved variety of verum is becoming increasingly popular in Akola.

14. Licences for protection of crops were freely granted and the condition of producing tushes was generally enforced. Although with the extension of groundnut cultivation it is more necessary than ever to reduce the number of pig, there are only two pig-killing associations, both in the Yeotmal district, in the division.

15. Relation between Government and the public.— The relations between Government and the public continued to be cordial.

16. Loans granted under the Agriculturists' Loans Act.—The total outstandings at the commencement of the year were Rs. 4.86 lakhs [Rs. 7.14 lakhs]. The advances made during the year aggregated Rs. 7.65 lakhs (Rs. 3.64 lakhs). Recoveries amounted to Rs. 3.91 lakhs including a sum of Rs. 4,355 remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 8.61 lakhs, out of which Rs. 1.17 lakhs was overdue. The recovery works out at 79 [83] per cent of the total outstandings.

In the Amraoti Recoveries were verv uneven. district the demand overdue was Rs. 30.000 against Rs. 58,000 in the previous year. Collections in the Chandur taluq (Mr. M. P. Dhope) and in the Melghat taluq (Mr. D. B. Mahajan) were particularly good. In the Melghat talug, remission was sanctioned of a large number of small amounts which had long been irrecoverable. The Buldana district maintained its reputation for prompt repayments and had less than Rs. 5,000 overdue at the end of the year. Indebtedness increased in the Akola and Yeotmal districts. In spite of the fact that the arrears in the Yeotmal talug (Mr. G. L. Deshpande) were the highest in the division at the beginning of the year, indebtedness was allowed to increase in this talug to an amount which exceeds the total amounts overdue in the Amraoti and Buldana districts.

17. Loans granted under Land Improvement Loans Act.—A sum of Rs. 1.95 lakhs [Rs. 2.35 lakhs] was outstanding at the commencement of the year. Rs. 0.64 lakhs [Rs. 0.51 lakhs] was advanced during the year. Collections amounted to Rs. 0.61 lakhs [Rs. 0.93 lakhs] which includes a remission of Rs. 739, leaving a balance of Rs. 1.98 lakhs, of which Rs. 0.64 lakhs was overdue at the close of the year. The recovery works out at 31 per cent of the total outstandings. Demands overdue in each taluq vary very considerably. 45 per cent of the total amount overdue at the end of the year in the division was owed by persons in the Yeotmal taluq (Mr. G. L. Deshpande).

Rs. 32,452 [Rs. 51,198] under the Agriculturists' Loans Act and Rs. 12,237 [Rs. 20,266] under the Land Improvement Loans Act were recovered as interest during the year.

18. Demand and collection of land revenue (Appendix II).—The subjoined table gives the revenue account of the year :—

### The following table gives collection work by taluqs :--

Owing to the drop in cotton prices and the poor outturns especially in West Berar, an increase in the arrears of the division was to be expected. The Yeotmal district, which had the best crops in the division, alone reduced its indebtedness. But considering the comparatively low assessments in this district and the better prices obtained for its cotton, there should have been a greater reduction. The orders restricting the collection of arrears and early collections of the current dues undoubtedly increased the difficulties of the Tahsildars. In West Berar, the announcement of the orders for abatement of the demand in the revised talugs at a time when it was impossible to give effect to these orders for the current year also led to much delay in making payment. Throughout the division and especially in the Akola district, there were many rumours that the use of coercive processes would be greatly restricted and that other concessions would be given. These rumours were probably the main reason for the large increase in the arrears of the four plains talugs of this district which now owe more than 60 per cent of the arrears of the division. It is noticeable that generally arrears have increased in the taluqs which contain the larger towns. It is the noncultivating classes who are the most vocal in their complaints and who are the most reluctant to pay their dues.

19. The collection of cesses decreased from Rs. 19.34 lakhs to Rs. 16.85 lakhs. Fluctuating and miscellaneous collections also fell from Rs. 58,000 and Rs. 2.67 lakhs to Rs. 19,889 and Rs. 1.71 lakhs, respectively. The fall is shared by all districts and is chiefly marked in Yeotmal, the former being the result of stoppage of sales of H class lands in that district and the latter to the cessation of the income received in the previous year from measurement fees in the record of rights of jagir and inam lands.

20. The demand on account of jaglia and mahar cess on non-agricultural income inclusive of arrears of previous years amounted to Rs. 9,642 [Rs. 12,379]. Rs. 8,602 was collected and Rs. 75 remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 996 [Rs. 579] for recovery at the close of the year. The bulk of the arrears [Rs. 801] relates to the Amraoti district.

21. The demand on account of special school rate including arrears of previous years, was Rs. 71,500 [Rs. 91,956]. Rs. 64,540 was recovered and Rs. 1,445 remitted. The balance outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 6,871 [Rs. 3,193], of which Rs. 4,972 were outstanding in the Amraoti district alone.

The number of processes issued during the year rose from 11,698 to 19,130. The increase is shared by all the districts, and is attributable mainly to a large increase in the number of warrants of attachments of movables which totalled 12,937. Of these only 2,038 were actually effected and sales were carried out in 336 cases.

Warrants of attachment of immovables were ordered in 5,253 cases. Of these 4,994 were actually effected and sales were held in 2,440 cases but fields were sold only in 591 cases involving 12,165 acres of land. The amount realized in auction of these sales was Rs. 1.32,594.

In many cases land had been uncultivated for several years. The Deputy Commissioner, Buldana, has given interesting statistics which show that of the 299 occupants whose fields were sold in his district, 181 had their fields lying fallow (167 for more than two years).

Only Rs. 402 was levied in the Amraoti district alone as penalty under section 137 of the Berar Land Revenue Code. I consider that more use should be made of this section where the defaulters are not agriculturists. It is obviously justifiable to recoup in this manner what is paid by the tax-payer in interest on money which has to be borrowed by Government because of short collections.

I have already described the difficulties with which Tahsildars were faced. There is always considerable criticism of the methods employed to collect land revenue and in the year under review, there was more criticism than usual. It is the duty of the Tahsildars to collect from every occupant without discrimination. Critics do not suggest any means of doing this except through the recognized means of coercive process. It is against human nature to pay taxes willingly. Without the threat of coercion no land revenue would be collected. The figures which I have quoted show that processes in the vast majority of cases are no more than threats, and rarely lead to loss of property. In a year of particular difficulties the number of occupants who had to part with either movable or immovable property was roughly two per thousand.

24. Cost of collection (Appendix IV).—Out of Rs. 10,30,760 payable to village officers as emoluments for collection of Government and other dues, Rs. 10,08,748 was disbursed leaving Rs. 22,012, of which Rs. 13,138 and Rs. 8,397 were withheld in the Amraoti and Akola districts, respectively, for distribution during the current year. In Akola some village officers purposely avoided taking their emoluments on account of arrears of land revenue subsisting against them. The average emoluments of all kinds paid to patels was Rs. 79.6 [Rs. 79.6] and to patwaris Rs. 255 [Rs. 257.9].

Copying fees paid to patwaris amounted to Rs. 14,449 [Rs. 15,836].

In Amraoti a sum of Rs. 1,176 was also paid as personal allowance to the patwaris.

25. The total number of patels and patwaris actually working during the year increased by four and 21, respectively, the latter being the result of adjustment of patwaris' circles.

The number of villages in which offices of patel and patwari were held in rotation was 1,160 [1,159] and 333 [334], respectively.

26. Seven malik-patels and one malik-patwari were dismissed with forfeiture of watan and four malik-patels without forfeiture of watan for misappropriation of Government dues. Three substitute patels and three substitute patwaris were also dismissed for the same reason.

For other offences such as neglect of duty, grave misconduct, failure to pass within a prescribed period, 13 patels and 19 patwaris were dismissed during the year. The number of patels and patwaris otherwise punished during the year was 83 [92] and 69 [86], respectively.

The number of unqualified patwaris stood at 265.

During the year 24 defalcations by village officerssix in Amraoti, 12 in Akola, five in Buldana and one in Yeotmal-were detected.

There has been some improvement in the check of village accounts. But there is still not sufficient supervision of this very important work. It has been impressed on Tahsildars that the accounts of every village must be checked every year. The need for extreme vigilance will continue as long as arrears exist.

27. Revenue cases (Appendix V).—The disposal of revenue case work in each district is given in the follow-ing table :—

The rise in pending file of all districts except Yeotmal was unavoidable.

Of the 6,324 and 4,909 cases pending over six months and 12 months, cases for recovery of land revenue (class 31), taccavi (class 54), collectors' cases (class 56) and cases of recovery of instalments fixed under Debt Conciliation Act (class 72-B) are responsible for as many as 5,726 and 4,435 cases, respectively. The increase in case work is marked chiefly in cases under classes 17 (unauthorized occupation of nazul land), class 31 (recovery of land revenue), class 42 (other cases under the Berar Land Revenue Code), classes 52 and 53 (taccavi loans under Land Improvement Loans and Agriculturists Loans Acts) and 72-B (recovery of instalments fixed by debt conciliation boards) which account for 19,973 cases, the number of cases registered in each district under the latter class (72-B) being 1,036 in Amraoti, 2,930 in Akola, 1,440 in Buldana and 866 in Yeotmal, a total of 6,272.

There was a large increase in the number of recovery cases of every kind. The strain on Tahsildars and their clerks of this work is very great. Inevitably a few mistakes occurred. But it is greatly to the credit of all concerned, that the mistakes were infinitesimal compared with the number of cases.

28. Appeals and revisions (Appendices VI, VII and VIII).—The record of appellate and revisional work is shown in the following table :—

The number of cases dealt with by the Commissioner rose to 483 [407] leaving 65 [46] pending at the end of the year.

29. Revenue records.—Elimination is reported to be up to date in district and tahsil offices.

30. Nazul records.—No new nazul settlement operations were undertaken during the year. The maintenance of nazul records continues to be unsatisfactory in Amraoti, Akola and Buldana. Now that the staff has been strengthened, much improvement will be expected.

The B Volumes of District Gazetteers except Amraoti are up to date. The Amraoti tables have been sent to Government for printing.

### PART IV.—OTHER HEADS OF ADMINISTRATION

31. Alienation of land (Appendix IX).—11,445 acres of land changed hands as the result of civil court decrees, and 184,973 [206,065] through ordinary transactions in 759 and 25,146 cases giving on an average price of Rs. 44 [Rs. 49] and Rs. 65 [Rs. 75], respectively, per acre.

It is satisfactory to note that although there were 2,440 [1,436] cases in which holdings were auctioned for arrears of land revenue, there were only 591 [707] cases in which transfers of holdings took place as the result of such auctions. This shows that in many cases defaulters were able to save their land by making the necessary deposits within 30 days of the sale. The average price fetched for the land sold comes to about Rs. 12 [Rs. 7] per acre.

32. Tours and inspections.—I was in charge of the division throughout the year and toured for 59 days.

I inspected the Buldana and Akola district offices and eight tahsils.

The touring in Amraoti was insufficient. But the Deputy Commissioner had much work at headquarters.

The Deupty Commissioners, Amraoti, Akola and Buldana, inspected all tahsils and subordinate courts. The Deputy Commissioner, Yeotmal, inspected three out of five tahsils and subordinate courts.

The Sub-Divisional Officers inspected all tahsils in their respective charges.

34. Condition of tenants in izara villages.—The Deputy Commissioner, Yeotmal, reports that there was no material change in the condition of these tenants. Five permanent tenants in Pusad taluq were ejected for failure to pay rent.

35. Condition of aboriginals.—The condition of the aboriginal cultivators of Melghat was generally satisfactory. In a few villages of the Katkumbha tract damage caused by frost was followed by remissions of land revenue amounting to Rs. 1,496.

36. Notice of officers.—I have already called attention to the extra strain imposed on the revenue staff owing to the difficulties of revenue collections. In addition, the staff had considerable work in connection with the elections to local bodies. On the whole, the response was admirable and revenue officials can look back on another year of good work.

## REPORT ON THE OPERATIONS OF THE LAND RECORDS AND SETTLEMENT DEPARTMENTS IN BERAR FOR THE YEAR ENDING THE 31st JULY 1938

[Note.--In this report the figures in brackets appearing immediately after these for the year under report refer to the previous year.]

I held charge of the departments throughout the year.

### I.—LAND RECORDS ESTABLISHMENT

2. Revision of establishment.—The second post of assistant superintendent of land records in the Amraoti district, which was held in abeyance since 1932 as a measure of retrenchment, has been revived with effect from 1st June 1938.

There is a case for the revival of the post of second assistant superintendent of land records in other districts as well, particularly in Akola, but financial considerations militate against it.

