Narayan Vaman Tilak, the Christian poet of Maharashtra, has been described as the Tagore of Western India, and is now generally accepted as the greatest Maratha poet of the last seventy years. His metrical version of the life of Christ is read by Hindus and Muhammadans, while his Christian hymns are sung by beggars at the roadside and have made their way also into the hymnody of the West. His patriotism found its inspiration in the Christian faith, for it was his ambition, as Sir Narayan Chandavarkar said of him, "to dedicate himself to the service of his motherland by poetry, politics and social service."