As a result of the reorganization of the nazul maintenance staff, additional posts of one supervisor, six nazul maintenance surveyors and 12 patwaris were created with effect from 1st April 1938 but the actual posting of the nazul surveyors could not be made till after the close of the year under report as it was decided to recruit and train candidates before posting them to their charges. A training class was, therefore, opened at Nagpur and 21 candidates were admitted into the class of whom 20 were paid a stipend of Rs. 15 a month each. The training lasted three months and included theoretical and practical instruction in survey and the maintenance of records. At the end of the course the candidates were examined and 17 passed. The six posts of nazul surveyors have since been filled from amongst these successful candidates.

One post of training reserve revenue inspector in each of the four districts was abolished and the other post was amalgamated with the district office cadre in 1935. This arrangement having proved unsatisfactory, the second post of training reserve revenue inspector in each of these four districts has been converted into that of a land records clerk and that of the "chainman" into that of "office peon" with effect from 1st November 1937. The revised arrangement is likely to improve the standard of office work in district offices. 3. Measures taken to improve the prospects of the staff.—No measures were taken to improve the prospects of the staff. On the contrary the rate of the conveyance allowance paid to revenue inspectors and measurers has been reduced from Rs. 20 to Rs. 15 per mensem from 1st May 1938 as a measure of economy.

#### II.—LAND RECORDS WORKS

4. Changes in the system of land records.—Several changes were introduced during the year and the important ones were—

- (i) Instructions have been issued for the preparation by patwaris of electoral rolls of villages under the Village Sanitation and Public Management Act or Village Panchayat Act.
- (ii) The superintendent of land records and his assistant are now required to inspect the land records branch of the district office and the survey record room at least once a year.
- (iii) The Director of Land Records has been empowered to transfer nazul maintenance surveyor from Berar to Central Provinces and vice versa.
- (iv) The form of *jamabandi* statement for khalsa villages has been amended in order to provide extra column to facilitate check of areas and kists and of the different kinds of cesses.
- (v) The agricultural enquiry by revenue inspectors has been discontinued.
- (vi) Instructions have been issued to classify varieties of cotton according to the revised trade classification.

5. Condition of boundary marks of survey numbers and progress in the single boundary marks system.—The following table gives the number of boundary marks inspections carried out by revenue inspectors during the year under report as compared with the previous year :—

The inspection of marks by revenue inspectors shews a striking fall in the Akola district where the marks inspected during the year under report amount to approximately

one-fifth of the preceding year. This is due to the reduction in the year under report of the normal scale to onethird as a special case as revenue inspectors were busy checking *jamabandi statements* prepared in connection with the  $12\frac{1}{2}$  per cent reduction of the assessment of small holdings. The percentage of marks found out of repair has decreased in Akola and Amraoti districts, considerably in the former, while it has increased slightly in the other two districts of Buldana and Yeotmal where the defaulters were punished and a penalty amounting to Rs. 1,099 was imposed in the former and of Rs. 202 in the latter. In order to improve the condition of boundary marks an adequate use by tahsildars of their powers is indicated.

The work in connection with the single boundary mark system was completed in one and is in progress in another village of the Akola district. No progress could be made in any of the other districts on account of continued economic depression.

6. Testing of village papers (Statement A).—The table below exhibits the boundary marks and crop inspections done by superintendent of land records, their assistants and revenue inspectors. Boundary marks inspected by Crop inspections by

The inspections in Akola are said to be adequate except but the figures do not support this. In Amraoti the decrease is explained as due to the land record staff being busy with local bodies elections and changes in the personnel of assistant superintendent of land records. poor outturn in Yeotmal is attributed to the superintendent The of land records being new to the charge and on leave for three weeks in the field season. The crop inspections by the superintendent of land records, Akola and Yeotmal, have deteriorated while those of the superintendent of land records, Buldana and Amraoti, show an improvement. Similarly crop inspections by assistant superintendents of land records have declined in all the districts

except Buldana. The average crop inspection by revenue inspectors was almost the same as in the preceding year.

Check of land records work by tahsildars and naibtahsildars has been adequate in Buldana and Yeotmal districts and the last year's standard has been maintained in the Amraoti district notwithstanding the multifarious duties and heavy collection work. The Deputy Commissioner, Akola, while admitting the inadequacy of check by naibtahsildars, Akola and Murtizapur, has given no reasons therefor. The check by sub-divisional officers has been generally adequate.

### III.--CONDUCT OF THE LAND RECORDS STAFF

7. (a) Conduct and discipline of patwaris.—The number of patwaris has increased in all the districts owing apparently to re-adjustment of charges. Except in the Buldana district, where patwaris are reported to be generally residing at the villages fixed for their residence, nonresidence of patwaris is on the increase and action to enforce residence is being taken in Amraoti and Yeotmal districts. In Buldana two patwaris were dismissed, and in Akola three suspended, for non-residence.

Punishments have decreased on the whole and were inflicted for neglect of duty, grave misconduct, for misappropriation of Government money, bad work and failure to qualify in the departmental tests. Of the 21 dismissals in all the four districts during the year, only one is with forfeiture of watan in the Yeotmal district for defalcation as against 10 in the previous year. With regard to defalcations by village officers, the Commissioner, Berar, observes :—

"Owing to the continued emphasis which has been laid on the check of village accounts during recent years, defalcations by village officers are now being detected more rapidly and it is hoped that when this is realized there will be a marked decrease in such defalcations. But as long as there are large arrears of land revenue, it is very necessary that vigilance should be maintained."

Rewards in the shape of wrist watches and silver cups were given to patwaris in all the districts except Buldana.

(b) Training of patwaris.—Training classes for patwaris were held at the taluq headquarters of all the districts as follows :—

The results of the examination were satisfactory in all the districts except in Amraoti where the results in manual rules were not out before the close of the year. Private candidates were admitted on payment of the requisite fees.

8. Revenue Inspectors.—The staff of revenue inspectors including measurers is fully qualified except for two individuals—one in Amraoti and the other in Yeotmal—and these appeared at the last examination.

The increments of four revenue inspectors in Akola, Amraoti and Buldana districts were stopped for bad work and general indiscipline and that of another in Buldana for alleged highhandedness and corruption pending result of a departmental enquiry. One revenue inspector in the Akola district was retired on compassionate pension as a result of the departmental enquiry held against him for non-submission of tour diaries and *nikal patraks*. The good conduct allowance of one revenue inspector in Akola was stopped for bad work. Three revenue inspectors were warned for negligence of crop inspection in Buldana and Yeotmal districts. Otherwise the conduct and discipline of revenue inspectors continued to be generally satisfactory. 9. Superintendents of land records and assistant superintendents of land records.—The touring done by these officers is as under :—

The touring of superintendents of land records and their assistants was adequate but that of the assistant superintendent of land records, Amraoti, failed to reach the minimum prescribed, viz., 170 days. The shortage is explained as due to frequent changes in the personnel of assistant superintendents of land records and elections to local bodies.

10. Circle note-books.—These books have been written up to date in all the districts.

#### V.—MISCELLANEOUS

11. Detection of encroachments (Statement B).— The table below compares the number of encroachments detected by revenue inspectors :—

The detection of encroachments has fallen off in all the districts except Amraoti where the number is almost the same as in the previous year. The decrease in Akola and Buldana is explained as due to revenue inspectors being occupied with the preparation of rebate statements and local bodies' elections. The decrease in Yeotmal is not explained but the attention of revenue inspectors is being drawn to the fall in the detection work. There is much greater scope in the detection of encroachments and the need for a drive in the matter is indicated. 12. Check of live-stock.—The number of entries in the live-stock returns checked by revenue inspectors and the number of mistakes detected during the year were as follows :—

The decrease in the entries checked which is striking in Yeotmal has not been explained but the attention of revenue inspectors is being drawn by the Deputy Commissioner to this fall as there is greater scope for detection of encroachments on gaothan sites and boundary roads.

The number of measurement cases has declined in all the districts except Amraoti but the fall is noticeable in cases pertaining to "disputes requiring fixing of marks", "encroachments", "measurement of land for public purposes" and "miscellaneous", but the district reports do not explain the reasons for the decrease.

The number of sub-divisions remaining for measurement at the close of the year increased from 3,784 to 5,190; of these Buldana alone accounts for as many as 3,295. The reason assigned for the heavy arrears in Buldana is the establishment of debt conciliation boards all over the district. In the Yeotmal district five additional measurers were sanctioned for a period of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  months to clear off the arrears which have consequently been considerably reduced. 14. Correction of survey records.—The survey records were corrected by the survey clerks as usual. A special staff was engaged for repairing and rewriting old damaged records in Amraoti and Akola. In the former district the work continued after the close of the year and Rs. 681 were spent till the end of September 1938 while in Akola the work was completed at a cost of Rs. 732. No repairing or rewriting work was done in Buldana. In Yeotmal no special staff was employed although repairing and rewriting work was carried out in the district.

15. Check of vital statistics (Statement D).—The land records staff checked vital statistics in 6,505 [6,586] villages. The number of errors detected rose to 500 [439] but no reasons have been assigned for the increase.

16. Issue of sanads for agricultural improvement.— No sanads were issued during the year under report.

17. Degree of accuracy attained in the record of rights (Statement E-I).—The rewriting of the record of rights was done in 278 villages of Akola district at a cost of Rs. 718 and in 206 villages of Amraoti district and 277 villages of Yeotmal district, but no extra cost was incurred in these two districts. In Buldana district no rewriting was done.

Statement E-I indicates the amount of certification work and the number of errors in the record of rights. The total number of entries for certification increased to 127,107 [123,861]. The balance of uncertified entries dropped to 24,371 [26,350]. The entries remaining uncertified at the close of the year compare with those of the two preceding years as follows:—

The arrears in Akola are almost the same as in the preceding year but in Yeotmal the increase is striking. In Amraoti and Buldana although the total number of entries remaining to be certified has decreased the balance is still heavy. In Akola district the revenue inspectors of Basim taluq are said to be responsible for the bulk of the balance as also the superintendent of land records who did not certify a single entry. The large arrears in Yeotmal are due to inadequate certification by all tabsildars except that

due to inadequate certification by all tahsildars except that of Yeotmal. In Amraoti the superior land records staff being occupied with local board and municipal elections could not devote adequate time to certification work. No reasons are given in the Buldana district report. No special certifying officer was appointed in any of the districts during the year.

18. Maintenance of town survey (Statements E-II and F.—No town was settled or brought for the first time under maintenance during the year under report. The nazul maintenance staff has been reorganized and additional staff as shown below has been sanctioned in addition to a separate supervisor allotted to the charge of towns in Berar:—

The candidates recruited directly as nazul maintenance surveyors could not be posted to their charges immediately being inexperienced. A training class was therefore opened at Nagpur and the candidates were given intensive training in survey and all branches of nazul work. The candidates who passed the qualifying examination were posted to the new charges after the close of the year. Appointments to the posts of patwaris have been made locally. It is hoped that this addition to the staff will raise the standard of maintenance, arrest further deterioration in nazul records and facilitate detection of encroachment hitherto much neglected. Similarly, it is hoped that the appointment of a nazul supervisor will secure a higher standard of nazul administration.

Statement II shows that the number of entries for certification decreased to 7,650 [7,818] but the balance at the close of the year was almost the same, viz., 2,109 [2,122]. Of the balance, Amraoti is responsible for nearly half the entries. Almost the whole of the certification work was done by the nazul surveyors. The tahsil staff has shown some improvement in the certification work but the superior land records staff did not certify a single entry. It should have been possible for the superior land records and the tahsil staff to share in the certification work to a greater extent. The sub-division measurement work shows no improvement. The heaviest arrears are in Amraoti in spite of a temporary nazul surveyor having been employed there for the full year to clear off the arrears.

The inspection of traverse marks has further deteriorated, the number inspected being 14,207 [15,628] out of 18,348 [17,277]. The number of marks found either missing or out of repair was 70 [54]. The partalling of base lines does not show any improvement as the balance remaining to be partalled at the end of the year is almost the same. The partalling done by superintendents of land records and assistant superintendents of land records has increased. The number of encroachments detected has fallen off and the decrease is particularly noticeable in the Amraoti district. The superintendents of land records and assistant superintendents of land records have inspected the nazul charges in all the districts except Akola. No mention has been made of this in the Akola district report.

At my inspection of nazul maintenance of Amraoti town just after the close of the year, it was found that the arrears had accumulated to an alarming extent and the accounts were in an unsatisfactory condition. To clear off these arrears and to place the nazul work on a satisfactory footing, an extra staff of two nazul surveyors and one patwari has been sanctioned over and above the additional permanent staff allowed in the reorganization scheme. It is hoped that the nazul work in Amraoti town will now be set right.

19. (a) Enquiry into the value of land.—The table below gives comparative figures of the average multiples on assessment of consideration for sales and leases for the past seven years :—

The selling prices of land show a further fall of about 10 points in Yeotmal, which is explained as being due to continued economic depression and consequent financial stringency. The figures of the remaining three districts show a slight increase.

Letting values of land continue to stagnate.

(b) Enquiry into the profits of agriculture.—The statement below gives the comparative figures of average profit (+) or loss (-) per acre in each district for the last seven years :—

In the Amraoti district two holdings were changed during the year as the old ones had ceased to be typical. Out of the 24 selected holdings four worked at a loss varying from Re. 0-10-2 to Rs. 3-15-2 per acre. The loss is said to be due to comparatively high cost of cultivation and low prices of cotton. The average profit per acre for the district works out to Rs. 1-13-0 as against Rs. 7-14-3 in the previous year. In the Akola district no holding was changed during the year. Out of the 25 holdings five showed loss ranging between Re. 0-2-6 and Rs. 2-6-6 per acre. The loss in three holdings was due to untimely and excessive rains. The loss in the remaining two holdings was due to indifference of the occupant in one case and inexperience and loss of a pair of bullocks in the other. The highest net profit was Rs. 160-11-0 [Rs. 326-13-3] or Rs. 7-10-7 per acre in the holding at Karla in Akot taluo.

The average net profit per acre for the district as a whole is Rs. 2-0-9 against Rs. 5-11-4 in the previous year. In the Buldana district two holdings were changed. Out of the 24 selected holdings six worked at an average loss of Rs. 1-5-9 per acre. The average net profit per acre works out at Rs. 1-2-9 as against Rs. 3-8-3 in the previous year. In the Yeotmal district two holdings were changed as they had ceased to be representative. Out of 21 holdings only one has shown a loss of Rs. 1-5-3 owing to loss of a bullock. The largest profit of Rs. 11-9-9 per acre was derived from the holding at Kalsa in Digras circle of Darwha taluq and the smallest of Re. 0-3-2 per acre from the holding at Mankopra on account of exaggerated expenditure. The average net profit per acre for the district as a whole is Rs. 4-12-0 against Rs. 3-2-9 in the previous year.

The fall in average profit per acre in all the districts except Yeotmal is attributed to poor outturn and low prices of cotton. But a great deal also depends upon the care and attention devoted by land records staff to the accurate recording of results. Patwaris and revenue inspectors are not really equipped for conducting enquiries of such complicated and specialized character.

### VI.—SURVEY AND SETTLEMENT

#### I.—SETTLEMENT

20. No "revenue survey" operations of town lands or "revenue settlement" operations of taluqs took place during the year under report.

21. In all 40 appeals and applications for revision were presented during the year and 24 are pending disposal.

#### II.—SURVEYS

22. Rai Sahib Nanak Chand Puri continued as survey officer throughout the year. The posts of the assistant survey officer and of the two draftsmen remained in abeyance.

23. In addition to 18, 1 and 1 (total 20) new traverse marks fixed for the layout in Amraoti, Khamgaon and Ellichpur towns, respectively, all the marks reported to be missing in the nazul areas of Amraoti, Ellichpur, Khamgaon, Malkapur, Nandura, Shegaon and Buldana towns were replaced.

24. Traces of 47 village maps of Amraoti, Akola, Buldana and Yeotmal districts and of two taluq maps (viz., Mangrulpir and that part of Chandur recently transferred to Amraoti) were completed and sent to the Government Press for reproduction.

Printed copies of 62 village maps and of the two taluq maps mentioned above were supplied to the Deputy Commissioners concerned.

25. The survey officer inspected the nazul records of seven towns, namely, Amraoti, Murtizapur, Khamgaon, Shegaon, Nandura, Jalgaon and Yeotmal. It was noticed that for want of trained candidates the maintenance of nazul suffered during leave and other short term vacancies such as occurred in Shegaon-Jalgaon charge. With the opening of the training classes for the nazul surveyors from the middle of July, it is hoped that such difficulties in providing suitable substitutes will to a great extent be solved. The reorganization scheme for the nazul maintenance sanctioned in the latter part of the year under report is expected to come into force in the beginning of the next open season and it is hoped that with the extra staff the nazul survey records will show a distinct improvement in the near future.

### GOVERNMENT OF THE CENTRAL PROVINCES AND BERAR REVENUE DEPARTMENT

#### Nagpur, the 28th October 1940.

Read—

Report of the Commissioner, Berar, on the revenue administration of Berar and the report of the Settlement Commissioner and Director of Land Records on the Settlement and Land Records departments in Berar for the year ending the 31st July 1939.

#### **RESOLUTION** -

The year was one of extreme difficulty for all concerned, the salient features being the unsatisfactory outturn of crops, low prices, prevalence of epidemics and agricultural distress.

2. The agricultural history of the year was one of the continuous struggle of crops against recurring bouts of heavy rain, which continued right into the month of October. All the kharif crops suffered in greater or less degree and the outturn of the two principal crops, cotton and juar, was no more than 7.8 [9.0] and 10 [11.7] annas, respectively. During the main marketing months, the prices of cotton averaged lower than in the previous year. The effect of continued low prices was seen in a further substantial contraction in the area under cotton and an expansion in the areas under food-grains and oil seeds.

3. The collection of land revenue and agricultural loans reflects the prevailing economic conditions. The year opened with land revenue arrears amounting to Rs. 16.90 lakhs and the recoveries were only Rs. 81.96 lakhs against a net demand of Rs. 101.89 lakhs, so that at the close of the year the unsuspended balance had risen to 19.93 lakhs. A sum of Rs. 10.68 lakhs was remitted or suspended during the year.

4. The measures previously adopted for the alleviation of the condition of agriculturists were continued and expanded during the year. These included the application of the more liberal scale of relief for poor outturn of crops, the exemption from sale in execution of decrees of the portion of the crops needed for the maintenance of the cultivator, an additional 81 per cent rebate on the enhancement imposed on the seven taluqs which had come under revision settlement, in addition to the 25 per cent abatement already granted, the remission of all arrears of land revenue outstanding prior to the 1st August 1937 against small cultivators in those taluqs, the further limitation of coercive processes and the postponement of the recovery of agricultural loans and instalments of Debt Conciliation Boards. Loans were disbursed to agriculturists to the extent of Rs. 12.5 lakhs. The Temporary Postponement of Execution of Decrees Act expired during the year. It was replaced by the Central Provinces and Berar Relief of Indebtedness Act and six Debt Relief Courts were established. 5. In the months of March and April 40 relief works were opened to provide for rural labour, but the response except in the Buldana district was poor. Most of the works were closed at the commencement of the rains.

6. The year was distinctly unhealthy. The commencement of the year found Berar in the throes of a severe cholera epidemic which was not stamped out until it had brought an aggregate of 26,000 attacks and 8,000 deaths. The measures taken to combat an outbreak of this disease are much more efficacious now-a-days, and are well understood and appreciated by the people; but, as the Commissioner observes, the insanitary conditions of Berar villages are the real obstacle to its prevention or check.

7. In the Department of Land Records, the three posts of Assistant Superintendents held in abeyance as a measure of retrenchment since 1932 could not be revived owing to financial stringency, although this step is most necessary. The effect of the expansion of the nazul staff is reflected in 2,500 additional encroachment cases. Government hopes that a considerable and permanent improvement in the maintenance of nazul records will ensue. Government also desires to draw the attention of all revenue officers to the need for special attention to the newly completed record of rights of non-izara alienated villages. The recommendations of the Officer on Special Duty who prepared it are being examined by Government; they cover a wide field and include recommendations for legislation in regard to land records and tenancy rights.

8. This year again witnessed a further heavy addition to the burden of revenue work. The number of cases for disposal rose from about 94,000 to 163,000, and in spite of the fact that the number of cases disposed of increased by about 37,000, nearly 62,000 cases were pending at the close of the year. This abnormal expansion of revenue business is attributable partly to the general conditions of the year and partly to a large increase in the number of applications for recovery of Debt Conciliation Board instalments, of which 25,000 were registered during the year against 7,500 in the previous year. Most if not all of the increase is permanent, and Government at the close of the year was examining the question of some corresponding expansion of the staff to cope with it.

9. Government acknowledges the loyalty and devotion to duty of revenue officers of all grades in a year of exceptional difficulty and pressure.

ORDER.—Ordered that copies of this resolution and its annexure be forwarded to the Commissioner, Berar, the Deputy Commissioners in Berar and the Settlement Commissioner and the Director of Land Records, for information and guidance and that it be published in Part I of the Central Provinces and Berar Gazette.

## PART I.—AGRICULTURAL CONDITIONS OF THE YEAR 1938-39

1. Character of the season.—The rainfall registered at each district headquarters was as follows :—

The monsoon of 1938 set in earlier than usual. Local showers were received in the last week of May and the monsoon became fully established in the first week of June. Sowing of cotton was done in favourable circumstances, except in Basim and Mangrulpir taluqs, where it was delayed by continuous rainfall. Germination was generally successful. Early weeding was done during a short break at the end of June. Heavy and incessant rain in July held up the sowing of juar, retarded the growth of cotton and hindered interculturel operations. There was a much-needed break in West Berar during the first three weeks of August. In Eas. Berar there was more rain during this period but a certain amount of weeding was possible. There was a setback owing to heavy rain in the last week of August and the beginning of September. Hopes were again raised by useful breaks in September and towards the end of that month, both cotton and juar looked very promising. There was, however, heavy rain throughout the division during the first fortnight of October which caused very considerable damage to all kharif crops. Rabi sowings commenced at the normal time and resulted in successful germination. But absence of dew and lack of winter rain hampered growth and affected the outturn.

2. The damage to the kharif crops was more extensive in the Amraoti and Yeotmal districts. Buldana was the least affected. As soon as it was realised that suspensions might be necessary detailed enquiries were ordered. The more liberal B scale was applied and instructions were issued that in border lines cases the benefit of the doubt should be given to the occupants. Insistance on the preparation of suspension statements (in forms A and B) for every village brought within the scope of relief many villages with outturns above eight annas but with cropped areas below the average of previous years. This gave additional relief in certain areas of the Akola district where during the last ten years there has been a marked fall in the area under kharif cultivation.

The cotton area decreased by about 9 per cent as compared with the figures of 1937-38. The drop for the division amounted to as much as a quarter of a million acres. This was mainly due to the expectation of low prices. The juar area increased by over 1 per cent. The area under juar was almost the same as in 1929-30. But during the decade the cotton area has decreased by 830 thousand acres.

Though detailed information of road movements of unginned cotton is not available, imports from Hyderabad were undoubtedly considerably less than usual. It seems probable that the factory figures for the division approximated to actuals. Allowing for the considerable attraction of Akola cotton to the Khamgaon and Shegaon markets, it appears that the Akola district estimate was slightly below and the Buldana district estimate slightly above actuals. The Amraoti crop was overestimated by about one anna, while Yeotmal estimates were very inaccurate.

7. Classification of area (Appendix I).—The number of jagir villages in the Melghat taluq has been wrongly reported in previous years and has now been corrected to 25. There was an increase of 368 acres in column 4 in the Buldana district due to the detection of mistakes in the areas of A and C class forests. The increase of 2,918 acres in column 10 was due mainly to relinquishment of land by aboriginals in the Melghat. The decrease in column 13 of Rs. 3,73,299 was due to the abatement of land revenue sanctioned by Government in 1937-38 which was first brought into the jamabandi during the year.

8. Condition of the agricultural classes.—A statement showing the course of cotton prices during the last ten years has been added to the report. The table below gives the percentage of arrivals of cotton carts in the important months to the total arrivals of the season together with the cotton prices and the figures of the two previous years :—

It will be seen that during the main marketing months, prices were slightly below even those of 1937-38 and were the lowest prices in the decade. Groundnut prices were also low. Juar prices improved in the latter part of the season, but this brought no benefit to the cultivating classes.

With poor prices and poor crops, there was inevitably further deterioration in the condition of the agriculturists.

Reference has already been made to the very considerable relief given through land revenue suspensions. Orders for abatements of land revenue were issued in 1937-38 too late to be fully effective. During the year under review, many occupants, therefore, received benefit of two years' abatement, probably about Rs. 7 lakhs. Government also sanctioned an additional  $8\frac{1}{3}$  per cent rebate in the seven revised taluqs. But again orders were received too late to be effective. The reduction will amount to about Rs. 0.81 lakhs, bringing the total of the abatements sanctioned to Rs. 4.54 lakhs. A further concession was given in the remission of all arrears prior to 1st August 1937 due from the smaller resident cultivators in the revised taluqs. The amount thus written off came to Rs. 1.08 lakhs. Orders were issued restricting the use of coercive processes against the cultivating classes.

Postponement was ordered of all Government loans due from villages where land revenue suspensions had been granted. Orders were also issued to adjourn debt conciliation recovery cases, while Government sought legislative authority for general suspension of instalments in areas where land revenue had been suspended. This authority was later given in the Central Provinces Debt Conciliation (Amendment) Act, 1939.

Thanks to Berar's good record for repaying loans, it was possible to obtain a substantial increase in the usual allotment for loans and as much as Rs. 10.69 lakhs were distributed under the Agriculturists' Loans Act.

9. The condition of live-stock was generally good. Foot-and-mouth disease, hæmorrhagic septicæmia, rinderpest and blackquarter diseases prevailed in a mild form in some parts of West Berar. Fodder and watersupply were generally adequate except in Buldana where during the latter part of the year some scarcity of fodder was felt.

**10.** Condition of the labouring classes.—The 1938 weeding season was a good one for the labouring classes. But the harvest was so poor that in March it was feared that many were at the end of their resources. Test works were opened in March in the Amraoti (4), Akola (8) and Buldana (18) districts, and in April in the Yeotmal district (10). The highest fortnightly daily average attendance was 1,550 on the Buldana works in the first half of June and some of the works in this district were kept open during the first part of the rains. In the other districts the works were poorly attended. These test works showed that during the hot weather there was still little distress. However, the lightness of the early 1939 monsoon and the consequent lack of employment in weeding led to rapid deterioration towards the end of the revenue year. The situation became acute early in August 1939 and by the middle of that month, a network of relief camps had been established throughout Berar. The daily number attending these works rose at one time as high as 75,000.

Cholera had already spread throughout the 11. division at the beginning of the year and continued in West Berar until the middle of September and in East Berar for a month longer. There were 26,000 attacks and 8,000 deaths. The virulence of the epidemic was undoubtedly due to the insanitary conditions for which Berar villages are notorious. Revenue officers were instructed to pay special attention to village sanitation and to impress on patels their responsibility in this matter. But there is little hope of improvement or of insuring Berar against similar epidemics until there is a strengthening of public opinion regarding sanitation. It is a matter of regret that Government should have found it necessary to withdraw rule 10 of the Village Sanitation Rules framed under section 194 (2) (e) and (f) of the Berar Land Revenue Code in villages to which the rule had been applied.

12. Measures of improvement.—Eighteen debt conciliation boards were working at the beginning of the year. Five completed their work during the year. The Boards settled debts amounting to nearly Rs. 59 lakhs for Rs. 33.26 lakhs repayable in instalments. They also arranged for the settlement of Rs. 51.28 lakhs of debt by land transfers of 28,808 acres.

13. The usual propaganda was carried out by the Agriculture Department. There was little progress in the movement to improve cattle-breeding, mainly, it appears, because of the unpopularity of the Hissar bulls.

14. Crop protection licences were granted freely. Government sanctioned rewards for pigs killed by recognized associations. The Deputy Commissioner, Buldana, was successful in forming a keen district association and it is hoped that there will now be more protection of the groundnut crop which is gradually becoming an important one in that district.

15. Relations between Government and the public.—Relations between Government and public were generally cordial. In one or two places unsuccessful attempts were made to boycott revenue sales.

16. Loans granted under the Agriculturists' Loans Act.—The total outstandings at the commencement of the year were Rs. 8.61 lakhs [Rs. 4.86 lakhs]. The advances made during the year aggregated Rs. 10.69 lakhs [Rs. 7.65 lakhs]. Recoveries amounted to Rs. 6.12 lakhs [Rs. 3.91 lakhs] including a sum of Rs. 3,905 remitted. leaving a balance of Rs. 13.19 lakhs, out of which Rs. 1.05 lakhs was suspended and Rs. 1.86 lakhs was overdue. The recovery works out at 70 [79] per cent of the total outstandings.

As usual, recovery work was patchy. The amount overdue in the Buldana district increased by Rs. 10,000, but was still Rs. 30,000 below the arrears in any other district. The arrears increased only slightly in Yeotmal, but in Amraoti the amount overdue was Rs. 45,000 compared with Rs. 28,000 in the previous year, and in Akola Rs. 80,000 compared with Rs. 40,000 in the previous year.

17. Loans granted under the Land Improvement Loans Act.—The total outstandings at the commencement of the year were Rs. 1.98 lakhs [Rs. 1.95 lakhs]. The advances made during the year aggregated Rs. 1.76 lakhs [Rs. 0.64 lakhs]. Recoveries amounted to Rs. 0.66 lakhs [Rs. 0.61 lakhs] including a sum of Rs. 2,242 remitted leaving a balance of Rs. 3.08 lakhs out of which Rs. 0.14 lakhs was suspended and Rs. 0.55 lakhs was overdue. The recovery works out at 32 [31] per cent of the total outstandings.

The amount overdue in the Buldana district increased by a thousand rupees but was still Rs. 12,000 below the arrears in Akola and Yeotmal districts. Arrears decreased in Yeotmal by Rs. 11,000 and in Akola by Rs. 2,000 but in Amraoti the amount overdue was Rs. 11,000 compared with Rs. 7,000 in the previous year.

Rs. 41,796 [Rs. 32,452] under the Agriculturists' Loans Act and Rs. 14,414 [Rs. 12,237] under the Land Improvement Loans Act were recovered as interest during the year.

In spite of the very considerable concessions granted by Government, collection of land revenue was very difficult. Generally, tahsildars did extremely well in a year of unusual difficulties. One satisfactory feature of collections was the considerable reduction of old arrears through Arrears before 1st August collections and remissions. 1937 were reduced from Rs. 4.49 lakhs to Rs. 1.82 lakhs, while of the outstandings of 1937-38 amounting to Rs. 14.27 lakhs as much as Rs. 11.65 lakhs was collected. The carry-over increased considerably in Amraoti and Buldana, but was reduced in the Akola district. This reduction was mainly due to the fact that the Akola district, for reasons which have already been given, had more than half of the suspensions in the division. For the same reasons, the tahsildar, Akola, was able to reduce the carry-over of the taluq from 52 to 38 per cent. The percentage of unsuspended arrears increased most in the Chikhli taluq, followed by Morsi, Daryapur and Amraoti. Good progress in the collection of arrears was made in the Yeotmal taluq where many habitual defaulters were tackled successfully for the first time.

19. The collection of cesses decreased from Rs. 16.85 lakhs to Rs. 15.75 lakhs. Fluctuating and miscellaneous collections also fell from Rs. 19,889 and Rs. 1.71 lakhs to Rs. 19,117 and 1 lakh, respectively. The fall is shared by all districts except Akola, where there was an increase by about Rs. 3,000 in fluctuating collections due to the sale of H class land in the Mangrulpir taluq.

20. The demand on account of jaglia and mahar cess on non-agricultural income inclusive of arrears of previous years amounted to Rs. 7,781 [Rs. 9,642]. Rs. 6,666 was collected and Rs. 64 remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 1,051 [Rs. 996] for recovery at the close of the year. The bulk of the arrears (Rs. 694) relates to the Amraoti district.

21. The demand on account of special school rate including arrears of previous years was Rs. 58,947 [Rs. 71,500]. Rs. 50,515 was recovered and Rs. 1,104 remitted. The balance outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 7,328 [Rs. 6,871], of which Rs. 4,555 and Rs. 1,609 were outstanding in the Amraoti and Akola districts, respectively.

The large increase in the number of processes issued shows the difficulties of the year. The increase was mainly in the number of warrants of attachment of moveables. It is remarkable that of the 25,502 warrants issued, it was only necessary to execute 3,840 and that sales were carried out in only 656 cases. In the 8,196 cases in which immoveable property was attached, sales were held in 4,783 cases, but there were only 1,384 cases in which sales were confirmed. In other words, the 35,000 processes led to the sale of property in about 2,000 cases. It must be remembered that there are over 400,000 occupants in Berar and that the year ended with nearly Rs. 20 lakhs unauthorized arrears.

24. Cost of collection (Appendix IV).—Out of Rs. 10,22,645 payable to village officers as emoluments for collecting Government and other dues, Rs. 10,10,932 was disbursed, leaving Rs. 11,713 of which Rs. 3,233 and Rs. 6,294 pertained to Amraoti and Akola districts, respectively, where the village officers deliberately avoided taking away their dues as they were in arrears of land revenue or the payment was deferred on account where 3 defalcation cases were pending. The average emoluments of all kinds paid to patels was Rs. 79 [Rs. 79.6] and to patwaris Rs. 247 [Rs. 255].

Copying fees paid to patwaris amounted to Rs. 12,258 [Rs. 14,449].

25. The total number of patels and patwaris actually working during the year increased by 10 and 33, respectively, due to splitting up of the charges and adjustments of patwaris' circles. The number of villages in which the offices of patels and patwaris were held in rotation was 1,148 [1,160] and 332 [333], respectively.

26. There was no case of forfeiture of watan. Fifteen malik and 12 substitute patels and 5 malik and 7 substitute patwaris were dismissed. Of these, 11 malik and 5 substitute patels and 2 malik and 6 substitute patwaris were dismissed for misappropriation of Government money. The number of patels and patwaris otherwise punished during the year was 83 [83] and 72 [69], respectively.

The number of unqualified patwaris stood at 284 [265].

During the year 43 defalcations by village officers, 25 in Amraoti, 12 in Akola, 5 in Buldana and 1 in Yeotmal involving nearly Rs. 11,000 were detected. The increase is due partly to more effective checking of village accounts by revenue inspectors and partly to increased arrears and economic depression. In order to check this evil and to remove the defect in the system of village accounting a combined kird and receipt book on the lines of Bombay system was tried successfully in Amraoti and Malkapur taluqs.

Revenue officers in Berar had to deal with nearly 70,000 more cases than in the previous year and actually completed about 37,000 more cases. The enormous increase in case work is due partly to the circumstances of Nearly 7,000 of the increase in institutions the year. were due to suspensions and to the larger distribution of Government loans. The increase in nazul staff is reflected in the addition of 1,500 encroachment cases. The greatest increase was under the recovery heads which produced 37,000 more cases. This was due partly to the conditions of the year and partly to the fact that in the Akola and Amraoti districts cases were registered for almost every arrear. There is a growing realization that this is the only satisfactory method of ensuring that the more influential defaulters do not escape. There is every hope that there will be a considerable reduction in the number of collection cases during the next few years. But the same cannot be said of the class of case which has produced the second largest increase. There were about 25,000 applications for recovery of debt conciliation instalments compared with 7,500 in the previous year. In better years, creditors will not have so much difficulty in collecting their dues. But in the year under review there were certain talugs in which all the instalments had not become due. Moreover, the Relief of Indebtedness Act will lead to a steady increase in these cases.

The fact that 35,000 more cases were disposed of during the year is due mainly to the long and exhausting hours kept by all revenue officers and partly to the temporary increase in staff sanctioned for the four plain talugs of the Akola district. After the close of the year, recommendations have been made for both permanent and temporary increases in the clerical establishments and Government has already sanctioned the temporary increases.

The number of original cases dealt with by the Commissioner was 418 [483] with 71 [65] pending at the end of the year. This includes 36 surcharge cases of which 18 remained pending at the end of the year.

29. Revenue records.—Elimination is reported to be up to date in district and tahsil offices.

30. Nazul records.—No new nazul settlement operations were underfaken during the year. There has been some improvement in the maintenance of nazul records though it is too early to say how far the addition to the staff has resulted in a better standard of work.

The B volumes of District Gazetteers are reported to be up to date.

#### PART IV.—OTHER HEADS OF ADMINISTRATION

31. Alienation of land (Appendix IX).—10,398 [11,445] acres of land changed hands as the result of civil court decrees and 175,181 [184,973] acres through voluntary sales in 883 [759] and 24,127 [25,146] cases giving on an average price of Rs. 48 [Rs. 44] and Rs. 59 [Rs. 65], respectively, per acre.

Although there were 4,783 [2,440] cases in which holdings were auctioned for arrears of land revenue, there were only 949 [591] cases in which transfers of holdings took place as the result of such auctions. The average price fetched for the land sold came to about Rs. 11 per acre. 32. Tours and inspections.—I was in charge of the division throughout the year except from 13th December 1938 to 9th January 1939 when Mr. P. S. Rau held charge in addition to his duties as Settlement Commissioner. In addition to the divisional charge, I officiated as Financial Commissioner from the beginning of the year until 1st October 1938 and held charge of the Nagpur division from 15th April 1939 to 10th May 1939. I toured 52 days and Mr. Rau toured 12 days. I inspected Yeotmal district office and eight tahsils. The district charges were held by the following officers :—

- Amraoti district.—(1) Mr. A. G. F. Farquhar, I.C.S., from 1st August to 22nd September 1938, (2) Mr. P. S. Lawale, Extra-Assistant Commissioner, from 23rd September to 27th October 1938, and (3) Mr. A. H. Layard, C.I.E., I.C.S., from 28th October to the end of the year.
- Akola district.—(1) Mr. D. V. Rege, I.C.S., from 1st August to 7th December 1938 and (2) Mr. D. R. Rutnam, I.C.S., from 8th December 1938 to the end of the year.
- Bulduna district.—(1) Mr. R. K. Patil, I.C.S., from 1st August to 2nd December 1938 and (2) Mr. R. J. J. Hill, I.C.S., from 3rd December to the end of the year.
- Yeotmal district.—(1) Mr. M. I. Rahim, I.C.S., from 1st August 1938 to 19th April 1939 and (2) Mr. J. W. Meldrum, I.C.S., from 20th April 1939 to the end of the year.

The Deputy Commissioners inspected all tahsils and subordinate courts. So also the sub-divisional officers inspected all tahsils in their respective charges.

The year was one of exceptional difficulties which were tackled competently, courageously and sympathetically by the whole revenue staff.

### REPORT ON THE OPERATIONS OF THE LAND RECORDS AND SETTLEMENT DEPARTMENTS IN BERAR FOR THE YEAR ENDING THE 31st JULY 1939

[NOTE.—In this report the figures in brackets appearing immediately after those for the year under report refer to the previous year.]

1. Mr. P. S. Rau held charge of the departments till 21st August 1939 when I succeeded him.

### I.—LAND RECORDS ESTABLISHMENT

2. Revision of establishment.—The sanctioned strength of the establishment remained unchanged during the year under report.

Four posts of assistant superintendents of land records, one in each district in Berar, were abolished in 1932. Of these the second post of assistant superintendent of land records in the Amraoti district was revived last year, with effect from the 1st June 1938. In other districts also the ever increasing volume and variety of work of tahsildars and naib-tahsildars leaves them little time to devote to purely land records work, but for the present the revival of the posts in other districts has not been taken up owing to financial stringency.

3. Measures taken to improve the prospects of the staff.—No measures were taken to improve the prospects of the staff.

### II.--LAND RECORDS WORK

4. Changes in the system of land records.—The following changes were made in the system of land records during the year under report :—

- (i) The monthly reports on the agricultural outlook, trend of prices, etc., which were received during the months of July, August and September, were discontinued;
- (ii) in order to ensure punctual submission of diaries and nikal-patraks by revenue inspectors and nazul maintenance surveyors a check register (form XXXVI) was prescribed;
- (iii) the number of forecasts of groundnut was increased from one to two;

- (iv) instructions were issued that the estimates of areas under cotton should be shown separately according to the revised trade classification for oomras, verum and buri, instead of for long-staple, short-staple and mixed cotton;
- (v) a distribution of work between the nazul surveyors and their patwaris designed to enable the former to pay attention to work, in which his technical qualifications are necessary, was prescribed; and
- (vi) a combined kird and receipt form, based on the form in use in Bombay Province, was introduced as an experimental measure in Malkapur and Amraoti taluqs.

5. Condition of boundary marks of survey numbers and progress in the single boundary marks system.—The following table gives the number of boundary marks inspections carried out by revenue inspectors during the year as compared with the previous year :—

The number of boundary marks inspected by the revenue inspectors has increased in all the districts except Amraoti. The Deputy Commissioner, Amraoti, reports that the fall in the number of marks inspected by the revenue inspectors was owing to their employment on the work of the recovery of Government dues, scarcity works and other miscellaneous duties of important nature. The percentage of marks found out of repairs increased in all the districts except in Buldana, where it decreased slightly. Penalties amounting to Rs. 664 [Rs. 1,099] in Buldana district and Rs. 290 [Rs. 202] in Yeotmal district were imposed on defaulters. The inability of tahsildars owing to other work to devote adequate attention to boundary marks and the consequent neglect by holders is reflected in the all-round increase in the percentage of marks found out of repair.

The single boundary mark system could not be introduced during the year in any new village owing to continued economic depression.

6. Testing of village papers (Statement A).—The details of boundary marks and crop inspection done by the superintendents of land records, their assistants and revenue inspectors are as follows :—

The crop and boundary marks inspections by superintendents of land records were adequate in all districts. No reason is assigned for the fall in the number of inspections of boundary marks by the assistant superintendent of land records, Akola. In the Amraoti district the inspections by the assistant superintendents of land records more than doubled in the case of boundary marks and more than trebled in the case of crop inspections, owing to the revival of the second post of assistant superintendent of land records. Inspections by revenue inspectors are satisfactory.

Check by tahsildars and naib-tahsildars is adequate in Amraoti, Yeotmal and Buldana districts except in the Mehkar taluq of the Buldana district. The tahsildar, Akot, and the naib-tahsildars, Akot, Murtizapur and Mangrulpir, in the Akola district, could not finish their quota of inspections, but no reason has been given in the district report for their failure to do so. The Deputy Commissioner reports that the attention of these officers is being drawn to this omission.

Check of land records work by the sub-divisional officers was satisfactory in Akola and Yeotmal districts but in the other two districts the sub-divisional officers could not spend more time for this work owing to their preoccupation with other more important work in connection with enquiries into the condition of crops, the difficulties in land revenue collections and the acarcity conditions.

## III.—CONDUCT OF THE LAND RECORDS STAFF

7. (a) Conduct and discipline of patwaris.—The number of patwaris increased in all districts except Akola owing to the splitting up of heavy charges in order to improve the standard of work. The number of non-resident patwaris decreased considerably. Action is still being taken against non-resident patwaris in Amraoti, Yeotmal and Buldana districts.

Punishments, other than those for non-residence, were as detailed below :---

Punishments have on the whole increased slightly and were inflicted mostly for habitual neglect of duty, grave misconduct, bad work, defalcations and failure to pass the departmental tests. With regard to defalcations the Commissioner, Berar, observes :---

"A combined *kird* and receipt book on the Bombay model was tried successfully in Amraoti and Malkapur taluqs. A further experiment with a different form has been recommended. The experience of last year gives every hope that the general introduction of this book will minimise the risk of defalcations."

Rewards in the shape of wrist watches and petromax lamps were given to patwaris in all the districts except Buldana for general good work and accuracy in the forecast reports.

(b) Training of patwaris.—Training classes for patwaris and outsiders were held at the following taluq headquarters :—

The results of the examinations were satisfactory in the districts of Akola, Yeotmal and Buldana. The results were not announced in the Amraoti district before the close of the year. Private candidates were admitted on payment of the requisite fees. For members of the scheduled castes Government has sanctioned exemption from payment of the prescribed fees for one year from the 1st July 1940.

Revenue inspectors.—The staff of revenue ins-8. pectors including measurers is fully qualified. except for one revenue inspector in the Amraoti district who is appearing at the ensuing departmental examination in rules regarding the duties of revenue inspectors and the Patwari Manual. The annual increments of two revenue inspectors in the Akola district were stopped and one revenue inspector was suspended for three months for gross neglect of duty and indiscipline. One revenue inspector was censured for falsehood during a departmental enquiry held against him. One revenue inspector was physically unfit and was permitted to retire voluntarily after completing twenty-five years' qualifying service. Two revenue inspectors in Amraoti district were warned-one for non-residence at his headquarters and the other for not reporting defalcations of Government money punctually.

The touring of the second assistant superintendent of land records, Amraoti, fell short of the minimum standard by five days. The shortage is attributed to his illness.

The detection of encroachments has fallen off in Amraoti and Buldana districts and is almost constant in Akola. The decrease in Amraoti and Buldana is attributed to the preoccupation of revenue inspectors with the calculation of the rebate of land revenue sanctioned by Government and extensive crop inspections and preparation of annewari statements owing to partial failure of crops. In Yeotmal district there was an increase in the number of encroachments detected.

12. Check of live-stock.—The number of entries in the live-stock returns checked by revenue inspectors and the number of mistakes detected by them during the year were as follows :—

The decrease in the number of entries checked in the Amraoti district is striking and is attributed to the preoccupation of revenue inspectors with the other work referred to above. The decrease in Akola district is not explained in the district report. 13. The fall is striking in Akola and Amraoti districts and is mainly noticeable under the heads "disputes requiring fixing of marks, encroachments and measurement of land for building purposes". Revenue inspectors were required to dispose of a very large number of extraneous cases such as those relating to sales of moveable property for recovery of land revenue and sales of trees with the result that there was a fall in the disposal of measurement cases.

There is a considerable improvement in the progress of sub-division measurement work. The number of unmeasured sub-divisions at the close of the year was 2,152 as against 3,784 in the preceding year. The outturn of measurement work by a few revenue inspectors in Akola and Amraoti districts is inadequate and action has been taken against four revenue inspectors of Akola district.

14. Correction of survey records.—The survey records were corrected as usual by the survey clerks. A special staff was engaged for repairing and rewriting old damaged records in all districts except Buldana. In the Akola district the work continued for 5 months and 20 days at a cost of Rs. 728-6-0. In Amraoti district the work continued even after the close of the year and Rs. 622-9-0 excluding Rs. 85-0-0 for stationery were spent till the end of September 1939. In Yeotmal district the work was completed in one month at a cost of Rs. 388.

15. Check or vital statistics (Statement D).—The land records staff checked vital statistics in 6,860 [6,505] villages. The number of errors detected was 513 [500]. 16. Issue of sanads for agricultural improvements.— The issue of such sanads was discontinued by orders in Revenue Department memorandum No. C.-881-610-XII, dated the 29th May 1937.

17. Degree of accuracy attained in the record of rights (Statement E-I).—The rewriting of the record of rights was done in 62 villages of the Akola district at a cost of Rs. 158-6-0 and in 230 villages of the Amraoti district and 201 villages of the Yeotmal district, without any extra cost. No rewriting was done in the Buldana district during the year. Statement E-I indicates the amount of certification work and the number of entries for certification decreased to 119,925 [127,107]. The balance of uncertified entries dropped to 19,941 [24,371] and compares with those of the preceding two years as follows :—

Arrears of this work increased in Akola. Although the total number of entries remaining to be certified in the other three districts has decreased the balance is still heavy. In Akola district the revenue inspectors, Akola, Akot, Hiwarkhed, Ugwa and Kamargaon circles are said to be responsible for the bulk of the arrears. The main reason for the large arrears is the preoccupation of revenue inspectors and revenue officers with other more urgent work. The Deputy Commissioner, Yeotmal, reports that the attention of the tahsildars, Yeotmal, Darwha and Pusad taluqs, is being drawn to the necessity of reducing the number of uncertified entries.

18. Maintenance of town survey (Statements E-II and F).—No town was settled or brought for the first time under maintenance during the year under report. Two additional posts of temporary nazul maintenance surveyors and one of nazul patwari were sanctioned for a period of six months in the Amraoti district to assist the permanent staff in disposing of the arrears.

. .....

Statement E-II shows that the number of entries for certification has more than doubled, being 15,425 [7,650]. The balance at the close of the year was 3,646 [2,109] of which Amraoti is responsible for 2,205. The Deputy Commissioner is being asked to take suitable action. The certification work by the tahsil as well as by the land records staff is inadequate in Akola and Amraoti districts. This is being brought to the notice of the Deputy Commissioners.

The inspection of traverse marks has slightly improved, the number inspected being 17,255 [14,207] out of 19,261 [18,348]. The number of marks found either missing or out of repairs was 326 [70].

There was a marked improvement in partalling work, the number of base lines checked being 19,066 [13,737] out of 21,330 [21,580]. The quality of partalling work by the superior land records staff has also improved. There is a remarkable rise in the number of encroachments detected in every district, especially in Amraoti. The total number of encroachments reported is 4,113 [1,609]. This is mainly owing to the reorganization of the nazul staff brought into force from the beginning of the year.

19. (a) Enquiry into the value of land.—The following table gives the comparative figures of the average multiples on assessment of consideration for sales and leases for the past eight years :—

As the fall in the selling prices of land in Amraoti, Akola and Buldana districts is attributed to economic depression and the rise in Yeotmal is explained as being due to keen competition the reasons appear to be unconvincing.

There is no appreciable change in the letting values of land.

(b) Enquiry into the profits of agriculture.—The following statement sets out the comparative figures of average profit (+) or loss (-) per acre in each district for the last eight years :—

Three holdings in Amraoti district, two in Buldana district and two in Yeotmal district ceased to be typical and were changed. In addition collection of figures regarding one holding in Buldana district was discontinued because there was another holding in the same circle. Ten out of 24 holdings in Amraoti district, 7 out of 25 in Akola district, 5 out of 23 in Buldana district and 5 out of 21 in Yeotmal district were reported as having worked at a loss. For each district as a whole the average profit per acre was reported to be Re. 0-10-4 [Re. 1-13-0] for Amraoti, Re. 0-10-2 [Rs. 2-0-9] for Akola, Re. 1-3-9 [Re. 1-2-9] for Buldana and Re. 1-12-7 [Rs. 4-12-0] for Yeotmal.

The statistics continue to be collected by untrained hands and the occupants to be apathetic.

### VI.—SURVEY AND SETTLEMENT I.—Settlement

20. No "revenue survey" operations of town lands or "revenue settlement" operations of taluqs took place during the year.

21. In all, 8 appeals and applications for revision against the orders of the Record of Rights Officer, Berar, were presented during the year and 24 were pending at

the close of the previous year. Out of these 27 have been disposed of, 3 transferred to the Commissioner, Berar, and 2 had not been disposed of.

#### II.—SURVEY

22. Rai Sahib Nanak Chand Puri continued to be survey officer throughout the year. The posts of the assistant survey officer and one traverser remained in abeyance while posts of two draftsmen were revived and filled up on the 29th August and 2nd September 1938, respectively.

23. In addition to fixing 28 new marks, all the missing traverse marks were replaced in Akola, Amraoti, Dhamangaon, Ellichpur and Yeotmal towns.

24. Thirty-three traces of village maps of Amraoti and Akola districts and 6 traces of taluq maps of Basim, Khamgaon, Jalgaon, Malkapur, Chikhli and Mehkar taluqs were prepared and sent to the Government Press for reproduction. Printed copies of 23 village maps of Amraoti, Akola and Buldana districts and those of 3 taluq maps, viz., Basim, Khamgaon and Jalgaon were supplied to the Deputy Commissioners concerned.

25. The survey officer inspected the nazul records of 3 towns, Amraoti, Ellichpur and Yeotmal, chiefly to reconcile the discrepancies between the field books, the maps and the spot that came to notice during the verification of base lines. Mr. Alimuddin, the nazul supervisor appointed under the reorganization scheme, carried out more detailed inspection of the survey records of all the settled towns including Basim. With a view to enabling the maintenance surveyors to devote more time to the technical side of their work, the nazul staff was strengthened by the addition of 5 successful candidates from the training class and 12 patwaris most of whom are matriculates.

The final report on the preparation of the record of rights of non-izara alienated villages in Berar submitted by me as Officer on Special Duty, Amraoti, was received and examined during the year. The record of rights was prepared for 212 villages for—

(a) superior holders;

1

(b) ante-alienation tenants, tenants of antiquity and tenants entitled to hold land whether under leases or otherwise for a period of not less than 10 years; (c) communal rights over roads, burial grounds, grazing lands, gaothan khalwadi lands and gaothan.

Record of rights of superior holders.—The record 26. of rights operations involved 1,108 superior holders and 10,798 ante-alienation tenants, 10,270 tenants of anti-quity, 710 ten-year tenants and 95 holders of inams. The total expenditure on the operations amounted to Rs. 1,39,435 and the total income from measurement fees and parcha fees Rs. 1,50,734 leaving a small surplus of Rs. 11,299. The recommendations include proposals designed to ensure the erection of boundary marks of all fields included in the record of rights and improvement in the present rules regarding the maintenance of boundary marks and entries in the survey records relating to them. Amendments have also been suggested to rules and instructions regarding record of rights not only of nonizara alienated villages but also of other villages. Legislation is recommended to ensure removal of encroachments on plots used for communal purposes and to stop the breaking up of grazing land for cultivation without affording tenants of non-izara alienated villages and adequate opportunity of effecting a reasonable settlement with the superior holders relating to grazing land. Detailed modifications are suggested in the forms of jamastatement. statement and bandi crop jamabandi abstract. Other recommendations in the report dealing with the land records include a recommendation that statistics relating to changes affecting tenants should be abstracted periodically from the record of rights. All these matters are engaging the attention of the Provincial Government. The desirability of keeping up to date the record of rights prepared at much expense and labour for non-izara alienated villages has been pointed out to the Commissioner, Berar, who has been asked to impress it on the district officers.

Report of the Commissioner, Berar, on the revenue administration of Berar and the report of the Settlement Commissioner and Director of Land Records on the Settlement and Land Records Departments in Berar for the year ending the 31st July 1940.

#### RESOLUTION

In August 1939, when the year opened, Berar was confronted vith a break in the monsoon so prolonged that a severe failure of all crops began to be visualized and agricultural labour became to impoverished for lack of occupation that Government had to ake the unprecedented step of opening relief works, which at their peak attracted as many as 70,000 persons. Happily the break terminated in sufficient time to save the principal crops, and the putturn was eventually quite satisfactory. Before the kharif props were harvested, war broke out between Great Britain and Germany, and prices of all agricultural produce immediately swung upwards. Berar thus enjoyed the combination of a good harvest and a good market, conditions which it had not experienced for several years. The resultant prosperity was the outstanding feature of the year.

2. This general prosperity was of course reflected in the collection of land revenue, which reached a total figure of 116<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> lakhs of rupees, representing 121 per cent of a normal year's demand. To this admirable result two factors in addition to the purely economic causes contributed. The first was the systematic advance registration, under the direction of the Commissioner, of revenue cases for each separate item out of the total outstanding arrears of nearly 29 lakhs of rupees, and the initiation of proceedings immediately money began to come into the pockets of the cultivator; and the second was the greater concentration of revenue officers on the purely administrative side of collection. The ultimate soundness of the Berar revenue system and the willingness of the Berari generally to pay the just dues of Government also deserve a tribute. The final results were better than in any year since 1929-30, and outstanding arrears were reduced to no more than 8 lakhs of rupees.

3. The taccavi position also showed considerable improvement. The recoveries were satisfactory and the outstandings under the Agriculturists, and the Land Improvement Loans Acts were reduced from Rs. 13.18 and Rs. 3.07 lakhs respectively at the commencement of the year to Rs. 6.42 and Rs. 3.05 lakhs at its close. 4. The Commissioner's report exhibits the remarkable change in cropping that has taken place during the last decade, In 1930-31 the area under cotton was over 32 lakhs of acres and that under juar about 23.5 lakhs. Now each crop accounts for little over 24 lakhs. The shrinkage in the area under cotton is not altogether unwelcome at the present juncture, when the market for cotton has been so curtailed by the war. The rural economy of Berar should eventually benefit by becoming less dependent on this crop, and in particular on the short stapled varieties.

5. Debt Conciliation Boards were replaced during the year by Debt Relief Courts under the Relief of Indebtedness Act. But the recovery of overdue instalments due under Debt Conciliation Board agreements continues to throw a very heavy burden on the revenue staff. To the total of 14,500 such cases pending at the commencement of the year another 13,000 were added in the course of the year, and the number left over for disposal at the close of the year, and the number left over for disposal at the close of the year swelled to 16,000. It is becoming only too apparent that the Debt Conciliation Act has not entirely fulfilled its expectations and in many cases has operated as little more than a moratorium. It is too early yet to pronounce on the effect of the Relief of Indebtedness Act; but unless there is willingness to pay on the part of debtors there is a danger that this Act too will fail to achieve its object and will still further weaken the fabric of agricutural credit.

6. In the previous year's report a very considerable increase in the volume of revenue work was noted. During the year under report the number of cases for disposal rose from 1.63 to 1.89 lakhs. The process of expansion appears unending, and the continuous augmentation of the revenue staff is always a little behind what is needed to keep up-to-date.

7. In the Department of Land Records the revival of the three posts of assistant superintendents of land records held in abeyance since 1932 was again postponed owing to financial stringency. Changes in the system of collection and accounting of land revenue designed to prevent misappropriation of recoveries on account of land revenue, several instances of which were brought to light during the accumulation of arrears in recent years, are being investigated and some of these were introduced experimentally in selected localities.

8. Government is pleased to notice that despite a considerable measure of political agitation the relations between the public and Government officers continued to be cordial and Government takes this opportunity to express its appreciation of the ready help which was extended to revenue officers in the matter of relief works and in organising private charity for the relief of the distressed.

ORDER.—Ordered that copies of this resolution and its annexure be forwarded to the Commissioner, Berar, the Deputy Commissioners in Berar and the Settlement Commissioner and the Director of Land Records, for information and guidance and that it be published in Part I of the Central Provinces and Berar Gazette.

# PART I.—AGRICULTURAL CONDITIONS OF THE YEAR 1939-40

1. Character of the season.—The rainfall registered at each district headquarters was as follows :—

The monsoon broke in the second week of June, but 't was feeble and only just sufficient for general sowings. The current strengthened early in July and by the middle of the month cotton was germinating successfully and most of the juar area had been sown. From the middle of July till the middle of August, there was practically no rain. Agriculturists were able to carry out weeding and intercultural operations effectively and economically. The economy was, however, at the expense of the field labourers who were already, after the poor harvest of the previous year, at the end of their resources. The first half of August was a period of great anxiety to all concerned with agriculture. Crops began to show signs of withering and everywhere there was fear of crop failure and of famine. After a series of years of excessive rainfall, people had forgotten how well cotton stands up to drought. When the situation was saved by adequate rain in the third and fourth weeks of August, there had been little permanent damage. There was probably a little too much rain in early September, but a timely break occurred just when people were beginning to fear damage. In the second half of September, there were only a few showers and then the monsoon faded away to reappear again at the end of October with good showers which improved the condition of the ripenning crops and produced ideal conditions for the rabi sowings so that there was a fair crop in spite of the entire absence of winter rain.

2. In small local areas in the Akola and Buldana districts where the early rainfall was even less than elsewhere, crops never recovered from the drought and it was necessary to suspend and resuspend revenue as follows :---

3. Area sown under cotton and juar is compared below :--

After the low prices of the two preceding years and the poor 1938-39 harvest, further shrinkage in the cotton area was inevitable. It is also probable that the weakness of the early monsoon led to a little last moment diversion of cotton to juar. For the first time for many years the cotton area was below two and a half million acres. (This was a million acres less than the acreage in 1929-30.) The juar area was the highest for many years and absorbed all the loss in the cotton area, the actual cropped area of the division being practically the same as in the preceding year.

It seems appropriate to place on record in this report the important statistics of the decade and these are shown in the statement given below :---

Information collected by the Director of Land Records indicates that the Buldana factories dealt with about 8 per cent more cotton than was produced in the district, that Akola factories also dealt with more than the district production while the Amraoti and Yeotmal factories dealt with slightly less. It will be seen, therefore, that the Yeotmal third forecast was fairly accurate while those of the other three districts were on the low side. The information goes to prove that there is little difference between the divisional exports and imports of unginned cotton. The 1939-40 crop can, I think, be taken as 590,000 bales, a figure considerably in excess of the 537,200 bales given in the third forecast.

7. Classification of area.—The decrease of 9,065 acres in the occupied area was due mainly to relinquishments in the Melghat and in Buldana. The area relinquished included many holdings which had been virtually abandoned several years ago and which were formally relinquished during the current year owing to special attention paid by tahsildars.

8. Condition of the agricultural classes.—A statement showing the course of cotton prices during the last ten years has been added to the report. The table below gives the percentage of arrivals of cotton carts in the important months to the total arrivals of the season together with the cotton prices and the figures of the two previous years:—

The year opened very gloomily. After the poor harvest of the preceding year and the rock-bottom prices of the two preceding years, agriculturists were at the end of their resources. During the first fortnight of August, everyone feared the culminating disaster of a complete crop failure. A month later, the outlook was entirely changed. The crops had been saved and gave promise of a very fair harvest. Owing to the outbreak of war in Europe, cotton prices were rising rapidly. By the time marketing began, prices were already higher than they had been for ten years. In December, they rose still higher and for once the small cultivator who has to sell as he picks profited by the gambling in the Bombay and other world markets. By the time buyers realised that the war was being waged under vastly different conditions than those of the Great War and prices began to fall, most of the crop had been marketed. This marketing of a good crop at good prices enabled cultivators to make up some of the economic lee-way lost during the decade and to pay some of the debts accumulated during the boom days before 1930.

9. Condition of live-stock was generally good. There was anxiety about fodder and water-supply at the beginning of the year which disappeared with the drought.

10. Condition of the labouring classes.—An examination of the statistics given in paragraph 3 is sufficient to show why it was that the labouring population was at the end of its resources in August 1939. The last straw was the feebleness of the early monsoon which made so little weeding necessary. At the beginning of August, immediate steps had to be taken to deal with a rapidly deteriorating situation. Relief works were opened throughout the division as quickly as possible. At one time there were as many as 170 works giving employment to over 70,000 persons. The high attendance continued throughout September and it was not until the end of October that employment was again available in the fields.

11. The year was a comparatively healthy one. There was a certain amount of cholera during the rains. But fortunately effective steps were taken to prevent the spread of the epidemic to relief works and only a few cases occurred in the camps. There was a certain amount of plague in the Yeotmal district.

12. Measures of improvement.—The remaining debt conciliation boards were wound up during the first part of the year. Debt Relief courts were established throughout Berar. It is too early to judge the effect of the clange in the method of dealing with old debts. It will, I am afraid, be found that debtors have less hope of saving some of their lands under the Relief of Indebtedness Act than they had under the Debt Conciliation Act.

13. The usual propaganda was carried out by the Agriculture Department.

14. There was a certain amount of progress in the formation of Pig Killing Associations and it is hoped that there will be further development in this method of crop protection now that Government has sanctioned the enahanced reward of Rs. 2 per head.

15. Relations between Government and the public.---Relations between revenue officers and the public were cordial and particularly so during the scarcity operations when revenue officers received much assistance from the public. During and after these operations, it was gratifying to hear on all sides much praise of the prompt measures which had been taken.

16. Loans granted under the Agriculturists' Loans Act.— The advances made during the year aggregated Rs. 5.82 [Rs. 10.69] lakhs. The amount due for collection within the year including arrears was Rs. 13.58 [Rs. 7.37] lakhs. Recoveries amounted to Rs. 12.46 [Rs. 5.52] lakhs including a sum of Rs. 14,897 remitted and excluding advance collections. At the end of the year the total amount of principal outstanding was Rs. 6.42 lakhs out of which Rs. 1.12 lakhs was overdue.

As usual recovery was best in the Buldana district which collected nearly 98 per cent of the total arrears and instalments which fell due during the year. Amraoti was next with 96 per cent and then Yeotmal with 95 per cent. As in the case of land revenue, Akola had the most to collect. But even if this is taken into consideration, the recovery work in this district was definitely below the high standard of the division. Recoveries were particularly poor in the Akot taluq, which had at the end of the year about one-third of the total amount overdue in the division.

17. Loans granted under the Land Improvement Loans Act.—The advances made during the year aggregated Rs. 1.47 [Rs. 1.76] lakhs. The amount due for collection within the year including arrears was Rs. 1.82 [Rs. 1.18] lakhs. Recoveries amounted to Rs. 1.4/ [Rs. 0.62] lakhs including a sum of Rs. 983 remitted and excluding advance collections, leaving a balance of Rs. 3.06 lakhs, out of which Rs. 0.35 lakhs was overdue.

There was considerable improvement in collections except in the Akola district which ended the year with more than half of the total overdue in the division. The arrears were largest in the Akola taluq where they exceeded the district totals elsewhere in the division.

Conditions were particularly favourable for collection work. With the good harvest and high cotton prices agriculturists were better off than they had been for many years. It was only necessary to make it clear that the opportunity must be taken to relieve the land of its burden of arrears. Ample additional staff was provided in taluqs where arrears were heavy and tahsildars were instructed to encourage early payments. The results were remarkable. Budget estimates were exceeded by the end of February and by the end of the revenue year only Rs. 1.40 lakhs remained of the Rs. 28.81 lakhs arrears of previous years. Of the current demand about 94 per cent was collected. The divisional carry over was the lowest by 5 lakhs since August 1931. The standard of collections was high throughout the division and particularly creditable after the heavy work which had fallen to the lot of the tahsildars during the preceding 12 months. Reduction in the heavy arrears in the three revised taluqs of the Akola district was very satisfactory, though it is not clear why the work in Balapur was not up to the standard of Akola and Akot. There was considerable reduction in Murtizapur and Amraoti. But there seems no reason why it should have been more d fficult to collect revenue in these taluqs than in Chandur and Daryapur, where collections were particularly good. In the Buldana district, Khamgaon had the best record with Jalgaon not far behind. Collections in Chikhli and Mehkar could have been better. In the Yeotmal district there was improvement in the headquarter taluq and in Darwha. But it is difficult to find any reason except bad administration for the existence of arrears in these taluqs.

19. The collection of cesses increased to Rs. 19.68 [Rs. 15.75 lakhs. Fluctuating and miscellaneous collections rose to Rs. 26,928 [Rs. 19,117] and Rs. 1.03 lakhs [Rs. 1 lakh], respectively. There was an increase under miscellaneous in all the districts except Buldana where there was a decrease of about Rs. 8,000. The increase in fluctuating collections was mainly due to the sale of H class land in the Wun taluq.

20. The demand on account of jaglia and mahar cess on nonagricultural income inclusive of arrears of previous years amounted to Rs. 6,260 [Rs. 7,781] of which Rs. 5,682 was collected and Rs. 47 remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 531 [Rs. 1.051] for recovery at the close of the year.

21. The demand on account of special school rate including arrears of previous years was Rs. 50,555 [Rs. 58 947]. Rs. 44,900 was recovered and Rs. 667 remitted. The balance outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 4,988 [Rs. 7,328] the bulk of which related to the Amraoti [Rs. 3,075] and Akola [Rs. 1,048] districts, respectively.

22. Coercive processes (Appendix III).—The following table gives the details of processes issued for the recovery of land evenue :—

The number of processes issued during the year fell to 28,916 [35,079]. The decrease was entirely in warrants of attachment of moveables which fell to 16,667 [25,502]. That this form of process is little more than a threat is illustrated by the fact that only 1,091 of these warrants were executed while sales were only carried out in 127 cases. There was an increase in the attachments of holdings to 11,440 [8,196]. 6,622 [4,783] sales were held but only 2,628 [1,384] sales were confirmed. The increase in expropriation on account of land revenue arrears during a good year is remarkable at first sight, but is easily explained. In the preceding three years it had often been difficult to obtain bidders at auctions and many sales had had to be postponed. During the year under review, land prices were rising and it was possible not only to seil inferior lands but also to obtain very fair prices.

24. Cost of collection (Appendix IV).—Out of Rs. 10,14,177 payable to village officers as emoluments for collecting Government and other dues, Rs. 10,01,703 was disbursed, leaving Rs. 12,474 of which Rs. 3,034 and Rs. 8,200 pertained to the Amraoti and Akola districts. The average emoluments of all kinds paid to patels was Rs. 78.8 [Rs. 79] and to patwaris Rs. 242.5 [Rs. 247].

Copying fees paid to patwaris amounted to Rs. 13,906 [Rs. 12,258].

25. The total number of patels actually working during the year decreased by 1, while that of patwaris increased by 11. The increase in the latter is mainly in the Amraoti district due to adjustment of patwaris' circles. The number of villages in which the offices of patels were held in rotation remained unchanged at 1,148 while that of patwaris increased by 1 from 332 to 333.

26. Three malik patels were dismissed with forfeiture of watan for misappropriation of Government money. Eight malik and seventeen substitute patels and five malik and fifteen substitute patwaris were dismissed. Of these, eight malik and eleven substitute patels and three malik and four substitute patwarks were dismissed for misappropriation and late credit of Government money. The number of patels and patwarks otherwise punished during the year was 100 [83] and 35 [72], respectively.

The number of unqualified patwaris stood at 247 [284].

During the year 41 [43] defalcations of land revenue were detected -13 in Amraoti, 19 in Akola, 7 ir. Buldana and 2 in Yeotmal. It is satisfactory that the vigorous collection of old arrears and the more systematic registration of cases did not bring to light more defalcations.

The system of checking village accounts is being gradually overhauled. During the year many discrepancies were discovered and reconciled between the tahsii and village accounts. A closer check should gradually eliminate defalcations. Another step forward has been the orders permitting officers to insist on security when making appointments to non-watan village offices and of substitutes not nominated by maliks.

Revenue officers had to deal with more than twice as many cases as in 1937-38. The increase in work ic not as alarming as it appears. The bulk of the increase was in land revenue recovery cases. Statistics of these cases are given below :---

The large number of institut ons was mainly due to insistence on the opening of cases for every old arrear. The need for this had already been realized in the Amraoti and Akola districts. During the year under review, the system was followed in Buldana. That the revenue courts were able to handle 83,000 cases of this type and to complete 71,000 of them was only possible through the appointment of additional staff. The three temporary naib-tabsildars and twelve additional clerks employed in the four plain taluos of the Akola district during the previous year were continued throughout the year under review. In addition, five temporary naib-tabsildars and thirty temporary clerks were employed from the 1st December 1939 to the 31st July 1940. Of these temporary posts, two posts of naib-tabsildars and twelve clerical posts were subsequently made permanent

Debt conciliation instalment recovery cases were again the second largest class. The business of this class is shown below :---

Cases were most numerous in the Mehkar and Basim taluqs. In the former there were over 4,000 pending at the end of the year. The high pitch of instalments in this taluq is well-known and Government has now applied section 27 of the Relief of Indebtedness Act. In Basim, I found recently that out of the 1,700 cases disposed of during last year, only about 30 had led to the sale of either moveables or immoveables. It seems probable that elsewhere also debtors have been delaying payments because tahsildars have not pursued recovery cases vigorously owing to their pre-occupation with the collection of land revenue arrears.

The increase in the number of appeals and revisions pending before the Deputy Commissioner, Amraoti, was due to the large number instituted towards the end of the revenue year. Although the number of pending cases in sub-divisional officer's court in the Buldana district decreased to 96 [115], it was still high compared with other courts.

The number of original cases dealt with by the Commissioner was 584 [418] with :71 [71] pending at the end of the year. This includes 57 surcharge cases, of which 26 remained pending at the end of the year.

29. Revenue records.—Elimination is reported to be up to date in district and tahsil offices.

30. Nazul records.—No new nazul settlements were undertaken during the year. There has been considerable improvement in the maintenance of nazul records since the appointment of additional staff in Amraoti and Akola districts.

The B volumes of District Gazetteers are reported to be up to date.

#### PART IV.—OTHER HEADS OF ADMINISTRATION

31. Alienation of land (Appendix IX).—10,129 [10,398] acres of land changed hands as the result of civil court decrees and 236,499 [175.181] acres through voluntary sales in 985 [883] and 32,012 [24,127] cases giving on an average price of Rs. 28 [Rs. 48] and Rs. 54 [Rs. 59], respectively, per acre.

Although there were 7,622 [4,783] cases in which holdings were auctioned for arrears of land revenue, there were only 1,860 [949] cases in which transfers of holdings took place as the result of such auctions. The average price fetched for the land came to about Rs. 15 [Rs. 11] per acre.

32. Tours and inspections.—I was in charge of the division throughout the year except from 1st to 31st March 1940, when Mr. Layard officiated during my absence on leave. I toured 55 days. I inspected Akela, Buldana, and Amraoti district offices and seven tabsils. The district charges were held by the following officers :—

Only the Deputy Commissioner, Yeotmal, inspected all tahsils. The Deputy Commissioners, Amraoti, Akola and Buldana, could each inspect only four, three and two tahsils, respectively, in their districts and could not inspect the remaining tahsils due to preoccupation with other important work. The sub-divisional officers inspected all taheils in their respective charges.

The whole revenue staff of Berar may be justly proud of its work throughout the year. The previous year had been an exacting one and yet there were no signs of staleness when almost at a moment's notice it became necessary to provide work for the largest numbers of labourers since the 1900 famine. Works had hardly closed before the collection season started. It was greatly to the credit of all concerned and especially of the taluq officers and establishments that full advantage was taken of the favourable conditions and that such excel ent results were achieved.

#### REPORT ON THE OPERATIONS OF THE LAND RECORDS AND SETTLEMENT DEPARTMENTS IN BERAR FOR THE YEAR ENDING THE 31ST JULY 1940

Note.—In this report the figures in brackets appearing immediately after those for the year under roport refer to the previous year.

1. Prefatory.—Mr. P. S. Rau held charge of the departments for three weeks till 21st August 1939 when I succeeded him.

2. Establishment.—There was no change in the sanctioned strength of the permanent establishment and the only change affecting their emoluments was to increase the rate of permanent travelling allowance of the measurer's chainman from Rs. 2 to Rs. 4 per mensem.

3. Changes in the system of land records.—The following minor changes were introduced in the system of land records during the year :—

(i) a check register (form XXXVI) was prescribed to ensure punctual submission of returns by revenue inspectors, measurers and nazul maintenance surveyors;

(ii) the duty of helping an illiterate patel in maintaining the cattle mortality register was prescribed for patwaris;

(iii) the introduction, as an experimental measure, of a combined kird and receipt form, based on the form used in the Bombay province, in the Malkapur and Amraoti taluqs was extended to the Ellichpur and Balapur taluqs; and

(iv) as an experimental measure, the receipt and *irsal patti* forms in respect of land revenue payable on nazul lands and converted lands within the town survey perimeter were revised and instructions were issued for the collection of the land revenue on these lands by tahsildars through the agency of the village officers.

4. Boundary marks.—Revenue inspectors inspected boundary marks as follows :—

The number of boundary marks inspections by revenue inspectors increased in district; except Yeotmal. The Deputy Commissioner, Yeotmal, reports that revenue inspectors could not complete their quota of inspections owing to their pre-occupation with the preparation of the preliminary statements in connection with census operations. The increase in the scale of boundary marks inspection in the Akola district from 300 to 500 accounts for the gratifying increase in the number of boundary marks inspected in that district. In the Buldana district the inspection was inadequate in the Janephal and Jalamb revenue inspectors' circles. The percentage of marks found out of repair decreased in all the districts except Buldana where it rose by 2 per cent. The Deputy Commissioner, Buldana, attributes this increase to the inadequate use of their powers by tahsildars. Penalties amounting to Rs. 333 (Rs. 664) and Rs. 243 (Rs. 290) in the Buldana and Yeotmal districts, respectively, were imposed on the defaulters.

The single boundary marks system was introduced in only three villages, all in the Daryapur taluq of the Amraoti district.

5. Correction of survey records.—Besides the usual correction of the survey records by the survey clerks special staff was employed in the Akola and Amraoti districts for the rewriting of the damaged records at a cost of Rs. 737 and Rs. 703, respectively.

6. Testing of village papers (vide statement A).— The details of boundary marks and crop inspections by the superintendents of land records, assistant superintendents of land records, and revenue inspectors, were as follows :—

The number of boundary marks inspected by the superintendents of land records, Akola and Buldana, and by the assistant superintendents of land records, Amraoti and Buldana, and the number of crop inspections by the superintendents of land records and the assistant superintendents of land records in the Buldana and Yeotmal districts decreased during the year.

(a) The checking of the village accounts and the record of rights at Shegaon,

(b) the execution of commissions issued by civil courts, and

(c) other important work at the district headquarters

are given as reasons for inadequate inspections in the Buldani district. No reasons are given for other districts.

The check by tahsildars and naib-tahsildars has deteriorated in all the districts as regards boundary marks inspections and in the Yeotmal district as regards crop inspections. The check by the following tahsildars and naib-tahsildars was inadequate :---

The Deputy Commissioner, Akola, reports that he is drawing the attention of the tahsildars and naib-tahsildars concerned to the deficiency. The Deputy Commissioners, Buldana and Yeotmal, do not comment on the inadequacy. Their attention will be drawn to this point.

The check of the land records work by the Sub-Divisional Officers of the Yeotmal and Akola districts, except the Sub-Divisional Officers, Basim and Akola—Murtizapur, was satisfactory, but not of the other Sub-Divisional Officers. Preoccupation with other important work is given as the reason for this deficiency.

7. Filing of village papers at the tahsili.—All the vil'age papers were filed in the tahsil record rooms in time except a few crop statements and jamabandi statements in the Buldana district. Suitable action was taken against the patwaris who did not file the papers in time. The elimination of the village papers is reported to have been done properly in the Akola district. The reports from other districts are silent on this point.

8. Tahsil record rooms.—All the tahsil record rooms were inspected by the superior land records staff during the year.

9. District land records offices.—All the land records offices were inspected during the year by the Deputy Director of Land Records and by the superintendent of land records concerned. The land records office in the Buldana district was also inspected by the officer-in-charge. The assistant superintendent of land records did not inspect the offices. The Deputy Commissioner, Akola, is dealing with this omission and other Deputy Commissioners will be asked to do the same. There is one land records clerk in each district land records office. Prior to the creation of the post of the land records clerk two training reserve revenue inspectors were employed on this work. The work is heavy for one clerk and the possibility of reducing it with a view to averting the necessity of augmenting the staff is being examined.

10. Patwaris.—There was no important change in the number of patwaris. There was a welcome decrease in the number of nonresident patwaris owing to the enforcement of the rule regarding residence. Punishments, other than those for non-residence, were as follows :—

The number of punishments decreased slightly. Patwaris were punished as usual mostly for habitual neglect of duty, grave misconduct, bad work and defalcation of Government money.

Deserving patwaris were given rewards for accuracy in crop forecasts and general good work in the shape of wrist watches and woollen coats.

11. Revenue inspectors and measurers.—Except for five revenue inspectors, all revenue inspectors and measurers have passed the prescribed tests. Suitable disciplinary action was taken against offending revenue inspectors.

The annual increments of four revenue inspectors and two measurers in the Akola district, two revenue inspectors in the Buldana district and two revenue inspectors in the Yeotmal district were stopped for gross neglect of duty and general bad work; the pay of one revenue inspector in the Yeotmal district was reduced by Rs. 5; and two physically unfit revenue inspectors in the Akola district were retired after 25 years' service. One measurer in the Amraoti district was reverted as a nazul patwari owing to failure to qualify and three measurers were warned for minor offences.

12. Nazul maintenance surveyors and nazul patwaris.— The staff consists of 21 nazul maintenance surveyors and 12 nazul patwaris. One post of nazul patwari was created at Amraoti for a period of one year with effect from the 1st June 1940 to deal with accumulated arrears of work. One nazul surveyor in the Buldana district was warned and the increments of two nazul patwaris in the same district were withheld for neglect of duties. 13. Superior land records staff.—The following table sets out the details of days spent by the superintendents of land records and their assistants on tour :—

All of them were examined in Survey and were declared to have passed.

15. Circle note-books.—These books were written up-todate in all the districts.

16. Village note-books.—Village note-books are filled up properly and maintained up-to-date in the Buldana and Yeotmal districts and in the Melghat taluq of the Amraoti district. These books are not prescribed for the other districts. The desirability of maintaining these books in all the districts is being examined.

17. Encroachments (vide statement B).—Revenue inspectors detected encroachments as follows :—

The reasons given for the decrease in the Buldana district, viz., the preoccupation of revenue inspectors with scarcity work in 1939 and the quinquennial census in 1940, are unconvincing.

18. Measurement work (vide statement C).—The following statement shows that there was a slight increase in the number of measurement cases disposed of by revenue inspectors—

Besides the above cases the revenue inspectors had to dispose of a number of miscellaneous cases, some prescribed and some not prescribed by rules, as indicated in statement C.

The sub-division measurement work was inadequate in all the districts. Out of 24,371 sub-divisions due for measurement 17,546 were measured during the year leaving a balance of 6,825 sub-divisions at the close of the year as against 2,152 in the preceding year

Out of this balance the Buldana district is responsible for 3,849 or more than half. Two additional measurers were employed in the Amraoti district and one in the Yeotmal district during the year to deal with arrears of work. Disciplinary action is being taken against two measurers in the Akola district for their neglect of work.

19. (a) Enquiry into the value of land.—The following table gives the comparative figures of the average multiples of consideration for sales and leases on assessment for the past 9 years :—

The partial failure of crops in 1939 combined with the general economic depression are given as main reasons for the lower multiples in the Akola, Amraoti and Buldana districts. The effect of the rise in the prices of the agricultural commodities should be reflected in the figures of 1940. The small rise in the price of land in the Yeotmal district is attributed to a better harvest than in the previous year. There is no significant change in the multiples of consideration for leases.

(b) Enquiry into the profits of agriculture.—The following table sets out the comparative figures of average profits (+) or loss (-) per acre in each district, for the period from 1st May to 30th April for the last 9 years :—

The enquiry was conducted in respect of 92 (91) detailed holdings which included 88 holdings of the previous year. Only one holding, that at Nandura of the Buldana district, showed a loss of Rs. 42. The largest profit in the various districts was as shown below :—

This year showed the largest profits since these enquiries were begun in 1931-32. This is attributed to the better crops of 1939-40 coupled with a rise in the price of agricultural products, specially cotton. The average profit per acre for the 91 holdings which showed a profit works out to Rs. 5-3-5 (Re. 1-3-9) in Buldana, Rs. 7-5-4 (Re. 0-10-2) in Akola, Rs. 8-12-8 (Re. 1-12-7) in Yeotmal and Rs. 12-12-1 (Re. 0-10-4) in Amraoti districts.

These enquiries have not improved in accuracy or reliability and until specially trained staff can be employed they are not likely to yield results of any real value.

20. Record of rights.—The record of rights of 64 (62) villages of the Akola district and 77 (*nil*) villages of the Buldana district was rewritten at a cost of Rs. 177-3-0 (Rs. 158-6-0) and Rs. 115-4-0 (*nil*), respectively, and of 96 (230) villages of the Amraoti district and 165 (201) villages of the Yeotmal district without any extra cost. Statement E-I sets out particulars of the certification work. The total number of entries for certification decreased to 114,019 (119,925), but the balance of uncertified entries rose to 23,634 (19,941) and compares with those of the preceding two years as follows :—

The increase in the arrears of this work in the Buldana district was heavy. The Deputy Commissioner, Buldana, reports that tahsildars and naib-tahsildars cannot pay their proper attention to this work owing to their increased and heavy responsibilities. The Deputy Commissioner, Yeotmal, reports that the attention of the tahsildars concerned is being drawn to the arrears of certification work in all taluqs except the Darwha taluq. In the Akola district the revenue inspectors, Ugwa, Hiwarkhed, Basim, Panchagawan, Malegaon, Gowardhan and Pinjar, are said to be responsible for the bulk of the arrears.

21. Employment of revenue inspectors on work other than land records work.—Revenue inspectors were employed during the year on scarcity work for about three months and on the following miscellaneous items not connected with land records:—

(1) execution of warrants of attachment of moveables,

(2) preparation and check of electoral rolls of the local bodies,

(3) census work, and

(4) disposal of miscellaneous cases.

22. Check of vital statistics (vide statement D).—During the usual vital statistics check in 6,761 (6,860) villages 422 (513) mistakes were detected.

23. Town survey records.—No town was settled or brought for the first time under maintenance during the year under report. The second revision settlement of all the five taluqs in the Yeotmal district was extended till the 31st July 1941, vide Survey and Settlement Department Memorandum No. 366-XVI-22, dated the 18th June 1940.

One additional post of a nazul patwari was created at Amraoti for a period of one year with effect from the 1st June 1940 to dispose of arrears of work.

Statement E-II shows that the number of certification entries decreased to 11,099 (15,425). The balance at the close of the year was 1,659 (3,646). It is reported that the certification work by the tahsil staff in the Akola district was very inadequate. The Deputy Commissioner, Akola, is taking suitable action.

The work of traverse marks inspection (statement F) continued to be satisfactory during the year. The total number of traverse marks inspected was 16,869 (17,255) out of ,19,245 (19,261). The number of marks found either missing or out of repair was 340 (326).

Fifteen thousand eight hundred and seventy (19,066) out of 17,396 (21,330) partal lines were checked by the nazul surveyors during the year. The quality as well as the quantity of the partalling work by the superior land records staff has improved, the number of partal lines checked being 789 (594). The total number of encroachments reported during the year was 4,017 (4,113).

24. Forecasts.—The following crop forecasts were issued during the agricultural year 1939-40:—

The forecasts regarding cotton were examined in the light of all relevant information that became available subsequently in a report on the accuracy of cotton forecast issued on the 16th March 1940.

25. Instruments.—Instruments and survey appliances worth Rs. 1,027-3-0 were supplied during the year from the depôt attached to my office, for the use of the land records staff in Berar

26. Survey Office.—(1) Rai Saheb Nanak Chand Puri continued to be Survey Officer throughout the year. The post of the Assistant Survey Officer remained in abeyance.

(2) (i) In addition to fixing 41 new traverse marks, all the missing traverse marks were replaced in Akola, Khamgaon, Shegaon, Nandura, Malkapur, Buldana, Amraoti, Yeotmal and Pandharkaoda towns and the level of one mark was reduced in the Dhamangaon town.

(ii) 56 new traverse marks were fixed in village Medsi of Akola district for a special survey of Public Works Department roads.

(3) (i) 19,5 and 9 traces of the village maps of Amraoti, Akola and Yeotmal districts, respectively, were prepared and the existing traces of the 7 taluq maps, viz., Khamgaon, Mehkar, Malkapur, Chikhli, Jalgaon, Yeotmal and Pusad were sent to the Government Press for reproduction. (ii) Printed copies of 20, 30 and 10 village maps of Amraoti, Akola and Yeotmal districts, respectively, and 5 taluq maps of Mehkar, Chikhli, Malkapur, Wun and Kelapur were supplied to the Deputy Commissioners concerned.

(4) An amount of Rs. 496, being the cost of replacing lost nazul stations by the Traverse Survey Party, Central Provinces, was recovered from the gross nazul income of the towns concerned.

(5) The Survey Officer inspected three towns, viz., Yeotmal, Malkapur and Nandura in connection with the reconciliation of discrepancies in the survey records. Mr. Alimuddin, Nazul Supervisor, completed his second round of inspection of all the towns. From the large number of discrepancy reports, received from the Nazul Surveyors of almost all the towns, it appears that the verification of base lines is now done by the surveyors with more care and exactitude. The nazul patwaris are being given an opportunity of learning survey and the deserving hands tried as maintenance surveyors in short-term leave vacancies.

27. Inspections by Director of Land Records, Deputy Director of Land Records and Survey Officer.—All the land records offices were inspected by the Deputy Director of Land Records during the year. The charges of nazul maintenance surveyors, Yeotmal, Malkapur and Nandura, were inspected by the Survey Officer.
